IN ITS complete version the three acts of this elaborate ballet demand an entire evening for performance. Only in Russia—and several years ago in London—was the entire work given. Dance devotees throughout the world are more familiar with the two small ballets which have been extracted from *Sleeping Beauty*: "Aurora's Wedding" and "Princess Aurora."

On these record sides Leopold Stokowski and his Symphony Orchestra perform excerpts from the complete score—revealing not only the well-known and beloved melodies that have endeared *Sleeping Beauty* to millions, but unfamiliar passages of delightful color as well.

This is a recordrama album. Stokowski himself has written the foreword and in addition, there are four inserted pages of pictures and text, illustrating and narrating the plot.

Sleeping Beauty, destined to be a favorite with two Tzars in turn, tells the familiar fairytale legend of Princess Aurora, enchanted into a hundred year's sleep by an evil fairy. Only the love of a noble and handsome prince can awaken her. The intricacies and complications of the plot are surpassed only by the beauty of its music and its dancing and the magic of its make-believe atmosphere.

The music for Sleeping Beauty was written in

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1889, in the short space of six weeks, although parts of it had been sketched some time before. The libretto, based on the fairy tales of the French poet, Perrault, was written by Alexandrovich Vsevolozhsky. The great Marius Petipa was responsible for the choreography. In January, 1890, the first performance took place at the Marvinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg.

Stokowski's loving and remarkable insight into the intricacies of the art of recording has won him another triumph. For the connoisseur the present album will be doubly rewarding from a reproduction as well as a musical standpoint! Much of Tchaikovsky's most appealing music is included in the complete score of *Sleeping Beauty*, music which receives profound devotion at the artistic hands of Stokowski. Altogether this is an album that will appeal to everyone—young or old, musician or layman. It will be available very shortly on De Luxe Vinylite material.

R^{IMSKY-KORSAKOFF} hased this dramatic and colorful work on Syenkovsky's Oriental tale of *Antar*, a famous Arabic warrior and poet who lived in the sixth century. The work had its first performance in Petrograd on March 22, 1869.

The composer originally classified this masterpiece as his Second Symphony, but later renamed it a Symphonic Suite. "My Antar," he wrote, "was a poem, suite, fairy-tale, story or anything you like, but not a symphony. Its structure in four separate movements was all that made it approach a symphony . . ."

The setting for the story is the desert of Shan, with its desolate ruins of the city of Palmyra. Antar, in a dream, receives the gift of the three great joys of life: the delight of vengeance, the delight of power and the joy of true love. It is the fairy, Gül Nazar, who, in the form of a defenseless gazelle, had been rescued by Antar and who gives the hero these gifts.

Pierre Monteux and the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, who recently recorded lbert's picturesque and exotic *Escules* (M/DM-1173 and V/DV-10). project the *Antar* Symphony with characteristic brilliance and finesse. The variety of subtle tonal color, produced by the greatest of orchestral painters, has been ideally captured in the present recording.

A TRUE FEAST for the ear is provided by Koussevitzky and the Boston Symphony Orchestra with the recording of this brilliant and hauntingly beautiful score. A product of one of France's most eloquent musical craftsmen, *Rapsodie Espagnole* reflects magically all the mystery and intrigue of the Spanish country.

Ravel was of Basque descent and his youth was steeped in the melodies and rhythms of Spain. It was natural that he should turn his musical attention to the Spanish idiom. Manuel de Falla once called him "more Spanish than the Spanish themselves."

The *Rapsodie* was composed in 1907 and had its première a year later at one of the famous Colonne Concerts in Paris under the direction of Eduard Colonne himself.

In four sections, the work is arranged as follows: *Prélude à la Nuit, Malagueña, Habanera* (a re-working of a composition originally written for two pianos) and *Feria* (Fair).

For his latest group of recordings, the distinguished baritone of the Metropolitan turns to one of nautical history's most colorful periods—to the clipper ship era of a hundred years ago, when vigorous trade under sail dotted the seven seas.

The shanty, as an active force in seafaring life, died with the advent of steam. For this was a work-song that accompanied the backbreaking manual labor on shipboard. The shantyman, gifted with a strong sense of rhythm and improvisation, led the rest of the crew, singing the verses of the song in question, while the crewmen, bellowing in answering chorns, swung their bodies in vigorous teamwork.

The gifted American musician and folk-song collector, Tom Scott, has devoted loving care to his arrangements of the eight sea-shanties heard in this album: Blow the Man Down, Rio Grande, Shenandoah, Low Lands, The Drummer and the Cook, Haul-A-Way, Joe, The Drunken Sailor and A-Rovin'. Many of them are sung here in versions which Mr. Scott heard from former sailing ship eaptains at Nantucket and in New York. With all, he has evoked the true atmosphere of the sea with its rolling motion and haunting and mysterious harmonies. Throughout be has maintained the spontaneity of this rich and natural music of the sea.

To the task of projecting the rousing, lusty ballads, Leonard Warren is ideally suited. Already represented on Red Seal records in arias from eleven operas, Warren in this album reaffirms the musical versatility and the exceptional dramatic insight that have won him such acclaim. The millions who know him for his villainous operatic characterizations and for his serious and artistic concert and radio work willbedelighted with his newly recorded offerings.

Mr. Warren's resonant and lavish tones and his dramatic and spirited understanding of the songs he sings make this album something of a classic. Morris Levine conducts the small orchestra of strings, woodwinds, guitar and accordion; a rousing chorus of male voices completes this authentic recording!

DER HIRT AUF DEM FELSEN SCHUBERT

(The Shepherd on the Mountain) (Words by Wilhelm Müller)

Dorothy Maynor, Soprano with George Schick at the Piano David Oppenheim: Clarinet obbligato

One writer has called this lovely Schubert song "a cantata in miniature." On a larger scale than any of his other songs, *Der Hirt auf dem Felsen* calls for the elaborate accompaniment of piano and clarinet. This is one of Schubert's last songs and was written in 1828, the year of his death. Of tender, pastoral feeling, it is ideally projected through the golden tones of Dorothy Maynor's singing. George Schick, responsible for many noble accompaniments for Miss Maynor, is again at the piano, and David Oppenheim lends heautiful clarinet support. Altogether this is one of Miss Maynor's finest recordings.

For his second RCA Victor recording, the Swedish baritone offers two arias from Wagner's opera, *Tannhauser. Blick' ich umher* (Gazing on this august Assembly), occurs in the Hall of the Singers at Wartburg. The Minnesinger, Wolfram, hymns his noble praises of "Love," the theme of the Song Contest. The exquisite *Song to the Evening Star*, beloved to operatic audiences, is also sung by Wolfram. With Elizabeth, he has watched the return of the Pilgrins at sunset. Then, gazing after Elizabeth's retreating form, he takes his minstrel harp and sings this air. As was the case with Mr. Berglund's first recording, Leo Blech again directs the orchestra.

The Fairy's Kiss

THE Fairy's Kiss, Allegorical Ballet in Four Tableaux, Inspired by the Muse of Tchaikovsky." Thus reads the full title of Stravinsky's exquisite ballet, The Fairy's Kiss (Le Baiser de la Fée). Commissioned by the French actressimpresario, Ida Rubinstein, in 1927, it was completed a year later, in time for the commemoration of the thirty-fifth anniversary of Tchaikovsky's death.

For the selection of an appropriate libretto to take the form of a grand 19th century ballet, Stravinsky turned to Hans Christian Anderson's enchanting tale, *The Ice-Maiden*. *The Fairy's Kiss*, with choreography by Bronislava Nijinska, was the result.

The music for the *Divertimento*, heard on these records, consists of a set of pieces taken from the ballet and contains about a third of the complete score. This arrangement was made by Stravinsky in 1934, along with an arrangement of the same music for violin and piano.

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For this tribute to Tchaikovsky's muse, Stravinsky used excerpts from the master's songs and piano compositions as thematic material. As Ingolf Dahl points out in the album's accompanying notes, 'This music is full of real feeling, but it is not Tchaikovsky's feeling. Stravinsky has, as it were, de-neuroticized Tchaikovsky by superimposing his own objective attitude on the material. The techniques with which he does this are of inexhaustible variety. . . ."

The story of *The Fairy's Kiss* takes place in the Swiss Alps during the nineteenth century. A mother, carrying her infant over a glacier during a violent snowstorm, succumbs to the fury of the storm. The Ice Maiden, ruler of the Ice World, bestows a kiss on the infant. Later, rescuers find the child. He grows up and is betrothed to a miller's daughter. At a village fair, the youth has his palm read by a soothsayer who attracts him strangely. But she disappears before he can find out who she is.

Later, the soothsayer re-appears and reveals herself to be the Ice Maiden. Once more she kisses him, and from this time forth he is destined to follow her through her world of ice and snow.

This is the first recording of one of the masterpieces of contemporary music. Moreover, it is the first release of Igor Stravinsky conducting his own music. The *Divertimento* will appeal to an exceptionally wide audience: to the balletlover, to those whose musical interest centers about the rich romanticism of Tchaikovsky, and last—but assuredly not least—to those who feel and understand the creative force of one of this era's most tremendous musical spokesmen!

HANDEL'S Concerto for Harp and Orchestra is the principal work in this album which also includes three smaller compositions. The distinguished harp virtuoso, Parisian-born Marcel Grandjany, receives the background assistance of Jean Paul Morel and the RCA Victor Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Grandjany has supplemented his interpretation of the classic work with a cadenza in the Handelian style.

Handel wrote his *Concerto for Harp* in 1735 and it was first performed by the harpist, John Powell, during the intermission of a performance of the oratorio, *Alexander's* Feast.

The other three works heard in this album are Antoine Francisque's Pavane et Branslés from Le Trésor d'Orphée, Gottfried Kirchhoff's Aria and Rigaudon and François Couperin's Soeur Monique. The comparatively small literature for harp has been greatly enhanced by Marcel Grandjany's loving transcriptions. Lute, organ and harpsichord. respectively, are the instruments from which he has transcribed these delightful compositions of the seventeenth century.

BRIGG FAIR

An English Rhapsody

Brigg Fair is based on a Lincolnshire folk song of the same name discovered by the pianist, Percy Grainger. Composed in 1907, it had its first performance at Basle under the direction of Hermann Suter. With the performance of this lovely English Rhapsody, Sir Thomas Beecham, Bart., brings another of Delius' incomparable paintings of his native land to the fore. One of the most ardent spokesmen for the neglected composer, Sir Thomas has succeeded in projecting, for more than a decade, the exquisite, pastoral beauty of Delius' scores to the world of music.

Recorded in England, the release of the present album follows the recently issued *Delius Society Set* (M/DM-1185). *Brigg Fair*, filled with old world charm and color, has been recorded on vinylite (V-14, \$6.00; DV-14, \$5.00) as well as shellac (M-1206, \$4.50; DM-1206, \$3.50) and will be a delightful addition to your record library!

A RTHUR FIEDLER and the Boston "Pops" Orchestra chalk up another triumph with this gay and tricky score by Benjamin Britten. The career of England's foremost contemporary musical figure and composer of the sensational *Peter Grimes* has been a tremendously versatile one. Opera, concert, films and the theatre have been greatly enriched by his contributions in recent years.

Mr. Britten wrote his *Matinées Musicales* and *Soirées Musicales* for the well-known American dance enthusiast, Lincoln Kerstein, and his American Ballet Theatre.

For subject matter, he turned to the gay opera huffa wit and sparkle of that master of them all, Gioacchino Rossini. William Tell and Pechés de Vieillesse, the latter a delightful collection of piano pieces, are the works from which Britten's themes have been derived.

Matinées Musicales, subtitled Second Suite of Five Movements from Rossini, consist of the fol-

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SIXTH RELEASE

WITH the latest series of Heritage recordings, RCA Victor presents five great personalities from the operatic world of yesterday: Marcel Journet (this is the second of his Heritage discs), Marcella Sembrich, Titta Ruffo, Riccardo Martin and Otto Goritz. Some rare treats are in store for collectors this month. All recordings are on De Luxe Vinylite Material; the list price of each is \$2.50.

MARCEL JOURNET, Bass — Donizetti: Anathème de Balthazar (Balthazar's Curse) from La Favorita (Act II); Adam: Chanson Militaire (The Song of the Soldiers) from Le Châlet. Recorded with orchestra; the former, a first edition, in 1917, the latter, in 1910, Record No. 15-1026.

The Donizetti aria, recorded by the great French basso, has been lying dormant in our vaults since the date it was recorded over thirty years ago. It is now released for the first time anywhere. The reverse side of this record is a collectors' item which was in the old Victor catalogue only a very short time and then withdrawn.

MARCELLA SEMBRICH, Soprano—Donizetti: O Luce di quest' anima (Guiding Star of Love) from Linda di Chamounix (Act 1); Verdi: Ernani involami (Ernani, fly with me) from Ernani (Act 1). Recorded with Orchestra, 1908. Record No. 15-1027.

The beloved Galician-born coloratura soprano made her debut in Athens, Greece, in 1877. She sang the role of *Lucia* at the Metropolitan's second performance in 1883, and sang regularly there from 1898– 1909. In later years, Mme Sembrich was active as a teacher at the Juilliard School in New York and at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia. Two of her finest interpretations appear on this record. The former has everything in the way of coloratura embellishment for which she was so famous; the latter is more dramatic.

Titta Ruffo

TITTA RUFFO, Baritone-Verdi: Per me giunto è il dí supremo (That Day Supreme) from Don Carlos (Act IV); Ettore Titta: Canzone-Dai canti d'amore (Ballad, "A Song of Love"). Recorded with Orchestra, the former in 1908, the latter in 1912. Record No. 15-1028.

Titta—not Ruffo—was the family name of this musical group. A sister, Fosca, had quite a career as leading soprano in many European opera honses. A brother, Ettore, was the successful composer of the opera *Malena* as well as numerous songs, of which the ballad on the "B" side of this record is perhaps the most famous. The *Don Carlos* aria is one of the opera's most thrilling. These are welcome gens from the career of one of the most remarkable singing artists in history!

RICCARDO MARTIN, Tenor—Massenet: O Souverain, O Juge, O Père! (Almighty Lord, My Judge, My Father) from Le Cid (Act III); Mascagni: Addio alla madre (Turiddu's Farewell) from Cavalleria Rusticana. Recorded with Orchestra, 1910. Record No. 15-1029.

The famed American tenor, whose real name was Hugh Whitfield, was born in Hopkinsville, Kentucky, in 1879. He was at one time a composition student of Edward MacDowell. Martin made his debut in Nantes, France, in 1904, and then appeared in Verona and Milan. He made his American debut with the French Opera Co. in New Orleans and sang with the Metropolitan Opera from 1907 to 1915. Martin was particularly at home in French roles, where his masterful phrasing and exquisite diction made him a prime favorite.

OTTO GORITZ, Baritone-Brüll: Bombardon's Song-Wie anders war es! (How times have changed) from The Golden Cross (Act II); Wagner. Wolfram's Ansprache: Blick' ich umher (Wolfram's eulogy of love: Gazing about, upon this fair assembly) from Tannhäuser (Act II). The Brüll aria was recorded in May, 1913, with Orchestra; the Wagnerian excerpt in Jan., 1910, with String

Quartet and Harp, Record No. 15-1030.

Both of these selections were recorded during the Prussian baritone's tenure at the Met. Otto Goritz was especially noted for his Wagnerian character roles as well as with parts in light German operas. The charming Viennese opera, *The Golden Cross*, enjoyed great popularity in Europe during the early years of the century, and it was for this that its composer, Ignaz Brüll, was especially noted.

POPULAR AND INTERNATIONAL

SOME bright new popular albums take to the market this month, a varied assortment that will satisfy many a taste. If it's Blues you're after you won't want to miss that jazz technician of



the keyboard, Earl Hines, in his album entitled Stormy Monday Blues, which features Billy Eckstine rendering the vocals. Recorded back before Billy became such a star attraction, they evidence all the finesse and superb vocal talent that have skyrocketed him to fame. (P-212; \$4.00, list price. A) Then there's Count Basie and his Piano Rhythms, a terrific package featuring the beloved Count and his instrumentalists in such favorites as Shine on Harvest Moon, I Never Knew and others (P-200; \$4.00, list price). A

Broadway—old and new—is on the record scene this month. Maestro Al Goodman, one of the foremost interpreters of operetta, brings out all the charm and nostalgie flavor of Romberg's *Desert Song* in Album K-12; (\$4.00 list price). A Earl Wrightson, Frances Greer and Jimmy Carroll highlight with beautiful vocalizing. And—of all people—the adored Bea Lillie shines forth with Jack Haley in an album from their latest Broadway success, *Inside U.S.A.*, a sophisticated and witty bit of fun.
