Occasionally, as restrictions relaxed, people like The Platters, the late Sam Cooke, Fats Domino and Little Richard topped both black and white charts. But people like this are rare and their tunes exceptional. Standard practice is for some "grey" artist to snaffle the tune and record themselves - with no acknowledgement.

Unfortunately most imitators achieve technical perfection at the expense of "soul"; the vitality loses itself in a web of technical stiffness.

JAMES BROWN currently heads one of the biggest nightclub-cum-concert acts in American show business, touring as a package deal. To quote from inside the cover of one of his albums called "Pure Dynamite", "During any 30-day period James Brown will give away over 5000 autographed pictures; make gifts of over 1000 pairs of cuff links to some of his lucky fans: wear 120 freshly laundered shirts; change uniforms over 150 times; wear more than 30 pairs of shoes; perform over 4,800

minutes on stage and bandstand; sing and play over 960 songs; play more shows . . . than any other musician or singer in the business today; lose up to seven pounds each performance; write several new songs; rehearse new songs for his show; prepare for his next recording session; pose for publicity pictures etc., etc., etc."

In other words Jaines Brown IS ON IN A BIG WAY in America, although he's almost unheard of here With P. J. Proby it's pre-cisely the reverse. Now although I think Proby is THE most fantastically talented, hard-working vocalist to visit Australia, I do think it was a little raw of him to copy the entire James Brown show, 20-piece orchestra and all. The arrangements, the extravagant costum-

ing (not the same style, naturally ... only Proby), the selection of songs, the lighting, the entrance and even the lengthy, suspenseful introduction . . . word for word. Perceptive of him to realise the overall effect of a cleverly planned and executed show, the value of lighting and so on - but a swipe nevertheless.

On a slightly different level, one has only to glance at the credits on locally produced record labels to realise how much material local artists have "borrowed". There's only the odd duo, trio or band around with the ability to write their own material, and even these don't often use it. Many of them, like The Twilights, struggled hard to earn the name "good, but a copying group" and are having difficulty losing

Some, like Bobby and Laurie, combine both drastic re-arranging, and writing their own material.

Others, such as NORMIE ROWE, borrow heavily from such people as Chuck Jackson. In "Tell Him I'm Not Home" and "Breaking Point" the re-arranging, if any, was small enough to go unnoticed. "Que Sera Sera"
