

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


ALBUM OF THE WEEK

TEENA MARIE NAKED TO THE WORLD EPIC

Teena really goes all out on this hit packed LP, including orchestral and horn arrangements on most of her selfpenned and produced songs. "Trick Bag" is a bright up tempo dance groove that's ready for the airwaves, while cohort Rick James contributes vocals on the mid tempo funk rocker "Call Me." "Crocodile Tears" is another hot radio bound number, once again underscoring Teena's well developed and occasionally innovative songwriting talent.

SINGLES

MAGIC LADY—BETCHA CAN'T LOSE (WITH MY LOVE)—MOTOWN— Magic Lady debuts with this rock solid arrangement from songwriter/ producer Michael Stokes. Coming across with a powerful contemporary R&B sound, the group is picking up adds out of the box!

PRINCESS AND STARBREEZE—BABY IT'S OVER—MCA—Lead vocalist and all-around talent Princess is getting a lot of attention with her aggressive, driving sound, a sound that she powers with her own extra funky bass plucking. Shades of Keith Sweat and Prince are evident in this up tempo, multi-format chart buster!

CHRIS JASPER—ONE TIME LOVE—CBS ASSOCIATED—Jasper finds himself in the midst of an exploding solo career after the hot debut release "Superbad" took off earlier this year. Offering another piping hot, hit bound groover with strong dance sensibilities, the Isley associate has another winner.







TAKE 6—DOO BE DOO WOP BOP—REPRISE—Take 6 takes contemporary Gospel up another level with their beautifully harmonious accapella vocals in, count 'em, six parts. Drawing from influences such as The Persuasions and The Manhattan Transfer, the group offers squeaky clean selections like "Gold Mine" and "Spread Love." An LP as impressive technically as it is artistically.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK—HANGIN' TOUGH—COLUMBIA—This teen vocal group takes a solid R&B direction on the Maurice Starr produced album. "Please Don't Go Girl" is an outstanding ballad that brings the young Michael Jackson to mind, it's already breaking big. "The Right Stuff" picks up the pace for the dancers and has a fresh Urban and Pop sound that is definitely headed for heavy radio action. "Hangin' Tough" is a hard rockish jam with strong Rap sensibilities, proving that the kids may be teen heartthrobs, but they're still tough!!!

JOHN WHITEHEAD—I NEED MONEY BAD—MERCURY/ POLYGRAM—Whitehead is a serious singer. His first single release is "I Need Money Bad," a theme most of us can relate to well enough. The vocalists depth of talent shines brightly again on the gorgeous composition "Pick Yourself Up," a quiet, reflective cut with loads of style and class. "Body Move" is a jammin' up tempo selection!





KEITH SWEAT NOSWEAT

inger/songwriter Keith Sweat finally quit his 9-to-5 on the New York stock market last month. But unlike other colleagues who may have left due to the rise and fall of stock shares, Harlem-born Keith walked because he's just had the No.1 record on the black music charts. His debut single, "I Want Her," has become one of the biggest records in the nation over the past few months and his first LP, the hit-filled *Make It Last Forever* just turned gold on its way to platinum status.

Add to all of that the fact that Keith's second single, "Something Just Ain't Right" is a major add at Black radio across the country and you might have some inkling as to why Keith decided it was time to make that move and solidify his career in music. "It was rough trying to do it all," said 26-year old Keith, "working all the time and promoting the record so once my tour was set, I knew I could leave the job."

Keith admits that he didn't expect "I Want Her" to turn into as big a hit as it has. "I knew something was going to happen with the record but not all this. Actually, when I was recording it, I had a bunch of friends in the studio and I watched their reactions. That gave me a pretty good indication of whether the music was happening."

Keith's journey into the recording studios was no overnight occurrence. After a number of years of preparation encouraged by his family—Keith became lead singer for a local New York band, Jamilah, affording him the chance to share the stage of the famed Apollo Theater with artists the caliber of Teddy Pendergrass and The Whispers.

He laughed as he recalls that during his formative years, his mother made him sing with a swing band at a local club. "She used to really encourage me and my two older brothers and two younger sisters to sing all the time," Keith smiled. Obviously the family support paid off, although Keith is under no illusion that the kind of success he's having now was only achieved by paying dues.

After three years with Jamilah, Keith left the group: "I decided I should put

my hard-earned money into making some demos for myself but I soon found out that breaking into the business isn't the easiest thing to do. People take your tapes and never listen to them!"

In the process of playing his music for industry personnel, Keith met Rahiem LeBlanc and Herb Lane, two members of the group G.Q., who gave him the opportunity to record at their studio in the Bronx. Publicist Judy Hutson, a mutual friend, introduced Keith to Vincent Davis, head of Vintertainment Recordings Inc. Davis knew

that Keith clearly had something to offer with his music and although the original plan was for an initial 12" single release, Elektra Records—with whom Davis has a production deal for Vintertainment gave the green light for an entire LP. "I guess everyone felt strongly about what they heard," Keith agreed.

Keith credits Davis with having the belief in his talent that allowed him the opportunity to produce his debut LP, with longtime friend Teddy Riley contributing as co-producer of half of the LP's eight cuts. "Vincent told me, 'do what you want,' and I felt great having that much freedom. It was a lot easier than having someone tell me how my music should sound."

For the subject matter in his songs (six of which he co-wrote with Riley), Keith concentrated on love relationships "because that's something everyone can relate to," noting that much of the material is derived from his own personal experience. Even the choice to cover The Dramatics' '70s hit "In The Rain" came from Keith's own life experiences. "You know the old saying that 'men aren't supposed to cry'—well, that song's all about the hurt men feel sometimes," Keith reflects.

Describing himself as "single yet attached," Keith maintained that he's coping with all the sudden activity in his life. "To be honest with you, I haven't even had time to think about what's happening. It's just been about trying to fit everything into a tight schedule."

Keith's spent time criss-crossing the country as well as making a lightning trip to the U.K. where he's been voted No. 1 New Artist of 1987 by readers of a leading Black music publication there. However, the pressures of newfound international stardom haven't had any noticeable effect on the genial Mr. Sweat.

"I haven't had to deal with the kind of pressure of being stopped in the street yet—because I'm literally onstage, offstage and gone!" he laughed, referring to his non-stop itinerary. "Right now, I'm performing all the time—mostly in clubs. But I expect we'll be doing concerts next month," said Keith, who added that he hasn't even begun to think about his next LP, anticipating at least a couple more singles from his debut.

With all the immediacy of a No. 1 hit record, has Keith changed his lifestyle? "I really haven't had time to change anything!" he smiled. "I'm the same guy and really nothing's changed, except for the fact that I'm performing all the time now. It's tough not getting much rest but I don't see myself slowing down any time soon."

And that's not going to happen as long as Keith Sweat's distinctive brand of strong urban contemporary, blending soulful ballads and slammin' funk, continues to receive the kind of response that's propelling Keith to become a major artist for the '90s.

WKYS Sale To Minority Group Reported Near

WASHINGTON: Widespread industry speculation as to the new ownership of WKYS, the market-leading NBC urban outlet here, was fueled by reports of a nearly finalized sale to Boston-based Albimar Communications Limited Partnership. A price tag of slightly less than \$50 million was said to be offered by the minority-owned broadcast investment group, controlled by a Bertram Leea co-chair of Jesse Jackson's national campaign finance committee—and E. W. Finley, Jr.

Through limited partnerships, Albimar currently has controlling interest in three stations and was among four groups still in the running for WKYS at the late February bidding deadline. Other finalists were Inner City Broadcasting, New York; Tak Communications, Vienna, Va.;

and Washington FM Radio Partners. Dropping out of the bidding as the price tag escalated was Merit Communications, which counted among its partners Muhammad Ali and Don King.

National Black Media Coalition Chairman Pluria Marshall, whose organization obtained a March 1986 commitment from NBC to sell at least one of its radio properties to a minority purchaser, was highly vocal in his opposition to the sale of WKYS to Tak, owned by a Pakistani-born entrepreneur.

NBC Radio President Randy Bongarten confirmed that negotiations were underway with a buyer for WHYS, but would not identify the group.

Contacted by BRE, WKYS PD Donnie Simpson commented: "Whatever happens with the sale of the station, there probably won't be any major changes here at KYS. We're a top-rated station." He added, "NBC has been great to me and I've enjoyed being a part of NBC. But just maybe I'll like working for a smaller organization now...I know I will."

6th Annual 'Budweiser Showdown'

HOUSTON: "The Budweiser Showdown," a major R&B musical talent search competition, recently kicked off in 41 major markets across the country. LOS ANGELES: Local black radio stations and press turned out in full force at a March 19 fundraising rally for presidential candidate Rev. Jesse Jackson. The event, held at the Baldwin Hills home of black businessman, Bondie Gambrell, became Jackson's biggest fundraiser to date. Nearly 1,000 affluent black supporters poured over \$200,000 into Jackson's campaign coffers.

Jackson was in town to gear up his campaign for the June 7 primary in which California has been historically significant in determining a presidential nominee

To continue to do well in the

primaries and capture the nomination crown, Jackson has called on black radio, which he referred to as "the kingmaker."

Said Jackson: "It was black radio in fact that was most responsible for now deceased Harold Washington being elected mayor of Chicago. Black radio supported a boycott that toppled then-Mayor Jane Byrne and followed that with a push for voter registration."

Cliff Winston, P.D. for KJLH/ Los Angeles told BRE: "Black radio **does** have the power to influence people and get the registration of the voters. We, as black people must take elections seriously. Our task as a black radio station is to mobilize the black community to get out and vote. Not necessarily just to vote for Jacksonbut to get out and vote. However, once that is done the polls have revealed that over 95% of the blacks who do vote, vote for Jackson."

Jesse Jackson added, "My first interview was with Eddie Castleberry of WDAS in Philadelphia, not with Walter Cronkite or Dan Rather. Black radio is the kingmaker that holds the keys to the kingdom."

LOS ANGELES: It's official! Michael Jackson has become the first solo artist to earn four No. 1 singles from one album, thanks to the current #1 position of "Man In The Mirror" on Billboard's pop singles chart.

Sales figures also indicate that Jackson's Bad LP, which has remained in the top 5 of the charts since its release 27 weeks ago, is selling at an even swifter pace at this point than his record-breaking Thriller.

Stricken by a severe throat infection during the St. Louis leg of his "BAD" tour, Jackson was forced to cancel one of two scheduled concerts there. But the consummate showman was able to perform at his two weekend dates in Indianapolis.





In part two of our series on the good ole' production studio, we'll take a look at boards, or if you feel more technically inclined, *mixing consoles*.

SILENCE AT LAST!

Thank goodness, the days of crackling, noisy pots (volume controls) are over. In the last generation of boards the audio signal itself went through the pot. If the pot was dirty, that annoying static was heard when the level was changed. In the latest generation of mixers the volume is controlled by using a logic type circuit (an offshoot of today's computer micro-chip technology). To make a long story short, no more crackling volume controls. There are still some fine boards with the older technology on the market, but the potential of noisy pots still exists.

Another plus to the high-tech boards

is that the mike or any other device can be switched on and off without putting a chilling pop on the air.

Looking at this from an engineering point of view, downtime is radically reduced for two reasons.

1. Less time is spent in replacing pots 2. Most of the new boards have plugin modules. If a channel should go out, the engineer just replaces the module. Most of these boards have external power supplies. Its a good idea to have redundancy in this area, because a blown power supply could put you out of business.

There are quite a few high quality, high-tech boards on the market. I'm sure you know that they "ain't" cheap, but there's more than one way to skin the cat.

First, let's take a look at Carvin, a California-based company. Carvin has become a familiar name to musicians and sound companies. In addition to manufacturing fine guitars and guitar amplifiers, they also build recording/live sound boards. These are hi-tech boards with a budget price tag.

Carvin's MX1644 is a board with 16 inputs, and 4,2, or 1 channel(s) out. It has 20 db headroom, and a quiet -128 dbv input noise. This board sells for less than \$2000! You can add a 9 band built in graphic equalizer for around \$200. I'm sure Carvin would be glad to send you a complete catalog if you call them at 1-800-845-2235.

Another great budget system is the Tascam M-500 series. I personally found the early Tascam boards somewhat noisy, but they seem to have solved that problem. Their boards are around the \$2000 mark according to how many bells and whistles you want. One nice thing is that you can start with the basic system, and expand on it as your needs expand. As a matter of fact most of the hi-tech recording boards are expandable. Tascam is Teac's professional division, and you can call them at 213-726-0303.

These boards are recording boards. With a little *creative* engineering they can be used as back-up for on air operations, but not as a full-time on air board.

Now, for those lucky folks with a healthy budget, there's always the Pacific Recorders BMX or ABX series, and the Auditronics boards. The great thing here is they are both broadcast, and/or production mixers. Watch your engineer's eyes light up when you mention the prospect of having identical boards in both the on-air and the production studios! Of course these boards are expandable, and promise years of low maintenance operation. I feel that such an investment will pay off in the future.

Next week we'll take a look at speakers, mikes, and power amps. Then pull all of this together with a few complete system recommendations for well under \$10,000.



WHATEVER HAPPENED TO ...?

MEL "KISS ME, HOLD ME, THRILL ME" CARTER

In 1965, "Hold Me, Thrill Me, Kiss Me" was an international hit for Mel Carter. Many artists have covered this tune, but no one has outclassed Mel Carter's version. The song was first recorded by a pop artist named Karen Chandler on Decca Records in the early 50s.

We should all remember 1965-the year the new Voting Rights Act was signed. 1965 was also the year that the Watts Riots erupted, 35 people died and property damage was estimated at \$200 million.

And, that same year, one of the most popular songs was "Hold Me, Thrill Me, Kiss Me" by Mel Carter and it was right on time for the general market.

Every now and then you hear about a young talent who comes to Hollywood unknown and goes straight to the top. This was the case with Mel Carter in the early 60s. Never an R&B force in the industry, he was nonetheless a proud Black brother who made it big on the pop scene.

Mel Carter was born in Cincinnati, attended the same school system as the Isley Brothers, He also knew the students who had the hit, "So Young" in 1961. Mel grew up listening to Cincinnati's pop stations and of course WCIN.

As a teenager, almost at once he became leading soloist and assistant director of the greater Cincinnati Youth and Young Adult Choral Union-noted

members of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses of America-resulting in his award in 1957 as the nation's top tenor in the gospel field. He also formed his own gospel group, The Carvetts. Mel hasn't lost his roots. Today he performs at various gospel events and workshops in Los Angeles.

Before moving to the Coast, he had worked with Quincy Jones on Mercury Records. His first R&B hit was "When A Boy Falls In Love" on Sam Cooke's label, Derby Records. In 1963 this song was number 30 on the Billboard chart.

Mel Carter's first appearance on wax was at the age of four-thanks to his grandmother, who held him up to the microphone while he sang out a popular Black spiritual. It was in one of those 25-cent recording booths generally found in penny arcades, but it encouraged Mel's family enough to launch his career.

At age nine, following years of experience entertaining at the church functions and on local shows, Mel thrillingly accepted an engagement with the great Lionel Hampton at Cincinnati's Regal Theater. He had entered and won an amateur contest at the theater, resulting in a regular spot with Hampton, who was obviously impressed with young Mel's talent.

Anxious to see new sights, Mel decided to join the air force at sixteen. Following his tenure in the service, Mel seriously embarked on a singing career.

Mel came to the BRE office recently with his manager of 25 years, Zelda Sands. Zelda believes strongly in her artist and told me of the hard times back in the '60s when she had to fight major department stores to carry Mel's albums. "They didn't want to carry his albums because his picture was on it," she said. Eventually she won.

In addition to night clubs, concerts and recordings, Mel has been seen in many commercials, movies, variety, comedy and dramatic TV shows. Mel says, "I've never been approached by an R&B producer, but I'm open to all ideas." Sounds like a j-o-b for Al McKay, formerly of Earth, Wind and Fire.

Best of luck to the gentle gentleman, Mr. Mel Carter.

COSBY WILL HOST PLAYBOY JAZZ FEST

Bill Cosby, who has emceed seven of the previous nine Playboy Jazz Festivals at the Hollywood Bowl, will return again this year to host the Tenth Anniversary weekend, June 18-19.

Previously informed by Playboy's PR arm that this year's emcee would be comedian Mort Sahl, BRE readers were so advised in our March 18 issue. However, since the original announcement of the line-up, there have been changes in Cost schedule permitting him to appear. "We are delighted that Cos will again join us," said Dick Rosenzweig, the festival's exec-in-charge. "His vast knowledge of jazz and his casual, enthusiastic stage presence have made him synonymous with the festival."

MILES DAVIS GETTING

Trumpter Miles Davis is recuperating in a New York City hospital from an infection in his leg caused by an injury sustained while touring France, it was announced March 15. Davis, 62, is in good condition and is expected to remain hospitalized until the first week in April.

His condition forced him to miss an appearance at the 30th Annual Grammy Awards, March 2. In addition, he has had to cancel concert dates in Chicago, Detroit, Hawaii, New Zealand and Australia. According to his manager, Peter Shukat, all of Davis' affected dates will be rescheduled, if possible.

The tour, which kicked off in February with concerts in France and Italy, is the first in which Miles and his band use state-of-the-art light and sound stage technology.

Davis was hospitalized in 1975 for a hip implant because of injuries sustained in a car accident. His doctors say that his latest infection is unrelated to that operation. Following his recuperation, he will resume the tour, which highlights music from his Warner Brothers album, *Siesta*.

COLUMBIA JAZZ SERIES TOPS MILLION MARK

Columbia Records' Jazz Masterpiece Series moves into its second year with record sales for reissues of America's premier art form. More than one million combined units have shipped on the first five groups of releases, 41 albums (and three commercial samplers) chronicling the work of Louis Armstrong, count Basie, Dave Brubeck, Charlie Christian, Miles Davis, Duke Ellington, Erroll Garner, Benny Goodman, Billie Holiday, Charles Mingus, Thelonious Monk and many other greats.

Columbia, the only major record label to maintain a steady jazz profile since world War 11, is in the process of digitally remastering all the classics in their library.

Along with the success of their record reissues, Columbia's monthly syndicated "Jazz Masterpieces Radio Show," hosted by Wynton Marsalis and produced by Radio Works, Inc., of Los Angeles, debuted in December and is now heard on nearly 20 radio stations around the country.







uring a routine record review session at BRE late last year (in the midst of working on our year-end issue, in fact) staff writer Duff Marlowe played an LP by an artist who was virtually unknown in the music industry. I got the opportunity to meet Keith Sweat recently. With him and Vincent Davis, president of Vintertainment, I talked about personal relationships and how Sweat's LP seemed to reflect my own life and experiences. He agreed with me that when you the see one you want...acknowledge it!

I want to thank Keith Sweat for writing songs that have made such an impact on my own life. And I want to take this opportunity to thank him on behalf of all the people who helped make "I Want Her" into a #1 chart-topper. When it comes to music and love, it never pays to be jaded. Wouldn't you agree?




