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
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
BRE CONFERENCE CO-CHAIRPERSONS


"Sidney (Miller, *BRE* publisher) has always been a person who has been unafraid to explore and teach

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

February Gold Sparse At RIAA

There are fewer happy artists this February than last year. Those gold plaques representing RIAA certification for gold albums can be hung on only eight walls this year, compared to 13 in February 90.

Of the eight gold album certifications issued, only three went to black acts. Ice Cube's *Kill at Will*, on Priority, *The Boys* on Mo-

town and C & C Music Factory's Gonna Make You Sweat, on Columbia.

In the gold single category, four singles were certified in both '90 and '91. This year three of the four came from black acts. They were After 7's "Can't Stop;" Mariah Carey's "Someday," and Janet Jackson's "Love Will Never Do (Without You)."

Black artists were shut out of the platinum category, but two multi-platinum certifications were awarded. Johnny Gill and Mariah Carey's self-titled albums hit that mark.

The RIAA is likely to make some others happy, however with the introduction this month of the video single award. Gold, platinum or multi-platinum video singles at a maximum running time

> of 15 minutes with no more than two songs, qualify for this category of certification.

> Certification requirements are sales of 25,000 units for Gold and 50,000 units for platinum. Multi-platinum video singles are certified at 100,000 units and at additional 50,000 unit increments. The video single award category is now in effect for all existing releases.

Beginning April 1, 1991, the certifications requirement for long-form music videos will increase. Long-form videos will require the sale of 50,000 units for

gold; 100,000 units for platinum and 200,000 units for multi-platinum certification. Long-form videos are


defined as titles that have not been exhibited theatrically prior to their release on video cassette or video disc.

Jay Berman, pres, RIAA, states "Video singles will have a tremendous impact and will further enhance the importance of music videos as a marketing tool for the industry. We hope the certification of video singles will create enough excitement to spur sales of the recording.'


As always, Arista led the way, pulling out all the stops in a splashy dinner show the night before the Grammys.

Janet's New World Order

At no time during his many references to the "New World Order" in the Middle East has President Bush made any mention of Janet Jackson. However, Jackson's \$32 million recording contract with Virgin Records has done for music industry dealmaking what the allied victory over Iraq did in the Persian Gulf: reshuffled the deck just a bit. Things are different now; what is being called the richest record deal in the history of the business belongs not to Madonna, Springsteen, Prince or even Michael Jackson, but to his little sister, Jan. Even E.F. Hutton is paying attention

With the deal, Jackson has emerged as a major player in a business where men who play

hard ball are deemed driven and brilliant, while the women who play the same game are often labelled "bitchy" and "hard to work with." As if Jackson's big deal isn't already rich enough, the contract reportedly includes a clause that requires her to be paid additional major monies if Virgin is sold, a rumor that has made the rounds lately. If that happens, the settlement could make Jackson the Oprah Winfrey of pop music, in total control of an empire worth millions.

In any case, the question burning the lips of many in the business is this: how did Jackson parlay two (albeit successful) albums and a famous last name into \$32 million?

Well, timing is everything. Jackson and associates commenced shopping at a time when, despite cries of national recession, rich entertainment deals and acquisitions have reached a

frenzied peak. Ridiculously big deals like Sony's purchase of CBS Records, the merger of Time Inc. and Warner Brothers, the sales of A&M and Island to Polygram. MCA's sale to Matsushita. which triggered David Geffen's celebrated billiondollar triumph, all served to set the stage. Suddenly, it didn't seem so ridiculous to ask for \$10 million per album, as Jackson's people were reportedly demanding during the bidding war that included several majors.

On Jackson's part, it didn't hurt that her debut world tour last year was a huge success. The dates gave across-the-board credibility to an act previously thought to be merely a video image. Whether or not label heads took this into account, Jackson consistently filled major venues in the U.S., Europe and Japan with a ferocity that usually translates into record sales.

Most importantly, Jackson has sold records. Her *Control* LP sold eight million copies worldwide, while *Rhythm Nation* has currently logged some six million. Not too shabby.

Though several labels expressed interest in Jackson, sources say Virgin had the inside tract from the onset mainly because of its penchant for doing stupid money deals and its image as an artist-conscious label in the tradition of early Warner Brothers and Jackson's former label, A&M.

Of course, the skeptics bought their tickets to this show early, and while all of them think it's only fair that Jackson profits from a Virgin sale—after all, her presence makes such a deal all the more attractive—many voiced doubt that Virgin can recoup the price it paid for three Jackson albums. They argue that while the last two continued on page 44

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



JAZZ NOTES

Marcus Roberts Alone With Three Giants



Legends are not born but evolve through exploits. Jelly Roll Morton, Duke Ellington and Thelonious Monk were the inspiration for jazz pianist Marcus Roberts. His third album for Novus/RCA is entitled Alone With Three Giants and serves as Roberts' first solo recital recording.

"I selected the works of Morton, Ellington and Monk because I see them as complete pianists. But each of them had their own personal style. With Jelly Roll, his music was well organized and based on orchestral concepts. He was there at the beginning. He's one of the early pianists who influenced everyone from Ellington to **Art Tatum** to Monk.

"I chose to include Duke on this project because he's a logical descendant of Jelly, who expanded on Morton's style. Both he and Duke developed all types of styles—from duos to triosthey did everything. Monk came straight out of Ellington, but developed his own unique individuality and technique. All three were fine composers and major influences on how we perceive jazz today."

Originally from Jacksonville, FL, he began his formal training on piano at the age of 12. After nine years of classical piano studies, including four years as a music major with Leonidus Lipovetsky at Florida State University, Roberts found himself winning several local music competitions and won acclaim from the governor of the state. Continuing his craft, he soon caught the ear of trumpeter Wynton Marsalis in 1985 and was asked to replace the departing Kenny Kirkland. He remained with the group for six years before leaving. During that time, in 1987, Roberts won the first Thelonious Monk International Jazz Competicontinued on page 44



BILL COSBY—MY APPRECIATION—VERVE/POLYGRAM—Once again Bill Cosby has found a way of making himself more of a feature in the public eye. For now Cosby drops his thesbian skills to accommodate one of his lifetime loves, music. On this album Quincy Jones supplies the liner notes, so you know that this album must feature good music. Whether the song was written by Cosby, like "Camille," the opening song, or like "Have A Little Talk With Jesus," a song featuring Mavis Staples on lead, the sound is inspiring. With "Running Bear" and the title track, this album is always interesting and should suit most new age and even jazz fans. Demos: Adults.

DAVID HOFFMAN—ON FIRE—BRICK CITY—This classy album showcases the trumpet playing talents of David Hoffman. Soft notes accompany Hoffman as he creates the mood with each song. Opening with "Running The Race," you can feel that more magical songs will follow, and they do. "Chicago Theme" and "Dave's Groove" are superb cuts that any music lover should be able to relate to. Going on his performance on this album, Hoffman deserves to blare his own trumpet. Demos: Jazz Lovers.

COURTNEY PINE—WITHIN THE REALMS OF OUR DREAMS—ANTILLES—This talented British saxophonist displays why he has been so highly touted by giving a superb performance on this album. With 10 solid songs featured, there is something for all jazz lovers. "Time To Go Home" and "A Ragamuffin and His Lance" are records that really strike a chord and should further add to Pine's already great reputation. Demos: Jazz Lovers.

SUPERHOT SUPERACTIVE

Looking at radio add action this week, we find last week's Single of the Week "Your Love—Part 2" leading the way with 39 adds, more than any other single. Keith Sweat is keeping radio programmers happy, and that keeps Elektra execs happy, too. Credit KGFJ-AM, KHRN-FM, KIDZ-AM, KJLH-FM, KKFX-AM, and WYLD-FM.

Keith Washington is also a favorite among stations, with **38** of them adding his latest release on the Qwest label entitled "Kissing You." An Important Single last week, the vocalist demonstrates that ballads are "in" and apparently so is Washington, at least according to pds from such radio stations as KCXL-AM, KIIZ-AM, KKDA-FM, KMJQ-FM, WGCI-FM, and WHUR-FM.

"A Heart Is A House For Love," by The Dells, is another tune that was an Important Single last week. This week, the Virgin recording act gains another 27 adds, which adds to the credibility of this group's potential. Just ask stations like KIDZ-AM, KIIZ-AM, WAAA-AM, WDAO-AM, WDAS-FM, and WDKX-FM.

Epic's Tony Terry earned 19 adds this week, pushing the single "With You" higher on the chart. Seems programmers can't do without the song. Some of the stations on it include WACR-FM, WBIL-FM, WBLX-FM, WGOV-FM, and WJFX-FM.—J.R.

to do session work, Wilson-James was invited to the United Kingdom to do some research and development with a producer. Not happy with the 'Grace Jones approach' that the producer was taking, Wilson-James opted to go it alone and went on to do more work as a background vocalist.



tale than a myth. While shopping in a basement shop in Camden, England, with an American girlfriend who was also a singer, the two made the acquaintance of a group of musicians. The girlfriend left their names and numbers and Soul II Soul's Jazzie B. returned the call to Wilson-James just a short time later.

Wilson-James joined the Soul II Soul camp when the group was in the midst of cutting the classic Keep On Movin' LP in October 1987. Approximately two and a half years later, she and Jazzie were responsible for making "A Dream's a continued on next page



Dream," the debut track from Soul II Soul's follow-up LP, 1990: A New Decade, a Top Five hit in the U.K.

Now out on her own, and often compared to UK Blak princess Caron Wheeler-the vocalist behind Soul II Soul's two biggest all-time hits "Keep On Movin' " and "Back to Life"-Wilson-James has masterfully used her jazz-tinged vocals to bring to life the cutting lyrics. Her debut effort, Perseverance, solidifies her rank with the elite. And, although the premiere single, "Through," is inviting, it is important that listeners pull themselves away from the lure of Wilson-James' vocals so they might taste other treats, including "Bright Lights" (a midtempo jam that boasts heavy drum beats and percussion) and "Angel" (a true poetic escapade accented by primal beats and surrealistic instrumentation).

Of course, because of her commanding and somewhat

commanding and somewhat androgynous appearance, Wilson-James is often prematurely categorized as "another Grace Jones." "I've taken a lot of chances here and there," Wilson-James says of her image. "And, I've done a lot of experimenting over the years. If I play my

cards right, and if the gods are in my corner, then people will realize that I can sing and that there is a big difference between Victoria and Grace. Maybe, someday, people will be comparing new vocalists to me—and it will have nothing to do with appearance."

"As far as my stage performance goes," she continues. "I think I scare some people because they're so used to seeing me in flowing white. Now I'm wearing black and am showing a little more figure and they just can't handle it," she laughs.

Epic's La'Verne Perry, vp, publicity, black music, clarifies the vocalist's image. "She has a totally different sound from Grace. When the public and the industry get a chance to view Victoria in her totality, then they will see that the two have nothing in common.

"As a matter of fact," she continues, "one of my favorite projects is the take-off on *Victoria's Secrets* catalogues, that I've done. This one is entitled *Victoria's Singles* and depicts Victoria in various shots with quotes from some of the singles on the *Perseverance LP*. This campaign alone will show people that Victoria has a class and

elegance that is absolutely remarkable."

"In the States 'Through' is doing well. But things are a little different here. When I originally wrote the song it was contrived so that I was specifically targeting an American audience. Unfortunately, the same song was released in Europe, and they don't really understand the 'rap.' They miss the fact that the 'rap' is a telephone dialogue that is done tongue-in-cheek. The confusion probably results from there being two versions of the song in rotation (one lacks the sound effect of a telephone ring) and the fact that there is only one national station that plays my kind of music.

The conversation takes on a more serious note as Wilson-James comments on the controversy that surrounded entertainers Milli Vanilli, "People are being too harsh on Milli Vanilli," she reflects. "They were

victims. You know what I mean? People are so imageconscious that they're willing to sacrifice an artist's dignity to satisfy their own needs.

"You know, there was a model here, and she was white, who had a very popular commercial. There were

some producers who wanted her to do a pop album, but she couldn't sing and they wanted her to have a voice like mine. I was offended. My attitude was one of 'What am I, chopped liver?'"

Apparently not. Not only did Wilson-James make sure that she didn't allow herself to fall into any legal traps, but she is currently working with an organization known as Riff Raff—a network of musicians, songwriters, arrangers, lawyers and other music industry professionals who take on the task

of guiding young people who want to pursue careers in the music industry. Their primary focus is to insure that aspiring entertainers will not be taken for the ride that all but destroyed the infamous lipsyncing duo's integrity. It is her future goal to hopefully launch a similar project in the U.S.

Making a stand and setting the pace, Wilson-James often times has the resounding tones of a Greek philosopher rather than a goddess. But once you focus your attention on her sultry vocals and let her music take you on a fantastic ride, you may question her mortality. She definitely possesses a talent that is heaven sent. **3RE**

This past week BRE got the chance to talk with BWP, Bytches With Problems, from the No Face/RAL record label. This very unique duo dishes out hard core rap lyrics. Not your average female rap group, these ladies (yes ladies) have much to say about the plight of women and how they suffer at the hands or words of men. These women are no ghetto types either, which is what one would expect after listening to their LP, simply titled, The

Bytches. Song titles like: "Is The P**** Still Good?," "Two Minute Brother," (their first single) "F*** A Man," "We Want Money," "A Different Category," "Wanted," (a song about the police), "Sh*t Popper," and "No Means No" (a song about date rape) lets the listener know these female rappers mean business. Each song has a different sound and a funky groove to it as well as strong lyrics that will make you think twice about men.

Producer, Mark Sexx of the group No Face (Fake Hair Wearin' B.) discovered the Bytches. He also produced their album. Lyndah went to school with Mark, and about two years ago, Mark introduced Lyndah to Tanisia Michelle, and together they became the Bytches. Both ladies are in their early 20's, Lyndah hails from Queens, New York and Tanisia Michelle hails from New Jersey, just around the way from Queens. Michelle says, "Lyndah does most of the writing and together we do the rappin'. She is a real talented writer."

On why they chose their name, Michelle says, "It stands for the strong, assertive, aggressive type of woman who is basically in control of her life. She doesn't succumb to the pressures of todays society. It ranges from the female executive who is not friendly to

her secretary, she's labeled a bitch—all the way to the girl who's walkin' down the street and doesn't reply to all the whistles and catcalls, she too is called a bitch," says Michelle.

"If a woman is the head of her office, most times she is labelled a bitch because she is aggressive. But if a man is in the same position and does his job the same way as the woman, he's admired and called a take-charge kinda guy, a leader.

"So instead of saying, I don't want

So we did, and they loved it more than what they had written! It was very exciting to do this because we have always wanted to do more than rap."

There is definitely more to BWP than meets the eye. This is one female rap group that should have the staying power needed to survive this business we call music. Knowledge is Power.



PHIL PERRY: Calling the Plays



or so many of today's top male recording artists, the road to the top, or that first solo project can take years to materialize. Take for instance Luther Vandross and Teddy Pendergrass. Both were well established with bands, writing or recording, for quite some time before owning the spotlight themselves. The same can be said of Capitol recording artist Phil Perry.

As Perry puts it, "I feel like an offensive lineman in football. You make all the holes for the glory boys without getting any credit. Well, now I have the ball."

Perry's career in music can be traced back to his home town of East St. Louis, IL. It was at his local Catholic church that Perry learned to shape his vocals. He explains, "As a boy I found it a lot easier to express myself by singing than if I had to explain normally." It was toward the end of high school that Perry joined his first band—The Montclairs.

As the lead vocalist Perry soon realized that being a singer was what he wanted his vocation to be in life. While with The Montclairs, Perry cut two albums on the Jewel Paula label out of Shreveport, LA.

After measurable success with The Montclairs, Perry decided to leave Illinois and head west to Los Angeles. It was shortly after arriving in continued on page 44

THE BRAND NEW HEAVIES: A Heavy New Sound

f you use the early response a new band receives as a yardstick to measure how good they really are, then The Brand New Heavies, a multiracial quintet who have just signed with Delicious Vinyl, should be classed as one of this year's top new bands to surface this side of the Atlantic.

Hailing from Ealing, West London, BNH is bassist Andrew Levy, guitarist Simon Bartholomew, percussionist Lascelles Gordon, drummer/keyboards Jan Kincaid and saxophonist Jim Wellman. Also featured with BNH is Delicious Vinyl label mate N'Dea Davenport.

Davenport is no stranger to performing, having gained vast experience working alongside artists such as Madonna and Tone Loc.

The origins of BNH can be traced to "when we all began to jam together after school and on the weekends," says Kincaid. He further adds, "Growing up in a multiracial society like London we all picked up and adapted to the varying styles of music we heard."

Bartholomew states, "Funk was a very active part of our social lives, we all were strongly influenced by it." Their musical influences range from James Brown, Earth, Wind & Fire to Jimi Hendrix, and the sound of continued on page 44



Monie Loves The States

"I'd rather stay in the States," says Rapper **Monie Love**. Love, a transAtlantic commuter since the age of eight, has homes in both Queens, NY, and Battersea, South London.

But now, about to join **Bell**, **Biv**, **Devoe**'s four-month U.S. tour, she's considering making New York her permanent base.

"I found a lot of things out when I did 'Juke Box Jury' at the end of last year," she says. "I was a mystery guest on the show. They played my video and almost every video was rap. And the attitude from the panel was these records are rubbish because we don't like rap.

"When you look at how the U.K. rap scene's changed in the six years since I started, this is ridiculous. Back then I was just doing it for the rap audience—about 10 people, give or take one or two—and I realized this will never appeal to the masses. So I started to water it down and bring in all sorts of pop elements, everybody who

wanted to survive did. Now you look at **Dream Warriors** or my *Down To Earth* LP and they're Top 40 material, yet this panel is still dismissing them.

"Then Tairrie B. comes on and it's the rudest, bitching, nastiest rap of the lot. But she happens to be white, and they're going, 'Hmmm, a rap record. This sounds interesting!'

"It really smacked me in the face that I've done all this work and risked my street reputation—because that rap crowd is very possessive—and it's me and Dream Warriors that are having the hits. Yet, the attitude is still that it isn't worth taking seriously."

Love concludes, "That's what you're up against in Britain, so I'd be quite prepared to record in America. Let the records come out there first and then come over here on import. That wouldn't be very fair to people that have stuck by me, but the only way I'm going to be able to improve is somewhere where they take it seriously within the industry."

A list of the top 50 songs written by members of the Performing Rights Society (U.K. equivalent of BMI) and performed on U.S. radio and television

over the past 35 years was released this week by the U.S. performing rights organization BMI. The Top 50 is dominated by songs written by members of The Beatles, a total of 19, with six of those in the top 10. The list was compiled to celebrate the organization's 35-year relationship with PRS.

The John Lennon/Paul McCartney song "Yesterday" tops the list with more than 5.5 million United States performances—equivalent to nearly 30 years of continuous airplay—since it was first recorded by The Beatles in 1965. According to the *Guinness Book Of Records*, it is the most recorded song in history, with more than 2,500 cover versions.

Other Lennon/McCartney songs in BMI's top 10 include "Michelle," "Hey Jude" and "Let It Be"; George Harrison's "Something" and "My Sweet Lord" occupy the third and eighth positions respectively.

The Elton John/Bernie Taupin song-writing combination has four songs in the Top 50, second only to Lennon/McCartney, including "Your Song" at No. 11 and "Daniel" at No. 14; and John Kostill has two songs in the top 20 with "Let Me Be There" at No. 10 and "If You Love Me

Let Me Know" at No. 16.

"More," written by Norman Newell, Martello Ciorciolini, Nino Oliviero and Riz Ortolani, "Michelle" and "Something" have over four million performances; "Hey Jude," "Let It Be" and "Born Free" by Don Black and John Barry over three million; "My Sweet Lord" and Gerry Rafferty's "Baker Street" are two million plus. Northern Songs and Dick James Music are the publishers with the most songs in the Top 50.

Missing from the BMI Top 50 are any contributions by U.K. blacks. When BMI celebrates their 50th anniversary, expect to see some names such as Jazzie B., of Soul II Soul and Carl McIntosh of Loose Ends up there amongst the Lennons and McCartneys.

News that **Prince**'s "Graffiti Bridge" flopped at movie theaters all over the USA has reached the U.K. The film's distributors have decided not to

give the film a U.K. release, preferring instead to release it on video in Europe.

The **Ben E. King** tour scheduled to run through April 6 has been cancelled due to health problems King has suffered as the result of a back injury. Fans of the soul legend are asked to 'stand by him' while the tour is rescheduled for November.

Meanwhile, singer **Jimmy Ruffin** is being seconded to replace King for one of his tour dates on March 20 at London's Jazz Cafe.

U.K. Rapper **MC Mell'O** joins the ranks of talent signed to Jazzie B.'s Motown distributed Funki Dred label.

Mell'o had made it clear in the last year that he was unhappy with his deal with Republic Records and made it known that he was on the market. There were various rumors that he would soon be signed to a major. RCA was tipped as front runner, with Mell'O's guest rap on **Caron Wheeler**'s debut album being cited as evidence.

"There isn't much I can say about MC Mell'O," said Jazzie. "Everything he's done speaks for itself. He's been consistent—live and on record. Mell'O is a man I've kept my eyes on for years. I've always felt that he was one of the best rappers in the U.K." **TRE**

Juno Awards: A Day Late And A Dollar Short

The 20th annual Juno Awards have come and gone, and once again they came up a day late and a dollar short. The Junos are Canada's most prestigious music awards and are the equivalent of America's Grammys. They are presented by the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (CARAS).

The big winner in this year's Junos was Vancouver, British Columbia. Snatched from Toronto for the first time in two decades, the Junos were broadcast live on CBC from Vancouver's Queen Elizabeth Theater—and viewed as a truly symbolic victory for non-Torontonians from coast to coast.

Unfortunately, African-Canadians didn't fare as well as the city of Vancouver. Yes, **Maestro Fresh-Wes** walked away with two Junos for Best Rap Recording of the Year, *Symphony In Effect*, and Best Video of the Year, "Drop the Needle," which he shared with video producer **Joel Goldberg**.

And yes, Simply Majestic featuring B. Kool won in the Best R&B/Soul Recording category with the song "Dance To The Music (Work Your Body)." Jayson and Friends won Best

Reggae/Calypso Recording with a song called "Soldiers We Are All" and even Oaktown's M.C. Hammer came to Vancouver to accept the award for Best International Album, Please Hammer Don't Hurt 'Em.

However, the night still came across like a show out of the "new" South or a presentation under F. W. deKlerks's "reformed" South Africa. With the exception of Fresh-Wes, **MCJ** and **Cool G**, all the presenters were of the Caucasian persuasion.

While Hammer brought the "white" house down with his electrifying performance and **Aaron Neville** was superb with his musical salute to Canadian **Leonard Cohen**, no African-Canadian artist was allowed to perform. This could have been a golden opportunity for an African-Canadian to get national television exposure, Imagine the lift a young African-Canadian artist could get by being able to say they shared the stage with Hammer and the legendary Neville.


African-Canadian artists were further insulted by not having the R&B/Soul and Reggae/Calypso categories televised. Only Maestro Fresh-Wes

accepted his award, for the Best Rap Recording of the Year, on national television. Neither B. Kool, Jayson nor any of his friends got on prime time television. The Best R&B/Soul and Reggae/Calypso awards were handed out without lights, camera, or action.

Another irony about the Juno Awards was the fact that the great African-Canadian pianist **Oscar Peterson** won two Grammy Awards this year. His album Legendary Oscar Peterson Trio Live At The Blue Note won for the Best Jazz Instrumental Performance, Soloist, and Best Jazz Instrumental Performance, Group. Yet Peterson walked away emptyhanded from the Junos.

The Seventh Annual Reggae Awards recently took place at the Westin Harbour Castle Hotel. Jamaica's Consulate General **Kay Baxtor** opened the concert and awards ceremonies. The program was coordinated and produced by **Winston Hewitt** Productions. It was dedicated to the memory of the late **Jackie Mittoo**, who died of cancer in December.

Creation Of A Promotion From A...Z

The spring rating survey, considered by many to be the most important book of the year, is here. For many Black/Urban radio stations, the big budget, high profile, major spring promotion is already in gear. It consists of direct mail campaigns, cash, prizes, luxury automobiles and all other high cost bells and whistles.

For some Black/Urban radio stations, this major spring promotion, due to little or no promotional budget, is just not available. So if you fall into the "have not" category, you really have just two choices: ignore the fact that you have a *MAJOR* competitive disadvantage ("warning, warning, not a good idea"), or bust your butt and put together your own major onair promotion.

The way to do this is to get creative and recruit help from within your radio station. Find a promotion that benefits programming and generates sales, this will bring your sales department to the party and through teamwork you can get the job done.

Let's do a basic outline of one conceivable way to accomplish this goal.

STEP # 1—THE IDEA

Yeah, it's just that easy. Think of a promotion and look for creative ways for programming and sales to get it done. How about this one:

THE KISS 108.3 VACATION IN PARADISE SWEEPSTAKES!!

For four to eight weeks listeners win a variety of daily prizes and qualify for a grand prize drawing of several trips for two to the Caribbean.

As we've determined in previous articles, unused commercial units can provide the opportunity to trade for promotional purposes. Work with your sales department to identify an airline or local travel agency and develop an attractive promotional sponsor.

STEP # 2—MAKE THEM AN OFFER THEY CAN'T REFUSE

In exchange for five all-expense paid trips to the Caribbean (yeah, five—it gives you room to negotiate), you will provide a client with sponsorship of a major promotion that matches or exceeds the cost of the merchandise provided.

Sponsor provides: Five (5) vacation packages that include:

- -Round trip air travel for two
- -Hotel accommodations (5 days/4 nights)
- -Taxes and Transfers
- -Meals
- -Ground transportation (airport/hotel)

Station provides:

- —Co-sponsorship of this high profile, major, on-air promotion
 - -Qualifying gifts and prizes
 - —Transportation to and from the local airport
 - -Spending cash
 - -Reduced rate, special term commercial time-buy
- —8- to 12-week promotional/commercial schedule of greater value than wholesale cost of the trips provided.

This scenario provides a win-win situation for both radio station and sponsor. You now have the *beginnings* of an exciting on-air promotion.

STEP #3-FINDING THOSE QUALIFYING GIFTS AND PRIZES

Your next step is to create a promotion or series of promotions that will serve as the qualifying promotion for your grand prize vacation(s).

Winners of any giveaways that take place during the time

frame of the Paradise Vacation giveaway will also qualify for the grand prize drawing.

EXAMPLE A: Do a CD giveaway with ABC Records, with three to four CDs as the gift pack. ABC Records and your contest sponsor will both receive mentions in the open and close of each giveaway.

EXAMPLE B: A giveaway by a local stereo/appliance store with Walkmen, portable radios and gift certificates as the qualifying prizes. The appliance store and your vacation sponsor will receive mentions in the open and close of each giveaway.

EXAMPLE C: Any and all concert ticket giveaways can also serve as qualifying prizes for your Paradise Vacation.



"I also did sports and hosted a talk show called 'Talk Net'"





alive. Our format includes blues artists like J. Blackfoot and Johnnie Taylor. We also have jazz and gospel shows which even spotlight New Orleans jazz." With all that to offer listeners, it's easy to see just why Wallace and WYLD are on top. **375**





This is a superb jazz tune. It has a nice walking feel to it. To me it's a throwback to classic jazz with a great '90s sound. Excellent work from two great side men, Akira Tana and Rufus Reid. STEP # 5—PROMOTING THE CONTEST

Now that you have a promotion in motion, it's useless unless you properly promote the event. Station promotional announcements are needed in order to make your audience aware of your contest

For best results in promoting your on-air event, have a 60-second promotional spot made to run every hour. This promotional spot should have lots of snap, crackle and pop, and it must convince your audience that this is the best contest in the world. Remember, perception is reality.

If promoted properly, you could make your contest a success and generate

revenue at the same time. You may want to consider including in your recorded promotional announcements mentions of the sponsors of the qualifying prizes, to match a time-buy made to promote the product you're giving away on-air.

You also need to schedule continuous liners on every air personality's shift. If this is truly a great promotion, then everyone should be talking about it.

Sometimes it takes a little imagination and a lot of extra effort to effectively deal with the shortcomings in your particular station. That's all a part of living. The idea is to do what you have to do to win. 37E



tion and received a \$10,000 cash prize.

While Monk, Morton and Ellington were indeed important influences on his own playing style, Roberts did not choose the three piano giants for his love of their music alone. "Playing music is a part of an evolutionary process," he says, "Recording music is a way to document where you are in that process at a given moment.

By the end of this project, I had moved to yet another stage in my own musical development. The only way you reach a certain level of self-actualization is to develop your strengths as well as your weaknesses. Thus, interpreting the works of the three giants for this project served as a sort of test for me."

If Alone With Three Giants is an examination of Roberts'

skills and interpretation, then the introspective artist passes with flying colors from a listener's point of view. Roberts weaves his way through each selection with seeming ease and appears comfortable with every tune. despite their technical demands. Jackson LPs sold well, the element of spectacle that usually surrounds multimillion-selling albums is no longer there. The skeptics also point to the ailing economy.

In any case, if the Jackson/ Virgin deal resulted in the biggest recording contract ever, then it will most likely lead to the biggest record producer's fee as well. According to one industry insider, "Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis wrote and produced 95 percent of Control and all of Rhythm Nation; they definitely know what they're worth and what they mean to the success of the next project." Figures being tossed around start at \$1 million each for

Jam and Lewis and swell from there

Regardless, while there is glee in such a precedentsetting deal, there's got to be enough pressure to go around as well. Everyone wants to do better than well. Count on Virgin to promote the deal's debut LP to the high heavens. Look for some firsts, including spell-binding music videos. Meanwhile, Jam and Lewis are undoubtedly faced with the question of whether to go with what is musically tried and true or tread new ground. How do you make a big enough splash to sell the kind of volume folks are expecting? A film starring Jackson might do the trick.

Jackson may not enjoy the role of highest-paid recording artist for very long; most insiders agree that when her brother Michael and Sony leave the negotiation table, his re-signing with the company will be the richest deal in the business. To be sure, baby sis set Mike up good with her deal-how could Sony offer him anything less? But no matter what transpires in Janet's universe now, one thing's for sure-whether you're nasty or not, it's definitely Miss Jackson now.

MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE RANCH: Speaking of Janet, \$32 million wasn't all that was sacrificed in the heavy-duty deal making. After a Virgin-sponsored party to celebrate the deal, Virgin attorney Bernie Fishback walked outside the restaurant only to find that his vintage Mercedes had been stolen.... Considering how long he has backed some of the biggest acts in the business, it seems a crime that singer Phil Perry has waited this long for his own album. No matter, check out his Capitol collection, The Heart Of The Man, and be mesmerized by his performances on the tracks "Woman," "Forever" and "The Best Of Me." Definitely a singer whose time has come....Rapper Kid Capri's Cold Chillin/Warner Bros. LP, The Tape, produced by Biz Markie, is as funky as it is both thought-provoking and humorous. Check it out. 

Shortly after that, Perry was introduced to Quincy Jones. Perry recalls, "Quincy was hiring singers to sing background for the Budweiser Superfest. I was so nervous, but Quincy really settled me. Even now I can call Quincy and receive his assistance." The Budweiser Superfest helped to promote Perry nationally to the extent that he was being asked to tour with artists such as Al Jarreau, Patti LaBelle and George Benson; touring the world as he worked.

It was while performing at the Hollywood Bowl with Lee Ritenour that Perry got his biggest break. "The reviews I received were very good," Perry says. "It wasn't long before I was contacted by

Capitol Records representatives. They stated they loved my voice and wanted to sign me quick because they (felt that) with the reviews I'd received I would be signed very quickly by another label.

Perry states, "Having a solo project can be summed up in one word: Rewarding." The debut solo album titled The Heart Of The Man features some great assists from the likes of George Duke, Brenda Russell and Robbie Neville. all people Perry formerly worked for.

The album's first release "Call Me" is a cover of the Aretha Franklin classic. Nationally, people in the industry have praised Perry's version, saying it is one of the best covers of an Aretha Franklin song they've heard. "It's the best compliment I could pay to Aretha after she'd recorded one of my songs," says Perry.

Phil Perry's career has had its valleys and peaks and it is a testament to his dedication and "never say die" attitude. He finally has the ball and the glory to go with it. 375

With the release of their debut album, BNH hopes to experience the same level of success that other U.K. recording artists have achieved. The album, simply titled The Brand New Heavies, fields an excellent blend of fusion, jazz, soul and funk. BNH

wrote all the songs and performed all the instruments themselves, a fact they take great pride in.

We have plans to tour the U.K. and Europe this year and to hopefully tour the U.S. college circuit," says Bartholomew.

BNH also claim that their next projects "will test all facets of music," a trend they have strictly followed to date.

With all the popularity they have started attaining, BNH seem to be in the perfect situation: being an enthusiastic band coupled with a ground-breaking label. 37E
