

Jackson and Edmonds Named BMI Songwriters of the Year

BMI named Janet Jackson and Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds as Songwriters of the Year, Michael Bolton's "How Am I Supposed To Live Without You" Song of the Year, and EMI Music Publishing Publisher of the Year, as the performing rights organization honored the past year's top songwriters and music publishers at a 700-person gala awards dinner at the Regent Beverly Wilshire Hotel.

BMI pres/ceo Frances W. Preston hosted the black tie ceremonies at the 39th Pop Awards Dinner in which Citations of Achievement went to the writers and publishers of the 79 songs most performed on American radio and television from the third quarter of 1989 through the fourth quarter of 1990.

Jackson and Edmonds led all other songwriters with four Citations each to take Songwriters of the Year honors. Jackson's "Alright," "Come Back To Me," "Escapade" and "Rhythm Nation," all included on her most recent album, were honored. "It's No Crime" (co-written by Antonio "L.A." Reid and Daryl Simmons) and "Whip Appeal" were featured on Babyface's Tender Lover LP, while his additional Citations recognized "Ready Or Not," recorded by After 7, and "Rock Wit'cha" (co-written by Daryl Simmons), recorded by Bobby Brown. L.A. and Babyface were also named the 1990 BMI Songwriters of the Year.

Michael Bolton's "How Am I Supposed To Live Without You," co-written by Doug James and published by EMI-Blackwood Music Inc., was the most performed song during the eligibility period and won Song of the Year designation. The song

received its first Citation in 1983 for its recording by Laura Branigan and was recently certified a BMI Million-Air for reaching the one million performances mark. Bolton was also honored for "How Can We Be Lovers," published by Bolton's Music and Warner-Tamerlane Pub. Corp. Both songs were recorded by Bolton on his album Soul Provider.

As at the 1990 Pop Awards, EMI Music Publishing was named Publisher of the Year, with 15 Citations between its publishing companies EMI-Blackwood Music Inc. and Screen Gems-EMI Music Inc.

Gloria Estefan, BMI's 1989 Songwriter of the Year, received Citations for three songs, including "Don't Wanna Lose You," which was honored for the second year in a row. Roxette's Per Gessle (STIM) also received three Citations. Recipients of two Citations each were Billy Joel, the B-52s, Daryl Simmons, John Waite, Roy Orbison, the writing team of Barry Mann & Cynthia Weil, Chynna Phillips and Carnie Wilson of Wilson Phillips and Michael Bolton.



Edmonds

Ben E. King's R&B classic "Stand By Me" received its sixth Pop Award since 1961. The song, which recently passed the four million performance mark, has also received two BMI Rhythm

and Blues Awards (1961, 1967) and a BMI Country Award (1981). "You've Lost That Lovin' Feelin'," written by Barry Mann, Cynthia Weil and Phil Spector, received its fifth Pop Award since 1964. It has also been performed more than four million times on U.S. radio and television and received a Rhythm and Blues Award in 1972, Songs receiving their third Citations were "A Groovy Kind of Love" (1990 BMI Song of the Year), "If You Don't Know Me By Now," "Oh Girl" and "Wind Beneath My Wings." "Oh Pretty Woman" received its second Citation.

Warner Music Group took second place in the publisher category with 11 Citations. Virgin Songs Inc. received nine awards.

Teller To Receive 'Spirit' Award

Al Teller, chairman, MCA Music Entertainment Group, will receive the "Spirit of Life" Award for the City of Hope's Music and Entertainment Industry Chapter on Sept. 4, it was announced today by Dr. Sanford Shapero, ceo, City of Hope.

"I am proud to have been chosen to receive the 'Spirit of Life' Award," Teller said. "I respect the work the City of Hope does, and the Music and Entertainment Industry Chapter has been responsible for raising millions of dollars for the City of Hope and its programs."

The goal of the event honoring Teller is to raise \$2.5 million. Honorary chairpersons for the event include Lew Wasserman, Sid Sheinberg, Bobby Brown, Jerry Bruckheimer, Michael Dornemann, Tom Freston, David Geffen, Elton John,

Naomi and Wynonna Judd, B.B. King, Peter Morton, Reba McEntire, Tom Petty, Tom Pollock, Don Simpson, Rod Stewart, George Strait and Jann Wenner.

Each year the Music and Entertainment Industry Chapter honors an outstanding music executive at a fundraising dinner. Past honorees include Mo Ostin, Clive Davis, Quincy Jones, Tommy Mottola, Bill Graham, Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss.

The City of Hope is a non-profit medical and research center that treats and researches major diseases, such as cancer, AIDS, diabetes and leukemia. It provides care regardless of a patient's financial resources. The Music and Entertainment Industry Chapter was formed in 1974 and has raised more than \$12 million.



Amazing Stories!

They say the most exciting thing about attaining success is getting there. While that's debatable, all success stories have roots. And depending on where the person is now, how they got there makes some music biz tales of triumph all the more remarkable.

For instance, in 1982, shortly after **Prince** fired them from **The Time** for producing the **S.O.S Band**(an assign-

ment that had them stuck in an Atlanta airport when they should have been on to the next band date) Jimmy "Jam" Harris and Terry Lewis decided that to tackle the independent production scene properly. they needed to relocate from Minneapolis to Los Angeles. There they shared a small two-bedroom apartment with Dina Andrews, who represented the duo when she wasn't working as a production coordinator for Solar.

There was work—it was during this period that they laid their foundation, producing

a track here on **Klymaxx**, a track there on **Change**, several things on a new-comer named **Cherrelle** and tracks for **Cheryl Lynn** and a band called **Reel To Real**. However, the L.A. days seemed to involve more partying than anything else

One summer night when folks crammed into the apartment to celebrate Jam's birthday, someone put on a copy of "Fascination," a new record by a group called Human League. Late that night, out in the humidity, Jam and Lewis, with some other musicians, stood outside under the stars and dreamed. "We just wanna make good records," Lewis was sayin'. "And," echoed Jam, 'not just black records. We wanna do it all." Who could have known that several years later the duo would give Human League its biggest hit with "Human"? Certainly not Jam. though today he can recall hearing the group for the first time that night. "I remember it because it was a synth(esizer) record. and because it was a little different. But

you never could have told me we would produce that group. That night, it was just another record on the turntable." And to think, when he fired them, Prince told fellow Time members they'd never hear from Jam and Lewis again. Amazing but true!

That's incredible! As late as their productions on **Bobby Brown** and **Karyn White**, producers/songwriters **Antonio**

R&B team to come along since Jam and Lewis. They were getting assignments but, as they told it then, weren't commanding the fees that everyone assumed. To remedy the situation, they consulted

music biz guru **Clarence Avant**. He said, "You guys are supplying the labels with a valuable service," Reid remembers. "Act like it. The next time a label calls, ask them for *real* money and see what happens." They did, and according to Reid, "The company said 'okay' without even batting an eye." L.A. and 'Face have since relocated to amenity-ridden palaces in Atlanta. *Coincidence? We think not!*

Long before there was a Jam and Lewis and L.A. and 'Face, there was **Leon**

Sylvers, whose fledgling Silver-spoon Productions (with whom a young Jam and Lewis considered signing) supplied hits for Shalamar, the Whispers and Gladys Knight and the Pips, among others. At

one point in the early '80s, Sylvers was so busy, at any given time he'd be overseeing productions at three different studios around L.A. all at once. Sylvers would whisk between locations in a brand new Mercedes that had been hit broadside; he was so busy making money he didn't have time to get it fixed. Sylvers also had a curious production style. Legend had it that while waiting at the studio for him to finish a re-mix, a client would turn on the televised


Lakers game and there, among Dyan Cannon and Jack Nicholson, Sylvers would be rooting for Magic. Believe it or not!

Not too many years before he became an A&R tastemaker, MCA

Monk Institute Presents Sax Competition

The Thelonious Monk Institute of Jazz and the Smithsonian Institution's Resident Associate Program will present the fifth annual Thelonious Monk International Jazz Instrumental Competition in Baird Auditorium at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., on November 23 and 24, 1991. This year's competition will feature the saxophone.

Young saxophonists from around the world will compete for the scholarship prizes—\$10,000 first place (sponsored by Ford Motor Company), \$5,000 second place (Junior Beethoven Society), and \$3,000 third place (Black United Fund). In addition, the first place winner will be featured at the Blues Alley jazz club in Washington, D.C., the following evening.

Judges for the competition will be sax players Jimmy Heath, Branford Marsalis, Benny Carter, Frank Wess and James Moody.

Last year's competition was named in honor of Louis Armstrong and featured the trumpet. The winner, 17-year-old Ryan Kisor, was signed by Sony Music and will release his debut album next September. Some of the

past participants in the competition include Marcus Roberts (winner, 1987), Joey DeFrancesco (a 1987 finalist), and Vernell Brown (a finalist in 1988).


STEVIE WONDER GOTTA HAVE YOU MOTOWN



Ed O.G. & Da Bulldogs: Survival of the Fittest

ow does a young black male with dreams of becoming a star get out of the ghetto to become famous? Well, with perseverance, inner strength and a whole lot of talent it can be done. This is the success story that all kids in ghettoes across America should hear. It's a story about a group of young men who grew up in the same neighborhood, the community of Roxbury in Boston. This is their story.

Edward Anderson, DJ Cruz, Smooth Ice G. and T-Nyne are Ed O.G. & Da Bulldogs, which stands for Every Day Other Girls and Black United Leaders Living Directly On Groovin' Sounds. When asked about the name, Ed said, "We wanted to come up with a fun name. Smooth Ice G. came up with 'directly on groovin' sounds' and I thought up 'black united leaders living.' It's fun, but has meaning at the same time".

Ed started out as a breakdancer back in the day when breakin' was the "in" thing to do. Shortly after the faze died down, Ed started listening to people like Kurtis Blow. Realizing that rappin' might be fun, he started beatboxing and rappin' in local clubs and soon became a member of two different groups. Fresh To Impress and 3 Def Notes. During this time Ed met his future posse, T-Nyne, Smooth Ice G. and his funky deejay, DJ Cruz. After numerous MC and DJ contests, the crew had its first taste of the excitement that was soon to come. Upon putting out his first single, "Suzie Q," which made an impressive impact on his peers, Ed noticed that people were beginning to take him more seriously.

Now with the debut LP, Life Of A Kid In The Ghetto on the PWL America label, listeners can hear various degrees of Ed's rap style. Each song displays Ed's talents as a writer, rapper and producer.



The help of the famous production team of Teddy Ted and Special K. only adds to the flavor of the album. With the successful first single, "I Got To Have It," steadily climbing the music charts, Ed O.G. & Da Bulldogs will soon be a household name.

This group is about to be the premiere rap group of '91. This prolific writer/ rapper has a unique way of speeding up his raps during a verse. There are many sides to this rapper-political. sexy and funny. The political side comes through on the cut "Speak Upon It," which features the poet with soul, Def Jef, and the rappin' duo of Ace & Quan. Other conscious raps are "Dedicated To The Right Wingers" and "Be Father To Your Child," the latter being Ed's favorite song on the entire album because "it's real," he states. "Every song on this album comes from my reality and my friends' realities. 

ome subjects are touchy, some are taboo and some simply aren't discussed except behind closed doors among friends. Race is a touchy subject.

Feelings run high when discussing how one race of people looks at another race. Say the word racist out loud and listen to your own insides. The word itself has a physical impact. The pulses race, the face burns hot like a fever. Say interracial love. Another kind of physical reaction, racing pulses here, too. The response is visceral, often purient, sometimes puzzling. There was a time when the word was whispered, all that forbidden sex—more dangerous for being illicit and feverish.





Suddenly in 28 days, all these elements came together in the amazing heart and soul of Stevie Wonder. The result is the personal, poetic soundtrack to Spike Lee's sixth and latest film, "Jungle Fever."

The subject matter of the film is interracial love. But, Spike being Spike, doesn't make it simply a case of two people getting hotted up and leaping on each others bones. He adds some twists and turns, letting those genuine

reactions hang out there on the giant screen. You know, the kind discussed behind closed doors. And, if nobody likes it. Spike has a message for them. It is in an opening sequence he shot and then decided not to use. The filmmaker says, "At the beginning we shot a scene that was to precede the film. Ernest Dickerson, my cameraman was on a crane. We shot on the Brooklyn Bridge. The crane comes down out of the sky and I address the camera, the audience, and tell them what this film is about. That we don't have any answers for this stuff, but we feel it's our duty to present it. And then, before the camera goes up in the sky again, I say: 'And for all you enlightened beings who feel anti-Semitic and racist, kiss my ass, and kiss my black ass two times." Well, he's got a lot to say. Spike presents to the public as pretty-much the anger-tinged prägmatist.

Wonder presents to the public a much different persona. He has always been joyous. Always, he's seemed to be about love, both the emotional and the physical side. He's not angry at a life that permitted a condition of birth to leave him blind. From the first moment Stevie hit the public eye he's seemed so filled with so much life and exuberance that other people feel compelled to speak out in anger for Stevie and against his blindness.

Regardless of the different way their personalities manifest themselves, these are two men with strong opinions who move on them. In the case of the music for "Jungle Fever," they moved in

tandem, in an exalted dance of life. For both these men are about enlightenment, the paths of choice just show up different.

They are friends, as the young and famous are sometimes. Spike talks about how they came together on this project. "Well, Steve and I have known each other for awhile. He contributed a song to 'School Daze.' We got along really good with that collaboration and we were just trying to find the right project where it could repeat itself and

do it on a bigger scale. And when I told Stevie about this film about interracial relationships, he was intrigued."

After Lee screened the film for Wonder, he put his *Conversation Piece* album on hold and locked himself up in the studio over the course of a few weeks because there was a deadline.

Naturally, he had heads shaking when he finished the project in such a short time frame, but Stevie only laughs

at the question. "I knew there was a deadline. I knew the story of the film and what I was dealing with. I liked the fact that it was going to be a controversial film. But in that controversy, there's going to be conversation and food for thought. I liked that."

If, as it is said when they hand out awards for film music, the purpose is to advance the storyline by making music to move the visuals, how, then, does a blind man write music for films?

Spike answers: "Well, he listened to the film, and when he didn't know what was being conveyed visually, he just said 'What's happening?' Not having eyesight has never hindered his enjoyment of film. I guess if you were blind and you weren't a great artist, it would be a problem to write music for film. But I think all great artists have insight and have vision. And that's something that Stevie has in abundance."

Did Lee, the filmmaker, have directions for Wonder, the musicmaker? Lee, the eternal gambler, took a risk here. Normally, this is a man who WILL have the final word about things. "I put a great importance on music. I pay as much attention to music as I do the scripts I write, or the action in the film, or the lighting. I think I could trace this probably back to my father, Bill Lee, being a great jazz musician. I was brought up in a household where music was played all the time." But he let Stevie have his head.

"I encouraged Stevie to try to use musicians so this was as live an album as possible. There are a lot of times I

think that technology can be a trap. I think Stevie is one who knows how to use the technology, synthesizers, but as far as my taste goes, I think no machine can compare to a great musician playing an acoustic instrument. But nobody can dictate to Stevie. Just make suggestions and hopefully he does listen and will implement them." At this last, Lee laughs.

Like Lee's, many households in the U.S. played music all the time. Much of that music continued on next page

came from Motown and thanks to the 27 or 28 LPs mentioned earlier, a good deal of that music came from Stevie Wonder. There's a Stevie tune to mark all the important rites of passage in the lives of anyone between the ages of 30 to 50.

If Spike's film moves the understanding of interracial

relationships along, this too will be a rite of passage, moved with Wonder music.

On this soundtrack, there's a happy mix of vintage and contemporary Stevie. "Fun/Day" is a cheery song for summer. It should draw mass appeal, it feels a bit like it wants the positive response "Happy Birthday" received. It's a catchy dance party cut for all the family, with one of those seductive Wonder harmonica solos.

"Queen in the Black" by

Stevie's description, is about a beautiful girl. "I can't see her, but I caught the feeling of the interaction between the two characters and I was inspired to then say, 'Whoa, this is more than I can deal with.'

"Then there is 'These Three Words,' where the music definitely takes you even more into the interior, the

character of the person. In the picture, the music says 'When was the last time you heard them say, "mother, or father, I love you"? And when was the last time that you heard them say, "daughter or son, I love you"? The ones you see, you cherish every day can be taken away." This is a beautiful, quiet song that shows Stevie's vocal

power and depth.

In talking about the overall project, Lee offers, "Often you have songs that are good for a film, but can they stand on their own apart from the movie? I think if people didn't know this film was attached, I don't think it would detract from the enjoyment of listening to Stevie's album."

One of the best examples is "If She Breaks Your Heart." It's one of those classic boy/girl love duets and one of the best songs

on the LP. Part of that perfection could come from what Stevie admits is having "my girlfriend, Kimberly Brewer, sing with me on this one." This mid-tempo cut jumps off the LP.

There are a number of dance cuts on the LP and "Gotta Have You" leads the way. It's continued on page 43

loves youth groups. It seems to thrive on their energy and exuberance. Youthful optimism keeps the industry fresh, always changing and growing, and taking a new look at the old standards. And for young people, the industry can sometimes be a kind of fairy godmother—granting wishes and making dreams come true.

Mercury's Small Change is a family group that's got all the right qualities to hit big in the business—they're talented, good looking, and nice as all get out. They're cousins—two boys and two girls—Kairi Guinn-Styles, 15; Neamen Howard, 16; Lakuana Brockington, 15; and Tamika Jarmon, 16. They spent their childhoods together, getting ready for what would become a serious commitment to music.

"We were always singing and dancing together. It was fun," says Kairi, "but we really worked hard. I don't think you can get that far as a young group just being cute and dancing. We wanted to take things a little further."

Taking things further for Small Change meant making sure they could hang, vocally. Their first single, "Why," is a good indication of their ability to deliver. The song has all the elements to make it to the top—great vocals and harmony, slamming tracks, catchy samples, and a message of hope for young people going through hard times.



"We'd like to see more kids portraying a positive attitude," says Kairi. "We try to encourage them to find something they really like to do and stick with it instead of getting involved in negative things."

"Our songs talk about kids putting their energy into positive things and staying in school," says Neamen.

Anything worth having is worth working for," says

Tamika. "We try to show kids they can do the same things we are doing—but it takes hard work."

Small Change credits their strong family bond with helping them to maintain their focus in the business. They travel with their aunt and uncle, Sandy and Wayne Styles, as co-managers. And even at their record company it's something of a family affair. "At Mercury, they treat

us really nice," says Lakuana. "Everyone there treats us like we're one of their children."

Wayne says that providing guidance is very important part of his role as manager. "The group has a strong foundation as far as their singing. With their dedication and hard work and the family behind them, their potential is unlimited. Sound minds, hard work and good material—that's the key to longevity. I see them being around a long time."

Like most young people, Small Change has their visions of sugarplums. They dream of nice houses and fancy cars and they see themselves having long and fruitful careers in entertainment. Neamen and Kairi spend a lot of time working on music. They would like to write and produce for their group and for other acts.

And Lakuana has set her sights pretty high, too. "I'd like to produce videos or maybe take Ed Eckstine's job one day," she laughs.

Small Change is a young group that isn't in a hurry to grow up too fast. They say being young in this business gives them the best of both worlds and they don't mind the responsibility that comes with being role models. And that's a small but refreshing change of pace.





Evans Wins AP Award

James Evans, news director, 16-WVKO, won an Associated Press News Award in the category of Best Enterprise Reporting 1991. The laurel was issued as a result of Evans' investigative series "From the Trenches: The War on Drugs One Year Later," which ran in 1990.

The award-winning piece focused on the declaration of the national war on drugs by President Bush in 1989. Evans examined the statistics on a local, state-wide and national level one year after the declaration.

Group Endorses Status For DAB

The general assembly of the International Association of Broadcasting (IAB) endorsed putting aside portions of the L-Band radio spectrum for digital audio broadcasting (DAB) and granting "co-primary status" to land-based and satellite DAB. The group, which met in Mexico, representing broadcasters from 20 countries, also jointly supported a National Association of Broadcasting (NAB) plan to introduce DAB to the

"This unified position of the largest international organization of private broadcasters should have a significant influence on NAB decisions to be made at WARC '92," said Edward O. Fritts, pres/ceo, NAB.

During the meeting, John Abel, exec vp. operations, made a special presentation to the group on the status of DAB worldwide and on NAB's plan for implementing DAB. The recommendation for granting terrestrial DAB co-primary status and allocating L-Band frequencies for DAB is the same position the NAB has recommended that the FCC adopt as the official United States position on DAB. The IAB will convey the endorsement to the ITU and to all countries sending delegates to the WACR '92 conference.

JON LUCIEN: For Love Of Music

he passionate sounds of Jon Lucien are back and they offer the same messages of love he last left. His debut release on Mercury Records, entitled Listen Love, is making romantic hearts throb with desire. Armed with a voice that "kills," Lucien is picking up where he left off, bellowing soothing tones that turn any person's evening into one of blissful splendor.

Prior to his leaving the business, Lucien had fallen into the trap of drug abuse. In addition, he had also suffered the pain of divorce. Because of these problems, Lucien recognized a need to get away from the sources of his distress.

He was on a self-imposed hiatus for nearly 10 years. "I simply retreated into myself and stopped singing," Lucien recalls. "I had to get away from things, so I went back home, where I continued music, but from a different perspective."

That perspective was playing his bass with small jazz combos and earning about \$100 per night. His wages were a long throw from the heavy-hitting contracts he was used to back in the States, but for Lucien, it helped him in a healing process he felt he needed to go through. "I remained there from '85 until '89. After that I moved over to Puerto Rico, where I currently reside."

Living in the rural hills of Puerto Rico gave Lucien the continued break he needed, and it wasn't long before the overcame him. While he is now back into the grind of being a popular recording artist, Lucien says he's very much at ease with himself and with the hectic lifestyle that accompanies his job in the business.


"I'm much more health-conscious now," he comments. "I've come to regard life as a vast resource, and you must be prepared to use the tools you've been given in order to succeed. For me, it's a matter of creating and producing good music."

Jon Lucien was one of the original love crooners. His seductive, tenor-baritone voice is classic and is the reason he was regarded as one of the premiere balladeers

during his "first" career. "I'm a native of St. Thomas, in the Virgin Islands, and my family moved to New York City in the early '60s. It was a wonderful experience moving to the United States."

Lucien had always been involved in music since he was a child. Once he arrived in New York, he continued that endeavor by performing at bar mitzvahs, weddings—anything to further practice his craft. "Not long after, I put together a demo and began shopping it. In 1970 I got my first deal."

Lucien takes producer credits, in addition to his vocalist responsibilities, on Listen Love. "Mercury gave



me the creative latitude I needed to cut a good album. They're very supportive." Asked about the mood of the people working with him on the project, he says, "I'm a pretty organized person, so we went in and just did it. I tend to give my people a free hand, creatively, and after they understand the direction I'm flowing in, I just sit back. It makes for an extremely creative atmosphere."

Standout tracks on *Listen Love* include "Nothing Lasts Forever," with it's powerful message and vocal blending with the instrumentals; "You Take My Breath Away," another heavy tune, with

pacing that puts you in that special mood for romance; the title track; and "Sweet Control," a ballad with a sound that conveys the fact that Jon Lucien is here to stay.

Being out of the professional music business could have tarnished another vocalist's voice or spirit, but not Lucien's. His sound is as strong and clear as ever, and the positive attitude he's brought back is sure to propel him into the realm of stardom once more. "I do it (sing) for the love of music," he says. "It's all I've ever wanted to do. I hope to continue doing this for as long as I can." "

AL 'LUV' JENKINS

Accent On Southern Radio

lack radio is alive and well in the South. The entire southern region alone encompasses more than 40 percent of the stations that report to BRE weekly.

Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi, while not major market states, serve as a sort of haven for Urban radio. One station in Mississippi seems to be leading the long list of popular Southern stations. WQFX-FM in Gulfport, under the direction of pd/md Al. "Luv" Jenkins, has emerged as one of the most popular Urban stations in that region.

Jenkins has had a full yet varied career. He's done everything from radio to artist management. He was even somewhat of a hippie in the mid '60s when he lived in Berkeley, CA, near the Haight Ashbury district

Jenkins had an early interest in radio He explained, "It all began when I was in high school in Indianapolis, IN. I was the representative for the school paper and I used to call in to WTLC-FM with all the school's news and sports reports. It also gave me the opportunity to hang out at the station and just learn more about the business."

And learn he did. WTLC was definitely a stomping ground for Jenkins during the late '60s. By hanging out and making himself available he was able to take over an overnight air-shift after the regular overnight jock suddenly left the station. Jenkins said, "My first time at the mic I totally froze up. I was so nervous I didn't know what to do But after that I was fine. I just had to look at it as a learning situation. And that's exactly how the pd felt about it. He taught me when to talk, when not to talk, and why."

That type of first hand experience turned out to be very helpful for Jenkins in the long run. He also said that during his time at WTLC, he was in the company of some of the most prominent radio people of that time. "The pd at the time was Spider Harrison, the gm was Tom Mathis, and last but not least, there was

Al "The Bishop" Hobbes, who was just starting out. But he worked his way up just like we all did. And we were all learning at the same time. There were no ego trips or anything like that." Together, these professionals generated a pool of knowledge and experience that proved very beneficial in the future.

By the early '70s, Jenkins had moved on to KNOK-AM/FM in Dallas, TX. Under the direction of Bernard Miller, Jenkins did airshifts for that station for about a year. From there he was ready to move once again. Jenkins was commut-

ing to Oklahoma when he suddenly noticed a good-sounding Urban station playing on his car stereo.

Jenkins said, "The station was WOKJ-AM. But when I pulled over to get the station's phone number from the operator. I was given the number to a different station altogether. That station was WKXI-FM in Jackson, Mt." That strange twist of fate is what brought Jenkins to the first ever black FM station in Jackson. The pd there was Bill Hunt, who Jenkins already knew from his days in Indiana.

Soon after, Jenkins took a break from broadcasting and got into artist management. He handled a few artists on the Stax label, one of which was a group known as 24 Carat Black. "I went on the road with the band—again gaining much needed first hand experience," said Jenkins. "If you've ever traveled on the road with a band, you know exactly what I'm talking about." Jenkins and the band even did soundtrack work on a movie called "The Klansman"



A few years later. Jenkins returned to Mississippi—Gulfport this time—to work for WTAM-FM. He was the operations manager as well as an on-air personality. From there Jenkins took a year off to do a bit of fund raising for the Aaron E. Henry Health Care Center in Clarksdale, MS. Following that he went back into artist management, this time forming his own company called Al Luv Enterprises. "We spent time managing a group called Natural High on Malaco Records. I was responsible for promo, PR, tour development and finance management."

By 1981 Jenkins was ready to return to radio full-tilt, without ever looking back. He came back to WTAM for the second time, resuming his duties as op mgr. Jenkins said, "I was also responsible for programming, music formatting, staff management, and acting as sales/programming liaison. I stayed there until '85, which is when I made the move to WQFX-FM. I've been here ever since, basically doing the same things I did at WTAM." continued on page 42






