Exclusive Arb Tally: Upper Demos Help Country Reverse Direction

Top 40 radio had its best Arbitron book in five years. Country, after a particularly harsh winter, nudged forward. And the usually durable AC format seemed to suffer at the hands of both, as well as the R&B oldies format, which continued to grow.

Album rock radio, unusually strong in the winter, was well below its usual level this spring, but modern rock rebounded, and classic rock really rocked. And with its core artists on prominent display at other formats, Spanish-language radio had its best book ever.

Those are the highlights of Airplay Monitor and Billboard's exclusive national format tally of the spring '99 Arbitrons in the ratings service's 94 continuous-measurement markets. Billboard took its first look at national ratings in spring 1989. At that time, AC was the No. 1 format nationally, with a 17.2 share, followed by top 40 (15.9), news/talk (11.7), country (9.4), album rock (9.0), and R&B (7.6).

A decade later, no format controls 17 shares, although N/T got pretty close as recently as six months ago,

when it posted a 16.8. N/T has been the perennial leader for several years, and remains so this time, although post-Monicagate, its numbers have returned to more normal levels. It was down 16.1-15.9 from winter to spring and down from a 16.1 in spring '98. It's the format's lowest number since summer '97. The N/T numbers include sports-talk stations, which, measured separately, would account for a 2 share.

N/T is followed by AC (14.5-13.9); R&B (12.4-12.7); top 40 (9.2-9.8); country (9.3-9.4); Spanish (6.5-6.7), which overtakes album rock (7.5-6.6); oldies (5.5-5.8); classic rock (4.2-4.7); modern rock (3.8-4.1); adult standards (2.9-2.9); jazz (2.9-2.8); religious (2.2-2.4); and classical (2.2-1.6).

OLDER DEMOS, ARTISTS PROPEL COUNTRY FORWARD

Country radio is still at roughly its fall '89 level, meaning it's in about the same place it was before Garth Brooks, Clint Black, and the gang kicked things into high gear, although some format proponents allege that because of changes in the Arbitron landscape, even that same 12-plus number represents growth for the format from over a decade ago. And it is nudging forward after nine months of decline.

Country continues to decline among teens (4.8-4.5) and in the 18-34 demo (8.4-8.2), two demos that most country PDs have long ceded to top 40. It was up, however, in 25-54 (9.5-9.7) and 35-64 (10.6-10.9). It's the first time the format has been up in 35-64 since fall '95, right around the time that many stations began filtering some older gold titles back into their libraries.

What made the difference? Spring is traditionally a heavy marketing book for the format (although that's the case for AC too). It's also significant that Kenny Rogers and George Jones appeared on the scene with current hits for the first time in years, suggesting



A Country Seminar Within Radio Seminar

While the larger Billboard/Airplay Monitor Radio Seminar takes place Oct. 7-9 at the Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach, a separate "seminar within a seminar" agenda is planned for country attendees Oct. 9. The country agenda will include a special country keynote speaker, three country-specific sessions, artist performances, and meals, all designed to keep the country attendees together and the discussion flowing throughout the day. The day will culminate with the gala Billboard/Airplay Monitor Radio Awards.

As always, our panel topics will focus on the most relevant current issues facing the country radio and record industries. The more intimate "seminar within a seminar" setting will provide a forum for real conversation, honest answers, and valuable solutions.

"Who's On First, What's On Middays" will focus on syndicated dayparts and programming the newer technologies, such as so-called virtual radio. The panel will discuss ways to work with, and compete against, these new radio tools, which can both complement and compete with local programming.

"The True Cost Of Airplay" is a session geared toward both country labels and stations. It will focus on the "cost per station" labels pay to set up each new single and where

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We Ask Again: Is Today's Country Still Country?

As country music struggles to redefine itself, times have never been tougher for PDs striving to strike a musical balance on their stations. With the shopping cart top-heavy with teen artists, brimming with female acts of all descriptions, and the dominant style being candy-coated, non-offensive AC and over-the-top pop, who's watching the store for listeners who aren't 18-to 44-year-old women? Equally troubling are growing numbers of stations that aren't even testing songs with male listeners at all.

Of the 75 titles on this issue's Country Airplay chart, 17 songs are slow ballads. Of those 17, at least seven are devoid of anything that would label them as unmistakably country records. In the uptempo column, 11 songs on the chart are not distinctly country-sounding.

An astounding 11 titles on the chart represent songs by new and veteran artists that are seemingly aimed at teens. More than half of those songs could easily fit most top 40 station playlists.

Only about four or five songs on the chart have any lyrical substance that doesn't deal primarily with happy or sad love. Where are the workingman's anthems and songs of social relevance? No need to count them, there's only one—Alan Jackson's "Little Man."

As always, Music Row has a lot in the pipeline, and a great amount of it is compelling and diverse. For the moment, however, the format's

best-selling star, Garth Brooks, has taken a hiatus to work on and promote a pop/rock project and has given country stations a thoroughly AC ballad. The one true country legend on the chart, George Jones, is still fighting for airplay despite a Country Music Assn. Award nomination for single of the year and, for whatever reason, won't be performing it at the CMA Awards.

Perhaps, just as former President Ronald Reagan publicly bellowed the stern order, "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down that wall," country music's definitive cornerstones are poised to begin crumbling. I've posed the question before in this column, and I'll ask it again—when the majority of mainstream country music stops sounding like country music, shouldn't we give it another name?

STILL AMAZED: Admit it. Most of us were predicting an upset at the top of our Country Airplay chart this issue that would have pushed Lonestar's "Amazed" (BNA) down from No. 1 after seven weeks there. However, "Amazed" finishes atop the detection and audience charts again this week.

The battle for No. 1 next issue heats up with Chely Wright's "Single White Female" (MCA Nashville) and Kenny Chesney's "You Had Me From Hello" (BNA) poised to replace Lonestar's song. Wright's track gains 62 detections to move 4-3 while Chesney gains 258 plays to jump 6-4.

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Movie Promotions Edge Out School, NFL

Movies are back at the top of the Topical Barometer this week, edging out back-to-school events, now that many schools are in session. Also back in session is the NFL. Radio is talking about the pre-season matchups, as well as the MTV Music Awards, which debuts this week at No. 8 on the list.

Top 40 WFLZ Tampa, Fla., is musing about the new *Sharon Stone* movie, "The Muse," by giving away a trip to L.A. with the *Schmooze the Muse* promotion. Winners get to attend the premiere and enjoy dinner at the star-studded Spago restaurant. "Listeners can win prize packs on the Web, and then we'll have a jock at a mall event giving contestants the chance to give us their best pitch line to 'The Muse,' which will be captured on video by a crew from E! Entertainment Television," according to bemused Jay Griffiths.

Also hitting a local mall is AC KESZ Phoenix, for its back-to-school party. "We've teamed up with all of our local sports outlets—the Mercury, Suns, Rattlers, D-Backs, and Coyotes—Blockbuster Video, and a local TV station to throw a huge fiesta for students before they get into the school year," says a studious Vicki Fiorelli.

At times, it can be near impossible to chronicle all the worthwhile promotions we get from our panelists. Here's a chance to catch up and showcase how they're putting fresh spins on standard stunts.

* **Live in it and win it.** How many ways can you get listeners to sit in a car nonstop? Top 40 WKSE (Kiss 98.5) Buffalo, N.Y., set up shop at a local county fair that attracts more than a million people. To give away a new 18-foot camper, the station is having four families of three live inside it for the duration of the fair (11 days). Joining them for *Camper Cram* will be a Kiss part-timer. What's the new twist? The camper comes with a bathroom, so the contestants will not be allowed out at all. The only thing that could make it more intense would be tornado season. **Stephanie Ringer** will be there at the end to pick up the pieces.

Classic hits WMGK Philadelphia is taking a different tack. For the chance to win a 2000 Mitsubishi Eclipse, it will have five mothers live in separate cars at a local mall—along with their sons or daughters—for as long as they can stand

it. No one will be allowed out of the vehicle, except for several scheduled 15-minute breaks each day. The family that endures the longest without driving each other nuts will get to drive home in the new car and become WMGK's **Mom of the Millennium**. Of course, the losers' kids will be put up for adoption.

* **Cash contesting.** What else can you do to cultivate the greed of your listeners in an entertaining fashion? Modern rock KEDJ (the Edge) Phoenix has been staging **Free Money Fridays** since January. "We've been giving out free money to the first 106 cars to show up with an Edge rear-window sticker on their car at an announced location," cashier **Jane Monzures** says. "People plug 1063 into our ATM and then receive money from our live cash cow, whose name is Blue. While waiting in line, people receive samplings from area clients and retailers. People can win anywhere from \$5 to \$1,000 weekly."

Top 40 WWXM (Mix 97.7) Myrtle Beach, S.C., PD **Scrap Jackson** is dying to tell us about **Crash and Turn . . . Into a Millionaire**. "We couldn't afford a big million-dollar birthday game, but afternoon jock **Kosmo** had \$20 to spare, so he bought a million-dollar flight-crash policy before he flew to Minnesota for vacation. To the winning listener's disappointment, Kosmo survived."

* **The dating game.** The great punk poet laureate **Osterberg** once said that love is like hypnotizing chickens, which hardly explains the exploits of country KYGO Denver and modern adult KMXB (Mix 94.7) Las Vegas, which both do variations of **Win a Guy/Girl Wednesday**. At KYGO, **Garret "Living" Doll** says singles come into the studio to tell listeners about themselves and what they are looking for. Then interested listeners call in to answer questions posed by the in-studio guest. The guest chooses a listener. They both come in the next day, meet on-air, and are treated to a dinner and movie. At KMXB, the guest asks questions to three members of the opposite sex, and the listeners choose the winner. "The follow-up is the best part, when [morning duo] **Mark and Mercedes** have the guests back to talk about the dates," says matchmaker **Jennifer Markham-Wynn**. "Think **Chuck Woolery** . . . It's great water-cooler talk around offices!"

* Elsewhere, top 40 WPXY Rochester, N.Y., has a **Hit Squad** that visits offices, delivering prizes. "Each week, one office that signs up at the Hit Squad page on our Web site wins an office delivery by a jock who brings along a huge gift basket with Diet Coke, food, and movie passes for the entire office," says recently departed promo ace **Tristano Korlou**.

* Country WWKA (K92) Orlando, Fla., is doing its own **Truck Show**, complete with mud runs, sled pulls, "show and shine" area, car crushing, tug of war, etc. "It's a great lifestyle event; we produce and sell sponsorships," says **Dave Demer**, while selling collision insurance.

* Rhythmic top 40 KQBT (the Beat) Austin, Texas, celebrates **The Last Summer of the Century** with customized swag prizes. "We switched to 'Last Summer' tank tops, which are in high demand, as well as Frisbees, Koozies . . . You name it, we have it tied up," says **Jody Bailey**.



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Welcome To CRS-Gulf Coast: Plenty Of Country Choices In Mobile, Ala.

Welcome to Mobile, Ala., and the regional Country Radio Seminar-Gulf Coast. You'll have plenty of radio-listening choices while you're in town. Arbitron's No. 86-ranked market had 22 stations with at least a 1 share in the spring Arbitron book, four of which are country. Although Mobile is about one-third African-American, the four country choices accounted for a combined 16.3 shares of 12-plus listening in the spring book. All four are run by major players, AMFM and Clear Channel, which have two each.

Bill Black, PD of market leader WKSJ, calls Mobile a very professional-sounding radio market, despite its size. "There are a lot of radio dollars up for grabs in this market," he says. "The more money, the more professional you have to be to get the lion's share of that."

Clear Channel owns mainstream country WKSJ (94.9 MHz) and classic country WDWG (Classic Country 104 at 104.9 MHz). WKSJ was the market's top station in the spring book, with a 9.0-9.4 jump, and was also No. 1 in the 25-54 demo. WDWG took ninth place and remained steady, with a 4.0 share 12-plus.

The AMFM stations come from other cities but can be heard and generate shares in Mobile. WXBM (102.7 MHz), based in Pensacola, Fla., about 60 miles away, was ranked No. 15 in the Mobile market, off 4.0-1.9, although it is the top-ranked station in the twice-yearly Pensacola book, with a 12.5 share. (WKSJ is No. 10 in Pensacola, with a 3.3 share.)

But Black and WXBM PD Lynn West say they do not target each other's markets. "Both stations tend to take care of their own backyard," says Black.

West says that while Mobile and Pensacola are only 60 miles apart, Mobile is "basically a different world. Mobile is more of a cosmopolitan city. Not that we're backward here—it's just different. People in Pensacola are not that concerned with what goes on in Mobile and vice versa. We don't stick our toe in Mobile."

Also rim-shooting the market is AMFM's WKNN (K99, located at 99.1 MHz), which primarily serves the Mississippi markets of Biloxi/Gulfport and Pascagoula. That station had a 1 share in Mobile in the spring book, tying for the market's No. 21 position.

Here's what you can expect to hear when you tune in the top three country outlets.

WKSJ: FLEXIBLE WITH NEW AND OLD

WKSJ takes the 12-in-a-row position outside of morning drive. After 9 a.m., there are 14 songs and two stop sets an hour. Black plays about 35 currents, and the music mix is 60% current and recurrent and 40% gold. (See sample hour on this page.)

Black says the WKSJ audience is unusual in that it likes both old and new country music and artists about equally. "We play the Sherrie Austin and the Shane Minors, but when I play [George Jones'] 'The Grand Tour,' it gets as good a response as something brand new on the charts. My audience is just real flexible when it comes to new and old."

The WKSJ gold library generally dates back to about 1988, with the exception of "anything Alabama ever released," which, for obvious reasons, works particularly well in the state. Black calls the band his "safety net."

Besides Alabama, Black says, blues-tinged music like that of Lee Roy Parnell works espe-

cially well in Mobile. Other than that, he says, "we are pretty typical in our musical taste. I look at the SoundScan [figures] every week" and find that the top-selling songs in the country are also the top sellers in Mobile.

Black describes WXBM, his chief mainstream competitor, as being "a little tighter" and "really a jukebox after mornings. I don't really hear any personality outside of morning drive." He considers WKSJ "a little more personality-oriented."

In the spring book, WKSJ ran the Filmhouse million-dollar birthday game, which includes a heavy TV schedule, and as a result, Black says, "we saw a great increase in cume" that "blasted [WXBM] out of the market."

WKSJ, which, like sister WDWG, is consulted by Craig Scott, runs "After MidNite With Blair Garner" in overnights. Most of the regular programming features are crammed into the night show, including a top seven countdown at 7 p.m., a song shootout at 8 p.m., and a "cryin', lovin', and leavin'" show 8 p.m.-midnight. During Black's midday show, he runs the "All Request Country Cafe" at noon.

Black describes WKSJ as "a heavily produced radio station" with "a lot of positioning elements." And while he says "the music comes first, that does not disallow the announcers."

The station also relies on a strong news and weather position, particularly during hurricane season, when, Black says, "we have a history of being the station to turn to." Clear Channel's radio cluster and two TV stations in the market pool their resources to form the Gulf Coast Storm Alert Network in emergencies.

WKSJ signed on as a country station in the '70s, giving it "a real heritage," according to Black, who says, "We do everything we can to thrive off that image."


Black, an Alabama native, has programmed WKSJ for four years and has worked there since 1992, following a stint as PD of K99.

TEACHING A NEW DAWG OLD HITS

Prior to the change to classic country almost exactly a year ago, **WDWG** had been doing what Black describes as a "real hot, uptempo presentation with a very tight current list." But current WDWG PD/morning man Scott O'Brien says, "The radio station, as it was, was ineffective. WKSJ was the heritage station here. Trying to play a lot of the same stuff seemed fruitless and was not paying off."

But, O'Brien adds, "because nobody else was playing Jones and Conway and Tammy Wynette," the station decided to try that route. With the help of consultant Craig Scott, the sta-

tion put together a playlist of about 800 songs, primarily from the '70s and '80s, with a "pretty good collection of songs from the '60s; a smattering of songs from the '50s" by artists like Elvis Presley, Ferlin Husky, and Stonewall Jackson; and "a pretty good amount of stuff from the early and mid-'90s," with almost nothing more recent than 1996. (See sample hour, this page.)



O'BRIEN

But what became **Classic Country 104** got off to a rocky start. It launched in September '98 at the 100,000-watt 104.1 frequency, then flipped with R&B WYOK to a less-powerful 104.9 dial position, licensed to Moss Point, Miss., just after New Year's Day of this year.

O'Brien says, "When we inherited 104.9, we inherited a whole bunch of problems. The transmitter was very old and poorly maintained, and we had some awful signal problems. In spite of all that, we managed to have halfway decent numbers."

Since then, O'Brien says, "our management acquired a new transmitter, and we made all the necessary repairs at the transmitter site."

The station uses the positioners "all country classics all the time" and "country music's greatest hits from the past five decades." And O'Brien says, "Our job now is to complement WKSJ."

O'Brien says, "We play all the traditional artists with the exception of Hank Williams, Ernest Tubb, Hank Snow, and Kitty Wells, because their music does not blend in very well with the rest of the stuff we play. It is obviously dated" in terms of production. The station will play those artists on occasion as part of a special feature such as a trivia contest.

O'Brien describes WDWG as "very music-intensive. Not fast-paced, but not sleepy either. It's a station that has a lot of respect for the music we play, which still has a lot of substance. That is what we're banking on, the substance of the music." The station does very little marketing or contesting other than giving away a few CDs now and then. "There's not a lot of whistles and bells," says O'Brien. "We let the music speak for itself, and I think it speaks very well."

WDWG features a lot of NASCAR programming and airs University of Alabama football



and basketball games. "In between that, we play a little country music," says O'Brien.

Prior to transferring over to WDWG when it changed format, O'Brien had been part of the WKSJ air staff for 13 years.

PLAYING 'TODAY'S BEST AND MOST COUNTRY'

WXBM plays about 42 currents, and, like WKSJ, is 60% current/recurrent and 40% gold. While most of the gold dates back only to the early '90s, West says that a few titles dip back as far as the mid-'80s. (See sample hour, this page.)

She admits that artists who have "second homes or family" on the Gulf Coast, such as Aaron Tippin and John Anderson, get a slight advantage on her playlist.

Although Black describes WXBM as tighter and faster on new music than his own station, West disagrees. "Musically, we're pretty close" to WKSJ, she says. "I don't think one city is more progressive than the other. It varies week by week. Sometimes I see [Black] on things sooner than me, and sometimes I'm first."

While it does not quite run WKSJ's 12 in a row, WXBM features a long "music marathon" every hour. WXBM is positioned as "today's best and most country."

For the spring book, WXBM did some telemarketing and gave away fly-away trips every week in May. For visibility, the station does at least three remotes every week.

WXBM bests WKSJ in the heritage department. It signed on as a country station in 1964 and has never changed format. As a result, West says, "people, even if they don't listen, they know the station."

West has been programming WXBM since 1995 and hosts afternoon drive. Phil Hunt of Rusty Walker Programming consults.

that contrary to popular belief, today's audiences are more interested in current titles from older country artists than in their gold. And country PDs seemingly responded to many pleas at the Country Radio Seminar and elsewhere to slow the pace at which they run titles in and out of their current rotations, although that process started long before the spring.

One more thought: Country PDs may not be sure whether it's good to have Shania Twain and Faith Hill (and now Brooks and Martina McBride) on top 40 radio, but Spanish-language radio has managed its best book ever, even while sharing Ricky Martin and Enrique Iglesias with top 40. Spanish radio had its biggest boost in 18-34 (7.9-8.4) but was also up in 25-54 and 35-64 to smaller degrees.

AC: HIT FROM ALL SIDES

AC radio, whose numbers here also include adult top 40s and soft ACs, has never been under a 14.4 share in the 10-year history of the national Arbitrums, so its decline in the spring, a book when the format is usually heavily marketed, is significant. While the format is flat among teens, it's off by .6-.7 in all other demos. It's down by a share from spring '98.

After a period of early-/mid-'90s decline, when the rise of country meant that there were no longer always four AC stations in a market, AC stabilized, moving back and forth in the 14-share range but rarely deviating from that. This book, it seems apparent that it was hit at the lower end by the resurgence of mainstream top 40 and the relative stability of country (whose best books seemed to come at AC's expense in certain markets). It also appears to be AC radio that's taking the biggest hit from the rise of R&B oldies stations this spring, particularly those with a general-market lean, since traditional oldies stations were up.


Then there's the modern adult format. In 1996-98, its rise probably helped grow the AC format and keep it vital in the 18-34 demo. But over the past six months, modern adult stations have been fleeing the format, and the evidence is that the listeners they exile are going to top 40 or modern rock, not to other ACs. AC radio's biggest decline, albeit by a tenth of a share, was in 18-34.

TOP 40 GETS ITS GAME ON

Top 40 posted its best numbers since spring '94. If it's able to build even slightly on those numbers next time, it'll be the first time the format has seen double digits since 1992. Our top 40 number includes both mainstream and rhythmic stations, of which 158 made an Arbitron book in the markets surveyed this spring vs. only 143 during the winter. If rhythmic top 40 were broken out separately, it would represent a 3 share.

Top 40 was up in all demos: teens (34.6-35.1), 18-34 (13.9-14.8), 25-54 (7.4-8.0), and 35-64 (4.6-

The spring Arbitrums also represent the first time we've done a separate number for triple-A stations. Broken out from the album rock number, they'd represent a 1 share of radio listening. Triple-A's biggest demographic bulge is in the 25-54 range, where it posts a 1.4. It has a 1.2 18-34 and a 1.1 35-64.

AMFM Spins Four To New Northwest

The largest radio company is getting a little bit *smaller*. AMFM is spinning four stations in Tri-Cities, Wash., to New Northwest Broadcasters for \$4 million. NNB will acquire country KIOK, classic rock KEGX, adult standards KALE, and news/talk KTCR; all four were picked up by AMFM when it bought Triathlon Broadcasting last winter. AMFM CEO **Jimmy de Castro** says AMFM is looking at other "strategic swaps, acquisitions, or divestitures."



Entercom Communications has increased the amount it is paying for Sinclair Broadcast Group's radio holdings to \$824.5 million, to include an additional \$3 million for N/Ts WORD/WYRD and WSPA Greenville, S.C. The FCC and DOJ must still give the deal their blessings.

Spanish Broadcasting System, the second-largest Spanish-language radio group, is filing a \$300 million IPO. CEO **Raul Alarcon Jr.** says its strategy is to expand in its existing markets and into others with large Hispanic populations.

CAPITOL

With Congress in recess, Washington, D.C., all but shuts down in August. One item from the FCC this week: It is giving Fort Myers Broadcasting, which owns AC WINK-FM, N/T WINK, and WINK-TV Fort Myers, Fla., a permanent waiver to its one-to-a-market rule. The trio has been run by the McBride family since 1964.

NEW MEDIA: WEB RADIO ON FM?

In what may be yet another threat to radio, new technology has hit the market that will help

overcome some of the sound-quality limitations of Internet streaming. A product called Radio Webcaster is an FM transmitter that connects to a computer sound card and allows the computer to transmit any audio signal to a standard FM radio. According to the sales pitch, "It's like having your very own private radio station."

CBS buy a 38% equity stake in jobs.com, an online recruitment site. Jobs.com will receive \$62 million in advertising over the next five years in CBS-owned media. "The newspaper business has long been the sole recipient of the \$17 billion classifieds advertising market. As that revenue is increasingly ceded to the [Net], we believe that jobs.com is well-positioned to benefit from the transition," says CEO **Mel Karmazin**. CBS is still considering a dedicated tracking stock for its Net holdings.

In its most recent quarterly report, Internet Advertising Bureau shows Web sites pulled in \$693 million in ad revenue in the first three months of '99, nearly doubling the \$351 million seen in the same period of '98. IAB chairman **Rich LeFurgy** says the online ad industry is on track to cross the \$3 billion mark this year. Consumer-related advertising took the biggest share of the pie at 27%, financial services accounted for 21%, and computing-related ads took 20%.

CD Radio CFO **Andrew Greenebaum** exits at the end of the month to be CFO of eCompanies, an L.A.-based incubator of Net companies.

SALES

Clear Channel is buying five stations in Parkersburg, W.Va., for \$11.5 million: country WNUS, top 40 WRVB, oldies WDMX, and N/T WLTP from Bennco Inc. and classic rock WRZZ from Impact Radio.

Country WPWC Dumfries, Va., has been sold by Happy Broadcasting Co. to L.A.-based JMK Communications for \$900,000. Neither company owns any other stations. Happy Broadcasting president "Cousin Ray" Woolfenden, a recent inductee into the Country DJ Hall of Fame who has been owner/operator and air personality at the station for 38 years, is retiring.
