WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Acting Chairman Paul Walker of the Federal Communications Commission is in prospect of an indefinite stay at the Commission helm as President Truman rasts about for someone to fill the FCC vacancy left by Wayne Coy's resignation from the chairmanship this week.

White House insiders hinted that Walker's tenure as chairman could run anywhere from "a month or so to the expiration of his term in 1953," depending on Mr. Truman's choice for the FCC vacancy. Heading a raft of names mentioned as prospects for the Commission are Robert Bartley, nephew of House Speaker Sam Rayburn, and Neville Miller, former president of the then National Association of Broadcasters (now National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters).

When a station has used the film, it returns the reels directly to the distributor.



WGN seems to have tossed everything in its studios except Col. McCormick into this radio version of a TV click, and the result was surprisingly good. The AM "Down You Go" had five panelists, Dr. Bergen Evans as moderator, a musical combo, a vocalist, and one of the most combinated set of clews and rules on

moderator, a musical combo, a vocalist, and one of the most comlicated set of clews and rules on the air. To the credit of the WGN writers who whipped it up, the show moved and was spiced, as is the TV version, by Dr. Evans' quick wit and ready tongue. Pat Tobin, local TV performer, was added to the regular TV panel. This was the format. The audience was told the saying that the panelists were trying to guess, and Evans gave the panel a clew. Example, "Parting is such sweet sorrow." Clew, "One grief bald men never know." The Starnoters played a few bars of "Too Much in Love to Say Goodbve" as a musical clew. Evans said that the last word in the saying rhymed with "borrow."

As a final hint, the Starnoters played a phrase that had the musical rhythm of the saying. Perhaps it is anti-climactical that the second quick guess named the phrase. But the panel missed on two, and got others in from one to 10 or 12 guesses.

The doctor quieted her and, after the child was moved to the hospital, the film was cut for a live interview with Dr. Hart Van Ripermedical director of the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis. With Announcer Tom Shirley priming line with astute questions, Dr. Van Riper described how polio gets into the system, the relatively small number of cases considering the population, the development of a vaccine which cures laboratory animals, another step along the road to its development for humans and the methods used to cure paralytics. The show's most fascinating

The show's most fascinating segment, actual treatment of patients at the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, was handled by Dr. Howard Rusk; its director. Televiewers saw young patients doing sit-ups and riding bikes in its gym, undergoing hydrotherapy swimming in its pool after being I owered on stretchers and finally being taught in its schoolroom. Dr. Rusk's closing commentary was that "it was impossible to disable courage and ambition," and the patients justified the truth of his remark.

The opening film was then re-

The opening film was then re-integrated to show the youngster stricken with polio leaving the hospital. An interview with a mother whose three children were polio victims and recovered filled the last portion of the program. The coupling of the film and the interview pointed up the fact that most polio patients do make com-plete recoveries which should do much to quiet the nerves of par-ents.

All televiewers interested in their health should find time spent watching this stanza well invested. Leon Morse.

Dispensing with elaborate production gimmicks utilized by more pretentious news airers, "Televiews of the News" crams plenty of news in a 15-minute period. Thursday's program (21) covered everything from Willic Suitton's capture to movie actress Elizabeth Taylor's wedding in London that morning.

Commentator Kevin Kennedy is handsome and personable, but wisely subjugates his own charm to the show's basic function—reporting the news.

Cities Service Silver Radio Jubilee

Cities Service celebrated its 25th anniversary broadcast Mon-day (18), with all the hoopla merited by radio's oldest spon-sored series. A brass band (Paul Lavalle's, of course) figured prom-inently in the special hour of programing, along with James Melton, Jessica Dragonette and Ford Bond. The last named has announced Cities Service broad-

casts for 22 years.

The nostalgie affair, beamed from Carnegie Hall, was the 1,301st program in the series, which first bowed over NBC from Carnegie February 18, 1927, and has never missed a week on the air since then. In view of radio's eurrent struggle to keep its head above-or at least level withvideo, this record of long, uninterrupted sponsorship is particularly significant, and certainly bears out broadcasters' stand that, with advertisers who know the medium best, radio still holds its own.

In line with this, it's interesting to note that Cities Service took a brief fling in TV back in 1949, via a "Band of America" simulcast, but dropped video after three months in favor of its present radio-only polley. Altho the series has retained its original musical format, it has run a full cycle of musical styles, beginning with Edwin Franko Goldman's brass band in 1927, thru the classical and semi-classical era with conductors Rosario Bourdon and Frank Black and the barbershop spiritual-folk period of the Green and White Quartet. Today the series has come full circle again with Paul Lavalle's "Band of America" show.

The anniversary program was an admirable montage of all these musical styles, with Jessica Dragonette (star of the "Cities Service Concert" for eight years during the 1930's) singing the "Valse Hug u et te" from "Vagabond King"; James Melton (who started in radio as a member of the Revelers Quartet, a Cities Service group at one time) providing a surprisingly light (for him) touch with "Hello, Young Lovers," and Paul Lavalle's 48-piece aggregation playing everything from "Shortnin Bread" to "The Cities Service Triumphal March," a band number he composed especially for the occasion. The presidential campaigns may yet prove too hot to handle on TV, if Sen. Robert Taft's appearance on "Author Meets the on TV, if Sen. Robert Tatt's appearance on "Author Meets the Critics" Thursday (21) was any indication of what we can expect in the way of explosive debate on future political airers. The show was supposedly set up as a cozy discussion of the Republican candidate's new book, "A Foreign Policy for Americans," with syndicated columnist George Sokolsky speaking in favor of it and TV's Tex McCrary (an ardent supporter of General Eisenhower) against it.

However, the studio audience was predominantly (and audibly) pro-Taft, and, judging by Moderator Faye Emerson's grim introduction, trouble was brewing before the show even went on the air. Temperature of the usually cool panel program shot up rapidly when McCrary started the discussion by bluntly stafing his opinion that Taft had switched foreign policies mid-stream in the book (isolationist to internationalist) in a "desperate last chance" to be president. "There's a difference in what a man thinks and what he says when he wants something." McCrary said, adding hastily, "Senator Taft wants to be president."

Rest of McCrary's statement was drowned out by loud voeiferous boos from the audience and a sputtering denial from Sokolsky, who leaped to his feet un-

All these production items are imaginative and, for the most part well done. Major weaknesses are the boy's delivery, which tends to be a bit on the monotonous side, and some of the lines he is called upon to render. The first may improve as the youth gains experience. The scripts, however, are a hodge-podge of hokey pseudo-Indian dialect (sometimes almost un-intelligible) and some pretty awful lines.

Rarely is the label identified and in many cases, the aertist and song title definitions are also eliminated. The net result is a healthy mixture of all types of music surrounded by sound effects, voice cuts and such other gimmicks as would give the listeners a would give the listeners a chuckle. The show includes some fine station relations work for the

chuckle. The show includes some fine station relations work for the net via plugs for the affiliates and, in one case, an on-the-air phone call to the program director of one of the stations which had run a Bob Poole contest.

Guests interviewed on the shows caught ranged from thrush Betty Clooney to chain-store owner J. C. Penney. Poole's ribbing of his guests via weird sound effects and gimmicked records rarely goes over the heads of the average listener. Yet the laughs come regularly and often.

Typical bits used during the week were a hoked-up news broadcast called "Review of the News That's Weak" and a two-minute satire of soap operacalled "The Dill Family, Featuring Ma Gherkins, the Pickle Packin Momma." The Davis committee, in it report, stated the question of televising or broadcasting sessions of Congress or other Legislatures was the concern of those bodies, but on legislative investigations the committee was encerned with the matter of private rights.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Federal Trade Commission representatives will meet with members of the newly formed Association of Record Dealers, Inc., according to Charles Katz, attorney for the dealers' group, within the near future, Katz said Thurnday (21) that he had received a letter from James Mead, chairman of the FTC, which said in effect that "arrangements are now being made for a commission attorney to meet with Katz for the purpose of developing additional information concerning discriminatory practices."

This letter, Katz noted, was in answer to the one he wrote to the FTC for the ARD, cloiming that certain record companies were engaging in discriminatory practices, such as special discounts to certain dealers for volume sales and rebates to some dealers. Katz's letter asked the FTC to investigate these complaints and to set up a code of fair trade practices for the record industry. Katz also said that he would meet next week with representatives of the anti-trust division of the Department of Justice to discuss with them information which Katz believes might be construed as violations of the Sherman antitust law. Charles Gorner, public relations man for the ARD, told The Billboard that the group intended to meet with the congressional committee in Washington now holding hearings on the Keough amendment to the Fir Trade Act to support this amendment.





I have used this gimmick for some time now and its popularity is steadily growing.





In order to stimulate interest in the disks, the mag started a disk column a month ago.

The four publications will feature heavy plugging of the new label, but the mags will do no direct mail-order selling of the disks. The firm is preparing to name a set of national distributors. Disks on the new label will sell for 89 cents, with only 78 r.p.m. releases at first, to be followed by subsequent sides on 45 r.p.m.



More industrial spots are being activated to support the stepped-up defense effort, and more of the older factories are permitting the on-location sale of eigarcities. In addition to this broadening of the base of potential eigarcite locations, many old-line operators of non-eigarcite venders have taken on tobacco equipment in order to offer full-package service to better locations. Competition between such operators and eigarcite specialists is said to have attended the purchase of new machines in greater quantities.
