The plaintiffs are three Scophony stockholders, who claim to have held 250 shares among them. They are asking the court to appoint a temporary receiver, and Judge Irving Saypol has set a hearing on their motion for next week.

Meanwhile, Levey has announced that about 80 per cent of Sklatron's stockholders have voted their approval of a new stock Isaue to finance Skiatron's subscription television test here. The new isaue, about 100,000 common shares, would bring in about \$270,000. The tests are due to come off in January.

Major Scophony stock-holders, aside from Levey and the plaintiffs in the current suit, were British Scophony, General Precisions Equipment Corporation (a Paramount subsidiary), and Television Productions, Inc. (a 20th Century-Fox subsid). The government charged that the firm was restraining use of the theater-TV inventions.





Victory at Sea

"Victory at Sea," NBC's new film history of U. S. and Allied naval operations during the "critical years—1939 to 1952," is obviously a labor of love for all concerned. Produced with the active co-operation of the U. S. Navy and the navies of our allies, the half-hour series is one of NBC's full-speed ahead- and damn the budget operations, with a raft of top-flight talent on board to make sure the final product lives up to expectations. However, in liming up its big name staff, NBC evidently suffered an embarrassment of riches, with the result that "Victory at Sea" has everything it takes to be an outstanding TV film documentary but proper balance and paefing.

Thruout the first two films, the

mentary but proper balance and pacing.
Thruout the first two films, the viewer's eyes and ears are in almost constant disagreement, while brilliant photography, commentary and background music vie simultaneously for his attention. The ears easily win out, with Robert Russell Bennett's arrangement of Richard Rodgers' first original score for TV out, shining every other aspect of production.

The Rodgers score (longest symphonic work ever written—almost 13 hours of music) will be issued later this year as an RCA Victor record album, and a major publishing house will bring out a "Victory at Sea" book in pictorial form at the same time—all of which points up the really remarkable artistic merit of the series when tabulated on the basis of its separate entitles.

Altho NBC hails "Victory at Sea" as the "first network-produced motion picture to present contemporary history in a dramatic manner," the fact remains that the March of Time has done it with "Crusade in Europe" (1948) and, more recently, "Crusade in the Pacific."

However, the MOT treatment of the subject had more in common with newspaper-type coverage, in that it was spotty and rough around the edges, yet imbued with that urgent sense of vitality and immediacy so characteristic of the best documentary films.

acteristic of the best documentary films.

By comparison, the NBC series is a beautifully bound, carefully documented history book, highly respected for literary content and style, but far too redundant and slow moving to win any popularity polls with the average history student.

Little Cutting

After screening more than 50,000,000 feet of film from 10 different governments, it's understandable that producer Henry Solomon and film editor Isaac Kleinerman were reluctant to sacrifice some of their rarer film finds to the cutting room floor. Unfortunately, tho, many of the "rare" shots bear such a close resemblance to familiar old newsreel pictures that the viewer of ten receives the impression that the series is "padded" with unnecessary footage to bring its trunning time up to the half-hour mark.

If one 'picture is worth 1,000

If one picture is worth 1,000 words, a single shot of outstanding quality is certainly more effective by itself than strirounded by four or five lesser views of the same subject. For instance, in the second episode, "The Pacific Boils Over," suspense is built by alternating film clips of peacetime Hawali (hulu girls, etc.) with shots of Japanese planes winging toward Pearl Harbor.

The captured Japanese films are so similar that at one point the suspense borders dangerously on farce (a la the quickie Westernproducer's technique of using the same posse shot for both sides).

Opening item was titled "The Inquisitors," and dealt with a young Communist official in Czechoslo akie who ultimately rebelled against being forced to supply slave laborers to the gov-

supply slave laborers to the government.

His ultimate decision to use his position to undermine the government came after analysis by a psychiatrist he was supposed to linger. This analyses revealed that he was an example of that type of person who worried too much about his fellow man and not enough about himself, and therefore did not enjoy himself sufficiently in his youth—the inference being that as a result the Reds were able to lead him up the garden puth.

All this was intermingled with a family struggle wherein his wife sought to persuade the young official to change allegiance. This brought her a couple of resounding whacks in the face before her counsel bore fruit. The gal, played by Anne Burr, also appeared in the opening and closing sequences with the doctor, and it was she who presumably told the story.

According to insiders the reason was a solid combination—Les Paul and Mary Ford on stage with the Rita Hayworth pie, "Affair in Trinidad," on the screen.

The Loew fiasco was attributed to poor pictures. "Film bookers take a look at pictures, and when they see a real stiff, that's the one they put into a theater with a stage show, arguing if the live attractions are that good, we don't need a picture." The result is a box office fiasco for which


Club Violation

More than 98 per cent of 260,163 tobacco growers policed last month favored flue-cured tobacco marketing quotas, the Agriculture Department announced this week. Most of them also favored the imposition of quotas for three years, altho 2,639 supported a one-year guota.

Since more than the necessary two-thirds of those voiting favored tobacco, the department said the three-year program will go inteffect July 1, '953.

Sugar Use Stable

Civilian consumption of sugar and cocoa will stay at close to 1951 levels, if preliminary Agriculture Deportment estimates of this year's consumption are borne out. The average American consumed 96.3 pounds of sugar last year, while average per capita consumption is expected to be between 91 to 96 pounds this year. This compares with a 1935-39 average of 97 pounds of sugar pernerson. Cocoa consumption perperson totaled 4 pounds in 1951 and expected to remain at the same figure for 1952, compared with a 1935-39 average of 44 pounds per person. The average percapita consumption of pennuts has not been estimated for 1952, the 1950 and 1951 averages stood at 44 pounds per person. Sugar marketed domestically by primary distributors during the first half of 1952 totaled 4,071,000, about the same as that of a year earlier, but almost 10 per cention of 1952 is expected to exceed that in the comparable period of 1951.

Cigarette Use Rises

Cigarette e-nsumption during the year ending July 30 bit a record 385 billion—4 per cent more than the previous year, according to the 'atest Agriculture Department report. The 1952 crop of burley obacco, indicated at 599 million pounds as of July 1. is 3 per cent under last year's record crop, but still appears likely to be the fourth largest crop in history. Burley carry-over this fall is exceeded to be large; than a very ago and 1952-53 supplies now appear likely to risk 4 per cent above last year's level the tepartment said.

Sugar Imports Off

Sugar imports from the Philippines thru the first seven months of 1952 totaler 1.273,142.017 pounds. 631,000,000 nounds under the established quota, according to lettest Treasury Department figures. Jobacco imports from the Philippines in the same period totaled 1,325,345 pounds, with a quota of 6.506,000 nounds
