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Country's Brightest Stars Highlight CMA October Activities

It is unmatched for excitement, pagentry and splendor anywhere else in Country Music. It is the night when Country Music's brightest stars are celebrated and honored from the hallowed stage which represents all that is revered in Country Music. It is truly Country Music's finest hour.

October is Country Music Month throughout the United States, and Monday, October 14 is the 19th Annual Country Music Association Awards Show. Hosted by Anne Murray and Kris Kristofferson, two of the industry's most gifted and exciting entertainers, the evening's activities will center around the stage of the Grand Ole Opry where Country Music's finest will be honored for their stellar artistic achievements during the past year. The initiation of a new award or 1985—The Music Video of the Year Award—will focus attention on the expanding technology in the industry and recognize achievement in the medium.

Among the artists who will perform on the annual extravaganza are: Alabama, Johnny Cash, Crystal Gayle, Emmylou Harris, Waylon Jennings, The Jards, Kris Kristofferson, Dave Loggins, Loretta Lynn, Gary Morris, Willie Nelson, Ray Price, Kenny Rogers, Ricky Skaggs and Hank Williams, Jr. and the 'Bama Band These outstanding artists, representing all acets of the industry, are in addition to the rainbow of stars who will attend. Following the Awards Show talecast, the performers and guests will attend the gala postawards party in the magnificent Presidential Ballroom at Opryland Hotel.

The entire nation can enjoy the festivities through the live telecast on the CBS Television Network and a stereo radio simulcast over the Mutual Broadcasting System, as well as a pre- and post-awards radio special carried on Mutual. Viewers in major Canadian cities will also enjoy the Awards Show on a satellite distributed network of independent television stations. Additionally, attention will be focused on the Awards when DIR Broadcasting produces its third Horizon Award Special

scheduled to air the weekend prior to the show on the Silver Eagle Network.

The CMA Awards Show is always the highlight of the Country Music calendar, and its superb performances and professional production have been factors in the increased viewer awareness and positive perception of Country Music. A special promotional effort between CMA and NARM has resulted in a highly successful point of purchase campaign designed to publicize Country Music Month and increase Country sales activity during the entire month of October. With the theme "Bring Home Country's Brightest Stars", merchandisars' requests for P-O-P promotional pieces numbered 900,000.

Country Music Month, celebrated each year by Presidential procession in October, is also marked by several other important events. Talent Buyers Entertainment Marketplace, held this year on October 11–13, is spongored by CMA for the benefit of all those involved in live onto tainment in the Country Music industry.

"The Fast-Foward March" is the theme chosen by the Coaltion to Save America's Music for their rally and reception on Tuesday, October 15 at 2:30 p.m. at the Vander oilt Plaza Hotel. Jointly sponsored by CMA and the National Music Publishers Association for the Coalition, the forum will focus attention on the grass roots campaign for the home taping legislation now pending in Congress and will feature leading authorities on the subject. Appearing at the rally, which is open to members of CMA, NSAI, NMA and NMPA will be: Louise Mandrell, Roger Miller, George David Weiss, Ralph Peer and Stan Gortikov.

The Country Music Association's fourth quarterly meeting of the Board of Directors is also scheduled for Tuesday, October 15. The final CMA event will be the election of new Directors at the Annual Membership Meeting on Wednesday, October 16 at 9:00 a.m. at the Opryland Hotel.

ORIZON

In 1981, the Board of Directors of the Country Music Association established the Horizon Award to honor that artist who for the first time in the field of Country Music demonstrated the most significant creative growth and development in overall chart and sales activity, live performance professionalism, and critical media recognition.

The Horizon Award is **not** a new artist award, but rather is intended to recognize an outstanding artist development effort. Although the award goes to the artist, others share credit for the success. The artist's manager, agent, producer, publicist and record label personnel are some of the elements which must function effectively to create a star. Today's star on the horizon may be tomorrow's superstar.

Previous winners Terri Gibbs (1981), Ricky Skaggs (1982), John Anderson (1983), and The Judds (1984) have all exemplified the type career development the award is meant to honor.

The outstanding artists nominated for the 1985 CMA Horizon Award are:

RAY CHARLES CBS Records

Superlatives seem trite when applied to a man of Ray Charles' musical ability and genius. He is the embodiment of greatness, with respect from his peers that borders on reverence. His music transcends all barriers of language, culture, and musical genres and runs the gamut of musical styles, making rhythm and blues, rock, and Country all uniquely his element.

Of himself, Ray says, "I was born with music inside me; music was one of my parts...it was a necessity for me, like food or water." An accomplished musician, he

taught himself how to play and write for every brass and wind instrument in an orchestra, specializing in piano, organ and sax. He composes and arranges, and his proficiency in a recording studio has given rise to the rumor that Ray Charles really can see. And see he could, until glaucoma effected his sight, and at the age of six, darkness closed in.

He began to play music professionally at the age of 15 when he joined a dance band, and signed his first major recording contract in 1954 with Atlantic Records. His first hit was the classic "I Got A Woman", followed in rapid succession by "Hallelujah, I Love Her So" and "What'd I Say". But his Country/soul records, beginning with MODERN SOUNDS IN COUNTRY & WEST-ERN MUSIC, recorded in 1962, became his signature songs. "I Can't Stop Loving You", "You Don't Know Me", "You Are My Sunshine", and "Take These Chains From My Heart"—all became classics from the golden throat and special treatment of the "genius". A second volume of the album was recorded in 1965; both were certified gold, and today remain two of his most remembered accomplishments. "Georgia" and "America The Beautiful" were immortalized by Ray Charles' mastery-his rendition of the latter was one of the highlights of CMA's Twenty-fifth Anniversary Special performed in Washington, D.C. in 1983. His FRIENDSHIP offering for Columbia Records, with whom he signed in 1983.



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paired Ray with 10 musical greats and produced a number of chart-topping duets, including the poignant "Seven Spanish Angels", his collaboration with Willie Nelson. The singles from this album marked Ray's first broad acceptance by Country radio and helped garner the Horizon Award nomination, attesting to his first time career development in the field.

MEL McDANIEL Capitol Records

In a day when stars sometimes become egomaniacs, Mel McDaniel has a modesty that is as refreshing as it is honest. The singer/songwriter who signed with Capitol Records nine years ago only now seems to be approaching the zenith of his career, and his face wears a broad grin and his eyes flash and sparkle when he speaks of number one records and standing room only crowds.



But this Tulsa, Oklahoma native is anything but a flash in the pan. A string of memorable tunes such as "Have A Dream On Me", "Louisiana Saturday Night", "Right In the Palm of Your Hands" and "I Call It Love" established his name long before "Baby's Got Her Blue Jeans On" took him to the top of the charts for the first time in 1985. But that Bob McDill tune set off a chain reaction of events in his life that very often happens only once in the career of an artist. "Blue Jeans" is fast becoming the signature song for the big, friendly blonde, although his follow up, "Let It Roll (Let It Rock)" became an enormous hit and acclaimed video. Not only did "Blue Jeans" have direct and predictable impact on Mel's booking picture, but suddenly huge turn-away crowds were jamming his shows and promoters were racing to re-order the act. It's a dream come true for the music industry veteran who criss-crossed the highways of America in a van, pulling a trailer loaded with equipment to one-night stands in one honky-tonk after another.

Mel McDaniel and his success story are what the Country Music dream is all about. It still happens, and it's something wonderful to behold.

EDDY RAVEN RCA Records

Known by his many admirers as one of the most creative and sensitive writers to hit the Nashville scene,

Eddy Raven continues to gain success after success. Winner of 14 ASCAP awards for songwriting, Eddy was a destined hit when in 1974 Roy Acuff, singing the Raven-penned "Back in the Country", made his first charted hit in 19 years. His creative writing ability led him to an even higher stature in 1982 when the Oak Ridge Boys topped the Country charts with another of Eddy's compositions, "Thank God For Kids".



Eddy's new RCA album, LOVE AND OTHER HARD TIMES, is proof positive that this Louisiana native is hot. The album is a combination of seven self-penned compositions plus three from other writers. With the LP's first single, "Operator, Operator" hitting the top ten, and Eddy's most recent release "I Wanna hear It From You" bulleting up the charts, Eddy's popularity is not soon to die.

It wasn't until some of his best songs were turned down that Eddy knew he would have to be a singer to get his musical message across. Sing he did—hit after hit—such songs as "I Should've Called", "Who Do You Know in California", "She's Playing Hard to Forget" and "I Could Use Another You". His first number one single, "I Got Mexico" in 1984 indeed proved that Eddy knows what is best for him. His surging career has propelled him into the Horizon Award category for 1985.

P-O-P Campaign Off To Good Start

The Country Music industry has displayed an incredible amount of support in this year's Point of Purchase campaign, with close to 900,000 promotional pieces shipped to retailers and rack jobbers representing more than 3,000 locations. Orders from such national rack jobbers as Handleman, Lieberman, Western Merchandisers, Sight & Sound Distributing, Interstate and Arrow Distributing were placed.

Themed "Bring Home Country's Brightest Stars", the purpose of the merchandising campaign is to establish higher visibility for the October 14th CMA Awards Show, as well as, boost sales and awareness of Country product both before and after the show. To aid in promoting product after the show, two posters, one depicting the Entertainer of the Year finalists and one with the covers of the Album of the Year Finalists (see separate story for list of 1985 Awards finalists) are available to retailers. Additionally, divider cards, which are available to retailers and racks, are designed to highlight the CMA nominees, finalists and winners. All the P-O-P graphics will prominently display the CMA, Kraft and Give the Gift of Music logos.

A display contest conducted in each division—rack and retail—is a feature of the 1985 P-O-P campaign. Deadline for entering the contest, sponsored by NARM (National Association of Record Merchandisers), is November 15, 1985. According to Pam Cohen of NARM, "The contest combined with the exceptional graphics of the campaign should generate some super viewing of the show."

Roy Wunsch, Chairman of CMA's Retailers/Record Merchandisers Committee said about the 1985 campaign, "CMA and NARM's combined efforts on behalf of the industry, plus a graphic theme that is representative of where Country Music is today should produce the most successful fall marketing season we have ever achieved," concluding, "This approach works for all labels and can, and will, work for all participating accounts.

Lomax Responds To Times Article

The following letter to the editor was written by John Lomax III, a Nashville free lance journalist and author, in response to the September 17, 1985 *New York Times* article entitled "Nashville Sound: Blues for Country Music".

To The Editor:

As a longtime member of the Nashville music press I was very disturbed by Robert Palmer's article in yesterday's paper (9–17). I feel that Mr. Palmer chose to present only one side of the coin. In so doing he overlooked several salient points:

Country sales are down when measured by the all-time highs posted in the 1979–1982 period. When viewed against the 65 years of recorded country history, they are very healthy.

The "Nashville Sound", begun by Chet Atkins, Owen Bradley, Don Law, Anita Kerr, Floyd Cramer and others in 1958 has been "dead" for at least ten years, replaced by many different styles.

Country Music is not a style which appeals exclusively to an over 50 crowd. Recent studies have shown that, if anything, the country audience is getting younger thanks to the recent radio breakthroughs of Sawyer Brown, Kathy Mattea, Restless Heart, Vince Gill, John Schneider and Southern Pacific.

I'm sure that if Mr. Palmer attended a concert by George Strait, Reba McEntire, Exile or Steve Wariner he would notice the majority of the crowd to be under 35.

Some of the stars are losing their grip on the buying public but this is a common occurrence in show business. The examples given: Conway Twitty, Crystal Gayle, Barbara Mandrell, Mickey Gilley and Waylon Jennings are all artists who made their recording debuts in the 1960's and all have benefitted from intense airplay for at least ten years.

Country Music is in a period of transition common to any musical form. The older acts are being replaced by the acts mentioned in the fourth and fifth paragraphs. I don't believe that The Judds or the Forester Sisters feel that the Nashville dream has died. Neither had previously recorded before coming to town yet both acts hit No. 1 with their second single. (The Foresters are #1 this week in *BILLBOARD*). The Judds have gone on to post a gold album.

Jason and the Scorchers may have "opened doors" for such talented Nashville artists as Webb Wilder and The Beatnecks, Walk The West and Will Rambeaux and the Delta Hurricanes but the fact remains that none of them have gained a recording deal as a result. Better Mr. Palmer should have mentioned Tim Krekel & The Sluggers (recently signed to Arista) or Billy Chinnock (CBS).

If Country Music is in such bad shape why are such former rock or pop artists as Neil Young, Dan Fogelberg, Ray Charles, Jimmy Buffett, Dan Seals, Nicolette Larson and John McFee rushing onto the bandwagon?

The finalists for the upcoming Country Music Association Awards (CBS TV, October 14) clearly show the emergence of many new artists. All five of the nominees for "Entertainer of the Year"—Alabama, Lee Greenwood, Reba McEntire, Ricky Skaggs and George Strait—enjoyed their first big hit in 1980 or later.

How could any article like this one fail to mention Rosanne Cash?

In light of the above I feel justified in saying that Mr. Palmer's article was short on balance. Country Music has existed as a recorded entity since 1920. The form has been through slumps before and each time it has rebounded to even higher levels.

Just because Mr. Palmer has dug a grave for Country Music and "the Nashville dream" does not mean we are going to lie in it.

1st UK Album Sales Charts Show Broad Product Mix

CMA's United Kingdom Country Album Chart debuted August 17 in MUSIC WEEK, the UK's major trade magazine (see story September CLOSE UP). Reprinted here are the first two charts. The charts are compiled for CMA by Gallup, the organization which also compiles the British pop charts. Released every two weeks on Thursdays, the chart ranks the top 30 Country releases in combined sales of LP's, cassettes and compact discs. SAWYER BROWN Capitol/Curb Records

The group Sawyer Brown burst onto the Country Music scene with all the subtlety of a hurricane. Discounting their meteoric rise to fame, their story is one of determination and unfaltering belief in God-given musical abilities and natural inclination for entertaining people. The group members have gained their success the best possible way—they've earned it.

The members first united on stage in 1981 as the touring group for recording artist, Don King. When he stopped touring, the band decided to stay together.

Taking the name of a Nashville street, the members booked themselves as Sawyer Brown. A chance audition in October, 1983 for the nationally-syndicated "Star Search" television talent hunt, landed them in Los Angeles for five months. After winning the competition for 12 straight weeks, the quintet walked away from the finals as "Best New Star Musical Group" and pocketed \$175.000 in accumulated prize monies.

A recording contract with Capitol/Curb Records followed as well as tours with Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton, Crystal Gayle, the Oak Ridge Boys and Eddie Rabbitt. Their debut album, SAWYER BROWN, is full of upbeat songs that just make people feel good, as well as a couple of pretty tunes like the third single, "Used to Blue". Their sound is unique and their style infectious; talent is the main ingredient, but their success also stems from the bubbling, fun-loving personalities they project from the stage and in their music. Lead singer Mark Miller, who also writes material for the group, is an incredibly energetic dancer whose antics carry him all over the stage.

All gifted instrumentalists, the group consists of Miller on lead vocals and rhythm guitar; Bobby Randall on lead guitar, fiddle, steel guitar, harmonica and vocals, Gregg Hubbard, keyboards and vocals, Jim Scholten on bass and Joe Smyth on drums and percussion. They are a combination of different musical backgrounds and styles who have come together to form one of Country's most exciting new sounds.

JOHN SCHNEIDER MCA Records

Within only a few short years, John Schneider has earned the reputation as one of the entertainment industry's most prolific creative talents. As an actor, he created the role of "Bo Duke" on the long-running CBS television show, "Dukes of Hazzard", and has starred in made-for-television movies, several specials and full-length feature films. In addition, he is a capable producer, screenwriter and director, with his own production company devoted to creating and producing promotional videos.



Although he has been performing most of his life (he started acting at the age of 9), his multi-faceted career is only beginning to reach its full potential with his venture into Country Music. John had recorded four albums for Scotti Brothers Records in the early 1980's and enjoyed some success with hits such as "It's Now Or Never", "Them Good Ol' Boys Are Bad", and "Dreamin". But it was not until signing with MCA Records in 1984 that John hit his full stride. His first single for the label, "I've Been Around Enough To Know", (test-mailed in a white, unlabeled jacket) reached number one on the national Country charts, and his debut MCA album, TOO GOOD TO STOP NOW, quickly became his best-selling product to date, thanks in part to the follow-up single, "Country Girls".

For his second MCA album, TRYIN' TO OUTRUN THE WIND, John became even more involved with his music, serving as co-producer with Jimmy Bowen, selecting material, and working on arrangements and mixes in addition to providing vocals. Country Music has opened its arms to welcome this multi-talented entertainer to the fold, and it looks as if his run will be a long one indeed.

Wife of the late Country great Tex Ritter, Dorothy's tireless efforts on behalf of the handicapped began after she learned that her first born, Tom, had cerebral palsy. A pioneer advocate for the rights of the physically handicapped, Dorothy has traveled from as near as our nation's capitol to as far as South Africa spreading the word about the plight of handicapped people. She has been instrumental in raising funds for hospitals, care units, and support groups.

Joining in her struggle have been Dorothy's two sons, Tom and John. Tom, the host of a local television show in Los Angeles on KTLA-TV and announcer on KCSN-FM, has devoted his life to making others aware of the special needs and concerns of physically handicapped people. And John, who has become a household name since starring on ABC's "Three's Company" and "Three's A Crowd", is national spokesman and host for the United Cerebral Palsy "Weekend With The Stars" Telethon. Both Tom and John, along with John's wife Nancy Morgan Ritter, were in Nashville to share this special night with Dorothy.

Dorothy has been honored several times for her multitudinous contributions to the handicapped: she was the first woman ever elected National Vice President of United Cerebral Palsy Association, Inc.; she is listed in "Who's Who in America" and "International Who's Who of American Women" she has served on the President's Committee on Employment of the Handi-

HOME TAPING

The following article was written by Amy Longsworth of the **Coalition to Save America's Music** in Washington.

Remember the old story about the king and the bright young fellow who invented the game of chess? The game so delighted the king that he promised the young man whatever his heart desired. The young man's request was simple: He asked the king to place a single grain of wheat on one square, then two in the next, then four in the next, continuing the doubling until all the chess squares had been filled. Long before the counting was done, the king's storehouses were all emptied. The number of pieces of grain the king owed the young man was two followed by 64 zeroes—a number so large there wasn't even a name for it!

The principle the young man applied to getting rich can just as easily be applied to getting information around. And that is what grassroots action is all about: multiplying contacts to achieve a wide distribution of a particular message, and using that message to enlist support for achieving a goal.

The coalition to SAVE AMERICA'S MUSIC (SAM) has mounted a grassroots campaign on the issue of home taping. The idea is to inform as many people as possible about the harm that home taping causes and the simple legislative solution that can benefit both those who want to continue to tape and those who are hurt by it.

How Grassroots Organizing Works

The SAM grassroots strategy is a fairly simple, six step process:

- (1) DEVELOP A MESSAGE. SAM has come up with a straightforward, three-part message: (a) Home taping is unfair to artists and others in the music industry. (b) There is an alternative. (c) We need your help in convincing Congress to make this alternative a law.
- (2) ESTABLISH A NETWORK. Find those persons and groups who are most directly affected by home taping. Inform them of the impact of home taping and enlist their support. SAM has enlisted the support of more than 20 trade associations affected by home taping. Fan clubs and other groups of music lovers have also been contacted.

- (3) BUILD LEVERAGE. Identify the key spokespersons who can participate in media interviews. Corporate leaders, recording artists and others have been recruited to help SAM spread the word.
- (4) GET THE WORD TO THE WIDEST POSSIBLE AUDIENCE. SAM has arranged for editorials, op ed pieces, interviews, and other activities that will raise the level of public interest in home taping and prompt others to join us.
- (5) TARGET DECISION MAKERS. Bring the message on home taping to decision makers from two directions; first, from those who have the most influence on them—voters, and second, from the key spokespersons, whose personal and professional credibility give weight to their opinions.
- (6) GET FEEDBACK AND RETURN IT TO THE SYSTEM. SAM serves as a clearinghouse for information on the home taping issue. They direct this information to decision makers to give them a sense of what people around the country think about the issue. To be most effective, SAM needs to hear about any action you take and should receive copies of the letters you write to Congress.

From Information to Action

There you have it. Grassroots organizing is simply a fancy term for decreasing the time and distance between getting information and taking action—then focusing that action where it is most likely to achieve results.

You can help the efforts of the SAM Coalition in the following ways:

- Identify those around you who are most affected by home taping and encourage them to help. Show them—concretely—how their interests are affected.
- Write letters to your Senators and Representatives about home taping. The SAM Coalition can help by providing sample letters and suggesting activities.
- Provide SAM with as much data and exposure as you can. In particular, the Coalition needs mailing lists and forums for getting the word out.

All three songs were penned by Writers Group songwriters.

CLOSE UP would like to acknowlede **Max D. Barnes** as co-writer of George Jones' single, "Who's Gonna Fill Their Shoes". The release is best described as a travelogue through the history of Country Music.

The Creative Radio Network has announced exclusive representation of TM's "The Story of Country Music". The show is sold as a 48 hour special, but special emphasis will be directed in the marketing of the show during Country Music Month. "Half Nelson", an album of duet projects by Willie Nelson, was released on CBS/Columbia Records in early September. A highlight of the album is a duet with Hank Williams, Sr. entitled "I Told A Lie To My Heart". The Williams' song, which has never appeared on a commercial record, was discovered by the staff of the Country Music Foundation in a collection of original demonstration recordings preserved by the pioneering Columbia Records staff producer Art Satherley. According to Bill Ivey of the Foundation, the demos were recorded by Williams in late 1946 or early 1947 when he became a staff writer for Acuff-Rose Publishing. "I Told A Lie To My Heart" includes some additional rhythm guitar measures added by Ivey, plus a guitar solo and harmony vocals featuring Nelson.

"Meet Me In Montana", Marie Osmond and Dan Seal's current Capitol Records duet, became the focal point of a promotion gimmick in September. Sponsored by Northwest Orient Airlines, the state of Montana, Capitol Records and key Country radio stations in fourteen major markets, the promotion was targeted at bringing attention to the single and encouraging skiers to visit Montana ski resorts this fall. The heart of the "Meet Me in Montana" campaign was a fourteen city promotion involving tie-ins with Country radio stations and local ski shops.
