







1989 CMA Awards Finalists Announced

odney Crowell, Ricky Van Shelton and Hank Williams, Jr. have claimed the most nominations for the 1989 Country Music Association Awards, each garnering four nods apiece. Trailing the top ontenders with three nominations are newcomer Clint Black, the Nitty citty Dirt Band, George Strait, Randy Travis and Keith Whitley. Johnny Cash, Rosanne Cash, the Desert Rose Band, Vern Gosdin, Patty Loveless, Kathy

Mattea, Reba McEntire and Shenandoah each received two nominations. In addition to a Male Vocalist of the Year nomination, Crowell was nominated for

Single and Song of the Year honors for his self-penned "After All This Time". His video of "After All This Time" claimed a Video of the Year nomination for Director Bill Pope.

1988 Horizon Award winner Shelton received nods in the Entertainer and Male Vocalist of the Year categories. His LOVING PROOF lp garnered an Album of the Year nomination, while his number one hit, "I'll Leave This World Loving You" captured a Single of the Year nomination.

Two-time Entertainer of the Year (1987, 1988) Hank Williams, Jr. was again nominated for that honor. He also received two nominations in the Vocal Event of the Year category, one with Johnny Cash and another with his legendary father, Hank Williams, Sr. Bocephus' video for "There's A Tear In My Beer" racked up a nomination for Video Director Ethan Russell.

First-time CMA nominee Clint Black took an Horizon Award nomination. His single, "A Better Man", which he co-wrote with Hayden Nicholas received Single and Song of the Year nods.

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's much touted WILL THE CIRCLE BE UNBROKEN VOL II lp received an Album of the Year nomination and spawned a Vocal Event of the Year nomination for the group as well as fellow Coloradoan John Denver. Videc Director Bill Pope claimed a Video of the Year nomination for the album's title-track

Texan George Strait, a three-time CMA Award winner, is a contender for the Entertainer and Male Vocalist of the Year Award. His BEYOND THE BLUE NEON Ip is also competing in the Album of the Year category.

Current Male Vocalist of the Year Randy Travis is again a nominee for that citation, Entertainer of the Year and Album of the Year (OLD 8 X 10).

The late Keith Whitley, who died May 9, was nominated for Horizon Award, Mal Vocalist of the Year and Single of the Year ("I'm No Stranger To The Rain"). Songwrite Bob McDill garnered a nomination for the Whitley cut, "Don't Close Your Eyes".

The 23rd Annual CMA Awards Show, hosted by Anne Murray and Kenny Rogers, will be telecast live from Nashville on CBS-TV Monday, October 9 from 9:00 - 11:00 p.m. (ET). The show is produced by Bob Precht of Sullivan Productions and directed by Walter Miller. Irving Waugh serves as executive producer for CMA, and Donald Epstein scripts the show. For the seventh year, a stereo radio simulcast of the show will be satellite-delivered by Mutual Broadcasting System. CTV will also carry the show live in Canada. Cu

<u>Country Video Is Coming Of Age</u> New Survey Says Outlets, Viewership Up

he latest survey by Aristo Video Promotions in Nashville concluded June 30 - says that the number of outlets continues to increase for Country Music videos and that radio is finding more uses for the clips. The study also asserts that the growth of low-power television stations in major markets and the expansion of many cable systems from 36 to 55 channels spell good news for Country videos.

Aristo services and promotes videos for about half of Nashville's major Country labels, as well as for selected indie and gospel record companies.

Such established outlets as Country Music Television and The Nashville Network are also steadily enlarging their viewership, the report says. CMT, according to the survey, now reaches more than 13 million people, including 350,000 subscribers in Canada. "With its rotation structure and its extended library life of clips," the report notes, "CMT offers the opportunity for over 1,000 airings of any given clip in its first year of release if that clip reaches heavy-rotation status."

While The Nashville Network has not scheduled more time for videos. its two regular video shows, "Video Country" and "Country Clips", have the potential to reach 45.4 million homes. In addition, 13 "Video Country" shows are being broadcast in Italy this year, according to the Aristo study.

This fall, VH-1 will begin airing a Country segment, the report notes. A spokeswoman at VH-1 confirms that a half-hour Country segment is on the drawing boards and that it will probably air daily. Neither a title nor debut date has been determined, she says.

Other growth areas, the study contends, are regionally syndicated shows, national satellite programming services, the Armed Forces Network, Canada's Much Music channel, video pools, video jukeboxes, individual nightclubs, regional outlets, and radio stations.

Two regionally syndicated video programs, "The Country Record Guide" and "Hit Video Country", cover 42 markets in the Northeast, the mid-Atlantic, and the South.

Ten video pools, according to the survey, now service Country reels to more than 1,100 locations. Eight of these have expanded the length of their Country compilations or increased the frequency of Country reel distribution in the past year.

Rowe International uses 38 clips monthly on its Country reel and services it to 350 jukebox locations.

At least 70 regional outlets, the report continues, program Country videos. Of these, 31 are in the South, 19 in the Midwest, 11 in the East, and nine in the West.

Aristo polled 210 radio stations that report their playlists to trade publications to see if videos were making any impact on their programming or promotional activity.

Among the 55 stations that responded, 36 said videos had influenced their decision to program singles; 40 said videos had generated requests for records before radio had aired the songs in their markets; and 48 said they want to be serviced with videos on a regular basis.

Artists whose videos led to early requests for radio play, the respondents specified, included Clint Black ("Better Man"), Dolly Parton ("Why'd You Come In Here Lookin' Like That"), Kenny Rogers ("Planet Texas"), Hank Williams, Jr. ("There's A Tear In My Beer"), Reba McEntire ("Cathy's Clown"), Lionel Cartwright ("Give Me His Last Chance"), Becky Hobbs ("Jones On The Jukebox"), Lorrie Morgan ("Dear Me"), Suzy Bogguss ("Somewhere Between"), and Mason Dixon ("When Karen Comes Around").

Besides familiarizing station personnel with new acts and material, radio respondents said they used videos for listening parties, training new sales people, remote broadcasts, club and local television tie-ins, and contest prizes. Most stations, however, reported that they have no additional uses for videos.

Nashville "Home" For Three More Record Labels

urb Records, Arista and Atlantic have opened offices in Nashville this summer while other labels are making plans to expand.

That's good news to the Country Music industry.

"One has to be 'bullish' about Country Music's future," said Ed Benson, CMA's associate executive director.

"It is a tremendous boost to have more major record labels involved in marketing the music. And the commitments by several existing labels to expand into new headquarters will reinforce Nashville's position as the industry center."

Curb Records first dabbled in Country 20 years ago with a roster that boasted Hank Williams, Jr., Mel Tillis and Tompall and the Glaser Brothers.

Now the label's roster includes Ronnie McDowell, Moe Bandy, Johnny Lee, pop-turned-Country star Bobby Vinton, Cee Cee Chapman, Jan Brown and Josh Logan. Curb also releases records in association with major labels. Acts represented include The Desert Rose Band and Lyle Lovett on MCA/Curb, The Judds on RCA/ Curb, Sawyer Brown and Marie Osmond on Capitol/Curb and Hank Williams, Jr. on Warner Bros./Curb.

"Our roster has gotten the size that we need a headquarters here," said Dick Whitestone, president of Curb's Country division.

"One of the reasons we elected not just to open an office but to purchase an office on the Row was for the purpose of expansion."

Former independent promoter Mike Borchetta, Curb's new vice president of national promotion, and associate Sue Austin began work in July out of the new Nashville office located at 47 Music Square East.

Until recently Atlantic Records also had a Country roster but no Nashville office. Rick Blackburn, former CBS/Nashville chief, and Producer Nelson Larkin will head Atlantic Records' Nashville operations.

The Atlantic roster includes Billy Joe Royal, Robin Lee, Billy "Crash" Craddock, Girls Next Door, Pal Rakes and Jeff Stevens & The Bullets. Country acts previously were recorded under the Atlantic America logo but will now appear only on the Atlantic label.

In May, Arista Records formed a Country division and opened a Nashville office at 29 Music Square East.

President and founder Clive Davis said he wanted to start a Country division 10 years ago but waited until the young company was on sound financial footing. This year the 14-year-old label will top \$100 million in sales for the second consecutive year.

Its pop roster includes Whitney Houston, Aretha Franklin, Dionne Warwick, Carly Simon and Barry Manilow.

A month after forming the division, Arista signed several Country acts including Asleep at the Wheel, Pam Tillis, Lee Roy Parnell, Alan Jackson and Canadian Michelle Wright.

Last December, Universal Records was formed with a strong roster of stars like Eddie Rabbitt, Eddy Raven, Joe Barnhill, Jr., Lacy J. Dalton, Larry Gatlin and The Gatlin Brothers, The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Carl Perkins and Roger Whittaker. Universal is headed by Producer Jimmy Bowen. Three of Nashville's major labels are also planning new buildings.

BMG/RCA will locate it new headquarters at the corner of Music Circle East and Music Circle North. The 28,000-square-foot building will have two stories and a two-level parking garage. RCA expects to move in in February 1990. BMG Publishing, BMG Distribution and Arista Records will also be tenants.

Warner Bros. Records recently purchased a 55,000-square-foot tract at the corner of Music Square East and Music Circle North. A new building will be constructed on half the area. The other half will be sold. Construction is scheduled to begin next year, with completion planned for 1991.

Architects are working on building designs for CBS Records. That new building may be located beside Tree International on Music Square West. Tree, a major Nashville publishing company, and CBS are owned by Sony.

Opryland Music Group, which includes 16th Avenue Records, is building a \$1.8 million office complex at 65 Music Square West. It's expected to be completed by December.

Also, ASCAP is working on plans to expand. And CMA will move from its current location on Music Circle North into a new building of its own on Music Circle South. The building is planned for completion next summer. Cu

The Wagoneers

hey've been compared to a sensitive Ray Price, an exuberant Buddy Holly and a smooth Ricky Nelson. But ask the Wagoneers to describe their music and they'll flatly answer Country — Wagoneers' style.

Says lead singer Monte Warden, "I'm a Country singer. I'm a Country songwriter. And, I play a Martin guitar. Period. But the guys that I play with like rock 'n' roll and that's where our unique sound comes in. "We don't consciously put an edge on our music, but I don't think those guys could or want to play 'Sally Gooden', and I know I wouldn't want to play 'Stairway To Heaven', so somewhere in the middle comes the Wagoneers."

In addition to lead singer/guitarist Warden, the Austin, Texas-based quartet is composed of Tom Lewis on drums, guitarist Brent Wilson and bass player Craig Pettigrew.

Surprisingly, the average age of the group is 24; but don't let that fool you. Warden is quick to respond when someone mentions his age. "I don't think you have to be 50 years old to make a Country record . . . Elvis Presley was 21 when it happened for him, Conway Twitty was 20. Hank Williams was 29 when the poor man died. I don't think anyone would accuse them of being too young. It's just somewhere along the line, Country turned 40 with Elvis and 50 with Conway Twitty."

The Wagoneers are determined to help change that mentality.

In the Wagoneers' music is unencumbered by trends or regional colorations. There's no West Texas weirdness, neo-Nashville noise or Country-rock fusion attempts in the band's unflinchingly traditional sound and sensibility. II Michael Point, Austin-American Statesman

Despite their ages, the group boasts much experience. Warden, who's been writing songs since he was 11, sprouted from the musical landscape as the 15-year-old lead singer of Whoa! Trigger, which was voted Austin's best new band by readers of the *Austin Chronicle* in 1983. Lewis and Wilson flourished after a year on the road backing cult hero Sleepy LaBeef and Houston's popular Six Gun before that. "Playing with Sleepy was like going to the Berklee School of Music on the road," Lewis notes.

The first Country act to record on Herb Alpert's A&M Records since the Flying Burrito Brothers in the early 70s, the Wagoneers signed with the label in November of 1987 and since have released two lps — their first effort STOUT AND HIGH and the recently released GOOD FORTUNE.

On both albums, the group has remained in tune to their vision of playing "pristine, pre-outlaw Country Music". "You could bury me today with the first album," said Warden, who writes the majority of the material for the self-contained group, "but I will admit that our second album is far, far superior to the first.

NThe Wagoneers' musical game plan is designed for the long run. The group sees its future as a Country Music institution, performing its tried-and-true repertoire decades from now for the Country-Music faithful. IP – Michael Point, Austin-American Statesman

"The first time around I let the headphones scare me a little bit, but I realized when I went in to record this last time that there is no difference in singing in a studio than singing in a club. You just put your heart and soul into it and if you have to throw your head back and wail a little bit, then that's what you do."

For GOOD FORTUNE the band reenlisted STOUT AND HIGH producer Emory Gordy, Jr., whose resume includes gigs with Roy Orbison and Elvis Presley and production for such acts as Steve Earle and bluegrass immortal Bill Monroe. "Emory Gordy's the best in the business at getting live sounds," says Warden. "And this time we wanted to show that the Wagoneers could put a fire underneath any honky tonk, maybe even a rock club or two."

The Wagoneers story isn't unlike most artists, but it does have some interesting twists. With a strong Texas following, the four musicians began performing throughout the Lone Star State in early 1987. That summer, with their sound intact and several Monte Warden tunes in their hat, they began doing showcases in Austin for such Nashville publishing houses as Almo-Irving, Screen Gems and Dick James Music. "Once they started coming down, so did just about every record company in Nashville." Soon, deals began coming their way, with practically every major label in Nashville — one of those being CBS Records — offering the quartet a recording contract. Warden recalls, "Larry Hamby, who was with CBS/Nashville at the time offered us a deal and had told Patrick Clifford at A&M about us. He said he didn't mind telling Patrick because A&M didn't have any Country acts."

Unbeknownst to Hamby, though, A&M was thinking of entering the Country field. And the Wagoneers became the company's first target.

"They offered us a deal we couldn't refuse," Warden said. "What was nice was that we knew we would have priority at A&M because they weren't gonna go out and make themselves look foolish with their only Country band.

"A&M wants to show us off, but on the other hand, they're not sure what to do with us," Warden relayed. "When I say they don't know what to do with us I mean that in a positive way because they're trying to take as many avenues as possible."

One of the first avenues the band traveled was in June of '88 in England. "They (A&M) threw us over in England and we played our first show to 20 people, ten of them being from A&M. Our second show was before about 150 people, our third to about 400 and by the time we got to our fourth and fifth show we had sold out a 600-seat hall with people lined around the block." The Wagoneers' instant success in Europe led to another international tour just four months later.

But Europe isn't the only place the Wagoneers have left their mark. The band has toured Canada and, of course, they're making waves in the States touring with the likes of Emmylou Harris, Willie Nelson, George Strait, k. d. lang, and Randy Travis.

The Wagoneers' music seems to be transcending all demographic boundaries, with the group boasting a following anywhere from a squealing 14-year-old girl to a college crooner to a two-stepping 40-year-old.

"When we first started we noticed a representation in about every age group," Warden explained. "After the first album came out we had predominantly a college following, but with our latest video, which had a lot of close ups, our following has changed to a younger, female demographic."

If there's one challenge the Wagoneers are determined to meet, it's bringing Country Music into the hearts of all people — the old *and* the young. "Right now I think is the time to strike the blow and bring some younger listeners into Country Music," Warden said.

"I would like the Wagoneers to be regarded as a band that put something nice in Country Music and left it in a better state than they found it." C_U

Chet Atkins



e careful where you aim, because that's likely where you'll end up." Sage advice from a man who is living proof of his own adage.

Chet Atkins had one singular aim, one all-consuming goal as a boy growing up in Luttrell, a small town in eastern Tennessee — to be introduced as "the world's greatest guitar player". He dreamed about it all the time. He could hear the applause in his head.

Now the applause is real. The kudos are real. But nearly 40 years after landing exactly where he aimed, Chet is, in his own words, "still trying to get it right."

The trip from his rural beginnings in the Tennessee hills to his plush office on Nashville's Music Row was an arduous one, but Chet Atkins the man shows no outward signs of change as a result of it, and seems to be more taciturn than ever on the subject of his success. Chet Atkins the entertainer, however, speaks freely of his burning desire to stay on top. "I think there are a few younger artists who are driven today, and those are the ones who excel. The cream rises to the top, and in this industry, the cream usually is the people who work the hardest, are the most driven and ambitious, and have the 'want-to' more than other people. Those are the people who make it. That's true in my case," Chet comments.

"I'm no more talented than anybody else, but I really had just an insatiable desire for success. And I still have. That's the reason I continue, I think, to sell a few records and to be on a major label today. I've always been trying to get it to sound right. And to play things that will please me. And I never have been able to do that."

It's a byproduct of growing old, I guess, having the younger generation admire what you've done. You lose your youth, but you gain that adulation and respect from the young kids. And that's nice.

Almost 120 albums later, Chet's quest to get his music right goes on. The CBS artist's latest effort is an upcoming album with Dire Straits' member Mark Knopfler. Knopfler has collaborated with Chet on several of his previous albums, including SAILS and CHET ATKINS, C.G.P.

"I guess somewhere along the line Mark was maybe influenced by me. He's one of those guys that doesn't do it according to the rules, and those are the guys that come up with something different. They figure out a better way to do it, so they come up with new sounds," Chet said.

"The people that come up with something different are usually the people that don't know any better. Mark sat around and played by himself and worked it all out by himself with no instruction from anyone. And as a result, he's very different," Chet remarks.

Chet thrives on the very thought of being different. He continuously strives to be different, to do different things with his music, in order to excite himself as well as his audiences.

"When I play, I just play a form that I like and then try to improvise within that form. And sometimes it comes off, and sometimes it's messy as all get out. But it keeps me on my toes. I find that if I play the same thing over and over perfectly, I get so bored with it that I convey that to the audience and it doesn't excite them," Chet explains.

"But when I play off the top of my head, play a rough form and improvise, it seems to work better for me and keeps me excited. And therefore the audience stays excited about my playing, too."

And those audiences *have* stayed excited over Chet's playing — for over three decades. He has fans in all corners of the world, and has influenced a generation of guitarists ranging from George Harrison to Earl Klugh. And he finds a certain satisfaction in knowing that the younger generation is aware of his accomplishments.

"I run into actors, rock 'n' roll artists, and all other kinds of people whom I'm amazed to find listen to my music. It's a byproduct of growing old, I guess, having the younger generation admire what you've done. You lose your youth, but you gain that adulation and respect from the young kids. And that's nice," Chet admits.

As a young boy, that same kind of admiration for an older adult is one of the things that drew him to the guitar.

"I suppose what influenced me to play the guitar was my brother. My older brother played guitar, and I just idolized him. He was my half brother, and he left home when I was 6 years old and moved to Nebraska. Maybe that had something to do with my fascination with the guitar," Chet said.

"Also, when I was a teenager, I was living with my dad. He wanted me to be a violinist or a piano player, and I rebelled like all kids do and played the guitar instead because he didn't like the guitar. He liked it, but he didn't think it had much future."

Fortunately, Chet did think it had a future, and the rest, as they say, is history. His devotion to his craft eventually brought him to Nashville, landed him a job on the Grand Ole Opry, and after years of hard work seated him at RCA Records as head of the A&R department. Long considered to be one of the best, if not *the* best producer in the business, Chet produced such greats as Elvis Presley, Hank Williams, Jim Reeves and Don Gibson. He credits one-time RCA A&R Director Steve Sholes with much of his success.

A new audio processor is revolutionizing the music industry and making its way into the Country arena. The brain interprets the sound as a holographic audio image with natural live presence. A number of Nashville producers have been introduced to BASE and Universal Records President **Jimmy Bowen** has implemented the processor on most of his products released this year.

Allowing for placement of two custom pickups, it has wiring and controls similar to an electric guitar, yet still maintains the banjo sound. Already in use, The Crossfire, as it is called, is being played by musicians such as Roy Clark and Bernie Leadon, formerly with the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band.



"Country Today"





t the Tishman building at 666 Fifth Avenue, in Manhattan, the most important news of August 3 on the 12th floor was Bush's reaction to the hostage crisis. But on the 34th floor, the home for "Country Today", the news that Reba McEntire is expecting a baby had everyone abuzz.

Even though "Country Today", a syndicated radio show, doesn't hail from Music City, U.S.A., it has no problems staying in touch with the Country scene.

Host Dan Taylor describes the show as "The Entertainment Tonight" of Country Music. "In other words you're getting a lot of facts and a lot of information within 60 minutes . . . there's no fat, no fluff. It's a lean, mean show."

"Country Today", a part of MJI Broadcasting, airs once a week across the United States. Country stations in various cities include the show as part of their format.

Diane Richey, the Nashville correspondent for the show, keeps listeners up-to-date with the hottest news from Nashville. She also has a two-minute segment in the program known as the Nashville Report.

"Country Today" reaches a broad demographic area, and to keep the show successful, it must please those from Seattle to St. Louis. Taylor reveals the show's secret. "You get a formula, and once you get the formula down, you let it go. It's kinda like if it works, don't fix it."

"Country Today" has 11 key elements in its program, including the Feature Interview, Nashville Report, On The Road, On The Horizon, and The Big Picture.

The Feature Interview spotlights one of Country's brightest entertainers each week. Stars have no trouble opening up to Taylor. His method of interviewing is easygoing. "A lot of times I'll go into an interview without anything or any questions at all. I'll just know what the artist is doing. It just becomes a conversation and after a while you don't even think about it. Sometimes they ask me questions!

"I just sit down and think about what they would like to be asked. Put myself in their shoes. What would they wanna be talking about? I just make it up as I go."

This style has proven to be a good one for Taylor. "I remember Anne Murray said she wanted to do a duet with Phil Collins or Sting. T. G. Sheppard told a great story once about how he was on a plane sitting in front of a man who he recognized but couldn't place. They both did a double take of each other. Finally, they struck up a conversation and the man turned out to be Harrison Ford."

On The Road moves the interview from the studio to the highways and byways of the U.S. Taylor claims, "There's always a roadie story, something that happens on the road. I say at the time maybe it wasn't so funny, but you can laugh at now. Like you ran over the manager's foot with the bus. The fans love that stuff."

With the new surge of videos in Country Music, Taylor thought it would be a good idea to incorporate a video segment in the show. "The Big Picture is a feature where we talk about videos. There's always a good story about making videos because not everybody gets a chance to get up and perform in front of a camera."

Keeping the show up-to-the-minute is tough, but they manage. "One of the ways we do it is just by keeping up with the latest information from the record companies. Rosemary Young, the writer of the show, does the chore of getting all the information compiled and whittled out. It's kind of like a news room. It's just a lot of detective work, and preparation remains an ongoing thing."

When focusing on a star, Taylor keeps his interview somewhere between the *Wall Street Journal* and PEOPLE magazine.

"We try to focus on a combination of a star's personal life and career. I think that's so important and I think that's what turned me on to Country Music because with Country artists their career goes hand in hand with their everyday life."

Of all the great artists Taylor has interviewed — Willie Nelson, Alabama, The Judds, Ricky Skaggs, and the list goes on — there is one man he has yet to catch — Merle Haggard. "I just like Merle; I like his writing. I've always come really close to interviewing him, but missed him every time."

Maybe an interview with Merle will be the hot topic on the 34th floor of the Tishman building next week. **C**_U

CMA Announces Broadcast Finalists

he third annual CMA Radio Broadcast Awards finalists have been named.

The awards were instituted to acknowledge the vital role radio broadcasters play in Country Music. They are presented in four categories — Station of the Year, General Manager of the Year, Program Director of the Year and Music Director of the Year — in three market sizes — small, medium and large.

Any full-time Country station was eligible to enter regardless of whether the station was a CMA member. Entries were submitted to an anonymous panel of judges, each of whom is an expert in the broadcast field.

The top three finalists in each category were chosen unless there was a tie or one vote difference, then the top four were selected. In the General Manager of the Year — Large Market category, only two entries were eligible.

The same panel of anonymous judges will evaluate different entries in the second round of voting. Winners will be announced in late September and receive their awards on October 10 at the annual CMA Membership Meeting in Nashville.

Hank Cochran

he one thing Hank Cochran has held onto through 50 years of hard living is a pen. He is a master of the ballad, author of the sad poem of lost love.

His loneliness and heartache reverberate in each note of "I Fall To Pieces", "Make The World Go Away", "Don't You Ever Get Tired (Of Hurting Me)", and "Little Bitty Tear".

He can write so freely of lost love because he's experienced it. Hank's been married three times, divorced twice.

His parents' rocky marriage ended when Hank was 9, about the time he started writing poems. After the divorce, his mother kept him for a few months, then his father. Before long Hank was sent to St. Peter's orphanage in Memphis. He ran away time and again. Finally at the age of 12, he hitchhiked to Hobbs, New Mexico with an uncle and worked in the oil fields making good money for 1948 — \$1.80 an hour.

Who raised him?

"I guess me and everybody else," he says.

But being on his own made him self-reliant. "I've never seen anything that I really wanted to do that I couldn't."

That rock-solid confidence has made him believe in his songs when no one else did.

"When I wrote 'Make The World Go Away' I was so happy about the song, and I took it to Hal Smith (the owner of Pamper Music where Hank worked) and he thought it was the worst song I ever wrote. I said, 'Well, I can't believe you think that. It's gonna be one of the biggest songs in this catalog.' And it was."

After writing the classic "I Fall To Pieces", Hank said he played it for every producer in town. No one liked it. Finally he took it to famed producer Owen Bradley.

"I don't know what Owen saw in the song, but I'm sure glad he did. He thought it was a hit. Patsy (Cline) didn't like the song at first but she respected Owen's opinion. He believed in the song, and he believed in Patsy." "I Fall To Pieces" became Hank's first number one hit. Before that, he plugged songs for Pamper Music.

"I was actually looking for writers and songs, and I ran into Willie (Nelson) at Tootsie's. He was just sittin' in the back room where we used to gather. He was singin' a song, and I asked him what publishing company he was with and he said, 'Nobody'."

" 'You mean nobody's got any of those songs? "

" 'Nobody wants 'em.' "

"I said, Boy I sure want to talk to you."

"So he came to the office the next day. I was fixin' to get a raise cuz I was only makin' \$50 a week, and they were gonna raise me to \$100 a week. I wanted to sign Willie as a writer to the company, and I went to talk to Hal Smith and he said, 'You know we'd love to have him if you think we could get his songs recorded.' But he couldn't afford to pay him and I said, 'Well, instead of giving me the raise, give it to Willie.'" So for a while each of them scraped by on \$50 a week.

About the time Hank charted with "I Fall To Pieces", he placed Willie's "Hello Walls" with Faron Young. He also was instrumental in Willie signing with Liberty Records as an artist.

Their friendship has weathered nearly three decades.

"I asked Willie a few years ago why he didn't get off the road and quit pickin' so much. He said, 'Hell, I like to pick. If I wasn't pickin' on the road, I'd be pickin' in some bar somewhere for nothin' so I might as well pick out there and make some money.' Same ole Willie."

Willie isn't the only writer Hank's helped. Harlan Howard had written several tunes like "Heartaches By The Number" when he moved from California to Nashville.

"Harlan would write songs, and I would go through this box that he had thrown stuff in and pull out songs that would turn out to be hits. One was 'Heartbreak U.S.A.'"

Merle Haggard has also relied on Hank's instincts for picking great songs.

"A few years back, Merle called and said he wanted me to come to California. He was just gettin' cold and everything. He got upset and he hated Nashville and wasn't gonna come back. And I said, 'Why don't you let me produce your album, pick the musicians, the songs? You don't have nothin' to worry about.'

"One night I was asleep and about 3 or 4 in the morning the phone rings. He said, 'I thought about it and yeah.'"

A week later The Hag was in the studio cutting "If I'm Not Back In Love By Monday" and "Always On A Mountain When I Fall".

"And one time he came into town and it was the same way again. He called and said, "I'm gonna cut tomorrow or the next day. Have you got a song?' And I said, 'As a matter of fact, I do. I think it's a damn hit too. I just finished it this morning.'

"He said, 'What's the title of it?' " 'It's Not Love But It's Not Bad." "He said, 'I'll cut it.' "

Hank co-wrote "It's Not Love But It's Not Bad" with his good friend and business partner Glenn Martin.

In May, Hank amicably ended his 20-year run with Tree International and decided to form a publishing company with Glenn called Co-Heart Music. Hank's enjoying doing what he does best — writing songs and plugging his tunes and those by other writers.

Besides writing songs, he's also serving as executive producer of an album and video project with Johnny Paycheck who's serving time in Chillicothe Corrections Institution in Ohio for bringing a firearm into a bar, a federal offense. Hank taped two shows Johnny performed for fellow inmates. George Jones, Vern Gosdin and Merle Haggard will probably be featured on the lp.

This summer Hank also formed a new record label, Gifted Few Records. The company's first release, "Home, Sweet Homeless People" by Jim Best, was shipped in August.

Hank says over the years his style hasn't changed, but now he's more open to writing with others. By nature, Hank's a loner. He wrote most of his songs alone. If he did co-write a song, it was with an inner circle of friends that included his former wife Jeannie Seely and Harlan, Glenn and Willie.

But in the last several years he's written with more people such as Dean Dillon on George Strait hits like "The Chair" and "Ocean Front Property". And he co-wrote seven songs on Vern Gosdin's CHISELED IN STONE lp including "Set 'Em Up Joe" and "Who You Gonna Blame It On This Time". Hank personally took the songs to CBS and convinced label executives to sign Vern. He also cowrote five songs on Vern's new ALONE lp.

Hank's career is going just as strong now as it was 28 years ago when "I Fall To Pieces" went number one. But if the fame, the reputation and the money disappeared tomorrow, Hank would still make it — alone — with his pen and the melodies in his head. C_U



TBEM Keynote Presentation To Feature Amazing Kreskin



Japan Opens Its Doors To Country Music

even acts will perform at the First Annual Country Gold Concert in Kumamoto, Japan on September 23.

Scheduled to appear are Roger Miller, The Wagoneers, Michael Johnson, Hank Thompson, Bill Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys, Wanda Jackson and the clogging duo, Pride of America. The event will be held at Kumamoto's Aspecta, the world's largest outdoor stage. This will be Japan's first Country Music outdoor concert festival.

"I'm so thrilled to be a part of this festival," said Roger Miller. "It offers us the opportunity to open a new door for Country Music, and I'm extremely proud to participate in this landmark event."

The announcement was made by the Country Music Association and the Jim Halsey Company July 21 at a press conference at CMA's Music Row office. The Jim Halsey Company is the exclusive booking agent and producer for the concert.

Charlie Nagatani, the primary coordinator of the event, flew in from Japan to make the announcement. He and his band, the Western Cannonballs, will also perform at the Country Gold Concert.

Nagatani has been an avid supporter of Country Music for years. He learned English from American GIs after World War II and adopted their love of Country Music. He and his band have played together in Japan for 28 years and he owns a successful Country nightclub in Kumamoto.

Nagatani enlisted the help and support of Kumamoto's Governor Morihiro Hosokawa and the Kumamoto Prefectural Government for the concert.

"I'm looking forward to the success of this Country concert and hope it becomes a wonderful festival for promoting relations between the United States and Japan," Governor Hosokawa said in a letter.

"Through this event, we hope to further introduce Country Music to Japanese people and to deepen the relations and understanding between the United States and Japan by providing such an environment to the local citizens and resident Americans."

Ticket prices will be 3,000 yen which is about \$20. This is an extremely low price since the average jazz festival ticket is about \$50 and hotel dinner shows featuring U.S. Country acts are about \$250 and up. The concert is being publicized in Japanese newspapers and on radio and television.

Organizers of the event have already made plans to have a Country Gold concert each year in Japan to bring Country Music to new audiences. [C_U]

"Steve was a wonderful guy who took a chance on me and kept me on at RCA even when he should have let me go. He saw something in me, and believed in me. I was dedicated to him to help him in every way I could to make hit records," Chet said.

"I enjoyed my time at RCA very much, especially the time I spent in the studio working with the artists. I was lucky as a producer that I had always listened to all kinds of music, and I loved the melodies of songs. Because I listened to those other kinds of music, I could draw ideas from them and use them in the sessions. That helped me a lot as a producer, because my mind was open to newer sounds.

"The longer you stay in this business, the more analytical you get. You begin to conform more and more, and when something real different comes along, you don't recognize the value of it. I think you burn out after awhile. You get older, and your tastes are not like the record buying public. That's one of the reasons I don't produce much anymore, because I realize the public's tastes have changed since I was successful," Chet said.

In this business, the more analytical you get. You begin to conform more and more, and when something real different comes along, you don't recognize the value of it.

With a career that has spanned nearly half a century, and dozens of awards to his credit including six Grammys, 10 CMA Awards and four PLAYBOY Jazz Poll honors, one would think that Chet would be content in his international acclaim, that he would be ready to sit back and rest on his laurels, reaping the benefits after so many years of reaching for the top. Hardly.

"I'll always be poor in my mind, I suppose. I'll always be trying to accomplish things to keep the wolf away from the door. I'm not that concerned with money as long as I make a living, but I guess I came from the work ethic generation, where I'll always feel like I have to be accomplishing something or I'm backpeddling.

"I want to keep doing exactly what I'm doing right now in years to come. I want to keep learning, and selling some records. I want to go on being different, and nonconformist, and fighting mediocrity tooth and nail. Because that's what destroys you as a writer, as a musician, as anything — mediocrity. And the only reason people beat a path to your door ever, is because you're different from anyone else in the world."


