

Top Talent To Perform On CMA Awards Show

ne music critic called the lineup for this year's "CMA Awards Show" the "new kids on the block". And the stellar talent roster includes such new faces as Clint Black, Garth Brooks, Travis Tritt, Lorrie Morgan, Vince Gill, Patty Loveless, the Kentucky HeadHunters and Alan Jackson.

But the established artists also will be spotlighted on the 24th annual show on October 8. The Oak Ridge Boys will sing a medley of hits honoring the Hall of Fame inductee who will be announced the night of the show. The Judds will open the show with a tune off their latest lp, "This Country's Rockin". Tanya Tucker and T. Graham Brown will perform their duet "Don't Go Out". Ricky Van Shelton, an Entertainer of the Year nominee, will sing "Pretty Woman" and Kathy Mattea, also up for Entertainer of the Year, will perform "Time Passing By" off her upcoming lp. Barbara Mandrell and K.T. Oslin are also scheduled to appear.

Reba McEntire and Randy Travis will host the two-hour telecast, to be broadcast live from the Grand Ole Opry House on the CBS television network from 9-11 p.m. (ET).

McEntire will perform her current single, "You Lie", while Travis will sing "Heroes and Friends". Collaborating with Travis during his performance will be the legendary Roy Rogers, Vern Gosdin and Tammy Wynette.

Black, who is nominated for four CMA Awards this year, will debut his upcoming single, "Put Yourself In My Shoes". The single, scheduled to be released to radio October 9, is on Black's next lp due out in November.

Top CMA Award nominee Garth Brooks is slated to perform his highenergy, sing-along-song, "Friends In Low Places". Brooks is nominated for Horizon Award and Male Vocalist of the Year as well as Single and Song of the Year for his chart-topper, "If Tomorrow Never Comes". Brooks' video of "The Dance" is a contender in the Video of the Year category.

The four other Horizon nominees will also perform. Jackson will sing his 1990 Single and Song of the Year-nominated, "Here In The Real World"; the Kentucky HeadHunters will perform the Don Gibson-penned Country standard, "Oh Lonesome Me"; Morgan will sing her number one, "Out Of Your Shoes"; and Tritt will sing his current single, "Put Some Drive In Your Country".

Vince Gill and Patty Loveless will pair up for "When I Call Your Name", nominated for Single and Song of the Year.

The "CMA Awards Show" is produced by Bob Precht of Sullivan Productions and directed by Walter C. Miller. Irving Waugh serves as executive producer, and Donald Epstein scripts the show. For the eighth year, a stereo radio simulcast of the show will be satellite-delivered by the Mutual Broadcasting System. CTV will carry the show live in Canada. C_U

Mark Chesnutt

Mark Chesnutt is heating up the Country Music world with his first major single "Too Cold At Home". His friends around Beaumont, Texas knew his potential before Tony Brown of MCA Records spotted him. On Wednesday nights, 500 people would be packed into Cutter's nightclub to hear Chesnutt sing.

"He's not a nightclub act who decided one day to sing Country. It's in the marrow of his bones,"

said Mark Wright, Chesnutt's producer.

Two years ago, Chesnutt cut "Too Cold At Home" for the independent Cherry label out of Houston. His drummer at the time, Roger Montgomery, was a former bandmember for MCA artist George Strait, and he brought the record to the attention of MCA executives.

The 26-year-old Texan joined his first band in junior high school and started singing in clubs when he was 16. He continued the club circuit 10 years until he made enough money to hire his own band. Now he's playing sold-out concerts with George Jones, Conway Twitty, Sawyer

Brown and Steve Wariner.

One song on his debut lp is "Friends in Low Places". "It's another song I fell in love with when I first heard it," Chesnutt said. "I wanted it to be the second single, and everybody else did too, but Garth Brooks put it out first. That's okay, because my version is a lot different than his. I'm just anxious for everybody to hear mine."

Chesnutt is currently out on the road touring with major Country acts and promoting his lp, TOO COLD AT HOME and his video of the same

name.

Horizon Nominees


ountry Music has always stayed fresh because of the infusion of new talent, the upstarts who interpret Country Music somewhat differently than their predecessors.

This year's five Horizon nominees - Garth Brooks, Alan Jackson, the Kentucky HeadHunters, Lorrie Morgan and Travis Tritt - have all had an incredible year. Each one has earned a gold album and performed before thousands of fans.

As evidenced by this year's Horizon nominees, Country artists are now becoming major superstars more quickly. In 1981, the CMA Board of Directors established the Horizon Award to honor that artist, who for the first time in the field of Country Music, demonstrated the most significant creative growth and development in overall chart and sales activity, live performance professionalism and media recognition.

The Horizon Award is not a new artist award, but rather is intended to recognize an outstanding artist development effort that includes the artist's manager, agent, producer, publicist and record label.

Last year's winner was Clint Black. Previous winners have included Ricky Van Shelton, Ricky Skaggs and The Judds.





GARTH BROOKS

CAPITOL RECORDS

When Oklahoma native Garth Brooks recorded his debut single "Much to Young (To Feel This Damn Old)", he had been living in Nashville less than one year. But, 120,000 copies and a top 10 single later, Garth is no longer the new kid on the block. Subsequent releases from his self-titled gold-certified Capitol/Nashville lp have gone straight to the top of the Country charts, including "Not Counting You", "The Dance", and "If Tomorrow Never Comes".

The first single on his new lp NO FENCES is the Dewayne Blackwell/Bud Lee sing-along-song "Friends In Low Places", a type of audience participation song Garth says he likes and one that fits well in his high-energy live performances.

Ironically, Garth was not always interested in music. In high school, he was more interested in sports and attended Oklahoma State University on an athletic scholarship.

But the musical influence was there. His mother, the former Colleen Carroll, recorded for Capitol Records in the mid-1950's. His father played guitar and an older sister worked with recording artist Gus Hardin. Garth's first trip to Nashville in 1985 lasted 23 hours, when a wave of reality came over him and sent him disillusioned but not broken back to Oklahoma. After making a second trip to Nashville, he signed with managers Bob Doyle and Pam Lewis and within three months, Garth was beginning his climb to stardom.

ALAN JACKSON

ARISTA RECORDS

First-time CMA nominee Alan Jackson has been living a dream come true since he signed with Arista Records just over a year ago. But that dream seemed unattainable to Alan for a long time.

Growing up in Newnan, Georgia, his life fell into a typical smalltown pattern: go to school, go to college, get married, have a family. Being a Country singer with a number one record was definitely not part of the pattern.

Fortunately, Alan was encouraged to make music his career when one of his best friends became an airline pilot – another goal that was, on the surface, just as out of reach as singing. Spurred by his friend's success, and confident in the knowledge that music was all he had ever really wanted to do, Alan decided to turn his impossible dream into a reality. With a few hit songs in his pocket and wife, Denise, at his side, he sold his house and moved to Nashville, determined to pursue a career in Country Music.

Alan's determination and perseverance paid off when he became the first artist signed to Arista Records' newly-formed Country division. With the phenomenal success of his debut album, HERE IN THE REAL WORLD, the lanky blond has finally achieved the life he dreamed of for so long.



KENTUCKY HEADHUNTERS

MERCURY RECORDS

Music industry insiders were caught off guard this past year by the whirlwind success of The Kentucky Head-Hunters. But Country Music fans weren't surprised at all. Instead, they were joyously relieved to have finally found a group that combines Country, rock, blues and bluegrass into a new sound that is best described as "hippie hillbilly".

The HeadHunters - Ricky Phelps, Doug Phelps, Richard Young, Fred Young and Greg Martin - will be the first to tell you that their "overnight" success was actually 20 years in the making. That's 20 years of playing separately and honing their individual talents.

Citing such musically diverse influences as Ernest Tubb, Cream, Don Gibson and Jimi Hendrix, the five rowdy rebels of Country Music share a spirit that allows each in his own way to defy the conventions of society. That same spirit, when joined in a group effort, becomes a force that is undeniable.

The Kentucky HeadHunters knew they had the right combination. Their 20 years of patience and practice were finally rewarded when Mercury/PolyGram executive Harold Shedd signed them to the label. More importantly, the powers-that-be at Mercury/PolyGram realized they couldn't alter or "commercialize" this so-called band of misfits. Instead, the high-spirited Country-blues-rockers were allowed to be themselves and stretch their creative wings.

The impact of The Kentucky HeadHunters has caused Country Music to stretch its boundaries, proving that rebels and rockers can share the spotlight with Country traditionalists.



LORRIE MORGAN RCA RECORDS

Lorrie Morgan was 13 years old the first time she sang on the Grand Ole Opry, but one look at the tears in her mom and dad's eyes told her she was in the right place - on stage. Now, 17 years later, Lorrie is still in the right place, bringing tears to the eyes of her audience with her emotion-packed

delivery of songs like "Dear Me" and "Trainwreck of Emotion".

The urge to be on stage is among Lorrie's earliest memories. As a youngster, she loved performing and would put on shows for her family. Using a perfume bottle for a microphrone, the enterprising performer would charge admission, have her sister introduce her, and make a grand entrance, singing Petula Clark's "Downtown".

Years of traveling and appearing at the Opry allowed Lorrie to fine-tune her performing style and delivery, and once she hooked up with producer Barry Beckett, she was able to translate her on-stage dynamism to radio and records. Her debut album on RCA Records, LEAVE THE LIGHT ON, was certified gold just 10 months after its release.

The sassy blonde possesses a love of performing that can't be denied and a self-assuredness that won't be compromised. Whether it's a 15.000-seat arena or a 400-seat club, as long as there's a stage, Lorrie Morgan is definitely in the right place.



TRAVIS TRITT

WARNER BROS. RECORDS

In 1981, Travis Tritt went to work loading trucks. Four years later, he walked out on that job to pursue his dream of being a Country singer. Now he stands on a stage and sings his number one single, "I'm Gonna Be Somebody" with a certain conviction - one that comes from sheer, unmitigated determination.

Determination is something that Travis is quite familiar with, for it's what brought him from the Atlanta club circuit to the forefront of a skyrocketing career as one of Country Music's hottest new acts today. The first single off his debut Warner Bros. album, COUNTRY CLUB, went top 10, and his subsequent singles, "Help Me Hold On" and the selfprophetic "I'm Gonna Be Somebody" both garnered the number one position on the charts.

Born and raised in Marietta, Georgia, Travis began his musical career as a soloist in the children's choir at the neighborhood church. He taught himself guitar at age 8, and wrote his first song at 14. During his teen years he acquired a taste for rock and Country/rock blends, and the advent of the "outlaw" movement in Country brought Travis' multi-faceted interests together.

The blend of those interests has paid off in spades for Travis so far, gaining him national recognition as a force to be reckoned with in Country Music circles. He now belts out that chorus, "I'm Gonna Be Somebody" with relaxed confidence, no longer having to convince anybody of the fact. $|\mathbf{c}_{\mathbf{U}}|$

CMA's Legend Series Kicks Off At Belmont College

MA'S Legend Series kicks off on November 14 with Roger Miller joining Brenda Lee, Owen Bradley, Jack Clement and Don Everly for an informal evening at Belmont College's Massey Auditorium. Miller, who serves as moderator for the legendary panel, will delve into the 60s music scene in Nashville. The panelists, each of whom played an integral role in shaping the music of that era, will discuss how pop and Country Music were intertwined during that period.

Singer Brenda Lee was a wellestablished pop star who ushered in the 60s with hits like "Rockin' Around The Christmas Tree" and "I'm Sorry". She was considered a rock 'n' roll artist at that time simply because there was no other category to accommodate her innovative singing style the same style which today is called

Country.

Lee's producer, Owen Bradley, was instrumental in the development of the "Nashville Sound". Under his guidance, Country sentiments were given a pop presentation, resulting in

numerous crossover hits. Bradley's leadership in the interaction of personality, business independence and artistic excellence produced an era in which Nashville gained its reputation as the place to record.

Don Everly, with his brother, Phil, formed one of the most influential pop acts of the late 50s. Originally

classified as Country, they exceeded all expectations for a Country harmony duo, hitting the number one position on the pop charts in 1957 with "Wake Up, Little Susie". By 1960, they were firmly established as a pop act and were a major influence on later pop and rock performers such as Buddy Holly and The Beatles.

Jack Clement began his career at Sun Records in Memphis, where he produced Jerry Lee Lewis and Johnny Cash. His move to Nashville brought Music City an approach to producing that was viewed in the 60s as, at best, unconventional, but which today has become a cornerstone of mainstream Country Music. Considered a rebel 30 years ago for his willingness to experiment with new and different sounds, Clement is now regarded as a visionary musical catalyst.

Roger Miller opened the doors to a new breed of Country songwriters as the advent of rock music forced Nashville to develop new sounds in the 60s. With his long-term widespread acceptance by both pop and Country audiences and his natural storytelling abilities, he is the quintessential choice to host CMA's first Legend

"During the 60s, there was such a blending of pop and Country," said Miller. "That just opened to door for me, since there was an awareness to try to broaden the market, to appeal to more people. Country Music was geared to rural communities in the 40s and 50s. Then in the 60s, with the realization that urban areas were growing and rural areas were diminishing, Country Music took a turn into the pop market, and that trend has continued even more so today.

"The entire world underwent a metamorphosis in the 60s, and

certainly the kind of music people listened to was part of that change, just as fashions and social behaviors were part of it. In fact, music changed gears entirely, and it was for the better. A lot of things happened in the music industry back then, and this Legend Series couldn't find a more representative panel than the one we've put together, because all the panelists were an active part of what

"I think we're going to hear a lot of stories that maybe no one's heard about in a long time. It's going to be an interesting – and fun – evening."

CMA inaugurated the Legend Series in order to appeal to younger professionals in the Country Music industry. According to Jody Williams of BMI, who serves as CMA's membership subcommittee chairman, one goal of the Legend Series is to broaden the perception and understanding of Country Music's past.

"It is hoped that industry leaders of today and tomorrow can benefit from understanding how Country Music's history has shaped the various sounds that are classified as Country Music today," Williams said.

The event, which runs from 6:30 -8:30 p.m., is free to CMA members and college music students upon presentation of a CMA membership card or college ID at the door; there is no pre-registration. The admittance fee for non-CMA members is \$5. The evening will conclude with a question and answer period with the audience. Awards Show Promotion A Hot Item For Radio

or the past two years, the Country Music Association's Award Show radio promotion has been the hottest contest ever conducted for member stations. This year, the stakes are even higher.

In April CMA broadcast organizational members were mailed an entry card which they completed and mailed back to CMA to become eligible for a drawing. One hundred member stations were selected in June to participate in the 1990 promotion.

Those stations received an on-air promotion contest package that includes two free tickets to the "CMA Awards Show" including shuttle service to and from the awards show, tickets for a Saturday night Grand Ole Opry performance, Opryland passes, and a Sunday cruise on the General Jackson.

"Our member stations have told us that this contest is always their best and most exciting promotion of the year," said Janet Bozeman, CMA membership director.

"Several of the stations have clients sponsor the contest

which makes it great because they can customize their individual packages and that builds listenership and brings in valuable sales dollars. This contest is just one of the many benefits available to our broadcast organizational members," she said.

"This particular promotion is fantastic for both CMA and its member radio stations. CMA gets great coverage on the promotion, and it is nice for the winners of the contest to be able to go to the show because all other ticket holders are CMA members."

In addition to the radio contest, CMA mailed to each broadcast organizational member an awards information kit which included a poster sporting the fall merchandising campaign slogan "Bring Home Country's Brightest Stars", a trivia booklet, a CMA Awards information booklet listing 1990 nominees, past CMA Award winners and top CMA Award winners and nominees, and a tape of generic spots recorded by such 1990 CMA nominees as Garth Brooks, Reba McEntire and Restless Heart. WRITE THE SONGS

Song Of The Year Award

hen people hear a song for the first time, especially one with which they identify so closely, they often wonder about the writer - what the songwriter is like and what experiences he or she has been through.

Abel Green, former editor of the show business newspaper Variety, once said of songwriters, ". . . the minute you read the list of the songs he wrote, you start to identify with him. All those titles strike nerves inside of you. People respond, 'I remember the first time I heard that song, I was at a dance with a girl.' To remember what each song did to you is like running through the chapters

of your own biography."

With the power of the pen, songwriters have this amazing effect on listeners. The first songwriter CMA honored was Dallas Frazier in 1967 for his now classic song "There Goes My Everything".

This year the nominees for Song of the Year are "Here In The Real World" by Alan Jackson and Mark Irwin: "If Tomorrow Never Comes" by Kent Blazy and Garth Brooks; "Killin' Time" by Clint Black and Hayden Nicholas; "When I Call Your Name" by Vince Gill and Tim DuBois; and "Where've You Been" by Jon Vezner and Don Henry.

raised in Lexington, Kentucky, Kent Blazy has worked on the road with songwriter Ian Tyson and the pop group Pure Prairie League.

His musical inspiration came from another Country-tinged-rock group. "I began playing the guitar after hearing and seeing The Byrds perform 'Mr. Tambourine Man' on the Ed Sullivan Show'. The sound of Roger McGuinn's 12-string guitar mesmerized me," Kent recalls.

In 1980, because of the encouragement of singer/songwriter Mark Gray, Kent moved to Nashville. The next year Gary Morris took one of his tunes "Headed For A Heartache" (cowritten with Iim Dowell) to number eight on the BILLBOARD charts.

His latest hit, "If Tomorrow Never Comes", has received numerous accolades including 1990 Song of the Year from the Nashville Songwriters Association International.



ALAN JACKSON "Here In The Real World"

Artista Records artist Alan Jackson gave a showcase at a Nashville club for music industry executives on Valentine's Day 1990. Just a few short months later, he was being mobbed by female fans, packing in the crowds and recently was awarded a gold album. Nine of the 10 songs on his debut lp HERE IN THE REAL WORLD, Alan had a hand in writing.

Alan grew up in Newnan, Georgia, graduated from high school and spent several years doing odd jobs. Music, he says, was about the only thing he didn't tire of. His wife, Denise, spotted Glen Campbell in an airport and asked what her husband should do to get in the music business. Glen handed her a card with the name and address of his office on it. When Alan and Denise moved to Nashville, he landed a job in the mailroom of The Nashville Network and a publishing contract with Glen Campbell Music. Now four years later, Alan is nominated for four CMA Awards.



MARK IRWIN "Here In The Real World"

Mark Irwin was born and raised in The Bronx and was a devoted rock 'n' roll fan until he heard Emmylou Harris and Ricky Skaggs. In 1985, he moved to Nashville with a few songs, then got a job as a bartender at the Bluebird Cafe, a favorite writers' hangout.

While mixing drinks for customers, he listened to other writers and honed his skills. Mark also wrote Io-El Sonnier's hit "If Your Heart Should Ever Roll This Way Again" and "Meet Me Under The Mistletoe" which was on a Randy Travis Christmas album.

Garth Brooks' new lp is titled NO FENCES, and this year Garth Brooks hasn't let any boundaries contain him or any obstacles impede him.

He's had a phenomenal year both as a performer and writer. His selftitled Capitol Records lp, which included "Much Too Young To Feel This Damn Old" and "The Dance", went gold. And his latest lp, NO FENCES, shipped gold and is nearing platinum status.

He co-wrote the award-winning "If Tomorrow Never Comes" and four cuts on his new lp including "The Thunder Rolls", "Unanswered Prayers", "New Way To Fly" and "Victim of the Game".

The Oklahoma native came to Nashville several years ago and turned around and left 23 hours later knowing he wasn't ready.

"Things unfold as they're supposed to, and the very time you think things

aren't working out - that's the time the plan is probably fully operational. Timing is everything. It's sometimes hard during the dry period, but generally you find it was worth the wait." For Garth Brooks, success has definitely been worth the wait.

CLINT BLACK "Killin' Time"

Clint Black has done just about everything this year but kill time. His hectic road schedule, dozens of interviews with national journalists and writing songs and recording a new album has left him with precious few minutes to spare.

This year he's toured with RCA labelmates Alabama and Lorrie Morgan among others, watched his KILLIN' TIME lp go platinum and played Carnegie Hall.

In 1987, Clint was introduced to Bill Ham, ZZ Top's manager, who helped Clint secure a deal with RCA Records.

Buck Owens describes his appeal this way: "He's the kind of guy you'd want to take home to meet your father, if you could trust your mother."



HAYDEN NICHOLAS "Killin' Time"

As Clint Black's favorite sidekick, Havden Nicholas has enjoyed immeasurable success as a songwriter and performer.

He and Clint were nominated for Song of the Year last year for "A Better Man" and have collaborated on numerous other tunes.

Hayden has been a successful musician for years, playing in bands and writing and recording his own material. A native of Hobbs, New Mexico, Hayden learned to play the guitar as a teen and later played the Houston club circuit crossing paths with Clint.

The first songs he and Clint recorded were on an eight-track machine at Hayden's house. Hayden is currently touring with Clint, playing lead guitar, singing back-up vocals and always taking time for writing songs.



VINCE GILL "When I Call Your Name"

MCA artist Vince Gill has more people calling his name with the release of "When I Call Your Name", the biggest song of his career.

Although he's had hits like "If It Weren't For Him", "Oklahoma Borderline" and the semi-autobiographical "Everybody's Sweetheart" (about his marriage to Janis Gill of Sweethearts of the Rodeo), he's moved out of the pack of also-rans into Country Music's forefront.

The Oklahoma native grew up playing four-string tenor guitar and his dad's banjo. The practice served him well. Vince has played many of the lead guitar solos on his own albums. On his latest release, WHEN I CALL YOUR NAME, he also wrote seven out of the album's 10 cuts including "Oklahoma Swing", his duet with Reba McEntire.

As a musician, songwriter and performer, Vince has made a name for



TIM DUBOIS "When I Call Your Name"

A native of Grove, Oklahoma, Tim DuBois is an accounting professor turned songwriter.

He's penned such hits as "Love In The First Degree" for Alabama, Razzy Bailey's "Midnight Hauler" and Jerry Reed's "She Got The Goldmine, I Got

He and Scott Hendricks formed Restless Heart, and Tim wrote several hits for them including "The Bluest Eyes In Texas", "Big Dreams In A Small Town" and "Dancy's Dream" in addition to co-producing their albums. He also co-wrote "Oklahoma Swing", Vince Gill's duet with Reba McEntire.

Besides producing and songwriting, he heads Arista Records' Nashville division and signed Alan lackson as the label's first act.

ION VEZNER "Where've You Been"

When Jon Vezner was 34 years old, he packed up a U-Haul and headed from Minnesota to Nashville. Like most new songwriters, he was worried he wouldn't make it. But the first year in town he earned five cuts including recordings by Reba McEntire and Ronnie Milsap.

In 1989, "Trainwreck of Emotion", a song he had co-written became a top 20 single for Lorrie Morgan and the highest charting song of Jon's career.

But it was Kathy Mattea's "Where've You Been", a song about his ailing grandparents, that has garnered Jon the most attention. The song captured an Academy of Country Music Award and became a crossover success as

Singer/songwriter Don Henry has had songs recorded by Jon Conlee, Ray Charles, the Oak Ridge Boys, Conway Twitty and Highway 101.

"My earliest influences were my dad and the singer/songwriter movement of the early 70s," he said. "Artists like James Taylor and Paul Simon really spoke to me through their music in a way rock 'n' roll never did."

It was through his father that he met songwriter Sonny Throckmorton who told Don that if he came to Nashville he would help him find a job. The job turned out to be as a tape librarian at publishing giant Tree International.

Don was expected to be familiar with thousands of songs and be able to find them at a moment's notice. It also gave him an education in the works of such writers as Harlan Howard, Curly Putman and Willie Nelson.

Don recently signed with Epic Records to pursue a solo singing career. C_U




Musician Of The Year Nominees

hile the performing artist often holds the most visible spot on the music industry ladder, the session player occupies a most crucial and necessary rung on that same ladder. Session musicians are a key link in perfecting the sounds that come out of Music City, and they are often unsung heroes whose names are never known or given proper recognition.

CMA wished to applaud the talents of these skilled instrumentalists, and so established the Musician of the Year Award to honor the best of the best. In 1967, guitar master Chet Atkins picked up the first award, and has received it eight times since. Musicians such as Jerry Reed, Roy Clark and Hargus "Pig" Robbins have all garnered the trophy for their musical expertise.

In order to be eligible for the award, a musician must have played on at least one album or single which has appeared in the top 10 of the Country album or singles charts from BILL-BOARD, CAŠHBOX, THE GAVIN **REPORT or RADIO & RECORDS** during the eligibility period.

Nominees for Musician of the Year for 1990 are Jerry Douglas, Paul Franklin, Johnny Gimble, Mark O'Connor and Brent Rowan.





IERRY DOUGLAS

Clearly an artist at the top of his class, Jerry Douglas has created new boundaries for Dobro players around the world. From his start as a touring musician with such bluegrass greats as The Country Gentlemen and J.D. Crowe and the New South to playing on albums for the likes of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Randy Travis and Emmylou Harris to releasing three critically acclaimed self-produced albums of his music, Jerry has proven his craft in virtually every realm of the Country Music industry. He's also a member of the all-star MCA Master Series group Strength in Numbers, which includes fellow musicians Mark O'Connor, Edgar Meyer, Bela Fleck and Sam Bush.

Jerry's masterful, stylistic approach to the Dobro, which he's been perfecting since he was 8, has garnered him award after award, including a Grammy in 1983 for Best Country Instrumental Performance and a place in FRETS magazine's Gallery of Greats. His 1990 CMA Musician of the Year nomination marks the fourth time he's logged the

Just this past year, Jerry toured throughout the U.S. for the National Council of Traditional Arts with the Masters of the Steel String Guitar. joining such greats as Albert Lee and jazzist Tal Farlow. And in December, he's slated to make his first Carnegie Hall appearance as part of the venue's 100th birthday celebration. But the U.S. isn't the only territory in which he's made his mark. He's toured such countries as Poland, Czechoslavakia and most recently Ireland, all the time confirming his long-standing reign as the best Dobro player in the world.



PAUL FRANKLIN

As much as he would have liked to. Paul Franklin could not be in the audience at this year's "CMA Awards Show". He was recording an album in England with the rock group Dire

An unlikely assignment for a pedal steel player?

Maybe. But after years of playing on hundreds of Country albums, Paul has taken the pedal steel beyond the boundaries it's been confined to.

Growing up in Detroit, Paul spent his time playing lap steel to songs on the Country radio station. After high school, he moved to Nashville and went on the road with Barbara Mandrell. Now he averages at least 500 sessions a year for the likes of George Strait, Waylon Jennings, Eddy Raven and Rodney Crowell.

Besides playing instruments, Paul also helps design them. Several years ago, he and his father Paul Franklin Sr. created the Ped-a-bro, a cross between a steel guitar and a Dobro. This year they also developed an acoustic lap steel.

Paul has taken his ingenious use of instruments on the road to England and Scotland with the pop band, The Nottinghill Billies (Mark Knopfler and Guy Fletcher of Dire Straits, Brendon Croker and Steven Phillips), and the group recently performed on "Saturday Night Live".

In 1991, he'll begin a Dire Straits world tour that will include dates in Europe, the U.S., South America, New Zealand, Tasmania, Japan and Taiwan.

But whether it's in Taiwan or Tennessee, Paul Franklin is creating new sounds and new audiences for his pedal steel playing.



IOHNNY GIMBLE

Johnny Gimble's musical resume' reads like a list of who's who in Country Music. The fiery fiddle player has toured with the likes of Bob Wills and Willie Nelson, played on sessions for everyone from Chet Atkins to George Strait, and is a television and recording star in his own right to boot.

The Texas native appeared in his own show, "Johnny Gimble and the Homefolks" for three years in Waco, was a staff fiddler on NBC's "Five-Star Jubilee" for several more, and has even played roles in some movies, including "Honeysuckle Rose" with Willie Nelson, and "Honkytonk Man" with Clint Eastwood.

But it's undoubtedly Johnny's

smokin' fiddle that he's best known for and has gained him accolades such as the honor of being voted CMA's Musician of the Year last year and three years prior, as well as being named Fiddler of the Year by the Academy of Country Music for over eight years.

Growing up with four musical brothers, Johnny was already performing on a regular radio show by age 13. He joined the Shelton Brothers Sunshine Boys on KWKH radio in Shreveport and spent time touring with Jimmie Davis when he became governor. His career progressed from there to include several stints in bands, as well playing on radio and television shows. In the early 1950's, Johnny gained studio experience playing for artists such as Lefty Frizzell, Ray Price and Marty Robbins.

Johnny has also recorded several albums of his own. His most recent album, appropriately titled "STILL FIDDLIN' AROUND", was nominated for a Grammy Award in 1989. And from the looks of things, Johnny will be "fiddling around" for a long time to come.



MARK O'CONNOR

Ask any Country Music aficionado what multitalented musician won a classical/flamenco contest at the age of 10, and there's only one possible answer * Mark O'Connor. Inquire the identity of the guitarist who toured with jazz greats Dave Grisman and Stephane Grappelli in 1979, and the answer is the same * Mark O'Connor. And the name of the highlyacclaimed writer, performer and musical conceptualist who's appeared on record and on stage with such diverse artists as Merle Watson, James Taylor, Chet Atkins, and Loretta Lynn, just to name a few? Again, there's only one answer - Mark O'Connor.

A native of Seattle, Washington, Mark first demonstrated his musical genius at the age of 3 by identifying classical albums and their composers when he heard them on the stereo. By the time he was 11, he had mastered the banjo, mandolin, Dobro, steelstringed guitar, and, most signifi-



cantly, the violin. Only seven months after first picking up the instrument, Mark was adept enough to enter the National Old-Time Fiddle Championships.

In addition to winning almost every competition he's entered, Mark has also recorded a succession of solo albums, each of them more innovative than the last.

Mark O'Connor has become one of the most talented, prolific and consistently surprising artists of not only Country Music, but music of any genre.



BRENT ROWAN

Walk into a Country, rock or R&B session going on in any studio in Nashville and you're likely to find this man, seated behind an ever-present inflatable palm tree, picking away at one of his 65 different guitars.

Playing three sessions a day, Brent Rowan has plenty of opportunity to hone the skills that brought him to his present-day status as one of the hottest session players in Music City today. He's played on sessions for nearly every Country artist imaginable, from Dan Seals to Dolly Parton to Roy Rogers, but finds as much of his work comes from other types of music as from Country.

Brent received his first guitar at age 10, and he hasn't put one down since. Though several of the guitar players he counts as influences are staunch rock'n'rollers, Brent discovered rock, R&B and jazz much later in life than most other kids, growing up in a family that listened only to gospel and Country. Players such as Eric Clapton, Andy Summer and Elliot Easton all had a profound influence on Brent's love of the guitar, as well as Chet Atkins, who serves as an idol for nearly every well-known and successful guitar player today.

Among Brent's accomplishments are his 1990 Guitar Player of the Year Award from the Academy of Country Music, and his seat on GUITAR PLAYER magazine's advisory board. His first nomination for CMA Musician of the Year is just more evidence that this first-rate musician is starting to receive some of the recognition he deserves after 24 years of playing his instrument.












Country Album Chart

In Memoriam

LEW DeWITT

Lew DeWitt, 52, tenor and guitarist for the Statler Brothers for more than 18 years, died of Crohn's disease on August 16 at his Waynesboro, Virginia home. He had suffered from the intestinal disorder for nine years, forcing him to leave The Statlers in 1982.

DeWitt wrote one of The Statlers' biggest hits, "Flowers On The Wall", in 1965. It sold more than 1 million copies and has been recorded by over 30 other artists. It was the Statlers' recording of the song that catapulted them into the national spotlight as one of the most popular vocal groups in Country Music.

After leaving the Statler Brothers, DeWitt resumed his career as a solo artist, releasing a single on Nashville's Compleat Records in 1985. He also released an album before retiring again in November 1989.

DeWitt is survived by his wife, Judy; four children; and his mother. Rose.

MARTIN CHRISTIAN HAERLE

Martin Christian Haerle, founder and president of CMH Records, died of a heart attack on September 4, while hiking in Griffith Park, CA.

Born in Stuttgart, Germany, Haerle, 51, developed a love for American Country Music through listening to broadcasts over Armed Forces Radio. His interest in music brought him to the United States via Nashville in 1960, when he convinced Don Pierce of Starday Records to give him a job. He later joined Liberty, then United Artists Records before opening his own label in 1975. Specializing in bluegrass and acoustic Country Music, Haerle recorded such legends as Mac Wiseman, Grandpa Jones, Don Reno, Felice & Boudleaux Bryant, Carl and Pearl Butler, and many others. Under Haerle's guidance, several CMH albums, including those by Merle Travis, Lester Flatt's Nashville Grass, the Osborne Brothers, Johnny Gimble, and Joe Maphis, were honored with Grammy nominations.

One of Haerle's key projects at the time of his death was a new album by The Masters, a "supergroup" comprised of bluegrass virtuosos Josh Graves, Kenny Baker, Jesse McReynolds and Eddie Adcock. The album, SATURDAY NIGHT FISH FRY, was released shortly before Haerle's death.

Haerle is survived by his wife, Glenda Christian, and son, David, who plan to continue CMH Records; another son, Christian; one daughter, Katja Ploetz; and his mother, Elsa Haerle.



BEN SMATHERS

Grand Ole Opry clogging star, Ben Smathers, 61, died at Vanderbilt University Hospital in Nashville due to complications following open-heart surgery. His death occurred on the 32nd anniversary of his membership in the Opry.

During the 1950s, Smathers worked as a railroad switchman and commuted to the Opry from his home in Hendersonville, North Carolina, before gaining membership in the world-famous Country Music show. He and his Stoney Mountain Cloggers were also regulars on North Carolina television before they were established on the Opry. Smathers and his troupe toured with such diverse acts as Roy Rogers and Dale Evans and the Charlie Daniels Band. Among his proudest achievements were two appearances, in 1961 with Jim Reeves and Patsy Cline, and in 1981 with Tammy Wynette and Merle Haggard, at New York City's famed Carnegie Hall.

Smathers traced the high-stepping clogging style for which he was known to the German, Irish and Dutch immigrant population of his native western North Carolina and is credited with introducing that type of folk dance to audiences around the world.

In addition to clogging, Smathers enjoyed a second career as an actor, and appeared in numerous commmercials and television series for over 25 years.

Smathers is survived by his wife, Margaret; six children; his mother, Burdell Smathers; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.
