"CMA AWARDS BACKSTAGE PASS"

"CMA Awards Backstage Pass," the first-ever pay-per-view event produced in conjunction with a music awards telecast, was broadcast live September 21. From the comfort of their own homes, Country Music fans throughout the U.S. and Canada were treated to "CMA Awards Backstage Pass," which aired one night prior to the CBS network telecast of the "33rd Annual CMA Awards."

"CMA Awards Backstage Pass" served up a truly unique viewing experience. Noted comic Bill Engvall and Mercury recording artist Terri Clark hosted the live event. 

race rounded the corner and met all of my expectations in a glance. We had pushed the stubby, plaid couch all the way against the wall so he could stretch his legs without hitting the coffee table. I was told to wait in the tiny, dimly lit room until I heard him come in. How would I know it was him? "His voice carries," his publicist told me, a little agitated that I had to ask. When he leaned into the room, slumping through the doorway so as not to hit his head, he filled it with a very definable presence. Buck Owens once compared Trace to Johnny Cash, saying you didn't have to turn around to know he was there. That claim is not only accurate, but it impresses Trace as much as it did me.

"I have the utmost respect for Cash. He's always demanded respect and always gotten it. He has this presence about him, almost like a mystical figure. He's created this thing that is Johnny Cash, that transcends his music and transcends who he is in his personal life. He's a monster and a hellion. He's always done things the way he's wanted to do them, and I just love that about him."

One of the qualities that sets Adkins apart is the balance he embodies between being a famous Country Music star and being the son of a hardworking, swing shift employee of International Paper Company in Louisiana. In response to Buck Owens' quote, Adkins displays the humility that makes him as easy to talk to as a long lost friend.

"I don't deserve those kinds of accolades. I don't know why Buck was that way. I'll never forget the first time I met him. I was doing a radio tour and I went in this radio station there in Bakersfield. I sat down in the conference room, and he got the whole staff, everybody that worked there, to come into this big conference room. I sat down, and he was the master of ceremonies, and he said, 'OK, play me a Merle Haggard song.' I said, 'OK,' and played him a Merle Haggard song. 'Now, don't play your single, but play me something you like off your album, something you think should have been the single.' It was incredible. And then when I finished, he stood up in the middle of the room and announced, 'Thank God they finally sent us someone who can sing!' I thought, 'Oh God, this is too cool! Is there anybody videoing this?'"

The most current groundbreaking experience in Adkins' life is the release of his new album MORE. The title song is written by Thom McHugh and Del Gray and is described by Adkins as a fun song with a positive message about love. "I like it because it's kind of a mature love song with a groove to it that just makes you feel good. I enjoy performing it." The first single off the album strikes a more personal chord with Adkins. It's called "Don't Lie" and was written by Chet Biggers and Frank Rogers.

"Most everything I sing, in one way or another, I've experienced, and I've been this guy. I've been the guy where she's telling him she wants to remember him and all that kind of stuff, and he knows she's leaving him for another man. I'll never forget, I had a woman one time stop right in the door and as she was leaving she said, 'You know I'm always gonna love you.' And I was like, 'I don't want to hear that. That's the coldest thing you could've said to me right now. Are you that cruel? Just leave!' This song hurts me every time I sing it, but that's what a good song should do."

Throughout the album and throughout his career, Adkins admits to being vulnerable in his music.

"I am sharing something about myself. If not, there's no passion, no honesty. I need that to be able to sing a song. To be able to sing with passion or conviction, it has to be something I've experienced or I've seen somebody else experience. There's only one song on this album I had a part in writing. Nobody shoved anything down my throat on this album. Nobody said, 'You need to sing this because it's a radio hit.' There

was nothing like that. There's nothing that I didn't personally say 'I like this. I want to do this.' That's what was totally cool about this album. They said, 'Here's the money. Here's the budget. Make us a good album and bring it to us when you're done.'"

One of the aspects of Trace's personality that carries over into his music is his willingness to be transparent with the audience or with anyone else for that matter. He recognizes the need to make songs enjoyable and to embrace the pleasure that makes songwriting and performing such a sought after, enviable occupation, but he also feels the need to express deep, meaningful summaries about human nature. He keeps a watchful eye on the world around him and studies the way people think and act. That's one of the reasons being a Civil War buff isn't an isolated

hobby that has nothing to do with his music. It actually carries over into his songs.

"If you look back at the Civil War, it makes you realize how much human nature has changed. You don't really realize that unless you study history."

It takes a certain depth of character to appreciate events and people who aren't in the here and now. Still, most of Trace's songs are about tangible joys, pleasures and heartaches that anyone can relate to.

When asked to discuss "Can't I Want Your Love" from MORE, Trace responded, "It's sex. It's totally about sex." But more abstract ideals occupy his mind, things that aren't necessarily guaranteed to have mass appeal and are therefore not as likely to show up in his albums.

"There's a balance you have to try to keep. If I didn't care about the longevity of my career, my albums would be much darker. They would be very dark. What would end up happening is that I would get no airplay and sell no albums. Nobody would hear any of it. So what I have to do is try to balance it a little bit so that there's some stuff in there that I still

believe in and still can sink my teeth into, but it's a little more commercial. I can put some deeper, darker stuff in there that people will get to hear anyway. . . I'm not a giddy, happy person. That's just not me. I have to purposely put a little happiness and levity in there."

Maybe giddy isn't a good word to describe Trace, but when he starts talking about his wife, Rhonda, there's definitely a glow about him.

"Relationship-wise I don't think you can do much better. I'm happier now than I've ever been and more secure and whole. The relationship I

have with Rhonda is the best relationship I've ever had with a woman, ever. Thank God for that. At least that task is finally put to bed. I don't have to worry about that anymore."

Again, there's always a balance. Sarah and Tarah, his daughters from a previous marriage, are entering their teenage years. Being a father is one of the most fulfilling roles in his life, but making decisions about what's best for them is a difficult task.

"I feel guilty and kind of sorry for my first two daughters because I know how to be a father now. Fourteen years ago when my first daughter was born I was just ignorant as hell, pretty much out of control.

"I have custody of them, but if they didn't want to (live with me) what would I have achieved? You know, I may be doing the wrong thing - I may be. But unfortunately there's no wise old man who has all the answers that you can go to in this world and say, 'Hey, wise old man, what should I do?' and he gives you a perfect, correct answer. There is nobody to do that, so you have to rely on your own feeble wisdom. So one day I might look back and go, 'Wow, I really screwed that up.'" Trace has the same attitude with his music. There are some things he feels are simply out of

his control. He knows his strengths and weaknesses and admits he can't do everything.

"I'm not a musician. I'm not a songwriter. I'm a singer, and not even a good singer or a great singer. I think my strong point is on stage. That's the take I

have on it. I'm my best when I'm on stage. I've written a couple songs and have done okay, but I don't consider myself a songwriter. A songwriter is one of those guys who goes down there on 16th Avenue

everyday and writes songs from nine to five. That's a songwriter. It's a craft for them. Me? When the spirit moves me, I do it. When I've got something to write about, I do it. I have the utmost respect for those guys. Somebody comes to them and says, 'Hey, here's this movie that I've done. I need a song for the title song track for this movie.' And somebody can sit down and write that! That is a songwriter."

So what does Trace Adkins identify as his purpose in life?

"As far as why I'm here and if I'm here for a reason, I have no idea. I don't know. Do I think about it from time to time? Maybe every once in a while, but I don't dwell on it because I don't know. Nobody knows. I think the only reason that I can see is to be a father, and other than that, what's the point?"

One point is to grace the world with good music, to "get down in that lower register" as he describes himself doing on "I Can Dig It" from MORE. He's been granted a mysteriously wonderful talent that must have been given for a reason.

"It's hard to explain, but I'd make all the sacrifices that I've made in my life trying to become successful in the music industry and go through it all again. There's something about that hour or 90 minutes or whatever the show length is that I get to be on stage, that is a place for me. I'm very comfortable on stage; I'm very relaxed there because, for me, it's a sanctuary."



COUNTRY MUSIC HALL OF FAME

Timeline

Dolly Parton was a 15-year-old girl in rural Tennessee when the Country Music Hall of Fame was introduced in 1961. Three Country legends were inducted that year, all posthumously - performers Jimmie Rodgers and Hank Williams and songwriter/music publisher Fred Rose.


Even for a girl with Parton's ambition and determination, the Hall of Fame must have seemed hopelessly out of reach back in the '60s.

For one thing, the Hall of Fame was, for many years, a virtual mens' club. No women were admitted until 1970, when voters selected the original Carter Family - a legendary trio featuring Maybelle and Sara Carter. Three years later, Patsy Cline became the first solo female inductee, but the honor came a decade after her death. In 1975 and 1976, Minnie Pearl, then 62, and Kitty Wells, then 57, were admitted, but they must have seemed like venerable historical figures to Parton, who was just 30 in 1976.

Twelve years elapsed until the next woman, Loretta Lynn, was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1988. Lynn was 53 at the time, making her the youngest woman voted into the Hall to that point - and just 11 years older than Parton. Though Lynn was certifiably a Country legend, Parton was fast becoming a legend in her own right. The Hall of Fame suddenly became a real possibility for the girl from Locust Ridge, TN.

Parton's prospects brightened even further in the '90s when the door to the Hall of Fame finally burst wide open to women. Between 1991 and 1998, seven women were honored - songwriters Felice Bryant and Cindy Walker, executives Frances Preston and Jo Walker-Meador, pioneer female performer Patsy Montana and two women who were more or less Parton's peers - Brenda Lee and Tammy Wynette.

So it was hardly a surprise a few months ago when Parton was announced as one of this year's Hall of Fame honorees. Parton is 53, the same age that Lynn



Parton's election also reflects the inevitable march of time: she is the first Hall of Fame honoree who was born after World War II.

Two male performers are also being inducted this year. Conway Twitty and Johnny Bond are being admitted posthumously. Both began their careers long before Parton burst on the scene in 1967. Bond recorded his first Country hit in 1947; Twitty first made the pop chart in 1957.

Counting this year's honorees, 72 acts have been inducted into the Hall of Fame. All but four are individuals. The exceptions are two performing groups (the original Carter Family and the original Sons of the Pioneers), one performing duo (Flatt and Scruggs) and one songwriting team (Boudleaux & Felice Bryant).

Roy Rogers is the only person who has been inducted twice - as an individual and as a group member. Eddy Arnold was just 48 at the time of his induction, making him the youngest honoree. Wesley H. Rose is the only son or daughter of a Hall of Fame member (Fred Rose) to make the Hall - though Hank Williams Jr, June Carter Cash, Roseanne Cash, Lorrie Morgan and Randy Scruggs are among those hoping to one day follow suit.

In addition to artists and song-1995 Jo Walker-Meador honorees writers, the include label and pubexecutives, lishing record producers, broadcasters and Grand Ole Opry comedians. All have made Country Music history. To illustrate the point, here's a Country Music time line, with one entry for each of the 72 honorees.

December 8, 1923 - Fiddlin' John Carson's "The Little Old Log Cabin In The Lane" - produced by Ralph Sylvester Peer - becomes the first commer-

cially successful Country recording. In 1927, Peer discovers Jimmie Rodgers and the Carter Family. The following year, he forms Southern Music Publishing Co. - the first major Country publisher.

"The Prisoner's Song" becomes Country's first million-seller. The saga reportedly sells a phenomenal 7 million copies, making it one of the biggest hits of the era. Dalhart dabbled in everything from Hawaiian music to light opera before his influential move to "hillbilly" story songs.

December 26, 1925 - **George D. Hay** creates the Grand Ole Opry radio program for WSM. Hay models the show after the "National Barn Dance," a hit show at WLS in Chicago, where he previously worked. The WSM show was simply known as the "Old-Time Music Program" until 1927, when Hay dubbed it the Grand Ole Opry.

1927 November 30, 1927 - **Jimmie Rodgers**, widely hailed as the "Father of Country Music," records "Blue Yodel," also known as "T For Texas." The classic becomes a crossover smash the following spring and spawns a dozen sequels. Rodgers was just 35 when he died of tuberculosis in 1933.

releases its first hit, "Bury Me Under The Weeping Willow." The trio follows it with such classics as "Wildwood Flower" and "Can The Circle Be Unbroken (Bye and Bye)." The Carter Family - consisting of A.P. Carter, his wife Sara and her cousin Maybelle - later becomes the first group inducted into the Hall of Fame.

1929 - Arthur Edward Satherley joins the American Record Corporation, which is later purchased by Columbia Records. Satherley remains with Columbia until 1952, recording such stars as Gene Autry, Bob Wills and Bill Monroe. Satherley, who was born in Bristol, England, is the only Englishman in the Hall of Fame. The former executive was 82 at the time of his election, which also makes him the oldest honoree.

1934 December 15, 1934 - The original **Sons of the Pioneers** - formed in 1933 as the Pioneer Trio - land their first hit with "Tumbling Tumbleweeds." Founding member Bob Nolan wrote the song, as well as a later classic by the group, "Cool Water." Roy Rogers,

another founding member, leaves in 1937 to sign with Republic Pictures in Hollywood.

1935 - At the ripe old age of 22, Louis 1935

Marshall Jones adopts the stage name

Grandpa Jones. Bradley Kincaid, a Country radio star of the era, gives him that nickname because Jones sounds old and grouchy on an early morning radio show in Boston. Grandpa Jones joins the Grand Ole Opry in 1946 and becomes a household name on "Hee Haw" in 1969.

January 25, 1936 - Patsy 1936

Montana & the Prairie Ramblers' "I

Wanna Be A Cowboy's Sweetheart"

becomes a crossover hit. Montana wrote the song, which is the first big hit by a female Country star.

Montana, who was known for her yodeling flair and cowgirl costumes, was born in Hope, AR, the same town that gave us President Clinton.

1937 - J.L. (Joe) Frank helps land Pee Wee 1937 King and his Golden West Cowboys a berth on the Grand Ole Opry. The following year, he does the same for Roy Acuff. He even suggests changing the name of Acuff's band from the Crazy Tennesseans to the Smoky Mountain Boys. Such savvy moves enable Frank to become known as Nashville's leading concert promoter; "the Flo Ziegfeld of Country Music."

December 24, 1938 - **Roy Acuff** lands his 1938 biggest hit with "Wabash Cannonball." Four years later, he teams with Fred Rose to form Acuff-Rose Publications, Nashville's first major Country publishing house. In 1962, Acuff becomes the first living person to be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. Acuff is a top star at the Grand Ole Opry from 1938 until his death in 1992.

April 1939 - Sarah Ophelia Colley makes her first professional appearance as **Minnie Pearl** at a womens club function in Aiken, SC. She delights audiences with the character for the next 52 years, becoming not just the queen of Country comedy but one of the most beloved entertainers of our time.

June 3, 1939 - **Bob Wills** & His Texas Playboys release their breakthrough hit, "San Antonio Rose." The following year, they release a new recording of the song, which becomes an even bigger hit. Wills and his band are the top Country group of the '40s. Wills is also the undisputed "King of Western Swing."

1940 - At age 70, **Uncle Dave Macon** provides one of the highlights of the Republic film, "Grand Ole Opry" - an exuberant performance of "Take Me Back To My Carolina Home." Macon, who was born just five years after the end of the Civil War, was over 50 when he was discovered performing for customers in a Nashville barber shop. He gained a reputation as a master showman, banjo player, singer and comedian.

Walker lands her first hit with "Lone Star Trail" by Bing Crosby. Walker goes on to write number-one Country hits for Bob Wills & His Texas Playboys, Eddy Arnold, Webb Pierce, Jim Reeves, Sonny James and Jack Greene. Her most enduring song is "You Don't Know Me," recorded by Eddy Arnold and later Ray Charles.

1942 - Comedian **Benjamin F. Ford** begins a five-year run as the star comedian on the Grand Ole Opry's NBC network segment. "Whitey" Ford is best known for his rube character "The Duke of Paducah." Ford compiles a vast library of jokes, which he later sells to "Hee Haw."

October 13, 1942 - **Fred Rose** teams with Roy Acuff to form Acuff-Rose Publications. The two men also collaborate on such songs as "Be Honest With Me," which is nominated for an Academy Award in 1941. Rose later writes or co-writes number-one Country hits for Gene Autry, Eddy Arnold and Hank Williams. In 1975, Willie Nelson tops the Country chart with a sublime version of Rose's "Blue Eyes Crying In The Rain."

June 6, 1944 - On "D Day," the day the Allies invade Europe in World War II, **Grant Turner** joins the staff of WSM in Nashville. Turner soon joins George D. Hay's stable of Saturday night Grand Ole Opry announcers. Turner goes on to serve on the Opry announcing staff for 47 years.

1944 - **Jimmie H. Davis** is elected Governor of Louisiana. Davis' day job doesn't slow down his music career: He has a series of Country hits during his term. In 1940, Davis released "You Are My Sunshine," which has since become a standard. Davis has a cowriting credit on the song, though some historians suspect that he merely bought the copyright. Davis serves a second term as Governor from 1960-64.

1945 - Cliffie Stone takes a job at Capitol Records as assistant to Country A&R chief Lee Gillette. Stone signs Merle Travis to Capitol and co-writes several of Travis' hits, including "Divorce Me C.O.D." Stone also records a few hits of his own for the label.



Stone later manages Tennessee Ernie Ford and produces Ford's TV show. Stone is the first California native to be voted into the Hall of Fame.

1945 - **Stephen H. Sholes** becomes head of Country and R&B recording for RCA Victor Records. Sholes is instrumental in guiding the careers of Hall of Famers Eddy Arnold, Chet Atkins, Hank Snow, Jim Reeves and Pee Wee King. Sholes, who started at Victor in 1929, makes his greatest contribution to the company in 1955, when he buys out Sun Records' contract with a young up-and-comer named Elvis Presley.

1945 - **Roy Rogers**, the beloved "King of the Cowboys," makes his first appearance on Quigley Publications' annual list of the nation's top 10 boxoffice stars. (Gene Autry had made the list from 1940-42.) In 1988, Rogers becomes the only person to be inducted into the Hall of Fame as both an individual and as a group member. Rogers had been admitted with the original Sons of the Pioneers in 1980.

1946 - **Red Foley** replaces Roy Acuff as the emcee of the "Prince Albert Show," the network segment of the Grand Ole Opry broadcast. Foley remains in that slot for seven years. In 1950, Foley tops the pop and Country charts with "Chattanoogie Shoe Shine Boy." In addition to his solo hits, Foley teams with Ernest Tubb, and later, Kitty Wells for a long string of hit duets.

March 23, 1946 - **Bill Monroe** and his Blue Grass Boys land their first hit with "Kentucky Waltz." Monroe, a Kentucky native, wrote the song and another classic, "Blue Moon Of Kentucky." His band takes its name from Kentucky's state motto, "the Blue Grass State." Monroe, who started out with his brother Charlie in the Monroe Brothers, is universally regarded as "the father of bluegrass."

October 12, 1946 - **Merle Travis** lands his first number-one Country hit with "Divorce Me C.O.D." Travis goes on to write two of the biggest hits of the era - Tennessee Ernie Ford's "Sixteen Tons" and Tex Williams' "Smoke! Smoke! Smoke! (That Cigarette)." Both records reach number one on both the pop and Country charts.

1947 - Rod Brasfield becomes
the premier comedian at the Grand
Ole Opry, where he performs both
as a solo act and, most memorably, in tandem with Minnie
Pearl. Brasfield plays the part of a
hapless Country bumpkin to the
hilt. In 1957, he plays Andy
Griffith's sidekick in the movie, "A
Face In The Crowd."

August 1947 - Paul Cohen, a
Decca executive since the label's formation in 1934, begins regular recording sessions at Castle Recording studio in Nashville.
Cohen's insistence on Nashville as a recording location helps him build Decca into a Country powerhouse. Cohen's signings include Hall of Famers Red Foley, Kitty Wells, Bill Monroe, Patsy Cline, Bob Wills, Loretta Lynn and Brenda Lee.

September 18, 1947 - **Ernest Tubb** headlines the first Grand Ole Opry show ever to play Carnegie Hall. Tubb, nicknamed "The Texas Troubadour," has been turning out hits since 1941, when he wrote and recorded "Walking The Floor Over You." Tubb goes on to record hit duets with the Andrews Sisters, Red Foley, the Wilburn Brothers and Loretta Lynn.

1948 September 25, 1948 - Little Jimmy Dickens joins the Grand Ole Opry and signs with Columbia Records. Dickens promptly lands a string of hits, including the 1949 novelty "Take An Old Cold 'Tater (And Wait)." Dickens has his biggest success in 1965 with another novelty single, "May The Bird Of Paradise Fly Up Your Nose."

1949 February 26, 1949 - **George Morgan** kicks off a long string of Country hits with the number-one smash "Candy Kisses." Morgan's song triggers one of Country's all-time cover battles. Five cover recordings make the Country chart in 1949. All become hits; though none equals Morgan's success.

May 21, 1949 - **Eddy Arnold's** "Bouquet Of Roses" logs its 54th week on the Country chart - a longevity record that stands to this day. In 1966, Arnold becomes, at 48, the youngest person ever inducted into the Hall of Fame. The following year, he becomes

CMA's first Entertainer of the Year. "The Tennessee Plowboy" is the number-one Country hitmaker of all time, according to Joel Whitburn's "Top Country Singles."


June 1949 - **Hank Williams** with His Drifting Cowboys make their first appearance at

the Grand Ole Opry. Williams, who had just notched his first numberone Country hit, "Lovesick Blues," is a sensation. Williams goes on to write and record such enduring hits as "Your Cheatin' Heart" and "Jambalaya (On The Bayou)." Williams was just 29 when he died in 1953 the shortest life span of any Hall of Fame member.

August 20, 1949 - **Floyd Tillman** and His Favorite Playboys land a top five

Country hit with the Tillman composition "Slipping Around." That's a strong showing, but it's eclipsed by Ernest Tubb's cover recording, which becomes a number-one Country hit, and by an even more successful version by Margaret Whiting & Jimmy Wakely, which hits number one both pop and Country.

January 7, 1950 - **Gene Autry** and the Pinafores' "Rudolph, The Red-Nosed Reindeer" tops the pop and Country charts. The single reportedly sells 8 million copies, which at the time was second only to Bing Crosby's "White Christmas." Autry, a recording and movie star since the '30s, scores with two other holiday songs, "Frosty The Snow Man" and "Here Comes Santa Claus (Down Santa Claus Lane)."



December 16, 1950 - "I'm Moving On" by **Hank Snow** and his Rainbow Ranch Boys logs its 21st week atop BILLBOARD's Country chart. That puts it in a three-way tie as the longest running number one Country hit of all time. Snow is one of only two Canadians in the Hall of Fame. The other: Bob Nolan of the original Sons of the Pioneers.

Cowan to establish Tree Publishing Co., one of Nashville's most successful music publishing firms. Stapp, who also makes his mark as a highly successful program director for WSM and WKDA in Nashville, finally joins Tree on a full-time basis in 1964. Ten years later, he becomes Tree's chairman and CEO.

1952 - **Hubert Long** forms Hubert Long International, which becomes a publishing, management and booking giant. Long's management clients include such top stars as Webb Pierce and Faron Young. Long later becomes the first person to serve as both President and Chairman of CMA.

January 5, 1952 - Frank "Pee Wee" King and his Golden West Cowboys top the pop and Country charts with "Slow Poke." King co-wrote the song with Chilton Price. The two men also collaborate on two other number-one pop hits of the early '50s - Patti Page's "The Tennessee Waltz" and Jo Stafford's "You Belong To Me."

May 10, 1952 - **Hank Thompson** and His Brazos Valley Boys' "The Wild Side Of Life" begins a 15-week run atop the Country chart. The song includes the line, "I didn't know God made honky-tonk angels." That line inspires Kitty Wells' "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels." Thompson is an enduring force in honky-tonk and Western swing, landing top 10 Country hits in the '40s, '50s, '60s and '70s.

August 23, 1952 - **Kitty Wells**' "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels" tops the Country chart. Four decades later, Hall of Famers Dolly Parton, Loretta Lynn and Tammy Wynette use the song as the centerpiece of the album HONKY TONK ANGELS. Wells - the first of three Nashville natives to be voted into the Hall of Fame - is Country's top female singles artist of the '50s and '60s.

1953 - James R. Denny teams with Webb Pierce, the number one Country hitmaker of the '50s, to form Cedarwood Publishing Co. Three years later, after being forced out at the Grand Ole Opry, Denny forms the Jim Denny Artist Bureau. By 1963, the year of Denny's death, the company books nearly 4,000 Country shows annually.

March 19, 1953 - **Tex Ritter** performs the theme from the Gary Cooper classic "High Noon" on the Academy Awards. The ballad, "Do Not Forsake Me, Oh My Darlin'," wins as Best Original Song, making it the first Country song to be so honored. Ritter later becomes the first native Texan to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. The Lone Star State has spawned 18 Hall of Fame members - more than any other.



July 1954 - **Elvis Presley** releases his first single on Sun Records - "That's All Right," backed with Bill Monroe's "Blue Moon Of Kentucky." It fails to make much noise, but Presley lands two top five Country hits the following year, "Baby Let's Play House" and "I Forgot To Remember To Forget." Presley has to wait until 1956, after he moves to RCA Victor, to make an impact in the pop market.

1955 - Chet Atkins is named manager of RCA 1955
Records' new Nashville studio - a stepping stone to a vice presidential appointment. Atkins produces major hits for such artists as Jim Reeves, Don Gibson, Eddy Arnold, Bobby Bare and Floyd Cramer. Atkins is also a legendary guitarist. Between 1967 and 1988, he wins the CMA Award for Instrumentalist of the Year a record nine times.

August 6, 1955 - **Lefty Frizzell** headlines the first Country concert ever held at the Hollywood Bowl. Frizzell kicked off his recording career in 1950 with the lively honky-tonk number, "If You've Got The Money I've Got The Time." It was the first of six number-one Country hits for Frizzell, whom Merle Haggard once called "the most unique thing that ever happened to Country Music."

March 1, 1956 - **Ray Price** records "Crazy 1956 Arms," which many regard as the pivotal recording of his career. During the next several years, Price develops the 4/4-shuffle rhythm that becomes his trademark. In 1971, Price wins the CMA Award for Album of the Year with I WON'T MENTION IT AGAIN."

October 4, 1956 -Tennessee Emie Ford's weekly variety show begins a five-year run on NBC. The series premieres just nine months after Ford's smash single "Sixteen Tons" tops the pop and Country charts. 1957, "the Peapicker" demonstrates his serious side on his best-selling inspirational album, HYMNS.

Twelve-year-old "Little Miss Dynamite" **Brenda**Lee lands her first pop and Country hit with "One Step At A Time." Lee goes on to be one of the top pop stars of the 1960s. She re-ignites her Country

career in 1969 with a remake of Willie Nelson's "Johnny One Time.[™] Lee was just 52 at the time of her election, making her the youngest female inductee.

1958 - Connie B. Gay becomes the founding President of CMA. Gay, a veteran broadcaster and artist manager in the Washington D.C./Virginia area is credited with driving the change in terminology from "hillbilly" to "Country." In 1974, Gay becomes president of the Country Music Foundation.

1958 - Frances Williams Preston opens BMI's first Southern regional office in Nashville. Within six years, she is named Vice President - a rarity for a woman in those days. In 1986, she becomes the company's President and CEO. FORTUNE magazine has called Preston "one of the true powerhouses in the pop music business." That's true, but the Nashville native's heart is still in Country.

1958 - **Owen Bradley** is named head of Decca's Nashville division. In that capacity, he produces hits for such Hall of Famers as Kitty Wells, Patsy Cline, Brenda Lee and Loretta Lynn. Bradley, who works for Decca from 1947 to 1976, later produces the sound-tracks to the biographical movies "Coal Miner's Daughter" and "Sweet Dreams."

September 8, 1958 - The Everly Brothers land their fourth number-one Country hit in less than 15 months with "Bird Dog." All four songs are written by the

husband-and-wife team of **Boudleaux & Felice Bryant**. Boudleaux had previously written numberone Country hits by Carl Smith and Red Foley. In 1991, the Bryants become the only songwriting team to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

April 12, 1961 - **Marty Robbins'** "El Paso," 1961 the first number-one hit of the 1960s on both the pop and Country charts, wins a Grammy for Best Country & Western Performance. Robbins, who was born near Glendale, AZ, is the first person born west of the Continental Divide to be voted into the Hall of Fame.

December 25, 1961 - **Patsy Cline's** "I Fall To Pieces" logs its 39th week on the Country chart - the longest run of any hit in the 1960s. The singer is killed in a plane crash less than 15 months later. In 1973, Cline becomes the first solo female to be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame.

September 26, 1962 - "The Beverly Hillbillies" 1962 begins a nine-year run on CBS Television. Bluegrass legends **Lester Flatt** and **Earl Scruggs** perform the theme song, "The Ballad Of Jed Clampett." In 1985, Flatt & Scruggs become the only performing duo to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

November 6, 1962 - **Jo Walker-Meador** is named executive director of the four-year-old Country Music Association. During her 29-year tenure, Walker-Meador is instrumental in establishing the annual CMA Awards, the Country Music Hall of Fame and the International Country Music Fan Fair.




July 31, 1964 - **Jim Reeves**, one of Country's 1964 top stars since 1953, is killed in a plane crash in Nashville. Within a month, Reeves' song "I Guess I'm Crazy" is number-one and that's just the start of an unprecedented run of posthumous hits. In the 10 years after his death, Reeves has an unbroken string of 19 top 20 hits. It was like he never left.



February 6, 1965 - **Johnny Bond** lands one of the top Country novelty hits of the 1960s with the drinking song "10 Little Bottles." Bond wrote and first recorded the song in 1951. Bond and his Red River Valley Boys recorded a string of Country hits beginning in 1947. Bond also wrote a biography of fellow Hall of Famer Tex Ritter.

1966 March 26, 1966 - Eight years after topping the pop charts with "It's Only Make Believe,"

Conway Twitty launches his Country career with "Guess My Eyes Were Bigger Than My Heart." The single reaches the top 20 on the Country chart. Between 1968 and 1986, Twitty amasses a record setting 40 number-one Country hits. Five of them are duets with Loretta Lynn. Twitty is Country's number-one singles artist of the '70s.



Horton presides over the opening of the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum. Horton worked for Peer-Southern Music for more than 40 years, promoting songs by Jimmie Rodgers, the Carter Family and Bill Monroe, among others. In 1978, Horton becomes president of the Country Music Foundation.

March 15, 1968 - **Buck Owens** & His 1968
Buckaroos' "It Takes People Like You To Make
People Like Me" tops BILLBOARD's Country album
chart. It's Owens' 11th consecutive number one
Country album (excluding a 1965 instrumental
release) - a streak that holds the record to this day.
Owens, the number-one Country artist of the 1960s,
later records duets with Emmylou Harris and Dwight
Yoakam.

February 16, 1969 - **Tammy Wynette** and George Jones are married. One song they can't avoid on their honeymoon: Wynette's "Stand By Your Man," which went top 20 on the pop chart earlier in the month. The success of the song comes amid Wynette's three-year reign as Best Female Vocalist at the CMA Awards. Wynette and Jones are divorced in 1975, but they remain one of the legendary duets in Country Music history.

June 7, 1969 - "The **Johnny Cash** Show" debuts on ABC-TV. The series gives network exposure to such Country greats as Roy Acuff, Minnie Pearl and Merle Haggard. Two months after the show's debut, the live album JOHNNY CASH AT SAN QUENTIN tops both the pop and Country charts. In October, Cash takes home five of the 10 CMA Awards that were presented that year.

October 1970 - On the strength of his classic hit, "Okie From Muskogee," **Merle Haggard** receives a record-setting nine CMA nominations. He wins four Awards, including Entertainer of the Year. Haggard has had 39 top 10 albums, more than any other artist in the history of BILLBOARD's Country charts. Hag, who hails from Bakersfield, CA, is the only Southern California native in the Hall of Fame.

October 1972 - **Loretta Lynn** becomes the first woman to win the CMA Award as Entertainer of the Year. Lynn is Country's top female album artist of the '60s and '70s. Lynn's 1970 song "Coal Miner's Daughter" provides the title of her 1976 autobiography and a 1980 movie based on the book. Actress Sissy Spacek wins an Academy Award for her portrayal of Lynn.

1978 - **Bud Wendell** succeeds Irving Waugh as CEO of WSM. Three years later, Wendell is named president and CEO of Gaylord Entertainment. Under Wendell's watch, Gaylord launches the Nashville Network, acquires Country Music Television and establishes the Opryland Music Group. Yet Wendell retains a common touch. As journalist Jack Hurst put it, "He's the kind of guy who never got too big to be called Bud."

May 13, 1978 - **Willie Nelson's** "Stardust" enters the pop and Country charts. The album remains on the Country chart for 551 weeks, which remains the all-time longevity record. Nelson is the number one Country album artist of all time according to Joel Whitburn's "Top Country Albums." He is also the only artist to have won the CMA Award for Single of the Year more than once.

July 5, 1980 - **George Jones**' "He Stopped Loving Her Today" reaches number one, en route to multiple CMA Awards in October. The classic ballad is named Single of the Year and Song of the Year and pushes Jones to his first victory as Best Male Vocalist. (Both Jones and the song win again the following year.) Jones has placed more albums and singles on BILLBOARD's Country charts than any other artist in history.

October 13, 1986 - **Wesley H. Rose** becomes the first son or daughter of a Hall of Fame member to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. Rose, the son of Fred Rose, ran Acuff-Rose Publications from 1945 until 1985, when he and Acuff sold their catalogues to Gaylord Broadcasting. Rose was also the first Nashville publisher on the national boards of ASCAP and the Music Publishers Association.

1994 - **Harlan Howard**, the dean of Country songwriters, walks off with BMI's award for Most Performed Country Song of the Year - "Blame It On Your Heart" by Patty Loveless. Since his career took off in 1958, Howard has written or co-written 38 top five Country hits, including Patsy Cline's "I Fall To Pieces," Buck Owens' "I've Got A Tiger By The Tail" and The Judds' "Why Not Me."



198.5 April 25, 1985 - Roger Miller's "Big River," a musical adaptation of Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn," opens on Broadway. The show runs for more than 1,000 performances and wins seven Tony Awards, including Best Musical and Best Score. "This is a pretty good deal," exclaims Miller on receiving his Tony.

1986 May 1986 - **Dolly Parton** opens the Dollywood theme park in Pigeon Forge, TN. Against the advice of her accountants, Parton sinks \$6 million of her own money into the park's construction. It proves to be a sharp investment. In its first season, Dollywood attracts 1.3 million visitors. In her spare time, Parton adds to her standing as the number one female artist of all time on BILLBOARD's Country charts. (Elected 1999)


Paul Brandt says as he crosses his hands across his chest, giving a grin that could light up the darkest of rooms. "My job is about making people smile and making people laugh and letting them escape a little bit. I believe in what I'm doing, I've seen it work when I go out and play. It all had a common thread, but I didn't know what that common thread was until I wrote the song 'That's The

veryone knows what an enormous talent Dolly Parton is. She has written songs that are already classics, that will be around and enjoyed forever. God gave her such a beautiful voice that is recognized instantly, on any song she sings, because he made her voice one of a kind. Her wisdom, charm, sense of humor, delivery, spontaneity, wit, sensitivity and sincerity are unmatched by anyone. I admire Dolly's glamour, great beauty and pizzazz. Her presence is always felt, not just on stage, but anyplace she is. She can walk into a room and fill it with her vivaciousness. She's electric! I want to tell you just a couple of examples of what an extraordinary person Dolly is...

Soon after I first moved to Nashville and was still was very much, "Barbara who," my daddy and I met Dolly. A couple of weeks later, we were walking to our car in the CMA parking lot and we heard this "Hi Barbara. Hi Mr. Mandrell." It was Dolly yelling to us. Well, she sure made us feel important and so happy that day.

A few years ago, after about 18 months of recovery from a serious car crash, I was going to have a "comeback" performance at the Universal Amphitheater in Los Angeles, California. Dolly volunteered to open for me that night and believe me, I shall never forget her unselfish and loving gift to me.

When Peter Guber of Mandalay Entertainment did a movie of my life for CBS ("Get To The Heart"), the Linda Bergman script opened and closed with a shot of Dolly and me. Dolly told them that she wanted to play herself...so she did, and I played myself in those two scenes. Dolly has done great movies and television shows. She has written and performed in great shows, and she has recorded great songs. The world is blessed by the gift of her endless talents that she shares with us.

Thank you Heavenly Father, for letting me be on this earth at the same time as Dolly Parton.



cma awards retail campaign includes the UK, Holland, Germany and Australia





oosted by primetime TV coverage of the CMA Awards on BBC2, retail campaign efforts for the 33rd Annual CMA

Awards this year include the UK, as well as Holland, Germany and Australia.

The UK campaign, now in its fourth year, ran from 23 September -4 October. This year's campaign had over 1,000 stores participating, including HMV, Virgin, Our Price, W.H. Smith, MVC, Tower, Borders and key independents. Posters, end-racking, header cards, window displays, consumer ads and merchandise giveaways supported 32 nominated titles from most of the major labels. On 13 September, the first-ever CMA Awards compilation album was released by Universal in association with CMA's UK office.

"The CMA Awards Collection" is a full-price disc containing 20 tracks. Among the artists included on the album are CMA Awards winners Brooks & Dunn, the Dixie Chicks, Faith Hill, Vince Gill, Martina McBride, Tim McGraw, and Jo Dee Messina. Several artists who have already made trips to the UK are also on the compilation, including Sara Evans, Steve Earle and the Del McCoury Band, the Mavericks, Reba McEntire, Allison Moorer, Dolly Parton and Chely Wright.


While complete sales figures for the duration of the campaign were not yet known at press time, several artists have seen significant sales spikes following the primetime telecast of the CMA Awards on BBC2 on 28 September. Virgin Megastores product manager Simon Coe noted increases of 300% on albums by the Dixie Chicks and Tim McGraw after the telecast. Coe is encouraged by the expansive coverage of the Awards and the growing acceptance of Country Music in Britain, saying, "The American Country market realizes it needs to export more so there are more acts coming over to tour. It's getting more profile in the media with BBC Radio 2 and (television) shows like 'The Lottery'."

Gary Rolfe, head of specialties and classical for retailer HMV, also noted huge sales increases for Male and Female Vocalist of the Year winners Tim McGraw and Martina McBride, respectively. The telecast was also beneficial to Shania Twain, as nearly 80,000 copies of "Come On Over" were sold the week after the telecast. That number buoyed sales of the album to over a million units, which is the highest -selling Country album ever in the UK.

Backed by similar materials, Holland debuted its first-ever Awards retail promotion, involving the Music House chain and other retailers in support of the KRO telecast and KRO Radio coverage. On average, participants saw their Country sales increase by 15-25% in the Netherlands, with the Dixie Chicks and Shania Twain garnering the highest sales.

Germany is planning its inaugural retail campaign in connection with a November Awards telecast. Also in the works for Germany is a 4-CD box set featuring CMA Awards nominees and other artists, which will be made






available for purchase only via television.

Australia will see "The Cream Of Country Vol. III 33rd Annual CMA Awards Collection" compilation released by Universal, timed with a retail campaign and national telecast of the Awards later this fall.


