

DANGER MEN WORKING UNDERGROUND

Why Does the ASCAP Sponsored McCarran Bill (S. 1106) Read in Part:

“The reproduction or rendition of a musical composition by or upon a coin operated machine shall be deemed a public performance for profit by the person who owns, operates or services such machine whether or not a fee is charged for admission; provided that a person who himself owns, operates, services and retains all receipts of a single such machine, located in an establishment in which he conducts a business other than that of providing entertainment, and to which no fee for admission is charged shall not be deemed to have infringed upon the exclusive right of public performance for profit as a result of the rendition or reproduction of the musical composition by means of that coin operated machine if such rendition or reproduction is intended to be heard only by persons in such establishments.”?

Have you ever read a more insidiously devious arrangement of double-talk than the above phraseology that appears in the McCarran Bill?

(This is the difference between the present McCarran Bill and the old Scott Bill of 1951).

Isn't this the old, old, crocodile tears, sob-sister malarkey about the little man who wasn't (and isn't) there? (In short, the little man who owns his own phono has long, long ago given up trying to meet the terrible overhead expense to maintain his own phono.)

Is this to be the type of underground and underhanded action which will be pushed before the Committee on the Judiciary to take off the heat from the real reason why ASCAP wants the Congress of these United States to vote this single, rich, all-powerful corporation even more money to make ASCAP richer and more all-powerful? (And ASCAP is asking that this be done by the Congressmen and Senators elected to their exalted and highly respected positions by the free peoples of this nation. The very people who will have to pay this double tax.)

Is this the camouflage to be smoke-screened before the Congressional Committee on the Judiciary to get ASCAP a tax on top of a tax? (Not only do the manufacturers of recordings already pay heavy royalty, but, now ASCAP wants the juke box buyers of these very same already-taxed-recordings to

pay them still more royalty-tax-tribute for these very same recordings.)

Is this the American Way?

Is unthinking, unscrupulous over-taxation what made this great and free nation the industrial and commercial giant it is today?

Is this the sort of underground activity with which the nation's juke box industry will have to contend in open hearings before the Committee on the Judiciary?

Isn't this the way ASCAP can KILL THE GOOSE THAT LAYS THE GOLDEN EGGS for its own members?

Is this the type of thing which pervades, and is dispensed by, an organization of supposedly great, renowned, and ennobled music minds, who have created the music of America?

Is it ASCAP's purpose to destroy, debase and decry the very network of music which keeps its own members in business today—the juke boxes of America?

Is this type of underground effort to be the sort of procedure which can be expected from an artistic and supposedly outstanding organization?

Is this the American way—to take from the poor and laboring peoples of this nation the music they can afford and the music they enjoy—the juke box musical entertainment of the nation?

Isn't this the way to: CRUCIFY THE MUSIC OF THE POOR ON A CROSS OF GOLD?

What do you think?

TRENDS

The record business is a business of trends.

We've gone through the new sound trend, the girl singer trend, the boy singer trend, the hillbilly trend, the rhythm and blues trend and many others.

There's always been some trend to explain why a record or song did or didn't make it at any particular time.

So at the moment we feel a little non-plussed. There is no discernable trend in the record business.

About a year ago, we asked editorially "What's happened to the girl singers?" and since then they've come back with such strength that we were wondering only a few months ago what happened to the boy singers.

For a long time everyone was looking for a new sound and we were getting every weird combination of instruments that could be imagined. Then came the gimmicks. Then the trek to Nashville to sign up every folk writer who could even whistle a tune.

But at the moment we're in a trendless era.

The important thing now seems to be the song and the rendition—just as it was in the good old days that everyone always wants to go back to.

Which leads us to the publishers in this industry.

For years they have been talking about the days when a plug was a plug, when a song mattered more than the gimmick.

Well if ever they've had the opportunity to show the importance of material, this is it.

Today there is no trend that they have to stick to. There's no formula they have to follow. All types of songs are making it. All types of records are hitting the top. There's not even the excuse that "the song is just too good" anymore, for several of the songs in today's upper brackets would be worthy of being there at any time in our musical history. They are tunes that come from excellent writers and excellent sources.

This is the period which publishers have been waiting for—this trendless period. For now they can show that the material is not only important but vital to the creation of a hit disk. They can show, for instance—as was hard to do only a few months ago—that a good tune sung straight can become a hit. And they can show furthermore that just because a tune is done in a style which was formerly accepted—such as the belting style—that doesn't necessarily assure its even being listened to.

They can show that every type of song has a chance today. And what's more that records done by every type of artist can reach the top.

Most importantly, publishers can point out that here we are in a completely trendless stage and we still have hits. As a matter of fact, the record business is in one of the healthiest positions it's ever been in. Business has been generally excellent—for everybody. And this state of affairs has lasted for a long time now.

The feeling in the trade is that the trendless phase can go on for quite a while and be profitable to everyone.

That doesn't mean that we are predicting that there won't be any more trends. Undoubtedly there will be.

But we are pointing out that at the moment there is no one dominant trend and we're wondering out loud, "Can this be the reason for the healthy state of the record business today?"

Decca will mail a reprint of the Dorothy (Small World) Collins article that appeared in the March Cosmopolitan Magazine to jockies around the country. Particularly liked the item about the night club that turned Television's Sweetheart" down cold a couple of years ago but now wants her back at any figure. . . . The Tom 'N Jack show (WKAB-TV) is now sponsored Monday-Wednesday-Friday 8-8:30 P.M., and Saturday 7-8 P.M. Tom and Jack are Tom Jackson and Jack Cardwell.

- B** "LITTLE DID WE KNOW" (2:15) [Johnstone-Montei] Dean Martin bubbles over with warmth as he sings in his soft and inviting manner a pretty ballad with a lovely tune. Dick Stabile assists with a smooth orking on the lush side.
- C** "THERE'S MY LOVER" (2:58) [Jefferson Music] The singing portion of the Martin & Lewis team does another polished job on a warm ballad. His treatment of this tender tune oughta please his fans.

DANNY WINCHELL
(MGM 11455; K-11455)

- B+** "OHIO" (2:45) [Chappell & Co.] Mr. Personality, Danny Winchell, does some cute vocaling and whistling on one of the top tunes from the hit musical "Wonderful Town." His delivery is full of a relaxed natural feeling that makes for good listening.
- B** "I CAN'T HELP LOVING YOU" (2:57) [Famous Music] Leroy Holmes supports the warbler once again but with an entirely different backing on this blasting side as Dan gives out with a happy jump novelty on the cute and catchy side.

KAY MALONE

- C+** "ANGEL OR DEVIL" (3:02) [Weiss & Barry Music] A fast moving and exciting tempo is set up by Lou Brings' ork for a zestful and strong voiced vocal by Kay Malone. The thrush really puts over the song.
- B** "BLACK IS THE COLOR OF MY TRUE LOVE'S HAIR" (3:06) Jud Conlon's Rhythmaires and Marty Gould's ork come up with a lush backdrop for a pretty slow ballad with a folk flavor that's done wonderfully by Kay. Rendition is touching.

- B** "YOUR CHEATIN' HEART" (2:42) [Acuff-Rose Pub.] A current Hank Williams hit tune is invitingly covered by the froggy voice of Louis Armstrong in his inviting manner of delivery. This side should get spins.
- C+** "CONGRATULATIONS TO SOMEONE" (2:46) [United Music] Satchmo covers another tune that's reaching high on the lists. He toots a bit and sings a bit with the able assistance of Sy Oliver's crew.

- B** "ANNA" (2:40) [Hollis Music] From the current motion picture "Anna," comes this exciting beatty tune with a Lat'n flavor that Paul Weston and h's ork do such an able job on. Tune is a good one and delivery makes it a contender for top honors.

Tessie offers a bluesy item on the lower lid tagged "Breakin' In The Blues." "Dancin'" is very similar to "Waltz" and is a perfect follow up that could reach the top of the song parade too.

Both ends are vocal masterpieces and are perfect sets for the thrush to show her talent. Glen Osser does a top flight backing job on both halves.

They take a novel jump number dubbed "He Who Has Love" and give it a peppy going over with their stellar rhythm and harmony and set it up against a sensational backdrop just packed with sock by the Norman Leyden ork. The lyrics are catchy and easily remembered. Flip is the standard "I Wonder, I Wonder, I Wonder" that the boys give a personal and warm treatment to. We favor the top half and feel it will be the side that will make them a top vocal quartet. Top deck is 1:57 long and a natural for the boxes.

"Less Than Tomorrow" is a warm and tender ballad that Hamish (Scotch Gaelic for "James") presents in a manner that makes the listener feel very close to the artist. You feel that he's singing to you. "You Can Be In Love" is another penetrating love song that is delivered with inspiration. The Jack Halloran Chorus and Lew Douglas' orchestra do a grade "A" job of enhancing the beauty of the side with a plush soft setting.

LITTLE SYLVIA

- B** "THE RING" (2:50) [Wemar Music] The soft hazyness of Little Sylvia's voice comes off in good form as the thrush does a sparkling job on a folk flavored ballad. The job is enhanced by an organ and guitar backdrop.
- C** "BLUE HEAVEN" (2:44) [Benell Music] The young thrush has a tear in her voice as she hands up a sentimental item in her caressing manner. This talented performer has a brilliant future that could begin with the top half.

- B** "SAY 'SI SI'" (2:50) [E. B. Marks] A novel standard is belted out in top flight form by the exciting voice of Eugenie Baird with a sensational un-named orchestral assist. The amazing rhythm is full of life and really makes you jump.
- C+** "HOOTIN' HOLLER" (2:12) [Vinrob Music] The thrush does another pleasing job on a novel hand-clapping and hootin novelty. It's a real peppy piece.



- B** "INFATUATION" (3:06) [Gornston Music] A soft guitar handled by Bill Suyker is a perfect setting for a most warm and inviting vocal by Danny Stabile. His expression and smoothness are tops.
- C** "I HAD TOO MUCH TO DREAM LAST NIGHT" (2:50) [Gate Music] Laura Leslie does a misty solo job on a ballad that's on the mood style. Rhythm backing is fitting.

- B+** "OHIO" (3:10) [Chappell & Co.] Bing Crosby does a top flight job on a lovely tune from "Wonderful Town." The lilting melody is inviting and gets the relaxed Crosby treatment. Jud Conlon's Rhythmaires and the John Scott Trotter ork ably assist.
- B** "A QUIET GIRL" (3:10) [Chappell & Co.] The established groaner does another super tender job from the same musical. Soft lush music backs him as he feelingly presents a tune warm enough to be called a lullaby. A fine coupling.

- B** "THEY DIDN'T BELIEVE ME" (3:17) [T. B. Harms Co.] From his latest album "Campus Rumpus" comes this lovely instrumental in the smooth Ray Anthony fashion. The soft version is perfect for dancing and features some sweet trumpeting.
- B** "TRUE BLUE LOU" (2:56) [Famous Music] Ray and his men handle another tune from the album in a solid jump manner that the jitterbugs will go for in a big way. It's some fine team work and Ray's solo is tops.

Hal Cook Named National Sales Manager of Capitol



HAL COOK

NEW YORK — Hal Cook has been named national sales manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corp. effective April 1, 1953, it was announced this week by William Fowler.

Fowler said that this was a major move by the diskery to strengthen its industry position. He said also that

during the past year (1952) Cook had been largely responsible, in his position as New York district manager and national promotion manager, for an increase of over 25% in the district sales volume which substantially exceeds the overall national gain of 10%.

In his five years with the Capitol organization, Cook has had wide experience starting as field sales representative in the mid-west. His later positions included branch manager at St. Louis, district promotion manager at Chicago and a two-year stretch as popular promotion manager in Hollywood — all prior to his transfer to New York in 1951.

In his new position, Cook will be directly responsible for all of Capitol's domestic sales and field promotion in the United States, Hawaii and Alaska, and will direct all pop, kiddie, classical and Cetra-Soria promotional activities handled out of the New York headquarters.

Al Levine, present New York branch manager, is being upped to district sales manager filling the vacancy left by Cook's promotion, while Anthony Rubino takes over as branch manager in New York.

Court Rules Widow Is Entitled To Copyright

NEW YORK — A complete victory was won by the Edward B. Marks Music Corporation last week in its lawsuit for infringement of the song, "In the Baggage Coach Ahead," by Gussie L. Davis. The action was brought in the New Jersey District Court against Borst Music Publishing Co., Inc., Arthur Borst and Cyrus Borst, who had published a song called "Baggage Coach Ahead" in 1947. Samuel Hollander of Newark and Arthur E. Carmaize of New York City represented Marks.

Among a number of other novel points, the court held for the first time in a copyright case, that a widow of the author, even though she re-marries, is nevertheless still the widow of the deceased and is entitled to renew the copyright. The defense had contended that the writer's brother, who had applied for a renewal, was the person entitled to it but Judge Modarelli emphasized the fact that the widow came first, even though she had re-married.

Marks first became aware of the infringement through a record made in Newark in 1949 by Coleman Records, Inc. Herbert Marks summoned the infringing writer, Arthur Borst and his father, Cyrus Borst, to his office in an attempt to straighten out the matter amicably. When the younger Borst, however, a man well under thirty at the time, stubbornly insisted that he had written the lyrics of the infringing song himself, under the title "Baggage Coach Ahead," Marks decided to take action. The facts are that the original success was created some 30 years before he was born.

In his opinion, Judge Modarelli described plagiarism as "naughtiest of literary vices, which has had a long and dishonorable career." It was held that, not only were the lyrics practically identical, but that Arthur Borst must have had access to these lyrics. The decision was, in every way, one which supported all of the Marks attorney's contentions.

Rackmil Named To Full Term As RIAA Prexy

NEW YORK — At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Record Industry Association of America, Inc., held Tuesday, March 10, the following officers were elected for the year 1953: Milton R. Rackmil, President; Lawrence K. Green, Vice-President; Harry C. Kruse, Vice-President; Frank B. Walker, Treasurer. All officers were unanimously elected to serve for a one-year period. John W. Griffin will continue to serve as Executive Secretary and Ernest S. Meyers as Counsel.

In accordance with the constitution and by-laws of the Association, officers are elected by the Board of Directors. The Board was elected by the members at a general membership meeting held on February 11, 1953.

While it is the policy of the Board of Directors to rotate the Presidency among the members of the Board as elected each year, consideration was given to the fact that activities of the Association did not get under way until late spring of 1952. Therefore, none of the officers had the opportunity to serve for a full year, and the Board prevailed upon Mr. Rackmil to accept the Presidency for the full term of 1953.

American Named Selling Agent For Slim Willet Songs

NEW YORK — Slim Willet, writer of "Don't Let The Stars Get In Your Eyes" and "Let Me Know," this week announced the selection of American Music, Inc. as sole selling agent for his new pubbery, "Slim Willet Songs."

Deal is for five years and gives American, in addition to sheet music selling rights, the sole right to handle foreign licensing, etc.

In addition to the Slim Willet tie-up, American Music is sole selling agent for Montclare Music Corporation, which has ridden high the past year with such songs as "Rock Of Gibraltar," "Mr. Tap Toe" and now, the new Jimmy Boyd-Frankie Laine hit, "Tell Me A Story."



René, formerly in charge of RCA Victor's west coast recording activities, is presently assistant A and R manager to Kapp.

Born in the United States, René, at an early age, was taken to Berlin by his parents, where he studied piano and composition. When he later returned to America, he organized his first orchestra, then took it abroad and toured western European and Scandanavian countries. At a later date, he became staff music arranger for both Tobis and UFA films in Germany.

René joined RCA Victor in 1939 as musical director of the company's International Division. During the last war, he served in the music division of Special Services, and in 1945 joined RCA Victor's Popular Artists and Repertoire Department as musical director.

NEW YORK—Danny Sutton headlines at the Town Casino in Buffalo beginning Monday, March 16, for a week.

Danny, one of show business' up and coming talents, hails from the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn and had his first professional singing engagement in New York State's Catskill Mountains resort area, the traditional starting place of entertainers. He did so well that he was signed by a theatrical agency to do a tour of nightclubs across the country. A year later, Guy Lombardo heard him sing and shortly thereafter, Danny became the featured vocalist with Lombardo's orchestra.

BMI To Exploit Canadian Tunes

MONTREAL, CAN.—Music created in Canada by Canadian songwriters and composers will be exploited and promoted throughout the United States and other countries under a campaign being planned by BMI Canada, Limited, according to music organization's General Manager, Robert J. Burton, in his report last week to the Canadian Association of Broadcasters in Montreal.

Burton, who is also vice president of Broadcast Music, Inc., counterpart of BMI Canada in the U. S., announced the setting up of a staff of music men which will devote full time to the promotion of Canadian songs here.

The report by Burton included figures showing the results of last year's activities of BMI Canada in the publication and performance of Canadian composed music. With 120 affiliated composers and 27 music publishers furnishing the source of music by Canadians, the BMI Canada repertoire now contains more than 5,000 compositions of all types, said Burton. More than 3,000 numbers are in the popular category, another 2,000 are of the classical or standard type, while a third of the total is in the French language.

Reviewing the past year's accomplishments of BMI Canada, Burton told delegates to the CAB Conference that BMI-licensed songs earned an overall 81.2% in the year-end popularity survey conducted by the British United Press. BMI songs headed the weekly surveys of BUP in the No. 1 position for 39 out of the 48 weeks.

New Tony Bennet Disk Picked

CLEVELAND, O.—At the Cleveland Hit Parade party last week, Bill Randle played the new releases of every major record company for his teen age audience and they chose Tony Bennett's recording of "No One Will Ever Know" as the one with the best hit possibilities. As a result the tune will be featured on juke boxes throughout Ohio starting April 1. Acuff-Rose is the publisher of the song.

Another Sports Disk For Corelli

NEW YORK—Alan Corelli, who recently promoted the "Let's Go Bowling" disk on the Maestro label, has made another tie-up in the sports field, cutting a baseball tune "Who's Gonna Win The Pennant This Year?"

The Four Toppers will cut the record for Decatur and arrangements have been made with the leading ball parks for play over their loud speakers.

The tune is in Chick Kardale Music.

The HALE You Say

—by natt hale—

Not too many eons ago, we once observed one of the major recording artists of the era undergoing a character analysis by an interviewer for one of the leading fan mags, describing his thoughts on: 1) the popular songs of that period, 2) his favorite vocalists, 3) his preference for working either nightclubs or theaters, 4) his fans, 5) women, 6) further aspirations, and 7) how he happened to get into the music and show business. Now, bear in mind that this gent was one of these sincere people who believed that all interviews should definitely reflect his genuine personality. To the last question, therefore, he candidly intimated that he got into the biz because: 1) he like to sing, 2) he could sleep late every morning and 3) it was a "quick and easy buck."

This week's sermon will be devoted to dispelling any and all illusions to all three of these reasons, as attested to by this very same artist—no longer a top-flight performer, but still a name to be reckoned with. That is, if you want to reckon with names.

First of all, let's take his first point: He liked to sing.

There are, at present, 150 million Americans, according to the census of 1950. Of these, only about 100% actually like to sing. So, despite the fact that only a chosen few can gain the smile from Lady Luck which propels them to fame and fortune, it isn't too important that one *likes* to sing. It's more important to have an aunt who's married to the A. & R. Director of a record company. Likes to sing, INDEED!

The other two points require a much more careful analysis, and have a much greater bearing on the case as it exists today.

The second reason, if you recall (if you don't recall, glance up to the end of the very first paragraph—Do we have to tell you *everything*?) was the fact that our hero could sleep late every morning.

With astoundingly few exceptions, make the rounds amongst today's top recording folk, and ask them to describe their average working day. Considering that you are extending your survey among real, intelligent, perspicacious (oh, for-Heavensake, is he going to start with that slop again?) artists, you will probably be amazed to learn that they *don't* sleep late every morning, and, in truth their life is not a bed of roses. The average recording poisonality is committed to cementing his or her public relations to a point almost approaching filial devotion. Therefore, his personal activities center about a routine which could easily result in a condition almost approaching paranoia. The constant rounds and devotion to "duty" include their frequent visitations to disc jockeys, radio interviews, television interviews, fan mag interviews, fulfillment of correspondential obligations (writing letters, you know),

continual contact with fan clubs, music lessons (We're not *too* sure about this!), and—*this* we *are* sure about—always in condition for preparation of the little ordinary things that go to make up their career. This takes in the study of new numbers for recording purposes, the preparation of personal appearances, traveling, etc. . . . But the other facets of the business go on and on and on. It's a hectic pace. And, once it stops, it's only because the performer's time has run out professionally. Then,—and only then—is he or she in a position to sleep late in the morning.

On to Reason No. 3—the "quick and easy buck. . ." This one is simple. . .

Regardless of one's individual pursuit, it now seems to be apparent that there is no such thing as a "quick and easy buck" or a "fast buck" or a "short cut to the green." As evidenced by the multitudinous details advanced in the paragraph preceding, one could hardly describe the life of an artist as "quick and easy." Moreover, there are a few other things to consider.

Like this:

Like the personal manager, who comes in for a fair share of the artist's quick and easys, from something like 10% of the net to something like 50% of the gross.

Like the booking agency, which also comes in for graduating scales, sometimes up to 15 and 20 percent. Unfair? Well, we've heard the remark from a personal manager, holding a 15% contract with an artist, who begrudged the fact that the singer was taking 85% of *his*—the manager's—income.

Like the wardrobe, definitely an integral part of any professional career. In the case of the young males, this isn't too haphazard an undertaking, since silk mohair dress suits can be purchased at the bargain price of around \$175 per copy these days. And the average male performer can struggle along with three or four varied outfits. But the gals are up against a knottier problem. Their gowns must be distinctive, flattering and the envy of every other female in the audience. Therefore, gowns run from \$350 all the way up to \$1500 per item, each. And the average gal's wardrobe consists of some eight or ten draperies.

Naturally, we could roll on and on and on. But time and space don't permit.

Wonder what plumber's apprentices are making these days.

Ah, well—

Prestige Signs Elly Williams

NEW YORK—Eddie Heller, president of Prestige Records, has announced the signing of Elly Williams to a term contract.

The singer, who hails from Boston, formerly worked at the Saxony in that city and is currently appearing at Lilliana's on Fifth Avenue in New York.

Her first record is expected to be released shortly.

Peggy Mann To Coral

NEW YORK—Coral Records has signed Peggy Mann to a term contract. Deal was a result of the noise made on the west coast by the thrush on a Cavalier disk titled "So Do I."

Coral has bought that master but is not issuing it and instead has re-recorded the tune with the singer.

Peggy formerly sang with Jerry Wald's orchestra.

Disks For Education Now Used Extensively

NEW YORK—The increasing importance of the phonograph record as an aid in the teaching of music appreciation and other classroom subjects is indicated by the publication of a comprehensive educational record catalog just announced by the Educational Services Division of RCA Victor.

Designed to help teachers achieve more effective use of disks as classroom aids, the new catalog represents the most complete compilation of available educational records ever prepared by the company in its more than 40 years in this specialized field.

The recording and listing of special disks for use as teaching aids was pioneered by the Victor Talking Machine Company, forerunner of the RCA Victor Division of the Radio Corporation of America. In 1911, the company retained Dr. Frances Elliott Clark, a Midwest school teacher, to develop and direct an educational department. It was the purpose of this department to promote music education in the schools through the use of phonographs and records as teaching aids. Now in her nineties, Dr. Clark is director emeritus of RCA Victor's Educational Services Division—a post assigned upon her retirement in 1947.

The new catalog lists records selected for use in two major phases of music education. One section presents recordings designed to stimulate basic aptitudes and physical responses; to create awareness of pitch and tone, phrasing, and the broader aspects of form; and to provide material for the study of musical skills and techniques. Another section is devoted to recorded material which can provide esthetic musical experience for the student and aid in the development of imagination, concentration, discrimination, and judgment.

Gene Janklow Dies

CHICAGO—Gene Janklow, General Salesmanager of the Columbia Record division of The Sampson Company, this city, distributors for Columbia Records, passed away from a heart attack (Wednesday evening, March 11, 1953).

Janklow was only 38 years old. He was one of the best liked men here from the juke box operators' standpoint.

He had always made it his business to work very closely with the juke box operators and had always helped them in every possible fashion.

In fact, just a week prior to his demise, Janklow held a meeting with top juke box operators here, to arrange for better and speedier service to the industry.

His passing is sadly mourned by all the juke box men thruout the entire Chicagoland area.



The lower lid is a moderate tempo item, performed by the Four Blazes in smooth and feelingful manner. Very pleasant listening. Ops, get with the top deck.

● B. B. King comes up with another "hot" item. Titled, "Woke Up This Morning," the upper lid is a slow low down blues with lament lyrics, and King polishes off the sad words with great feeling and emotion. His know-how added to potent material makes this a powerful etching and this means spins and spins. The lower lid is a rhythmic Latin beat that comes out an exciting and lively side. King belts this ditty against a driving ork background. In spots, ork is a little too loud and fights the singer, but on the whole, etching is good.

● That man at the keyboard, Lloyd Glenn, with the aid of his orchestra, dishes up an exciting rhythmic middle beat, "It Moves Me," in a manner calculated to bring solid coin action. Glenn's keyboard technique, plus the stimulating solo rides of the key sidemen, gives this disk the class that makes "hits." Look for lots of action on this one. The under portion is a rhythmic slowbeat, titled, "Night Time," that gets the same instrumental treatment accorded the upper deck. Glenn again displays his talents to great advantage. Also standout, is a relaxing sax ride and interesting guitar. We see a slight advantage in favor of the upper lid.

JIMMY FORREST

● "MRS. JONES' DAUGHTER" (2:50) The natural follow-up to the hit "Hey Mrs. Jones" is this Latin tempo ditty. Forrest tells of the merits of Mrs. Jones' daughter in humorous fashion. Orking and the Jimmy Forrest tenor sax help make this a solid disk.

● "HE'S THE BEST IN THE BUSINESS" (2:40) [Marvin Music] Terry Timmons can sing and sell a tune. Her chanting of the moderate tempo bounce is assisted by some top deck orking by the Howard Biggs ork.

● "EVIL EYED WOMAN" (2:35) [Raleigh Music] The under portion is a slow blues emotionally sung by Miss Timmons. A pleasure to listen to her read lyrics.



NEW YORK—Francia Luban, for many years head of the Latin-American music department of the Edward B. Marks Music Corporation, has just returned to that concern in the same capacity.

Miss Luban started her music business career in the 30's, with Marks, remaining until matrimony and motherhood made it impossible. Now her son is in kindergarten and she returns to renew old friendships and business contacts.

Miss Luban has also written English and Spanish lyrics, being best known as co-writer with Al Stillman of the words of Lecuona's "Say Si Si." Marks has chosen this tune for its next big drive, basing this activity on forthcoming records by the Mills Brothers, Eugenie Baird and several others.

It is Miss Luban's feeling that the mambo craze is on the wane and that this decline will be an excellent thing for Latin-American music. She will concentrate on both old and new songs from Cuba, Mexico, Brazil and other Latin-American countries. Among some of these are top songs by Lecuona, Simons, Cugat, Grenet, Roig, Grever, Lara, Menendez, Gardel and many others. Chief of the new Latin American hits is "Piel Canela" by Bobby Capo, which Herbert Marks, head of the firm, acquired on his recent trip to Havana.

One of the most important assets Miss Luban brings to her work is her unmatched ability to teach American singers the correct way to pronounce Spanish lyrics. Many of the biggest name artists have received valuable coaching from her in this respect.

● Marty Robbins, who is no newcomer to the best seller lists, chips in with two of his own tunes in a bid for a "hit." Currently, Robbins is high with "I'll Go On Alone," and his latest release gives him a solid two contenders. The top lid, "After You Leave," is a moderate-quick tempo bounce with romantic lyrics that Robbins chants softly, smoothly, and sentimentally. The under portion, "I Couldn't Keep From Crying," is a rhythmic middle beat, expertly and warmly vocaled by the western artist. His easy treatment and emotional delivery helps put the tune in the upper category. Light string backing sets the proper mood on both decks. In our opinion the "Crying" deck will break first.



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



Bill Fitzgerald Writes About "Kerry Drake" Cartoon Strip

Letter Reveals Need For "Public Relations Bureau" THE CASH BOX Has Been Urging On Industry For Over 10 Years

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH. — William E. (Bill) Fitzgerald, advertising and sales promotion manager of AMI, Inc., this city, greatly disturbed over the "Kerry Drake" comic strip appearing syndicated in many newspapers thruout the country, which depicts one of the characters as a hoodlum operating juke boxes, sends along the following letter:

"The morning mail brought copies of the Kerry Drake comic strip, cartooned by Alfred Andriola and syndicated in a number of newspapers throughout the country. They feature a hoodlum by the name of 'Big Frank Fargo', who is known as 'the boss of the east side juke box racket'.

"All of us will be happy, I'm sure, when they put Big Frank behind bars. There is no room for crooks, real or fictional, in the juke box business.

"It is unfortunate, however, that the general public, without knowledge of the facts, often infers that there is some basis behind these fictional episodes.

"One wishes that Mr. Andriola had known something of our business before he selected the juke box as the *modus operandi* of this criminal character, Big Frank. The artist would have learned that operators do not force juke boxes on locations. He would have known that the business is such that there must be wholehearted and willing cooperation on the part of both location and operator if the enterprise is to be successful. Just a little information could quickly have shown Mr. Andriola that ours is hardly the kind of business that attracts the racketeer. It requires too much specialized knowledge and too much hard work for the modest return per dollar invested to appeal to the criminal element.

"There is little question but that such strips and stories reflect disfavor upon our business. The injustice done us hurts and rankles. Yet, we must be realistic and recognize that the harm is already done. In my opinion, it is futile to quarrel with the newspapers. Instead, we need positive, constructive action to inform the papers in general, and the public in particular, about our industry so that there can be no misunderstanding as to the integrity and honorable conduct of those whose career it is to serve the public's need for music. People who do not know, should be shown that the juke box is not indigenous to the low

diver, and it flourishes best in restaurants, canteens, social clubs, military installations, taverns, ice cream parlors, etc., where it brings inexpensive, wholesome entertainment and recreation to millions.

"Many people — too many, in fact — are unaware of the hundreds of schools, churches and other institutions which employ the juke box to provide supervised entertainment in the battle against juvenile delinquency. There's an inspiring story in the public welfare activities of operators in the generous manner in which they have turned over receipts to the 'March of Dimes', the 'Heart' and 'Cancer' Funds and others.

"Actually, there's so much that is noble and fine in the willing acceptance of civic responsibilities on the part of operators, that they need never fear injury from carping critics and self-seeking interests — if only they will tell their story. You have done much in the pages of 'The Cash Box' to make the juke box operator better understood for what he is: a rare combination of music critic, accountant, mechanic and salesman who works long, hard hours to bring the joy of music to people everywhere in all walks of life. The problem, as I see it, is to echo your voice far beyond the range of the trade itself.

"AMI spares no effort to familiarize the public with the fact that the operation and manufacture of the juke box is a sound American enterprise. The operator himself, working alone or in cooperation with an association can most effectively tell that story in his own community."

Chi Coin Intros New Double Score Tenth Frame Bowler

CHICAGO — Ed Levin, general sales manager of Chicago Coin Machine Company, this city, reported this past week that the firm was shipping samples of its newest bowler, "Tenth Frame Double Score Bowler" to all its distributors.

But should he first get a strike on the two extra plays after the 10th frame and then get a spare, he gets 30 for the strike, 20 for the spare, which is then double for a grand total of 100 extra points.

Tests on this new "10th Frame Double Score Bowler" have shown absolutely phenomenal returns, according to Ed Levin.

He claims that the game won acclaim on every test location.

Levin believes, "Once the operators have a chance to test our new '10th Frame Double Score Bowler' they are, like the players in test locations, also going to acclaim this new bowling game as one of the greatest they have yet played."

Kiddie Ride Mfrs At Toy Show



AMI 1952 Sales Greatest In Firm's History

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH. — Sales in 1952 of AMI, Inc., were the highest in the company's history, but income and excess profits taxes cut net income to \$1.54 a share from \$2.09 in the preceding year, John W. Haddock, president, reported.

Earnings before income taxes in 1952 totaled \$1,060,081, compared with \$686,344 in 1951. Provision for federal taxes was \$720,000 against \$225,000 in the preceding year. Net after taxes amounted to \$340,081, compared with \$461,344.

Sales last year would have been greater had production not been limited by government control on use of critical materials, principally copper, aluminum and steel, Haddock declared. "A higher volume of production was accomplished in 1952 despite allocations because of design and engineering changes in the product in the interest of widest possible employment of materials available to us," he explained.

"Demand for our products continued strong throughout the year — fourth quarter operations being at the highest level ever attained," Haddock said. "Production in the first quarter of 1953 has been maintained at the same high level."

Barring unforeseen adversity, it presently appears that both sales and profits before taxes should be greater for 1953, Haddock declared. "It is questionable whether there will be any easing of the tax burden on corporations for the year 1953," he said, but noted that with the elimination of the allocations system scheduled for June 30, "our volume of business no longer will be limited by the availability of materials."

A.A.M.O. To Hold Annual Membership Dinner

NEW YORK—George Ponser, business manager for Associated Amusement Machine Operators of New York, Inc., this city, announced this week that the association is holding its annual membership dinner Wednesday, March 18, at the Henry Hudson Hotel.





Wurlitzer Appoints Crosby Southwest Rep



The Woman's Viewpoint of the Coin Machine Industry

DALLAS, TEX.—“There is no doubt in my mind whatsoever that any woman with executive ability, a fair share of good personality, a flair for friendliness, and who is willing to work hard, will succeed in the coin machines business.” So spoke Mrs. Audrey Reynolds Hunter, of this city who has been actively engaged in the coin machines industry for 22 years.

Mrs. Hunter has been engaged in operating, jobbing and distributing coin operated equipment of all kinds. She has seen many people and many products come and go in the industry ever since 1931.

“But,” she says, “every woman who has entered into this business and has really wanted to make her way in it has successfully done so.

“Some,” she reminds, “have retired to domestic life, but even then,” she says, “they still continue to discuss the business with their husbands.”

with these first ten machines by placing ten more in Houston, Texas. And that very same year they sold these machines as a profitable route.

They then returned to Dallas late in 1931 and set up a distribution office, operating at the same time, and created many of the operators still to be found throughout the state.

In 1936, she reports, they were appointed distributors for The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company and set up headquarters in the Jefferson Hotel in Dallas.

They continued as distributors, as well as jobbers, and worked shoulder to shoulder until 1946, when Earl E. Reynolds passed away.

Mrs. Reynolds continued on ahead by herself. She joined forces with Robert W. Hunter. And in 1948 she married Bob Hunter.

Today, because of her great knowledge of the industry, in Texas especially, and also because of her knowledge of all types of equipment, she is working with State Music Distributors in Dallas, distributors for AMI phonographs and accessories.

Even though Mrs. Hunter recalls many of the ups and downs of the olden days of the industry, she states that:

“Everyone who has been engaged in this thrilling and fascinating industry has always been able to enjoy this business.”

She says, “The people in the business make this one field where it is enjoyable for a woman to work and stay on to make this her life work as well as her business career.”

Mrs. Hunter also says, “There are many, many women who are active in the business of this industry but who do not come to the forefront.

“These are the wives of many of operators,” she explains, “who actually help their husbands to enjoy a better business but who are not directly engaged in the business. They do not come down to the office or run around the routes.

“They will,” she says, “cover locations and meet the man and his wife who own the location.

“The woman will,” she claims, “in almost every instance, build up a closer and better understanding so that, in the long run, her husband has a better customer and a more profitable location.”

Mrs. Hunter also says, “In the past ten years or so more and more woman have become active in the industry, especially in the coin operated music field.

“This seems to be due to the fact that women seem to have a better understanding of what people like in music.

“They are also able to bring about a more friendly relationship between all factors with whom they have to deal.

“They help the location owners. They help the community. They know what the youthful enthusiasts of juke box music like and they instinctively

seem to know what the general public likes in music of all kinds.”

Mrs. Hunter claims she would never want to be in any other business. She feels that any woman who enters into this field will feel the same way with-

in a short period of time.

In conclusion, Mrs. Hunter says, “I can sum up my career of 22 years in this industry by saying, I consider all my customers in this business my personal friends.”





"The Confidential Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Confidential Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. 
