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THE CASH BOX covers the entire music industry, ranging from retail record and music stores to disk jockeys, music publishers, recording artists, record manufacturers, music composers and arrangers, radio and TV stations, and all others allied to the music industry throughout the world.

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ISN'T IT WONDERFUL!

(Part II)

Last week we discussed some of the changes in the social structure of our society which have contributed and which certainly will contribute even more in the future to the expansion of the music and record businesses.

This week we would like to detail the changes in the entertainment world which are likely to aid our business.

The physical development of the record itself has been one of the most substantial factors in its tremendous growth in popularity. In the last several years, records have taken on a quality which brings true sound, true reproduction right into the home. Recording processes have improved spectacularly. The use of tape has made possible the most nearly perfect record imaginable.

In addition, the development of 33 1/3 and 45 rpm has made it possible to purchase hours and hours of the best entertainment for a nominal price. Whereas formerly shows, symphonies and other such works would require numerous records in a set, now, for the most part they can be put on one disk at a reasonable price. And the danger of breaking one record in a set and thus ruining it no longer exists.

One of the greatest factors in the rapid increase in popularity of records has been the improvement in the machines on which they are played. Juke boxes and phonographs have undergone wide changes in the last two decades. Juke boxes have been improved to the point where they offer up to 120 selections. Their sound systems and mechanisms are of the highest development to date and they reproduce music for public areas in a way which satisfies even the most fastidious sound connoisseur. Home phonographs have taken on a completely new dimension with the development of hi-fi, which has almost become a national hobby.

The eagerness which individuals have demonstrated to build their own hi-fi sets has not only been a healthy development as

far as phonograph equipment is concerned, but it has focused new attention on records themselves and has given the buying of records a much greater importance than it has ever had before.

Lastly, the development of TV and the changing place of radio in our lives has contributed substantially to the development of the record business. Because of economic factors, the disk jockey has become THE important person in radio. He can provide a program which attracts a large audience at a minimum cost. And his one aid is records. Disk jockeys, who used to be limited to single stations, are now going network spreading the gospel of the record far and wide. Top programming time, which used to be devoted to the highest priced entertainers, is now devoted to disk jockey programs. And there is no locality limitation as far as they are concerned. A disk jockey can broadcast in Boston one day and New York the next, in Cleveland on Friday, in New York on Saturday.

As far as TV is concerned, it has already demonstrated its importance to the music business. It has broken several songs and records simply by showcasing them properly. And it has brought new importance to the entertainer who now can be seen as well as be heard and thus has the opportunity to portray other talents which he or she may have.

In the last two weeks, we have shown how the social and entertainment changes in our nation have contributed to the development of the music and record fields. The picture is a bright one. And the future is particularly shining.

Let's all keep our eye on the positive achievements which we can encourage and speed up for the coming years and our business will fulfill in even greater measure than we expect the wonderful promise which it holds forth for us.

B "SHAKE THE HAND OF A STRANGER" (2:40) [Hamblen BMI—Hamblen] Another thrilling Hamblen tune with that delightful country flavor, is smoothly treated by the Choir with a dixieland backdrop assisting.

B "SMACK DAB IN THE MIDDLE" (2:47) [Roosevelt BMI—Calhoun] The boys get into the swing of the rock 'n roll trend and drive across a solid, driving deck. Commercial ditty with big possibilities.



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**Mercury Records Corp. to
Introduce New Label**

**Subsidiary to Issue Disks in All
Categories**

CHICAGO—Mercury records will introduce a subsidiary record label this summer. The new label, Wing Records, will be a wholly owned subsidiary of the Mercury Record Corporation and will issue disks in all categories of music—pop, classical, children's, rhythm and blues and country and western. First releases will be marketed on June 15th.

According to Irving B. Green, Mercury President, the Wing label will make its headquarters in Chicago with a second office in New York City just as Mercury itself is set up. The line will be handled by completely separate artists and repertoire, promotional and sales staffs and distribution will be thru a new set of independent wholesalers.

Executive sales, promotion and recording personnel have not yet been set by Mercury for the Wing label. Personnel announcements will be

made shortly as the Mercury contracts its top echelon staff for the Wing line.

The Wing line records, said Green, will be priced in line with current Mercury prices. There is no plan at present to introduce a low-priced packaged line on the Wing label.

Green said that the move was, to a great extent, dictated by the volume of material available for release on the Mercury line and which could not get sufficient exposure or attention unless handled via a separate company. The Wing label will engage in a heavy recording schedule in late May and early June. In addition a great deal of material available to Mercury thru its foreign affiliates will be issued on the Wing label.

Distributors will be selected and named as soon as the Wing label's new sales manager and field sales staff is announced.

Releases of "O Mio Babbino Caro" Must Be Cleared By The Puccini Estate

NEW YORK—A sudden interest in the aria "O Mio Babbino Caro" (O My Beloved Daddy) from the opera "Gianni Schicchi" by Giacomo Puccini has arisen in the popular music world.

The opera Gianni Schicchi is a copyright of G. Ricordi & Co. This firm is bound by its agreements with Puccini to forbid the use of any of this composer's music in any form or for any purpose which would alter or distort the dramatico-musical nature of the composition.

The Puccini Estate is the sole authority empowered to establish whether an arrangement, adaptation,

version or modification of any kind is in keeping with Puccini's wishes. "As part of a dramatico-musical work the aria "O Mio Babbino Caro" does not fall within the provisions of the Copyright Act establishing the compulsory mechanical license. G. Ricordi & Co. has, therefore, complete and exclusive control of all rights on said composition including the right to grant or refuse licenses for mechanical reproduction," said Dr. Columbo, managing director of G. Ricordi & Co.

At this time there are two records on "O Mio Babbino Caro", Tutti Camarata on Decca and Ralph Marterie on Mercury.

20 Year Precedent Broken

The town's deejays are kicking up quite a ruckus pro and con about rhythm and blues numbers. Hunter Hancock, KGFJ deejay, hit the nail on the head when he said, "It is my contention that most of the criticism being leveled against R & B is unwarranted. True, some Rhythm and blues records have objectionable lyrics but so do many of the top selling records in the popular and Western fields. Actually R & B is the music that to the average Negro is his pop music. Many of the words and phrases in rhythm and blues are innocent in their meaning but some non-Negroes misinterpret and misconstrue their meaning. Therefore it is entirely possible that some criticism is completely unjustified. I honestly believe that the tunes played on my programs and most other rhythm and blues shows are completely acceptable. I do regret that a very small minority of disc jockeys has given R & B records a bad name because of their bad taste and lack of common sense. It is deplorable that their actions have hurt a great many innocent people. Therefore again I say, the criticism should be directed against the individual and not against rhythm and blues as a whole." . . . Received a nice note from Chuck Higgins who has been touring the South. Chuck has been away for eight weeks and reports that he's having a very successful tour. He says that his new Dootone waxing of "Tonky Honk" b/w "Here I'm Is" has been kicking up a storm in all the towns where he and his band have played. Chuck will hit Kansas, Louisiana and Florida before heading West again. . . . Bobby Shad in town scheduling recording dates for Mercury and EmArcy. Dinah Washington was the first to be hustled into the recording studios. She has been a busy gal guest starring on radio and TV shows, recording and club dates. . . . The label billing stars Etta James with Richard Berry as Henry in "Hey, Henry!" Tune has catchy lyrics which could again make this a solid smash. . . . Wedding bells will ring for Jim Warren of Central Record Sales when he marries vivacious Heidi Christian, songstress and TV personality, on May 8. They met at a recording session several months ago and have been on a musical merry-go-round every since. . . . Congratulations. . . . Instrumentalist Lloyd Glenn has another potent seller in his latest Aladdin slicing of "Glenn's Glide." Tune is getting favorable reaction all over the country. . . . John Dolphin is like a little boy with a new toy whenever he talks about his latest releases on the Cash label. He is bubbling over with enthusiasm about Red Callender's LP waxing of "Pink Coat." He's also plenty exuberant over his three other single releases which include Jimmy Grissom's "I Had To Find Out For Myself" b/w "Listen, Pretty Baby"; Honey Lee's "Piney's Boogie" b/w "Angel Cake" and The Miracles' "You're An Angel" b/w "A Gal Named Jo." . . . Earl Bostic is chalking up another record smashing tour of the West. The "Earl" is always in great demand throughout West Coast nite spots. His progressive R & B beat is a sure winner for a full house nite after nite. . . . Chuck Hicks, sales rep. for Record Sales Co., returned from a trip through the San Diego—El Centro—Indio area and reports that the territory is becoming a key Southland record market. Sales figures show the strong trend toward LP package goods. . . . Larry Mead and Michael Gradney, Mambo Records execs, are breaking through locally with "Sindy" by The Squires. . . . Also showing signs that it may hit the charts is "I've Got A New Car" by "Big Boy" Groves on the Spark label.

JAZZ JOTS

Bethlehem Records newest artist, Joe Derise, opened the new Metronome Club on 52nd Street, New York. Joe is the intimate type jazz vocalist and accompanies himself on the piano with bass and drums filling out the instrumental support. Derise's warm, friendly, in-your-lap approach won his audience and his obvious nervousness only served to increase rather than detract from his appeal. Joe's act consisted, in the main, of the eight tunes which comprise his Bethlehem album, "Joe Derise Sings." . . . And that leads to a fast resume of a record company that has come a long way in eight short months—Bethlehem Records. The success of the company, after a shaky start, has been in the hands of Gus Wildi, president; Murray Singer, national sales manager; Creed Taylor, young a & r head. No detail is too small for the intense interest of the three as evidenced by the high quality of releases, album notes and album covers. The newborn jazz diskery hit with the first album released. It was a Chris Connor package titled "Chris Connor Sings Lullabys Of Birdland." They've since given their distribs a number of top quality albums, most of which have become strong sellers. With the current keen interest in jazz Bethlehem looks forward to a continued and speedy growth. . . . Another company that has made great progress over a period of the last three years is Pacific Jazz. Pacific was started during a period when jazz was at its lowest ebb. It is to the credit of Richard Bock, a young jazz enthusiast, that he discerned a stirring of interest and launched the company with a capital of \$500. Pacific Jazz developed such top jazz artists as Gerry Mulligan and Chet Baker in addition to a roster of great jazz talent, and it is reported that the company is today valued at more than one hundred times its original capital. . . . Prestige will inaugurate a series of 12" LPs on May 15 when they release Billy Taylor's "A Touch of Taylor." It is the plan of Prestige to adhere to a monthly release schedule, featuring such stars as Milt Jackson, The Modern Jazz Quartet and Miles Davis. Prestige will also reissue a 12" LP program of earlier recordings. Employing the newest techniques, audio engineer Rudy Van Gelder is reprocessing the original tapes to meet the capabilities of today's hi fi sets.



ⓑ "YOU MEAN EVERYTHING TO ME" (2:55) [Davis BMI—Greene, Davis] Greene sings a soft slow blues ballad with romantic lyrics with tender phrasings. Ok coupling well done.

THE SPENCE SISTERS
(Aladdin 3285)

ⓑ+ "WHY DID YOU LIE?" (2:20) The Spence Sisters come up with a good sound as they bounce engagingly through the lilting pretty. A rhythmic item that comes out a happy sounding wax. It's the type of tune the teen kids will like.

ⓑ+ "I HAVE A LITTLE GIRL" (2:35) [Arc BMI—Burnett] Howlin' Wolf is deeply in love with his 18-year-old sweetheart and shouts his blues with an excitement born of happiness. Good pairing.

B "I'M SO LONELY" (2:50) [Progressive BMI—Russell, Cornelius, Holeman] The Regals go sentimental on the flip for a complete change of pace. A slow rhythmic effort pretty, pleasant, but not unusual.

THE DREAMS

B+ "I'LL BE FAITHFUL" (2:41) [Robbins ASCAP—Wrubel, Washington] The Dreams dish up a strong etching that could command lots of attention. George Tindley is dramatically forceful as he sings an emotional lead. The group backs him beautifully and the result is a powerful entry. Listen carefully.

B+ "MY LITTLE HONEYBUN" (2:41) [Savoy BMI—Pressbery] The Dreams provide a switch in tempo and treatment as they give out with a unique reading of a rock and roll item. It's a chuckley side with the bass voiced lead giving it a gimmicked reading. Another strong side.

JAZZ

JOHNNY HODGES

(Norgran 137)

B "PERDIDO" Parts 1 and 2 [Tempo ASCAP—Tizol, Lengsfelder, Drake] Johnny Hodges and his orchestra dish up a two-part treatment of the much recorded Perdido. Hodges does an ok solo job as does Harold Baker on the trumpet. In fact, it is Baker's horn job that lends strength to the deck. One annoying feature is the way the tape is cut at the end of side one. It is cut right in the middle of a phrase. Good wax tho.

LULA REED

(King 4796)

B "CAUGHT ME WHEN MY LOVE WAS DOWN" (2:38) [Jay & Cee BMI—Henry Glover] Lula Reed sings a fast beat romantic cutie in which she receives a strong chorus and orchestral support. Lula's distinctive vocal handling of the infectious tune gives her a good chance with this one.

B "WITHOUT LOVE (AIN'T IT A SHAME)" (2:16) [Jay & Cee BMI—Henry Glover] Miss Reed goes sentimental on the flip as she sings a slow tempo blues with sorrowful lyrics. Ok mood wax.

JOHNNY FULLER

(Aladdin 3286)

B "MY HEART BEATS FOR YOU" (2:55) [Gallo-Otis-Gallo] Johnny Fuller, the lad who sang "Johnny Ace's Last Letter" and who sounded so much like him, continues in the same vein on this one. Material and treatment are both Johnny Ace. A slow blues ballad very pleasantly done. The kids might find him the one to fill the void caused by Ace's death.

B "CRUEL, CRUEL WORLD" (2:40) [Aladdin BMI—Fuller] Similar material, similar vocal treatment, similar comments. Very pretty tune.

DIZZY GILLESPIE SEXTET

(Norgran 135)

B+ "RAILS" (3:27) [JATAP BMI—Gillespie, Harding] The Dizzy Gillespie Sextet rides through a spritely modern tune with Gillespie providing a stimulating trumpet lead. Crisp ensemble work and Gillespie's horn make this a strong deck.

B "BLUE MOOD" (3:26) [JATAP BMI—Gillespie, Harding] A change of pace. Gillespie paints a "blue mood" effectively, tho at times his horn seems a little too forceful for the general feeling of the piece.

Lavern Baker Complaint Brings Congressional Action

WASHINGTON—As a result of protests from singer Lavern Baker that other performers had duplicated her hit record, "Tweedlee Dee," causing her to lose over \$15,000 in royalties, Congressman Charles Diggs, Jr., introduced a bill in Congress that is designed to prevent such actions in the future.

Miss Baker who sprang into the spotlight with her version of "Tweedlee," claimed that Georgia Gibbs and other singers had lifted her exact arrangement and odd rhythm beat. She said that hundreds of her fans had told her that they bought these reproductions, thinking it was hers.

After having the situation probed, Diggs drew up his House of Representatives Bill 5366 to create a Federal commission to study the copyright laws and to make recommendations for their revision. It was referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary for further study.

Officials at Atlantic records said that Lavern's "Tweedlee Dee" has passed the 500,000 sales mark. Mercury Records has announced the award of a gold record, designating sale of one million records, to Georgia Gibbs for her version of "Tweedlee Dee."

Miss Baker's newest release is "That's All I Need." Miss Gibbs' is another taken from the r & b field titled, "Dance With Me Henry."

New WOV Show to Air Harlem Juke Box Survey

NEW YORK—Fred Bastone, Barrister Productions, Inc., this city, announced this week its plans for a radio production, "The Harlem Hit Parade," to commence on April 30 on WOV. The show will be a weekly half hour to be heard on Saturdays from 8 to 8:30 P.M.

Each week the program will present the top five Harlem hits as tallied by actual survey of the area's jukeboxes. "This marks the first time," said Bastone, "that the Harlem tally has been used for programming purposes."

A regular feature will be a "silver disc" award for the list topping artist of the week, with the silver disc motif reappearing in miniature on membership cards of the "Silver Disc Club" being formed for the Harlem Hit Parade listeners.

Jack Walker, who conducts WOV's 12-3 A.M. "Life Begins At Midnight" stanza, Mondays thru Saturdays, has been appointed director and master of ceremonies. Robert Lopez and Jerry Fine of Barrister Productions are co-producers.

On Friday, April 28, Fred Bastone, Jack Walker and the Barrister Productions staff were hosts at a cocktail party at the Chateau Madrid at which The Harlem Hit Parade was previewed.

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



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Here and There

DETROIT, MICH.—The fact that General Motors, thru its president, Harlow H. Curtice, announced that net sales for this year's January-March quarter totaled an unprecedented \$3,101,000,000, which tops the previous record achieved during the second quarter of 1953, is interesting to us only because of the staggering figure. But what is of more importance to the trade is the statement that this period also saw a record in total employment and average weekly worker earnings. Total employment in GM plants in the United States and Canada reached 550,000, and weekly pay to wage earners averaged a record \$103.79 and their average work hours 44.2 per week. When the average worker is employed and earning fine wages, everyone in the nation benefits, including coin machine operators.

LONDON, ENGLAND—Every once in a while we like to point out how fortunate are operators in the good old U. S. A.—fortunate by comparison to coinmen in other countries. How would you like to be in a position where you had to pay the following prices for music machines—and happy to do so: Wurlitzer 1250—550 pounds (\$1540); Wurlitzer 1015—450 pounds (\$1260); AMI Model A—500 pounds (\$1400); Seeburg 147—450 pounds (\$1260); Seeburg Lo-Tone—390 pounds (\$1092); and a Wurlitzer 600K—250 pounds (\$700). That's what operators in England are paying.

ASCAP ON LETTER WRITING PROGRAM ASKING PASSAGE OF COPYRIGHT BILL

Nat'l Federation of Music Clubs, in Miami Meet, Resolve That Members Be Urged to Write Their Senators and Congressmen (Clubs Represent a Membership of Over 600,000). ASCAP Speakers Talk to Other Groups

NEW YORK—If members of the music machine industry want to know just what they're up against in dealing with ASCAP and the importance it lays on impressing the general public with the need for sending letters to Senators and Representatives in Congress, here's a report on some of their recent activities.

At a meeting of the National Federation of Music Clubs in Miami last week, Mrs. Ada Holding Miller, president, announced that the Federation passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, the National Federation of Music Clubs always has sought to encourage and support the creators of our American music; and

"Whereas, the National Federation of Music Clubs has taken a firm stand in support of just compensation to our American authors and composers for the public performance for profit of their copyrighted music, and

"Whereas, there is before the 84th Congress a bill, S.590, which would correct an existing inequity to America's composers in the present Copyright Law; therefore

"Resolved, that the National Federation of Music Clubs in convention assembled, April 1955, lend their support to S.590 in the interest of America's authors and composers; and

"Further Resolved, that each member be urged to write his own Senators and Representatives in Congress asking their favorable action on S.590, in fairness and justice to our creative artists."

(Ed Note: The Federation represents a membership of more than 600,000 thruout the country).

Two other ASCAP speakers appeared before audiences last week, both talking about the pending copyright legislation. Herman Finkelstein, general attorney for ASCAP, addressed the eighth annual Radio and Television Institute at Pennsylvania State University, Thursday, April 21; and Clarence C. Rubin, ASCAP's New York division manager, spoke on the subject of performing rights to the student body of Lafayette High School

in Brooklyn, Wednesday, April 20.

Mt. Clemens, Mich. Ops Hit With Stiff License Ordinance

Ask \$100 Master Fee From Music and Games Ops, Plus \$5 Per Location On Music and \$10 Per Location On Amusement Machines. Cig. Machine Ops To Be Taxed \$50 Master License Plus \$10 Per Location. Coinmen Appear In Opposition, But Bill Passes 5 to 2

MT. CLEMENS, MICH.—The City of Mt. Clemens passed an ordinance Monday, April 25, providing for licensing of all types of coin machines. The ordinance provides for payment of a master license of \$100 for a music operating firm, and \$5 per location;

\$100 master license for amusement machine operating firms, and \$10 per location; \$50 master license for cigarette vending firms, and \$10 per location and a sliding scale of rates for penny vendors, as well as a tax for postage stamp machines.

Speakers representing associations of coin machine operators voiced their opposition to the ordinance, but the Mt. Clemens City Commissioners voted five for adoption, and two against.

Ed Carlson, president of the United Music Operators of Michigan, spoke against the ordinance and what the industry calls exorbitant fees.

Roy Small, public relations counsel for U.M.O., speaking against passage, stated that the General Rule of Law in Michigan provides that licenses are for regulation, and not for profit, and that the proposed fees appear to be an attempt to stifle competition to the exclusion of new operators, and for the purpose of profit. He asked, "What do you wish to regulate?" He told the Commissioners that it was stated by Detroit Police Inspectors Krug and Maxon that they haven't had any complaints to investigate in the City of Detroit for more than a year. "The small profit in the music business" Small said, "does not permit for increases in cost without charging it back to the bar or restaurant. Therefore if you pass this ordinance you will penalize the very people you represent, the small businesses in your city that use coin machines because it will be necessary for the operators to give them less commission."

Other speakers who appealed for the defeat of the ordinance were C. J. Morgan, representative of United Vendors Association of Michigan, and Fred Brandstrater, representing the National Automatic Merchandising Association.

It is reported coinmen will ask for an injunction restraining the enforcement of the bill.

Interpretations By Federal Government On Shuffle Game License And Use Of Prizes Favorable—Only \$10 License Needed

CHICAGO—Because some amusement operators have again run into the problem in their areas as to whether they can, or cannot, operate shuffle games and, at the same time, offer prizes for play stimulation and still purchase the \$10 Federal License, instead of the \$250 Federal License, the following interpretations made by Federal Government officials of the U. S. Treasury Department may prove of value to these operators faced with this problem.

Gentlemen:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 16, 1952, wherein you request to be advised if the operators of a coin-operated shuffle bowling game are liable for the wagering taxes imposed by sections 3285 and 3290 of the Internal Revenue Code. You state that the games are placed in various locations on a percentage arrangement with the proprietors and are operated in the following manner:

"In running these games the location will award a numbered ticket to any participant who achieves a score above a certain amount, such as, 175. This ticket is considered a skill award because of the score. In the location there is placed a board or panel on which there are mounted various prizes, each bearing a number. If the number of the prize corresponds with the number on the ticket received by the player, the player is awarded the prize."

Section 3285 of the Internal Revenue Code imposes a tax of 10 percent, effective November 1, 1951, on all wagers placed in a lottery conducted for profit. Accordingly, all such wagers accepted on or after November 1, 1951, are subject to the 10 percent excise tax.

In addition to the above-mentioned excise tax, there is imposed by section 3290 of the Code, effective November 1, 1951, a special or occupational tax of \$50.00 per year on each person who is liable for the excise tax on wagering, and on each person who is engaged in receiving wagers for or on behalf of any person so liable.

Section 325.22(d) of Regulations 132, pertaining to the wagering tax, states that no tax shall be imposed with respect to any wager placed in a coin-operated device with respect to which an occupational tax is imposed by section 3267.

In view of the foregoing, since a coin-operated shuffle bowling game is considered to be a coin-operated amusement device, subject to the \$10.00 per year special tax imposed by section 3267 of the Code, no liability for the wagering taxes imposed by sections 3285 and 3290 of the Code would be incurred with respect thereto.

However, with respect to the tickets or chances which are awarded in connection with the successful operation of the machine, if such tickets or chances are used in any other manner except that described, that is, sold outright to individuals, such operation would be considered to be the operation of a lottery conducted for profit and would be subject to the 10 percent excise tax and the \$50.00 per year occupational tax imposed by the above-mentioned sections of the Code.

Gentlemen:

Further reference is made to your letter of October 10, 1951, with which you enclosed an excerpt from Bureau letter, dated May 8, 1950, which contained a ruling under which you have been operating a number of amusement devices called "shuffle alleys". The device is classified in such excerpt as a coin-operated amusement device. The method by which these devices are operated has caused a variance in opinions among deputy collectors in your area, as to whether such machines are amusement or gaming devices, and whether the special tax liability of \$10.00 or \$150.00 per year, per machine, would be incurred with respect thereto. You request a ruling as to the proper classification of this type of machine, when operated in the manner set forth below, and also to be advised as to the tax liability which would be incurred in connection therewith.

You state that you own and operate shuffle alleys in taverns, restaurants and similar places of business, and that tax at the rate of \$10.00 per year, per machine has been paid with respect thereto. You also state that you operate these games in two ways. One method is to offer a free coupon to each customer who scores at least 150 points or more. Each ticket is numbered and should that number correspond with a numbered prize on a large premium display board, the customer holding such numbered ticket receives this prize free of charge. One of the more valuable prizes is reserved for the grand prize and is given to the player making the highest score in a designated period. This period is usually the length of time required to pass out all of the regular prizes. A second method of operation is to give each player a free coupon regardless of the score made. This coupon is used to award prizes in the same way as described above.

The device known as "shuffle alley", where the insertion of a coin activates the machine by releasing pucks or discs for playing in a manner similar to a "skee ball" machine where balls are released, is distinguishable from the conventional type of shuffle board which is not operated by means of the insertion of a coin, token or similar object, and is, accordingly, not taxable under the provisions of section 3267 of the Code. The successful operation of a shuffle alley is determined by the player's skill in pushing the discs or pucks over the playing surface (manual operation) and the insertion of the coin merely releases such discs or pucks for play. The device is thus distinguished from those machines, the successful operation of which is determined by the application of the element of chance, such as slot machines, dice games and pinball machines, where prizes are offered for certain designated scores.

Accordingly, the device "shuffle alley", regardless of whether or not prizes are offered for high scores, is considered by the Bureau to be a coin-operated amusement device within the meaning of section 3267 of the Code. The special tax of \$10.00 per year, per machine would be incurred by the person who maintains for use or permits the use of, on any place or premises occupied by him, such coin-operated amusement device.



Bill Alberg Dies

GLEN COVE, N. Y.—Bill Alberg, one of the pioneers of our modern coin machine business, died here Monday, April 25, at the age of 65.

Alberg, dynamic and aggressive, came into New York from Chicago in the early 30's. After operating on his own for a while, he joined with Charles Aronson in 1936 and formed Brooklyn Amusement Machine Company, with headquarters in Brooklyn. The firm, at one time or another, manufactured, distributed and operated all types of coin machines. In 1952, Albert and Aronson sold their operations to A & A Operating Corporation, and both retired from the business. Alberg had been living on his estate until his death.

Alberg was one of the original founders and members of the New York Music Operators Association, and was its first treasurer. He remained a member of the organization until his retirement.

The body rested at the Dodge Funeral Parlor, and he was buried from the St. Patrick's Cathedral, Glen Cove on Thursday, April 28.

He is survived by his wife, Ethel, and brother Frank.

The Association will hold its next meeting on June 11 and 12 at the Paddock Hotel in Beatrice. This is the regular annual meeting at which new officers will be elected for 1955.

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

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


"The Confidential Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Confidential Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Confidential Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Confidential Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.


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
