PHONY LISTS

Very often we are asked the question, "How come disk jockeys clear across the country use *The Cash Box* lists to program their shows in preference to other lists that may be available to them?"

Naturally it is hard not to boast a little when such a question comes up, but the truth is that *The Cash Box* lists are the most widely used of any by disk jockeys all over the country. And the reason is very simple: They are the most accurate.

We have found through long experience that up to about fifty we can get an absolutely authentic list, one which can be relied upon, one which you can program by, and one which does not have to have a warning printed underneath it cautioning you to question its authenticity.

Our lists do not go beyond the limit of logic. They do not attempt to go to 100, which one paper recently inaugurated, because we know—and anyone who has ever had any experience in the music business knows—that such a list is impossible to authenticate.

WE CHALLENGE ANY PUBLICATION TO EXPLAIN TO US OR THE REST OF THE MUSIC BUSINESS ON WHAT BASIS ONE SONG IS NUMBER 91 AND ANOTHER IS NUMBER 92.

We all know that in that strata any number is a sheer guess. And trying to pass it off as a list with any semblance of reality is an insult to the intelligence of all those who deal in this industry and a fraud upon the entire music business.

The Cash Box will never perpetrate such obvious deceptions upon its readership and upon the industry with which it is associated. We sincerely believe—more than that, know — that fifty is about the limit at which a list can be accurate. We will continue to give our readers this authentic service in the same way we have been doing for years.

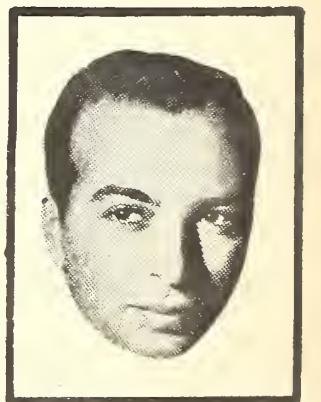

VICTOR'S DETROIT PROMOTION

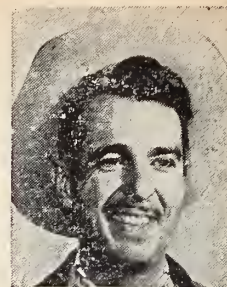

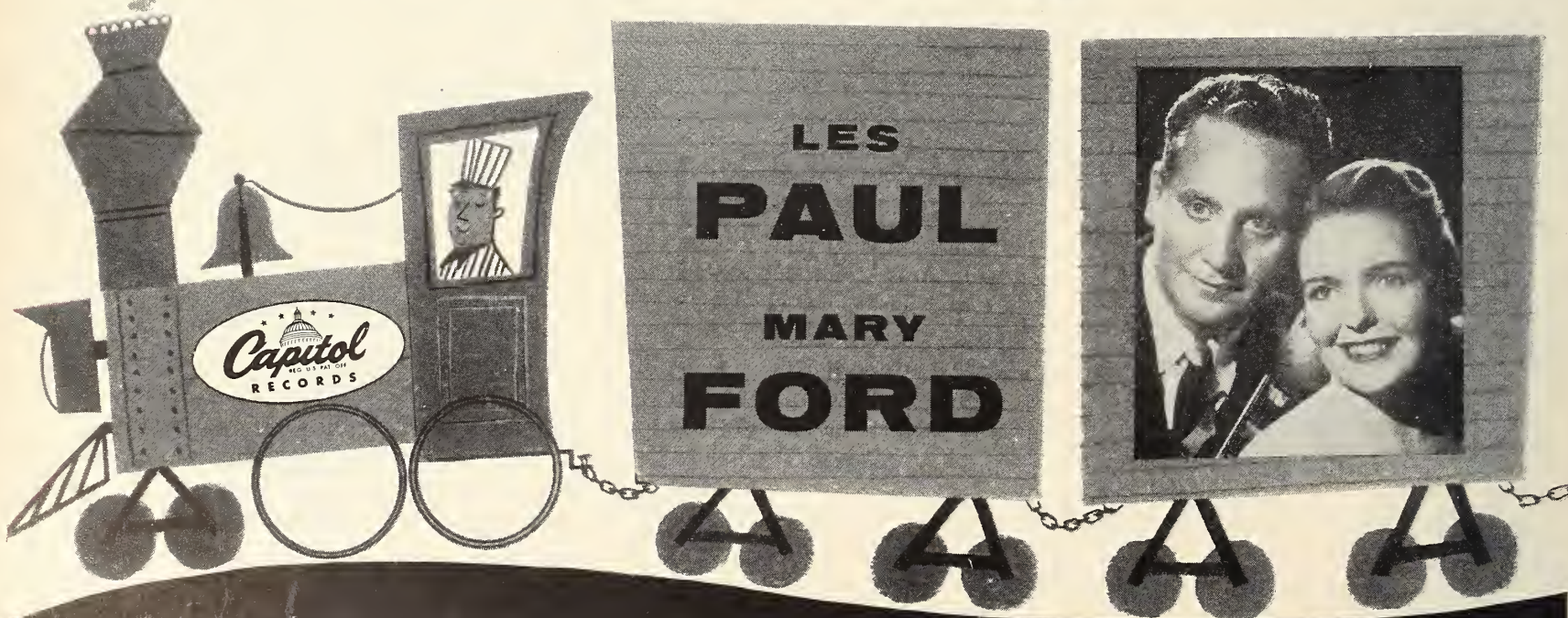

In addition to featuring the group in the film, Columbia will also use Bill Haley, himself, as an integral part of the story.

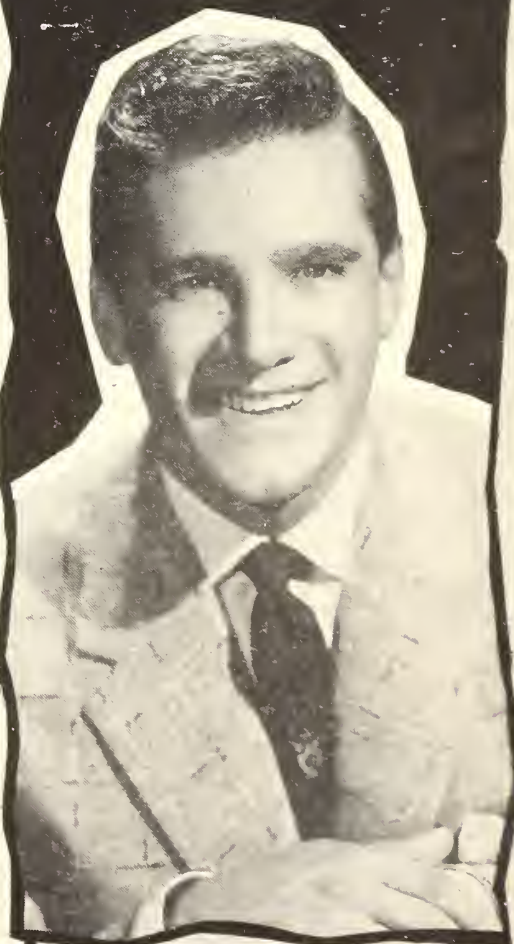

Unusual Promotion

NEW YORK—Paul Livert, who has a long and varied experience as professional musician, personal manager and now a & r at Dawn Records, probably never got the reception at any of his regular activities that was accorded his first attempt at promotion.

Livert's first two records for Seeco on the Dawn label were mailed to jockeys all over the country with a return card enclosed. The card asked for comments, which is a pretty usual thing. However, Livert's card consisted of three statements to be checked and a few lines for the deejay's own comments. They are:

—Two more and you'll have four lousy records.

—Go back to parking cars.

—Mitch Miller's got nothing to worry about.

The off-beat approach to a situation that is usually handled with such choice embellishments as "this is the greatest" or "breaking in Oshkosh" did the trick and brought Livert a rash of return cards with humorous remarks and a strong percentage of promises to play the disks.

100th Account For Basch

NEW YORK—When the Buddy Basch Office this week signed to handle Eastern record promotion on behalf of batoneer-writer-arranger Paul Weston and singer Shirley Harmer, they marked the Basch Offices one hundredth and one hundred first accounts. Basch will handle "The Naked Sea"; just released by Weston as a single, as well as his best-selling "Mood For Twelve" album. For Miss Harmer, Basch will promote the just-issued "Secret Doorway".

In the past few years Basch has represented some of the top name recording artists: Danny Kaye, Dinah Shore, Spike Jones, Tony Martin, Johnny Desmond, Florian Zabach, Tex Beneke-Glenn Miller Orchestra, Lisa Kirk, Burl Ives, Andy Russell, Morey Amsterdam, Mimi Benzell, Morton Gould, Gloria De Haven, Connie Boswell, Buddy Clark, Johnny Long, Bill Snyder, Georgia Gibbs, Al Morgan, Tutti Camarata, Karen Chandler, Snooky Lanson, Fran Warren, Sammy Davis Jr., Bob Manning, Eileen Barton, and Dick Contino, among others.

An Organ Revival

HOLLYWOOD, CAL. — "When everyone in and out of the record business tells you that organ music doesn't sell and that you can't start a record company with a 12" organ album, it's downright discouraging—especially when that's exactly what you intend doing."

So says 32-year-old Rich Vaughn, prexy of HIFI records, who, in eight months reports he has sold 84,000 record albums.

It all started in February, 1955, when Vaughn submitted a tape of organ music by ex-Paramount organist George Wright to a number of recording companies. Little interest was shown by the companies and the music was turned down. So Vaughn decided to start his own label, with his own money, and put it out himself.

"George Wright Plays The Mighty Wurlitzer Pipe Organ," a 12" album, was HIFI record's initial release on April 1, of this year. Vaughn was so sure it would sell that he guaranteed the initial shipments to all 27 distributors. Then the re-orders started pouring in.

The second album, "George Wright Encores At The Mighty Wurlitzer," Vaughn says hit even bigger, for now the consumer was familiar with HIFI records' quality and was on the lookout for the next one. By the end of the year, RCA's Custom Record Division will have pressed over 100,000 12" LP's on these two numbers.

Vaughn didn't follow any of the accepted methods for cutting albums. He used an unpopular instrument "cold," without publicity. He had Wright mix ballads, novelty tunes and up-tempo music purposely, because he felt the listener would like variety.

"You can't," states Vaughn, "underestimate today's record buyer. He's always on the prowl for something new, and if it's recorded properly, reproduced with the finest fidelity, and packaged attractively, he'll not only buy it, but be on the lookout for the next one."

HIFI records' catalog also includes two Richard Purvis classical organ recital albums, "Dick Stewart Sings," "Joe Enos Plays Two Pianos," and "The Mitchell Boys Choir Sings." All the albums are available on 7½" and 15" half track or full track HIFI tape, and the Wright and Purvis albums have been issued in stereophonic HIFI tape.

A new George Wright Christmas album has just been released and multiple-recorded harp, poetry, classical piano, and military band albums are on the slate for early 1956.

Ross, Benson Merge Firms

NEW YORK—The Universal Corporation, headed by Kal Ross, and Anthon Management, headed by Fred Benson, will merge as of December 1 in a new personal management office to be known as Benson & Ross. Among the artists the firm will handle are bandleaders Ray Anthony and Les Baxter, comic Jackie Kannon and announcer Del Scharbutt.

2 MINUTE RECORDS

Nation's Music Ops Ask "The Cash Box" To Start Crusade For 2 Minute Recordings All Over Again

Claim Many Record Manufacturers Have Been "Neglecting This Important Time Element"

CHICAGO—"Now that we have so much greater selectivity, and the public takes more time to choose the recordings they want to listen to, let's remind the record manufacturers all over again that two minutes should be the time limit for all recordings", wrote one very well known music operator.

He also added, "I remember your hot crusade to get all the record manufacturers to cut down on the time of their recordings.

"Perhaps", he concluded, "the time has come when you have to enter into this crusade all over again."

A checkup thruout this area revealed that many other music operators are of the same opinion. They have personally protested the increased time to those who distribute recordings to them.

Said one of the Chicago music operators, "This operator is telling the truth. Personally, we all agree that greater selectivity is helping all of us to prove that the automatic musical instrument is the finest there is in the nation.

"But", he adds, "we can't make money if we have to wait for minutes until the public chooses the recording they want to hear, and then

find that the record is going to play three minutes and more.

"The fact is", he concluded, "the best hits have been two minutes and less."

Years ago *The Cash Box* started a crusade to get record manufacturers to realize that the nation's juke box owners must have "timed recordings."

As *The Cash Box* explained then, 2 minute records meant almost 30 plays an hour during peak hour playtime, whereas 3 minute disks meant less than 20 plays an hour during the same peak play periods. A difference of 50% intake.

The Cash Box was the very first publication in music history to "time" all new recordings released by the manufacturers. Never before had "time of play" appeared on record labels.

The Cash Box also pointed out that the greatest hits in recorded music were two minutes and even less.

This publication does not believe that a "crusade" is again necessary as to time of play. It hopes that this "reminder" will bring back to the record manufacturers the fact that the juke box industry needs recordings that are perfectly timed for greater play appeal.

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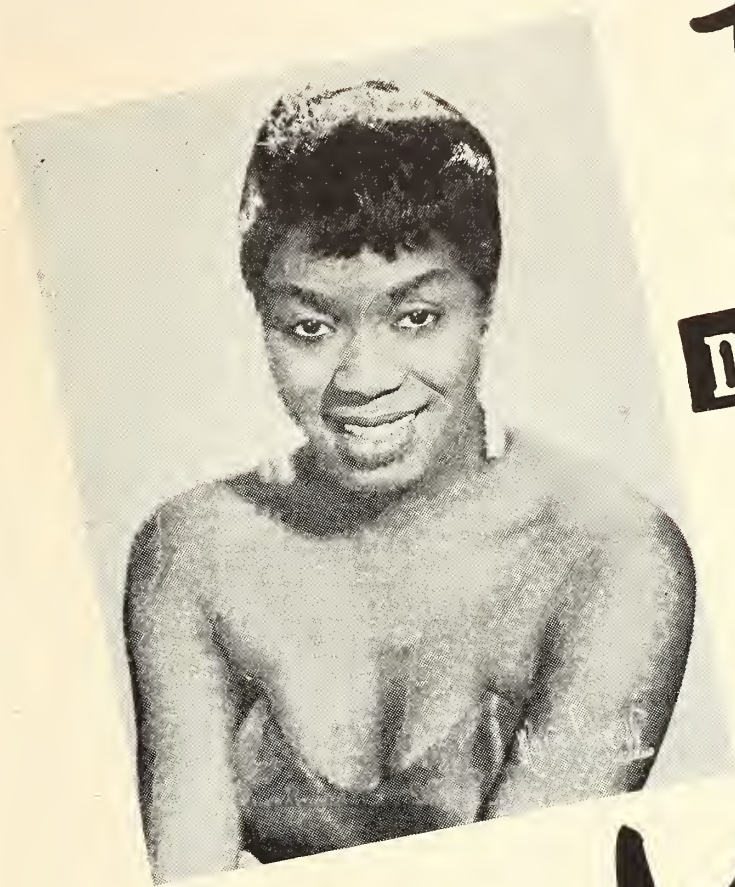

Though the recorded sound may not be on a par with today's standards this package offers one of the most sweeping arrays of Jerome Kern music available anywhere. The scope of the melodies gives the listener the rare treat of hearing many unfamiliar tunes that missed the pop parade, all at a budget price. Nevertheless melodies such as "Twas Not So Long Ago," "Siren's Song," "Babes in the Wood," have ingratiating qualities. The Regent Light Opera Company under Leonard Joy's direction does a thoroughly professional job in bringing the songs across. This set is a must for collectors of show music.

CLASSICAL

GROFE—"Grand Canyon Suite"—Copland—"El Salon Mexico"—Boston Pops Orchestra, Arthur Fiedler, Conductor—RCA Victor LM-1928 (12")

This set offers two works by a pair of American composers who have musically attempted to capture our natural wonders and those of neighboring lands. Grofe, has accurately written into music the majesty and mystery of the Grand Canyon. The suite's familiar third section, "On the Trail," has one experiencing his way on mule around the canyon. Copland in his short work, "El Salon Mexico," has also picturesquely captured the theme of his work, a dance hall in Mexico. There is a spright and melodic Latin dance rhythm throughout the piece. With the Boston Pops Orchestra and, of course Arthur Fiedler at the helm, the works are played for all their worth. Top-notch sound. Imposing view of the Grand Canyon on the cover should help draw attention to the album. The set belongs in the modern, serious music lover's record cabinet.

VERDI—"The Force of Destiny" (Highlights)—Milanov, Peerce, Warren, Moscona—Renato Cellini and Jonel Perlea, Conductors—RCA Victor LM-1916 (12" LP)

Even in excerpts Verdi's opera of tow ill-fated lovers comes across with fine dramatic intensity. This can be attributed largely to the fine cast Victor has assembled for the leading roles. It would be rather difficult to improve upon such outstanding Met singers as Jan Peerce, Zinka Milanov and Leonard Warren. Verdi's powerful and emotional score fits neatly into the somberness and melancholia of the opera's plot. This beautiful work unfortunately, has a meager representation in the LP catalogues. Thus, this set with a commendable performance and hi-fi sound will get the nod from operatic music collectors.

"SYLVIA" and "COPPELIA"—Delibes—Pierre Monteux—members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra—RCA Victor LM-1913—(1-12" LP)

The name Delibes conjures the names of "Sylvia"; "Coppelia" and "Lakme." Pierre Monteux, with members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, backs the two Delibes ballet scores thus offering as delectable a package as could be desired. Monteux's treatment brings forth all the fragile charm, melodic treats and enchantment embodied in the two fairy tales. Ballet lovers, Delibes fans, and buyers of light classical music will find this release to their liking.

"TROMBONE FOR TWO"—J. J. Johnson and Kai Winding—Columbia CL 742—(1-12")

THE WIFFENPOOF SONG; GIVE ME THE SIMPLE LIFE; CLOSE AS PAGES IN A BOOK; TURNABOUT; TROMBONE FOR TWO; IT'S SAND, MAN; WE TWO; LET'S GET AWAY FROM IT ALL; GOODBYE; THIS CAN'T BE LOVE.

J. J. Johnson and Kai Winding have teamed up to bring a new sound to the ear. Their previous album "Kai Winding and Jay Johnson," is currently a best seller. The two trombone artists are rounded out by the inclusion of Dick Katz on the piano; Paul Chambers, bass; and Osie Johnson, drums. Tho the three carry off their chores in excellent manner, and have brief spots in the sun, it is completely a J. J. and Kai album and the two turn in a magnificent bit of teamwork that is fun to follow. This should prove to be a strong Fall seller.

EDDIE HEYWOOD—EmArcy MG-36042—(1-12" LP)

HEY THERE; YOU NEVER GAVE IT A TRY; LOVE ME OR LEAVE ME; TENDERLY; SO LITTLE TIME; LET'S FALL IN LOVE; SECRET LOVE; OLD FASHIONED WALK; SOFT SUMMER BREEZE; HEYWOOD'S BOUNCE; YOUNG AT HEART; 'S WONDERFUL.

The poignant story told in the notes on the album, of Eddie Heywood's paralyzed hands, and the road back, only serves to point up to a greater degree his complete mastery of the piano as evidenced by this issue. Heywood is back in complete control of the keyboard, which he plays with a warmth, depth and technical virtuosity. His selection of tunes is light, lyrical and pleasing. An excellent choice of material to listen to carefully, or to relax to in complete comfort.

"THREE SWINGING BELLS"—The Aaron Bell Trio—Herald Jazz HLP 0100—(1-12" LP)

LOVER COME BACK TO ME; THEY CAN'T TAKE THAT AWAY FROM ME; STELLA BY STARLIGHT; COOLCITY; THERE'LL NEVER BE ANOTHER YOU; SOMEBODY LOVES ME; OLD MAN RIVER; DEVIL'S CREEP; THE MAN I LOVE; SOFTLY AS IN A MORNING SUNRISE; PURPLE MOOD; CHOLLY'S FOLLY.

A new group, insofar as records go, the Aaron Bell Trio comes up with an album that is an excellently performed set of 12 tunes, for the main part, tried and true standards. The trio has a fresh, commercial sound, and each artist is skillful at his chosen instrument. Aaron Bell on the bass, Charlie Bateman on the piano, and Charlie Smith on the drums complement each other expertly in the ensembles and shine in the solo spots. This initial entry for Herald into the LP field should prove to be a money maker for all concerned.

"JAZZ ECSTASY"—Harvey Leonard Sextet and Trio—Keynote LP 1102—(1-12" LP)

WOODY'N YOU; LADY IS A TRAMP; BEE CEE CEE; TIGER'S TUNE; WE'LL BE TOGETHER AGAIN; THE TIGER; CHIPPY'N; AUTUMN NOCTURNE; ALONE TOGETHER; TO MICKEY'S MEMORY.

Keynote offers Harvey Leonard with his Sextet and Trio. Both groups are composed of accomplished, tho lesser known jazz lights. Leonard works with Jerry Lloyd, trumpet; Morty Lewis, tenor; Frank Rehack, trombone; Teddy Kotick, bass; and Will Bradley, Jr. on the drums. The trio is rounded out with two females in the rhythm section—Elaine Leighton, drums; and Anne Drevnak, bass. The two combos show a keen awareness of modern jazz and turn out an album that is worthy of a good long listen. Given the proper exposure it should sell well.



A star studded Royal Variety Show was the talk of the town. Critics said "A show truly fit for a Queen". It would be hard to say who was the outstanding performer of the evening, nevertheless, I'd like to single out the surprise addition to the show, and what a wonderful surprise it was. Hearing Ethel Merman lead the entire cast in the finale singing "There's No Business Like Show Business". I'm sure Ethel, who should by now be back in the States, can't stop talking about the whole event, a really Royal occasion.

"Sunday Night at The London Palladium", the regular T.V. show on I.T.A., is replaced this Sunday by excerpts of the Daily Mirror "Disk Festival". It also comes from the London Palladium and will feature the most popular recording stars in the country. Among those appearing are Ted Heath and his Music, Ruby Murray, Eddie Calvert, Joan Regan, Alma Cogan, Dickie Valentine, Max Bygraves, the Stargazers and David Whitfield just back from the U.S. where once again he scored such a big success.

Manuel Kopelman who started the cut-price record business recently over here on the mail order system, has now taken over a factory and plans to deliver records to stores all over the country. . . . M. C. A.'s London office announced that it has negotiated a world wide contract with George Melachrino and his orchestra. George's orchestra, which records for RCA Victor and H.M.V., is very popular in the U.S. and it seems likely that following the fabulous success of Mantovani in America the Melachrino orchestra may be invited to tour the U.S.

Leon Kaba of French Vogue Records over in London, this week told me that the biggest box office attraction in France and Belgium at the moment is that great soprano-sax man Sidney Bechet. Wherever he appears S.R.O. notices are put up and police reinforcement has to be called in.

Three songs for the 1956 best seller charts in Britain are "Love and Marriage", "Sixteen Tons" and "The Shifting Whispering Sands". I don't see all three as sheet music sellers but I see them all as disk hits. Lew and Leslie Grade the agents, are interested in Julius La Rosa for this country. Should please Julie and Archie Bleyer with whom he makes such wonderful records.

Multi-Activated Johnny

NEW YORK—If you ask Johnny Parker what he's doing these days, you'll have to stop for about a half hour or so to get an answer, because the artist-writer is involved in a dozen different projects.

On the song-writing front, he is the writer of the words and music of a number of songs including: "Nothin' To Do" by Archie Bleyer; "Alphabet Rock" by the Lancers; "Ooh How I Love Ya" by Ginny Gibson; "Keep It Movin'" by the Ink Spots; "Red Hot Serenade" recorded by the Crewcuts in their LP "Crewcuts Go Long Hair"; "The Last Spring" and "Open Your Heart" by Sidney Torch in his LP "Music From Across The Sea", and in England, Ronnie Aldrich and the Squadronaires have released "Rock Candy" on the London label.

On the singing front, the crooner has just completed a 12" LP for Dave Kapp, proxy of the Kapp Label. It features Parker singing standards with accompaniment by guitarist Tony Mottola and his group. The LP is skedded for release in January.

On the author front, he is finishing up his philosophy book on Relativism, a philosophy he hopes one day to teach. He has also started on a novel about show business and has just become engaged.

Rudolph Rides Again

NEW YORK—"Rudolph The Red Nosed Reindeer" is set to ride for the seventh time. The publisher, St. Nicholas Music, has added Norm Rubin (New York), Solly Wagner (Chicago), and Joe Whalen (Hollywood) to the staff.

There are eleven new records, including Les Paul and Mary Ford (Capitol), The Four Aces (Decca), The Three Suns (Victor), The Voices of Walter Schuman (Victor), Dennis James (Kapp) etc. There are now 80 versions which have sold 18 million records, the first being Autry's which accounts for 5 million. Over 2 million copies of sheet music have been sold and this year sales are running ahead of last year. The song has again received all rack orders. The record companies are having special promotions of their versions of the song.

For the first time, Radio City Music Hall is including Rudolph in its Christmas Stage Show with special introductory lyrics by Al Stillman. The Technicolor picture short of Rudolph will open at the Roxy Theater mid-December and will be shown in leading theaters all over the country.

In addition to Rudolph, the firm will be working on "The Night Before Christmas Song" with reissues of the seven records out last year.

Freed's "Rock and Roll Christmas Show" will feature Count Basie, Joe Williams, Don Cherry, Lavern Baker, Boyd Bennett, The Valentines, The Cadillacs, The Wrens. Dr. Jive has signed the Five Keys, Ruth Brown, The Cheers, Bo Diddley, Willis Jackson and Pat Boone. All are the current possessors of rock and roll hits. With the two shows playing simultaneously it will be interesting to see how many dollars the teeners will spend. It is our bet that both shows will play to packed houses and that a great portion of the kids will see the Paramount and Academy bills at least one time each. Tommy

It is estimated 30 to 40 million people saw Tommy Smalls and his show consisting of Bo Diddley, Five Keys, Lavern Baker and the Willis Jackson orchestra. The Sullivan shot arose from the publicity that was given the Dr. Jive Apollo show when the police had to be called out to handle the huge overflowing crowd trying to fight its way into the theatre on Election Day. . . . Phil Rose on the loose again with Glory Record "Stormy Weather" by The Leaders. Deck has been stirring up action in L. A., Hartford, Buffalo and Boston. . . . Phil Kahl, back in town after a recent road trip to plug his "C'est La Vie" and "Lily Maebelle." Phil predicts the former will be number one in the Nation. "Lily Maebelle" by the Valentines on Rama, Phil reports, created excitement where he went. He expects it to be a big pop as well as r & b hit. . . . The Atco line has begun to make important strides currently providing distributors with four strong sellers. "Smokey Joe" by the Robins; "You Tickle Me Baby" by The Royal Jokers; "Yum Yummy" by The Pearls; and "Yes Sir That's My Baby" by The Sensations. . . . 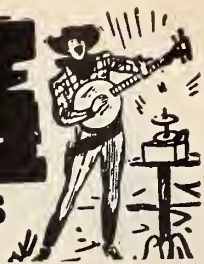

Country DJ Group Reveals Future Plans

NASHVILLE—At a press conference held at the Country Disk Jockey Festival the CMDJA, Nelson King, spokesman for the group, revealed some of the plans it had arrived at during the meeting held previous to the trade paper confab.

King stated that the CMDJA will furnish an up-to-date, active list of its members to all record companies and guaranteed that association members will play their disks. He went on to tell that the biggest problem right now deals with the servicing of deejays and stations. He felt, however, that there is now a better relationship between deejays and wax manufacturers and that the basic goal of the CMDJA is more widespread acceptance of country music. He disclosed that during the meetings the organization ratified preliminary plans, as of the coming year, to assume on a national basis, the promotion of a country music festival, with the finest artists, to be held some time near the end of May and at a different city each year in recognition of Country Music Day.

He added that although the current music festivals, such as the Jimmie Rodgers Memorial Day in Meridian, Miss., and the Hank Williams Memorial Day in Montgomery, Ala., are of a local nature the CMDJA will continue to give them their full blessings. In addition, it will do so for any other such worthy events that may develop in the future such as the one proposed for the late Fred Rose. Also the jocks felt that the national festivals would receive the support of individual city's chambers of commerce and civic groups and the deejays themselves would help publicize

the event long in advance. Any profits derived from these events, it was noted, would be placed in the CMDJA treasury to further the cause of country music.

King stated that the association was grateful to WSM and its Grand Ole Opry for the hand it played in helping to found the CMDJ, but stressed that the station, in no way, is connected with any of its own promotion. He also revealed that the initial chance to promote Country Music Day would be offered to WSM but Bill McDaniel and station officials, at the present time, have not presented their views on the matter.

It was also voted unanimously that the annual CMDJA meeting be held in Nashville and that it should take place during the festival, Friday or Saturday, so that many more can attend.

Arrangements have been made by the CMDJA for a monthly release to all its members and non-members, to appear shortly. There will also be a quarterly release, designed in fan club magazine form, which will go out in January.

Connie B. Gay of Washington's Town and Country and KSJI—Gladwater, Texas deejay Tom Perryman were elected to the board.

The association, as is WSM, is looking forward to the day when the country field will have its own museum and hall of fame honoring all the outstanding men and women connected with country music and displaying such prized possessions as original lead sheets, musical instruments, pictures and personal belongings.

The execs, the members of their individual wax families, included Ken Nelson and Mike Maitland, Capitol, Dick Linke, Columbia, Mike Connors, Paul Cohen and Syd Goldberg, Decca, Bill Bullock, Steve Sholes and Jack Burgess, RCA Victor, Morrie Price and Dee Kilpatrick, Mercury and Randy Wood of Dot.

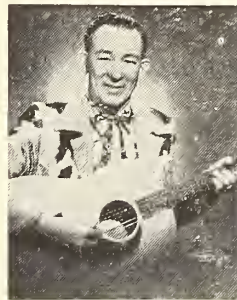

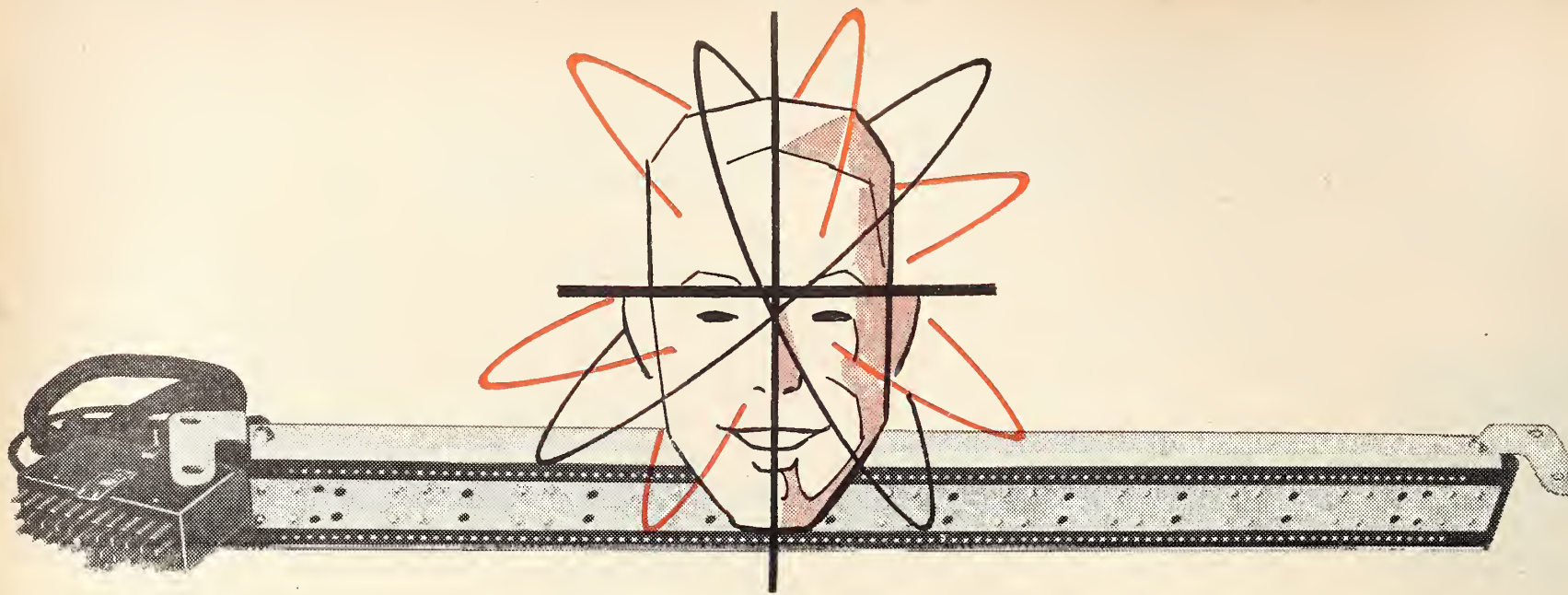

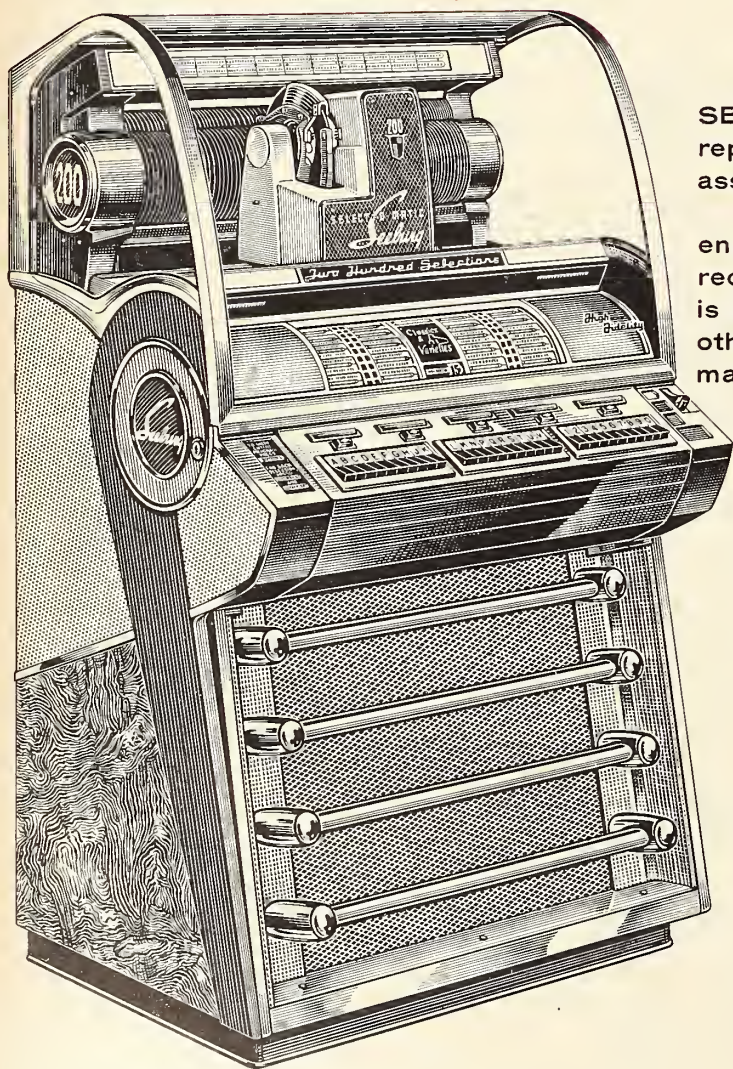

Here and There

NEW YORK—Ben Weberman, feature writer for the Journal of Commerce, in a special story this week, analyzes the cigarette situation. "The \$5 billion tobacco industry appears to be on the threshold of a new period of sales and earnings growth," he reports. "Analysis of current sales statistics of cigarette makers" he continued, "indicates that the health scare stories, which brought out the filter brands in full force and temporarily dented consumer use, no longer are a dragging influence." The report pointed out that other factors, such as switch to king-size cigarettes, the arrival at smoking age of the small, depression-era crop of babies, and the lessening in the general tempo of the economy which accompanied the end of the Korean hostilities, all were of equal importance. The shift of the smoking habits of the nation's smokers caused many headaches. This statement is of great interest to coinmen. "The headaches", it is stated, "have been due principally to the problem of trying to squeeze 30 brands into vending machines which have slots for only six or eight kinds."

NEW YORK—On April 1, 1956, the Federal excise tax on distilled spirits is scheduled to revert to \$9 per proof gallon from the "temporary" \$10.50 rate the legal distilling industry has been laboring under since 1951. The revision was first due in 1954, when the Korean crisis—in the name of which the last \$1.50 increment was levied—had long been over. It was again looked for this Spring, but the tax was extended on the basis that revenue needs made a reduction impossible at the time. Revision to the \$9 rate will mean a lower retail price and could be a means of stimulating activity in taverns.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Another indication that the country is heading for a record year of prosperity in 1956 is the joint prediction this week by the Commerce and Labor departments. These departments estimate that a record \$44 billion worth of construction in 1956 will be undertaken. The outlook was based on an assumption that general economic activity would show a "moderate increase" next year. The predicted 1956 expenditure would be a 5 per cent increase above the \$42 billion of construction outlays now indicated for this year.

Maxwell Abbell was Dinner Chairman; Rabbi Henry Fisher of B'nai Zion Synagogue was Spiritual Leader; Cantor Haazzan Moses Silverman of Anshe Emet Synagogue and the Anshe Emet Choir were featured; the principal address was by Dr. Bernard Mandelbaum, Dean of Students, Rabbinical School; remarks were by Rabbi Ralph Simon, spiritual leader of Rodfei Zedek Synagogue.

Regarding the Solomon Schechter Award the program stated:

*"To Samuel Wolberg
"Who through ceaseless efforts and unswerving loyalty has shown his devotion to the great institutions which Solomon Schechter inspired — The Jewish Theological Seminary of America, The United Synagogue of America, and The Rabbinical Assembly of America. His dedication has helped these institutions to train scholars, rabbis, teachers, and lay leaders for Jewish life in America."*

"Mr. Wolberg served with distinction as first President of the Chicago Council of Conservative Synagogues. He has been active in the leadership of his own Congregation, B'nai Zion and has been a leader in marshalling congregational support for the work of the Seminary. In all of his activities, Mr. Wolberg has shown himself to be a loyal and devoted worker for K'lal Yisroel, working with all his heart and with all his soul and with all his might' to bring Solomon Schechter's great dream for American Judaism to early fruition."

Better Programming Continues Top Aim of Leading Juke Box Ops

Believe Top Music Men Should Help Guide Service Men and Agents in How to Judge Programs for Each Location

CHICAGO — A leading juke box operator advised this past week:

"We've never forgotten *The Cash Box* editorial, 'Better Programming Means Bigger Profits.'"

He continued, "This is one of the big problems of our industry. I've talked to many, many juke box ops", he claims, "and have yet to find anyone who has a set formula for programming individual locations.

"Like you stated in your editorial, 'this is up to the operator to study and to understand each and every one of his individual locations.'"

Like many other operators of music equipment this man, too, feels that there should come into being schools and lectures by noted music men so that the service men and agents of the leading operators would have a better understanding of music generally and, thereby, be able to better program their phonographs.

He says, "The time has come when we should have experts who know music prepare some kind of pamphlet, especially for foreign recordings and old time tunes, so that the agents and service men can study these and quickly ascertain the tunes that the location wants and needs to assure the juke box operator peak play profits by more correct programming.

"I don't want my name used at this time, as you can guess. My own service men and agents might not only lose their respect but, what's even more important, think that I'm trying to load them with more work.

"But believe me", he advises, "your editorials and, especially, your charts and selections are the one and only way we juke box operators know what's what when it comes to music.

"What we also need", he says, "is something that will give us the old time tunes as well as foreign recordings.

"Why doesn't *The Cash Box* make up such a listing for the operators all over the country? I'm sure that every juke box operator in the nation will agree with me that this would prove of tremendous value to all."

How To Use "THE CASH BOX PRICE LISTS"

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

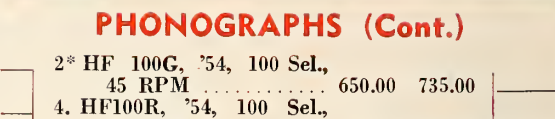

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
