These two features should prove of inestimable aid in the conduct of a retail record shop. It is one more step in *The Cash Box*' ever expanding service to the record industry and it is one more development in the emergence of *The Cash Box* as the one trade paper capable of giving the retailer the same complete unbiased service with which it has proven itself in the juke box and disk jockey fields.

B "THE WAY THAT I WANT YOU" (2:43) [Mills ASCAP—DeLange, Myrow] Mary Angel bows under the American moniker with a lovely romantic item that's tailor-made for her rich, polished voice. Good combination of talent and tune. Watch it.

C+ "A WEEPIN' AND A WAILIN' SONG" (2:31) [Mills ASCAP—Gilbert, Myrow] A cute little rhythm item contagiously presented by the thrush.

ALAN FREED ROCK 'N ROLL BAND
(Coral 61660; 9-61660)

B+ "I DON'T NEED LOTS A MONEY" (2:28) [Bonita BMI—Johnson] Popular rock and roll jockey Alan Freed leads his swinging band through a terrific dance deck that the kids will love. Al Sears does a big job on the sax. Terrific juke box item. Side really builds.

C+ "THE CAMEL ROCK" (2:47) [Bonita BMI—Kirkland, Mitchell] Here the ork gives out with a slow rocker tailor made for the hoofers.

SUNNY GALE
(RCA Victor 20-6588; 47-6588)

B+ "TRY A LITTLE PRAYER" (2:20) [Famous ASCAP—Magidson, Manning] Sunny Gale does a wonderful job with a stirring inspirational ballad that has the ingredients needed to hit the big time. Strong deck to watch closely.

C+ "IF YOU REALLY WANT TO KNOW" (2:40) [Harman ASCAP—Hoffman, Manning] The lark comes over well on this end. A good romantic tune rendered with emotion.

GLORIA MANN
(Decca 29961; 9-29961)

B "MY SECRET SIN" (2:27) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Demetrius] Gloria Mann of "Teen Age Prayer" fame, employs the same beat used on her recent hit to fashion another romantic rock and roll ballad. Pretty tune offered with much feeling. Good side the kids will enjoy.

C+ "CASHMERE SWEATER" (2:38) [Admont ASCAP—Robinson] Another fish-beat item with a teen-age theme. Aimed strictly at the kids.

BILLY VAUGHN ORCH.
(Dot 15479; 45-15479)

B+ "THE LEFT BANK" (2:26) [Cromwell ASCAP—Monnot] Billy Vaughn and the ork have caught the spirit of this spright Parisian instrumental and should enjoy a healthy sale with their rendition. A lively item that'll appeal to the folks who so enjoyed "Poor People of Paris." This should be the biggest version.

C+ "THE SWEETHEART POLKA" (2:12) [Randy-Smith ASCAP—Vaughn, Wood] The title clearly defines the contents of this happy-go-lucky side. Colorful polka item that should get spins in every juke. Billy Rowland is featured on the honky-tonk piano.

Should make it two-in-a-row for the lass. Lower lid is a cute fish-beat novelty dubbed "The Boy On Page Thirty-Five." Top half is the one that'll attract the chips.

BONNIE LOU

(King 4948; 45-4948)

B+ "NO ROCK 'N ROLL TONIGHT" (2:23) [Harvard BMI—Grace, Graziano] Bonnie Lou comes over wonderfully on a soft and sentimental rock and roll ballad that tells the sad story of a broken teen-age love affair. Lovely reading of a good tune that should be making big noise.

C+ "ONE TRACK LOVE" (2:32) [Jay & Cee BMI—Glover, Innis] Bonnie picks up the pace on this half and rhythms through a lively jumper.

HI-FI's

(Liberty 55023; 45-55023)

B+ "SOMEBODY'S GOTTA LOSE" (2:22) [Robbins ASCAP—Ludlum, MacDonald] Here's a group to watch closely. A polished and imaginative aggregation with a fascinating blend. They glide through a sentimental romancer that could start them on the road to the top. Pretty song and delivery that the dee jays are sure to appreciate.

B+ "LONESOME ROAD" (2:31) [Robbins ASCAP—MacDonald] Here the crew hands in a fantastic arrangement of a great oldie. First minute is a high speed delivery in an echo chamber with the band in the foreground. Then the boys slow up a bit and send out another strong deck. Solid coupling.

CARMEN CAVALLARO

(Decca 29912; 9-29912)

B "CHOPSTICKS" (2:25) [P. D.] Due to the demand for this side, Decca has pulled "Chopsticks" out of the Cavallaro "Eddy Duchin" album and issued it on a single. Amazing finger work on a fascinating novelty side. Should do very well as a single.

B "DIZZY FINGERS" (1:50) [Mills ASCAP—Confrey] Another fleet-fingered Cavallaro interpretation of an oldie. This side is also from the sound track LP. Both should enjoy smooth sailing when the pic hits the local cinemas.

EDDIE LAWRENCE

(Coral 61671; 9-61671)

B+ "THE OLD PHILOSOPHER" (2:22) [Merrick BMI—Lawrence] Here's one of the funniest sides we've heard in many months. It's a hilarious comedy recitation that could do for Eddie Lawrence what the "Football" novelty did for Andy Griffith. You've gotta fall apart when you hear this deck for the first time. Jockeys will probably be spinning the grooves off this one. Watch it. It could be a huge seller.

C+ "KING ARTHUR'S MINES" (2:03) [Merrick BMI—Lawrence] Another clever, enjoyable comedy item penned by the performer. But top half is the one with the strength.

TED HEATH ORCH.

(London 1675; 45-1675)

B "THE FAITHFUL HUSSAR" (2:46) [International ASCAP—Armstrong] Ted Heath and his men hand in a solid jump deck as they ride through a swinging Louis Armstrong composition. Steady dance tempo. Kids should like it. Fine arrangement.

B "HAVE YOU MET MISS JONES" (2:03) [Chappell ASCAP—Rodgers, Hart] Another excellent dance arrangement this time of a great Rodgers-Hart oldie. Strong dance offering for all jukes.

BOBBY SCOTT

(ABC-Paramount 9723; 45-9723)

B+ "CHLOE" (2:25) [Charles N. Daniels & Robbins ASCAP—Kahn, Moret] Bobby "Chain Gang" Scott lends his unique, exciting voice to a great oldie and comes through with a commercial new side that could step out and hit the big time. Refreshing sound that the kids should enjoy.

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THE CASH BOX POP POLL

The Cash Box Disk Jockey Poll was designed to determine which songs and artists have been the most popular and played the most during the past several months by deejays around the country.

The Poll was divided into three sections, popular, rhythm and blues, and country. Here we present the findings in the pop field.

Each disk jockey listed three choices in each category. Three points were awarded for each first choice, two points for each second choice, and one point for each third choice. Of the total number of points cast, the following is the percentage each artist received. The maximum percentage an artist could possibly receive was 50% since even if every disk jockey voted the same artist #1, it would still add up to only 50% of the six points available in each category.

Harry Link Dies

NEW YORK—Harry Link, one of the best known men in the music industry died July 5 at 12:45 at the Park West Hospital of New York. He was 60 years old.

One of the leading figures on the music scene for most of his entire life, Link was born January 25th, 1896. He was educated at the Wharton School and the University of Pennsylvania. In 1930, he became a member of ASCAP and is best remembered for his compositions "I've Got A Feeling I'm Falling", "These Foolish Things Remind Me Of You", "The Miracle Of The Bells", "Tell Me While We're Dancing" and many others.

During his career in the music industry, Link was general professional manager of the Wattison, Berlin & Snyder Music firm and of such other leading publishing companies as Irving Berlin, Leo Feist, the Santly Brothers and most recently of E. B. Marks. He lived in New Hyde Park, Long Island.

He is survived by his wife Dorothy Dick, also an ASCAP writer, and his daughter Mrs. Peter Gordon Brown.

Funeral services were held at the Campbell Mortuary at 81st St. and Madison Avenue, Saturday July 7th at 2:00 P. M.

NEW YORK — Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia Records, revealed this week his plans to fly to Los Angeles on July 13 for one week. This will be Lieberson's first visit to the West Coast since ascending to the presidency of the company.

From Los Angeles Lieberson will fly to Estes Park, Colorado, to attend the annual convention of Columbia's distributors set for July 22, 23 and 24.

Music Men's Outing Aug. 9

NEW YORK — The Professional Music Men will hold their 21st Annual Golf Tournament and Outing at the Harrison Country Club, Thursday, August 9. Practically every contact man, along with A & R executives, recording stars and music publishers will again vie for top golf honors.

Bob Miller, president of the Music Men's Contact Association will be host and will be aided by a staff including Murray Luth, chairman, and assistants Mickey Addy and Bernie Pollack.

"Leroy Anderson Month" Huge Success

NEW YORK—The "June Is Leroy Anderson Month" campaign turned out to be a huge success for Mills Music.

Sid Mills reports that Anderson received more plugs during June than any other writer in any given month. Mills surveyed all the plugs on Anderson tunes in New York from January 1 to June 1. He then checked all the plugs for the month of June and found that more of the composer's songs were programmed in the one month than in the five months prior to June.

One of the most important features that made the campaign such a success was the taped interviews which were set up with different jockeys. Anderson made more than 50 such informal interviews.

Letters poured in to Mills Music from more than 700 jockeys throughout the country stating that they were devoting from 15-minute segments to as much as one-hour shows to Anderson's music.

NEW YORK—Joe Burton and his trio, well known on the west coast, have been booked into the Embers starting August 20 to play opposite George Shearing. Burton is currently being managed by George Albert, who also manages Art Waner.

Known on the coast as "Mr. Keyboard", Burton has had long engagements in Las Vegas and other western cities.

PHOENIX, ARIZONA—Two leading disk jockeys, Dick Gilbert of Phoenix and Saxie Dowell of Chicago have bought a new radio station KPOK, a 1,000 watt in Phoenix which they will operate. He was a record promotion man in Chicago for a number of years and most recently was a dj at WHN. WPOK will take in over 60% of Arizona.

Panart Makes Deal With EMI For European Distribution

NEW YORK CITY—At a luncheon which took place in Dining Room No. 4 of the United Nations on June 27, 1956, Ramon S. Sabat, President of Panart, played host to Ambassador Nunez Portuondo of Cuba, members of the Cuban official missions, record trade, local and international press. Sabat used the occasion to report on his trip through Europe and give the details of the agreements made in the various countries with the affiliates of Electric and Musical Industries (EMI) Ltd. which will release Panart material on their various labels. The agreements make available to Cuban Plastics and Record, the Cuban producers of the Panart label, the complete catalogue of EMI for production in Cuba as may be required by that market. Sabat expressed his belief that with the increased interest in good recordings from Europe in Cuba, the Panart catalogue, supplemented now with the European-cut material will increase the demand for package material there and in other areas whereas up to now that market was dormant.

Ambassador Nunez Portuondo manifested his gratification and congratulated Sabat on the success of his trip, which constituted the first organized distribution of Cuban music in Europe and the Scandinavian countries. The ambassador pointed out to the attending guests the importance of the cultural repercussions which will undoubtedly result from Sabat's work. It was also noted that now Cuban musicians as well as artists and arrangers will get a well deserved boost in their popularity with the international record buyer and benefit to great extent in their collections of royalties and performance rights, which have up to date been confined to Cuba and the United States.

Attending guests, representing the various groups which are interested in further development of Cuban music and tourist traffic to Cuba, were Luis Arenal, Consul of Cuba in New York, and member of the Cuban Tourist Commission, representing the Consul General and Minister; Alfredo Hernandez; Ulpino Muniz, executive of Cubana Airlines; Harry Graff, president of Graff Advertising Agency; and Al Kaplan, account executive for Cubana Airline; Bill Simon, of Billboard; and Bob Austin of The Cash

Box. ica featuring the string arrangement, Fajardo and his Montmatee All Stars featuring the flute type of the Cha Cha Cha, and Julio Gutierrez and his Orchestra highlighting the modern sound.

With over twelve 12-inch LP's currently in the works for release during the next three-month period, Steinhaus announced that he would leave on a trip which would take him through Chicago, Detroit, Denver, San Francisco, New Orleans, Dallas and Atlanta, where the dealer acceptance has been established and where, to date, no distribution has been set up. With over 70 10-inch LP's and over 2000 singles in their general catalog, Steinhaus hopes to get active interest from distributors who require this type of music to complete their label availability, and meet the growing demand for authentic Cuban and Latin-American music.

Out of the meeting with the representatives of the Cuban Tourist Commission and Cubana Airlines at the luncheon came the surprise announcement by Sabat endorsing a promotional contest among all local DJ's which will result in a trip to Havana and sitting at the Panart recording sessions, where they will meet Panart artists and see how the Cuban operation of the label is working. Rules for the contest will be issued shortly.

POPULAR

"EXACTLY LIKE YOU"—The Ames Brothers—With Joe Reisman And His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1142 (1-12" LP)

EXACTLY LIKE YOU; I HADN'T ANYONE TILL YOU; WHEN MY SUGAR WALKS DOWN THE STREET; I ONLY HAVE EYES FOR YOU; YOU WERE MEANT FOR ME; YOU AND I; DON'T BLAME ME; AUTUMN LEAVES; YOU FORGOT TO REMEMBER; YOU'RE DRIVING ME CRAZY; THE VERY THOUGHT OF YOU; TOGETHER.

Since the novelty ditty "Rag Mop" established the Ames Brothers as a vocal group to be reckoned with, they have kept their musical stature on an extremely high level. This Victor release marks a high point in the boys' careers. It's a beautifully conceived set featuring reliable material, soft orchestrations and, above all, a resourceful, rich blend of voices. The group handles the ballad in a completely ingratiating manner that goes beyond mere sentimentality. Classy cover. The group is one of the most popular in the nation and sales should prove the point further.

"THE VOICES OF PATTI PAGE"—Mercury MG-20100 (1-12" LP)

THE DOGGIE IN THE WINDOW; BUTTERFLIES; HOCUS POCUS; I CRIED; I CAN'T TELL A WALTZ FROM A TANGO; MILWAUKEE POLKA; CHANGING PARTNERS; WHAT A DREAM; I LOVE TO DANCE WITH YOU; EVERLOVIN'; LITTLE CRAZY QUILT; KEEP ME IN MIND.

The plural of voice as used in the set's title is exactly as intended. Patti Page a pioneer in the now extensively used multiple track technique, is heard in 12 selections using the gimmick. Two of the selections easily topped the million mark. These are "The Doggie In The Window" and "Changing Partners." Other previous singles effectively used Patti's sweet voice(s). Patti's summer TV'er and current chart item "Allegheny Moon" should impressively add to the package's sales.

"THE GOLDEN INSTRUMENTALS"—Billy Vaughn And His Orchestra—Dot DLP 3016 (1-12" LP)

BLUE TANGO; SONG FROM MOULIN ROUGE; BEWITCHED; OH MY PAPA; PRETEND; EBB TIDE; AUTUMN LEAVES; LISBON ANTIGUA; CHERRY PINK & APPLE BLOSSOM WHITE; UNCHAINED MELODY; POOR PEOPLE OF PARIS; THIRD MAN THEME.

Here are 12 of Tin Pan Alley's recent Million Sellers assembled in one top quality mood disk. Some of the tunes (i.e. "Autumn Leaves", "Lisbon Antigua") were strictly instrumental in their original form and all of them are, happily, songs that will linger on. Billy Vaughn's individual sounding ork performs the selections with a lush, but easy-going nature. Vaughn's popularity and the solid material played make this a handy item to have on dealer's shelves. Attractive package.

"ALEXANDER THE GREAT"—Tommy Alexander And His Orchestra—Liberty LRP 3008 (1-12" LP)

MAD ABOUT THE BOY; TOMBOY; WE'LL BE TOGETHER AGAIN; I HADN'T ANYONE TILL YOU; MIDNIGHT SUN; LULLABY OF BIRDLAND; OLD DEVIL MOON; SONG IS YOU; ALL THE THINGS YOU ARE; IT COULD HAPPEN TO YOU; FLAMINGO.

Tommy Alexander and the ork represent one of the disk jockey's most appreciated aggregations to come along in a fair amount of time. Their basically swing approach has a modern touch about it that sort of accounts for "renovated" swing. The sparkling arrangements are played with flashy skill by both soloists and/or the whole troupe. Alexander's platters have been favorites of the dee jays, thus assuring valuable air play for the waxing. Most of the sales should involve a jazz crowd.

"STAN FREEMAN"—Epic LN 3224 (1-12" LP)

SUNNY SIDE UP; RIDIN' ON THE MOON; INTERMEZZO; LADY OF THE EVENING; I HAPPEN TO LIKE NEW YORK; SPEAK LOW; THAT'S LIFE; WALTZ IN SWINGTIME.

This disk offers a versatile look at the popular night club entertainer, Stan Freeman. One side features Freeman at the "Blue Angel" as he hilariously spoofs all forms of the popular song. But the artist makes amends to the hand that feeds him by playing and performing some of the lesser known standards on the second side. In the latter department he's best on Cole Porter's emphatic "I Happen To Like New York". Other songs, like "Speak Low", display Freeman's soft touch on the keyboard. The disk spells pure entertainment for listeners who take to intimate, sophisticated and witty artists.

"BROADWAY MELODIES"—Songs From Hit Shows—Buddy Greco And His Quartet—Kapp KL-1033 (1-12" LP)

STANDING ON THE CORNER; MACK THE KNIFE; SHANGRI-LA; LISTEN TO THE SOUND OF MY LOVE; TOO CLOSE FOR COMFORT; IT'S ALL RIGHT WITH ME; ON THE STREET WHERE YOU LIVE; I'VE GROWN ACCUSTOMED TO HER FACE; ALL AT ONCE YOU LOVE HER; DON'T CRY; BAUBLES, BANGLES AND BEADS.

With the nation being delightfully bombarded with songs from such musical smashes as "My Fair Lady" and "The Most Happy Fella", it is clearly evident that Broadway is currently enjoying a notable season. Buddy Greco and His Quartet perform 12 melodies from musicals currently running and from those of a few seasons back. Greco's vocals and the group's jazz intimacy nicely convey the Schubert Row hits. The platter should cash in on the popularity of the set's chart numbers.

"BLUE HAWAII"—Bing Crosby With Orchestra—Decca DL 8269 (1-12" LP)

BLUE HAWAII; SONG OF THE ISLANDS; ALOHA OE; HAWAIIAN PARADISE; TO YOU, SWEETHEART, ALOHA; A SONG OF OLD HAWAII; SOUTH SEA ISLAND MAGIC; SWEET LILANI; DANCING UNDER THE STARS; PALACE IN PARADISE; TRADE WINDS; SWEET HAWAIIAN CHIMES.

Bing Crosby's over-all easy-going personality makes him a natural to sing Hawaii-inspired melodies. Like the land, Crosby is exceedingly relaxed and a deep, rhythmic delivery suits the slow, swaying music perfectly. Accompanying Crosby on most of these previously released tunes is Lani McIntyre and His Hawaiians. This combination of Crosby and Hawaii makes an unbeatable sales item. The platter must be stocked by dealers. It's sure to be a standard seller.

"LIFE OF THE PARTY"—Player Piano Music You Can Sing To—Disneyland WDL 3001 (1-12" LP)

The latest Disneyland release offers an abundance of good natured fun and for the more mature folks around, authentic reminiscing. The featured "artist" is the player piano in 23 still popular oldies. A rinky-dink "Sweet Rosie O'Grady", "Daisy Daisy", etc. is delivered in just about the only way this corner wants to hear them. Included in the package is a booklet containing the lyrics to many of the tunes on the disk. Excellent party set.

"SWEET"—The Trumpet Of Ernie Englund—Cadence CLP 1014 (1-12" LP)

THE VERY THOUGHT OF YOU; COCKTAILS FOR TWO; YOU GO TO MY HEAD; ROSES OF PICARDY; STAR DUST; MARGIE; EMBRACEABLE; LOVE FOR SALE; TWO SLEEPY PEOPLE; S'POSIN'; MY MELANCHOLY BABY; BLUE ROOM; MARIA ELENA.

One of the principal ingredients in many successful mood music sets is the sweet sound of a soaring trumpet. This Cadence release features Ernie Englund's mellow trumpet supported by an organ, drum, sax and bass. The resulting blend keeps a moody atmosphere that, in many instances, can parallel an ork with the whole works. Tastefully selected tunes. Worthwhile platter for any mood music home.

SPECIAL MATERIAL

"WEDDING IN MONACO"—Actual Recording of The Civil And Religious Ceremonies Made At The Wedding Of S.A.S. Prince Rainier III And Grace Kelly—The Ballet "Homage To The Princess"—Music By Stan Kenton—Mercury MG 20149 (1-12" LP)

One of the social highlights of the year was the marriage of Hollywood actress Grace Kelly to Prince Rainier III of Monaco. This unusual recording features not only the pomp and circumstance surrounding the civil and religious ceremonies, but also an exotic-sounding ballet score, "Homage To The Princess", written by famed band leader Stan Kenton. Miss Kelly's popularity should take this "documentary" pressing somewhat beyond the normal sales range for such releases.

JAZZ

"RELAXIN' WITH FRANCES FAYE"—Bethlehem BCP-62 (1-12" LP)

LOVE IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER; I'M GONNA SIT RIGHT DOWN AND WRITE MYSELF A LETTER; DON'T BLAME ME; AIN'T MISBEHAVIN'; ALL THE THINGS YOU ARE; THE DARK-TOWN STRUTTERS' BALL; JUST YOU, JUST ME; YOU'RE MY THRILL; MY BABY JUST CARES FOR ME; WELL ALL RIGHT; THE THRILL IS GONE; WAY DOWN YONDER IN NEW ORLEANS.

Song stylist Frances Faye has some of her best no-holds-barred swing moments on this Bethlehem issue. Miss Faye reacts to each melody with polished phrasing, and a swing momentum that the listener will find nothing short of astounding. Frank Hunter's sparkling arrangements and orchestral direction put him in one of the most accomplished supporting roles ever heard on a jazz pressing. Here's a memorable jazz release that's a goal for future pressing of this type to shoot at. Frances has a large and loyal following that will flip when it hears this platter.

"A MUSICAL HISTORY OF JAZZ"—Grand Award G.A. 33-322 (1-12" LP)

Though having a short history, jazz represents one of the important milestones in the development of a truly American musical art form. Grand Award has attempted, through narration and actual examples of jazz performances, to trace historically the origins of this often complicated musical area. The narrator is the affable TV comedian Wally Cox reading an intelligent script by jazz critic George T. Simon. Supporting Cox are such solid jazz names as Bud Freeman, Peanuts Hucko, Dick Hyman and Hank Jones. "When The Saints Go Marching In", "Basin Street Blues", and "Take The 'A' Train" are some of the jazz classics well performed by the set's artists. Here's a fortunate opportunity for the newer inductees into jazz to get a pleasant and informative introduction to the music.

"RAVE NOTICE"—The Calvin Jackson Quartet—Columbia CL 824 (1-12" LP)

STOMPIN' AT THE SAVOY; DREAM; YOU AND THE NIGHT AND THE MUSIC; THE TOUCH OF YOUR LIPS; MINE; LINGER AWHILE; GET OUT OF TOWN.

Though obvious disciples of the swing idiom, the Calvin Jackson Quartet have woven a few new swing patterns of their own here. On this Columbia pressing the Quartet's in an invigorating and richly imaginative mood. Peter Appleyard on vibraphone, must be singled out for his soft and smooth touch. If you happen to hear portions of an unlisted tune intermingled with one already listed don't fret. It's all part of the wonderful swing game the boys are playing. This bright waxing should meet with solid sales to jazzophiles.

"RED CALLENDER SWINGIN' SUITE"—Red Callender And His Modern Octet—Modern LMP 1207 (1-12" LP)

SKYLINE; SLEIGH RIDE; ALL FOR YOU; OUTLINES; WALKING ON AIR; YOU'RE PART OF ME ON AGAIN; GREENERY; PASTEL; OCTOBER BLUE; DANCERS; BIHARI.

A neat swing entry by Red Callender and His Modern Octet is highly imaginative and extremely well-rounded. Callender, whose background includes work with Charlie Ventura, Mel Powell, Lester Young and others, composed all of the 12 full-bodied selections. His group meets either explosive or sentimental swing with enthusiasm and graceful jazz-knowledge. Bassist Callender puts on a show that can be avidly recommended to jazz fans.

CLASSICAL

MOZART: Symphony No. 39, K. 543—Divertimento No. 15, K. 287—Arturo Toscanini And The NBC Symphony Orchestra—RCA Victor LM-2001 (1-12" LP)

Two popular Mozart creations take up Toscanini's crisp and delicate podium chores on this Victor release. The lovely Symphony No. 39 and spirited Divertimento No. 15 make thoroughly delightful listening and result in one of the best efforts in the Maestro's distinguished recording career. The sound, even though the symphony was taken from an NBC broadcast in 1948, is unusually fine. Choice classical waxing.

CHADWICK: Symphonic Sketches—Howard Hanson Conducting The Eaman-Rochester Symphony Orchestra—Mercury MG 50104 (1-12" LP)

Mercury and conductor Howard Hanson can again be given an appreciative "Thanks" for their commendable venture in bringing serious American music to a deserving spotlight. George Chadwick's "Symphonic Sketches" is a somewhat neglected work that continually pours forth both lyrical and jaunty gems. The opus, divided into four parts, has a lovely bucolic atmosphere. The Eaman-Rochester Orchestra responds gracefully to Hanson's direction. Superb sound. Once heard, the disk has a surprisingly fine chance of making the same grade with classical collectors.

Pianist Roger Williams In Providence Concert Honoring Roger Williams, R.I. Founder

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—At 10 p.m. last Monday (July 2), Roger Williams arrived in Providence, R. I., for a series of festivities commemorating the founding of the tiny state by Roger Williams over 300 years ago. If this sounds slightly confusing, this was the Roger Williams who achieved national prominence with his recording of "Autumn Leaves" and not the 17th century founding father. Pianist Williams was guest soloist with the Providence Symphony at a highly successful concert the following day (July 3).

The pianist's arrival signaled the commencement of a series of events unlike any ever accorded to a visiting musician in the past. Williams was met at Providence Airport by Rhode Island's Governor Roberts, Miss Rhode Island, and prominent civic leaders costumed as Pilgrims and Indians. A parade up Providence's Main Street terminated at the Mayor's office, where Williams was presented with the key to the city. Later that afternoon, costumed as his name-alike, Roger Williams placed a wreath on the memorial statue in Roger Williams Park.

On July 3, which was actually Founder's Day, the city commemorated the birthplace of religious freedom in the Western Hemisphere by solemn public services. In the evening,

prominent Providence citizens assembled for Williams' concert at the Stadium. It was the first of a season of "pop" concerts and was jubilantly received by an SRO audience.



WOR To Debut Uninterrupted Music Program July 9

NEW YORK—"The most enjoyable and listenable radio program on the air" was promised listeners by Robert J. Lader, vice president and general manager of WOR, New York.

The new program, to be called "Music from Studio X" will be heard over WOR and WOR-FM from 9:05 p.m. until 1:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday and from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. on Sundays, starting July 9th.

Studio X has been especially designed for the new program and incorporates the latest in high fidelity facilities: the latest in acoustical materials; finest high fidelity playback equipment; diamond styli; easy-floating playback arm; and a special high-fidelity line direct from Studio X to the WOR transmitter in Carteret, N. J. Together, these components will bring top recorded music to 25 million people in thirteen states who tune regularly to WOR.

"Music from Studio X" will consist of uninterrupted music for almost four hours each night (announcements will be made only on the hour and the half-hour). The music itself will consist of smooth instrumentals and plush vocals recorded in high fidelity by such artists as Percy Faith, Paul Weston, Melachrino Strings, Perry Como, Les Baxter, Nat Cole, Hugo Winterhalter, Ella Fitzgerald, Jackie Gleason, David Rose, Frank Sinatra, Leroy Anderson, Jo Stafford, Fred Waring and Mantovani.

In announcing the new program, Bob Leder commented: "The recording industry has, in the past few years, made tremendous technical progress in the art of capturing sound on disks. But up to now the broadcasting industry has done little to take advantage of the higher fidelity available. The construction of 'Studio X' and the acquisition of the latest proven equip-

ment for our new program should be a giant stride in the direction of bringing broadcasting quality up to the high standards set by the recording companies. I've heard advance tapes of 'Music from Studio X' and I'll go on record as saying that I've never heard a more beautiful sound."

"Music from Studio X" is the joint concept of Bob Leder, and Bob Smith, Wor's program director.

The show's host is John A. Gambling, son of WOR's famous 30-year veteran, and a broadcaster in his own right since 1951.

There will be a pause at 11 p.m. for the regular newscast by Lyle Van—all the rest is music.

The new show will be under the supervision of program manager Bob Smith.

A special theme song, called "Studio X" was composed and conducted by Joe Leahy.

An extensive promotion will be used to kick off "Music from Studio X."

A teaser campaign was started on WOR two weeks ago and is gradually being stepped up until an average of thirty on-the-air announcements per day will be made over the two weeks prior to the show.

In addition more than \$15,000 will be spent during the first month on: ads up to three-quarters of a page in the leading New York and suburban newspapers; 125 giant billboards throughout the Metropolitan area; car cards in Hudson-Manhattan Railroad cars reaching 1,000,000 fares per week; one-minute trailer in chain of drive-in theaters; restaurant menus which are read by 700,000 customers weekly; more than 650,000 leaflets to be distributed in one week; and aerial advertising over all the major beaches.

The trade gets a shot in the arm this week with the new Fats Domino "When My Dreamboat Comes Home" and "So Long" on Imperial. So as to get the earliest start possible, and thus make it that much more difficult for anyone to cover, Lew Chudd did not alert even his distributors. He merely shipped the records and the first the distributors learned of a Domino release was when they opened the cartons. From some of the local distributors we spoke to, it was like giving away ten dollar bills on the corner. Retailers ordered without even hearing the platter and the first shipments were cleaned up one hour after they arrived. This gives one a picture of how powerful this down home country blues singer has become. . . . Savoy continues to be hot with the Big Maybelle "Candy" moving up—up—the lists; and "Taint Watcha Say" by Little Esther and "Love, Baby" by Nappy Brown grossing heavily. . . . Atlantic Records making the big push on "Treasure Of Love" by Clyde McPhatter with its deejay contest. Jockeys have two things going for them in this contest. 1) They are probably playing the record anyway since it is one of the top sellers; and 2) Every jockey wins a prize and one or more of his listeners must be a winner.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The first American recordings by the jazz pianist Friedrich Gulda were made Thursday afternoon and evening (June 28) by RCA Victor at Manhattan's famed Birdland.

"That's the reason he can make those daily morning trips to the bank with that bulging paper bag," they would tell each other.





FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worse to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
