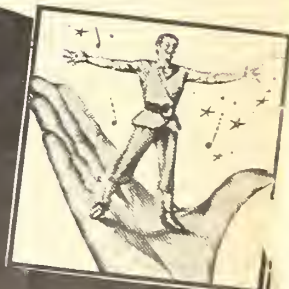

first release of '59 is any indication of things to come. She has a winner in her beautiful new interpretation of the evergreen, "Trust In Me". It's a lush and enchanting recitation enhanced by a pretty choral backdrop. And it's got a pleasant rock-a-ballad beat that will make the side most attractive to the younger set. On the flip the "Waltz Queen" glides thru another multi-track reading of a dreamy new waltz ballad dubbed "Under The Sun Valley Moon". This side grows prettier with each listen. Hot coupling with the top half leading the way.

● Three new recordings of "The Children's Marching Song" (also being referred to as "Nick Nack Paddy Whack", "This Old Man", etc.) which is impressively used in the new Ingrid Bergman pic "Inn Of The Sixth Happiness", debuted on the disk scene this week. (Cyril Stapleton's London waxing was reviewed last week.) The three are on Kapp, 20th-Fox and Columbia Records.

The 20th-Fox pressing is from the sound track of the film and features the Orphan's Chorus with a spirited reading of the song. Miss Bergman's voice is heard only for a few moments. A counter theme orchestration by Malcolm Arnold's Ork is in the backdrop.

Mitch Miller and his 'Sing Along With Mitch' chorus are on the Columbia platter. A spright, high-stepping marcher sung with gusto by an adult chorus. Mitch has neatly woven whistling into his version.

The Sauter-Finegan Doodletown Fifers have a strong rendition on Kapp. Youthful voices chant the lyrics against a full, resounding band backdrop.

All renditions will share in the huge sale this song should garner.

BILL DARNEL
(Jubilee 5355)

B+ "I UNDERSTAND (Just How You Feel)" (2:06) [Jubilee ASCAP—Best] Bill Darnel could have a strong money-maker in this attractive, easy-going new interpretation of a ballad that clicked a few years back. It's one of Darnel's best efforts in quite some time and could make noise. Pretty tune.

C+ "LONELY WINE" (2:24) [Kingsway ASCAP—Wells] A tearful love tune is handled in beat style by the songster.

GEORGE WESTON
(Jackpot 48013)

B+ "WELL DON'T YOU KNOW" (2:25) [Jat BMI—Weston] Here's a sleeper that could crash thru. It's a solid beat-filled rocker with an exciting sound the kids'll eat up. Commercial fare with some good Bo Diddley guitar stylings.

C+ "HEY LITTLE CAR HOP" (1:55) [Jat BMI—MacArthur, Weston] Another good rocker chanted with gusto against a hard-hitting rockin' beat by Weston.

MATYS BROS.
(Sunnyside 3102)

B+ "RUMMY POLKA" [Flax-Ford BMI—Matys] A wonderful new polka item that could develop into a pop success, is joyfully presented by the Matys Bros. (former Decca artists.) Side is full of spunk and has an authentic Polish polka quality. There's a funny gimmick toward the end too. At the end of the first run, a voice cries out "vunce more times boyse", and they start all over again. Refreshing instrumental and vocal that could catch big. Watch this long-shot.

C+ "HEEL & TOE POLKA" [Matys] Another spirited polka item.

LEROY HOLMES ORCH.

B "SONG FROM 'SOME CAME RUNNING'" [Maraville ASCAP—Cahn, Van Heusen] The lovely main theme from the new Frank Sinatra pic "Some Came Running", is lushly interpreted by Leroy Holmes' string-filled orchestra. Dreamy mood piece set to a soothing shuffle rhythm. Good dee jay programming.

B "CHIEF ROCKY BOY" [Saunders ASCAP—Gimbel, Charlap] An exciting production piece from the B'way bound musical "Whoop Up" is offered here. Good Latin swinger excellent for a dance production number. Jocks should enjoy spinning this one too.

B "CARESS ME, POSSESS ME, PERFUME" (2:31) [Saunders ASCAP—Gimbel, Charlap] A smart rock and roll novelty from the B'way bound musical "Whoop Up" is cleverly fashioned by the "Whoop Up" and ork.

BOB STRAUSS
(Curtis 750)

B "NAMELESS" (2:12) [Curtis ASCAP—George, Demetrius] Bob Strauss, best known for his role as Animal in the film "Stalag 17", turns vocalist here and belts out a zany rock and roll novelty. Side oughta appeal to the kids.

C+ "WHERE WERE YOU LAST NIGHT" (2:20) [Curtis ASCAP—George] Another daffy rock and roll novelty employing a deep voice gimmick thruout.

JERRY LEWIS

● Johnny Cash, the country songster who added a pop following to his fandom with "Ballad Of A Teenage Queen", "Guess Things Happen That Way" and "I Walk The Line", has another strong side in his latest release "I Still Miss Someone". Side has the familiar lilting rhythm so popular in Cash releases plus a heart-breaking romantic lyric. Should do well in pop. Flip, "Don't Take Your Guns To Town" is a folk-flavored item about a cowboy. Top half is the one to watch.

"PETITE FLEUR" (2:42) [Hill & Range BMI—Bechet]
 "WILD CAT BLUES" (2:56) [Pickwick ASCAP—Williams, Waller]
 CHRIS BARBER'S JAZZ BAND (Laurie 3022)

● A Laurie master purchase of a smash European item, "Petite Fleur" figures to repeat its chart performance in the U.S. The song—composed by the great jazzist, Sidney Bechet—is Gallic flavored in its haunting melody, yet the performance here by the Barber outfit is a beautiful hybrid of Paris and New Orleans. Monty Sunshine's sweet clarinet work is the big sound factor. A side with great grow-on-you power that's going to be the next big chart import. Fats Waller's "Wild Cat Blues" is the upswing item on the bottom track.

● Rock artist Conn, who received play in the recent Life mag entertainment issue as one of rock 'n roll's aspiring young songsters, may well make the disk grade on his first outing for Decca, the highlight of which is the sharp rhythm performance on the "Dangerous Doll" bouncer. Working a multi-track bit, Conn knows the sock value of the number, and launches it to noteworthy teen-beat heights. Conn's aforementioned nation-wide publicity and quality of performance are squarely in the side's chart favor. Bottom half is another belt stint from the performer.

C "THE FIREMAN'S SONG (UP AND DOWN AND DOWN AND UP THE LADDER)" (1:56) [Ruco BMI—Rosen] Something about a fireman finding love at a fire.

JERRY MURAD'S HARMONICATS
 (Mercury 71396)

B+ "COCKTAILS FOR TWO CHA-CHA" (2:39) [Paramount ASCAP—Johnston, Coslow] The famed harmonica outfit struts smoothly to the favored Latin step on the ever-green. Integration of rhythm section and the harmonica sounds is excellent. Humor ending when boys supply the title strain of their big hit, "Peg 'O My Heart". Track can move.

B "HONEYMOON IN PUERTO RICO" (2:33) [Peer International BMI—Capo] Another cha-cha production embellished by a rich melody.

BILL and DOREE POST
 (Crest 1054)

B+ "LONELY" (2:25) [American BMI—Post, Post] The singing duo reads a plaintive, down-and-out beat-romantic that has solid teen performance and material merit. Blend by the two captures the bluesy nature of the affair. There's a sound here that could move out.

C+ "RAWHIDE" (2:06) [American BMI—Post, Post] Swift-running vocal work by the two on a number about the Old West.

NINO TEMPO
 (RCA Victor 7424)

B "15 GIRL FRIENDS" (1:46) [Northridge ASCAP—Tempo] A folk-ish rock item that seems to conjure up—title and tune-wise—"16 Tons" gets a sure-handed beat reading from Tempo and his particularly fine-sounding combo friends. Seems the fella has gals galore, but at disk's end the listener finds he's just been dreaming about such a fortunate social circumstance.

B "LOONIE 'BOUT JUNIE" (2:03) [Northridge ASCAP—Tempo] Tempo wraps out his own opus, which has been featured in the "Peter Gunn" TV series. Both Tempo and the combo display a pro beat way. Play on the rhyming title is effective. The kids have much to listen to here.

GLENN REEVES
 (Decca 30780)

B+ "BORN TO CRY" (2:05) [Buna BMI—Axton, Reeves] The country songster effectively middle-beats an above-board rockabilly item which ought to meet with solid teen acceptance. Session by the combo contains much in gimmick sound to keep the kids busy listening and dancing. Reeves delves well into the pop rock field here. Could move.

B "TARZAN" (2:33) [BMI] Rock sock account by Reeves on a familiar-sounding beat tune, excitingly beefed-up by jungle-like sounds from the combo-chorus. Lots of colorful teen goings on here.

JOY AND DAVID
 (Capitol 4106)

B "MY OH MY!" (1:57) [Allegro Music—Robert, Luke] Very tricky beat sounds from the English twosome and the Marty Slavin ork backing. The duo whips-up a fair-sized rock storm, while the accompaniment pops-up with all sorts of percussive and guitar workings.

C+ "WHOOPEE!" (2:00) [Allegro Music—Adams] Tempo tones down to a middle-beat, but gimmicks are still humorously present.

RAY SANDERS
 (Cullman 6405)

B "I'M SO AFRAID" (1:55) [Gaylord BMI—Sanders] Sanders nicely struts his uptempo rock stuff on a fair teen affair. Sounds from the percussion-featured combo and chorus are Big Beat polished. OK beat romp.

C+ "I CAN'T RESIST YOU" (2:15) [Gaylord BMI—Sanders] In a rock-romantic turn, the songster clings effectively to the sentimental offering.

B "THEME FROM 'THE PERFECT FURLOUGH' (A PERFECT ROMANCE)" [Northern ASCAP—Skinner, Lampert, Loring] The vocalist swings smartly on the tune-ful main-title from the forthcoming flick. Bud Johnson's ork-chorus support is brightly in line with the Berry rendition. Swingeroo for the deejays to delight in.

Organ and sax are featured. This is smart deejay work.

B "MY HEART IN PORTUGAL (Mon Coeur Au Portugal)" (2:36) [Kalith BMI—Yanne, Gaste] A colorful run-through on one of those picturesque European orchestral affairs. Sparkling session jocks should note, too.

FELICIA SANDERS

B "SHALL I TAKE MY HEART AND GO?" (2:55) [Ankerford ASCAP—Anderson, Kerr, Kerr, Ford] Fine ballad performance by the songstress on the top romancer from the "Goldilocks" musical. The support is simple at the start, but then reaches lush ork-chorus proportions about three-quarters of the way down. Class presentation for class programming.

B "TONIGHT" (Introduction: "SOMETHING'S COMING") (3:10) [G. Schirmer ASCAP—Bernstein, Sondheim] Interesting two-tune affair from the Leonard Bernstein score for "West Side Story" wherein Miss Sanders opens with the rhythmic "Something's Coming" and leads into the beautiful, soaring "Tonight". Again, a class date.

THE NIGHT OWLS

B "YOU SHOULDN'T OUGHTA DONE IT" (2:35) [Lowery BMI—Jenkins] Plenty of uptempo rock humor bits in this OK beat enterprise from the vocalists. An effort that makes with the sound kids can easily take to.

Marty Paich ork work takes things in an affably relaxed way. Pretty Ella offering sure to win over the class jocks.

B "DREAMS ARE MADE FOR CHILDREN" (2:40) [Fullarton ASCAP—David, Livingston] Knowing warmth by the chantress on a lovely item from the recent Shirley Temple TV'er, "Mother Goose."

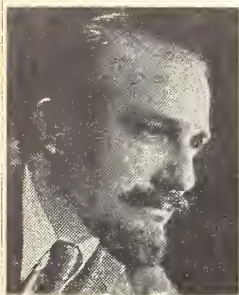

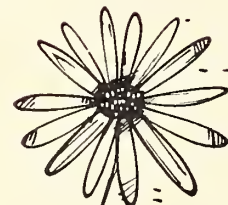

Roulette 2nd Ann'y Marked By Special Jan. Distrib-Dealer Deals

NEW YORK — Irv Jerome, Vice-President in charge of sales, announced last week that Roulette Records will celebrate its second anniversary and open 1959 with a special sales offer to its distributors, all record dealers, and the consumer. The offer will be in the form of a Restocking Sales Program, that is effective January 1st, and will run until January 31st. The program is divided into two parts and encompasses the following essential features.

Part I—During the month of January only, Roulette will offer distributors and dealers a 10% discount on the entire album catalog. This includes the label's divisions: Tico, Roost, Gee, and Rama, and their subsidiary, Co-Star Records.

There will be five specific albums that will not be included in the 10% discount offer. These five albums make up the second part of the company's Restocking Sales Program.

Part II—During the month of January only, Roulette will offer "Jimmie Rodgers Sings Folk Songs," "Basie"—Count Basie and His Orchestra, "A Man Ain't Supposed To Cry"—Joe Williams, "When Good Fellows Get Together"—Hugo & Luigi and Their Family Singers, and "Tyree Glenn At the Roundtable"; for the suggested retail price of \$2.98. This means, of course, that the consumer can purchase these five albums at \$1.00 less, and the price to the dealer and distributor will be based at this suggested \$2.98 price.

Irv Jerome stated "The five albums were not chosen at random, but because of the fact that they are the label's best-selling LP's, have tremendous sales potential, and all five have

shown every indication of being chart album sellers. A number of these albums have been right on the brink of breaking onto the best-seller lists, and it is certain that with a heavily concentrated promotion on all levels, and the sales that the reduction in price will harvest; and one or all of these five best-selling catalog LP's can land high on all the lists."

An all-out merchandising and promotional campaign is already getting under way to support the distributors and dealers during the Restocking Sales Program. Roulette has sent out window and counter displays, window streamers, and a consumer booklet for the dealer's counter. Also, the distributors will be supplied with a new catalog order and inventory control form as well as a special order pad on the five best-selling albums for their salesmen. An advertising schedule in the trade papers and consumer publications is set for January and the distributors will also receive co-op mats for local ad campaigns. For the radio stations and disk jockeys, Roulette will send out some 4,000 "Hit Album Highlights" LP's which will feature excerpts from the five key albums and thus stimulate renewed air play on these albums.

Irv Jerome concluded with the statement, "This program is our way of thanking the record-buying public, the dealers and our distributors, for their continual support of our product in the past two years. We expect to continue with a variety of sales programs throughout the coming year, and make 1959 the biggest year since Roulette's inception."

BBC is reputed to have paid Belafonte 75,000 dollars for exclusive TV shows to be drafted over the next five years. Belafonte will do from one to four shows a year under this contract.

This year's pantomimes feature mainly recording stars as leading attractions.

I hear that Cyril Stapleton may have a big hit with his waxing from the movie "The Inn Of The Sixth Happiness" on the London label.

Paul Anka returns for TV appearances and continental dates and he will be accompanied by his father.

Mercury Introduces Latest LP Sales Plan, "Operation Papoose"

CHICAGO—Mercury Records last week introduced its latest LP sales plan, called "Operation Papoose," a concept conceived and designed to further strengthen the stability of the retail operation by affording the dealer the dual opportunity of expanding his present sales potential while at the same time increasing his gross percentage of profit.

"Operation Papoose" begins on January 1, 1959, and will be in effect for a period of 45 days, ending on February 15th.

The Plan is divided into 3 separate phases. The first states that for every two \$3.98 12-inch Mercury long playing monaural records purchased by a dealer, he will receive one Mercury-Wing, economy-priced, long playing album of his choice. Phase two states that for every Mercury Long Playing Stereo Record purchased by a dealer, he will receive one Mercury-Wing long playing album of his choice. And thirdly, for every 12 Mercury-Wing long plays purchased by a dealer, from the company's first two releases of 24 albums, the dealer may select two additional Wing LP's from these releases at no charge. Mercury's line of Childcraft-Playcraft Wing long playing albums are also to be considered a part of phases 1, 2 and 3 of the foregoing.

The dealer may participate in any or all of the 3 phases. The percentage of gross profit varies slightly on each phase; 50.30 per cent on Phase 1, 53.47 per cent on phase 2, and 47 per

cent on phase 3). These figures average out to 50.25 per cent for a dealer who participates in all facets of the plan or an increase in profit of 12.25 per cent over the dealer's normal gross of 38 per cent. This is in addition to the expanded and extra sales that the dealer will receive by merchandising the stereo, monaural and economy-priced product of the Mercury line.

Mercury will further back up "Operation Papoose" with a highly developed program of display material, including a 22-inch by 28-inch "1812 Overture," 3-color, stereo display panel; individual stereo easel alphabet cards with album cover permanently mounted; a 48-inch by 8-inch stereo banner with Kleenstock applied to reverse side for display variations, a full-color 21-inch by 13-inch "1812" paper window streamer, a black and white stereo record brochure, "tag on" display cards that can be attached to standard Mercury easels, etc. In addition a dealer display contest will be held in conjunction with "Operation Papoose," whereby the best dealer display in a territory will win 50 free Mercury long-play albums.

Additional information on "Operation Papoose" has been sent to the dealer via a gigantic direct mail leaflet.

Tiomkin Suit Points Up Need For New Methods Of Handling Song-Infringement Claims

NEW YORK—New methods of handling song-infringement suits were aired last week as a result of such a suit against composer Dimitri Tiomkin in the New York Supreme Court, ending in a unanimous jury verdict for Tiomkin.

The suit was brought against Tiomkin by Leon Navarra, who claimed a melody of his, "Enchanted Cello," was used by Tiomkin as the source of "The High and the Mighty," a Tiomkin Academy Award winning tune.

Veteran musicologists Sigmund Spaeth and Deems Taylor, who were witnesses on Tiomkin's behalf during the trial, questioned the ability of a lay jury to handle cases where it was necessary to arrive at decisions requiring a technical musical knowledge. Spaeth said that cases involving song-infringement suits should be referred to the National Music Council, an organization representing various music organizations and settled by a "referee." Spaeth would make such settlements law under a Congressional act.

Arthur Driscoll, one of the attorneys at the trial representing John Wayne and Robert Fellows, producers of "The High and the Mighty" pic, viewed the high expense incurred by a defendant in such a suit, and suggested that the plaintiff be required—through law—to post a bond between \$25,000 to \$50,000 to be used to pay all court expenses should he lose the case.

Durgom-Katz Adds To Firm

NEW YORK—Durgom-Katz Associates, artists personal managers, have announced the addition of Tino Barzic to the firm. Barzic was formerly the personal manager of the Dorsey Brothers and also managed the Art Mooney and Tex Beneke bands.

His addition to Durgom-Katz is the initial move in the firm's expansion program.

The Durgom-Katz client roster includes Marguerite Piazza, Jaye P. Morgan, Bobby Van, The Morgan Brothers, the Four Aces, Enzo Stuarti, Jules Munshin, Vicki Benet and several others.

Urania's 1959 Plans

BELLEVILLE, N. J.—As announced by Bill Nielsen, new Director of Sales, Urania Records under the ownership of Sieg Bart, will take long strides in 1959 to become a major factor in both the classical and popular album fields.

1958 is proving the largest sales year in the label's history, with November and December the two all-time high-volume producers. Outstanding items that caused this late-year upsurge were: the entire stereo catalog, now numbering over thirty albums; highlight recordings such as the Pope Pius set; the first recording of Offenbach's "La Grande Duchesse de Gerolstein"; Barbara Cook's "Songs of Perfect Propriety"; Henny Youngman's Horse and Auto Race; Saint Saens Symphony No. 3; Offenbach's "Gaité Parisienne"; etc.

"Sales and distribution have improved greatly with Decca Distributing Corp. taking over 29 markets," said Nielsen. Urania now has only nine "independents."

Negotiations are under way for a general strengthening of foreign affiliations.

Urania's catalog has been deleted by close to 40 per cent, leaving a "streamlined, fast-moving repertory including many Urania exclusives."

This remaining catalog will be exploited heavily in January. As Urania feels that much of its repertoire has not been adequately exposed and exploited, all emphasis will be on existing items. No new releases will be issued in January.

A 10 per cent discount on both the monaural and stereo catalogs is being offered to distributors. It is understood that this discount will be passed on to qualifying dealers.

Heavy advertising will back the program, as will eased displays, new catalogs, salesmen's kits, etc.

Of interest in Urania's stand on shipping of merchandise only through its regular distributors and of discontinuing disposing of deleted items through channels that have in the past hampered dealers' and distributors' efforts.

Within a week Urania will announce the first group of artists signed to the label on exclusive contracts. This is in line with the company's plans to record, merchandise and promote artists and orchestras known to the American public.

"Throughout the entire year, the label will offer well-coordinated sales programs, designed to put the label at the top," said Nielsen. "From its newly designed trade-mark (to appear in February) to its new offices, everything about Urania is NEW."

"Excellent," says The Cash Box.

Disk Jockey Tour



NEW YORK—Michael Todd, Jr. took the disk jockey route this month in a flash coast-to-coast trip to introduce his first record produced under the Everest label. The new album is entitled "Mike Todd's Broadway", a galaxy of top hit tunes from the late famous showman's Broadway shows, beginning with the "Hot Mikado" and ending with "Around The World". The cameraman caught Mike Jr. with Dick Shepard during his all-night WNEW record show and early in the AM they started a contest for listeners. Best letters about "80 Days" will win Mike Todd's Broadway album and a first release of "Around The World In 80 Days" in words and music. The latter is the second in a total of six albums planned by Todd, with music from Todd productions, all to be made by Everest.

Siegel Scans Europe Scene; Sets Deal To Release Telefunken Of Madrid In U. S.

NEW YORK—Sidney Siegel, prexy of Seeco Records, just back from a trip to London, Paris, Rome and Madrid to arrange for 1959 distribution policies with his European affiliates, declared last week that the record business in Europe is healthy and at the same time announced that he will be releasing Telefunken of Madrid in this country on the Seeco label.

Siegel said that, while there is a good deal of talk about stereophonic sound in Europe, there is almost no business in stereo records on the retail level. "Not one of our European affiliates even brought up the subject of stereo in discussing our releasing, promotion and distribution plans for the new year."

"Throughout the world there seems to be a boom in Latin American music. In England (where Seeco is distributed by Oriole Records) the cha-cha has taken over in the dance halls and cabarets. The LP business there is booming and the twelve packages that we released in time for the holiday season more than lived up to our hopes. The leaders for the line are 'Fiesta De Toros', Elsa Maxwell, Celia Cruz and 'Cha-Cha-Cha' Volumes I and II.

"France seems to have received the confidence that it was lacking a while back due to the stable government they now have under De Gaulle. The result is a growing buying urge that is reflected in great prosperity for the record business. Leon Kaba, the head of Vogue Records (Seeco's distributor in France, Belgium and Holland) has expanded his activities enormously and we will now go through Vogue into Germany.

"Last year," Siegel continued, "Italian music was all the rage in France. This year, they have developed a taste for Latin American music and the business we are doing through Vogue has increased 150% over 1957. In France, our big sellers have been Lola Flores, Celia Cruz, Sonora Mantancera and the 'Cha-Cha' sets. As a

matter of fact, Kaba told me that we were one of his top sellers.

"Our operation through Durium of Italy is brand new. They have issued only six of our albums so far. The ones that are currently moving the fastest are 'Tonight With Jose Melis', 'Skitch Henderson Palys Latin American Favorites' and 'Dancing At The Tavern On The Green'. We've got the Durium line in South America and currently they have three hits there, Marino Marini's 'Come Prima', his new album and the packages of prize-winning tunes from the San Remo music festival.

"Top man in the Telefunken setup is Herman Zander. The heads of the record division are Ranier Sanchez and Senor R. Molla. They know only a few English phrases and most of them are taken straight from the music business. It's kind of peculiar to hear long serious speeches in German and Spanish filled with words like 'swingin', 'all-out', 'crazy', 'greatest' and 'terrific'.

"Actually, though, 'greatest' is a good description of the record business in Spain. There has been a tremendous influx of inexpensive players sold almost at cost. This has created a giant increase in the number of record buyers in Spain. As a result, the sales potential there is going up faster than it is anywhere else in the world."

Siegel, closed a deal with Frederico Moreno Toroba, leading band leader in Spain, to record albums of fados in Portugal, flamencos and jotas, a kind of native Spanish dance music rarely heard in this country. Toroba will produce ten of these directly for Seeco.

CHICAGO — The Diamonds, Mercury Records' songsters, returned to activity in this country December 27th after a four month tour of the Pacific area.

On that date, the Group appeared on the Dick Clark A.B.C. Network Television Show out of New York City. The Diamonds used the occasion to perform their latest single "Walking Along".

The Diamonds' current alignment of personnel now includes: Dave Somerville and Mike Douglas, the two original members, both of whom hail from Toronto, John Felten of Seattle, Washington and Evan Fisher of Hollywood, California.

Felten and Fisher replaced Bill Reed and Tedd Kowalski. Reed left the group to get married and Kowalski returned to college to work for his Master's Degree in Engineering.

When Reed and Kowalski left the group last fall, The Diamonds' Manager, Nat Goodman, decided to cancel all bookings, rather than replace it temporarily with whomever he could find in a hurry. Goodman stashed Somerville and Douglas away at the Knickerbocker Hotel in Hollywood and then proceeded to methodically scour all over America in an effort to find the best men available. His travels took him throughout the entire country, yet he finally found the "missing Diamonds" close at hand on the West Coast.

Once the foursome was geographically assembled, Goodman and The Diamonds began to re-vamp, re-write, and re-vitalize its vocal arrangements and night club routines.

After two months of constant rehearsing, Goodman felt that the group was ready and in mid-November, booked it for a tour of the Pacific area that included stop-overs in Melbourne and Sydney, Australia; Hong Kong; and Honolulu, Hawaii. Leslie Announces \$5.95 "Off-Broadway" Label; Lutz To Be General Mgr.

NEW YORK—Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick Sales (Design, Stereo-Spectrum and Cricket Records) last week announced the formation of a fourth label to be called alternately "Off-Broadway" and "on-Broadway", depending on the source of the material. The line will be priced at \$5.95 and made available only in the "better retail record stores".

Abbot Lutz, who is currently Product Director for Pickwick Sales and will continue in that capacity, has been named General Manager in charge of A & R and Sales for the new "Off-Broadway" label.

Leslie revealed that an entirely new department has been set up within Pickwick Sales. He stated, "In line with our policy of separation, this department will be entirely independent of the rest of our operation. Abbot Lutz is now in the process of lining up national distribution, signing artists and making all arrangements for the new firm. We have long felt that a high-priced, extremely sophisticated label would be the addition that we need in covering all phases of the record business. We now have product that sells at every price from \$5.95 for 'Off-Broadway', to \$2.98 for Stereo-Spectrum, \$1.49 for Design and 25 cents for Cricket singles. 'Off-Broadway' is frankly intended for the connoisseur: We anticipate a very select audience for these recordings which will receive a specialized publicity, promotion, advertising merchandising and sales treatment as befits material that is aimed at the 'class' market and is entirely distinctive and unusual. 'Off-Broadway' is a prestige label. Abbott Lutz has both the feeling and taste for sophisticated record production. He has the all-around executive ability and experience needed to run a successful recording firm. In every way, Abbot Lutz was the ideal choice for the job."

Prior to joining Pickwick Sales, Abbot Lutz was sales manager of Seeco Records, sales manager of Urania Records and dealer merchandise manager of the Columbia "LP Record Club". Lutz also worked with Columbia's 12-inch kiddie album line acting as head of both A & R and sales. He is a graduate of Trinity College of Music in London, England.

Lutz produced the successful "Take Five" album, a recording of the hit revue at Julius Monk's "Upstairs At The Downstairs" cabaret. The new recording of a Julius Monk revue, "Demi-Dozen", just released this week, was also produced by Lutz.

Lutz said, Off-Broadway will have only a few "carefully planned" releases a year due to the difficulty in securing the kind of highly specialized material we are seeking.

"Where the average recording company puts out anywhere from ten to thirty albums a month, we will be satisfied to restrict our output to two to ten carefully planned releases during 1959.

Mercury Sees 1959 As Greatest Potential Volume Year

CHICAGO — "1959; the greatest potential volume year in the history of the record industry," was the underlying theme of the recently concluded semi-annual Sales Meeting of the Mercury Record Corporation.

In order to allow Mercury's entire family of distributors, saelsmen, and promotion managers to attend the meeting with a minimum of time lost during the busy Christmas sales season, the meeting was divided into 3 identical segments, held concurrently in New York, Chicago and San Francisco.

Keynote speakers, President Irving Green in New York, Vice President Irwin Steinberg in Chicago, and Vice President Art Talmadge in San Francisco, sparked the meetings by proudly noting that Mercury has just completed the firm's most lucrative dollar volume quarter in its 15 year history and that despite a serious mid-year economic recession Mercury nonetheless managed a 15% increase in total yearly volume over the previous corresponding period. The speakers further asserted that 1959 would even surpass the closing periods of 1958 in business volume; that the advent of stereo combined with product and promotion inventiveness would make 1959 the most staggering, fruitful year in the record industry's history. That increased population, more buying power, infatuation with the magic of stereo, more leisure time, and the ever increasing stability of the dealer would further enhance the bright future ahead.

Attention was then taken off the past and present and focused on the future with the announcement of Mercury's most ambitious sales plan to date, "Operation Papoose" (see other story this issue) designed primarily to enable the retail dealer to regain a greater degree of business stability in 1959 by realizing an extra percentage of profit from the heavily anticipated album merchandise sales of the forthcoming year. The advent and development of stereo product and an ever growing mar-

azines and books. In addition several guest speakers provided the gathered Mercury personnel with an outside-the-company viewpoint and the subject, "Significant Trends In The Record Industry in 1958", and also on the subject, "Controlled Radio Programming".

Besides the introduction of "Operation Papoose" to the meeting, other subjects covered were "Popular Singles", a review of current important releases and also a preview of January releases; "Promotion And The Distributor"; "Advertising", a review; "An Introduction To New Popular and Jazz Long Play Merchandise"; and the "Mercury-Wing Economy Priced Line of LP Merchandise".

The day prior to the New York meeting, a special promotional seminar was held for Mercury's entire staff of promotion managers. Ken Myers, Director of Promotion and Michael Kerr, Radio and Television Stations Relations Manager helmed the meeting. The ever changing role of the promotion man in today's record industry and new roads of promotion was discussed.

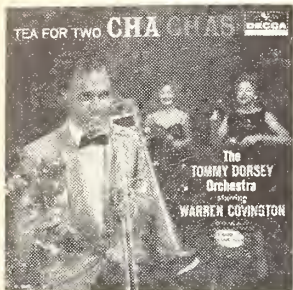

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"TEA FOR TWO CHA CHA" — The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra Starring Warren Covington—Decca DL 8842 (Monaural & Stereo)

The Covington directed Tommy Dorsey ork has been one of the outfits at the head of the cha-cha class in singles ("Tea For Two Cha Cha", "I Want To Be Happy Cha Cha") and it's likely that the sales response to these slick cha-cha rendezvous—including the two hits—will be hefty. Included here are such oldies on the Latin beat as "Dinah", "Dardenella", "I Still Get Jealous" and the cha-cha "standard", "Together 1-2-3". Sure to keep the cash-register humming.



"THE YOUNG FRANKIE AVALON"—Chancellor CHL-5002

Currently getting chart coin on "I'll Wait For You", the natural teen songster has what should be an easy-sell item to the youngsters here. Variety is the keynote of the Avalon vocals as the artist soft-beats, belts, cha-cha's a collection of standards and rockers set to these teen-understanding arrangements. Sides include "Fever", "The One I Love", "Hold Me", "Teach Me Tonight" and "Hallelujah I Love Her So". Figure chart sales on this one.



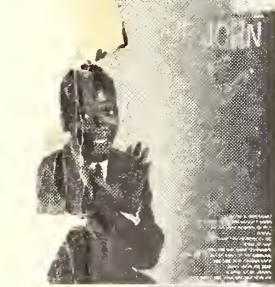
"FLOWER DRUM SONG"—Various Artists—Bell BLP 13 (Monaural & Stereo)

This is a thoroughly professional offering of the Rodgers-Hammerstein "Flower Drum" score (only several songs omitted) and at a \$1.98 (for the monaural version) it's a natural for budget-minded traffic. The performers and ork arrangements are bright. One of the artists—Cely Carillo—understudies Miyoshi Umeki in the show. Other singers include June Erickson, Edna McGriff, Jean Arnold, Wayne Sherwood and Artie Malvin. Jimmy Carrol heads the fine ork-chorus work. The Marshal Barer liner notes round out the plot well and wittily.



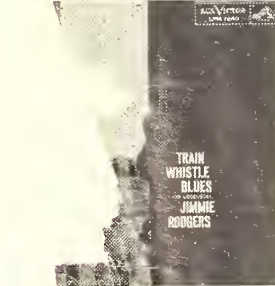
"HOWARD LANIN PLAYS 'FLOWER DRUM SONG' FOR DANCING"—ABC Paramount ABC-272

One of the first ork presentations of the score of the new Rodgers-Hammerstein musical, the waxing displays the melodic songs in bright, society-beat fashion. Nine of the tunes are heard on separate tracks, while two medleys at the end of side repeat tunes heard separately. Strong first showing for Howard Lanin (brother of famed Lester Lanin) on ABC-Paramount. Deck should ring the bell with society ork admirers.



"MISTER LITTLE WILLIE JOHN"—King 603

This round-up of previous single releases by the rock 'n roll champ hands dealers strong stuff for the teen shelf. Performing in a variety of rock ways—from a sweet-beat to a rock romp—the artist covers such items as "You're A Sweetheart", "Spasms", "Let's Rock While The Rockin's Good" and "A Little Bit Of Loving".



"TRAIN WHISTLE BLUES"—Jimmie Rodgers—RCA Victor LPM-1640

There's vast appeal in this collection of sixteen performances by the late Southern blues and ballad artist, who ranks as one of the all-time greats in his field. Recorded between 1928 and 1933 (two takes just two days before his death on May 26, 1933), the Rodgers' sessions here are remarkable examples of his ability to draw songs from a variety of folk sources (i.e. blues, back-mountain, country) and render them with artful authority. Sound holds-up fine. Memorable collection for Rodgers' many admirers.



"A HANDFUL OF STARS"—Bill Snyder, Piano—with Instrumental Accompaniment—Decca DL 8734

Keyboard stylist Snyder—long a big mood factor at Decca—cuddles a bill of ballad ever-greens with the word "star" in their titles. Backed subtly by a rhythm section, Snyder's performances here involve such staples as "Stars In My Eyes", "When You Wish Upon A Star", "Star Eyes" and "Count Every Star". Better mood work for home or station turntables.



"BORDER CORRIDA"—Recorded At The Bull-Ring, Tijuana, Mexico—Liberty LB 5001

Here's about all bullfight and/or bullfight music aficionados could ask for on wax. The two-disk set is an exciting on-the-spot recording of a day at the bullfights in Tijuana, Mexico, including the band concerts and a narrative on six bullfight events. Narrators are news broadcaster and former bullfight announcer Hank Weaver and official Tijuana bull-ring announcer Ray Garcia. A definitive issue on bullfighting.



"OPEN HOUSE"—Stan Rubin and His Big Band—Featuring The Tigertown Five—Coral CRL 57238 (Monaural & Stereo)

Rubin, a big Dixieland figure nitery and disk-wise since his days at Princeton—adopts both a society-beat and Dixieland atmosphere here, naturally leaving the business man's bounce to his Big Band and the New Orleans' romps to his Tigertown five. The big band swings well on the evergreen romancers, while his combo belts its Dixieland favorites ("Muskrat Ramble", "Dixie", "When The Saints Go Marching In").



"SOUTH SEAS ADVENTURE"—Original Sound-track—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1899 (Monaural & Stereo)

The first original soundtrack on Audio Fidelity, the Alex North score for the latest Cinerama flick plus a host of original South Sea sounds and songs generally fit nicely into the label's idea of disk entertainment at a high hi-fi level of sound. Exotic percussion sounds, group singing, provocative orchestral interludes all add up to a fine musical look at the Pacific islands encountered. Could turn out to be one of the diskery's hottest entries.



"RADIO CITY MUSIC HALL"—Ashley Miller, Organist—Cabot CAB-507 (Monaural & Stereo)

Organist Miller—who holds the reins of New York's Radio City Music Hall's commanding theatre organ—really makes the instrument sing here. Though working with an organ that can produce a massive sound, Miller's playing has lightness, flexibility and notable melodic regard. His ten-number program varies from "La Vie En Rose" to the "Ritual Fire Dance". A treat stereo or monaural-wise.



"SWINGIN' HI...FI"—Al Anthony, Organ and other Instruments—Liberty LRP 3090

Organist Anthony, previously via a Dot issue, makes a versatile and listenable debut on Liberty, performing not only on his accustomed instrument, but the host of supporting devices (piano, harp-sichord, and vibrachord), thanks to overdubbing magic. Most of the tunes are designed for glitter and show (i.e. "Sabre Dance", "Vanessa", "Tropical Merengue"), and—to be sure—the artist is vividly at home with them. Fine sound. Slick musical gymnastics.



"HOLIDAY SONGS OF ISRAEL"—Geula Gill—Accompanied by Dov Seltzer and Group—Folkways FC 7738

The Israeli songstress is a charming vehicle for this delightful collection of fifteen Israeli songs in celebration of nine Jewish Holidays (i.e. "Rosh Hashana", "Sabbath", "Passover", "Chanuka"). Spirited and rhythmic—the lovely Sabbath Day song, "My Father Lit The Candles", a reverent exception—the selections are sung with obvious authority and regard by Miss Gill, who is gayly supported by accordionist Dov Seltzer and his rhythm group. Booklet translates the Hebrew-sung lyrics. Another fine Folkways contribution to the folk-song catalog.



"HUMPTY DUMPTY'S ALBUM FOR LITTLE CHILDREN"—Bud Collyer—RCA Victor LBY-1015

Broadcasting personality Collyer gives the kiddies lots of variety on this grab-bag of children's songs, stories and games. Besides seeming to enjoy what he's doing, his voice is easy to understand. He carries a colorful lyrics well, too. Tie-in with the mag allows 75¢ savings on the publication. Fit

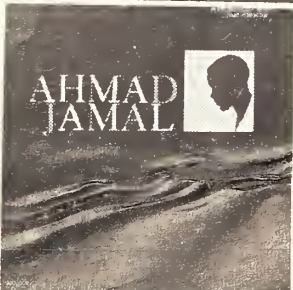
Album Reviews

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



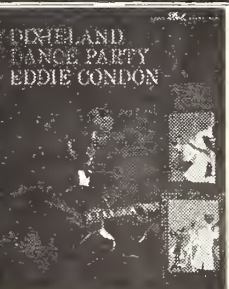
"AHMAD JAMAL"—Argo LP 636 (Monaural & Stereo)

The set has already become a sell-out. But Not For Me" effort. Here again the Jamal trio works an engagingly inventive trick on a mostly evergreen bill, covering various jazz tempi, including an Afro-Cuban stint on the package opener. Those dealers who have not as yet hopped on the "Ahmad Jamal" bandwagon should very soon.



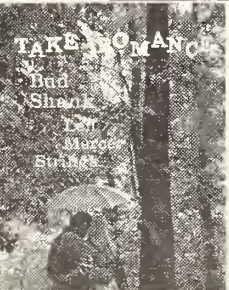
"LATIN FOR LOVERS"—Cal Tjader and Strings—Arrangements by Jack Weeks—Fantasy 3279 (Monaural & Stereo)

Vibraphonist Tjader, one of jazzdom's leading importers of the Latin beat, has a beaut here. A class crop of ballads receive lovely, subtle, softspoken Latin arrangements from Tjader, the string section and flute-drum support. Items beautifully patterned by arranger Weeks include "Spring Is Here", "Alone Together", "Stella By Starlight" and "Skylark". Jazz, mood, Latin work or what have you, the sounds are superb.



"DIXIELAND DANCE PARTY"—Eddie Condon—Dot DLP 3141

The vet Dixieland guitarist heads a stellar lineup in an ebullient, great sounding medley-fashioned Dixieland tour. The boys—they include Peanuts Hucko, Bud Freeman, Billy Butterfield, Gene Schroeder, George Wettling and others of note—sizzle through the likes of such New Orleans' standbys as "Sugar Foot Stomp", "High Society", "That's A Plenty", "Nobody's Sweetheart" plus eighteen others. One of the better Dixieland showings around.



"I'LL TAKE ROMANCE"—Bud Shank, Alto Sax and Flute—Len Mercer Strings—World Pacific WP-1251

Cut when Shank toured Italy earlier this year, the deck is a glowing jazz-mood affair, with Shank beautifully coddling a class bill on either alto sax or flute and a string and rhythm section (bass and drums) adding nicely to Shank's sentiments. Songs include "Embraceable You", "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes", "These Foolish Things", "How Deep Is The Ocean". A specially appealing jazz-mood meet.



"PEE WEE RUSSELL PLAYS PEE WEE"—Ster O Craft RTN-105

Ster O Craft—until now a stereo tape name and a supplier of stereo 45's (it only produces stereo products) to juke box operators—will be a strong consumer stereo LP name with the likes of this excellent sounding stereo issue. Clarinetist Russell and a fine, four-man crew (Nat Pierce, George Wettling, Walter Page and Steve Jordan) cover an eight-tune bill of standards and originals with an introspective and socko Dixieland-ish poise. Outstanding stereo sound greatly adds to "live" combo presence. Dealers can easily sell stereo with such striking issues.



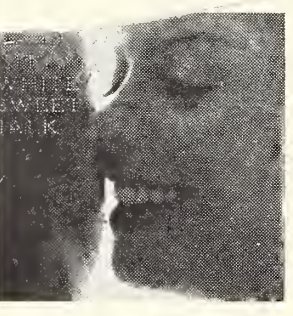

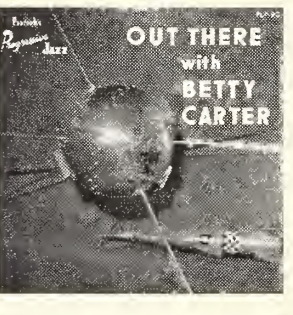
"THE ARRIVAL OF VICTOR FELDMAN"—Stan Levey-Scott La Faro—Contemporary C 3549

The waxing is a fine feature showcase for the English born pianist-vibraharpist who's been around other Contemporary issues. Under the cozy trio circumstances here, Feldman's creative uptempo and ballad way show up well as the dominating instrumental factor (either keyboard or vibraharp). The ten sessions—standards and originals—cover lots of jazz ground as far as putting Feldman to the test on various tempi is concerned. Bright support from drummer Stan Levey and bassist Scott La Faro. A feature arrival by jazzist will want.



"SWEET TALK"—Kitty White—Roulette R-5200

Jazz vocal fans will welcome Miss White's return to the disk scene here. On demanding material requiring a variety of vocal shadings and tempi, the stylist hops, swings and sentimentalizes with utmost taste and expression. She's in luck when it comes to instrumental support, for a smart crew of jazzists has been assembled to skillfully follow her moods (artists include Alvin Stoller, Red Callender, Benny Carter and Harry Edison). Some of the bill: "Where Or When", "Lazy Afternoon", "Of Thee I Sing" and "Alone Together".



"OUT THERE WITH BETTY CARTER"—Peacock PLP-90

The former Lionel Hampton ork vocalist brings jazz vivacity and sensitivity to a program of varied jump tunes and romantics. Backed by a ten man outfit on one side, a six man crew on the other, Miss Carter carries slick be-bop taste on the likes of "You're Driving Me Crazy" and "Bab's Blues" and fine ballad poise on such durables as "Something Wonderful" and "But Beautiful". Jazz instrumentalists include Kenny Dorham, Sam Jones, Wynton Kelly and femme trombonist, Melba Liston. Smart jazz vocals.

OFFENBACH: Gaité Parisienne—KHACHATURIAN: Gayne Ballet Suite—Boston Pops Orchestra—Arthur Fiedler, Conductor—LM 2267 (Monaural & Stereo)

Here's a dazzling new Boston Pops version of "Gaité Parisienne" by the Boston Pops—the older rendition being one of Victor's great classical sales items—that will not only bring a hoard of classical purchasers in its monaural form, but which is likely to become a standard entry in the stereo catalog. Of great interest, too, is the short companion opus, "Gayne Ballet Suite", another buoyant work full of orchestral wizardry. What a classical shelf prize!



RACHMANINOFF: Concerto No. 3—Byron Janis, Pianist—Boston Symphony—Charles Munch, Conductor—RCA Victor LM-2237

The young American pianist has been making well-received concert appearances across the nation, a factor which brings considerable purchaser appeal to this fine display of romanticism on the Rachmaninoff opus (the composer favored this work over his more popular second piano concerto). Glowing sound. Should be a feature of classical shelf display.



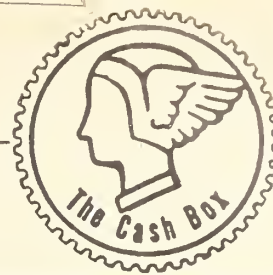

Weston indicated that in a few weeks preliminary nomination ballots will be sent to all members of NARAS in Los Angeles and New York.

The actual April date for the televised awards presentation has not been determined, nor has a final decision been reached on the network facilities that will carry the telecast.

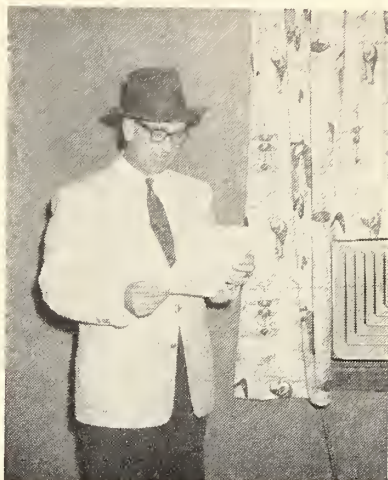

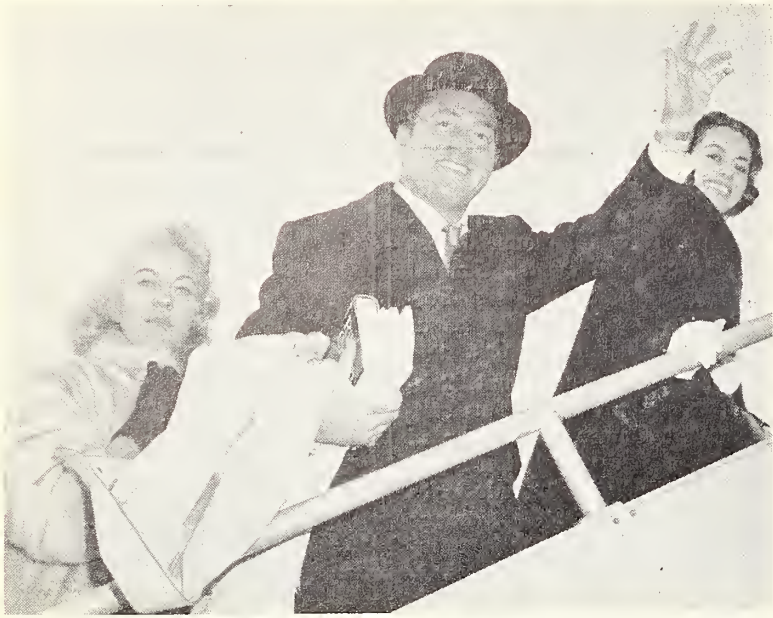

NEW YORK—Eli Oberstein, president of Rondo Records, announced last week that since its inception in June of 1958, the company has shown a net profit of almost \$250,000. "This is extremely gratifying", Oberstein stated, "because there are certain initial expenses in launching a new label which are non-recurring. In the 35 years that I have been in the record business I have never seen an operation as instantly successful as this one. Now that we have developed volume because of the acceptance given to the new line, we know that our operating overhead will be appreciably lessened and thus raise our 'per album' profit margin."

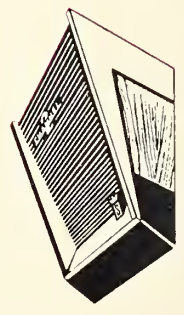

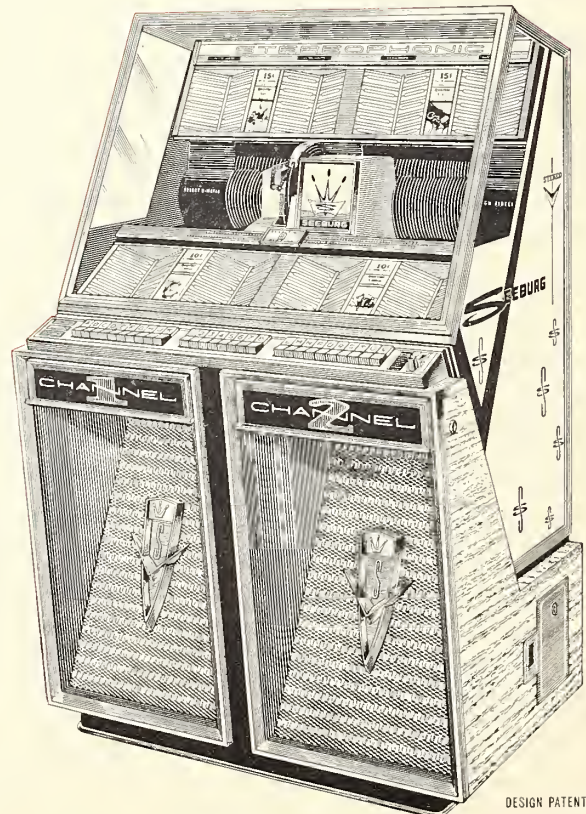

The Year Operators MUST Set Their Houses In Order

As 1959 approaches, business, financial and governmental economy experts look into their crystal balls—and offer their predictions for the new year.

It isn't necessary to highlight their opinions, but it is quite obvious to all reading their newspapers and listening to radio or TV that OPTIMISM has hit its highest level in a number of years.

Dun & Bradstreet recently polled 1548 executives. 72% forecast higher sales, with only 4% predicting declines. "This overwhelming belief that sales will be up in 1959 reflects a more optimistic viewpoint than we have uncovered since 1955", stated this firm. "During the current questioning", the business reporting service said, "businessmen were cheered by numerous reports that over-all business activity was steadily moving upward from the recession low of last April."

But—what about the coin machine business?

Regardless of its own particular internal business problems, the coin machine industry stands to ride along with any general business upward surge. General business improvement means more employment and more wages. Coin operated equipment of all kinds will get its share of the general public's spending. So, on general observation, our industry can look to 1959 optimistically for increased business.

However, to get right into the problem of our coin machine business—will the operator be prepared to take advantage of a more liberal spending public? The Investment Bankers Association of America, meeting in Florida, heard one of its members predict that a record high level of consumer income would propel the economy to new heights. One of his statements struck us as hitting close to the core of what operators must give their utmost consideration. "The pressure of competition" stated this banker, "and of rising labor costs will force most American concerns to scrap or modernize much of their existing plant and equipment."

We feel that the operator must not only give his attention to scrapping outmoded and obsolete equipment, but also must scrap any outmoded and obsolete business methods. If he doesn't do so, 1959 might be the year in which the pressure of competition from those who do, will bring him to the brink of disaster.

We feel that the operator who keeps step with advanced business methods as well as with top equipment will, not only demolish his competition, but stands to reap a harvest of profits in an American economy which has led the world to carry it to new heights.

C. M. BIZ SHOULD ORGANIZE LOCAL AND NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS PROGRAMS

A great many thousands of words have been written by **The Cash Box** over the past 17 years about Public Relations.

Of course, the consistent editorial pounding, as well as reports of public relations program of individual coinmen have had its effect. Thru the examples of public relations efforts of some in the trade, others have followed. However, overall, not a great deal has been done—and nothing at all on a national scale.

On a national level, there aren't too many programs the trade can join in one concerted effort. But it isn't necessary to have many of these. One or two would be practical, and would bring the industry great glory—from the general public and press, where it is most needed. The two programs, to our way of thinking, which could be utilized to the greatest benefit are "The March Of Dimes" and the "PAL" (Police Athletic League). Both these projects have had the cooperation of the coin trade in past years, and both have proven most successful.

"The March Of Dimes", a program which has been suggested by **The Cash Box** over the past several years is now getting under way. Coinmen contribute the collections from their equipment to the Polio Foundation. Signs are set above each machine with the notice "All collections from this machine during this week (or on this day) go to the March Of Dimes". The operator, of course, cannot make a complete collection during this short period, so he strikes an average and sends (or presents) a check. The resultant favorable publicity from the general public and press has been most gratifying in past years, and can always be beneficial.

The "PAL" program, suggested and effectuated by Willie Blatt of Miami Beach, Florida, with the cooperation

of his fellow operators, is another public relations program which has brought the industry great commendation, both from public officials and the press. The "PAL" program is one which can be started in every city or community thruout the nation, and is not limited to one day, or one month—but can be carried out thruout the entire year.

Both of these projects have a tremendous dramatic appeal to the public—one, to effect a cure for a dread disease, as well as the care of unfortunate crippled people; and the other, to assist the youth of our nation to a better future.

It would be of greater advantage to the coin machine industry if either one of these programs (or both) were undertaken as a national program. Some day, we hope they will.

However, until a complete, nationwide program is organized, it is up to the individual operator—or local association. It is the opinion of most of the coinmen to whom we have spoken, that the public relations effort must come from the individual, and then will grow into a national program. So we make this plea to one and all. Start a public relations program in your area right now. The benefits cannot be estimated—but they are there.

If the public, officials and press can be educated over the years as to how our industry functions, and that it is made up of honest, hard working, charitable, typical small businessmen—then, the industry will have nothing to fear of adverse publicity, which might take place once in a while. Our friends would say "This news story doesn't refer to the coin machine people we know—they're all wonderful people. It reports only about some one individual, and he's the bad apple in the barrel."

Million Factory Workers Receive Wage Hike

Factory Pay Climbs to Record Level

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Ewan Clague, Labor Statistics Commissioner, reported this week that factory workers' take-home pay rose to a new record last month.

The rise in the Government's living cost index brought a cent an hour pay-boost to about one million workers under escalator contracts hinged to the index.

The bureau said spendable earnings of factory production workers—the Government's monthly spot checks on worker earnings—rose to new records of \$78.41 a week for the worker heading a family of four. It reached

\$70.93 for the single worker.

This is about \$1.30 a week higher than in October and about \$3 a week higher than in November a year ago.

The bureau also stated that the factory worker's buying power (his earnings relating to living costs) rose by 1½ per cent in November.

The workers affected by this increase were in the steel, aluminum and meat packing industries. Another group of 80,000 workers in scattered industries, including some municipal transportation systems, will receive varying increases under a quarterly adjustment.

Baltimore Ops To Hold 11th Annual Affair Feb. 1

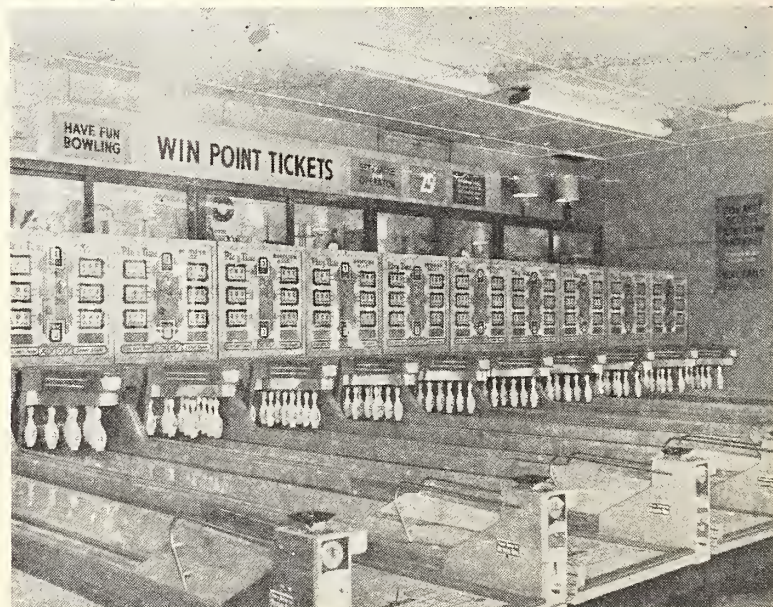

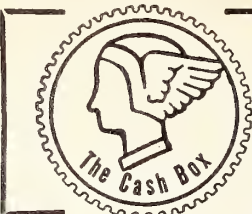
