The jubilant air at Coed Records is evident in the above picture. Less than ten months ago, Adam Wade (center) was a bio-chemist on the staff of scientist Jonas Salk. Today he is one of the industry's most promising young talents with three successive chart making hits under his belt—"Tell Her For Me," "Ruby" and his current hit "I Can't Help It." The excitement in the Coed offices is due to the reaction from disk jockeys and distributors to Wade's first album release, "And Then Came Adam." The songster is shown with George Paxton, president, and Marvin Cane, vice-president of Coed Records. These two men, also highly successful in the field of music publishing and management, played an important role in Wade's rise to prominence as an artist.

Wade last week completed a stint at the Town Casino in Buffalo and is booked right through the summer at prominent clubs around the country.

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

"RUN SAMPSON RUN" (2:30) "YOU MEAN EVERYTHING TO ME" (2:32)
[Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield] [Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield]
NEIL SEDAKA (RCA Victor 7781)

Both "Run Sampson Run" and "You Mean Everything To Me" should soon be added to the talented Victor songster's hit chain, which now includes "Stairway To Heaven" and "Oh Carol." Altho different as day and night, they're both loaded with smash potential. Former's a country-styled, happy-go-lucky thumper while the latter's from the big, dramatic beat-ballad school. Fabulous Stan Applebaum ork-chorus assists for Neil's great piping on both ends. Release is a Nevins-Kirshner production.

"THE BRIGADE OF BROKEN HEARTS" (2:18)

[Sequence, Pambill ASCAP—Ballard, Tobias]

"TWINS" (1:41) [Charles N. Daniels, Pambill ASCAP—Schroeder, McFarland]

PAUL EVANS (Guaranteed 210)

The "Brigade Of Broken Hearts" shall soon be marching in Evans' rapidly-growing parade of hits. It's a fife and drum march-jumper with a tearful set of lyrics that Evans grooves in coin-catching style. Identical "Twins" are giving Paul trouble on the tantalizing up beat dual-track flip portion.

"DEVIL OR ANGEL" (2:15) "SINCE I MET YOU BABY" (2:19)
[Progressive BMI—Carter] [Progressive BMI—Hunter]

BOBBY VEE (Liberty 55270)

Toss up this release and you'll come up a winner with either end. Both are revivals of short-while back clicks, revived by Bobby Vee (who just stirred up attention with "One Last Kiss") and both are tailor-made for the teen trade. One's a beat-ballad styling of the Clovers' "Devil Or Angel" while the other's a soft shuffle treatment of Ivory Joe Hunter's "Since I Met You Baby." Get with 'em!

"THE OLD OAKEN BUCKET" (2:43) [Court ASCAP—Drake]
"THESE ARE THE THINGS YOU ARE" (2:07) [Bowie BMI—Nichols]
TOMMY SANDS (Capitol 4405)

Sands and ork slickly swing a new, Darin-type version of "The Old Oaken Bucket," the ancient which lends itself to the updated treatment here. In the current teen-swingtime groove, side can prove of chart note. Coupler is a haunting affectionate in tender vocal-ork-chorus hands. Eye the top-half.

"A LOVER'S PRAYER" [Trga—Weissman, Lewis]

"NEVER LET ME GO" [Lion BMI—Scott]

ROY HAMILTON (Epic 9398)

Chances are Roy Hamilton will climb back into the winner's circle with his powerful performance of "A Lover's Prayer." It's an ultra-lovely beat-ballad affair on which Roy's full, rich tones come across with telling effect. Superb Chuck Sagle choral-ork support. "Never Let Me Go" is a beautiful ballad-with-a-mild beat love affair that features another fine performance by Roy and Chuck's crew. Can also happen.

"IT'S THE TALK OF THE TOWN" (2:25)

[Joy ASCAP—Livingston, Symes, Nieburg]

"WITH YOU" (2:31) [Marble ASCAP—Villa, Conte]

ROYAL TEENS (Capitol 4402)

Fine teen song team—with such clicks as "Short Shorts" and "Believe Me" behind them—can sell the kids with an attractive, Dion & The Bel-monts-styling of the chestnut, "It's The Talk Of The Town." Lead, who displays solid teen heart, is backed by soft chants and string arrangement. "With You" is a pretty, true-love opus derived from Brahms' "Lullaby" that also merits exposure.

"NOW THAT SUMMER IS HERE" (2:30)

[Peer Int'l BMI—Andreoli, Poncia]

"SHE'S NOT COMING HOME" (2:47) [Joel BMI—Andreoli, Poncia]
THE VIDELS (JDS 5005)

The group, coming off its "Mr. Lonely" JDS chart-maker, can have another one in its latest, "Now That Summer Is Here." It's an uptempo shuffler that's right up the teener's alley. Lead voice gives it that ultra-commercial touch. Songsters offer one from the tender, tear-compelling ballad-with-a-beat school in "She's Not Coming Home."

JOE MAPHIS (Republic 2006)
(B+) "WATER BABY BOOGIE" (2:05) [4-Star Sales BMI—Lindsay] Guitars and percussions blend in a steady, boogie-woogie-styled teen affair. Strong echo-chamber effect is the result of what the label describes as Ecco-Fonic Sound.

(B) "BLACK SOMBRERO" (2:24) [Western ASCAP—Carr] Same engineering for this interesting, easy-beat display of a catchy Latin-flavored melody.

DANNY STATON (Almar 1001)
(B+) "THE RIDDLE OF THE PA-PAWHOS" (2:30) [Raleigh BMI—Chase, Wade] Catchy novelty-tale of a "mysterious tribe" is conveyed with a Staton vocal against an Indian-flavored drum beat and Chipmunk-like voices.

(B) "A PAIR OF HEARTS" (2:30) [Raleigh BMI—Staton, Anthony] Singer's upbeat delivery receives a contagious, sax-led combo beat.

MAKADOPOULOS (Palette 5060)
(B+) "NEVER ON SUNDAYS" (2:27) [Esteem Sidmore BMI—Hadjidakis] Catchy main-title ditty from a Greek pic comedy is charmingly handled in this Greek import, which features a small band and chorus. Could compete successfully with other disk versions.

(B) "YASOU (The Greek Farewell Song)" (2:13) [Zodiac BMI—Albimoor, Rolle] There's charm abounding in this corner too.

LITTLE JAN & RADIANTS (Vim 507)

(B+) "IF YOU LOVE ME" (2:35) [Duchess BMI—Parsons, Monnet] A commanding blues-pop rendition of the evergreen. Little Jan's effective warbling gets a busy sound from other songsters and combo (date opens with a solid guitar sound). Can show-up strong.

(B) "HEART AND SOUL" (2:25) [Famous ASCAP—Loesser, Carmichael] A good, tho not as potent, teen account of another durable.

RAY CHARLES (Atlantic 2068)
(B+) "SWEET SIXTEEN BARS" (2:05) [Progressive BMI—Charles] Charles' gospel-inspiration takes firm hold of his piano solo work on this blues instrumental and it comes out a pretty moving piece of expression. Will strike a chord with the jazz jocks.

(B+) "TELL THE TRUTH" (2:43) [Progressive BMI—Charles] The Rayettes are spotlighted here on a contagious bit of blues that also bears the strong Charles gospel flavor. Colorful session.

BILLY MIRANDA (Checker 957)
(B+) "GO AHEAD" (2:12) [Arc, BoDean BMI—Miranda, Duke] Rugged, rip-snorting recitation is taken all the way by Miranda over draggingly slow combo-chorus support. Unusual deck—high potential for the blues market.
(C+) "RUN ROSE" (2:07) [Arc, BoDean BMI—Miranda, Duke] Here a more conventional upbeat shout occupies Miranda's talented blues time.

RAYMOND LEFEVRE ORCH. (Jamie 1161)
(B+) "NEVER ON SUNDAY" (2:28) [Chappell ASCAP—Hadjidakis] The European ork offers a fine, continental view of the oft-cut foreign instrumental. Sound is in the chart race.

(B) "SLEEPY TIME" (2:10) [Barclay ASCAP—Larue, Magenta] A colorful, merengue-like arrangement for another European ditty.

MORTY CRAFT & SINGING STRINGS (Warwick 561)
(B+) "THEME FROM THE UNTOUCHABLES" [Desilu ASCAP—Riddle] The oft-cut stark theme from the popular TV'er gets an intriguing rendition, with percussion effects the feature (side is from an LP, "Percussion In Hollywood, Broadway, Television"). Off-beat sound.

(B) "SKYLINER" [Indigo BMI—Barnet] Strings and vibes head this cheerful swing showing of the Charlie Barnet ork-associated opus. Cut's also from the LP.

VISIONS (Elgey 1003)
(B+) "TEENAGER'S LIFE" (2:04) [Kenny BMI—Visions] Time-tested vocal chants back the lead's typical, middle-beat day-in-teen's-life tale. String comments are strong. Will interest the teen crowd.

(B) "LITTLE MOON" (2:36) [Kenny BMI—Visions] Front vocalist has a semi-emotional approach to the romantic.

ROSCOE SHELTON (Excello 2181)
(B+) "MISS YOU" (2:22) [Excello BMI—Babb] Quality deep-South blues chanting on a stanza that dredges up a sorrowful outlook. Shelton is convincing in his methodical approach to emotion. He has a faithful cortege.

(B) "LET ME BELIEVE IN YOU" (2:19) [Excello BMI—Shelton] More power-packed emotional wailing on a more serene stand.

JOHN BENNING (Vim 510)
(B) "BEYOND THE HILL" (2:35) [Lowell BMI—Wood, Kriegsmann] Opus with an appealing wistful quality is handed a sincere survey by the songsters. Sentimental triplet sound supports.
(B) "GIVEN THE CHANCE" (2:12) [Mecca ASCAP—Kronides, Warren] There's much the same inviting work here.

ANITA KERR QUARTET (Decca 31126)
(B+) "WHY CAN'T THIS NIGHT GO ON FOREVER" (2:32) [World ASCAP—Newman, Jones] Vocalists—so often a setting feature—get the featured role, and invitingly caress the fine, rarely heard oldie. Merits lots of airtime.
(B+) "FOR YOU, FOR ME, FOREVERMORE" [Chappel ASCAP—G.&I. Gershwin] From the Gershwin Bros. ballad treasurehouse, mixed group picks-out a lesser known effort by the team, and gives it a rendition similar to the top-half.

"OH, OH ROSI" (2:13) [Ivan Mogull ASCAP—Granata]

"E' PRIMAVERA" (2:43) [Ray Maxwell BMI—Granata]

ROCCO GRANATA (Epic 9401)

Granata, who made the disk scene over here via his European click, "Marina," pops up on the Epic label with another Italian original hitting big on the Continent. It's a happy-sounding quick beat affair tabbed "Oh, Oh Rosi," and Granata's chorus-backed delivery makes for a listening treat. Backing's a fetching Latin-flavored Granata-penned item dubbed "E' Primavera."

"YOGI" (2:09) [Saxon BMI—Stallman, Jacobson, Koppelman]

"WAS JUDY THERE" (2:15) [Saxon BMI—Kaye, Kasha]

THE IVY THREE (Shell 720)

The Mala-distributed Shell label can have a 'left-field' click in this delectable novelty take-off on the popular "Huckleberry Hound" TV series. It's labeled "Yogi" and the rib-tickling voices are supplied by the Ivy Three. Watch it! Coupler's a teen-angled ballad warmly cuddled by the threesome.

"CONGRATULATIONS" (2:25) [Aldon BMI—Keller, Goffin]

"I CAN TELL" (2:05) [Berkshire BMI—Willis]

CAROL HUGHES (RCA Victor 7763)

This could be the one to put the young lark up among the front-runners. Tune, tabbed "Congratulations," is a heartfelt romantic weeper, set to a soft cha cha beat, that Carol (and chorus) warbles with conviction. Watch it closely. 





Elaborate Victor-Remington Joint Promo Designed To Boost Singles Sales

NEW YORK—In an effort to develop new merchandising techniques for single records and expand the singles market RCA Victor is launching a new joint promotion with Remington Rand Portable typewriters, it was announced last week by W. I. Alexander, Victor advertising and promotion manager. The promotion centers around six Victor artists.

Theme of the campaign, which will run from August 1 through October 10, will be "Be A Hit At School." Featured artists include Neil Sedaka, Henry Mancini, Della Reese, The Browns, Sam Cooke, and newcomer Jeanie Johnson.

Promotion features a free offer by Remington of a 45 EP record created especially for this event, containing six tunes by the artists. The EP cannot be bought anywhere. At the same time, a new single by each of the six artists will be released by Victor during the course of the promotion. These new singles will not be contained on the 45 EP premium record.

To get the premium record, the consumer goes to his local Remington dealer for a demonstration of one of the company's portables. The consumer will also be invited to use the demonstration portable to write a letter to his favorite Victor recording artist. Entry blanks, which read "I am typing this on a Remington portable. I enjoy listening to your records because . . ." will be made available by the dealer. Letters will be judged by a panel of Victor recording artists, and winners will receive Victor LP libraries. Any of the winners who have bought a Remington portable during the contest period will also receive double the purchase price of the typewriter.

To promote the six artists, their new singles and the premium record, Remington Rand has developed a blockbuster advertising campaign. Spearheading the print schedule will be a two-color double-page spread in Life on August 22. Concurrently, a four-color page will appear in junior and senior scholastic magazines and a two-color page in Seventeen. In addition, black-and-white spreads will be included in Teen, Boys' Life, and Ebony, while half-page ads will be featured in Suburbia Today, This Week, Parade and Family Weekly.

Remington will also back the promotion on a wide scale with point-of-sale material. Included will be five thousand major four-color window displays, day-glo banners, easel cards, and six pennants, each featuring one of the promoted artists. Other material includes decals, dealer badges, brochures and ad mats.

Victor will collaborate closely with Remington on both advertising and point-of-sale. For example, a Victor full-column in Life will supplement Remington's double-page spread. Victor will also ship major window displays, and on September 10 will feature the promotion on a full-minute color spot on NBC TV's "Bonanza."

One of the major features of the promotion will be window display contests for both Remington portable and

Victor dealers. Remington dealers will compete for RCA Victor stereo phonographs, while Victor dealers will receive Remington portables as prizes.

In developing the "Be A Hit At School" promotion, Victor said it is offering four major sales advantages to make the program the "biggest the singles market has ever seen: (1) promotion includes five of today's top-selling single artists, plus a brilliantly-regarded newcomer. (2) the release of their new singles during the course of the promotion will receive the greatest exposure ever given singles merchandise. (3) the Remington Rand premium record will not compete in any way with the six new singles, since they contain entirely different material, and (4) the program has built-in teen-age appeal, offering the right product at the right time for precisely the right market."

Hal then chatted off the record about the tremendous response Freed has met with after just six weeks with KDAY. According to Hal, Freed has "accumulated a huge following"—"a helluva good start" considering the recent incidents. . . . Harry Downie, afternoon man on Connecticut's Big 60, WICC-Bridgeport, is off on a six day cruise to Bermuda as host to two listener couples, selected from more than five thousand post card entries, as typical WICC listening families. Big promotion had entries addressed to favorite personality listeners wanted to host cruise—and Harry was the lucky winner. It was all part of the station's 34th Birthday celebration. . . . Speaking of birthday, KOIL, the Star Station in Omaha, is in process of setting a summer galaxy of fun and games for its listeners to mark its 35th Ann'y. . . . Dick Clayton and Ed Bonner, WIL-St. Louis staffers, will temporarily trade their microphones for St. Louis Cardinal uniforms on Monday, July 25, when Dick and Ed will serve as the station's representatives in the annual Radio-Press Baseball Game. . . . And fellow WIL patriot Jack Carney will be seeing double in September when he appears as guest speaker of the International Twins Association's 26th annual convention (?). . . . WXYZ-Detroit morning man Fred Wolf planed into Philly July 13 as a one-day replacement for Dick Clark on his WFIL "American Bandstand." This stint marked the first national exposure of Fred as an MC of a music program. Sitting in for Fred, who made the trip to aid the vacationing Clark, was Paul Winter. . . . Up to these offices last week were Jerry McCarthy and Bob Caron of WHOU-Houlton, Maine. Columbia Announces Staff Realignment

NEW YORK—Realignment of responsibilities in the New York sales staff has been announced by William Gallagher, Columbia's vice president in charge of sales.

Richard Smith, manager of sales administration, now reporting directly to Gallagher, will be responsible for product merchandising in all categories. All product managers, formerly designated "merchandising managers" will report directly to Smith. He will also act as liaison with manufacturing, order service, product coordination, and creative services, as well as continuing to supervise field communications.

Gallagher has also announced development of a popular albums product section which will encompass sales and merchandising responsibilities of Columbia popular and Harmony products. Reporting to Smith will be Joseph Norton, appointed product manager, popular albums. Norton's assistants will be Robert Messinger, assistant manager, and Bruce Lundvall, trainee. With Norton acting as administrator of the section, Messinger and Lundvall will prepare product

presentations and will take care of creative catalog merchandising, popular albums.

Peter Munves will continue as product manager, classical albums, reporting to Smith. His assistant, David Kleger, will, as assistant product manager, classical albums, assume responsibilities of merchandising Harmony's classical product.

Also reporting to Smith will be Herbert Mayer, product manager, special products. His responsibilities will include the WL series, the new EX foreign series, and all pre-recorded tape.

Assistant product manager, single records, John Pressel will schedule and merchandise all single records.

David Kapralik, just appointed director of artists relations and national promotion, will head promotional programs in all repertoire fields, will maintain close relations between the sales department and all artists, and will maintain relations with the television network and radio stations. He will report directly to Gallagher.

Kapralik Appointed Columbia's Dir. of Artists Relations And National Promotion

NEW YORK—David Kapralik has been appointed director of artists relations and national promotion for Columbia records, it was announced by William Gallagher, vice president in charge of sales.

Kapralik joined Columbia in 1957 as a sales staff trainee, became manager of sales communication, and merchandise manager of single records before being promoted to his new post.

He will report directly to Gallagher and will be responsible for coordinating the efforts of product, regional, and district managers. He will head promotional programs in all repertoire fields, and will assume the responsibility of maintaining close liaison between the sales department and all artists. He will continue his duties of taking care of television network and radio station relations.

World Wide LP Single

NEWARK—World Wide Records, the Savoy affiliate, has released its first single in stereo 33 rpm form. Deck is "Ida" and "Glow Worm" by the Back Room Boys.

Jocks In On Del-Fi Confabs

HOLLYWOOD—Del-Fi Records has instituted a conference-call idea, "The Music Roundtable," between disk jockeys and program directors around the country.

Every two weeks, the label pays for a call to approximately a dozen of the top station men, using different people each time. Persons phoned tell of their picks-of-the-week, disks breaking in their areas, etc. In addition, the call is recorded and copies of the disk are mailed to 600 other jocks around the country, enabling them to hear what's going on in those areas. Jim Randolph, the label's promo head, who conducts the conference-call, is expanding the idea to include a conference-call to R&B jocks on alternate weeks.

Del-Fi prexy Bob Keene feels that this move can help get records started nationally and hitting in all areas at once for greater impact. "There is a vast and expanding future to the musical interests of our country . . . at no other time in our musical history have two industries been so dependent on each other," Keene said. "It is our intense desire to arrive at effective, legitimate communications between the two, hence, 'The Music Conference.'"

Atlantic Pacts Herbie Mann

NEW YORK—Atlantic has signed famed jazz flutist, Herbie Mann, to a long-term, exclusive contract. Mann's style of jazz is called "Afro-Jazz," and his interest in combining African musical elements with jazz led to his being sent recently on a lengthy trip throughout Africa by the U. S. Department of State's cultural program.

Mann has been working on his first LP for Atlantic and it will be ready for early fall release.

Burnette Signs With Agency

LOS ANGELES—Dorsey Burnette, star Era artist now hitting with "Hey Little One," has been signed exclusively with Artists Management Bureau, this city. Firm said it would pursue the college circuit for the songster-writer, as well as the nitery circuit. His current tour includes Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, and Florida, after which he returns to the Coast for a series of one-nighters through Oregon, Washington, and California.

New Victor Bluebird Albums

NEW YORK—RCA Victor records has instituted a new series of Bluebird albums designed for pre-school, nursery, and first-grade children, it was announced last week by H. Ray Clark, label planning and merchandising manager.

Two Bluebird LY series albums will be released each month, starting with the current releases "Around The Block, Around The World/Singalong Around The World" and "Holidays." Tom Glazer, veteran in the field of children's records, will produce the series for Bluebird.

"Around The Block, Around The World" features songs from various foreign lands, introduced to the listener in terms of a neighborhood. A visit with a Chinese laundryman leads to the Chinese drum gong song. Side two of the LP features singalongs in Swiss, Czech, Israeli, Indonesian, Russian and English.

"Holidays" salutes leading holidays the world over, from New Year's Day to St. Patrick's Day to Hannukah and Christmas, and including the listener's birthday. Glazer narrates and sings "holidays."

The new Bluebird series will retail at \$2.49, and will be packaged with inner sleeves in heavy board albums, with printed spines. All albums in the series will be polyethylene bagged and pre-priced.

20th Fox Single Ties-In With Kennedy Nomination



WB Sales Train To Intro Fall Product; Conkling & Execs Set For Trip

HOLLYWOOD—Warner Bros. Records will conduct its own fall sales convention this year by traveling in a specially equipped Pullman railroad car to ten cities in twelve days. Beginning July 18 in Minneapolis, Minn., Warner Records president James B. Conkling, together with Joel Friedman, merchandising director, and Lowell Frank, director of Engineering, will conduct this whistle-stop tour, contacting Warners' distributors and sales personnel at the "grass roots" level.

"We have chosen this unique method," Conkling said, "over the usual convention method because of one desire. We have found it most important to include all sales personnel at all levels in our conventions. In addition to the sales managers and owners who usually attend company conventions, our 'whistle-stop' approach will allow us to meet every one of the sales personnel of our distributors. These are the people who are in direct contact with the dealers, and these are the people who will be spreading the Warner Bros. Records message. By taking a specially equipped, de luxe railroad car with the latest in stereo equipment, displays, slide projectors to each of these cities, we will be able to meet each of these people as we never would if we'd held a convention in New York or Hollywood."

Schedule of the Convention Special includes stops at the following cities: Minneapolis, St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Cleveland, and Detroit.

Joining Conkling, Friedman, and Frank in presenting the program in each of these cities will be Bob Summers and Vic Chirumbolo, district sales managers in Warners' two Eastern territories; George Avakian, director of A&R, and Monroe Glasberg, operations manager.

At each of the stops along the route, personnel for the distributing companies involved will meet at a morning session hosted by Conkling. During the session, the diskery will introduce its new August and September albums as well as review its strong catalog sellers. Previews will also be given of future Warners' singles and its October albums release. Discussions will then be held about Warners' fall merchandising and sales programs. Following this, label execs will close up shop and ride on to the next stop on their timetable.

Following the Detroit meeting on July 29, Conkling, Friedman and Frank will fly to San Francisco, together with their complete set of displays and audio set-up, where they will host a meeting July 30 in the Jack Tar Hotel. Joining them at that meeting will be Fran Howell, western district sales manager for Warners. At this meeting will be the sales personnel from Warners distribution organizations in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, Phoenix, and Hawaii.

Subsequent to the July 30 meeting, Howell will then hold a similar meeting in Dallas, attended by Warner Bros. Records distributors in Salt Lake City, Denver, Oklahoma City, Houston, El Paso and Dallas.

"We have high hopes for this rather unconventional, traveling approach to the presentation of product," said Conkling. "We feel it will give us the opportunity to meet the men and women who do the actual selling of Warners product as never before. There is no substitute for direct contact with these people, and this approach will give us the opportunity not only to thank each one of them individually for the job they've done in the past but also to present to them the Warners story for this fall as never before possible."



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

Liberty Sets 2nd Annual Distrib Meet In L.A.

LOS ANGELES—Liberty Records hosts its second annual distrib conclave July 28 and 29 at the firm's Los Angeles headquarters, it was announced by Al Bennett, Liberty president.

Representatives of 33 distributors handling Liberty product are slated to attend the two-day session to map coordinated plans for the next 12 months.

Agenda highlights include previews of up-coming Liberty monaural and stereo LP releases; sales strategy ses-

sions and a merchandising-promotion seminar.

Additionally, the Liberty distributors will huddle with executives of the Anderson-McConnell Advertising Agency, recently appointed by the diskery to function on behalf of the organization in all advertising media.

The distributor meeting is the first set since Liberty moved into the firm's expanded headquarters on L.A.'s Sunset Blvd. All product and marketing sessions will be held in the new building. Conclave will be capped by a dinner at the Sportsmen's Lodge in North Hollywood on July 29.

Atlantic's 6-Mos. LP Sales Volume Double '59 Period

NEW YORK—Atlantic's LP sales volume for the first six months of 1960 was more than double that of the comparable 1959 period, according to the firm's sales manager, Bob Kornheiser.

"The healthy Atlantic LP sales picture is due in part to the growing stereo market," Kornheiser said. "One of Atlantic's recent leading LP sellers did 40% of its business in the stereo edition. That is not typical but it is an indication of what the potential for stereo is."

Koss Intros New Stereo Demonstration Unit

MILWAUKEE—Introduction of a new stereo record demonstration unit has been announced by Koss, Inc., Milwaukee manufacturer of Stereophones.

The Koss Silent Symphony system is based on demonstrating records through Stereophones. Because Stereophone headsets are designed for personalized listening, the customer who desires to listen to a record will be the only one to hear it. Through the use of several systems, numerous records may be demonstrated simultaneously without interfering with each other. The unit also performs a demonstration for a single customer without becoming a store-wide annoyance.

Features of the Koss system include individual volume controls for each ear, two jack output plugs for Stereophone headsets, and a monaural button for "dramatic" stereo demonstrations to show customers the realism of stereo. The phono and one set of Stereophones retail for \$89.95. Additional sets of Stereophones are \$24.95 retail.

MRIA Board Appointment

CHICAGO—Daniel E. Denham, Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company executive, has been named a member of the board of directors of the Magnetic Recording Industry Association, it was announced last week by Herbert L. Brown, association president.

General sales manager of the Magnetic Products Division of 3M, Denham joins the MRIA board of directors at a time when membership has grown to forty-six member companies, representing all facets of the magnetic recording industry association.

Denham, who has been with 3M since 1949, is active in industry affairs. In addition to his participation in MRIA, he serves as chairman of the magnetic tape section of the Electronics Industry Association.

"Colie" Ervin and ARAC manager W.D. Kilpatrick. Stars will include Don Gibson (Victor), Hickory artists Roy Acuff and his Smoky Mountain Boys, June Webb, Margie Bowes. Also present will be the Opry square dance team, "Stoney Mountain Cloggers."

New Cadence Buffalo Distrib

NEW YORK—Don Sanders, Cadence sales manager, has announced the appointment of Metro Distributing Company, Buffalo, as the Cadence Distributor for that area. The move enables Cadence to close the gap in distribution left by the recent shuttering of Scan Distributors.

New TV Sleuth Series Includes Darin-Anka

NEW YORK—Teen stars Bobby Darin and Paul Anka will make time-to-time appearances on TV's new who-done-it stint, "Dan Raven." Show—which will be aired over NBC-TV beginning September 30—is about an L.A. detective who makes the rounds of entertainment spots. According to Screen Gems, the show's producers, the two will play themselves, and both act and sing.

Malverne's Shocket Gets ARMADA Veep Post

NEW YORK—Bill Shocket, treasurer of Malverne Distributors, here, has been appointed vice-president of ARMADA in charge of the Eastern region, it was announced last week by Art Talmadge, president of the organization.

Shocket completes the group of ARMADA regional vice-presidents which includes Al Bennett, president of Liberty Records, Sam Phillips, president of Sun Records and Milt Salstone, president of M & S Record Distributors.

In making the announcement, Talmadge commented on ARMADA's continuing fight against bootleggers and counterfeiters: "The results we have obtained through the efforts of our legal counsel, Blanc, Steinberg, Balder and Steinbrook can be measured in the noticeable reduction in traffic of phony records. Many manufacturers and distributors have reported that the general improvement in business in the past few weeks can be attributed in part to a curtailment of illegal records in circulation. By putting a spotlight on the individuals involved, ARMADA is making real progress in cleaning up the situation. We are continuing our efforts in this area in every way we can."

Talmadge intends to call a meeting of ARMADA's officers and board of directors in the middle of next March, exact date to be announced later. "At this meeting we will review what ARMADA has accomplished since the election of its new officers and map out plans for the future," he said.

Hyland Breaks Fair Record

Vee-Jay Expands; Drops Abner Label, Appoints Three In National Promo Setup

CHICAGO—Ewart G. Abner, Jr., Vee-Jay Records, of this city, has announced several "progressive changes" in the diskery "in keeping with the biggest year in the growth of our firm."

"Because of this great development, and fine success in the production of record albums—pop-wise, as well as in the jazz field, the past year, it became necessary to concentrate more fully in all markets with greater continuity," Abner stated.

"Therefore, we have strengthened our position throughout the United States and overseas, by placing the best available representatives in the field.

"Concurrent with our stronger marketing activity we have appointed Randy Woods in the area covering the western states as sales and promotion manager," Abner said. "Randy has had considerable experience with one of the finest package goods lines in the record industry. Previously he was with Kapp Record Co. as national sales manager. He has already moved his family to Los Angeles to take up permanent residence there."

Abner further stated that Martin "Red" Schwartz, who is well known throughout the eastern and midwestern states, was placed in charge of sales and promotional activity for Vee-Jay Records in this vast territory.

Steve Clark, who formerly headed his own independent record firm, Tempus Records, Inc., is covering the entire south and southwestern territory as sales and promotional head for Vee-Jay there.

In announcing further developments in the expansion of Vee-Jay, Abner advised that the Abner label is being discontinued. In view of the demise of the Abner label such strong artists as Dee Clark, Jerry Butler, and The Impressions are being recorded now on the Vee-Jay label.

Also in keeping with this trend the Vee-Jay label has been redesigned, and will appear hereafter in a four-color and black pattern for strong identification. The label will first be circulated July 18 with the new Dee Clark single.

"Furthermore—and foremost," Abner said, "we are in the process of lining up our forthcoming Vee-Jay Fall LP Plan, which will be released to the trade August 15. You will probably recall that our first LP Fall Plan was initiated in July, 1959, when we introduced 45 new record albums.

"Our new plan calls for 22 more great, new LP's, now giving us a total of 67 very popular record albums in our catalog of hits.

"Because of our recent entry into the rapid-rising jazz field, we have developed a new numerical system for identification of the jazz line, commencing with Frank Strozier's "The Fantastic Frank Strozier," Vee-Jay number 3005.

"Other fine jazz artists in this new Vee-Jay camp are Wayne Shorter, Louis Hayes, The MJT plus 3, Lee Morgan, Winton Kelly, and Paul Chambers, all of whom are owned exclusively by Vee-Jay Records, Abner concluded.

Joe Linhart Named To Victor A&R Dept.

NEW YORK—Joe Linhart has been appointed music director, popular A&R of RCA Victor Records.

In announcing the appointment, Robert L. Yorke, division VP, Commercial Records Creation Dept., described Linhart as "One of the most knowledgeable individuals in the industry today, combining both theatre and music business know-how to an unusual degree. We're delighted to have him."

As music director, Linhart will be responsible for all Broadway original cast albums as well as east coast movie and TV soundtracks. He will look for new talent and new Broadway shows for recording purposes

and will audition and produce the final product on LP himself. In addition, he will also produce LP's for a specially-selected roster of artists.

Linhart, who has been active on both west and east coasts over the past seven years, brings a wide range of experience to the new job. Besides music publishing activities and heading up the formation of Arwin Records, he was closely involved in promoting many of Broadway's recent musical hits, including "Carousel," "The King And I," "South Pacific," and "The Most Happy Fella."

Working out of RCA Victor's New York office, Linhart will report to Steve Sholes.

Command 4-Track Tapes

NEW YORK—Command Records, the Grand Award affiliate, will enter the 4-track stereo tape field at the end of the month with the release of ten packages, according to topper Enoch Light. Top chart sellers "Persuasive Percussion" and "Provocative Percussion" volumes 1 & 2 are included.

Other releases will be: "Bongos"—Los Admiradores; "The Million Dollar Sound Of The World's Most Precious Violins" (Vols. 1 & 2); "The Dixie Rebels"—Big Jeb Dooley; "Mr. Big"—Tony Mottola; "The Private Life Of A Private Eye"—Enoch Light & The Light Brigade.

A "heavy" national and local campaign on both the tapes and disks is planned.

Westminster Issues 5 Summer Classics

NEW YORK—Westminster Records has released five classical packages for the summer. They include two stereo-monaural, one monaural-only, and one stereo-only packages, headed by a stereo-monaural recording of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture and Capriccio Italian and Rimsky-Korsakoff's Russian Eastern Overture and Capriccio Espagnole. Performing is the Vienna State Opera Orch. directed by Maurice Abravanel, augmented by the Deutsche Meister Band and the Laxenberg Carillon in the 1812.

The other LP's include "Mozart Symphonies" (Vol. 2)—Erich Leinsdorf and the Philharmonic Symph. Orch. of London (monaural-only); Liszt: Hungarian Rhapsodies Nos. 1, 4, & 5—Battle of the Huns—Hermann Scherchen conducting (stereo-only); Bach: Six Keyboard Concerti—Pianists Paul Badura Skoda and Joerg Demus (stereo-monaural); Villa-Lobos: Eleven Piano Pieces—Pianist Jose Echaniz (monaural-only).

The young song stylist is a popular attraction in eastern night clubs and appears often on such Philadelphia television shows as The Dick Clark Show. She has also toured the South with Tony Pastor and Bob Crosby as sole girl vocalist.

According to Altschuler and her personal manager, Paul Lasky, Miss Saynt will record her first sides for Columbia in the very near future.

Elektra Sales Rep For Aero Progress Records

NEW YORK—The Elektra Sales Corporation has been appointed national sales representative for Aero Progress, producers of instruction records in numerous aspects of flying and boating. Elektra, which is the sales division for Elektra Records, will release Aero Progress disks through normal channels of regional record distributors and local record stores.

Elektra prexy Jac Holzman announced that the deal included these LPs: "On Course, On The Glide Path," "Instrument Flight," "Tower Communications" and "Ship To Shore." Future joint releases are being planned by the two labels. The initial pact goes into effect immediately.

Aero Progress packages contain both disks and instruction booklets, and frequently such additional paraphernalia as charts, maps and manuals. They feature actual sounds as navigation beams, radar landings and foghorn signals.

Atlantic Vs. Triple-X; Judge Holds Injunction In Abeyance

NEW YORK—Judge Flynn of the Supreme Court of New York County last week reserved decision on the motion for a temporary injunction against the sale of the Triple-X hit, "I Shot Mr. Lee" by the Bobbettes, and held it in abeyance.

In a suit against the label, Atlantic Records charges interference with its contract with the group and "unfair competition." Judge Ryan sent the case to an unofficial referee who will hear both parties and report to Ryan on the results.

The Bobbettes previously cut for Atlantic, and during their contract with the diskery had a session of "I Shot Mr. Lee." Triple-X issued its Bobbettes version of the tune several weeks ago, and the Atlantic version followed soon after. According to Atlantic's attorney, Paul Marshall, the group was not free to record the tune for another diskery for ten years.

Along with Triple-X Records, Atlantic has also charged the label's execs Alan Kallman and Lou Galli. In addition, Progressive Music, Atlantic's publishing affiliate, has brought suit in Federal Court in New York against Triple-X and Alan K. Music for infringement of its "Lee" copyright.

Warren Troob, attorney for Triple-X, said upon receipt of the Atlantic summons that "we will very likely countersue."

Newport Fete Will Sue City Over Cancellation

NEW YORK—The Newport Jazz Festival has announced its intention of suing—"at the earliest possible time"—the city of Newport, Rhode Island for \$400,000 suffered in losses and damages resulting from the cancellation of three festival events due to the July 2 disturbances. Suit is expected within sixty days.

Louis L. Lorillard, president of the Festival, stated that in the unanimous opinion of the board of directors of the non-profit organization, Newport city officials "must assume full responsibility for not being prepared to handle the emergency in the city."

He said, "The 15,000 people sitting in Newport's Freebody Park the evening of July 2 were not even aware of any trouble taking place outside of the park; the audience was well-behaved and enjoying the performances. It was only the unruly element outside of the Jazz Festival Park that created the disturbances, and city officials had been requested innumerable times starting early this year to provide for the expected onrush of holidaying youngsters. City officials publicly claimed they could handle any situation arising, which proved to be completely untrue, and they even took the unnecessary step of cancelling our remaining performances, even though the Jazz Festival itself was entirely blameless."

In the past seven years, the Newport Jazz Festival has spent over \$2,000,000 on musician's salaries, equipment, promotion and advertising of these jazz events.

Capitol Debuts Brit. Team

HOLLYWOOD—Tommy Bruce and The Bruisers, a group of young Britishers, made their U.S. recording debut last week with the release by Capitol of "Ain't Misbehavin'" and "Got the Water Boilin'."

"Misbehavin'" is a burlesque of the Fats Waller standard. "Water Boilin'" is similar to the top side, but is a brand new song.

"SUMMER SCENE"—Frankie Avalon—Chancellor CHL 5011

For this latest LP date Avalon has completely forsaken the heavy beat for a lightly swinging journey through sunny seasonal songs. Following the bright arrangements of Nick Perito and Florian the songster jaunts gaily over "Swingin' Down the Lane," "June Night," "The Things We Did Last Summer," and "For Me And My Gal." Has adult appeal as well as a strong teen attraction.



"EYDIE AND STEVE SING THE GOLDEN HITS"—Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence—ABC Paramount ABCS-311

A bright and bubbly sendoff to a dozen evergreens is given by the singing pair. The contrast of their two distinctly different singing styles—Eydie's brash enthusiasm and Steve's suave sophistication—are happily mated in "I Don't Want To Walk Without You," "Green Eyes," "And the Angels Sing," "Apple Blossom Time" and "Sentimental Journey" with Don Costa's efficient arrangements. A tempting follow-up to their first dual session—"We Got Us."



"THE PASSION OF PARIS"—Hal Mooney—Time S/2005

The combination of Time's 2000 Series outstanding sound qualities and Hal Mooney's special stereo scoring has produced one chart item in "Flutes and Percussion" and promises even another in this outing. The atmosphere is very continental in the rendering of "Beyond the Sea," "Valentine," "Under Paris Skies," "La Seine" and "La Vie En Rose" and should supply many enchanting listening hours.




"ELMER GANTRY"—Original Film Soundtrack—Music composed and directed by Andre Previn—United Artists UAL 4069

The turbulent motion picture about the lust and opportunism of a self-styled evangelist, which has received rave notices, has a musical score to match its highly pitched emotions. Award-winning composer-conductor Previn has really come up with a power-laden piece of writing, which should ride to sales heights aboard the flick's following.



"PATTI PAGE SINGS AND STARS IN 'ELMER GANTRY'"—Mercury SR 60260

Appearing in the role of a choir girl in "Elmer Gantry" and thusly singing several religious hymns during the course of the film, Patti Page has here been recorded in an album of hymns. It contains some of the most famous and popular Christian hymns, such as "Onward Christian Soldiers," "Shall We Gather At the River?," "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," "Abide With Me" and "Stand Up For Jesus," and the songstress, in accord with a large chorus, renders them in simple, straightforward, melodic terms.



"LET'S GET LOST"—Johnny Nash—ABC Paramount ABCS-334

The youngster's got loads of pro quality talent which he puts to romantic use in transmitting the cozy feelings of such likeables as "Together," "Let's Fly Away," "Alone Together," "The Love Nest" and "Let the Rest of the World Go By." Sid Feller's got the proper bright feelings instilled in the lightly swinging backdrops and the songster follows him smoothly. Enjoyable date.



"THE SIMPLE LIFE"—Mavis Rivers—Capitol ST 1408

Her third album for Capitol and already she has caused quite a stir in jazz and pop singing circles. On this date Miss Rivers temptingly serves up vibrant performances of such evergreens as "At Sundown," "Try A Little Tenderness," "Far Away Places," "Spring Is Here" and "Early Autumn." Her accompaniment is her best yet—vibes, guitars and rhythm—leaving the melody up to the singer's voice—a job she does well. Should get heavy play.



"RICHARD THE LION-HEARTED"—Dick Haymes—Warwick W 2023

The most successful tracks in this album are "Serenade in Blue" and "There's No You," for they put Haymes in a sensuous ballad mood—the style which first brought him to stardom. On the remaining ten tracks an honest attempt is made to swing but it appears Ralph Burns' modern swing arrangements slightly escape Haymes' phrasing and timing. Nevertheless his legit manner is still far superior to many pop stars and this album is a long-awaited, welcome return to the disk scene.



"OH, KAY!"—Original Cast—20th Fox 4003

This is the cast deck of the recent Off-B'way revival of the 1927 Gershwin Bros. musical, a show which is loaded with some of the team's finest pieces. The performers and twin-piano led ork are generally in the Gershwin spirit, tho there's a lackluster solo, chorus and instrumental stint at times. Deck's delight is "Little Jazz Bird," an engaging number inserted into the score from the Gershwins' 1925 opus, "Lady Be Good." Original "Oh, Kay!" standouts include "Someone To Watch Over Me," "Do, Do, Do," "Clap Yo' Hands," and "Maybe."



"SWEET, HOT AND BLUE"—The Skip-Jacks—RCA Victor LPM 2200

As the title indicates, an album of many moods specifically put together to showcase the versatility of this new singing group. (Their 2nd LP.) This end is accomplished with finesse, whether they are leaning heavily into the brass of Ray Martin's backing, or coyly weaving in and out of Al Cohn's intimate jazz combo settings. Selections include such diverse material as "Limehouse Blues," "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen," "Red Sails In the Sunset" and "How Are Things In Glocca Morra." This album can get them the recognition they deserve.



"BELLS ARE RINGING"—Guy Lombardo and the Royal Canadians—Capitol ST 1453

A companion set to the label's soundtrack LP, this dance offering is in the familiar Lombardo style—sweet music and sensible arrangements—angled at the older patrons. Eleven numbers from the film score are here, five vocalized by Kenny Gardner, Cliff Grass and Bill Flannigan. Lombardo fans have another solid set to add to their collection.




"SAMMY KAYE SWINGS AND SWAYS 'BELLS ARE RINGING' FOR DANCING"—Columbia CL 1453

The tuneful Jule Styne melodies from the Broadway music (and now film) have been set to dance tempos in the familiar Kaye "swing and sway" manner. He offers lilting ork stylings of "The Party's Over," "Mu-Cha-Cha," "Just In Time," "Long Before I Knew You" and others from the stage success. The tempos are varied and his fans should enjoy his latest dance outing.



"A LITTLE TRAVELIN' MUSIC"—Susan Barrett—Capitol ST 1412

The thrush hops aboard the Kenyon Hopkins bandwagon for a tuneful tour of such picturesque places and scenes as "Manhattan," "Beautiful Ohio," "Old Cape Cod," "Moon Over Miami" and "Carolina In The Morning." She proves a vocally able guide to these places and merits listening to.




"BLUE SMOKE"—Johnny Desmond—Columbia CL 1477

The idea of using only a guitar and bass backdrop to convey the blue mood comes across winningly as does the direct, ungimmicked expressions of Desmond. The singer is master of the mood as he languidly roams through "No One Ever Tells You," "I'm Glad There Is You," "It's A Lonesome Old Town" and "The Party's Over." Tony Mottola and Bob Haggart rate plaudits for their accompaniment. Reserve this for beautiful after-hours listening.

"ANOTHER COLLECTION OF GOLDEN HITS"—The Platters, Crew-Cuts, Diamonds, Gaylords—Mercury SR 60256

Mercury's vocal groups have racked up quite a string of hits. Here the label has packaged some of them in LP form—the selections ranging from original versions of hits to some versions of hits by others. Of course the Platters lead the pack with "My Prayer," "Twilight Time" and "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes." There's "Crazy 'Bout Ya Baby" by the Crew-Cuts, "Little Darlin'" and "The Stroll" by the Diamonds and "Ah Marie" and "That's Amore" by the Gaylords. Loads of teen appeal.



"JAN AUGUST PLAYS GREAT PIANO HITS"—Mercury SR 60189

Some of the most revered instrumental piano hits of the past are remembered by pianist August in this sparkling collection. His approach is basically dramatic and his accompaniment ranges from lush ork to simple rhythm depending on the particular mood. Included are "Cumana," "Misirlou," "Malaguena," "Warsaw Concerto," "Near You" and "Till The End Of Time." Thoroughly enjoyable listening.



"FANTASTIKS"—Original Cast MGM E 28720C

Off-B'way's successful off-beat "book" musical gets a first-rate production. The score of Tom Jones (lyrics) and Harvey Schmidt (music) is a deft combination of beatnik-like philosophy, satire and outright romanticism. Schmidt's tunes are pleasing, often haunting. Audience appeal is limited, but those who attend the show and show-music buffs in general should be interested in the issue.



"CUGAT IN FRANCE, SPAIN AND ITALY"—Xavier Cugat and His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM 2173

Cugat in Spain is expected and familiar, but he appears equally at home on such non-familiar grounds as "Under Paris Skies," "La Mer," "Comme Facette Mammeta" and "Souvenir d'Italie." "Andalucia" and "Valencia" are present to bring Cugat safely "home." An interesting listening session that brings him out of the realm of just dance music.



"INSTRUMENTAL IMPORTS"—Joe Reisman & His Orchestra—Roulette R 25114

Gaily decorated instrumental versions of European melodies. Included also are several Tin Pan Alley tunes that have been penned with the continental flavor in mind. The arrangements are present-day pop angled—shuffle beat, guitars and strings accented. Collection includes "Melodie D'Amour," "Third Man Theme," "Petite Fleur" and "Volare." Interesting, easy-on-the-ears listening.



"MILLION DOLLAR BABY"—The Four Knights—Coral 57309

Song stylists, who will be remembered for their smash hit of "Oh Baby Mine" several years back, whip up a barrelful of musical babies—"Pretty Baby," "Baby Face," "Baby Doll," "Melancholy Baby" and "Baby, Won't You Please Come Home." The approach is fresh and imaginative, with thanks to Charles Bud Dant's arrangements and direction for the pleasurable session. New, up-dated version of the hit is also included.



"FROM DAWN TO DREAMING"—Art Harris—Panorama PLP-2007

Multi-tracked at 3 pianos, Harris plays a series of original musical compositions designed to depict "a day in the life of a very young and very pretty secretary." Such titled pieces as "Getting Up In The Morning Blues," "Coffee Break," "In Answer To Your Letter" and so on through the day until "Midnight Melody," he advances pleasant solo piano moods. An interesting experiment.




"STILL MORE OF THE GREATEST PIANO OF THEM ALL"—Art Tatum—Verve MG V-8360

Verve seems to have an inexhaustible supply of Tatum tapes on hand for this is the third consecutive LP of solo piano by the late genius. Once more the music here bears out the uncontested greatness of Tatum—his unflinching rhythm sense, his completely individual and spontaneous improvisational ability and his melodic conceptions. It's all here in "I Won't Dance," "Out Of Nowhere," "It's Only A Paper Moon" and "Moon-glow." A collector's item.



"CLEVELAND STYLE"—Jimmy Cleveland and his Orchestra—Mercury SR 60121

Showcasing Cleveland's outstanding trombone work, the music on this album is similar to that played by the Jazztet, mainly because of the presence here of Jazztet members-arrangers Art Farmer and Benny Golson, although the scoring was done by neither but by Ernie Wilkins. The constant interplay of the instruments, in solo and ensemble, produces an interesting and effective sound on the standard "Long Ago And Far Away" and originals "Out Of This World," "Posterity" and "Goodbye Ebbets Field."



"FUEGO"—Donald Byrd—Blue Note 4026

A strikingly individual stylist, Byrd rates as one of the top men in his class today. With a group consisting of Jackie McLean, another hard-driver, Duke Pearson, Doug Watkins and Lex Humphries, Byrd leads them across the various funky, gospel-inspired and bop-like figures found in "Low Life," "Amen," "Bup A Loup" and "Lament." Solidly swinging modern date.



"PARADE OF THE PENNIES"—Red Nichols and his Pennies—RCA Victor LPM 1455

Out of its archives Victor has dredged up fourteen sides cut by the Nichols band in 1939, one from 1934 and one from 1928. It is these latter two sides which contain the historical interest of the set, for they were cut at a time when the cornetist was making his biggest impact on jazz. In 1939 he had a larger group, a sweeter sound, a gimmick approach, competing with the big bands of the era. Value lies in "Five Pennies" (1928) and "Rockin' In Rhythm" (1934) for the collectors.

"THIS IS THE HOLLYWOOD BOWL!"—Capitol SABO 8496

To commemorate the thirty-eighth anniversary of the Hollywood Bowl, Capitol has drawn upon its catalog of thirty LP's by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony ork for this comprehensive two-disk survey of the popular classics which are played there. Among the artists are such names as Felix Slatkin, Carmen Dragon, Michael Rabin and Leonard Pennario, contributing excellent performances of Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture," Debussy's "Reverie," Brahms' "Hungarian Dances" and numerous other selections from the pops and classical repertoire. Strong sales item at the \$9.98 price (\$11.98 for stereo).



BERLIOZ: "Symphonie Fantastique"—Paul Paray Conducting the Detroit Symphony Orchestra—Mercury SR 90254

The turbulent, stormy passions of this symphony need stereo scoring for its full disk appreciation and Paray's interpretation here is an ideal one. He directs with vividness and imagery the Berlioz work and the excellent Detroit ork responds fully to his demands. Invigorating experience.



"BALLET MUSIC FROM THE OPERA"—Paris Conservatoire Orchestra, Anatole Fistoulari, Conductor—RCA Victor LM-2400

Conductor Fistoulari uses the proper sweet, melodic approach to these ballet interludes from the opera. And basically because this music was written as a respite from the vocal affairs of the works, they should be done in this manner. The package includes selections from Verdi's "Aida," Rossini's "William Tell," Moussorgsky's "Khovantchina" and Saent-Saens "Sampson and Delilah." Pleasant listening.

"COQ D'OR SUITE—RIMSKY-KORSAKOV" Prague Symphony Orch., Cond. by Vaclav Smeacek, Parliament PLP(S)-130, \$2.98, Monaural \$1.98

Content: Includes Korsakov's "Legend of Invisible City of Kitezh" on flip side of title. Cover: Artful and tasteful with appropriate golden rooster against light maroon backdrop. Classical feeling. Performance: "Legend" side is from the famed Korsakov opera completed in 1906. "Le Coq d'Or" followed this work and was Korsakov's final opera. Both sides are beautiful performances with the "Coq" offering displaying the composer's gift for characterization well. Commercial Value: Heavy success down through the years with a vast history of acceptance among classical lovers.

"ROMEO AND JULIET BALLET SUITE—PROKOFIEV" Czech Philharmonic Orch. Cond. by Karel Ancerl, Parliament PLP(S)-132, \$2.98, Monaural \$1.98

Content: Excerpts from the famous opus by Prokofiev offers 10 tracks, among them, "Masques," "Friar Laurence" and "The Death of Tybalt." Cover: Color reproduction of red roses being passed from hand to hand. Attractive. Performance: The love story is told in several suites which are most effective. Lightness of love and the heavy approach of death are all here in the composer's ballet—a pleasant musical experience. Commercial Value: Strong name value and excellent orchestral performance should combine for classical sales.

"SYMPHONY FANTASTIQUE, OP. 14—BERLIOZ" Czech Philharmonic Orch., Cond. by Carlo Zecchi, Parliament PLP(S)-131, \$2.98, Monaural \$1.98

Content: Berlioz' 1830 opus is presented here as it was a century ago amidst shouts of defiance from music industry critics who claimed that the music must be preceded by the love story which brought it about. Cover: Impressionistic color art decorates the jacket with title at top. Performance: The personal love story of Berlioz is performed on 6 tracks with each contributing a different portion of the overall story. The individual listener is left to decide for himself the value of the printed word story accompaniment. Commercial Value: Accepted fare among the classical ranks and should stand up well on this performance.

"FLATT AND SCRUGGS WITH THE FOGGY MOUNTAIN BOYS" Harmony HL-7250, \$1.98

Content: "Jimmie Brown, the Newsboy," "Foggy Mt. Special," "I Won't Be Hanging Around," 7 others. Cover: Color shot of the singing combo. Performance: Flatt and Scruggs harmonize in true country fashion delivering a pleasant brace of country-styled vocalizing complete with lotsa guitar work. Good listening. Commercial Value: Name value and content ought to help the package rate with country-music shoppers.

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ENGLAND

Philips Records last week hit the market with a new low priced series of 12" LP's issued on the Fontana label under the title "Fortune." Retailing at 22/6d, the idea is to make available to record collectors the "groundwork of a library of best selling LP's hitherto obtainable only at conventional prices." Following its successful 'Zip' campaign in June, the company is backing the new series with national advertising as well as offering dealers a special "Fortune" pack comprising a demonstration record containing two highlights of each of the first ten releases together with a selection of color posters and other point-of-sale material, including a three-wing counter display unit in full color. Packed in a luxury sleeve with polythene outer cover, the first ten releases are "The Liberate Show," "Music From The King And I" and "Flower Drum Song" by Rodgers and Hammerstein, who are also represented on three other disks in the series with "Music From South Pacific," "My Fair Lady" and "Brigadoon" and "Oklahoma!" and "Carousel." "Dancing With Sammy Kaye in Hi Fi," "Jimmy McPartland's Dixieland," "Flames, Flappers And Flasks" by Joe Glover and His Collegians, "25 All Time Country & Western Hits" by Dickson Hall and The Wayfarers and "The Basso Profundo" by John Neher, Gordon Goodman and The Summit Four.

Robbins Music elated with the upsurge in the British charts of "Made You" (featured on the LP "Beat Girl"). The number was waxed by Adam Faith as the B side to his Parlophone recording "When Johnny Comes Marching Home" and is now taking the lead. Robbins are also working on "One Finger Symphony" recorded by Michael Holliday on Columbia. Mike features the song in this week's "Tin Pan Alley IV Show" and in the same program Craig Douglas sings his latest Top Rank recording, "Oh What A Day."

Donald Phillips well known British composer and pianist—currently playing for Anne Shelton during her summer season at Weymouth—has had his publishing contract with Lawrence Wright Music Company extended for a further period. Don, who has been tied to Lawrence Wright since the end of the war, has a long string of hits to his credit including the instrumentals "Concerto In Jazz," "Cuban Holiday," "The Firefly," "City Rhapsody," "October Rhapsody" and the Ivor Novello Award, "Melody From The Sea." Song hits include "Get Well Soon," "Old Pi-anna Rag," "Tin Pan Alley Rag" and more recently Les Howard's Columbia recording of "To Him We're All The Same" published in the States by Mills Music Inc. who also publish most of Don's numbers.

Noel Rogers, who handles United Artistes Music Company in London, is happy to have the music from the film "Never On Sunday" due for release here in October and distributed by United Artistes. Dominion Music also handled by Rogers publishes "Get Your Daddies Car Tonight" recorded by The Petites on American Columbia and released here on Philips and by Lorrae Desmond on Parlophone. Rogers has high hopes for Perry Ford, composer of "Someone Else's Baby" whom he has under contract. A Parlophone recording session is planned for next week and one of the titles will be "Don't Weep Little Lady."

Shortly after flying in from Philadelphia Harry Finfer of Jamie-Guyden Records this week visited The Cash Box London office. Delighted to find his Umberto Bindi recording of "Our Concerto" No: 3 in the Italian charts and a Cash Box Pick of the Week (July 9). Harry reports that publishers Shapiro Bernstein is making it a No: 1 plug. He also has two versions coming out in the States of the theme from the film "Never On Sunday"—one on Jamie and one on Guyden. Finfer is en route for Milan, Germany, Belgium and Scandinavia to contact foreign representatives and distributors of the Jamie-Guyden labels and appoint distributors for the newly formed Caldwell label.

Paul Cave, manager for Frankie Vaughan told The Cash Box that since the star's return from Hollywood earlier this month his reputation in the international field has been firmly established by the impact of 20th Century Fox's publicity machine and offers are pouring in from all over the world including Australia, Denmark and Finland. British, American and Continental firm scripts are under consideration. The Davison Brothers—aged fourteen and sixteen—introduced by Frankie on the opening night of his Brighton summer season, were immediately offered a recording contract by Leslie Gould, managing director of Philips and the label's A & R Manager, Johnnie Franz.

Tommy Steel's latest film, "Light Up The Sky," opened in the West End last week. Score includes "Touch It Light" by Michael Pratt and the phenomenal Lionel Bart, whose latest musical "Oliver" has this week been the subject of a £23,000 library deal—plus a similar deal of £40,000 for his other current smash "Fings Ain't Wot They Used T'Be." Already bidding for the Broadway rights of "Oliver" are Impresarios David Merrick, Maurice Evans, Gilbert Miller and Ed Padula.

Lonnie Donegan, currently playing a summer season at Gt. Yarmouth this week, awarded a silver plaque by The Wholesale Clothing Manufacturers Association as "The Best Dressed Man in Show Business." Lonnie's new TV series "Putting On The Donegan" is now in full swing.

America's opera star, Rise Stevens, makes her second TV appearance here this year in "Saturday Spectacular." Also in the bill Roy Castle and Russ Conway. Russ will also be seen on four consecutive nights in July when BBC-TV screen repeat programmes from his successful series first seen earlier in the year. Guests featured in the shows include singers Joan Regan, Eddie Falcon, Jill Day, Marion Keene and Douglas Squires as well as The King Brothers. Guitarist Bert Weedon and The Peter Crawford Trio will also be seen. In all four programs Russ is accompanied by Geoff Love and his Orchestra.

On Sunday, July 31 ATV features a 35-minute excerpt from the London production of Frank Loesser's successful musical "The Most Happy Fella."

A new series of six half-hourly programs entitled "A Date With Shirley Jones and Jack Cassidy" is also planned by ATV starring the famous husband-and-wife team commencing August 11. Alma Cogan booked for the "The Tin Pan Alley Show" on July 23 and Cliff Richard stars in another "Saturday Spectacular" on July 30.

Carmen Dragon of the Hollywood Bowl this month conducts the Pro Arte Orchestra in his second BBC-TV appearance this year.

Monty Lewis of Gala Records announced that after a trial through thirteen wholesale branches with satisfactory results, W. H. Smith & Sons have agreed to undertake increased distribution of Gala disks through forty of their branches.

L. G. Wood, managing director of E.M.I. Records told The Cash Box that plans for presenting his company's artistes at the forthcoming Radio Show are now complete. A feature of the E.M.I. Stand will be an attractively decorated enquiry bureau supplying a comprehensive service to fans. The E.M.I. factory at Hayes closes for a two-week annual holiday from July 15. However, provision has been made for a suitable number of press men to remain for handling current hit records the supply of which will continue unhindered. With a dozen disks in The Top Twenty, E.M.I. is riding high—at the top is Jimmy Jones with "Good Timin'" on MGM and at No: 2 newcomer Tommy Bruce is a hot challenger with "Ain't Misbehavin,'" while Cliff Richard proves his fans were right in choosing "Please Don't Tease" now at No: 6 for his latest waxing on Colum-

'Miss Show Business' herself—Judy Garland—arrives in London this week. Norman Newell, A & R manager for EMI told The Cash Box that he expects her to wax an LP. Newell last week recorded an original cast LP of The Sadlers Wells Opera Company's successful production of "Orpheus In The Underworld." This week Newell is recording a new album by Paul Robeson.

Some huge benefit concerts have been arranged for Johnny O'Keefe, John Greeman and his wife Jan, who were recently involved in a serious motor accident. Concerts have already been conducted in Sydney and Melbourne starring Col Joye, Johnny Rebb, The Crescents, Candy & Mandy, Lucky Starr, and many other topline Australian stars. These shows have been compered by leading DJ's in these cities. All three people involved in the accident are progressing slowly but it is thought to be many months before Greeman will be able to resume his music. O'Keefe has had more than sixty stitches inserted in his facial cuts and arrangements have been made for a leading plastic surgeon to operate on him. The history-making 16-week Australian visit by the Sadler's Wells Opera Company also includes a season at The Tivoli Theatre in Sydney. There is a tremendous publicity campaign set to back "The Merry Widow" being handled by popular Bill Gordon.

Adding a further blaze to the steadily growing low-priced record fire is the new Gold Label series of Philips', 12" albums retailing at 39/6. First release in the series contains ten albums of popular classical material.

Another local boy making a mark for himself is E.M.I. recording star Ian Crawford. On the HMV label Ian is out with two new sides "Uptown" c/o "D-J Blues."

In a surprise move that should pay off in tremendous sales, W&G have made a rush release of the album "Rolf Harris At The Down-Under Club," recorded in the club of that name in London. W & G release this album under a deal with Queensway Records of England. Harris is currently one of the hottest artists in this country with his single of "Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport."

Brook Benton and Dinah Washington are having a successful chart run with their catchy Mercury single, "A Rockin' Good Way." This type of material is becoming very popular with Australian teenagers.

Continuing their entry into the local singles field, Pye Records have just released The Allen Brothers with "First Kiss" c/w "My Secret."

FROM HERE AND THERE:

Connie Francis is making a terrific impact with "Everybody's Somebody's Fool."

Duane Eddy's "Because They're Young" looks like breaking the charts pretty soon; the disk is bringing good advance publicity for the film.

Rhett Walker, young disk jockey with Radio 2UW in Sydney, is filling in as compere of television's "Six O'Clock Rock" while Johnny O'Keefe—the regular host—is recovering from his recent accident.

Quite an amount of interest in the recent announcement that the American Ampex Corporation is to commence operations in Australia shortly. There is already some Ampex equipment in use in radio and television stations and in record plants in this country.

GERMANY

American country music is finally making a big impact on the German market. At present, versions of "El Paso," "The Same Old Me," "Paper Roses," "He'll Have To Go" and many others are now out with German lyrics, and all are selling well.

This is the first time that country recordings have been successful in Germany in such large quantities. About 2 years ago, Englishman Chris Howland, who works in Germany as a D.J. in Cologne, covered "Fraulein" and sold over a million copies, but that was certainly an exception to the rule, and the German title helped.

The German public has long been familiar with American country music. The Armed Forces Radio Network, which has an estimated 50 million listeners in Europe, broadcasts 10 hours of country music a week. Although this station is beamed in English to the troops stationed here, many Germans listen to no other station. Army D.J. Jim Carter reported to The Cash Box that during the past 6 months, his German mail has picked up considerably. Country music caught the fancy of the people, but there are still too few records in the German language available. Then came the turning point. A young performer in Belgium, complete with ten gallon hat and leather fringed coat and pants, began singing country music and fast became the number one recording artist in Belgium. Then, about 1 year ago, Bobbyjaan, the Belgium youngster, recorded his first number in German. This simple melody, "Ich Steh An Der Bar Und Habe Kein Geld," had little success in Germany. In neighboring Austria, however, the song hit the Number 1 slot on the hit parade and is still there. The tune was originally the English song, "A Pub With No Beer." Finally, after sitting on the shelves 8 months, the song has caught on in Germany and is now Number 4 on the hit parade here. Now, publishers and record companies alike, are fighting for good country material. Don Pierce of Starday Records visited Germany, and reported great interest in country music. Wesley Rose also recently visited Germany for conferences with his partner here, Ralph Maria Siegel. From the other side of the picture, German publisher Peter Meisel, who introduced such songs as "Morgen" and "Petite Fleur" to America, just returned from America; and announced that the old itinerary of New York and L.A. is no longer sufficient for the German visiting the States on business. Nashville is now a must. Quite to the contrary, Rhythm and Blues has as yet, little influence on the trends here. Although names such as Lloyd Price, Little Richard and a very few others are popular, American stars such as Brook Benton, Dinah Washington, Sam Cooke, and others with the blues feeling, have not sold at all, and their numbers are not being covered. The one exception to this rule was "I'm Going To Get Married," which hit the top ten in Germany.

American film and TV star, Jerome Courtland, who is now seen on American screens with European produced series, "Tales Of The Vikings" has now settled in Germany. Jerry, who did recordings for Disneyland and Jubilee records in the states, has learned the German language and is now negotiating for a record contract here. He has also entered negotiations for the starring role in 3 musical films with German producer Herr Von Pinelli. In America, he also sang the title song from Disney's "Old Yeller" and narrated the soon to be released cartoon feature "Noah And The Ark," as well as singing all the songs from the film. It looks like he has a bright future here in Germany.

Three other Americans are now active on the German record scene. Bill Ramsey, who hit the top of the German hit parade with his cover of American flop "Souvenirs" is now riding high with his "Telephon Aus Paris." Gus Backus, who sang lead with The Vikings and also helped to compose their hits in America, "Come Go With Me" and "Whispering Bells" is also doing well with his cover of "If I Had A Girl" and is currently producing "Running Bear." The third, Mal Sondock, who is doing "Record Hops" and D.J. work here, just released his first record, which is a cover of Ray Price's hillbilly smash, "The Same Old Me."

That's all for this week in Germany. Auf Wiedersehn!

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BENELUX

Paul Anka's "Puppy Love" is topping the juke box charts in Belgium. The three Belgian music magazines printed an Anka photograph on the cover of their July issue. This is no coincidence, but accentuates Paul's tremendous popularity in Belgium.

Rocco Granata, of "Marina" fame, returned from Berlin to Brussels. In Berlin he appeared in a film titled "Marina." His new record "Rocco Cha Cha" (Moonglow label) is rapidly climbing the charts.

Freddy Quinn, one of Europe's biggest recording stars (every new record reaches the million mark!) made a Flemish-Dutch recording of his German successes "Melodie der Nacht" and "Irgendwann." Lyrics were written by Landy Calebaut. Producer Louis van Rymenant from Antwerp, flew to Hamburg to supervise the session. Freddy Quinn leaves this week for Brazil for his fifth film.

Oriole Records, distributed in Belgium by Ronnex Records, has a hit on its hands with "Little Christine" by Dick Jordan.

Mr. P. Borzée, chief of "Sonobel" (distributors in Belgium for Top Rank, Durium, Amadeo, etc.), has signed an exclusive contract with French indie label "America Records," specialists in Latin-American music. First releases by the Tito Rodriguez orchestra, "Figaro Cha Cha" and "Elvira" (in the new wa-pa-cha style!), have fine initial reactions with juke boxes. Same firm issued a single of the Amadeo L.P. "Los Javaloyas" under the "Sonobel" label; standard "La Violettera" b/w "Triana." This exciting cha-cha-record is proving to be a best seller.

Bobbejaan Schoepen, one of Belgium's most reputed recording artists, sings now in German language with same success. His record "Ich steh' an der Bar und habe kein Geld" (I stand on the bar and have no money) another version of "A Pub with no beer," rides high in Germany's top twenty. Bobbejaan is known in the US under his cowboy name Bobby John, where he recorded for RCA. The film of same title will be released shortly.

This year's International Song Contest in the Casino of Knokke, one of Belgium's seaside resorts, will be held from July 22nd-28th. It will be a big event and six countries will be represented. Belgium's competitors: Jean-Michel Blanc, Terry Lamo, Maryse Litsch, Louis Notari and Rina Pia. From Holland: Rita Reys, Willy Alberti, Teddy Scholten, Corry Brokken and Ton van Duinhoven. From Italy: Isabella Fedeli, Adriana Vasto, Edda Montanari, Tony Cucchiara and Nuzzo Salonia. From Germany: Inge Brandenburg, Hannelore Auer, Udo Jürgens, Frank Foster and Heinz Sagner. From England: Mat Munro, Jimmy Lloyd, Steve Martin, Valerie Masters and Wally Whyton. And from France: Barbara, Carole Vernel, Violette Renoir, Jean-Claude Renard and Jean-Pierre Delley. There will be many broadcasts from the Festival by the radio companies of Belgium, England, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg and Holland, as well as TV transmissions. Each evening there will be a guest appearance by a well known singer: Annie Cordy, Felix Marten, Jacqueline Boyer, Colette Renard, Jean-Claude Pascal and Georges Brassens.

Holland's famous home made Italian singer Willy Alberti is having a holiday in Italy.

One of the most active Dutch record bosses is Gerry M. Oord, who, when he travels through Germany and Switzerland, leaves at 5 o'clock and drives for 500 miles in-a-row.

In the Dutch record business there's a strong battle between the original version of "Cathy's Clown" by the Everly Brothers and the Blue Diamonds' imitational number. There is, however, a definite preference for the Everlys. On the other hand, the (Dutch) Blue Diamonds are extremely popular in Holland and this week these Decca artists reached a record. They celebrated their 200,000 sold record. There has been a reception at Loosdrecht, Holland's yachting centre, where the Blue Diamonds were presented with the latest model radiogram for selling so many records in such a short time. Record business started for the Blue Diamonds about nine months ago. The 200,000 mark is a real record for a country as small as Holland. When a Dutch artist reaches the 100,000 mark he is presented with a golden record.

Well known Frisia's, a very popular Frisian accordion trio, had their part of festivities too. Leader Jopie Roukema celebrated his 30th anniversary as an artist. He went professional when six years old. Now records by the trio are high in the market and selling steadily. The Frisia's newest Decca recording—a medley of hit tunes—can be found on 9 out of ten juke boxes in Holland.

Peter en zijn Rockets—most original R & R group from the Low Countries—are making hit upon hit. Their "Kom van dat dak af" is number two on the charts at this moment, and their new single "Laat me los" sold a few thousand before it was released. L.C. Phonogram thinks "Laat me los" will be the R & R hit of 1960!

L.C. Bovema will also release repertoire from the COED label, which has artists like The Crests and Adam Wade. The label will be rushed in the Dutch market.

Hitmaker Corry Brokken (L.C. Phonogram) who is still high on the charts with her "Milord," sung in Dutch, made a German version of her biggest success.

Umberto Bindi is currently the most successful Italian composer. In fact, his "Il Nostro Concerto" (Our Concert) is still number 3 and selling very well. The sheet music of this hit composition is published by Maestro Alfredo Rossi of Ariston (Vicolo Pattari 2, Milan), who also has the rights to all the other Bindi musical creations. The recording of "Our Concerto" performed by the author himself is on Ricordi.

On Tuesday, July 5th, a new show appeared on Italian television titled "Tintarella." The movie "Girls Town" is expected to appear on the Italian screens shortly. Paul Anka stars in his first role as an actor. He sings his big hit, "It's Time To Cry."

Gilbert Becaud's opening night at the Chez Vous in Venice was aired on TV. The singer was very successful.

Decca has released "Paper Roses" by Anita Bryant in Italy, and "He'll Have To Stay" by Jeanne Black on Capitol has just been released here, too.

A 45 EP titled "Jungle Echoes" by Caino & The Safari Percussion Boys distributed in Italy on the Omega Records label, has been censored and copies taken from circulation due to its piece titled, "Jungle Chase" which reproduced too much reality with the voices and sighs of two lovers.

Mogull Firms Hold Foreign Domestic Right To Buy Tunes

NEW YORK—Top tunes—including "Alley-Oop," the nation's number one tune, and others with a rosy future have been acquired by various Ivan Mogull publishing firms for exposure abroad.

"Alley-Oop"—sales are shared by the Hollywood Argyles (Lute) and Dante & The Evergreens (Madison)—was purchased for Harvard Music, with world rights excluding the U.S., Canada, British Empire and Commonwealth of Nations. Another hit novelty, "Itsy Bitsy Teenie Weenie Yellow Polkadot Bikini" (Brian Hyland on Kapp) was bought for Ivan Mogull Music, and rights include: British Commonwealth of Nations and Mandated territories (excluding Canada, Australia and New Zealand), Republic of Eire, France and French Union, Belgium, Holland, Luxemburg and Italy.

From Class Music of Belgium, Mogull Music has the hot instrumental-lyric item, "Oh, Oh Rosie," (a hit in Europe) for the U.S., and the Brit-

ish Commonwealth of Nations. Versions of the tune available here include Marino Marini (Top Rank); Rocco Granata (Epic); Perez Prado (Victor); Lou Monte (Roulette).

Mogull Music has another European hit, "Mustapha," represented disk-wise here by Archie Bleyer (Cadence) under the title of "Mustafa" and the Four Lads (Columbia) under the English lyric title of "The Sheik Of Chicago." Also in the Mogull Music catalog is a Scandanavian success, "Klas-Goran," and "Goin' To The Dogs" by Art & Dottie Todd (Dart).

Harvard Music has Bleyer's flip side, "Jimmie's Blues" and Alan Chase's Columbia side, "Let Me See You Smile." Mogull, who recently returned from a world tour, said his foreign rights to "Running Bear"—the Johnny Preston (Mercury) smash—proved a successful venture.

Recent additions to Mogull's disk promo staff include Jerry Moss on the West Coast, Joe Petralia for the East Coast.

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SCANDINAVIA

Finland reports that the present Finnish Hit Parade includes nine songs in Finnish and one in English—all ten sung by domestic artists. Finnish artists as well as songs in the Finnish language, many of them written by Finnish composers, are at the present popular as never before.

News from Denmark is that the Hit Parade is topped by a domestic song, "To lys på et bord" (Two candles on a table). This song appeared in the local Danish melody Grand Prix this year. The jury, however, didn't find the song good enough to be the Danish contribution at Royal Festival Hall (Eurovision Song Festival) in March this year, and chose another number, "Det var en yndig tid" (It was a wonderful time). The latter didn't do anything in London and nothing at all on the home market, while "To lys. . ." now is the top seller in Denmark.

Grethe Sönck was presented with a Silver Record (comparable to a Gold disk) when her Danish recording of "Klaus Jörgen" went over 50,000. The song was recorded on the Sonet label.

Several new labels have started to appear on the Danish record market. Skandinavisk Grammophon A/S (the local EMI distributor) introduced Lion and Wing. Nordisk Polyphon, the Decca-Brunswick distributor, introduced Ace of Clubs. RCA released its Camden series and Sonet introduced Gala. Most of those labels have one thing in common, they are low-price labels for LP albums.

"Tom Pillibi" is now in third place on the Danish Hit Parade. Two recordings are listed among the best sellers, the original French version sung by Jacqueline Boyer on Columbia and a Danish version sung by Raquel Rastenni on HMV.

"Stuck On You" by Elvis Presley on RCA is now 13th on the Danish Hit Parade. Danish rock'n'roll fans have finally accepted Elvis as "king of rock," a position he seems to have had difficulty reaching among Danish teenagers.

Spotted as next big Hit in Denmark is Edith Piaf's "Milord" on Columbia, just released on the Danish market.

Danish TV presented Pat Boone's Danish concert (in April) on June 28th. So far, the song has been released in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Holland and Belgium, and negotiations are going on with the U.S.

Hermanas Benitez (the Benitez Sisters) from Cuba, are at the Berns, Stockholm, this month. The five sisters are doing very well, and all Swedish critics agree that their singing is first class.

Requests Hans Lengsfelder Skeds Extensive European Trip

NEW YORK—H. J. Lengsfelder, A&R head of Request Records, will leave on an extensive European business trip on Sept. 2. He will visit Portugal, Spain, Italy, Greece, Austria, Switzerland, Germany, Sweden, Holland, France and England.

Aside from his recording activities for Request, he will also make recordings for other labels under special agreement. In addition, Lengsfelder plans to revamp his foreign distributor network. He has already begun such a project here.

Lengsfelder, who also represents

his publishing firm, Pleasant Music, will also have conferences with major publishers in every country where his firm has not as yet made catalog arrangements. In Vienna, he will confer with the heads of the Ludwig Doblinger publishing firm, one of Austria's oldest and largest, which he represents in all English-speaking countries.

Request specializes in "unusual," yet "commercial" LP's, some of which include "Songs Of Korea," "Jan Bart Sings Best Loved Jewish Songs," and "Just Arrived From Italy."

"Heart To Heart Talk," which marked Bob's first release in four years and Bob's and Tommy's first together in 14 years is making strides up the charts and looks like a big one. Bob is currently on a tour of one-nighters throughout Texas, booked through Sam Gibbs of Wichita Falls . . . To top off all these activities, Chuck also has reigns over his own show on KMSP, "The Chuck Carson Show," which has been fortunate in having as recent guests such stars as Wanda Jackson, Porter Wagoner, Billy Grammer, Bill Anderson, Little Jimmy Dickens, Hank Locklin and many others. Chuck extends an open invitation to all artists travelling through the area to drop in and chat with him on the show or at his Circle Dot operation located at 5200 Minnehaha Avenue, Minneapolis.




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*An Informal Discussion Among
Several Leading Operators:*

Loans To Locations

Loans continue to rank as one of the primary topics of conversation whenever coinmen gather, and the main subject during an informal discussion among operators several weeks ago, during an industry get-together, outlined the views of several leading music operators with firms currently operating in the Upper New York State area.

While all concerned admitted that loans were a necessary evil, the degree to which this practice is conducted seemed to be the measuring stick as to what part loans should play in the overall music operating business.

An operator present opened the conversation with the suggestion that his policy of utilizing loans only as a means of obtaining brand new locations, and not to "jump" competitive locations, was the most efficient way to handle the problem. According to this coinman, it placed the expenditure into a "cost of new business" category that at least made some sense.

Another operator could see no reason why a request for a loan, from a financially sound location, should be refused. "Loans in this instance are almost guaranteed to be repaid, provide for additional income through interest, and cement relationships between the location and myself."

A third coinman present voiced the opinion that his "loan money" had to return a profit equal to that of his capital investment as it applies to the overall business or he wouldn't handle it. "At the end of each month, loans ranging from the smallest to the largest amounts must return X% profit to me or I'm not interested. To date this is my personal policy. Unfortunately, this policy puts me into the finance business and I'd just as soon use the money to buy new equipment. I'm an operator and I want to control the capital investment where there is a possibility of expansion and greater return through merchandising, increased traffic in a specified location, and various programs whereby play can be stimulated on a phonograph. While the loan offers a return, I'd much rather put the money into the sale of automatic music. That's my business."

One operator at the table spoke in favor of "front money" and a contract or "at least a 'minimum' collections deal." He stated that if this wasn't part of the overall proposition, then the loan was out of the question. "One way I know of circumventing the problem is to suggest to the location owner a new machine each year which will return greater income each week. I put the money into the new equipment which is a much better deal than any loan. I get him off my back as far as requests for new machines are concerned and I can depreciate the machine considerably on my books which he doesn't necessarily know anything about, of course. The final impression he has is that I would rather put money into new equipment in order to increase his profits than loan it to him and have him wind up worse off than when he started—and we usually depart on a friendly note."

This report is presented in the hope that strategy used by other coinmen may be helpful to all concerned with the loan problem—a problem that has grown in size since an operator loaned his very first dollar.

Rock-Ola Enters Vending Field With Purchase Of Hebel Expect To Hold Major Vending Berth With Three More Acquisitions Planned

CHICAGO—David C. Rockola, president, Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation this city announced last week that the firm has entered the rapidly expanding vending-machine field with the purchase of Fred Hebel Corporation of Addison, Illinois.

Rockola said the purchase is the first step in making Rock-Ola a major factor in the vending-machine field. "Negotiations now are underway," he said, "with a view to acquiring three additional subsidiaries to Rock-Ola Manufacturing."

Purchase of the Hebel Corporation was for an undisclosed sum, but Rockola said the transaction was for cash with no stock involved.

In addition to the 25,000-square-foot Hebel plant in Addison, the acquisition includes three acres of land which will be used for a planned 60,000-square-foot expansion program.

"Rock-Ola's goal in the expansion of its new Hebel subsidiary," said Rockola, "is to start work on a complete line of in-plant food vendors by the close of 1960."

These would include coffee, milk, ice cream, hot food machines, cigaret, candy, pastry, detergent, pre-mix and post-mix selective beverage vendors, single and batch-brew coffee machines and a number of miscellaneous food-vending machines, he said.

Hebel currently manufactures coffee, milk, ice cream and hot food vending machines.

E. G. Doris, executive vice president of Rock-Ola, said the present Hebel working force would be left intact. He said the Hebel employment rolls will be expanded in the near future as the new lines are added. The Hebel name, he said, will be retained on all vending machines.

Rockola said there would be no change in the operation of the Rock-Ola Chicago plant as a result of the firm's entry into the vending-machine field.

"The present Rock-Ola factory in Chicago covers three and one-half city blocks with 23 buildings and more than 500,000 square feet of manufacturing facilities, making it the largest factory of its kind in the world devoted solely to manufacturing coin-operated phonographs.

"However, the demand for increased production to satisfy both domestic and overseas demand, he said, will mean all facilities at the Chicago site will remain in production of phonographs," continued Rock-Ola.

Rockola said sales of coin-operated phonographs increased at the rate of 12 per cent per year since 1951, and this year Rock-Ola expects the largest increase in the history of the company.

By purchasing Hebel, Rock-Ola plans to take advantage of the booming vending-machine business volume which has increased from 600 million dollars in 1946 to more than \$2,300,000,000 in 1959. Vending-machine sales, he said, are expected to reach four billion dollars by 1965.

C-MC Re-Elects Entire Panel Reports On Increased Membership

CHICAGO—The Coin-Machine Council for public relations executive committee met Tuesday, July 12, at the Morrison Hotel in this city to discuss current membership, and to lay the groundwork for a strong public relations drive in the near future. He said: "Most of us who have been in the coin machine industry for many years are fully aware of the many problems and adversities heaped upon us through the years because of poor public relations.

"We desperately need good public relations," he concluded, "and should do everything in our power toward this end."
