



"ONE-EYED JACKS" (3:00) [Famous ASCAP-Friedhofer] "TARA'S THEME" (2:41) [Remick ASCAP-Steiner] FERRANTE & TEICHER (United Artists 300)

The dual-pianists, who have scored heavily via their readings of "The Apartment" and "Exodus" themes, should do more of the same with this newcomer. It's the love theme from the up-coming Marlon Brando western, "One-Eyed Jacks," and it receives a lush showcase with the dramatic-pic opening and closing segment. "Tara's Theme" (the background music from "Gone With The Wind"—which is getting the re-release treatment) is also fitted out in similar style. Two great sides.

DINAH WASHINGTON (Mercury 71778)

The coming weeks should find Dinah Washington's name plastered all over the hit lists. Her latest for Mercury has that double-barreled smash look. "Early Every Morning (Early Every Evening Too)" is a sparkling rockin' rhythm affair, colorfully backed by the Fred Norman outfit. "Do You Want It That Way" features Dinah's beautiful ballad stylings against a lush Nat Goodman ork-chorus backdrop.

"MOOD INDIGO" (2:45) [Gotham Music Service ASCAP—Ellington, Mills, Bigard]

"ON THE REBOUND" (2:05) [Cigma BMI-Cramer]

FLOYD CRAMER (RCA Victor 7840)

Cramer, who broke thru with his captivating 88-work on "Last Date," should stay right up on top with his wonderful version of the Duke Ellington classic, "Mood Indigo." It's an ear-arresting "Date"-styled session culled from Floyd's "Last Date" LP. The rockin' "On The Re-bound" can also land in hitsville.

Here's two more winners from Cooke, who recently completed a solid chart run with "Sad Mood." "That's It—I Quit—I'm Movin' On" is an enticing rock-a-shuffler backed in bright handclapping fashion by the Sammy Lowe ork-chorus. Ralph Burns' crew warmly backs up on the poignant, ultra-lovely "What Do You Say." Either, or both, can make it.

JERRY BUTLER (VeeJay 375)

Watch for Jerry Butler to come thru with a hit follow-up to "He Will Break Your Heart." Tune's another 'advice giving' rock-a-cha-cha ditty tagged "Find Another Girl," that Butler dishes up in ten-appealing manner. Flipdeck's a heartfelt beat-ballad affair.





Lush backing includes an effective rock percussion sound. Deck was reportedly a European hit. Should be watched closely. Minton's, the "place where modern jazz was born," has become a famed and fabled place to jazz fans and musicians alike. And throughout its years of importance as a jazz experiment mecca, not one commercial recording had ever been made in it. Never, that is, until Jan. 6th this year, when Prestige Records went in to tape a "live" session by the Eddie Davis-Johnny Griffin Quintet. The place, known as the Playhouse Restaurant (208 W. 118th St.) to non-jazz buffs, still has live jazz—the Davis-Griffin Quintet is there now—but has lost much of its fame in recent years. Prestige intends to revive interest in it as an offshoot to the recording of "The Tenor Scene," the title given the set recorded there. Advance reports indicate that though these men are not pointing the way in modern jazz there, they sure can blow up a storm.

Gene Ammons, absent from the New York scene for several years, returned to the city for a week date at the Apollo Theatre as co-headliner with Nina Simone, Horace Silver, James Moody and Eddie Jefferson in disk jockey (WEVD) Mort Fega's jazz show. The show closed out a successful week Feb. 20th. While in N.Y., Ammons did a studio session for Prestige which will be on LP in March.

Monte Kay has put together his second theatre jazz package in a month. The new one is set for a week at Washington, D.C.'s Howard Theatre (beginning Feb. 24th) and features Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, Herbie Mann's Afro-Jazz Sextet augmented with four trumpets, and Gloria Lynne accompanied by the Earl May Trio. This is Blakey's first bug date since returning from Kay's jazz festival in Japan in January.

Songstress Teri Thornton is being groomed as a new jazz star by Riverside Records. The thrush, who boasts a rich contralto voice, was pacted by Orin Keepnews, Riverside's A&R topper, who has already cut her initial LP, titled "Devil May Care." The gal had been doing club dates in Montreal, Chicago and Cleveland until a shot on the Dave Garroway TV'er attracted attention to her talents. Keepnews signed her on recommendations by Cannonball Adderley and Johnny Griffin. Bob Altshuler told us about a recent studio session with Abbey Lincoln that turned into a meeting of jazz giants. Bob was overlooking Nat Hentoff's supervision of Abbey's first solo LP for Candid, a sort of sequel to the "Freedom Now" date tagged "Straight Ahead," when Charlie Mingus dropped in to listen followed by Thelonious Monk who stopped in to give approval of Abbey's lyrics to his famed "Blue Monk" opus. Max Roach did the charts for the session.

The Modern Jazz Quartet has established some sort of "first" in jazz by having three of LP's released simultaneously in one week by Atlantic Records. The LP's are "European Concert," a double-disk set, and "The Modern Jazz Quartet & Orchestra." The "European Concert" package was recorded "live" in Copenhagen last year by the label's Nesuhi Ertegun during the MJQ's triumphal European tour. The other set follows the pattern set by the group on its previous "Third Stream Music" LP, combining a blend of classical and jazz elements.

Leslie & Creditors Fail To Settle At N.Y. Meet

NEW YORK—A settlement between Leslie Distributors of New York, the one-stop operation, and its creditors failed to materialize at a creditors' meeting held here last week (12) at the Biltmore Hotel. A committee of creditors was formed to keep the door open for future negotiations.

A rarity for such a gathering was the appearance of the principle, Leslie owner Lou Boorstein. Usually, such meetings are conducted between the creditors and the principles' lawyers and accountants.

Boorstein opened the meeting with a statement that he was "sorry for those two creditors who had no previous billings with me to be caught in this net of circumstances." He noted that he had done business with the others over a period of sixteen years, with billings totalling between twelve and fifteen million dollars. He felt that unless a settlement was reached, Leslie of New York would have to go out of business. Not affected by the creditors' meeting is Leslie's other butlets in Freeport, L.I., Newark, and Hartford.

Boorstein said both private detectives and the police department were checking his reports of theft of merchandise, a problem, Boorstein noted, that has plagued other firms of late. It was brought out that an inventory taken on Dec. 31 showed a loss of records worth \$40,000, and another nventory on Jan. 31 showed a loss of \$50,000 worth of records.

The creditors turned-down a settlenent offer which included the paynent of 20% in merchandise and 10%in cash plus an additional $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ to be paid in two notes over a period of three years. Counter offers by the reditors of payment of a hundred tents on the dollar over a long period of time or 66 and 2/3% with 10%lown were turned-down by Leslie's awyer, Sam Kaufman, who said 'financial circumstances'' did not alow for such settlements.

In a letter to dealers, label president Glen E. Wallichs said that "we take this step as positive expression of our belief in the rightness and inevitability of our industry's adoption of but one speed-33 RPM. Wallichs said that Capitol's action was rooted in reasoning which included "a fresh selling approach to the 33-speed album enthusiast" who could now play the new singles at the same machine speed as his favorite LP and "longawaited relief to those who have fretted and fumbled with awkward center hole adapters and spindles"; a broader range of buying groups, both in interest and age; the "Capitol 33 implies and assures all the quality and fidelity a buyer has learned to expect from the 33 LP."

Among dealer incentives on the releases is 100% exchange protection. Capitol's previous 33 singles releases have been confined to Seeburg's "Artist of the Week" juke-boxes.

UA's Talmadge Set For 2-Week Tour In Europe


NEW YORK—Art Talmadge, vice president and general manager of United Artists Records, will make a two-week swing of the European continent starting March 10 to meet with foreign affiliates of the UA line. Accompanying Talmadge will be Sidney Shemel, director of foreign operations.

David Picker, UA's executive vice president, preceded Talmadge, leaving for Europe last week. While he will be primarily concerned with motion picture activities while on the Continent, Picker will also meet with record company affiliates during his trip.


"Due to the rapid growth of United Artists Records," Talmadge said, "and the stepped-up activity throughout the European market with our product, it is vitally important to effect a closely knit understanding with each of our affiliates in that area. In addition, we plan to review our contracts with each affiliate.

This will mark Talmadge's first overseas trip since assuming his present post with United Artists.

UA has been especially active in the European market in the past few months with its motion picture sound tracks and releases, with "Never On Sunday" and "The Apartment" both reportedly best-selling albums in most European countries, and the singles featuring the themes from both UA films also on the best-selling charts. In addition. Talmadge's trip will precede the openings of "Exodus" in London and Paris, and he will complete arrangements for the release of the Ferrante and Teicher single and the Hollywood Studio Symphony album of the "Exodus" music in those areas.

Phil Stout continues to make friends and influence people bi being two-faced. That is, Phil spins the sweet sounds via WTOA-FM-Trentor but still manages to dig the teen scene by hosting two or three record hops an week. Phil asks not to be overlooked with service as his hops at Lambertvill Roller Arena (since 1955) rack up huge attendance figures regularly.... Ai editorial aired over WMAK-Nashville proved instrumental in rallying the loca populace to the cause of a city educational TV station. For seven years city and county officials booted around plans for the channel, which had been al located for such a purpose by the FCC. Nashville's delay in getting started prompted an Alabama group to take action in getting the channel for their own commercial use. WMAK's "Opinion-Aire" rallied citizens to urge city official to get moving on its plans, which they are now doing. The success of radie editorials continues to prove its importance in enlightened radio management thinking.... The name Johnny Fortune prompted KBLA-Burbank deeja;" Jay Michael to name his Emmy disk, "Gee But I Miss You," his Fortune Kookide of Tomorrow.... 

Arranged by SBC-TV (Swedish Broadcasting-TV Company) and varmed by something close to scanlals in previous years, this year's vent was so surrounded by various ecrets that the whole thing ended up n something very close to another candal.

While last year, the names of comosers-writers were no secret 12 hours efore the Festival took place—a mart record company had recorded n EP which it released before the estival took place, and everybody vho purchased the EP could read the ames on the label long before those ames became "official"-this year BC-TV done its very best to keep ll names secret until after the Fesival. Unfortunately, they also coninued to keep things secret after the 'estival, and everybody who wanted o know the titles of the songs had to sk SBC-TV Press Dept.

Most of the local dailies didn't have ime to do so before going to press, nd therefore, the five songs sung in he Festival, have almost as many ifferent titles as there are newsapers here. Only one paper, the eveing Expressen, was able to print the orrect titles, which might be exlained by the fact that this paper had ne of its editors in the Stockholm ury of three persons. Other jurys ere sitting in Gothenburg, Malmö nd Umeå. Each member of the jury ould give from one to ten points to he songs, and the Stockholm jury was atriotic enough to give a song titled Stockholm" 24 points, while the other pots didn't feel too enthusiastic about nis song. Frankly its chances abroad ouldn't have been too great, since ny song describing various places in ne Swedish capitol wouldn't appeal such to anyone living outside of tockholm.

Southern Music of Stockholm is the ublisher of four of the five songs in ne local Festival. The fifth song is ublished by Reuter & Reuter. The inning song, "April, April," will be weden's contribution to the Eurovion Song Festival, which takes place 1 Cannes, on March 18. It is not yet ecided who will sing Sweden's song Cannes. Since the song was sung ere by Siw Malmkvist, the Metroome artist and by Gunnar Wiklund BFB artist)-each song was sung vice-most of the Swedish people ave declared that they would like iss Malmkvist to represent Sweden Cannes. SBC-TV is to decide whom ley will send to Cannes within some IVS.




NEW YORK—Vanguard Records has announced the release of seven albums for Feb., including recorded firsts in the classical field.

Vanguard's "Landmarks of American Music" series, issued in conjunction with West Projects, will present two albums containing previously unrecorded works. Five short works by Samuel Barber, which includes "A Hand of Bridge," a 9-minute opera with libretto by Menotti, and Roy Harris' "Folksong Symphony 1940," are both conducted by Vladimir Golschmann. The Barber disk features the Symphony of the Air, the Robert De Cormier Chorale and a cast of vocalists including Patricia Neway. He will also be responsible for the supply of EMI disks to the firm's London provincial depots and to wholesalers. White's activities will continue to include the selection of repertoire for release in the United Kingdom, EP cover production, ad-vertising and promotion and merchan-dising. dising. G. J. Freshwater and Arthur Mux-

low will continue to be responsible to White for advertising and cover production and promotion and exploitation.

Other major changes will include the appointments of R. L. Oldfield as marketing manager for the Colum-bia, Parlophone, MGM and Mercury labels, handled abroad by EMI, and D. T. Tungate as marketing manager for HMV, Capitol and Top Rank. Certain other changes will be made within EMI's sales force with the ob-ject of effecting, by greater concen-tration, a "considerable" increase in the company's share of the United Kingdom market and improved serv-ice to dealers. 1960 was one of the most successful sales years in the history of the company.

Seeger Celebrates 70th Birthday

After the war, Seeger headed up the new talent studios for Polydor Records until Ralph S. Peer asked him to head the German office for Peer International and Southern Music. Under Seeger's guidance, Peer has become one of the most promi-nent publishing houses in Germany.



Like All Other Industries:

Operators Need Credit Information

The editorial, "The Location Contract," which appeared in the January 28, 1961 issue of *The Cash Box*, stirred up tremendous interest, resulting in a great many requests from operators for a copy of the MONY contract form.

Numerons comments and advices were also received. It seems that one of the problems prevalent in many areas thruont the nation has been created in recent years, whereby operators are being injured financially due to scheming location owners. These individuals, in many instances, are responsible for creating breach of contract. They invite other operators, unfamiliar with the financial merits of the location, to install a machine, and turn ont the present operator, even though a contract is in existence. There is no question that were the new operator aware of the facts, he wouldn't become a party to this breach of contract. However, there is no source available whereby he can find out the facts.

To assist the operator in conducting a responsible business, it has been suggested by coinmen from several areas that a "Credit" organization be set up in local areas, which would keep pertinent credit, financial and legal information available to the operator.

We can see the merit of these arguments. Credit bureaus exist thruout the nation in practically every business (clothing, dresses, hard goods, soft goods, department stores, banks, etc.). Why not in the Coin Machine operating business?

Looking back to the response from operators to our standing offer of copies of MONY's location contract, which incidentally includes supplemental forms or bonuses, loans, and loan-bonus agreements, and judging from this response the value such a document has in conducting an operation, it would be wise for coinmen who haven't requested free copies of the MONY contract to do so at the earliest possible moment. Copies are available at the New York office of *The Cash Box*.

New England Ops Hear Trimount's **Plans For AMI-Rowe Equipment; Concern Over Canteen Move Eases**

BOSTON, MASS. — Approximately seventy-five operators from the New England area turned out in response to an invitation from Trimount Auto-matic Sales Company last week to meet the firm's new owners— officials of the Automatic Canteen Company of America. The invitation was prompted for several reasons, one of which was to alleviate whatever doubt the coinmen might have had regarding the coinmen might have had regarding rumors of operating competition from Canteen. Trimount's holdings include

rumors of operating comparison Canteen. Trimount's holdings include a music-games operation. "We have been appointed exclusive distributors for the AMI phonograph in the New England area," said Irv Margold, Trimount host for the day-long get-acquainted session, "and we intend to offer every operator in New England the same fine service he has come to expect over our thirty-five years in this business." AMI, Inc. is a subsidiary of Canteen having been acquired by the nation's largest vend-ing organization in 1959. With this acquired by the nation's largest vend-ing organization in 1959. With this statement, Margold extinguished whatever spark of doubt may have existed in the minds of the operators and the general consensus was that the coinmen were happy to see Tri-mount back in the phonograph dis-tributing business. Canteen's operat-ing ambitions were played down by company officials with emphasis for the acquisition being placed on the opportunity to establish a distributing arm for the AMI phonograph with a firm recognized as a leading whole-saler in this area.

Margold, in discussing the Canteen acquisition, outlined the move from a corporate point of view. "Canteen has corporate point of view. "Canteen has the plans of setting up a sales and service outlet not only for the AMI phonograph but also for the Rowe cigarette and vending machine lines. Up until now operators couldn't pur-chase a part for the machine in this city. This is all good business not only for Canteen but for the New England operators of this equipment."

He added that the Trimount back-He added that the Trimount back-ground music operations are extensive and that Canteen, as an operator of background music on a nationwide basis, was interested in this aspect as well. In addition, Trimount is also dis-tributor for RCA communications sys-tems which include paging and address tems which include paging and address systems in the New England schools and also 'language laboratories' which have been installed in high schools and colleges here. Canteen has been reported to be interested in this field of growth. Trimount has also pioneered the growth of Telenorm, an inter-departmental telephone system which is currently in use in the New England area. Much of this electronic development has been supervised by Dave Bond, Trimount's founder and President of the firm. Bond was away during the Canteen-operator meeting. Furthermore, Trimount boasts a firm with thirty-seven employees, twenty-five of whom have more than ten years experience with the comany. "Canteen was in the market for an established

In addition, the 3: idea will not meet with as much 4! rpm problem since Europe has no where near as many 45 rpm player: on the market as the U.S. "Mos phono players are already three speed players so the 33-single idea presents no problem for the home re tail market," stated Silverman.

Silverman expects the labels to ge into production within 90 days and intends to follow up the visit with contact designed to stimulate further action on the part of the labels insofar as actual 33 single pressing is concerned. As it stands, the only 33's to be pressed will be those ordered by Seeburg for use in the 5-disk packages which are sold throughout the USA.

"The plan will also enable the European recording artist to benefit from Artist of the Week' display on the Seeburg machines," said Silverman.

Labels lined up for the Seeburg program are Tel-Dec, Philips, Pye, EMI, Decca, Pallette, Barclay, Oriole, and Vogue. The Seeburg promo head's tour embraced Switzerland, Germany, France, England and Denmark.



characters which are viewed by the player on the 'Panascope Viewer'.


