The Cash Box Pick of the Week

"THE FISH" (2:17) [Lowe ASCAP—Lowe, Mann, Appell]
"THE THIRD HOUSE" (2:26) [Lowe ASCAP—Lowe, Mann, Appell]
BOBBY RYDELL (Cameo 192)

The talented young song stylist has two powerful newcomer follow-ups to his recent oldie hit, "That Old Black Magic." On one end he teaches the kids how to do "The Fish" in a "Mama Said"-rock-a-cha-cha style. The other half features a rockin', handclapping party going on at "The Third House (In From The Right)." Sensational vocal and instrumental assist on both portions.

"A TEAR" (2:05) [Ludix BMI—Dixon, Dennson]
"SHE'S COME BACK" (2:37) [Cedarwood BMI—Wilkin, Westberry]
GENE McDANIELS (Liberty 55344)

"A Tear" should put a smile on the lips of everyone concerned with this new Gene McDaniels release. It's the follow-up to the artist's "Hundred Pounds Of Clay" smasher and it's a touching teen beat cha weeper that Gene and the ork-chorus put across with heartfelt emotion. The rhythmic rock-a-shuffler, "She's Come Back," can also make big chart noise.

"I'LL BE THERE" (2:53) [Progressive, Trio BMI—King, Glick, Jones]
"LOVE LAID ITS HANDS ON ME" (2:00) [Tree, Betalbin BMI—Singleton, Kennedy, Gibson]
DAMITA JO (Mercury 71840)

The fabulous wax and in-person talent, who 'answered' the Drifters' "Save The Last Dance" in hit "I'll Save The Last Dance" style, can come thru again with her answer to Ben E. King's "Stand By Me." This one, tagged "I'll Be There," spotlights Damita at her vocal best on a session with the same melody and arrangement as the King click. The ork support by Chuck Sagle is top drawer. The happy romantic, chorus-backed coupler rocks along at an attention-getting clip.

"TEARS ON MY PILLOW" (2:52) [Western ASCAP—Autry, Rose]
"WILL THERE BE SPACE IN MY SPACESHIP" (1:53) [Lisa-Ann ASCAP—Morris, Kane]
THE MCGUIRE SISTERS (Coral 62275)

Gals, having returned to chartdom with their country-angled "Just For Old Times Sake," dish up more of the same hit sounds with this updating of "Tears On My Pillow." It's a real smoothie that the McGuire three deliver at a pleasing ballad-shuffle pace. The topical "Spaceship" coupler has a catchy vaudeville era flavor.

"VOYAGE TO THE BOTTOM OF THE SEA" (2:13) [Debmar BMI—Faith]
"THE SUMMER OF '61" (2:38) [Debmar BMI—Mareucci, Faith]
FRANKIE AVALON (Chancellor 1081)

The young crooner can soon be chalking up another chart item in his latest for Chancellor. It's the title-tune of the forthcoming pic, "Voyage To The Bottom Of The Sea," and it's an ultra-lovely ballad (in spite of the unromantic tag) warmly caressed by Avalon and the Russ Faith ork-choral group. There's a "Venus"-flavor to the soft beat cha cha beaut, "Summer Of '61." Can also take off.

"PRINCESS" (2:22) [Harvest, Recherche, E. V. Deane ASCAP—Deane, Leonard, Familio]
"THE LAST BUS LEFT AT MIDNIGHT" (2:25) [Harvest, Recherche ASCAP—David, Hampton]
FRANK GARI (Crusade 1022)

This looks like the third hit-in-a-row for the warm-voiced youngster who's had "Utopia" and "Lullabye Of Love." It's an extremely pretty "Venus"-type cha cha ballad, tabbed "Princess," that Gari and the Bob Mersey ork-chorus serve up in charming fashion. Don't overlook the rock-a-cha-cha coupler, "The Last Bus Left At Midnight." It also has the chart goods. Could be a doubleheader.

"THEME FROM COME SEPTEMBER" (2:35) [Adaris BMI—Darin]
"WALK BACK TO ME" (2:21) [Adaris BMI—Darin]
BOBBY DARIN & HIS ORCHESTRA (Atco 6200)

The gifted, versatile Mr. Darin, who's currently showing up on the hit lists with his vocal rendition of "Nature Boy," grabs maestro (and cleffing) credits this time out. Tune, an enchanting baion, is the theme from the up-coming Darin-starring flick, "Come September." Ear-pleasing choral-ork arrangement by Bob Mersey. Fred Norman's the arranger of the enticing ("One Mint Julep"-flavored) "Walk Back To Me" coupler that highlights Darin's fine harpsichord talents.

PEGGY BROWN & THE STARLETS (London 1996)

(B+) "ALONE ON THE SHORE (Denn Sie Fahren Hinaus Auf Das Meer)" (2:54) [Burlington ASCAP—Scharfenberger, Busch, Stelman] Star German thrush, aptly called the Doris Day of Germany, does an English version of her current German Best Seller, a pretty wistful set in a rock-a-cha beat. Sound could happen here.

(B) "SAY YOU'LL BE MINE" (Zahle Jede Stunde)" (2:30) [Felsted BMI—Wilden, Hofmeister, Stelman] More straight forward, appealing ballad sound in this corner.

THE SUPERBS (Heritage 340)

(B+) "THE FISH" (2:29) [Elsher BMI—Robinson] Contagious busy-beat display by the songsters and combo on a teen dance-theme that could click (Bobby Rydell has a different ditty also named "The Fish"). This outing could be one of the step's disk successes. Label is based in Philly.

(B) "RAINBOW OF LOVE" (2:27) [Elsher BMI—Robinson, Grier] Boys switch to an inviting soft-beat lovey-dovey.

FRANKIE NOLAN (ABC-Paramount 10231)

(B+) "(Wish It Were) SUMMER ALL YEAR 'ROUND" (2:20) [Saturday ASCAP—Crewe] Spirited rockin' from the lark and combo-chorus backing. A sure teen pleaser, infectious attack could receive Top 100 status.

(B) "I STILL CARE" (2:13) [Tomorrow's Tunes BMI—Gaudio] Things settle-down to a sensitive teen-ballad portrayal by the lass.

JERRY REED (Columbia 42047)

(B+) "LOVE AND WAR (Ain't Much Difference In The Two)" (2:00) [Lowery BMI—Reed] Wild contagious country-styled attack. The Reed belt is supported by a particularly sound-worthy percussion stint. Could grab solid coin.

(B) "LOVE IS THE CAUSE OF IT ALL" (2:08) [Lowery BMI—Reed] More rock-a-billy color from the performer and backing.

THE COUNTDOWNS (Image 5002)

(B+) "WATERMELON" (1:50) [Acklen & Wonder BMI—Cason, Moon] Male vocalists and instrumental support display pro rock-novelty sense in this exciting stand. Strong summertime stint that could go on to Top 100 success. London handles the label's distribution.

(B) "THE WRITING ON THE WALL" (2:24) [Kenny Marlow-Wonder BMI—Russell] Inviting rock-a-cha blend by the boys. Tune is not the current Adam Wade hit.

BOOTS RANDOLPH (Monument 443)

(B+) "HEY! DADDY DADDY" (2:23) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant] Interesting children's-questions number with a folksy touch is given a colorful rock rendition by the songster, guitar-led combo and young chorus. May get around.

(B) "FANCY DAN" (2:47) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Orbison, Melson] Bright upbeat rock-a-cha track.

ROOSEVELT NETTLES (Bamboo 510)

(B+) "YES, YOUR HONOR" (2:22) [Renda BMI—Nettles, Curtis] Fella pleads guilty to loving the gal in this fine Latinish-blues affair with strings. The sometimes over-dubbed Nettles vocal is very teen-wise. A highly current rock sound that could make it.

(B) "HEARTACHES AND TROUBLES" (2:09) [Renda BMI—Hart] An effective low-down blues quality to this date, which also has string statements.

THE HALOS (7 Arts 709)

(B+) "NAG" (2:50) [Selma BMI—Crier] Warwick's companion label can have a sold chart noise-maker with this engaging novelty cha cha rocker that the Halos knock out in "Get A Job"-like fashion. Catchy stand that could come thru in a big way.

(B) "COPY CAT" (2:09) [Selma BMI—Spencer, Crier] More dandy teen sounds on this shuffle rock-a-cha-cha entry.

FRANK SCHEEREN (Style 101)

(B+) "I GOT TROUBLES" (2:38) [Nocturne BMI—Scheeren] The teen-beat crowd gets a strong-sounding rock-a-cha entry. Catchy ditty is displayed in pro style by songster Scheeren & other songsters, who also employ most effective chant bits. A busy sound that could come through. Diskery headquarters in New York.

(B) "SUGARWOOD MOUNTAIN" (2:13) [Dove ASCAP—Stock, Sigler, Rose] Easy-go rock stint on a "Blueberry Hill"-type plot.

JULIANA (RCA Victor 7906)

(B+) "YOU'RE SAYING GOOD-NIGHT (But You Mean Good-bye)" (2:20) [Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Kaye, Springer] Thrush does a fine job on the melodic plaintive, receiving an attractive full ork-chorus rock-a-cha backdrop sound. Side can come-up with important airplay.

(B) "YOU CAN HAVE ANY BOY" (2:28) [Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Kaye, Springer] Another wistful (no strings) in which the gal tells another girl to lay-off her flame.

TOMMY AMBROSE (Strand 25042)

(B) "UNCHAINED MELODY" (2:24) [Frank ASCAP—North] The lovely oldie receives a good-sounding rock-a-cha arrangement featuring teen-wise drama from vocalist Ambrose.

(B) "JIMINY JUM JUM" (1:57) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP—Carter, Nagy] Cheerful teen item which employs the title to good vocal gimmick advantage.

LINDA FIELDS (Gold Eagle 1807)

(B) "GET ALONG PONY" (2:24) [Regent BMI—Envick, Gietz] Sunny rock work by the lass and backing on a ditty with a popish country flavor. Good teen cheer here.

(B) "QUIETLY" (2:33) [George Pincus ASCAP—Whitcup, Lehrman, Gierlach] Lark settles-down to a feelingful portrayal of a slow-waltz item.

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ARMADA MEETS

ARMADA (American Record Manufacturers And Distributors Association) this week holds its Third Annual Convention at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Florida.

Considering that the organization is just two-years old, it has made tremendous strides. It had its growing pains at the onset, but during the past year, members of the association found a mutual enemy in record counterfeiters. This turned out to be the important unifying force which could be the stepping stone needed to make ARMADA one of the record industry's most beneficial organizations.

During the past half year ARMADA's accomplishments in the fight against bootleggers have been truly amazing. Each week has seen ARMADA efforts deal another blow to the bogus pressers. Only last week, further headway was made when the California Anti-Bootlegging Bill, which will make the penalty for bootlegging in California much more severe than it has been in the past, passed the State Senate. The Bill now needs only the signature of Governor Edmond Brown for it to become law. The counterfeiting fight is continuing on many fronts and we hope to be able to print many more success stories in the future.

It wasn't long ago that everyone considered the bootlegging situation hopeless. It also wasn't long ago (at last year's ARMADA meet to be exact) that many were heard to have said that the ARMADA would never work because of competing factions in its membership—namely distributors and manufacturers. However, in spite of the lack of enthusiasm on the part of many, the ARMADA has "worked" for the benefit of everyone.

The attendance at this year's meet is expected to be stand-out. If those who attend do so with a negative attitude once again, they can be of little help in assisting the further growth of the association. We can only hope that ARMADA's record during the past year will give everyone a feeling of confidence that there will be a healthier industry in the years ahead.

ARMADA is just an infant. It has great room for further growth and success. There are many areas in our trade which can use improvement. Few problems, perhaps even none, can be solved at any one convention. But a convention is a meeting place at which major problems are brought forth for an airing. Perhaps by the time the Fourth Annual Convention takes place, new strides will have been made in other directions.

Chances are Johnny Mathis'll get back on the hit trail with his beautifully sensitive portrayal of "Laurie, My Love." It's a charming lilter, with a folk-like quality, that Mathis and the Ray Ellis ork-chorus paint with warmth. More lovely ballad sounds on the grade "A" ballad coupler, "Should I Wait."

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

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

Album Reviews

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"SOMETHING FOR EVERYBODY"—Elvis Presley—RCA Victor LPM-2370

The "something for everybody" aspect of Presley's latest LP is devoting one entire side to ballads, the other to raucous rockers. In the former dept. he offers his gripping, dramatic ballad technique in "Sentimental Me," "There's Always Me" and "Gently"; the latter side contains "I'm Comin' Home," "Judy" and "I Slipped, I Stumbled, I Fell" from the flick "Wild In the Country." Huge sales imminent.



"VIVA!"—Bobby Montez and his Orch.—World Pacific WP-1404

The Bobby Montez quintet features instrumentation and ensemble sound similar to the Martin Denny and Arthur Lyman groups. In this vein they play eight extended Montez originals. The music is most-times attractively melodic and the beat is of the gently-persuasive, undulating kind that compels at least toe-tapping if not outright dance participation to the cha cha rhythm. Album has already hit the stereo chart and promises much more sales action.



"GET HAPPY"—Ella Fitzgerald—Verge V-4036

Another collection of fine songs honored with the impeccable taste and artistry of an Ella Fitzgerald performance. Here, the first lady of song offers personal essays of such goodies as "Somebody Loves Me," "Blue Skies," "Cheerful Little Earful" and "St. Louis Blues." Arranging chores are shared by Riddle, Garcia, DeVol and Weston, a particularly distinguished group of chartsmen. As is expected, this set maintains the singer's respected tradition and should do extremely well at the counters.



"CATERINA . . . THE GREATEST IN ANY LANGUAGE"—Caterina Valente—Decca DL 4052

With six languages at her command, Caterina Valente has charmed Europe and the U.S. by switching singing language as frequently as possible. Indicative of her vocal prowess is this album in which five of these languages are utilized (English, Spanish, Italian, French, German) to sing such popular items as "Granada," "Be Mine Tonight," "Babalu" and "Dans Ma Vie." A singer with showmanship flair and talent.



"CARNIVAL! IN PERCUSSION"—The Paul Smith Ensemble—Verve V-4051

All the lilt and charm of Bob Merrill's score for "Carnival!" has been forthrightly retained by Smith et. al. but it is additionally enhanced for stereo rig owners with a generous helping of percussive delights. An enjoyable instrumental sound session for all types of music fans. The only slight drawback is that the Latin rhythms employed throughout wear thin on the ear after a while. But they are cleverly varied and will hold up for most people.



"DANTE AND THE EVERGREENS"—Madison MA-LP 1002

Group's proficiency with novelty material was amply demonstrated on the hit "Alley-Oop" and the follow-up click "Time Machine." This first LP by the quartet includes these two items plus readings of several while-back teen tunes, including "Dream Lover," "Venus," "Glory Of Love" and "Let the Good Times Roll." Kids have both ballad and rock knowhow and exhibit it here. Could make it with the teenagers.



"MORE PIAF OF PARIS"—Edith Piaf—Capitol T 10283

The most celebrated of the French chanteuses, practically a legend in her time, Edith Piaf is spotlighted in another superb disk program on Capitol of the World. The songs of love, torment, bitterness that make up the basis of her repertoire are again vividly portrayed with the emotional vocal drama and striking impact of a Piaf performance. In this set she performs "Je Suis A Toi," "Cri du Coeur," "Non Je Regrette Rien" and the currently popular "Milord." Explanations of each song is on the back liner.



"SING OUT WITH PETE!"—Pete Seeger—Folkways FA 2455

There's hardly a Pete Seeger concert at which he doesn't at least once prod his audience to assist him in a community sing. These sessions are usually indicative of the enthusiasm which greets Seeger at every stop on his itinerary. Here Folkways has preserved a dozen of these sing-alongs from concerts at Yale, Chicago Univ., Carnegie Hall and the Village Gate, and it's a joy to observe how Seeger manipulates his audience into responding. Songs include "Down By The Riverside," "Oh, Mary Don't You Weep," "I'm On My Way" and "The Hammer Song." Lyrics are included for home audiences.



"THE FOLK MUSIC OF THE NEWPORT FOLK FESTIVAL, 1959-60"—Vols. 1 & 2—Folkways FA 2431, 2432

With the main attractions of the '59-'60 Newport Folk Festivals already released on other labels, Folkways has picked up the performance tapes of many of the lesser-known folk artists and released them here in a two volume set. It is the most engrossing collection of disk performances to come out of the Festivals. Performers include Brownie McGhee & Sonny Terry, Pete Seeger, New Lost City Ramblers, Pat Clancy, Guy Carawan, Alan Mills and several outstanding blues singers. Among the names are some of the only authentic folk artists to perform at Newport and the entire set should be of high interest to the more astute folk enthusiasts.



"THE SOUND OF MY OWN VOICE AND OTHER NOISES"—Severn Darden At The Second City—Mercury OCS-6202

Severn Darden is one of the leading members of The Second City, a group of young Chicago-based satirists who work improvisationally. Here, he offers a sampling of his comedic wares (from "live" performance), including a 16 minute dissertation on Metaphysics that's thoroughly confusing and hilarious. Other Second Citizens support in various minor roles. It's part of that "new" wave of comedy.



"HELEN TRUMP"—A Lotta Woman—Dick Whittinghill—Republic REP 501

KMPC-Los Angeles disk jockey Dick Whittinghill entertained his listeners for thirteen weeks with daily soap-opera episodes about Helen Trump, an active free-loving gal from what can be heard here. In typical soap-opera fashion, baritone announcer and organ music backdrop, the ridiculous plots unfold in three-to-four minute segments each. They get fairly risqué at times, but that's the whole object of the thing.



"ROCKIN' AND DRINKIN' MUSIC"—The Symphony de Paris—Norwood NS 100

The "rockin'" in the title refers to the action of a wicker chair and not the beat. In other words, the label, in its LP debut, attempts to offer a package of music to accompany the relaxation of summertime quaffing. The music, all composed by Ray Haney, is of varying moods and tempos and is accompanied occasionally by extracurricular sounds associated with the preparing of beverages. Titles are also fit to the mood and include "Cold Porter," "Off the Wagon Polka," "The Ballentine's Nest" and "Overture For a Waitress Working Overtime." Diverting musical package.



"STEP WE GAILY"—Jimmy Shand and his Band—Mercury SRI 603

The insistent contagiousness of Scottish dances—reel, jig, strathspey—are unfurled in all their native color and simplicity by accordionist Jimmy Shand and his Scottish country band. There's nothing tricky or intricate in this music, just a rigid beat that manages to effervesce the feelings and a bright, honest, simple melody. There are twenty-seven authentic numbers grouped into 8 medleys. A boon to those of Scottish descent, and those many others who just enjoy this type of music.



"THE HUNGRY i PRESENTS THE LAST OF THE WELL COMEDIANS"—Harrison Baker—RCA Victor LSP-2349

Harrison Baker bills himself as "the last of the well comedians" to differentiate his old line style of comedy from the current crop of social scene commentators. In a session taped at the Hungry i he debuts to disk audiences the usual run of jokes, stories and patter on things usual. One side is devoted to comments on the world political situation but without barbed jibes. Pleasant comedy.

"LA PLATA JUMPS THE CHARANGA"—La Plata Sextette—Seeco CELP-472

La Plata, an industrious sextette of Latin musicians (& vocalists) with a strong following in the east (especially the Catskill resort area), now hops on the charanga/pachanga bandwagon with this LP. In it they perform a lineup of mostly authentic Latin tunes in pachanga rhythm with a couple of cha cha chas and a merengue thrown in. Lively dance date here.



"LOVE SONGS OF THE MEDITERRANEAN"—Charles K. L. Davis—Everest LPBR 5122

The concert/operatic tenor who's been concentrating on the pop song, offers interpretations of Italian, French and Spanish love songs. He's aided by David Terry's arrangements in performances of such material as "Non Dimenticar," "Solamente Una Vez," "Sou Le Ciel de Paris" and the very American "Song From Moulin Rouge." Pleasing vocal entertainment.




"MI ULTIMO TANGO"—Sarita Montiel—Columbia EX 5048

International film star and nitery attraction Sarita Montiel is heard in a program of Spanish popular songs. The album is titled after her latest film success and contains songs from this film, plus others, including the traditional "A Media Luz." Has a natural appeal to the Spanish-speaking markets.



"SONGS OF JUAN VALDEZ"—Music of Colombia—Jose Duval—RCA Victor LSP-2367

Native Colombian music is presented here in arrangements palatable to American record market tastes. The singer is Jose Duval, the Juan Valdez of the TV commercials, hence the LP's title tie-in. Ray Martin's ork and chorus assist the varying moods of the music appropriately. It's a tuneful, lively session in which the colorful Colombian music is essayed in easy-to-take terms.



"KNOW WHAT WILL HAPPEN TOMORROW"—Maurice Woodruff—Warner Bros. 1414

Woodruff, billed as "the world's foremost clairvoyant" by dint of several reportedly uncanny observations, plies his trade now via this WB disk. In it he offers a whole array of political and social predictions which will take place before June 1, 1962. For disbelievers, the predictions are guaranteed 79% accurate or the purchaser is entitled to another WB LP. We predict Mr. Woodruff will not sell too many albums. (Accuracy not guaranteed.)



"PARTY MAGIC"—Harry Blackstone—Pathe 701

The famed magician presents several card and mathematical tricks that should appeal to many adults as well as the youngsters they're intended for. In addition, musical interludes are supplied by Glenda Paris and an ork. The Blackstone's "magic" can be fascinating but the music, of amateurish quality, serves no purpose.



"GROOVIN' BLUE"—Curtis Amy & Frank Butler—Pacific Jazz PJ-19

Tenor saxist Curtis Amy has become a leading figure in the new "return to roots" movement on the west coast, speaking a virile, muscular blues language. His previous Pacific Jazz album (with Paul Bryant) went a long way in establishing his popularity and this set, on which he shares leader chores with drummer Frank Butler, will well add to his audience. Trumpeter Carmell Jones also distinguishes himself in this idiom. It's truly a "groovin'" session.



"LET'S SWING!"—The Budd Johnson Quintet—Prestige/Swingville 2015

Through a long and distinguished career Budd Johnson has always been noted for his warmth, a natural, easy flow of musical ideas, and uncompromising taste. This set is no exception. It features the tenor saxist in easy-swing stylings of several standards and a few originals. Cohesive support is provided by a Flanagan-Persip-Duvivier rhythm section and brother Keg Johnson contributes some interesting trombone licks. High points of the set are "Falling In Love With Love," "Serenade in Blue" and "Uptown Manhattan."



"FUSION"—The Jimmy Giuffre 3—Verve V-8397

In his search for new musical vistas Jimmy Giuffre comes up with several interesting ideas for his trio setup. Within a slight framework of written arrangements (at beginning and end of piece), the three musicians work almost independently of each other in improvising. When their ideas coincide there is "fusion" of various sorts, otherwise there is dissonance—but a seemingly planned dissonance that titillates the ear with all kinds of intriguing combinations of sounds. Another step in the Giuffre development.




"UNDERCURRENT"—Kenny Drew—Blue Note 4059

Having "paid his dues" for years as a sideman, Kenny Drew emerges here in his first Blue Note LP as a group leader. The LP title "Undercurrent" (also the name of the fiery first track) is indicative of the unifying rhythm piano Drew plays to back up the front line of Hank Mobley and Freddie Hubbard, but Drew is also a technically proficient and mature soloist in his own right. Six Drew originals are performed in a full-voiced, virile style by the sextet.



"NEW GROOVE"—Bud Shank, featuring Carmell Jones—Pacific Jazz PJ-21

Caught up in the west coast "blues groove" movement, Bud Shank has adjusted his sights to bear down harder in his playing to meet the demand. It's highly debatable whether Shank's "new groove" is more desirable than his previous fluid, subtle style which always found a sympathetic, attentive ear. But on face value, Shank acquits himself here admirably. He has the support of trumpeter Carmell Jones, a fast rising, versatile young man with a rich, open tone, and a vigorous rhythm section headed by drummer Mel Lewis.



"JAZZ AIN'T NOTHIN' BUT SOUL"—Norman Mapp Sings—Epic BA 17014


Just as its co-label, Columbia, has introduced Oscar Brown, Jr., Epic now has its own triple-threat writer-arranger-singer in Norman Mapp, who bows here in a lineup of originals (except "Moanin'"). His songs are melodically sure and have intelligent lyrics. He sings with an intimate warmth in a relaxed, natural gait. Instrumental support by Clark Terry, Seldon Powel and others is well written and gently swinging. Mapp's got a future and this debut LP will certainly help.


"EXOTIQUE"—Whittemore & Lowe—Capitol SP 8550

The duo pianists in a program of "exotic" music from the classics. They have culled works from such composers as Ravel, Debussy, Cyril Scott and Rachmaninoff and have adapted these excerpts into compelling mood pieces. Their piano work is technically proficient and the wrap-up of Capitol's fine stereo sound make for a desirable album of light classical entertainment.



"NEW DIMENSIONS IN ORGAN SOUND"—Catharine Crozier—Washington SWAS XIV

This is the first release of organ music from the tape catalog which Washington acquired from the Aeolian-Skinner Organ Co. It presents virtuoso organist Catharine Crozier playing a program comprised of both sacred and secular music—Reubke's "Sonata on the 94th Psalm," Langlais' "Arabesque Sur Les Flutes" and "Dialogue Sur Les Mixtures," and Alain's "2nd Fantasie." The music presents a formidable challenge and Miss Crozier acquits herself admirably. A choice item for the organ literature.

Philips Buys Mercury Records

CHICAGO—Irving B. Green, president of the Mercury Record Corporation, last week announced the consolidation of Mercury Record Corporation with Consolidated Electronics Industries Corp. Negotiations were completed yesterday in New York between Green and Pieter van den Berg, president of Consolidated Electronics.

Consolidated Electronics, whose controlling stockholder is the United States Philips Trust, are manufacturers of a wide variety of products in the electronics and electro-mechanical field. The agreement was made for an undisclosed amount of cash and stock.

To facilitate the financing of the acquisition, Consolidated Electronics said it is selling \$1,680,000 of its common shares to the Hartford National Bank & Trust Co., trustee for the United States Philips Trust, the controlling stockholder of Consolidated Electronics. The \$1,680,000 is based on last Friday's closing price on the New York Stock Exchange of 42½.

Consolidated Electronics also said it is acquiring the facilities of National Record Pressings, Inc., of Richmond, Ind., which produces Mercury's phonograph records.

Along with the consolidation, Mercury and Consolidated Electronics have completed arrangements for an international exchange of recorded libraries with Philips Phonographische Industries. Philips Phonographische Industries operates in 32 countries throughout the world and has its own pressing plants and distribution facilities throughout these areas as a subsidiary of the company, Philips Lamps of Holland, one of the industrial giants of the world.

In each country, Philips also records local repertoire. All of these catalogs are now made exclusively available to Mercury for distribution in the United States.

Mercury plans an expansion program based on the acquisition of a part of this vast classical and foreign popular catalog. It is intended that separate label identification be given to the Philips library. The Mercury library and catalog will continue to

be marketed under the present distribution system and the Mercury label. Plans are also being made to utilize distribution facilities and new marketing practices for the Philips line of merchandise. It is anticipated that the first American Philips releases, both classical and popular, will be issued before the end of this year. Furthermore, Mercury will undertake the acquisition of American talents and the recording of artists and repertoire for this label.

In turn, Philips will have exclusive distribution rights throughout the world for the Mercury catalog and library subject to the present Mercury foreign licensee agreements, which will be serviced in the interim as in the past.

Green announced that the executive staff and other personnel of the Mercury Record Corporation, its distrib-

utors, sales staff, recording people and promotional men will all remain unchanged. According to Green, the joining of Mercury and Consolidated Electronics was based on a view toward considerable world-wide growth of Mercury.

Green said, "Business today requires thinking beyond the domestic market or foreign market. Business must concern itself with the world market. This so-called 'small world' is here now; with cultures, technological advances, business and politics merging into one. The under-developed countries of the past are rapidly becoming the new and fertile markets of the future and herein lies a tremendous growth potential for the entire recording industry. The consolidation of Mercury and Consolidated Electronics is in our opinion a giant step forward toward such a goal."

Lieberson Now In England; May Meet With Philips

NEW YORK—With the announcement this week of the Philips-Mercury pact, Philips' long running reciprocal agreement with Columbia Records of the United States has been brought to the fore.

It is understood that Columbia's pact with Philips runs until the end of 1962. There is no official word as to how the Columbia pact will be settled, however it is known that Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia is

now in England and may be negotiating with the Philips people on this very subject. It is also common knowledge, although, here again, official word has not yet been given, that Columbia is gunning for a January 1962 date to introduce its own CBS label on a world wide scale. While in London, Lieberson may be negotiating for the distribution of the CBS label in Europe and, although it cannot be confirmed, there is a very good chance that Philips will distribute the CBS line in Europe. If Philips handles CBS, then the Columbia problem will be resolved. Columbia owns its own distribution outlets in South America, Australia and Canada.

Mercury, which has an international distribution agreement with EMI and independent foreign outlets in many countries, must resolve its foreign set-up now that it is owned by Philips.

Indigo LP Program; 2 New Albums

HOLLYWOOD—Indigo Records is bowing to new LP's with a "full-scale" sales and promotional program on the label's complete catalog.

The two new LP's are: "The Sound of Kathy Young" and Cy Coleman's readings of tunes from his "Wildcat" score, released on the label's Gold Band Series.

Under the terms of the program, one part offers distributors three LP's free for every ten LP's purchased of the same number through July 4; the second part offers two free LP's for every ten LP's purchased after July 4. There's also a 100% exchange privilege.

Yes, Peggy, There Are Beans In Boston

NEW YORK—Capitol Records' distrib in Boston has sent songstress Peggy Lee a can of beans to prove, of course, that there are beans in Boston.

A Boston paper, the Boston Traveler, and various restaurateurs picked up the fact that one line in the lyric of Miss Lee's new single, "Boston Beans," goes: "I couldn't find any Boston Beans there."

The lark is the co-author of the song. Her collaborator was Milton Raskin, a native of Boston.

Lan-Cet Label Formed

HOLLYWOOD—Lan-Cet Records has been formed in Maywood, Calif. under the auspices of Progressive Sound. Heading the operation, which has already pacted thirteen artists, are Bill Aken, A&R head, and Phil Towle, promotion topper. Just released have been "Don't Ever Leave Me" by Zane Ashton and "Little Wheel" by The Arc-Angels.



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


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ARMADA Will Grow

Tommy Gilbert, WATM-Atmore, Ala., is trying to locate a copy of "The Perfect Song" by Elliot Lawrence on Columbia. It's Tommy's theme song but the only copy he had was recently broken. Since the deck's no longer in the catalog, he's having a heck of a time locating a copy and could use some help. . . . Rudy Rutherford up to The Cash Box office saying hello while vacationing in New York. Rudy's the popular genial host of "Rockin' With Deuce," WTVM, Columbus, Georgia's only all Negro TV hop show. . . . KING-Seattle is now waking up listeners with a 15-minute Mitch Miller Sing-Along segment. Hosted by Buzz Lawrence, it precedes the regular morning stanza.

In his first move at WINS-New York, newly-appointed general manager Ted Steele has changed the "Midnight Starr" to the "Morning Starr," that is, he moved veteran personality Lonny Starr from the all-night show to the wake-up stanza. Stan Richards, who previously spun in the AM, will take over the night owl chores. Starr, who joined WINS last October, was one of the country's top jockeys during his 13 years with WNEW-New York. He's had a total of 28 years in the field. . . . Dex Card takes his morning show from WCOP-Boston to KYW-Cleveland, where he replaces the gap left by Big Wilson's departure for WNEW-New York. Also new at KYW is Michael Ruppe, Jr., who's now handling the promo director post after doing same very successfully for WIL-St. Louis. . . . Bob Prescott exits KFEQ-St. Joseph, Mo. to wake up the people in Lafayette, Indiana via WAZY. . . . Ken Dow named program director of WTKO-Ithaca, N.Y. He keeps busy in the morning slot and an early afternoon stanza. . . . George R. ARMADA's Fight Against Bootleggers Has Not Ended

Our law firm has been happy to have been privileged to be associated with ARMADA during the past year and to have assisted in ARMADA's successful campaign against counterfeiters of phonograph records. That our efforts thus far have met with success is gratifying. However, much more remains to be done before the task is completed.

In June of 1960 when ARMADA held its last convention at Atlantic City, New Jersey, the prevalent opinion in the industry was that nothing could be done to stamp out counterfeiting. We disagreed with this attitude. Prior to the convention, as counsel for Cameo Records, we had uncovered excessive counterfeiting and by dint of hard detective work discovered two large counterfeiting operations in Northern New Jersey and initiated prosecutions thereon.

When asked to speak at the ARMADA convention we presented the facts and shocked the members into a realization of the true nature and scope of the counterfeiting operation and stated the opinion that counterfeiters too long have gotten away with their nefarious activities. We voiced the opinion that they could and should be stopped. David J. Furman, Attorney General of the State of New Jersey, who also addressed the convention, assisted in making this point clear.

We were happy to accept the request of Art Talmadge, ARMADA's newly elected President, to become ARMADA's counsel to continue the campaign against counterfeiters. Since then ARMADA has pursued the battle with vigor and enthusiasm. In the short space of one year additional

indictments were obtained in Hackensack, New Jersey for counterfeiting Laurie, Warwick and Audicon records. Twenty-two persons were indicted throughout the country. Three were actually tried and sentenced in Hackensack, New Jersey, two of whom are serving jail terms of one year in the New Jersey State Prison. This appears to be the first time that a jail sentence was given in connection with counterfeiting. As ARMADA's counsel we assisted in all the investigations in Hackensack and Newark, New Jersey, Brooklyn and Utica, New York, and Los Angeles, California. We attended every day of the eight day trial in Hackensack and assisted the local prosecutor in arranging for witnesses and presenting evidence.

As a result of our leads and investigation we supplied information to the Los Angeles District Attorney which alerted him to the situation in that area and enabled him to make further investigation and numerous arrests, and secured indictments which are still pending.

Prosecutions initiated in Brooklyn and Utica, New York are awaiting trial.

In addition to the criminal prosecutions we caused several civil suits to be instituted against the counterfeiters. We obtained judgments in two said suits; another is still pending.

Now that ARMADA has conclusively demonstrated that counterfeiters can be discovered, prosecuted and jailed, we believe it is necessary to complete the job. ARMADA must see to it that the penalties for counterfeiting are severe enough to deter and dissuade the most audacious counterfeiter from practicing his illegal trade.

This can be accomplished by preparation and sponsoring of State and Federal legislation which increases the criminal penalties. To this end we have persuaded the Attorney General of California to introduce legislation in that State. On behalf of ARMADA we brought before the Committee on Criminal Procedure and sponsored this legislation. The Bill passed the Assembly as a result of ARMADA's participation and support by local distributors and manufacturers. This bill makes a substantial jail sentence the only penalty. No longer can a mere fine be imposed. At this writing the Bill is awaiting approval by the Senate, which is expected.

On behalf of ARMADA we have also been cooperating with Congressman Emanuel Celler and the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives upon new legislation that has been prepared for and introduced in Congress.

Much credit is due to ARMADA's President, Art Talmadge, and to the other officers and members of the Executive Committee for their vision and wholehearted support. ARMADA's individual members should be commended for their voluntary contributions to make it possible to carry on the work. A special vote of thanks is due to the Prosecutors in New Jersey, California and New York who have undertaken to investigate and prosecute the counterfeiters with the most satisfactory results thus far obtained.

In our opinion ARMADA is entitled to the gratitude and the future support of the entire record industry.

Thus far ARMADA has made great progress in its campaign against counterfeiters. However, the pending prosecutions must still be concluded, the legislative program should be pushed forward, and ARMADA must still be vigilant to uncover any new counterfeiting and to prosecute the counterfeiters vigorously.

ARMADA cannot stop now but must constantly be vigilant to uncover and prosecute any others who may enter the field upon the theory that the recent prosecutions are merely a temporary activity and that ARMADA will be content to rest upon past laurels.

NEW YORK—The Reader's Digest last week announced it had purchased from the Book-of-the-Month Club assets relating to the RCA Victor Record Club and new, wholly-owned subsidiary, Reader's Digest Music, Inc., will become exclusive agents for these clubs in the U.S.

Both Reader's Digest and RCA Victor would not elaborate on the details of the move, which is subject to approval by Book-of-the-Month Club stockholders, when reached last week. However, details on the new operation are expected within the next few weeks.

A statement by DeWitt Wallace, editor and publisher of the magazine, which has a circulation of 12½ million in the U.S., said that he had seen

"impressive evidence from readers of their interest in good music" and "for this reason, we are particularly happy that our millions of readers in the U.S. now have the opportunity to purchase, on a regular and convenient basis, the fine recordings offered through the RCA Victor Record Clubs."

Reader's Digest Music has appointed Maxwell Sacheim-Franklin Bruck, Inc., of New York, to handle the record clubs' advertising, effective immediately.

Harry Scherman, chairman of the Book-of-the-Month Club, said the sale was prompted by his firm's desire to concentrate in the book and allied fields.

MGM & WRCV In Big-Band Promo

NEW YORK—Continuing its exploitation of its album product via radio-TV promotions, MGM Records is currently tying in radio station WRCV-Philadelphia on behalf of Larry Elgart's "Sophisticated Sixties" LP.

Idea calls for WRCV, in promoting its own "Sophisticated Sound of the Big Bands" music project, to distribute 1,500 of the Elgart LP's, each with special WRCV wrap-arounds, to its advertisers, clients and agency reps touting the station's project of building-up advertising appeal for its big-band programs.

Arrangements for the promotion were worked-out with John P. Wiley, advertising and promotion manager of WRCV, and Sol Handwerker, MGM's publicity and promotion chief.

Prestige Releases 1st 33 Singles

They include: "Don't Blame Me," "Cuban Love Song," "You're A Sweetheart," "I Feel A Song Comin' On," "I'm In The Mood For Love," "It's A Most Unusual Day."

Sam Fox To Tie-In With Ed. Music Films

NEW YORK—Sam Fox Publishing and the educational films division of John Sutherland Productions will combine their world-wide facilities to produce what is described as "completely new" audio-visual concept for the school music class.

This involves an extensive series of educational films on various school music subjects, as well as correlated publications and recordings. Produced by Sutherland, well-known producer of industrial films, the films will utilize both animated and live action. The complete project will be under the supervision of music educator Dr. Richard Berg.



Sports-In-Sound, in a tie-in with "Sports Afield" Magazine, has already produced six albums: "The ABC's of Archery," "Training Your Dog To Hunt, Point, Retrieve," "Wing, Trap & Skeet Shooting," "Camping & Woodcraft," "Bass & Trout Fishing" and "Modern Boating—Inboard & Outboard." All of the albums are narrated by "Sports Afield" editors. The packages feature complete instructions, free charts, full color jackets and free record racks are available with every order of 25 albums.

The LP's are being sold through sporting goods dealers and negotiations are now under way for distribution through an established record firm. No diskery was named at press time but it is understood that Friedman is negotiating with several record companies who have bid for the product.

Friedman explained that Sports-In-Sound, the corporate title for the parent firm, will produce many lines of records that have special appeal. In each case, they will be sold in bulk to an established record company which will have an exclusive on the particular label for their sources of distribution.

Strand Reports Big Response To Jessell, Sherman LP's

NEW YORK—Two specialty LP's recently issued by Strand Records, "Seeing Israel with George Jessell" and deejay Paul Sherman's "Kinder Lummir Reddin Yiddish"—a kiddie lesson LP in Yiddish—have "surpassed the wildest hopes" of Sid Pastner, the label's general manager.

Pastner said that these albums were doing "exceptionally well" in metropolitan areas, and that many synagogues throughout the country were using both LP's in promoting funds for their groups.

Jessell, who just returned from a trip to Israel, introduced his package on a Jack Paar TV stanza last week (21), and is promoting the album on his many toastmaster engagements throughout the U.S.

Label has also reported action to three singles: its Polyphonic diskings of "Sweetheart" by Frank Heppinstall; The Fiestas diskings on Strand, "Come On Everybody"; its Dorset label's "Steel Driving Man" by The Demotrons.

The Year In Review

One year ago the ARMADA convention in Atlantic City was basically built around the counterfeiting activities which had infected the phonograph record industry. ARMADA's determination to combat counterfeiting was clearly expressed to the membership at that time.

During the past year ARMADA "came of age" as a vital factor in the phonograph record industry, representing manufacturers and distributors, and within the past few months including other allied interests.

During the 1960-61 year ARMADA brought to fruition the fight against counterfeiting by materially assisting in the first successful conviction of counterfeiters in a criminal court; the introduction of legislature against counterfeiting on a state and federal level and displayed the determination to continue these efforts by giving every assistance to legislators and law enforcement officers in future activities in this area.

The confines by ARMADA in limiting its membership to distributors and manufacturers was recognized when, during the past year it was decided to extend the organization through the formation of a new membership classification to be known as Affiliate Membership. Eligible for this

category were allied interests which included printers, album cover manufacturers, publications, broadcasters, etc. The enthusiastic response to this new category indicated the definite interest in ARMADA by all phases of the recording industry.

During the past year ARMADA continued its program of service to the industry by developing an Insurance program for its membership and by working towards the establishment of an annual meeting ground which would provide all phases of the recording industry with an opportunity to meet and study their various problems together.

In this regard efforts were made to bring into active participation in the convention leaders of the industry and to further bring to the membership first hand information on up and coming federal legislative events by presenting Congressman Emanuel Celler as the featured speaker at this year's banquet.

As ARMADA opens its third convention its membership has increased by almost one third during the past year and the industry-wide interest in the convention is reflected in the record attendance which has been assured through heavy pre-convention registrations.





FTC Drops Payola Complaints Against Columbia, Capitol, Dot

WASHINGTON—The Federal Trade Commission last week dismissed its payola complaints against the distributors of Columbia, Capitol and Dot Records. This action was taken, the FTC said, because of the amendment in

the Federal Communications Act which makes it crime to give payola to deejays and other station personnel.

FTC complaints were dismissed against the Columbia Records Sales Corp. and Columbia Record Distributors, both of New York; Interstate Electric Co. of New Orleans; Capitol Records Distributing Corp. and Dot Records, both of Hollywood.

Of the FTC's original 105 payola complaints, five remain unresolved, though it is understood they will be dismissed also.

Jamal Opens New Chicago Nitery

CHICAGO—Argo recording star Ahmad Jamal hosted a gala press party here last Thursday afternoon (22) in his exotic new nitery, Alhambra, which is located in the heart of Record Row.

Jamal, who has many successful albums on the Argo label for many years with his trio, boasts of the fact that his new club—designed in a middle eastern Arabic motif—has the finest acoustics available for entertainers to perform with. He said he went out into the field to find the best experts possible to set up the acoustical arrangements in the Alhambra.

He further stressed the fact that, although there are no alcoholic beverages served in Alhambra, there are "90 different, exciting drinks available to patrons." He selected the concoctions from all over the world in a five month project.

"Another thing we are thrilled about," Jamal said, "is that we offer the ultimate in cuisine, atmosphere, service, decor and entertainment. We serve Middle Eastern cuisine (Pakistani and Indian) as well as American delicacies. Also, every ethnic group is represented in cuisine at the Alhambra."

Argo and Jamal have made arrangements to record Ahmad Jamal And His Trio at the Alhambra.

Conniff Breaks Record At Hollywood Palladium

WOODLAND HILLS, CALIF.—Maestro Ray Conniff took his orchestra and chorus into the World Famous Hollywood Palladium on Friday and Saturday (June 16 & 17), played his first public dance date in the United States, and went on to break all existing records at the Palladium for a two night stand. 9614 paid admissions for the two nights brought in a total gross gate of \$24,035. (Price of admission: \$2.50 per person.)

Conniff by-passed the customary band-stand set up at the Palladium and installed his own stage and platform at the west end of the ballroom. Sound engineers located in the middle of the ballroom balance the sounds of the orchestra and chorus for the "Dance in Stereo."

Conniff is currently at work arranging a new album for Columbia Records which he will record back in New York the first week in July.

The team's initial Coral waxing, "Again" and "Count Your Blessings," has already been released. The boys have been making frequent nitery, theatre and TV appearances.

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RIAA Publishes Brochure On Disk Manufacture

NEW YORK—A 16-page brochure, entitled "The Wonderful World of Records," has been published by the Record Industry Association of America, Inc. (RIAA).

It contains a picture story on the manufacturing processes involved in the production of records, plus sections on the care and handling of records and an explanation of stereo. The brochures are intended primarily to acquaint the consumer public with the care, quality and detail that go into the engineering, recording and pressing of records and to highlight the industry's "unceasing quest to duplicate the vitality, the richness and the realism of the live performance."

The booklet will be made available upon request at no charge. In addition, quantity orders will be accepted from RIAA members who may want to distribute the brochure themselves.

England's Pye Names U.S. Rep

NEW YORK—Irving Chezar has been named as U.S. rep for England's Pye Records with headquarters at 488 Madison Avenue, this city. Chezar will distribute Pye's product in this country and acquire American material for release by Pye in England and elsewhere.

Chezar finalized the deal during an April trip to London, after studying the British record scene and Pye's marketing and distribution system.

In his recent association with General Artists Corp. Chezar was liaison between that agency and the Grade organization in London. He was also responsible for booking talent for such TV programs as "The Perry Como Show" and "The Pat Boone Show."

Freshmen Ink Rep Pact With VIP

HOLLYWOOD—The Four Freshmen, the popular Capitol Records vocalists, have signed an exclusive representation pact with the newly-formed Viscount International Productions (VIP), according to a joint announcement by Fred Dale, VIP prexy, and Bill Manager, group's manager. The Freshmen, the first big attraction signed by VIP, had been under contract to General Artists Corp. for the past eight years.

A Husky Hello

BIOS FOR DEEJAYS

The Cleftones



With their current hit "Heart And Soul" The Cleftones have proved to be one of the most durable of the rock and roll vocal groups. They started their career back in 1956 with their first hit, "You, Baby, You" on the then newly-formed Gee label, a Roulette subsid. The follow-up was their biggest smash, "Little Girl of Mine," which was then succeeded by "Why Can't We Be Sweethearts."

Although their string of hits was interrupted they remained active in personal appearances. Inevitable eclipse, which so often claims most vocal groups, never visited the Cleftones.

This year when Roulette decided to reactivate its Gee label, it once again looked to the Cleftones for a debut blockbuster. The group responded with "Heart And Soul," and reestablished themselves and the label as formidable competition in the record market.

George Greeley



With over a half-dozen LP's selling briskly across the country, George Greeley has become firmly established as the leading interpreter of the "popular piano concerto." His current chart-rider is "Best of the Popular Piano Concertos."

Before developing the concerto format in his piano playing, Greeley worked in almost every area open to a musician. After graduation from the Julliard School of Music and Columbia Univ. in 1939 he entered the big band business, scoring and playing piano for the orchestras of Tommy Dorsey and Glen Gray among others. Then came 10 years of radio experience, where he added the title of conductor. He followed with long stints in the recording studios backing up numerous name singers. By this time, 1957, Hollywood beckoned with film scoring chores and in 1958 he became an exclusive Warner Bros. artist and embarked upon his concerto disk career.



ALL THAT JAZZ

After months of being romanced by Miles Davis, J. J. Johnson finally gave in and joined Davis' Quintet. The association should benefit both greatly. Davis was in dire need of a good man to share the front-line. Hank Mobiey just didn't fit into the pattern. Johnson, who, though winning poll after poll, has been floundering around for the past few years. (He's still trying to live down his association with Kai Winding.) A long stint with Davis should set him back on his feet with the public; and Miles will certainly reap benefits from J.J.'s inventiveness. With this addition, the group continues to be one of the most effective small groups in jazz.

WLIB becomes the first full-time AM jazz station in the New York area. The forward-looking general manager of the station, Harry Novik, appointed Billy Taylor music coordinator to oversee the new format. In addition, Billy's Saturday jazz show now becomes a daily feature, running from 5 PM until sign-off. Commenting on the appointment and new format, Taylor said that he now will be able to bring the FM quality concept of radio to AM listeners. While programming jazz full-time, the station also plans to concentrate completely on service to the 1½ million Negroes in the New York metropolitan area through public service projects, educational programs and news and special events coverage.

At a press conference to welcome him back from an extended Latin American tour, guitarist Charlie Byrd reiterated several of the complaints of other jazz musicians touring under State Dept. auspices. Byrd's biggest complaint was that the USIS is not thoroughly coordinated in these events. Although his group was travelling under diplomatic immunity, they repeatedly had to check all 28 pieces of luggage through customs. This held them up considerably and put a pinch in their close-timed schedule.

Then there's the matter of officious officials—American embassy officials who frequently demanded too much of Byrd's time to play at private parties. Many of these officials, said Byrd, felt as if the tour was a personal benefit to them and disregarded the demands made upon his time. Byrd also commented that at many of the concerts, which were supposed to be for the general public, were filled mainly with embassy officials and representatives of the political and cultural factions of the countries. The "plain people" didn't have much opportunity in some places to hear Byrd. Of course there were notable exceptions on the tour, but these were few and far between. In some stops, the embassy was not even aware of his arrival and failed to coordinate the concert with the American State Dept. In these places, producing the concert was left up to a local promoter or jazz club. An incident in Mexico City proved the biggest violation of the tour. A jazz concert had been set up there to coincide with Byrd's performance in the city. But the embassy had not even bothered to associate Byrd's name with the concert. Nevertheless, it was in Mexico City that the guitarist received his most enthusiastic public reception. And despite these flagrant mistakes, Byrd made many friends on the tour. In Bogota, a jazz club was formed on the night of his departure—in his honor. In summing up, Byrd felt that the proper way to conduct State Dept. jazz was to send young musicians to spend time in one place working with local musicians and fermenting friendships. On a tour such as his, Byrd thinks a four-day minimum in each city should be established. This would allow the musician to make friends and really influence the local populace. All in all, he thinks that President Kennedy's favorable outlook on the arts will eventually remedy many of his complaints.

JAZZ JOTTINGS. . . . The MJQ will both open and close the Berkshire Music Barn season. As disclosed here two weeks ago, the quartet will open July 1 in concert with the Contemporary String Quartet. They'll close the Barn Sept. 3 in an all-jazz concert with guest soloists. . . . A special Randall's Island Jazz Concert will be held June 28 for the benefit of C.O.R.E. and the Freedom Riders. Performing for the occasion will be Louis Armstrong, Cannonball Adderly and Gerry Mulligan and their respective groups. Naturally, the special buses leaving from Harlem for the concert that evening will be fully integrated. . . . Bob Hope bowed out of Newport because of a conflict of a taping schedule for July 1. Additions to the Newport fest include the Jon Hendricks-narrated "Evolution of the Blues" presentation featuring Jimmy Witherspoon, Hannah Dean and Big Miller. Also, Mel Torme will be added to the closing night's festivities, as will the Quincy Jones ork. . . . Cannonball Adderley will be appearing at the Antibes Jazz Festival in France, July 16 through 25.

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
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Bagels & Bongos

17 Columbia LP's Due In July

NEW YORK—Seventeen LP's will be released by Columbia Records next month, including nine pop, two jazz, two in the Latin American "EX" series, three Masterworks and one low-priced Harmony.

The pop issues are headed by three pic soundtrack releases, "Guns of Navarone," "Snow White and the Three Stooges" and "The Young Savages." Other pop issues include Brazilian singer Maysa's "Songs Before Dawn," Lois Hunt's-Earl Wrightson's "A Night with Rudolf Friml," Polly Bergen's songs from "Do Re Mi" and "Annie Get Your Gun," Marijohn Wilkin's and The Jordanaires' "Ballads of the Blue and Grey," Mark Laub's "Twin Melodies—Solo Organ," Captain Stubby and the Buccaneers' "Square Dance."

The jazz LP's are "The Chico Hamilton Special," with the Chico Hamilton Quintet, and "Con Alma," with The Ray Bryant Trio.

Classical issues include: the disk bow of "Aniara," a two-act "space opera" by Karl-Birger Blomdahl and featuring the soloists of the Royal

Opera, Stockholm and the chorus and orchestra of Vienna Volksoper under Werner Janssen's direction; William Schuman's 3rd Symphony performed by Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic; the third in the series of 1961 "Chamber Music from Marlboro" series: Schoenberg's "Verklarte Nacht" and Faure's "La Bonne Chanson."

The "EX" entries are "Mi Ultimo Tango," Sarita Montiel, and "Trio Los Mexicanos." The Harmony issue is The Norman Luboff Choir's "Sleepy Time Songs."

Del-Fi Names A&R Chief, Buys Canadian Master

HOLLYWOOD—Bob Keene, head of Del-Fi Records, has announced the appointment of Fred Smith to head the label's A&R staff. Smith, in association with Cliff Goldsmith, wrote such successes for the Olympics (Arvee) as "Western Movies," "Hully Gully," "Shimmy Like Kate," "Dance By The Light of the Moon" and "Dooley," the team's current entry. Goldsmith will continue to assist Smith in his new post.

In another Del-Fi move, Keene also announced the purchase and release of "Don't You Sweetheart Me" by Bobby Curtola, a deck originally on Canada's Tartan label. Del-Fi also signed Curtola to an exclusive long-term disk pact for the U.S. and its possessions. EMI has the disk rights to the performer other than the U.S. and Canada.

Alex Kramer Elected "Beside Network" Prexy

NEW YORK—Vet cleffer Alex Kramer has been elected president of The Veterans Hospital Radio & Television Guild, known in the entertainment industry as the "Beside Network." Kramer, an original member of the organization, and three-times its prexy, has written such hits as "Candy," "High On A Windy Hill" and "Far-away Places." The organization helps hospitalized veterans to help themselves at 110 Veterans Administration installations in forty states.

Boone To Africa; Move His Firms

NEW YORK—Pat Boone will be making a personal appearance tour in South Africa, opening July 12 at the Ice Drome in Durbin, and then going on to Johannesburg, Pt. Elizabeth, and Salsbury and Bulwayu in Rhodesia. This is Boone's first tour of Africa, where his records have met with success. The tour will cover ten days, at which time he returns to Hollywood to start filming "State Fair."

As of July 1, Danny Crystal, national record promotion director for Boone, will transfer his home base from the Time and Life Building to the Dot Record office at 157 West 57 Street, New York. Boone's record company, Agoom Agoom, and his publishing firms, Spooone Music (ASCAP) and Cooga Music (BMI), which Crystal also represents in New York, will be located at the same address.

Crystal says he is always on the lookout for fresh new material, not only for Boone, but for the record and publishing companies as well.

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Atlantic & Atco Bow LP Program, New LP's In Miami

NEW YORK—The Atlantic and Atco labels, at special meetings for its respective distributors in Miami Beach this past weekend (just prior to the ARMADA convention), announced a special LP summer sales incentive through August 31.

Heart of the deal is a 15% discount offered on all Atlantic and Atco stereo and mono LPs, including thirteen newly released albums. A feature of the plan is a 100% dealer exchange privilege. A deferred payments plan (30-60-90 days) was offered, which distributors in turn, will pass on to qualifying dealers.

A number of new merchandising and sales aids were displayed to the distributors. Both Atlantic and Atco showed new LP sales presentation catalogs that reproduce each album cover of the line. Newly created store and window display material available to dealers was also unveiled. Atlantic announced a drop in price of the stereo albums in the "8000" series to \$4.98 from \$5.98. Prices of all other series remain unchanged.

At the distrib meetings, Jerry Wexler presented new singles that will be released in the immediate future; Nesuhi Ertegun played tapes of future LP releases and introduced the new Atlantic Atco LP's that were readied for his special presentation in Miami. They are as follows:

"Fanny," the pic version of hit Harold Rome Broadway musical, stars Leslie Caron and Maurice Chevalier. Voice tracks by Miss Caron and Chevalier and producer-director Joshua Logan, are being prepared for disk-jockeys.

"Parrish," starring Troy Donahue, Connie Stevens, Diane McBain and Sharon Huguely, is being released in a four-color book-type package, with the front cover and side one of the LP featuring the soundtrack music by Max Steiner, and the other side of the LP features George Greeley and his piano-concerto interpretations of the film's music.

Both LP's will be distributed to some 500 members of the entertainment press. In addition, special screenings for deejays, and dealers have set-up for both films, and the albums are being made available for sale in theatre lobbies throughout the country, and die-cut window displays and window streamers have been prepared for dealer distribution. Many AM & FM outlets will receive the packages.

WB has also tied-in with the Fairchild Camera Company's current merchandising campaign, "So You Want to be A Star" and "Parrish" albums are being made available as contest prizes through Fairchild.

Film trailers, radio-TV spot commercials make liberal use of the music from both attractions.

Boyd Inks Songster

OKLAHOMA CITY—Boyd Records has signed songster Randy Page to an exclusive disk pact, according to topper Bobby Boyd. Page's first Boyd outing consists of two of his own numbers, "S.W.T.K. (Sweet Worlds & Tender Kisses)" and "I Need You." Label, which is distributed by United Artists, has a Top 100 deck in "You Can't Sit Down (Part 2)" by The Phil Upchurch Combo (62).

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
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Youth Figures Big In New Chancellor Expansion Moves

PHILADELPHIA—Robert Marcucci, President of Chancellor Records, has announced an expansion and re-organization program for the label—accenting youth.

One objective of the expansion has been a concentrated effort by Marcucci and his A & R chief, Russ Faith, to recruit actors to make their debut as singers. It's a switch for Chancellor since its top two artists, Fabian and Frankie Avalon gained fame first as singers and then became actors.

Marcucci and Faith, who will produce all of Chancellor sessions, have been seeing some of filmland's young talents. Additionally, Marcucci still will be looking for new singing talent in all categories, male and female teen singers, groups and instrumentalists.

Besides interviewing and auditioning new talent, Marcucci has been concentrating on wrapping up deals with pic studios to produce and release scores from features. Currently, he has penned (with collaboration by Faith), produced, recorded and released "You're Only Young Once," from "Love In A Goldfish Bowl," "Opposites Attract" from Columbia's "Sail A Crooked Ship," and "If You Knew" for "North to Alaska."

New talent signed to the label by Marcucci so far is Lada Edmund, of Broadway's "Bye Bye Birdie," Carlo

Gerace, a new Marcucci find, who cut "Wild About That Girl" from Columbia's "Gidget Goes Hawaiian." The Fabulous Four, who previously had been used to vocally backstop Fabian, also have cut an individual LP.

The record company reshuffled too by Marcucci and its organizational breakdown will be as follows: Joyce Weston, public relations for Fabian and Frankie Avalon in the East; Marti Jewel, head of the Promotion department and also promoted to the top of Chancellor's new Literary department, with duties that include finding film and television properties which can be used as starring vehicles for the label's artists; Rocco B. Ochuda, top man in the foreign sales and distribution department and assistant to Marcucci; Peter Girardi, also executive assistant to Marcucci; Chic Laganela, chief of advertising and art; Barbara Cartassi, foreign publicity and promotion.

Lastly, Chancellor's personal management arm, MDB, has hired for executive training in the management field, two Philadelphians, Thomas Marotta and Tony DeSantis. Marcucci stated in summing up the new program, "I merely am looking for fresh and new ideas. I believe that only the young or the young at heart can give us this. It's part of a campaign I started in management and recording to give youth its say."

Roth Exits Scepter; Acquires Seg-Way

NEW YORK—Scepter Music has purchased Jerry Roth's partnership interest in the firm, according to an announcement by Scepter last week.

Roth's affiliation with Scepter and its other firms, Wand Records and Ludix and Mary Jane pubberies, ended last Tuesday (20) when, after weeks of negotiations, the deal was concluded. (It was also announced that Roth had purchased Seg-way Records from Irv Jerome. Label has clicked with The Echoes diskings of "Baby Blue" and "Sad Eyes").

Youth Ork Names Avalon "Singer Of The Year"

vocalists Ray Eberle, Marion Hutton, Tex Beneke and The Modernaires (re-issued for the first time since their release on the Bluebird label twenty years ago).

"Oh Gentle Shepherd" debuts popular radio-TV gospel singer Bob Daniels on Victor; "Festival of RCA Victor Artists—Religious Concert (Vol. 1)" and "Festival of RCA Victor Artists—Gospel Sing (Vol. 2)," including such artists as Harry Belafonte, George Beverly Shea, Jerome Hines, The Blackwood Bros., Don Gibson, Jim Reeves, The Johnson Family and The Billy Graham Crusade Choirs; "Through the States with the Statesmen and Hovie Lister" (cut "live" at the quartet's Chicago gospel concerts).

5 New Candid LP's Bow With Bonus Deal

NEW YORK—Candid Records is releasing five jazz albums under the tag "Candid's Summer Jazz Star Program."

Candid is offering distributors a 15% bonus in free goods on the new releases as well as the label's entire catalog.

The five new packages are "Newport Rebels" with Charles Mingus and Max Roach, the first time both have been available in one album; Abbey Lincoln's "Straight Ahead;" "Jazz Re-

union" of Pee Wee Russell and Coleman Hawkins; an original full-length jazz opus by Phil Woods called the "Rights Of Swing;" Booker Ervin's "That's It." All five albums are being released in both mono and stereo.

An "extensive" consumer advertising and promotion campaign is underway to bring these albums to the attention of jazz buyers.

Candid is also releasing a single from the Abbey Lincoln album, pairing "When Malindy Sings" and "African Lady." A special mailing of promotional copies is being made to disk jockeys. Deejays who do not receive the deck can write to Candid for a copy.

Jensen Snap-In Cartridge Kits

CHICAGO—New snap-in cartridge kits for both distributors and dealers are being provided by big phono accessory manufacturer Jensen Industries, with snap-in brackets enabling a few cartridges, the firm says, to do what otherwise would be the work of many.

The distrib kit offers replacement for 432 cartridge types with just eight cartridges and two each of thirteen different brackets, and appropriate needles for each cartridge and snap-in phono guide and cross-reference showing how Jensen snap-in replacements can be used in various phono makes as replacements for many cartridges.

The dealer kit is designed for the service technician to carry in his tube caddy. Similar but smaller than the distrib kit, it includes two cartridges and eight brackets, each of a different type.

Jensen has also issued a new catalog page listing the cartridges and brackets in the snap-in line and showing how the cartridges are snapped into the brackets which in turn are fitted into the phono.

To meet the demand, advance copies of "Judy At Carnegie Hall" will be made available early this week in deluxe limited editions. Distribution of these boxed sets will be made only in the New York-New England area, where requests for the album are heaviest. Complete national distribution of the album, in its regular double packet, is expected to be accomplished by mid-July.

When finished, the regular jacket will bear a replica of the poster for the Carnegie Hall concert on the front cover and a 12- by 12-inch, full-color photograph of Miss Garland on the back cover. In addition to editorial matter, the inside of the jacket will contain seven black-and-white pictures of Miss Garland which, along with the color photo, was taken during the concert.

The Roncone deck is a master purchase from a local label in Youngstown, Ohio, where the five musicians hail from. They recently appeared on TV's "Route 66" when the program picked Youngstown as the locale for one program.

Capitol found Stone singing in the choir of a Los Angeles church.

New Head Elected By Copyright Society

NEW YORK—Professor Harry G. Henn, of Cornell Law School, was elected President of the Copyright Society of the U. S. A. at the recent annual meeting of the board of trustees.

Presti & Lagoya, Guitar Duo, Inked By Elektra



"We intend to map out tours for our artists as much as a year in advance," Dale said. "Considering the caliber of artists with whom we are now negotiating, this will not be too much of a problem."

Viscount International expects to announce its first clients within two weeks, Dale said.

With Phil Upchurch's "You Can't Sit Down" on the Top 100, UA, which is handling distribution of the disk for Boyd Records, has signed an exclusive deal with the latter covering its entire catalog.

New board members named are Arnold P. Hultgren, vice president of American Molded Products Co., Chicago; Neal W. Turner, director of product planning, Heath Company, Benton Harbor, Michigan; and Mr. Brown. Directors re-elected are Daniel E. Denham (3M), William P. Gallagher (Columbia Record Sales Corp.), and John H. Ihrig (Webcor, Inc.).

American Ork League To Sponsor Symph. Center

NEW YORK—Symphony Hill, an international center for more than 1,200 symphony orchestras in the U.S. and Canada, is being planned by the American Symphony Orchestra League on forty acres of woodlands in Fairfax County, Va., near Washington.

The center—which will comprise four buildings—will be primarily concerned with study sessions and group workshops, though concerts may be inaugurated at a later time.

A committee set-up by BMI prexy Carl Haverlin will conduct a nationwide campaign for funds to finance the center.

The announcement of the establishment of Symphony Hill was made last week at the opening of a three day meet of the ASO in Philadelphia.

Bow Coast Promo Firm

May has been associated with Desilu Studios as assistant publicity director and more recently has produced "The Big Night" for Paramount. Also acquired by Talmadge for release on UA is a master cut by syndicated disk jockey George Lorenz with the Cavalrymen, "Battle Cry," which is being distributed this week.

Parr Premium LP Hits 1 Million Sales

NEW YORK—A Jack Paar premium LP has sold a million copies in the first several weeks since the debut of the offer, according to Record Products, producer of the LP.

The disk, which highlights past Paar TV programs, is being offered to consumers as a premium with the 98¢ size of Jiffy Sew, a liquid mending product. The purchaser pays \$1.47 for the package.

The LP is promoted via commercials on the Paar TV'er and a "heavy" newspaper schedule plus an ad in Life Magazine.

Other entertainment figures will make premium LP, the firm said, with releases due early next month by General Harmonics and Video, RP's parent company.

Demain Exits Kapp Post

HOLLYWOOD—Bob Demain has resigned his position as western division Sales manager for Kapp Records. Demain had covered the eleven western states for Kapp for the past four years. Previous to that he handled the same territory for Epic Records. Demain will announce his future plans after a brief vacation.

These signings, to be followed by more, are part of the new look Westminster is taking on as a result of its recent purchase by ABC-Paramount. The acquisition of Westminster will now enable AmPar to enter the classical field with an established competitive label.

Westminster, which has ventured occasionally into other fields, will now concentrate exclusively on the classical field. Label A&R chief Dr. Kurt List revealed an extensive program of recordings for this year which will culminate in an LP release of 15 albums in September. He left June 28 for Europe where he will spend several months (until next spring) cutting material for 30 albums.

ABC-Paramount and Westminster execs expressed the feeling that under the Westminster banner they will now be able to compete against every major in the classical recording field. Dr. List said, "With ABC-Paramount behind us 100% there will be abso-

lutely nothing too big or adventurous for us to undertake. If any project sounds marketable, whether it has been done before or not, I feel we will attempt to and can do the best job possible."

Over the past year the Westminster line has been subject to enormous discounting and price cutting. Dr. List emphasized that now Westminster LP's will be available only at normal retail prices: \$4.98 and \$5.98.

The firm also plans to return many previously-discounted packages to the catalog, but will not repackage the merchandise.

NEW YORK—For the first time in its nine year history, Caedmon Records, the spoken-word label, will release this week (30) two all-music LP's. The LP's are "Songs of Courtship" and "Songs of Seduction," mono-only collections of authentic anthologies of early English folk material collected on-the-spot by Alan Lomax and Peter Kennedy. LP's are part of a five LP series under the title of "Folk Songs of Britain."

Since TV is a basic means of record promotion, the eyes of the industry were centered recently on Stuttgart where a meeting took place that breathed life into the 2nd TV program here. At that meeting, the heads of the German states agreed and signed contracts whereby the 2nd program was officially constituted. The new authority will be centered in Mainz near Frankfurt and will start in July 1962. In the meantime, provisional programs are being transmitted by the regional stations in addition to the 1st program. The 2nd program is expected to give the record industry a big boost as many more entertainment programs will be broadcast. The 2nd program will feature 35 to 45% light entertainment programs and will depend on advertising dollars for 70% of their income. The other 30% will come from the 5 mark fee that the viewers pay to the state. The 2nd program is also expected to have much stronger ties with Austria and Switzerland.

Pardon My Slip. Theodore O. Seeger of Peer Music reports that the hit tune "Missouri Cowboy" (Mule Skinner Blues) is published by Peer in Germany and not by Gerig as was listed a few weeks ago.

Rolf Arland from Chappell Music and Seith Music reports that my report on the number "Exodus" not getting plays here is not exactly true. The tune is being played by radio stations in Cologne, Stuttgart, Baden-Baden, and Luxemburg. Rolf also reports that the top hit "Mother-In-Law" has been translated into German by Kurt Feltz and will be recorded by Margit Imlau.

"Banned In Boston" is being done by American Bill Ramsey in German; the Carl Dobkins Jr. hit of a few seasons ago "Lucky Devil" has been done by The Missouriis, the Adam Faith hit "Take Good Care of Her" has been turned out by Wolfgang Sauer and the Edwin Morris Music "evergreen" "Careless Hands" has a new recording by top star Peter Alexander.

Jazz tenor sax man Hans Koller, who was awarded the title "Musician of the Year" in the German Jazz Poll, has been invited to a large English jazz festival in Beaulieu. He'll be accompanied by the Johnny Dankworth orchestra. Hans will also do some B.B.C. broadcasts. In exchange, England is sending tenor saxist Tubby Hayes to Cologne for broadcasts with the Kurt Edelhagen orchestra.

Hans Beierlein, the chief editor of the music journal "Der Musikmarkt" and owner of the Montana Music Publishing outfit in Munich, has opened a second publishing company in Frankfurt in partnership with Marianne Karthal of the Globus Automaten GMBH, one of Germany's biggest "One Stops." The new publishing company will go under the name "Globus Music."

The Rolf Budde Music group reports top action on the Caterina Valente recording of "Ein Seemannsherz" which is already in The Cash Box top 10. The firm also reports that the Ray Peterson hit "Corinna Corinna" has been recorded by Peter Beil, the original Charleston has been re-recorded under the German title "Okky Dokky" with Conny and Rex Gildo, the Everly Brothers hit "Lucille" has been done by Ursula Junkert and Helmut Schmidt and top stars Gerd Boettcher and Detlef Engel have teamed up for duets on the oldie "Home On The Range" backed with the Italian "evergreen" "Santa Lucia." The lyrics were handled by Fred Oldorp and Gunter Loose. Electrola Records reports that Germany's top hit "Babysitter Boogie" by Ralf Bendix has passed the 400,000 mark in sales.

Reports have it that Wanda Jackson is heading to Germany for a series of personal appearances. The good-looking lass with the "Elvis" like voice is much in demand for TV here. Her records are selling very well. German teenager Peter Kraus is readying his 3rd TV show for broadcast. One feature of his show is international guests. The last two were Connie Francis and France's Sacha Distel. For this show he's signed Italy's queen Milva and the Korean lass Jong Whan Choi.

Deutsche Grammophon reports that the United Artist label which has been released under the home owned Helidor banner will have its original label in Germany, Norway, Sweden, Austria, Switzerland, Denmark and Finland. This action starts immediately and UA records are now on sale in these countries.

One of Germany's greatest pop and film composers Werner Richard Heymann is dead. The 65 year old great, who is rated here alongside such names as Gershwin or Berlin, wrote the music for over 40 films both here and in America where he spent the war years. He has also written many evergreens which will continue to rack up sales and performances for years to come.

The Cash Box recently listed the first American release of a German production by American Gus Backus. The "Best Bet" awarded record is "Wooden Heart" backed with "Said the Old Indian Chief." The record also has a story to tell. Actually, this record was released 4 weeks before Elvis Presley released his single of "Wooden Heart" and the Backus version reportedly racked up over 100,000 sales before the Elvis record reached the market and continued to outsell Elvis in Austria. The Presley version later went on to top the hit parade in almost every European country, but the Backus record refused to die. D.J.'s flipped the record over and began spinning "Said The Old Indian Chief," which went on to rack up over 500,000 sales before it died. The Elvis record of "Wooden Heart" sold only about 200,000 in Germany. Good Luck in America, Gus!

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SCANDINAVIA

SWEDEN

Scandinavian Record Co. (Sonet, Storyville, Roulette, Gazell, Colpix, Debut, Bel Air, Collector and Hispavox record labels) presents a bi-monthly magazine-news bulletin, with Björn Fremer (head of publicity) as editor. Its first issue presents an editorial article which no doubt has caused some discussions here. Fremer refers to the problems of promoting records and record artists in Swedish Radio and TV. "When an artist is contracted for a radio or TV show, the non-commercial Radio-TV-company refuses him/her to sing a song from the latest record made by the artist, the Radio-TV Co. being so afraid for all the noise caused by a column writer in the daily evening paper Aftonbladet (social-democratic) who seems to have got this thing called 'promotion' on his brain," writes Fremer. He also refers to the fact that Swedish Radio-TV recently had a chance to present Connie Francis but they refused since it expected her to sing one or two songs from her latest record, and knowing all the noise that followed after Bobby Rydell's visit, when he sung "Sway" twice or three times in two days, it expected the same if they accepted a show with Miss Francis. The policy of the Swedish government radio and TV company does not stimulate cooperation between the record companies and the Radio, and with more and more best-selling artists bound to record companies it seems as if SBC-TV might be short of artists for its entertainment programs if it doesn't change its policy. Exceptions to its rules are made from time to time, particularly when it concerns a few of the top selling Swedish artists, such as Povel Ramel, Martin Ljung, etc. from Knäppupp and Siv Malmquist from Metronome, artists who are badly wanted by radio and TV but who refuse to appear there unless they are allowed to do the numbers they want. Other artists who do not have the same possibilities become more and more interested (and forced) to look for cooperation with the so called pirate radio stations, operating on commercial basis.

Nordiska Musikförlaget's record dept. presents three new jazz LP's and one 45 RPM single on Blue Note. The LP's are "Flight To Jordan" with Duke Jordan, "Goin' Up" with Freddie Hubbard and "Grant's First Stand" with Grant Green. The same company also released four new jazz LP's on Pacific Jazz. Nordiska Musikförlaget represents some 15 different labels in the Swedish market.

Latest releases from Knäppupp are Pat Boone's "Moody River" on Dot and a new EP with Robertino on Triola. The latter has, among others, "Jamaica" and "Pappagallos" among the numbers. Knäppupp also informs that Robertino's "O Sole Mio" (It's Now Or Never) has sold 100,000 in Scandinavia and the artist received a gold disk when he appeared in Sjömarken, near Gothenburg in western Sweden on June 23.

Björn Fremer, publicity head of Sonet Grammofon AB, reports that Bertil Englund has signed a new contract with Sonet for another two years. The popular singer Ping Ping ("Sucu Sucu") will tour in Sweden at the end of July and beginning of August.

EMI has contracted the couple Solveig Linnér and Bengt von Knorring (they are married) for recordings. The couple has become very popular after some TV shows here recently. Another artist the company is doing much to promote these days is Jay Epae on Mercury.

New sheet music from Gehrman's includes "Salome" by Robert Stolz, a German song, "Buzz-Buzz A-Diddle-It"/"Opportunity" both with Swedish lyrics by Ulf Klefelt, and "Two Sleepy People" by Hoagy Carmichael with Swedish lyrics by Al Sandström.

DENMARK

EMI in Scandinavia just had a Scandinavian convention in Copenhagen. Summer and Autumn releases and sales campaigns were discussed.

Vera Lynn, British songstress, made a brilliant performance at Tivoli in Copenhagen. All dailies were very enthusiastic about her show.

NORWAY

Arild Iversen of Iversen & Frogg A/S (EMI in Norway) off for Copenhagen for a Scandinavian convention.

A/S Nor-Disc in Oslo has rushed out "But I Do" with Ray Garnett b/w "Runnin' Scared" with Timmy Reynolds on Top Rank.

Egil Monn Iversen A/S presents an LP with Italian singer Robertino on Triola. Some company also represents Warner Bros in Norway and has, among others, "Temptation"/"Stick With Me Baby" by the Everly Brothers. On Sonet, the company has rushed out Linda Scott's "I've Told Every Little Star," a record played very often over the continental Radio Luxembourg.

ARGENTINA

The visitor of the week was Miguel Aceves Mejia, the world-famous Mexican singer. Mejia plans to stay in Buenos Aires for some time, but without performing. Recently, RCA released his LP "The Voice of Mexico." Other artists of international prestige currently in Argentina are Bobby Capó, Antonia Prieto and Daniel Riobobos. We were told Prieto would wax tangos with Juan D'Arienzo's orchestra—he has always been a bolero and rock singer—and also record "Cara de Payaso" (Face of a Clown), the Brazilian tune.

Pat Henry—the Chilean rock'n roller—may become a big hit in the northern part of Argentina. Some dealers have written Odeon asking for special promotion in Tucuman, where Pat's "Poetry in Motion" has shown very good sales.

Ray Anthony has recorded "Moliendo Café" (Grinding Coffee) in the States. The tune is number one on our charts this week. Domenico Modugno—the author of "Volare"—cut "La Novia," sung in Spanish and Italian.

Columbia has finished the recording of its first stereo LP for release here. It contains tango music played by Osvaldo Fresedo, well known arranger and director. Columbia has been recording in stereo for the States for about a year and a half, but these records weren't released here, because the market for this type of disk was too small.

RCA announced it will start releasing single 33's, considering the success they have had. The label will make combinations of 33, 45 and 78 releases for each record, according to the type of music. The "Compact 33" will also appear very soon. The first single 33 will be "Exodus" (movie soundtrack) and will be presented with a special sleeve.

Los Cuatro Duendes—Chilean vocal group—arrived here recently and will perform on radio and television.

The fire that destroyed part of Channel 9 TV caused, besides material losses, big trouble for people who have to produce shows because of lack of space and time. One of them is Rodriguez Luque, who had to start his "Musica en el Aire" show in July, and now has his program delayed.

Los TNT will go to Venezuela next July, after they finish their second LP. According to RCA, the first one is selling pretty well in that country. Los Santos, as part of their world-wide trip, will perform at the Pessaro Song Festival, in Italy. This contest will be telecast by Eurovisión. After it, they will go to Spain, United States and France. Billy Cafaro is also going to Venezuela, contracted by Venevisión. July 10 he will go to Spain, to take part in the Benidorm Song Festival, and then to Peru (Panamericana TV, Channel 13) and Chile (Bim Bam Bum Theatre-Buddy Day).

Famous SRL—ABC Paramount representative—has an agreement with EMI of England and its local representative, Odeon, for releasing part of Odeon's French catalog. This was possible because both parts considered it was big enough to permit both companies operations. Famous has also started releasing Brazilian label Musidisc and American Colpix. Colpix has a good seller in "Blue Moon" by The Marcels. Musidisc's best seller is the "Romanticos de Cuba" LP.

Virgilio Exposito has decided to wax his compositions with his own orchestra. He'll also start a record producing company. He hasn't decided yet on which label he will release them.

"Il Nostro Concerto" has reached 24 waxings, Gigo Gallo (the publisher) announced. The tune is on the charts this week mainly because of the Roberto Yanes, Umberto Bindi and Pino Calvi recordings.

Palette will release ten Disc Jockey recordings this year, according to Rodriguez Luque, Disc Jockey's topper. Disc Jockey had a good hit recently with Palette's recording of "Never on Sunday" made by Makadopoulos and his orchestra.

"Eso" (one of Argentina's 1960 best sellers) has been contracted by Tulio Gallo for publishing in Italy. "El Momento" and "Bailemos, Bailemos" will also be published in that country.

Ruth Durante—tango songstress—recorded "Esclavo de tu piel" and "La Noche de Anoche"—formerly boleros—with Roberto Casal's orchestra.

Inter Bas has put to sale its first "Petit LP's," that is, seven inch 33's with three tunes on each side. The price is slightly higher than EP's.

Ariel Records released Paul Anka's "Songs for Young Lovers" with big acceptance. Anka's last single, "Tonight My Love, Tonight," is selling pretty well.

"Angelica"—currently number three in the list—is being recorded in nearly all companies. TK released it, sung by Los Andariegos; Odeon, by Los Chilicotes, and RCA, by Bienvenido Cardenas and the Trio Lima.

Jolly Land has just finished her first LP for Vik, sung in Spanish and English. Fernando Borges is starting a tour of Mendoza and Peru. Lalo Fransen is returning from Colombia very soon. Columbia's promotional LP is receiving big air play. Rafael Hidalgo cut "Ciceron Cha Cha Cha," which may become a hit. "Ja da," by Johnny and the Hurricanes is also sounding loud. Paco Amor will wax "Flamenco Rock" and "Argentina." Capitol is releasing a "La Pachanga" LP recorded by Rene & Orch in Spanish. Clebanoff's "Cha Cha Cha Flamenco" was just released here on Mercury.

ENGLAND

EMI Records Ltd. which introduced record tokens to this country fifteen years ago, are extending the service—the only one of its kind—from July 1. The tokens, until now only exchangeable for records issued by EMI, will cover all major labels. EMI will continue to administer the service but in view of the increased benefits to dealers and other manufacturers certain adjustments will be made in dealers' profit margins to help offset the cost.

Impresario Bernard Delfont recently hit the headlines by buying the freehold of London's Saville Theatre. Built in 1931 with a seating capacity of 1,200, the theatre is ideal for large scale musicals. Delfont plans to rename it The Gaiety and his first presentation will be Victor Borge, who opens a three-week season on July 4 followed by The Jerome Robbins "Ballets USA." Delfont also announced that following extensive alterations The Prince of Wales Theatre will re-open on August 21 with "An Evening With Sammy Davis" for a 7-week season. While in this country, Davis will undertake a 2-week nation wide tour of one nighters. Following Davis at The Prince of Wales will be the Broadway musical "Do-Re-Mi" starring Max Bygraves, which opens on October 12 presented by H. M. Tennant and Leslie A. Macdonnell by arrangement with Bernard Delfont.

Sydney Bron of Bron Associated has formed a 50/50 partnership with American publisher Aaron Schroeder, owner of Sea-Lark Enterprise Inc., January Music Inc. and Arch Music Co. The British firm will be called A. Schroeder Music Publishing Co. Inc. Besides his publishing activities, Schroeder is also a song writer of note and has been responsible for 17 Elvis Presley hits, four of which "Big Hunk Of Love," "I Got Stung," "Stuck On You" and "It's Now Or Never" have been No. 1. Other major publications include "Rubber Ball" and "I Wanna Love My Life Away" by Gene Pitney whose latest disk "A Town Without Pity" and "Hello Mary Lou" by Ricky Nelson are handled by the new company.

After eight years as exploitation manager for Sydney Bron Associated, Dick James is leaving to start his own publishing company. He will remain with Bron Associated until October when the Dick James Music Co. will become operative. Meantime James is looking for suitable American and Continental material for the new company.

Reorganization within the Bron Group includes increased activity on the publishing side by Gerald Bron, formerly in charge of the Orchestral Service, and the appointment of Peter Callander as exploitation manager. Overall direction continues to be under Sydney Bron.

Musician and agent Dick Katz, recently joined forces with Harold Davidson under the name of Dick Katz Ltd. Top recording artists handled by him include Marion Ryan, whose latest Columbia disk "Blue Bubbles" backed with "I Wish You Love" is just released; song writer and Decca recording star Paddy Roberts, shortly off to S. Africa for cabaret after which he cuts his third LP "Paddy Roberts At The Blue Angel" to be recorded live at the night spot; Valerie Masters, who just cut a new disk for Fontana "Birmingham Rag," and Mike Preston, whose latest Decca disk "It's All Happening" was penned by The Allison's.

In London, celebrated Swiss conductor and publisher Cedric Dumont of Editions Coda, Zurich, drew a capacity house and plaudits from the Press for his concert at the Royal Festival Hall. He expressed his appreciation for the quality and co-operative spirit of British musicians. Before leaving London, Dumont visited publishing houses of Francis Day & Hunter, Feldman and Lawrence Wright for whom he is the Swiss Representative.

H. M. The Queen and members of The Royal Family attended a performance at The Theatre Royal, Windsor of the new musical "Jane Eyre" based on the novel by Charlotte Bronte, with book by R. H. Lewis and Hal Shaper—who also wrote the lyrics—and music by Monty Stevens. After the show, leading lady Diane Todd and the cast were presented to the Royal Party. "Jane" will shortly be seen in the West End. Music is published by Edwards Music Co.

Before returning to New York after his extensive Continental trips publisher Jack Mills hosted a cocktail party at the Dorchester Hotel attended by his many friends in the record, publishing and entertainment world.

Congratulations to strict tempo dance band leader Victor Silvester awarded the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.) in the Queen's Birthday Honours List, "for services to ballroom dancing." In December last year, EMI awarded him the first British platinum disk to mark the sale of over 30,000,000 singles and a Silver LP for the sale of over 250,000 LP's during the past 25 years.

Silver Dollar Records Ltd., relative newcomer to the realm of strict tempo music for the ballroom, has its own success story to report. After twelve months trading, the company has attracted both interest and enthusiasm for the 10 7" EP's so far released. Recorded by pianist Ernest Wilson with bass and drums the disks conform to the tempos laid down by the Imperial Society of Dance Teachers and cover every kind of dance from the conventional quick-step and waltz to the cha-cha-cha and samba. Retailing at 8/11½d, five further releases are scheduled for September.

"We think you're gonna like Peanut Butter" was the tag around the jar received by djs and reviewers—an exploitation gimmick by Pye Records to promote the British release of The Marathons stateside hit "Peanut Butter."

Freelance A & R managers Michael Barclay and Philip Waddilove of Audio Enterprise Ltd. and Noel Rogers of United Artists Music have just returned from a week in Greece recording an LP of Greek music for release in the States on the United Artists label.

Fred Jackson of Tin Pan Alley Music recently visited Germany and placed British material with publishers there including Tony Osborne's "Swinging Gypsies" to be handled by Rolfe Budde Music in Germany, Austria and Switzerland. Aberbach Hamburg have accepted "Hello Spring" and "Eclipse." Jackson also met up with Dave Miller of Somerset Records of America who plans to open a company and plant in Germany.

Krigror Mintangian, president of Durium, is in Naples to arrange the participation of his cast in the next Festival. Last year he won the first and second prizes.

Ricordi has released "Riviera" sung by Umberto Bindi, who penned the tune as well. Publisher of Bindi's compositions is Alfredo Rossi of Ariston. The record is expected to be a success.

Mr. Rapetti, Jr., of Ricordi told us that "La Ballata Di Cerutti" (The Ballad of Mr. Cerutti), penned and sung by Giorgio Gaber, is selling strongly and is just on the point of reaching the 50,000 mark in sales.

Arturo Benedetti Michelangeli, world famed Italian pianist, was in Florence May 31 and June 4 for two concerts. He received the unanimous acclaim of the public and the critics alike. Benedetti Michaelangeli, who records exclusively for His Master's Voice, is due in London in the next few months for a series of recordings for a new LP. His Master's Voice published "Hymne A L'Amour" by Edith Piaf, which has already become a best seller.

Maestro Carlo Alberto Rossi, well known song-writer and music publisher, showed the Italian rep of The Cash Box the plans of his new sound recording studio being built in Milan. It will be ready at the end of the year and will be one of the best equipped studios in Italy. All of the sound recording plants will be supplied by Telefunken.

Publisher Alfredo Rossi was happy to see, in the June 17 issue, two full page ads for two hit songs in his catalogue—"This Pullover" by Paul Evans on Carlton and "Giuggiola" by Corrado Lojacono (original version) on Columbia. In Italy, "Il Pullover," which was composed by Gianni Meccia, is known only via the version of the author on RCA Italiana, and was on our charts for a long time. Speaking with Mr. Vigorelli, who manages the Milan office of RCA Italiana, I learned that the record is still selling well even after the sales "boom" period.

Adriano Celentano has picked a good Cha Cha Cha from Sidet's music catalogue—"Ba Ta," available on the Jolly label. During its first week it reportedly received a promising reaction.

Calling Mr. Anzelmo, who handles the foreign labels of Ricordi, I learned that the hit "But I Do" (music sheet published by Ariston in Italy) by Clarence "Frogman" Henry (Argo) was "successfully released." The first group of records on Mercury's "Perfect Presence Sound" imported to Italy by Ricordi, was quickly sold out and others will be immediately imported. Roulette has a strong campaign going to promote "Let's" by Sarah Vaughan, while it has also released "African Waltz" by Johnny Dankworth (the sheet music is published here by Connelly).

News from Titanus, the music publishing company managed by Mr. Fiori-Peppino Di Capri has picked and waxed the tune "No Nun Di' Ca' Me Vuoi Bbene" (Don't Say That You Love Me). "Romantica," after its big success of last year, is meeting with new success in the Scandinavian countries via the version of Italian singer Robertino, who, on his European tour, will present the song on TV. "Lady Luna" (Lady Moon) has been sold the world over and also "Just The Same Old Line" is being sold to many countries abroad.

Jack Mills, recently visiting Milan, bought some tunes from the Carisch—catalog—"Venezia La Luna E Tu" (Venice The Moon And You); "Cuore Napoletano" (Neapolitan Heart); "Sono Tre Parole" (Three Words); penned by maestro Mascheroni the same author of "Jealous Of You"; "Come E' Bello Far L'Amore" (How Nice It Is To Make Love). He also picked two songs written by Peppino Di Capri—"Let Me Cry" and "Lassame" (Let Me Go).

Mr. Crepax is leaving Ricordi and Mr. Todini is leaving Fonit. Both will fill important posts in another record company just increasing in strength.

Other dealers are using similar ideas in order to present the consumer with better creative display.

Wilf A. Gillmeister, merchandising manager of RCA Victor record sales, has added to his duties that of A&R director, a post recently vacated by Hugh Joseph. Gillmeister has been with the firm for the past six years.

Quality Records just released a Chubby Checker compact 33. The package is attractively presented by using a color photo shot of Checker on the label. Also released were, "Missing You" by Ray Peterson, "The Presidential Press Conference" by The Sickniks, and "Skin Tight, Pin Striped, Purple Pedal Pushers" by Sheb Wooley. Phil Rose of Compo reports good reaction on, "John Brown's Baby" by Jimmy Rodgers, "Sermonette" by Earl Grant, and "Never On Sunday" by The Chordettes. A new album doing well for the firm is "The Explosive Sounds of Jackson Paine" on Warner Bros.

Bo Diddley currently appearing at the Esquire Show Bar in Montreal. Bud Hayden, of Select Music in Vancouver, reports great reaction on "Tossin' and Turnin'" by Bobby Lewis on Delta, "Should I" by the String-A-Longs on Warwick, and "Exodus" by Eddie Harris on Delta.

JAPAN

In celebration of the 60th anniversary of the famous Kosaku Yamada, Toshiba will release the first in a series of eight LP's. The first three LP's are a limited series. These include 30 tunes, all of which are still sung by most of the Japanese people. 5 LP's will be released from August on, and completed within this year. The firm is planning to release one volume monthly.

Japan's King put the Mexican Orfeon label into its "King International Series." The first release here is a 12" LP titled "Trio," by the singing group of the same name. The LP should sell well, as many fans demand more Latin-style records these days.

Yukio Hashi, the Star of Victor, recorded another brand new release "Ukina-no Watari-Dori." Hashi, who made his sensational debut last July with "Itako Gasa" is still selling well. Meanwhile, his second one-man show in Tokyo has been booked with the Nichigeki Theater. The show will start on September 5 for a week.

2,186 disks which were produced for August release by member diskeries of Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA) passed the 75th Standard committee. The committee's last session admonished only one tune (last month) saying it was not suitable for TV and radio use.

Toshiba Record Music Institute newly opened in Tokyo. The institute will teach new singers who are to record on Toshiba.

Film star Yuza Kayama (Toho film) just recorded his initial tunes for Toshiba. The single, "Daigaku-no Waka-Daisho" b/w "Yoru-no Taiyo," will be released next month. Many other diskeries wanted to sign him. The release of "24,000 Baci (24,000 Kisses)" by Renatino and Franco Scarica e il suo Complesso, both on Fonit, were followed by another Italian label, Gurtler Saar. The tune (backed with "Al Di La by Tony Dallara) was, however, released by (Japan's) King on the King International label.

Peggy Hayama of (Japan's) King returned to Tokyo after her singing performances in Australia and Hawaii. She appeared on General TV, Melbourne. Then she joined "5 Stars Show" in Hawaii with Yukiji Asaoka, Ukiko Kagurazaka, Frank Nagai and Masa-aki Hirao. Meanwhile, Izumi Yukimura of Victor also returned home from the U.S. She had been there for 11 months.

A Teichiku master will be, for the first time in the firm's history, released next month in all of the American area including Canada and South America. The selected 45 rpm single is "Aye George Konya-mo Bera-bera Bencharo (by Aye George) b/w "Corazon de Mellon" by Sumiko Sakamoto. This news was reported by president Shigeji Nanko from the U.S. via his overseas telephone contact with Tokyo office. He is now visiting the US on business. Distribution will be handled by Decca, Teichiku's contracted party, and bear the Decca label. Decca also wants all-out distribution rights of Teichiku's masters as far as the entire American area is concerned. More and more of Teichiku's tunes are expected to be released in America through Decca. This is the biggest business outcome gained so far from Nanko's US trip.

"Living Library" will be opened on the first floor of the Record Raikan Building shortly. All the phonograph disks released by JPRA's affiliated companies (now 9 firms), starting with their July issues, will be stored and opened before the public here. About 6,000 disks are produced each month by nine diskeries.

No substantial gains to report on the hot debate between JPRA and BIEM, but high officials of disk firms met with several people under the auspices of JPRA. They are still trying to find out which way is the best to meet with BIEM.

Victor's "Rolling Record Orientation" will be opened five times a year starting very soon. This aims to make the employees of Victor's special contracted record stores aware of distribution and other needed information. This plan came into existence by complaints that employees of record stores were not experienced, and the necessity of educating them was urgently needed. 1,500 people of stores around the nation are to take the lectures. Speakers include Kiyoshi Hasegawa, of Japan Management Association.

Elvis Presley, with his photo on the front page of most every teenage record magazine last week in Belgium, is more than ever the craze of youngsters in Belgium. His latest record "I Feel So Sad"/"Wild in the Country" was issued recently by Inelco, Belgium. According to W. Roelans, head of Inelco records sales, orders during the last 10 days broke all previous records. Record business is certainly soft these days in Belgium, but a new Presley issue acts like a shot in the arm for every record dealer around the country. Elvis' "Surrender" is still one of the 10 best sellers in Belgium, and "Wooden Heart" is still selling.

The Tramps, one of the most promising Philips' teen ensembles here in Belgium, creating excitement with their "Tomawak" and "Maharadja" on the Philips Label. Songs belong to a young publishing firm, Primavera-Brussels, and both numbers have been received enthusiastically by publishers in most important countries of the Continent and it seems that even American publishers are interested in these titles.

Every year an Italian Song Festival is organized in Belgium. Many Italians are working in this country. Among the songs which impressed the public was "Rondinella d'Or," recorded by Tony Palermo on the Will-label.

"Parasol" is the title of the new number recorded by The Cousins on Palette. "Parasol" is also the name of a new lemonade, so that there's publicity for the name from two ends.

The Whitsun holiday proved very good for Les Chakachas and their new record "La Pachanga." Every juke-box on the Belgian coast kept playing "La Pachanga" again and again. This sounds very promising for Les Chakachas and the pachanga dance during the Summer holidays. Inelco came out with a new record by the group: "Ca c'est du Poulet." Tune is a French slang expression currently used in France to designate hot items or persons. Les Chakachas, in their new song, are boosting such hot "poulet" as Marilyn Monroe—Loll (brigida)—Dalida—B.B. (Brigitte Bardot). Sounds like another hit by the team.

Sacha Distel, the famous French singer (remember "Scoubidou"—"Personalities") just came out with a wonderful and most promising EP, and it looks like his "A cause de toi" (I don't know why), "Oui, devant Dieu" (La Novia), "On dit, on dit" (They say, they say) will get him again to the top. Excellent French lyrics by his manager and lyric writer Maurice Tézé.

New recording of "Calcutta" by Petula Clark (Pye) getting big attention in this market. Newest success on the Olympia label: "Mi Zapato" and "El Baile Del Limon," recorded by Pepe Camora.

Ria Valk, the Dutch singing cow-girl, is also hitting with her version of "Muss I Denn"—"Afscheid van een soldaat." She will be the star of the Dutch team in the 1961 Knoché Eurovision Festival that will take place from July 21-27. Her first album soon will be put on the market entitled "Ria Valk goes Western." The arrangements are by famous Jack Bulterman ("Ramona"—Blue Diamonds) and no doubt something wonderful and catchy will come out of this combination.

Neil Sedaka, the Victor artist who became a big star through his international success, just came out with "Little Devil," a sure winner for Benelux.

New Belgian rock 'n roll platters to be mentioned: "One Song" by Don Ellery (Philips), "Bonanza," by The Bonanzas (Barclay), "American Rock" by Joske Harry (Philips), "Brigitte" by The Spoetniks (Hélie), "Juliska" by The Jokers (Philips) and "Maharadja" by The Tramps (Philips).

Ricordi Records is presenting a new duet: Les Baby Twins. These are twin-sisters and like the Kessler-Sisters they are dancers as well as singers.

HOLLAND

In the small country of Holland, a gold record is awarded on titles that reach the 100,000 mark. In a prosperous year, the Dutch market brings 4 to 5 golden disks. The more astonishing is the fact that Wim van Vught, managing director of Editions Altona, could be a party to three gold records on titles from his catalog. The first was "Rocking Billy." The Fontana-recording of songstress Ria Valk reached the sale of 100,000. The second was the flip-side of this recording, called "Darling ik ben zo blij," an original copyright of Altona-Radar, written and composed by Ria Valk herself. The third gold record has to remain for some time on Bovema's shelf because it was on the title "Non je ne regrette rien" and this gold disk will be handed over to Edith Piaf as soon as she will be able to make her promised tour to Holland. All Dutch Piaf-fans really hope that this will be within a short time.

New recording activities of Delta Records. Under the name "The Sunbeams," Delta released the first record of a vocal group, consisting of two (twin) sisters and their three brothers. Insiders speak about a revelation in teenage singing. Top side of the record: Dutch version of "Salome." Delta also released a disk by the Dutch rock sensation "Little Henny and the Shakin' Boys." Titles: "Passion Flower" and "Home on the Range." Released by Delta on the Dutch market with a lot of publicity and plugging: Janie Grant's "Triangle." High expectations!

Robert Oeges, Bovema's Columbia label manager told The Cash Box that his label will soon release the new Cliff Richard-recording of "A Girl Like You," backed with "Now's The Time To Fall In Love." Oeges reports that a recent poll among about 25 fan clubs in Holland has proved that Cliff will become the next Frank Sinatra in the future.

Sinatra fans will welcome a newly released album, titled "The Nearness of You," with some of Frank's best recordings from the late forties. It contains fourteen great standards in great interpretations by the one and only "Voice." Well remembered track is "Nancy with the Laughing Face." Record buyers will also be glad to hear "Oh! What it Seemed to Be" and "Full Moon and Empty Arms" again, two Sinatra hits dating from just after the war (Philips, L. C. Phonogram).

It's quite a long time since the last LP of French singer Catherine Sauvage was released here. Now lovers of French chansons can buy "Catherine Sauvage Chante (chansons by) Léo Ferré" Volume 1, on the Philips label.

Capitol just released a new EP series. Among the highlights are Sinatra's "Swinging Session" and Nat King Cole's "A Mis Amigos."

Bovema's MGM label has contributed a wonderful MGM-jazz-LP to the jazz catalog in Holland. It's "Carrefour du Jazz," which features wonderful takes of Toshiko Akiyoshi, Gerry Mulligan, Red Mitchell and the late vibist Lem Winchester.

"The Westside Story," which will be on the stage in Holland shortly, is getting increasing attention. Basart is rushing out a "Westside Story" LP. Goodman-Basart's strongest radio plugging at this moment is the American hit song "But I Do." There is a Dutch Funckler (Artone) record on the market already.

There are new recordings to be mentioned on Imperialist, Bovema's Dutch orientated label, lead by Gerry Oord Jr., son of managing director Gerry M. Oord. Among the current hits are The Hot Jumpers, a rock group from The Hague, making their first appearance with "The Hippy Hippy Shake." One of the greatest today, of course, is Ricky Nelson's "Travellin' Man," very much in demand in Holland.

RCA signed Carmela Rey and is preparing her first LP, singing in duo with her husband Rafaél Vázquez.

Newspaper men Alejandro Guzmán Mayer, Antonio Lamadrid and Roberto Velasco will fly to Guadalajara to interview the Governor to arrange a homage in honor of Gonzalo Curiel, one of the best Mexican composers, who died three years ago. This homage will be celebrated July 2, 3, 4 in every city of the country.

With a big orchestra of 47 pieces, conductors and arrangers Chucho Ferrer, Mario Ruiz Armengol and Jorge Ortega are preparing an LP with music of Cuba, Venezuela, Argentina, Brazil, Puerto Rico, México and other Latin American countries, cut by RCA and suggested by Reader's Digest for a special promotion.

We just received a post card from San Salvador, where the Mexican trio Los Tres Reyes are performing with big success. Guatemala, Honduras and Panama are the next countries they will visit.

Returning from a long retirement period, Brazilian singer Lana Bittencourt waxed for Columbia a standard with a Portuguese version of Dreamin' which is called here "Sonhando." Now she just finished an LP, entitled "Sambas Do Rio" accompanied by Astor's Orchestra. The album is made with twelve sambas from two of Brazil's finest composers, very well known here and in other countries: Antonio Carlos Jobim and Luiz Antonio.

Two new Brazilian composers emerged from other activities and started to write music and lyrics with great success. They are Haroldo Barbosa, journalist and Radio producer and Luis Reis, pianist and horse race reporter. Their compositions are doing very well, especially "Palhaçada," "Nossos Momentos," "Noticia De Jornal" and "Só Vou De Mulher," recorded by our top artists, such as Miltoninho, Elizette Cardoso, Ivon Curi, the vocal group Os Cariocas and others.

Sylvio Mazzuca's dance orchestra, very popular here, recorded a new album for Columbia, which is entitled "Baile De Sucessos No. 2." Following the No. 1, this one includes sixteen Brazilian and international hits, selected by Mazzuca, who's responsible for the arrangements. Another Columbia artist, Alcides Gerardi, in the retail stores with his most recent album, "Palavras De Amor (Words of Love)." Gerardi's "Cabecinha No Ombro"—(Little Head On My Shoulder) was 1958's best seller in Brazil.

As yet, nothing has been announced regarding Taylor's future plans, but it is believed in some quarters that he may join the A&R staff of another Australian record company which plans to move strongly into the local production field.

Col Joye, who has always appeared exclusively for TCN-9 in Sydney, will be seen for the first time on ATN-7 shortly when he sits as a judge on the panel of "Juke Box Jury." Meanwhile, TCN-9 producer Warwick Freeman is working on the second Col Joye TV spectacular to be shown on July 4. Brian Henderson will emcee the show and Judy Stone, The Allen Bros. and Patsy Ann Noble are some of the stars who will appear.

Festival Records artist Lucky Starr will leave on August 25 to try his luck in the United States and Ian Crawford (Leedon) is going to America on July 4.

Pye Records issued "Rama Lama Ding Dong" by The Edsels. This is one of the hottest singles from The Cash Box Top 100 chart and its release marks another move into the US indie field by Pye of Australia.

Sydney disk jockey Arch McKirdy hosted the recent TV spectacular "Some More Jazz" shown on TCN-9 Sydney. Arch fits into TV so well that it wouldn't be surprising if an offer was made for his services full-time on TV.

American artist Johnny Burnette, whose records are issued in this country on the London (EMI) label, proved very popular on his recent Australian tour. Johnny may have his biggest hit to date in this country with "Big Big World."

Young English star Mark Wynter is a really big hit with television audiences in Melbourne where he is appearing regularly on GTV-Channel 9. His widespread TV popularity could lead to his newly released Decca single of "Dream Girl" getting off the ground.

Johnny O'Keefe seems to be concentrating more on the production side of show business and is now devoting all of his time to being A&R manager for Leedon; Johnny has recently formed his own publishing company—Victoria Music. Lonnie Lee is also forming his own music publishing company and Johnny Devlin has joined forces with Nat Kipner; these artists are following the lead set by Col Joye, who established Joye Publishing Company some eighteen months ago.

The RCA boys are geared for yet another big smash from Elvis Presley's "I Feel So Bad" c/w "Wild In The Country," which has been rush-released in this area. Whether it be on films, albums, singles, EP's or what-have-you Elvis is still the hottest artist in this country by far.

Sydney singer George Karren who was such a success on the recent Col Joye show at Brisbane Festival Hall has just been signed to a recording contract with EMI. His first release will be "Ain't Got A Girl" written by Geoff Harvey and Joe Halford (EMI). Flip side is "Winter Came Along Too Soon."

The race is on in the "La Dolce Vita" stakes with three strong versions already out and catching solid air-play. RCA has the Ray Ellis release; Freddy and The Continentals are on W&G and the Harry Simeone version is on EMI's London label. "La Dolce Vita" is the catchy title tune from the Italian film.

Leedon recording artist Barry Stanton created a precedent when the "Juke Box Jury" panel voted his new release "Teenage Idol" an all-out hit. Lonnie Lee's "Sitting By The River" (Leedon) was also voted a hit. Johnny O'Keefe is responsible for the arrangement behind Lonnie in this disk and also wrote "Teenage Idol" for Stanton.

Our dear ole friends Homer & Jethro look strong with their newly issued RCA album "Songs My Mother Never Sang." The humorous pair built a fan following in Australia as a result of some of their recent singles that have achieved sales success. Homer & Jethro could be a great television act for this country—maybe the day will come soon when they will visit this territory.

Indicative of the wide audience appeal of Sydney deejays is that Bob Rogers of 2UE now has his own column in the new "Sunday Mirror News-Pictorial" while Tony Withers of 2GB writes a column for the "Sun-Herald." Incidentally, Rogers won the recent stock car trial held in Sydney between radio and TV stars.

The Marcells, who are still on the local charts with "Blue Moon," are out on a new Pye single with their unusual arrangement of "Summertime," which is currently making noise in the United States.



FRANCE

As vacation time approaches, activity in the record and music world seems to be intensified before slackening and coming to a virtual standstill. . . . Jacques Wolfson, A&R man for Vogue Records reports the Paris visit by Cy Choen, the happy publisher of "Souvenir, souvenir," "Boys and Girls" and "Why Do You Let Me Cry" which rock 'n' roll star Johnny Hallyday plans to develop into hits here. Also in Paris this week was Franca Dirienzo (Vogue) who represented Switzerland in the latest Eurovision contest where she placed third. Franca was readying her third recording session for the label. Johnny Hallyday's latest best-selling side is "Nouvelle Orleans" and the teen-agers are again making it theirs. Rumour has it that Johnny will do a stint at the Olympia in September and up to present, there have been no objections from the police!

Korafas and his orchestra will take their music to Saint Raphael for the season, while Claude Luter and Colette Renard are being anxiously awaited in the Soviet Union for what will certainly be a long tour this time. As for Vogue President Leon Cabat, he has returned to Paris after an important business trip which took him to Switzerland, Holland, Austria and Germany, and his winter campaign for these countries is already getting underway, for where Cabat is concerned, selling means above all exporting.

Big promotional activities at Bagatelle Editions for the tune, "African Waltz." Philips already has out an excellent recording of it by Francis Bay.

Jean-Michel Defaye, ex-laureate of a "Grand Prix de Rome," talented pianist and fine arranger, now has his latest EP on the market. His big band with strings has waxed, among other good tunes, on this album called "Pour danser et faire rever," "Guitar Tango" and "Piziccati-Piziccati." Singer Anne Sylvester, whose stock is definitely on the upgrade on the market here, has issued a new EP on which the best tune seems to be "Mon mari est parti." Chris Sarrel's new EP includes "Doux" (which he sang in the Coq d'Or competition), "Dans le coeur de ma blonde" "Tu as des yeux d'ange" and "Tu reviendras."

Publishers Pigalle and Salvat who manage to obtain French rights for some particularly good songs which are very much in demand, are now working on "What'd I Say" of which the Ray Charles version is so well known here in France. "Les Chats Sauvages" (EMI) will record this one too and will do "Never Mind" at the same session. For the moment, Cliff Richard has recorded the only disk of the later tune available in France.

Bel-Air's A&R man, Leo Missir, has a new rock 'n' roll group up his sleeve, so to speak, and will introduce them under the name "Les Tigres du Bengale," it appears. In any case, their first release will include "Hats Off to Larry."

Bob Azzam and his orchestra will wax "Poison Ivy" for the Festival label under the French title "Fleur du diable" and it must be said that Bob needs a new, good tune these days. Other French adaptations for which Pigalle has rights include "So Sick," "Mama Said . . ." and "Baby, Baby, Bye-Bye."

Ricordi has signed their contract with Francis Linel and his latest song for the firm is "Les millions d'Arlequins" recorded on a rock tempo! As surprising as this is, the result is excellent and Madame Breton must get credit for the idea. She even plans to have good old "Salome" recorded in rock 'n' roll! And after having heard Salvador's version of the famous tirade from Corneille's "Le Cid" recorded in rock 'n' roll we are ready to believe that anything's possible! Ricordi's "Blue Moon" by The Marcells is selling like hot cakes and big things are expected of Rosalie Dubois' version of "Cherbourg avait raison."

R.C.A. has a new Presley 45 single on the market as well as a 7-inch "compact" including "La Pachanga" by Les Chakachas in the series "Treasury of Jazz" reserved for collectors.

Monsieur Brodfield is re-issuing the MacLennon hits dating from 1928 through 1941. Classical series includes new S. Richter versions of Beethoven's "Appassionata" Sonata and the "Funeral March" as well as Charles Munch's conducting of Berlioz's best-known overtures. The pops series features a Perez Prado 12-inch album called "Rock 'n' Mambo," Presley's "Something for Everybody" album and a new EP plan called "PPZ" made up a new disk every month with four of the biggest U.S. hits either in the original version or adapted into French. We await the first issue with impatience.

Everybody seems busy at Decca these days too—there's a new Frankie Jordan platter on the market (with Silvi Parton) on which is found "J'aime ta facon de faire ca" and "Panne d'essence." Katia Valere has waxed Trenet's "Les voix du ciel" and "Otorynlaringo" (!) is the title of Los Macucambos latest side. It's doing all right saleswise, too! Jean Beriac included "L'oreillet" and "J'ai le coeur qui ronronne" in his recent recording program.

JIM REEVES (RCA Victor 7905)

The whispery soft tones of Jim Reeves gently caress the lamenting lyrics of "What Would You Do?" and mark it for the Golden Boy's next chart stand. It's got that special Reeves touch. And the bright, melodic sounds of "Stand At Your Window" on the flipside could offer strong coupler action too.

"JOEY'S BACK IN TOWN" (2:36) [Golden West BMI—Guynes, Bare]

"FUNNY HOW TIME SLIPS AWAY" (2:50) [Pamper BMI—Nelson]

BILLY WALKER (Columbia 42050)

Billy Walker follows up "Faded Lights and Lonesome People" with another outstanding piece of material which he essays in his usual excellent manner. Topside is "Joey's Back In Town." A bouncy up-tempo, syncopated beat sets the pace for the poignant Walker lyric reading. He really seems to feel it here. A slow, plodding lament, "Funny How Time Slips Away," is the coupler. "Joey's" Got the Goods.

KENNY BROWN (Toppa 1040)

(B+) "STANDING BY" (2:15)
[Mixer BMI—Brown, Sharp]

A lovely, lilting melody with a familiar ring is Kenny Brown's Toppa vehicle here. It's indicative of the fine product the label's turning out and could mean a strong stand for the songster.

(B+) "WHEN YOU GO" (2:32)
[Mixer BMI—Brown, Sharp]

Here he takes a turn at a warm, appealing, sentimental waltzer and etches it with wispy smoothness. Both ends rate careful attention.

OLEN BINGHAM (Mur-E-cord 101)

(B) "WHAT ELSE CAN I DO" (2:05) [Airy BMI—Bingham]
It's a dual label-artist disk debut. Bingham is fairly effective on the traditional-styled weeper and could earn some spins.

(C+) "BAYOU QUEEN" (2:27)
[Airy BMI—Sargent] A fast-paced rocker here which the songster reads vigorously.

WILEY BARKDULL (Allstar 7222)

(B) "THESE OLD ARMS" (2:10)
[Acuff-Rose BMI—Barkdull]
The former Hickory artist bows on the Allstar label. He has an honest vocal style and a sincere approach to his work. This side's a conventional middle-beat weeper.

(C+) "TEAR DOWN THAT WALL" (2:05) [Allstar ASCAP—Tomko, Hamilton] The pace is raised a bit and Wiley offers another romantic tear-jerker.

LARRY NOLEN (Renner 211)

(B+) "WHAT HEARTBREAK REALLY MEANS" (2:23)
[TNT BMI—Nolen] Songster has an excellent ballad technique and a fine voice to match. Here he displays a solid vocal style in which he gets top notch chorus-combo assistance. Deck could happen for Nolen.

(B+) "REMEMBER ME" (2:02)
[Wiseman] The old Mac Wiseman vehicle is growled affectionately by Nolen here. Lad is versatile and has talent. Rates a hearing.

CURLY HERDMAN (Arcade 164)

(B) "TALK TO YOUR HEART" (2:10) [Howard BMI—Herdman]
The bluegrass sound is effectively portrayed here by Curly, who has the West Virginia Boys and Mac Justice's stylish banjo pickin' laying down the solid beat. Strong issue for this market.

(B) "MAC'S BANJO PICKIN'" (2:15) [Howard BMI—Justice]
Here it's Mac Justice leading the way through a rip-snorting instrumental attack. A real foot-stomper.

THE SPROUTS (K-ARK 623)

(C+) "LILY WHITE ROSE" (2:47)
[Ashna BMI—Nelson] The Sprouts blend in smooth hillbilly-type harmony on a heavy, march-time beat romantic opus. Instrumental support is different, but gets annoying with its loud persistence.

(C+) "MERCIFUL TEARS" (2:37)
[Ashna BMI—Nelson] An engaging ditty is offered here in softer terms.

LEON BEAVER (J and J 002)

(C+) "I'D LIKE TO HOLD YOU" (2:29) [Dogwood BMI—Beaver, Kennedy] Interesting little love ditty is tenderly essayed by the songster. Combo-chorus support is in a pop angle.

(C+) "I CAN FORGIVE YOU" (2:14) [Dogwood BMI—Beaver] An upbeat turn by Beaver as he sinks his teeth into another sentimental session.

Weldon Pruitt, now the country jockey at WJJC, handled the promotion for the day-long event.

Shirley Collie has signed Slick to do her promo work, which, with Warren Smith, gives Slick two Liberty artists in his stable, in addition to Webb Pierce. Also, Slick notified us that he's now working on the Johnny & Jonie Mosby Toppa disk of "Ain't You Ever." He couldn't have picked a more deserving disk—from reports pouring in to this office it looks like a big one; their biggest, possibly. We also found out that a big country indie diskery wants Slick to do its promo work, but it's just in the talking stage so far. If anything develops, you'll read about it first in this column. . . . Johnny Cash has been signed by Dodge Motors to narrate and star in a special 30-minute film which will be the core of a new sales campaign by the firm to introduce a new series of cars. In it Cash sings a six-minute song of his own composition. . . . Come September will find Cash trekking the hinterlands of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia for Saul Holiff of London, Ontario. This will be followed by a journey to Japan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Manila and Honolulu in late October. (By the way, have you seen the new Johnny Cash stationery? At the very bottom he bills himself as Singer-Song Writer-Guitar Picker-Cotton Picker.)

Also set to venture overseas is Hank Snow. The Jolly Joyce Agency in New York has tentatively skedded Hank for appearances in Germany, England, Australia and Japan later this year. Meanwhile, Hank and his Rainbow Ranch Boys are currently on a p.a. tour that will carry them across the dominion of Canada. It started in Nova Scotia on June 16 and is slated to wind up in British Columbia on July 20. Along with the package are Wilf Carter (Montana Slim), Big Slim, Little Jimmy Dickens, the Canadian Sweethearts, Gene O'Guinn and Homer & Jethro. The reliable Marlin Payne is handling all the promo work. Just before embarking Hank cut a new LP in Nashville to be released later this year. . . . Ernie Kerns, country jockey at WOCH-North Vernon, Indiana, was named "Outstanding Radio Broadcaster of the Year" by the board of directors of the Jennings Farm Bureau Co-Op. . . . The list of all-country station continues to increase at an amazing rate. KWOW-Pomona, Calif. just joined our ranks by devoting all of its 19 hour program day to country music. Program director Lee Richards needs disks, especially LP's. Lee says that there are over 170,000 people in the station's primary service area and that Los Angeles is in its secondary coverage area. . . . Other "turn-coats" in the fold include KMBX-Coalinga, Calif. and KOKE-Austin, Tex. They both need disks. Then, a full time country station is slated to bow Aug. 15th in Santa Rosa, Calif. under the ownership of vets Tom Brennen and Jolly Joe Nixon. Shoot the disks to Jolly Joe at 2121 Grace Drive, Santa Rosa.

The next few weeks finds Columbia's Claude King, escorted by Tillman Franks, making the rounds of radio and TV stations to plug his debut disk, "Big River, Big Man." Claude's first big p.a. was at the Old-Time Fiddler's Convention in Crockett, Tex., last week. Another headlining stint follows July 1 at the City Auditorium in Big Spring, Tex. . . . Another Louisiana Hayride coming up on July 15. Frank Page notes that headliners will be Don Gibson, June Carter and the Wilburn Bros. . . . Hank Davis will begin New York's only regularly scheduled country music show this September over WKCR-AM and FM, the 5,000 watt station operated by Columbia University. He'll be serving an 80 mile radius of listeners each Saturday at 12:30 PM. As per usual, an SOS for disks goes out urgently from Hank.

Operators Need More Income

The coin machine business was originally a nickel business with commissions established at 50-50, an arrangement, incidentally, which was an arbitrary split — how it came about and why has never been determined.

This arrangement continued until after WWII when, because of dire necessity, operators changed over to dime play. This changeover took years of prodding and continued editorial effort on the part of *The Cash Box*, which pointed out in innumerable articles the economically unsound cost per play of five cents.

Today, sixteen post-war and inflationary years later we have come to the realization that the ten-cent gross is insufficient for an operating firm to remain healthy. During the past few years collections have not only fallen off but overhead has continued to increase.

What is the solution?

There appears to be at least two moves an operator can make —

- 1) Increase play to 15¢ — 2 plays for 25¢.

Most operators feel that it is not now practical to increase the price.

- 2) Arrange a more equitable commission set-up. Two large and successful operators, in discussing this problem, have suggested two different methods.

(a) Re-arrange commission ratio so that the operator receives a larger amount of the collection: 55-45, 60-40, possibly 65-35. While the difficulties are immediately apparent, the operator is advised to deal with each location individually, studying each situation on its own merits. Needless to say, a strong selling job must be done.

(b) Re-arrange location deal with a “front money” agreement in every location. Again, the operator in this case suggests handling each location individually with proper planning in each case. The “front money” plan, across the board, was suggested in this case as opposed to an increase in operator commission.

In both instances, however, the operators agree that neither plan should be a one-sided deal. Something must be given the location in order to work out an equitable arrangement and it should be something the owner has not previously received as a part of his share of the business deal. Better service, additional programming and better equipment are just several of the possibilities which can be offered in return for increased income on location. There are many others.

The means by which an operator's share of gross income is increased is a matter of discussion. Whichever way works best is the approach which will eventually be used by a majority of operators. But there can be no arguing the point that an increase is absolutely necessary and preparatory steps to obtain this increase should be taken immediately.

Gottlieb Memorial Dedication Dinner Set For June 29; Speakers Include Sen. McCarthy

CHICAGO—The culminating event of a \$500,000 campaign in behalf of the West Towns Hospital Association's new Gottlieb Memorial Hospital, 8800 West North Avenue, Melrose Park, will be a Dedication Dinner in the Guildhall of Chicago's Ambassador West Hotel on Thursday evening, June 29, 1961, at 6:00 p.m. In addition to many dignitaries, a host of representatives from the coin machine industry are expected to be on hand.

Principal speaker will be United States Senator Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, one of the finest orators in Washington.

The hospital will officially be dedicated on Sunday, June 25, at 3:00 p.m. ceremonies at which Lieut. Gov. Samuel H. Shapiro of Illinois will be the principal speaker.

For the Guildhall dinner, Irv Kupcinet, Chicago Sun-Times columnist and host of television's "At Random" show, is preparing a surprise program of top entertainment.

"This dinner marks a high point in our efforts to complete the financing of construction and equipment of the hospital," said Louis Zahn, president of the Board of Governors.

The campaign is divided into three divisions. The West Suburbs Industrial Division is headed by Robert Brandenburg, manager of the Chicago Parts Depot, Ford Motor Company, Melrose Park. General Community solicitation is directed by John Mattmiller, vice-president of the Northern Trust Co., and Edwin Sabath, president of Sabath's Department Store, Chicago. A third section of the drive is being conducted by the medical staff.

A special feature of the campaign is a matching plan set up by members of the board of governors who have pledged \$100,000 in additional contributions, contingent on \$200,000 being raised in the balance of the drive.

"In other words, for every two dollars contributed to this campaign, there is another dollar waiting to match it up," Zahn explained.

The hospital was constructed at a total cost of \$3,922,000. Of this total, \$822,000 was received from the State

of Illinois in a grant under the Hospital Construction Act (Hill-Burton legislation) and \$1,600,000 was raised in previous campaigns. The balance of financing comes from a \$1,000,000 mortgage.

The new community hospital is located on a seven-acre site west of First Avenue and north of North Avenue. Ground was broken for the 122-bed four-story brick and glass structure in June, 1959.

Eighteen West Suburban communities will be served by the new facility, which was built to meet an acute shortage of hospital beds in the area, as determined by a survey by the Illinois State Health Department.

Gene Bybee Dead At 57

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS—Gene Bybee, president of Pan-American Sales Company, Bally and Rock-Ola distributors in this area, died suddenly on June 1, at the age of 57. Bybee was a veteran of some thirty years in the coin machine business and at the time of his death was head of the San Antonio distributorship. It was expected that stockholders of Pan-American would hold a meeting to determine Bybee's successor. A spokesman for the firm indicated that there would be no other change in personnel.

Bybee headed Pan-Am from the day it was formed in 1947. The firm was named by Rock-Ola as distributor in this area in 1956. Bybee was a coin machine operator in Austin before joining Pan-American and before the operating phase of his career, Bybee was a distributor in Houston, Texas.

At the time of his death, Bybee was a member of the Masonic Order and was active in numerous philanthropic and civic organizations. He served as a flight instructor during WW II.

Funeral services were held June 5 in the Porter Loring Funeral Home in San Antonio.

Surviving are his widow Mrs. Julie Bybee and a daughter, Virginia.

Exporters Hit Hard By Pier Strike

NEW YORK—Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg proposed last week that striking maritime unions agree to halt their walkouts for 60 days and submit their dispute with shipowners to a three-man Presidential committee for solution. Meanwhile the port tieup was having an adverse effect on the nation's foreign commerce and several hundred thousands of dollars in coin-operated equipment sat idle on piers from California to New York. The strike will cost the industry untold sums of money in export business.

Coin machine exports from the United States average approximately \$500,000 weekly including all types of equipment.

The export business has been hard hit of late what with strikes in this country, numerous strikes in New York, and last year's Belgian strike which came just around Christmas time.

"About all we can do is wait," was the general comment from exporters here. Meanwhile, the maritime unions were considering the Labor Secretary's proposal.

Redd Announces "Sell At Any Price" Policy On Deals Before Fiscal Closing

BOSTON, MASS.—Leave it to Si Redd to come up with something new, even when it involves closing out his firm's fiscal year. Redd, who has been in the business more years than he cares to remember, has manufactured, distributed and operated coin-operated machines from the beginning. Like most veteran coinmen he knows just about every which way to make a trade, a sell, a straight swap, or you name it.

But just last week, when Redd announced that he would sell his present stock of used equipment "at any price" as long as he can get rid of it by June 30, fiscal year closing date, a few heads looked up.

"I'm not kidding," said the former

Mississippian. "I'll sell a \$200 machine for \$100 rather than not sell it at all when we close our books each June 30. I'd rather come out with cash, and no equipment, and then start all over, than to hold on to some machines that I may have trouble moving for quite a while."

Redd's answer is backed with good common sense. A bank looks kindly upon a firm coming in to talk business in preparation for the start of a new fiscal year, when they have less merchandise and more cash on hand. "It's a good deal for all concerned. I found out a few years ago that if I can't sell it at my price by June 30 then I'd rather let it go at the best bid and at least move the equipment. That way we can start with a clean slate on July 1st which is what I intend to do."





Canteen Offers Debentures

WASHINGTON—Automatic Canteen is planning a public sale of \$12 million in 20-year sinking fund debentures, according to the Securities and Exchange Commission. This financing is reportedly in addition to the firm's proposed \$20.8 million convertible debenture offering to stockholders of record. Another \$2 million of the convertible securities will be offered to insurance companies in exchange for a like amount of 5 3/4% notes. Glore, Forgan & Co. underwriters for the issues, said the convertible securities would be sent out around June 30 under rights expiring July 18. The sinking fund debentures will be publicly sold July 18. The firm advised that the proceeds will be used for development of vending machines and to finance recent acquisitions and expansions.





A cocktail party and dinner topped off the whirlwind schedule and after spending the evening at the Belden-Stratford Hotel, left the following day for home.



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
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
