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INNOVATIONS

No industry that stands still can expect to survive the rapidly changing tastes and desires of the American public. Innovations must be made to keep pace with the times.

However the rate of speed with which these innovations seem to appear has been upped considerably in recent years. We've witnessed the development of the LP, the change from a 10 inch album to a 12 inch disk, the change to hi-fi, the advent of stereo, and super-stereo. We have seen the ten inch 78 rpm become a seven inch 45 record. We have witnessed radical packaging changes and have seen drastic changes in the way recordings are merchandised.

But never have innovations been so radical as they have been during the current Fall season. In less than a span of approximately two months a number of different record firms have introduced new ideas in recording and merchandising techniques which may in time have a marked effect on the record industry should they succeed in accomplishing the goals for which they have been designed.

About two months ago, London Records introduced "phase 4," its new stereo recording technique. More recently, Warner Brothers

Records introduced "Plus 2" in an effort to increase the sale of single records. Last week, Archie Bleyer introduced his new "Cadence Little LP" offering three selections on a side in new packaging to consumers for \$1.69. Mercury Records, agreeing with the merit of the idea immediately announced its "Compact 6" series. Bringing the innovations up to date, the end of this month will see RCA Victor revive its Groove label offering singles to the consumer on Groove at a 49¢ price in an "effort to expand the singles market."

It is impossible, of course, at this early date to consider any of the changes we have seen this Fall as the "answer" to specific problems facing the business. But we must consider that the people making these innovations have given their ideas considerable thought and investigation. From any one of these moves may come important solutions or the germs of improvement which eventually will lead the record industry on to greater success and continued growth.

We are proud to see that the record industry's minds are not at rest but are constantly experimenting with new ideas.

CHAD ALLEN'S "LITTLE LONELY" HEADING FOR CHART BREAKOUT

Smash Records Buys Lama Label Master

SAN FRANCISCO—Smash Records, on a hot tip from Gene Becker, general manager of C&C Distributors in San Francisco, this week latched on to one of the hottest records ever to come out of the West Coast, "Little Lonely" by Chad Allen.

INFORMS CHIEF

Becker called Charlie Fach, head of Smash Records at 3 a.m. last week to inform the label chief that Allen's disk had broken wide open in the San Francisco area. Fach immediately flew to the West Coast and bought the master.

BATTLE WINNER

"Little Lonely" was produced by Don Ralke and the Wilder Bros., whose "Mountains High" kicked off in exactly the same way as did "Little Lonely". Both records were "battle" winners on KYA radio here, and the station is starting to get the reputation of being a top hit maker.

FAST RELEASE

The Allen waxing will be released immediately on the Smash label and will be handled by the Smash line-up of distributors in all areas, except in San Francisco, where it will be handled by C&C, and where it will remain on the Lama label.

SMASH RECORDS BUYS THE FAST RISING "LITTLE LONELY" DISK

Fach Gets Jump On Hot New Master

SAN FRANCISCO—Charlie Fach, head of the Smash label, got the jump on the record industry and this week purchased the hot master of Chad Allen's "Little Lonely"

HISTORY MADE

The disk was originally issued on the Lama label locally and was picked as a "Battle Of Sounds" winner on radio station KYA. The rest is history. The disk started to skyrocket. Fach was notified of the disk's breakout in the area by Gene Becker of C&C Distributors who handle the Lama line.

OUT NATIONALLY

Smash will release the disk immediately for nationwide distribution through their distrib line-up in all areas except San Francisco. The disk will still be sold here on the Lama label and will still be distributed by C&C.

LIGHTNING STRIKES

Local music moguls are in amazement at the manner in which "Little Lonely" took off. The disk was produced by Don Ralke and the Wilder Brothers, whose "Mountains High" waxing took off in exactly the same fashion, via a "battle" win on KYA. Lightning does strike twice in the same place.



Pick of the Week

"MY HEART BELONGS TO ONLY YOU" (2:45)
[Merrimac BMI—F. & D. Daniels]

"THE WAY I AM" (2:10) [East-West BMI—Udell, Geld]
JACKIE WILSON (Brunswick 55220)

Take your pick here. The chanter's headed straight towards hitsville with another Brunswick release that has that back-to-back hit look. Already happening is the short-while-back click, "My Heart Belong To Only You," that Jackie takes for a warm, sincere beat-ballad ride. New on the scene is "The Way I Am," an exciting rock-a-rhythm affair. Top notch assists on both halves from Bob Mersey's ork-chorus.

"IT'S ALL BECAUSE" (2:33) [Kilt BMI—Davie]

"I DON'T KNOW WHY" (2:20)
[Fred Ahlert, Cromwell ASCAP—Turk, Ahlert]
LINDA SCOTT (Canadian-American 129)

Looks like Linda Scott, who's coming off "Don't Bet Money Honey" and "Starlight, Starbright," has another big two-sider in this newie-oldie combination. "It's All Because" is a steady, beat-ballad hip-swingin' newcomer while the evergreen beaut moves along at a slower ballad pace. Stellar support from the Hutch Davie crew on these two ear-pleasers.

"THE GYPSY ROVER" (2:11) [Box & Cox ASCAP—McQuire]

"COTTON FIELDS" (2:11) [Westside BMI—Fisher]
THE HIGHWAYMEN (United Artists 370)

The Highwaymen, who took a long time in rowing "Michael" ashore (but finally did so in chart-topping style), should have no trouble in bringing "The Gypsy Rover" home. It's a similarly-styled easy-going folk affair that sports the whistling feature. Excellent job. Fine change-of-pace in the up-beat "Cotton Fields" pairing.

"THE BREAKING POINT" [Famous ASCAP—David, Bachrach]

"MY WILLOW TREE" [Mary Jane ASCAP—Elgin, Rogers]
CHUCK JACKSON (Wand 115)

Jackson, whose hits have had him in a tearful mood ("I Don't Want To Cry" and "I Wake Up Crying") has reached "The Breaking Point" on this powerful new tearjerker. It's a sensational chorus-backed wailer with driving, attention-getting vocal and musical tricks. "My Willow Tree" is a warm and pretty soft beat cha cha coupler. Watch it too!

"LONELY SOLDIER BOY" (2:30) [Central Songs BMI—Fallin, Rhodes]

"STRANGE LITTLE MELODY" (2:46)
[Edward Schuberth SESAC—Levy]

TEX RITTER (Capitol 4644)

"Lonely Soldier Boy," a big item in Japan, can develop into a tremendous follow-up slice for Ritter—who currently has "Hillbilly Heaven" in both the country and pop depts. It's a heartbreaking topical affair, set to a soft cha cha beat, that sports poignant mid-deck recitation and inviting Ralph Carmichael ork-choral assist. Coupler's a heartfelt sentimental lilter that also rates attention.

"LOSING YOUR LOVE" (2:15) [Tree BMI—Anderson]

[Tuckahoe BMI—Carter, Harrison, Reeves]

JIM REEVES (RCA Victor 7950)

Reeves is once again in top country-pop form as he carves out another pair of weepers that are sure to latch onto high positions in both markets. They're "Losing Your Love," a superb, slow ballad lilter and "(How Can I Write) What I Feel In My Heart," a multi-track up-beat'er (with a marimba leading the way). Two standout sides.

"THE MIRACLE" (2:31) [A.C.M. BMI—Ram]

"MY PRAYER" (2:46) [Skidmore ASCAP—Kennedy, Boulanger]
TONY WILLIAMS (Reprise 20,030)

Williams, having attracted a heap of sales and spins with his initial Reprise outing, "Sleepless Nights," can have a pair of sales sizzlers this time out. One side's an ultra-lovely beat-ballad opus tabbed "The Miracle" while the other's a new soft Latin beat view of "My Prayer," one of the many Platters hits on which Tony provided the lead voicings.

SUZANNE CLARK (Jaf 2025)

(B+) "JUST A WORD" (2:25) [Jaf BMI—Cole] Lass' medium-beat vocal of the interesting romancer is supported by a generally striking combo sound, featuring effective percussion remarks. Could get big station time. Label is handled by Era Records.

(B) "NEED YOUR LOVE" (2:20)
[Jaf BMI—Cole, Van Winkle]
Bluesy belt from the performer.

JOANIE SOMMERS
(Warner Bros. 5507)

(B+) "WHAT'S WRONG WITH ME?" (2:58) [Chappell ASCAP—Adler] Lark does a solid light-swing pose on a top ballad entry from the incoming musical, "Kwamina." Adding to the class nature of the session is the bright Neal Hefti-directed ork. Here's a beaut for the deejays. The "plus 2" entry here is "One Boy" (1:23) E. H. Morris ASCAP—Adams, Strouse.

(B+) "M A K I N' WHOOPEE!" (2:57) [Bregman, Vocco & Conn ASCAP—Kahn, Donaldson] Sly, jazzy view of the charming evergreen. Also noteworthy deejay work. "Plus 2" tune on this end is "Seems, Like Long, Long Ago" (1:28) Embassy BMI—Oliver.

DIORIS VALLADARES
(Alegre 5207)

(B+) "VETE PA'L COLEGIO" [Arkayem—Mozian, Santiago] This excitingly authentic Spanish vocal and instrumental version of "Changa Rock" (a recent Lenny Welch Cadence entry) has what it takes to rise to the top in the proper locations (as well as spilling over into the pop mart). Sock pachanga outing.

(B) "QUIERO QUE" [Sanchez, Valladares] Here the Valladares crew tastefully carves out one for the merengue enthusiasts.

LITTLE RICHARD (Mercury 71884)

(B+) "HE'S NOT JUST A SOLDIER" (2:36) [Woodman BMI—Pitt, Penniman] The performer, now pursuing a gospel-singing career, bows on Mercury with a touching portrayal of a strong number that notes that a soldier is made of flesh-and-blood. A strong martial beat is presented by the full ork-chorus. Off-beat stand that could make noise, particularly in view of the current military build-up.

(B) "JOY, JOY, JOY" (2:17)
[Rodeheaver ASCAP—Gabriel] Joyful sacred stint. Also from the album.

BONNIE GUITAR
(RCA Victor 7951)

(B+) "TELL HER BYE" (2:14)

GEORGE YOUNG (Chancellor 1066)





Best Bets

BRIAN HYLAND (Kapp 429)

(B+) "EVERY OTHER NIGHT" (2:26) [Vanno ASCAP—Kahan, Snyder] Youngster, currently clicking with his ABC waxing of "Let Me Belong To You," can clean up loads of loot with this cha cha beat, chorus-backed teen charmer cut during his Kapp days. Can step way out. Keep close tabs on it.

(B) "SHE'S MY ALL AMERICAN GIRL" (1:57) [World ASCAP—Udell, Geld] This bright quick beat marcher, previously cut on other labels, can also come thru for Hyland here.

THE KINGSTON TRIO (Capitol 4642)

(B+) "NOTHING MORE TO LOOK FORWARD TO" (2:25) [Chappell ASCAP—Adler] The stand-out folk trio does a handsome calypso-styled reading of a lovely ballad from the forthcoming musical, "Kwamina." Boys can have a showtune success here.

(B) "COMING FROM THE MOUNTAINS" (2:22) Sausalito BMI—Stewart] A lusty performance taken from the team's new LP, "Close-up."

TED TAYLOR (Soncraft 400)

(B+) "I LOST THE BEST THINGS I EVER HAD" (2:45) [Wian BMI—Taylor] Popular R&B-directed songster tells of a fella's romantic woes with upbeat blues finesse, and he gets an exciting rock-a-string & male chorus sound in the setting. Might move. Warwick Records handles distribution for the label.

(B+) "ANY TIME, ANYPLACE, ANYWHERE" (2:31) [Skidmore ASCAP—Glazer] Taylor puts lots of blues conviction into the I'll-give-my-all-for-you item.

POLLY PUPPET (Challenge 9126)

(B+) "PUPPETEER" (2:12) [4-Star Sales BMI—Thomas, Burgess] A Chipmunk-like voice warbles an attractive rock-slanted tune about a puppet who is sad because it has no one to pull its strings. Nice bouncy combo arrangement. Very cute pose. Could happen.

(B) "PUPPET SERENADE" (2:12) [4-Star BMI—Burgess] Combo has an appealing Latinish sound in this reading of the top-half's melody.

JAMES BOOKER (Peacock 1908)

(B+) "TUBBY" (Part 1) (2:26) [Lion BMI—Booker, Malone, Frank] Organist, of "Gonzo" fame, could collect chart coin with this infectious blueser. Flute and brass have strong-sounding remarks. Eye closely.

(B+) "TUBBY" (Part 2) (2:19) [Lion BMI—Booker, Malone, Frank] More of same.

THE SHELLS (Johnson 112)

(B+) "BABY, WALK ON IN" (2:23) [Joli BMI—Alston] The vocalists, who had a teen success with "Baby Oh Baby" awhile back, treat the kids to a well-done romantic. Deck's sound is a natural for teen acceptance.

(B) "SWEETEST ONE" (2:08) [Thornett BMI—Browne, Mas-trangelo] Another affectionate-beat stint by the singers.

LLOYD PRICE

(ABC-Paramount 10229)

(B+) "TALK TO ME" (2:43) [Jay & Cee BMI—Seneca] Very appealing revival of the old hit by Price, whose feelingful stint resembles the original Little Willie John click. Sid Feller heads the lush string accompaniment. Date, from an LP, could step-out, and bring a "new" Price to the charts.

(B) "I COVER THE WATERFRONT" (2:35) [Harms ASCAP—Herman, Green] Similar inviting view of the evergreen. From the same LP.

THE FLAMINGOS (End 1099)

(B+) "I WANT TO LOVE YOU" (2:51) [Arc & Ford BMI—Nelson, Carry, Freed] The vet big-beat songsters sing-out with a distinctive deliberate-beat quality on the bluesy ballad. Busy slow-beat setting has some interesting touches. Guys could score here with enough exposure.

(B) "MY MEMORIES OF YOU" (2:22) [Nuway BMI—Cita] Catchy beat backs the team's upbeat lost-love statement.

JOHN LEYTON

(ABC-Paramount 10257)

(B+) "JOHNNY REMEMBER ME" (2:40) [Southern ASCAP—Goddard] This galloping folk-like romantic is top seller in England for Leyton, and can do some chart business in the U.S. It's English standing makes it a platter to be eyed.

(B) "THERE MUST BE" (2:40) [Ivy M. Ltd.—Duke] Pleasing light-beat teen plaintive.

FAYE ADAMS (Savoy 1606)

(B+) "STEP UP AND RESCUE ME" [B. F. Wood ASCAP—Kay, Peck] Thrush could move with her infectious LaVern Baker-type sock stint. Her backing also reflects the contagious sound that supports Miss Baker on many dates. Should be eyed.

(B) "CRY, YOU CRAZY HEART" [Medallion ASCAP—Betzner] Cozy blues warble by the performer. Arrangement includes striking sax remarks.

VALADIERS (Miracle 6)

(B+) "GREETINGS (This Is Uncle Sam)" (2:33) [Jobete BMI—Bennett] Fella gets a rather kindly draft-call from Uncle Sam in this emotional R&B-type reading by the lead, who, later on in the session, is accompanied by a "sergeant" who clues the draftee in on Army life. Can happen.

(B) "TAKE A CHANCE" (2:23) [Jobete BMI—Holland, Bate-man, Coleman] Nice wistful affectionate is appealingly warbled by the lead voice.

PETE BENNETT & THE EMBERS (Sunset 1002)

(B+) "FEVER" (2:25) [Jay & Gee BMI—Davenport, Cooley] The smash oldie can be in for another chart go-round as Bennett & the Embers take it for a bluesy, steady beat "Last Night"-like instrumental ride. Eye it.

(B) "SOFT" (2:15) More fetching funky up beat, funky-musical sounds on this r&b click revival. Label's based in Philly.

DON WILSON (Gedinson's 6156)

(B) "HEADOVER FLIP" (2:25) [B-Flat BMI—McCracklin] Bright bouncer in a blues vein from the songster and Jimmy McCracklin ork.

(B) "TOOK A CHANCE" (2:33) [B-Flat BMI—McCracklin] Cozy romantic blueser from the artist.

BIG WALTER (Myrl 406)

(B+) "FEELIN' A LITTLE WORRIED" (2:32) [Starflite BMI—Price, Harper] Good, basic tradition blues opus with a vocal tailored to traditional shouting lines. Exciting deck for the r&b market.

(B+) "IT'S HOW YOU TREAT ME" (2:21) [Starflite BMI—Price, Harper] Again, artist comes through with a winning blues performance. Here, the segment's a steady, middle beat affair. Two-sided potential.

CHASE WEBSTER (Dot 16270)

(B) "COULD THIS BE MAGIC" (2:18) [Sea-Lark BMI—Johnson, Blandon] The countryish lovey-dovey is done with good teen feeling by the songster. He's supported by a warm rock-a-string pose. Kids will get the sentimental idea here.

(B) "SWEETHEARTS IN HEAVEN" (2:29) [Pamper BMI—Owens] There's a catchy honky-tonk nature to this romancer, which features the warbler against a full ork-male chorus backdrop. Also should be appreciated by the youngsters.

BARRY GORDON (Mercury 71878)

(B+) "SHE'S GOT SOUL" (3:07) (Pockvan BMI—Wayne, Sauter] Young male rock songster who had the years-back Xmas hit, "I'm Getting Nuttin' for Christmas," displays proteen zest in this belt outing a tune with a gospel flavoring. Fella says his gal has "soul" ala rock stars Brenda Lee, Connie Francis, Elvis Presley and Chubby Checker. Lively Joe Sherman-headed ork-chorus out-ing.

(B) "SAD LITTLE GIRL" (2:32) [Vanno ASCAP—Vance, Kent] Inviting ballad rock-a-cha track.

THE HAYDEN SISTERS (Tilt 784)

(B+) "MR. BLUES" (2:30) [Bo-An BMI—I&H Clark] Infectious bright-beat romantic stint by the lead thrush, her kin and Latinish combo. The deck deserves a spin to teen audiences. Tune is not to be confused with the awhile-back hit by The Fleetwoods, "Mr. Blue." London distributes the waxery.

(B) "SILENT TEARS" (3:03) [Bo-An BMI—I&H Clark] Gals, featuring the same effective lead, are warmer on this bluesy wistful. Also merits teen attention.

FREDDIE NORTH (Phillips 3574)

(B+) "DON'T MAKE ME CRY" (2:00) [Lowery BMI—Stevens] This is a pleader done with lots of rhythmic rock vitality. North is a strong belt vehicle, and his backing is a potent ork-chorus affair. Can get some action.

(B) "SOMEDAY SHE'LL COME ALONG" (2:22) [Fame & Fame BMI—Hall] Poignant build-up ballad vocal by the talented warbler. Titled may have been inspired by the first line in the Gershwin Brothers' "The Man I Love."

INT'L "POP" ALL STARS (London 2008)

(B) "BUTTON UP YOUR OVERCOAT" (2:05) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—DeSylva, Brown, Henderson] The ork, from its "Phase 4" LP, "Twelve Star Percussion," offers a jaunty, percussion-gimmick swing reading of the standby. Nice sunny sound.

(B) "I GOT RHYTHM" (1:58) [New World ASCAP—G&I Gershwin] From the same album, a more gimmicky stand by the crew.

DICK DALE (Deltone 5017)

(B) "LET'S GO TRIPPIN'" (2:10) [Monsour ASCAP—Dale] Though the title indicates a new teen-dance, kids will find the proceedings good for a good twist-time-of-it. Guitar-led group has a teen-wise delivery.

(B) "DEL-TONE ROCK" (2:35) [Monsour ASCAP—Dale] This lively attack is titled after Dale's support, The Del-Tones.

BOBBY OLIVER (Lucky Four 1006)

(B+) "LUCILLE" (2:20) [Venice BMI—Penniman, Collins] The Little Richard rouser (and later an Everly Bros. hit vehicle) is delivered a raucous punch here by Oliver with his band wailing support-wise. Could stir re-interest in the deck.

(B+) "LORRAINE" (2:17) [La Cour BMI—Oliver] This Lorraine is not Sweet but she's more suitable for today's market especially the way she elicits the violent vocal reaction from Oliver. A real raucous riff.

CHARLES SHEFFIELD (Excello 2205)

(B+) "I WOULD BE A SINNER" (2:00) [Excellorec BMI—West] Sheffield poses a serious r&b chart threat with his striking blues reading of a driving swinger. Good shout stint is matched by pile-driving combo cutups.

(B) "THE KANGAROO" (2:52) [Excellorec BMI—Sheffield] More in the 'low down' manner is this intro to a new dance step. Rates attention.

ENZO STUARTI (Roulette 4395)

(B) "ALL OR NOTHING AT ALL" (2:10) [Leeds ASCAP—Lawrence, Altman] The oldie, one of Frank Sinatra's top successes, gets a big-sounding legit vocal from the tenor, who is backed by an interesting Latin-styled sound from the lush ork. Can do well in juke-boxes.

(B) "I RUN TO BE WITH YOU" (2:31) [Tyrol BMI—Lehmann, Manning] The performer is strong again on the familiar theme, known pop-wise as "Full Moon & Empty Arms," from Rachmaninoff's 2nd piano concerto.

JOE HENDERSON (Todd 1066)

(B) "RIGHT NOW" (2:30) [Copar-Forrest BMI—Riley, Henderson] Longtime warbler does an understanding essay of the intimate ballad. Soulful sax is included in the simple combo-chorus backdrop. Generally touching performance.

(B) "BABY DON'T LEAVE ME" (2:35) [Copar-Forrest BMI—Riley, Henderson] Even more cozy blues-flavored approach from the performer and backing (also topped by a warm sax).


POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK




"BEHIND THE BUTTON-DOWN MIND OF BOB NEWHART"—Warner Bros. 1417
The top-selling disk comic began a weekly TV series last week (11), and, ironically, some of the funniest bits in this, his fourth LP for the label, are jabs at the hand that feeds him (e.g. "The Uncle Freddie Show," "TV Commercials"). Newhart's new TV exposure will add even more sales potential to a consistent chart name.




"A PERSONAL APPEARANCE"—Shelley Berman—Verve V-15027
Recorded during a recent 35-city one-niter tour, this LP is Berman at his best again. His timing has even been further sharpened and here he goes after some more-than-usual controversial subjects, particularly a popular TV commercial (the opening scene). Other usual everyday occurrences are treated to Berman's devastating madcap comic genius. It's a welcome return to the disk scene that should liven up the chart situation.



"ELLA IN HOLLYWOOD"—Ella Fitzgerald—Verve V-4052
The excitement from Ella's last in-person album, "Ella In Berlin," has prompted the diskery to venture into a second "live" LP date. Here, she's been waxed at the Crescendo and the full impact of an Ella in-person performance has been captured beautifully. The singer lets go with a fury of free-swinging singing, like the wild "You're Driving Me Crazy." Other top tracks include "It Might As Well Be Spring," "Stain Doll," "Air Mail Special" and the current single release, "Mr. Paganini." Has big hit potential.




"THE ALVIN SHOW"—Liberty LRP 3209
"The Alvin Show" TV'er gives The Chipmunks vast new exposure, and this package, based on the program, is a natural for top kiddie-market sales. Adults too will enjoy the clean humor and tuneful ditties, including a reading of David Seville's big hit, "Witch Doctor." Also present is a charming scientist chap, Clyde Crashcup, who has outdone the Russians in the number of inventions originated by him (on the LP he tells how he invented the bathtub).



"POPULAR PIANO CONCERTOS OF FAMOUS FILM THEMES"—George Greeley with Warner Bros. Orchestra—Warner Bros. W 1427
Pianist Greeley's concertized versions of pop tunes have met with continued LP success, and his latest release should continue the string. Highlighting the affair is an all-out multi-mood 10½ minute "concert version" of the main theme from "Exodus." Other lushly portrayed items include "Tonight," "Fanny," "Tara's Theme." Felix Slatkin directs the big WB ork.



"THIS LITTLE BOY OF MINE"—Gloria Lynne—Everest LPBR 5131
As the singer progresses to the top of the pop singing pile she continues to devote time to more artistic vocal endeavors. Nowhere is this more evident than in this album. Titled after her recent single click, it also includes other recent single ventures ("Dreamy," "Impossible," "The Jazz In You"), but it also covers some astute vocal territory in superb, jazz-oriented renditions of "My Romance," "Getting To Know You" and "But Not For Me." Instrumental support serves each track's need excellently. Could be another hit album for the thrush.



"SAIL AWAY"—Original Cast—Capitol WAO-1643
Though all the critics didn't regard the new Noel Coward musical as ship-shape, there's enough of Coward in his clever specialty vein in the score to appeal to his admirers. Also, some of the ballads (e.g. "Later Than Spring") are good I'll-See-You-Again romancers. Well-performed deck is topped by Elaine Strich. Noel Coward will draw customers to the musical-comedy shelf.



"CLAY COLE PRESENTS BLASTS FROM THE PAST"—Blast BLP 6803
Taking a cue from the successful Murray Kaufman "gassers" LP's, Blast has assembled a collection of "oldies" and tied them to the name value of deejay Clay Cole. There are twelve tracks here, including "Daddy's Home"—Shep & the Limelites, "Goodnight Sweetheart, Goodnight"—The Spaniels, "Oh What A Night"—The Dells and "A Fool In Love"—Ike & Tina Turner. Could meet with big teen market success.



"EL SENOR BING"—Bing Crosby—MGM E3890
Bing Crosby's musical compass has in the past girded the globe in song. Here, in one of his infrequent disk appearances he concentrates in the Latin-American idiom (a favorite field of his) with forays into other countries as well as bouts with some home-grown evergreens. All are executed in the neat, seemingly-simple yet superbly paced Bing manner with a nod to the effective and thankfully unobtrusive Billy May Latin-oriented arrangements. There are twenty songs in all, including "In The Still Of The Night," "My Shawl," "Malaguena," "Cuban Love Song" and "Ramona."



"FOLKSONGS BY JONI JAMES"—MGM E3958
The hushed-voice thrust in a new setting in which she caressingly embraces a handful of familiar folk items. Knowledgeably, musical backdrop has been kept to a minimum with a guitar highlighted. Her fans will certainly appreciate the smooth, easy-to-listen treatments of "The Riddle Song," "Careless Love," "On Top Of Old Smokey," "Danny Boy" and "I Know Where I'm Goin'."



"THAT COUNTRY SOUND"—Jaye P. Morgan—MGM E3940
One of the reasons for the recent widening of country music horizons has been albums like this new Jaye P. Morgan entry. She takes a brace of famed hits from the field and gives them a flavorful, semi-pop reading. The basic beat is kept Nashville-style, and that's a big help. This collection should be of big interest to borderline country/pop fans and could make a few more converts. Selections include "I Walk The Line," "Slipping Around," "Cold Cold Heart," "That's What It's Like To Be Lonesome" and "Jealous Heart," a truly superior collection.




"IT'S DE-LOVELY FOR DANCING AND LISTENING"—Les Elgart—Columbia CL 1659
Here's the smart, sophisticated swing sound of the Les Elgart ork in a program designed (as all Les Elgart albums are) to supply top-flight dance music or listening fare. Each selection is an easy-beat affair (though now and then the heavy-beat emphasis creeps in) and adult enjoyment is assured through the familiar Elgart touch. Tunes include "The Continental," "In The Still Of The Night," "Green-Up Time" and "Looking For A Boy."



"GLENN MILLER TIME"—The New Glenn Miller Orch. Directed by Ray McKinley—RCA Victor LPM-2436
A dozen tunes that weren't in the Glen Miller book are given that famed glossy smooth treatment by the Ray McKinley-directed holdover band. It's a sound that's an American musical mainstay. Album takes its title from the TV show and its added exposure could add up to increased LP sales. Tunes include "You Go To My Head," "Mack The Knife," "Make Someone Happy" and "Stranger In Paradise."



"HONKY TONK ANGEL"—Kitty Kallen—Columbia CL 1652
Just as the subtitle indicates, this is a program of country songs served up with a citified flavor. Kitty Kallen is a sincere interpreter of these famed gems that have earned wide popularity and she's aided by arrangements that still retain some of the songs' original home grown flavor. The twelve tunes include "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels," "I'll Never Stand In Your Way," "Raining In My Heart" and "I Love You Because."




"LAS CHARANGAS"—Johnny Pacheco, Charlie Palmieri, Jose Fajardo—Alegre LPA 807
The three biggest guns on the authentic charanga scene have been assembled under one cover. Package could easily repeat the chart action of the label's first Pacheco album (early this year). Some of the tracks are newly recorded, some culled from the Alegre catalog. Fajardo gets six tracks, Pacheco and Palmieri three each. Musicianship is at a high level throughout and the Latin dance crowd should respond accordingly. Selections include "Monton Simon," "Moliendo Cafe," "Verano De Amor" and "Lloraras."



"ROMAN HOLIDAY"—Dick Contino and his Accordion—Mercury SR 60635
Accordianist Contino's large following has a choice package here. Contino acknowledges his heritage with a musical bow to the melodies of Italy in a prettily-played collection. David Carroll colorfully batons the continental-flavored ork and sans-lyric choir, while Contino portrays "Santa Lucia," "Non Dimenticar," "O Sole Mio," "Ritorna-Me" and six more.



"MORGAN TIME"—Russ Morgan and his Orch.—Everest LPBR 5129
The association between Russ Morgan and sweet, easily danceable music is still revered by many. In this new Everest collection Morgan has drawn upon the favorites in his book for an appealing, glowingly warm dance date. Here, familiarity breeds memories, and there'll be plenty while listening to "The Sheik Of Araby," "Zing Went The Strings Of My Heart," "Goodbye My Lady Love," "Poor Butterfly" and eight more.



"CLANCY'S CLOWNS SAXOPHOBIA"—Capitol ST 1614
Though the style has been out for years, like many things old, it still warms the cockles of the heart. And as cliché-ish as the last phrase is Clancy's Clowns' Zany saxophone harmony here. The five saxes (soprano, alto, tenor, baritone, bass) pull out all the old tricks from the buried 20's bag for a zany run-through of such gems as "Nola," "Chicken Reel," "Barney Google," "Oh By Jingo" and "Ragging The Scale." As the liner points out you'll either wince and laugh. For the laughers, it's loads of fun.



"MARTHA SCHLAMME AT THE GATE OF HORN"—Vanguard VRS-9091
Chicago's Gate of Horn (a favorite stopping-off place for top folk artists) provided the sympathetic atmosphere for this recording by Martha Schlamme. Although her heritage is German-Austrian-Yiddish (her initial impact was made in this area) she has ranged far afield to fill her repertoire and here offers a program of generally light-hearted and sometimes humorous folk items of varied vintage and origin. Her mostly sophisticated following has a choice package here.




"BACK STREET"—Original Film Soundtrack—Decca DL 79097
Lush string score sprinkled heavily with dramatic and romantic effects has been created by clefter Frank Skinner for the Fannie Hurst-culled flick "Back Street." The Susan Hayward-starrer is set to open shortly and its success can reflect in some sales for this deck.



"PERCUSSION BITTER SWEET"—Max Roach—Impulse A-8
Solidly embarked on a wave of music-for-freedom (initially established in his "Freedom-Now Suite") Max Roach unveils here six new compositions dedicated for the most part to this militant cause. He also, and not insignificantly, displays his almost unbelievable jazz percussion talent to a wide degree, for this music relies on dynamic rhythmic propulsion. Outstanding too in their parts are Eric Dolphy, Clifford Jordan and vocalist Abbey Lincoln, who uses her voice effectively as an instrument. Another important session by Roach.



"VISIONS"—American Legends: A New Look And A New Sound composed by Bobby Scott—Larry Elgart and his Orch.—MGM E3961
Although every track here is immensely danceable (a good basis to start on) there's a much more adventurous tone to this session. Bobby Scott's talented pen has created a twelve part look at America and its history. Each piece reflects a particular event, scene or mood, and they range from delicately fragile tone poem to the roaring enthusiasm of gospel music. Larry Elgart's well-disciplined crew respond dynamically and the leader shows soprano sax solo to advantage in flashes of brilliance. An earthy adventure, well accomplished.



"EDDIE HIGGINS"—Vee Jay LP-3017
Eddie Higgins' piano playing is best described as worthwhile. Though not overly adventurous he is inventive, plays with a fresh hand, is always listenable and is at all times tasteful in his execution. His material here is divided between his own tunes and standards; his accompaniment is also divided, between trio sides and quintet tracks (adding Frank Foster, tenor, and Paul Serrano, trumpet, for the front line). Exciting moments crop up on "Foot's Bag," "Blues For Big Scotia" and "Zarac, The Evil One." Set is sure to spread Higgins' fame beyond his Chicago home base.



"BEN DI TOSTI PLAYS THE MUSIC FROM THE BROADWAY HIT 'CARNIVAL'"—World Pacific WP-1410
In his debut album pianist Di Tosti comes up against the formidable challenge of offering his own jazz view of a Broadway musical score. In this overcrowded, cliché-ridden field he comes through like a trooper—unveiling a freshly conceived batch of ideas. He proves an extremely thoughtful musician who tastefully executes well-planned ideas with an air of immediate improvisation. And, thankfully, we can recognize every tune. Put this man down as a big comer in the field.




"STRAIGHTAWAY" JAZZ THEMES—Maynard Ferguson and his Orch.—Roulette R 52076
The new ABC-TV series, "Straightaway," deals with the world of racing cars and features a high-voltage background score penned by Maynard Ferguson, played by his ork. This set presents the original versions of ten of the show's themes (bearing such titles as "Pit Stop," "Up Shift," "Last Lap" and "Apprehension") and TV theme jazzophiles can now add the first jazz TV score of the new season to their collection.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"THE FAMILY OF MANN"—Herbie Mann—Atlantic 1371
The title not only encompasses the collection of unusual flutes shown on the cover (all of which are played by Mann) but the scope of material in the Mann book. A continual searcher, Mann collects flutes and songs from all over the world in an earnest, horizon-widening manner. And though much of this material eventually is revamped into Afro-Cuban terms he strives to retain the flavor of their original sound. Example: This album contains songs by Charlie Parker, Victor Young, Ray Charles, two originals and a Yiddish favorite. There are not many more such individually minded men in jazz and Herbie Mann is successfully carving out his own private niche. An outstanding album.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



VERDI: "Otello"—Jon Vickers, Leonie Rysanek, Tito Gobbi, Tullio Serafin conducting the Rome Opera Orch. and Chorus—RCA Victor LD-6155
Verdi's great final opera bow-out remains one of his most eloquent. This new stereo recording of the work attests to this eloquence, especially in the masterful direction of maestro Serafin. Though it has the excellent London package as competition, it should stand up well; this has been assured by the grandiose Soria packaging which includes a 60-page libretto book featuring extensive annotations and innumerable interesting pictures.

NEW YORK—Because of the nature of today's business, there has been a tendency to shift interest to hits of the future and the progress of newer releases, at the expense of the established hits, which may still have important sales power despite a drop from a higher position on the Top 100. Therefore, to call attention to these hits, and possibly extend their life-span, the first 20 songs on the Top 100 are being printed in red beginning with this issue.

AmPar To Issue Eddie Fisher Dates

NEW YORK—Songster Eddie Fisher will perform on ABC-Paramount Records, as a project for his Ramrod Productions, it was announced last week after the deal was concluded between Sam Clark, AmPar prexy, and Milton Blackstone, Fisher's manager.

The first Fisher single to be handled by AmPar contains two songs from the new musical, "Milk & Honey," the title song and "Shalom."

Soon after the contracts were signed, Sid Feller, A&R head for AmPar, selected the songs, made arrangements, and then flew to Rome, where Fisher is currently making a film. The sides were cut there, with Feller conducting and Peter DeAngelis supervising in the control room. Feller flew back to New York with the tapes, and master dubs were made, which were played for Clark and his exec staff, and an immediate release was scheduled.

Fisher had a long and highly successful stint with Victor, and, after leaving the label, he formed Ramrod Productions, and did several singles and an LP on a label called Ramrod.

Trade Comments On 49¢ Single

NEW YORK—If Victor's new 49¢ Groove label only serves to increase RCA Victor's share of the existing singles market, then we will have failed to accomplish the goal we are attempting to reach with this low priced singles line. That is what George Marek, vice-president of RCA Victor said last week upon the official announcement that Victor is reviving the Groove label at a 49¢ price in an effort to expand the slumping singles market.

"Groove," Marek stated, "will be an all-purpose label encompassing the entire spectrum of contemporary sound; Pop, Country-Western and Rhythm and Blues music. It will enable us to present more artists and more fresh material and, via this injection of new vitality, provide new vigor for an ever-broadening singles market."

Groove Records will be 7-inch, 45 rpm singles bearing handsome, four-color labels. "All Groove Records," Marek continued, "will be given the same expert attention now accorded in creating releases for the regular RCA Victor product and will, of course, have the exact quality of sound."

The first release of Groove Records is scheduled for the last week of October. They will be distributed, promoted and sold through RCA Victor Distributors.

"A thriving singles business, with its discoveries of new personalities, its tremendous appeal to teenager and adult as well, represents the best hope for a healthy, exciting Recording Industry," Marek said. "It is our purpose with Groove Records to draw fresh attention to our industry and bring more music to a greater audience."

However, officers and sales execs of other leading major and independent record firms do not seem to agree with the Victor concept that the 49¢ price is the answer to boosting single sales.

In interviews all during the week with representatives of other leading record manufacturers, the most repeated opinion was that the teenage market, which is responsible almost exclusively for the purchase of single records, is not influenced by price. If there is a specific single a youngster wants, he will pay the 98¢ for it. If he likes this record better than the 49¢ one that may also be a hit at the same time, he will still buy the 98¢ disk.

Most of the other manufacturers seemed to agree that it would be impossible for them to produce a 49¢ single because of the cost of producing a record today. Figuring the minimum cost, most analyzed it this way: the cost of a pressing is a minimum of 10¢; minimum artist royalty is 3% or 1½¢; publisher royalties for the two sides are normally 4¢—assuming that agreement can be reached with each publisher for half the rate, the cost will have to be a minimum of 2¢; add to this the cost of the labels, excise tax, the musicians' union fee and other charges and you have a minimum running cost per record of approximately 18¢ each, exclusive of overhead. If 2% for cash and a 5% return privilege is allowed, it appears to be an almost profitless product since other manufacturers figure that the single will sell to the distributor at approximately 27¢, to the retailer at 33¢ and to the consumer at the list price of 49¢.

Considering the structure of the business today, with independent producers responsible for many of the new releases, such people could not produce for the 49¢ line and get the royalty that record manufacturers are now giving them for their masters.

Many manufacturers doubted that at the retail level, the product would sell at the 49¢ list. Many expect retailers to take advantage of the single and sell it for the 98¢ price. (The 49¢ single will be produced with a perforated tag mentioning the 49¢ list price, but the tag can easily be removed.)

A rack jobber commenting on the new product said it would be impossible to handle but would do so, probably at a loss, if it was important enough for his racks. He said that he bills his outlets at a given percentage of the list and could not ask his outlets to accept a lower margin of profit on one specific single. Other manufacturers stated that if the Groove line succeeds and RCA cuts its line to 49¢, it may mean the death of the small indies. Cash Box contacted Louis Shapiro, of Music Center in Jersey City, who is executive secretary of the Society of Record Dealers (SORD), and his feeling on the Groove line was that it would cause confusion among dealers, and thus they would not know "whether they are coming or going."

Victor feels the disk will be well accepted by juke box operators. If a specific record at 49¢ is a hit, Victor feels the op will accept it more readily because of the lower cost and will perhaps gamble on this record earlier in its rise to prominence because of its lower cost. Victor expects this to lead to increased operator sales.

In a nutshell, Victor feels that when the Groove label comes up with a bonafide hit, it must sell at least double what the anticipated sale at 98¢ would have been. If the sale, after enough testing (and one hit cannot be used as an example), does not approach this figure, than it cannot be considered a success.

The first Groove release will be issued late this month. No Victor artists will be recorded on Groove at present. However the company feels that if a specific teenage market favorite might reach greater success under the Groove low price banner, and should he agree to have his single released on the Groove label, the company might attempt this move.

The RCA Victor label, however, will remain a 98¢ singles line.

Capitol Signs Linkletter

NEW YORK—Art Linkletter, popular radio-TV personality, has been signed to an exclusive Capitol Records pact, according to Alan W. Livingston, creative services veep. Linkletter, who hosts such top-rated shows as "People Are Funny" and "House Party," is currently cutting his first LP for the label under the supervision of Bill Miller, A&R producer. Linkletter has also authored such best-selling books as "Secret World Of Kids" and "Kids Say the Darndest Things."

Parker said that special merchandising kits would be furnished to the distributors for use in the retail dealer program. They contain, for the AmPar and Impulse! product, streamers, easels, special-point-of-sale displays, etc.


New L.A. Distrib

NEW YORK—When Maurice Chevalier sings three songs in Walt Disney's forthcoming pic, "The Castaways," the vet performer will bridge two generations of song writing.

Thirty years ago, Chevalier sang Al Sherman's "Livin' in the Sunlight, Lovin' in the Moonlight" in the film, "The Big Pond." In the Disney pic, Chevalier will sing three songs by Sherman's sons, Dick and Bob. They are "Merci Beaucoup," "Enjoy It" and "Grimpons!"

The brother writing team also wrote the songs for Disney's "The Parent Trap," one of which was "Let's Get Together," the current click by Hayley Mills, "Parent" star who is also featured with Chevalier, along with George Sanders, in "The Castaways." The pair are working on music for four of Disney's future efforts.

UA Names New Milwaukee Distrib

NEW YORK—United Artists Records has announced the appointment of John O'Brian Distributing Company as its distributor in Milwaukee. Appointment was announced by Jerry Raker, national sales manager, who said that the new representative would be handled by Morris S. Event, which took place in the downtown section of the city in the evening, was attended by local, state and Treasury Department officials. Bonds' latest hit for the Le-grand label is tagged "School's In."

ASPEN, COLO.—Walter Susskind, conductor of The Toronto Symphony Orchestra, has been appointed conductor of the Aspen Music Festival Symphony Orchestra for the 1962 summer season (June 25-August 26).

Dot Records will again sponsor the Friday luncheon, which will have as

guest speaker Senator Estes Ke-fauver, and RCA Victor and Columbia will host Saturday's breakfast and luncheon, respectively, at the Maxwell House Hotel. Columbia will also have its yearly coffee clutch on Sunday morning (4). Capitol Records, which will publish a daily paper during the convention, will entertain at a buffet reception Saturday afternoon. Hospitality suites sponsored by various labels, publishers and artists will be open during the day and evening.

Though the label will initially direct its attention to the singles market, Kolsky said he was definitely planning to cut LP's, foregoing, however, "catalog merchandise."

Kolsky said he would, in due time, appoint two A&R men to Diamond. His own promotional efforts will be supplemented by the services of two indie promotion reps in the New York area. The exec is planning a road trip shortly.

He is now discussing world-wide distribution for the label.

Their now expanded gospel-flavored repertoire encompasses The Blues, Spirituals, Jazz and Rhythm & Blues with original arrangements provided by the groups' Floyd Bibbins, who also plays piano accompaniment.

The Grandison Singers will record both singles and albums for Victor.

Also during the meets, the trustees evolved nominations and awards procedures for the 1961 Grammy Awards and discussed progress of the N.Y., Chicago and L.A. chapters in the area of scholarships and development of university lecture courses based on the record industry.



A special release from Candid is, "The Jazz Life," an anthology with 22 top jazz musicians including tracks by Charles Mingus, Max Roach, Lucky Thompson, Lightnin' Hopkins and Cal Massey. None of these sides has been previously released. The album carries the same title as a new book by Nat Hentoff, who also produced the album, recently published by the Dial Press. 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THE EVERLY BROTHERS



For more than four years, The Everly Brothers have been among the top attractions in the teen-beat business. The boys' latest click vehicle is "Don't Blame Me," one of their rare stints on a standard, which this week holds the #35 spot on the Top 100. They began their remarkable Top 100 career in 1957, when, after looking for a break in Nashville, publisher-manager Wesley Rose liked the way they sang, and introduced them to Archie Bleyer, head of Cadence Records, who added the duo to his label.

That same year, Don and Phil offered "Bye Bye Love" to the teeners, who responded to the distinctive country-styled sound of the boys in a gold-record manner. Other hits, many million-sellers, on Cadence, both singles and LP's, came one after another. In 1960, the boys left Cadence for Warner Bros. Records—and continued making chart dates.

The Kentucky-born artists (Phil is 22, Don 24) now live in Hollywood, where they study acting, not as a team, but on an individual basis.

THE DREAMLOVERS



The Dreamlovers are yet another example of the willingness of youngsters to readily accept new talent. The five vocalists bowed both themselves and the Philly-based Heritage (distributed by Cameo) label on the Top 100 with their dinking of "When We Get Married," and are now going for a second-in-a-row success with "Let Them Love" and "Welcome Home."

Their background should be familiar to those who have followed the careers of today's teen-market standouts. The boys were friends and fellow-classmates at Philly's North East High School, where they formed a singing team, in 1956, for a talent show at the school.

After four years of talent shows, charity benefits and an occasional local club date, the songsters were selected to provide the vocal backdrop on last year's smash by Chubby Checker (Parkway), "The Twist." While most were listening to Checker on the date, Heritage execs Jerry Ross and Murray Wecht spotted a "unique style" from the group. Donny Hogan, a former member of the group, supplies all its material.

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
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

Musidisc is releasing this month the first records of the two new U.S. labels it now represents: United States and Command. From UA 4 albums are being issued here, two by Ferrante & Teicher, one by Don Costa's Orchestra and another by Ralph Marterie's Orchestra. From Ferrante & Teicher, "Sucessos De Ouro (Golden Hits)" and "Os Mais Famosos Temas Universais (The Most Famous Universal Themes)." Don Costa's outing is "Magnifica Musica De Cinema (Magnificent Movie Music)" and from Ralph Marterie there's "88 Violinos E Vozes Celestiais (88 Violins and Heavenly Voices)." From the Command label, there's two LP's, one with Los Admiradores entitled "Bongos, Bongos, Bongos" and the other with Enoch Light and The Light Brigade, "Pertinent Percussion Cha-Cha's."

The Brazilian record industry is seriously thinking of pressing from now on only two types of records: Singles on 78 rpm and albums and Compacts on 33 1/3 rpm. This idea was very well received by all record producers, since the 45 rpm records never had great popularity around here. Sales already proved that compacts are more suitable for our public.

RGE Records released, under 20th Fox label, "Os Grandes Sucessos Do Cinema" (The Greatest Movie Hits) with the 20th Century Strings. At the same time, the label issued a standard on 78 rpm with the famous Brazilian singer Silvio Caldas. Silvio waxed two sambas by the Southern composer Lupicinio Rodrigues, who's commemorating his Silver Jubilee this year.

Copacabana (Som) has three albums this month. One is an LP from the Coral label, "O Homem Da Batuta De Ouro" (The Man With The Golden Baton), with the Dick Jacobs Orchestra, because two melodies in this album are back again on the charts here: "The Man With The Golden Arms" and "Molly-O." BENELUX

HOLLAND

On September 29 the Month-Of-The-Record Action, which has been organized by the Commission of Collective Gramophonorecords Campaign started to a brilliant classical show in the Concertgebouw, Amsterdam. On September 30, a popular show took place in the Kurzaal, Scheveningen. The highlights of the "Grand Gala Du Disque" events, on which more than 20 top national and international attractions were featured, was the "Solemn Hour of Edisons" Awards for the best performances on records in 1961 in every musical field. Here is the list of artists and records which got an "Edison":

- Honorable mention was given to the recording of "Musique Insolite" (Pathé).

- Wim Kan for his recording of "Uithuilen en Opnieuw Beginnen" (Philips).
- Rita Reys for her recording of "Marriage In Modern Jazz" (Philips).
- Captain H. F. W. van Diepenbeek for his recording of "Marching Together Holland/U.S.A." (CNR).
- The Blue Diamonds for their recording of "Ramona" (Decca).
- Henk Bakker for his recording of "Ali Baba En De Veertig Rovers" (Artone).
- Jack Marshall for his recording of "Soundsville" (Capitol).
- John Coltrane for his recording of "Giant Steps" (London).
- Harry Belafonte for his recording of "Belafonte At Carnegie Hall" (RCA).
- Actor Ko van Dijk received an "Edison" for his recording of "Tribunal Scene" from "Danton's Death" (Pythia).

The Edison Award performances were closed by a pleasantly informal ball, (at the Kurzaal, Scheveningen) which lasted until the small hours of Sunday morning.

Edison Awards have now international recognition and importance. Closely following the commercial importance of Oscars in the motion picture industry, The Edison Awards is becoming more of a big highlight in the international recording industry every year. The big stars, applauded during both "Grand Gala Du Disque" shows (classical—and popular music), were top artists like Elisabeth Schwarzkopf and Robert Casadesus (classical music), and Caterina Valente, Siw Malmkvist, Valerie Masters, Lys Assia, Svend Asmussen & Ulrik Neumann and Charles Aznavour.

Dutch singer of Italian songs, Willy Alberti, is the first over here to record the now famous and well loved Mexican song "La Sposa," better known under its Italian title: "La Novia." Willy's new single disk may prove a double winner, for it has the latest Rocco Granata song "Irena" on the other side.

Ray Conniff records never fail to be good sellers. Two new EP records in the series, "Ray Conniff Presents The Classics," have just been released. They feature compositions by masters like Liszt, Chopin and Puccini, presented in a special way by The Ray Conniff Orchestra and chorus, on Philips.

The boys of The Dutch Swing College Band of Peter Schilperoord are real world travellers these days. Fortunately, they find time now and then to make records in the Hilversum Phonogram studio. Their dixie-versions of pop songs have made the band popular by an even larger public than before. Latest single release has "Old Amsterdam," couched with pre-war German hit "Bel Ami," which comes from the Willi Forst film of the same name.

Soundtrack EP from "Dreamland Of Desire" ("Traumland Der Sehnsucht"), with Greek music and songs by Manos "Never On Sunday" Hadjidakis, is meeting with great success here (Fontana, L.C. Phonogram).

Decca-London's new label manager John Ros told Cash Box he has great expectations of Bobby Darin's new rendering of oldie "You Must Have Been A Beautiful Baby," on London. New season started with three big hits: "Take Good Care Of My Baby" (Bobby Vee), "The Mountain's High" (Dick And DeeDee) and "Hurt" (Timi Yuro), Liberty recordings that are issued here on the London label. At the time you read this, Mr. John Ros will be in England to talk to Decca people in London.

Dutch song "Gloedrode Rozen" ("Glowing Red Roses"), written by Theo Warrens, has been assigned to Germany by Storz Musikverlag, Osterode (Harz). Storz informed Basart, that the German lyrics are in the making and that a release is scheduled on the Metronome label. Basart, who represents the Storz catalog for Benelux, also has some very good songs on hand, from which "De Trouwe Herder" ("The Old Shepherd") has been recorded by the popular Limbra Sisters on the Polydor label.

Conny Froboess, Bovema's His Master's Voice teenage star from Germany, recorded some English versions of late, of which the titles are "Lovable" and "No One Can Tell Me I'm Too Young."

Ricky Nelson's "Hello Mary Lou"—hit recently passed the 100,000 sales in Holland. Rick is the big American star of the Imperial label, represented by L. C. Bovema, Holland. In the meantime, William Voerman of Bovema said that there is a rapidly increasing interest for Fats Domino LP's in Holland so that more Fats LP's than ever before will be released on the Dutch market in the near future.

German publisher Peter Meisel and Dutch publisher Joop Portengen made an exchange deal with successful results for both of them: Meisel gave Dutch rights of top hit "Schade, Schade, Schade" to Joop Portengen, who in some days obtained a Philips record of the Dutch version of this new Siw Malmkvist success. Peter Meisel obtained a Lys Assia record to be released by German Philips of "Ay, Ay, En Bilbao," of which Joop Portengen is original publisher.

C. N. Rood L.C. just released "Runaround Sue" by Dion on the Top Rank label. High expectations! On the Storyville label a new series of singles and EP's were released entitled "The Traditional Jazzscene In Europe." In the series you can find about every well known Dixieland band of Europe. Humphrey Lyttelton, Chris Barber, Cy Laurie and the (Dutch) New Orleans Synchronators.

Robertino, CNR's fast selling young Italian singer, will come to Holland this month, for radio and TV performances. Robertino's "Mama" and "O Sole Mio" are selling extremely well.

First Dutch sung version of "Brigitte Bardot" by The Emeralds got a big promotion by Dutch TV. C. N. Rood L.C. is making very good business with country & western LP's and EP's on the Starday label.

First jazz concert of this season in Holland is by The Modern Jazz Quartet (20th October). Others to follow are The Dave Brubeck Quartet (10th November), the groups of Dizzy Gillespie and John Coltrane (19th November) and Art Blakey And The Jazz Messengers (2nd December). All concerts are in Amsterdam and The Hague. Next year the following jazz groups are expected in Holland: Count Basie, Sarah Vaughan, Louis Armstrong and Erroll Garner.



ENGLAND

Pye recording artist Lonnie Donegan created record history when Bing Crosby presented him with two gold disks. Recent American interest has rocketed sales of "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose It's Flavor On The Bedpost Over Night" well over the million mark. The second award was for "Rock Island Line," which he recorded in 1956 while under contract to Decca, but because he left the company to join Pye before a million sales were notched up he was not considered eligible for the award. Now matters have been put right and with "My Old Man's A Dustman," which reached the million mark last October, Donegan holds three gold disks—the first British artist to achieve this distinction. Currently visiting the States Donegan commences a month's tour of New Zealand on October 23.

Rock stars are noticeably absent from this year's list of artists appearing in The Royal Variety Performance which takes place on November 6 at the Prince of Wales Theatre in the presence of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. Instead trade is well represented with Kenny Ball and His Jazzmen, Acker Bilk and His Paramount Jazz Band and The Temperance Seven. Other artists taking part include Shirley Bassey, Max Bygraves, Sammy Davis Jr., Charlie Drake, Bruce Forsyth, The McGuire Sisters, Nina & Frederik, Andy Stewart and Frankie Vaughan. ATV have acquired the television rights and the show will be screened on November 12. As usual all proceeds are donated to the Variety Artists' Benevolent Fund.

The first LP releases here on the Reprise label have been announced by Pye. They are Frank Sinatra's "Sinatra Swings," Sammy Davis Jr.'s "The Wham Of Sam," Tony Williams's "Sings His Greatest Hits," Mort Sahl's "New Frontier," Calvin Jackson's "Variations On Movie Themes" and The Sande and Green Fun-Time Band's "The Ol' Calliope Man At The Fair." New singles are Calvin Jackson's "How High The Moon" b/w "Moon River" and Nancy Sinatra's "Cuff Links And A Tie Clip."

Ember International chief Jeff Kruger has acquired Cedric Dumont's "Klimper Dixie" for his label. Francis Day & Hunter hold the publishing rights here.

Jerry Lordan, composer of The Shadows "Apache" hit, has penned a number for Shane Fenton and The Fentones, who make their debut on the Parlophone label with "I'm A Moody Guy" published by Francis Day & Hunter. The same company handle Karl Denver's latest release, "Mexicali Rose." Denver recently scored a great success here with "Marcheta," and his latest disk looks all set for a repeat performance.

Chappells reports that Tony Osborne has waxed "Mexico"—the instrumental which is currently riding high in the States. The original version by Bob Moore is released here on London.

Troy Shondell's "This Time," which is currently enjoying success in the States for Liberty, is due for release here on the Decca label on October 23.

Another gold disk award—this time for The Allison's million seller "Are You Sure" on Fontana. D.J. and compere Keith Fordyce made the presentation on ABC TV's "Thank Your Lucky Stars." The boys' current release is "What A Mess."

During a recent visit to this country, top German teenage star Conny cut some titles in English for Columbia's A&R manager Norrie Paramor. Two tracks are now released "Loveable" and "No-One Can Tell Me I'm Too Young." Norrie also reports that he has recorded an LP with Kay Starr for subsequent issue on the Capitol label.

Dick James, who recently set up his own company Dick James Music, now reports the formation of We Three Music Ltd. in conjunction with We Three Music, Inc. of America. First number in the catalog is "A Thing of The Past" by The Shirelles on Top Rank. Latest releases for Dick James Music are "Who's Chicken" and "Sloppy Joe" on Parlophone and for November "Snowman's Land" by Zack Laurence also on Parlophone.

Only ten months after its release HMV's LP "The Black And White Minstrel Show" has topped the 100,000 sales mark. This is the first LP by British artists to reach six-figure sales. Encouraged by its success, HMV this month issues "Another Black And White Minstrel Show"—again featuring The George Mitchell Singers.

Miki and Griff, who, with Lonnie Donegan began a tour of New Zealand on October 23, feature an oldie on the latest Pye release, "Tennessee Waltz," published by Cinephonic.

The latest recruit to wax the catchy Latin-American tune, "Sucu Sucu," is Joe Loss on H.M.V. which makes publisher Bill Phillips of Peter Maurice a very happy man. Other recordings already released are Laurie Johnson (Pye), Nina & Frederik (Columbia), Ted Heath (Decca), Ping Ping and Al Verlaine (Oriole), The Polka Dots (Philips) and Johnny Gregory (Fontana). Another South American tune handled by KPM is "La Novia" (The Wedding), currently topping the Italian charts. English version by Malcolm Vaughan (HMV) and Anita Bryant (Philips). Bill Phillips also reports that Harry Secombe's "No Man Is An Island" is proving a steady seller.

Interdisc reports that "Roarin" by The Don Rendell New Jazz Quintet—the first British Jazzland release—has been so successful that since its release on October 1 the disk has had to be re-pressed twice. Firm also announced that advance orders for its latest copyright clearance "Cannonball Adderley In San Francisco" on Riverside (October 13 release) have far exceeded that of any other LP. Riverside chief, Bill Grauer is expected in London on October 19 for meetings with executives here.

A number from his film "The Young Ones" is the latest Cliff Richard Columbia release—a romantic ballad entitled "When The Girl In Your Arms Is The Girl In Your Heart."

The first subject in the BBC TV series "This Is Your Life" was Max Bygraves, who is currently starring in "Do Re Mi."

BELGIUM

L. C. Gramophone's best selling single record of the moment is "You Don't Know" by Helen Shapiro (Columbia). Among Gramophone's new releases are "The Little White Cloud That Cried" by Jan Hoiland (Parlophone), "That's My Home" by Mr. Acker Bilk (Columbia), "Reach For The Stars" by Shirley Bassey (Columbia), "It's Drivin' Me Wild" by Conway Twitty (MGM), "Espresso" by The Pines (Capitol), "Navarone" and "La Marmite" by Les Compagnons De La Chanson, a Trianon (Gramophone's cheap label) EP version by "Brigitte Bardot" by Orchestra El Guarayo, and a new German-sung recording by Cliff Richard: "Schön Wie Ein Traum" ("Theme For A Dream") and "Vreneli" (a German original).

Discotrade, the company who distributes Mercury and Top Rank among others, released during the past 10 days 15 new records which are listed on various Cash Box charts: "Raindrops" by Dee Clark (Top Rank), "Johnny Remember Me" by John Leyton (Top Rank) and "Frankie And Johnny" by Brook Benton (Mercury). Discotrade still has big success with their artist André Verschuren, especially with "Les Fiances D'Auvergne" (on the Festival label). New Top Rank releases include "Sittin' Here Cryin'" and "Uncle John" (Byron Gipson) and "Runaway Girl"/"Runaround Sue" (Dion).

Jules Nijs, well known impresario of Rocco Granata, started a new Belgian record company with a new label: Show Records. One of the first recordings were made by The Matiny's, two young girls who are singing "Come On And Tell" and "Strolling Along."

JAPAN

The Matsuhita Electric Appliances Company, one of Japan's biggest firms, has bought into Teichiku Records. By this tie-up, Matsushita will send one or two managing staffs into Teichiku. Also technical cooperation is expected to be given Teichiku under the new affiliation.

Massao Suzuki, Victor's folk singer, died recently at the age of 61. He had been recording only Japanese folk songs for Victor since 1937, and was a top artist in the field.

Masaichi Kanishi, president of Westminster Records, left for Okinawa. He will do marketing research there and be back in Tokyo via Hong Kong shortly.

Distribution of Flatt & Scruggs' first 12" LP by King Records of Japan was followed up by Columbia doing the same with a 10" LP. This is Flatt & Scruggs and their Foggy Mountain Boys' second LP here and the first bluegrass album that has been released here in Columbia's history. King Records of Japan issued the first album that has been released here in Columbia's history. King Records of Japan issued the first album by a local bluegrass artist Jimmie Tokita and His Mountain Playboys. He once recorded some western tunes on King, but this is the first time for them on down-to-earth country tunes in their favorite bluegrass style. On stage, he and his boys specialize in bluegrass only.

Toshiba decided to place 222 LP's that were out-of-print on sale throughout the nation in record stores. These include 27 stereo 12" LP's, 139 mono 12" LP's and 56 mono 10" LP's. They were selected from 741 disks which went out-of-print recently. Retail prices are expected to be cut to half of the regular prices.

Four new singers, Satoshi Togawa, Minoru Maki, Shiyoki Ishii and Eiji Toyama, held their joint recital October 3rd in Tokyo. They "want to be crusaders for European popular songs," as there are few who render continental pops here. It was their debut performances.

Nanae Takahashi, 19 year old girl, and Isao Izumiya, 19 year old boy, were selected the best by judges when the 12th Columbia National Popular Song Contest was over. The runner-up was a 15 year old girl, Tamiko Hayashida. All the performers who won were under 20.

DENMARK

The last week of September was filled with activity as all recording companies making domestic recordings tried to make as many recordings as possible before the end of the month and before the agreement between the record industry and Musicians' Union (MU) expired on Sept. 30. Since no new agreement has been made between the two organizations, there are no recordings made in Denmark any longer, and at the moment there is no sign of any agreement. According to the record industry, MU asks for unacceptable conditions. The MU has listed two stipulations, 1): The salaries to be raised with 20 per cent, and 2): A recording session should mean that the record company use the made recording for only one release (one release means that the record company for its own or for third man's use produces commercial records with one catalog number only).

According to spokesmen for the record industry, the first point perhaps could be discussed while the second point is out of question, since accepting this means that a record company no longer could use a recording for release on both single, EP and LP without special permission from the MU. It would also stop Danish record companies from releasing a Danish recording on any other label abroad. A good example is Jorgen Ingman's recordings. They are made for and by Metronome in Denmark, but appear on Atco in the US and on Top Rank in Asia, etc.

The MU has not listed any conditions according to which a record company would be allowed to use a recording under different catalog numbers (i.e. as both singles, EP's and/or LP's) or for release under a different label outside Denmark.

Musicians have observed that it happens very often that the background music for a recording is used for many recordings, particularly if the singers (in different countries) use the same key. It is believed, however that the MU could have found a better way to cover their interest than the solution they have presented.

At the moment, there are negotiations between record industry and MU going on in Copenhagen, but the negotiations at the moment only deal with the point 1 while point 2 is not discussed at all. A spokesman for a recording company told the Cash Box that "the conditions asked for by the MU was probably nothing but an attempt to find out the reaction and not so seriously meant."

NORWAY

"Michael" with The Highwaymen on London is doing very well in Norway, where the record appears at 10th spot this week. Publisher of the song in Scandinavia is Multitone in Stockholm.

Nora Brøckstedt back in Norway after a 11 days tour in Finland, reports very good success during her tour.

American pianist Van Cliburn to Oslo where he will play at the Aulaen during a farewell-concert for conductor Odd Grøner Hegge.

SWEDEN

The dispute between RCA and Radio Nord continues, taking almost unexpected proportions these days. Behind the story is the fact that Radio Nord has agreed to pay record companies for records it uses on its programs. However, since Radio Nord is a commercial station, it wants the record companies to accept advertising time instead of cash money. RCA (Grammofon AB Electra) has refused to make any deals with an illegal station, and the Radio Nord answered with a withdraw of all RCA records from its programs, including its Radio Nord Hit Parade every Wednesday. Since Radio Nord is financially owned by two Americans, it has been in touch with RCA Victor in New York, trying to get its help to make Swedish RCA change its policy. RCA Victor, however, has answered that Sixten Eriksson, head of Electra, has free hands to handle the situation as he prefers. Jack S. Kotschack of Radio Nord now declares that Gordon MacLendon (one of the owners of Radio Nord) is prepared to start a boycott against RCA Victor over his American radio stations until "we reach a satisfying deal." Eriksson replied that "we never capitulate for any threats."

Modern Jazz Quartet gave two concerts at the Concert Hall in Stockholm October 14. Fabian, Jay Epae, Little Gerhard, Gunnar Wiklund, Gitte, Lil Malmkvist and Putti Wickman and His Ork. giving a concert at the Kungliga Hallen October 15.

Swedish and Danish governments have tried new ways to stop the so-called pirate radio stations. The recent step is that they have closed the radio and telephone contacts between the offices and the ships outside the three mile border, except for emergency calls. Since these stations are broadcasting news bulletins every hour, this step has caused them some stoppage in its activity, but the stations have solved the problems by having people on board the ships following news broadcasts from legal radio stations in Sweden, Denmark, Germany, England and France. So far, however, the stations are continuing playing records 24 hours a day.

HMV is releasing a 12" LP with old recordings with Carli Tornehave as a low price record, sold at 16:- Kr (around \$3) against 24:- (about \$3) which is the regular price for a 12" LP here. Tornehave left HMV a couple of months ago and is now recording for Philips.

New release on sheet music: Gehrmans has released "A Breath Of Scandal" titled "Blygaste, Raraste, Käraste" with lyrics in Swedish. A Swedish recording with Britt Damberg on RCA is available here.

Danish teenage artist Gitte to Stockholm for recordings for EMI. Börje Ekberg, back from a biz trip on the continent, told Cash Box that he is very happy to discover that the new label, Cadence, started in Scandinavia with the release of two records only, of which one already is reportedly making noise in Sweden, Denmark and Norway. It is most unusual that a new label can have such success from the very start. Mats Bjerke, head of Metronome, and Bent Fabricus-Bjerre (Metronome in Denmark) are now in the U.S. on a biz visit.

"In the last three months we have doubled our sales," said Luis Arriola Sirvent, general manager of Sicamericana, to Cash Box, adding that "Music Hall will continue its expansion plans, with increased releases of our labels and some important others that we have just acquired." Sicamericana has got to an agreement with Reprise Records of the US for representing it in Argentina. First releases will be made in November (three LP's: Sinatra, Sammy Davis and Tony Williams, and some singles) and the diskery believes they'll cause plenty of commotion in the market. Special emphasis will be put on Nancy Sinatra, who is considered "a potential big star in the River Plate." Arriola also said that "there will be big news regarding Dot (also represented by Sicamericana) very soon; besides, we will probably start representing two or three other very important labels." However, he declined to give the names of these labels because the deals were not completed yet.

December 1 will initiate the shooting of a new musical film, the first of a series produced by a new company. It will star Baby Bell, and will include ten songs. Ben Molar, artistic and musical director of the film, explained that the plan is to get back for Argentine films and music a lot of South American markets that were conquered by Mexican and Spanish producers some years ago, also with musicals. "We will make films for all South America," he said, "they will be easy to understand and will bring a lot of popularity to our young artists, who will be the stars in all of them." About ten years ago, local films were very popular in many other Spanish-speaking markets, but that prestige was lost in the fifties. Now, this production may start a new era for Argentine picture industry and our artists and singers.

Luis Aguile must return from Miami, where he is now, to start a big musical show on TV Channel 9. The title will be "Fiesta con Luis Aguile," and the premiere is scheduled November 2. Aguile's last record, "Los Iracundos," penned by himself, is doing very well.

The Audio Fidelity line, recently released by Microfon Records, is already a big success, both in quality and sales. Mario Kaminsky, head of Microfon, worked many weeks to get the high quality he needed for AF records. The records are made by RCA, with special proceedings, and have been considered very good by local Hi Fi fans. Kaminsky is also working on new Italian records, and mainly on Adriano Celentano's waxing of "Non Esiste L'Amor" (Love Does Not Exist), a big hit in Italy, which will be released very soon here.

Orfeo has put to sale the first waxing of its newest vocal group, The Silver Stars. The titles are taken from TV serials: "77 Sunset Strip" (in Spanish: Callecita Soleada), and "Bat Masterson."

Los Cantores del Alba, the folk group, are preparing a tour of several provinces, that will last a couple of months. It will include Cordoba, Mendoza, Tucuman and Mar del Plata, where they will perform at the Hotel Provincial. They are currently performing on TV Channel 7 (Show de YPF) and LR4 Radio Splendid.

The big success of Del Shannon ("Runaway") has stimulated Odeon (London representative) to release his first LP very soon.

Disconoticias, the music magazine directed by Roberto Victor Cicuta and Miguel Angel Merrellano, offered a cocktail to the disk jockeys, publishers and recording companies, celebrating its first issue. Many of the most important personalities of our record world were present there: Enrique Rosso, Juan Carlos Menna and Jose A. Rota, of Odeon; Luis Arriola and M. Bernardoni of Sicamericana; Ricardo Gaspari and Jose Carli of Columbia, S. Pereira of Orfeo; Mario Kaminsky of Microfon; Jorge Esperon of Tonodisc; Miguel Davis of Ariel; Carlos Tealdo Alizieri of Surco, Haydee Isabel Gonzalez of Disk Jockey, disk jockeys Carlos Medina, Ruben Machado, Osvaldo Aguilar, Francisco Mujia Jackson and many others. The publishing part was also well represented: Ricardo Korn and Felix Lipesker of Julio Korn, and Mauricio and Rafael Brenner of Fermata.

ITALY

The Mercury label in Italy will pass to Melodicon (Philips Italia) as soon as the terms of this change of representation are settled and decided between Melodicon and its former rep, Ricordi. The MGM line will pass to Siemens, the Italian representative of Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft.

Maestro Kramer, one of the most popular musicians and composers we have in Italy, just entered into a new music venture when he opened a new dance hall in Milan called the Olimpia Ball Room. This place is not new, as at its beginning it was a luxurious theatre for plays and shows and then it was turned into a music hall where dinner was served, a show was performed and there was dancing. At present, it's simply a dance hall. These recent and quick changes mean that theatres in Italy have a difficult time and that the time of Music Halls has definitely passed. The Olimpia Ball Room will have a big band managed and conducted each night by Kramer, while normally our night spots only have four or five piece bands at the most. Every week, new singers and vocal groups will appear on that stage. Kramer has asked our music publishers to send him their new songs and to use his band and dancing hall to test their possibilities of success.

Two years after the release of the last recital on record by **Maria Callas** titled, "Arie Da Opere Di Verdi," VCM will issue this month a new release titled "Arie Da Opere Francesi." VCM also announced the arrival of the famous conductor **Andre Cluytens** in Milan, who will perform in this city and at the same time, violinist **Nathan Milstein** will open the A.R.C.'s concert season here. VCM is presenting an album of rare charm by **Nat "King" Cole** titled, "Wild Is Love," in Italy.

Mr. Baron announces the next release of another important version of "Exodus" on our market. It is the **Percy Faith** recording backed with "The Last Time I Saw Archie." At the same time, **Marino Barreto, Jr.**'s version of "La Novia," the song which tops our charts in other versions, will be released here. Philips also emphasized the continuous big success of **Ray Conniff's** repertoire. "Besame Mucho," coupled with "The Way You Look Tonight," fills the number four position, and Conniff sells strongest on an LP with numbers such as "Say It With Music," "Memories Are Made Of This" and "S Marvelous." Recently, Melodicon (Italina Philips) released a low priced LP by Conniff titled "Ascoltate E Ballate" (Listen And Dance) and sub-titled "The New Style The World Is Crazy For." This promotional LP is on sale at the price of 1590 Italian liras (\$2.50).

Alberto Carisch, the director of Southern Music Italiana, said he is already making plans for the next convention of all the international representatives of Southern Music the month over, to be held in September, for the entire month, (1962), in Italy as Stresa, a nice place on Lake Maggiore (Northern Italy). He foresees that at least 40 to 50 people will attend it, and says that the press will receive a special and warm reception.

Decca has released "I Due Volti" (One Eyed Jacks) coupled with "Dimmelo In Settembre" by **Caterina Valente** in Italian. The second side is an original Spanish composition by **Alguero** titled "Dimelo En Septiembre," which also appears on the back of "Pepito" by **The Machucambos** in this group's version.

News of RCA American's names in Italy. The latest release by **Harry Belafonte**, "Angelina," backed with "Gloria." Firm will shortly issue a new Belafonte LP titled "Jumping Calypso." **Neil Sedaka**, whose "Little Sister" is hitting big, will visit Italy. As to RCA Italiana, **Nico Fidenco** has penned a new song titled "Stringiti Alla Mia Mano" (Get Close To My Hand) and **Miranda Martino** waxed it on record. Fidenco also cut the soundtrack of a film and the record version will come out within a week titled, "La Scala Di Seta" (The Staircase Of Silk). **The Flipper** group, which cut a hit this summer with "Cha Cha Dell'Impiccato" (Cha Cha Of The Hanged Man), has launched another possible hit titled, "Giada." The LP, "Su Per Le Montagne," cut by the Italian chorus **S.A.T.**, specializing in mountain songs, is available both in mono and stereo. The same chorus already has available two LP's and a third is expected, and very soon the first EP with new tunes will come out.

Durium said it has sold, on the whole, some one hundred thousand records since the last Naples Festival. Most of them are represented by "Tu Si E Malincunia" in the version by **Aurelio Fierro**, and a good amount is due to **Mario Trevi**, as well, with other songs. "Italian Lover," the song which **Little Tony** (Durium) will interpret on the first show of Canzonissimi, was penned by maestro **Cassano**, the art advisor of Durium and, of course, it is copyrighted by Durium itself. Added to the list of "Exodus" record versions appearing on the chart this week is the recording by the **Encore Ensemble**, distributed here by Durium, which first released it in February.

Besides **Celentano's** version, "Basta" (That's Enough) is available on another successful record by **Clem Sacco** of Durium.

New songs added to the catalogue of **Alfredo Rossi** (Ariston) are: "Midi Midinette," already waxed successfully by **Betty Curtis** (CGD) and **Leda Devi** (Phonocolor); "Non So Resisterti" (I'm Not Able To Withstand You) released by **Caterina Valente** (Decca) and by **Corrado Lajacono** (VCM); "Prendi La Matita" (Take The Pencil) waxed by **Mina** (Italdisc); "Estate" (Summer) recorded by **Milva** (Cetra), **Bruno Martino** (VCM); **J. Fontana** (Meazzi Bros.), and lastly the new vedette of Italdisc, **Renata Mauro**, has picked up and recorded "I Desideri Mi Fanno Paura" (Wishes Frighten Me).

Canzonissima (The Songest) started its shows on our TV screens on October 10th. **Little Tony** (Durium), **Corrado Lajacono** (VCM) **Miranda Martino** (RCA Italiano), **Artura Testa** (Melodicon), **Katina Ranieri** (MGM-CGD), **Giorgio Gaber** (Ricordi) and **Giuseppe Rondinella** (Fonit) will be the opening singers. Along with the San Remo Festival, **Canzonissima** represents the main music event of the year.

From the soundtrack of the Warner Bros. motion picture "Parrish" translated here, "Vento Caldo" (Hot Wind), three record versions are available—"Parrish" by **George Greeley**, distributed by Gurtler, "Vento Caldo" (Lucy's Theme and Paige's Theme) by **Freddy Martin** and his orchestra, and "Vento Caldo" by **The Hollyridge Strings** (VCM).

The latest outstanding release from Carisch is "Quando" (When) backed with "Cinque Minuti Ancora" (Five More Minutes) by **Peppino Di Capri**. "Quando" was penned by **Luigi Tenco** and is already popular via the record performance of the author himself.

Bob Weiss, international director of Warner Bros., in Milan. **Giuseppe Gianini**, the manager of C.G.D., just flew to Japan.

Peter De Angelis is in Rome to work with **Eddie Fisher**. Next week, he will come to Milan to see **Mr. Casetta** of Bluebell and bring some of his new compositions to the singers of Bluebell to have them recorded. Casetta, who at the moment is in New York for a very short stay, will be back in Milan in time to contact De Angelis here.



GERMANY

The Second "Week Of Records" has been ended for Ariola Records with a promotion effort topped off with the "New Talent Festival" held this year in Frankfurt. Every year (this is the 2nd annual event) the firm holds a huge promotion for its product with prizes and contests for dealers and public alike.

Deutsche Vogue Records handling the **Pye**, **Vogue** and **Durium** lines has moved its central office from Bremen to Frankfurt. Firm's new address is **Sophien Strasse 44**. The new quarters in the center of Germany will allow the firm an easier access to the population centers of this country. The General Director of **Vogue Records** in both France and Germany **Leon Cabat** has appointed **Jacqueline Bouvier** as general manager for the German firm. **Jacqueline** has now moved to Frankfurt from Paris to take over her new post. **Günter Gayer** has been appointed public relations and sales manager for the firm and will also be responsible for radio promotion. **Karlheinz Plötz** is the sales manager for distributors and large mail order and department stores. The firm is increasing its German production and has just signed Germany's top dixieland band **The Spree City Stompers** to an exclusive contract. Their recording of the German evergreen "Warte Warte Nur Ein Weilchen" makes its entry in the top 10 this week marking the first time that the firm has been so high in the charts. The newest waxing by the band is a dixie version of "Brigitte Bardot" with a German lyric sung by band leader-trombonist **Hawe Schneider**. The group records in Berlin. Other top sellers by the firm include the Spanish sung version of "Brigitte Bardot" by **Roberto Seto** which is topping the French charts, "Michael" and "Does Your Chewing Gum Lost It's Flavor" by **Lonnie Donegan**, "Romeo" with **Petula Clark**, and the recordings of German and Austrian folk songs and evergreens by French accordionist **Aimable**. New recordings have just been made with **The Leathertown Jazz Men** from Offenbach for **Pye Records**. The records which include "Thriller Rag" are also set for English release.

Ariola is going 3/4 time with the release of 43 records of Vienna waltzes. 24 singles, 12 EP's and 8 LP's have been released in the series which features the **Vienna Stateopera Orchestra** under the direction of **Josef Leo Gruber**.

Storyville Records announced another tour of Germany for the top Danish dixie band **Papa Bue's Viking Jazzband**, which sold 1/2 million copies of one single last year here, and New Orleans veteran **George Lewis**. The tour will take the stars through 35 cities in Germany in 6 weeks. **Metronome Records** announces that **Siv Malmkvist** and **Jörgen Ingmann** are set for a TV show called "Guests from Scandinavia" in the next weeks. The top folk singing group **Nina and Frederik** have also cut their first German language record. The group has already had several releases in America and **Metronome** hopes to establish their popularity here in Germany.

Denise Lamarque and **Aviva Silver** of New York Radio Station **WTFM Stereo** visited Hamburg and the Radio Luxembourg Pop Music Festival in Weisbanen. The gals are picking up continental material for their broadcasts. While here, they met with **Helmut Stoldt** of Radio Luxembourg and **Alfred Schacht** of Aberbach Music and also lined up tape interviews with many stars including **Bert Kaempfert**, **Ivo Robic**, **Helmut Zacharias** and **Kurt Edelhagen**. **Gert Hämerling** of Schaeffers Musik writes that the song "Pepe", which gave composer **Hans Wittstatt** his first gold record, has been published in 46 countries and that over 120 recordings of the song have been made. That's it for this week in Germany.

FRANCE

The Fall season is really and truly underway. From all corners, news of all kinds is not scarce. . . . Despite the unexplained bombing of the ABC Music Hall the evening before the new show starring Sacha Distel was to start, the show went on. The first night audience came forth in tuxedos, evening gowns and the crowd included many stars. The future will tell whether there were also new songs which will count. The famous Bal Tabarin in Pigalle has also reopened and keeping step with the times, has become a rock 'n' roll center. The Pirates (Bel-Air) head the present bill and subsequent shows will feature Les Chaussettes Noires (Barclay), Vince Taylor and his Playboys (Barclay), etc. And where new discoveries are concerned, note that Jackie Seven, whose first disk on the Vogue label is on the market, promises to become the singer (so to speak) whose rock 'n' roll will make news in 1962.

Maria Candido (DDG) just made her debut at the Bobino Music Hall, co-starring with Jean-Jacques Debout. Rene Louis Lafforgue (EMI) makes his debut at the European—or shall we say he's ending there. Petula Clark, while awaiting that happy event, is continuing to record, and giving in to the present (and sometimes deplorable) trend, she is recording songs of her own composition (along with Darnal). The happy publisher of "Bougainvilliers" is Alpha publishers, in other words, Jacques Wolfsohn, who is working hard also to relaunch a tune which never had the success it deserved, "Nous les gars, nous les filles." More on this later. Petula will also wax "Calendar Girl" in French.

Leon Cabat is off on another trip, but since he refuses to divulge his destination! People are talking again about Bel-Air's star singer, Rika Zarai, and it's good things they're saying. Rika was in Scheveningen (Holland) for the huge record fest on September 30, and on October 11 she made her Paris Music Hall debut at the Olympia and meanwhile has a record session lined up for Bel-Air.

On his latest disk—recorded for Philips—Johnny Hallyday launched some rock 'n' roll with violin accompaniment. Barclay's Vince Taylor has followed suit and on his latest disk performs with the accompaniment of René Lefevre and his string orchestra. We eagerly await those rock 'n' roll recordings with Lillie Laskine providing harp accompaniment.

Ricordi has released on the Roulette label for the first time here an album featuring Louis Armstrong and Duke Ellington together. It appears that the album was issued in Paris and New York at the same time, which is also good news.

A little late but news nevertheless—Barclay announces that they will serve as distributors for Frank Sinatra's new label, "Reprise." That catchy tune, "Brigitte Bardot," has now been waxed in Polish by the "Oumpah" band. There's no doubt about it—B.B. is popular just everywhere. And more good news!—Leo Ferre is readying twelve new songs for a series of concerts at the Alhambra from November 3 to December 3 next.

Artec will issue two EP's from the films, "The Singer, Not the Song" (Top Rank) and "Romanoff and Juliet" (Odeon). The Jarmels latest issue on the same label is an EP including "Little Lonely One" and "A Little Bit of Soap" (Top Rank). Catering to both jazz and rock fans, Odeon has issued two King originals, an LP featuring the alto sax of Earl Bostic and an album called "Tenor Sax Parade" starring 14 top soloists such as Red Prysock, Willis Jackson, Sil Austin, Cliff Scott and Noble Watts, et al.

The low-price Odeon LP of Raymond Trouard (famous works by Chopin and Liszt) has established the popularity of that artist with the public and the pianist is slated for a concert at Paris' Palais de Chaillot which will be recorded and released in the same collection.

News from Chappell where everyone is well and in good health! Soula reports excellent sales of "Le Twist à St. Tropez" by Lafitte, Salvat and Morisse, which has waxings already by Les Chats Sauvages, Les Sax Succes (EMI), Les Twist (RCA). On the back of this twist, if we may so express ourselves, is a version of "Oh Boy" adapted by Pierre Salka from "I Want You To Know." Lafitte and his Sax Succes have also recorded "Je Prefere Le Twist."

Charles Trenet has begun his series of recitals at the Etoile Music Hall and they promise to keep going for quite a while. Among his new songs is one in the same vein as "L'Ame des poetes," called, "Au fil du temps perdu." It seems that with this tune Trenet is slated for another hit which for him appears to come in cycles, we might say. Among his other new creations are "Kangoorou" and "Le pauvre Antoine." People are talking about Maurice Chevalier again. Seems he's slated to record for Barclay a Chappell tune called "La petite Didi."

Orlando has recorded for Bel-Air "La plus belle fille du monde" a French adaptation of "Number 1 in the Nation" from the pens of Salvat and Morisse.

Decca's Frankie Jordan will wax "La rue des quatre vents" French version of "Let the Four Winds Blow" at his next session. Bourvil, about whom we hear little these days, added "Kilimandjaro" to his recorded repertoire and A. Popp (Fontana) as well as Los Cubancitos (Ducrete) have also recorded this one. The hearing in the Hallyday-Philips-Vogue case has been postponed for another 8 days. The judges themselves must be pleased at this 8-day respite in such a thorny case.

AUSTRALIA

Cash Box in Australia has received many complaints over the past few months from record dealers expressing grave concern over the price slashing that is evident in many sections of the record industry in this country.

Each year, under an agreement with the Record Manufacturers Association, Australian record manufacturers set aside certain "sale" periods when dealers may dispose of "stale stocks" at prices far below the regular prices for all sizes and types of discs. At the same time, record companies sell "deleted stock" to dealers at greatly reduced prices and there is a time limit during which these "record sales" may be conducted.

Cash Box has contacted many dealers on the subject of these "sales" and while the majority of the major retailers favor these sales on a definite time restriction, they are not happy about the growing practice of some dealers cutting prices on an almost constant basis. In some instances albums and EP's are being offered—at consumer level—at far below half price.

Cash Box has also received reports that some record companies continue to sell products to dealers at prices reported to be "ridiculous." While there is little documentary evidence of such actions, a tour of retail outlets in the major sales areas—and a close look at retail prices—adds great strength to the accuracy of the reports.

There is general fear that if such "foolishly low" consumer prices are allowed to continue (outside the official sales periods), it must lead to chaos in the entire industry, particularly at manufacturing, distributing and dealer levels. A recent check on dealer outlets in Sydney and Melbourne taken during the official sales period revealed a tremendous consumer interest and acceptance of lower priced disks and this demand is causing industry leaders to take a long and close look at regular retail prices. There are many record company executives who privately believe that a general lowering of the retail price structure would give the entire record industry a much needed "shot in the arm" and that the present consumer response to the low priced products could well lead to a complete revision of prices by the major labels in this country. As a comparison, here is an approximate American currency equivalent to regular Australian album prices in Australia:

Popular albums retail at an average of 52/6—equal to about \$5.50.

Classical albums retail at an average of 57/6—better than \$6.

Cash Box in Australia invites record companies and dealers to submit their thoughts, comments and suggestions on the subject of prices, price cutting and the effect they believe it can have on the industry in general.

Pye Records has issued the Santo and Johnny single of "Come September," which is now in competition to the Bobby Darin version that has been out for a few weeks on EMI's London label. Pye have also issued the Al Saxon record of the revival of "There I've Said It Again," which is reported to be getting good action in England.

Floyd Cramer, who is becoming quite a regular chart artist here, has a new single out on RCA which couples "Your Last Goodbye" with "Hang On." Floyd's singles "Last Date"; "On The Rebound" and "San Antonio Rose", have all had reasonably good success in Australia and his newie should maintain his unbeaten performance.

The day Andy Stewart arrived here he won many friends as a result of some television interviews. His Australian concert season should be a roaring success as he is certainly the hottest disk attraction to visit these shores in many a long day—in fact his record success throughout Australia has been nothing short of fantastic, his discs have not (particularly in the United States) won a great deal of support overseas and yet Stewart has come up with three top hits in a row here, together with a best selling album.

Young singing star Tony Brady (who is also on the promotion staff of the Belinda Music group of companies) has a new single out of the Leedon label that stands a great chance of chart rating. Top side is a very pretty song called "Big Things Are Happening" and the lower half is "Golden Boy." Good luck Tony—your friends throughout the trade hope you make it big with this one.

Popular Irish tenor Josef Locke is booked for an Australian concert tour towards the end of October; with Locket will be comedian Jimmy O'Dea, who played a leading role in the Walt Disney film "Darby O'Gill And The Little People." There will be other Irish acts on the same bill.

Local instrumental group The Dominoes have cut their first single for W&G Records—top side is "John Henry" coupled with "Two Brothers." The disk is issued under the terms of an agreement between W&G and Talent Promotion of Australia which is a subsidiary company of television station GTV—Channel 9 in Melbourne. Several other TPA stars are scheduled to cut singles within the next few months.

RCA Records is out with the album "Sing To Me Mr. C" by Perry Como. Perry's big adult following in Australia should assure this album of steady action.

Among the new EMI singles recently released are "Nag" by The Haloes, a strong chart rider in the United States; Karl Hammel Jr. has his "Summer Souvenirs" out on the London label and on the local front EMI has just issued (on HMV) a fabulous new single by Bryan Davies which highlights a swingin' revival arrangement of "Five Foot Two."

Jose Luis Fernández has been elected President of the Chamber of Radio of México, for the next two years, replacing Guillermo Morales. Salas will be the new secretary. And so ended the Radio Week, with assistance of the President of the Republic, Lic. Adolfo López Mateos.

The Autumn Season in the Palace of Fine Arts just began with the National Symphonic Orchestra of México under the direction of Luis Herrera de la Fuente and guest conductors Bernard Flavigny and Miguel García Mora.

Here from WBNX of New York is deejay Freddy Báez, who has a daily program in Spanish named "Caravana Musical," on which he only plays Latin music with a preference for Mexican music. Freddy came to the city to record some greetings from Mexican artists and get the latest top hits.

Concerts of Cultural Difusion is the sponsor of five concerts with the Vivaldi orchestra, which will perform at the University of México.

Cash Box received word from the 11 Zavala Brothers, who continue their tour through Europe very successfully. They are now performing in Spain. RCA expecting them soon in México to record new songs.

Rebuilt night club "Social" (now with the name of Social Ritz) will open its floor show with The Platters, due in México on October 17th to perform on the 20th. This is the third trip to México for this popular group.

After more than one month of successful performances in the city, popular American TV artist Mike Connors left town to tour other Latin countries.

Marco Antonio Muñoz, the most popular bolero singer, recorded for RCA the new Ruben Fuentes' song "Mala Ley" (Bad Law) in the same style of his latest hit, "Escándalo" (Scandal), also Rubén's composition.

From Caracas, Venezuela, another post card from young Mexican singer César Costa, who has had a wonderful reception from the teenagers of that country. Before leaving town, César cut at Orfeon Paul Anka's "Kisses On The Phone" and Gustavo Pimentel's "Caminando" (Walking). And after César completes his tour in Venezuela, another young singer Enrique Guzmán, will debut in that country.

Casetta, Bluebell, In N.Y.

NEW YORK—Tony Casetta of Bluebell, S.P.A., Milano, Italy, returned to his native city last week after a short visit to the States to contact the music trade. Mr. Casetta is a frequent visitor to these shores.

A few weeks ago Cash Box invited comments concerning a statement by Dick McFarland, Ontario disk jockey, in which he remarked that Canadian record companies were over-emphasizing Canadian recordings. Several letters were received, most of them against McFarland's views. One letter which summed up the arguments of the opposition was received from Al Allbutt of Leeds Music Canada Limited. Mr. Allbutt points out: "It is not always the case that if a record is air-worthy it will get played whether or not it is Canadian talent. There are indeed many, many Canadian records by such artists as Tommy Ambrose, Peter Appleyard, Lou Snider, Tommy Common, The Rhythm Pals, etc., who have made air-worthy recordings that are under exposed regardless of promotion." Allbutt continues by stating, "I maintain that only with constant pressure on the skeptical exposure outlets can any advance be made. Too often we have shrugged our shoulders in the belief that the Canadian public will not accept them. How wrong this is! The all-Canadian CNE grandstand show in Toronto this year adequately proved my point by breaking all previous attendance records. Has the quality of British music suffered since their Songwriters Guild pressured for more British recordings in the past couple of years (over 40%)? I don't think so. Good Canadian talent deserves to be heard. Sure there are bad Canadian records and performances, but we don't hold any monopoly in this regard." In the interest of the record industry, Cash Box will print suggestions and concrete opinions regarding Canadian recordings. It is by offering your ideas and opinions in a constructive manner will we then benefit our Canadian record industry.

Phonodisc just released a flock of new singles. Bill Fisher announced the release of "Mina Bird" b/w "Scottie" by The String-A-Longs, "Two Initials" by Ritchie Adams on Delta, "Big Red Sunset" by Hank Ballard on Regency, "You'd Better Be Sure" by Ricky Allen on Regency, and "Sweet Thing" by Jimmie Nabbie on Carlton.

Jackie Lee, Sure recording artist (label distributed by Mercury), informed Cash Box that he will be appearing in Quebec night clubs from Oct. 9 in Shawinigan Falls and wind up the circuit on Nov. 30 in St. Anne de Bellevue. His current release is "Isle Of Capri Boogie" on Mercury in Canada.

The Boulevard Cafe Michel Inc. in Montreal came up with a new publicity idea in promoting the artists appearing at its Greco-Roman lounge. Roger Landry, the owner of the club, recently pressed 1,500 records of Carmelito, Cavalier recording artist, under his own Cafe Michel label. After signing a long term engagement with Carmelito, Landry asked permission from Cavalier Records to record Carmelito. Cavalier allowed Landry to proceed on the condition that the records would be given to Cafe Michel customers only. The records are not available to dealers or any other retail outlet.

Yves Montand received a tremendous reception from his Montreal fans during his one week engagement at the St. Denis Theatre recently. Montand, who comes to Canada once a year, displayed his sensational act through fourteen performances. The showman is not only strong as a concert performer, but also rips box office sales at the movie houses. As far as recordings are concerned all his albums have been big Canadian sellers. He appears under the Columbia banner.

New Top 100 releases from Quality Records include, "I Really Love You" by The Stereos on MGM, "Moon River" by Jerry Butler on Vee Jay, "The Fly" by Chubby Checker on Parkway, "Big John" by The Shirelles on Reo, and "Bright Lights Big City" by Jimmy Reed. Bill Smitters also reports these newbies making noise, "Shenandoah" by The Deaxville Trio on Jubilee, "Sunday Kind Of Love" by The Mystics on Quality, and "Dance With A Dolly" by Damita Jo on Mercury.

A new French label just made its appearance. The label, which is owned by Olanda Music, is known as Cavalier Records. Initial releases are, "Qu'il Est Doux" b/w "Je Veux Me Promener" by Dante (these are the French versions of "Wooden Heart" and "I Want To Walk You Home), the other release is "Bambino" b/w "Scrivimi" by Carmelito.

Cavalier is being distributed by Adanac Music. Tony Choma also announced that a French rock 'n roll album has been recorded by Dante and will be released shortly. This is the first French "American style" rock 'n roll artist to come out of Canada. Currently there is a big rock 'n roll wave in France. Such artists at Johnny Hallyday, Les Chaussettes Noires, etc., are now the big record sellers in France. Whether or not this will influence the French Canadian market remains to be seen. Choma has already received an offer for distribution rights in France. Choma further informed Cash Box that he will not make a deal in France until he has tested the product here.

Capitol Records recently held a party in honor of Les Compagnons de la Chanson, Pathe recording artists. Their new release is "Marin," the French version of "Seaman." The song is currently in the No. 3 slot by Pierrette Roy on Rusticana.

Word for the Week (compliments of Jack Howard): Pack Your Grip, For the Nashville Trip.

Newsletter published by Ole Hillbilly Drifters Chuck Steiner and Hauke Struebing (in Europe) points out an area where many American country music firms are missing the boat. In their top-twenty sheet (compiled from requests sent in to the Armed Forces Network by European-stationed G.I.'s to the AFN's many country music segments) only four of the twenty disks on the list were available on European disk counters. And that includes such top items as George Jones' "Tender Years," Hank Snow's "Beggars To A King," Jim Reeves' "Stand At Your Window," Cowboy Copas' "Sunny Tennessee" and "Flat Top," Warren Smith's "Odds and Ends" and Hank Locklin's "From Here To There To You." Looks like a lot of important disk revenue is being ignored. To European country music fans it's a crucial issue not being able to get these items. Something should be done about it.

The biggest show of its kind Atlanta has seen was hosted by WGUN and station staffer Bob Gallion. To celebrate its birthday the station threw the gates to Lakewood Amusement Park open to the public all day and saw more than 53,000 people troop through to take advantage of the free rides, exhibits and food. Highlight of the day was when a capacity audience of 7,000 filled the grandstand to see performances by Red Foley, Faron Young, the Louvin Brothers, Jan Howard, Bob Luman, George Hamilton IV, June Carter and Bob Gallion. The big GUN really boomed.

DIVERSIFICATION and the NAMA CONVENTION

Is there a coin machine operator in business who hasn't given thought to entering the vending machine field? Reports from vending distributors indicate an almost daily rate of increase in the number of vending ops—a result of diversification on the part of music and games operating firms.

For the benefit of those operators who have not made the move into vending as yet, possibly because of incomplete information about this field of automatic service, may we suggest they attend the forthcoming NAMA Convention as a means of breaking the ice, so to speak.

The Chicago vending show will begin on October 28 and continue for four days. At no other time during the year will so many tradespeople learn so much in so short a time.

An almost endless stream of exhibitors will display new machines, vending products, component parts, supplies and services to 8000 trade representatives from all over the nation plus a large entourage from Europe who will attend the show and the First International Symposium, a special foreign addition to the regular convention. The trade show will probably break all existing records for attendance and, from all indications, will surpass previous efforts in every respect.

We don't know of any other business that provides its members with such detailed information pertaining to costs, profits and operating technique. Much of this information is compiled and issued through the services of the National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA) a highly qualified trade association.

While estimates of what a specific machine will gross in any given location can not always be arrived at, certainly more important figures such as cost-per-cup, profit-per-pack, and the various laws governing the sale of merchandise through machines, are all available. The NAMA show presents a fine opportunity for the coin machine operator looking for additional avenues of income.

There is no question that diversification—in this case, entry into the vending machine field—presents an attractive proposition for many operators. However, the decision rests with each individual—and this decision can only be made intelligently after a study has been made of the vending machine business.

Regardless of the final decision, no other single experience will help each operator arrive at his decision than attendance at the NAMA Convention.

Previously National Coin handled distribution solely in the southern portion of Indiana, as well as in the vast Chicago territory.

National Coin, headed by coinverts Joe Schwartz, president, and Mort Levinson, sales manager, has been responsible for the distribution of Gottlieb amusement games in this territory for many years.

Douglas W. Keough, president, is also the head of The Tower Equipment Corporation, Canada's largest distributor of Laundry and Dry Cleaning equipment.

Sugerman Reports On Europe's Coin Machine Market After Visiting 11 Countries

After A Decade Of Imports Europe Takes On The Face Of America As Markets Level Off And Competition Among Operators Grows But The Constant Addition Of New Virgin Territories Keeps Export In U.S. Limelight

Myron Sugerman, executive vice-president of Runyon International, subsidiary of Runyon Sales Company, New York, recently returned from an extended tour of the European coin machine market. CASH BOX, in its continuing effort to keep the American coin machine market abreast of export trends and developments, requested Sugerman to report in full on his trip. His country-by-country report follows.


Two years ago I visited nine countries in Europe with the intention of instituting and developing an export outlet for our (Runyon's) second-hand coin operated equipment. Since that time, Runyon has grown in the export field to the extent that today it is regarded as one of the leading exporters of coin operated equipment throughout the world. We have shipped coin operated phonographs, amusement games, vending equipment and parts to more than fifty countries throughout the world, including every continent.

On August 5, 1961, I left the United States with a different purpose in mind than the one which prompted my first trip in September 1959. My trip abroad this time had a multi-fold purpose; re-visit established accounts; develop new accounts; test the readiness of newer countries for the importation of coin operated equipment; consider the idea of exclusive representation in respective countries as against present policy of exporting to all recognized importers; test the pulse of the European market for the acceptability of vending equipment; and finally, see if any merchandise being produced in Europe had any potential for the United States.

ISRAEL

Jukes are a luxury but milk shake machines help dairy program

My first stop was Telaviv, Israel. Having a pre-knowledge regarding the economy of Israel, I knew that the idea of exporting of our equipment would be a difficult matter. Presently, the only games and music to be seen are located at the seashore resorts off of Telaviv and the equipment being operated is of considerable vintage. The potential of games and music, however, is terrific because of the social structure of this struggling nation. The people in the cities frequent cafes where Italian espresso is served. The nation is extremely music conscious and they are already producing their own phonographs and their own records, consequently if it would be possible, the juke box would find a ready market acceptance in Israel. The country itself requires items of necessity so therefore the government is only allotting dollars for material which is needed badly today to help develop the country. Games and music fall into the classification of luxury items and it is my opinion that it will be a long time before any liberalization will be enacted regarding the importation of music and games. On the other hand, it was interesting to note that on a certain boulevard in the city of Telaviv where the corner open soda fountains existed, I saw coin-operated milk shake machines located on every other corner. The operators informed me that they had purchased several hundred of these machines from an American firm on a close-out and that since the idea of vending milk through machines would serve as another outlet for Israel's abundant dairy supply, the government viewed these machines with favor. The success of these machines was hard to judge since there were several factors working against the operators: first, the availability of competent servicemen; secondly, this

was their initial effort in the area of vending operation; thirdly, the Israeli people were unfamiliar with the vending machine and its function.

GREECE

Pingames lead the way as development of interior begins

The market in Greece has been very good for the last year. The major American juke box manufacturers are all represented in Greece as well as a couple of German phonograph manufacturers. Used juke boxes from the states have been imported in large quantities during the year directly from America with some shipments being received through the Belgian importers. Pinballs are extremely popular novelties in Greece and Greek importers buy from American exporters on a disassembled basis in order to save on taxes and duties, which is levied on the gross weight of an article. The Greek importers have developed production on wooden cabinets so that pinball games from America are shipped on a complete mechanism basis less the original cabinet. The city of Athens has been nearly fully exploited in the last year since the Greek government liberalized the imports so today large Greek importers and operators are beginning to develop the interior of the country. Liberalized imports has coincided with a recent uprise in the Greek economy and further activity is anticipated in the Greek coin machine market. Some small interest is being generated in the field of drink machines.

ITALY

After eight months, bingos and uprights show promise

Today, Italy is one of the most promising markets in Europe for coin operated equipment. AMI and WURLITZER have licensee manufacturing arrangements in Italy, and there is a considerable quantity of used phonographs being imported today directly from America. In the novelty field,

bingos and certain late model uprights are enjoying fabulous success. Up to approximately eight months ago, there was very little activity in the field of games since they were ruled illegal several years ago and were not permitted to be operated in private locations. However, today the situation has been altered by legislation which permits the operation of games in private clubs with private membership. The principal importers in Italy are situated in the cities of Bologna, Milan, and Florence. Italy has a fast growing economy and its membership in the European Common Market will lend it certain economic advantages. In the area of vending, there has been very little progress.

GERMANY

Competition among ops takes on an American look

Two years ago, I visited the cities of Frankfurt, Berlin, Hamburg and Bremen. This time I reduced my visit to Munich and Hamburg. Today, the operating conditions in certain areas in Germany are equal to the conditions which many operators are combatting today in America. The increased competition among operators in Germany today has led to location loans and for the most part a 60-40 take, however, I met operators who were giving 50-50, depending upon the quality of the location. Germany has been actively engaged in the coin machine trade since 1952 and today, there is very little virgin territory left, and the only virgin territory to be found is located in the country, and the quality of these stops are not lucrative enough to attract operators to operate in these small remote villages and country locations.

No Sign of Competition with American Juke Box


There are approximately six German domestic juke box manufacturers who compete with the importers of new and used American made machines on the basis of a lower price factor. Although the Germans are renowned for technical skill, as of yet they have not produced a juke box that compares with any American machine. However, many people in our industry in Europe feel that within two or three years the quality of the German made juke boxes will command the attention of the American market.

Although there are many reports stating that the juke box market in Germany is at a saturated level, nevertheless there is still large volume of American made second hand juke boxes that are being shipped directly from the States or being transhipped by the Belgian importers. One of the general importers in Hamburg offered the following explanation to this paradox. There is a German law that states that on the purchase of a new article, the best discount that a manufacturer may grant its customer for a cash purchase is 3% off list price. Consequently, since this is true than the discount granted is not sufficient enough to satisfy the operator so therefore there is still a healthy mar-



ket for used American equipment (late model merchandise) in Germany. The progress of the German market today is to a point that when a German distributor sells a brand new unit, he is obliged to take in a used machine on trade. As a result of being required to take used machines on trade, the German distributor has been compelled to find a wholesale export outlet for his second hand equipment. These distributors have followed the pattern established in America by American distributors and today are attempting to negotiate business with the Scandinavian countries, Austria, Yugoslavia, etc.

Pertaining to the game market, Germany still represents a very good market for late Gottlieb and Williams pin ball games. Albert Adickes of Nova-Apparate, Hamburg, Germany, general Rock-ola Distributor for Europe and Gottlieb Distributor for Germany is the man responsible for the success of flipper games in Germany. He has been importing flipper games into Germany for more than ten years, and today flipper games are the basic equipment for the arcades. Slot machines are legal, however, this is a market confined to the German manufacturers. The type of machine to be found is a wall machine which pays out a maximum one Deutsch mark or what is equivalent to 25 American cents.

Three or four years ago Germany was a fantastic outlet for used American shuffle bowlers however slightly more than two years ago, the market terminated. Since that time, there has been a very limited market on shuffle bowlers, and the demand today is filled through the Belgian importers. Also, three years ago Germany was buying large numbers of bowling alleys however this market has also come to nearly a halt and only a select

number of games are being shipped today.

Ops Moving Into Vending

In Germany today, the large music and game operators are moving into the vending field. Albert Adickes, who operates as well as manufactures and distributes, has an outstanding vending operation in a ship building factory which accommodates 15,000 people. Successful operations such as these serve as examples, and other music and game operators are anxious to exploit this relatively new field.

In the way of new ideas, several German importers are specializing in constructing console model juke boxes, made from the complete mechanism of both new and used American machines. They buy the units completely dismantled from the States and construct console cabinets in which they place the actual juke box mechanism. These console type juke boxes are being placed into more sophisticated type of locations that would not normally accept a commercial juke box, on the basis that the juke box would not conform to the mood of the establishment. However, they install wall-boxes in the locations and the unit functions in the same manner as a hideaway unit except the machine is situated on the floor and is an accepted piece of furniture. It must be mentioned at this point for clarification that this idea is not the same thing as background music, however, background music is definitely found on the German market.

It must be said that the German coin machine industry should be commended for their operators' associations and their distributors' associations. Their associations are strong and unified and have been outstanding in serving the coin machine industry in general. These associations have

strong public relation programs and have done a good job to maintain the respect of the industry.

SCANDINAVIAN COUNTRIES

Denmark

The City of Copenhagen is the port of distribution for the Scandinavian countries. There are three or four important distributors and importers who feed off of the coin machine manufacturers situated in Hamburg and re-ship to the other Scandinavian markets. In Denmark itself, very little second hand American music is being imported. The greatest emphasis is on brand new American juke boxes and certain brand new German made phonographs. The market is rather limited as a result of a relatively small national population of four million. Today in Denmark, the trend is towards the importing of pin ball games, limited quantities of shuffle bowlers and bowling alleys. For a certain period of time, the operation of slot machines was legitimate however today, they are only being operated in the arcade areas, such as can be seen in the famous Tivoli Amusement Center, on a token pay-out basis which have a gift surrender value.

In the field of vending, Copenhagen is blanketed with a considerable number of outdoor vending equipment that vends anything from cigarettes to herring. The vending machines themselves are manufactured in Denmark. Since retail stores in Denmark close at a comparatively early hour, there is strong dependence on vending machines by the public.

Interstate Buys Brass Rail; Stock Swap Estimated At \$12 Million

CHICAGO—Interstate Vending Company confirmed reports last week that it has purchased Brass Rail, Inc. through an exchange of stock (CB Oct. 14 p58). Ronald Wolff, Interstate president, made the announcement after the trade had learned of the expected move via other channels. Estimated value of the stock is more than \$12 million.

Wolff declined to state the number of shares to be issued for Brass Rail, a privately held company, but a source reportedly close to the company indicated that about 317,000 Interstate Vending shares would be issued. At the close on Friday (10/13) Interstate's shares were quoted at

\$39.75 bid in over-the-counter trading.

Brass Rail's annual sales are estimated at \$16 million from its snack bar operations, food facilities in industrial restaurant chain plants, and its airline catering service. Interstate's sales last year were \$42,600,000.

"Audit-In-Route" Handles Currency And Coin

CHICAGO—In order to fill the special needs of certain vending machine operating firms, a new "Audit-In-Route" unit that handles currency as well as coin has been introduced by Johnson Fare Box Company. This model has a locked vault door with a revolving slot for depositing currency received during route stops, thus eliminating the need for routemen to carry large sums of money on their persons.

The route man records each deposit on the "A-I-R" Revenue Receipt bearing the machine-stamped record of coin collected from that location. The vault is unlocked only at route headquarters, where currency is counted and compared with the Location Revenue Receipts.

"Audit-In-Route" was developed to reduce coin-handling and bookkeeping errors and expense, cut labor costs, and speed detection and repair of erratic vending machines.

The "A-I-R" sorts, counts and locks up coins while the route man drives, printing duplicate Location Revenue Receipts. Inventory records on these cards eliminate ledger-card posting. On-the-route comparison of stock sold with revenue received quickly detects short collections in time for "same-day" repair of faulty vending machines.

Ruud-Melikian Aids Ops

HATBORO, PA.—Vending operators whose Brew-A-Cup coffee vending machines were damaged by hurricane Carla or Esther now can turn to Rudd-Melikian, Inc. here for emergency service. "Damaged Brew-A-Cup machines" may be returned to the plant here for repair work at factory cost," reports Grant Strohm, sales finance manager.

Waukesha Names Shargel

CHICAGO—Hyman Gale, president of the Waukesha Springs Brew Co., Inc., this city, has announced the appointment of Jack Shargel as director of sales. Shargel was recently sales manager of the Al Green Vending Co. Waukesha is marketing a new non-alcoholic beer in bottles and cans and a vending machine sales program has been set. Shargel reportedly has experience in both the beer and vending businesses.

New Tea By Continental



CHICAGO — A free-flow Instant Vending Powdered Tea has been introduced by Continental Coffee Company, Chicago.

NAMA's Intl. Segment Will Offer Tips On Vending Tea, Beer, Cosmetics In Schools, Shipyards, Outdoors; Heavy Attendance Seen

CHICAGO — Panel discussions and talks on unusual vending methods around the world, how U.S.A.-style vending operates in other countries, and methods of exporting American vending equipment will be presented at the First International Vending Symposium in Chicago, October 31.

"The American vending industry has aroused much interest in foreign countries because of its many innovations and growth in recent years," NAMA President, Thomas B. Donahue said. By contrast, several European countries are using advanced methods in other areas of automatic selling. Thus, both overseas and American vending executives will benefit from this exchange of ideas, he added.

Several hundred overseas vending executives already have registered for the International Vending Symposium which will take place at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, October 31, according to Jack Low, Wittenborg, Inc., Chairman of the International Vending Symposium Committee.

Low said Donahue will open the international meet at 9:00 a.m. with a welcoming address for international guests. Responding for overseas delegates will be Mr. E. Gonin, Switzerland, overseas vending expert for the Nestle Company.

The remainder of the morning session will be devoted to two consecutive panel discussions, each followed by a period for audience discussion and participation.

The first morning panel, "How U.S.A.-Style Vending Operates in Other Countries," will present operations in other parts of the world based on vending operations where a vending company services and owns the equipment.

Following is a list of panelists and the subjects they will cover:

"Tea Vending in England" — Mr. Norman Ditchburn, chairman, The Ditchburn Organization, London, England.

"Outdoor Cigarette Vending and Cosmetic Vending in England" — Mr. Robert Gooda, managing director, Automat Ltd., Beckenham, Kent, England.

"Full-Line Vending in Shipyards in Sweden and Other Scandinavian Countries" — Mr. P. A. Atterbom, president, Pan-Nordic Automation, Saeroe, Sweden.

"Vending in Schools" and "Beer Vending" — Mr. Frank Bart, managing director, West Indies Vendors, Ltd., Kingston, Jamaica.

"Soft Drink Vending in the Pacific Islands" — Mr. Tom Higa, vice president, Yonagusuku Beverage Company, Naha, Okinawa.

The second morning panel discussion is entitled "Unusual Vending Methods Around the Globe." It will be

devoted to the presentation of vending methods not usually found in America.

Panelists and their topics are: "Taxiphones" and "Parcel Lockers in Paris" — Mr. Paul du Chayla, president, S.A.A.F.A., Paris, France. (Taxiphones are token telephones operated in France. The parcel lockers are unusual types, utilizing timing devices.)

"Store Front Vending in Italy" and "Problems of Municipal Licensing in Italy" — Mr. Alessandro G. d'Anna, Vend System, Milan, Italy.

"Store Front Vending and Inplant Food Services in Switzerland" — Mr. Edy Faessler, Faessler Automaten, A. G., Zurich, Switzerland.

"Automatic Public Restaurants and Outdoor Vending in Holland" — Mr. J. M. Scheeren, president, N. V. Eumatic, Kaalheide, Holland.

The morning International Vending Symposium program will end at 11.45 a.m.

The afternoon program beginning at 2:00 p.m. is intended only for manufacturers of equipment and products as well as for the benefit of international guests. Its purpose is to exchange information on importing equipment or products from the U.S.A., according to Mr. Low.

The program includes two presentations:

"Licensing as a Method of Exporting Equipment From the U.S.A." — Mr. Dwight Hightower, international attorney and export specialist, Baker, McKenzie & Hightower, Chicago, Illinois, an international law firm with offices in Europe and South America.

"Solving Problems of Exporting U.S.A. Vending Equipment to Other Countries" — (A panel workshop presenting typical American manufacturers who will discuss current export problems, solutions, ideas.)

The International Vending Symposium will adjourn at 4:00 p.m., October 31.

The following day (November 1), foreign delegates will be taken on a tour of typical vending and manufacturing installations in Chicago.

The purpose of the international meeting is three-fold:

First, to exchange ideas and know-how about vending as a marketing method with vending executives from foreign countries; second, to create further export markets for American vending machine manufacturers, and third, to better acquaint businessmen of other countries with the American economic and distribution system.

The first three days of the Convention will be devoted to American vending with the exhibit of the latest automatic vending equipment and discussion panels and industry meetings at McCormick Place and the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Sweden and Norway

Mr. Hans Siesbye, Oscar Siesbye Company, informed me that Sweden has been importing since the end of the war and today is nearly totally saturated market. Mr. Siesbye, whose firm is the Scandinavian Distributors for AMI, commented that the coin machine market in Norway hit its saturation point several years ago.

FINLAND

In the last couple of years, there has been some activity in the field of coin operated equipment. Finland has liberalized its imports to a great extent, however, musical articles or anything pertaining to the music field remains in the last 20% import restrictions where import licenses are required. These licenses are very difficult to obtain and they present themselves as a problem. As in the other Scandinavian countries, pin ball games are the popular novelties with the growing interest in shuffle bowlers and bowling alleys.

HOLLAND

I visited Rotterdam, Bergen Op Zoom, and The Hague on this visit. Holland, similar to Belgium, is specializing in bingos and music. One particular point of interest in Holland is the increasing interest in arcades. Mr. Rudy Hommerson, president of Hommerson Amusements, The Hague, opened an arcade on Scheveningen last year and overnight it developed into one of the biggest arcade successes in all of Europe. (See photo.) Mr. Hans Vandendop, shop foreman for Runyon Sales Company was originally

from The Hague and got his start with Hommerson Amusements. Mr. Hommerson purchased 85% of his arcade merchandise last year from Runyon on the strength of Runyon's recommendations. The arcade turned out to be such a fabulous success that Mr. Hommerson is presently negotiating for the opening of two more arcades by the Spring of 1962. Hommerson's Sportland is a credit to the industry. The merchandise is maintained in excellent working condition by three skilled mechanics, who are present at all times. The merchandise is properly displayed, and the arcade imposes a generally pleasant and clean impression that automatically commands the public's attention. Mr. Jacob Vandendop, father of Hans Vandendop, is the morning supervisor of the arcade, and he advises that he is proud of his son's discretion in selection of choice arcade equipment.

HOLLAND TURNS TO VENDING

Holland is very progressive in the field of coin automation and has begun to take an interest in drink and coffee machines. Firms who are presently engaged in the music and game industry are beginning to notice the vending field and its tremendous potential. Certain American manufacturers have shipped new vending equipment into Holland in the last year and the market is just being exploited.

Contrary to conditions in the United States, the operation of cigarette machines is not a very profitable field. The profit factor in the operation of cigarettes is not great enough. Profit on a pack of cigarettes is as little as 1 and 1½ American cents. This condition not only exists in Holland, but in Belgium, Germany, England, and every other European country as well. The explanation offered is that the

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government controls the cigarette industry and at the same time the pricing. Consequently, the cigarette operator is in no position to compete with the retail stores where tobacco and tobacco articles are sold.

BELGIUM

The city of Antwerp remains as the hub and center for all activity in the coin operated industry throughout Europe. According to history, at the end of World War II, the United States was indebted to Belgium. Consequently, Belgium had a decisive ad-

vantage because it could import immediately as a result of its credit rating with America. The ambitious Belgians took advantage of this situation and by the early 1950's, they were the undisputed leaders in the coin machine field throughout Europe. They established the structure of the industry for Europe. The large Antwerp and Brussels importers maintained transit warehouses in the ports of Antwerp and served as brokers by re-shipping merchandise to wholesalers throughout Europe. Today, there are more than thirty importers located throughout Belgium who are active and engage in trans-shipping as well as direct importation for consumption in Belgium itself. Although Belgium is a country of ten million people, there are reported to be more than thirty thousand locations. Besides the existence of approximately thirty importers, it is said that there are nearly five hundred operators. Bingos are the only important novelties with natural interest in arcade equipment by the owners of the arcades located at the seashore resorts. Belgium is so remarkably bingo conscious that Belgian wholesalers are compelled to break up older bingo models that are still in usage today

in the United States. Phonographs are being sold directly to the locations today by the importers of brand new machines. The margin of profit is quite small in music that the only reason an operator handles music is because he wants to accommodate a good bingo stop. There are reports that state approximately 40%-50% of the locations in Belgium (and in Holland) today own their own juke boxes.

FRANCE

Pingames alter the French cafe image

During the last 6 months, France completely liberalized its import restrictions and today there is an outstanding market for pin ball games. Cafes, that were by tradition characteristically French, have been altered in appearance and mode by the introduction of American pin ball machines. There are four or five principal importers in France today, however a great deal of the importing is handled out of Belgium as the Belgian general importers stock equipment in transit warehouses and offer immediate delivery service. Bowling is just catching on today in France as a result of increase exploitation of the French market by Brunswick and AMF.

In the field of music, the French have developed a machine called Scopitone which reminds the old timers of a Mills machine that was on the American market twenty years ago. The unit is a combined television and juke box. The machine operates on one new French franc (equivalent to twenty American cents) and a film appears on a television screen attached to the juke box in conjunction to the recording. Its concept is novel and has only been on the French market for less than eight months.

ENGLAND

A leveling off as industry turns to standard equipment

The market in England has finally reached its leveling off point. Two years ago, when I had visited England for the first time, there was a great deal of talk and discussion regarding import restriction removals and the revision of the gaming laws. Beginning with 1960 there was considerable activity in fruit machines. Two years later, the novelty of slot machines or fruit machines as they are known in England, has decreased and the emphasis today is on equipment such as juke boxes, pin balls, arcade equipment, shuffle bowlers, bowling alleys, etc. The English operators today are advancing into the field of vending with in-plant feeding becoming an important industry. Although vending is considered in its stages of infancy, many wise operators and businessmen are beginning to recognize the vast potential in vending.

In the field of music, England was exploited with juke boxes more than seven years ago when AMI established licensee arrangements with Bal-AMI. In talking with several English distributors, I learned that a limited amount of juke boxes that were produced under this BAL-AMI era, are now being exported to British Commonwealth countries throughout the world.

From a social slant on the English way of life, the British pubs and taverns have not been radically altered by the introduction of American games except that instead of "darts" the Englishman has familiarized himself with Bally "All Star Bowlers," Williams "Ten Strike Bowlers," small ball bowling alleys, etc. The general opinion is that these games are definitely more competitive. Games in England today are operated on a sixpence or half of a shilling (equivalent to 7 American cents).

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

SUMMARY

European operations working on reduced percentage, better than average volume, but high equipment costs

What can be said about the industry in general in America can be generally noted of the industry in Europe. Increased competition amongst operators naturally means a reduced net percentage. The important difference to be seen is in the nature of importance of the locations themselves. The cafes, taverns, and pubs represent the essence of social life in European countries, and these locations have not been marred by television or other obstacles working against the operators. Consequently the undistracted public makes for a better income in the machines. However, what we take for granted and what means a great deal to the Europeans is that the cost of their equipment is a great deal higher than what we pay here in America as a result of freight charges, customs, taxes, duties, etc. The European market is extremely significant to the American coin machine industry as it helps not only the manufacturer, and the distributor but the operator as well. The foreign market has enabled the industry to develop newer ideas by consuming terrific amounts of our second hand merchandise and giving everybody more freedom of movement.

The vending field in Europe is in its infancy today and within the next couple of years its potential will be unlimited. It is the responsibility now of the manufacturers and the distributors to make a concerted effort to develop this market by educating these people in the ways of vending and helping them to develop by teaching them and showing them sound vending methods.

United Ships "7 Star" Bwlr., "Stardust" Shuffle

CHICAGO—C. B. (Bill) DeSelm, vice president in charge of sales for the Chicago-based United Manufacturing Company, heralded the introduction of an exciting, new duo of coin-operated bowling games, when he announced the release to the coin machine trade this week of United Manufacturing's "Seven Star" big ball bowling alley and "Stardust" shuffle alley bowler.

Although both games are, as DeSelm expressed it, "loaded with cabinet beauty and play inducing features," most prominently mentioned is the singular fact that there are seven play-appealing ways to play both "Seven Star" bowler and "Stardust" shuffle alley.

The seven bowling games revealed by DeSelm are: The recently introduced "Flash Scores," the "Progressive" scoring game, "All Strikes," "Advance" scoring, "Mystery Spares" (another recent United bowling innovation), "Regulation" bowling, and the new "Bonus" scoring game being introduced in "Seven Star" and "Stardust."

In the new "Bonus" bowling game, emphasis is placed on the fact that the bowler receives an extra shot at the bowling pins in each frame, from the first through the ninth frames (exclusive of the tenth frame) each time he makes a strike. A skilled player can make 21 strikes in "Bonus" bowling. A perfect score for this game is 570 points. Other than that the game is played like "Regulation" bowling.

In "Flash Scores" bowling (in both

new games) traveling lights across the playfield, just in front of the bowling pins, and on the pinhood above the pins register changing values of strikes and spares. This game has evinced much interest from distributors and operators, according to DeSelm.

DeSelm asserted that "Advance" scoring and "Progressive" bowling have achieved such success in so many locations that it is not necessary to explain their features in detail to most game operators. Top score in "Advance" is 7800 points and top score in "Progressive" is 9900 pins.

In "All Strikes" bowling strike values for each are 300 points. The top score is 3600 pins. In "All Spares" bowling the spare "pin set-up" changes for every shot at the pins. Each spare value is 300, and the top score a bowler can attain is 3600 points, as in "All Strike."

Finally, "Regulation" bowling which has always been widely accepted by players through the years ever since United Manufacturing introduced its first coin-operated bowling alley and shuffle alley bowler, adheres to the standard American Bowling Congress (ABC) rules of playing and scoring. A perfect score in "Regulation" is 300 pins.

The "Seven Star" bowling alley is shipped to distributors in 13 foot lengths and 16 feet, with 4 1/2 foot sections available for further expansion in size.
