This week, through the release of a new album called the "All Star Festival," the record industry and some of its leading international recording stars (seen above) have joined hands to raise funds for an extremely deserving cause. All profits and royalties from this LP will be turned over to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees whose task it is to aid refugees throughout the world in the name of the international community. The record has no label identification and features all new recordings specially donated for this album. The record is being pressed by Mercury Records and will be distributed through all Mercury, Smash and Philips distributors to retailers throughout the U.S. The record will also be distributed through the Capitol and Columbia Record Clubs to their members. And all mail order requests stemming from extensive radio and television spots will be handled through the Columbia Club. The record will sell at \$3.98 (mono) and \$4.98 (stereo). The Storz chain of radio stations has donated a minimum of \$50,000 worth of air time to advertise the album. This is a world-wide record industry effort and the recording will be made available internationally through the Philips Record Companies.







## NARM CONVENTION 1963

The first of 1963's major record industry association conventions takes place beginning this Sunday (Mar. 3) when NARM (National Association of Record Merchandisers), the rack-jobber association, meets for a five day session (Mar. 3-7) at the Fairmont Hotel in San Francisco.

It was only four years ago that NARM staged its first convention, and in that short period of time the association has become a major factor in the record industry.

The association has done a magnificent job of bringing recognition to its members and their importance to the record industry. And it has done so in a business-like manner, regardless of the obstacles it was forced to hurdle at the onset.

The association made its gains by not pulling any punches. With the aid of a most capable spokesman in its executive secretary, Jules Malamud, NARM has always laid its cards on the table. And after each convention, every manufac-

turer knew exactly what the jobber had in mind.

Some manufacturers were willing to appreciate these requests and others were not. But all returned from NARM conventions with respect for a group of individuals who were putting-up a good fight for the right to make gains for themselves and their businesses in a highly competitive and rapidly changing industry.

Through panel discussions, conferences and hospitality suites, manufacturers and jobbers again will state their cases in San Francisco this year. And as has been the case in the past, it will probably be another informative, interesting and productive convention.

No doubt, once again, one of the prime subjects for discussion will be the definition of a rack-jobber—is he or is he not a distributor.

Attendance is already at an all time high for this year's meet and it will be *Cash Box*' pleasure to report on the events once again.

# NARM Meet Readies Trade For Hello, Frisco, Hello

PHILADELPHIA—The attention of the entire disk industry is being turned to San Francisco, where the 1963 fifth annual convention of the National Association of Record Merchandisers will be held next week (3-7), at the Fairmont Hotel.

Jules Malamud, NARM executive director, in releasing the list of advance registrants, noted that it would be the largest industry aggregation ever to attend an annual NARM meeting.

The NARM Convention Committee, under the chairmanship of Alvin M. Driscoll, has directed its efforts to constructing a convention program which will give the industry registrants opportunities for "real progress" in solving their mutual problems, as they seek "The Key to 1963," the convention theme. The business sessions, on Monday and Tuesday morning, March 4 and 5, will hear manufacturing and merchandising execs as speakers and panel participants, leading off with Goddard Lieberman, president of Columbia Records, as the keynote speaker. Further opportunity for manufacturer-merchandise discussion, on a more private level, will be afforded convention registrants, as the NARM regular members visit with the Associate Members in the convention Exhibit Hall, on Monday and Tuesday afternoons, March 4 and 5, and all day Wednesday, March 6.

The 1962 NARM Awards, the record rack merchandisers' "Oscars," will be presented to the winning artists and companies at the NARM Awards Banquet, on Wednesday evening, March 6. The affair will see four recording stars entertaining the guests: Capitol's Kingston Trio, Columbia's Tony Bennett, Victor's Peter Nero, and Warner Brothers' Allan Sherman. Lou J. Kustas (Toy House of Hudson Valley, Poughkeepsie,

N. Y.) served as chairman of the NARM Awards Committee, and Cecil H. Steen (Recordwagon, Inc., Boston, Mass.) served as chairman of the NARM Awards Banquet Committee.

Other social events include cocktail parties by Capitol, Columbia, Liberty, and Warner Brothers; a recording session party with Homer and Jethro, sponsored by Victor; and a champagne breakfast party hosted by NARM, and featuring entertainment by Jubilee's Rusty Warren, who will present a mink stole from Jubilee's Jerry Blaine to one of the wives at the convention.

Two special parties are also planned for the largest contingent of wives ever to attend a NARM convention: an Oriental Fashion Show and luncheon, sponsored by Ambassador Records; and a Tour of San Francisco, with luncheon at The Trident, in Sausalito, sponsored by Miller International Company.

## Mercury Adds 3 Sales Regions Under New Management Concepts

CHICAGO—Mercury is putting new management concepts into effect with the expansion of its regional sales program from five to eight regions, and the addition of three new regional sales promotion managers.

Heading the new regions will be Bob Richardson of Charlotte, N.C., formerly with Columbia Records, who will handle the Southeast territory; Ernie Johnson, formerly for Coda Distributors in Minneapolis, who will headquarter in Des Moines, Iowa, and handle the Northern Midwest territory; and Chic Silvers of Baltimore, in charge of the Middle East region.

Kenny Meyers, veep in charge of sales, explained that the expanded program is designed to let the regional men become more deeply involved, in a more consolidated territory, in all phases of marketing.

"The end result," Myers said, "will be far stronger management in the field. The regional men, rather than performing just sales and administrative functions, will now have the knowledge and authority to act on policy decisions and management matters in all areas of marketing, sales promotion and merchandising. Concentration in smaller regions will allow each man to more fully carry out the complete marketing functions, and will add greatly to the efficiency of the entire Mercury selling organization."

Mercury's other five regions are handled by George Hays of Boston; Fred Katz of Pittsburgh; Bob Kryl of Dallas; Glen Miller of Chicago and Tom Bonetti of Los Angeles.

The regional force met in Chicago on Feb. 15, at which time Dick Bruce, Mercury's national sales manager in charge of the regional sales managers, outlined the operation of the new territorial arrangement.

The meeting also covered presentation of the new February 15 release, including the "Three Ring Circus" sales plan and the "Mercury Hootenanny" folk album collection, plans for cooperative advertising and a discussion of distributor performance.

Also participating in the meeting were Irwin Steinberg, executive vice-president; Morris Diamond, national promotion manager; Lou Reizner, sales manager for folk and jazz, and Harry Kelly, Mercury-Wing sales manager.

## C-P's Sales, Earnings Set New Highs in '62

PHILADELPHIA—Net sales and earnings of Cameo-Parkway Records reached an all-time high in '62, Bernie Lowe, the label's prexy, reported last week.

For the year ending Dec. 31, net sales were \$7,656,987, up from 1961's total of \$3,804,048. Net income increased from \$490,553 in '61 to

\$949,805 for the new period. Based on 605,500 shares of C-P common (Class A Common Stock and Class B Common Stock combined) now outstanding, this represents an increase in net per share earnings from 81¢ per share for '61 to \$1.57 per share for 1962. Class A Common stock is listed on the American Stock Exchange.

## Philips Debuts "Connoisseur" LP's; March Plan

CHICAGO—A new LP series, designed to appeal to the connoisseur record buyer, will be introduced March 1 by Philips Records. Series bows with new Mar. LP's and sales program (see below).

Called the "Connoisseur Collection," the new albums will feature diskings from around the world, utilizing authentic material normally not available on records, and will be presented in a deluxe package.

The first two albums in the series are "Songs and Sounds of Faraway Places," featuring authentic native music, dances and sounds performed by actual natives in places such as the Congo, Corsica, Nigeria, Pakistan and Indonesia; and "Paris Recital" by famed French singer Yves Montand singing entirely in French.

The "Connoisseur Collection" package, designed to give immediate identification to the series, is a double-fold, one-record album, with a profusely illustrated portfolio bound inside giving complete pictorial and written background on the particular album.

Printed in striking black and white, the covers have golden seal identifying them as being in the Connoisseur Collection, and are packed in a removable pliofilm cover.

## U.S. Exports Require New Form After July 1

NEW YORK—The disk trade should be aware that all shipments leaving the U.S. after July 1, 1963 are required to be accompanied by the revised U.S. Export Declaration. Shipments not accompanied by the revised form (Form 7525-V Alternate Revised) will be held at the U.S. Port of Exit. Form number remains the same and may be obtained from local Custom Houses of public stationers.

"The new series is designed to offer a really different, high quality product in a unique package, yet will sell at the regular classical product price structure instead of at a premium price," Lou Simon, sales manager, explained. Suggested list price for the albums is \$4.98-\$5.98.

Future plans for the series include an album by Jacqueline Franco, French singer; and one presenting songs of faith from around the world.

Two new classical albums also are included in the Philips March 1 release. They are Pablo Casals, dean of the world's cellists and a White House favorite, playing "Trio No. 7 and Archduke Trio by Beethoven;" and a two-record album of great baritone Gerard Souzay singing "Schubert Winterreise."

Pop selections are: Trio Los Paraguayos, the popular Latin group, with "Songs and Dances of Latin America;" Jimmy Day, steel guitarist playing with an orchestral background on "Steel and Strings;" The Springfields, well-known English group of "Silver Threads and Golden Needles" fame, singing old and new American folk songs on "Folk Songs from the Hills;" and Roy Castle, English singer who has been a frequent featured guest on the Garry Moore television show, with "Newcomer!"

Sales plan for the Mar. 1 release offers a 10 per cent discount program on the new LP release and the Philips catalog. The plan will be in effect from March 1 through April 15.

## 46% of Radio-TV Phono Combinations Produced in '62 Had FM Stereo

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Nearly 46 per cent of all radio-TV combinations and radio-phono combinations produced in 1962 were capable of receiving FM stereo broadcasts, according to the Electronic Industries Association.

Output of combinations totaled 1,677,385 last year, of which 767,539 contained FM stereo capability. Of 296,816 radio-TV combinations produced, 162,208—or 54.65 per cent—could receive FM stereo, while 605,331 radio-phono combinations out of the total output of 1,380,569—or 43.85 per cent—were capable of receiving the new broadcast medium (see story in last week's issue on new sales highs reached in phono-radio purchases in '62).

NEW YORK—After earlier certification by the RIAA, Johnny Mathis was presented with eight gold disks—representing the sales of \$1 million or more on eight albums—backstage at the Copacabana, this city, where the star songster just concluded a personal appearance. Presentations took place last week (18), with Dave Kapralik, pop A&R head in the east for Columbia Records, handing the gold disks to the performer. The eight albums are: "Johnny's Greatest Hits," "More Johnny's Greatest Hits," "Heavenly," "Faithfully," "Merry Christmas," "Warm," "Swing Softly" and "Open Fire, Two Guitars." Performer begins a 3-week engagement at the Riviera in Las Vegas next week (4).

## Darin's TM, Inc. Buys Cside-Burton Pubberies

NEW YORK—Bobby Darin's newly-formed disk production firm, TM, Inc., has purchased the four major publishing firms owned by Joe Cside and Ed Burton for a reported \$500,000.

The purchase includes the Cside-Burton BMI firms, Trinity Music, Adaris Music and Edgar Music, as well as the ASCAP firm, Towne Music, plus the pair's full share of Burton Music Ltd (England), Trinity Musikverlag (Germany, Austria and Switzerland) and Trinity Music Pty. Ltd. (Australia and New Zealand).

Cside and Burton were represented in negotiations by Lewis Dreyer of Feinman & Dreyer, while Ed Blau of the Pacht, Ross & Warner office in Hollywood represented Darin.

The deal does not include any of the other properties and organizations in which Cside and Burton were partners. These include the talent management organization, Cside, Burton & Schuster, Inc.

Burton will continue to direct the activities of Trinity, Adaris, Edgar and Towne for Darin as veep of TM and general manager of its pubbery activities (Burton signed a long-term employment pact with Darin simultaneously with the sale of the catalogues).

Cside has not finalized his own plans for the immediate future. He does intend to continue the talent management organization he founded, and will announce other plans in the near future.

Trinity was founded in 1953 by Cside in partnership with vet pubbery execs George & Eddie Joy. In 1954, Cside bought the firm from the Joys, set-up Towne and formed an association with Charlie Grean and Ed

## Columbia Marketing Changes Brings Glancy, Loetz To New Posts

NEW YORK—Norman Adler, executive vice president of Columbia Records, has announced the reorganization of two of the diskery's most important marketing groups: Columbia Records Sales Corp. and Columbia Record Distributors.

Kenneth Glancy has been transferred and will assume the responsibility of the Columbia Records Sales Corp. as vice president. Glancy will be responsible for the label's sales and merchandising programs through distributors and branches. Prior to this appointment, Glancy headed up Columbia's wholly owned distributing branches. Glancy joined Columbia in 1952 as a district sales manager in the mid-west and has been in charge of Columbia's distributing corporation for the past five years.

Jack Loetz has been appointed general manager of the Columbia Record Distributors and in his new position will be responsible for the management of Columbia's 13 company branches located in major marketing areas throughout the United States. Prior to his new appointment, Loetz was director of sales for the Columbia Records Sales Corp. Loetz joined Columbia in 1955 and had been in his present position for the past three years. Both Loetz and Glancy will report to William P. Gallagher, Columbia's vice president of marketing.

In commenting on this appointment, Gallagher stated: "This change of leadership in these two vital marketing areas will serve further to consolidate our efforts to meet the marketing challenges of the future."

## Dealer Relates Anti-Club Crusade At Chi Hearings

CHICAGO—A crusade to have all disk clubs abolished was outlined by a dealer last week at a continuation in the Windy City of the FTC's anti-trust suit against the Columbia Record Club.

The dealer was J. E. Metcalf of the Metcalf Record Shop in Fayetteville, Ark., who testified at the opening session last Mon. (18) [Ed. Note: Because of the earlier deadline for last week's issue, this report only includes the first day's testimony; see next week for remaining testimony].

Lengthy questioning and cross examination by FTC counsels Lavine and Needleman and Columbia attorney Sokolow revealed that the irate dealer wrote letters to Goddard Lieberston, Glen Wallichs and George Marek urging them to do away with their respective record clubs and give the business back to the independent record dealer. Metcalf also stated that as a member of SORD (Society of Record Dealers) he urged the organization to instigate proceedings against the clubs to have them abolished. This case was dismissed with prejudice and Metcalf was asked by SORD's president to resign for recommending its members to boycott the companies that operated clubs.

Metcalf felt that he was being treated so badly by the clubs that he severed all business relations with the distributors of Columbia, Victor and Capitol, and now buys a minimum of their products from one-stops. The dealer was so infuriated by the clubs that he accused them of having been the cause of discount houses springing up throughout the area.

Andrew Collins, record manager for Grinnell Brothers, a chain operation in the middle West, and Donald J. Winograd of the Roseland Music Shop in Chicago followed Metcalf and reiterated many of the remarks made by the Philadelphia dealers the week before. The latter dealers testified that they believed some of the discount houses in the mid-West (Sears for example) were able to buy direct from the manufacturer and resell at a price below any they could meet.

The closing of the first day's testimony in Chicago reflected a general pattern that has been followed since the case opened. The dealers are unhappy with the clubs for siphoning off their business, the distributors are somewhat in the middle, and the record clubs themselves proclaim they are providing a beneficial service to the general public. The independent labels that distribute through the club are satisfied with existing agreements, and those who are not participating in club distribution would like to be.

## ARMADA Convention Dates Set: July 24th, 25th In Chicago

NEW YORK—ARMADA, the distrib organization, has set July 24, 25 as the dates for its gathering this year at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago.

With increased membership on both label and distrib levels, plans call for a discussion at the meet on the possibility of forming an advisory group of label-distrib within the association.

Also announced were new members, six firms in both the manufacturer and distrib segments of the industry. New manufacturer members, who have joined the roster as associate members, include ABC-Paramount, Warner Bros. Records, Monument Records and Hickory Records. New distrib members are Chips Distributing of Philadelphia and Andy Huffine of Seattle. Several memberships are pending and likely to materialize within the next few days.

Amos Heilicher and John Kaplan, respectively president and executive vice-president, expressed gratification at the membership increase and scheduled for discussion at the next board meeting the advisability of creating within ARMADA of an advisory group of manufacturers and distributors. In conferences with Paul Ackerman, ARMADA executive secretary who visited the Minneapolis and Detroit areas last week, the executives noted that the strength of the manufacturer and distrib roster had

reached the point where such a group could function effectively.

It was pointed out that the manufacturer roster, in addition to the firms mentioned above, includes many other powerhouse and medium-strength labels such as Kapp, Liberty, Atlantic, Cadence, Cameo-Parkway, United Artists, 20th-Fox, Audio Fidelity, Vanguard, Chess, Miller International, Roulette, Todd, Starday, Amy-Dimension, Veejay, Bigtop, Sun, Swan etc.

In addition to proposing the concept of the manufacturer-distributor advisory group, Heilicher and Kaplan also blueprinted several more surveys, one of which will be designed to ascertain from manufacturers how distributors may improve their service. A questionnaire in conjunction with this survey will be sent out very shortly, and will examine into such matters as whether distributors are doing a proper job on promotion, merchandising, etc. Heilicher and Kaplan reiterated that these plans are in line with the policy that ARMADA is not to be a crutch for weak distributors.

The next board meeting will be held in Washington, D.C., in March. The agenda, in addition to such matters as the proposed advisory group, will have as its most important topic the furtherance of the FTC Trade Conference. The board holds to the view that the Conference will prob-

## COLUMBIA USING NEW CUTTING TECHNIQUE THAT ADDS LIFE, CLARITY TO ALBUMS

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has, for the past six months, been using an exclusive new master groove cutting technique that the label claims gives the stereo buff and general disk buyer greater clarity of reproduction on all reproducing equipment and much greater longevity for the LP.

Technique, it was learned last week, was first used in the production of the Stereo Test Record, STR 111, made available to the public last Oct. The method is employed in current Columbia LP's, both Masterwork and pop.

As explained by the label, the process is essentially one in which groove cutting distortion is measurably reduced, thereby insuring optimum vertical tracking. Optimum tracking is achieved, the label said, by compensating for spring-back within the lacquer.

The method of cutting the groove differs from standard procedures in that the disparity between the geometric axis and the actual axis of the vertical modulation is corrected.

The process is a development of Columbia and CBS Laboratories.

## WB Pics Sues Over "Speedy Gonzales" Voice

HOLLYWOOD—Warner Bros. Pictures has filed a \$850,000 dollar damage suit against Pat Boone, Agoom Agooc Records, Boone's production firm, Randy Wood and Dot Records over Boone's big Dot dinking of "Speedy Gonzales."

In a complaint, WB alleges unfair competition in the deck's use of impersonator Mel Blanc as "Speedy Gonzales," which is a Spanish-dialect animated cartoon character copyrighted by WB.

Blanc is prohibited, according to the complaint, from simulating the voice of "Speedy Gonzales" for his own use or for the use of third parties.

WB states that it licensed Budd Music Corp. to sublicense third parties to use the name and likeness of its character in connection with the exploitation of the "Speedy Gonzales" number, but not a reproduction or simulation of the "Gonzales" voice.

However, the suit charges, the defendants got Blanc to "unwittingly breach his contractual obligations to plaintiff and, in the voice of . . . 'Speedy Gonzales' . . . Blanc did inter-

polate into said Dot master recording certain text materials supplied by defendants and not found in the musical composition . . ."

The complaint says that 2 million copies of the world-wide Boone reading of the song were sold, and the appearance of Blanc's popular characterization helped it beat out 50 other recordings of the song.

While it tried to negotiate a royalty settlement on sales of the record, WB charges, the defendants "committed further acts contrary to commercial good faith and honest practice . . ." by releasing an LP, "Pat Boone's Golden Hits," featuring "Speedy Gonzales," and negotiations were ended.

WB seeks the following judgement: \$150,000 in actual damages; treble damages in the sum of \$450,000; exemplary damages in the sum of \$250,000; an order requiring defendants and all acting in concert with them to deliver up to the Clerk of the Court for destruction all copies of all infringing recordings of the record together with all tapes, plates, molds, matrices and other means of making the same; a permanent injunction.

Side, already a big deck in England, is an infectious thump beat cha cha up-dating of Gogi Grant's years-back triumph, "The Wayward Wind." Superb Norrie Paramor assist. However, don't overlook the lovely, up tempo "I'm Smiling Now." It, too, has the Top 100 goods.

Side's an unusual, fast moving entry on which the voice takes the place of instruments. Can break wide open. Watch it. Coupler's a catchy cha cha from the while-back "Let's All Sing With The Chipmunks" LP.

JOE POWELL (Regent 1000)

The vocalist hands-in a potent stand on a strong blueser about a fella who knows he's only kidding himself when he thinks he can forget someone he should forget. Fine Nashville-blues sound supports his survey. Deserves airplay.

(B) "SHE'S A GOOD LOOKER" (2:54) [Cedarwood BMI—Wilson] Joyful shout-type affair.

ENOCH LIGHT ORCH. (Command 4029)

(B) "MEDITATION (Meditacao)" (2:25) [Duchess BMI—Jobim, Gimbel, Mendonca] The chart-riding Bossa Nova tune, via diskings by Pat Boone and Charlie Byrd, receives a full-bodied band treatment from the Light ork. Date was culled from an LP, "Let's Dance The Bossa Nova."

(B) "BIG BEN BOSSA" (2:12) [Record ASCAP—Davies, Light] The same album also contains this sparkling BN session.

RUSS WAYNE (Samter 214)

(B) "LOVE YOU" (2:15) [Samchera & Anticipated BMI—Bonvillain, Vidacovich] Nice unhurried bluesy quality to Wayne's warble of an inviting romantic wistful. Chorus is part of the easy-beat backdrop. Label works out of Gretna, La. (C+) "MY HEART LOVES ONLY YOU" (2:05) [Samchera & Anticipated BMI—Bonvillain] Brisk Nashville-sounding plaintive.

SUE ROSE (Brent 7041)

● "THAT'S HOW YOU TREAT A CHEATER" (2:26) [Breezy Willow ASCAP—Cole, Cox] Solid Nashville-waltz sound from the songster and his backup arrangement. Gray had a noise-maker awhile-back with "Look at Me," and could get a bigger reaction with this portion. Label is handled by Original Sound Records.

(B) "A FEELIN' IN MY HEART" (1:59) [Breezy Willow ASCAP—Van Winkle, Darian] Catchy blues-styled cut.

**NATHANIEL MAYER** (Fortune 550)

● "WORK OUT" [Trianon BMI—Mayer, Brown] The chanter who scored a while back with "Village Of Love," can achieve Top 100 status again with this first-rate, funky, chorus-backed r&b weeper styled after his previous click. Eye the deck for rapid acceptance.

(B+) "WELL, I'VE GOT NEWS" [Trianon BMI] On this end Mayer offers a traditional, slow-moving tear-jerker featuring Butch Vaden on drums.

**DELLA REESE** (RCA Victor 8145)

● "I BEHOLD YOU" (2:10) [Alexis ASCAP—Rich] Classy Cole Porter-like beguine ballad is presented with typical finesse by the thrush, who gets a lush, exciting legit ork setting under Hal Mooney's direction. Good-music jocks are likely to be spinning quite a bit.

● "PHANTOM RIDERS" (2:35) [Southern ASCAP—Goddard] Interesting theme goes on a galloping rock-oriented ride—guitars leading the way—in this strong instrumental from England. Could catch-on.

(B+) "THEME FOR TWO HEARTS" (2:45) [Southern ASCAP—Blackwell] Pretty item is attractively styled by the ork, led here by a solo clarinet.

**JOEL HILL** (Monogram 510)

(B) "WILD WEEKEND" [Chantod BMI—Todaro, Shannon] Here, a hot sax works with a steady-beat sound from an electric guitar aimed at the teen trade performance of the Rockin' Rebels' smash.

(B) "ZOSIA (Sophie)" (2:22)—More polka cheer. Lyrics are done in Polish.

## Best Bets

### THE COTILLIONS (ABC-Paramount 10413)

● "SOMETIMES I GET LONELY" (2:16) [Little Bunker BMI — Irby] The gals can score big with this label bow that spotlights the lead vocal talents of Gwen Richards. Side's a tearful rock-a-cha-cha thumper that has loads of dual-mart, pop-r&b potential. Keep close tabs on it.

(B+) "ONE OF THESE DAYS" (2:25) [Little Bunker BMI — Irby] Larks get across the disenchanting theme with much feeling on this pulsating beat-ballad pop-blues session. Strong Teacho Wiltshire arrangements.

### THE PLEASURES (Catch 100)

● "MUSIC CITY" (2:19) [Pattern ASCAP — Howard] The new Era-distributed label can have a big winner in this "Alley-Oop"-styled rock-a-cha-cha novelty. On it the songsters mention some of the top hits — emanating from the record room at the L. A. — music shop. Dandy Jack Nitzsche arrangement. Has that break-wide-open sound.

(B) "IF I HAD A LITTLE MONEY" (1:46) [Pattern ASCAP — Stuart] Groups pounds out a catchy thumper on this end.

### JODY WILLIAMS (Mercury 1801)

(B+) "HIDEOUT" (2:30) [Anthor & MRC BMI—Williams] Guitar-led "Green Onions"-styled blues instrumental is a master purchase from the Chicago-based Nike label. It's catchy and liable to pick-up important coin for the Mercury affiliate.

(B) "MOANING FOR MOLASSES" (2:28) [Anthor & MRC BMI—Williams] Deeper blues feel here.

### BERNARDO MARTINI (Philips 40090)

(B) "GHOST TOWN" (1:48) [Keynote Mart ASCAP — Turnbull] Guitarist heads an exciting full ork-chorus reading of an attractive "western" tune. Commercial instrumental sound that could get around.

(B) "SILVER DUST" (2:14) [Little Darlin' & Marcus BMI—Cooper, Nitzsche] More in the go-west groove.

### GEORGE TIPTON (B&F 1358)

(B) "WHERE THE BONGOS PLAY" (2:32) [Brandon ASCAP—Douglas, Whitman, Polizzi] Capri is where the bongos play and this fella's true-love is in this agreeable, Italian-flavored upbeat stand by the legit warbler and Lew Douglas ork-chorus.

(B) "WILLINGLY" (2:45) [Brandon ASCAP — Polizzi] Sentimental romantic also from the Italian school.

### LYNN CONNER (Monument 808)

(B) "FORGIVE ME" (2:15) [Cedarwood BMI — Wilkin, Walker] Thrush appealingly essays a fine evergreen-type ballad. Her stint is supported by a lush hint-of-the-beat sound from the full ork-chorus. Merits airplay.

(B) "LAUGHING AT ME" (2:17) [Acuff-Rose BMI—B&F Bryant] A gal's former flame has put her down in this "16 Tons"-type sound.

### CHUCK WRIGHT (Ember 1091)

● "DON'T PLAY THAT DANCE" (2:12) [Trinity BMI—Barry] Wright can really cash in with this potent pleader that shuffle-rocks along in very commercial two-market, pop-r&b style. Strong Bert Keyes combo-chorus backdrop rounds out a deck that mentions a host of the popular teen dances.

(B+) "THE PALM OF YOUR HAND" (2:05) [Trinity BMI — Barry, Resnick] This infectious, twist handclapper. Can also kick up chart dust.

### THE SLAY RIDERS (Atco 6255)

● "THE DOWNTOWN" (2:32) [Conley ASCAP — Slay, Crewe, Page] This swinging, big band, boogie-woogie-styled rocker from the Slay Riders, featuring Slay 'N Page, the Piano Rage, is sure to make the teenagers (and adults) sit up and take notice. Sock arrangement by Sid Bass. Side can really step way out.

(B+) "ST. LOUIS BLUES-HITCH HIKE" (2:32) [Handy ASCAP—Handy] More exciting big band sounds on this sparkling revival of the W. C. Handy classic.

### THE DARLINGS (Dore 663)

(B+) "TO KNOW HIM IS TO LOVE HIM" [Hillary & Bamboo BMI—Spector] Femme song team does a pro job on what is proving to be a teen-class, originally presented by The Teddy Bears. Exciting new rendition.

(B) "TRAIN OUT OF MEMPHIS" [Hillary BMI — Jay] Interesting choo-choo all-instrumental.

### CHUCK STAR (Atlantic 2178)

(B) "SHIRLEY" (2:25) [Jimskip BMI—Hockaday] Star gives a distinctive vocal account of the rock-a-cha name-song, and there's an interesting make-up to the full ork-chorus stand in the setting. Deserves teen airtime.

(B) "TOO POUND FOR TEARS" (2:39) [Jaro BMI—Payne] A striking spiritual-like approach to a sensitive blues-ballad.

### COOKIE JACKSON (Progress 912)

(B) "DO YOU STILL LOVE ME" (2:00) [Melodic BMI—Chambers] Generally off-beat blues-flavored upbeat doings from the lark and Zeke Strong band-chorus backing. Both the teenagers and blues trade will enjoy the infectious side. Label operates out of L.A.

(B) "BLIND LOVE" (2:24) [Melodic BMI — Chambers, Wilkins] Well-done semi-wail performance by the artist. Mostly blues-market work.

### JIMMY DEE (Cutie 1400)

(B) "YOU SAY YOU BEAT TO THE PUNCH" (2:30) [Osage BMI—Dee] Deck serves as a good reply to the recent Mary Wells hit, "You Beat Me to the Punch." Blues singer Dee's fine reading is backed by a lively sax-led combo sound. Melody is not the one on the Wells deck. Diskery is a Baltimore outfit.

(B) "I'VE GOT A SECRET" (2:35) [Osage BMI—Dee] Striking combo sounds support Dee's semi-wail stint.

### JOE BROWN (Cameo 241)

(B+) "IT ONLY TOOK A MINUTE" (1:52) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP—Garson, David] Singer Brown and his backdrop sound offer a strong country-styled reading of a folksy ditty about a love-at-first-sight romance. Contagious cut that could get places.

(B) "ALL THINGS BRIGHT & BEAUTIFUL" (1:49) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP — Monk Alexander, Arr. Brown] There's an inviting kiddie-like simplicity to this mostly instrumental reading of a disarming melody.

### GRACIE FIELDS (London 9582)

(B) "NOW IS THE HOUR" (2:55) [Leeds ASCAP — Kalhan, Scott, Stewart] Performer's 16-year-old hit is heard on the same label, but in a new reading that retains—in a lush manner—the sentiments of the original cut. Nostalgia seekers will be after this updated reading of the item, especially through the exposure of jukeboxes.

(B) "SMALL WORLD" (2:15) [Chappell ASCAP—Sondheim, Styne] Very appealing go for the beautiful ballad from the "Gypsy" score.

### JOHNNY GRECO (Pageant 602)

(B) "ROCKET RIDE" (2:11) [Kalmann ASCAP — Mann, Appell] Good old-fashioned rock take-off sound is topped by the songster, whose support carries lots of pro upbeat weight. Natural for hop spins (kids can Lindy to the cut). Diskery is the new Cameo/Parkway outlet.

(B) "WHY DON'T Y' LOVE ME" (2:12) [Woodcrest BMI — Sheldon, Leon] Somewhat milder doings, but the side generates excitement.

### GIULIO LIBANO ORCH. (Rexford 602)

(B+) "LEI PER LUI (He's For You)" (2:46) [Gus Kahn ASCAP — Beretta, Libano] An ingratiating tune gets a first-rate modern band arrangement from the Italian maestro's crew. Also involved are hip vocal chants from a femme named Caterina Villalba, Libano's wife. Hip deejays will dig the sound. Diskery is located in Hollywood.

(B) "MAC FROM MILAN (Gli Svitati)" (2:12) [Gus Kahn ASCAP — Medini, DeVera] Happy reading of a tuneful ditty. Both ends were cut in Milan.

### ROLAND KIRK (Mercury 72075)

(B+) "DOMINO" (3:10) [Pickwick ASCAP—Ferrari, Raye, Plante] The multi-talented Roland Kirk unleashes his fine instrumental skills on this top-flight, free-flowing reading of the French evergreen. The side is culled from Kirk's "Domino" LP. Deck should do well with ops and deejays.

(B) "3-IN-1 WITHOUT THE OIL" (2:20) [MRC BMI—Kirk] This side's a lively, fast-moving Kirk original also taken from his "Domino" album.

### SHUGGY SMITH (Imperial 5918)

(B+) "DUM-DITTY DUM DUM" (1:57) [Vendo, Welton. & Travis BMI—Smith] Cute fun-rock cut, with Smith telling of a guy who wants to be a disk star. Femmes are around to offer the catchy chant title. Worth partytime teen spins.

(B) "HUSTLIN' MAN" (2:50) [Vendo, Welton & Travis BMI —Smith] There are some striking percussion sounds throughout his funky-styled novelty, which spotlights a narrative by Smith that recalls the old "Allez-Oop" hit.

### RAMSEY LEWIS TRIO (Argo 5431)

(B+) "THE MORNING OF THE CARNIVAL" (3:45) [Ross Jungnickel ASCAP—Jobin, Bonfa] Ramsey Lewis jumps on the bossa nova bandwagon with this intriguing, slow-moving, extremely melodic item taken from his "Bossa Nova" album. Side should do well with ops and spinners.

(B+) "TANGLEWEED 'ROUND MY HEART" (3:24) [Leeds ASCAP—Kelley, Wyatt] More fine jazz sounds. This one's a funky ballad culled from Lewis' "Country Meets The Blues" LP.

### HAROLD BRADLEY (Columbia 42694)

(B+) "WALK ON BY" (3:01) [Lowery BMI—Hayes] The awhile-back Leroy Van Dyke hit stands up well sans-lyric, and the teenagers could a good-sounding all-instrumental reading — Nashville-Bossa Nova-style—from the guitarist and his ork.

(B) "DEVIL WOMAN" BN-Nashville (2:17) [Marty's BMI—Robbins] Another worthwhile instrumental go for a vocal hit, originally cut by the label's own Marty Robbins.

### CLINT MASON (S.P.Q.R. 3307)

(B+) "PLEASE DON'T RELEASE ME" (2:20) [Rockmasters BMI—Guida, Royster] Blues warbler Mason and his interesting busy-beat combo-chorus backing have taken the tune to the familiar folk song, "Red River Valley," for a reply to Esther Philips "Release Me" smash. Effective answer entry. Diskery is part of the London Group.

(B) "I WANT WHAT I WANT" (2:18) [Rockmasters BMI—Mason] Unhurried blues musings by the performer.

### RICK & THE MASTERS (Cameo 247)

(B+) "LET IT PLEASE BE YOU" (2:13) [Keel BMI—The Desires] Teen-market song blends in an oldie-but-goodie ballad manner here. It's all done with solid blend polish, and side is of value in today's rock scene.

(B) "I DON'T WANT YOUR LOVE" (2:29) [Farwood BMI—Sheldon, Leon] Boys also hark back to earlier rock sounds with this fine speedy-beat venture.

### JOHNNY RAVEN (Felsted 8669)

(B+) "LOVE ME JUST A LITTLE BIT" (2:35) [Tri-City BMI—Malis] Raven caresses the pretty plaintive-plea item with much conviction, getting a sensitive, uncomplicated setting sound. Track's standout tenderness gives it an off-beat quality that could eventually develop into something.

(B) "FLY ME TO THE MOON" (2:28) [Almanac ASCAP—Howard] The current hit is done in a similar honest manner by the songster, who this time gets more of a teen-beat backdrop.

### JACK PASTORIUS (7-11 738)

(B) "I REALLY LOVE YOU (Bossa Nova)" (2:20) [Tone-lynn BMI—Mahoney] Songster warbles in a legit ballad manner as Sid Bass directs the ork in a bright Bossa Nova arrangement of his own. Side caters nicely to adults who are hip to the BN sound. Diskery is based in Carlisle, Pa.

(B) "PLEASE DON'T LOVE" (2:21) [Tone-lynn BMI—Mahoney] Smart, sunny swingin'.





The Smothers Brothers, who are still pulling plenty of coin with their "Two Sides Of The Smothers Brothers" LP, have a sure-fire second stanza for the charts with this new effort on Mercury. Here is musical satire at its devastating best with the entire session devoted to laugh-laden slapstick interspersed with occasional snatches of folk harmony. The disk is a delightful spoof of folk singers and looms as an immediate blockbuster.

### FELIX SLATKIN



### "OUR WINTER LOVE"—Felix Slatkin—Liberty LST7287

The late Felix Slatkin, whose recent "Hoedown" LP is still climbing the stereo charts, lends his superior brand of musicianship to a host of current big ballads on this Liberty outing. The violinist-orkster has come up with some lush sounding and pulsating arrangements of such biggies as "I Left My Heart In San Francisco," "Days Of Wine And Roses" and "What Kind Of Fool Am I." All off the tunes here are potent in sales and this delightful Slatkin treatment of them should spark plenty of sales for the disk. Eye it for rapid acceptance.

### GOLDEN HITS



### "GOLDEN HITS"—Sue Thompson—Hickory LPM111

Sue Thompson, who is currently represented on the charts with her best-selling single, "Willie Can," launches this program with the biggie and includes her other chart-riding items on this Hickory outing. The lark essays these biggies with the same lilting charm that made them blockbusters the first time around. Also included here are "James," "Norman" and "Two Of A Kind." The songstress' many admirers will surely dig this one.

### NINA'S CHOICE



### "NINA'S CHOICE"—Nina Simone—Colpix SCP443

Nina Simone unleashes her vocal talents on a wide variety of musical areas on this first-rate Colpix outing. The thrush proves herself equally adept at delivering an effective readings of blues and pop as well as down-to-earth folk songs. Her versatility is perfectly showcased in her renditions of "Trouble In Mind," "Little Liza Jane" and "Just Say I Love Him." The disk is a top-rung effort that increases her stature as a performer.

### RIVERWIND



### "RIVERWIND"—Original Cast—London AM-48001

"Riverwind," the new off-Broadway musical by John Jennings, featuring the voices of Lawrence Brooks, Elizabeth Parrish, Helen Blount, Dawn Nickerson and Lovelady Powell, aptly showcases the writing-composing talents of Jennings. This original cast disk on London comes off as a highly pleasurable listening experience and ranks as a superior off-Broadway production. Some ear-captivating melodies are found in "Riverwind," "Pardon Me While I Dance" and "Almost, But Not Quite Married." Excellent performances by the principals, effective orchestration and inventive arrangements deftly overshadow the composer's sometimes weak lyrics. Show buffs will surely want to add it to their cast shelves.

Here's a delightful, romantic package of sturdies and originals from ace clarinetist Mr. Acker Bilk. The artist's soft-and-easy, relaxed, delicate sounds are aptly spotlighted against the melodic backing of the Leon Young String Chorale. Bilk comes with some especially listenable-danceable renditions of "Only You," "La Vie En Rose" and "A Taste Of Honey." Deejays should find plenty of top-flight programming material here.


### SEE SEE RIDER

Carmen Cavallaro showcases his keyboard artistry with this session of American waltzes on Decca. ### "GUITARS AND STRINGS PLAY GOLDEN STANDARDS"—Jerry Kennedy Smash SRS67024






**"THE FUNNIEST NEW COMIC SINCE THE LAST NEW COMIC"**—Dave Turner—Roulette R 25201

Pete Seeger utilizes the popular sing-along technique on this interesting folk session cut live at New York's Town Hall. The vet balladeer does not rely on gimmicks for singing and banjo playing but offers up a collection of familiar and little-known items in a straightforward and feelingful style. Seeger shines as he leads the kids in the audience through first-rate readings of "Henry My Son," "It Could Be A Wonderful World" and "This Land Is Your Land." Delightful listening throughout.



**"THE MAJESTIC SOUNDS OF SEMPRINI"**—Capitol ST1836  
Here is a truly lush sounding disk of oldies and movie themes played by the piano and orchestra of Semprini on Capitol. The 88'er displays an almost flamboyant keyboard style that effectively blends with the sweeping, soaring string section which dominates each arrangement. Highly listenable tracks here are "Theme From Exodus," "London Fantasia Pts 1 & 2," and a powerful rendition of "Malaguena." Excellent in stereo, the disk could be a dark horse candidate for the best-seller list.



**"RAISE A RUCKUS AND HAVE A HOOTENANNY"**—Alan Lomax & Dupree Family—Kapp KL 1316  
Alan Lomax, who has been recording folk artists for twenty years, makes his debut as a performer on this pleasant Kapp album. Lomax displays a straightforward, easy-goin' approach in the Pete Seeger vein to a warm collection of folk favorites. While backed by the Dupree Family, the chanter-guitarist offers some interesting reading of "A Pretty Girl Is Like A Little Bird," "Railroad Bill" and "Raise A Ruckus."



**"A TRAVES DEL RIO BRAVO"**—Los Riverenos—Seeco SCLP 92470  
With the current new popularity of Latin music this top-notch Seeco set featuring Los Riverenos offering a bevy of warm Mexican sounds should find favor with a host of record buyers. The boys dish up a variety of folk-styled items in a distinctive, gimmick-free singing style. Best listening bets here include "Una Pena," "Gabino Barrera" and "La Palomita."




**"TANGO MAGIC"**—Frank Chacksfield—Richmond B20110




**"JAZZ WORKSHOP REVISITED"**—Cannonball Adderley—Riverside 444  
The vet jazz alto saxist, who is currently clicking in the top slot with "The Jive Samba," comes up with first-rate session cut live at the Jazz Workshop in San Francisco. The entire sextet in fine form as they go through their musical paces with assurance and polish. Top-flight tracks here include "Primitivo," "Marney" and "Mellow Buno." For commercial purposes Adderley's single hit is spotlighted on the album cover. Potent entry.



**"BOSSA NOVA BACCHANAL"**—Charlie Rouse—Blue Note 4119  
With the seemingly endless stream of bossa nova product currently being released, a great deal of it falls into the pop category lacking almost jazz overtones. Tenor saxist Charlie Rouse comes with a first-rate jazz-oriented bossa nova set with enough inventiveness to please even the most discerning record buyers on this blue note item. While backed by a small combo, Rouse renders some attractive free-flowing readings of "Back To The Tropics," "Samba De Orfeu" and "Un Dia." Superior listening throughout.



**"DAVE PIKE PLAYS THE JAZZ VERSION OF OLIVER!"**—Moodsville MV36  
Broadway show scores have become an important part of the jazz musician's repertoire this past year, and Dave Pike makes his contribution to this area with this excellent version of the current smash success, "Oliver!" The vibesman did all the arrangements, and is joined by Jimmy Raney on guitar, Tommy Flanagan on piano, George Tucker on bass and Walter Perkins on drums. The score, which is loaded with haunting melodies, is effectively paced and retains all of its original warmth in this jazz version. The disk is an excellent adaptation and should find wide acceptance from jazz buffs.



**"BLUES ON THE OTHER SIDE"**—Mike Mainieri Quartet—Argo LP 706  
There are only a few jazz groups around today with a vibraphone lead. Vibists are almost becoming the forgotten men of jazz. Newcomer Mike Mainieri offers proof—positive that the instrument is not dead on this swingin' Argo bow. The young musician displays a forceful, inventive, polished approach on this listenable set of evergreens and originals. The crew turns in superb renditions of "If I Were A Bell," "When I Fall In Love" and a top-drawer Mainieri newie tagged "B. R. Blues."

**"ERNEST HAEFLIGER SINGS ARIAS BY BACH & HANDEL"**—Deutsche Grammophon LPEM19268  
Here is the warm tenor voice of Ernest Haefliger singing some of the intricate but melodic arias of Bach and Handel accompanied by the Munich Bach Orchestra directed by Karl Richter. The singer's vocal artistry reflects a deep-seated feeling for and knowledge of these arias as he reads them with lyrical purity. Included here are Bach's "Benedictus," "Deposuit" and Handel's "Frondi Tenere" and "Svegliatevi."



**DVORAK: Symphony No. 5 & Carnival Overture**—The Bamberg Symphony, Joseph Keilberth, Conductor—Telefunken TCS18053  
Dvorak's hauntingly beautiful "New World" symphony is performed by the Bamberg Symphony with Joseph Keilberth at the helm. The composer's memorable musical tribute to his "new land" is brilliantly and sensitively interpreted by the maestro on this Telefunken dishing and the familiar melodies attain a fresh new beauty here. Stereo enhances the beauty of the performance.

## Vertical Tracking Improvements in Stereo Recording

B. B. BAUER\*

A revolutionary discovery shows that the recorded modulation slant on a stereo record differs from the geometry of the cutter because of lacquer "springback," and vastly reduced intermodulation distortion can be effected by a corrective mounting of the cutterhead.

**S**TEREOPHONIC RECORDS and equipment for playing them made their appearance on a wide scale some five years ago. At the present stage of development, both the records and the equipment have reached a high state of perfection and have enjoyed wide acclaim. One criticism has been heard from time to time: With some stereophonic pickup-record combinations, a careful listener is able to perceive a certain type of distortion which is not discernible with monophonic records under similar conditions. This distortion has been traced to an improper vertical-tracking-angle of the pickup and the

### Vertical Tracking Angles

The principal information content in a stereo record resides in the sum signal of the 45/45-deg. modulation which appears as a lateral cut, and this is not affected by the vertical tracking angles. However, the stereo information is identified with the difference signal which is contained in the vertical mode. Therefore, proper tracking of vertical modulation assumes increasing importance with records having considerable channel separation, especially toward the end of the record where wavelengths are short.

Since the cutter and the pickup suspensions are pivoted above the record

is called the vertical recording angle B. Assuming that a sinusoidal vertical signal is applied to the cutter, the modulation actually cut can be expected to be contained in a coordinate system with inclined ordinates. The inclination angle of the modulation ordinate is called the vertical modulation slant C, and the difference between the vertical tracking angle and the vertical modulation slant is a vertical tracking error angle D. If D is zero then the pickup will reproduce an undistorted signal. It had been assumed from the beginning of stereophonic recording that vertical modulation slant was equal to the vertical recording angle, but we show later that this is far from being the case. Actually,

This new technique has been utilized by Columbia Records for several months. This is another example of leadership in the art of recorded sound by the company that developed and introduced the long-playing record.

## Grayson Back At Westminster, Dr. List Leaves A&R Post

NEW YORK—James Grayson is back as head of Westminster Records, the ABC-Paramount label's classical outlet.

Grayson, who served as proxy at the label for 10 years since the firm was founded in Nov., 1949, takes over the newly-created post of managing director and will helm all operations of Westminster and its low-priced subsid, Whitehall, according to Sam Clark, ABC-Par topper. He left the label in 1959 upon change of ownership. ABC-Par acquired it in June, 1961.

Clark also announced that Dr. R. Kurt List, Westminster's A&R veep, had resigned from his post. Dr. List, who was based on the Continent, is expected to continue his activities in Europe.

During Grayson's initial association with Westminster, a quality classical line was established. He introduced such artists as Paul Badura-Skoda, Joerg Demus, Julian Bream, Antonio Janigro, the Amadeus Quartet and others. Noted conductors that he brought into the Westminster fold included Hermann Scherchen, Sir Adrian Boult, Arur Rodzinski, Erich Leinsdorf.

Since leaving Westminster, Grayson founded his own firm, The Music Guild, which began as a classical subscription club and now has expanded its sales through many selected dealers. It will continue to be operated by Grayson.

## Sinatra On Single, Soundtrack Of Garner Flick Tune

NEW YORK—Frank Sinatra will sing the title song over the main title billing of Melville Shavelson's production, "A New Kind Of Love," Paramount release starring Paul Newman and Joanne Woodward.

Sinatra will also record and release the song on his Reprise label. Errol Garner, who is composing the score for the comedy, will record an album for "A New Kind Of Love," which will also be released by Reprise.

An extensive music promotion campaign is now being blueprinted by Paramount and Reprise to be activated in advance of the release of "A New Kind Of Love" next fall.

Sinatra also stars in the recently completed "Come Blow Your Horn," Paramount release produced by Sinatra's Essex Productions in association with Norman Lear and Bud Yorkin's Tandem Productions.

## Faith Cuts LP With Own Tunes

HOLLYWOOD — Composer-arranger Percy Faith, whose lush orchestra stylings can be found in 33 Columbia albums, completed work on an album of his own compositions last week.

Recently returned from a special assignment where he scored the music for the CBS Television special "A Look At Monaco," Faith recorded music from this program plus themes from "The Virginian" TV show during the session (14).

A&R producer Ed Kleban handled the assignment which featured the familiar Faith full orchestral backing. Faith's most recent Columbia album is "American Serenade" and is a continuation of his interpretative visits to romantic lands.

## Winterhalter Joins ABC-Par As Artist



WINTERHALTER & CLARK

NEW YORK—Hugo Winterhalter, for many years a big factor in the disk business as an arranger-maestro, has inked an exclusive pact as an artist with ABC-Paramount Records.

The deal will permit Winterhalter to arrange dates for artists outside of the ABC-Par fold, a function he has been doing since ending his 14-year association as a musical director, artist, arranger, conductor and cleffer for RCA Victor Records.

Winterhalter will concentrate on making album product. No singles sessions planned for the present.

After meets with Sid Feller, ABC-Par's director of A&R, Winterhalter cut an LP for immediate release (as of last week, diskery had not yet decided on a title). LP will receive full-scale promo efforts from the label.

Negotiations were handled through Julie Chester of the Lester Shurr Agency, which now represents Winterhalter.

During his association with Victor, Winterhalter A&R'd hit dates by Perry Como ("Wanted"), The Ames Bros. ("Naughty Lady Of Shady Lane"), Kay Starr ("Rock And Roll Waltz") and Eddie Fisher ("Anytime"), among others. As an artist, the vet music man got a gold disk for his arrangement and recording of "Canadian Sunset."

A native of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., where he studied violin and reed instruments, Winterhalter received his bachelor of arts degree at Mount St. Mary's College, Emmitsburg, Md. Following graduation, he played with the bands of Larry Clinton, Raymond Scott and Jack Jenney. In 1944, he made his first arrangement for the Tommy Dorsey orchestra, and this was the beginning of the lush Winterhalter arrangements of today. He has also arranged for the orchestras of Count Basie, Vaughn Monroe and Claude Thornhill, and for such top-flight singers as Frank Sinatra, Dinah Shore and Doris Day.

The Winterhalter sound is familiar to TV audiences via his composing and arranging skills; and he scored and conducted the music for the RKO film, "Bundle Of Joy," starring Eddie Fisher and Debbie Reynolds.

He recently composed the title theme for the current Columbia motion picture, "Diamond Head," starring Charlton Heston, and to date, eight recordings have been made of the song.

On the serious side, Winterhalter has conducted both the Milwaukee and Washington symphony orchestras.

## Vinton Going After Acting Career, Makes H'wood His Home

HOLLYWOOD—Bobby Vinton has gone Hollywood, that is the Epic disk star has set up permanent residence in the city to develop a career as a flick and TV actor.

Vinton and his manager, Alan Bregman, are currently making the rounds of the film studios where they hope to find properties suitable for Vinton's talent. Vinton has already performed on several TV programs including "Celebrity Talent Scouts," "Saturday Night Prom" and most recently, Jerry Lester's "Weekend" late night syndicated feature.

The vocalist is also preparing a night club act which he will debut at the Casino Royale in Washington, D. C., March 11-17, followed by an appearance at Palumbo's in Philadelphia, March 25-31. Vinton says his new act will have an adult approach—more variety with Vinton playing saxophone, clarinet, piano and trumpet in the act.

Vinton, whose disking of "Roses are Red" was Epic's first million-seller, enters the Top 100 this week with latest effort, "Over the Mountain (Across the Sea)."

## BMI's "Varsity Show" Competition Is On

NEW YORK—The third annual BMI Varsity Show Competition, offering a prize of \$1,000 to the composer and lyricist of the best college musical comedy or revue presented in the U. S. or Canada during the 1962-63 academic year, is now open. Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI) will also award an additional prize of \$500 to the drama or music department, or the student dramatic club, sponsoring the production.

A panel of judges including Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick, the Pulitzer Prize-winning team which wrote the words and music for "Fiorello!"; Lehman Engel, composer and musical director for many Broadway productions; and Robert B. Sour, BMI vice president in charge of writer relations, will judge the entries. They will be joined by other leading figures from the musical theater world.

Rules for the competition, which closes June 15, are available from Robert B. Sour, Broadcast Music, Inc., 589 Fifth Avenue, New York 17, New York. Announcement of winners will be made no later than Oct. 15, 1963.

## More Atlantic-Atco Jazz Singles

NEW YORK—The Atlantic & Atco labels, reporting an increase in the sales of all jazz singles, continues its policy of issuing jazz singles by jazzists from their current albums with four new entries. Atlantic has just bowed Leo Wright's "The Wiggler" and "A Felicidad" from the saxist's "Suddenly the Blues" LP; "Souls Valley" and "Poinciana" from the "Sonny Stitt & The Top Brass" album; and "Maria" and "Spanish Flier" from Slide Hamptons "Explosion!" set. The Atco entry is Betty Carter's "The Good Life" and "Nothing More to Look Forward To" from her new LP, "Round Midnight."

In addition to getting encouraging sales, the singles are seen by the label as an important asset in promoting sales on the associated LP.

Atlantic is making a special effort to have the new singles placed in jukeboxes which stack a heavy selection of jazz singles. Jazz and pop deejays are being serviced with the new singles.

## Jody Miller, Capitol's New Folk Thrush

HOLLYWOOD—Jody Miller, a young folk singer from Oklahoma, has been signed to an exclusive recording contract by Capitol Records.

Although the performer has been singing since the age of six, she turned attention exclusively to folk music less than two years ago. Accompanying herself on a baritone ukulele, she has appeared on TV variety shows and in coffee houses throughout Oklahoma.

She left Oklahoma to try her luck in Hollywood on the advice of The Limelickers. The celebrated folk trio was appearing at the University of Oklahoma field house a few months ago while she was holding forth at a nearby coffee house called The Jester. After catching her act one evening following their own show, the group advised her to try for bigger things on the West Coast. Within a few months she had sung for and impressed actor Dale Robertson, who arranged for her audition with Capitol.

A&R producer Curly Walter has already recorded the artist, and her first album is due out soon. She has been appearing occasionally at Shelly's Manne Hole in Hollywood.

## Publish "R&H Story"

NEW YORK—Musical theatre buffs can now add "The Rodgers & Hammerstein Story" (John Day, \$4.50) to their library. Written by Stanley Green, an authority on the musical stage, the book covers the works of the famed team plus their careers before they teamed-up for their first effort, "Oklahoma!" (1943). An appendix includes all the songs written by R&H, who first sang them and a listing of all their shows. Green is the writer of "The World of Musical Comedy."

## Artone Knows Disk Game, Colpix Finds It A Pleasure

NEW YORK—Herb Homes, international director for Colpix, reports that many of the label's European distributors are able to act as quickly on Colpix products as domestic distributors. Artone, for instance, which is centered in Haarlem, Holland, last week sent news of strong sales on several items recently released by Colpix.

Current noise-makers for Colpix in the Benelux countries include "My Dad" by Paul Petersen, "Big Wide World" by Teddy Randazzo, "Recado" by Zoot Sims, "Pin a Medal on Joey" by James Darren, "My Coloring Book" by Sandy Stewart and "Lawrence of Arabia" by Bernie Leighton and by Jim Hall on May Records.

Via daily communication with its Netherlands outlet suggestions are sent and received with a speed to match Colpix' contact with its distributors in the U. S.

Artone is especially promotion conscious and is currently sponsoring a contest to stimulate interest in Paul Petersen's new LP, "My Dad," with winners receiving personally autographed copies of the album.

Almost all of Colpix' product is released by Artone, and Homes finds that the firm is not hampered by nationalists influences in releasing American product. Copies of all promotional material, designed by Artone, are sent to Colpix along with copies of singles that are released. Most of these are in color sleeves with photos of the artist.

Homes states that Artone is highly Americanized in its ability to move with records, and dynamic, modern and aggressive methods make Artone one of the hottest distributors on the international record scene.

The firm has, Homes stated an impressive knowledge of American trends, charts and promotional efforts, and it continually applies these, with its own creative touches to the Colpix disks that it issues in its own area of sales. Artone is currently plugging the above-mentioned releases in the fan magazines and trade and consumer publications in Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. The firm will also sponsor a great deal of air time over Radio Luxemburg to help create interest in its current Colpix best-sellers.

## Capitol Issues Gleason's TV'er Themes

NEW YORK—Capitol Records, answering requests of TV viewers, has issued a single of two themes heard on Jackie Gleason's "American Scene Magazine" TV'er as performed under the direction of Gleason himself. Sides are "La La La La La La La La" and "It's Such a Happy Face," which are the background music for the pantomime skits on the show. Disking was prompted by a "flood of requests" from viewers writing the Gleason office.

## NARAS Seminar Covers A&R Man, Creative Artist

NEW YORK—The record producers intense interest in an consuming concern for the creative recording artist were heavily stressed at the third session of the NYU-NARAS course, "The Art of Recording," last Tuesday (19) evening in the RCA Exhibition Hall in New York.

Under the guidance of moderator Goddard Lieberman, Columbia Records president, who injected several humorous asides, panelists Seymour Solomon and Tom Wilson, of Vanguard and Audio-Fidelity, respectively, projected an acute awareness of and sensitive sympathy for the unique problems that beset the careers of "The Special Artist." That was the title of the session that concerned itself with the relationship of the A&R man to classical, folk and jazz performers.

Solomon, who interspersed his talk with recorded examples, stressed the importance of selectivity, "the no buck shot approach," as he called it. He recommended making records only for a valid reason, such as something new, a better performance than is currently available, a unique approach for a unique artist.

Selecting four case histories, he noted that greater cooperation between recording companies and artists management can increase record sales and concert attendances. He emphasized his contention that special artists are better served by the independent companies because of closer and often better working relationships at the a. and r. level and because smaller companies with lower overheads can be satisfied with lesser sales. He cited the case of an unnamed "small orchestra" which had been started on records by Vanguard, succumbed, despite warnings, to the enticing offer of a major company, only to become subsequently disillusioned, and eventually to leave the big label.

Wilson, who reflected his contention that "everyone in the A&R end should be in love with talent, started his talk with a description of 'the typical jazz artist.' He's a high school graduate, about 30 years old with ten years of musical education and ten years of working as a musician. He has two aspirations, to create a personal style and to blow exactly what he wants to blow without interference.

He dwelled on the importance of "digging out talent," now more difficult than before because of the demise of many local clubs and the absence of after hours cutting sessions. He underscored "the adventurous spirit of the small companies" and listed the kinds of places where jazz talent could be discovered: out-of-the-way clubs, in musicians' homes, through contacts with other musicians, club owners and agents and by listening to all of the many demo records ("they're usually pretty dreary, too!") that cross an A&R man's desk.

Like Solomon, Wilson regretted what he called "the new pattern of the big company's stealing new talent developed by the independents." Noting that today's jazz requirements call for greater all-around musicianship, Wilson listed five criteria for evaluating talent: (1) technical proficiency, (2) high reading skills, (3) an original style, (4) unusual thematic material, and (5) the ability to be emotionally evocative.

Wilson also warned young jazz A&R men to "be prepared to get hurt. You may be far ahead of your time and an artist you may be building now may not become successful until 1973, after he's gone somewhere else." He closed his talk with his description of the ideal a. and r. man. "He should possess the inventiveness of Thomas Edison, the wisdom of Solomon, the tact of Ralph Bunche, the musicianship of Duke Ellington and the organizational ability of Robert McNamara. But," he concluded facetiously, "I'm sorry but I'm not available. I already have a job."

Following Solomon's and Wilson's talks, Lieberman led the students through a question and answer period that help set in perspective the points stressed by the two lecturers, with some further bon mots contributed by Lieberman.

## Music Men Tackle Flops, Commercial And Artistic

NEW YORK—A lot goes into making a flop record, but, then again, there are those who contend that most of today's hit records are artistic flops.

Matters relating directly and not-so-directly to "What Makes a Flop (or Who Did It to Whom?)" were taken-up by a panel of music men at a discussion last week (18) at Fine Studios, this city, under the sponsorship of NARAS, the disk award society.

Panel was composed of Milt Gabler of Decca's A&R dept., Hugo & Luigi, Victor's A&R producers, Lou Levy, head of Leeds Music, Jim McCarthy, the indie promo man, Bobby Scott, the jazz pianist-clefper, writer Charlie Singleton and Art Talmadge, head of U.A. Joe Csida of Trinity Music was the moderator.

The discussion began on a light note (e.g. Csida: "Anyone who agrees with another is out!"), but—granted humorous interjections throughout the debate—it soon took on a serious, if not often heated—character.

Despite Csida's opening tongue-in-cheek admonition, all agreed that a song, whether classified as artistic or not—was the most important element in obtaining a hit record. As outlined by Gabler, and generally accepted by the panel, these factors followed: artist, "dressing" (arrangement), promotion and sales. It was generally agreed that no amount of promo and sales efforts could help a record that didn't "have it in the grooves." As Luigi put it, "a good record sells, a bad record doesn't sell."

Lou Levy took the publisher's view that there are instances whereby a publisher's belief that his side of a single is the "A" side and his resulting promo effort, actually did prove he had the hit side, despite the initial feelings of the label. He referred to Brenda Lee's "All Alone Am I," a Leeds copyright, which became the hit side although Decca felt the rhythm end, "Save Your Lovin' for Me," deserved the initial push. Gabler countered by noting that the label "thought enough of the song "Alone" to make it," but we thought we were right in going with the rhythm side." After realizing that "Alone" was the top side, "we went with it," Gabler added.

The Levy-Gabler exchange led the panel to a discussion of whether a publisher by going against a side declared to be the "A side by label was actually destroying the deck's potential by creating a "split-play" situation.

Levy explained that "Alone" would have never made it without his firm's belief in the song, while Luigi declared that a publisher had "many-times loused up a side" that could sell by developing a "split-play" on the record.

Talmadge said that one of the major factors in "flop" records was a label that had too big an artist roster. "The easiest thing to do is make records," Talmadge said. He said there wasn't sufficient good material to go around, but A&R men get "panicky," realizing that the firm has an overhead and payroll to think about, and "cut, cut, cut." This, Talmadge asserted, "removes selectivity" from making a disk. Talmadge also pointed to the great amount of time that is spent on "diamond polishing" today's disks, that is work done on a deck after the session has taken place.

Gabler said that big artist rosters are sometimes necessary, since a label must constantly try to develop new artists in view of the fact that all-time greats on the label do not necessarily remain all-time great sellers. "Nobody lasts forever," Gabler noted.

## Columbia Cuts "Virginia"

Charlie Singleton stated that he wanted the record business returned to the publishers and A&R, the people, according to Singleton, who have "song-sense." He said that all writers write with an artist in mind, and it was the responsibility of publishers and A&R men to fit songs with the right artist.

Bobby Scott led the panel to the area of artistic integrity in today's music scene. He said most records produced today require only "1/16 of one's talent." He termed popular music one of America's "greatest forces . . . and it's getting more and more inane."

Scott said that such a situation was created by malpractice (e.g. guarantees), stylization and no-talent artists.

It was Luigi's view that artistic integrity should be left to the public. Would Hugo & Luigi cut Joan Baez, the Vanguard label's hot artist?, Scott questioned. The Victor execs replied in the affirmative.

In the question-and-answer period that followed, Dave Cavanaugh, Capitol A&R producer on the coast and a national trustee of NARAS, called for greater responsibility from industry in raising the standards of disk produced, which, he added, is one of the very reason for existence of an organization like NARAS.

Csida left for a 2½ year period in March, 1960 to become veep in charge of eastern operations for Capitol Records. He left Capitol last Sept. to return to his firms.

Darin formed TM productions less than a month ago. Acquisition of the pubberies thus gives Darin a totally integrated music-record operation, over and above his own personal activities as a performer.

As a performer, Darin is at a new peak of his career. His current Capitol single, "You're the Reason I'm Living," published by Adaris, is a top 10 tune. His recent flicks, "If a Man Answers" and "Pressure Point," were good box office. Four new Darin flicks are scheduled for the immediate future. He'll be doing several specials on TV in the near future. He is currently playing the Coconut Grove at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles after a four week run at the Flamingo in Las Vegas. Part of the premiere of his L.A. engagement last week (21) was taped "live" for first telecast of a nitery opener.

## Mercury Names Phono Sales Head

CHICAGO—The phono division of Mercury Records has named Perry Winokur as its sales topper, according to veep Irwin Steinberg.

Winokur, who has had many years of experience in the major appliance industry, was formerly sales promotion manager for Polk Bros. in Chicago; sales manager for Hornstein, Inc., and national sales representative for Marubeni-Iida.

According to Winokur, "The phonograph industry in 1962 reached a new sales high, with an increase of over 24 per cent. Mercury intends to become a major factor in the industry in 1963, and we will equip our dealers with the tools, knowledge and desire to achieve this goal."

Winokur added that the Mercury phonograph line will be rapidly expanded with a number of "exciting" new products, and that a review is being made of the price structure for the entire Mercury line.

"We will also be providing more promotional help at the dealer level, and Mercury will assume its role at all phases of distribution to spearhead our new sales drive."

ably be held; that this will offer a great opportunity to restore a measure of stability and order to the industry; and the ARMADA committee, appointed at the last board meeting in Detroit to set guide lines in preparation for the conference, has been alerted.

The Washington, D.C., meeting, will also study the standard contract form drawn up by Bill Shocket of Malverne. It will also jell plans for the ARMADA annual convention, to be held in July at the Edgewater Beach Hotel, Chicago. These plans will include the designation of key convention speakers and the formulation of symposiums on key industry problems. The symposiums will draw the participation of both distributors and manufacturers. Subjects already scheduled for symposium treatment include 1) The Unrealistic Price of Records; 2) Diversification for Distributors—An inquiry into how the distributor can maintain his status by becoming an integral part of rack-jobbing and one-stopping; 3) Promotion—A Distributor Function. Other symposiums are being set and will touch upon retailing, the proposed manufacturer-distrib contract and other matters.

Another recent action of Heilicher and Kaplan was the appointment of Jim Schwartz, of Schwartz Brothers, as temporary ARMADA treasurer. Jim Schwartz thereby assumes the organizational functions of the late Harry Schwartz, pioneer distributor and ARMADA pillar.

Performer on both sides is Eric Bentley, the writer-critic who has been a Brecht interpreter-translator for the past 10 years. His adaptation of "Mother Courage" will be seen on B'way during the '63 season with Ann Bancroft as its star.

Songs featured—on which Bentley accompanies himself on the harmonium, a seldom used reed organ which had been called for by Brecht since his first play, "Baal,"—include "Mack The Knife," from "Three Penny Opera," "A Man's A Man" and "The Song Of Mother Courage."

## Townsend's New Veep Post Gives Col's H'wood A&R Men Added Duties

HOLLYWOOD—Irving Townsend's new position as west coast operations Vice President has necessitated his expanding the recording activities of his three A&R producers.

Jim Harbert, Ed Kleban and Terry Melcher are being assigned new roles as Townsend slowly phases himself out of A&R work to concentrate on his administrative duties as the Operations Vice President and not just head of the A&R Department.

There are four areas in which Townsend is now concerned in addition to running the A&R operation. These include sales, studio operation, custom service and any new diversification the company gets into.

Townsend stated he will still be active as an A&R producer, but not to the degree he formerly was during the three years he has been in California. He said he would represent Columbia whenever an officer of the company was required, as in dealings with labor unions. He also proffered he would be concerned with the relationships between the sales operation in the 12 Western states and the various distributor outlets (retailers, rack jobbers and one-stops) and disk jockeys.

Just as Andy Schrade, the previous operations vice president, (who headed the Los Angeles factory) was not involved with A&R work, so too will Townsend not be in control of the factory operation.

Townsend explained he was taking an active interest in the technical facilities and would be soliciting outside accounts for the Sunset Boulevard studio. Columbia presently records 40% of its total output in this Hollywood studio.

The three Hollywood-based A&R producers are working in three separate areas and will be assigned artists who have recorded for Townsend in the past, the vice president explained. Jim Harbert is handling pop albums and singles for such artists as the New Christy Minstrels, Johnny Williams and the Les Brown Band. Ed Kleban is handling the Brothers Four, Percy Faith and Andre Previn and will also specialize in soundtracks and classical projects. Terry Melcher is developing teen singles with Eddie Hodges, the Rip Chords, Emil O'Connor and Hannah Dean. Terry's own single, "Be A Soldier" and the Rip Chords' "Here I Stand," have been breakout records in many West Coast locations. Melcher is also seeking material for special single projects involving his mother, Doris Day and Frankie Laine.

# GREAT BRITAIN

"All Star Festival," the LP produced to aid world refugees, is being released in Britain this week (28). Efforts to get the British Government to free the disk from purchase tax failed and the retail price has been fixed at 20/—(\$2.80) including tax. All the artists featured on the disk have given their services free. These include Louis Armstrong, Maurice Chevalier, Nat King Cole, Bing Crosby, Doris Day, Ella Fitzgerald, Mahalia Jackson, Nana Mouskouri, Patti Page, Luis Alberto del Parana, Edith Piaf, Anne Shelton and Caterina Valente. This Tues. (26) Anne Shelton will go to Buckingham Palace to present a copy of the disk to the Lord Chamberlain, who will receive it on behalf of The Queen.

After a two year association with Bron Music the Spanka catalog has been taken over by KPM Music. In London to set up the deal with KPM's Jimmy Phillips came Andrew Anka and Bill Lazarow of Spanka. The new contract, which embraces the whole Spanka catalog, becomes effective on March 1st and will run for two years. Anka's RCA recording of "Love (Makes The World Go Round)"—a hit in the States—is already released here.

Jimmy Phillips has also acquired three songs from the San Remo Festival for the KPM catalog—"Perche, Perche"; "Sull Acqua" and "Le Voci."

The 'New Look' policy inaugurated by Oriole Records a year ago has certainly paid off. Having entered the charts at the end of last year with "Like I Do" by Maureen Evans, the label has now firmly established itself with a second entry "Hava Nagila" by The Spotnicks. The Swedish group has just completed a successful three-week tour of Britain.

Although there is no broadcasting outlet (other than Radio Luxembourg) for authentic rhythm and blues material in Britain, Oriole Records is forging ahead with its Motown catalog. Considering it has a minority appeal, it is having quite a bit of success, particularly in areas where there is a large colored population. Next two singles to be released are "Shake Sherry" by The Contours and "Stubborn Kind Of Fellow" by Martin Gaye.

The dynamic Brenda Lee arrives here on March 10th to start a three-week nationwide tour. She will have the backing of Sounds Incorporated and her touring companions will include Mike Berry, The Bachelors, Steve Perry and Tony Sheridan. Already in the charts is her latest single "All Alone Am I" and Decca has issued an LP, "Brenda, That's All." While in this country, she will appear on ABC TV's top teen program, "Thank Your Lucky Stars."

Another American artist to appear on "Thank Your Lucky Stars" is Little Eva, who just completed a very successful British tour. Her LP "Lilloco-Motion" is issued on the London label.

Decca artist Doug Sheldon has recorded a French version of his English disk "I Saw Linda Yesterday" for release in France on the Decca label. This is Doug's first foreign language recording and Decca's European representative Marcel Stellman was on hand to help with pronunciation problems.

Nana Mouskouri returned to London to cut "A Force de Prier"—the Luxembourg Eurovision entry. Fontana's Paris A and R Manager Gerard Cote joined Britain's Jack Baverstock on the session. English and German versions were also cut for possible future release in those territories.

Pye Records released the Sammy Davis Reprise waxing of "As Long As She Needs Me" from Lionel Bart's "Oliver," which is new breaking attendance records in America. This was a big hit for Shirley Bassey in 1960 when her Columbia waxing stayed in the Top Twenty for 20 weeks.

Liberty recording star Bobby Vee is an established favorite with the British teenagers and his LP, "Bobby Vee Meets The Crickets" and EP, "Sincerely" have been featured in the album charts for many weeks. His latest single "The Night Has A Thousand Eyes" has now entered the Top Twenty and looks all set for a long stay. Also coming up fast is his "Bobby Vee Recording Session" LP.

The Avons have covered the No. 1 American smash "Hey Paula" for their latest Decca disk as have the 14 year old Irish twins Elaine and Derek on Piccadilly. The original American version by Paul and Paula is available on Philips.

The BBC TV's late-nite satirical program "That Was The Week That Was" (which now has an audience of nearly 10,000,000) has already been put on disk in album form but now Parlophone have waxed the catchy title song sung by Millicent Martin. The 23 year old ex-Cambridge undergraduate comper David Frost is also heard on the disk. Another version is by Ron Grainer on Decca.

Manager Derek Boulton reports that singer Sheila Southern has a two-week engagement in Estoril commencing March 23rd and a month's season of cabaret in Johannesburg in May where her HMV recording of "White Wedding" will be issued. The American publishing rights of the number have been acquired by E. Marks Music.

Following his LP of best loved Viennese songs, Harry Secombe has just returned from Paris where he recorded an album of best loved French songs. His latest Philips single is an English version of "Catari Catari" which has been retitled "Unforgiving Heart."

Into London came American TV personality Ed Sullivan making final arrangements for the London taping of an "Ed Sullivan Show" which will feature British stars Frank Ifield and Helen Shapiro.

On the same show, Columbia artiste Frank Ifield collected a Melody Maker Press Award for his "I Remember You" single.

## ARGENTINA

Nat Shapiro, director of the international sound recording and creative service of CBS Columbia, visited Buenos Aires recently. Shapiro was invited to the First International Jazz Festival taking place in the city of Mar del Plata, and had also the opportunity of visiting the local branch of CBS. Peter de Rougemont, recently appointed European vice-president of CBS, is also back in Buenos Aires, after a new trip to Europe, started a few weeks ago.

Antonio Prieto is making news again, this time by becoming record producer. The arrangement between him and Microfon Argentina was unveiled a few days ago, during a talk we had with Mario Kaminsky, the diskery's topper. The first record to be released will be "Sing Along with Antonio Prieto and the Jazz Singers," an LP, and will be presented in March. However, Microfon rushed a single 33 designed specifically for promotion, featuring "Palabras Nuevas" and "Excuseme," both penned by Joaquin Prieto, Antonio's brother. According to the contract, Prieto will produce records distributed by Microfon; it hasn't been announced if he will also appear as an artist or not. On these days, Prieto is visiting the U.S.

More well known visitors: Enrique Guzman, Los Teen Tops and Manolo Muñoz, all from Mexico. CBS had a very good reception for Guzman at the Ezeiza Airport, Feb. 21, and afterwards organized a press conference. Los Teen Tops arrived in the same plane. We may not that Guzman was a member of the Teen Tops group, until he decided to become a soloist about a year ago. Guzman will appear on TV and at dance parties organized by Escala Musical. The Tops will also perform on TV, and so will Muñoz.

Everybody at Sicamericana (Music Hall) is happily listening to the new records of the label now represented by the diskery, Gema. The arrangement between Music Hall and Gema established that both companies will release the other's records reciprocally. Gema's catalog may be of big interest in Argentina, since it features well known artists like Rolando Laserie, Cortijo y su Combo, Elena Burke, Fernando Alvarez and others.

Disc Jockey is also continuing its expansion. Now, it has finished an arrangement with Disques Vega of France for tape exchange. Besides, it is sending tapes of many of its recordings to Brazil and Mexico, to Continental Records (DJ's rep. in Brazil) and Disco Importadora of Mexico, which seems very interested in all the recordings made by Juan Ramon in Buenos Aires. This artist has recently finished a new series of recordings, which includes "Ese Beso," "Desafinado," "Next Door to an Angel," "Limbo Rock," "Si E Spento Il Sole" and other chart riders. Another DJ artist, Rosamel Araya, has cut a local tune which is believed to become a big smash: "Marido y Mujer" (Wife and Husband). The song was penned by Juan Carlos Correa and Silvio Soldan, and the orchestra was directed by well known Horacio Malvicino. After his personal appearances in the city of Rosario during Carnival, Araya is preparing a tour of all Latin America, to be started in March or April.

Reports from Lebanon inform us that the Los Tres Sudamericanos group have been very well received in that country. Besides, their version of "Tombola" is running very well in Greece's best seller list. The tune was recorded in Spain, and is included in a new Compact 33 to be released soon in Argentina, by CBS.

A new record by Los Chalchaleros is always good news. This time, it features also the voices of the members of the group, Juan Carlos Saravia, Ricardo Davalos, Ernesto Cabeza and Victor Jose Zambrano. Some of the titles are "Pinceladas del Pago," "Coplas de Ausencia," "La Raqueña" and several other folk hits. The album has been released by RCA.

The promotion department of Music Hall is working on the latest Pat Boone production: "Meditacion" and "Acuarela Brasileña," two Bossa Nova tunes, and the first record by Little Joe and The Thrillers, from the Reprise catalog: "Peanuts," and "No, No, I Can't Stop." There is also the first record by Donald, a new MII artist, called "Gina" and "Pretty Blue Eyes," and a new single by local arranger and musician Lito Escarso: "Limbo Rock."

Producciones Fermata released "Si E Spento el Sole," by Adriano Celentano forty eight hours after the inking of a new arrangement between PF and Jolly Records from Italy. As it is known, "Si E . . ." has been recently on top of the Italian charts, and recently was in the number six spot. Fedmata believes that it will sell very well in Argentina. Besides, the diskery has put to sale a new album of the 4:35 Cameo series, featuring Bernie Lowe and his orchestra, playing in the "Big Bands" style such tunes as "Exodus," "The Twist," and "Moon River."

Ariel has released two records designed for Carnival, and recorded in Brazil by Musidisc. The titles are "Carnival for Tourists" and "Sambas en Bronce," and are expected to meet the Carnival music market these days.

Odeon is releasing a new album by Mexican singer Manolo Muñoz, currently in Buenos Aires. The record contains Manolo's latest hits, like "Speedy Gonzales," "Lulu," "Multiplication" and "Lonely Boy," all sung in Spanish. Muñoz is well known in Buenos Aires, and it may be supposed that this LP will sell well. There are also new LP's by Gilbert Becaud, who is in the lists with "Et Manteinant," and Lucho Gatica, also including "Et Manteinant," but in Spanish. The Gatica record is completed with "El Pecador," "Exodus," "El Poeta Loro" and other smashes. Local artist Luis Aguilé has also completed a new LP, titled "La Chacota" after his latest film. The orchestra was directed by Armando Patrono. Aguilé has also cut "Ya No Estamos Juntos," an Italian tune with good possibilities.

Fermata Publishers acquired the rights for two more chart items in Argentina: "Sealed with a Kiss" and "Darlin'." The pubbery has also Brazilian Carnival song "Bota Rolha" (Tira el Corcho), and Italian tune "Vola Vola D'ame" (Huye de Mi), which has been already cut by Romana Farres, for the Disc Jockey label.

Gigi Gallo of Fortissimo Americana is very happy with the success in Italy of "Adios Mi Amor," an Argentine tune penned by local composer Aldo Legui. "Adios . . ." has been cut by Claudia, with the Tullio Gallo orchestra. Besides, Gallo is working on "Ya No Estamos Juntos," which has several recordings in Argentina: Palito Ortega (RCA); Pappino de Capri (Odeon Pops), Los Santos (Music Hall) and Tony Vilar (CBS).

Surco has released three new LP's under the United Artists label: Herbie Mann's "African Suite," by Johnny Rae and his Septet, "Midnight Dance Party," starring Al Caiola, and "Pianos In Paradise" by Ferrante & Teicher. We must note that the jackets of these records are really very well made, and are probably one the best printing works ever made for regular-priced albums in Argentina. In general, Surco has been taking big care of this part of the record during the last year.



# SCANDINAVIA

## DENMARK

Actress Grethe Thordahl and composer Hans Schreiber have made a record for Pan Records, distributed by Hede Nielsen's Fabriker A/S (RCA in Denmark). The Grethe Thordahl record includes "En Lillebitte Rød Pompon," a song dedicated to Princess Anne-Marie of Denmark, recently engaged to Crown Prince Konstantin of Greece.

NPA (Nordisk Polyphon A/S) has rushed out Chris Montez' "Some Kinda Fun" on London, and "Walk Right In" with The Two Smith Brothers on Decca. In connection with the Duke Ellington concerts at the Falkoner Centret on Feb. 8th, NPA rushed out the LP, "Money Jungle," in stereo and mono.

I. S. Dansk Grammofonpladeforlag has released an EP on Sonet with Kjeld Ingrisch presenting "Viser Fra Det Gamle Kjöbenhavn" (Songs from the Old Copenhagen).

## FINLAND

Many groups like The Shadows have appeared here recently. One of them, The Sounds, recently made their first record for Fontana, recording "Emma" and "Mandschurian Beat."

Osmo Ruuskanen, a & r man of Musiikki-Fazer, told Cash Box that the German song "Manzanilla" is very popular in Finland at the moment. Recently it was recorded in Finnish by Marion Rung and Johnny Forsell on the Decca label.

A Finnish song, "Satumaa" (Fairyländ) with Reijo Taipale on Scandia is now topping the charts in Finland. Other local copyrights doing very well is "Musta Ruusu" (Black Roses), recorded with Veikko Tuomi on Odeon, "Uusi Säkijärven Polkka" (The New Säkijärven Polka) with The Vostok All-Stars on RCA and "Leirinuotiolla" (By the Watch-Fire) with Olavi Virta on the Nor-Disc. All listed here now appear among the Top 20 in Finland.

## NORWAY

The Melody Grand Prix took place last Saturday over the Norwegian TV stations. The winning song was a waltz titled "Solhverv," which will represent Norway in the Eurovision Song Festival in London in March. Composer of the song is Dag Kristoffersen, who is also lyric writer. Publisher of the song is Norsk Musikforlag A/S. The first recording of the song, with Jan Höiland on Columbia, is already on the market. The songs coming in second and third in the local competition, "Jakteskipperen" and "Vi Slentret Langs En Vårlig Sti" has been recorded by Jens Book-Jensen at the HMV label. The latter two songs have not yet been published.

Ase Thoresen is now doing very well with the Norwegian recording of "Send Me The Pillow You Dream On" (Send Meg Et Bilde Kjaere Käre) on Triola, a label owned by Egil Monn Iversen A/S. Back in 1959, Miss Thorsen started working at Egil Monn Iversen as a telephone operator, but did her record debut within a short time and has since then had several top sellers.

## SWEDEN

A postcard just arrived from publisher Felix Stahl, who is visiting Milan, after having attended the San Remo Festival, where he obtained the Scandinavian rights for the winning song, "Uno Per Tutte."

Barbara Gardner, export manager of Vee Jay Records, recently visited Stockholm for biz talks with Simon Brehm of Karusell Records. Combining business with pleasure, she used the Swedish winter to try skiing for the first time, which turned out very successfully. Also here recently for business talks with Simon Brehm was the Los Angeles record distributor Jack Lewerke of Merit Distr. Corp., and California Record Distributing Co. Lewerke recently started his own label, Vault, and was happy to get a best seller with his first LP, which will now be released in Scandinavia by Karusell, Brehm told Cash Box. Lewerke heard the Swedish group, The Spot-nicks, and considered them a sure bet for the United States and will present their records there in the near future.

Dag Häggqvist of Sonet Grammofon AB told Cash Box that the firm is very happy that its records now seem to do well in many countries of the world. Rune Ofverman's "Madison Piano" was recently released in the United States and England. The group The Violents will have their first record released in England by EMI in the near future, and Jerry Williams will have his "Wedding Bells Make Me Run"/"Twistin' Patricia" released at the Moonglow label in the United States within a short time. Some of Ernie Englund's records have been released by Hockey in Italy and Fly in Belgium.

Coming here for concerts are Cannonball Adderley on March 19 and Ella Fitzgerald and Oscar Peterson in the first week of April. Mahalia Jackson is expected here in the end of April, and negotiations are going on with the Gerry Mulligan Quartet.

Simon Brehm reported it was a great success when Duke Ellington recently toured Sweden. While here, Karusell recorded an LP with the suite "Night Creature" in three movements. The recording was originally planned with a 93 piece symphonic band plus the Ellington musicians, but since the MU musicians asked for too much in payment, the LP was made with a 54 piece band plus the Ellington musicians. The LP will be released in the United States by Reprise, Simon Brehm told Cash Box.

During the Swedish Song Festival, which took place over all Swedish TV stations last Saturday, Feb. 16th, 12 songs competed. A special 12 piece jury voted for the best song, which will represent Sweden in the Eurovision Song Festival in London on March 18. The winning song was "En Gaang I Stockholm," words by Beppe Wolfers, melody by Bobbie Ericson, and sung by Philip's artists Carli Tornehave and Monica Zetterlund.

This year two different competitions were arranged by SBC-TV, who arranged the competition. First of all, six composers, winners of previous competitions, and in the second competition, everybody who liked to send in their contribution. From the latter category, six songs appeared, while the other six came from the invited composers.

# BELGIUM

Billy Bishop is a new name on the London label. There are great expectations about his first record, which features "Cancel the Reservation." The Belgian Kili Jacks have had Carnival on their minds and cut a single for Barclay, showing "Doo-doo-doo" and "Jingles," which reflect the festive atmosphere of a Carnival day with the well known Gilles of Binche, a small Walloon town, where this colorful folklore group forms the principal attraction.

Jack Hammer, who is known over here as The Twistin' King, has again done very well with his latest recording "Stop Slop" (Ronnex). A number of radio stations, both in the Flemish and French speaking parts of Belgium have in recent weeks featured "From A Jack To A King," in the original version by Ned Miller. On the forefront of the repertoire of the cheaper Teen-records (only 39 francs or 78 cents) are numbers like "Eenzaam zonder jou," "Coeur blessé," "Limbo Rock" and "Sans toi Mamie." These numbers are however not rendered by the original performers.

Fonior had a cocktail party at the Martini bar in Brussels for the Los Machucambos Trio, who happened to be in the Belgian capital.

Before appearing on a popular record program for Flemish TV, Walloon top performer Adamo was little known. This telecast gave him a chance to sing his own composition "Sans toi Mamie," which is now ranking high with NV Gramophone (on Pathé) and at the same time a bestseller in Belgium. Ardmore and Beechwood have secured world rights for six original Adamo songs: "N'est-ce pas merveilleux," "J'aime un fleur," "En blue jeans et blouson de cuir," "Laissons dire," "Fais-toi croque-mort" and "Sans-toi Mamie." The last four appear on an EP and are distributed in France by Pathé Marconi.

At the invitation of Inelco-Belgium, Cash Box went to visit the Netherlands television studios in Bussum in the company of Willy Roelants, RCA-salesman and a Flemish journalist, to have a look at the Rudi Carrell-show, in which the American folkloristic trio The Limelites appeared. They did three songs and it was said afterwards that their performance had been a great success. The show was seen in Belgium the week after the live cast in Holland, everything having been taken on Ampex-tape. The Limelites are a very capable ensemble in their domain but we didn't think they are outdoing The Journeymen and the Kingston Trio. Their gags are nevertheless very sharp and possibly other American ensembles are not equipped similarly. Popularity of The Limelites is on its way up anyway, for a few days after their appearance in Holland, they went to Brussels where they did a fifty minute show for the entertainment section on Flemish TV.

After the TV show in Bussum, we had a look round the Inelco offices and warehouses in Amsterdam. Everything here has been done to keep things going in a speedy and orderly manner, and obviously this goal has been reached.

As we had expected, the latest record by Alberto Cortez, featuring "Prima Donna" and "Amapola" is doing well, which proves that although Alberto is living in Belgium, he is still very popular. His friend, Argentine-born Carlos Montero who accompanied him when he came to this country, and who decided to stay here with him, apparently does not want to be left behind. He therefore hopes that his latest record, featuring "Segamos Tecando" and "Pantalan Talito," will score heavily. Both are on Show-records.

Soon to be on the market are four new songs by very popular local singer Robert Cogoi (Si un jour), who established his reputation by first winning the 1962 Grand Prix de Variété and then making his first record a best seller even in the Flemish part of the country (Philips).

Under the Fontana label is the American number by the Rooftop Singers, "Walk Right In." Johnny Halliday again hits the charts with "Elle est terrible" (Something else) and "Pas cette chanson" (Philips).

# AUSTRALIA

English singer Shirley Bassey has been awarded £3,000 (Australian) damages by the Supreme Court in Sydney in a defamation case against Sungravure Ltd., publishers of Pix, a weekly magazine; this amount is in the vicinity of \$6,000. The case was heard before Justice Macfarlane and a jury of four.

EMI has suddenly speeded up their release program of overseas hits. There used to be quite a time lag between a US or English release and the appearance of the same record on the local scene through EMI but the situation is vastly improved now with a new rush-release program in operation. Records such as "What Does A Girl Do?"—Marcie Blane; "Dance On!"—The Shadows; "In Dreams"—Roy Orbison; "Butterfly Baby"—Bobby Rydell and "The Puzzle" by Gene McDaniels have already been in Australia for the past couple of weeks.

Set for a concert season in this country beginning late in March are Louis Armstrong and His Jazz All Stars, together with the Eddie Cano Quartet. The Australian tour is being handled by Arthur J. Tait in association with James Dilena by arrangement with Harry Miller.

Chris Vaughan-Smith of Southern Music has secured the Australian and New Zealand rights to the current worldwide smash "Walk Right In" which is doing great disk business in this part of the world for Astor Records with the single release by the Rooftop Singers. The Southern group also controls "What Will Mary Say" and the English hit tune "Must Be Madison."

Local boys The Deltones are making giant strides in progress with their fine single on the Leedon label of "Come A Little Closer." This is an excellent piece of production and is worthy of immediate worldwide action.

George Taylor, of Melbourne Records (a subsidiary of Rodeo Records) in Canada, advises he is planning to release the album "Frankie Davidson's Big 16" which he has negotiated through W&G Records in Australia; a single from the album will also be issued. Frankie moves out at the end of February for a lengthy tour of New Zealand.

Dr. John Chapman, writer of such hits as "Southern 'Rora" and "Xmas Guitar"—both of which were successfully recorded by The Joy Boys, was a recent visitor to Cash Box. John recently collected third prize in a playwriting contest conducted throughout Australia by General Motors.

One of the recent big American hits "Up On The Roof" by The Drifters looks like it's missing out on any really big success in Australia—a couple of cover versions are making headway in England but it seems unlikely that the song will emulate its American and English success in this country.

Eydie Gorme will probably have the biggest Australian hit of her career with her present CBS label single "Blame It On The Bossa Nova." It is catching top-notch airplay and should soon hit the high spots on sales charts. Eydie's husband, Steve Lawrence, is on the best-seller list with his CBS release "Go Away Little Girl."

As an illustration of a point we made in an editorial of a few weeks back on the problem of local records gaining national recognition, we cite the present instance of "Surfside" by The Denver Men—which is close to the number one record in Sydney where it was produced—and "The Girl Behind The Bar" by Johnny Ashcroft which has also done good business in Sydney . . . neither of these records has done good business in Melbourne which is regarded as a prime disc market. Reversing the situation, we find that two of the hottest singles in Melbourne are "Summertime Blues" by Johnny Chester and "Leavin' Town" and "Cry Of The Wild Goose" by The Strangers—both disks are by Melbourne artists and neither record has done anything in Sydney . . . yet each disk is good enough to get top action in their local markets so there can't be much wrong with these records if they can enjoy fine sales in their home States. Since our first editorial on this problem, Cash Box in Australia has received many comments from disk-jockeys, record companies and publishers all condemning this sad state of affairs—but there has been little or no improvement. Again we say: if the Australian record industry is to develop to the stage of successful competition for a share of the international market, it must first solve its most urgent problem—that of national acceptance of Australian recording talent.

# JAPAN

Though we have still a severe winter in Japan, people have been feeling the approach of spring since celebrating the traditional Spring Starting Day, with the colorful event of pitching beans against the imaginary demons to chase them away. We shall have a number of visitors for the early spring season, of whom announced until this date are:

German popular singer, Caterina Valente, in Feb. for the first performance here; Chubby Checker, well known to our fans as the King of Twist, in Feb.; George Shearing, the jazz pianist, in Mar.; French singer Gilbert Becaud, in Mar.; Lionel Hampton, King of the Vibes, and originator of Two Finger System on piano, in Apr., with all his stars; Count Basie and his 16 members, holding big popularity among our fans as the leading orchestra of America, in May; England's Mantovani Orchestra, dominating our mood music world, in May; Marcel Amont, French popular singer, in May.

Ray Charles was honored by Nippon King Records for the big sales of his disks released from the company during the last half-year, "All About Ray Charles" (LP album), "Ray Charles Country Song O Utah" (LP album), and many singles. He is the first artist to receive the Hit Prize of this company as an American or as a male singer, and the third foreigner after the war, following Caterina Valente and Kathy Linden. The Prize is to be presented through Samuel Clark, president of ABC-Paramount.

Victor Shuppan KK is releasing modern jazz albums, the original masters of Prestige, including dates by Art Blakey, Horace Silver, Miles Davis, Sonny Rollins and Stan Getz.

Nippon Grammophon Records established two deals on new labels: One is Ansonia, on which it is pushing Middle-South American Music. The first release will be in March, an album of a native chorus group Julito Rodorigez Trio. The other one is the original master of "Sounds Of Hawaii," to be re-released on the Polydor Label. The first such issue is due March 20.

Nippon Columbia is putting to sale two issues of coupled 30cm LP records. "All About Connie Francis" is a collection of her hits, while "Marty Robbins For You" is the 4th issue of Columbia's popular series, which features popular singers in 30cm mono coupled records.

# CANADA

Under the heading of "it can shake your day up a little," try this item for size. A very female voice on the phone the other A.M., identifying the caller as "Mister" Lori Bruner of Astral Records in Toronto. All these months this reporter was under the impression that the "live" wire chief of Astral was a gentleman, only to discover that all the mailing pieces and samples were supplied all the time by a very charming lady, Lori Bruner. Lori's currently riding the crest of some very commercial items. "Ain't Gonna Kiss Ya," a recent Cash Box Top 100 item, is released in this country by Astral and features The Ribbons. Another strong sales item at Astral branches across Canada is the new sound by The Furys, entitled, "Zing Went The Strings Of My Heart." Astral has picked up Canadian distribution rights to a strong cover item on the current best seller, "Spanish Twist." Originating on Holiday Inn Records in the States, Lori reports that The Roller Coasters are getting their share of Canadian spins with their version of the hit. Outstanding sales, especially throughout Ontario, were realized by Astral on the Gary Ferrier comedy outing, "The President's Canadian Press Conference." In only four days the side rang up 10,000 sales for the diskery in Ontario alone.

One of the best new sounds of the week to cross the desk originated with a diskery in Winnetka, Ill. Premere Records are high on their new release by a gal called Dora Hall. The song is "Hello Faithless," and possesses that happy balance of country/pop sounds that is proving so successful in today's market. At least one large Canadian firm is very excited about the Premere release and is doing everything in their power to tie up Canadian distribution rights for the Dora Hall disk. The disk's early exposure in the Chicago area has resulted in its appearing on numerous Chicago area station play sheets.

From Reg Ayres, Quality's man in "Wonderful Winnipeg," comes the report that Canada's mid-west is absolutely limbo crazy. "Let's Limbo Some More" by Chubby Checker is breaking wide open in Reg's territory. The flip side, "Twenty Miles," is also showing strongly in some western centers, according to Reg. The Richard Chamberlain LP has the females in Canada's wide west in an advanced state of panic, the like of which hasn't been seen since Frank Sinatra's early days in the business.

Johnny Maddox is set for Winnipeg's Club 76 opening (3/4). Big package of top record talent headed into the Manitoba Capital for a one niter (3/23). Package is to be headlined by Little Eva and Paul & Paula. The Paul & Paula album package is getting a big push in the area, says Reg, as a result of the forthcoming appearance by the duo. Winnipeg has gone in a big way for the newie by George McCurn, "I'm Just A Country Boy." Ottawa is reportedly following suit on the Barry release that features a backing by Herb Alpert of "Tiajuana Brass" fame. Tremendous adult response in all areas on the "Country Boy" side, as well as enthusiastic response from teens.

Considerable flip side action reported in the Ottawa market on the Johnny Cymbal Kapp outing, "Mr. Bass Man." Entitled, "Sacred Lovers Vow," the side first began getting spins by deejays at teen hops throughout the Capital on the basis of requests by the dancers. From there the action spilled over into a few deejay shows on the air, and as a result considerable action is now reported at the retail level on both sides of the Cymbal hit.

Deejays and customers alike are terribly excited over the Billy Vaughn album, "1962's Greatest Hits." It's packed with excellent programming material and is showing up on one deejay stint after another all across the country. Something of a sleeper, and in the same general category as the Vaughn package, is the tremendous album outing on Cameo by Jack Pleis and His Orchestra. "All The Hits," a package of delightful instrumental arrangements by the much respected Mr. Pleis on the big hits of 1962 is another must play item with the country's platter spinners. This turntable action is beginning to bear fruit in sales action on the package in several important Canadian centers.

Don Gibson's new RCA Victor single will be a toss up. Both sides are great, "Head Over Heels In Love With You" seems destined to be a two-market smash, country and pop, while the flip, "It Was Worth It All," appears headed for some real sales action in the country dept.

Dean Hagopian, spinner on Ottawa's CKOY, repeated his victory of last year in an annual station promotion billed as the "King Of Hearts" contest. Gimmick calls for listeners to vote for the station's personality they like the best at a pre-arranged commercial establishment, a different one for each participating jock. Winning deejay draws from ballots deposited for him and awards numerous prizes to voters so selected.

Rich Little is enjoying healthy sales on his comedy impersonation package in many top markets. The set, "My Fellow Canadians" on Capitol, continues to do well in the comic's home town, Ottawa, and recent reports from Regina indicate the set is being played heavily on CKCK, and as a result showing well in the sales columns in the Prairie City. Rich was to do a few of the impersonations from his album on the Tommy Ambrose Network TV'er set for (2/22). The show was taped in advance and in the can for showing on that date, however, in the interim a federal general election was called in Canada. The network felt that under these circumstances the impressions that were to be part of the Ambrose show on the date mentioned would not be in order, so the entire show was scrapped for that evening.

Belated congratulations from this corner to Paul Anka on the occasion of his recent wedding.

Earl Grant's new single, "Steve's Theme" and "Yes Sirree" seem headed for hitsville. Hal Ross reports that early reaction to the two sides has been outstanding. Another big starter for Hal and the Compo folks is "Preacher-man" by Charlie Russo on Apex. Johnny Tillotson with "Out Of My Mind" and The Exciters new deck, "He's Got The Power" are also keeping Hal busy these days.

The Count Victors appeared week of (2/18) at the Ottawa House Hotel in Hull, Quebec. The group are expecting an early release on their latest Coral outing, entitled "Road Runner." There are two new members of the group currently, Don Wheeler and Jim McCheran, both Canadian musicians, recently joined to fill spots left by departing Count Victors. Highlight of the group's stay in Canada's Capital, say the fellows, was an after hours jam session with Veejay artist John Lee Hooker who was appearing at another Ottawa night spot. The sounds reportedly came on strong all night long.

London Records and Gilles Aubin keeping very busy with some outstanding new LP products these days. "Victory In Review" a new Phase 4 stereo outing that can only be called, "spectacular" is creating a lot of sales excitement. "The Best Of Renata Tebaldi" in mono and stereo is doing a brisk business with the great artist's legions of fans.

A new liberty LP release is bringing a lot of deejay and customer attention reports London's Keith Ashdown. Highlights of the most recent release are "Spanish Lace" a great collection of latin flavored items by Gene McDaniels. "Another Taste Of Honey" the great new Martin Denny set seems to justify what the name implies. Deejay exposure has been really encouraging, says Keith. Singles are also strong with a flock of new items originating in Great Britain currently doing a big business for Gilles and Keith.



# GERMANY

The independent record producer has made his way into the American and British markets to such an extent that these two major markets couldn't live without him. English Decca is perhaps the strongest example, as the firm has no producers itself and is completely dependent on independent product and Decca is certainly one of the top firms in that land.

The question today is whether the 23rd biggest world market, Germany, will follow the same path. Germany is a country where every major record firm has its set list of company A&R men working on a salary plus percentage basis and the market has grown powerful through the excellent work of these men.

The independent producer was an unknown factor until a year ago, and still is a very minor factor in sales here. However, the small indie production firms has produced such hits on the market as "Hawaii Tattoo" for Teldec which was a top tenner here, and "St. Tropez Twist" by Metronome which passed the 300,000 mark in sales. Other big sellers through the independent production and distribution of Golden 12 Records and Bernhard Mikulski have certainly played an important role in sales this last year and who can forget "The Liebestraum As Twist," which was also an indie production.

A new indie record "Wini Wini" distributed by Polydor is now racking up top sales and more and more industry men are planning on building up production firms mainly distributed by major labels. This development is a healthy one for the firms as they must just sit back and judge the finished product and decide whether they will distribute it or not without the tremendous costs of producing records which do not have the chance to develop into hits, but must be released as they have already cost the firm a pile of money.

The indie producers are also a wonderful method of finding and building up new talent which is a very expensive proposition. It has been proven over and over that if a record has it in the grooves, it can mean big sales, big name or no name. The new found job of indie producer can mean big business, lower costs and a shot in the arm to the very sick singles business in Germany.

Ralph Maria Siegel reports that the new Bob Moore single "Flea Circus" is beginning to rack up top sales. Ralph also has the flip side, "Autumn Souvenirs". Other top hits for the firm include the Burl Ives smash "Mary Ann Regrets" sung in German by Gunnar Wiklund for Ariola, Jorgen Ingmann's new hit "Africa" and a new waxing by the Gloria Trio on his own Jupiter label. Ralph also reports that there are already 34 different versions of "Desafinado" released in Germany.

Mike Clifford has his first German sung record on the market for United Artists. It's a German waxing of his "Laurie" smash.

Hazy Osterwald Sextet has the first "Maroc" recording in German out on Polydor.

Hans Gerig announces that they have the 3rd place winner by the San Remo Festival "Giovane, Giovane" by Pino Donaggio with the Italian record already rushed onto the market by Electrola.

Electrola Records shot out a quick letter announcing that the top 2 songs from San Remo were recorded in German by Vittorio who burned up the charts with his waxing of "Cuando Caliente El Sol" in half-German-Half Italian.

Teldec Records is working hard on Vico Torriani's waxing of "Pepino" and Billy Vaughn's newie "Down Yonder" b/w "I'm Waiting."

Swinging Paul Siegel reports that he has been hired by a top Berlin newspaper as music critic and reporter. Paul is now back in the states buying and selling like crazy.

Hans R. Beierlein reports that his new Charley Tabor waxing of "Caucasian Melody" b/w "Mexican Moon" have been sold all over the world. Both tunes were written by hitmaker Werner Scharfenberger, who has written most of the German hits for Connie Francis, Peter Kraus, Mina, etc. The waxing will be released in the U. S. on Laurie, in France and Belgium on Vogue, in Italy on Sprint, in Holland on Imperial, in Australia on W&G and in Germany, Austria and Switzerland on German Vogue.

Han's big hit "Monsieur" sung by Petula Clark is now racking up chart sales in many countries in Europe. Petula has recorded the song in French and Italian along with her German version.

# HOLLAND

Bovema's Columbia-label really swinging in Holland with Buddy Greco's new LP "I Like It Swinging."

Ellen Cramer, Award-winner in the Dutch pop vocal-category last year, taped "Een Speeldoos" for Bovema's Imperial-label. The number will be Holland's contribution to the Eurovision-Songfestival in London, March next. Composer Pieter Goemans wrote the song especially for Ellen's voice.

Bovema's HMV/SGL-label rushed out balladeer's Jaap Fischer's interpretation of "Zeg Me Waar De Bloemen Zijn," a Dutch version of "Where Have All The Flowers Gone," which is also on the repertory of Capitol's Kingston-Trio and WB's Peter, Paul & Mary. The flipside covers Fischer's own "Jan Soldaat."

Artone has launched an all-out sales drive on the Bossa Nova this month. With the original version of "Desafinado" by Stan Getz & Charlie Byrd now riding the charts and with plenty of action to report on the vocal version by Ella Fitzgerald (also on the Verve label), Artone's A&R Department has been very active in recording BN-items with local artists. Already released are Willy Schobben's strong readings of "Me Voy P'al Pueblo" and "Maria de Bahia" and "Si tu vas à Rio" and O passo de Kanguru." Both decks blossom beautifully here.

New star teen combo Willy & His Giants, which scored high with "Sarie Marijs" last year, out now with two tremendous instrumentals back to back: "Ajoen, Ajoen" and "Huckleberry Beat." According to U. S. publisher Harry Goodman, visiting here recently "A recording which should sell well in all areas due to the highly professional musicianship and unique sound control!"

Artone has managed to become a leader in the field of record packaging in the Benelux countries. All singles handled by the Artone and Funckler sales-organizations are released in poly-color sleeves featuring a photograph of the performing artist (s). A dealer and buyer service not yet equalled in these countries. According to Paul Visser, of publicity & promotion, all LP and EP recordings released by Artone are now issued in a new type of sleeve made of heavy, everlasting, clear PVC-foil. Largest part of the printing and sleeve-manufacturing is done by Artone's affiliate company, Arprint.

Hans Tecker of L.C. Phonogram reported that Decca's "Ace of Club" label has released a popular priced LP with two "unsurpassable, historic performances." "They are Beethoven's 4th Piano Concerto played by Clara Haskil, and Mozart's 24th Piano Concerto by Kathleen Long. The Haskil recording dates from 1947, when the great artist did English radio concerts with the London Philharmonic. The Kathleen Long recording was made in 1948, with the Concertgebouw Orchestra of Amsterdam, conducted by Eduard van Beinum. Certainly an indispensable gain for Haskil-collectors, but the well-chosen coupling makes the record the more worthwhile.

The young but internationally well-known Greek singer Nana Mouskouri, who recorded such a splendid album with American standards for the Fontana-label lately ("Nana Mouskouri In New York"), sang a version of "My Coloring Book," which is drawing attention here. Johnny Keating's Orchestra supplies the excellent musical backing. Coupled with "My Lover" on Fontana.

The sensational version of "How Much Is That Doggie In The Window" by Baby Jane & The Rock-A-Byes on United Artists, was proclaimed a "top" in the February-issue of Holland's popular "Top or Flop" TV-program. Jury and Public (some odd hundred teen-agers) agreed unanimously on its top-hit chances.

Rushing up the Dutch hit-parade is Pat Boone's rendition of "Meditation" (Meditacao) on the London-label. It is obvious that popular songs from Brazilian origin (especially in such a remarkably well-done style as Boone's) are very well received by the modern teen-agers since the victory of Bossa Nova. Boone's "Meditation" is coupled with "Mexican Joe".

The Blue Diamonds, not much heard of since their very successful "Marching Along With The Blue Diamonds," made an excellent recording of "Alice In Wonderland" for Decca. "This was the best recording-session with the boys I have ever witnessed," Jan de Winter of L.C. Phonogram's programming Office told us. "You see, it was hard to find suitable material and suitable recording dates while they were in their final military training for such a long time. They will be in the center of Dutch show-business again!" Alice, backed by Chorus and Orchestra conducted by Jack Bulterman, is coupled with "Bye Bye Lola."

# BRAZIL

BOSSA NOVA NEWS—Aldon Music sent a cable to Brazil saying that it will wax here in our country an LP with the best numbers of its catalog, in Bossa Nova rhythm. The arrangements will be the responsibility of Antonio Porto Filho—(Portinho)—and Francisco Moraes—(Chiquinho), two young and talented arrangers, the first one being responsible for the orchestral accompaniment of "Volta Por Cima"—a smash hit throughout Brazil. In Argentina, Bossa Nova is taking gigantic steps. The singer Olga Lee was in Sao Paulo recording for RCA two Bossa Nova numbers to be released in her country. She loves the style of our sambas and had enormous facility in interpreting the Bossa Nova sound. Henrique Lebendiger, from Fermata, said to Cash Box that the American and the European record and music dealers don't understand yet what the Bossa Nova really is. In his opinion, it's a very simple music. Some Brazilian numbers already in the hands of foreign artists, can't get public attention, because the lyrics are based on social problems, very particular to the Brazilian people and not very easy to be understood by a non-Brazilian public. Lebendiger concluded by reminding the foreign music and record dealers, that we have lots more of Bossa Nova hits around here which deserve their attention.

Antonio and Joaquin Prieto, brothers of great international popularity, one singing, the other composing and arranging, were in Brazil recently recording in the RGE studios for RCA. Antonio Prieto is a very popular songster in our country and his brother had, months ago, a smash hit on our charts, "A Noiva" (The Bride).

Nelson Gonçalves—a consistent chart rider in all Brazil, waxed for RCA a new album, gathering songs by the greatest Brazilian composers of all time, such as Ary Barroso, Dolores Duran, Vinicius de Moraes, Antonio Carlos Jobim and others.

The "Chico Viola" prize, distributed by "TV and Radio Record," is one of the most important Record awards in the country. Among the rewarded artists of this year is Ray Ellis for his great hit "Dumpy" during 1962.

Copacabana Records just put in the retail stores a new release for February-March, including 12 LP's, 6 double compact and 20 in 78's. HANK SNOW (RCA Victor 8151)

The vet chanter, who hit last time out with "I've Been Everywhere," comes up with a potent follow-up stanza with this Victor newie labeled "The Man Who Robbed The Bank At Santa Fe." The tune is a medium-paced folk ballad essayed by Snow with all of his expected authority. "You're Losing Your Baby" is a tender, slow-shufflin' weeper in a traditional country vein. Also merits a close look.

"WHO'LL HELP ME GET OVER YOU" (2:45) [Sure-Fire BMI—Perry]

"THE OTHER WOMAN" (2:26) [Sure-Fire BMI—Perry]

LORETTA LYNN (Decca 31471)

The lark seems sure destined to continue in her best-selling ways with this first-rate Decca release. The top side here, "Who'll Help Me Get Over You," is a slow-moving, easy-going, chorus-backed lament on a standard hillbilly theme. The side has enough good stuff in it to zoom up the charts. On the flip, "The Other Woman," Loretta offers an extremely pretty expression of heartbreak. Deejays should come out in force for the deck.

"MY FATHER'S VOICE" (3:30) [Glad BMI—Lynn]

"WHEN YOU THANKED ME FOR THE ROSES" (2:10)

JUDY LYNN (United Artists 571)

Judy Lynn, who hit a while back with "Footsteps Of A Fool," should reach the charts in no time flat this new United Artists outing tagged "My Father's Voice." The side is a moving, chorus-backed, self-penned "Mama Sang A Song"-styled recitation. Enough potential here to make some noise in the pop slot. On the flip, "When You Thanked Me For The Roses," the lark dishes up a pleasing, easy-on-the-ears traditional bluegrass-flavored lament.

The tune is a slow-moving, pop-flavored, chorus-backed lament with some top-flight moving lyrics. Side has that money-in-the-bank sound. The chanter claims he will hurt "Til Sunday" on the medium-paced weeper on the flip.

On "Three Little Words Too Late" the songster delivers a sentimental, shuffle-beat tear-jerker with loads of good stuff in it.

The Teenage Smoker

**TARGET  
FOR  
CIGARETTE

Whether the nation's cigarette operators like it or not, the sooner they alienate the teenage smoker the sooner they will be in a position to operate without fear of being legislated right out of business. That's the opinion of industry leaders and it happens to be the direction in which operators should move in order to be in a position to fight the biggest battle of their business lives—the tobacco-health controversy. As we said last week (CB Feb. 23) the problem here doesn't have anything to do with cancer inasmuch as the operator is concerned. If cigarettes cause cancer then steps will certainly be taken to protect the public. What will probably happen is that the trouble-making ingredients will be removed and cigarettes will continue to be sold and smoked. But that's the problem of the tobacco industry as such and the medical profession and lately the United States government.

The operator's responsibility to himself and his business lies in his defense against the attack which has come from those individuals and groups who claim that the way in which to protect the public from the alleged health impairment is to enforce the sale-to-minors law which happens to be on the books of every state in the union but three. And again, herein lies the operator's weakness in defense. Too many vending machines appear to be on location in areas where these same minors can avail themselves of a pack of smokes without any hindrance from the authorities, the location, or the operator himself. If possession is nine-tenths of the law, consider appearance to be ten-tenths, because that is the ammunition which will be used to attempt to legislate cigarette vending machines out of business in this country.

Last week we mentioned that several bills of this type are smoldering at this moment. Actually four states are considering bills to prohibit the sale of tobacco in various locations through vending machines. The sale-to-minors law is the basis for most of the action.

NAMA's Operation Alert! program, which is designed to prepare cigarette vending operators for this type of legislative attack, started the first of sixty-four sectional meetings on Feb. 19. The complete list of dates for all meetings can be found in this issue elsewhere. Operators will learn what must be done and how one should go about accomplishing certain goals in order to arrive at a position of strength as it pertains to a necessary and adequate defense.

But before your local meeting is held there is no need to sit back and await instructions. Following is a six-point program which can be followed immediately. It is about the best way a cigarette operator can protect his business from a law which will be used to take this business away from him.

1. Determine through survey the location of those machines to which minors are likely to have access.
2. Post large 'Minors Are Forbidden' decals, conspicuously.
3. Post name, address, and telephone number of operator, on each machine.
4. Solicit cooperation of location owners, include appropriate clause in next location contract, reposition machines where necessary to assure adequate supervision.
5. Remove, where necessary, machines located where sales to minors cannot be prevented.
6. Cooperate with competitors, offer local police cooperation in the enforcement of sale-to-minors law.

Just about every other retail outlet for cigarettes has a break proof alibi in defense of this law. The clerk merely states that he does not sell to minors. Operators are not in this same position. By following the six-point program, and attending the Operation Alert! meeting in their town, the cigarette operator can probably build a more positive and believable defense than these same outlets.

## Bally's 'Table Hockey' Hits When Enthusiastic Players Get Together

NEW YORK—By the week's end, Bally's new "Table Hockey" 2-player amusement game was considered a good location game by the trade, after distributors and operators alike worked to get the fast-play game off the ground. It was the case of a good thing not receiving the attention it deserved, but once the players started swinging the hockey sticks, everyone's eyes opened up. The action and interest the game produces is intense.

In Philadelphia, the "Table Hockey" game was received with the usual optimism, by Abe Witsen of Scott Crosse Company, Bally distrib for the State of Pennsylvania. Ops were reluctant to place the machines on location because in their estimation the game lacked "play appeal." This proved to be true in some instances but strictly from an offhand look. The game standing idle just doesn't catch on. But once the two Witsen boys, Billy and Harry, started competing before visiting ops, the action became apparent and the "beat you next game" spirit became evident. Before long, Abe got into the action, and ops joined into the competitive play. "We didn't answer too many phone calls for several hours, but we had a heck of a time playing hockey!" said Bill, who eventually managed to move the ten machines which were on the floor. At press time, according to Scott Crosse, the first collections were as expected—"Where the

crowd takes to the machine, the money was in the cash box. It's too early to tell about the one or two locations which didn't hold up. But the equipment has been moved around and the operators were more certain of the type spot which would give the machine its just play," said Witsen.

Jack Shawcross in Syracuse liked the game from the start and one location in particular was boasting high collections. "Considering the cost of the game the collections on our first deliveries are really something," said Shawcross. "One tavern has started a tourney play already and this is something that keeps the action going for several weeks," continued Shawcross. John Bilotta, Bilotta head expected to duplicate the "Table Hockey" success in his other territories where the game, according to one operator "was made for this section."

Runyon's Morris Rood and Irving Kempner shipped several units to the outlying areas and were awaiting results. "We expect good things from this game," stated Kempy. "The way the ops were playing it here in the showroom this week confirmed early feelings that you just have to play it to get worked up about it. But it's one heck of a game."

Norman Berkowitz, Deperrri Advertising Agency, ad exec handling many of the coin machine accounts in Philly and NYC, said that he "knocked himself out" playing the game in Philly. "Three games and I was sweating, so help me!" sighed Berkowitz, who has seen most of the games in this area for the past ten years. "The game is really something for operators to make the most of," continued the ad exec. "There's a lot in it that can come out providing the location has customers willing to play it and providing the operator promotes it."


Jack Bess in Richmond, Virginia, had shipped a half-dozen last week but hadn't checked out collection reports as yet. "I assume the game is doing well," said Bess. "I haven't heard any complaints as yet!" The game was expected to do well in the Virginia area.

The "Table Hockey" game found it tough sledding in the bingo territory but then almost every other type of equipment does in this market. Cincinnati had a success story on the "Table Hockey" to tell, and Harold Hoffman told it. "We received our sample two weeks ago and I just looked at it, not having time to give it a close check when it arrived," said the sales manager. "But our shop foreman came by later and asked me if I played the new hockey game just delivered. He said it was really one heck of an attraction. I played it once, played it again, a crowd gathered, and before long I knew we had something. I called one of our operator customers, told him about it, he ordered one and tried it. Two days later he took another ten and I placed a re-order with the factory," continued Hoffman. "We expect to go all the way with the game but we realize it has to be played and promoted to be appreciated. I ought to know," said Hoffman, "it hit me the same way as the others."

That was the story behind the "Table Hockey" game which reached the nation's locations this month. It wasn't an immediate hit with ops because the game basically is one of standard competition with the usual hockey attraction. But once the players get behind the hockey sticks and the puck starts to fly, look out!

He explained that the "Read-Out" indicator flashes the individual competing player's score as it is made during each frame of bowling through rapid changing lights in a 'Magic Square' on the backglass.

This new feature is also incorporated into United's "Caravelle" coin-operated (puck-type) shuffle alley bowler which was released about a week ago (*Cash Box*, Feb. 16). The only difference is that in "Caravelle" the "Read-out" flashing-light indicator is on the pin-hood, instead of the backglass.

"Sabre," DeSelm explained, "is a six player big ball bowler, with five ways to play and score. He said that operators themselves urgently requested these particular scoring games selected for the new bowler.

"The most popular scoring game," DeSelm continued, "is called 'Dual-Flash,' in which the lights flashing across the alley near the bowling pins are activated for both balls in the frame.

"However, in 'Flash' bowling (a companion game) the lights flash across (for greater excitement and suspense in both games) only when the first ball is in play. Both games offer suspenseful bowling action. And, this induces greater skill development for bowlers to achieve the highest possible scores."

DeSelm listed the three other bowling games as "Strikes," "Spare" and "Regulation" bowling. These three games are incorporated into "Sabre," as well as in "Caravelle" by popular demand of the operators in this country, and in Europe.

Another important United Manufacturing innovation, DeSelm said, is the "Handicap Feature"—"Easy Strike" or "Normal Strike," which is the player's optional alternative by merely selecting and pressing the proper button at the front of the playfield (to the right).

DeSelm explained the internal features in the "Sabre" ball bowler's cabinetry. He listed as some of the features: Chrome siderails at both sides of the alley, the beauty in the playfield and backglass design, and the easy access at the rear of the backbox for servicing for the operator or his service personnel.

"Sabre" is available to operators everywhere in 13 foot and 16 foot (standard) bowling alley lengths. Furthermore there are four foot and eight foot sections available to increase the playfield lengths as desired.


Another feature DeSelm spelled out is the instantaneous action in the scoring reels to indicate the scoring for each of the one to six players (competing) on the backglass which, incidentally, has "eye-comfortable" fluorescent lighting. Finally, the game has a very efficient, noiseless ball return mechanism and return lane, at the right of the bowling alley.

Sample shipments are being made to United Mfg's. distributors. They should be available in the showrooms of most distributors for demonstration.



## State Wide Sues Mayor Of Glen Cove

HEMPSTEAD, N. Y.—State Wide Vending Corporation, a Glen Cove operating company with 800 locations throughout the New York State area, accused the Mayor of Glen Cove, Joseph M. Reilly, of libeling the company at a recent board meeting.

The vending machine firm is suing the Mayor personally for \$750,000 for allegedly referring to the Long Island operating company as a firm with a "sketchy" background, while discussing the firm's bid for a county installation before the board. State Wide was accused by the Mayor, according to papers filed in the Supreme Court by State Wide's attorney Arthur Goldberg, of planning to float a \$600,000 stock issue on the basis of the county contract.

According to the papers, the board at the time of Reilly's alleged reference, rejected the company's bid which had been approved by County Executive Nickerson.

Goldberg stated that State Wide has been in business for seven years and in 1962 did a gross volume of \$500,000. He was expected to move at a Supreme Court hearing on Thursday, Feb. 21, for a default judgment against the Mayor.

The State Wide contract was reportedly signed by the County Executive without bidding, as authorized, and submitted to the board for approval. When the board rejected the contract it went out for bids which were thrown out on technicalities. Nickerson said that State Wide was the apparent low-bidder on second bids submitted, and that these bids were also to be discarded on a technicality, but that this matter was being discussed by the board.

## Rex-Bilotta Appoints Rock-Ola, Coan Reps

SYRACUSE — Conrad Bordeleau, Manager of the Vending Division of Rex-Bilotta Corp., this city, appointed Mike Gannon as field man for the firm's U-Select-It vending machine line in the Pennsylvania, Delaware and Virginia territory. The Coan line is handled by Bilotta in ten states along the eastern seaboard.

In another announcement, Bordeleau advised that Tom Buzzy, former Coca-Cola Bottling Company head in Syracuse, will head the firm's sales department on the Rock-Ola IVI and DuGrenier cigarette vendor lines in New York State.

Bordeleau also appointed Fred Caramica Long Island field representative for the Coan U-Select-It machine.

Rex-Bilotta Corporation also distributes a wide selection of phonograph and amusement machine equipment in the New York State territory.

The firm will represent Tape-Athon Inc., a background music firm based on the west coast beginning this month (see separate story).

CHICAGO—John A. McDonald has been appointed Midwest Region Sales Manager for Interstate Vending Company, it was announced last week.

McDonald formerly was Midwest Region Sales Manager for Automatic Canteen Company. He has also served as salesman for Canteen Company, and was with Swift and Company for five years, serving in sales and in the Standards Department.

He holds an MBA degree from University of Chicago, and a B.S. degree from Loyola University.

## Dixie Launches \$10,000 Cup Promo With 'Coffee and Roll'

NEW YORK—An unusual "win a cup of coffee and a roll" promotion, aimed at stimulating sale of coffee in its polyethylene-lined paper cups, is being conducted by the Dixie Cup Division of American Can Company.

The "rolls" that consumers and food service establishments can win are not the edible kind. They are rolls of money—a total of \$10,000.

The promotion began in January, will peak after appearance of a full-page advertisement in Life on March 22, and will end May 31. Dixie Cup has produced back bar strips, window streamers and entry blank pads for use at snack bars, plant cafeterias, vending installations, fast food operations and all other food service establishments where coffee and other hot beverages are served in Dixie "Mira-Glaze" cups.

The "Mira-Glaze" cup, Dixie Cup says, is a "kind to coffee" cup, since the polyethylene lining ends all cardboard taste.

There are two first prizes in the drawing—\$5,000 for a consumer, and \$1,000 for the food service operator at whose place of business the consumer winner obtained his cup of coffee.

For food service operators, there are also ten second prizes of \$100 each, and 100 third prizes of \$10 each. A similar number of \$100 second prizes and \$10 third prizes will be available for coffee drinkers, too.

To enter the contest, the food service operator simply fills in an entry blank with his name and address, as well as the name of his local Dixie Cup sales representative. The consumer, on his sweepstakes blank, provides his name and address, plus the name of the place where his cup of coffee in a Dixie "Mira-Glaze" cup was purchased.

Winners in the sweepstakes will receive their prizes—free cups of coffee, plus the "rolls" amounting to \$10 to \$5,000—from the Dixie Cup sales representative in their areas.







## First Scopitone Comes To Britain As A.T.E. Conventioneers See Juke-Movie Machine In Operation

LONDON—The latest visual juke box to make its appearance on the British scene is the French manufactured Scopitone which is to be marketed in this country on a large scale. A one-day demonstration was given recently by Radio Vision (Westminster) Ltd. the company responsible for the development and importation of supplies into this country.

The machine manufactured by the French engineering firm of Cameco will be available in Britain for outright sale, on a profit sharing basis or for hire. Scopitone holds 36 films of up to four minutes in length. A pre-selection device enables any number of films to be chosen for the cost of 1/-each. Continuous play is assured as each film is automatically rewound while the next one is being shown. It can play about 20 films in an hour.

Scopitones have been available in France for two years where some 700 are in operation. At least 300 more can be found in Germany, Belgium and Italy.

With the first machine already sited in a Fleet Street restaurant, Mr. Norman Miller, a Radio Vision Director, foresees the time when Scopitones will become as widely available and popular as the ordinary juke boxes.

During the demonstrations three films were shown—two German and one French—and the first British star to film for the medium will be Decca's Craig Douglas with his current release "Town Crier."

In addition to its use as a promotional medium for recording stars Scopitone can be adapted for business purposes as a sales aid or staff training etc.



## Mar-Tabb, A Study In Growth

HIALEAH, FLA.—One of the fastest growing coin machine-vending operations in the country continues to grow with each passing day. Sol Tabb, President of Mar-Tabb Vending, never has given much consideration to trends but he may possibly have something to do with any "upward trends" reported.

As this is written, Tabb is in the process of completing the finishing touches on a new plant in Miami—a 40,000 sq. ft. building which will be one of the largest in the south. Starting with 400 machines six years ago, Tabb today takes responsibility for 2500 machines of all types. "If its coin-operated," states the operator, "Mar-Tabb has it on location." From music to cigarettes to ice cream, candy and coffee, the giant operator continues to expand purchasing routes, gaining new locations, and heading for a goal expected to be reached in 1965 of 7500 machines.

He credits diversification with the reason for the unusual growth. Fifty-four employees conduct the operation which will emanate in Miami and continues to Florida City to West Palm Beach. Radio trucks and men are stationed throughout the 100 mile area. In addition to being in a position to service a location in the shortest possible time, Mar-Tabb can also spot an opportunity within the area. If one exists chances are Tabb will act upon it. And therein lies another reason for the firm's success. The new plant opens in May 1963.

### Shipping Rates Hiked

NEW YORK—Steamship lines have reacted to the settlement terms of the recent east coast strike with a wave of freight rate increases some of which run as high as 10% over rates charged before the east and gulf coasts of the U.S. were shut last month. In some areas where rates were not hiked, reports stated that the possibility of such a move was "under intense study". The increase was expected to affect to cost of shipping coin machines as well as other exports.

NEW YORK—The first UJA-Coin Machine Division Committee meeting of the year was held last Wednesday evening, Feb. 20, in the UJA headquarters here, and discussions were held regarding the nomination of qualifying personages for the role of Guest of Honor and Chairman of the 1963 Drive.

Close to one dozen members of the industry in this area attended the meeting and although several choice names were submitted for both posts, no official decision was made on the nomination of these names. In the past heads of distributorships and leading operators have held the Guest of Honor spot. Last year, R. L. Littleford V.P. of Billboard and Joe Orleck, Cash Box prexy, were honored together.

No date was announced for the next meeting.

Each year, this division of UJA manages to raise about \$30,000 in funds for the charity. The goal for this year is expected to be slightly higher. Three hundred persons usually attend the annual banquet at which time the Guest of Honor receives an award and tribute is paid.

## Globe Consumer Discount Finances Coin Industry With Funds From 1200

PHILADELPHIA—There may be several hundred operators throughout the entire Pennsylvania territory but much of the financing is done from funds belonging to more than 1200 individuals in the Philadelphia area. That's the story of Globe Consumer Discount Company, a mutual corporation, credited with financing millions of dollars of equipment each year for coin machine operations here.

This year, as announced at the corporation's annual dinner meeting recently, Globe paid an extra 5% dividend bringing to shareholders a total 13% on capitalization of more than \$3 million, with a reserve of \$1 million, and an expected gross for 1963 of \$5 million.

Globe's Chairman of the Board is Dave Rosen of David Rosen Inc., Rowe AC distributors here. According to Rosen, Globe has paid 8% and

**Tape-Athon Launches Background Program For Ops; Appts. Distribbs**

LOS ANGELES—Tape-Athon, manufacturers of high fidelity tape players, has launched a sales program designed to corner a share of the background music business which is now conducted by the coin machine industry. According to President George Anthony, who discussed the details with Cash Box last week, the program calls for initial appointment of distributors, most of whom will be franchised phonograph outlets, and from there a sales package will be promoted to the music machine operator who is either already in the background business or desires to diversify into this phase of the business.

Tape-Athon's package calls for a tape player which is priced from \$300 on up to ultra-high frequency equipment currently on location in broadcast studios and similar locations. The firm has its standard equipment already installed in several nationwide chains including Newberry's, Kresge's, Twinfair and Fields shopping centers.

The player uses a standard tape reel which Anthony says will play eight hours of continuous music before repeating. One tape playing three times will fill 24 hours of uninterrupted music. Tapes are rented for \$6 per month. Royalties to licensing organizations will be handled through the Tape-Athon distributor, at the discretion of the operator.

Anthony also stated that the same reel can be played 24 hrs. per day for periods up to two years before possible repair becomes necessary. The tape player is said to have construction features which will enable it to remain on location for periods of ten years and more, according to Anthony. Motors are guaranteed for one year. Components are guaranteed for 90 days. Distributors will be authorized to stand behind the guarantees according to the Tape-Athon head.

Anthony said that the player is constructed with ball-bearing fittings and die-cast parts. "No pieces are stamped out as in lower-priced players now on the market," stated the company exec. Each reel offers from 200 to 400 selections. Rentals can be arranged also from distributors.

Among the distributors already appointed to handle the Tape-Athon line are: Rex-Bilotta Corporation, Syracuse, N.Y.; United Inc., Wichita, Kansas; Culp Dist. Co., Oklahoma City, Okla.; Williams Dist. Co., Houston; United Dist. Co., Milwaukee; and Draco Sales Co., Denver.

The distributors appointed to date are all distributors for the Wurlitzer phonograph. Anthony said that future distributor appointments would probably work out in this same manner, although it in no way limited the firm's choice of distributor in other areas.

Anthony plans a sales meeting in May with all distributors in attendance at which time an all-out sales promotion program is expected to be carried at the manufacturer and distributor levels.

## Eastern Flashes

There's always something new if you look for it and that was the case last week as the coin machine industry made the most of new ideas, new equipment, and new approaches to old ideas, in order to keep the locations happy with money-making equipment.

Johnny Bilotta was very much on the scene with George Anthony, Tape-A-Thon, exec., who was in town staying at the Barbizon-Plaza, showing the newest background music system available featuring an eight-hour repeating tape. The unit will be distributed throughout this area by Bilotta Enterprises. Bilotta stayed in NYC for several days, and it took every minute of each day to settle the vast amount of business at hand. In Bilotta's Barbizon-Plaza suite, on hand were such stalwarts as Bill Weincr, who worked out sales arrangements for the sale of the Smokeshop cig vendor with John; Conrad Bordeleau, Rex-Bilotta's number one man in charge of vending—and this means Rock-Ola IVI coffee machines in the New York State territory, and the Coan U-Select-It vendors in ten states along the eastern seaboard. Bordeleau appointed Fred Caramica field man for the Coan line in Long Island and before arriving at the hotel, named Mike Gannon field man for Penna-Delaware-Va territories. John's son, John Jr., towering six-footer, is learning the business from a first hand view, traveling with the Bilotta crew. Bilotta's Rex-Bilotta man on the DuGrenier line and the Rock-Ola coffee machine, is Tom Buzzy, newly appointed vending exec, who left his position as top man at Syracuse's Coca-Cola plant to join Bilotta. Yes, you could say that the Bilotta organization worked a full week last week.

East coast distribs were flippin' over the 'Table Hockey' game produced by Bally and shipped two weeks ago. Hardest part of the deal is to get the machine on location, according to the franchised outlets. But once the machine is installed the collections warrant more games in other spots and eventually the operator finds that there is much more to 'Table Hockey' than evidently meets the eye. The list price on the game was quoted at \$425.00 so the price was right. Bill Witsen in Philly, Morris Rood and Irv Kempner in NYC, Bob Jones up in Boston, and Jack Bess down Richmond way, all agreed that the game has merit and is definitely making a name for itself whenever it goes out on location. "We think highly of it here," stated one distrib, "but unless the operator places it in a tavern, there's no money being made for him with praises and such. Put it out and see for yourself, is what I've been tellin' them and reports indicate that I'm right."

As far as newness is concerned, of course anything new deserves mention, especially when it concerns so many members of the industry, and we speak of the AMOA of Pennsylvania. Members are currently going all out to increase membership. Meeting sites have been changed to vary the location of the monthly meet rather than hold it each month in Harrisburg. Next month, March 6th, Wednesday, check into Norristown for the regular meet and hear what's going on in the State of Pennsylvania. The General DeKalb Hotel is the place and if you get there by 6:00 PM you can have dinner.

One of the most talked about amusement games to come about in years is the Bally "Spinner" which has excited the most staid of distribs. We have heard raves before, and in many cases they were deserved, but the operators themselves have told us that Bally's "Spinner" is the best money-making game to come along in too many years. Check out Harry Sanders, Nashville; Abe Witsen, Philly; Dyke Hawes, Macon; Jack Bess, Roanoke; Sam Taran, Miami; and not least of all, Al Calderon, in Indianapolis, who helped test the game. Then let your judgment be your guide. And this is just the east coast. "Spinner" will help many fading territories make a come-back, and of this you can be sure. The price? About \$500.

New things are not always good things and the cigarette operator troubles are an example. The Operation Alert! meeting for NYC is set for April 1st, Riccardo's Restaurant; Buffalo, March 25, Charter House; Syracuse, March 26, Country House Motel; Albany, March 27, Thruway Motel; Phila., April 3, Marriott Motel; Hartford, March 29, Shine Airport Motel; Wash. 

### Factory Expects Long Run

## "Spinner" Has Bally Distribs Shipping Overtime; Ops and Locations Take To Novelty Game!

NEW YORK—The newest Bally game "Spinner" had the industry talking profits last week and the reason was the immediate acceptance of this four-player which was released last week. The action which results from a combination of colored marbles, marked numbers, and the kickout feature which enables players to shoot for a high score or a poker hand, was termed by most Bally distribbers as the biggest potential money-maker Bally has come out with in years.

The game can be played by four people but regardless of the number of players, only one dime can be inserted. Marbles are propelled into pockets on the playfield by a revolving rotor. Each player controls a bank of five pockets, trying for the higher score marbles constantly.

"The time is great," said Al Calderon, Indianapolis distrib, "because in the right location you can collect a dime a minute." This was the case in most markets although in some the location owner was asking for more than 60 seconds per play, according to other distribbers.

"We're selling 'em, no question about it," said Clint Shockey, Royal's sales exec. "The Spinner" is one game that is selling on sight. I think we're going to see some record sales on the machine around the country."

Phil Greenberg, Atlas Music, thought Pittsburgh ops could use "dozens." The list price on "Spinner" was quoted at \$515.00

Joel Kleiman, Milwaukee outlet, said that "Spinner" would help ops in the territory recoup past losses. "The game is without question a money-maker. It has everything a fast-money-maker needs—interest, skill, and player appeal."

The small game—which requires only a 30-inch square floor area—was taking Chicago by storm and Atlas Music's Eddie Ginsberg was one of the first to let the factory know it had a winner. "Why I haven't seen a game with so much potential in years," said the Rowe AC distrib, "and in Chicago, you can bet this game will outsell any other market. It has to. We need a game like 'Spinner' and Bally has come through for us."

Sanders in Nashville looked for big things on the versatile game. He thought that "Spinner" would sell right from the start and this was based merely on the sample. "We get delivery this week but you can be assured the game will sell. It doesn't take a genius to see that," said the Tennessee wholesaler.

RF Jones' crew on the coast was selling up a storm in four markets with "Spinner" taking off right from the start. "It's a once-a-year game," said Jones, "and if this is any indication, we can expect a lot from Bally in the coming months. This game has more appeal and more action than anything I've seen since years ago."


One thing about the game, according to Harry Witsen in Philly, "it's got something for everybody. There are so many different ways of scoring—it's up to the players to score the way they want—that the game has to stay on location for a longer period than usual. I think we'll be selling 'Spinner' for a long time," concluded the Scott Grosse sales rep.

The Bally factory in Chicago admitted the game was a hit last week, and according to plant officials, production had already been geared for what the factory evidently knew would be a success, several weeks ago. This advance preview usually comes about after tests have been completed.
