

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How 'Market Awareness' Can Cut Into Returns

Much of the problem of "returns," one of the industry's most devastating, seemingly incurable diseases, could be drastically reduced if there were more "market awareness" on the wholesaling and discount retail levels of the business. Again, we return to the nature of those employees who are hired with what we believe to be a false sense of economy. The equation in these instances goes: low pay = low overhead = greater profitability.

The truth is that the unaware or unconcerned employee who approaches the executive level of a retail-wholesaler operation can keep sales excitement at these establishments on a hum-drum level—or worse.

Take this case in point, an example that, unfortunately, may be more than just the exception. Orders are placed on recordings based on heavy local airplay on a key station. That is, heavy play at the **time of the order**, with no attention paid to the fact that the disk will be taken off the playlist the following week. The order comes through, play stops and sales on the disk come to a virtual halt. The simple matter of "market awareness"—getting a feed-back from the stationcould have warned the operation not to re-order and sell-off as much of the stock he has on hand as possible.

On the wholesaling level, there are labels who take pride in the fact that they have people in their branches who keep on top of the local radio situation and will, in fact, inform retailers either to go with a disk or, interestingly, take a pass based on a disk being dropped from the play list.

This kind of honest approach in the follow-through of product can do much to correct the return problem. It can do much to assure the retailwholesale areas of the business that product on hand has the most likelihood of making it all the way to the consumer. The use of "market awareness" personnel will not solve the return problem completely, for admittedly, there are other matters, contributed by all levels, that make the problem as difficult as it is.

But, the kind of employee who knows the market, cares about the profile of the customer he serves, can put a significant dent into the return situation. He is also going to help immeasurably to make sure that the traffic flow is well served and more likely to make a recording purchase.





At Chicago Meet: Indie Distributors Vote To Seek Gains In NARM Framework

NEW YORK — Dispelling rumors of a separate indie distributor organiza-tion, a group of indie distributors meeting in Chicago on Fri., Dec. 8, voted unanimously to work within the framework of NARM, the merchan-diser-manufacturer association. The meeting of 22 distributors was called in the wake of problems faced by this segment of the business, which in recent years has been con-fronted with the growth of branch operations and charges by labels util-izing such a network that indie dis-tributors are failing to provide sufficient promo support on product and are slow in payment of bills. The Chicago meeting also saw plans developed for an expanded role of the indie distributor in NARM, originally organized to serve the rack-jobber area, but which has evolved as an association of wider industry purpose. The first order of business at the Chicago meeting was a unanimous vote of the 22 distributors present to

industry purpose. The first order of business at the Chicago meeting was a unanimous vote of the 22 distributors present to remain in NARM, and to continue to work as members of NARM, for the best interests of their segment of the industry. Plans were developed whereby the indie distributors could achieve their objectives within the framework of the established industry association. Working with Jules Malamud, NARM exec director, Dave Press, NARM president, and Earl Kintner, general counsel, who attend-ed the meeting, the distributors present worked out a set of initial plans for their expanded role in NARM. Foremost and of the most immediate importance was the role

which indie distributors would play at the forthcoming NARM Convention, which convenes February 25-28 at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles, California.

Convention Plans

On Sunday, Feb. 25, following the NARM regular members meeting (which indie distributors attend along with the rack jobbers and retailers, all of whom together comprise the Regular Membership), a separate in-die distributors meeting will be held. NEW YORK — The yuletide season is, of course, traditionally a boom period for Christmas songs, and this year's performances and disk sales are expected to set new records in this according to ASCAP.

Irving Berlin's "White Christ-mas" has thus far sold 91 million records, an average of some five nul-lion per year. The song has also gen-erated the sale of some five and a half

GSF Into Jazz As Distributor **Of Encounter**

NEW YORK — Larry Newton pres-ident of GSF Records has announced ident of GSF Records has announced that the newly formed jazz label, En-counter Records, will be distributed in the United States by GSF. Encounter was recently formed by Lloyd Price and Bernard Purdie. The distribution agreement was set in conjunction with the appointment of Price as GSF's director of A&R.

Encounter will be concentrating its Encounter will be concentrating its creative efforts on the contemporary jazz market. Three albuns featuring Seldon Powell, "The Sands of Time", and "East Coast," have already been completed and two other artists are scheduled to record their initial al-bums for the label within the next for wrotes. few weeks.

In commenting on Encounter's mer-chandising and marketing concepts Price stated: "We plan to go all out in the packaging of our product and each album will be totally distinc-tive. The jazz buying public is a very sophisticated and selective group and we hope to appeal to their tastes through excellent recordings and su-perior packaging."

The company's initial release of five albums will be in mid-Jan. and special promo campaigns are planned. The suggested retail list price of the al-bums will be \$5.98.

Foreign affiliations are currently being discussed by Purdie and Price, and the New York firm of Kaplan, Gusick & Wachs will be handling negotiations with prospective licensees.

UA Action Vs. Amer. Rec. Club

HOLLYWOOD — In a suit filed in Los Angeles Superior Court, United Artists Records claims that the Rec-ord Club of America breached a 1970 agreement covering distribution of agreement covering distribution of UA Records to Record Club sub-scribers. UA's complaint, filed on Dec. 8, charged that the Record Club did not properly account for albums sold.

According to UA's papers, distribu-

According to UA's papers, distribu-tion and accounting records maintained by the Record Club are, "so inadequate and incomplete . . . (that) it is impossible to verify the accuracy" of the club's statements. The US action also charged that the Record Club of America has re-fused to pay royalties owing on "free" albums, which the Club dis-tributed in excess of contract limits. UA requested a declaration by the Court confirming its right to termi-nate the Record Club contract in view of the alleged violations. The suit also seeks recovery of \$200,000 in of the alleged violations. The suit also seeks recovery of \$200,000 in damages and an accounting of all UA albums sold or distributed by the Club.

The Los Angeles firm of Loeb and Loeb represents United Artists Rec-ords in the litigation.

'Rudolph' Single

According to ASCAP writer John-ny Marks, his "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" may well be the big-gest selling yuletide bonanza of all time with record sales of 97 million— 65 million in the United States and 32 million abroad. Marks, who is also the publisher of this work, calculates that sheet music sales total six milthat sheet music sales total six mil-lion copies. Marks is also the creative parent of "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" which has sold five million discs and "Holly Jolly Christmas"-a comfortable one million sell-

mas"—a comfortable one million sell-er. Another monster is "Santa Claus is Comin' to Town" by ASCAP writers J. Fred Coots and Haven Gillespie. This number has accounted for the sale of 40 million records and some 500,000 copies of sheet music, its pub-lishers report. Study of the index of song titles at the One Lincoln Plaza headquarters of ASCAP indicates that members of the society have written many thousands of Christmas songs, and new ones are being written every week. There are more than 5.000 songs on file with titles that include the word Christmas, but of course, there are also many seasonal favor-ites bearing titles that do not include "Christmas". Among the best known are "Little

Among the best known are "Little Drummer Boy" and in the classic de-partment, the opera "Amahl and the Night Visitors".

Most Profitable

Most Profitable There is a running and good hu-mored competition as to which is the most profitable among all of the Christmas songs, and accurate figures on money are extremely difficult to secure. While sales of records of sheet music are one indication of a song's success, there is also the ques-tion of the very substantial ASCAP income generated by public per-formances of a work on radio, televi-sion, Muzak type wired-music systems and in night clubs, on ships, on air-planes etc.

Tape, Porno Film Raid In New York

NEW YORK — A court hearing has been scheduled for Jan. 18, for two Brooklyn men who were arrested last week in police raids that uncovered a cache of 50,000 pirated pre-recorded tapes along with large quantities of pornographic films, books and magazines.

Brooklyn District Attorney Eugene Gold said the operation was part of a national network with links to orga-nized crime that was doing \$200 mil-lion a year in pirated tapes. The two arrested men were iden-tified as Bernard Damsky, 72, and Benjamin Lichtman, 61, both of Brooklyn. At their arraignment, Dam-sky was released in bail of \$1,000, Lichtman in bail of \$500 until their hearing next month. The raids and arrests were the cul-mination of a six-month-long investi-gation that began last May following the arrests of two other men on mis-demeanor charges. The Recording In-dustry Association of America also provided information on the activi-ties of this pirate operation. Early Monday morning, a squad of police under the direction of Capt. John J. Nevins, Jr., of the Brooklyn District Attorney's squad, armed with search warrants, searched Damsky's (Cont'd on p. 18)

For \$630,000 OCEANSIDE, N.Y. — In a move to divest itself of all involvements unre-lated to record and tape rack jobbing, NMC Corp. has sold its Riverside Records library and its investment in-terest in Rid-Jid Products Corp. According to Jesse Selter, NMC's president and chairman, the Riverside catalog of approximately 600 master jazz recordings together with a sub-sidiary's 2/3 stock interest in Orphe-um Music Co., Inc., which holds cer-tain music copyrights, were sold to Lo Cele, a Grand Cayman, Cayman Islands firm. The sale was made for a total of \$630,000, including \$475,000 for the Riverside catalog and \$25,000 for the Riverside catalog and \$25,000 for the stock interest in Orpheum Mu-sic. The balance of \$130,000, with in-terest, is to be paid 12 months after the closing. These assets which were acquired by NMC in 1967, had a cur-rent book value of \$48,000. The sale, therefore, resulted in a capital gain of \$582,000 for the company, Selter re-ported. Through Lo Cele, Fantasy re-cently acquired U.S. and Canada rights to the Riverside line. Rid-Jid Products Corp. is a Spring Park, Minn. manufacturer of ironing tables and barbecue grills in which NMC acquired a 51% investment inter-est in 1971. The company sold its share to the minority holders, Selter said, at no profit or loss to NMC. In making the announcement, Selter added that "management recently de-cided to reorient its goals and dispose of all non-rack jobbing activities. The sale of Riverside and Rid-Jid will now enable NMC to concentrate on its pri-mary business, as one of the leading jobbers of tapes and records in the country."



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Radio-TV News Report

Dick Lavsky: Ad Music Is Tuned To The Ears Of Madison Avenue, Not Top 40

NEW YORK There would be a REW FORK — There would be a greater number of hit songs coming out of musical commercial production if it were not for certain ad agency policies. These are the insights of Dick Lavsky, founder and president of Dick Lavsky's Music House Inc.

Economy

One factor limiting the potential of its from spot production is econom-ic. When budgets are low per project (as they always seem to be when the (as they always seem to be when the general economic picture looks bleak), "music is the first item cut." According to Lavsky, music may be sliced out entirely under these condi-tions. Or the agency may prefer to keep costs down by utilizing "library music," previously published material not identifiable as a hit to the general nublic public.

Lavksy still finds a market for 200 Lavksy still hnds a market for 200 or so pieces which he writes per year expressly for commercial pur-poses. Some of his recent projects include two for NBC ("This fall, NBC has it all" spots as well as the daytime promotional soundtrack, "I Like Being With You.") and a new jingle package for WNEW-AM.

Music Lag

There's always a general time lag in musical up-to-dateness in the minds of agency execs who commis-sion music, according to Lavsky. Usu-ally, their ears are two years behind what's happening on the charts. This detracts from an ultra-contemporary approach which would lead to more "hit" commercials in the chart sense. Many agencies are afraid of pock in

"hit" commercials in the chart sense. Many agencies are afraid of rock in its purest form altogether. They feel it will limit the effectiveness of their product pitches and gravitate toward the MOR sound for the mass market. With so much of the record market being rock-oriented, this limits the chart success of the original "commer-cial" song to the MOR/Top 40 cross-over segment of the industry.

Buying White

One look at the charts today and anyone can see that black music is stronger than ever. But with few ex-ceptions, Lavsky notes that the agen-cies don't want black music for their commercials. For special projects, such as spots which will be aired only in heavily black markets or on soul radio stations, black can be beautiful to the agency. But black, like rock music is viewed as of limited mass appeal and hence not suitable for a appeal and hence not suitable for a

appeal and hence not suitable for a national ad campaign. This is doubly curious as many of the black vocalists of today started out recording commercials in the somewhat more rigid musical formats dictated by agencies. Lavsky cited Melba Moore and Varlerie Simpson as two examples.

Buying Hits

Still, hits do come out of the com-mercial music soundtrack. The most recent example of course is "I'd Like To Teach The World To Sing," a two-

time Top 20 record this year for The New Seekers and The Hillside Singers, written as a Coca-Cola com-mercial. Past hits include "No Matter What Shape," and "The Girl Watch-er's Theme." But frequently, agencies will pay huge sums for already estab-lished songs they feel fit the mood they are trying to create to sell their product. Donovan's "Wear Your Love Like Heaven" (for Love Cosmetics) and "Up Up And Away" (for TWA) were so purchased. So one could al-most say that hits make commercials as often as commercials make hits under the present state of affairs.

Parakeets

Lavsky as a composer must work under conditions as they are and he regards each project as a special chal-lenge. He is a songwriter who also must excel at arranging, producing, editing and engineering. The folks on his staff must also feel at ease wear-ing a number of hats. Music House's facilities include an eight-track studio and moog synthesizer. These features and moog synthesizer. These features are dutifully noted on his business card above a more curious line, are dutifully noted on his business card above a more curious line, "Parakeet Training." Humor is an im-portant part of success when working for and between client and agency.

TROUBLE MAN—Marvin Gaye, Original Motion Picture Soundtrack—Tamla T322L Marvin Gaye's last LP, "What's Goin' On," deserves much of the credit for turning soul around to its present high state of success and artistry. His long-awaited follow-up comes in the form of a soundtrack to a black action film, one in the tradition of "Shaft" and "Su-perfly," though much more instrumentally ori-ented. Gaye's current single is the title track, and his vocals do crop us as flourishes on many other cuts. But for the most part, Gaye's original score is an ostentive definition of just what a soul orchestra is; it has much to offer a what a soul orchestra is; it has much to offer a wide cross-section of buyers.

GREEN IS BLUES-Al Green-Hi/London SHL 32055

32055 The man who emerged this year as the biggest thing to hit soul since Otis Redding and James Brown proves he had it all together back when. This is a repackage of his first LP recorded for the label, and the first Green product produced by Willie Mitchell. Most of the tunes are remakes, from Sunny & The Sunglows' "Talk To Me," on through the Temptations' "My Girl" and The Beatles' "Get Back." But there are two Green originals here, sketching out the plans for his future hits. Should have significant sales impact, as his roots are where he wants 'em—deep down into the soulful turf.

REALLY—J. J. Cale—Shelter SW-8912 Ethnic musics of many varieties—especially early country and blues—frequently have one thing in common: a "basement" approach to sound wherein the bass and percussion throw a blanket on the damp floor for the other instruments to rest on. J. J. Cale has brought this kind of approach to rock and here, he brings it to the hyphenated varieties (country-and blues-rock) as well. Muddy Waters' "Mo Jo" and his own countrified tunes like "Louisi-ana Women" both have that basement sound, bridging the gaps between. So what he's created here is a mood album of the multi-colored variety without straying from home. We colored variety without straying from home. We like the address.


COME SOFTLY TO ME—The New Seekers— MGM/Verve MV-5090 The quintet, as we all know by now, is as pleasant to listen to as they are to watch. HURRICANE SMITH—Capitol ST-11139 A certain Norman Smith is known as the Beatles' engineer from the early days, and producer for acts like Pink Floyd. A certain Hurricane Smith has made his mark with three top singles in England and one which is cur-rently bringing America over to his side, "Oh Babe, What Would You Say?" Liner notes re-veal they are one and the same. 





COIN MACHINE NEWS

1972 In Review Depending upon whom you talk to

Depending upon whom you talk to in the music and games industry, the past twelve months is either "the year of the dart game", "the blossoming of the family fun center arcade" or the "return to prosperity." Perhaps it's all three (and more) rolled up, spell-ing out one of the most satisfying years in a long time for most in the business. business

business. The plethora of "dart games", or more correctly, wall-mounted remote-control panel-games, which start off with darts and moved into basketball, control panel-games, which with darts and moved into basketball, golf, bowling and football, brought a dozen or more new firms into the industry. In addition, both ChiCoin and Midway marketed several pieces in this genre... all earning terrific collections for operators (national average is over \$40 gross per week). One of the most unusual aspects of the game was that many distribs sold the game to operator customers, de-claring no trade-in afterward. "After

claring no trade-in afterward. "After they've made the money, they can throw them away if they want... it's that kind of game," distribs stated.

Recession Thawing More Dollars for Op.

1972 was also the year the Ameri-can public began to cut loose with more of that horded pocket money, as the recession, which began in 1970, finally thawed. More folks turned out of an evening at bars and diners and restaurants; even at big city arcades, and collections came back toward the

restaurants; even at big city arcades, and collections came back toward the level the trade "appreciates". Quarter play on big games and mu-sic boxes helped bring up that earn-ings figure, but the skyrocketing op-erating costs sucked up the gravy pretty much anyway. More for the help, more for the machines, more taxes . . . thanks for 25¢ play. Was about time! about time!

about time! 1972 saw the introduction of the first tape jukebox—Wurlitzer's Car-ousel—which plays 10 cassettes and also hit the right taste bud with hun-dreds of locations which previously didn't care to have a jukebox with top 100 type tunes. Almost a hit before it came out, the little tape player is so far back-ordered at this writing, the word at Wurlitzer is not "sell" but "have patience". word at Wurl "have patience"

New Machines ALI Pins Bows

Console-styled machines, which resemble your own home stereo, made further success in 1972 and are now a recognized factor on the nation's locations. Both Rock-Ola and Wurlitzer sold plenty of theirs; and the NSM Consul 130-B from Germany performed likewise.

Other machine innovations during the year have to include the introduction of Allied Leisure's first flipper piece called 'Sea Hunt'. The item was not only the first pingame from this young factory but the first in an upright cabinet. Chicoin bowed a twoplayer rifle game called 'Twin Rifle' and scored terrific success with the item. Brunswick shocked the trade when it bowed a smash hit machine at the Sept. MOA Show. It's called 'Air Hockey' and it makes nothing but money.

Regional Seminars Score for MOA

On the association scene, MOA's John Trucano scored a historic suc-cess with his regional business meet-

John Trucano scored a historic suc-cess with his regional business meet-ings. Trucano, a Notre Dame gradu-ate, got their Center for Continuing Education to collect data and suitable professors who could talk with au-thority to operators about the busi-ness of operating—from gaining and keeping locations to hiring help to keeping the books stright. They DID and three seminars took place early in the year that were, as the kids say, "out of sight." The first seminar took place at Notre Dame and had 55 operators in attendance. Based upon the response to those two fact-filled days, the group went on to Las Vegas where 95 operators turned out at the Sands to see the "same show". Then another SRO per-formance in New York City's Hilton Hotel. The program will continue in 1972 and the credit goes to Trucano.

Wingrave MOA Pres: 25th Anny Pgrm.

Harlan Wingrave of Kansas suc-ceeded Trucano as MOA president at the Sept. 14-16 convention in Chica-go. Wingrave vowed to continue the good work, while adding his own theme for his term—the celebration of the national association's 25th an-niversary. Indeed, as Wingrave toured the regional association meetings throughout the fall and early winter. niversary. Indeed, as Wingrave toured the regional association meetings throughout the fall and early winter, that was the theme he pounded out (presenting 25th anniversary gavels to each group's president). The next show should be a stunner, when MOA will put out the red carpet in its own honor honor.

Down in Washington, meanwhile, Down in Washington, meanwhile, just about nothing happened with the copyright thing. MOA is still backing its \$8 per box per year bid, while other contesting groups hondle for additional burdens on the operator. 1973 should see some action in that long, arduous struggle.

Key events on the manufacturing level have to be topped by Seeburg's successful separation from Commonwealth United Corp. Now called Seeburg Industries, the firm's executive brass (with exception of president Sam Stern) moved into New York City back in March, taking up residence in the new General Motors Building on Fifth Ave.

Bally Mfg. Corp. in its continuing effort to purchase key overseas distribution companies, made constant headlines during 1972. In addition to its acquisition of Australia's Electronics Amusements and Hong Kong's Jack Rooklyn Amusements, Bally also bought Germany's Gunter Wulff Appartebau for a reported \$11 million. The latter firm, one of Europe's most prominent makers of payout equipment, now ranks Bally far and away the undisputed leader in gaming equipment.

At home, Bally announced the formation of Carousel Time as an operating arm of the corporation, designed to pursue the blossoming fun center style of games operation in

shopping malls. By mid-year they had installations in 15 states. Indeed, this new area of the industry finally be-came a reality: unfortunately, largely due to professional arcade people and even entrepreneurs from outside the industry, rather than to the efforts of the street operator. It became clear to many resistant chain store owners that mini-cades within their stores of-ten outearned every other concession in the place, based upon square-foot age. However, some operators (like Bally's Carousel Time) prefer to lease space as tenants, rather than concesspace as tenants, rather than concession, for their installations.

New Companies Into Coinbiz

In addition to the dart game manu-In addition to the dart game manu-facturers entering the industry, a new games manufacturer called For Play, Inc. out of California joined the trade and released their now-successful 'Las Vegas Gallery (a target/dice/card gallery on the style of the Seeburg Bear Gun). Firm's products are mar-keted exclusively thru ACA of Cali-fornia and the latter's regional dis-tributors. ACA product vice pres-ident Mickie Greenman was highly in-strumental in the rapid distribution of the Gallery; also in the company's expansion in the in-store fun center business.

With the retirement of 20 year Wurlitzer veteran sales director Bob Bear this fall, Tonawanda chief Amile Addy assumed responsibility of sales and set Nat Hockman as Eastern US sales coordinator and Ralph Cragan for the same in the west, under a new sales chain of com-mand. Late in the year, Addy appoint-ed Ken Malick as Wurlitzer's new product sales manager, with the tape ed Ken Malick as Wurlitzer's new product sales manager, with the tape playing Carousel as his first project.

Foreign Market Remains Strong

The flow of new and used equip-ment to and fro the foreign markets ment to and fro the foreign markets was brisk during 1972, getting a healthy start at the Jan. 25-27 Amusement Trades Exhibition in London. The Japanese operating in-dustry took a second position only to the US with 1.4 million verding units on location by mid-year. The export of US manufactured pool tables into Europe in particular was extremely healthy during the year . . . many wondering why it took so long for the European industry to catch up on one of America's most lucrative pieces of equipment. Rowe Interna-tional signed an exclusive pact with American Shuffleboard of New Jersey to handle the latter's coin and home billiard products thru their European branches and independent distribution billiard products thru their European branches and independent distribution outlets. Ball Fruit of England bought ACE and Mecca from the Grand Ho-tel chain. And Bally opened up dis-tribution points in Guam, Venezuela and Africa for gaming and amuse-ment devices.

Significant events on the distribu-tion level during 1972 have to he headlined by the purchase of Empire Distributing by Bally Mfg. Deal was consumated late in December. Anoth-er startling development was Wurlitz-er's appointment of Dale Distributing to handle their music line throughout the entire nation of Canada. Rock-Ola also created a significant Canadian move with the appointment of New-Way Sales Co. to traffic their music and vending line throughout Western Canada.

Also from Dedham, industry veteran Irwin Margold retired from the top spot at Trimount Automatic Sales later in 1972 to become a full time consultant for Rowe Internation-al, operating out of Miami. Margold's consultant duties was greatly respon-sible for the introduction of Rowe's lottery ticket vending unit in both Mass. and New Hampshire during 1972, also for the import of a coin-op table soccer unit strictly for Rowe dealers. Marshall Caras took over as Trimount general manager. Jim Ginsburg left Banner Specialty (Philadelphia) during 1972; banking expert William Moore joined up with Banner also during 1972. Marc Rod-stein was appointed Banner's general manager. from Dedham, industry

manager. Seeburg's Columbia, S.C. outlet moved into sumptuous new quarters in Cayce, S.C. during '72. Wurlitzer's Denver branch also moved into new building in April; likewise J&J Dis-

D&L Vend-ing and Roth Novelty Co. (Wilkes-Barre) were particularly hard hit with near 90% water damage to the equipment inventory and places of business. But thanks to help from tradesters both in and out of the area, all firms were back in action within weeks.

Veterans Pass On During 72

Unfortunately, every year-end summary story includes mention of industry members who passed away during the preceding twelve months. Veteran distributor/jobber Ed Heath (Heath Dist., Macon, Ga.) died Jan. 7th. Max Perlman, who ran the Atlantic New York Corp's East Hartford, Conn. branch for 20 years, passed on Dec. 30th (71). On Jan. 15th, a renown leader of the operating industry, Jim Tolisano, died. The former president of MOA and the Florida Amusement and Music Assn., had sold his route more than one year prior to his death, and was devoting his time to running his fabulous arcade on Trea-sure Island, Florida when he died.

Then on February 18th, a leader in the manufacture of jukeboxes, be-loved by many in the trade, left us when Wurlitzer's Roy Waltemade died. Roy had spent the bulk of his carrer running the North Tonawanda operation for Wurlitzer and had scarcely begun his retirement when he died. On May 6th, Farney Wurlitzer, son of Wurlitzer Company founder Rudolph, died at the age of 88. Paul Kotler, founder of the Nation-al Shuffleboard Co. in Jersey, passed on. Kotler realized one of his fondest dreams before he died when the en-tire National manufacturing complex moved into giant new quarters in

moved into giant new quarters in Green Brook, N.J.

Hy Lesnick, operator of Richmond Music Co. and another staunch association leader (both in Virginia and with MOA) died on June 26th. On July 18th, a tradester often referred to as a "living legend" died on July 18th at the age of 60. He was Bert Lane whose manufacturing and promotional inventiveness both in amusement games and parks attractions launched many ideas onto the market, including kiddie rides and coin-op slot car racing. Lane was also the inventor of "ice cream on a stick" for Eskimo Pie.

Ted Rubey, founder of Marvel Mfg. Co. (Chicago parts suppliers) passed away on July 31st at the age of 75. On Oct. 11th, fresh from visiting the NAMA Trade Show in Atlantic City, Advance Dist. president Morrie Lerner died in Syracuse, N.Y. His company management was taken over by his wife and two sons.

"We tried again in 1964, 1965, with a simi-lar lack of success; however, a com-pany in Cincinnati subsequently im-ported a table from Germany and concentrated on franchising and col-lege-type locations with some measure of success."


"A table imported from Italy by "A table imported from Italy by Empire achieved marked success in Upper Wisconsin, starting in 1969," he said. "It gradually grew in popu-larity and by mid-1971 other areas in the USA started to enjoy similar suc-cess. Imports began to flow into this country, from Italy, Germany and France."

France." Some states such as Wisconsin, Texas and Louisiana are in the midst of a real boom with the soccer ma-chines, according to Robbins, but there are many states which haven't been touched. They, too, will get into it eventually, he predicted.

Robbins pointed up the fact that there are several US manufactured units, as well as the foreign makes.

"Tournaments have been conducted on local levels." he said, "and eventu-ally these will spread and blossom into regional and possibly even na-

tional affairs. "It's difficult to predict the popu-larity of this machine," Robbins stated. "It takes time, patience, and some concentration in an area to get it started. People have to learn how to play it. But once the fever gets up, it spreads like wildfire!" In conclusion Robbins said, "for the operators it's a marvelous business. The machines are mechanical. low in cost and they operate on a 25ϕ coin. The income actually increases as time goes on. The service is practically nil. Put all these ingredients together and they make a recipe for real profits! Certainly 1973 will be the biggest year yet for the soccer football!"

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




"We are working with the military on the possibility of receiving students under a program called "Project Transition," which would enable military personnel with six months or less remaining time in the service, to enroll for our course," said institute administrator Barbara Frank. "We have also been contacting various educational facilities (community colleges and high schools) to arrange for our representatives to address students, on a seminar type basis, and familiarize them with our program and with the coin machine industry in general."

Asked whether the present enrollment is largely from the institute's home state of Colorado. Ms. Frank replied, "Some of our students are from Colorado, of course, but we have a sizeable number from other areas such as Fairbanks, Alaska, South Dakota, Wisconsin. Illinois, Texas, New Mexico and New York. We have also had inquiries from foreign countries and recently signed up a student from Mexico City."

Since the institute's recruitment program has reached nationwide proportions, additional personnel are being hired to service various areas of the country. Mr. Roy Pettengill and Mr. Pat Brower have been appointed to serve as directors of recruiting for the state of Texas; Mr. Fred Mills will serve in a similar capacity for the state of New Mexico. Additional appointments will be announced.

"Numerous operators have been most cooperative in sending us their requests for technicians and job availability lists," Ms. Frank said. "We are encouraging all operators to do likewise so that we may amplify, to the government agencies and the military, the fact that there does exist a great need for trained technicians in our industry. 


