


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

Charting The Mysterious Crossover

We have found in our history as a trade publication that crossover product has always been a mysterious, unpredictable process. For a variety of reasons, certain jazz, r&b and country records create tremendous sales in their particular field and then pass into history. On the other hand, similar specialty product follows a similar pattern, but then crosses over into the pop market, resulting in wider exposure, magnified sales and establishment of new talent.


Why not try to chart this phenomenon and perhaps take some of the mystery out of it? By opening lines of communication, we propose that this might be accomplished. When a manufacturer, distributor, one-stop or retail outlet becomes aware of an LP or single crossing over and getting pop play and/or selling in pop markets, we urge that they contact us and inform us of it. We'll then apprise our readers. Potentially, this open line of communication could stimulate a national crossover.

In contacting us please include the LP, single, the market(s) and the radio stations that have helped create this crossover plus whatever wholesalers and retailers are selling the product due to the crossover. When a promotion man helps cross the record, please give us his name as well.

Besides exposure value, this information will help other record companies create crossovers which in turn will establish new artists and generate greater revenue. We at Cash Box will do our share. We're looking to you to do yours.



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

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Elton John Names New Band

HOLLYWOOD — Elton John has announced the members of his new band, which will appear with him at his Wembley Stadium concert on June 21 in England. The new members are Davey Johnstone, from Elton's previous band, Ray Cooper, former Kiki Dee Band drummer, Roger Pope, Doobie Brothers guitarist Jeff "Skunk" Baxter, and former Barnstorm bassist Kenny Passarelli. Baxter is not leaving the Doobies, who are currently on tour, but will rehearse and perform with the Elton band for the "Midsummer Music" Wembley concert.

Also appearing at the Wembley event will be the Beach Boys, Rufus featuring Chaka Khan, Kiki Dee, Joe Walsh, the Eagles, and Stackridge. Stevie Wonder has been mentioned as a possible artist on the date also.

The 72,000-seat stadium event, produced by John Reid and Mel Bush, is expected to gross Elton \$250,000, and the pianist-composer will donate his earnings to the Watford Football Club, of which he is a member.


Kass Named Viewlex VP

NEW YORK — Andrew Galef, president of Viewlex, Inc., announced last week that Art Kass has been named executive vice president and elected to the board of directors of the company. Kass now serves and will continue to serve as president and chief operating officer of The Buddah Group.

The appointment of Kass highlights the recent decision of the company to make Buddah the focal point of its operation. All efforts will be channeled towards total involvement in the recording area including the company's facilities for pressing and tape duplicating.

"The Buddah Group will continue to operate as the key division," said Kass, "and this will afford us the freedom and opportunity to expand rapidly. Our primary goal is to make Buddah a greater force in the industry."

In 1967, Kass became comptroller at Kama Sutra and in a very short time became executive vice president of the company. Buddah Records was founded in 1968 during his tenure as vice president of Kama Sutra. In 1970 he became co-president of the label and in 1973 he became president.

HOLLYWOOD — Motown Record Corporation has signed singer Jerry Butler to an exclusive recording contract, it was announced by Ewart Abner, president.

In making the announcement at a reception held in the presidential suite of the Century Plaza Hotel, Abner stated: "Jerry Butler and I started together many years ago. I have looked forward to the day when we would again be together under the banner of Motown. That day

S. Dakota Passes Anti-Piracy Law

PIERRE, SOUTH DAKOTA — Governor R. F. Kneif has signed into law House Bill 664 making South Dakota the 27th state to enact an anti-piracy statute.

The new law, effective immediately, prohibits the unauthorized duplication, offer or sale of sound recordings without the authorization of the owner. It also requires that the name and address of the manufacturer and the name of the actual artist appear prominently on the recording.

Violations of the law will be treated as a felony for all violators other than retailers, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or imprisonment for up to three years. The retail sale of pirated recordings is classified as a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$500 and/or imprisonment of up to one year.

Warners Appeals Sirica Ruling On Nixon Tapes

NEW YORK — Warner Communications, Inc., parent company of Warner Bros. Records, has begun procedures to appeal judge John Sirica's Apr. 4 decision denying their petition for the immediate release of the now-famous tapes of Watergate discussions in the Nixon White House. Warners' appeal will take place in the District of Columbia Federal Court of Appeals.

Michael Kapp, director of Warner Bros. 'Watergate project,' stated that work would continue on the heavily-researched set of documentary albums, whose narrative script has been prepared by TV writer David Davidson. Walter Pincus, executive editor of The New Republic, is serving as project consultant. George C. Scott has been contracted to narrate the two-record set.

"We are firmly committed to this project," Kapp said, "and we will continue, through our law firm of Williams, Connolly and Califano, to press through the proper channels for the immediate release of the tapes." Joseph Califano stated that the firm is preparing the appeal papers as rapidly as possible.

Warner Bros. was extremely disappointed at judge Sirica's stance that the public's "right to know" had been met by printed transcripts — already released — of the desired tapes. It is the firm's con-

tention that the release of the actual recordings will provide a much clearer dimension of the true character of the conversations than the transcripts — a dimension not currently available to the public. Questions of phrasing, nuance, inflection — and all the rest of those areas where speech clarifies content — were answered for the Watergate jurors and were acknowledged to have aided them in making their historic decisions.

"A member of the Watergate coverage jury says that the 28 white house tapes played during the trial were the key factor in the panel's verdict convicting four of the five defendants," wrote the New York Post on Jan. 2, 1975.

"It's too bad you can't have tapes in every trial," the jury member told the Associated Press. "It's hard to argue with the tapes."

"In interviews after the verdict," the New York Times reported on Jan. 5, "several jurors confirmed what seemed evident during the trial: That the evidence of tape-recorded conversations between the defendants and president Nixon were convincing."

"Dean struck a lot of people like a little boy," Newsday quoted jury foreman John A. Hoffar, "He sounds good. He came over well on the tapes."

Freidus New CBS Int'l Marketing VP

NEW YORK — Walter Yetnikoff, president of CBS Records International, has announced the appointment of Bunny Freidus to the position of vice president for marketing services.

Ms. Freidus will be responsible for the development of United States' artists overseas as well as for the promotion and coordination of releases of the U.S. Columbia, Epic and CBS Custom label catalogs abroad. She will also continue to provide overall direction for the CBS Records international press and public information activities. She will report directly to Yetnikoff.

Ms. Freidus first joined CBS Records in 1965 in the creative services department of Columbia Records. She has since held various positions in the promotion and merchandising areas of the CBS Records international division. Most recently, she served as director of marketing services, for the international division.

Dr. Hook Signs Capitol Deal

HOLLYWOOD — Dr. Hook has signed a long-term exclusive recording contract with Capitol Records for five million dollars announced by Al Coury, senior vice president, a&r/promotion/artist development, Capitol Records, Inc.

Negotiating the unprecedented contract were Capitol's Coury and Dr. Hook's producer/manager Ron Haffkine, who met with the group over dinner. The advance monies were mistaken as the salad and eaten by the group.

In welcoming Dr. Hook to Capitol, Coury said, "This was the best contract ever negotiated by any record company. With Dr. Hook's track record, I'm confident that we'll be able to recoup the damage by at least 1981."

The group's initial album for the label is titled "Bankrupt" and will feature their soon-to-be-released single, "Levitate." The album is scheduled for release in May.

Gortikov Urges Industry To Stop 'Pirate Rape!'

HOLLYWOOD — RIAA president Stan Gortikov told members of NARAS at a meeting at RCA studios, that the continued large scale piracy of records and tapes is casting a financial blight on the recording industry.

According to Gortikov, the financial loss to the industry as the result of continued trafficking, with the emphasis on eight track tapes, is amounting to a \$200,000,000 annual profit loss in this country.

He described the major offenders in music piracy as a highly organized unit

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

Schlitten Forms New Jazz Label

NEW YORK — Don Schlitten, whose productions have won the Grammy awards for "jazz soloist of the year" for the last two years, announced today that he has formed his own record company, Xanadu Records Ltd., and the first release is scheduled for May 1975. For Xanadu, Schlitten will produce a gold series which will contain historical recordings. There will also be a silver series which will contain brand new recordings.

The initial Xanadu release will consist of the following albums: "Don't Look Back" by the ballad singer, David Allyn; "Bud In Paris," previously unissued 1959-60 Bud Powell recordings; "The East/West Controversy" by Paul Chambers with an all star quintet, and the Hampton Hawes Trio; saxophonist Sonny Criss is accompanied by Barry Harris, Leroy Vinnegar and Lenny McBrowne on "Saturday Morning," and Joe Guy and Hot Lips Page in the "Trumpet Battle At Minton's" an original 1941 live recording from the Jerry Newman archives, featuring Charlie Christian and Thelonious Monk. All Xanadu albums will have a list price of \$6.98.

During the past two years Don Schlitten created Onyx Records and produced its prestigious catalogue and in addition produced almost the entire Muse catalogue of artists such as Sonny Stitt, James Moody, Richard Davis, Kenny Barron, Jimmy Heath, Eric Kloss, and Pat Martino.

NARAS Holds Piracy Panel

NEW YORK — Record piracy will be the focus of the Apr. 29 meeting of the New York chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS) at RCA studio A. For the first time, no admission charge will be levied.

Richard Jablow, a New York attorney, will chair the meeting. Other members on the panel will include Henry Brief, the executive director of the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA), Tony Martell, ABC Records' eastern marketing vice president; attorney Harold Orenstein; and Jules Yarnell, special counsel to the RIAA on piracy.

NJ Legislature Irons Out Anti-Piracy Measure

NEW YORK — The New Jersey legislature is currently working on ironing out differences between Assembly and Senate versions of a bill which would prohibit the unauthorized duplication and sale of tapes and records. The statute, #A1916, originated in the Assembly where it passed having designated the "bootlegging" practice a felony. In its consideration of the measure, the state Senate last week reduced the penalty to a misdemeanor, and the bill is now slated to return to the Assembly for final consideration. If approved, the measure would then go to Governor Byrne for signing.

Depending on the specifics of the bill, the usual penalty for a misdemeanor is a jail sentence of no more than one year and a fine of no more than \$1,000. A felony generally carries a jail term of two or more years and a substantially larger fine. Thus, the Senate has voted to regard tape and record piracy as a significantly lesser offense than the Assembly initially proposed.

London Launches Major Z. Z. Top Promo Campaign

NEW YORK — Z.Z. Top's "Fandango" LP will be released next week, according to Herb Goldfarb, vice president of sales and marketing at London Records. He also said that the album, in preparation for more than a year, will be promoted extensively by the company.

The record was recorded in the studio and live at The Warehouse in New Orleans. It follows the group's golden "Tres Hombres" disk. "Fandango" is the group's fourth London record.

The ad campaign began four weeks ago with four color ads in the trades. Novelty postcards of the same teaser ad were sent to all of rock press. Color ads will also be taken in commercial and musical magazines and newspapers.

Four color browser cards for dealers showing the Top's LPs have been made. They will be supplemented by full color posters for in-store and window displays.

The initial impact of the project will be sustained by mailings of simulated leather press kits in bulk quantities. Radio time buys in major markets will also be made. The college markets will be covered nationally in programs coordinated by London's local representatives.

WCI Disk Earnings Fall In 1st Quarter

NEW YORK — A slump in returns in Jan. and Feb. for WCI's record divisions highlighted the company's first quarter returns. Warners reported a first quarter net income of \$14,254,000 which is a drop of about \$1,500,000 from 1974. The company did indicate, however, that record income showed a substantial increase in Mar. Last year's first quarter was the highest, and this year's the second highest, of any quarter in the company's history in both net income and earnings per share. Fully diluted earnings per share were \$.76, versus the \$.77 earned last year. The smaller decline in earnings per share than in net income reflects the continuing effect of the company's stock purchase program. Revenues were \$171,289,000 compared to \$175,417,000 last year.

Commenting on these earnings, WCI chairman Steven J. Ross said, "I am pleased with our performance for the first quarter of 1975, given the extremely

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Almo Music Inks Big Secret

HOLLYWOOD — Chuck Kaye, executive vice president of Irving/Almo Music, has announced the representation of Big Secret Music, Ltd., via Almo Music in the United States and Canada.

Doug Flett and Guy Fletcher of Big Secret Music are writers of international renown, and their songs have been covered by Elvis Presley, Cliff Richard, and the Hollies, to name a few. The Big Secret Music catalog, which contains over two hundred titles, will feature the music of two major new artists, Chris DeBurgh on A&M Records, and John Dawson Reed on Chrysalis Records. DeBurgh has just released an album on A&M, entitled "Beyond These Castle Walls," and has just completed his first American tour. Reed will release an album on Chrysalis Records, entitled "A Friend Of Mine Is Going Blind," which is tentatively scheduled to be released June 1.

Swan Song Achieves Chart Successes

NEW YORK — One year after a party at New York's Four Seasons celebrating the creation of Swan Song, a record company owned by the members of Led Zeppelin and their manager Peter Grant, the label has all five albums that it has released on the **Cash Box** chart, and has generated more than \$20 million in retail sales.

Thus, Swan Song, which is distributed by Atlantic Records, has become one of the more prestigious and powerful labels in the business.

One reason obviously, is the quality of the acts and the label's small roster. The first records Swan Song put out were an album, "Bad Co.," and a single "Can't Get Enough" by the newly formed group Bad Company. Both went to number one, and the "Bad Co." album has now sold in excess of 1.3 million units and is still selling briskly. A followup single by Bad Company, "Movin' On," went top 20 with a bullet after only three weeks, and their new single, "Good Lovin' Gone Bad," is number 54 with a bullet after only two weeks. Although the members of Bad Company, Paul Rodgers, Mick Ralphs, Boz Burrell, and Simon Kirke had all been in moderately successful English groups, none of them ever received a gold or a platinum record prior to getting together and signing to Swan Song.

The Pretty Things' "Silk Torpedo" was the second LP released on Swan Song and it has been on the charts now for 11 weeks. Although the group had released five albums in the last nine years on various labels in the U.S., the Swan Song album is their first ever to hit the charts and translate their prestige in the press and rock community into sales. A single, "Joey," is getting action in several markets.

'Pinball Wizard,' Not A Single, Acts Like One

NEW YORK — "Pinball Wizard," the Elton John cut from the "Tommy" Polydor soundtrack LP is developing into an industry phenomenon. Radio stations all over the country have begun to play the cut consistently, listing it on their top 20, 30 or 40 playlists as though it were a single. But the record is only available in the LP.

Arnie Geller, marketing director of Polydor, has just shipped a two-sided single for "dee jay purposes only" to all stations on the Polydor pop and r&b lists coupling a version of the five minute and fourteen second single of "Pinball" with Tina Turner's "Acid Queen" cut from the same LP. The single has been shipped only as a convenience to dee jays.

So many key top forty stations have added the Elton John cut to their programming list this past week that the cut is listed #2 on the **Cash Box** Radio Active list of April 26, second only to the new Chicago single as the cut most added by stations during the past five work days.

The LP, of course, is one of the nation's biggest albums, bulleting into the #13 spot last week. All this is happening with the film in release for only four weeks; in most cities the movie has been playing for only two weeks. The last key city, San Francisco, will open the flick this week. And in most major cities where it is playing, the film is only in one theatre. The Ziegfeld Theatre in New York, for example, is the only theatre playing "Tommy" in the New York area. Additionally, Geller feels that when the film opens in a broader theatre spread in either May or June, that there will be a much stronger sales impact of the LP.

Maggie Bell's "Suicide Sal" was released three weeks ago and has moved up the charts each week. A single will be released within the next week. Sales in several markets have already surpassed the performance of her debut album, "Queen Of The Night," which was released on Atlantic.

Led Zeppelin, meanwhile, have become bigger than ever. Their latest, "Physical Graffiti," a two-record set, was number one for five weeks before dropping to number two this week. They have sold well over one million units and two of their Atlantic albums returned to the charts recently as a result of their recent U.S. tour and an Atlantic discount program on the catalog.

The number one upcoming project for Swan Song is Bad Company's first headline tour of the U.S., a 33-city tour on which Maggie Bell will be special

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Col. Supports Saratoga Fest

NEW YORK — Columbia Records, in conjunction with the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, will be helping to present the Saratoga Free Festival on May 24 in Saratoga, New York. Columbia artists Blue Oyster Cult and Journey will headline the show, and also on the bill will be rock group Pavlov's Dog and Columbia recording duo Myles & Lenny. According to Jonathan Coffino, director of new artist development for Columbia, "the Saratoga site has become an important showcase for both new and established acts in recent years, and in kicking off this new season, a tremendous free concert has been organized. Both the Columbia label and the bands involved are giving their time and effort for free in order to make this concert a successful and enjoyable event for the entire community." Other artists scheduled to appear at Saratoga this season include Chicago, Frank Sinatra, The New York Philharmonic Orchestra, and others.

A major campaign has been launched to promote the free concert, including a tie-in with radio stations in the upstate New York area, who are giving support through free air advertising time and aid in planning the event.

City Holds Funds Pending Decision In Beatles Suit

NEW YORK — N.Y. Supreme Court Justice Jacob Markowitz has ordered Capitol Records to turn over to the sheriff of the city of New York monies in amounts up to a total of \$5,751,000, pending settlement of a suit by ABKCO Industries Inc. versus Capitol Records and The Beatles. The judgment ties up the funds so that they can neither be removed from the state of New York nor the U.S. Monies will be held by the sheriff pending trial, for which a date has not yet been set. As royalties come in from Beatles product, they must be turned over to the sheriff until they reach the roughly \$5.7-million dollar figure.

Apple Corp., Ltd., the Beatles company, had tried to block the payments to the sheriff by saying the funds were owed to them in England and not the U.S. Justice Markowitz disagreed on the point however. ABKCO formerly managed the Beatles business affairs and has litigation pending against members of the group. Two such cases were recently settled (**Cash Box**, Apr. 26).

Talbert Named Arista R&B Product Chief

NEW YORK — Clive Davis, president of Arista Records, announced last week the appointment of Hank Talbert to the newly created post of national director of r&b product. Talbert, whose responsibilities will be wide ranging from r&b artist acquisition and development through promotion and merchandising of r&b product will report directly to Elliot Goldman, Arista's executive vice president.

Talbert's immediate duties will encompass the supervision of r&b promotion and the hiring and direction of the r&b promotion staff as well as the initial formulation of merchandising and marketing plans for r&b product. In addition, he will work closely with Davis in the evaluation of masters and artists in the r&b area.

Talbert comes to Arista from Buddah Records where he served as vice president in charge of the r&b division. Prior to that Talbert served as general manager of operations and national director of promotion and sales for Hot Wax and Music Merchant, divisions of Holland, Dozier, and Holland.

Rosica, who joined ABC in August 1974 as vice-president and general manager of the ABC/Impulse label and as ABC east coast office head, will announce his future plans shortly.

Price Named MCA Vice Pres.

NEW YORK — Frank Price, president of Universal Television, has been named a vice president of the parent company, MCA Inc., it was reported last week by Sidney J. Sheinberg, president and chief operating officer of MCA Inc.

Price joined Universal Television as associate producer and writer in 1959, subsequently becoming executive producer of a number of television series including "The Virginian," "Ironside," "It Takes A Thief" and several "World Premiere Movies." He was named a vice president of Universal Television in 1964, senior vice president in 1971 and president in July 1974.



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With the diminished club scene, what alternatives do contemporary music agents have in breaking new acts, and how do they secure a sufficient amount of annual dates for their seasoned performers?

How much effect can public relations have in the creation of a hit record or establishment of a new artist?

Linda Grey, Vice President, Levinson Associates

As to whether any amount of public relations can create a hit record, I would have to answer a resounding NO!

Whatever those forces are that cause hit records to happen, clearly the experience of the industry suggests that public relations is NOT one of those forces. There likewise appears to be little question that public relations IS the definitive force in establishing a new artist with or without a hit.

Our charter here is twofold: First, to gain recognition and acceptance of the artist as a creditable and viable talent by the music industry itself. Time and again experience has shown that budgetary expenditures and promotion, marketing and merchandising are functional to the visibility maintained by the artist in the recording community. Public relations is part of that overall marketing plan.

The second pr assignment is to bring the personality to the attention of the public and maintain his public posture in as high a profile as possible. The longer he can be kept in the public consciousness, the higher the public retention factor will be until finally (in the best of all possible worlds) he becomes an established celebrity, independent of the vagaries of "hit records."

If public relations cannot promise hit records or stardom, then what, one may ask, is its value? Insurance. Pure and simple. The greatest surgeon in the world can only do his best. He is somewhat dependent upon intangibles. He is not a "miracle worker." He depends on his professional expertise and skills. The "hacked" adage, "the operation was a success, but the patient died" is operative here as it pertains to a pr campaign by answering "When does hype cease being hype?" The greatest campaign is only as good as the artist's acceptance when he stands alone on the stage! Only then does the hype stop.

Well placed trade and consumer feature stories and items are essential in creating interest in any new product. This coverage not only lends credibility to the artist and his (or her) work, it makes breaking their records considerably easier. D.J.'s and P.D.'s relate stories they read to the music they listen to just as the public does. Articles about producers, studios, artists, etc., weave together to produce a collage of curiosity. Our most recent example of the way this p.r. pattern setting pays off can be found with Millie Jackson. Spring Records and Polydor felt her "Caught Up" album was something special, and they put us on just as it was released. We broke stories on Millie everywhere from The Village Voice to Black Stars. The LP crossed over from r&b to pop, went gold and turned Millie superstar.

A new artist needs public relations to develop properly. A public relations representative is a consultant or tool that when used correctly can be a vehicle for success. Through public relations contacts, an artist is introduced to the consumer through the media via a campaign that FITS the artist. This establishes the artist, but the consultant's job is far from complete. His work is never finished. He is always enhancing the artist's career with the ultimate goal of making him into a full-fledged star on an international level. And, once he reaches this level, assisting the artist in maintaining the high plateau. This all must be done on a highly professional, interesting and tasteful level. The artist must be kept aware of what the public relations advisor is doing. Communication between the two is vital.

Public relations, or more properly, publicity, connotes a longer range function than the sort of instantaneous impact promotion that can make a record hit. Hits are made by the excitement factor that's generated by an interesting or catchy sound, which in turn brings radio play and chart activity. Publicity is like a snowball, tiny at first, but which gathers momentum to a point where it is often still producing results long after a specific hit has disappeared from the public ear. Thus, in the building of a career, from a standing start, publicity, or p.r., plays a major role along with the other steps in the marketing chain, to build awareness, recognition and finally acceptance and desire for the product — in this case the performer. Publicity generates coverage which hits the public at widely varying times, from the next day's newspaper review to the magazine article that hits four to six months or more after the interview. Breaking hits is based on how fast the fur can be made to fly, how quickly the record can be gotten on the air with substantial spread. That function becomes a teammate of publicity but not an integral part of it.

We are still firm believers that the most important factor in the making of a hit record is obviously airplay. However, in recent years the advent of alternative publications, coupled with the enlargement of music interest sections in metropolitan newspapers, publicity in the record business has grown to enormous proportions. To this end, pr firms that specialize in contemporary music have become paramount in importance throughout the industry.

Record companies have expanded their own press information departments as a result, and, in many cases employ outside offices to supplement their efforts. Results have been good in many cases, providing caution is exercised in the selection of outside aid. After all, retainers do not purchase products. A pr company can only offer the good-will, time and contacts its employees have garnered through the years. The word "professionalism" seems to sum things up.

If a publicist is fairly selective and therefore not placed in a position in which he has to wantonly "hype" mediocre product, he can maintain his credibility with the world's press corps. This modus operandi cannot create a hit record. However, it can make a "hit" a "smash," or turn a "smash" into a "monster." It can also serve to uplift the overall image and stature of a new artist, or maintain that "image" for a performer who is "in-between" hits. In other words, "good hype" via tour publicity and personal contact with key city press, or simply talking up a well-produced record, can give all concerned a lot more mileage.

A direct cause and effect relationship exists between a good publicity campaign and hit records. Via public relations, a new artist with no hit can be brought to the public's attention consistently enough to create a strong awareness of his existence. Then, after sustained and careful image building, an interest in hearing the music and thereby a market for records and personal appearances is created.

For an artist with a hit record, public relations ensures against the "flash in the pan" syndrome we are all familiar with. A hit song itself — without publicity focusing on the artist — can be a dead end. Effective publicity creates solid sales power and career longevity.

The public tends to mark the passing of time in direct relation to the tides of news media saturation. A "whatever happened to" attitude is very common and if the public feels out-of-touch with its old favorites, they will find new ones... who are being publicized.



Chemical Company Finds Process To Lower Vinyl Chloride Factory Levels

NEW YORK — Tenneco Chemicals revealed last week that it is now able to remove over 98 percent of the previously contained residual vinyl chloride from the PVC resins which it produces at its plants in Texas and New Jersey. Effective immediately, twelve of its PVC grades will be shipped with a maximum monomer content of 10 parts per million (in the resin), compared with 50 times that figure, which has been typical industry practice.

Tenneco Chemicals is believed to be the first PVC producer to announce the voluntary achievement of these new low vinyl chloride levels in a broad range of resins, according to its president, Raymond H. Marks.

Vinyl chloride is a colorless gas at room temperatures. It has been produced commercially in the United States since about 1939, and is used primarily for the production of polyvinyl chloride (PVC).

PVC is one of the most versatile and widely used plastic materials. It is the prime material for phonograph records. Though vinyl chloride is now recognized

as a major toxicological problem, PVC is non-toxic according to all available data.

New information presented to the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health in Jan. 1974, attributed three deaths of workers in PVC production plants to angiosarcoma of the liver caused by exposure to VCM.

Since that time, 35 worldwide confirmed cases of angiosarcoma of the liver have occurred in employees with an average of over 19 years exposure to VCM. Most of them worked in PVC or VCM production plants (not fabricating plants), where the exposure levels were not accurately known. These are generally considered to have been well in excess of 50 parts per million (PPM), and in some cases above 500 PPM.

"These new resins will make it easier for fabricators to operate their plants safely below the OSHA action levels. This means that vinyl chloride in their work areas is 0.5 parts per million or less," Marks declared. "Our ultimate goal is commercial production of PVC resins with no detectable amounts of vinyl chloride monomer."

CBS Holds Pub Confab In Milan

NEW YORK — CBS Music Publishing is holding a special four-day conference in Milan, Italy this week (Apr. 28-May1). CBS Records has arranged a gathering of music publishing executives, artists, writers, artist managers, attorneys and members of the press. The main purpose of the event is to bring together the managers of the CBS and CBS-affiliated music publishing companies from various countries to exchange information and ideas.

The meetings will be highlighted by the announcement of new publishing deals, the presentation of an assortment of new songs, the appearance of several artist/writers, and a series of seminars on music publishing operation.

The conference will be attended by the managers of CBS publishing affiliates from the following regions: Japan, England, France, Italy, Holland, Australia, Germany, Scandinavia, Spain and, of course, the United States. Among the artist/writers who will be present at the meetings are Columbia recording artists Dave Mason and Ian Hunter, and Mums recording artist Albert Hammond. Also invited for the first time were a select group of attorneys, artist managers and press.

Several key announcements will also be made over the course of the four-day affair, including the disclosure of a number of new music publishing deals involving several top artists. Another highlight of the conference will be the presentation of new songs by many of the new publishers with whom CBS music publishing has become associated.

Charles Koppelman, vice president of CBS music publishing international said, "We plan to repeat this kind of meeting on an annual basis so that the flow of information will not stop once we have gotten it started."


Ron Wood A Face, Not A Stone

NEW YORK — In an effort to clear up the general confusion surrounding various reports which have appeared in the press in recent days, Billy Gaff, manager of Rod Stewart and The Faces, stated that guitarist Ron Wood is not leaving The Faces to join the Rolling Stones. However, the Stones have asked Ron Wood to appear with them as guest guitarist should they decide to tour the United States this year.

The situation, as it stands now, is this: As many followers of the music scene already know, the Stones have not replaced guitarist Mick Taylor, who left the group some months ago. Although they have decided against a permanent replacement for Taylor at this time, they have asked Ron Wood, whom Stones manager Peter Rudge says they consider the best man for the job, to appear with them if they decide to tour America in 1975. Two points must be emphasized here: 1.) As of now, no decision regarding a Stones tour has been made, nor will one be made prior to April 30th, and 2.) Ron Wood will not be leaving The Faces; should the Stones' tour become a reality, he would simply be pursuing an outside project which would not affect his activities as a member of The Faces.

However, at the moment there is some conflict regarding Wood's availabilities should the Stones decide to tour. The Faces next American tour is scheduled to start on July 30th at the Cape Cod Coliseum, and due to re-turfing of places such as the Tampa Stadium at that time of the year, it seems unlikely that The Faces will be able to alter any dates. Since the Stones tour is at this point still in some doubt, The Faces are going ahead with their plans, which include Ron Wood.

In addition to the above-mentioned plans for an extensive American tour in August and September, The Faces have a full schedule for the rest of 1975. An extensive tour of the United Kingdom is set for the end of the year and, in between tours, the group will be spending time together and separately in the recording studios, where they will be working on a new Faces group album, and various solo efforts by Stewart, Wood and Jones.



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Atl. Sets Apr. Disks

NEW YORK — Atlantic/ATCO Records reports the release of eight new pop albums in April, headed by "Ain't Life Grand," the seventh ATCO album in five years from Black Oak Arkansas. The release also includes albums from artists Kenny Vance, Phil Manzanera, The James Gang, King Crimson, The Kids, poet Nikki Giovanni (on Niktom Records), and a new group on Big Tree Records, Diamond Reo. National marketing and promotion priorities have already been set, while an advertising newsletter has been circulated to all sales managers and marketing coordinators detailing radio spot information and indicating the importance of radio and local print support for touring artists Black Oak Arkansas, James Gang, Nikki Giovanni, and The Kids. In addition, various merchandising tools have been allocated to the eighteen WEA Corporation service centers and satellite offices.

The release of the Black Oak LP, featuring the group's current single revival of the Beatles' "Taxman," coincides with their six week tour of the U.S. The album is their first with Los Angeles producer Richard Podolor. Kenny Vance's debut album on Atlantic is "Vance 32," a concept project that touches on a wide range of American music. Vance is the founder and 13-year alumnus of Jay and the Americans.

Roxy Music guitarist Phil Manzanera's first 'solo' venture, "Diamond Head," features Eno, Roxy members Andy Mackay, Paul Thompson, and John Wetton, one track with members of Manzanera's 'previous' group Quiet Sun, and a Robert Wyatt vocal on the opening track, "Frontera." The James Gang's third ATCO release, "Newborn," finds the band re-formed with west coast newcomers Richard Shack and Bubba Keith re-joining old friends Fox and Peters. The LP was produced in Cleveland and at Criteria in No. Miami by Tom Dowd.

King Crimson's eighth (and perhaps final) Atlantic album, "USA," was recorded 'live' last June in N.Y. With members Fripp, Cross, Wetton and Bruford. Cuts range in time from 1970, with the first LPs "20th Century Schizoid Man," through to the never-before-recorded "Asbury Park."

"Anvil Chorus" is the second British-produced album from The Kids (formerly: Heavy Metal Kids), the Cockney hard-rockers led by Gary Holton. Poet Nikki Giovanni's second album for her Niktom label (distributed by Atlantic/ATCO) is "The Way I Feel," which finds her recitations supported by r&b flavored instrumental backing, composed by producer Arif Mardin. The eighth album in the April release, on Big Tree Records, is "Diamond Reo," the debut of the Pittsburgh based band led by ex-Jagger keyboarder Frank Zuri. "Ain't That Peculiar" was their first single last year, and their brand new single, "Rock And Roll Till I Die," opens the disk.



Tanya Tucker MCA Debut LP Due In May

LOS ANGELES — Tanya Tucker's first album on the MCA Record label will be released in May it was announced by Rick Frio, MCA vice president of marketing. Tanya signed with MCA on her sixteenth birthday in October of 1974.

Her debut MCA album, "Tanya Tucker," features the single cut "Lizzie And The Rainman" (by Kenny O'Dell and Larry Henley) as well as "When Will I Be Loved" (by Phil Everly), "Son-Of-A Preacher Man" (by John Hurley and Ronnie Wilkins), "Someday Soon" (by Ian Tyson) and "Love Of A Rolling Stone" (by Jerry Chesnut). The LP was produced by Snuff Garrett and was arranged by Al Capps.

She had her first hit record when she was only 13 years old. Titled "Delta Dawn," the song hit the number one spot on country charts. Within three years, Tanya had several number one hits including "What's Your Mama's Name," "Blood Red And Going Down," "Would You Lay With Me (In A Field Of Stone)," and "The Man Who Turned My Mama On." All of Tanya's albums have reached country's top ten.

Tull's 'Child' Platinum

A subsequent album scheduled in May, "The Last Concert" by The Modern Jazz Quartet (a double-LP set) is set for a simultaneous release in stereo and quad, a first for Atlantic Records.

"From now on, as much as possible," says Mimaroglu, "we will be aiming for simultaneous stereo and CD-4 quad releases. And we will continue to inform the buyer of the stereo compatibility of all our quad albums."

that is often backed by organized crime. A major area of pirating centers on the bootlegging of records and tapes and, according to Gortikov, these bogus items are easy to spot.

Said Gortikov, "Bootleg records often have no discernable company markings on them and the art is often inferior or non-existent. Often times the only identifying marks will be a list of the songs."

"Another type of bootleg is the sound alike record where a band or singer who sounds like a well known act is passed off as the real thing, sometimes packaged in the real act's album cover."

Gortikov also stated that the upfrontness of some pirates has led them to taking out ads in well known publications.

"Of course," stated Gortikov, "the piracy wouldn't be as rampant if there wasn't a ready market for it. People will buy the records and tapes regardless of the questionable quality, because they think they're getting a bargain."

Gortikov concluded his speech by urging those present to do their part to help stop "this rape of the recording industry."

"One of the reasons for this problem is that people within the industry are not willing to get involved and fight for their rights. The creative cycle of an artist is often too short to have his artistry taken advantage of by these pirates."

Butler first grabbed national attention as a member of the Impressions with Curtis Mayfield. The group scored with "For Your Precious Love," and Butler's collaboration with Curtis not only led to "He Will Break Your Heart," "Find Yourself Another Girl" and "I'm A Telling You," but also the formation of Curtom Publishing, one of the first black artist-owned publishing companies in the country.

Butler is also credited with pioneering the r&b assault on the pop market. "At the time I was doing rhythm and blues, it wasn't even popular. It would be a fight to get the kind of stuff I was doing on pop stations. You couldn't even book an r&b act on a college campus."

On his own, Butler scored heavily with "Western Union Man" and "Only The Strong Survive," both considered soul classics.

"As far as I'm concerned, Abner, Motown and I are both concerned with the same thing — growth," Butler laughed. "We've both grown tremendously over the years and we're going to grow more."

strong results in last year's corresponding quarter. Based on the current outlook, we expect the second quarter and the full year 1975 to show gains in net income as well as earnings per share compared to 1974."

Pretax income from operating units was \$23,486,000 compared to \$28,401,000 a year ago. Last year's first quarter motion picture results were significantly aided by the initial release of "The Exorcist." Successful 1975 releases include "The Towering Inferno," "Freebie and the Bean," and "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore." Earnings from WCI's recorded music companies were lower than those of 1974's first quarter. The swing in television operations from a loss last year to a profit this year is the outgrowth of income from the leasing of feature films to television as well as certain cost efficiencies in ongoing series production. The substantial improvement in publishing earnings primarily reflects reduced losses from foreign operations, many of which were discontinued in 1974. Profitable first quarter cable television results should continue throughout 1975. Overall results benefited from a reduction in interest expense reflecting both lower rates and less outstanding debt.

During the quarter ended March 31, 1975, WCI purchased 1,444,700 shares of its common stock. The acquisition of these shares has been reflected in the computation of earnings per share on a weighted average basis. Subsequent to March 31, 1975, WCI has purchased an additional 438,700 of its common shares.

Weiss, in from his Hollywood base, spent five days in Atlanta meeting with GRC execs Bob Harrington, Oscar Fields, Mike Walker, Jim Jeffries, Jim Barden and Ruby Mazur, as well as Jason Management's David Jackson; discussing the international plans for the GRC, Hotlanta, Aware and Elephant labels, plus Jason Management's foreign opportunities.

It was pointed out by Weiss that there are more than eighty record and music publishing firms seeking the worldwide ties to the GRC companies and now, following prolonged discussions, the choice of licensees and sub-publishers has narrowed to a select few in each territory. Through GRC's legal representatives (Thompson, Shankman and Bond and via attorney Larry Thompson), contracts will be drawn for presentation to the selected companies for final approval and signature.

During the course of his Atlanta visit, Weiss set the global operational plan into motion for the respective departments of GRC, thus assuring the international licensees the smoothest of operations with a "very tight liaison by way of information, service and cooperation."

GRC is already contracted with Nippon Columbia in Japan, EMI-Capitol of Canada, Phonogram of Australia and New Zealand, with key foreign appointments to be made within the next four to six weeks.



Polydor's Got Hunks Of Funk


LONDON — Freddie Haayen, managing director, and Malcolm Jones, pop product manager, Polydor Ltd. in London have launched a major soul campaign for the month of April in the English market. The campaign, titled "Hunks of Funk — Soul Supreme from Polydor," highlights Polydor/MGM/Spring Records releases by James Brown, Millie Jackson, Gloria Gaynor, Johnny Bristol, The Fatback Band, the J.B.'s, and "Disco Par-r-ty."

In addition to the usual advertising in consumer and music trades press, a special press campaign for "Hunks of Funk" is being mounted. Posters and stickers for each of the albums are being distributed to dealers, discotheques and radio stations throughout England and Scotland. An eight page, full-color booklet on the LPs with a listing of all Polydor soul records is available at point-

of-purchase. A concentrated radio ad campaign is covering four major regions of Great Britain: London, the Midlands, the North country, and Scotland. A special discotheque promotion includes 2,000 specially-pressed singles with cuts by Bristol, Ms. Gaynor, and the Fatback Band that are being given to the clubs for use as prizes.

The albums in the campaign are: James Brown, "Reality"; Millie Jackson, "Caught Up"; Gloria Gaynor, "Never Can Say Goodbye"; Johnny Bristol, "Feeling the Magic"; The Fatback Band, "Keep On Steppin'"; Fred & The New J.B.'s, "Breakin' Bread"; and "Disco Par-r-ty," a continuous dance album starring 14 artists, among them Joe Simon, Ms. Jackson, Ms. Gaynor, Bristol, Brown, Disco Tex & The Sex-O-Lettes, and Kool & The Gang.

POINTS WEST — **Cash Box's Phil Alexander** and myself spent a good part of the business week tracing rumors that flew furiously on the street (what else is new?) to find out who the lucky winners in the "Who's Elton Gonna Pick?" contest would be. At **Joe Walsh's Shrine Auditorium** concert, there was "Captain Fantastic" himself, leaping on stage to accompany Joe in an encore of the **Beatles' "Get Back."** At that point, word had it that former **Kiki Dee Band** drummer **Roger Pope** would figure prominently in Elton's plans in replacing departed **Nigel Olsson**. What has now been confirmed by Elton's publicists is this: Elton is leaving imminently for Paris to produce a solo LP for guitarist **Davey Johnstone**. Appearing with Elton, Davey and Roger on the LP will be former **Barnstorm** bassist **Kenny Passerelli** and **Ray Cooper**. This band, with the addition of **Doobie Brothers** guitarist **Jeff "Skunk" Baxter**, will perform at Elton's June 21 Wembley Stadium concert. Whether or not the five-member unit represents a new nucleus for Elton, or whether the band has been assembled for the one date is unknown; however, Baxter is definitely not leaving the Doobies, who are on a U.S. tour at the moment. But what a great "one-nighter" for the Skunk! Joe Walsh, on the other hand, seems to have a penchant for acrobatics, as he appeared onstage for his Shrine encore suspended in a bird cage, playing and singing to his heart's content. **Dan Fogelberg** flew in from his Colorado sessions to join Joe for "Part Of The Plan" and will remain in L.A. to rehearse a road band.

United Artists is preparing for an autobiography of legendary folksinger **Woody Guthrie**. Titled "Bound For Glory," the motion picture will be produced by **Robert Blumofe** and **Harold Leventhal**. An exhibition hall will display out of print records, posters and merchandise which will be sold and traded, and live music will be provided by "up and coming rock and roll artists." BITS & PIECES: The third annual Warner Bros. show at WLIR's Ultra-Sonic studios was broadcast live last week as part of the station's continuing series of Tuesday night concerts. **Grinderswitch** and the **Marshall Tucker Band** performed separate sets before joining forces for a jam session which lasted until the wee hours — much to the delight of the SRO audience of 100. ... The first official **Beatles** recording was released in Russia last week by the state-owned Melodiya label. The cover is a picture of a lake and trees and the name of the group is spelled "Bitlz," but the music remains intact. ... **Spirit**, now a trio featuring co-founders **Randy California** and **Ed Cassidy** have their first album for Mercury, "Spirit Of '76," released next week. It's a double album opening with a medley of "America The Beautiful" and "The Times They Are A' Changing" and closes with "Star Spangled Banner." Also included are versions of "Like A Rolling Stone," "Hey Joe" and "Happy."

Muddy Waters celebrated his 60th birthday with a concert and party at Boston's Pall Mall. The show was broadcast live over WBCN and featured a jam session afterwards with **Peter Wolf** and **Magic Dick** of the **J. Geils Band** joining **Muddy**, **Luther Johnson** and **James Montgomery** on stage while **Jeff Beck**, **Faye Dunaway**, and **Dick Wingate** watched from the audience. ... **Ringo Starr** is preparing a "Monty Python type" TV show based on the cover of his "Goodnight Vienna" LP. "I only know three chords," Ringo told an interviewer, "and when I'm writing I use three guitars — one tuned to each chord." ... **Gryphon** leader **Richard Harvey** has recorded a solo album of **Vivaldi** and **Handel** chamber music for recorder.

21st CENTURY DRUMMER: **Bill Bruford**, the tall, slender drummer who helped to shape and define the course of progressive rock percussion with **Yes** and later **King Crimson** was in New York last week, scouting musicians for a new group. While in town, he spoke to **Cash Box** about some of his recent activities and future plans.

Since **King Crimson** disbanded last year, **Bruford** has been the busiest member of the band, touring Europe as a temporary member of the Anglo-French group, **Gong**, and doing session work for people like **Roy Harper**, **Chris Squire**, **Steve Howe** and **Annette Peacock**. **Bruford** also worked on the all-star recording of "Flash Fearless Vs. The Zorg Woman Pts. 5 & 6" along with **Alice Cooper**, **John Entwistle**, **Nicky Hopkins** and others.

Bruford has most recently been called upon to assist his former colleagues, **Steve Howe** and **Chris Squire**, on their forthcoming solo albums. "Squire's album is classy and elegant and not too surprising," he says. "It kinda sounds like Yes without Jon Anderson. Working with Squire was like a deja vu. We disagreed and discussed the same things in the music that we did three years ago." **Bruford** also traded musical ideas with **Jon Anderson** once again prior to his proposed album. "He's doing something that will sound nothing at all like Yes. In fact, he will probably be playing all of the instruments on the album himself."

About **King Crimson's** premature demise, **Bruford** calls it a "fairly original move on Fripp's part — he just suddenly decided to stop." Nevertheless, he looks upon his tenure with the group as a learning experience which helped to sharpen his percussive abilities. "Actually, we were short on material in **Crimson** which was good because it helped us become better improvisators. A situation like that forces you to become reasonably imaginative — unlike a group like Yes where every note you will play has been planned before you even leave England. In Yes, you are instructed, ordered, and cajoled and then you wonder if you can still play music after a while. In **Crimson**, we purposely left gaps in the music and had no idea of how we would fill them until we got to them."

An example of the group's improvisational prowess can be heard on a track called "Asbury Park" on the soon to be released "King Crimson USA" live LP. The album stands as a testament to one of the finest incarnations of the group as they deliver confident and often blistering versions of latter compositions ("Easy Money," "Exiles," "Lament") in addition to the obligatory "21st Century Schizoid Man."

Bruford is currently seeking out "high quality players" in this country because he claims that English musicians "are not schooled enough." He says that "Europeans have the conceptual ideas, but the Americans have the chops." He leans toward the idea of forming a group because "it feels more comfortable" but hesitates to talk about the type of music he will be playing other than to say that it will be "funky as hell."

Take Me In Your Arms (Rock Me) (3:39) (Jobete/ASCAP — Holland — Dozier — Holland)

Carly's long awaited single from her new disk is the obvious choice for AM play. Containing the same, vibrant qualities which have made her past efforts so successful, Carly's latest, again produced by Richard Perry sounds destined for the top. Flip: No info. available.

ERIC CLAPTON (RSO SO-509) (Dist: Atlantic)

Swing Low Sweet Chariot (3:32) (Casserole/BMI-Trad., arr. E. Clapton)

Whoa! If Eric's reggae version of this traditional American ditty doesn't grab you like Harry Belafonte singing "Banana Boat," then I'm completely deaf! Super production here by Tom Dowd, this record has **got** to happen! It cooks, and features some of Eric's best slide work in some time. Go with this. Mellow summer music. Flip: Pretty Blue Eyes.

BARBRA STREISAND (Arista AS 0123 M)

How Lucky Can You Get (3:53) (Screen Gems-Columbia/EMI — F. Ebb — J. Kander)

"Wrap it up and charge it!" How lucky **we** are with this funny lady's super performance from the soundtrack LP from the film. Barbra's classy, sassy rendition gives way to a surreal, sarcastic parody at the end of a fine production. You gotta see the movie to appreciate this — a dynamite visual, and now aural experience. Big band finale takes out a hot piece of vinyl. Flip, too! (More Than You Know).

JUSTIN HAYWARD and JOHN LODGE (Threshold 5N-67019) (Dist: London)

I Dreamed Last Night (2:49) (Justunes/ASCAP — J. Hayward)

From their highly-acclaimed LP "Bluejays," it sounds very much like London has released a single with two "A" sides! "I Dreamed . . ." is as strong as Moody Blues' "Tuesday Afternoon" in its haunting lyricality. Hot AM property here from two fine artists. Brilliant production.

ELVIS PRESLEY (RCA JH 10278)

T-R-O-U-B-L-E (3:00) (Chesnut/BMI — J. Chestnut)

Our hero!!! Elvis' new single has the good-feeling character that was so evident in the best of his fifties rock and rollers, while utilizing those bases to bring things into '75's chart demands. Will be hot seller c/w, super-hot AM pop crossover. Important single for Elvis, five stars. Flip: Mr. Songman.

ANDY WILLIAMS (Columbia 3-10144)

Feelings (2:56) (Fermata/ASCAP — M. Albert)

Produced by Jack Gold and arranged by Nick DeCaro, Andy's latest single for Columbia couldn't be sweeter. The man has class in everything he sings, and his talents combined with sure, full orchestration and harmonies make this an MOR-pop monster. Will put you in the mood. Flip: No info. available.

KANSAS (Kirshner ZS8-4258) (Dist: Epic)

Song For America (2:59) (Don Kirshner/BMI — K. Livgren)

From the album of the same name comes this single featuring excellent musicianship and a strong lyric line. Bicentennially speaking, this is a timely record, but it is also strong enough to merit attention regardless of the year. This could be the record to give the group an AM following. BETTIE SWANN (Atlantic 3262)

Beautiful Loser (3:14) (Gear/ASCAP — B. Seger)

Produced by Bob and the Muscle Shoals Rhythm Section, the title cut from his LP, Capitol and Mr. Seger strike hard with a country-rocker that is a pop top ten smash prospect. Super hot production and rhythm makes it something to watch. Four stars. Flip: No info. available.

BARCLAY JAMES HARVEST (Polydor PD-15104)

One only wonders why this obviously commercial single was not released earlier. Flip: Ooh Baby (2:53) (Intersong USA/Chappell & Co./ASCAP — Rumpf — Cont.)

TEACH IN (Philips 40800)

Ding-A-Ling (2:24) (Dayglow/ASCAP — D. Bakker — W. Luikinga — E. Ouwens)

This is the tune that won the 1975 Eurovision song contest. The Dutch group follows in the footsteps of last year's winner, ABBA, with a brisk, uptempo tightly produced and well harmonized number much like "Waterloo." Flip: No info. available.

GEORGE FISCHOFF (P.I.P. 6503)

King Kingston (3:05) (George Fischoff/ASCAP — George Fischoff)

George makes his entry into the disco field with this instrumental piano-based tune. A network of percussive undercurrents is topped by George's honky tonk piano style. This cut should receive much disco action. Flip: Water Flower (2:21) (George Fischoff/Mourbar/ASCAP — George Fischoff).

Journey: A Trip Worth Taking

Journey is a name band.

Gregg Rolie, Neal Schon, Aynsley Dunbar, Ross Valory, George Tickner. Names to be reckoned with in the highly competitive world of popular music. Names who have banded together for an extended musical excursion called Journey.

When captured in a live setting (such as the recent week long gig at The Starwood in Los Angeles) the band comes across as a spacey crossmatching of Cream and Moody Blues influences. But according to Rolie, who did his musical teething on a ton of Santana gold, it's a lot more basic than that.

"Our music is basically rock and roll. There's a lot more changes and time signatures in our music than in the basic rock and roll track and there's bits of jazz scattered through it but when you get down to it, it's rock and roll."

Rock and roll, yes but in concert the likes of "Topaz" and "Look Into The Future" take on a symphonic quality highlighted by the playing off of riffs and runs between Rolie and former stablemate Neal Schon

Schon, who while growing up in San Mateo worshipped at the guitar altar of Eric Clapton and B. B. King, mastered his licks at an early age and, as a result, was a much sought after lead man. During his junior high school days Schon played in a variety of Bay Area rock and roll bands.

At age 16 Schon was offered his first substantial gig in the guise of Eric Clapton's Derek and The Dominos. A position he declined in favor of a similar post in the then fledgling Santana band.

Besides his work with Santana, Schon has proved a skillful sessionman; adding his chops to albums by Herbie Hancock, Kathi MacDonald, Azteca, Luis Gasca, Betty Davis and John Lee Hooker.

Schon described his short association with Journey as a fruitful one by virtue of the band's ability to work as a naturally moving unit; especially in the area of musical structuring.

"Most of what we do is spontaneous. That's what makes this band so easy to work with. Prior to going into the studio we did the basic structuring of the music but once we got into the studio everybody started coming up with bits of pieces of things that we hadn't thought of before. A lot of these recording studio ideas are on the album."

Tickner, a seasoned veteran of the Bay Area rock scene, echoed Schon's comments when he described the band's interaction on stage.

"During the course of a song everybody plays a certain part. It's not so much that we structure a song that way but because this style of playing happens to fit in with the natural flow of the band."



The musical odyssey that is Journey's began in the tail end of 1973 when the band members were drawn together under the auspices of Spreadeagle Productions with the name Journey, the by-product of a contest given by radio station KSAN.

The band chose New Year's Eve 1973 for their debut and the Winterland show, a gig the band members are most familiar with, proved a huge success. The band changed locale the next day as they played before 100,000 fans at the annual Sunshine festival at Diamond Heat Crater in Hawaii.

For the next year the band gigged when and where they could making some money and, more importantly, getting the exposure necessary for a brand new band. February '74 proved a boost for the infant Journey as the band filled San Francisco's Great American Music Hall on two successive weekends.

A series of sellout concerts quickly followed and the present tour which includes stops on the east coast and various points in the American heartland. According to Aynsley Dunbar the expected reception should not change according to region.

"People are willing to give a new band a chance no matter where they're from. There's no reason to believe that we won't go down well at all the gigs we do."

The obvious musical influences brought into this camp by its members are varied but the goal is the same — the institution of a new music upon the airwaves.

Nobody is more aware of this than Dunbar whose list of gigs (most notable providing the backbeat for John Mayall, Jeff Beck and Frank Zappa) is longer than the proverbial arm, stated it appropriately in musical terms.

"Right at this moment we are working on songs which are out of the three and four routine. That type of arrangement tends to get boring very quickly. If you listen closely to our live performance you'll see that we're getting into other times that fit into a melodic run without falling into the trap of shortening the time."

A concept often talked about but seldom put to effective use is that of the vocals used in the same context as another instrument. Rolie, whose vocals wax prominent on all of Journey's material described it this way:

"The way we handle vocals is different from what most bands do. A vast majority of bands feature the singer upfront and, in a sense, apart from the rest of the band. What we do is use our vocals in a restrained, sparing way. They dart in and out of the music; filling in the spaces left by the instruments. When you get right down to it this band uses no more or less vocals than any other band; it's just the way we use them that makes gaging the degree difficult."

Journey, by their own admittance, is a concert band and, although their Starwood gig proved an excellent showcase of their musical prowess, Ross Valory was upfront in stating the band's preference.

"We're doing the club gigs because right now that's all we can get but in a concert hall we've got more space on stage and there's more room to kick back and get into the musical trip that we can do best."

If nothing else Journey has been prolific in attacking its approach to music. Although their debut Columbia disk only recently dented the **Cash Box** charts the band has put together enough material to fill its next two albums which should assure their ever growing legion of fans music most palatable to the ears.

Journey; the musical road happily taken.



John Mayall — A Whole New Ballgame — Again

The name **John Mayall** has different degrees of meaning to people who love music. To those of us who first became familiar with his **Bluesbreakers Band** back in the early sixties, he stands as a figure who literally "graduated" scores of musicians from what many have referred to as the most influential music school in the history of pop music. To those just getting acquainted with the ABC Records artist, Mayall must seem like an enigma. At 41 years of age, many wonder where he came from. His current album "**New Year, New Band, New Company**" represents the incredible diversity that has always been his trademark and while teenagers try to figure out just who was in his band, John continues to explore new musical directions, having a ball all the while.

During a recent visit to **Cash Box** Mayall said, "I really don't know how many albums of my material and performances are on the market. I know of ten or eleven on London and of several German and European LPs and my ABC product, but I've seen underground collectors' sheets listing over 25 titles. It amazes me sometimes how many records I've made."

As busy as John has been writing, arranging and playing his own music, he has still had time to get into the arts on an intensive if selective basis. Few know that he is a film buff extraordinaire. Said Mayall, "People think of me as the guy who used to play with **Eric Clapton, Mick Taylor, Jack Bruce, Peter Green, Aynsley Dunbar, Mick Fleetwood, Keef Hartley** or **Dick Heckstall-Smith**, but I have a private life that I really enjoy. I'm really into films and go to five or six in a day if I have the time." This devotion to pursuing his own interests outside of music has probably added incalculable longevity to his career.



Perhaps of all the musicians who played in a Mayall band and then moved on, **Mick Taylor** stands out as an example of the calibre of talent John has attracted to his various groups over the years. Mayall recalled the time when Taylor left to become a member of the **Rolling Stones**: "**Mick Taylor** and I had come to an understanding that it was time for a change and then out of the blue **Mick Jagger** rang me up and started asking me questions about Taylor. I told him that if he wanted to hire him it was fine with me. So Mick called him up (Jagger called Taylor) and they worked out the arrangements." Taylor, now in his own band with **Jack Bruce** had been brought up in the creative air that was attendant to all Mayall bands and the inquiry by Jagger was as much a compliment to John as to **Mick Taylor**.

Another subject Mayall is quite vocal about is **Lenny Bruce** and what John feels has been an extremely distorted retrospective picture of his career and cultural significance. He has over forty hours of unreleased, unexpurgated tape of Lenny in concert and feels sad that the American public has, in his opinion, been given a misimpression of the comedian.

John has not been totally free of problems in his own career and consequently can empathize with any performer who has paid his dues. When a broken leg forced him to cancel several dates of a tour of England in 1974, John surprised everyone by returning to the stage with a hip to foot cast and naturally, his guitars and harmonicas. Though many consider it bad luck to nurture a band and then see it break up, John looks upon such occurrences as new opportunities full of potential.

His current group includes **Jay Spell**, keyboards, **Don Harris**, violin/vocals, **Rick Vito**, guitar/vocals, **Dee McKinnie**, vocals, **Soko Richardson**, drums, and **Larry Taylor**, bass. The aggregation astounds everyone who hears their music. No one can believe that lovely **Dee McKinnie** has never taken vocal lessons, and veteran music buffs rub their eyes when they look at the talented lineup that recorded "New Year, New Band, New Company."

The demand for John and his band to appear in concert is always tremendous, because folks are starting to get hip to the new Mayall sound and are interested to come out and see the master who makes such great music and who turned out so many musical giants from his blues school. When you consider all the different areas of rock that these musicians have gone into, you get an idea of how universal an art form the blues is. That's why you'll always hear some of the great licks reminiscent of past years on John's current LP as well as on future ones. After all, John's quest for new forms of expression makes every experience an exciting one.

RUPERT HOLMES — Rupert Holmes — Epic KC 33443 — Producer: Jeffrey Lesser





JANIS — Janis Joplin — Columbia PG 33345 — Producer: Paul A. Rothchild


BARBARA COOK AT CARNEGIE HALL — Barbara Cook — Columbia M 33438 — Producer: Thomas Frost

LOVE TRIP — Tamiko Jones — Arista 4040 — Producer: Tamiko Jones





**Chick Corea &
Return To Forever
Larry Coryell & 11th House**

SANTA MONICA CIVIC — Chick Corea's avowed decision to replace the jazzman's ego by returning to communication with audiences has come to fruition, as evidenced by a sterling performance given to a totally partial, ecstatic L.A. audience last week. Corea's compositional genius, well-recorded through his early work with Miles, Mongo, Mann and McLaughlin, is as brilliant as ever, but the astounding part of Return To Forever is the on-stage communication taking place between the artists themselves. One would be hard-pressed to come up with superlatives to laud the friendly, relaxed atmosphere that surrounds the band when they play, amazing when one considers the difficulty and technical nature of the tempos and key signatures that Corea's music is written in. The obvious answer to one's initial amazement at the band, of course, lies in the accomplished abilities of the musicians themselves, each having transcended technique alone, although there is the recognition that without a flawless flow of notes inherent in the band's abilities, such music could neither be conceptualized nor performed. So

much for the obvious. The performance, graced by Corea's masterful employment of ARP synthesizer, Hohner clavinet piano, Fender Rhodes, and Steinway, represented a cross-section of material Chick has composed over the years. Featured this evening was a piece by Stanley Clarke, bassist, off the band's most recent Polydor/MGM LP, entitled "Dayride," "Celebration Suite" by Corea, and the incredible "Beyond The Seventh Galaxy." Did I say incredible "Beyond The Seventh Galaxy." What a poor excuse for description!

To be honest, I've not been more impressed by the combined musical ability of any other contemporary progressive jazz group. Bassist Stanley Clarke is a totally accomplished master of his instrument, but that must also be said for drummer Lenny White, and guitarist Al DiMeola as well. One could go on for pages about the skills of each individual, suffice it to say that the sum of the parts is far greater than the whole. Particularly effective, and indicative of the total visual and musical affinity the band has at its command was a section where Corea would play a solo line, followed in turn by

Sometimes you go to a concert to clap along and feel happy, sometimes to experience the bizarre, sometimes to because you're really into the artist and his music; people go to Pink Floyd concerts for a religious experience. I'm sure the lady next to me either saw God or a perfectly acceptable stand-in. It was that kind of show.


It's not an easy task for a group to totally dominate a space the size of the Sports Arena, but thanks to one of the most impressively arranged and performed total shows I've ever seen, Pink Floyd pulled it off.

We all know the brand of music; long, spacey bridges with lots of sustain from the keyboards and lots of novel effects thrown in for us to think about while being led to the next jam. The music builds constantly, not just within numbers but from the opening audio hum of the amps to the final notes of the concert. Essentially the entire show is one piece of music.

The climax comes of course in "Dark Side Of The Moon." I've seen other groups run a theme song into the ground simply by overworking a dead horse. Not so in this case. Each time I hear this number it has new dimensions. I've heard it said that a "classic" can be recognized in art when its theme and style are timeless, mark then, this music is such.

The effects, lighting, mixing, and "specials" were right up to the music. The theme was power — power in size, power in decibels, and power in color. It was all done with consummate artistry. Some groups try to bowl you over with lots of effects and trust to random luck for it to all blend together. Pink Floyd's crew deserves a note of their own. Anytime you can take a giant circular movie screen with a full scale motion picture running, a dazzling rotating mirror arrangement, the banks of color-lights, and the old fog, blend it to such music as Floyd's and have it fit and fit well, you've done something.

DiMeola, Clarke, and White, growing progressively faster as they performed in succession. This sort of "musical chairs" was contrasted nicely when the band performed a piece of softer, perhaps more traditional music featuring Clarke on a 100-year-old acoustic double bass, which he bowed with the gentleness and precision of a symphony musician. Corea's touch on the Steinway compares with any modern day comparison to a Rubinstein or Graffman. Between numbers, Stanley addresses the audience to announce the next number and talk to the crowd, in a manner that is candid, sincere and a welcome relief from the contrived on-stage patter that emanates from most groups. At the end of the performance, each expresses himself vocally in thanking the crowd for coming. A band that is this interested in the approval and attendance of their admirers, while blowing them away with brilliance in the process, is a rare thing in the music world, and the band deserves all the success and recognition that accompany such quality.

Also appearing on the bill was guitarist supreme Larry Coryell and Eleventh House. Brilliant in technique, but unfortunately not comparable in on-stage presence to Corea's band, the most redeeming segment of the Coryell set was a solo acoustic set played prior to the band's entrance.

SANTA MONICA CIVIC, L.A. — The highest complement that can be paid Lynyrd Skynyrd is that if the band moved next door to you, your lawn would die. In other words they sure were funky.

The band made no bones about its southern roots as they turned in a raw series of Alabama rockers filled to overflowing with harsh experience and just plain feeling.

The nucleus of this night's set centered around a grinding interaction between the guitar trio of Collins, Rossington and King and the throbbing bass of Leon Wilkinson. It quickly became evident that the band had learned its rock and roll lessons well. A bit of Deep Purple here, a dash of ZZ Top there; all deep fried in a burning rock and roll shell.

Easily the set's "Sweet Home Alabama" featured Ron Van Zant spitting out his southern pride to the delight of the crowd.

More than able support was provided by the Charlie Daniels Band which turned in a churning set of countrified blues mixed in with a ton of varied musical influences. An interesting instrumental jam on Daniel's part produced some decidedly Quicksilver riffs circa the summer of love. The Daniels set ranged far and wide the musical spectrum while keeping a respectful hold on its traditional roots.

Based on this gig the south will most definitely rise again.

**Joe Walsh
Emmylou Harris**

SHRINE AUDITORIUM, L.A. — Most people would have you believe that good music is creative inspiration and nothing more. Well in the case of Joe Walsh's Shrine gig it was that and something more; a working knowledge of rock and roll technology.

Throughout the set Walsh proved himself the master craftsman; bending a riff here or extending a run there, which, when combined with some decidedly fresh rock and roll flash, made for a most entertaining musical experience.

The key to Walsh's effectiveness on the boards is the refreshing interplay he displayed with the audience. His between-song patter with the audience and members of his backing ensemble brought back a lighthearted, reckless tone that was rock and roll in days gone by.



Musically the classic chording of "Rocky Mountain Way" took on added dimension in its live setting via some deft instrumental passages that, at times, threatened to take the piece to a higher level than mere move music.

The set's multiple encores produced a segue into Walsh's rock and roll past with a steamroller effort on "Funk #49" and a literal airborne effort on "Walk Away" as Joe played his now classic riffs suspended from the Shrine's ceiling.

A cover of "Get Back" proved an added on stage bonus as Elton John put in a piano pounding accompaniment to Walsh's axe.

Joe Walsh pulled a Caesar this night. He came, he saw and he conquered.

Proving a spirited show opener was country-rock belter Emmylou Harris. Ms. Harris' set, aided by the funkiest vocals in many a moon, proved the perfect tool to showcase the many and diverse possibilities of country music. She opened the show this time but Emmylou Harris is definitely headline material.

John Prine

AVERY FISHER HALL, NEW YORK — John Prine has always been a purveyor of a varied soup. His songs run the gamut from outrage about strip mining, to paranoia about the smoking of contraband substances, to sensitivity about the plight of lonely elderly people. Yet it was apparent from the large crowd assembled to hear him that his greatest asset is his wry sense of humor. From "Dear Abby" and "Your Flag Decal Won't Get You Into Heaven Anymore" in his acoustic set through "Middle Man," "Come Back Barbara Louis Hare Krishna Beauregard," and "Forbidden Jimmy" in the electrified second set, his wit was king. The latter set was especially good,

featuring most of the material from his recent Atlantic release "Common Sense." His voice raunching and rheumy like some latter day incarnation of a good-time Bob Dylan, Prine tore into the numbers with a great deal of energy, no doubt helped by the fine rhythm section of Greg Jackson on bass and Peter Bunetta on drums. Alan Hand was also present to throw in some succulent licks on piano and organ. The concert ended, after a three song encore, as "Common Sense" ends, with Chuck Berry's "You Never Can Tell." Although a departure from his earlier work, it fits in quite well with his most recent music. It just goes to show you that one never can tell. r.i.p

In addition, Cochran will remain active with Wally Cochran and Associates, the independent record promotions and public relations venture he formed since exiting GRC Records, prior to which he spent some three decades with RCA.

"She's Not Lisa" — The Capitol Records artist that is making so many waves is a lady of many names. She claims she's not Lisa on her hot chart climbing hit "I'm Not Lisa" which is #4 with a bullet on the **Cash Box Country Chart** and #46 with a bullet in the **Cash Box Pop Chart**. With Capitol Records, and her professional following, she is known as Jessi Colter, in her home she is Mrs. Waylon Jennings, but all of it put together comes out as Miriam Johnson Eddy Jennings who has it all together as an artist, a writer and top performer.

Miriam Johnson was born in Phoenix, Arizona and is the sixth of seven children. Her father was many, many things including a race car builder, a mechanical expert, mining engineer and inventor. Her mother became a minister, or evangelist, at a time when women just didn't enter such fields. Jessi got her nickname from, of all people, Jesse James but of course the spelling was given a feminine touch.

Jessi became a church pianist when

she was eleven, then added the accordion and when she was fifteen she started writing. Her writing ability is evidenced by such songs as "I'm Not Lisa," and the new Dotts single on RCA titled "Storms Never Last."

Switching from churches to clubs, Jessi filled in her younger years singing and playing until she met and married Duane Eddy who encouraged and recorded her as an artist. Waylon Jennings soon entered the picture and romance led to marriage. At first Waylon produced Jessi for the RCA label where she met with a modicum of success. Today Jessi is not robbing trains or people, but is giving of herself and her talent and says she has a real love affair going with country music.

Brabo's Al den Ouden Dead At 55

CHICAGO — Al den Ouden, general director of the N.V. Brabo Corp. in Antwerp, Belgium, died on Apr. 13 at the age of 55. Den Ouden was a long time associate and close friend of Brabo president George Charlier with whom he served in the French underground during World War II.

At the time of his death den Ouden managed the firm's Hong Kong facilities. He was a frequent visitor to the United States and made numerous trips to the Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corp. factory. Brabo has been a distributor of the Rock-Ola phonograph line for many years and, during this tenure, den Ouden developed a very close personal and business relationship with the Rock-Ola family.

NAMA West Show Draws 94 Exhibits

CHICAGO — The annual NAMA Western Convention-Exhibit of Vending and Foodservice Management drew 94 exhibitors in San Diego Apr. 4-6, the second largest number in recent years, according to Jack Rielley, NAMA director of sales.

"This was exceeded only at our 1974 convention, also held in San Diego," Rielley said, "and is remarkable in view of the current economic situation." There were 96 exhibitors that year.

Registration reached an unofficial 2,850 industry representatives, said G. Richard Schreiber, NAMA president. The figure is less than the slightly over 3,000 figure of recent NAMA western shows but represents primarily a drop in attendance of individual company personnel, which Schreiber said is probably occasioned by economy measures.

Schreiber said the convention sessions were well attended and the association received acclaim for the program presentations.

Large attendance was registered by a panel discussion on internal security chaired by Clarke Braly, a San Diego operating company executive, and featuring a panel of five industry experts. Other popular sessions dealt with the application of computers in the vending industry, office coffee service and a forecast of 1975 business conditions by UCLA forecaster Larry J. Kimbell.

Dr. Fergus M. Clydesdale, University of Massachusetts scientist and professor, told the convention audience that the term "junk foods" sometimes applied to vending machine products does not have scientific validity and that nutritional habits cannot be legislated.

He said that all foods are beneficial and that the proper orientation of educational efforts should be toward the consumption of a variety of foods. The nationally known nutrition expert criticized attacks on vended products as losing sight of the fact that vending machines, like other serving methods, are a useful means of dispensing food and beverages and that many of the attacks on the American food supply are not founded on scientific fact.

Dr. Clydesdale suggested that the vending industry should participate in consumer education about nutrition and that vending installations can be utilized to suggest that consumers obtain a varied diet.

Wagner Van Vlack, NAMA board chairman and chairman of Interstate United Corporation of Chicago, expressed optimism about improvement in the economy next year. He said that certain aspects of the vending and foodservice management business look positive, even though employment has declined in the automotive and in other manufacturing sectors.

Matter of fact, he info's that architects generally put a games room right into the original plans nowadays before they erect new hotels and motels, so half the selling job for the operator is done. The feeling at the Atari meeting, expressed by the assembled distributors, had it that the demand for good novelty equipment, (and selective used games) hasn't been as great for quite some time as it is right now. The games business is flourishing in many precincts, he says, and the boom should continue for many months to come. . . . Next NAMA Western Show will be held in San Francisco April 2-4. Ms. Dorothea Jones, of West Orange, New Jersey has developed a unique food dispensing vendor type machine which is equipped to dispense pre-selected amounts of cheese and meats, already sliced. The machine is comprised of a box housing which contains a number of conventional electro-mechanical food slicing assemblies, each communicating with an individual weighing scale. A conventional on-off assembly, governed by a deposit coin assembly, regulates the food slicing devices and the weighing scale. This vending machine is said to eliminate the problem of soggy or stale bread, which can occur with machines now in use. The meats and cheeses are always fresh, since the machine is continuously cooled, she says. Ms. Jones is now negotiating for the sale or licensing of her invention to interested manufacturers.

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Karajan Sings New EMI Pact

LOS ANGELES — On the afternoon of Sunday, April 20, in the Hotel Kempinski in West Berlin, international conductor Herbert Von Karajan signed a new long-term contract with Electric & Music Industries Limited. Representing EMI was Peter Andry, general manager-international classical division. In conjunction with the agreement, a second contract was signed between EMI and the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra; the orchestra of which Karajan has been principal conductor since 1955. In America, the product will be made available via Angel Records — the classical wing of Capitol Industries — EMI Inc.

The contract between EMI and the conductor marks the continuation of an association that started some thirty years ago. During his affiliation with EMI, the company has recorded 15 complete operas and over 150 orchestral and choral recordings. A wide range of orchestral, choral and operatic recordings reaching from Haydn to Mahler will be made — the first major recordings under provisions set down in the new contracts being an all-star cast production of Wagner's Lohengrin and the Beethoven Piano Concertos with soloist Alexis Weissenberg. Numbering among Karajan's most recently issued recordings international released by the affiliate EMI companies are Bartok's Concerto for Orchestra, Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 5, Beethoven's Missa Solemnis, and Verdi's Otello.

In setting the record straight, Jacks stated: "There are no immediate plans for Goldfish as a label, but I'm not ruling out completely that the label will emerge again over the next little while. I am more interested right now in the creative end of the business and if these people who consider themselves reporters would only check the facts they would find out that I'm very busy in the studios in Vancouver producing for others." Jacks hasn't been too happy in his role of president of Goldfish which bogged him down with administrative duties and kept his creative endeavors to a minimum.

Jacks also reported that he is now free and clear from all contractual commitments in Canada and the U.S. He terminated his contract with Clive Davis' Arista Records and has made no further commitments for Canadian distribution which was handled by A&M. He is however, open for discussion. If Jacks runs true to his past, he could be the hottest potential on the market. His first big hit "Which Way You Goin' Billy?" was followed by a disappointing calm during which many supporters had second thoughts. He bounced back in again with "Seasons In The Sun" and the wooing began again. Now he seems to be going through that calm period once again.

Ray Charles: Tres Vivant In Paris

PARIS — Ray Charles, on tour in Western Europe, made his Paris appearances at the Salle Playel Apr. 21 and 23, and will return to Paris early next month for three additional concerts May 5, 6, and 7, according to Michel Salou Resegogue, promoter for Charles' Paris appearances. The Charles' troupe, featuring The Raeletts and Ray's orchestra, is presently in Europe on its annual tour, with a total of 24 concerts in 17 cities scheduled.

Serkin, Mehta, Team For Benefit

LOS ANGELES — Pianist Rudolf Serkin, who has been called the most outstanding living exponent of the German romantic piano tradition, and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra under the baton of Zubin Mehta, gave a performance at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion of the Music Center for the benefit of the orchestra's pension fund on Apr. 22 that was perhaps the highlight of the symphony season.

The performance opened with a masterful rendition of Dvorak's "Carnival" Overture, Op. 92, with the orchestra responding to the bright and vivacious character of the piece in top form. Mehta's interpretation of program music has earned him the justifiable reputation as one of the world's great conductors of Richard Strauss, and the full orchestra gleamed brilliantly for Dvorak's lively piece.

At 72, Rudolf Serkin performs with the tenacity of a virtuoso of much younger years. The Czechoslovakian-born pianist, whose recordings appear in the U.S. on Columbia, began his performance career in 1915, at the age of 12, with the Vienna Symphony, and began concertizing with violinist Adolf Busch at 17. Emigrating to the U.S. shortly after a 1936 debut with Toscanini and the New York Philharmonic, Serkin is a founder and artistic director of the Marlboro School of Music in Vermont, and a director of the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.

For his pension fund benefit concert, for which both he and Mehta donated their services, Serkin performed the Concerto in B Flat, K. 595 by Mozart and the forceful C Minor Concerto No. 3, Op. 37, by Beethoven. The orchestra, slightly diminished in size for the Mozart, was expanded for the Beethoven concerto, and provided an evening of grace and brilliance that is rarely equalled on the concert stage. Serkin is without doubt a master in both technique and interpretation, whose skills were complimented eloquently by the L.A. Philharmonic.

All proceeds from the concert go to benefit the orchestra's musicians, and the Philharmonic Association will be hard pressed to find a more memorable combination of repertoire and artist next year. Happily, Los Angeles is blessed with both a symphony, conductor and cultural center where international artistry at its finest has become the norm.

Great Britain

Elton John's new DJM album "Captain Fantastic and the Brown Dirt Band" is, in the words of Elton himself, "the best album I've ever made." The album is a concept theme tracing Elton and Bernie Taupin's early careers in the music business and culminating in their worldwide success. Retailing at 3.25 pounds (approximately \$8) the album comes complete with two 16-page booklets — the first is taken from Elton's personal scrapbook of reminiscences and the second is a book of Bernie Taupin lyrics. Also included is a full-size colour poster.

Barry Johnstone, a 29-year-old New Zealander has been appointed press and publicity manager for Magnet Records. Previously with York Records for two years in a similar capacity Johnstone has just returned from a two month visit to the United States and Australia.

Henry Hadaway has announced the signing of an exclusive licensing agreement between Satril Records and Sonopress/Gerard Tournier S.A. which provides for the distribution of the Satril label, under its own logo, by Sonopresse in France. Contracts were signed and exchanged when the international director of Gerard Tournier, Jean Michel Gallois-Montbrun visited Satril's London office to conclude the deal. Also announced this week is the signing of an exclusive licensing deal with BIAC Records providing for the distribution of Satril, under its own logo, in Belgium and Luxembourg. BIAC are an established importer and distributor of records and audio equipment manufactured overseas and acts as agents for Toshiba. The acquisition of the Satril label marks their expansion into the marketing of records manufactured domestically and licensed from overseas.

Following the success of the German group Kraftwerk in the U.S., Phonogram is stepping up their promotion on the group's single and album "Autobahn" released on the Vertigo label.

Another artist currently breaking through in the U.S. is Roger Whittaker who is fast climbing the charts with "The Last Farewell" on RCA. EMI is issuing the single in Great Britain.

RCA threw a lavish reception at the Beachcomber for Ronnie Milsap who is on his first British tour with Glen Campbell. Milsap, one of America's top selling recording artists of 1974 recently won a Grammy Award as country male vocalist of the year. His hit U.S. single "A Legend In My Time" together with album of the same name has just been released in Britain by RCA.

Fania Prexy In Brazil

LOS ANGELES — Latin/Salsa music is the subject of a visit to South America from Fania Records president Jerry Masucci who is in the continent to meet with Fania licensees for discussions of upcoming product and activities.

Masucci is currently in Brazil to study the music-record market and to meet with Fania licensee Sigla-Som Livre. The record executive is also finalizing plans for a concert by the Fania All-Stars later this year.

In addition, Masucci will be visiting Argentina to meet with licensee Sigla and Ricardo Kleinman; and Peru, for talks with Fania licensee Disco Industria National, S.A. (DINSA) and Vaya (a Fania subsidiary) licensee Industria Fonografica Peruana, S.A. (INFOPESA).

CBS-Sony Exits JPRA

TOKYO — CBS-Sony-Record Co. (president: Norio Ohga) has decided to withdraw from Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA president: Takami Shobochi) as of Apr. 11, 1975. This is the first instance of a major Japanese label seceding from the organization. Together with CBS-Sony, Polydor Co. (president: Seiichiro Ko) is expected to submit notice of withdrawal as well.

Prior to this decision, Takuro Yoshida, a famous singer-songwriter for CBS-Sony, refused to renew his contract with the company for the reason that he is going to establish his own record-company together with other famous Japan's folk-singer songwriters Yoosuyi Inouye (Polydor), Shigeru Izumiya (Elec) and Hitoshi Komuro (Bellwood). With regard to the establishment of this new company, K.K. Pony has entered the negotiations with Yoshida also. Prior to the formal decision of Pony Co., the presidents of Japan's main labels which are affiliated with JPRA had asked Pony not to sell the new company's product. Pony Co. has decided to sell the disk of the new company nevertheless, ignoring the recommendation of the conference. CBS-Sony has decided to withdraw from JPRA to reserve "freedom of action" in the future.

The establishment of the new company has been announced formally by the four artists mentioned above on Apr. 11, 1975 at Akasaka Prince Hotel in Tokyo. The new label is to begin operations on June 1, 1975 and Hitoshi Komuro is expected to be president.

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
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
