MIDEM — The idea survives . . .

Ten years ago the Beatles were topping both the singles and album charts in **Cash Box**, Herman's Hermits were hot, Simon was together with Garfunkel and Sam the Sham was running the Pharaohs.

And a Frenchman named Bernard Chevry had his idea. . . .

The record business is, sometimes by necessity, a fast moving one, relying much on change. But there are elements of permanence around.

MIDEM for instance.

Ten years ago Bernard Chevry had his idea that the music business needed a marketplace, some kind of event where large labels and small publishers, all the diverse pieces that make up the business, all over the world, could get together to wheel and deal, discuss and complain, and occasionally for pure pleasure. RCA Holds National Sales Meeting In Georgia

NEW YORK — RCA Records has just completed a four-day meeting in Atlanta for sales and promotion managers from around the country.

The meeting was threefold in purpose: to push 1975 sales impetus into 1976; to finalize operating plans for the first quarter of the New Year; and to introduce January product.

marketing; Mike Berniker, division vice president for popular a&r; Jerry Bradley, division vice president for Nashville operations; Tom Shepard, division vice president for merchandising and promotion; Ron Moseley, division vice president for r&b a&r; John Rosica, division vice president for merchandising and promotion; and Mario De Filippo, director of national sales.

Stewart Leaves Faces For Solo Career

HOLLYWOOD — Following is a statement released this week by Gaff Management in London, the firm responsible for managing Warner Bros. recording artist Rod Stewart:

"Rod Stewart will be forming his own band now that he has broken his connections with the Faces. Tony Toon, Rod's personal assistant, confirms that Rod's tour of Australia, New Zealand and the Far East, scheduled to start in February 1976, has been cancelled, but the date at Wembley Stadium on the 26th of June still stands. Billy Gaff, Stewart's manager, says Rod will be appearing there with his new band. Gaff will be announcing details of the new band early in the new year.

"Rod's decision to leave the Faces and to concentrate on a new solo career was taken after much deliberation. He feels that he can no longer work in a situation where the group's lead guitarist Ron Wood seems to be permanently 'on loan' to the Rolling Stones.

"Rod is now working on a new solo album with Tom Dowd, with whom he produced the gold certified album "Atlantic Crossing." The new album, which is as yet untitled, is being recorded in New Orleans and Los Angeles, possibly with The Meters in the former locale."

New Markets For Disco Soul Acts In Europe

NEW YORK — Many disco-oriented acts have found the European market to be very receptive to their music, often more receptive than the States.

According to Ruth Bowen of Queen Booking Corporation, many of her acts work two to three weeks several times a year in Europe. Acts like Bohannon, Esther Phillips and the Chi-Lites, who are strong in the U.S., also find extremely eager audiences in Europe, and acts who, according to Bowen, "you couldn't give away in the States" such as Major Lance and the Drifters, do very well overseas. Major acts such as Aretha Franklin, Ray Charles and Sammy Davis, Jr. also work Europe regularly.

The main city that most acts play is London, but lately the market has expanded into Spain, France, Italy and Turkey. The Far East is also a major market, the largest segment of which is in Japan, but Manila has also shown interest in black American acts as of late, according to Bowen.

Dakar recording artist Bohannon, first toured in Europe in 1966 as a drummer for Stevie Wonder, doing a 21 day tour. Since he has emerged as an artist on his own he has been back once and is planning a return trip in March. Says Bohannon, "There were discos in England when I was there in '66, but I didn't know anything about them. England, and Europe in general, is about two years ahead of the states as far as music is concerned. They recognize talent more quickly." Bohannon, during his U.K. stint, had two records in the pop charts at the same time, an unusual occurrence in England.

During the tour, which was originally scheduled to last two and a half weeks, but which ended up lasting for five, Bohannon played the U.K., Holland, and did television in France, as well as concerts in Nairobi, Africa.

He mostly played the larger clubs, some which seated as many as 2,000 people, and some 3,000-seat ballrooms. Bohannon confirmed what Ms. Bowen told **Cash Box**, that many of the acts she sends to Europe work a week in one city in several different clubs. Bohannon did that often, and even played two shows in one night in two different clubs that were ten miles apart. They had two sets of equipment, (that he insisted on) and got to do soundchecks in each club. Bohannon says that when he was in Europe with Wonder, they did the same, every other night.

Bohannon plans to return to Italy in March, and has a tentative tour of ten countries set for that time.

George McCrea recently completed

his second European tour, playing to crowds in England, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and Finland. His show was a "disco-concert" presentation, playing one-nighters in large discos and halls. McCrea says that discos have been strong in Europe for ten years, and found the crowds very receptive to his show. Part of the reason for their enthusiasm, he felt, was that his was the first real concert presentation on disco songs that they had seen, and he felt that they were pleased with his two-hour show, especially because of the high prices of some of the tickets.

He plans to return to the French Riviera in May and has tentative plans to play Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia. His tour of Japan, which was set for January, has been postponed.

Confirmation of the status of Major Lance in the British market comes from Alan McLachlan, U.S. product manager for the Pye Records group. "Major Lance was signed to Pye purely on the basis of his in-person appeal in the British market," he said.

McLachlan was very positive about the strength of the club and disco scene in the north of England, citing the Wigan Casino, a discotheque that holds 2,000 people and opens its doors at 8 p.m. continuing through until 8 a.m.. No alcohol is served but this "northern soul" venue is often instrumental in breaking records, particularly the more obscure type.

As an example McLachlan cited "Footsee" by the Chosen Few, originally

Casablanca Dec.: 2nd \$2 Mil. Mo.

HOLLYWOOD — For the fourth consecutive month Casablanca Records has topped its previous month's sales figures, with December having provided the label with sales in excess of \$2 million, according to president Neil Bogart.

Bogart also announced overall profits for Casablanca's fiscal 1975 to be \$734,351 before taxes. Statements were prepared for the company by the accounting firm of Glefand, Macnow, Rennert and Feldman of Los Angeles and New York.

Casablanca projects it will probably rate among the top three or four independents in the country if similar successes continue through 1976. Bogart credits independent distributors with his label's sales power, noting that it was only through their help that Casablanca ever made it past the critical stages of its early existence.

"Fly, Robin, Fly" actually did more than that — it zoomed and made Silver Convention's single No. 1 in the pop charts and also No. 1 in the r&b department. It earned the mysterious mixed group from Germany their first gold single to be followed shortly afterwards by gold status being conferred on the album, "Save Me."

It also did a lot for the group's label, Midland International, establishing them as a hot indie. Midland's president Bob Reno's first idea was to build himself a pop label similar to Elektra/Asylum but he felt that the economic conditions would not allow it and thought his best and fastest answer was to latch on to the disco trend.

"Fly, Robin, Fly" and Silver Convention proved the viability of his theory almost immediately and he was certainly helped by the fact that r&b stations are more responsive than top 40 stations to new artists.

Silver Convention's success has prompted Reno to allocate an extra \$100,000 for independent promotion — the key to his label's success, according to Reno.

At the recent celebration of Midland's first birthday, the gold records from Silver Convention made the best possible birthday present.

Elektra Record Family Sales Show 35% Increase Over '74

2nd Year Chart Penetration "Pleasing"

HOLLYWOOD — The Elektra Records family which includes the Asylum and Nonesuch labels is entering its third calendar year of operation with a boost, having seen 1975 reflect an increase over the previous year's sales figures by a full 35 percent.

Continued growth was marked by a noted increase in the firm's penetration of the charts, as well as with, according to company officials, 88.8 percent of all Elektra and Asylum pop and rock albums released during '75 making the industry charts. This success was paralleled by Elektra/Asylum's most consistent singles success to date, with additional chart strength realized through renewed support of catalog albums released prior to 1975.

Elektra/Asylum/Nonesuch also continued consolidation of its national operations during this period, particularly in the completion of a major renovation of the company's Los Angeles headquarters at the year's end. The New York headquarters, located at 1855 Broadway, continued to provide an east coast base for all areas of operation.

In commenting on the year's performance, Mel Posner, president, stated, "The essence of our story is one of enormous success, not only in dollars but, more significantly, in establishing new artists and advancing the careers of our proven talent." New artists debuted by the label during the year include the Cate Bros., Andrew Gold and Orleans. All three acts garnered airplay and chart showings and all three embarked on major tours which served to solidify national and regional marketing and promotion campaigns by the company.

Established Elektra/Asylum artists who continued growth in terms of audience and sales acceptance included the Eagles, Linda Ronstadt, Joni Mitchell, Judy Collins, John Fogerty, Queen and Harry Chapin. 1975 marked the Eagles' ascendance to the top ranks of international pop acts with appeal extending across top 40, progressive and country formats; during the year, the group completed its fourth Asylum album which, according to the label, became their fastest selling work while helping to activate the entire Eagles album catalog on Asylum. Similarly, Linda Ronstadt achieved extensive national tours and the release of her second Asylum album, "Prisoner In Disguise,"

which also generated renewed activity for her album catalog. "The Hissing Of Summer Lawns," Joni Mitchell's fourth Asylum album, earned a gold record album immediately after its release. Judy Collins' first Elektra album after a two-year hiatus from performing signaled international singles and album sales, as well as a national tour. The Asylum debut for John Fogerty also marked that artist's return to the charts with both an album and singles culled from it. Queen's first national tour as headliners was followed by their emergence as singles artists, while paving the way for a first gold record award for their Elektra album, "Sheer Heart Attack." Likewise, Harry Chapin achieved his most popular singles success to date with "Cat's In The Cradle."

Reflecting the company's overall success with pop and rock artists, as well as continued catalog strength, were nine albums certified gold by the RIAA. These included "Late For The Sky" and "For Everyman," both by Jackson Browne; Judy Collins' "Judith"; "One Of These Nights," by the Eagles; "The Hissing Of Summer Lawns," by Joni Mitchell, Queen's "Sheer Heart Attack"; "Prisoner In Disguise" and "Don't Cry Now" by Linda Ronstadt, and "The Best Of Carly Simon." Of these, six were released in 1975.

Elektra/Asylum's country division experienced similarly strong chart performances by the company's roster of country artists, with singles released by Melba Montgomery, Eddie Rabbitt, Even Stevens, Carmol Taylor and Dick Feller all achieving chart positions. Additionally, Linda Ronstadt and the Eagles both garnered chart success in the coun-

released in the U.S. several years ago by Roulette. "The record sold 200,000 copies and went to No. 5," said McLachlan. "If we could have found the group and got them together we would have had a No. 1 hit. As a kind of compliment to this northern soul scene we got Roulette's permission to retitle the group Wigan's Chosen Few."

According to MacLachlan, American black soul artists finding security in the British and European club scene include Tommy Hunt, the Exciters, Jimmy Ruffin and Edwin Starr.

The total success picture of MGM's Gloria Gaynor includes a tremendous amount of work and returns in foreign markets. "Gloria has commanded huge sums for foreign tours and appearances," stated Gloria Sondheim, manager of Polydor-MGM's international department, consulted by **Cash Box** on Gaynor's European activities. Ms. Sondheim pointed out that Gloria Gaynor's fee for a single Italian television appearance was a low five-figure sum, and that she was able to command very high ticket prices, even by U.S. standards, for a live appearance at the Caracas Hilton in Venezuela. A three minute promo short for her latest single "How High The Moon" will be shown on TV in Holland this week.

Golden 'Crossing'

HOLLYWOOD — Rod Stewart's current Warner Bros. album, "Atlantic Crossing" has been certified by the R.I.A.A. for a gold record award. Released last August, the album was recorded in Muscle Shoals with Tom Dowd producing. Already casting a glance toward the future, Stewart and Dowd have been conferring about plans for Stewart's second album for Warners, scheduled for later in 1976.

Columbia Sets RIAA Record — 17 Gold LPs

NEW YORK — Seventeen gold records certified during 1975 for Columbia Records is both a label and industry record, according to the label, since the RIAA started certifying album and single product in 1966. Columbia also received an award for a single.

Epic Records received four album and

three singles gold records and the CBS custom label division had five albums and two singles certified.

Aerosmith heads the artist list with three gold records during 1975 followed by Earth, Wind and Fire with two albums and one single award and Chicago (two gold albums).

"Polydor's International Department has been instrumental in arranging publicity down to the last detail in these countries," said Ms. Sondheim, "and the work has paid off." Gloria Gaynor's "Never Can Say Goodbye" LP is gold in Australia and France, and has sold well in most European and South American nations, yet the LP never achieved gold status in the States.

Her latest product, the "Experience" LP, continues the trend, with the help of simultaneous international release. "Imports to Europe definitely take the edge off the excitement surrounding a new release," states Ms. Sondheim. She continued to explain that such importance is attached to European release dates, that U.S. release schedules must now be planned accordingly. The "How High The Moon" single has sold in the middle five figures in Italy after three weeks of release, and is #11 in Switzerland and #7 in Argentina. Gloria Gaynor plans to return to the continent in early '76.

20th Cent. Music 1975 Profits Up By 25%

HOLLYWOOD — Twentieth Century Music Corporation has completed 1975 with profits exceeding the previous year by 25 percent. According to president Herbert Eiseman, this represents an all-time high for the label, which is a subsidiary of Twentieth Century Fox Film Corporation, since he assumed the presidency in 1972.

Several of the company's writers won awards this year for their songs, helping to contribute to the overall success of the label. Among the achievements is included an Oscar to Al Kasha and Joel Hirschhorn for "We May Never Love Like This Again" from the motion picture "Towering Inferno." Charlie Smalls was presented with one of seven Tony awards for his work on the score of the Broadway musical "The Wiz." Paul Williams, another writer under contract to Twentieth, won the Tokyo Song Festival in July with his composition, "Even Better Than I Know Myself" which was recorded by Maureen McGovern who won best performance honors at the same festival.

Eiseman isolated the four areas from which income was derived as mechanical, performance, print and foreign and attributed 20th's successful year to a number of factors. "Rhinestone Cowboy," written by Larry Weiss and recorded by Glen Campbell on Capitol, was one of the top records of the year. In addition to being Campbell's first number one record, it was a chart topper in 16 countries throughout the world. In all trade papers the record was simultaneously number one on pop, easy listening and country charts. Additionally, Ray Stevens' recording of "Misty" took high chart honors in the country and pop markets.

Eiseman and 20th look toward an equally prosperous '76 as a number of important contemporary writers have joined the current staff, including Pete Hoorelbeke, formerly of Rare Earth, and ex-Motown writer/producer Tom Baird. Both Baird and Hoorelbeke are members of Hub, which records for Capitol. Additionally, Cecilio & Capono have been signed as exclusive 20th writers. The singing/writing team's current Columbia single is "Good Night & Good Morning."

Prior to that he was a local promotion man in Miami and Charlotte; he started in the record business with Campus and Tone Distributors in Miami in the late sixties.

Delaplain Exits MCA — After 30 years with MCA Records, Inc., Francis A.X. "Derry" Delaplain will retire from his position as manufacturing coordination director on January 2.

Delaplain, who began his career with Decca in 1946, has held the position of manufacturing coordinator in the a&r, marketing and manufacturing branches for the label. He has been responsible for the coordination of lacquers, tapes and label copy for all new releases, recording studio priorities, and has acted as liaison between the United States and Canadian production. His responsibilities included communicating any or all deadline or manufacturing problems to the factories.

Ms. Iwataki To WFO Commercial Division — Sandi Iwataki has been named west coast director of WFO's commercial division, announced Steve Bedell, president of WFO Music Group. The move is effective immediately with Ms. Iwataki located at WFO's Los Angeles headquarters, 9200 Sunset Blvd.

He was appointed to complete the unexpired term of three time Oscar winner Ned Washington. Duning won an Oscar for his score of the movie "Picnic."

Blohm To Wally Heider — Gary Blohm has been appointed general manager of Wally Heider Recording. He was formerly west coast manager of a&r operations for Columbia Records, previously having produced films for industry and television. Blohm plans to open the studio to students and community groups, and increase radio drama production.

Artiles To Columbia Pictures Publications — Raul Artiles has been named international sales manager for Columbia Pictures Publications. He will be responsible for music print sales throughout the world. Prior to joining the music print division of Columbia Pictures Industries, he had held a wide range of positions in production and international sales for Hansen Publications.

Pirate Pleads Guilty In New York

NEW YORK — A New York man pleaded guilty to a reduced charge after being charged with possessing a counterfeit trademark, after he was discovered with counterfeit Greek recordings by an employee of Peters International.

In Canadian anti-piracy news, three Canadians pleaded guilty on the eve of their trial to possessing counterfeit tapes, 1200 pirated tapes, 100,000

labels, and winding and wrapping machines, which were seized by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, were ordered destroyed. And in a separate action, simultaneous raids were carried out against four suspected manufacturers and distributors of pirated Greek repertoire tapes. The raid netted 8000 pirate tapes, 100,000 labels, and duplicating equipment worth more than \$15,000.

Classical Pianist Serkin To Play Rock/Jazz Club

NEW YORK — Pianist Peter Serkin will headline the Bottom Line here Jan. 26 and 27, in what it is safe to brand an unprecedented event: the booking of a classical artist in what has been exclusively a popular and jazz cabaret.

The concert was conceived by Serkin in conjunction with Bottom Line proprietors Allan Pepper and Stanley Snadowsky, with George Schutz as a pivotal figure. Schutz has promoted classical concerts, such as New York's "Mostly Mozart" festival, and also manages The Chieftains, Oregon and David Bromberg. "I had always wanted to do Serkin," Allan Pepper told *Cash Box*, "and George Schutz was the logical person to approach him on our behalf. It happened Serkin had been to the room and liked it, and was very enthusiastic about the idea."

Serkin will be backed on the bill by Anthony Braxton, Arista Records' young jazz artist. "I had originally wanted to do an exclusive 'An Evening With Peter Serkin,'" said Pepper, "but he wanted to play with a jazz act. Several choices were considered, but upon hearing some of Braxton's work on record, Serkin and his group decided he was 'perfect.'" Pepper noted that although this was Serkin's first exposure to Anthony Braxton, Braxton was quite familiar with Serkin's music.

Serkin will play as part of the quartet, "Tashi," which includes Fred Sherry on cello, Ida Kafavian on violin and Richard Stolzman on clarinet.

Pepper sees the concert as the first of many new efforts to expand his audience's musical horizons. "I was aware that Serkin had a large young following. Based on the success of this engagement, we'll begin searching out similar new artists in the future."

Serkin has recorded as a solo artist on RCA, and has recorded with Tashi, but an album with the quartet is yet to be released. A spokesman for RCA said that in the way of support for the engagement, the press would be invited down just as they would for any popular concert. He remarked that the only example of any similar event he could recall was a solo concert by young pianist Lorin Hollander held at the Fillmore East several years ago.

Grand Funk's 13th Album Due

HOLLYWOOD — Grand Funk Railroad's "Born To Die" LP is set for Jan. 12 release according to Don Zimmermann, Capitol's senior vice president of marketing.

"Born To Die" is the group's 13th album release for the label, eleven of which have gone gold and 10 platinum. In addition, GFR has two gold singles to its credit.

"Born To Die" features the group's newly released single "Take Me" b/w "Genevieve," along with eight other songs composed by members of the group. This is the third Grand Funk Railroad album produced by Jimmy Ienner.

2nd Gold Album For Manilow In 1975

NEW YORK — Barry Manilow's new album, "Tryin' To Get The Feeling," has been certified gold by the RIAA, four weeks after its release. Manilow had a single certified gold earlier this year, "Mandy," and an album, "Barry Manilow II."

When asked if Serkin's appearance in this venue was expected to open him to new audiences, the spokesman responded: "Peter and his group have built up a large young following touring the country, to the point that there is a near mystique about them now. They play serious music and nothing else; however, much of it is in a modern vein."

"This is really a sort of experiment," he continued, "a very special situation. I don't think any other classical artist is quite as well suited to this type of thing. Eugene Fodor, the popular young violinist on our label, has a large enough young audience to be considered, but it would be a matter for him and his management to decide, whether the returns would warrant such a booking. It's not necessarily worth doing more than once merely for the sake of being different."

Capitol Readies For January LPs

HOLLYWOOD — Jessi Colter's second album, "Jessi," is scheduled for release through Capitol Records next week, according to Don Zimmermann, CRI senior vice president of marketing.

The new album follows her successful debut LP on Capitol, "I'm Jessi Colter," which contained the hit single, "I'm Not Lisa."

At the same time, Paris' debut album, "Paris," will also hit the streets.

The album marks the merger of guitarist Bob Welch, formerly with Fleetwood Mac, and bassist Glenn Cornick, formerly with Jethro Tull and Wild Turkey. Thom Mooney, who laid down the drumming tracks on the album, has since been replaced by Hunt Sales, who has played with Todd Rundgren's Utopia and Ray Manzarek.

Capitol will also launch an extensive merchandising campaign commencing Jan. 12, on behalf of The Sylvers' newly-released "Showcase" LP.

BTO's 'Head On' Certified Gold

NEW YORK — The RIAA has certified Bachman-Turner Overdrive's just released album "Head On" as gold, six days after its release. This makes the fifth gold album for the Mercury recording group.

HOLLYWOOD — Blue Note Records has released another batch of its ongoing Blue Note Re-Issue Series according to label director of merchandising Charlie Lourie

The release comprises albums by Sonny Rollins, Chick Corea, Fats Navarro, the Jazz Crusaders, Herbie Nichols, Paul Horn, Wes Montgomery, Gerry Mulligan and Lee Konitz, bluesman T-Bone Walker and an album of tenor "Blowing Sessions," featuring Johnny Griffin, Hank Mobley and John Coltrane.

The collections feature classic performances, some long out-of-print, by many of today's influential artists. The Sonny Rollins album, "More From The Vanguard," features recently discovered, unreleased tapes from Rollins' appearances at New York's Village Vanguard. The Chick Corea album, "Circling In," features three previously unreleased sessions featuring the composer/pianist in one of his most exploratory periods, accompanied by such sidemen as Anthony Braxton, Miroslav Vitous, Dave Holland, Roy Haynes and Barry Altschul. The Fats Navarro album, "Prime Source," features the complete Blue Note recordings by the bop innovator and contains appearances by Bud Powell, Sonny Rollins, Milt Jackson, Roy Haynes, Kenny Clarke and others; the Jazz Crusaders' album, "The Young Rabbits," presents important cuts from the group's years with Pacific Jazz, and features appearances by jazz performers Hubert Laws, Joe Pass and others.

Blue Note, the world's oldest jazz label, was founded in 1939. The Re-Issue Series is culled from Blue Note's catalog as well as the archives of other labels which have been acquired by United Artists, Blue Note's parent company. The series features extensive discographies and liner notes. The Dec. 29 release includes notes by such writers as Nat Hentoff, Ira Gitler, Leonard Feather, Robert Palmer, Pete Welding, Bob Blumenthal, Don DeMichael, Roswell Rudd and Stanley Crouch.

Capehart Shows Loss

NEW YORK — The Capehart Corporation, manufacturer and distributor of home entertainment systems, announced unaudited results for the six months ending September 30, 1975, showing an increase in sales to \$22,906,000 from \$19,972,000 in the year ago period. Capehart showed a six month net loss of \$855,000 after deducting an extraordinary credit of \$3,800,000 for an overall loss of \$4,155,000.

HOLLYWOOD — Atco Records has released a new Black Oak Arkansas LP, "Live Mutha," after three of the band's previous albums qualified for gold record million-seller certification.

Black Oak now records for MCA; however, this product stems from their original recording contract with Atco. The album is based on a Mother's Day '75 concert in Long Beach, Calif.

Among major Black Oak tunes featured on "Live Mutha" are "Hot and Nasty," "Lord Have Mercy," "Tax Man" and "Jim Dandy To The Rescue."

The three earlier Aco albums which went gold are "Black Oak Arkansas," "Raunch 'n' Roll" and "High On The Hog."

Black Oak had its biggest year in '75, in terms of both album sales and concert appearances, according to the group's manager, Butch Stone. The group achieved personal income in excess of \$2 million for the third consecutive year.

Gross on its most recent cross-country tour, which was originally expected to gross about \$1 million on 60 dates, is nearing the \$4 million dollar point.

The band has played to a total audience in excess of a half million people on this tour.

Plans for the new year, said Stone, include completion of a new MCA album and a third tour of Britain and the continent. The overseas jaunt, probably in April, will include visits to Germany, France and Scandinavia.

Four Charged With Piracy, Conspiracy

CHICAGO — Four men have been charged by the U.S. Attorney's office here with 32 counts of copyright infringement and conspiracy. The action against their operation, which used the names Kelly Plastics, M&N Company, A&C Distributors and Worldwide Tapes, was the first brought in Illinois under amended Copyright law provisions providing higher penalties upon conviction. New penalties for first offenders are fines up to \$25,000 and up to one year in jail. Those charged in this case could receive maximum penalties of up to 32 years in jail and fines of \$800,000.

12 Warner Bros. LPs For January

HOLLYWOOD — Warner Bros. Records and its affiliates are shipping their January release which consists of five Warners albums, one each on Reprise and Curtom, two Capricorn and three Chrysalis albums.

Of the five Warners releases, two represent the debut of new artists. Produced by Joe Boyd, "Kate and Anna McGarrigle" is the first album by the Canadian sisters whose songs have been recorded by Linda Ronstadt and Maria Muldaur; among the originals are "Heart Like A Wheel" and "Swimming Song." "Paloma Blanca" is the first Warners set by the George Baker Selection, the Dutch group which has enjoyed international success with their "Paloma Blanca" single.

"We Be Sailin'" represents the first Warners album by B. W. Stevenson, whose past hits have included "My Maria" and "Shambala"; with Warners staffer Tommy LiPuma producing, Stevenson contributes ten warm performances, including Roy Orbison's "Dream Baby." "The Essential Rod McKuen, Vol. 1" is the first of a three record set comprised of excerpts from three of the writer-singer's most popular books of poetry, produced by McKuen and Wade Alexander. McKuen's narration covers a wide range of subjects, with lush orchestral backing. Rounding out the Warners portion of the release is "Barry Lyndon," the soundtrack to Stanley Kubrick's new movie, comprised of both classical and traditional Irish music (performed by the Chieftains).

Following last year's successful "Pieces of the Sky," Emmylou Harris has come up with her second Reprise set, "Elite Hotel." Once again produced by Brian Ahern, Emmylou turns in an adventurous program, performing strong originals as well as tunes from the repertoires of the Beatles, Hank Williams and Gram Parsons.

"Now" represents the Curtom debut of writer-producer Ed Townsend, whose credits include hit records with Marvin Gaye, the Impressions and others; self-written and produced, "Now" finds Townsend comfortably handling a variety of pop and r&b styles on "Maybe I'll Bump," "The Moving Finger" and others.

"New Ray Of Sunshine" is Dobie Gray's first Capricorn album. Produced by Dobie with Troy Seals, the accent is on Gray's warm vocals and a program of first-rate Gray-Seals material, including "Easy Come Easy Go" and "Harold and the Swingin' Rocks."

Elvin Bishop's third Capricorn LP, "Struttin' My Stuff," was produced by Bill Szymczyk and Allan Blazek. Backed by his touring band, Bishop works his way through nine rocking original tunes and a spirited treatment of the Temptations' "My Girl."

Chrysalis Records is represented in January by "M.U. — The Best of Jethro Tull," a collection of favorite Tull tracks covering 1969 to 1972 (including the previously unreleased "Rainbow Blues"); "Mandalaband", the debut of the Tibetan-influenced British band of the same name, and "When An Old Cricketer Leaves The Crease," the label debut of legendary English folksinger Roy Harper, which features an all-original collection of Harper compositions.

AUDITORIUM THEATER, CHICAGO — An over-zealous crowd of adoring fans braved a torrential rainstorm to attend the Labelle concert, in full force, at the Auditorium Theater. Patti herself remarked from on stage that it was not a fit night for man or beast, but the downpour most certainly did not dampen either the spirits or the enthusiasm of the crowd; they were every bit as eager and responsive, and as outlandish in their attire, as they were a year ago for Labelle's previous appearance in town. Silver, although prevalent in rather subdued form, was not as predominant in either the audience's attire or that of the group.

Labelle's opening set was much more exciting this year and a lot less preachy, although in the latter vein they performed an outstanding new Nona Hendricks composition about the "System," which was unfamiliar to this reporter, but very vigorously received by the crowd. Patti's personal dynamism and visual antics were complemented by the dramatic vocalizing of Sarah (Dash) and Nona. As

is customary, a large portion of the audience, unable to restrain themselves, viewed practically the entire performance from the aisles, uninhibitedly dancing, rocking and just plain having fun in complete rapport with the group.

As a prelude to the second set, the group emerged in a cloud of smoke, shrouded and almost concealed from the audience; then returned, descending from the ceiling and individually costumed in a galaxy of sequins, feathers and color. The audience went wild!

The constantly quickening pace generated by such familiar material as "People Need Love," "What Can I Do For You . . ." "Can I Speak To You Before You Go To Hollywood" reached its peak with "Lady Marmalade," the closing number during which about ten of the most "uniquely" clad members of the audience were invited onstage to provide a fitting climax to a very exciting show!

Blue Oyster Cult

LONG BEACH ARENA, L.A. — Hitler's youth movement circa 1943. The heavymetal wrath of god. The people your parents warned you about.

Since their inception The Blue Oyster Cult have labored under a whole lot of labels, the least offensive of which kicked off this review. What is unfortunate is that lost in the leatheroid rush to dismiss the band as demented biker freaks from New York is the pure and simple fact that the Cult members are accomplished rock and roll musicians. A fact they decided to show at their recent Long Beach gig.

This night the Cult (Columbia's metal madness) bolstered their pseudo "we've come for your daughters" stance with some solid rock and roll musicianship. Led by guitarist Buck Dharma and lead singer Eric Bloom the band went a long way towards proving that loud music can be more intricate than volume and feedback.

On the more brontosaurian likes of "Hot Rails To Hell" and "Cities In Flame With Rock And Roll" Dharma's constricted, clipped style of riffing explored some

genuinely progressive passages while the rhythmic ground of the Bouchard brothers and Allan Lanier added proper support.

"O.D. 'd On Life Itself" provided a working platform for Bloom's shellshock approach to singing. Alternately spitting out the downer lyrics, Bloom's registers formed a constant fade in and out of the band's wall of sound.

Easily one of the set's strongest outings was the headlong plunge into "ME 262" as riffs and runs (sans the oft-used special effects) transformed the arena's confines into something vaguely familiar and yet strangely alien. The chance bits of melody that pervaded the metallic nature of the sound were the rule rather than the exception.

After the show a disgruntled fan bemoaned what he termed a gross inadequacy in the band's performance.

"Shit! They didn't use nearly enough smoke bombs."

ROXY, L.A. — Once I saw a band called the Raspberries on the Douglas show. I remember wishing my hair looked as good as theirs and my mother saying they were too pretty to be boys. I was just finding my way in the real world and couldn't be bothered with the innocence and pop youthfulness of their lyrics and image, or so it seemed.

After seeing Eric Carmen, the most notable surfaced survivor to date, I find myself scouring Tower's bowels for their remains.

Eric Carmen, one of Clive's pride, writes and arranges his own material, plays piano and guitar, sings with a certain freshness, and yet applies the presence required to accentuate each song. At the piano during the interlude of his classic hit single, "All By Myself," he made his six piece band mentally disappear only to have them come back gnashing out the pain of, "Don't wanna be all by myself anymore."

Unlike the Raspberries, this band not only looks good together, but plays well together. The versatility of what was and could be was exhilarating. Finally a cornucopia of sound that can flow forth ballads, synchronize full-bodied harmony, be popish, and yet rock. With as many as three keyboardists at one time the band contains enough keys to open all the doors to melodyland. Completing the lineup are two drummers and a possi-

ble four guitarists in a given song.

A flashback to the past was done with "Overnight Sensation," and, "Go All The Way." His new LP simply titled, "Eric Carmen," was showcased with "Last Night," "Never Gonna Fall In Love Again," and the lively grit truth of "That's Rock And Roll." His rendition of "On Broadway" was presented like a rock and roll James Dean — enlightened with his cause, his future in music.

Just as everyone is hyping their artist and their mother, a performer like Carmen slips through for the people to rediscover. Eric Carmen's music was love at first sound.

Opening was fellow Arista labelmate Terry Garthwaite, who sings with an intoxicating full-throated voice, oftentimes exchanging duel notes with guitar and saxophone. Although she held the crowd's basic attention many of her songs had excessive riffing and carried on past their peak, leaving the listener with a bleak realization of what might have been. The stigma that plagued her last band, Joy of Cooking, carries over to the present. The presentation being overworked, like a lover who can't live up to the tease, left her tunes fleeting fragments in the air, with unmemorable out-of-control realms. She is, however, an artist to watch in the future once her creativity is properly channeled to its best effect.

Take Me (3:53) (Brew — BMI) (D. Brewer, C. Frost)

Grand Funk advances a high-powered reason to surrender to the music and, judging from the dust cover, passion itself in whatever form the listener sees fit. Tenth Avenue Freeze-Out (3:11) (Laurel Canyon — ASCAP) (B. Springsteen)

Piano and horn-driven cut with a vocal much more accessible than Springsteen's first single, "Born To Run," which rose to the number seventeen position on the **Cash Box** top 100 chart. We predict this cut, which is less complicated with more melody to catch onto, besides being gutsy, will get into the top ten. Flip: No info. available.

FOUR TOPS (ABC 12155)

Mama You're All Right With Me (2:59) (ABC/Dunhill/One Of A Kind — BMI) (D. Lambert, B. Potter)

The classic vocal approach of the Four Tops has been one to be reckoned with over the past ten years in rhythm and blues field. Here is one cut that literally pulsates with the rhythm and passion. Some sweet flutes sandwiched in the breaks highlight the vocal instruments that are the Tops. We don't think anyone's going to disagree with "Mama." Flip: No info. available.

B.B. KING (ABC 12158)

When I'm Wrong (3:36) (ABC/Dunhill/King Guitar — BMI) (B.B. King)

Set against organ/synthesizer, Lucille really bawls the guitar blues while B.B. sings a hurting riff: "People are talkin' about us, baby/Talk's over town/My friends tell me that my woman don't want me/They say 'fool, you're just wastin' your time, wastin' your time, wastin' your time.'" Ha . . . no waste of time with this single. Chart guaranteed r&b hit. Flip: No info. available.

THE MASQUERADERS (Hot Buttered Soul ABC 12157)

(Call Me) The Traveling Man (3:49) (Incense — BMI) (The Raders: O. Deloney, L. Westley, D. Sanders, R. Wrightsil, S. Hutchinson)

Sensitive ballad with a shimmering background having to do with the vagabond who decides to hang up his traveling shoes in favor of settling down with love. From this point on his moving around will be in terms of finding out what's best for the two of them. Flip: No info. available.

WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE (Morningstar MST 502)

My Little Angel (3:29) (E.B. Marks — BMI) (H. Vanda, G. Young)

William Shakespeare is an Australian artist who has achieved some large reputation "down there." This tune is part rap and part singing, a story to a young girl (a daughter), reassuring her that everybody has a guardian angel. Why? Because she's his. Could pick off some AM pop play if given half a chance. Flip: Can't Stop Myself From Loving You (3:10).

THE CHIEFTAINS (Island IS 048A)

The Love Theme From Barry Lyndon (Women Of Ireland) (2:36) (Chrysalis — ASCAP) (S. O'Riada)

Rumor has it that instead of augmenting the story with mood music, Stanley Kubrick selected the music *first* and *then* built his new motion picture "Barry Lyndon" around it. The Chieftains, who are extremely popular in the United Kingdom, and have an LP breaking onto the **Cash Box** charts this week, play a haunting theme which is certainly an important part of this film which will be seen by millions. Flip: The Timap Timpan Reel (3:10).

JEAN-CLAUDE BORELLY AND HIS ORCHESTRA (London 5N-228)

Dolannes Melodie (2:55) (Burlington — ASCAP) (DeSenneville, Toussaint)

Here's an instrumental incorporating an acoustic guitar line running like a brook beneath a flighty flute solo. Number one record so far in Germany, France, Switzerland and Belgium. Repeating line much like "Feelings" repeats, however, "Dolannes Melodie" is all original and quite soothing. Flip: No info. available.

CLEDUS MAGGARD AND THE CITIZENS BAND (Mercury 73751)

The White Knight (3:57) (Unichappell — BMI) (J. Huguely)

Breaking on to the **Cash Box** charts this week at 83 with a bullet, "The White Knight" is a spoken-driven song after the fashion of "Hod Rod Lincoln." A Georgia night in the life of a cast of joy-riding CB operators. Truckers, white lightning runners and Hair Bear state troopers will appreciate this comedy disk. Good old southern Thunder Road humor strikes again. Flip: No info. available.

THE BRASS RING (Capitol P4205)

Theme From "The Man Who Would Be King" (2:50) (Colgems/Allied Artists — ASCAP) (M. Jarre)

Happy two minutes and fifty seconds of what sounds like the Wooden Soldiers playing ragtime. Horns, glockenspiels, whistling, banjos, tubas, this sort of thing reminds us of a trip through Disneyland's "It's A Small World." Holidays and children. A fun segue tune in or out of nearly anything except dismal news reports. Would really like to hear AM mor stations pick up on this one. Flip: The Sikanderkul Theme (2:49).

CHILLIWACK (Sire SAA 723)

Last Day Of December (2:59) (Doraflo/Makers — BMI) (Henderson, Turney)

Pure driving rock and roll from this Canadian band which captures the mid-sixties Who flavor by flailing their instruments with essence of latent violence. Unlike many hard-rockers, the vocal lines are right up front for the listener to grab on to — and it's something you want to grab. Picturesque lyrics. Flip: No info. available.

ROGER HATCHER (Brown Dog BD 9009)

We Gonna Make It (3:22) (Ankh — ASCAP) (R. Hatcher)

Roger Hatcher, the vocalist, has a voice full of blinding passion similar to the expressive opening lines of Marvin Gaye's "Let's Get It On." Storyline illustrates hard times but strong desire. Could use a little extra punch in the instrumental portion to match the soul of the vocals, but it still sounds like this side is gonna make it. Flip: High Blood Pressure (2:27).

behind the counter

Retailers are selling a lot of records, much more than last year. It's Christmas, and everything is moving — chart favorites as well as the regular catalog. Greatest hits collections, a relatively new phenomenon, are selling well everywhere. There have always been collections of this kind, but there seem to be a lot more of them now. Three, in fact, are in the **Cash Box** top ten.

Record companies are helping the retailer in this department. Warner Brothers came up with three radio spots for "History: America's Greatest Hits." Two minutes each, the spots are mostly music, with a bicentennial theme. "We can't really expect to get airplay for these older songs," said Warner promotion and merchandising man John Montgomery, "so we put recognizable parts of all the songs in the radio ads."

Bill Van Brunt operates Music Odyssey, a small independent in West Los Angeles, and he has a theory about these collections. "They attract people who normally don't buy records," he says. "Maybe they've heard of America, say, but they don't want to invest in a couple of albums, or maybe they don't know which ones to get."

Columbia Records group Chicago waited a long time to put a hits package together, perhaps longer than any other major group. This means more value for the consumer because all the tunes have been, through the years, legitimate hit singles, rather than only three or four of them on the record, with only moderately successful songs used for filler. The album is currently number one.

The Music Plus chain is supplementing record company in-store displays with their own advertising for the greatest hits packages, big hand-lettered signs that say "Greatest Hits from the Greatest Stars for the Greatest Customers." All greatest hits, about 200 of them this year, are selling for \$3.69. The chair also has a Christmas Gift Pack that's doing so well they're going to continue it for a couple of weeks more. A belt buckle, t shirt, and any \$6.98 list album, is ten dollars. The customer makes up his own package and the store gift wraps it for free. Joe Falzone is involved with promotion at the company, and he says they are putting a special effort into the college market, taking out lots of ad

space in college newspapers. Recognizing the college students' penchant for specialized collection, Music Plus keeps them informed about their specialized sales — classical, jazz.

Not just here in California, the retail business is jumping all over the country. Rob Bronstein reports from the Discount Records branch in Madison, Wisconsin: "Things are crazy here. Our biggest sale of the year, last Halloween, didn't match yesterday's day. It was our peak so far." What are they selling? "Everything, just everything," Bronstein said. "A lot of Angel boxed sets and the Columbia jazz series. Columbia's giving us a lot of newspaper support on that, good advertising." Discount doesn't have much room for in-store displays, so they put emphasis on their windows, updating the showcase regularly.

Downtown Records in Chicago means just that; it's in the heart of the city. Walter Maney was really too busy to talk, and when he did it was hard to hear — the register was ringing often and loud. "Business is only a little busier than usual," he said. "It's like this all the time. We're selling everything to everybody, Donna Summer, Stanley Turrentine, Grover Washington, John Denver." What about advertising? "Well, we don't really do any. We're a big store, right on State Street, and people just come right in."

Cat's Record Shop is in Nashville, and they are doing landmark business through the use of artist sales, special prices on LPs by Elton John, the Hello People, and Patti Smith. The top album list at Cat's includes Guy Clark, on RCA, Barefoot Jerry on Monument, Jefferson Starship on RCA, and, surprisingly enough, Patti Smith's "Horses," on Arista. Mark Germino works at Cat's Record Shop, and he is delighted with Patti's success in Nashville. "We've been doing a lot of advertising in the Vanderbilt University newspaper, also in a new music paper here, it's great, takes in all kinds of music, and it's called 'Hank.'" For Hank Williams? "Well, I don't know, there's a lot of Hanks in Nashville."

But it was a small record store in Philadelphia that told the story this week. "Are you kidding?" the manager screamed. "What are we selling? Everything. We're busy every single minute, and I certainly have no time to talk."

Station Breaks

John Platt at **WXRT** in Chicago thinks that "it's unrealistic to think that all product received by radio stations can be listened to by everyone." **WXRT** programs a progressive rock format and certainly receives a huge amount of product from the record companies since they operate in the third largest market in the country. John mentioned that he and Bob Shulman, his assistant music director, mostly listen to album product separately. In that respect there's no prior judgment from each other on the particular LP. If they agree, the album is usually added. If they disagree, they filter the album out to the entire staff for their individual reactions. Then a decision is made whether to add or not add. It's certainly something for stations who are not using this process to contemplate. The old idea that "two (or more) heads are better than one" may prove to be a meaningful microcosm for stations to get a fairer view of what their listeners are listening for.

Dennis Elsas, **WNEW** New York p.d., notes the huge success of the Christmas Concert/Cerebral Palsy Benefit on December 17 at Avery-Fisher Hall in New York. The sold-out show included artists like Peter Frampton and Eric Carmen and his band. The concert was preceded by gift-giving listeners whose presents went from there to the needy people in the area. All of **WNEW**'s air staff were involved in this very successful promotion.

WMMR, Philly in conjunction with Phonography Record Magazine will be conducting a record/artist poll in January. Plans are for readers and listeners to choose their favorite records and artists for 1975. The categories will be quite extensive to provide a well-rounded choice of Philadelphia's favorites.

Steve West, **KJR** Seattle p.d. reported phenomenal requests and sales on "Rock and Roll Christmas," a local-artist/deejay record produced in Seattle. The artist is Julie Miller, who performs in local nite-club spots in the city ... and the jock is Rick Hanson (2-6 p.m.) on **KJR**. The record had gone from 12 to 3 on **KJR**'s survey and requests were equaling that. Out of 10,000 records ordered by the station, 5500 were sold two days before Christmas. Each \$1.00 received went directly to Boy Scouts in the Seattle area.

KMYR, Albuquerque ran a 14 hour BBC "History of the Beatles" on Friday and Saturday (27-28) last week. The special ran on the outlet seven hours each day, as a post-Christmas gift to the listeners. In coordination with the broadcast, **KMYR** personalities invited their listeners to decorate the station's tree with any Beatle material. The most imaginative decoration garnered an entire set of Beatles albums for the winner.

T. Morgan, p.d. at **WMMR-FM**, Philadelphia reports **Paul Fuhr** in as assistant p.d./music director effective Dec. 29. Fuhr comes to **WMMR** from **WISP**, also Philly.

KDAY, Santa Monica is keeping their listeners in mind over the holiday season. Two station contests involving free LPs and a new car were rotating every other hour on the black-oriented outlet. All the LPs you can name on the **KDAY** playlist in 10 seconds were awarded to lucky callers and a brand new car giveaway is planned for New Year's Eve. All listeners have to do is guess the correct color of the car and which **KDAY** jock is occupying it.

The **RKO** outlet in Los Angeles, **KHJ**

provided its listeners with a Christmas gift. With new clues every day, new gifts went into the **KHJ** Christmas stocking and the winner took all on Christmas Eve. **KHJ** also broadcast a 2-hour Elton John special on Christmas and the day before. And the public affairs department at the station followed Sunday (28) with a 1½ hour 3-part special on "The Malpractice Crisis," moderated by Hal Dash. The special was broadcast as part of the "Closeup" show on **KHJ**.

Los Angeles Metromedia affiliate **KSAN** presents a one-hour news special, "The Decline and Fall of Western Civilization in Song and Dance," at 8 p.m. on Monday (29). **KSAN**'s Scoop Nisker ... who put the "Decline and Fall" together says the show will include vignettes on Watergate, the energy crisis, the nuclear arms race and the current spiritual fashions.

Art Directors of Los Angeles met recently at Troupers Hall for their annual get-together. Rock photographer Norman Seeff was guest at the affair.

In 1927 the critics called it "The All American Musical Comedy" ... and **KFAC** in L.A. simulcasted a special tribute to "Showboat" — on its 48th anniversary Saturday (27). The two-hour salute included the complete musical scoring of "Showboat" with every number used in the various stage, screen and recorded versions of the musical. Marge Champion, Emmy award winner and one of the stars of the 1951 **MGM** version of "Showboat," emceed the program which included exclusive personal interviews with other stars of the show's progression to present.

EAST COASTINGS — **Milled Rumors**: In an industry where fantasy and fact mix so freely, rumor often occupies a disproportionate share of the whole picture. Nonetheless when it comes to the material upon which this column is often composed; items which come our way as veritable kernels of truth occasionally end up as somewhat less. With this in mind, especially considering the season we're in, it is with mild amusement that we recount some of the choicer "East Coastings" items from the past year. In more or less chronological order, we begin with this statement, made nearly a full year ago — "**David Bowie**, a self-professed fan of **Springsteen**, has recorded two of his compositions for his upcoming album" ... "a tour by **Emerson, Lake and Palmer** is expected to be preceded by a Keith Emerson solo album in April" ... "**Rory Gallagher** is the latest to be named as a contender for the vacant position with the **Rolling Stones**" ... "**Humble Pie** may still find a compromise to solve the problems existing within the band ... could turn out to be the first of many farewell tours." ... "**Steve Marriott's** first solo LP will be ready in a couple of months" ... "**The Faces** recorded most of the tracks for their next album which should be released in the not too distant future" ... "**Jethro Tull** will have two albums released this summer" ... "**Rainbow Blues**" will be a compilation of some of their unissued material ... followed by next studio LP" ... "The next **Rolling Stones** album, titled 'Made In The Shade' — there is speculation that it will include some of their greatest hits coupled with unreleased material" (at least it was half right) ... "**Stills** is in the studio with **David Crosby**, **Graham Nash** and **Neil Young** finishing an album that Atlantic hopes to ship this summer" ... "**Rick Wakeman** will do a concert of classical music at Carnegie Hall with the American Symphony Orchestra conducted by David Measham" ... "**The Who** will probably do a week of concerts at Madison Square Garden sometime this summer" ... "Latest Word on those solo albums by **Keith Emerson**, **Carl Palmer** and **Greg Lake** is that all three will arrive about the same time as the next group studio effort in the fall" ... "It seems that **Eric Clapton's** live album has been shelved indefinitely" ... "**Keith Emerson's** the first of the ELP solo disks due out, in Nov." ... Other tidbits have yet to demonstrate their veracity or otherwise, and we anxiously await whatever the future may hold. We might also note at this point, that given an entire 12-month period, the number of rumors which reached the stage of being worthy of print is actually fairly small, a credit to our sources. So this seems like as good a place as any to thank those who continually (we hope) provide us with the information and inspiration which enliven these pages each and every week.



NEW NEWS IS NEWS — **Queen** will be embarking on a U.S. tour in the next month or so; the New York venue will be the Beacon Theatre, with four nights set aside. Meanwhile, the band is "tearing up" the English charts by occupying the #1 single slot ("**Bohemian Rhapsody**") and the #1 album spot ("**A Night At The Opera**"); they're not doing too badly stateside either, with both items bulleted this week on the **Cash Box** charts ... **Dylan's** new LP, "**Desire**," is due this week or next ... **Todd Rundgren** and **Utopia** are back at **Secret Sound Studio** working on a few tunes, as is **David Webster**, who played slide guitar on the upcoming **Bette Midler/Bob Dylan** duet "Buckets of Rain" on Ms. M's new LP. By the way, Secret Sound is undergoing extensive modifications and reconstruction and will be twice as large as before when all is said and done in a few weeks ... **The Ozark Mountain Daredevils**, the **Doobie Brothers** and **Hoyt Axton** got together for a jam recently ... As expected, the **Wings** tour has been greeted with ecstasy in Australia. When it reached the point that scalpers were getting up to \$100 a ticket (original price: \$7.50), the band agreed to permit a national TV telecast of their concert ... **Snuff Garrett** is producing the new **5th Dimension** album, the group's second for **ABC**. The LP is to be called "Home Cookin'," and features a newly re-formed 5th Dimension ... We noted last week that drummer **Carmine Appice** is playing with the **Leslie West Band** following the departure of **Corky Laing**; as far as we know, this is still the case, but **MCA** also lets us know that Appice is still a definite member of **KGB** and the West thing is not a full-time occupation ... From **Capitol/EMI of Canada** we received the news that the Russian cultural newspaper **Sovietskaya Cultura** has spoken the word on the **Bay City Rollers**, describing the phenomenon as "more lasting, more hysterical and more maniacal" than any Western craze to date. The mag groups the Rollers with sadistic films and pornographic literature as "low taste products" of mass Western culture ... **Don Kirshner's Rock Concert** airing Jan. 3 (NYC) and Jan. 1 (LA) features **Harry Chapin**, **Loudon Wainwright III** and **Tom Chapin** ... Well worth checking out is artist **Roger Dean's** newly-available book called "Views." It features Dean's painting and montage works, including his Yes covers, plus selections on his stage sculpture designed for Yes, plus a great variety of little known works.

CTI Promo Push Set By Motown

HOLLYWOOD — Motown Record Corporation has set the machinery in motion toward an extensive promotion campaign for the coinciding release of CTI albums this month by **George Benson**, **Hank Crawford**, **Hubert Laws**, **Idris Muhammad**, and a repackage of various CTI artists. According to executive vice president **Barney Ales**, Motown is "determined to push this package of albums high on all charts across-the-board." Ales credited Motown's sales and promotion forces with having done "a great job making CTI product acceptable at all levels in the marketplace," and feels the timing is now right to make jazz an acceptable medium of music for the entire population.

The label is also planning release of new singles from **Esther Phillips'** "Esther Phillips w/Beck" and **Grover Washington's** "Feels So Good" albums this month.

With respect to the current litigation

between CTI and Motown, Motown was, to its surprise, served earlier this week with a summons and complaint.

According to **Ralph Seltzer**, vice president of corporate affairs, Motown has retained the firm of **Ables, Clark and Osterberg** (**Bob Osterberg**) to represent them in connection with the complaint.

"We deny all allegations on the part of CTI that we have breached the agreement in any way and we will be shortly pursuing our full legal remedies against CTI and probably others in court."

"We were shocked by the suit. We consider that we have done an excellent job with the CTI product and we think that the position taken by CTI is totally unjustified and we intend to prove same in court."

"We hope to shortly move for a complete dismissal of all claims contained in the complaint filed by CTI against Motown," Seltzer concluded.

Casting is not yet complete for the male star to play opposite Ms. Knight in the PG movie. The plot centers around a pilot gone to Alaska to fly because he couldn't find a job in the U.S. His wife reluctantly joins him, and the couple encounter resistance from the environment as well as from the other characters.

Ms. Knight and **The Pips** will provide the musical score to be released as an album on **Buddah**. Ms. Knight is taking three months off the group's concert tour schedule to do the film, which is scheduled for release late this year.

Interiors will be filmed in **Hollywood** upon completion of the location work which will be limited by the four hours of daylight and intense cold during the winter months.

Reflections On Black Music '75

Keith Adams, p. d. at **KDIA** said that he saw '75 as an erosion of good black music. "Disco music was big; however, I think a lot of fine artists turned in the wrong direction. 1975 wasn't as good musically as '74. **Stevie Wonder** and **Marvin Gaye** didn't do anything. Not saying that there wasn't any good music, to me it was a poor year for good black music. Thank God for **Earth, Wind & Fire** and **Gamble & Huff**."

Don Mac over at **KDAY** said that the L. A. market showed again that the people in the area are still into mellow sexy records such as those by **Major Harris** and **Donna Summer**. "Listeners are becoming more liberal in their tastes. Suggestive lyrics were very prominent and the listeners seemed unconcerned. The disco thing didn't come off — people in L. A. are still into house parties and concerts."

Travis Gardnes, p. d. at **KCOH**, said that there were many fantastic tunes this year like "Let's Do It Again" and he was pleased in the variety of black music over years past. "It looks like playlists in the future will be extended because people are now more into LP cuts. People are buying LPs more and their preference is for the longer cuts on the air."

Joe Fisher, p. d. at **WCKO**, said the disco thing really helped black radio. It picked up the whole atmosphere and brought many new listeners to black radio. The black disco sounds crossed over to pop charts and stations. The disco thing is hard to explain — it's strings, the big band sound, but funkier than Barry White."

Jerry Boulding, p. d. at **WCHB**, said '75 was the year of many new self-contained groups such as **Earth, Wind & Fire**. "The disco thing was very strong and many of the hits crossed over big onto the pop charts. Jazz was more of an influence this year, with **Ramsey Lewis**, **Quincy Jones**, **Blackbyrds** and such all having good years. Black-FM radio also began to emerge this year." Jerry also said that many black programmers across the country are starting to get the attention they deserve as being top communicators.

Bob Moore at **KDKO** felt that too many artists got into the same bag. "Everything to me sounded disco, with the same beat and the same sound. Many good records got passed over. To me, all disco makes your sound monotonous after a while. Some of the bigger artists of the past didn't have a great year, but in the interim several new faces seem to be emerging, such as **The Impressions**, **Staple Singers** and **Norman Connors**."

Cortez Thompson, **WOL**, Washington, D.C. — "Personally, the one record I liked best this year was 'Get Down Tonight,' but in terms of sales, I understand 'The Hustle' was a greater success, and also a great favorite of mine. Other records I found to be important were 'Shinin' Star,' 'Fire' and 'Fight The Power.' The **Isley Brothers** are so consistent, being around for 20 years and still making hit records."

"This was the year that female artists came into their own: **Millie Jackson**, **Gloria Gaynor**, **Donna Summer**, **Natalie Cole**, **Freda Payne**, **Barbara Mason**, **LaBelle**, **Betty Wright** and **Jeannie Reynold** all had hits this year. The old rule of never playing two records by female vocalists back to back was impossible to follow."

"New artists on the scene put a lot of pressure on programmers. We also had crossover pressure to contend with. **David Bowie**, **Frankie Valli**, **AWB** and **Elton John** put black programmers in a new position, and I feel we'll have even more records by white artists going black in the coming year."

Cortez noted that while black radio was leaning away from the personality approach, white radio was perhaps taking on more of a personality sound recently. He also is of the opinion that FM stereo will take over the future of music broadcasting.

Sonny Taylor, **WWRL**, New York — "The popularity of disco music has forced record manufacturers to put out records geared to that sound, even if they aren't disco records as such. Orchestration and strings have become increasingly important and are a part of the majority of popular black music being played today."

Stevenson To Produce 'Adios Amigo' Film LP

HOLLYWOOD — Mickey Stevenson has been set to produce an album from the soundtrack of "Adios Amigo," a new film set in the 1870s starring Fred Williamson and Richard Pryor. The LP is being made in agreement with London Records, Atlas Films and Brut Productions.

The score by Lucci de Jesus ties together a series of vignettes from the comic action film which depicts the adventures of two black freed men in the New Mexico territory just after the Civil War.

Three songs from the album with be released as singles. "Adios Amigo" and "I Can Make It (With Love)" have lyrics by Mickey Stevenson, who has written for **Martha Reeves** and **The Vandellas** and **John Nash**. A third single "Never Turn Your Back On A Friend," carries the lyrics of **Arthur Hamilton** ("Taste Of Honey"). All three songs are sung by the **Infernal Machine**.

London will release the LP to coincide with the "Adios Amigo" Christmas premiere.

Burning Spear Signs To Island Trio Hails From Jamaica

HOLLYWOOD — Burning Spear, one of Jamaica's reggae groups, has been signed to a world-wide recording contract (excluding the West Indies) with **Island Records**, according to label president **Charley Nuccio**.

Burning Spear is a trio built around the songs and ghetto poetry of founder/writer **Winston Rodney**. The band has had a string of hits in Jamaica, including "Marcus Garvey," "Slavery Days" and "Tradition," making them one of the most influential musical forces on the island.

Burning Spear's debut **Island** album, called "Marcus Garvey," was released in England last week and promptly jumped into the top 20 LPs of 1975 in both the **Melody Maker** and **New Musical Express** year-end polls. U.S. release date for Spear's albums has been set for Jan 15 with a single to be culled from the album and an American tour to follow shortly after.

Bobby Bare's Daughter Dies

NASHVILLE — Fifteen-year-old Cari Jean Bare, daughter of RCA recording star Bobby Bare, died December 19 at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Cause of death was an extremely rare affliction called Adult Respiratory Distress Syndrome. It basically amounts to a complete failure of the lungs.

Harlan Howard For London Trip

NASHVILLE — Award winning country music songwriter Harlan Howard will depart Nashville for London in mid-January for his first visit to England and its music community.

In discussing the trip, Howard said, "I'm looking forward to the visit, and am very anxious to hear what's happening in England. Traveling has always inspired me, and I feel I can count on coming back with new dimensions in my own writing."

With over 3,000 songs to his credit, Howard is well known in Country Music circles for his many hits including "Heartaches By The Number," "I Fall To Pieces," "Too Many Rivers," "Busted," "Tiger By The Tail" and "Pick Me Up On Your Way Down."

Cari was first stricken at the family's Hendersonville, Tennessee home Thanksgiving Eve. She spent the rest of her life in hospital intensive care units, for the first eight days at Madison, Tennessee Hospital, then at Boston's General Hospital, having been flown there by the U.S. Air Force. That hospital's affiliation with the Harvard University Medical School permitted Cari to have the benefit of the world's finest medical talent and facilities.

According to family spokesman Charlie Williams in Nashville, the disease is almost always fatal. Physicians tried to keep the child alive through use of a special heart-lung machine, the only one of its kind in the world, while they embarked on a wide-ranging search for a lung donor. The only possible cure would be a lung transplant.

According to Williams numerous acceptable donors were found, but no next-of-kin would permit removal of the organs for transplant purposes. At the end of the time in which the heart-lung machine could be effective, no transplant was available, and death was inevitable.

A year ago, Cari, her father and mother, and her two brothers recorded a delightful family-fun album for RCA Records. Called "Singin' In The Kitchen," it instantly became popular and brought about a demand from the public for personal appearances by Bobby Bare and his family. During the summer of 1975, Cari participated in these appearances across the country.

Cari Bare was a student (10th grade) at B.C. Goodpasture Christian Academy in Madison, where this year she was a freshman homecoming queen attendant. During her previous two years she attended Knox Doss Junior High and was also chosen as Homecoming Queen Attendant.


She was also very active in Methodist Youth Fellowship (MYF) at the Madison Methodist Church, where she was a member.

Cari's parents, Bobby and Jeannie Bare, were with her in Boston until death came.

The funeral was held Monday, December 22, in Hendersonville, Tenn.

Country Artist of the Week

Kenny Starr



Kenny Starr was born on September 21, 1953 in Topeka, Kansas. Shortly thereafter, his family moved to Burlingame, Kansas where Starr grew up. His father, formerly involved in coal mining and construction industries, is now semi-retired. Kenny has an older brother and two older sisters.

The singer/songwriter/guitarist started his career at the age of five. He often went to the Veterans of Foreign Wars meeting house near his home in Burlingame. There he would unplug the jukebox and sing for nickles and dimes. By the age of nine Kenny was performing in local clubs with his first band, "The Rocking Rebels." That same year Kenny formed another group called "Kenny and the Imperials" which toured the area and brought the young entertainer \$10 to \$15 a night.

At sixteen Starr turned to country music. He played local gigs with a band called "Kenny Starr and The Country Showmen." Bob Hampton, a retired Air Force career man who also enjoyed writing country songs, took an active interest in Starr's career. He entered Kenny in a talent contest being held by Wichita radio station KFDI. Entrants were asked to submit a demo. Choosing the Ray Price single, "I Won't Mention It Again," Kenny was among the 97 hopefuls who entered the competition. The field was then narrowed to ten, and Kenny won the competition.

Local concert promoter Hap Peebles happened to see Kenny perform in the amateur contest and asked the aspiring artist to perform on an upcoming show with Loretta Lynn and Conway Twitty in Wichita, Kansas. Singing his good luck Ray Price song, Kenny received a standing ovation. After the show, Loretta offered to assist him if he came to Nashville.

To make a long story, short 17 year old Kenny beat Loretta's bus back to Nashville and was waiting on the office steps on 16th Avenue when she arrived. That was four years ago and ever since then Kenny has been the featured singer with the Loretta Lynn Show.

During those four years, Kenny has probably traveled over a half million miles with the show but never really had anything as far as a hit record was concerned until "Blind Man In The Bleachers." He had a couple of records which hit a fast 70 on the charts and then were promptly forgotten. The ironic part about "Blind Man in the Bleachers" is that about six weeks prior to the record, MCA's president, Mike Maitland, called Loretta's office to discuss dropping Kenny from the label's roster. Nothing had been happening and MCA was doing their annual house cleaning. Under normal conditions everyone would have understood this action, but for some reason or another Kenny had not been in the studio so it was decided it would not be fair to drop him without seeing what he could do, so later Kenny was in the studio and recorded "Blind Man in the Bleachers."

All of Kenny Starr's recording for MCA is directed by Snuffy Miller, with exclusive booking by United Talent, Inc.

Shahan, Rodriguez Part Company

HOLLYWOOD — Happy Shahan, whose personal management has contributed to Johnny Rodriguez's success, has announced that their management agreement has been dissolved effective immediately.

Although their contract calls for several more years before termination,

Shahan has stated that he has accepted Rodriguez's request for release based on the exchange of an undisclosed amount of money to be paid by Rodriguez.

Future management plans for Rodriguez have not been made at this time.

Nancy and Jon Fricke have named their little girl **Heather Renee**. Heather was born in Nashville in Nov. Jon, well known radio and music personality, is currently head of the Warner Brothers operation in Nashville.

Albert Young Eagle is cutting a new album to be released immediately. **Little Richie Johnson** will produce the album and handle national promotion for the up and coming Navajo Indian singing star.

The personal appearance show of United Artists Records artist **Jean Sheppard** now numbers seven members with the addition of fiddle virtuoso **Leon Boulanger**, a Nashville veteran bandman.

Melodyland recording artist **Jerry Naylor** has been set to appear at the Landmark Hotel in Las Vegas with **Barbara Fairchild** from Dec. 26 until Jan. 22.

T.G. Sheppard feels that sometimes your own judgment should be your guide. Thirteen record companies turned down "Devil In The Bottle." Only T.G.'s deep belief in the song kept him from being discouraged. T.G. has had three hit records in a row and is looking for number four with his current Melodyland release, "Motels And Memories."

Englishman **Stu Stevens** has been in the studio in London, England, with producer **Miki Dallon**, recording material for his next album. Stevens, who records for Granite Records here in the States, reviewed material while he was in Nashville, and he says he hopes to be able to include some of those songs on upcoming albums. His present U.S. single, "Honey, What's The Matter," is still receiving good airplay across the States.

Willie Nelson's Lone Star Recording Company has caused producer **Bucky Meadows** to commute between Austin and Nashville. A couple of weeks ago Bucky was in Nashville producing an album for **Billy ("Billy C.") Callery**. The result of that session will be released by Columbia around the first of the year. After a fast trip back to Austin, Bucky turned up in Nashville again last week to produce his own album, to be released under the new Lone Star/Columbia arrangement.

Storytelling and "Beer" seem to be the "in" things at the **Tom T. Hall** Enterprise operation, as a new Cadillac limo just became a permanent fixture — along with the bus, etc., Tom T. just hit the #1 spot with "I Like Beer" last month.



Pointing toward continued momentum for the country division during the coming year was the signing of Sammi Smith, who completed her Elektra debut album late in the year.

During 1975 Nonesuch Records continued in its long-range development of a repertory of historical American music by both popular and classical composers. In recognition of the approaching Bicentennial, Nonesuch released a series of albums honoring American music, highlighted by the broad success enjoyed by "After The Ball," a collection of turn-of-the-century pop songs recorded by mezzo soprano Joan Morris and pianist-composer William Bolcom. Morris and Bolcom were also among the featured performers in a subsequent collection of the songs of Henry Clay Work, composed during the Civil War era. 19th century ballroom compositions and cornet instrumentals were other uniquely American musical topics explored in Nonesuch albums.

Nonesuch also continued the development of its catalog of original recordings of works by leading contemporary composers, as well as new recordings of little-known compositions by composers from all musical epochs, including albums in the label's vintage Explorer Series.

Central to the success of the Elektra/Asylum/Nonesuch labels during the year was the selective release policy which the company has adhered to since its formation. During the first two quarters of the year, the company restricted its monthly release schedules to maximize effective support of each new album and permit optimum ex-

posure for singles releases. Thus, for the first quarter, album releases were held to two albums in national release each month; significantly, every album released during this period, in pop, rock and country formats, achieved chart acceptance, paralleled by strong singles performances in each category.

Elektra/Asylum's ongoing relationship with the WEA Distribution system also contributed to the company's success through extended regional and local promotions jointly directed by Elektra/Asylum and WEA. Such regional campaigns became focal to the success of Joni Mitchell's "The Hissing Of Summer Lawns," and were central in launching the careers of Andrew Gold and the Cate Bros. Elektra/Asylum's realignment of its marketing staff during 1974 provided additional efficiency throughout the 1975 business year.

Creative and business growth for Elektra/Asylum/Nonesuch during 1975 consolidated the operating base first established during the previous year. With the year-end appointment of Joe Smith as chairman, going to Elektra/Asylum after a highly successful 14-year career at Warner Bros. Records, the company's executive staff anticipates additional gains in its effective growth in marketing and sales.

Songwriters Showcase Resumes January 7

HOLLYWOOD — The BMI-sponsored Songwriters Showcase in Hollywood will resume its weekly series next week, following the holiday hiatus, with gatherings on January 7 and 14, according to Ron Anton, BMI vice president, west coast performing rights.

The first session of the new year will feature disk jockey Harry Newman of KLAC as special Q&A guest, along with newcomer appearances by Clayton/Brossman/Burroughs, Dale Jones and The Mystic Knights of the Oingo Boingo.

The January 14 get-together will lead off with entertainer Jewel Akens as Q&A guest, followed by performers Peter Alsop, Maureen Baily, Bonny Murray and Heart.

The Songwriters Showcase meets Wednesday evenings, from 7:30 p.m. at Budd Friedman's club, The Improvisation (8162 Melrose Ave.) The Showcase, hosted by Len Chandler and John Braheny, is open to the public as well as to people in the music industry, Anton noted.

London Sets Miles Campaign

NEW YORK — London Records is readying a promotional campaign for the John Miles single, "Highfly." The 45 has already topped British charts and is picking up followers in Europe.

The major part of the campaign will begin after the first of the new year. Teaser ads have already begun to appear in music trade magazines, with multi-media advertising set to begin later in the month. London is also making up several thousand 12-inch gliders with "Highfly" imprinted on the wings. The single will also be completely re-serviced.

Miles is now finishing a British tour, following the chart success of the single there. After the holidays, he will put the finishing touches on his debut LP for the label, which is slated for American release in early 1976. At that time he will also embark on his initial U.S. tour.

Houston Gives ZZ Top Day, Proclamation

HOUSTON — Mayor Fred Hofheinz, of Houston, Texas, is perhaps the first top official of a major American city to be publicly swayed by the music of ZZ Top. When the Texas trio made their first hometown appearance in over three years, Hofheinz issued the following official proclamation:

"Whereas, ZZ Top, that super high energy, Houston oriented band, is responsible for the popularity of rock Texas sound music throughout our nation, and

Whereas, ZZ Top, "that little ol' band from Texas," is the hottest rock and roll band today, breaking crowd attendance records throughout the United States and Canada, drawing the largest audience ever seen in music's history, and

Whereas, Billy Gibbons, Dusty Hill and Frank Beard have done more to promote Texas culture and good will and are known throughout the world for their four terrific albums, combining Texas blues and rock and roll with power rock and unique lyrics,

Now, therefore, I, Mayor Fred Hofheinz, Mayor of the city of Houston, do hereby proclaim ZZ Top Day in Houston, Texas."

Empire's 5-Day Service School Attracts Record Attendance More Schools Planned For '76

CHICAGO — In the period of five days, the product lines of approximately ten firms were thoroughly and technically reviewed during a massive service school program sponsored by Empire Distributing, Inc., and coordinated by Bob Rondeau of the firm's Green Bay, Wisconsin office and Harold LaRoux and Charles Elkins of the Empire-Grand Rapids, Michigan branch.

The schools, which ran from Dec. 1-5 at the Midway Motor Lodge in Grand Rapids, Michigan, drew an estimated average attendance of about 161 individuals per session and were open to operators and service personnel in the four-state area of Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan.

The sessions were separated into morning, afternoon and evening classes and among the factories participating were Atari/Kee; Automatic Products; Bally Mfg. Corp.; Ramtek Corp.; Electra Games; National Rejectors; Chicago Coin; Rock-Ola Mfg. Corp.; D. Gottlieb & Co.; and Midway Mfg. Co., with Kurz Kasch holding a lengthy session on the closing day of the series.

Factory representatives conducting the various sessions made themselves available for any individual post-classroom instruction that was requested. As a matter of fact, as Bob Rondeau pointed out, he frequently observed students assembled in the motel's lobby, after hours, with charts and data spread out on tables, going over schematics and the instructions of the day. "This really gives you a feeling of accomplishment," he

said, "and also reveals how interested everyone is in gaining knowledge about servicing equipment and getting as much as possible out of the school sessions."

The entire program was originated as a special service project by Empire and launched this past July with a highly successful 5-day seminar in Green Bay, Wisconsin. A flood of industry inquiries and commendations resulted from the summer series. "We were confident, at the conclusion of the July school, that we had come up with the correct formula for assisting our own customers and bridging the existing service gap in our industry," Bob Rondeau said. "Our experiences at these sessions provided a guideline for the Dec. school, which drew an unsurpassed attendance. By their all-out participation, operators and service people displayed an earnest desire to learn how to service today's equipment and, similarly, the full support of the factories reflected their willingness to cooperate."

In expressing his personal gratification over the tremendous success of the program, Empire's executive vice president Joe Robbins said he is hopeful that other distributors will follow Empire's lead and initiate similar projects to assist operators in meeting the standards of servicing the sophisticated range of equipment in today's marketplace.

At present, preparations are underway for phase three of this very ambitious program, to take place somewhere in the Illinois territory in either Jan. or Feb. of 1976.

Free Play Bill Passed In Michigan; Now Awaits Governor's Signature

LANSING, MICH. — Senate Bill 526, to "de-criminalize" the use of free plays on amusement machines in the state of Michigan, has been passed by both the Senate and the House. It is now in the hands of the governor, who has the option of signing it, vetoing it or allowing it to become law without his signature.

Passage of this bill culminates approximately eighteen months of tireless campaigning on the part of the Music Operators of Michigan and the association's legal counsel Mike Spaniole, as well as the legislators who sponsored and backed the bill, against such obstacles as the objections of the state police, the liquor commission, legislators who preferred awarding cash or goods for free plays and those who wanted no

ceiling on free plays, plus lobbyists representing interests wishing to use the bill as a vehicle to expand gambling.

Don Miller of Miller Newmark Distributing Co. was singled out by MOM for his personal efforts in alerting area operators to the dangers of removing the ceiling on free plays, as sought by a crippling amendment to S.B. 526. Mike Spaniole also warned that a bill with no limit on free plays would invite a veto by the governor.

Senate Bill 526, as passed in its original form, allows fifteen free plays. MOM, having filed a memorandum with the governor explaining the bill's purpose and background, is confident of his signature.

Atari Holds Seminar For New 'Indy 800'

HOLLYWOOD — Atari, Inc. recently held a two-day technical service instruction school seminar for its new 'Indy 800' eight-player racing game. The sessions, held at Atari's Los Gatos facilities, was one of a regular series of conferences held by the company to enable operators and distributors to locate and better deal with the intricacies of Atari games.

The seminar was headed by Don

Smith and conducted by Atari lead engineer/field service representatives Bruce Bennet, Bernie Barranger and Fred McCord. Highlights of the first day included discussion of logic board circuit architecture as well as construction and documentation of a new circuit test fixture designed specifically for 'Indy 800' trouble-shooting. The second day's activities included discussion of service and manual documentation for Indy's monitor. Those attending the conference were given tours of Atari's plant as well as luncheon and dinner.

"The Indy 800 seminar," Gene Lipkin, Atari's vice-president of marketing told **Cash Box**, "was a great success. These service schools will continue to be a part of an on-going, all-out program to back up our distributors and operators so that Atari products can maintain the highest revenues in the business."

Century's 24-Hour Repair Service

AUDUBON, PA. — Century Industries Inc. has been enjoying considerable success with its recently inaugurated 24-hour repair service, according to the firm's Emil Rotar. Originally exposed, quite effectively, to distributors in the eastern market, the service is now being offered on a national scale.

The service is unique for its speed and efficiency, Rotar indicated, especially under current circumstances. "Everyone knows how costly downtime can be and how important it is to have machines in top working condition. With these important factors in mind we established a service that's as close as the nearest post office or UPS terminal. Century has high speed computerized test stations set up at the factory to handle most of the big volume pieces such as the Tank, Gran Trak, Anti Aircraft, Wheels, Air Hockey and the like, enabling them to send the logic boards to the correct station for speedy repair, thus eliminating lengthy waiting periods.

Word of the new service has spread rapidly throughout the industry in the brief span of a few months. Rotar added, and inquiries have been received from all over the country.



Also, to mark his birthday, Polydor has released four boxed sets, totalling 30 albums with the overall title "Homage A Wilhelm Kempff."

Bell, Cowley Form Cowbell; EMI Buys 'Talk Of The Town'

LONDON — Two of the founders of the Chrysalis Agency, Kenny Bell and Richard Cowley have come to an amicable agreement with joint chairman of Chrysalis, Terry Ellis and Chris Wright whereby they will form their own agency, to be known as The Cowbell Agency, and will transfer the goodwill of the Chrysalis Agency to it. They will move into new offices on London's George Street. Commenting on the reason for the closure of the Chrysalis Agency Chris Wright said, "The move is regarded as being a major step in establishing Chrysalis as primarily a recording, publishing and studio company. This will be the future orientation of the company." Cowley and Bell have handled a large number of acts, not necessarily on the Chrysalis label, since the formation in 1969. Artists to be handled by the new company include Bryan Ferry, Fox, Jethro Tull, Johnny Cash, Nazareth, Procol Harum, Roxy Music, Sailor, Ten Years After and the Sensational Alex Harvey Band. Staff currently employed will transfer to the new agency.

It has been announced that EMI has bought from the Trust Houses Forte Hotel and Restaurant group the famed London nightery 'The Talk Of The Town.' The 'Talk' as it is affectionately known was launched in 1958 by Sir Charles Forte and Sir Bernard Delfont who has always been responsible for the entertainment aspect of the business, a role in which he will continue now that EMI has acquired the venue. From the outset, artists have never been paid huge sums for appearing there, so that a reasonable price may be charged to customers wanting first class entertainment with a good meal. This policy will continue. It has been rumored that the 'Talk' has not

been as successful as Forte would have liked in recent years and that this is the reason for the sale. EMI chairman John Read said, "This is a splendid addition to our various entertainment interests. The Talk Of The Town will be under the continued supervision of Sir Bernard Delfont, the group's entertainment director, and will provide the public with the same high standard entertainment as they have enjoyed in the past."

The Bay City Rollers keep moving in a positive direction with advance orders on their new album "Wouldn't You Like It" totalling 400,000, theoretically qualifying for three gold disks. This figure is one of the largest advanced orders ever achieved by an album in the UK. BCR's two previous albums "Rollin'" and "Once Upon A Star" qualified for platinum disks — 1 million pounds worth of sales. The awards were made on the eve of the BCR's Australian tour, by world light heavyweight boxing champion John Donte (see photo).

Former Head of April Music and Yorkshire TV's record and publishing company Deke Arlon has made his debut as a theatrical producer with a play written by Caryl Brahms and Ned Sherrin, titled "Nickleby And Me." Arlon also heads the Gurusama group of companies currently involved with the group Fox. The play opened at the Stratford East Theater Royal on Dec. 16 starring Peter Bayliss and Ann Beach.

Chrysalis has signed a recording and publishing deal with singer/songwriter Philip Goodhand-Tait, previously with DJM. Chrysalis will handle Goodhand-Tait's publishing company, Spaniel Music, on a worldwide basis. He will start work on his first album for the company in January.



HOT — James Brown — Polydor PD 6059 — Producer: James Brown — List: 6.98

James Brown continues to be the master of tried and true funk and on "Hot" Brown's true capabilities shine through. Slithery vocals over a super heavy rhythmic base make the movable most of each cut. There's no place for this record that a dance floor won't cure as each cut is suitable for moving feet and other bodily functions. Top listens include "The Future Shock Of The World," "(I Love You) For Sentimental Reasons" and "Hot (I Need To Be Loved, Loved, Loved, Loved)." This is a party record. You may now play it.




TROPEA — Tropea — Marlin 2200 — Producer: John Tropea — List: 6.98

"Tropea" is no mere excursion into the expectedness of one sound. Through each composition runs the light and dark of jazz, rock, soul, latin and untold numbers of interrelated influences. Tropea's guitar work is crisp and to the point, while his accompanying musicians are more than equal to the task. FM and jazz playlists and this record are the twain that's sure to meet. Top listens include "7th Heaven," "The Brat," "Just Blue" and "Cisco Disco." Pick up on this record.

"Mystic Voyage" is the perfect musical marriage of a whole lot of musical influences. Roy Ayers and band, on a variety of uptempo and laidback numbers, combine the best of jazz, soul and south of the border into songs that are progressive in an oh-so-subtle way. Jazz and soul stations will jump at the chance to add this to their playlists, be they AM or FM. Top listens include "The Black Five," "Take All The Time You Need" and "Life Is Just A Moment Parts 1 and 2." Meditative and moveable.



RAISING HELL — The Fatback Band — Event EV 6905 — Producer: The Fatback Band — List: 6.98

"Raising Hell" is a pure kind of soul. It's movable but not so easily dismissed as disco. The basic drive of the rhythmic ground has some melodic traces that give forth the favorable impression that the band is really trying. Good soul and possible loose FM additions. Top cuts include "(Are You Ready) Do The Bus Stop," "Put Your Love (In My Tender Care)," "Groovy Kind Of Day" and a one of a kind reworking of "I Can't Help Myself (Sugar Pie, Honey Bunch)." A moving side to the black man's burden.



BAD LUCK — The Atlanta Disco Band — Ariola America ST 50004 — Producer: Dave Crawford — List: 6.98

It's "lets take it to the dance floor time" as The Atlanta Disco Band churns out a series of thrashing disco numbers. The overall density of production gives each cut more depth than normally expected from a disco record and thus makes the record an equally good listen. AM and disco playlists are in the bag. Top listens include "My Soul Is Satisfied," "Do What You Feel," "I Am Trying" and a professional reworking of "Bad Luck."



THE JOEY JEFFERSON BAND — The Joey Jefferson Band — Mutt and Jeff MJS 5002 — List: 6.98

The elements of soul and jazz collide on "The Joey Jefferson Band" and the result is a deft, creative mixture. Guitar plays a big part in the overall blend as distinctive, crisp licks wend their way throughout an undulating rhythmic pattern. Jazz and soul stations with a progressive bent will have a field day with all cuts. Top cuts include "Baby Just To Love You," "Walk On By," "Hot Fun In The Summertime" and "Sleep My Love." A record that's good for what listens you.



G.T. MOORE — G.T. Moore — Mercury SRM-11065 — Producers: G.T. Moore, Dave Bloxham, Tony Braunagle — List: 6.98

Reggae as such is usually presented as one form devoid of other influences. On "G.T. Moore" reggae's driving rhythm is mixed with everything but the kitchen sink with the result being one of the cleanest presentations in quite a while. Strains of rock, pop and blues swirl around the reggae beat while the proceedings are anchored by Moore's soulful vocals. Easy AM access while FM should not be ruled out. Top cuts include "Knocking On Heaven's Door," "Thou Shalt Not Kill" and "Move It On Up."



THE BUTTERFLY BALL — Roger Glover and Guests — UK UKL 56000 — Producer: Roger Glover — List: 6.98

"The Butterfly Ball" is an extravagant and successful attempt at telling a children's tale in a mature manner. Glover and company have combined music into a smooth fitting story line with the resultant concept proving a successful one. As a whole this recorded tale is a cinch FM shot while bits and pieces of this odyssey can easily stand alone. Top listens include "Sitting In A Dream," "Watch Out For The Bat," "Behind The Smile" and "No Solution." An ambitious project that works.



DISCO CONNECTION — Isaac Hayes Movement — Hot Buttered Soul ABCD 923 — Producer: Isaac Hayes — List: 6.98

Isaac Hayes has always been known for his ability to give a piece of music just that something extra. That's exactly what happens on "Disco Connection" as The Movement enhances each song with clarity and, above all, spirit. The best way to sum it up is progressive disco. AM and soul stations should pick up on it as well as every disco in town. Top cuts include "The First Day Of Forever," "Disco Connection," "Choppers" and "St. Thomas Square." This record is yours for the moving.





"Disco Reggae" is an example of what happens when you take a hard edged genre and mellow it out. 
