Phyllis Hyman

PHILADELPHIA INTERNATIONAL RECORDS WAS TO '70s SOUL WHAT MOTOWN AND STAX WERE TO '60S

SOUL—a hit-making machine that was consistently on the charts. During the '70s, The O'Jays, Harold Melvin & The Bluenotes, Teddy Pendergrass, The Three Degrees and Billy Paul were among the artists who enjoyed major hits for Philadelphia International. Although things slowed down for the label in the 1980s, Philly International never really went away. In late 1990, Philly International secured a distribution deal with Zoo/BMG, and Phyllis Hyman's *Prime Of My Life* is the company's first album since the deal was signed—and Hyman's first album in five years. Hyman, known for such hits as "You Know How To Love Me" (1989) and "Riding The Tiger" (1983), signed with Philly International in 1986 and recorded her last album, *Living All Alone*, that year.

Serving as executive producers on the newly-released *Prime Of My Life* are Philly International leaders and veteran R&B producers Kenny Gamble & Leon Huff—and under their direction, Hyman delivers an album that is very contemporary-sounding yet true to the label's soulful history. The album's producers include Gamble, Nick Martinelli, Gene McDaniels, Marti Sharron, Roland Chambers and

Terry Burrus.

"I'd say this record really stands up to and goes beyond the last album," Hyman asserts. "It's much more well-rounded than some of my previous records. This album also represents the growth I've undergone not just as an artist but as a human being during the last few years. I feel that I'm more secure and more confortable with myself now, and I've learned to appreciate the physical, emotional and spiritual aspects to my voice in a way that I hadn't done in the past. I think you can hear that on this record... I can honestly say that I thought about what these songs meant to me. I really felt them." O

TOP PRIORITY NEWS

GOLD, GOLD EVERYWHERE—NEW GOLD, OLD GOLD: The RIAA, which always delights us this time of the month with a dazzling list of gold and platinum award winners, also chimed in with, yes, a list of the biggest gold album winners of all time. Where to begin?

Numbers of gold albums, in descending order:

Group: The Rolling Stones (34), the Beatles (25), Chicago (18), the Beach Boys and Kiss (17 each).

Solo, male: Elvis Presley (32), Elton John (24), Neil Diamond and Bob Dylan (21 each), and Kenny Rogers (20).

Solo, female: Barbra Streisand (29), Linda Ronstadt (16), Olivia Newton-John (13), and Donna Summer and Anne Murray (11 apiece).

Highest certified albums (multi platinum, in millions of units): Michael Jackson's Thriller (21 m), Fleetwood Mac's Rumours (13 m), The Eagles' Greatest Hits 1971-1975 and Bruce Springsteen's Born in the U.S.A. (12 m each), and Pink Floyd's Dark Side of the Moon and the Saturday Night Fever soundtrack (11 m apiece).

Well, that makes the items on this month's list look downright puny. The big winners—the two recent releases to soar to a multi-platinum level of 2 millionwere R.E.M.'s Out of Time and the debut album from the C&C Music Factory, Gonna Make You Sweat.

Getting into the platinum groove, with a bunch of catalogue items, were Paula Abdul's Spellbound, UB 40's Labour of Love II, Enya's Watermark, Luther Vandross' Power of Love, Michael Bolton's Time, Love & Tenderness, Extreme II's Pornograffiti and Amy Grant's Heart in Motion.

The Bolton, Vandross and Abdul all went gold as well last month, along with Jesus Jones's Doubt, Divinyls, John Barry's Dances with Wolves soundtrack, fIREHOUSE and Unchained Melody: The Best of the Righteous Brothers.

START SPREADING THE NEWS...: The Grammy Awards will return to New York City for a second consecutive year, the first time in Grammy history that New York has snared the ceremony two years running. The show, the 34th, will be telecast in late February from Radio City Music Hall, with Pierre

Cossette, naturalmente, producing.

TWO OTHER THINGS FOR YOU TO KNOW: Writing partners Dick Pasqual and James Merillat were named recipients of ASCAP's first Bernice Cohen Musical Theatre Award honoring creative achivements in musical theatre. They were honored for Exit Music and will split 500 bucks. They were eligible as participants in ASCAP's Musical Theatre Workshop... The McDonald Center of Scripps Memorial Hospitals and the Warner Music Group will host "Tropicana Night" at Fairbanks Raceway in Rancho Santa Fe, California, Aug. 24, to benefit the establishment of an Adolescent Long-Term Treatment Facility at Scripps for Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Treatment.

MUSIC REVIEWS

■ BIG DADDY KANE: "It's Hard Being The Kane" (Cold Chillin'/Reprise 9 21774-2)

This four-track CD single contains three mixes of 'It's Hard Being The Kane," a hardcore boasting rap song from Big Daddy Kane's Taste Of Chocolate. A new radio version, an extended remix and an instrumental version are followed by the message song "Who Am I."





OVERWEIGHT POOCH: "Ace Is A Spade" (A&M 75021 7544 2)

You have to give it up for this talented 20 year old, the Overweight Pooch. Raised in Manhattan, New York before relocating a couple years back to Phoenix, Arizona, Pooch didn't let the change from going from a big city to desert land change her. ~~"Ace Is ASpade," the first single from the female rapper Female Preacher, is basically a boasting song. But homegirl, who sounds somewhat like Roxanne Shante at times.

ORGANIZED KONFUSION: "Who Stole My Last Piece Of Chicken?" (Hollywood Basic PRCD-8384-2)

Hip-hop humor is in full effect on Organized Konfusion's "Who Stole My Last Piece Of Chicken?," which is as goofy as its title suggests. Meanwhile, "The Rough Side Of Town (Southside)," the other song on this four-track CD single, is a hard-hitting reflection on the crime and violence of inner-city life. Both songs were produced and mixed by Organized Konfusion.





■ TWO KINGS IN A CIPHER: "Definition of a King" (Bahia Entertainment RDJ 62002-2)

Two Kings In A Cipher have outdone themselves with their "Definition of a King." Bound together with a hard yet flexible mid-tempo beat, this single has the potential for radio, club and underground play. The lyrics put together for the song show the group's skill in writing a song with complex lyrics that are actually saying something unlike alot of artists now that are just saying anything that rhymes.

ARETHA FRANKLIN: What You See Is What You Sweat Arista ARCD-8626)

The Queen Of Soul's latest album, What You See Is What You Sweat is an R&B/pop effort that should fare well on both "urban" and CHR radio. Among the 10-track CD's potential hits are "Doctor's Orders," a mid-tempo duet with Luther Vandross; "Ever Changing Times," a duet with Michael McDonald; the techno-funk item "Mary Goes Round"; the sensuous ballad "Someone Else's Eyes"; and a cover of Sly & The Family Stone's "Everyday People."





FOREIGNER: Unusual Heat (Atlantic 7 82299)

Despite Lou Gramm's absence, Foreigner still sounds like Foreigner-something new lead vocalist Johnny Edwards, who'se very Gramm-ish, can take partial credit for. Unusual Heat, like previous Foreigner efforts, has both AOR and CHR appeal. The highly commercial 11-song CD ranges from the AOR-friendly "arena rock" of "Lowdown And Dirty" (the first single).

PICK OF THE WEEK

■ GLADYS KNIGHT: Good Woman (MCA MCAD-10329)

In the '90s, R&B veterans like Gladys Knight face the challenge of changing with the high-tech times while remaining true to themselves. A Pipless Knight meets the challenge head on and emerges artistically triumphant on Good Woman. As high-tech and contemporary-sounding as this solo album is, Knight remains true to the gritty blues-and-gospel basics that have made her singing

special since the early '60s.

Like her 1988 hits "Love Overboard" and "Lovin' On Next To Nothin',

"Cive May" upbeat, danceable cuts such as "Men," (the album's first single), "Give Me A Chance" (a duet with David Peaston) and "Meet Me In The Middle" (which contains a Flavor-Flav sample) are quite "urban contemporary"-sounding-yet the production doesn't smother Knight's powerful personality. And Knight fares equally well on the ballads "Superwoman" (which was previously recorded by Karyn White, and which finds Knight forming a trio with Patti LaBelle and Dionne Warwick), "Mr. Love," "In This Life," "If You Only Knew" and "Where Would I Be.'

NATALIE COLE: Unforgettable With Love

(Elektra 9 61049-2) Natalie Cole pays tribute to her legendary father Nat King Cole on Unforgettable With Love. Primarily, the 22-track CD underscores Nat's accomplishments as a pop star—Natalie embraces "Mona Lisa," "Nature Boy," "Too Young," "Unforgettable" and other classics that were major hits for him. But when Natalie applies her expressive, soulful vocals to "Straighten Up And Fly Right" and "Route 66," listeners are reminded of Nat's R&B efforts. And Billy Strayhorn's "Lush Life" underscores his contributions to jazz.



HEAVY D. & THE BOYZ: Peaceful Journey

(MCA D-10289)
Fourteen selections have been constructed for Peaceful Journey, rap posse Heavy D. & The Boyz' long-awaited follow-up to 2989's Big Tyme. The success of Big-Tyme, which crossed over to the pop charts worldwide and helped make him one of the most famous and loved rappers out today. Songs to look out for are "Now That We Found Love," which is already getting nationwide radio play; "Don't Curse," which addresses the whole censorship situation; and "Peaceful Journey."

YASMIN: Yasmin (Geffen GEFD-24411)

Yasmin's self-titled debut album is a promising collection of R&B/pop and dance music that sounds inspired and lacks the Reis/pop and dance music that sounds hispared and lakes the contrived qualities of much "urban contemporary" music. The 11-track CD's goodies include the smooth yet funky offerings "Stay" and "Confusion"; the caressing seductive slowjams "Remember You" and "Slow"; the house-influenced "Sacrifice"; and a jazz-influenced reading of the Gerschwin standard "Summer Coulded the Careford and Danced description. mertime." Producers Soulshock, Cutfather and Depete deserve applause—for as high-tech as things get, the use of real sax, real trumpet and real guitar is a definite plus.



■ PHYLLIS HYMAN: Prime Of My Life (Philadelphia International/ZOO/BMG 72445-11006-2)

Gamble & Huff's reactivated Philadelphia International label Gamble & Huff's reactivated Philadelphia International label is synonimous with quality R&B/soul, which is what you'll find plenty of on Phyllis Hyman's Prime Of My Life. The 10-track CD's strong points are its ballads—most noteably, "I've Found Love," "Meet Me On The Moon," "When I Give My Love (This Time)" and the melancholy "Living In Confusion." Producers include Nick Martinelli, Gamble, Roland Chambers and Marti Sharron, with Gamble & Huff serving as executive producers

PAULINHO DA COSTA: Breakdown (A&M

75021 5356 2) Percussionist Paulinho Da Costa has appeared on dozens of jazz, R&B and pop albums; Breakdown puts him in the driver's seat as a producer, arranger and songwriter. The vocals on Breakdown, which is basically an R&B/pop CD with Latin touches here and there, are handled by "newcomers" Peter Canada, Marsha Skidmore, Jimmy Varner and Darryl Phinnessee. The CD's strongest R&B/pop cuts are the caressing ballads "Let's Stay Friends" and 'I Believe You.'





WARREN HILL: Kiss Under The Moon (Novus/RCA 3117-2-N)

Quiet storm" and "new adult contemporary" programmers have plenty to choose from on pop-jazz saxophonist Warren Hill's Kiss Under The Moon. Hill, who plays both alto and soprano sax, is very much in the George Howard/Kenny G vein. "Take-Out Dreams," "Maybe Tomorrow," "Promises" and the title track are the type of light, innocuous instrumentals that fare well with those formats. And on the non-jazz tip, "One Touch" is a slick, Preston Glass-produced R&B cut featuring Craig Thomas on lead vocals, while "Waiting For A Love" is AC-friendly pop.

AIT FOR IT ON HOME VIDEO: Jimi Hendrix lived 27 of the most well-documented years in music history: if he did it, somebody seems to have taped it. Jimi Hendrix at the Isle of Wight is the name of a new film that is just that: an hour of Hendrix filmed 18 days before he died, the last concert he ever did. It's getting a theatrical release in town this month-it'll be at the Anthology Film Archives through July 14—and while, musically, it's certainly worth your time—Hendrix, the greatest improviser in rock history, improved steadily unitl he diedcinematically it's a flop. Okay, we don't expect much from a one-hour concert film—just show us the concert, man—but what director Murray Lerner does is give us Hendrix in excruciating facial close-ups. You want to see his guitar technique? Forget about it. You want to see his gum-chewing technique? You're there. Lerner, who apparently shot the entire Isle of Wight festival that year (the festival, you'll recall, was built around the return from seclusion of Bob Dylan), is best known for a legendary Academy Award-nominated documentary that I've never seen: Festival, which covers the Newport Folk Festival of the early '60s (including such Dylan footage as scenes from that first electric set in '65). Festival, by jingo, is also running at the Anthology Film Archives this month. I still haven't seen it, but as for the Hendrix film, it's okay—hey, it's an hour of Hendrix, what could be bad?—but, ultimately, it's annoying.

GO HEAR IT ON THE MOUNTAIN: Nothing like a weekend in the country to get your mind off the exhumation of dead presidents, pet cemetery scandals and brand name muggers (we've got a famous mugger in New York named Benji, but you probably know that already). From July 18-21, you can head up to the Berkshires for the eighth annual Winterhawk Bluegrass Festival. I'm one of those people who likes certain things in certain places: jazz in dank nightclubs, bouzouki music in Greek restaurants, and bluegrass in the country, amid hills and dales. The festival is located at the Rothvoss Farm, in Hillsdale, N.Y. (near where Mass., Conn. and N.Y. meet on Route 22) and, in bluegrass terms, the line-up's a killer: Alison Kraus, Tony Rice, Norman & Nancy Blake, Peter Rowan, Hazel Dickens, the Dillards, Riders in the Sky, etc. In typical weekend-in-the-country style, there'll be dances and children's activities and all sorts of other things. Interested? (513) 390-6211 is the number to call; otherwise, just show up with your resin and bow.

ROCKS AND GRAVEL: Me, I can't stomach Joe Jackson, but enough people can so that he sold out Radio City on July 15 and they've added another show on July 16. Also coming to the Music Hall: Keith Sweat (July 11), the Sisters of Mercy/Public Enemy/Gang of Four/Warrior Soul tour (July 24), and Diana Ross (Sept. 19-21)... Keep an eye peeled for Richard Thompson, who kicked off a U.S. tour last week (he's at the Ritz July 9), and keep an eye peeled for that woman playing guitar and singing in his band: it's Shawn Colvin... NPR's Bluesstage, which brings sweaty blues nightclubs from around America to a boom box near you, will celebrate Alligator Records' 20th anniversary next week by airing unreleased live recordings of Alligator artists, including Son Seals, Albert Collins, Koko Taylor, Lonnie Mack and Lonnie Brooks... Capitol Records has just added another of its classic Frank Sinatra albums to the CD bins: Á Swingin' Affair, the last Nelson Riddle Capitol to get the digital treatment.

ROCKERS REVISITED: "The only thing Grand Funk Railroad didn't have going for them was critical support," Greg Russo and Steve Kolanjian point out in the liner notes to a 15-track CD retrospective recently released as part of the Capitol Collectors Series. To be sure, those self-aggrandizing pseudo-intellectuals known as rock critics had little use for Grand Funk. Thus, ya gotta figure this CD has at least some redeeming qualities—well, in fact, is has bits of them. The disc contains Grand Funk's '70s mega-hits—"Were An American Band," "The Loco-Motion," "Shinin' On," "Bad Time," etc.—as well as the blues-rocker "Time Machine"; the eerie "Heartbreaker" (1969), the frenzied and metallic "Inside Looking Out" and an inspired remake of The Rolling Stones' "Gimme Shelter"... 

CASHBOX: How did you two come up with the name Damian Dame? DAME: The group consists of Damian's name and my name. His first name and my last name.

DAMIAN: Yeah, I play just about all the instruments, but my favorite one is the keyboard, I like the drums too. On later projects, I would be interested in doing the production definitly.

3rd Bass

BASS, BACK IN YOUR FACE—The trio which has given us such hits as "The Gas Face," "Step Into The A.M." and "Brooklyn Queens," recently released its second album *Derelicts of Dialect*. Basing their album on hard, movin' beats and tricky, but skillfully composed lyrics, 3rd Bass stand alone in the market of rap, or I should say traditional hip-hop, to exclude those "sold out" artists.

While speaking to 3rd Bass in a recent interview, I asked them what their opinion was on the success of commercialized rap compared to that of the hard traditional rappers and group member Richie Rich answered with "the commercial artists can have the catagory of rap music because were going to go back to original hip-hop, which is the true form of rap music. Hip-Hop is not just a music, it's a culture, a culture that the commercialized copy-cats have no idea about."

"On our first album," says Serch, "there were alot of hits that we recorded and we would like for that to definitly happen again. Every time they (record company executives) tried to abuse our album and make it commercial, it went more street. They tried to make "Brooklyn Queens" a big pop music record, but every time I heard the song it was in the clubs playing while bitches were getting freaked. The whole project got to a point where you would see sales figures and nobody knew where they were coming from because they were forgetting about the hood. Everyone forgot about Joe Neckbone who had two turntables in his basement and threw parties, we knew that so we released the "Product of the Enviornment" remix. The only thing the executives at the labels could say was 'Oh it's terrible, we don't know what to do with this record.' The whole thing got to a point where they started giving us the silent treatment, but to this day people play the sh*t out of "Brooklyn Queens." Now since the release of "Pop Goes The Weasel," the same people who were talking sh*t, act completly different."

Later in the conversation, we discussed how commercial rap is making it harder for hip-hop acts to break into the mainstream. Because of the increased success of crossover rap, the more underground, traditional hip-hop acts are getting pushed more and more to the background and have less and less presence. Rich commented on the situation, "It's always been hard for the real rap groups to make it, but now with all the commercial sh*t, it's even harder to break into the scene, which cheats the artists who work hard on originality."

Well, as for 3rd Bass themselves, they would like to take rap back to it's true roots and push the commercial (sellout bull) out the door, and they are already on their way with *Derelicts of Dialect*, which is climbing up the charts quite fast, proving that the original sound of hip hop is a viable, marketable 'product for the environment.'



Music Industry Creates Heavy Impact On TN Economy

WHILE THE ENTIRE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY creates an overall impact of an estimated \$2.5 billion figure for Tennessee's economy, the music business alone represents the largest segment with \$1.2 billion. Film and video production revenues were \$333 million, with the balance coming from live performances, support services and tourist attractions related to the music

Tennessee Governor Ned McWherter and the Tennessee Film, Entertainment and Music Commission recently announced such results from a two-year study of the entertainment industry's impact on Tennessee economy during 1990. Of the \$2.5 billion revenue, approximately 18,000 full-time jobs were also filled, according to a recent study conducted by the Business and Economic Research Center of Middle Tennessee State University.

"There are two key factors that are reflected in this study," says Gov. Mc-Wherter. "First, the entertainment industry is of major importance both to the economy and the international image and promotion of our state. Second, over 90 percent of the economic activity in this industry is created by firms permanently based in Tennessee."

Kicking off the festival will be Nagatani's own group, Charlie & The Cannonballs. A successful club owner, concert promoter and performer in his own right, Nagatani remains among Japan's most dedicated country music fans, and has helped establish country music as one of the fastest growing styles now enjoyed by Japanese listeners.

Trisha Yearwood

WE COULD PERHAPS COUNT ON ONE HAND the number of country female vocalists who've within the past five years knocked our socks off. Welcome to another barefoot return. New MCA recording artist Trisha Yearwood is knocking harder than ever with her debut single, "She's In Love With The Boy," and it would come as no surprise if this Monticello, Georgia gal comes out as the top winner of the hand.

Yearwood's description as a new artist spills out much more than a

"country gal with a powerful voice and a debut hit record"—it goes much deeper. Behind Yearwood's quick-hit success story, lies a thickly-bound deeper. Bening featwood's quick-fift success story, he's a lineary-boning photo album that's been around for quite a few years. A volume filled with pictures which expose a small-town country girl who played the character of Dorothy in her fifth grade class's production of the Wizard Of Oz, to filling the chair of receptionist at the now defunct MTM Records, to becoming one of the hottest demo singers in Nashville.

Before being signed to MCA Records just a few months ago, Yearwood had become a member of what she describes as "kind of a little click" of hopeful artists who were repeatedly being used for demo work. Among the group were Garth Brooks, Pam Tillis, Billy Dean, Joe Diffie and of course Yearwood, who was actually the last of the demo click to move on

"I'm from a small town in Georgia," explains Yearwood, "where nobody has ever attempted something like this. I made a deal with my parents—that if they would just send me to Nashville, I'd finish school. I went to Belmont College and got a degree in music business."

Although Yearwood spent hundreds of hours in the studio cutting demos and working with some of Nashville's top writers and producers, it was her first and only showers in which her formed that actually

Although Yearwood spent hundreds of hours in the studio cutting demos and working with some of Nashville's top writers and producers, it was her first and only showcase in which she performed that actually landed her a record deal with MCA. The showcase was the result of a chain introduction which included Garth Brooks, producer Allen Reynolds and producer Garth Fundis. "That night was kind of nerve-wracking, because I'd never done anything like that before." Despite her wrackened nerves, MCA A&R vp Tony Brown, approached her immediately following the stunning performance.

With only one cut shed from the can and still towering toward the top, Yearwood's debut album, entitled *Trisha Yearwood*, is already off to a screaming success story. MCA recently announced that due to the excitement from the initial response to her first single, they've tripled the initial orders of her album, which was released just last week.

"That was scary," admits Yearwood. "I sang so many demos that I thought how am I going to narrow this down to ten songs that say who I am?" When I moved here, I was singing with the radio, so I hadn't really developed my own style. Having to be creative with everybody else's songs really helped me to focus on my own style. Growing up, I imitated a lot of people. Probably... I think Linda Rondstat is the ultimate singer in the world. Her phrasing I think is really great."

The *Trisha Yearwood* project not only flaunts the singer's gutsy vocal chimes, but also presents a ten-tune package that has life's reality written all over it. Featured on the disc is the penmanship from such noted tunesmiths as Brooks, Pat Alger, Pat McLaughlin, Chuck Cannon and Gene & Paul Nelson. In addition are contributing vocals from artists like Vince Gill and Garth Brooks, and an unmatched energy and performance from Yearwood herself unleashing such favorites as "When Goodbye Was A Word (Other People Said)," "Like We Never Had A Broken Heart" and "Lonesome Dove."

Under the regal management force of Bob Doyle and Pam Lewis, Yearwood makes her tour debut this year as the opening act for none other than pal and collegue Garth Brooks—an endeavor that has Yearwood at the throne of challenge. "It's really amazing to me that he would take a chance on something that's so unknown, "Yearwood says. "I think the real challenge is going to be opening for Garth and making sure I've put on a good show."

Although Yearwood admits that much of her success is credited to Although Yearwood admits that much of her success is credited to those within the industry who have offered a helping hand, she's also the first to give her parents a major part of that credit. "The first time my mom heard my song on the radio, she called three times that day," laughs Yearwood. "Looking back, I realize how hard it must have been for them to let me go like that, even though they've always believed in me. I've just always dreamed of doing this, so I've always seen it in my mind, and I always felt like it would finally happen for me. Now, I just want people to know that I'm real and that I really believe in my music."



OUT OF THE BOX

■ JANN BROWNE: "It Only Hurts When I Laugh" (Curb 067)

The California country girl busts loose with this firey-tailed release. "It Only Hurts When I Laugh," which sparks the title cut from Jann Browne's latest project, drives with a racing tempo and instrumental licks that leave a trail of hot smoke. Still somewhat of a newcomer to many, Brown has certainly flaunted her vocal abilities with flying colors. With this hot cut, however, she unleashes a best-yet performance, while explaining how the memories of good times can often be the most painful following a break-up. "It Only Hurts When I Laugh" brings back the traditional qualities country music needs to keep alive, and brings us the hottest record from Janu Browne since "Tell Me Why."

Their first release entitled "Let's Talk Dirty In Hawaiin" gives us a sound definition of what music is all about: depth, talent, entertainment and an artistic ability to give and receive the freedom of expression through song and music. INDIE CD REVIEWS

ALBUMS

■ FREDDIE HUBBARD:

Bolivia (Musicmasters 5063-2-C)

Freddie Hubbard has recorded his share of dull pop-jazz over the years, but the vast majority of his hard bop and post-bop work shows why he's jazz' most exciting post-Clifford Brown trumpter. Bolivia—a 48-minute CD featuring Cedar Walton on piano, Ralph Moore on tenor and soprano sax, Vincent Herring on alto sax, David Williams on bass and Billy Higgins on drums-is no exception. Hub sounds inspired and passionate on Walton's happy, good-natured "Bolivia"; his Latin-flavored compositions "Homegrown" and "Managua"; "Dear John," Hub's ode to Mr. Coltrane; and a reading of Billie Holiday's "God Bless The Child." While Wynton Marsalis has shown a great deal of growth as a soloist, the digitally recorded Bolivia recorded, mixed and mastered digital-

■ JOHNNY LAW: Johnny Law (Metal Blade 9 26483-2)

Metal Blade has a non-metal CD in Johnny Law's self-titled debut album. The Austin, Texas rockers Johnny Law have been described as sounding like a "Texas bar band," and to be sure, there's nothing slick, glossy or overproduced about the 11-song CD. "Someone's Dead," "Too Weak To Fight," "Pieces Of The Bottle," "Don't Sacrifice," "We All Get Old" and other songs are raw, gritty '70s-style rock 'n'

roll. AOR programmers should jump all over Johnny Law if they haven't done so already.

■ SON SEALS: Living In The Danger Zone (Alligator ALCD 4798)

Son Seals has another collection of strongly soul-influenced Chicago blues and bluesy soul in Living In The Danger Zone. Seals' gutsy, expressive, Black-and-proud vocals work well on both aggressive, rockin' blues such as "Last Four Nickels," "Woman In Black," "Arkansas Woman," "I Just Can't Lose The Blues" and the slower blues of "Danger Zone" and "Tell It To Another Fool." The 11-song CD's standout track, however, is "Frigidaire Woman," a humorous attack on a cold bitch. Seals produced Living In The Danger Zone with Alligator founder Bruce Iglauer.

■ TAB SMITH: Jump Time (Delmark DD-447)

Jump Time, a CD containing 20 tracks recorded for the United label in 1951 and '52, shows two sides of alto/tenor saxophonist Tab Smith: the funky, groovin', blues-lovin' "rhythm-&-jazz" master heard on "Boogie Joogie," "Wig Song," "Down Beat" and "Deejay Special," and the romantic heard on "Sin," "Under A Blanket Of Blue," "All My Life" and other fine examples of his helled attribute. examples of his ballad style-a smooth, soulful approach clearly influenced by Johnny Hodges and the Swing Era yet cognizant of modernism. Although primarily an instrumentalist, Smith's suave vocals are heard on "Brown Baby" and "How Can You Say We're Through." Sidemen include Sonny Cohn on trumpet, Leon Washington on tenor sax, Lavern Dillon or Teddy Brannon on piano, Wilfred Middlebrooks on bass and Walter Johnson on drums.

■ LITTLE MILTON: Reality (Malaco MAL 7462 CD)

With Reality, Little Milton once again demonstrates that like B.B. King and Bobby Blue Bland, he's a first-rate blues singer who can also handle soul music quite well. Milton sings the blues like he means it on "Angel,"
"I'm Jealous Of Her Husband," "You Better Change Your Ways" and "A Right To Sing The Blues," and his credentials in the soul department are evident on Bobby Womack's "That's The Way I Feel About It," George Jackson's "I've Got To Remember" and "I Want My Baby Back"-all of which serve as reminders of just how richly absorbing R&B was in the '60s and '70s. This 10-track CD was produced by Malaco president Tommy Couch and studio partner Wolf Stephensen.

■ DAVE McKENNA:

Shadows 'N' Dreams (Concord Jazz CCD-4467)

Dave McKenna isn't one to beat you over the head with his chops-the lyrical acoustic jazz pianist certainly has chops, but tells meaningful, memorable stories without doing that.

On Shadows 'N' Dreams, an unaccompanied McKenna applies his sensuous fouch to standards, show tunes and pop classics containing the words "dream" or "shadow." Pseudo-intellectuals may call him a "cocktail pianist," but the fact is that his piano oozes with warmth on "You Stepped Out Of A Dream," "We Kiss In A Shadow," "Darn That Dream" and time-tested material.

■ FRANK ZAPPA: You Can't Do That On Stage Anymore, Vol. 4 (Rykodisc RCD 10087)

Like its predecessors, You Can't Do That On Stage Anymore, Vol.4 is a two-CD retrospective set focusing on live recordings by the eccentric yet brilliant Frank Zappa. Among the 34 goodies heard in the set, which spans 1969 to 1988, are "The Torture Never Stops" (1976), a tongue-in-cheek description of sado-masochism in a "dungeon of despair"; the outrageous "Willie The Pimp" (1984); "Disco Boy" (1982); the quasi-soul piece "Little Rubber Girl" (1979); "Let's Move To Cleveland" (1984), which features jazz tenor great Archie Shepp; "Truck Driver Divorce" (1984) and "My Guitar Wants To Kill Your Mama."

REBECCA COUPE FRANKS: Nighttime Daydreams (Justice JR 0901-2)

Promising jazz trumpeter Rebecca Coupe Franks keeps some impressive company on her debut album, Nighttime Daydreams—tenor giant Joe Henderson, pianist Kenny Barron, guitarist Leni Stern, bassist Buster Williams, drummer Ben Riley and percussionist Carolyn Brandy. The 28year-old improvisor takes an aggressive '60s-like post-bop approach on "U-Bitch," "Suit Of Armor," "Elephant Dreams" and other originals, but shows her more lyrical side on her ballads "Lydia" and "Soul-ful Betty, Fly." Nighttime Daydreams was produced by Randall Jamail, president of the Houston-based Justice Records—which can be reached at (713) 5420-6669 or (800) 762-4016.

■ LEEWAY: Desperate Measures (Profile PCD-1403)

If you bypass the death-metal of Deicide, Cannibal Corpse and Entombed in favor of the more accessible speed metalheads like Anthrax and DRI, thrash/punk posse Leeway's latest CD, Desperate Measures might be up your dark alley. Although slower and more melodic than Born To Expire, "The Future (Ain't What It Used To Be)," "Stand For," "Kingpin" and other sledgehammer cuts show that Leeway hasn't exactly turned into Bon Jovi or Trixter. At times, Desperate Measures sounds Black Sabbath-in-

WWRL AM: THE SPIRIT OF NEW YORK—It doesn't matter if it's day or night, if you want to hear God's Word or rejoice in good Gospel music, WWRL AM is on the air. The primary prerequisite to receiving this treat, however, is that you live in metropolitan New York or Newark, New Jersey. WWRL, a 5,000 watt, 24 hour station, is based in Queens,NY, and claims to be the nation's No.1 Gospel radio station.

WWRL is one of three African American owned and operated radio stations in the New York area. National Black Network Broadcasting, Inc. purchased WWRL in 1982. The format then was Inspirational music (Traditional Gospel,

Contemporary Christian, and secular music with positive lyrics).

WWRL's format was revised in 1983 to focus on Traditional Gospel music. "Several FM stations have pounced on crossover music (Gospel/secular) formats. An AM station such as ours cannot compete against high powered FM stations that play secular and crossover music," says WWRL vice president and general manager Vince Sanders. "The Inspirational format was not working for us. If we concentrate on playing Tramaine Hawkins or the Winans, if we play the same music they (FM stations) play, we can't win the battle for listeners. Switching to a Traditional Gospel music format gives us an edge. Traditional Gospel is the truest form of Gospel and has the most loyal following."

"They say there's not a lot of gospel tapes you can buy that have just instrumentals on them," says Byrd. "There are a lot of people in the church who don't want to go out and buy jazz. They really appreciate listening to this."

The Fight **For Display** In Secular **Stores**

EYE ON RETAIL

In store display space is limited and often reserved for people who have developed a rapport with the retailers. Top artists and the top 10 movers generally get first priority window space is concerned. Stores will use the album cover flats provided by record companies, but with LPs diminishing and CDs and cassettes increasing in sales, what will become of the tools needed for display? Will they come from CD and cassette boxes and/or posters if provided by the company?

Sometimes it is wise to get an ASR (account service representative) who understands how to design appealing displays for your gospel artists so that they may attain higher visibility. For gospel artist to get the proper exposure, they need to have the right merchandising tools to compete in the secular stores. Artists like BeBe & CeCe who have enjoyed pop and r&b success as well as gospel have the strong backing of a major record company that can expose them on two or three different levels effectively. It is certainly more difficult for artists on smaller, independent labels to compete at times.

ASCAP PRESENTS FOUNDERS AWARD TO JERRY LEIBER & MIKE STOLLER—Legendary songwriters Jerry Leiber & Mike Stoller were honored by ASCAP on June 27, in L.A. where ASCAP president Morton Gould presented them with the Society's prestigious Founders Award. The presentation was made before an audience of 600 music industry notables at a black-tie gala at the Hollywood Palladium celebrating Leiber & Stoller's 40th anniversary as songwriting collaborators. Gould recognized the songwriting duo as early pioneers of rock 'n' roll who influenced generations of music lovers and music makers worldwide, reflecting the goal's of ASCAP's founding fathers. A highlight of the evening was a special tribute performance of Leiber & Stoller hits by their original recording artists along with Billy Vera & The Beaters; Dion performed "Ruby Ruby" and "Drip Drop"; the Coasters performed "Searchin'," "Yakety Yak" and "Young Blood" and Miss Peggy Lee performed "I'm A Woman" and "Is That All There Is?" "Kansas City" was performed by veteran jazz and blues vocalist Ernie Watts. Among the prominent songwriters and recording artists on hand were ASCAP board members Sammy Cahn, Hal David, Arthur Hamilton and Johnny Mandel, David Byrne, Screamin' Jay Hawkins, Tom Kelly, Jay Livingston and Ray Evans, Jeff Lynne, Barry Mann & Cynthia Weill, John Sebastian and Diane Warren. Previous recipients of the ASCAP Founders Award include Bob Dylan, Paul McCartney, Smokey Robinson and Jules Styne...

SPOTLIGHT-JERRY LEIBER & MIKE STOLLER-If Elvis Presley was the king of rock and roll, then Jerry Leiber & Mike Stoller are certainly the court's highest ranking scribes. It's impossible to think of Elvis without thinking of "Hound Dog," "Treat Me Nice" or "Jailhouse Rock"—all creations from the pens and piano of Leiber & Stoller. To carry the analogy a step further, the choice for court jesters of the rock and roll kingdom would have to be the Coasters. Leiber & Stoller handled both the writing and production duties for all of the Coaster hits, including "Searchin'," "Young Blood," "Yakety Yak," "Charlie Brown," "Along Came Jones" and "Poison lvy." Elvis and the Coasters are only two of the acts whose careers skyrocketed because of Leiber & Stoller's crative partnership—a partnership which has lasted 40 years. Both born in 1933, they began their partnership in 1950 at the age of 17, when they discovered a similar interest in the lyrics and musical progressions of black music. By the time they were 20, they had seen their éarliest songs recorded by such artists as Jimmy Witherspoon, Little Esther, Linda Hopkins, Ray Charles and Wille Mae "Big Mama" Thornton, to name just a few. Their first in a series of major hits as both writers and producers began with "Big Mama" Thornton's recording of "Hound Dog" in 1953. That same year, along with Lester Sill, they formed Spark Records, a label with releases which included the Robins' "Riot In Cell Block #9" and "Smokey Joe's Cafe." Their production ablilities caught the ears of Ahmet Ertegun and Jerry Wexler of Atlantic Records, and in 1955 Atlantic signed them to what is reputedly the first independent record production deal. Their productions for Atlantic and its subsidiary Atco consistently hit the charts from '55 to '63. Aside from the Coasters' many hits, there were the Drifters' "Drip Drop," "There Goes My Baby," "Dance With Me," "Save The Last Dance For Me," "I Count The Tears," "On Broadway," and **Ben E. Kings**'s "Spanish Harlem," "I (Who Have Nothing)" and "Stand By Me," as well as hits by Ruth Brown, Joe Turner and La Vern Baker. Their productions were frequently revolutionary enough to change the way other label's records were made. Most notable their use of Latin rhythms and a string section beginning with the Drifter's "There Goes My Baby." Such eclectic musical and instrumental additions almost single-handedly ushered in the era of Soul music. During this same period, they produced records on such labels as RCA, Big Top, United Artists, Kapp, London, Scepter, MGM, Roulette, Wand and Tiger. While they were writing and producing hits for Jay & the Americans (whom I road managed), the Clovers, the Exciters and Sammy Turner, other artists were rapidly recording hits with their compositions. There was Wilbert Harrison with "Kansas City," Dion with "Ruby Baby," Peggy Lee with "I'm A Woman," the Cheers with "Black Denim Trousers & Motorcyle Boots" and Elvis with "Hound Dog." The combined energy of Elvis and the creative genius of Leiber & Stoller was the culmination of the creation of rock and roll. After his recording of "Hound Dog," Elvis was a household word. Over the next few years he would go on to record over 20 of their songs, including "Love Me," "Loving You," "Jailhouse Rock," "Treat Me Nice," "Don't" "(You're So Square) Baby, 1 Don't Care," "Fools Fall In

Love," "King Creole," "Trouble" and "She's Not You." In '64 teaming up with George Goldner to form Red Bird and Blue Cat Records, and along with songwriters Jeff Barry, Ellie Greenwich and George "Shadow" Morton, their hits for the labels included "Chapel Of Love," "Leader Of The Pack" and "The Boy From New York City." In the seventies they went abroad and produced hits with British rockers like Procol Harum, Elkie Brooks, and Stealers Wheel, providing an international hit with the latter's "Stuck In The Middle With You." From then till now their songs are always being covered and re-covered. For example, "Stand By Me" co-written by Ben E. King became the title of an '86 box-office smash and returned to the top ten, 25 years after its initial release. Currently, they are working on a Broadway musical, while a major motion picture studio is developing a movie based on their stories. Leiber and Stoller have been the recipients of many awards, including their induction into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1985, the Record Producers Hall of Fame in '86, and the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in '87. In '88, Elvis' recording of "Hound Dog" was placed in the Grammy Hall of Fame. But the greatest compliment to any songwriter is to have his songs recorded by the best in the business. Their list includes the Beatles, the Rolling Stones, the Beach Boys, James Brown, Little Richard, Jerry Lee Lewis, Buddy Holly, Fats Domino, the Everly Brothers, Bill Haley & the Comets, King Curtis, Barbra Streisand, Jimi Hendrix, Howlin' Wolf, Muddy Waters, Johnny Mathis, Count Basie, Mae West, Tom Jones, Lou Rawls, Billy Eckstein, Edith Piaf, Glen Campbell, Bobby Darin, Chet Atkins, Aretha Franklin, Herb Alpert, Otis Redding and literally hundreds more. Their contributions as songwriters and record producers have been so monumental that it is impossible to envision what today's music industry would have been like without them. I will never forget running home to turn on Alan Freed's radio show, to hear the "new sound" of the times—"Rythmn & Blues," which changed my life forever. I am grateful for the genius of Leiber & Stoller ...

Ops continue to buy cautiously and price consciously; likewise, distributors have had to totally evaluate equipment while adopting a "wait and see" attitude with respect to anything new that comes out. World Wide Dist. prexy Fred Skor, upon viewing the Taito Double Axle driving game prototype featured at the showing, was quite impressed. "It looked very good," he told us, adding an enthusiastic note with regard to what was secretly revealed, by Taito, behind closed doors at this meeting... Mondial's Tony Yula saw Sega's Time Traveler and told us it was "one of the most innovative products I have ever seen" and he hopes that "the collections are what they (Sega) claim them to be. If so, this could herald the next generation of video!"... When C.A. Robinson & Co. prexy Ira Bettelman looked at Sega's Time Traveler Hologram he immediately observed that "it was an improvement from what we saw in Vegas (at ACME '91)." His next comment was, "I am anxious to receive it and to

wow! NEXT UP from Williams (to follow Bride Of Pin Bot) is the Terminator 2 Judgment Day pin! ICMOA State Convention Draws Big Numbers

CHICAGO—Operators throughout Chicago, the suburbs and the state of Illinois made their way to the Drake Oak Brook Hotel to participate in the June 14-16 Illinois Coin Machine Operators Assn. (ICMOA) annual state convention. Pending legislation to legalize video lottery in the state of Illinois was a main reason for such a show of support.

Through the efforts of Ray Shroyer, chairman of the Illinois Video Lottery Committee, and ICMOA's executive director Adonna Jerman, the message has been brought home to operators via an ongoing series of regional meetings aimed at providing factual information and encouraging unification. This program received the full cooperation of manufacturers, who supplied the machines that were needed to "take on the road"; and distributors who made their facilities available as meeting sites

The original bill (H.R. 1976) was introduced this past April, under sponsorship of Zeke Giorgi, assistant House Majority Leader; and has since been amended on to a present bill to help speed up passage. As revealed at a three-hour Video

Lottery meeting that was held during the ICMOA convention, there has been some progress made in conveying to legislators the benefits of the machines as a source of state revenue. ICMOA lobbyists Zack Stamp and John O'Connell, who appeared on the panel along with Molly Donahue of Agenda Communications, have been promoting the bill in Congress (as "more of a concept," according to O'-Connell) and maintaining steady communications with the policy makers in the video lottery commission. At this point in time, fifty of the seventy-two House Democrats have indicated that they favor the legislation (sixty votes are needed for passage). Stamp gave an encouraging report regarding the

possibility of securing the remaining

votes required.

The second segment of this meeting saw a panel, composed of Gary Bennett (VLC), Kerry Reppert (IGT), John Nicastro (Williams), Sal Mirando (SMS Mfg.), Bill Ward (Arachnid), Scott Doherty (Merit), Mort Ansky (Kramer) and Jerry Young (IGT), who fielded questions from the operator assemblage, relating to the manufacturers' role in the video lottery arena. Some of the queries were a bit premature, others were relevant but the panel responded to each and every question posed and assured operators that there would be a library of games options to choose from once the legislation is passed and the machines go into production.

The Saturday afternoon agenda featured a presentation on redemption equipment, conducted by Art Warner, president of Coin Concepts, who gave a full analysis of this equipment category which has been enjoying steady growth in the marketplace.

Next up was the Manufacturers' Firing Line where operators were able to stand up and express their thoughts, grievances and suggestions. In this case, the prevailing climate was not so much heated as it was productive give and take. Moderator was former 1CMOA president Ed Velasquez (Velasquez Automatic Music); and panel members included Frank Cosentino (Atari), Joseph Dillon (Williams), Rene Lopez (Romstar), Frank Pellegrini (Konami), Gil Pollock (Premier Technology), Rick Rochetti (Taito America) and Gary Stern (Data East Pinball).

Once all of the business was attended to, the socializing was resumed, starting with a hospitality hour, followed by the banquet and awards ceremony, featuring AMOA president Jim Trucano as keynote speaker, the prize drawing and the popular PAC auction featuring Diane Seibert as auctioneer, with proceeds going to the Illinois Video Lottery
