

DOUG MORRIS TAKES HELM AT ATLANTIC

Atlantic Records President Doug Morris has been promoted to the newly-created position of President/Chief Operating Officer of that label.

New York native Morris has been with Atlantic since 1980. He has been in the music business since 1965, beginning as a songwriter for the Robert Mellin publishing firm. He went to Laurie Records as a writer and producer, and eventually became Vice President and General Manager for that company. In 1970 he formed Big Tree Records and introduced and had success with England Dan and Johnny Rivers, among many others.

After Atlantic bought Big Tree in 1978, Morris became President of Atco Records and Custom Labels and brought success to Atco in the form of solo ventures by The Who's Pete Townshend and Fleetwood Mac's Stevie Nicks. In 1980 he became President of Atlantic and his string of hits included AC/DC, Bette Midler and Laura Branigan to name but a very few.

"Doug Morris has been largely responsible for our company's record breaking success of the last decade," said Chairman Ahmet Ertegun in making the announcement. "It is with great joy that I am able to acknowledge his accomplishments with this important and meaningful promotion."

"This appointment is a well-deserved accolade," echoed Warner Communications Inc. Executive VP Robert J. Morgado, "but also a reflection of operational reality. ...His (Morris') executive stewardship alongside Ahmet Ertegun assures us at Warner Corporate that Atlantic's heritage will be protected and that its future will be provided."

JANG RETURNS NORTH TO KSJO



Said Jang, "I have lots of friends in the market, and they wanted my help at KSJO. It was a good opportunity to come back."

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

It's been one helluva summer at the movie box office-just ask most anyone in the business of selling records. Many attribute the summer's comparatively slow retail record picture to a seemingly endless number of blockbuster films. While most are made on budgets in the millions of dollars, the critically acclaimed "sex, lies and videotape," the brainchild of twenty-six year old Steven Sonderbergh as its director was a project reportedly completed for under two million dollars. The situation is similar, in a way, to the tremendous acceptance, earlier this year, of Tone Loc's "Wild Thing" which zoomed up the Top 40 while records that cost at least ten times as much to produce were gathering dust on a music director's shelf. And as some managers and PD's will tell you, simply outspending the competition is not always the answer. The common thread between movies like "sex, lies and videotape" and songs like "Wild Thing" is originality executed by people with a vision of the art they're attempting to create. There are many more examples of the "genuine article" but it's almost a given that right alongside them will be uninspired lackluster imitators. Beautiful artwork, elaborate staging of live performances, not to mention top-notch production, won't save an act that doesn't have the goods.

Can't keep those boys down as WAR-RANT takes the second single from their debut album to #1 this week. In doing so, they join 1989's other newcomers PAULA ABDUL and MARTIKA who also accomplished the difficult feat of going to the top with singles from debut LPs.

It's not often that songs debut in the twenties but this week we've got two of 'em. JANET JACKSON is already the most requested track at WQGN Groton, CT, where she moves 31-23. Also on fire at HOT 97 30-22, WCIL/FM debut #31 (only debut of the week) and the highest debuter at WSPK/FM #24. Top twenty at EAGLE106, WKSM, WNVZ, POWER 98, WHYT, KBQ, KRQ, KKSS, WKTI, KOZE, KS104, KROY, KMEL, KIIS/FM, KDON and KISS108.

Thanks to Annette M. Lai who filled in last week. I had an opportunity to take a week off, spending part of it housecleaning, which included doing some overdue record filing. In the midst of putting some gems away I cameacross my ROLLING STONES collection and realized I'd forgotten how many great albums they've released over the past twenty-five years. Their newest rates right up there among their best and the audience agrees. After only two days WBIZ Eau Claire, WI reports top five requests debuting at #17.

Charted #7 at KBQ St. Louis and #20 at both POWER 99 Atlanta and Q105 Tampa.



P.D. NOTEBOOK

MORE ON "THE JOB APPLICATION"

Last week's column responded to a reader's request that I discuss how to put an aircheck together for a job application—particularly for a job in a larger market than you're in now. We concentrated on the length and content of the aircheck.

A postscript to that: "The longer an aircheck looks, the less likely a PD is to hasten to listen to it. The standard aircheck today is on a tape cassette. In the days of reel-to-reel tapes, one could wind a custom length containing just the aircheck onto a small reel, and it would look as short as it was. Today, that telescoped aircheck may be on a C-60 or C-90 cassette, and will look longer than it is. If you must use a long cassette, do put the length on the label, along with your name, phone number and/or address. It will help you get the tape heard.

But why not use short cassettes to make the tape look short—and save money too? These are not readily available at Radio Shack, but they can cost you a lot less than commercial lengths. I suggest you write and ask for the tape cassette catalog from the Polyline Corporation, 1233 Rand Road, Des Plaines, IL 60016. They sell custom lengths (C-6, C-8, C-10, etc.) in blank shells for very low prices-often under \$50 for 100 tapes. There undoubtedly are other companies offering similar deals, but be sure you obtain quality tape!! It never pays to get a three-for-a-dollar pack of cassettes at the corner drugstore for this purpose; such prices at the retail level mean the tapes are very cheaply made, and commonly shed oxide on the recorder's heads. The fidelity will be poor, dropouts are common and you risk not only fouling your own heads (making subsequent recordings sounding very poor), but fouling the heads of the PD's machine as he or she listens to it! You impress no one by doing that. Quality tape stock is a must.

Another must is *never* to send your tape master. As noted in past columns, all too often the PD will not return your tape and with your master gone you have to come up with a new telescoped aircheck. And if you are then out of work, making a new aircheck may be difficult. *Never* send your master tape, regardless of a PD's promise to return it!

My correspondent asked "what advice would you offer someone wanting to explore opportunities in a larger market?"

Well, in addition to the contents of these last two columns, I'd note that in my experience, the more professional the applicant, the shorter and to-the-point is the application.

This not only applies to the aircheck, but to the resume and cover letter as well. The multi-pageresumes seem always to come from beginners! They also include a lot of irrelevant data, such as supermarket checking jobs held while attending school, etc. To the extent that such information is relevant, it can all be summarized in one sentence at the bottom of the resume.

Try to keep your resume to one page, with the most recent relevant job listed first, going back in time as you go down the page. If you have little broadcast experience, the PD will figure that out from the resume, regardless of length, so be brief. The cover letter should be short, too, but should contain some reason for the application, particularly if it is unsolicited. Why do you want to work for the station? Flattery of the obviously insincere type won't help. Be honest. Do you admire the air sound? Do you respect the PD's reputation? There must be some reason. On the other hand, if the only reason is "I want to make big bucks," maybe you should omit the reason!

And one closing thought. When I joined the Programming Department of KMPC in Los Angeles in the early '70s, I was amazed to discover that KMPC not only got far fewer applications, but worse ones too, than when I had been PD at KMBY/AM in Monterey, California. It developed that most of the interesting up-and-coming air talents felt KMPC too "exalted" a station to aspire to, and didn't bother sending in an application. What few applications we did receive came mostly from old-timers who felt that they had paid their dues and were now ready to "retire to KMPC." Since we didn't want to hire talent who would view the station as "retirement," we really had to beat the bushes to find the people we did hire. So, based on this and other experiences in large markets, I suggest you send an application to the stations you'd like to work at, regardless of market size, as soon as you are able to view yourself as a professional. You have nothing to lose but your aircheck! (And never send your master!)

FROM AFRICA: CHECKLIST FOR STARTING A BUSINESS

During the past few years I've had a few opportunities to work and travel in several African countries. Just last week I was going through some old files in my office and came across two documents which I picked up during one of my visits to Africa. Both of these documents were prepared by African and European businessmen who were attempting to teach native Africans the nuts and bolts of starting and maintaining a business. As I perused these papers, I was struck by their applicability to the American businessperson and entrepreneur. In that spirit, I'd like to summarize both documents for you. Next time we'll look at "Good Quality Salesmanship-What Does It Entail?" Today, we'll examine a "Checklist for Starting a Business," written by Mr. H. de Kock. Here's some common-sense advice from Africa:

1. What business should you choose?

Related questions: Who wants the service/ product you can provide? What specific knowledge and experiences do you bring into the picture? Should you include someone else who has more experience?

2. What are your chances for success?

Related questions: Are general business conditions good? Are current conditions (industry, customer-base, etc.) good in the business you plan?

3. What will be your return on investment?

Related questions: Do you know typical returns in the industry? How much will you have to invest? Are you satisfied that the rate of return on the money you invest in the business will be greater than the rate you would probably receive if you invested the money elsewhere?

4. How much money will you need?

Related questions: Do you have quoted prices on equipment and supplies? Do you know the cost of goods to be included in inventory? Have you carefully checked rents, wage scales, utilities and other pertinent costs? Do you know what percentage of your estimated sales your projected inventory and each expense item is? Have you compared those percentages with the typical percentages in the industry?

5. Where can you get money?

Related questions: How much money of your own can you put up? How much credit can you get from your suppliers? Do you know where else you can borrow money? Have you selected a progressive bank, and have you spoken with a banker who has an interested helpful attitude?

6. Where should you locate the business?

Related questions: Have you checked out the demographics, including potential customers, employees, and competitors? Have you satisfied yourself regarding utilities, parking facilities, police and fire protection, housing, taxes, and rents? Is there sufficient opportunity for growth and expansion?

7. How will you price your products and services?

Related questions: Do you have a good sense of your costs relative to prices? Do you know what competitors charge? Can you justify what you think the market will bear?

8. What selling methods will you use?

Related questions: Do you know the sales/ promotion methods of competitors? Do you know what customers want, and why they might want to buy your product or service?

9. How will you select and train personnel?

Related questions: Do you know where and how to recruit good people? Do you have and ongoing training and development plan for employees at all levels?

10. Have you made appropriate financial projections and considerations?

Related questions: Do you know what records (income, expenses, inventory, payroll, tax, etc.) you'll keep and how? Do you know which financial statements you'll need to prepare and do you know how to use them? Have you obtained standard operating ratios for your type of business which you can use as guides?

11. What laws will affect you?

Related questions: Are you aware of which forms and licenses you need to deal with at which times? Are you aware of regulations regarding police, health, insurance? What local, state, or federal ordinances and regulations might govern your business?

12. Will you keep up to date and improving?

Related questions: Have you set realistic but challenging goals and subgoals for yourself and your business? Have you specified dates when each goal is to be attained? Have you

anticipated potential obstacles? How will you keep up with improvements and trends in your industry?

Naturally, these dozen little points are not exhaustive. For example, the list does not include issues such as debt vs. equity financing, currency exchange fluctuations, interna-

tional competition and potential markets abroad, management passion and commitment, competent leadership, creating new products and services that are so innovative as to make comparisons with existing competitors less relevant, and so on. Still, the 12-point list can be very valuable for any bud-

ding entrepreneur, or just any person considering a start-up. It also demonstrates that there are some striking parallels between starting a business in Africa and starting a business in the good ol' U.S. of A!



DON WILLIAMS



fter writing, producing and playing with artists such as the Isley Brothers, New Edition and Jermaine Jackson, the multi-talented ensemble of David "Pic" Conley, Bernard Jackson and David Townsend, took the plunge and turned performers. Their 1986 debut album, "Surface," featured the smash crossover hit "Happy".

urrently Conley, Jackson, and Townsend's hard work is being rewarded by mass acceptance of their distinctive harmonics, dubbed by the group "the Surface sound." They are enjoying a string of top ten Urban singles from their most recent album 2nd Wave—most notably "I Missed" and "Closer Than Friends," a crossover sleeper. Currently, "Shower Me With Your Love" is nesting in the top ten on Top 40 charts and Surface's newer than new single, "You Are My Everything," is receiving a warm welcome from Urban radio.

uring the week of July 20, Surface's 2nd Wave album was certified Gold by the RIAA, and should earn platinum honors by fall. The material on the album is the group's most impressive effort to date. Its heart warming ballads and floor moving dance tunes have across-the-board appeal and the group is establishing a universal signature.

had the chance to speak with Bernard Jackson and David Townsend during a recent mini promotion tour.

BRIAN SAMSON: How did you come up with the name Surface?

BERNARD JACKSON: The name was being kicked around (laughs). What we usually tell people is that we rehearse in the basement, and want our music to get up to the first floor and out the door so it can get out. Actually, it was the name of a group David Conley had formed before any of us got together.

BS: What kind of musical background do each of you come from?

BJ: I'll give you a brief personal history and then I'll let David Townsend tell you about his start. I was born in Stamford, Connecticut. I started at the age of five just singing along with my mother at family get togethers. Even then I realized that people really appreciate my singing. At eight I was asked to perform with a live band at a pageant in front of three to four hundred



people. We did a couple of Jackson Five tunes. At that point I knew that I wanted to pursue a musiccareer because I enjoyed feeling the drama of performing in front of an audience.

DAVID TOWNSEND: My father had a lot to do with the start of my music career because he was a songwriter and producer, and his projects included Marvin Gaye's "Let's Get It On". My cousin, Bruce Fisher, wrote "You Are So Beautiful" and he had a big influence on my career. I come from a musical household. But I didn't take it seriously until I picked up the guitar. Until then I was determined to be a football player, but something about the guitar convinced me that I wanted to be a musician.

BS: I understand that each of you play a wide range of instruments.

DT: I play keyboards and guitars, and do most of the stuff on the album. Pic (David "Pic" Conley) handles a lot of the horns and percussion, and Bernard plays guitar and bass. We're all pretty versatile.

BS: You toured with the Isley Brothers.

DT: Ever since 1980 I've played guitar with them on the road every summer. It was a heck of an experience, because they are one of those groups that have been around forever and have produced hits ever since the sixties. My most memorable experience was when they picked the first song I ever wrote for their album "Inside You". The song is "First Love". I was really proud of that project, because The Isleys usually only record their own material.

BS: How did Surface evolve as a group?

BJ: The first Surface was created by David "Pic" Conley. It was a project he got together, and he and I wrote and produced. After that first group parted, Ilooked for a male vocalist to work with because "Pic" and I had a lot of unrecorded tracks. I heard that Bernard (Jackson) was the hottest thing in Connecticut, and was introduced to him through my uncle, his Godfather. After we were introduced it was like an instant chemistry—like a new Surface beginning to rise. We got together and wrote a couple of tunes.

BS: When the three of you got together did you have a preconceived idea of how you wanted Surface to sound?

DT: No, because we always looked at it from the standpoint of the "sky is the limit." The only thing that is preconceived is the message that we're trying to get across—to keep it posi-

tive. From our creative standpoint we believe in the "be yourself" philosophy. If you're true to your own sound people are going to recognize what you are, and when you establish that the public will be familiar with your signature. BS: There's a unique but sentimental sound to Surface's music. How do you describe your material?

BJ: We feel it's important to try to create a picture with our music in order to express our real feelings. For example, when I'm performing I like to close my eyes as if I'm expressing myself to someone without holding back anything. If my vocals do that then we've accomplished the magic.

BS: On your debut album, you released a series of ballads starting with "Let's Try Again". That was followed by "Happy" which crossed over, and then came "Lately". Was there a particular reason for debuting with a sequence of ballads instead of coming with an uptempo tune?

BJ: Not for us! We didn't have a particular reason for debuting with "Let's Try Again" except that it's easy to relate to. We credit the release of "Happy" and "Lately" to our listeners and to radio. We actually received letters from people asking when either of those tunes were going to be released. The last album really baffled us. Now on our current album "2nd Wave," we came with the uptempo approach

and took off with "I Missed".

BS: Does each group member contribute to the writing and producing of your material?

BJ: On the first album we all contributed to the writing and producing. On the "2nd Wave" album, there are about two or three songs that were co-written, but the rest of material on the album was either written by Surface or me alone.

BS: What other artists has Surface written and produced for?

BJ: We've composed material for Sister Sledge, Gwen Guthrie, Rebbie Jackson, New Edition, Isaac Hayes, Jermaine Jackson—the list goes on.

BS: What led Surface to performing?

BJ: First of all, I've always been a performer. When I met David Townsend my goal was to perform and cut records, but I think, then, he was more interested in writing and production. But once we got together with David Conley, the vibes were like it was meant for us to be out there getting' busy. As we grew into Surface, the group knew that I would be in the forefront and David and Pic would stand out with their writing and producing talents. It was inevitable that record companies notice where those tunes major acts were recording were coming from.

BS: What and who influences you?

BJ: It's hard to say. For me, there really isn't a particular source of influence simply because I'velived and grown upthrough different erasfrom the James Brown years right up to the entire Motown era. I guess I locked in with the R&B groups from the seventies in general. Isay that because you're going to be influenced by what radio and TV plays.

BS: What's your opinion of rap?

BJ: I wish I could do it like the rappers do! It's an art form—a new form of music that kids can call their own. Before that it was the rock n' roll era which we'll always have. Rap is a form of music that is definitely happening and should be heard and given its due. Recently Rap has been getting the respect it deserves, because it's not as easy to compose and not everybody can play it.

BS: How did you start composing for EMI Music?

BJ: After the three of us were together for weeks, David "Pic" Conley went to London and met with a lot of people from different

record and publishing companies just to make contacts. When he got back to the states he took the tape to Chuck Rowen & Don Pafione who were both at the New York offices of EMI Music. They liked a couple of tunes, and sent them to Nile Rodgers who used them for Sister Sledge. That's how it all began. Later on Gwen Guthrie picked up on one of our tunes and three months later New Edition jumped on our material. That's when EMI decided we could write, and they gave us one of those scary writer's deals. It wasn't like those regular deals when you get picked up by a record company—we got the type of deal that's called minimum wage!

BS: Do you produce?

BJ: Sometimes. Once we had the chance to produce Isaac Hayes. The more successful name you get as writer-producers, the more people will demand your sound. We've created our own unique sound—the Surface sound. To me, if you're out there giving away your sound then it's out there too much and can become redundant. I think what listeners enjoy

is hearing our sound on a Surface record, which only comes out once a year, and that's what I like. That's how the Isley Brothers survived all these years. After twenty-five years they're still pumping out hits. I know it may sound selfish, but the only way to make the hits is to keep 'em at home.

BS: Compare the "2nd Wave" album to your debut album "Surface"?

BJ: We just did a couple of songs right. On Black Shades and You Are My Everything, we collaborated with someone else on the writing and producing end. That's just one of the small changes we've made—but more or less it's still the Surface type of tunes. Actually, the only contrast to our last album was that we wrote and produced all of our own material.

BS: Describe the "2nd Wave" album.

BJ: Basically its the beginning of the second chapter of the Surface saga. I think this album contains a little bit of everything for everybody—the party people and the romancers.

BS: What are your feelings toward groups, particularly rap groups, using sampling and sequencing?

BJ: I think sampling is great, but not everybody can do it. If it works, it works. If it makes you



move who cares how it was done?

BS: What about your current tour. I understand it's a mini-tour?

BJ: Yes, were on a mini-tour right now. Covering all the secondary markets, we hope to jump on a major tour within the next month or so.

BS: What kind of response have you received so far?

BJ: (laughs) Oh man, it's definitely been all women. Actually, we've received a nice welcome from a broad age group and sometimes there's been places people haven't been able to

get in.

BS: What's been your biggest gig?

BJ: I think it would have to be our show at North Carolina A&T. There was about ten thousand people. On that show Sinbad, Kid n' Play and Ready For The World were on the bill as well.

BS: What's in store for Surface?

BJ: It would be nice for us to be millionaires some day. (laughs) But I think we've reached our goal. As far as the future is concerned, we would like to continue to reach for the surface.



In a year of comebacks, the BEE GEES have been among the most triumphant as their brilliant single, "One," nails down the top spot for the first #1 BEE GEES' single of the decade. A healthy 90% of all their airplay is in HEAVY rotation.

The only other underlined record among the top seven is CHER's "If I Could Turn Back Time." The song has done wonders for her career and the video is probably responsible for more Navy enlistments than any other video since "In The Navy" by The Village People. Just kiddin' folks. Her rotations lean well into HEAVY with 83% of all her stations in maximum.

The top seven remained so solid that both CUTTING CREW and DION, despite significant rotation increases, were held up momentarily at #8 and #9 respectively. The CREW added 20 HEAVY rotation reports and DION 30 HEAVY's.

SURFACE has moved 35 to 26 to 15 in the past two weeks and their HIT FACTOR is now a 72% (actually 87% from those on 'em for more than a week). Despite being at the back of a pack of eight straight underlines (#8-#15), expect the guys to leap frog most of the group next week.

Last week's TOP TIP, MICHAEL DAMIAN's "Was It Nothing At All" isagain number one MOST ADDED this week as 83 A/C stations have added it in the past two weeks. New ADDs include WMGL 3WM. WQTU, KXLK, WJON, KFYR, B100, WTPI, WTWR and KRNO/FM.



Our highest chart debut belongs to DAR-RYL TOOKES, who enters at number 35 with 23 ADDs and a 45% HIT FACTOR. New this week for WAHR, WZST, WTNY, WCVQ, KOKO, KWEB, KOEU and KUIC.

NEW GRASS REVIVAL: BREAKING THE BLUEGRASS BARRIER

A Conversation with Sam Bush

rtists trying to make it big in the Country Music Industry usually follow a pattern. They put a band together, try to get a major label contract, get a couple of radio hits, and then start touring. That was not the case with the New Grass Revival. The band was formed in 1971 and didn't have a major record deal until 1986. They have received substantial radio airplay only in the last two years, yet they are already touring 200+ days a year and have established quite a following. So what gives? Aren't they going about this all wrong?

According to the group's Sam Bush, they wouldn't change a thing, thank you. They're starting to add new Country fans to their already established following, they're beginning to be a familiar sound to the Country radio listener, and—after close to twenty years in the business—they are now considered one of Country music's most promising NEW bands. Their music, a blend of Country, rock, jazz, reggae, blues, gospel and yes, bluegrass, is as varied as the band's members themselves

The original New Grass consisted of Sam Bush on mandolin and fiddle, Courtney Johnson on banjo, Curtis Burch on guitar and Ebo Walker on bass. Bush is the only remaining member of the original group, or—as he jokingly puts it—"the only one dumb enough to stay in the band all this time." The only "Southern boy" in the group, Bush is considered the group's leader and spokesman. John Cowan joined the band in October of 1974. Originally from the Pittsburgh/Cleveland areas, Cowanisthegroup's bassist and lead vocalist. Manhattan-born September 1, 1989/the GAVIN REPORT

Bela Fleck joined the band in 1981 and is considered to be one of the world's best banjo players. Guitarist/songwriter Pat Flynn also joined the group in '81. Hailing from Los Angeles, he played for Dorsey Burnett and worked on recording sessions for producer Snuff Garrett.

After Bela and Pat joined the group, New Grass decided to leave their home base in Kentucky and test the waters in Nashville. "A lot of different things were starting to happen there," says Bush. "It's interesting that at the time we made our move there, trends in Country music were starting to change to accept more people. I don't think we have changed as much as Country music has expanded to include bands like us."

The term "bands like us" may be a strange one in relation to New Grass, because there may well be no other "bands like" the New Grass Revival. Bush explains, 'To a Country audience we're bluegrass, but a bluegrass audience looks at us and says, That's not bluegrass.' New Grass is a different kind of thing. Years ago, that may have been a stumbling block, but now I think it's more of an advantage. Bluegrass is getting more respect. We have a Grammy category now. We're in a great position because we've built up a cult following over the years that is not even a bluegrass audience. We were so different than the other bluegrass bands when we started that we really had to build up our own audience. Now we're trying to add to that audience as we enter the Country market, and hopefully our old fans will go along with us. It seems to be happening. And it's interesting—even though bluegrass fans might not think we play bluegrass, I know they reproud that we're one of the few bands to make a dent in the radio and video markets."

New Grass Revival can contribute their following and heavy tour schedule to their bluegrass background. It's helped them develop quite a name for themselves without extensive radio airplay. "We come from a bluegrass market, where the live show sells the records," explains Bush. "In other forms of music-Country, rock n roll, jazz, gospel—I think you find that the radio airplay sells the live shows. We've come from an area of music where the live shows come first. Now, in the last five years, we're trying to cross over into a market where you actually know the music before you see the show, where people can come in right off the bat and say, I heard those guys on the radio and now I want to see the band live."

So while they're trying to expand their audience to include the basic Country music fan, are they making any concessions musically? Is this band that's been known as a "musician's band" becoming more commercial? "Obviously we try to include a couple

of songs on each album that we think are singles in our own style," Bush responds. "That's how we're trying to be different. But we haven't changed that much. We've always made records pretty much the same way we make them now. There's a lot of acts that are now getting radio airplay that do use banjos and acoustic guitars and mandolins, but the main focus of the sound is not on those instruments. The way we do it the main focus of our sound—besides the vocals of course—is on the instruments we play. We use these instruments for our main thrust, for direction, whereas other people just kind of throw them in." The obvious difference on the band's most recent album, "Friday Night In America," was changing producers from Garth Fundis to Wendy Waldman. As Sam tells it, "Our association with Wendy started when Bela and I worked on the Forester Sisters' and Jonathan Edwards' LPs, which Wendy was producing. We really liked her energy. You go in the studio every day and sometimes you need somebody to get you a little bit up for the session. Wendy has a great positive attitude, not to mention she's a great singer. She also really knows what she's doing. She's a great vocal coach for us, and is really knowledgeable about harmony singing. She helped direct us with the song selection too, and choose some songs that are more lyrically oriented."

And finally, about being labeled "New Artists" after 18 years in the business. Doesn't that bother them? "No, I'm just glad to be mentioned in there somewhere," laughs Sam. "I think what they're referring to is that we're new to major labels and to Country radio. But there is no better compliment than to have someone who hasn't heard us before be blown away by something they heard. Plus, most 'New Artists' have been kicking around for years."

Have New Grass Revival found a home in the Country music format? Bush seems to think so. "It's a good time, a good growth period, for Country music. We've got all these new artists and there's still room for the old. We've still got Johnny Cash and Hank Snow that you can look up to and see the roots of Country music. Roy Acuff is still singing, Doc Watson still plays as good as he ever did. A few years ago I listened to rock n roll radio, but now I listen to Country radio more than any other format. A lot of the songs I used to hear on rock radio you'll now hear on some Country stations. The Country market has opened up so much."

JAZZ NEW RELEASES



(COLUMBIA)

Vibist Monte Croft delivers his debut album with the same intensified punch and fierce independence as Marcus Roberts did on his first Novus project. Though Croft is another discovery of Dr. George Butler (who in 1985 saw him sitting in with Wynton at the Village Vanguard), everything is composed and produced by the artist himself. While many see Croft as the keeper of the flame for Lionel Hampton, Milt Jackson and Bobby Hutcherson, Â Higher Fire takes on loftier Coltraneesqueambitions. On the opening track, "The


Money Players"—possibly named to salute the fine sidemen who pulled off these sessions in a mere four days—Croft casts pianist Mulgrew Miller in the McCoy Tyner role while Gene Jackson, an outstanding drummer, recreates those legendary rolling, swelling undercurrents that we associate with Elvin Jones. As a bonus, the two sophisticated vocal compositions, "Mandela" and "What Is Love," break up the set, are strongly molded from Stevie Wonder's Music Of My Mind, the album that jettisoned SW from Motown hitmaker to music visionary. Notice the record leaning against Croft's axe on the cover photo. A Higher Fire, and the sum of its parts—particularly the title track, "Escalator," "Vanessa Bing" and the aforementioned opener unveils a band that see thes with charisma and volatility. At last, a fire that really burns.

HOME AGAIN - THOM ROTELLA (DMP) Throughout this fine release Thom Rotella ambushes the listener with a flashy abundance of guitar overdubs and some cozy Southern California style quintet play. Apparently this is a reunion of sorts as Rotella returns to his native Los Angeles for a fresh perspective. The players on hand, including bassist Abraham Laboriel, drummer Carlos Vega and percussionist Lenny Castro, keep things slick but intriguing. Listeners will find Rotella's melodies endearing






and affable, particularly "Paradise Island" and "Gonna Love You." But it's Castro's knack for building the composition with a patchwork of guitar mosaics that's the main story here. On "The Long Walk" he opens with a basic acoustic guitar on the main theme, then adds a flock of overdubbed mandolins for orchestral embellishment. Even as the song winds down, Rotella scatters harmonic plucks and dampened electric leads for character and flavor. In the same vein, Castro contributes exacting percussive effects all across the sound canvas. For more improvised moments try "Journey."

CURRENT EVENTS (VERVE FORECAST/

Like the name suggests, Current Events has a ring of urgency to its ensemble arrangements. Keyboardist Darrell Grant writes all but two of the selections and fronts the four piece that consists of drums, bass, piano and guitar. Yet as Current Events keeps a sharp edge on the melody and solos, they pad things a bit by adding guest woodwind player Ken Anderson to each composition. Grant, a former pianist for Verve labelmate Betty Carter, doesn't make a full, exclusive Jazz commitment here. Instead Current Events is an eclectic stew pulling from funk, world, fusion, rock, Latin and Jazz with equal tugs. Tracks like "Tiger Walk" and "Black Angels" display the street smart capabilities of the band, while "The Roll" bops harder than anything else on the set. "Baranquilla" explores a more melodic side. Current Events will definitely keep you informed, especially if you keep the sound turned up.



THE ARMS OF LOVE - STEVE KUJALA (SONIC EDGE)

One day while Steve Kujala was practicing, he invented his own technique of playing and named it "fretless flute." This is best illustrated on the track "Together Again." Kujala lifts his fingers a certain way when he changes key positions causing the notes to blend into each other in an almost sliding, glissando fashion, similar the way a violin sounds without vibrato. Having fronted his own group, Auracle, Steve has also released a solo LP on CBS, toured for five years and played on four albums for Chick Corea's group. Adult Alternative programmers might want to key in on "Slow Nite Son" as well. It's something that could blend in nicely with, say, Free Flight's last top five CD. STRANGE CARGO - DAVID VAN

TIEGHEM (PRIVATE MUSIC)

Besides listening to keyboards and acoustic instruments, one of the highlights of the AA and Jazz formats is watching the growth and exploration of other forms of music, and specific instrumentation. Fans of the percussion project released a few months back by Michael Shrieve and David Beal will be in line (or should I say "on line") to enjoy percussionist David Van Tieghem's percussion expressions. Though not as purely "triggered" as the Shrieve / Beal project, Van Tieghem possesses a resourceful attitude towards

what constitutes percussion and household items and wherever the two shall meet. By combining clever synthesizing and samplings with plastic sticks, aftershave bottles, wine and milk bottles, cocktail shakers and amplified tennis rackets, Van Tieghem pushes the envelope. You have your choice between progressive pieces like "They Drive By Night" or a melodic entry like "Flying Hearts."



TERRA DO INDIO - MARCOS ARIEL (TROPICAL STORM/WEA LATINA)

Ah the international feel! The music of Marcos Ariel is far from a mellow Brazilian breeze. Ariel plays with the fury of newer artists like Michel Camilo. But, unlike Camilo, Ariel is unashamedly attached to the electric piano. On the opening title track, Ariel's four piece outfit burns with aggression as saxophonist Daniel Garcia leaves his body blasting both the solos and heads into hyperspace. Then there's the roomy drum sound as drummer Elcio Cafaro keeps his half of the bottom in constant motion while bassist Joao Baptista keeps up feverishly. If you need a quieter, though certainly not subdued, moment, try "Trem Das 7:00 (Seven O'Clock Train)." Terra Do Indio has both a live edge and a reflective studio polish that makes this effort an extraordinary listening experience. Turn it up, ferchrissakes! Could sound great at night.

HOTTEST NIGHT OF THE YEAR - MARK WINKLER (CHASE MUSIC GROUP)

Jazz-oriented vocalists are a rare commodity. Mark Winkler, who has made a good living writing for the likes of Randy Crawford, Liza Minnelli, Stephanie Mills and Rita Coolidge keeps a round of material for himself. Enlisting the West Coast Jazz/AA mafia (David Benoit, Russ Freeman, Dan Siegel and stray Rippingtons), Winkler may use electric pop instrumentation, but he can't hide his love for the odd Jazz feel. We think it's definitely the "chording" that separates singers like Winkler, Jarreau and Franks from the eighties brand of soul singers. As a lyricist, Winkler admits to a Jon Hendricks influence. We find merit in how the songs

drift from a pop/hook sensibility incorporating Jazzy solos and chord changes. Just hear what Winkler does to Ellington's "Satin Doll" or his own Jazz tribute "Takin' Chances" with its brash arrangement and brazen reference to Queen Ella, done in Ella/Hendricks-style scat.

LOGOSTHROUGH A SIDEMAN - DAVID

HAYES (GOLD CASTLE)

Playing bass with Van Morrison for many years obviously taught David Hayes a few key lessons in ambience, or as Hayes puts it, "filling me in on a few things." The music of Logos Through A Sideman features twelve audio tone poems that are grand-sounding and acoustic in nature. While the texture is expansive, none of the twelve extend themselves past the point where they either repeat themselves or wear out their welcomes. Rather than painting vapid "new age" landscapes, Hayes relies strongly on acoustic guitar chords and basic picking patterns with subtle, low bass lines. As I listened, I found my imagination drifting from the song title to my own personal sense of space and geography. Isn't it nice when music transforms you and takes you away? I know it sounds corny, but trax like "One Foggy Night," "Giant's Causeway" and "O'Connell Street" (which ventures "Into The Mystic") excel in a dark room.

THE INNOCENCE MISSION (A&M)

This four-piece features the vocals of Karen Peris, a progressive in the vein of Sarah McLachlan and 10,000 Maniacs' Natalie Merchant. Though such comparisons merely serve as a reference point from which to approach the music of bands such as The Innocence Mission, it must be said that their mission was certainly accomplished as far as originality and taste goes. While songs like "Curious" are singsongy, so too are they trance-like and weaving. Much of the material's movement (like on songs like "Clear To You") is sweeping and pendulum-like. Again, those stations looking for a special progressive nighttime ingredient, here's a new band that's well worth the investigation. The sound is bridled and controlled, yet free and airy. Among my favorites is "Mercy."

COLOR-RICK MARGITZA (BLUE NOTE) Currently on tour with Miles, Rick Margitza has the technical glide it takes to interest programmers who have succeeded with saxophonists like David Sanborn and Kirk Whalum. Yet the thrust of these arrangements border on traditional acoustic. Sevenstring guitarist Steve Masakowski and bassist Marc Johnson's contributions are almost subliminal. Margitza's debut is already getting lots of confident radio praise and airplay as he captures this week's Most Added honors on the Gavin Jazz chart. "Widow's Walk" is the expressive opener, featuring a unique self-duet on tenor (Margitza's primary instrument on this disc) and

soprano saxophones.

STEEL WHEELS - ROLLING STONES (ROLLING STONES/COLUMBIA)

I'm not one of those guys who automatically call every new Rolling Stones album "the best since Some Girls." First off, Some Girls was a united milestone of the Stones' post-London/Decca history. Secondly, many of the albums thereafter seemed to be a tug of war between splintering group politics and solo ambitions. During that period, the band was held together by chewing gum and contractual obligations. After Dirty Work, which spent one week in rabid home rotation and then, except for "Get Some Sleep Tonight," virtually disappeared, I decided to try to detach myself from the hoopla and strive for more rational judgment. Fortunately, Steel Wheels seems to have benefited from Jagger, Richards and Watts' getting in their licks as bandleaders. Those three are the absolute anchors of the Stones' sound. Their triumvirate focus has always been vital to the band's success. And while programmers are immediately biting on the opening "Sad Sad Sad," Steel Wheels, for me, started at track three with "Terrifying," and continued on with such groove-oriented highlights as "Hearts For Sale" and "Rock And A Hard Place." Keith checks in nicely with the incognito "Can't Be Seen" while the whole band expands themselves on the countrified "Blinded By Love" and the international "Continental Drift," which features the musicians of Jajouka, who were, ironically, the very first Rolling Stones Records artists, released and recorded by the late Brian Jones. Almost an hour of solid music, Steel Wheels is sounding better and better after as many plays in two days as Dirty Work got in my house all those years. I'm souled. Notice that I haven't even mentioned the impact of the t-o-u-r.

LEGACY - POCO (RCA)

Richie Furay nicely outlines the Poco "legacy" on the first song, "Where It All Began," Because San Francisco-based promoter Bill Graham was such a Poco fan, I was fortunate to see the original band perform many times. They were always sandwiched between many

interesting and bizarre acts on three and four band bills. Like the song says, the band and the audience always had a reciprocal glow. And while they achieved their greatest financial success during the ABC/"Crazy Love" era, I still hold the first two Poco Country-pop fusions in high esteem. Of course Legacy can never completely relive or revive that magic. nor should it. Instead, it's a patchwork of all the Poco ingredients: Rusty Young's moody vocals. Richie Furav's even temper. Randy Meisner's new rock direction. George Grantham's steady drumming and Jimmy Messina's introspective optimism. Trax include "When It All Began," "Call It Love," "Lovin' You Every Minute" and "The Nature Of Love."



MICHAEL MONROE (MERCURY/ POLYGRAM)

Anyone who remembers Hanoi Rocks knows that after a fatal car crash, the plug was prematurely pulled on this band. Michael Monroe is back as a solo singer—more precisely, a shouter in the tradition of New York Doll David Johansen or Billy Idol. I cite the Dolls because of the bluesy/Chuck Berry edge that, like the Dolls, Hanoi Rocks copped from the Stones. Besides covering "Not Fakin' It," (originally cut by another raspy voice, Dan McCafferty of Nazareth), there's Little Steven's "While You Were Looking At Me" and a Steven/Monroe collaboration, "Dead, Jail Or Rock N Roll." Quite a choice. I'll still take rock n roll.

"WAITING FOR YOU" - BONHAM (WTG/CBS) Jason Bonham goes to Kashmir via "Waiting For You." And like such second generation artists like Julian Lennon and Ziggy Marley. Jason Bonham's music (particularly his backbeat) has the eerie quality of the Zeppelin legacy. Since you're going to be playing this one at night, why not give the full seven minute version a try? As a composition (with a long two minute intro), the song takes risks and reaches some rather dynamic plateaus. Otherwise you can always take the short route.


COCKED AND LOADED - L.A. GUNS (VERTIGO/POLYGRAM)

If Clairol and black leather were death, L.A. Guns would be goners. Guitarists Tracii Guns and Nick Cripps (now there's a dangerous Los Angeles name) gang up on a total of fourteen songs to the tune of high energy and hi dB hard rock brain rot. Like those other guys from the LA streets, L.A. Guns cater to the runaways, the don'twannabees, the disenfranchised consumers and radio listeners-you know, the ones that bought Appetite For Destruction en masse. L.A. Guns attempt the same high wire act, trying to take it from the mean city streets to the suburban bedrooms where Johnny can't read, but he sure can rock. Don't say you weren't warned. Trax: "Letting Go" into "Slap In The Face" and "Rip And Tear" just for starters.

"C'MON" -FLIES ON FIRE (ATCO)

More bluesy American rock n roll, "C'mon," though written by one T. Paruszkiewicz (you pronounce it), sounds freshly derived from the late, great Slim Harpo. The name is Flies On Fire, as in zippers rather than picnic pests. WHEN JUSTICE CAME - BLACK VELVET BAND

(ELEKTRA ENTERTAINMENT) An interesting blend of backgrounds clashing here. That is, Dublin's Black Velvet Band meets producer Pete Anderson, who works with American acts like Dwight Yoakam and Michelle Shocked. When Justice Came offers something you don't hear too oftenconsistency. I marked off the following goodies in order of appearance—"When Justice Comes," "Old Man Stone," "Walking Down River Road" and "Domino" (no relation to Van The Man). The writer in this quartet is Kieran Kennedy, and he's quite a talented new writer. KZ



INSIDE ALBUM by Kent Zimmerman

CHART TALK, First off, here's the list of Rolling Stones trax mentioned this week. I'll list them in order of most mentions starting with the single, "Mixed Emotions," "Sad Sad Sad," "Terrifying," and "Rock And A Hard Place." After a big drop-off comes the following songs, "Blinded By Love," "Almost Hear You Sigh," "Hold On To Your Hat" (reported by the neo-punks out there) and a special mention to Magic Mike at KLAQ, who added "Continental Drift."

FIRMING UP. After quite a few weeks of soft charts, our Top Fifty firms up with the recent spurt of prime releases. While the Stones debut technically at number one, other monsters include the reformed Poco, Joe Cocker, Aerosmith, Starship, the Cure and a thirty point leap by Tears For Fears, who also captured Top Forty's Most Added honors this week. As for our highest debuts (besides the Stones), you'll notice that while the Alarm narrowly edged out Melissa Etheridge in the Most Added race, Melissa outdebuted the Alarm by one slot at #26. Why? Most Added is determined by total airplay mentions. The position on the chart is determined by total rotation points, in which Melissa had a slight edge. My bets are that both are bound for the Top Ten, possibly as early as next chart, which should make a pretty interesting crowd scene. When you've got underlined records like George Harrison/Lethal Weapon 2, Poco, Joe Cocker, Aerosmith, Starship, Trevor Rabin, The Cure and Tears For Fears, along with Melissa and the Alarm, it squeezes out records like Texas and Jackson Browne, who would have had more Top Ten time if the competition was a little less intense.

UP AND COMERS. Look out for Jethro Tull. Their debut at #48 is actually quite an accomplishment when you consider that they haven't even yet gathered much rotation, since people are just getting the single. Response has been monsterous, so expect Tull to perform much like Tears, Starship and Poco did this week when next week's stats roll in...The fact that bassist Tony Levin was felled by hepatitis put a temporary crimp in the Anderson, Bruford, Wakeman and Howe tour. Four dates have been postponed, and while the tour will resume on September 6th with six California dates, one being a cable pay television gig. Meanwhile the album reversed itself, moving 35-30... I still feel that James McMurtry's album is the best album I've heard all year. John Mellencamp's production is outstanding without creating a Cougar Clone. James debuts at #41...If you're wondering why Elton John has been mellow on the Album Radio side of things, bear in mind that this new one is an album of ballads titled Sleeping With The Past. Elton debuts at #50.

BYRDS (IMAGINARY/COMMUNION/ SKYCLAD)

Since I'm in an ornery, argumentative mood and I can't find much fault with the music on this Byrd tribute, let's quibble over the liner notes. I know that to most of you Alternative broadcasters (at least those college broadcasters not cramming themselves into phone booths, swallowing gold fish, wearing racoon coats, strumming ukeleles or stuffing your ugly faces with Camper Van Beethoven key lime pie) the Byrds are ancient history. Okay, you can call them an institution, refer to them as pioneers, but don't EVER use the word "genre" or coyly refer to drug use among record buyers in the sixties. That was allalie.Infact, Roger McGuinn claims "Eight Miles High" REALLY WAS about flying, and that Bill Gavin bum rapped the band when he panned the single. Years ago, people into drugs listened to other people's records, or worse yet, the borrowed my records and scratched them up. Goddammit, I'm pretty POed about what they did to my copy of Younger Than Yesterday. So I'll just jettison my brain cells into the present and settle for the Mock Turtles' version of "Why." P.S. Does anyone remember when it was just "Jim" McGuinn. All that Roger stuff started when the band went Country.

DISH - ASEXUALS (CARGO)

Lemme guess, that's Onionhead on the cover doing an impression of Peter Standish. Or is that Todd Bisson? Now can you imagine the action a band like Asexuals get on those long, lonely road trips across the Canadian prairie, passing through the towns that have a population of forty-five yet have hockey arenas that hold twelve thousand? Dish is an album that would have sounded precisely the same even if they had dumped another \$340,000 into the mix. Notice the absence of Synclaviers and orchestral arrangements. Getting back to the name of the band, since they truly are asexual, when you're tracking the album, think of the songs in terms of asexual objects like twin beds, stained glass windows, religious icons and Fleetwood Mac. ALBUMS by Ron Fell

ROLLING STONES-Steel Wheels

(Rolling Stones)

Hell's bellringers are back, makin' exciting music. Collectively these five guys are 233 years old, yet they play with the youthful spunk of mere centurians. Fondness for the groove of roots rock, both black and blue, coupled with their innate sense of place and attitude, are their trademarks. The first listen to a new Stones album is always exciting. Keith will almost always come up with a new riff or two and Mick's diabolic dissertations on the lust for life are always grist for the music mill. But unlike recent solo efforts and the current decade's group efforts, Steel Wheels survives the curiosity factor and their own hype to bear repeated auditions. Lyrically, the lead single, MIXED EMOTIONS, continues the intra-family feud which originally fractured the Glimmer Twins, but near the end of the song the guy with the extra large lips wags for all to hear, "Let's go out dancing. Let's rock 'n' roll." I like happy endings. The opener, SAD, SAD, SAD, begins the frenzy in the same way START ME UP ignited their last good album, Tatoo You. TERRIFYING is an hypnotic zoofull of beastly metaphors. And by the sixth track, Steel Wheels has taken us to some bordertown

(southwest of Spanish Harlem) for a fiddlin' look at the romance of royalty. Probably the most exotic track of the set is CONTINENTAL DRIFT with its Morrocanambience and a lyric which, for the life of me, I can't associate with its title. Anyway, it's only rock n roll!!

ELTON JOHN- Sleeping With The Past (MCA)

The liner notes from Elton and Bernie state, "These songs were inspired by the soul pioneers of the sixties and seventies, whose music meant so much to us." So I'm expecting more Thom Bell/Linda Creed stuff or maybe another BENNIE AND THE JETS. But I don't hear it. Such a dedication threw me a curve, but I really like the album anyway. It's a patient, thoughtful set with good core melodies from Elton and the usual taut thoughts from wordsmith Bernie Taupin. DURBAN DEEP evokes a sympathetic chord for the Black coalminers of South Africa. The single, HEALING HANDS, borders on pop gospel without the evangelism. Protecting his credibility as a rocker, EJ has to rock, but if he can be forgiven for letting his pace down, we can appreciate two beautiful slow songs: WHISPERS and SACRIFICES. Then later on down the road the soul surfaces in



full bloom with the track AMAZES ME, as Elton is reborn if not born again from the effects of the pale light of a "fat yellow moon" and the hoodoo of a sweet mama.


