IMPACT DEBUT



MCA Records and Left Bank Music this week announced the formation of Impact Records, to be headed up by CEO Allen Kovac. Currently, Kovac is co-owner of Left Bank Management. Impact will be a subsidiary of MCA.

"The establishment of Impact Records represents an important new phase in my music business career," said Kovac, who's guided the careers of such acts as Richard Marx, Ratt and Vixen. "I'm confident that, along with MCA, we will be creating a distinctive label of both talented newcomers and already established artists."

The first band to release an album on Impact is The Fixx, whose record will hit the streets in mid-February.

Said MCA Chairman Al Teller: "Allen Kovac is a music business entrepreneur who has achieved success in all areas of the business. We are very excited to join with him in his new label venture."

Borchetta to MCA/Nashville

In Nashville this week former indie promotion man Scott Borchetta was named Vice President of National Promotion, MCA/Nashville.

Immediately prior to this appointment, Borchetta headed up Scott Borchetta Promotions, which handled Mary Stuart, The Kentucky Headhunters and Carlene Carter. Borchetta also worked as National Promotion Director at MTM Records, and headed up the Country, A/C and Album Radio Departments at that label.

"Scott has proven himself to me through his independent promotion of MCA product," said company Vice President of Promotion Shelia Shipley. "His addition to my staff will round out what I believe is the best team on the street."

DRISCOLL SHIFTS DIRECTIONS

The big news in Philadelphia is that WIOQ Operations Manager Mark Driscoll has dropped his programming responsibilities and inked a two-year deal to be Creative Director for the station's parent company, EZ Communications.

"It's business as usual with Mark at this radio station," said General Manager Gil Rozzo, who told the Gavin Report that the Operations Manager position

will not be filled. "Mark has been very influential in getting this station to the position it's in in this market. We don't care to lose his input. We've worked out a deal with him where he'll continue to be part of the puzzle here."

Continuing as Program Director at WIOQ is John Roberts. According to Rozzo, Driscoll will work out of the WIOQ studios.

ON MANAGEMENT

WAR:

A MANAGEMENT ISSUE FOR RADIO?

I felt a little empty as I watched the Forty Niner/Giants game. Whether or not Congress has officially declared war, we're in one right now, and this one isn't going to be a quickie soundbite skirmish like in Grenada and Panama. I'm not suggesting that the football games should have been cancelled: after all, theatres and nightclubs are still open. Life goes on. Yet the notion of "business as usual" doesn't seem right either. And in fact, even those who would espouse "business as usual" can't control peoples' emotions and awareness. We know that next to war, things like football and Arbitron ratings are pretty unimportant.

I wonder if radio can do something about this. It seems to me that by and large, radio stations nowadays are pretty much doing business as usual. Other than more frequent newsblips and an occasional encouraging word, the same music and the same promotions and the same dj commentary goes on. I think that's a mistake, from both an ethical and a marketing perspective. Accordingly, I've got some naive ideas about moral responsibility and business opportunity that I'd like to throw out for your consideration.

The moral responsibility issue is based on the fact that airwaves are a precious commodity. Radio stations have access to airwaves. Therefore, does a radio station have some responsibility to use those airwaves actively to help inform and mobilize a country in times of war? Some would even take it a step further and argue that an organization that has access to airwaves should help unite a country in times of war.

The business opportunity issue is based on the fact that effective organizations always try to take advantage of events in order to buttress their own position. The questions managers ask is this: How can I take advantage of events—even war—to gather more customers, ultimately enhancing my market share and earnings? At first glance, this may sound cold-blooded, but I would argue that any manager has a fiduciary responsibility to think about that question at all times. Radio stations are not charities. However, and here's the kicker: I would argue that the questions about moral responsibility and business opportunity are not mutually exclusive; in fact, they are one and the same.

The avid interest in the Persian Gulf is by no means limited to Washington and New York. It's all across the nation. I just came back from a business trip in a small rural community in southern Oregon. People there were intensely and emotionally concerned about what's going on in the Persian Gulf. Many know people who are over there. I found many of them wedded to their radios and TVs. If in fact the

interest is that high, doesn't it make sense—from both a moral and marketing perspective—to address that need? By focusing on peoples' need to know in an innovative, listener-pleasing way, wouldn't a radio station not only be fulfilling its moral responsibility but also solidifying its current customer base and in fact adding to it?

I'm not talking about adding a few more news bulletins during the day, although that may indeed be part of the process. I'm talking about focusing your creative juices on the total problem at hand. For example, consider a hypothetical Country station KXYZ. Here's what it might do:

- Offer frequent dedications of songs to particular soldiers, sailors or marines. On the air, introduce and describe the intended receiver of the message (thus personalizing the war), have the person dedicating the song provide a short message to the receiver on the air, and then after playing the song send a cassette copy of everything (encased in KXYZ logo) to the GI. Do this frequently 24 hours a day, or however long the station broadcasts.

- Why stop with that one cassette? How about sending a promo pack of additional cassettes to that particular GI? KXYZ is inundated with promotional cassettes and CDs from labels anyway. Send them over to Saudi Arabia in a brightly colored KXYZ care package. The record companies shouldn't mind; besides, it's good PR for them too. In fact, hustle the labels to send you even more cassettes that you can then mail to the Gulf.

- Adopt a particular unit of soldiers or airmen. Send them letters, music, sand-proof cassette decks and CD players (do they exist?), and so on. Read your letters to them and their replies on the air.

- Organize telephone hookups between listeners and our men and women in uniform. Play them on the air, either fully or as edited versions. Get their requests and play them. Crazy thought: Can you get a dj over there to conduct interviews and actually broadcast

from Saudi Arabia?

- Get the artists involved. Interview Clint Black and Reba McEntire. Don't just ask softball questions. See if you can get your listeners in a live dialogue with them. See if you can get the artists to cut a special tape for your sponsored unit (see above). Can you imagine sending a KXYZ tape of Hank Williams Jr. doing a couple of customized songs for a particular unit, or for everyone serving in the Gulf? Take it even further: See if you can get Willie and Waylon to do a free concert, sponsored by KXYZ of course, and beamed directly to the men and women over there.

- Organize a local live concert sponsored by KXYZ. Get a big star and/or a group of local musicians to do it *pro bono*. Proceeds go to buy things to make our troops' lives easier, or to mail packages of goodies that those in attendance have brought for the troops.

- Encourage ventilation by your listeners. Give them short but frequent opportunities to talk and debate the issues. Nearly everyone supports our troops who are out there, but many have very reasonable doubts about the wisdom of our being there at all. Why not encourage some healthy, even acrimonious debate? It's a lot more real that some of the bland pap that appears on the airwaves nowadays. Remember that controversial talk shows—even sports related talk shows—have lots of listeners. Another idea: Leave a KXYZ number where listeners can call in and leave a pre-recorded message about their opinions and thoughts about the crisis. Play bits and pieces throughout the day. Perhaps what this means for KXYZ is that the station figures out ways to air differing viewpoints about the Persian Gulf crisis and then attempts to reconcile them.

Space considerations mean that I've got to quit here, but I hope you see what I'm getting at. Moral responsibilities and marketing opportunities are one and the same. Research indicates that in the long haul, the firms that attempt to conduct their businesses in an ethical fashion are those that are the more financially successful. As always, the goal is to satisfy your customers' needs and desires in the most innovative ways. Do it right during the war and you'll be building a customer base that'll stay loyal after the war. Prepare to invest some real time and money into this. I'm certainly no expert, but based on my own experiences in the Mideast, I seriously doubt that this war is going to be a short one. I'm not even sure it'll be "over" by Super Bowl time—and I mean 1992 Super Bowl time. So we're talking about a long-term issue. How well we position ourselves right now for the long haul will help determine our performance ethically and financially. ●

TWO PRODUCTION TRICKS FROM CHUCK BLORE

Chuck Blore became prominent in radio in the late 1950s as the Program Director for Crowell-Collier's KFVB in Los Angeles—probably the most successful “imitation McLendon” Top 40 station there ever was. As Los Angeles moved into the '60s, KFVB reportedly had a cume of *five million* weekly—a cume no L.A. station since has even approached, despite a substantial increase in the population. The station was so successful that when Crowell-Collier bought KLX in Oakland, California to introduce the same format there, at the same time Gordon McLendon bought KROW, also in Oakland and decided a Top 40 battle was not worth the effort. As a result, KLX became KEWB, with DJs like Gary Owens and Casey Kasem, and KROW became KABL, and McLendon invented his second fabulously successful radio format—“beautiful music.”

Blore has, since then, become even more well-known as the creator of many warm and/or funny, and very effective radio commercials, and he remains very active in this field. He's one of radio's most effective commercial minds.

In November of 1974, Chuck conducted a session on production at the Bill Gavin Radio Programming Conference, and I still use a tape of that session to teach radio broadcasting.

The whole session stimulated the imagination, but one point from the talk, and one from afterward, is the subject of this week's column.

Blore makes heavy use of interview settings—on the street or on the phone. He pointed out that it is essential, when you are using an interview setting for a spot, that the person being interviewed must not fully understand what you are going to do with the tape. If they learn, they are going to be participating in a

commercial, they start *acting* like they're in a commercial, and stop sounding natural. That being the case, the interviewer may have to go on asking questions at some length before getting all the audio bits needed to assemble the spot.

For on-the-street interviews, in which background sounds are constantly changing, Blore pointed out that the necessary edits to condense the interview into the spot will be very obvious as the background sounds abruptly change level and texture. He suggested running the cassette machine for two or three minutes at that location, nothing being said, just picking up background sound, and then putting that audio under the edited interview—at a fairly high level—to mask the changes in the background sound in the original edited interview. (It may be necessary to equalize and/or use audio compression on the interview track to keep it fully intelligible in this louder background track).

The use of fairly loud natural background sound tape—from such places as stores and supermarkets, etc.—can also make for a very “on-location-sounding” spot done in the studio, too. The recordings you make yourself in this way also usually sound more “real” than the ones found in production libraries, because in yours the natural *ambient bass effects* of the location have not been rolled off or EQ'd out. This “rumble” is usually filtered out of the commercial libraries; yet that is what gives a visceral feeling of “reality” to the background effect. When you set a good background tape track, save it in your production library. You'll find yourself using it again and again!

The other point Chuck made that I wanted to bring to you in this week's

column happened *after* the session. Blore is a legend in radio production for using kids' conversations in ways that are touching, funny and *real sounding*. Nobody else whose work I've heard has consistently gotten kids to sound as natural doing pre-written dialogue, and so I went up to him after the session broke up and asked him how he does it. He told me, and it's remarkably simple.

First, he said, you have to write dialogue which doesn't sound as if no kid would ever say it. It can be a little uncommon (erudite, arrogant, fearful or whatever), but it must sound believable coming from the kid. Then, once that's done, Chuck sits down with the kid, on-on-one, with the mike close to the kid, and after joking around a little to loosen the child up, he reads the script, phrase by phrase, *exactly how he wants the kid to say it*. Children almost never give either scripts or memorized lines a “real” delivery, but when all they have to do is parrot *a few words at a time*, in the tone or delivery in which it was said to them, they can do it easily. Chuck then just spliced his parts out of the tape, and is left with the finished track.

LIVE REMOTE BROADCASTS - FINE RADIO TRADITION OR SAVAGE BROADCASTERS UNLEASHED ON AN INNOCENT PUBLIC ?

Bobby an on-air examination on the house. Bobby declined, claiming that his career was already in the...well—you get the idea.

As for remote tips, Bobby says, always meet with the client several days in advance and go over the product you're promoting so you know what you're talking about while you pre-promote the event and during the broadcast.

Mark Evans at KOIL-Omaha reports that his station found a unique remote location that people are dying to duplicate. Yes, he buried a jock in a coffin. At a local car dealership, they dug a hole four feet deep, installed a microphone and a lucky disc jockey in the coffin and lowered it into the ground. The remote was an enormous success. Reports Mark, "Jocks in coffins is an idea whose time has come. There are less distractions. There's no room to make a mess. And the acoustics are excellent."

Today we'll address the question: "Live remotes: innocent diversion or dangerous public health risk."

We begin first by accepting that live remotes are a radio staple that cannot be ignored. It may be true that, "Hi! We're comin' to you live from Cloth World!" has caused the occasional listener to comment, "Who the heck needs this crap?" and turn the dial. But broadcast professionals are not blessed with that option. They never budge from their post. They are dedicated individuals with specific goals, lofty standards, a commitment to excellence and bills to pay. Faced with any live remote, the broadcast professional steps bravely forward and says give me a mic, a set of headphones and a mall full of people chanting my name, and heaven can wait.



Driving around in a truck shaped like a giant hot dog and allowing small children to operate dangerous electrical equipment. For me, those are just two of the great joys of live remote broadcasting," says Smith in the morning at KOZZ-Reno.

Jim Loftus, Sales Director at WUSL Power 99 in Philadelphia recalls an otherworldly remote experience he endured while employed at WTLQ-Scranton/Wilkes Barre, PA. The Smurl family of Pittston, PA was convinced that their house was haunted. Gripped with fear and anxious to have a qualified priest perform an exorcism, they took their story to the journalistic greats at the National Enquirer who, in turn, transformed the Smurls into instant hometown celebs. WTLQ was quick to pick up the drama and were determined to be at the source of the saga as it unfolded. In this endeavor, Jim and his partner Joe Montione anchored a five-hour remote at the Smurls. There they were joined by the Amazing Kreskin, who was on hand to officially detect the presence of evil energy. However, with company present, the house

heard. Finally, to kick the remote out of idle, Joe gave play-by-play as Kreskin used his astonishing mental powers to make a glass "move". It wasn't the liveliest radio ever broadcast, but just so the day wasn't a complete bust, Kreskin psychically "moved" all the dirty dishes into the kitchen and located the Smurl's missing TV remote.

Jim offers this tip for successful remote broadcasts: Always bring a cellular phone with you.

During his days at WBQW-Scranton, PA, WAEB-Allentown's Bobby "Gunther" Walsh was proud to host a remote broadcast celebrating the grand opening of a proctologist's office. Despite the free giveaways that included sample instruments used in "that area," and balloons for the kids, listeners stayed away in droves. Then Dr. Buttinsky offered

prompting a riot when one of the patrol cars had a KOIL bumper sticker and was determined to be the 250th vehicle.

When properly staged, the remote broadcast can personify everything about the field of radio that is fine and noble. Broadcasters, plying their craft amidst the very people who make their livelihoods possible. The walls of separation that keep talent from their audience are down. Consumers come fact to face with the voices that, daily, bring their radios to life. Yes, the loyal listener can now reach out, touch voice and exclaim, "Wow, he's a lot fatter than he sounds." And isn't that what it's all about? Remember, it's not where you start. It's where you finish. I'm finished. Jam I must.

INSIDE TOP 40

by Dave Sholin

Now that war in the Persian Gulf has turned from possibility to reality, it's a daily struggle to conduct business as usual. The stress created by the unfolding of events that change from minute to minute has permeated a society that, for the most part, has remained isolated from the horrors of war. Top 40 programmers have the unenviable task of balancing between giving listeners vital information and offering them a much needed release. **KRSR (Star 105) Dallas PD Bill Pasha**, while well aware that music and entertainment can't be overlooked, says it's important to keep in mind that stations are licensed to serve the community's interest and he uses that as one critical guideline. **Wayne Coy, PD at WIXX Green Bay, WI** determines his station's coverage by the amount of "new information" the audience needs to know. Otherwise, the jocks "tread lightly" on the subject, but Wayne encourages them to, "mirror the community and reflect its mood and attitude." At **WIOQ (Q102) Philadelphia, PD John Roberts** "stuck to the basics for the first few days of the war and pulled off all "in your face type" promotions." But John stresses, "You can't sound like a funeral home," either, so now the presentation is straight ahead with no change in the music except maybe an extra ballad here and there. **Q102** is also playing the "Star Spangled Banner" three times a day setting it up as "a salute to our fighting men and women in the Middle East." **WXKS (KISS 108) PD Steve Rivers** relies on a well-staffed news department to supply "Persian Gulf Updates," but otherwise it's "business as usual" as the order of the day. Steve says it's important to avoid a "depressing" on-air attitude. It appears walking that fine line between information and entertainment is something music radio programmers will have to do for a while—at least in the near future. Not since World War II has one event so transformed all our lives and there is no precedent for this generation of broadcasters to fall back on when determining where that fine line is.

Commonsense seems to be what everyone is relying on to guide them through the difficult and sensitive days ahead.



RUN-D.M.C. & JAM MASTER JAY REVOLUTIONIZING THE RELIGION OF HIP HOP

Interview by Brian Alan Samson and David "Davey D" Cook • Introduction by Brian Alan Samson

The trendsetters of Rap first came on the scene in the spring of 1983 with an innovative sound and message. The single, "It's Like That", became a national hit and opened the doors for hundreds of socially conscious Rap artists.

Three years later, in 1986, RUN-D.M.C. aka Joseph Simmons (Run), Darryl Mc Daniels (DMC), and deejay Jason Mizell (Jam Master Jay), placed another cornerstone by becoming the first Rap artist ever to endorse athletic merchandise. Not only did Run-D.M.C take Adidas to the bank that year, they had the entire teenage nation—both black and white—rockin' venues and waving tennis shoes to "My Adidas". That year RUN-D.M.C became the most successful crossover Rap group in the history of Hip Hop.

In the years since, the trio has broken through just about every facet of the entertainment industry, from appearing in films to running their own record label.

Recently Run-D.M.C. have taken flack from Hip Hop critics who claim the group's career has taken a roller coaster ride over their last two albums because of their crossover sound. Others claim they're old school. At twenty-five! Still others claim the success of the current album, "Back From Hell" will decide the trio's musical longevity.

In an exclusive interview, KALX-Oakland DJ Davey D and I had chance to find what RUN-D.M.C.'s hell raising mission was all about.

BRIAN ALAN SAMSON: **What's been happening with RUN-D.M.C. since the last album? Some say you've slacked off, some say you went on hiatus.**

RUN: Since the last album, RUN-D.M.C. and Jam Master Jay started two record companies, JMJ Records and JDK . In the last two years we've been eating and sleeping Hip Hop—producing and arranging albums for us, the Afros, The Family, Smooth Ice, My Professor and the Royalties of Rap.

BAS: For Gavin readers who aren't familiar with RUN-D.M.C.'s history, give us a summary of how the group evolved.

D.M.C.: My brother used to promote Kurtis Blow's RUSH Production events called "RUSH Parties". We'd to come home early in the morning and Kurtis would rap for me. When he put out his first single, "Christmas Rappings," Kurtis picked me to be his DJ. So after a while, I decided I wanted to put my own group together. We were all from the same school and neighborhood, and Run decided that when he finished high school he would get a crew together. Russell Simmons, who was the first member of RUN-D.M.C., had a lot of power among rappers at that time. He helped us put together RUN-D.M.C. and got us deal with Profile.

BAS: What Hip Hop acts inspired you back then?

D.M.C.: Afrika Bambaataa and The Zulu Nation, Grand Wizard Theodore & The Fantastic Five, The

Cold Crush 4 Brothers, Charley Chase & Tony Tone, Treacherous Three, and Furious Five. They are the founding fathers of Hip Hop. On the DJ tip, you had guys before Bambaataa such as DJ Hollywood, Grand Master Flowers and Eddie Cheba. They were first DJs who played the music, mixed and rapped at the same time. Cool Herc is the original DJ responsible for the creation of Hip Hop.

DAVID COOK: What contributions has Run-D.M.C. made to Hip Hop?

RUN: RUN-D.M.C. were the first Rappers to take the beat and the rap from the basement, the streets and the parks and put it on record. Before that, the so called "old school rappers" were rapping over grooves like "Freedom" and "Heart-beat" and music like that. We took it back to its original form. Our major contribution was allowing

rappers that came after us to be able to express whatever they felt without being too commercial. We also proved Rap albums could sell—we were the first Rap group ever to reach gold and platinum. We were the first to fuse Rap with Rock, first to get on MTV with a Rap video. RUN-D.M.C. led the way. We're not calling ourselves the Grand Dads of Rap or anything, but we made it raw and gave it national visibility.

D.C./BAS: Now we're seeing a proliferation of what we call "gangsta rap", which wasn't as dominant in the early '80s, and we're also seeing a strong Afro-centric movement happening. Is this a direction you envision Rap going in?

RUN: As long there are different kind of music there's going to be different



Rap styles. Everyone sees things differently. RUN-D.M.C. sees things differently from Public Enemy, and Public Enemy sees things differently from N.W.A. So what you've got is different interpreta-



tions and expressions. It's good because it prevents the music from getting corny.

BAS/D.C.: What does RUN-D.M.C. exemplify?

RUN: We want to let people know ain't nothing changed. We've still got a badass stage show, and right now we don't want people to look back—we just want them to listen to the new album and know what to expect from us.

D.C.: Do you agree with the critics that say there are a lot of mediocre groups being signed to record deals?

RUN: I could say that there's a lot of weak rappers out now. But not all of them are weak, because some of it really appeals to certain people. Record companies are signing artists for a reason. Maybe some of the labels do have a lot of faulty artists, but when they fall you won't hear from them anymore.

BAS: Let's talk about your new album "Back From Hell." Does the title come from personal experience?

RUN: We're going to let Jay answer that question. JAM MASTER JAY: What that was all about was getting away from RUN-D.M.C. Since I turned sixteen my whole life was all about RUN-D.M.C.—being Jam Master Jay, being on stage and rocking the house. Then for two years I wasn't performing. We were in the studio all the time. The hell part comes from not

being with the people—be it live performances or just meeting and greeting.

BAS: Tell our readers some of the songs they should be on the lookout for.

JMJ: The main songs to look out for are "Faces" and "Bob Your Head."

D.C.: There's been a lot of talk that you've found God and are born again. And you now have dreadlocks.

JMJ: I think that was a misprint in the bio, because it's RUN who's found God. And as far as my dreadlocks, it was just something that I always wanted to do. I didn't want to have no high top fade (laughs).

BAS: Who are your current favorite Rap groups—groups you feel are going to make an impact in 1991?

JMJ: I really like Ice Cube's album. And Bell Biv DeVoe, for whatever it takes to call them a Rap

group. Also the PRT, the Poor Righteous Teachers. **D.C.:** Do you think fusing Hip Hop with R&B—as BBD is doing is diluting the Rap sound, or do you think it's something that enhances it and gives Rap longevity?

JMJ: Gives it longevity. I always look at things from the positive side. The more people the merrier—more hit albums for everybody. What's the difference between BBD and Hammer's "You Got To Pray?" There both rhythmically saying words over a beat. To me, as lyricists, Bell Biv DeVoe are better than Hammer. Ronnie (DeVoe) is killing Hammer on the Rap trip. As far Rap is concerned in 1991, I'll have to give it to BBD and Hammer over Ice Cube and P.E., because they're definitely expanding the genre for us.

BAS: Is it possible to see RUN-D.M.C. doing a collaboration similar to the one you did with Aerosmith back in 1986?

JMJ: I'm looking forward to doing something with Living Colour. We want to put something on our next album.

BAS: Is there a tour slated for '91?

JMJ: Yes. We should be on the road by mid-February.

BAS: There seems to strong '70s fashion revival. You centered the Afro's theme around that particular fashion. Can you elaborate on that?

JMJ: That concept came up between me and my friend Hurricane, who produces

King Tee and all the St. Ide's radio spots. He's the character in Cube's "Who's The Mack" video. The Afro hair style has a special meaning. Back in the '70s it was a symbol of the Afro-American man and woman standing strong and proud. I look at the Afros concept as an Afro-centric tribute.

D.C.: Your group was caught up in the midst of controversy because of the gang violence at an LA show. What can Hip Hop fans do to curtail the violence problem?

JMJ: We have to say to ourselves, "Stop the violence among us." Stop the Black versus Black, the young versus young, and the old versus old. Our music is directed toward young listeners. Our number one audience is the young Black male, and when they get together they feel so oppressed they lash out at each other. And critics who claim that only gangsta rap inspires concert violence are wrong. Gangsta rap inspires kids just as much as, say, Eddie Murphy. It really comes down to the individual.

D.C.: There are a lot of females entering Rap. Do you feel that Rap is sexist?

JMJ: The world has been sexist since the caveman days. Males naturally demonstrate their strength. Now as far as females rapping, I love them. Anybody should be able to rap as long they do it right. When Monie Love and Queen Latifah get on the mic I think it's great, because they, too, are taking Rap to another level.●



Concrete Blonde's Johnette Napolitano is studying via correspondence course to become a veterinarian.

•a-ha

The duo of Mags and Morten, better known as a-ha, have sold more than 13 million records worldwide with its first four albums.

•VANILLA ICE

Never too far from a good quote, Vanilla Ice dictates in the January Musician magazine, "The reason you don't see as many white people in (rap) is because rap comes from the streets. White people can't dance. They got no rhythm, no connection to the streets."



•BOBBY CALDWELL

Balladeer Bobby Caldwell got his start in the early seventies Rock 'N Roll bands fronted by Johnny Winter, Rick Derringer and ex-Yardbird Keith Relf. It wasn't until 1979 that Bobby had his biggest hit, *WHAT YOU WON'T DO FOR LOVE*. Caldwell has since written for the likes of Boz Scaggs, Natalie Cole, Chicago, Peabo Bryson, Dionne Warwick and Roberta Flack.

•ELTON JOHN

In September of 1988, Elton decided to auction off much of the memorabilia he'd collected in his first two decades of entertaining. The result was more than a million dollars in receipts, including \$11,000 for the boots he wore in the film version of the rock opera *Tommy*.

•YANNI

Yanni's most recent album, "Reflections Of Passion," sold about 150,000 units in the first ten months of last year. •JON BON JOVI

Jon Bon Jovi admits to few creative mistakes, but he says he regrets naming the last Bon Jovi album, "New Jersey." Seems such a title created an unfortunate comparison to Bruce Springsteen, who put New Jersey on the musical map. "The biggest mistake of my career," say Jon in the current issue of *Q* magazine.

•JUDY COLLINS

Ms. Collins' affection for Colorado stems from her many years living in Denver before launching her career. Her father, Chuck Collins, who is blind, was a Denver musician and radio personality.

•JOHNNY MATHIS

In 1956, the same year he began his recording career, Johnny Mathis was invited to try out for the U.S. Olympic Track & Field team. The previous year, while attending San Francisco State, Mathis had high jumped six feet five inches, an impressive figure for that time.

•DONNY OSMOND

Twenty years ago this month The Osmonds had the number one record in *The Gavin Report* with *ONE BAD APPLE*.

•SHELBY LYNNE

Shelby Lynne has been cast in a new CBS-TV movie, *Another Pair Of Aces*, starring Willie Nelson and Kris Kristofferson.

•STAN GETZ

In 1964 Stan Getz and Astrid Gilberto won a Grammy for *THE GIRL FROM IPANEMA* as Record of The Year.

•JAMES INGRAM

Last year's James Ingram hit single, *I DON'T HAVE THE HEART*, was the first hit by James that was not a duet or a vocal for a Quincy Jones' album.

•BILLY JOEL

Billy Joel's 1990 Storm Front concert tour grossed \$43 million, a figure second only to labelmates New Kids On The Block's \$73.8 million.

They went from a 9.4 to a 12.0 12+, which makes them number two in the market 12+ and number one in the market 35+...James Wyatt is the new Assistant Music Director at KOYN-Paris...KSNV has a new address: 1718 West Alameda, Santa Fe, NM 87501. New phone is 505-982-5692 and the fax number is 505-984-2012...The 1991 concert season will soon be underway, and some major tours are being announced. 

JAZZ NEW RELEASES

DREAM KEEPER - CHARLIE HADEN & THE LIBERATION MUSIC ORCHESTRA (BLUE NOTE)

Only three times since 1969 has Charlie Haden assembled the Liberation Music Orchestra for emergency recording purposes. Each time he has used this powerful aggregation as a vehicle to interpret revolutionary fight songs during crucial social times, utilizing the great Carla Bley's arrangement wizardry. The first outing in 1969 on Impulse featured soloists like Gato Barbieri, Don Cherry, Dewey Redman, and Roswell Rudd who interpreted fight songs from the Spanish Civil War. 1983's *Ballad Of The Fallen* on ECM concentrated on moving portraits of Central America. *Dream Keeper* seems to focus on a few regions, specifically South Africa (with a powerful rendition of the ANC's official anthem) and a revisit to Central America with the Haden penned "Sandino." "Spiritual" is a tip of the hat to the American civil rights movement, and features spirited solos by trombonist Ray Anderson, Branford Marsalis and Haden, and a robust gospel piano workout by Amina Claudine Myers. Clearly the most moving moment is the Cuban "Rabo De Nube" (translated as "Tail Of The Tornado"), beautifully arranged by Carla Bley's talented young daughter, Karen Mantler. A real show stealer, Karen. It's obvious that Charlie Haden completely trusts Carla Bley. In essence, he hands a dream project, originally based on an obscure Langston Hughes poem, over to Carla's quirky, imaginative powers. Expect to see *Dream Keeper* on lots of best-of '91 lists come the end of the year. It's a lasting work that, considering our troubled times, shows that instrumental music can clearly contain as much emotional depth as the most eloquent vocal pieces. On first listen I found myself misty-eyed and quite moved.

JUST FRIENDS - A GATHERING IN TRIBUTE TO EMILY REMLER (JUSTICE)


The *Just Friends* tribute sessions carry a dominant influence from guitarist Herb Ellis, who's the bandleader on half the tracks and mentor on the remaining. This Volume One release spotlights Emily Remler's Wes Montgomery-hued styling, reminiscent of her Concord Jazz recordings that culminated with *East To Wes*. Although this traditional Jazz approach embodies the vast majority of her surviving discography, it was apparent to us (even from her chart-topping Justice release *This Is Me*) that Emily was anxious to expand into other genres, most notably electrified GRP-type melodics. She was clearly gravitating away from hardened Bop that eulogizes her on this disc. Until her death, she performed in an acoustic mostly for economic reasons. Her gigs with David Benoit's touring band probably gave us the best glimpse of what Emily would have been up to, had she lived to reap the respectability of *This Is Me*. *Just Friends* is a sweet, sincere gesture. We prefer "Nova Nice" with Leni Stern at the guitar helm.

HOPE - RICK MARGITZA (BLUE NOTE)

Former Miles sax sideman Rick Margitza blitzed his way to the top of our Jazz charts last year, making him an impressive new face. This second effort comes across as more compositionally intense. Margitza penned all but one of the eleven offerings. "Song Of Hope"—a timely credo for these times—is a fascinating swirl of over-dubbed tenor and soprano duet flashes. The piece crescendoes to finality with some urgent vocal scat. Guitarist Steve Masakowski provides a blue chordal backdrop on "Princess" a cut that somewhat resembles a samba. Each track on *Hope* is moody and introverted. "We The People" is the most uplifting and sentimental for both Jazz and Alternative Adult.



JAZZ NEW RELEASES

POST-MOTOWN BOP - BOBBY WATSON & HORIZON (BLUE NOTE)

Bobby Watson is far too busy to compromise his astounding Bop ensemble playing. When *Horizon* wasn't touring the horizon, Watson was sorting out projects for Bill Cosby and Joe Williams, and guiding the latest from Lou Rawls. Bobby Watson's *Horizon* is a tight unit. Watson relies heavily on longtime drummer Victor Lewis to supply both material and leadership. Lewis and Watson kick in three songs each. Although a Kansas City native, Watson is clearly a New York bopper entrenched in the sixties and beyond. Why Post-Motown Bop? It's in deference to the magic of Motown, Isaac Hayes, James Brown and their lingering domain. "The Punjab Of Java Po" is peppy and mischievous. Twenty one year old pianist Edward Simon handles his end of the two horn quintet with sparkling balance. "Falling In Love With Love" tintinnabulates with a bouncy and festive mood. Check out the smooth conversation between Watson and trumpeter Melton Mustafa on "Appointment In Milano."



PURE SCHUUR - DIANE SCHUUR (GRP)

Diane Schuur's towering vocal range and stunning dynamics are *Pure Schuur* all right. Schuur is gearing up for A/C acceptance with tracks like "All Caught Up In Love," Vonda Shepard's "Hold Out" and the torchy opener "Nobody But Me." Still, Diane's spotless phrasing and soaring gospel vogue never lets any of the arrangements mask her virtuosity. With vocals figuring heavily on Adult Alternative playlists these days, it's natural that an AA and A/C summit could exist on *Pure Schuur*. Jazz diehards need only punch onto Schuur's rousing duet with Joe Williams called "Deed I Do" for their Swing transfusion. Some might fall for the smoldering "You Won't Remember Me." David Benoit guests with grand piano accompaniment on the

standard "What A Difference A Day Makes." Adult Alternative stations could gravitate toward the more ethereal, yet strikingly sentimental "Touch."

RIPE FOUR DISTRACTION - JAMES LEE STANLEY (CHAMELEON/BEACHWOOD)

Songwriter/producer/solo artist James Lee Stanley prefers to give a bright timbre to his pop selections. At first we attributed it to his computer keyboard programmings at the studio console. With support from players like guitarist Rick Ruskin, bassist Ken Lyon and saxophonist Robert Kyle, the sheen remains. The tunes are minimalist in arrangement and pop in content. "My My (Chiaroscuro)," dedicated to pugilist extraordinaire Muhammad Ali, emits the most exotic grooves.

SIGN OF THE SNOW CRANE - KAZU MATSUI (SONIC ATMOSPHERES)

Kazu Matsui's bamboo flute vignettes might be just what we all need in uncertain times like these. Most selections enlist a balance of Western players like Grant Geissman and Will Kennedy to balance the Eastern chops of Kazu and Keiko Matsui. Keiko is spot on when it comes to bridging the Western style of improvisation and melody with the calming Buddhist powers of Kazu's flutes. Adult Alternative programmers will jump on the ultra-exotic soundscapes of the title track and a picturesque aural postcard like the stirring "Morning Mist Across The Sea." There are some topographically tasteful sytho textures backing up the desolate closer aptly titled "The Dream Walk." You get a feeling that the implosive serenity of the music gets lost in the translation of the song titles. Never mind. The breezy tonalities of Kazu Matsui are a welcome antidote to the winds of war.



YOU WON'T FORGET ME - SHIRLEY HORN (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

When it came time to reactivate the Verve label a few years ago, they called on Shirley Horn

to contribute some smokin' live tracks. This time around, she waited awhile before surrendering her latest gem, *You Won't Forget Me*. It's steeped in Horn's rich trio craftwork with some supreme guest slots by Wynton Marsalis, Miles Davis, Branford Marsalis and Toots Thielemans. Her duet with Toots on "Beautiful Love" is shatteringly intimate. As a bonus Toots plucks out some romantic electric box guitar lines. Regardless of who sits in, each track sizzles. The production is digitally warm and inviting. Horn stretches each word and phrase with as Wynton says, "rhythmic imagination." "Too Late Now" is a suspenseful ballad that segues into the notoriously funky "I Just Found Out I Love." Horn's piano work rivals anybody's. The tempo shifts from song to song, throwing the listener off balance in a nice way. The light and shade of the sessions are phenomenal. The cameos are truly special, particularly on the title track. Miles casts off some nice counter-melodies to a drumbeat reminiscent of Tony Williams' famous woodblock, cymbal ride on "In A Silent Way."



ALIVE - CHICK COREA AKOUSTIC BAND (GRP)

By alternating between Elektric and Akoustic, Chick Corea can have a project on the Jazz charts 12 months out of the year. With stalwarts John Patitucci and Dave Weckl, the trio is state of the art. Weckl provides a busy and bustling percussive backdrop. There is no limit to Patitucci's textbook virtuosity. Chick Corea has never sounded more disciplined. Several years after *Return To Forever*, Corea is still one of the most consistent technicians going. Live tracks like "Oh Green Dolphin Street" and the tangy "Morning Sprite" extend past the nine minute mark to accommodate lots of individual solo excursions.





THE SOUL CAGES - STING (A&M)

After wrestling with a bout of writer's block, Sting maps out what turns out to be a lyrically expansive, descriptive effort. As the relatively sedate "All This Time" makes heavy inroads all across the dial, those in the expansion mood might think about digging in with trax like "The Soul Cages" and the blues/rock/funker "Jeremiah Blues (Part I)." The instrumental support comes from a tight quartet of drummer Manu Katche, keyboardist Kenny Kirkland, guitarist Dominic Miller and, of course, Sting on bass and accoutrements. While there are stray horn, pipe and synthetic embellishments, it's the clear base that gives this album a much needed simplicity. For those in A/C and AA, there are plenty of contemplative moments to chose from, though none better than the ambiguously Mid-eastern "Mad About You."



THE SAMPLES (ARISTA)

In approximately the same vocal range as the aforementioned Sting, the Samples (who hail from Boulder) toy with some of the same early ingredients the Police played with. I'm referring to that subtle reggae beat. But hold the dreadlocks, because alongside those rhythms are acoustic twelve strings, mandolins, banjos, percussion and plenty of electric fire. This is virtually the same independent album that made the rounds during mid-1990, maybe spruced up a little for national

consumption. And, like a lot of the bands from the Rockies, the Samples have their heads screwed on straight, their eyes and minds open, and play their music with what sounds like a rhythmic global feel. Trax "Waited Up" and "Feel Us Shaking" for starters.




"I TOUCH MYSELF" - DIVINYLS (VIRGIN)

"I Touch Myself." Didn't that used to be illegal in three Southern states? Divinyls (now how's that for an stalwartly analog name?) back up those nasty postcards in the mail with a perfectly nasty, slinky, sexy single. Christine Amphlet has always been the sweatiest thing from down under. The talking bit toward the end should save you a fortune in 975 phone bills. Or, as Sting says, "the river flows." Nice dress, too.

"REACH THE ROCK" - HAVANA 3 A.M. (IRS)

A real guns n' butter outfit. I remember Paul Simonon's low slung bass with the Clash as well as with Gary Myrick's band, the Figures. Havana 3 A.M. sounds like a cross breed of that spare, razored spikey, punky sound that has never spun out of style.



"IN YOUR ARMS" - LITTLE CAESAR (DGC)

A beautiful rock ballad that's

catchy and feeling. This track has been laying back in the weeds for a long time. How long? Specifically since the week of May 11, 1990, when we received the very first report on "Chain Of Fools." My advice to the "Caesars" is to stop covering and keep on writing. This one's bound for a top slot.



"WILLY" - ASHLEY CLEVELAND ((ATLANTIC)

Tough stuff, baby, and not the voice you're expecting to hear. Co-producers Niko Bolas and Craig Krampf were the same team that helped launch Melissa Etheridge on record. Ashley Cleveland's music is much grittier. Songwriting and writers seem to be familiar turf as Ashley has played recently in John Hiatt's band and has backgrounded for folks like Emmylou, James McMurtry and—no surprise—Etta James. Now see if you can believe that this voice matches that face.



CASINO - BLUE RODEO (EAST WEST AMERICA)

Casino is a pleasant change of pace from all the big technicolor, cinematic mixes. While Blue Rodeo's sound is clear and well recorded, the music is homespun and circular. Heartfelt performances like "Til I Am Myself Again," "What Am I Doing Here," "5A.M. (A Love Song)" and

"Montreal" aren't anything that couldn't be reproduced right on the spot in a cozy garage. Rather than gadgetry, the Rodeo rely on their own personal sense of dynamics and harmony blends to accentuate their music. Casino's tour de force is "Last Laugh," the album's most aggressively arranged song.

"SHE TALKS TO ANGELS" - BLACK CROWES (DEF AMERICA)

Can you believe it? Almost a year ago to the day the Crowes put out their debut. The slowest acoustic crawler of the set is this week's Most Added. America has definitely taken to the Black Crowes in a megabig way. Do you s'pose the Georgia Satellites feel like someone's eaten their lunch? In the long run we're the winners, as more swaggering American riff rock hits the street. That's a pure acoustic version on track three, with a Nicky Hopkins-like piano on top. Shades of the Stones and Rod The Mod & Faces.



CHAGALL GUEVARA (MCA)

A peppy new band from the Nashville area records in Tennessee (beautiful Franklin, to be exact) and mixes their modern, American gem right in our Bay Area backyard. Co-produced by the band with Matt Wallace (Replacements), who has had previous success with some of the Slash label bands, notably the multiplatinum Faith Now More. Chagall Guevara, taking their name from a painter and a revolutionary, paint some pretty revolutionary potshots starting with "Violent Blue." "Play God" into "Monkey Grinder" (these guys got a way with titles). "Take Me To Love Canal" is the raver. Do you think the woman dialing the wrong number on "The Wrong George" knows she's been immortalized?

The Trees are in fine form with *Uncle Anesthesia*, a thirteen-track-strong follow-up that’s as awash in wah-wah, melody and psychedelic fuzz as its predecessors. What strikes me immediately about this release is the emphasis on Mark Lanegan’s vocals. His deep, warm, resonating voice (so amazing!) seems more prominent here, and it provides the perfect complement to the Trees’ foggy/buzzed guitar blend. Do you suppose they do a lot of logging in Ellensburg, WA? Songwriter/guitarist Gary Lee Connor might be exorcising the saws that haunt his past. Anyway, with the first song, “Beyond The Horizon,” Connor’s taut, planeing guitar counterpoints Lanegan’s soothing vocal and sets the record’s energy level at “high.” I prefer the more ringing cuts like “Bed Of Roses,” “Alice Said,” and “Lay Your Head Down,” but rock out to the title track as well. 





tobacco barn near the Bible Bellybutton vicinity, *Lived To Tell* gathers some of the proverbial lint, but in a good way. Sprinkled throughout are biblical references—"blooming like the rose of Jericho" ("Rose Of Jericho"), "in the morning...a rooster crowing" ("North Of Wasteland"), and "Angels Spread Your Wings." This makes for compelling lyrics to which I found myself paying close attention. Thank goodness Noah took two of everything, including guitars. The thick sound of swirling guitars makes a body wonder what Eleventh Dream Day could do live, and that's a good sign; an occasional surf beat makes a body wonder what Jesus really did on that water; and even when a body's tired of all this wondering, it can still move to these spurring rhythms. Take a gander at the righteous harmonies on "Rose Of Jericho," the spooky guitars on "Dream Of A Sleeping Sheep," and the clutching bass and drum on "You Know What It Is." As zen master Andy Griffith would put it, this is right as rain. DAVIDA. BERAN

MOUTH MUSIC - MOUTH MUSIC (RYKODISC)

If you're looking for something different and unusual, this might satiate those cravings. From the opening track "Br-Atach Bana," I became completely captivated by this duo. Sung in Gaelic, the songs are called "puirt a beul," or "mouth music." Tolitha Mackenzie on vocals and Martin Swan on instruments and arrangements, create a complex array of music "intended for dancing." Mouth Music may not sweep you off your feet, but it's cer-

tain to engross. Swan's intricate and delicate arranging is highlighted by Mackenzie's solid vocals. Lyrics relate yarns of youth, the sea, marriage, life, love and death. Tracks: "Martin Martin" (a brilliant instrumental), "Seinn Oi" (a foot-stomper), "Fraoch A Ronaigh" (where Mackenzie shines), "Mire Rium?" and "Chi Mi Na Morbheanna." Be sure to check the liner notes and give this a chance. ROBERT BARONE

YO LA TENGO - HERE COMES MY BABY
(Bar/None, PO Box 1704, Hoboken, NJ 07030)

"Here Comes My Baby," the leadoff track from this Yo La Tengo seven-cut gem, could be referred to as the first/next "single" from the band's 1990 LP *Fakebook*. Hey, it worked for the Tremeloes, who had a Top 20 hit with the song in 1967. Yo La's laudable interpretation rings bright and chirrup-y, with enough warmth and hook to make you smile and snap your fingers. But, lest we (blinded by our love of *Fakebook*) have forgotten that Yo La Tengo made their name and reputation as a snarling electric outfit, the band follows up this pure pop with some plugged-in, pumped-up live noise. "The Story Of Jazz" originally appeared on 1987's *New Wave Hot Dogs*; it benefits from the added distortion and thinner production of this live recording. Even the mixed-up vocal becomes a plus as it highlights Kaplan's crazed ranting, and complements "Jazz's" driven but jerky tempo. Neil Young's "Barstool Blues," the third track, is particularly well-rendered, and "Let's Compromise" (also from *New Wave Hot Dogs*) follows. With "At The River's Edge" and "Ecstasy Blues" (new!), the EP falters slightly (just *slightly*, mind you), the former being a cover with a surf-rock flair and the latter reaching (without enough prologue or volume) for the band's live orgasmic feedback extremes. Finally (sigh...) Yo La recap Daniel Johnston's "Speeding Motorcycle." This version was recorded live on WFMU with Johnston doing vocals via telephone. Daniel's childish voice is frail and strikingly touching when accompanied sparsely by the band. The result is winsome, fresh, naive, thoroughly loveable, and also available as a single on SOL. VARIOUS ARTISTS - BEETS - A COLLECTION OF JAZZ SONGS (Elemental/T.E.C. Tones, 109 Minna St. #391, San Francisco, CA 94105)

This collection is the second in an apparently ongoing series featuring anthologies of avant-

garde (or otherwise excellent) music called *Fruits Into The Underground*. Perhaps this helps to explain the album's curious name—as well as its predecessor's, *Potatoes* (a collection of folk tunes). Even after a quick listen it becomes clear that this is no garden-variety specimen but nothing less than a first-class sampling of styles tuned to please even the most voracious carnivore. For those of you in the John Zorn/Knitting Factory set, try "Boots" (Fred Frith), "She Left Him For Her" (A. Braxton & G. Robair), or "Recollection Bruise" (T. Cora). Purists will perhaps go for the more relaxing "Bad Mirror Ball" by E.D. Feldman, Clubfoot Orchestra's "Claire" or Sonny Simon's heartfelt sax on "Ballad For My Friend." Sun Ra helps round out the compilation with his thirteen-minute "Egyptian Fantasy." Sun Ra's ominous liner message: "I'm making a blueprint for the future...because this planet is in trouble." My favorite is actually "Medicine Man" by The Machete Ensemble Of S.F.—an atmospheric, neo-African soft jazz piece that features conch shells as the main improvisational instrument. It's all pretty interesting—and, though I'm not really partial to tubers myself, *Beets* left me hungry for more.

LEE "SCRATCH" PERRY & MAD PROFESSOR - MYSTIC WARRIOR DUB (ROIR/Reachout International, 611 Broadway, Suite 411, New York, NY 10012)

Two most prolific dub artists, Lee "Scratch" Perry and Mad Professor, team up again to destroy and expand the genre's boundaries. Perry and the Professor are often on the edge

both musically and mentally, and they're quite adept in their fields—as each's vast catalogues of releases will attest. Their music continues to stand tall against the test of time and is regularly heard in clubs and on the radio. Textured and contagious rhythms, bass, and guitar are interspersed, and the rocksteady Upsetters perform backing vocals for Scratch and the Professor. Tracks: "Broken Antennae," "Black Art," "Mystic Warrior Dub," "Dub Reggae Soca," "Dub It Scratchy Dub It" and "Jazzy Dub." ROBERT BARONE



THOMAS ANDERSON - ALRIGHT IT WAS FRANK— AND HE'S RISEN FROM THE DEAD AND GONE OFF WITH HIS TRUCK (Out There Records, P.O. Box 543, Norman, OK 73070)

Residing in a small town in Oklahoma, Thomas Anderson has penned eleven serious-but-light-hearted songs for his debut. The title of the album is taken from a line in the sci-fi flick *It Came From Outer Space*. Supporting Anderson's prose is music in a rock vein. "Vaudeville" is a harsh/pleasant tale of Anderson's hero the "Tyrant Lizard King," and the Lizard's history and media coverage. "Marilyn Says" explores matters of the heart. Other tracks: "She Looks Like Rickie Lee Jones," "SweetSweetRock 'N' Roll" and "The Bride And The Broomstick." Minimal production satisfies your craving for freshness. RB

BLACK TAPE FOR A BLUE GIRL - A CHAOS OF DESIRE (Projekt, Box 1591, Garden Grove, CA 92642-1591)

A few years ago Black Tape For A Blue Girl's *Ashes In The Brittle Air* fell into my possession, and I still treasure it. Now, *A Chaos Of Desire*, the band's fourth album, features more songs of tragic beauty. The music is often moody and foreboding, soaring to incredible tonal levels. The vocals are clear and sparse, laden with emotion and intrigue. Start with "The Hypocrite Is Me" and then try: "We Watch Our Sad-Eyed Angel Fall," "Of These Reminders," "Beneath The Icy Floe," "Pandora's Box" and "Could I Stay The Honest One." Certain to satisfy the neo-classical aficionado." RB

Testament

Jump starting into the 1991 concert season with Testament and Slayer was a good idea. The "Clash Of The Titans" tour just ended in Europe with Megadeth, and these two very simpatico bands are out on their own. The Kaiser facility in Oakland hasn't sweated like this since Exodus, Urban Dance League and the Red Hot Chili Peppers were in town. Thanks to a new Eastern Acoustic Works sound system Slayer picked up from Sun Sound Audio, the sound has never been better in that building. Every Kaiser concert will now be measured by that sound. Since our government had just signed us all up to invade Iraq that morning, it was ironic that the two most lyrically anti-war bands on the scene hit town. Testament's drummer Louie Clemente called me up on the day of show and proudly acknowledged they'd get a sound check from Slayer, who wanted to make sure they'd shine for the hometown crowd. Louie agreed that they found on *Practice What You Preach* and now with their fourth Megaforce/Atlantic album, *Souls Of Black* they've moved into a new dimension. Slayer's latest album, *Seasons In The Abyss*, for Def American, rates Six G-force points in my book right along with Testament's *Souls In Black*. Slayer raged on "Blood Red," "Deadskin Mask" and "Mandatory Suicide," but the more honed and complete 1991 band is doing their best material including "War Ensemble," "Born Of Fire" and "Seasons In The Abyss." On the way back from Japan, the band filmed their video for "Seasons" in Egypt in front of the sphinx and tombs with Marcus Blunder, a well-known Cairo filmmaker. The packed floor was a

snakepit, the lights and sound perfect, the music symphonic.

Bits & Pieces: Dave Sharp of The Alarm was in town recently and paid a visit to the Gavin with lots of information. Sharp opened a set for Donovan at Slim's later that night and then moved across the street to the Paradise for an acoustic session that included new material from his I.R.S. solo album *Hard Travelin'* due out in March. The newly-completed Alarm album, *Raw*, is finished and will be released in June...Roger Daltrey was in San Francisco for two nights of filming for the NBC series "Night Caller." Local studio musicians performing with Daltrey were Audie DeLone, keyboardist from the Fabulous Thunderbirds (and Music Director for the BAMmies), guitarist Jock Rockenbach, bassist Brad Russell and drummer Greg Gonaway (Mariah Carey)...INXS will call their tour "Let The X Factor Begin," and it's slated to hit Daytona, Florida on February 3 with 39 more cities to follow. 

STING - *The Soul Cages* (A&M)

Don't know if it's this new QSound system decoded on this disc or what, but the instruments and the vocals seem to jump and shimmer on *The Soul Cages*. After a long sit on the sidelines, Sting, not having the foggiest notion what it would entail, used his skills as an instrumentalist to lay the album's base. After applying lots of mileage on his shoe soles and seraching his primal soul, the images finally came flooding. And there are plenty of them. Bridges and landscapes lurk in the distance on MAD ABOUT YOU. A bluesy, fusion guitar sings on JEREMIAH BLUES (PART I). A beatele bass pumps as a mandolin plucks on the single, ALL THE TIME. WHY SHOULD I CRY FOR

YOU asks the musical question. The answer is born out of doubt and torment. Finally, just before the extended WHEN THE ANGELS FALL concludes this nine song collection, the aggressive title track provides a poignant rock moment that combines all the elements—the Jazz chording, the rock appeal, the hit personality and, most importantly, the skills of a great image maker and storyteller.

THE KNACK - *Serious Fun* (Charisma)

The first single is Saddam's wake up call, baby. ROCKET O' LOVE is precise and deadly. Serious Fun gets a lot of people out of the dog house. First is The Knack, a band who miraculously survived one of the biggest shellings and hype lube jobs in industry history. While their seventies debut was indeed a classic, all the mud and muck of pseudostardom gummed

up the works and ruined a great rock band—that is, until now. As those of us who saw them in their heyday know well, this band can rock and swing. Another doggie diner reprived is Don Was, whose last work with Dylan was anything but spectacular. Both Was and the Knack's Doug Feiger are of Detroit stock, so there's lots of nonverbal communication going on between the bits. Serious Fun is spectacular in every way. I know I'll look like a fool recommending this many cuts, but so what? Today's fave is I WANT LOVE. Next week's could include SERIOUS FUN, WON'T LET GOT/ACES & EIGHTS, the balladish ONE DAY AT A TIME, a hulking RIVER OF SIGHTS, LET'SGET LOST, gawd the list goes on and on.
