ARB CHANGES COMING?

GEFFEN SAYS MERCURY LEAKED GN'R

In their continuing efforts to learn who leaked unfinished copies of Guns N' Roses' next albums, Geffen Records notified Mercury Records on Monday that they've found that a Mercury staffer gave the tapes to radio stations in return for airplay. Geffen says that the act constitutes copyright infringement, unfair competition and uti-

lization of unfair trade practices, and has asked Mercury for cash compensation.

Said Geffen General Manager Al Coury: (Geffen Records) will "continue to pursue reports of unauthorized airplay because such action deprives the recording artists of their right to present their music in finished form, creates confusion with the consumers and

retailers as to the availability of the record, and is unfair to other radio stations in the market."

Use Your Illusion I and Use Your Illusion II are due for official release in early August. Two weeks ago, Geffen dropped a suit against WMMS-Cleveland, after the station aired a track from one of the albums. WMMS agreed to pay Geffen an undisclosed sum.

GROSSER CHECKS INTO THE ZOO

Amy Grosser has joined the staff of the still-new label Zoo Entertainment as National Director of Promotion. Grosser comes from I.R.S. Records, where she was West Coast Promotion Manager, Developing



Artists. "Amy's unique blend of talent, personality and experience n cemakeher a natural for the

job," said company president Michael Prince. "She's a welcome addition to the Zoo team."

Grosser started as Music Director for WNEW-New York in 1984. She also put in a stint as Music Editor for *FMQB*. "I'm delighted to be getting in on the ground floor of such a vibrant new company," she said. "I look forward to helping break the many exciting new artists on the Zoo roster."

KIOT HOWLS

On Saturday, June 15, a Santa Fe community carnival will kickoff the debut of Adult Alternative station KIOT (Coyote Radio).

Masterminding the station's operation will be majority owner/GM Bill Sims and Music/Program Director Jack Kolkmeyer, who worked together at the highly successful KLSK-Santa Fe, one of the country's first Jazz/Adult Alternative stations.

"It's (KIOT) a first cousin of the 'original' KLSK," said Kolkmeyer, who calls the format Diverse Adult Radio (DAR). "We were basically on this track when the station (KLSK) was sold in 1990. The musical baseline will continue to include Jazz, Blues, R&B, new acoustic styles and a wide variety of new technology."

To add some spice, Kolkmeyer says the station will be programming contemporary World Music from over 60 different countries. "I believe we'll be the only commercial station in the country doing this," he said. "There's a large segment of the American popula-

tion that likes diverse, adult music—they certainly buy it! The ...Jazz/Adult Alternative format has become very static and predictable. We're going to change that!"

Other innovative ideas incorporated in KIOT's programming are the use of community personalities as morning co-hosts; the use of BBC World Service News; and a daily "Coyote Tale" at noon.

The grand opening/community carnival will benefit the Santa Fe Family "Y" and the New Mexico Community foundation. Kolkmeyer can be reached Wednesday through Friday at (505) 983-1111. Bill Sims is available at (505) 983-6453.







INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Martha Reeves sang it in 1964: "Summer's here and the time is right for dancing in the street." For many high school and college students around the country, the arrival of summer means a break from classes. But gone are the days when Top 40 stations significantly alter daytime programming in response to summer vacation. Rooster Rhodes, PD at KCAQ Oxnard, CA, points out that many schools in California are now year-round, so vacation schedules vary. Even if that weren't the case, he still would be reluctant to make many changes "which would defeat the purpose of Top 40—appealing to adults in the daytime and 12-24s at night." For KQMQ Honolulu PD Kimo Akane, summer never ends. "It's summer all year long here, the only difference is kids are out of school. We've just redone our clocks, but we do that several times a year and it just happened to take place before the start of summer. However, we may be a taste more uptempo and younger at this time of the year without being offensive to 25-34s." In areas where there is a substantial college population, the situation is very different. ZFUN Moscow, ID PD Gary Cummings deals with that every summer when, "...seventy-five percent of the students leave town. We tend to be more adult-oriented than student-oriented, but of course, the teens are out of high school, so it's a fine line. It's safe to say we aren't looking for ballads at this time of year." Music freshening is what Jay Taylor, PD at Q105 Tampa, emphasizes more than anything else. "We may play a few summer tunes, but we're constantly putting songs in and taking them out of various categories-more so in summer than at other times of the year." Even though "there's no conscious effort" to change things in the summer, according to EAGLE 106 Philadelphia, PA PD Brian Phillips, "the station takes on a little different flavor." While the Top Ten has been ballad-heavy in recent months, Brian was in agreement with everyone else that a "bright, uptempo sound" is what stations will look to maintain in the summer of '91.

Yes, 'tis me, Annette M. Lai, once again putting the rest of INSIDE TOP 40 to paper this week. (See-I told you last week that Dave was getting spoiled!)

It's no surprise that the format's HOT record this week is DAVID A. STEWART Introducing CANDY DULFER. Early believer in this tasty instrumental, MIX 107.3 Washington, D.C., moves it closer to Top Ten territory 14-11. Seeing other top twenty action at WHDQ 28-19, WAPE 25-20, WCGQ 28-18, Y100 23-20, Q104 20-14, WIQQ 13-9, WNCI 16-14, KDOG 29-20, KGLI 19-14, KYYY 37-20, KZOR 15-9, KISN 19-15, etc. ADDs include:



ou have a once-in-a-lifetime chance to influence the future of Arbitron's surveys in all markets!

The ratings giant is polling its subscribers to determine whether or not to change from its current 12-week survey cycle, begun in 1978, and go to sweeps 16 weeks long, effective in 1993. The implications of such a historic move are mind-boggling. So, to unboggle some minds, let's look at the good, the bad and the ugly of this controversy—then, make sure your station *votes* on this pivotal matter.

WHY 16 WEEKS?

To those who propose extending the surveys to 16 weeks each—thus a switch to a maximum of three sweeps in any market annually—the key question or issue has to do with the reliability of the ratings. Some formats, especially Top 40, Album Rock and Black/Urban, feel that notable portions of their audience—especially those elusive young males 18 to 34-are either undersampled or underrepresented in the final rating tallies. Programming consultants who ply these formats have been fueling the discussion, and key members of the Arbitron Radio Advisory Council (ARAC) have been responsive. Interestingly, the chairman and vice chairman of ARAC each represent formats that they feel are hurt by the relatively poor sampling of men 18-34.

There have been various pressures on Arbitron to boost diary return from young males since my days with Arbitron in the mid-'70s, so this is not a new issue. Indeed, Arbitron has responded to past pressures. Such changes in their methodology, such as the sampling of those in homes not listed in the phone book (effective with the Spring '77 sweep), and the implementation of Differential Survey Treatment (DST) in the early '80s (which gives more money and more reminder follow-ups to diarykeepers who are ethnic or young males 18-34) are major indications that Arbitron has been responsive. Most recently, the company agreed to boost, over a two-year period, sample placement by 10%-although actual diary return was often not increased, due to poor diarykeeper response.

Since the proposed 10% boost didn't seem to make some people happy, the latest concept is to increase reliability by taking—in the markets under 48 weeks of Continuous Measurement surveys annually—the 48 diary weeks and creating not four, but three surveys of four months sample each. Thus, so the theory goes, you'd see an increase of 33% in sample size. For example, if a market had 1200 diaries returned ideally during the year—four sweeps of 300 usable diaries per survey—now that market would get three report cards with 400 listeners each. Or so the hope goes.

The unstated thought is that if sample sizes are upped by a third, then there'd be better representation of those who haven't been well captured by Arbitron. However, as the old saw goes, it ain't necessarily so.

16-WEEK SURVEYS? IT'S UP TO YOU

DIARY DANGERS

Many of you who've called have asked essentially, "Is there anything wrong with this proposal?" Especially since if this idea passes it will not cost you subscribers any more \$\$\$. Well, there's lots more to think about when you consider expanding the length of surveys. I know. I was at Arbitron when my boss asked me to prepare and to produce surveys not four weeks long, but 12. Changing a ratings methodology this drastically is the closest thing to childbirth male programmers will ever experience, so let me review some issues you should consider before you send your ballot back to Arbitron.

·Will the increased sample make a difference? Not really. Even though sample size would increase by a third, Arbitron officials are saying the reliability would improve by only 10% to 20%. Certainly increased reliability is welcome, but it's not really statistically significant. And since Arbitron isn't going to be placing the additional sample in the extra month exclusively with young males 18-34 there's no assurance that the increase to 16 weeks will make any difference. Don't expect to see the shares jump for Top 40, Album Rock or Black/ Urban stations. There's a very good chance that relative demographic diary return and format share levels will remain basically constant with today's status quo. So why go to the trouble of changing the system so drastically?

· Another concern has to do with monthly trend reports. In Continuous Measurement markets, stations receive two interim rolling trend reports persurvey. Unfortunately, these trends are not compiled using the same weighting scheme as when the (now) quarterly books are produced. As a result, the trends are, in my opinion, basically useless. Now, with a longer proposed survey sweep, there'd be another of these useless midterm reports. Who needs it? But of more concern is the threat of the "book-of-the-month club." If we end up with three big report cards and nine trend reports, that's going to lead to some paying more attention to the trends. As that happens, Arbitron could then say, essentially, "Well, since you pay so much attention to the trends, why don't we expand the monthly information—in essence produce a full ratings book each month. Now there's a major nightmare!

Twelve full report cards annually. Ouch. The ad community doesn't want it—and I can't imagine a programmer who would be pleased at the thought of having a monthly sword of Damocles hanging over their head.

If for no other reason than to keep Arbitron from eventually instituting the book-of-themonth club approach, I'd suggest you vote

NO on this 16-week idea.

• Are you ready for a 16-week sweep? Forgetting the technical stuff, how would you as a programmer or manager cope with such a lengthy survey? It's tough enough now keeping your performance—and that of your air staff—up to peak levels. Imagine doing that for a survey one-third longer And how do you handle jock vacations during this almost endless survey? Not to mention budgets, and so on. Lots of logistical nightmares.

•What would the survey months be? Even in those markets that get just one survey a year, the sweep would be 16 weeks (two 16-week surveys if your area is now swept Spring/Fall). Will the "Spring" survey begin in February and end in June? Or go March-July? When would results be available? And how will that timing effect the media buyers and your sales staff? Lots of quicksand here.

• Finally, what impact will all this have on your revenue? When this concept of three 16week books was first floated two years ago I spoke about it to ad agencies and advertisers in some major markets. To a person they were against the idea. Basically, since radio is already hard to buy (vs. TV for example) they don't need another confusion factor regarding our medium. With different delivery dates for the three books than the now four surveys; with more trends that are confusing (and can be used to beat down your sales staff's rates); and with no notable increase in the reliability of the data, why would our customers want such a change? A "Spring Book" that began in February, with results available in mid-July, is hardly useful. The data is almost ancient. No, as Arbitron polls its advertiser clients I think they'll find few in favor of changing the current system. Thus, if stations vote to go to the 16-week approach we may risk undermining the use of radioand thus our revenues.

BEWARE OF LAND MINES

As you can see, what at first seems like a possibly good idea is riddled withland mines. Let's not step on any. Arbitron does need to continue to boost its performance regarding the ethnic and young male audiences—but changing to 16-week surveys is a poor way to do it.

Stand by for results. After your station has voted, Arbitron will tally, then report to ARAC at their scheduled August meeting. Depending on what the ad community and stations say, changes could begin in early '93. Let's hope not.



the GAVIN REPORT

P.D. NOTEBOOK

ast week, I was rummaging through some clippings I'd saved on recent developments in digital tape recording and digital broadcasting: today the rummage concerns items more closely related to

programming.

I don't know about you, but I've always had my doubts about the value of air staff meetings. Certainly it's necessary that the staff be informed and have a team feeling-but the staff meetings I've attended, in large companies and small stations alike, tend to be somewhat uncomfortable affairs, with agendas that are fairly well set by the management that called the meetings. In the April, 1991 issue of Rotarian magazine, Kent Davies, a teacher in the off-campus business program at Washington University in Lynwood, Washington wrote that "regular staff meetings, although theoretically practical, can be costly and non-productive, as well as tedious. Other 'solutions' may include bulletin boards and weekly update memos. None of these are usually effective, and all waste valuable resources.

"Well-written, well-designed staff newsletters are often a much more effective long-term solution. A first-class newsletter can enhance a company's image as well as motivate employees and encourage a sense of oneness between different levels and departments... A good newsletter can even prove more effective than cash awards or other such incentives. Many firms' experience has shown that more often than not, employees prefer their picture and a write-up in the company newsletter over such awards or, better yet, in conjunction with them.

I would add to that excellent idea that such a newsletter should avoid a paternalistic or patronizing tone at all costs! For small companies such as single radio stations, the recipients should include the rep firm(s); and perhaps such a newsletter should be designed so as to be sent to advertisers as well, not only to expand the readership and sense of community, but to provide an additional promotional tool for the station.

Davies cautions, "first-class writing and editing is absolutely essential. Otherwise, your newsletter can quickly turn into a gossip sheet or be so poorly produced that it won't be taken seriously or even read. A well-written newsletter can be the perfect vehicle to sell your company's philosophy, promote strategic objects among your workforce, and recognize employees who have made significant contributions. It can help create a feeling of 'family' within the organization.'

My thanks to Mr. Davies for an excellent idea, that I think could prove practical for stations of any size. However, be sure to spell and punctuate correctly! Such errors can make the management look like uneducated jerks. If the editor of the newsletter is not sure of their spelling, have someone who is look over

the manuscript before it's printed!

In a recent column, I quoted a past Gavin Seminar keynote speaker, management consultant Tom Peters. In this clipping, I do so again. As a part of a list of 50 "management strategies" Peters offered recently in his syndicated column (copyright 1991, TPG Communications), designed to shake up the "planners" and encourage the "innovators," he offered one principle that should be helpful to most of us in radio, since we all seem to be fired at some time or another, and despite knowing better, we all still tend to take it rather hard. Peters offers as "management strategy #20".

"Get fired. (More than once is OK.) If you're not pushing hard enough to get sacked, you're not

pushing hard enough."

If you tend to get traumatized by the personal experience of being fired after doing what you consider really good work for a company, maybe you ought to have that statement made up in the form of a framed "sampler" and liang it on your wall! That is not to say you should not learn from experience, but surely the worst lesson to learn would be that maybe next time you should not do your best, give your all, or stick to your beliefs! Does anybody know exactly how many times the late Rick Carroll got fired for following his unique programming vision before he finally became a legend? It was quite a few.

Changing the subject once again, one of the staple pieces of equipment in radio newsrooms has always been the "pushbutton phone"—the handset with the big button in the middle that switched on the mouthpiece only when you are going to talk, and cuts it off when the button released, in order to make a clean "actuality" tape. Turning it on and off always causes a big pop.

A company called Miwltronics has come up with an improvement on that design—a small module with a mercury switch inside which reportedly turns the mouthpiece on and off with pops, and that does away with that button (and the expensive custom handset). The module, called the "Automute," installs in the earpiece of the standard handset; when you raise the mouth piece higher than the earpiece, the mouth piece is muted (it's also muted when you place the handset face down on a tabletop, but not if you put it down on its side). MOONLIGHTING

VIDEO COUNTRY

Part 1 of 2

n March 6, I moderated the opening session at this year's Country Radio Seminar, which concerned video and its impact on Country radio.

Among those featured on the panel was Bob Allen, VP/GM of KCRG, Cedar Rapids. Bob was unable to attend, but sent a video presentation. From his tape, which was edited from an interview I conducted with Bob, here are highlights.

MOON MULLINS: When did you change the format and what have been the early

BOB ALLEN: We changed the format of KCRG radio about a year ago, and since then the audience has grown considerably and sales have increased over fifty per cent, so we are very pleased with the progress the radio station has made.

MM: How did KCRG Radio get involved in video programs on KCRG/TV?

BA: Most of you don't have the advantage that we have in that we have owned KCRG Radio and since 1948 and we've owned KCRG television since 1953, in one of those interesting "grandfather" situations we just don't see much of anymore. And, of course, we are able to use the television station to help promote the radio station and there aren't very many AM radio stations who have that kind of advantage. On the other hand, if we didn't have the television station to help back up the radio station it is very possible we would be on satellite today or off the air, instead of growing as we have been.

MM: What does a radio station need to do to approach a TV station for a joint promotion or video program?

BA: The biggest problem I have had as the television general manager is the radio station program director who calls me up and says to me, "How can we get involved with you, how can we do some cross promotion? and I usually say, "Well gosh, I would like to do something, what are your ideas?" I have found that most radio program directors have a lot of trouble thinking TV. If you have a radio station that appeals to a certain demo that's a key demo to a television station, think about ways you can sell the idea of reaching that targeted demo or your targeted audience to that TV station. So think TV!

MM: Where should the stations go first? BA: First of all, I would try cable systems. There are lots of similarities between TV, cable systems and radio in that they both try to reach targeted audiences and very often they are looking for local product. And, a well-produced local video show is something a lot of local cable systems would like to have, especially if you give them an opportunity to sell advertising.

MM: How would you do that?

BA: Perhaps you can split the advertise-

ments between the two of you and if you offer to cross promote the time the video show appears on the cable system, that has a big appeal. It's also appealing to a local broadcaster in your area because we're also looking for those 25-54-year-old key demos. Since Country radio is increasing its appeal to adults of all socio-economic areas, I think there are some tremendous opportunities out there for cross promotion between the two.

MM: Give some examples.

BA: Think about ways to use their meteorologist to do your weather. If you are a AM radio station or perhaps a full service station, think about ways to simulcast some of their newscasts on your radio station and build it into a package. The package might include the video show you're wanting to do and that might be the quid pro quo: they get a lot of exposure in your drive time for their news and weather personalities in exchange for which they trade you some afternoon or fringe air time for your country video show. The main idea is, have your thoughts well collected, put a program together, and never give up, never give up.

MM: How do you produce a local video

BA: Well, we again have an advantage in that we have a television production department, but it doesn't have to be complicated. What we do at KCRG is record the opens and closes, the intros and the outros to the music videos one right after the other on video tape, just the same way you record liners for an automated radio station and then the TV station has a director or producer-director who's assigned to mix the show. We simply do A-B rolls and just dissolve in and out, we lay in supers. It's a very simple process that doesn't take a lot of time and can be done relatively inexpensively.

MM: How would a typical radio station that?

BA: If your local TV station doesn't have production facilities and if you are well-heeled enough, I will tell you there are some very inexpensive production facilities now for as little as a few thousand dollars that can produce very fine, very passable quality material on the 3/4 inch tape for TV and even on super VHS tape for cable. I would not recommend using VHS tape because it breaks down in multi-generations but SVHS is certainly worth looking at. Anybody can grab it, run out and take pictures of things. And the whole SVHS capability cost us \$1,500. The thing is practically indestructible and I would defy anybody to tell the difference between it and 3/4 inch. In fact, the resolution of SVHS tape is about double of 3/4 inch tape, and 3/4 inch cameras are pretty much the norm in our business.

y definition of a boombastic stylin', mindblowin sonic creation:

DREAM WARRIORS:

A carnival ride for the psyche via beats and off center samples, obtained through a Canadian Rap duo on their slammin' debut, " ...And Now the Legacy Begins."

Now close the dictionary and get hype to he rhythm.

Comprised of King Lou and Capital Q (as in Quiet Storm), the DREAM WARRIORS have taken the subliminal sound bites of life and casually created, well, art. The just-released album is easily a contender as one of the year's ten best releases. It's that impressive.

Originating from Toronto's equivalent of the projects, Capital Q (aka Frank Lennon Alert) and King Lou (aka Louis Robinson) met in school. Working and fine tuning their rapping skills, their legacy was on the verge of actuality. It wasn't until 1986 that they formally became the DREAM WARRIORS. With the help of longtime chum Ivan Berry (whose Beat Factory is responsible for much of Canada's Hip Hop scene), the dream began to emerge.

Fast forward to 1990 - a year that yielded two Top Twenty hits for the duo in—of all places—Europe! As a matter of fact, "Wash Your Face in My Sink," the first single, holds the record for longest charting rap single in British history. What is it about these DREAM WARRIORS that woke up the notoriously weird U.K. audience? Perhaps it is the unpredictable nature of their music. The second single, "My Definition of a Boombastic Style," (currently in the Gavin Rap Top 20) samples an old Canadian game show theme for it's backbeat. The show was called "Definition" and, strangely enough, the cheesy theme was actually an old Quincy Jones track, "Soul Bossa Nova" Even Quincy was amused.

A trip through the tracks on the album is

a journey through all cultures and mindsets. After the opening "Definition," with its '60s psychedelia, you enter the jazzy "Follow Me Not." Next stop is the ska/reggae fest "Ludi" - a tribute to King Lou's mom that's about the West Indian board game that is not unlike our game "Sorry." (Incidentally, the B-side to the U.K. single of "Ludi" features the last performance with late Jazz legend Slim Gillard). Later on this side, you tune into a "Tune From a Missing Channel," which features a broadcast-interruption rap that fades in and out of frequency. It concludes with "Wash Your Face In My Sink," which borrows a sort of high school band sample to rap over the positive and negative of cell life—the toilet and the sink.

Side two opens with "Voice Through the Multiverse," a cosmic dance assault. Later, we are confronted with "Face in the Basin," - a retread and expansion of the sink thing. "Do Not Feed the Alligators" is fun and simple, unlike "12-Sided Dice," a bizarre commentary on the complex roll playing world of Dungeons & Dragons. The CD concludes with "Answer for the Owl."

Taking Canada and rap to new and wonderful places, the DREAM WARRIORS are thus vacant from only one spot—U.S. domination. The challenge is waiting and the legacy begins now...







The Country Class Of 1991

When we had our First Annual Country Class issue back in 1986, we couldn't have imagined the effect new artists would have on the overall state of Country Music. It wasn't so long ago that Country Music had a reputation for not giving new artists a break. In the last few years, new artists have become the lifeblood of the format, selling platinum and double platinum. The percentage of the Class of 1991 who have already had Top Ten records is staggering—higher than any previous year. We're confident that this current group will go on to join recent Country Class graduates Garth Brooks ('89), Kathy Mattea ('86), Clint Black ('89), the Kentucky Headhunters ('90), K.T. Oslin ('87), Shenandoah ('88), Randy Travis ('86), Patty Loveless ('87), Highway 101 ('87), Alan Jackson ('90) and Ricky Van Shelton ('87) as Country Music's new superstars.



Mark Chesnutt

Linterviewed Mark Chesnutt for the first time right after "Too Cold At Home" burned up the charts last summer. His producer, Mark Wright, had written most of the songs on Chesnutt's debut album, and Mark admitted that was because it was difficult for him as a new artist to find quality songs. Rest assured he's not having the same problem these days. After the success of "Too Cold At Home," "Brother Jukebox," and "Blame It On Texas," songwriters are busting down his door. "I found a lot of great songs for this new album," Chesnutt enthused, "It was hard to narrow it down to the twelve I'm going to cut."

Chesnutt is a straight-to-the-core Country singer, who recognized his calling early on. "It's all I ever wanted to do, as far back as I can remember," Chesnutt says quietly. He formed his first band when he was in junior high school, and was playing clubs at 15. He attained a loyal following in his hometown of Beaumont, Texas, and released a few singles on the AXBAR and Cherry labels, including the original version of "Too Cold At Home." In the meantime, Chesnutt made trips to Nashville to hunt for songs and a record deal. MCA regional promotion manager Ramsey Corkill took Chesnutt's original recording of "Too Cold At Home" to MCA A&R chief Tony Brown. "His voice was too good to be true, and the song was a hit," Brown said. "So I flew down to see him and that's all she wrote." And while his new-found fame has upset his fishing schedule, Chesnutt's not complaining. Like he says, this is all he's ever wanted to do. CH

Rob Crosby

When you talk to Rob Crosby, you get the feeling he's a man who's definitely got both feet on the ground and his priorities in order. "I was raised with a strong sense of family," he explains. "I feel fortunate to know about my background. My father comes from a three hundred year line of New England Yankees, and my mother's family moved to Sumter, South Carolina from Atlanta in the 1860s to escape Sherman's advance during the Civil War. I was born and raised in Sumter and had a very happy childhood there."

While Rob's older brother and sister studied Country music seri-



ously, Rob got his first guitar when he was nine and began writing songs. "I started playing music professionally when I was in high school," he said. "I quit college and ended up playing around South Carolina and in the Southeast. My parents were disappointed when I quit school, but I think after ten years they have finally come to terms with the fact that I'm not going back to college!"

So when did he get his big break? "I was playing a Writer's Night. I was really intimidated by some of the other people on the show— Fred Knobloch, Billy Dean, Tom Schuyler—and I got up there with my knees shaking and played my three songs. When the show was over, Tim DuBois approached me and introduced himself and said he enjoyed what I did. About a week later Tim's partner Scott Hendricks asked if I was interested in working with them as an artist. Then Tim got the offer to head up Arista Records in Nashville. And

that has definitely been the high point of my career. When Tim and Scott shook my hand and agreed to produce me, I felt like my life's dream had finally come true, because I believed in them so much.

"I'm a songwriter," he continues, "and had that dream about reaching other people in other places. Coming to Nashville gave me the chance to grow as a songwriter and as a singer by doing studio work. Now here I am back on the road doing what I used to do. Hopefully I'm better at it, and I certainly have a better opportunity to make it go farther." LS

Davis Daniel

Davis Daniel's trek to Nashville came as much from a pioneer spirit instilled in him by his family as from his love of music. As a boy he joined his parents and eight brothers and sisters on a cross-country journey to Nebraska, seeking land to build a ranch. They took sickles to twelve years' growth of Nebraska weeds and endured painfully cold winters to help his father build his dream house by hand. Davis' love of music came a little later. "I didn't get interested in music until I was about 17 or 18, at a Willie Nelson concert in Denver," he remembers. "When I saw him at the concert I thought, 'man, what a great way to make a living.' I got a cheap little guitar and learned how to



play with a Willie Nelson songbook. Eventually I put a band together. We beat up Denver a June 7, 1991/the GAVIN REPORT

little bit on the weekends, and then about three years ago I got a wild hare and decided I'd try to make it in Nashville."

While his adventurous spirit made the decision to go to Nashville easy, trying to make it in a town that's bursting with talented singers, songwriters and musicians was a whole different story. "I started by looking in the Sunday paper that had a list of all the clubs and I'd go to Open Mike nights," he recalls. "I'd bump into people there who were doing the same thing I was doing, and they'd tell me about other places I could play. I started playing American Legions and Writer's Nights-wherever I could find someone who would listen to me." Daniel eventually met Ron Haffkine, the guiding force behind Dr. Hook, who brought Daniel to PolyGram and remains his producer and manager. LS

Billy Dean

Not only does Billy Dean have a great voice and a knack for songwriting he's also one heck of a nice guy.



Growing up in Northern Florida, he cites his father as his main musical influence. Billy Dean Sr., who sang and played with a band called The Country Rocks, taught Billy how to play the guitar and encouraged him to pattern his singing after great singers like Marty Robbins and Iim Reeves. But when did he really get serious about his music? "I decided this was the career for me when I was in high school. I started getting around town and playing music and the money was really good. I'd make fifty dollars for playing a couple of hours at parties and I realized I could work all week somewhere else and only make a hundred dollars. I didn't do real well in math, but I could figure this situation out pretty easily!"

With hefty support from the local following he'd built up, Billy won the local and state Wrangler Talent Shows and advanced to the finals in Nashville. He made it to the top ten in the finals, and that gave him the confidence he needed to stay in Nashville and pursue his career full force. "I moved here and met a lot of people and got into the songwriting. I sang on a lot of demos so my voice and my name would get circulated to all the labels and the producers. I did what I could do to stay in town until I finally got my record contract."

The contract came when Jimmy Bowen signed him to Capitol Nashville through a production deal with SBK. Things have been moving pretty fast ever since, with the success of "Only Here For A Little While" and his current single "Somewhere In My Broken Heart" barrelling up the chart.

It's been a busy year, between meet and greets with radio stations across the country, to performing at this year's Gavin Seminar, to appearing at the New Faces Show at the CRS. Any other highlights? "I got real excited when I started to

records do well on the charts. I'd read the charts and memorize all the statistics but I realized something was missing. This

couldn't be all there was to having a hit record. Then I went to do my first performance at Texas Stadium in Dallas. When I walked out there and heard 30,000 people screaming my name and singing "Only Here For A Little While" along with me, I thought, 'Wow, playing in front of an audience and getting to sing your hit record, that's what it's all about!'" LS

Martin Delray

If anybody on this roster of new artists has paid their dues, it's Mar-

tin Delray. While he's had his share of successes in this business, there have been plenty of lean times when someone with a little less determination would have given up. "Deep down! think!'ve always



thought this was what I was supposed to be doing," Martin reflects. "Although there's been several periods that have been very frustrating, you just have to believe in yourself and know that you have the talent to get the job done."

Delray first realized he had that talent growing up in Texarkana, Arkansas. As a youngster, he practiced on a guitar left behind by a friend's brother who had joined the Air Force. He spent his high school years performing around his home town with a Country group and he kept it up while working on a political science degree at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville. Following a hitch in the Marine Corps, he moved to Los Angeles, where he started on the nightclub circuit and opened for acts like Doug Kershaw and Juice Newton.

While in L.A., Delray was signed as a staff writer to the publishing company owned by Seals and Crofts. One of the songs he wrote during this period, "Old Fashioned Love" became a number one hit for The Kendalls and another song, "Somebody's Lyin' to Someone" won "Country Song of the Year" honors from the American Song Festival.

While he was having success with his songwriting, Delray still had that nagging desire to make it big as a Country singer. He made the move to Nashville in 1983, but success wasn't right around the corner. "I was going around to publishing companies trying to get a deal around three years ago," he said. "Someone told me that Blake Mevis and Rick Blackburn had started a publishing and produc-



Ray Kennedy

Besides being amazingly talented, Ray Kennedy is a very diverse person with a lot of interesting trivia surrounding his life. First there's his family. His great-grandmother died in the historic shipwreck of the Titanic. His father conceived and developed the Discover Card, which has become



one of the nation's most frequently used credit cards. Then there's Ray himself, who became interested in music after he built his own guitar when he was 15. He is still a collector of vintage guitars, with some models dating back to the 1920s. "Music kind of chose me," Ray muses. "As I was growing up, I really thought I was going to do something else. I went to college and tried to figure out who I was supposed to be. But I always had a band on the side playing nightclubs on the weekends. I probably spent a lot more time playing the guitar than I did studying. Eventually I got a bunch of songs together that I'd written and I decided to make the move to Nashville."


Upon his arrival in Nashville, he soon had songs recorded by John Anderson, David Allen Coe and Charley Pride, in addition to having numerous jingles accepted for radio and television advertising. Encouraged by these successes, he worked on honing his songwriting and production skills. This definitely worked to his advantage when we went in search of a recording contract. "My manage-

ment company and I had a few meetings with (Atlantic Nashville President) Rick Blackburn and played my demo tapes. He liked the material a lot and also liked the production, which led to my being able to produce my own record. I was fortunate to have that kind of control. Most people don't get that."

While Kennedy has had many successes since his arrival in Nashville, he's not taking any of it for granted. "I enjoy every part of this. I enjoy writing songs and I enjoy going into the studio to record them. I like playing live and I like the traveling and the radio promotion. To me it's all a big package. But it all goes back to having a song. If I didn't have something to sing about, I probably wouldn't be doing this. That's the foundation for me." I S

Hal Ketchum

"Small Town Saturday Night," an affectionate picture of teenage angst in Anywhere, U.S.A., was the first indication that Curb had something special on their hands. Hal Ketchum, who was born in upstate New York and raised in Texas, is a seasoned songwriter and performer. He did his songwriting apprenticeship in Austin learning from some of the best-Butch Hancock, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Townes Van Zandt, Lyle Lovett and Joe Ely. "Seeing 'the Lübbock constituency' play made me concentrate on playing guitar



and writing songs," Ketchum says. "I've always liked words, and I've always been a musician. So I reached a point where I was writing poetry, and because I played guitar was capable of putting it to music." After gaining experience and motivation in Austin, Ketchum

moved to Nashville to further work at the craft of songwriting. He released an independent albumtitled Threadbare Alibis, and eventually came to the attention of Curb. His debut album for the label, Past The Point Of Rescue, contains seven original songs.

Ketchum says that at last year's Fan Fair, folks would come up to him and ask, "Are you somebody?" He'd tell them, "My parents think so!" If you see Hal Ketchum this year, let him know you think so too. CH

Shelby Lynne

Shelby Lynne, recipient of the 1991 Academy of Country Music's "Best New Female Artist" award, seemed predestined for the top. Listen to this emotionally charged



voice; it's no wonder success seems to follow her around. Lynne spent many years singing in solo vocal competitions at fiddling contests throughout Southern Alabama, and usually emerged the winner. And even though her professional experience was limited at the time, in

1987 TNN booked Lynne on Nashville Now merely on the strength of her demo tape. From that appearance, she was offered four solid record deals. Lynne opted to go with Epic, "'cause I knew a lot of stars on that label and I was a fan of George Jones,

Merle Haggard and Tammy Wynette."

A legend-in-the-making herself, Shelby Lynne seems to blend right in with the best of Country music. Her first introduction to radio was a duet with George Jones, "If I Could Bottle This Up," and already she's performed in front of thousands, opening for Randy Travis, and winning the hearts of many fans when she performed at last year's Fan Fair. Singing to an enthusiastic following suits Shelby Lynne best. "That's the part of this business I love the most," she says. "Performing is where I can really show my stuff."

And show her stuff she does. Her sophomore album "Tough All Over" has caught the attention of radio and video outlets throughout the country. Her personal style blends old pop standards with a bluesy feel that comes across strong on such cuts as "Don't Get Around Much Anymore" and "Dog Day Afternoon." Shelby Lynne can count some Country legends as true fans; George Jones refers to Lynne as "my little adopted daughter," and such superstars as Randy Travis and Reba McEntire call her an incredible singer, with a powerful voice. Continuing on the trail to success, Shelby Lynne wants to be known as "not just a singer, but as à great singer." Sounds like she already is. ND



started ringing. Producer Paul Worley was the first to call, and then came inquiries from Mercury, Arista and RCA. Warner Nashville eventually offered the band a recording contract, while Tree signed Molly to a publishing deal. "I don't know how those people all got tapes," Molly says incredulously, "but they seemed to filter down to Nashville."

Molly is quick to point out that while they were lucky with the initial contact, the band was ready to back it up with the goods. "We were really prepared for our opportunity when it did come," she explains. "We were producing a lot, so when they called, I had another tape of new songs for them right away. They realized that I was writing a lot, that the band was active and that it was different."

That difference is what caused all the commotion in the first place. Up in Hayward, Wisconsin, away from all the latest trends, Molly and the band were able to forge their own sound, which they describe as "high energy Country twang." When Molly made her first trip to Nashville, she asked Paul Worley if he thought they could make it in the business without moving to town. He told her directly, "You guys have come up with something different. If you come down here you'll just start sounding like everybody else." So the band will stay based in Wisconsin, where Molly can concentrate on writing songs and raising her family-and continue to ride the edge of progressive Country music. CH

Pirates Of The Mississippi

Pirates Of The Mississippi came



together naturally, or accidentally, depending on who's telling the story. According to lead guitar player and co-producer Rich Alves, "I got together with some friends and we starting talking about how we missed jammin'. So we thought we'd put a group together and start playing in the basement—just get a couple of six packs of beer and start jammin'."

And that's basically how this fivesome came together. Their sound meshes like they've been playing for years, almost as if they were chosen to play together. But that was hardly the case. All five members held various day jobs: one was a computer analyst, a couple were successful songwriters for Nashville publishing houses, one worked in a factory and one was a sought-after session player. Together Rich Alves, Pat Seers, Dean Townson, Jimmy Lowe and Bill McCorvey congregated after work and on weekends because, says Rich, "we all missed the old band camaraderie. Bill and I started writing songs for the group, and every weekend we'd get together and just have a good time."

After about a year the band had a repertoire of songs, and due to pressure from family and friends decided to find a place to play live. "We started playing at a little place called the Settler, and the first night we had about fifty people," said Rich. "We'd play there about every two months. We didn't charge anything-it was open house. Before we knew it the place was packed—people were out on the streets. That's when we knew we had a little magic going on, and that's when we decided to contact some of my buddies in the music business. From there we decided to accept a record deal and make a commitment to make it work."

And make it work they did. Their self-titled album displays a variety of styles, assimilating all kinds of

influences ranging from Hendrix to Clapton to Led Zeppelin's John Bonham to ZZ Top, Creedence Clearwater Revival and the Happy Goodman Family. Their songs are about real life—drunks,

hookers, rednecks—each with it own meaning.

This is a special group—a magical group, if you will—with a solid foundation. "We're just a good time jammin' band," claims Rich, "and if you want to hear some good music, come see us." I recommend you do. ND

Mike Reid

By now, most of you know the Mike Reid story. An All-American, Outland Trophy winning 1 stround



draft pick of the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals, the AFC/NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year and an NFL All-Pro in the early seventies, Mike gave up this professional football "American Dream" when, at 28, he announced his retirement to pursue his real love—music. While some folks may have thought he was crazy (to say the least), Mike didn't second guess his decision. "When I quit football, I don't think I had another game left in me. I had burned out my desire to play that game. It wasn't that I didn't like the game. It just required emotional energy, and I wasn't able to dig down that far."

Mike decision to throw his heart and soul into another career has resulted in as much success in the music industry as he had in football. His first successes in Nashville came from his songwriting. In the last decade, Reid has won virtually every major songwriting award, including two Grammys and ASCAP's "Songwriter of the Year" award. His songs have been recorded by folks like Ronnie Milsap, Bonnie Raitt, Barbara Mandrell, Reba McEntire, The Judds, Ricky Van Shelton, Willie

Nelson, Tammy Wynette and many others. Does he have a personal favorite? "Alabama's version of "Forever's As Far As I'll Go" will always be one of my favorites. It was clear that they cared so much about the song."

Now Reid himself has taken center stage and seems to revel in it. One of the most talked about events at this year's Country Radio Seminar was his performance during the ASCAP lunch, and both of his singles, "Walk On Faith" and "Till You Were Gone" have had great success. However, Reid is still focusing on his songwriting. "I recently got a letter from a family in Michigan who'd just lost a family member in the war in the Gulf. This woman recounted that they had used 'Walk On Faith' to help them get through this difficult time. Whenever I wonder why I'm doing this, I get out that letter and read it."

Pam Tillis

"The musical odyssey of Pam Tillis has been very convoluted. But I came full circle," Tillis says, laughing at her own accessment.



In her musical career Pam has sung it all, from rock and roll to jazz fusion. As a youngster she turned away from Country music which was, after all, her dad's thing. (Pam's father, Mel Tillis has been involved in almost every aspect of the Country music industry, racking up a string of hits over three decades).

Luckily for us, Pam came around. "As Country music's demographics shifted, it just seemed to fit my life more, and who I was as a



person and a mom and a Southerner. It just seemed more true. Some of my favorite artists-Dave Edmunds and Elvis Costellostarted making Country records, and I went, "Wait a minute! I can do that!' I realized that this music is so much cooler than I ever gave it credit for." Tillis set about to reeducate herself and immersed herself in the Country music of the '40s, '50s and '60s, spending her afternoons at the Country Music Foundation and bugging friends like Robert Oermann to let her raid their record collections. She started putting on shows around Nashville called Twang Nights, where she'd perform all the classics she had been discovering. "I'd do Kitty Wells, Loretta Lynn, and George Jones songs. But we'd do these real revved up versions-kind of like the Clash meets Loretta Lynn! That's when I first felt like a Country singer. And there's been no turning back." She signed a songwriting deal with Tree, and not long after found a home at Arista. Her debut single for the label, "Don't Tell Me What To Do," shot to the top of the charts, reaching number one ten years to the day that her father hit number one in Gavin with "Southern Rains."

And there might just be a third generation Tillis performer. A few weeks ago Pam's 12 year old son Ben asked her if he could sing in her show. She said, "Well, I've taught you 'Salty Dog." Ben looked up at her and said, "No Mom. I think I need a ballad. How about something by Garth Brooks?" CH

Aaron Tippin

Many people are familiar with Aaron Tippin's story by now. A



hard Country singer from South Carolina, Tippin rocketed to the Big Time last year due to the promilitary interpretation of his first single, "You've Got To Stand For Something." As a result of the song, Tippin was asked to appear with Bob Hope in Saudi Arabia, and received a lot of national press.

But it's Tippin's seasoned hillbilly voice and his intuitive songwriting that makes most of us stand at attention. His debut album has been getting raves from fans and critics alike, garnering comparisons to the King of the hillbillies, Hank Williams. Tippin, who confessed to wearing out his 8-track of Hank Sr's Greatest Hits as a teenager, just shakes his head. "That's a big set of shoes to fill. I'm thrilled about that, even though it's like comparing a peanut to a watermelon. Obviously Hank Williams was one of the very strong influences in my musical career. Hank, Jimmie Rodgers, Lefty Frizzell, Buck Owens, the old cats. They are my teachers."

Anyone who's ever seen Tippin knows that he's a former competitive bodybuilder. He's also a pilot, having earned his license at the age of 15. Does he see any similarities between the life of a Country music singer and that of a pilot? "The thrill is the same," Tippin

explains. "Also, in the airplane business, if something goes wrong, you don't get a second chance. You better be right. When I go out and do a song, I want it to be that kind of right." Tippin would have to agree that his music career so far is right on course. "Things have just fallen into place," he says gratefully. "I couldn't have sat down and planned these things. I'm really thankful." CH

B.B. Watson

Some lucky radio programmers got their introduction to B.B. Watson at this year's Country Ra-



dio Seminar, when he sang on RCA's General Jackson showcase. Actually, sang doesn't really describe B.B.'s dynamic performance. It was what B.B. might call "honky tonkin' the town"—a show so full of sweat and energy that our mar-

keting rep Lisa Austin remarked, "He looks like he's gonna jump right out of his skin!"

To those unfamiliar with Watson, he's the debut artist on BMG's new label, and even though he's from Texas, he ain't no Hat Act. Watson grew up shuttling between his mom's house in Shreveport and his dad's place in Houston and began performing on the Texas-Louisiana circuit as a teenager. Along the way he developed a unique style that combines Country with jump blues, western swing, r&b—a style he calls "Southern honky tonk uptempo fun music."

Watson had released a few albums in Texas and Louisiana, and while he got regional airplay, he wasn't satisfied. He hustled his way into Joe Galante's office and was asked to join the label after a live audition. B.B. was thrilled, relishing the thought of telling his

mom that he was on the same label as Elvis.

B.B. picked up his nickname at a Nashville recording session when studio musicians, noticing how he nailed every song on the first take, started calling him "Bad Boy," later shortening it to "B.B." He says he went after a real honky tonk sound on his debut album, patterning his stuff after Gary Stewart's influential '70s work with RCA. The songs fit him perfectly. "I feel like I've lived all of the songs," B.B. confesses. His first single, "'Light At The End

Of The Tunnel," is no exception. "It's funny, and it's so real. There is a light at the end of the tunnel, at least you hope there is. And that's what it's all about—hope." CH







ICE-T KILLS COP KILLER

After weeks of controversy, Sire/Warner Bros. artist Ice-T has decided to withdraw the Body Count song, "Cop Killer" from distribution.

Warner Bros. officials expressed surprise, but indicated that the company will stop manufacturing and pressing the album immediately, and will release an amended version of it which will be available within four weeks. They have requested that music retailers return all unsold copies of the album.

In the past weeks, Time Warner has been under intense pressure from police associations to stop distributing the album. Many major retailers refused to stock it.

In a press conference Ice-T, whose real name is Tracy Morrow, said he wanted to shield his label from further criticism, and that Warner Bros. has supported him all the way. "It's not a Warner Bros. fight, it's my fight," he said. In defense of the song he added, "The record is not a call to murder police. The record is about anger. This is the end result of police brutality. I don't

know why I'm supposed to like the police. They've never been a friend of black people...When somebody says to me, 'What about the slain police officers?' I say, 'What about the slain kids?' "

Another reason for pulling the cut, Ice-T said, was that he was afraid it would be dragged into the current 'traditional values' debates. "This is like the Willie Horton thing," he said of the controversial 1988 commercial employed by President Bush. "They are using me as a platform."

Ice-T plans to give away tapes of "Cop Killer" at his concerts to prove the song was not released for profit.

Konowitch to Maverick, DeMann Entertainment Restructures



Former MTV executive Abbey Konowitch has returned to the record industry as Vice President of Maverick Recording Com-

pany. Prior to Konowitch's four years as MTV's Senior Vice President of Music and Talent, he was a Vice President of Artist Development and Video for Arista Records.

"Abbey's vision and energy are perfectly suited to Maverick's own," said label co-CEO Freddy DeMann. "Abbey and Maverick are another perfect combination. Madonna and I are thrilled to welcome him aboard."

This week the new company announced the signing of the Los Angeles-based rap/rock/theatrical band Proper Grounds and the inking of an exclusive publishing deal with Andre Betts, who co-wrote Madonna's "Justify My Love."

In a related move, DeMann announced the restructuring of his company, **DeMann Entertainment**. The firm will continue to represent Madonna and **Lionel Richie**, but will no longer be associated with the **Divinyls** and **Smithereens**. The move will affect veteran promoter **Bert Stein** and **Sherry Marsh**, who will be leaving the company.


Banned in South Africa

Cacciatore Dances To RCA



Godfathers of Surf Music, THE BEACH BOYS, are having their biggest single since "Kokomo," as "Hot Fun In The Summertime" has moved #37 to #21 to #17 with 60 ADDs in that two-week span. New now at Q104, KLTA, WBDX/FM, KXLK, KFYR and

LINDSEY BUCKINGHAM



Mary-Chapin Carpenter Taking Chances

"I took a walk in the rain one day on the wrong side of the tracks/I stood on the rail 'til I saw that train/Just to see how my heart would react/Now some people say that you shouldn't tempt fate/And for them I would not disagree/But I learned nothing from playing it safe/I say fate should not tempt me.

"I take my chances, I don't mind working without a net/I take my chances every chance I get."

Mary-Chapin Carpenter. Grammy award winner. Brown University graduate. Renown singer/songwriter known for her tours with Shawn Colvin and the Indigo Girls. A quick look at the fact sheet would never give away the punch line: Mary-Chapin is a Country Music star.

One of the great things about Country radio today is that it can embrace an artist like Mary-Chapin Carpenter, who doesn't wear a hat and doesn't pretend to. She didn't grow up on a ranch, she was born in Princeton, New Jersey. When she was ten years old, her father, an executive for Life magazine, moved the family to Japan where he served as the publishing director for Life's Asian edition. Chapin graduated from Brown University and got her start in the coffeehouses of Washington D.C. where she continues to live and record. She's Ivy League, very articulate and doesn't poof up her hair. Yet there is no doubt that Mary-Chapin is a Country singer, who has gradually built a following with her insightful songs and dynamic performances.

She's done it by taking chances all along. In 1990, Mary-Chapin was asked to perform at the Country Music Association awards. The producers of the show wanted her to do a song from her live set, "Opening Act," a satirical song that pokes fun at a certain hillbilly headliner while bemoaning the trials and tribulations of opening a show. She was a bit nervous about how it would go over, but her deadpan delivery brought the industry crowd to its feet.

Mary-Chapin made her recording debut in 1987, recording songs in longtime friend/guitarist John Jennings' basement studio, with the intent of making a cassette to sell at her gigs. Columbia snapped up the demo and released it as 1987's folksy Hometown Girl. Her followup, State Of The Heart, was released in 1989 and yielded her first hits "How Do," "Never Had It So Good" and "Something of a Dreamer." But

it was with 1990's Shooting Straight In The Dark album that Chapin really broke wide open. "Down at The Twist And Shout," Chapin's Cajun stomp featuring Beausoleil, became her first number one record and earned her a Grammy for Best Vocal Performance/Female, Country.

The new album, Come On Come On, is being called her best yet. "I think it's important that you don't make the same record over and over again," Chapin says. "You want to experience growth and feel that you are saying that in your writing.

"I feel my past records have been very inward looking," she says thoughtfully. "I had a desire to look a bit more outward this time, and I believe the songs reflect that." Chapin wrote ten of the album's twelve songs, four of them with Don Schlitz, marking the first time she's done any serious co-writing with a Nashville songwriter. The pairing at first seems odd, as Schiltz is a super-successful commercial songwriter while Chapin's songs have always fallen a little left of center. Yet the two caught fire, and the collaboration yielded extraordinary songs that run the gamut from the hip "I Feel Lucky" to the defiant "I Take My Chances" to the devastating "He Thinks He'll Keep Her."

"The thing that really made me want to write with Don were some songs that he played me from his 'private stash,'" Chapin admits. "They were things he had written that no one had heard—awesome songs that knocked me out.

"I remember the day we wrote 'He Thinks He'll Keep Her.' Don had already started working on the song, and I remember it being upbeat and positive. I was in a really dark mood, and I said, 'I don't think I can write that song with you today.' And he switched gears immediately. By the end of the day 'He Thinks He'll Keep Her' is what we came up with.

"It's a real unknown when you sit down with someone," Chapin continues. "We weren't sure if we had any common ground, but needless to say I was exceedingly pleased with the collaboration."

Another surprise on the album is her duet with Joe Diffie. A stone-Country singer, Diffie is not an obvious choice to team with Chapin. "I think I surprised the label when I first suggested Joe Diffie, because we have such disparate styles," Chapin agrees. "But I've always felt that Joe has that understanding and respect for

the great stylists, without being imitative of them. The emotional quality within his singing is so compelling to me. I felt that 'Not Too Much To Ask' was the most Country piece of music I've ever attempted and I felt that he lent something to that, something that I wasn't sure I could achieve by myself.


"I looked at it the same way I did 'Twist And Shout'—as a musical adventure. Because, let's face it, Cajun is not what I grew up with. In the same way that I can't claim to be a dyed-in-the-wool mainstream Country musician, but I felt 'Not Too Much To Ask' could be another musical adventure for me, expanding my horizons."

By touring and working with other exceptional, unclassifiable artists like Rosanne Cash, Shawn Colvin, Nanci Griffith, the Indigo Girls and Lucinda Williams, Chapin has been able to expand her horizons in another way—by exposing her music to different audiences. Chapin chose the Lucinda Williams' song, "Passionate Kisses," as one of the album's two covers. "When I cover a song, the criteria is that I have to connect with it in some way," she says. "Passionate Kisses' is an incredible song—an anthem. I did a songwriter's tour in Australia with Lucinda and Rosanne last fall and I would just go nuts listening to 'Passionate Kisses.' I think Lucinda was finally exasperated enough, and she said, 'Chapin, why don't you just cut that song!' I don't think I would have done it unless I received her blessing; it meant a lot to me. It's one of the highlights of our shows now,"

Chapin also covers Dire Straits' "The Bug," a song she laughingly refers to as "very Zen," while citing Mark Knopfler as one of her heroes.

Chapin smiles when asked how it feels being referred to now as "Grammy Award-winner Mary-Chapin Carpenter." "I can't help it," she admits. "It gives me goosebumps. You have to be careful not to put too much emphasis on awards, because that's not what you got into this for. But when it comes your way it's a very gratifying thing. I'm very fortunate and very lucky.

"I've been delighted (with Country Radio's acceptance)," Chapin continues. "Anytime a door opens it's a wonderful feeling. It's unwise to take anything for granted, and assume that that door is going to be open, but as long as it is I'm very happy."

LIFE AFTER BIRCH

om Birch was a program director who did his own ratings. They were so well accepted that his competition started buying them, and that led Tom into the ratings business. Birch's telephone interview-based service sidestepped some of the inaccuracies of the telephone-placed, mail-distributed, self-administered diary, and established a strong niche not only for audience research, but for advertiser-oriented circulation information. Agencies and buyers, attracted to the concept of accuracy in ratings (too often, a minority in the business), came to support Birch's product.

Tom Birch made money with his ratings, and a research firm made a very lucrative offer to buy the company. However, the firm couldn't contain costs, or overestimated the potential return, and abruptly folded the company last December.

Several research services have demonstrated interest in filling the role of the "second radio service," but so far the firm best positioned to do so is another rating company that started exactly the same way Birch did.

Jim Willhight was a program director at a station in Washington state. He did his own inmarket ratings, and after his competition started to buy them, he moved to Seattle and went into business full time. That was well over a decade ago, and Jim has built widespread agency acceptance in the Pacific Northwest for Willhight Research surveys. He's been so well accepted that at one time, in Yakima, Washington, Arbitron, Birch and Willhight services were all surveying simultaneously, with stations subscribing to all of them! For many years, other markets in the region have been surveyed by Willhight only.

Last month I had the chance to sit down and talk with Jim about his service. He told me he will be surveying 75 markets this fall, but is not in a position to survey any market where there is not at least one subscribing station. (Subscription discounts are available in multi-subscriber situations.) The rates are, roughly, comparable with Birch's in the same markets, and generally they're far less than Arbitron's. Willhight uses a telephone-interview technique very similar to the one used by Birch, with some refinements to make sure stations are identified accurately. These steps make possible a unique programming tool—a supplemental ratings report available in surveyed markets that identifies how many respondents knew your call letters, slogans, personalities, positioning liners, etc., by

category; how many who listened to your station didn't know them; how many who listened to your station who thought they knew them and were wrong. The study shows the same information about competing stations.

Generally, the samples are significantly larger than Arbitron's and, like Birch, feature only one respondent per household. Books can be ordered for standardized marketing areas, station-defined marketing areas and for breakouts from larger studies. Samples are balanced by ZIP code, and thus ZIP code-based ratings data can be obtained.

These days I doubt there's much argument that the radio business is too important to be at the mercy of the fluctuations of one ratings service—or at the pricing mercy of one rating service either. Wherever you may be in the country, whatever market size, I suggest you obtain samples of Willhight's work for subscription consideration. The format he uses is slightly different from other surveys, but once you're used to it you'll find all the information you expected from Birch, and with what I believe to be a slightly higher accuracy. Aside from the custom programmer studies available, Willhight is a pioneer in developing useful "qualitative"

information; Jim Willhight was publishing it before Birch, and has done it presenting many more categories than Birch customarily offered. Also, his ratings data is available on computer disk, as is Arbitron's and was Birch's.

Another programmer who has been in the ratings business for a long time, using data based on his own successful "station research" methodology, is the veteran and well-known Phoenix-based program director Todd Wallace. Wallace's "Radio Index" telephone technique, while not as sophisticated as Birch's and Willhight's, has had wide acceptance and remains virtually the only service able to do "special event one-day surveys," and "overnight" radio ratings. It's also the least expensive alternative for conventional ratings, but is not particularly well-known to ad agencies, which is a potential handicap. Nonetheless, in areas in which his data is the only information available, it has been accepted. For more information, call Todd Wallace toll-free at (800) 528-6082.







"old" friends and rookie tenor sax whiz Joshua Redman rings in the "new." The Bop here is drivin' and thrivin'. All eras bleed into one timeless agenda. The musicians scramble the eggs with anecdotal ease. That welcome spirit is contagious to the listener. Clark Terry's muted, blustery tones on the ultra swinging "True Blue" are witty and fresh. Duke's "It Don't Mean A Thing" is the epitome of the unselfish comradeship of these sessions.

PROVIDENCE - HIROSHIMA (EPIC)

Our records show that East, the previous Hiroshima effort, first surfaced way back in February of 1989. One personnel change we noticed is new singer Jeanette Clinger. The opening track, "Time On The Nile," bears encouraging news. The opening minutes rain colorations of piano, koto, strings and some Miles-styled trumpet musings. Then the percussion and synth blasts kick in, and the sound becomes supremely dynamic and urgent. For those of you who wore out your Greenwich/Utley CDs, try "Island World," where the oil drum returns to the solo spotlight. There's plenty of percussive oomphhere too. June Kuramoto's koto is vibrant and modern, vet still exotic and timeless on the slow instrumental ballad "Turning Point." Majestic stuff for princely playlists.


HAUNTED HEART - CHARLIE HADEN QUARTET WEST (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

Starting with his earliest involvement with Ornette Coleman and culminating with the Liberation Music Orchestra and various session stints and a tour with David Sanborn, Charlie Haden has always championed the notion of stepping out and taking charge of your sound. Whether you liked him or not, Charles Mingus pulled it off. So did Ellington's fullback bassist Jimmy Blanton. Quartet West tackling a set of standards might seem tame on paper, but Haden gives his players latitude. Each is highly accomplished. Just when you dub Ernie Watts a technician, along comes the emotionally eccentric "Dance Of The Infidels." Watts sounds more like Lester Young than a former member of Doc's Tonight Show Band.

"Lennie's Pennies" is a swirling tribute to Lennie Tristano, with fluid piano acrobatics from Alan Broadbent. Yet, as usual, it's Haden's thick, tremendous bass bravado that pushes Haunted Heart into the black. It's not as hair-raising as LMO, but Haden's fascination with blending torch singers with classic movie theme music and fortified Bop is a classy, credible experiment. Charlie's reputation helps push it over the top.

LOSTTRIBES-ZAWINULSYN-DICATE (COLUMBIA)

At last! It's the long awaited return of the Zawinul Syndicate. Those of you who saw Joe Zawinul's groove-breaking gig at the Jazz festival February's Gavin Seminar are no doubt anxious to check out the studio version of what went down that night. Zawinul's dramaticbroken rhythms fuse extraordinarily with explosive multi-culti percussion, creating a sound that hasn't been heard since his amazingly productive years with Weather Report. Lost Tribe is a blend of African, World Beat and Samba funkified with interplanetary synth trills. "Patriots" is a bare-fisted tour de force that boils over with complex yet catchy polyrhythms. Zawinul trades sporadic accents with drummer Mike Baker and it's clearly the most imaginative and poignant nod to Desert Storm we've heard. It mirrors the alchemy of high tech and Arabic scales, climaxing with victorious cheers. "South Africa" opens with authentic gunfire and commotion, then catapults into grooving choral calls and responses nestled in with Juju swing. Check out the rhythmic buildup of "Afternoon"—a swelling mixture of hand drums, kalimbas, shakers and drums. Hovering above is Zawinul's masterful impressionist keyboard. keyboard's sample is cleverly triggered to the sound of a tenor sax. Like Weather Report, the Zawinul Syndicate draws heavy on exotic polyrhythmic textures. While there are a lot of different tempos and rhythms being exchanged, it's all bound together with one cohesive vision. That's what made that live gigsomagnetic. Truth is, we much prefer Joe Zawinul's New World Order to George Bush or Bill Clinton's.





former manager/producer Marc Appel. This biography may not be the Boss's favorite but it's packed with the behind-the-scenetype stories we all love. There are some super photos and never-before-released documents that lay out the complete story of Springsteen's early years. Eliot is known for his biography of Phil Ochs, Death of a Rebel, and is currently working on a biography of Walt Disney and a novel. His Springsteen book is a serious look at the times and trials of the music business, and how one of the music world's most talented icons made it to the top. In the final analysis, it's a real how-to book. Easier to read is Springsteen: The Man and His Music from Charles R. Cross, who founded the fanzine Backstreets in 1980 and is editor of The Rocket, a Seattle music magazine. Harmony Books has found perhaps the ultimate fan in Cross, who devoted Backstreets magazine Springsteen. The 150 color and black and white photos in this book are fantastic, plus you get the E Street Band Family Tree with fascinating interviews conducted over the years with some close friends such as Southside Johnny, Max Weinberg, Little Steven Van Zandt, Clarence Clemons, and Danny Federici. There are a number of interviews with Springsteen by other famous journalists such as Crawdaddy's Paul Williams and L.A. Times music critic Robert Hilburn, and Philadelphia DJ/early supporter Ed Sciaky. There's even a section on Springsteen's studio sessions from 1966 to 1992 detailing every single song cut in the past twenty years, including the ones on his most recent albums, Human Touch and Lucky Town. There's also updated live concert listings from 1963, including the surprise club gig this past February in New Orleans with set lists and who showed up to jam. Needless to say, I'm a more knowledgeable fan now that I've taken the time to read these two books...






WELCOME TO WHEREVER YOU ARE - INXS (ATLANTIC)

INXS have proven that they have power in any direction they choose to take. Whether it's rock, ballad or dance, they have an uncanny ability to fit in across the dial without sacrificing their credibility. Welcome To Wherever You Are continues INXS's prolific winning streak. Instant out-of-the-boxers like "Heaven Sent," "Not Enough Time" and "Communication" alone should cover the airplay horizon. Personally, I go for the less obvious, snakey groove numbers. "Strange Desire" is an automatic pop fave, begins with fantastic bass and guitar counter melodies. The rhythmic catch is so supreme you find yourself hooked even before the vocal enters. "Beautiful Girl" is a similar diversion, sort of Lou Reed ice cool. It paints the sad tale of a beautiful street runaway, and the narrator tells the story halfway between being sympathetic and turned-on. Throughout the twelve song/forty-five minute span, you have ample choice between the easy pleasers and those that could be considered off the beaten path. Either way it's an adventurous listening experience.

IT'S ONLY TIME - MARK CURRY (VIRGIN)

My favorite artists seldom fit a mold or format. That's not to say Mark Curry couldn't fit on Album/Alternative radio; it's just that Curry seems to make his music and write his lyrics as if he's occupying an empty room. There's not much more than a acoustic guitar, a newspaper and a coffee cup. These days it's tremendously hard to forsake producers and excess. On the other side, spare production is equally useless if

there's nothing for the tape to capture. It's Only Time sounds years in the making in that it's rare for a debut artist to walk in with everything intact. All eleven songs reflect that exacts ort of "street preparation." Absolute proof comes late in the game. On "Somehow," my favorite track, there's really not much more than a basic four piece band. The production is extremely spare. A clock ticks away as the album ends with the acoustic title track. No doubt, this one has "major release" written all over it. As with other antitrendsetter acts (Lenny Kravitz comes immediately to mind), I hope this one is given months to percolate. Trax: "Blow Me Down," 'Sorry About The Weather," "All Over Me" just for starters.



YOUR ARSENAL -MORRISSEY (SIRE/REPRISE)

Most definitely Morrissey's finest post-Smiths recording yet. After a prolifically sporadic output in the form of stray singles and EPs, Your Arsenal re-unifies Morrissey's solo vision to the tune of ten outstanding new quartet performances. Producer Mick Ronson has toughened-up the sound considerably, dumping guitars galore up against Morrissey's moaning vocals. Even the perpetual depression can't stand in the way of the fallout of energy. In fact, the mood contrasts are intriguing. Guitarist Alain Whyte has injected lots of edge, as feedback and slide collide with Morrissey's somber, celibate images. The opening "You're Gonna Need Someone On Your Side" has

an evil, Peter Gunn feel. And that's just the beginning. Subsequent stops include "Glamorous Glue," "The National Front Disco" and "Tomorrow." This one is strong enough to force a serious US tour. We'll see.



COUNTDOWN TO EX-TINCTION - MEGADETH (CAPITOL)

Megadeth paint a pretty grim view of the world, and considering the possibilities come November, I can't say I blame them. Using a tight, compressed sound, Megadeth play on a substantially more progressive plane than the other monsters of rock, hardly cracking a smile and certainly not pandering to the video dream doll in her lip gloss and trench coat. Megadeth take their role as outsiders pretty seriously, although they sell records at the same rate as the pretty people peddling pabulum and bliss. Without comparing this to the other mega Mband, I'll say that Megadeth shows their sincerity by keeping intimacy atarm's length. To appreciate their craft, you have to at least travel half way onto their turf. Start with "Symphony Of Destruction." After that, you're on your own.

"BURST" -SHELLEYAN ORPHAN (ROUGH TRADE/ COLUMBIA)

With influences like Nick Drake, Bessie Smith, Jimi Hendrix, Mary Shelley, Van Morrison, T. Rex and the Chi-Lites, Shelleyan Orphan is truly a band after the hearts of the eclectic listener. "Burst" was written during the course of a

worldwide tour with the Cure that came about after Robert Smith took a shining to Shelleyan's 1989 album, Century Flower. Their latestsong comes as part of an EP CD that features an overview of the duo's past work. "Burst" can be found on the upcoming humroot album due August 11.

"ALL SHOOK UP" - BILLY JOEL (COLUMBIA)

Billy Joel turns into one more Elvis impersonator with a pretty fair rendition of my favorite Elvis song, "All Shook Up." His part of the Honeymoon In Vegas soundtrack, Billy plays it simple with big drums, not too far from what millions of Elvis fans could do if they were magically beamed from the shower to a recording studio.



OY VEY, BABY-TIN MACHINE (VICTORY/PLG)

Tin Machine in the studio and Tin Machine on stage are two different animals, separated by a pretty substantial chaos quotient. Oy Vey, Baby (as opposed to Achtung) is about as instantaneous as a live album gets. Recorded across America and Japan, one track, "Under The God," was mixed live to DAT. The rest of the album sounds just on the right side of frenzy. As guitarist Reeves Gabrels has always said, Tin Machine's mission was to operate onstage in the spirit of technological improvisation. You certainly get that here, as the trax are extended to artistic proportions. "Heaven's In Here," for instance, clocks in at just over twelve minutes, featuring some extreme guitar work. Meanwhile, free agent David Bowie solo seems headed toward re-signing with RCA.







IT THING - THE OTBJBDTJAE (MOIST/BAITED BREATH)


Those of you familiar with the San Francisco band The Catheads will probably want to check this offering out, as two out of three members of It Thing are former Catheads. As you might expect (and happily so) from their past, the songs on The Ode To Billy Joe Bob Dylan Thomas Jefferson Airplane Experience (whew!) are naive, punchy pop songs layered with sweet harmonies-for the most part. There are quite a few different styles on this album, and if drummer Melanie Clarin wasn't such a versatile talent, it might be difficult to take it all in and put in into perspective. As the name of the album suggests, there are quite a number of diverse influences that come into play with It Thing, and they seem quite content to show you them all at once. Who am I to argue? Without doubt, "Cupid Is Sniper" is the stand-out track. MARY-CHAPIN CARPENTER -

Come On Come On (Columbia)

A combination of lyrical wit and wisdom is an increasingly rare commodity in today's music. But this new Mary-Chapin album is brimming with provocative, highly spirited compositions that exceed the lite fantastic of roadhouse and honky tonk, and often thumb the nose of compositional convention. Unfairly pidgeon-holed as Country, Ms. Carpenter has a gift for music making that transcends every conceivable border, as evidenced in her adop-

tion of Dire Straits' THE BUG, with its wacky philosophic bent. And no sooner do we dispense with the novelty of it all comes the obsessive blissfulness of NOT TOO MUCH TO ASK (a duet with Joe Diffie). Early on, the set's opener, THE HARD WAY (with Shawn Colvin and Indigo Girls on backing vocals), and its immediate successor, HE THINKS HE'LL KEEP HER, can be cranked into full-bodied decibel heaven to fabulous effect. The set's first single, I FEEL LUCKY, is a loopy ode to lottery fever and the odds of staying happy in a mindless kinda way.
