

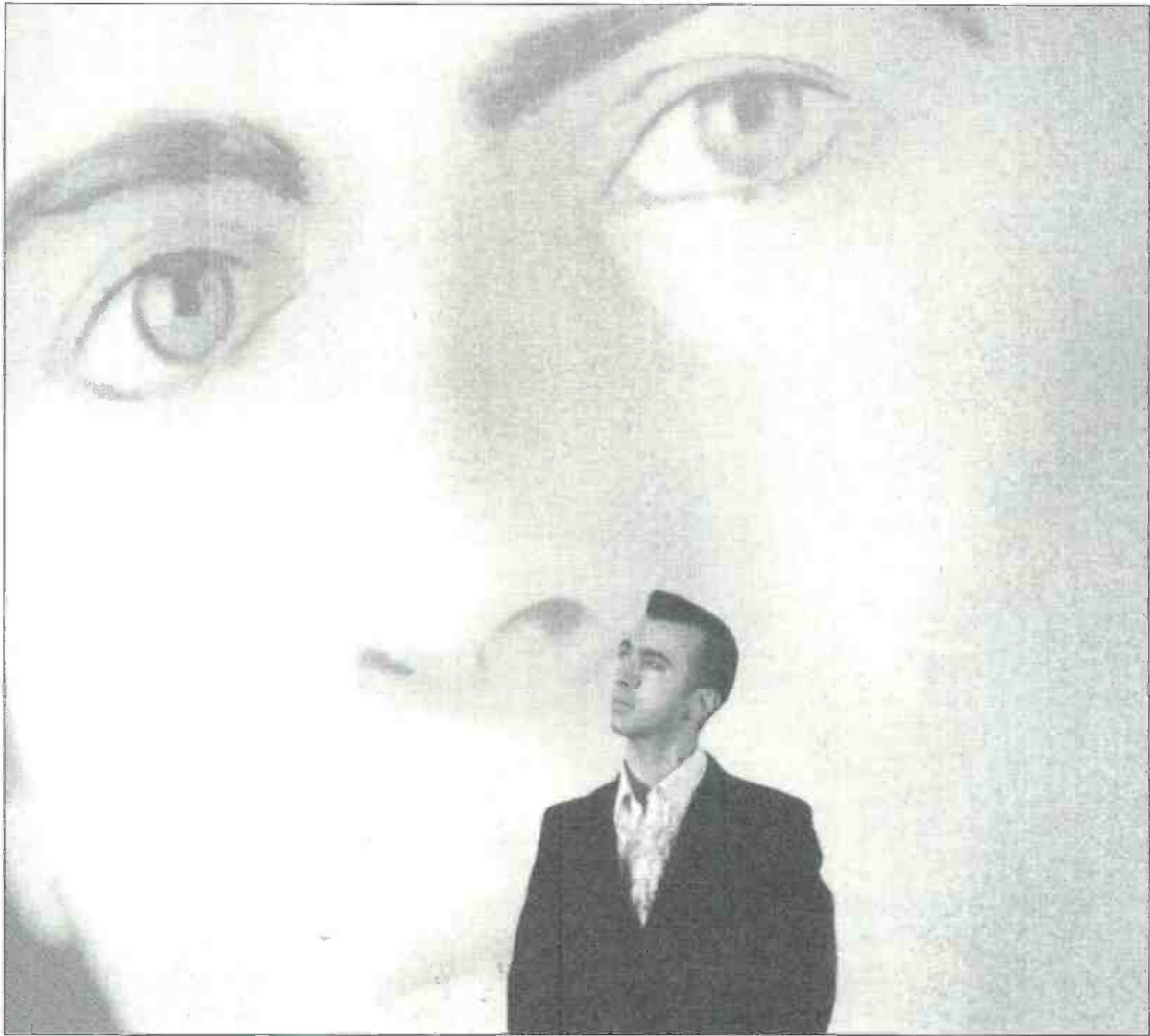

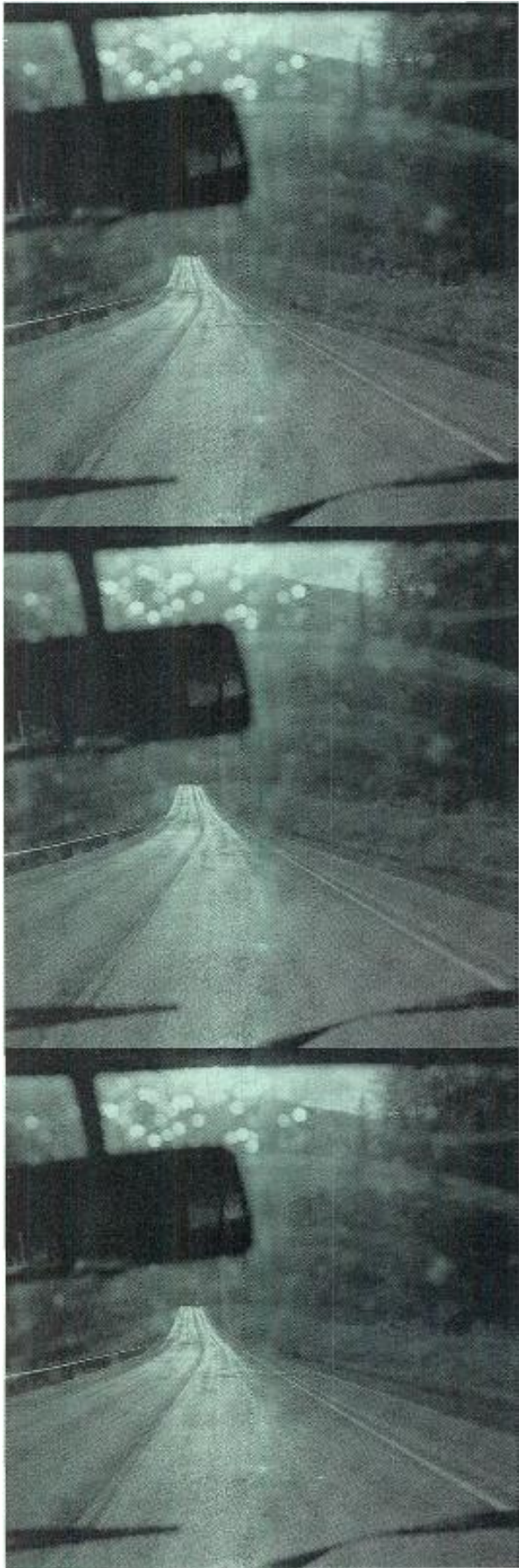

U2 (by satellite from California), Zucchero, and Guns N' Roses, a band previously accused of homophobia. For a touch of opera, the show will also include diva Montserrat Caballe.

Organizers of the tribute, designed to raise AIDS awareness as well as money for AIDS organizations, said performers are expected to do 20-minute sets, and the surviving members of Queen will close the concert.

(Mercury, who led Queen to such hits as "We Are the Champions," "Bohemian Rhapsody,"

"Another One Bites the Dust," and "Crazy Little Thing Called Love," died of AIDS late last year.)

Radio Vision (RVI) has placed the television broadcast on Fox, which will carry two hours of the show on April 20, and MTV, which will air the entire show the following weekend. RVI expected a total of 70 countries to carry the show to as many as half a billion viewers.

On radio, the Global Satellite Network is syndicating the show in the United States.

MCA, Motown File New Suits

The ten-month legal battle between MCA and Motown escalated last week, as the two sides exchanged new suits.

Motown filed an amended complaint to the lawsuit it brought against MCA last May, when it sought to sever its association with MCA, which it charged with "failure to live up to its agreement to distribute and promote Motown Records" through "ineptitude" and "deliberate misconduct."

In the amendment, Motown gave its first estimate of damages: \$60 million. Motown alleges that MCA "attempted to disrupt Motown's relationship with its new distributor, PolyGram, by selling Motown product to the market at prices believed to be below MCA's costs." Motown also charges MCA with destroying "significant evidence relating to MCA's failure to promote Motown Records."

Four days later, MCA Music Entertainment Group filed an amended cross-complaint, claiming that Motown and its majority owner, Boston Ventures, "schemed to deprive MCA of its partnership and contract rights" and seeks damages of more than \$75 million.

The filing amends MCA's May 1991 \$25 million suit against Motown and Boston Ventures, which MCA described as "a venture capital firm with a history of 'flipping' its investments in as

short a time as possible."

In September, PolyGram took over distribution of Motown Records, and two months later, MCA sued PolyGram "for inducing Motown to breach its agreement with MCA."

In the amendment, MCA charges that Motown and Boston Ventures' "reckless transition of distribution and manufacturing to PolyGram caused...unnecessary harm to Motown artists."

Soul Train Awards to Prince, Janet Jackson

Special awards to Janet Jackson and Prince were among the highlights of the 6th annual Soul Train Awards presented March 10 at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles.

Jackson received the first-ever Sammy Davis Jr. Award for using her music to address social issues, and Prince was presented the Heritage Award for lifetime career achievements in film and music.

Gunman Crashes Pizza Party

A gunman who police suspected of a murderous rampage earlier in the day took over a van being used by Y95 (KOY/FM)-Phoenix, AZ, last Sunday and used it to rob a store.

Y95 had planned a pizza party preceding a nearby concert with Marky Mark and the Funky Bunch. In the station's "Jam Van,"

Air Personality Kelly Urich was preparing to host the party when a man asked for a bumper sticker. The man then stuck a .357 Magnum at Urich's head, forced him out of the vehicle, climbed in, and took off.

While the gunman took off, Urich warned restaurant customers about the gun and called police, who were nearby, investigating a shooting spree at a trailer park hours before. Police spotted the stolen van about 45 minutes later and arrested the suspect after a short pursuit.

"I feel like a very lucky camper," said Urich, who arrived at Y95 only three weeks before from KXXR-Kansas City. He was alone in the van at the time of the incident.

"Usually, we have promotion people along," said PD Jamie Hyatt, "but they were busy at a festival." Although Hyatt believes stations should always have more than one person in a van, he added: "It probably would've been worse if there'd been a promotion person there, the way he got (Urich) out of the van. (The suspect) was pretty crazed, and if there'd been someone else in his way, who knows what he might've done."

"I don't think there's anything we could have done to prevent this from happening," Hyatt said. "It's just fate."

FCC Sets New Ownership Limits

The FCC has proposed to up station ownership limits for a single licensee from 12 AMs and 12 FMs nationally to 30 AMs and 30 FMs each. In the action, announced March 12, the Commission also voted to relax its duopoly rule, which limits owners to one AM and one FM outlet in each market.

Under the new plan, an owner in a small market (one to 14 stations) could own one AM and two FMs. In markets with between 15 and 29 stations, a licensee could own as many as two AMs and FMs each. Owners in markets with 30 to 39 stations could control three AMs and two FMs. In large markets (40 or more stations), an owner could have three AMs and FMs each.

In all except the small (one to 14 station) markets, no one owner could control more than 25 percent of the total listenership.

In response to Congressional pressure on ownership limits, the Commission tightened up on Local Marketing Agreements (LMAs), requiring stations in LMAs to file explanatory documents with the FCC and limiting simulcasting of LMA stations to 25% of their total programming.

FCC Chairman Alfred Sikes said the ownership changes were needed because of a weakening economy and new competing media. "More than half of all radio stations are currently in the red," he noted.

While one industry observer called the proposal "the Broker's Relief Act of 1992," others raised substantial questions about the new limits, which, if approved by Congress, could take effect as early as August.

Most early critics questioned the 25% audience cap and wondered who would measure the audience (the FCC currently uses Arbitron ADI figures for television) and how listenership would be measured. Arbitron does not freely release its ratings information, and it does not measure listenership in all radio markets.

A day after the FCC proposals were announced, Congressman John Dingell (Dem.-MI), Chairman of the House Commerce Committee, sent a letter to the five FCC members, threatening to submit legislation to stop the new limits. He told Chairman Sikes that he feared smaller broadcasters could be hurt by the new proposals.

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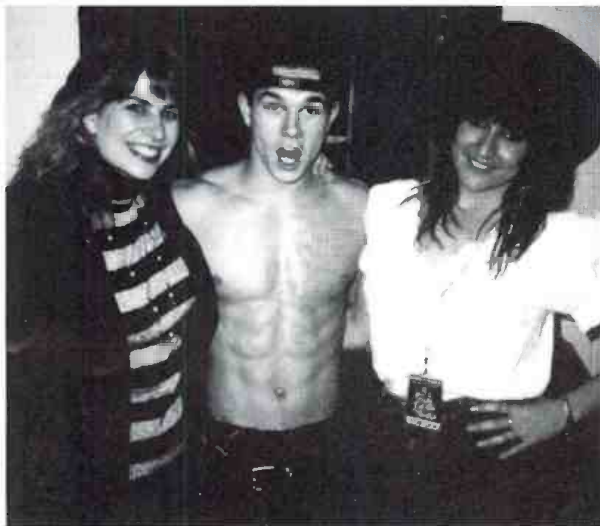

ON MANAGEMENT

This week our question comes from a Program Director in California who wonders how we can boost the motivation and creativity of people who have been with the organization for years and are starting to get stale. This is a thoughtful question because the business of radio and records requires constant creativity for success. But let me rephrase the question. I would suggest that the real issue is how do we, as managers, keep from unmotivating the creative people we hired in the first place. In other words, I propose that the real problem is not motivating creative people, but eliminating the environment of complacency, routine, over-control or fear that over time winds up dissipating the creative energy of people who are inherently creative. The answer, by the way, is not money. Yes, of course compensation is important to all of us. With-

- energy and inhibit them from taking on accountability for creative endeavors.
- 6. An abundance of consultants who whittle down peoples' creativity and accountability with their emphasis on cautiousness and "me-too"-ism, and their consultant lists.
- 7. Automated programming. Need I say more?
- 8. A reliance on too many lawyers and memos, instead of trying things out and talking to one another in person. The more the impact of paper and lawyers in any organization, the less motivation and creativity.
- 9. Department wars. When sales and programming and whoever else are at each other's throats, or simply having differing overall

acceptable boundaries of creativity. In addition, let me make three other quick suggestions:

1. Get your people together and figure out a common purpose. In particular, agree on your strategic and value priorities, and, most importantly, on what will make your station totally unique in the marketplace. These are the kinds of goals and standards which act as a creative booster and an excellent control mechanism which encourages focused creativity and keeps people from getting involved with unproductive, scattered sorts of creativity.
2. Get everyone (yes, everyone) in regular contact with customers. I don't mean "market research" (see my columns on this subject in January of this year), I mean focus groups, interviews, phone conversations and soon with randomly selected individuals and small groups. Constant contact



out offering a fair, competitive salary you will not be able to attract or retain good people. But what we're talking about is ongoing creativity on the job, and as I wrote in my column of January 22, 1988 ("How to Motivate the Creatives"):

"Think about it from your own perspective. What makes you decide to be creative, diligent, and quality conscious when you come to work? Is it the thought of your paycheck in two weeks, or is it the nature of the work environment around you on a daily basis? For most people, the type of work they're doing and the type of managers they work for are the most potent causes of daily motivation."

Now think about the elements of many work environments that act to de-motivate and lower creativity among employees:

1. Insecure managers who can't delegate or take risks.
2. Out-of-touch owners and/or General Managers.
3. A "me-too" mentality on the part of management; that is, a willingness to do and present what every other station does.
4. A "CYA" management mentality; that is, where covering one's rear end is necessary for survival.
5. An abundance of useless rules, sign-offs, policies, and meetings which drain peoples'

priorities, then the main creativity focuses on how to beat the other department, not how to win new listeners. I'm sure you can think of others, but you get the idea. Each of the above elements is a factor which slowly bleeds the creativity of anyone who starts out as a creative person. The more you can eliminate or at least reduce any of the nine factors above (and I know you have influence over at least some of them), the more motivated and creative your people will be.

Here's another related point: Back in that 1988 article, I pointed out research which indicated that the top three job factors which motivate the creatives the most are the opportunity to complete a job, creative control, and a supervisor who delegates. These three factors are sadly missing in many organizations. No wonder people eventually lose their creative zest.

"But surely, Oren, you're not recommending creativity run amok, where people do whatever they want to." Agreed. That is not what I am suggesting. But good management means constant coaching of your people in such a way that you are continuously engaged in task-related discussions about the

with customers is, again, a way of boosting creativity (customers have lots of ideas and just plain random thoughts which a creative person can piggyback on) and a way to control creativity, because customers keep you honest and keep you from going off a deep end that nobody will find attractive except you.

3. Agree that, other than #1, there will be no sacred cows. Once you get your priorities in place and get everyone constantly involved with customers, then agree to challenge everything that is currently done within the organization. That is, challenge every meeting, rule, pay system, computer system, promotion system, job description, and so on if it does not help your organization be unique in the marketplace and help you be creative on behalf of your customer. Remember the definition of insanity: "doing the same things the same way and expecting results to change." We want creativity, not insanity.

These three suggestions are a tall order, granted. But, unfortunately, there is no other way to maintain creative and competitive vigor. Besides, it's less difficult and more fun than it appears. After all, didn't you join this industry because you were creative, and in order to be creative? Let's stop worrying about how to motivate the creatives, and spend more time thinking about what we can do to stop de-motivating the creatives. The possibilities are enormous. ■

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Sure, pitchers throw the occasional curve ball and comedians take dramatic roles every so often, but in both cases, they only do so under the right conditions. The same holds true for Top 40 stations who step outside the boundaries of what they traditionally are known to play. Just because a station predominantly plays one genre of music doesn't mean it can't consider songs outside their norm.

KMEL San Francisco is currently playing



Mr. Big's "To Be With You" and Eric Clapton's "Tears In Heaven." PD Keith Naftaly explains his policy matter-of-factly. "When a record becomes bigger than life and the video is everywhere, the song defies categorization. It's no longer black or white, disco or rock, it's just a hit and if we position ourselves as the Bay Area's hit music station, it's just not wise to turn your back on a hit. Plus, it adds a nice balance to the station."

As for negative audience reaction, Naftaly claims, "no listener has ever called the request line, the suggestion line or my office to say those records stick out or sound funny on the station." Those who "freak out," he says, are "people in the industry. Listeners seem to understand. They thought it was cool when we played Nirvana's 'Teen Spirit' because that was the only record our listeners liked that had that type of sound. For some reason, it was this magical record that rose above any classification." In the case of Mr. Big, there was a "local angle and lead singer Eric Martin's soulful delivery helped it pass the test." Keith credits Eric Clapton's video for getting his current hit on the air. Station employees were telling him, "This song makes you cry. If we truly are a station plugged into people's emotions, we can't ignore this record."

Does that mean we can expect a lot more songs such as these on KMEL? "No," says Naftaly, "don't expect that to happen, but everything gets evaluated on a case-by-case basis. There will always be exceptions that may break through and ultimately broaden the boundaries of KMEL's street format."

The fact of the matter is that "a large portion of KMEL's audience is non-ethnic and anything can get played under the right conditions. What needs to be emphasized more than anything is music flow. It's so important and requires a lot of attention. For example, Enya's 'Caribbean Blue' is a great song that

sounds smooth going into Boyz II Men's 'Uhh Ahh.' Both have the same tempo, same atmospheric, angelic quality. Nirvana's 'Smells Like Teen Spirit' sounded perfect going into Public Enemy's 'Don't Believe The Hype.' Lots of intensity and energy, but it wouldn't be real smart to segue from Enya into Public Enemy. The music's flow is definitely crucial, and when not executed properly, that's when you run the risk of people saying, 'Oh, that sounds weird.'"

More comments on this subject next week.

A force in popular music in the '60s, '70s and '80s, ERIC CLAPTON pulls off one of the year's big surprises and takes over #1 with a powerful grip. New at the top of the chart for WILI/FM 7-1, WAVT 3-1, Z100 3-1, WAPE 3-1, WCGQ 4-1, WLZ 4-1, KOTM 4-1, WCIL 2-1, KXKT 4-1, Z104 8-1, KYA 7-1, ZFUND 5-1, KTMT 2-1, WSPK/FM 5-1, etc.

WSPT Stevens Pt., WI keeps the WILLIAMS BROTHERS at #1 for another week where it's top three on the phones. Only one record debuted higher than UGLY KID JOE at WGBQ Galesburg, IL and that was BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN. MD Dave Lavender debuts UKJ at #28 and calls his most requested song "explosive." Hot at KEGL Dallas 17-9, WCIL Carbondale, IL 8-4 "top three phones," WPST Trenton, NJ 11-5, WAAL/FM Binghamton, NY 29-21, WLFX Winchester, KY 24-17, KFBW Waynesville, MO 12-7, Z104.5 Tulsa, OK 22-16, SLY96 San Luis Obispo, CA 29-19, etc. New on: Z100, WNVZ, CKOI/FM, KGLI, 104 KRBE, FUN 107, Z104, KOYE, KZMG, KYRK, Q96, KHTR and WQGN.

Easy to spot the week's big gainer at Z100 New York—it's QUEEN'S "Bohemian Rhapsody"—jumping 26-15! WCIL's OM Tony Waitekus ADDS it after "three days of just playing it a few times, and as of last night, it's pulling number one requests!" 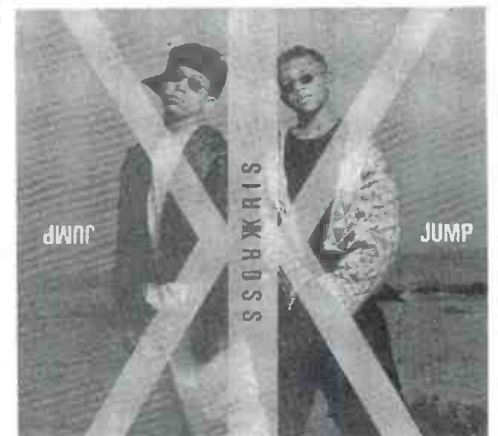

REPORT ON THE SEMINAR:

The Calloway Course On Survival

another attendance record! As unlikely as it seems, a few hundred more attendees than last year's record-breaking number found room for themselves at Gavin Seminar '92 in San Francisco. This also struck me as the best seminar yet. Of course, there were many concurrent sessions dealing with a variety of different formats and types of music, however the following focuses on one session in particular, moderated by Joe Calloway.

Calloway's session, titled, "The Competitive Edge: The Win/Win Strategy," was excellent. Calloway is reminiscent of Tom Peters—a past keynote speaker—and carries much the same message, but in a more condensed form. The key issue today, he said, is the need for flexibility—willingness and ability to change. The number one problem in business, according to Joe, is how to deal with all of today's change: How to survive it and how to make it work with you.

The old saying, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" warned that tampering with success risked turning it into failure. Today, said Calloway, that sort of thinking leads to complacency; and he offered the alternate saying, "if it ain't broke, break it!" The key to survival, he suggested, is to be much better tomorrow than today—which he identified as the IBM strategy. Xerox, an innovative company that lost its way, has come back using a philosophy of "make change a motivator rather than a demotivator."

The premium job skill today in all businesses, Calloway said, is "flexibility and teachability." Skills and experience are good, since they can provide a valuable foundation, but they also can make someone want to resist change, so they are not as important as flexibility and teachability.

Calloway counseled, "Figure out what business you are *really* in, and then make sure that all staff understand it and concentrate on it. McDonald's, for example, is not in the hamburger business, they are in the customer service business, and all staff members—down to the janitorial staff understand it and reflect it. (In fact, let me quote from the front cover of McDonald's 1991 fourth quarter report, which was in the mail as Calloway spoke. "Satisfied customers are key to the success of any business. So, we listen to our customers and respond to their changing tastes and priorities. When necessary, we change the way we do things. The goal is to satisfy them so completely on every visit that they want to return for more delicious meals. This focus on customer care drives every aspect of the busi-

ness, from product development to employee training to the design of restaurants and equipment.")

This thought—that we sometimes don't recognize what business we are *really* in—led me to reflect that one of the real problems in radio has always been that too many general managers have thought of themselves as being in the advertising business, which has led to spot clutter and declining audience. Then they fire the program director. Actually, they are in the entertainment and information business; they cannot sustain ad revenues unless they keep those nonpaying customers glued to the radio.

Calloway concluded his hour by enumerating three basic principles of today's successful business:

- 1) Don't hire skills, hire attitude.
- 2) Everybody's job is to make the customer happy (and everybody needs to be empowered to do it).
- 3) The vision, at a successful business, is to be the best in the business!

It struck me that these have always been the ingredients of a superior radio station, but in today's welter of radio signals, these three principles are more important than ever. But it can't work unless *everybody* on staff understands and agrees with all three points! Winning is a team effort!

Next week, a report on a new idea at the seminar—the "First Annual Adult Radio Summit." ●

The 15th Annual Bay Area Music Awards or Bammies are history. Four awards were given to Metallica, who gathered up Outstanding Album, Outstanding Metal Album, Outstanding Song for "Enter Sandman" and Lars Ulrich for Outstanding Drummer/Percussionist. This show had something for everyone, and I didn't leave my seat for a second in fear I'd miss something. Even before the awards started Carlos Santana and Charlie Musselwhite had exchanged phone numbers for a possible collaboration. This year's show was dedicated to the late Bill Graham with lots of stirring testimonials, including those from Carlos Santana, Haight Ashbury Free Clinic founder Dr. David Smith, BAM founder Dennis Erokian and John Fogerty. 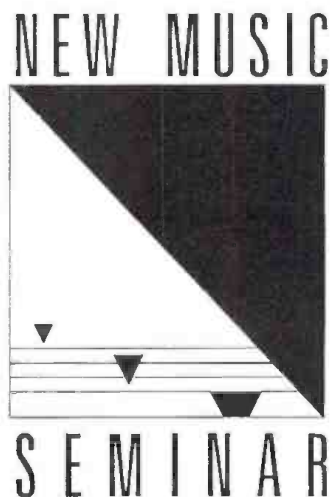

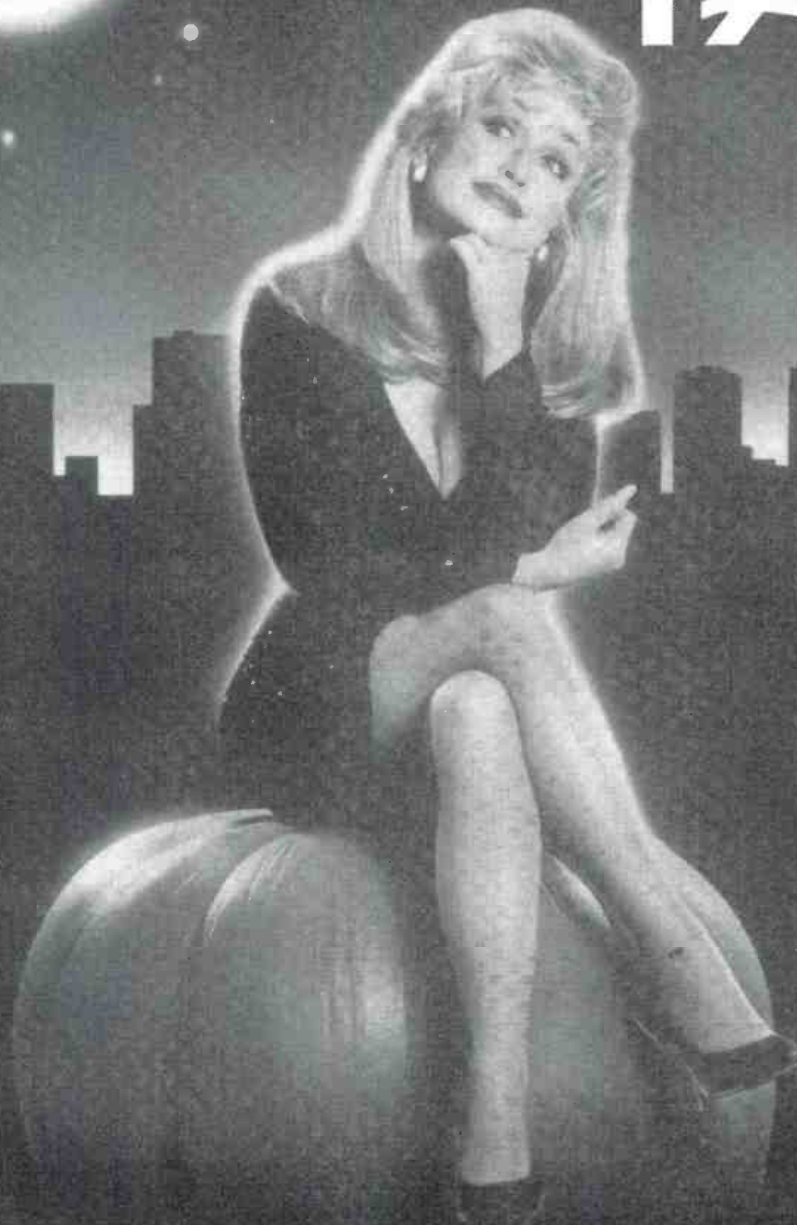

Twice a year we look back on the performance of records that receive special certification in The Gavin Report A/C chart pages. We look at the final peak performance of each week's MOST ADDED, TOP TIP and RECORD TO WATCH. Listed on the following tables are the weekly performances for the last half of 1991. As you can see from the following tables, those records that were the number one MOST ADDED peaked at an average of #4 on the chart. TOP TIP, the record Gavin's A/C department thinks will debut the highest on the following week's chart, averaged a peak position of #10. RECORD TO WATCH, never an obvious hit record at the time of its designation, averaged a peak of #24 for the last half of 1991. A third of the period's RECORD TO WATCHES finished in the top twenty.

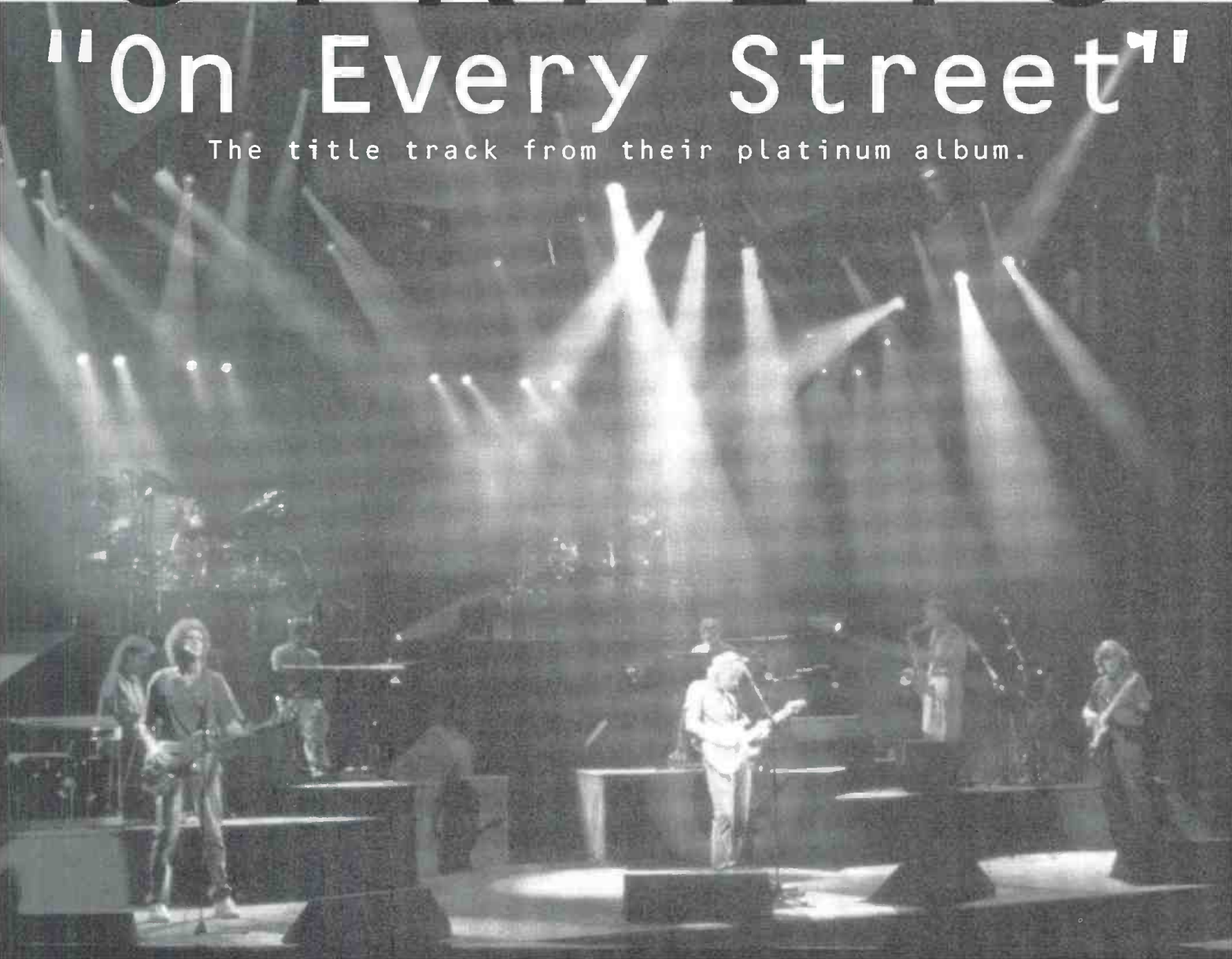



Collin

It's funny how one song can change a person's life. Collin Raye had a modest hit on his first single, "All I Can Be," but it was his second, "Love, Me," that thrust him into the spotlight, a place he's been struggling to reach for years. Raye's beautiful tenor, combined with moving lyrics, made the song an instant favorite,

and will probably be his signature song for years to come.

Collin knew that "Love, Me" was an exceptional song, but he says he didn't anticipate its enormous success. "I would have been disappointed if "Love, Me" had not been a hit. I really thought it was a number one song," Raye admits. "But I didn't anticipate it to be this big! It has really been a phenomenon." The song topped the charts in all the trades, and the strength of that took Raye's debut

album gold. He's been playing to packed houses ever since.

Collin has been working to get to this point for as long as he can remember, and it's no wonder, as he was surrounded by music from the start. His mother, Lois, was a regional star in Texarkana, opening shows for artists like Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis and

Carl Perkins. Collin's father played the guitar and his uncle was also a professional musician. Collin first took the stage at age seven, singing harmony for his mother, and by 13 he formed a band with his brother. "Our family was very Country music oriented," he remembers. "I was going to see George Jones, and Haggard, and Buck Owens when I was four years old."

As the Wray Brothers, Collin and his brother Scott played the Pacific Northwest for several years, and released a few singles. When Collin decided to go solo he hit pay dirt in Reno, and spent many years singing in the casinos. He says he learned some valuable performing lessons during his time there. "I learned a lot about entertainment and about entertaining people without a lot of sound help. Casinos are so noisy; you're constantly competing with slot machines, and the pit bosses are on you to turn it down, so you really have to learn another way of going about it to try to attract people visually."

The experience Collin gained in Reno helped him land his current deal with Epic. His producers, Jerry Fuller and John Hobbs, came up to see his show and were impressed enough that they invited Collin down to L.A. to do some demos, which eventually landed him his current contract with Epic.

His stage show is still stirring up excitement. During a recent tour of Texas, fire marshalls kept showing up to help control the crowds, leading some to dub the dates "the Fire Marshall Tour 1992." "The crowds have been tremendous," Collin admits. "Our shows are pretty energetic, and I always have about 150 women right up against the stage. They get pretty noisy sometimes," he

smiles.

No doubt part of Collin's appeal with those female fans is his classic good looks. Raye laughs when you bring up the "hunk" subject. "It's funny to me because I'm the same person now that I was ten years ago. But people are going to sell you however they can," he concedes. "I think it's working to a degree because we're selling a lot of albums. And if that's why, then I'm all for it. But hopefully after they get the album home they'll like me because of the music. When they come to see my show I don't want them walking away thinking I looked great, I want them walking away saying, 'He put on a good show. He really worked hard.' To me that's the greatest compliment I can get."

At least one female fan saw Collin's potential in the beginning. Tanya Tucker was watching when Collin made his first appearance on "Nashville Now" last year. She called the live broadcast to ask him on a date. Ralph Emery aired the call, and fans have been curious about what developed ever since. "I thought it was cute, and I called her back because I thought it was so sweet of her to call," Collin says. "Mainly I wanted to thank her. We've been out four or five times together, but we're just buddies—there's really nothing more to it than that. Tanya's a real easy person to become friends with—she's real up front and she doesn't hide much. She has a huge heart and is a very generous person. I think she's a doll. Tanya has a reputation for being a wildcat, and maybe in her day she was. But I didn't know her then. The Tanya that I know is a good mother who takes her children very seriously, and is a good friend."

It's a good bet that Collin and Tanya talked of the

concerns of balancing parenting and performing, because he also takes his children very seriously. One of the reasons he spent so much time in Reno—rather than waiting tables in Nashville—was that the money was good and he needed to support his kids. Brittany, 9, and Jacob, 6, who appeared in the video for "Love, Me," are obviously a major focus of Collin's life. As soon as he started seeing some success, he left Nevada to move closer to them. "I got divorced in 1987, and they moved back home to Texas. So the last few years it's been a real battle for me to try to be a long distance dad. I take being a father seriously, and they're the absolute top priority in my life." How do they feel about daddy being a Country star? "They love it. My daughter likes to go on the road with me whenever she can. I take her on the bus and she fits right in and has a great time."

Raye is currently at work on his next album. "Now it gets fun. Now that I've already established myself, I'll get to go in and cut something knowing it's going to get out there," he says enthusiastically. And while "Love, Me" may become Collin's signature song, he's got a lot more to offer, and has no plans to change his style. "The way I'm singing now is what got me here. Singing powerful yet emotional, subtle, but letting it fly sometimes. This is what I do best, so I'm going to stay with it."

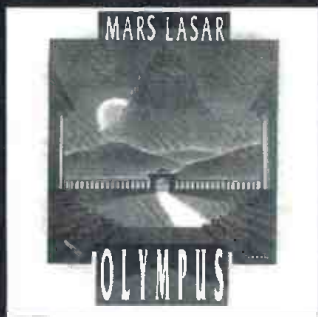

JAZZ NEW RELEASES

YOU CAN HIDE INSIDE THE MUSIC - THE HARPER BROTHERS (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

With every release, Winard and Philip Harper try something different. The first record was their obligatory "Young Lions" release. Their second was recorded live direct to DAT sans editing and second take safety nets. Their third disc was a move toward a more melodic feel. *You Can Hide Inside The Music*, their productive fourth effort is guaranteed to distance them further from the Young Prodigy tag that is now starting to dog the young guns and obscure the other seasoned "middle age" stalwarts in the scene. Winard and Philip have translated their newly enriched onstage sound to disc by utilizing the three horn front line (trumpet, alto and tenor sax) alongside the customary drum, bass and piano. You can still pick out Winard's fancy footings and clever gliding stick work on "For My Children Quamara and Scott." Philip's muted musings benefit profoundly from heightened sax/flute support. He sounds less scrappy and more robust. YCHITM is injected throughout with hard, vintage Jazz overtones a la the Billy Eckstine inspired vocal cameos by Ernie Andrews. Try the moody "Round Midnight" or the more barrel house "Since I Fell For You." How about a trumpet summit with Philip and Harry "Sweets" Edison? Go no further than "I Wish I Knew." If the Harpers' effortless Bop Swing is still your thing, check out "Kahlil" and see how they revel in that classic, booming Blue Note fifties studio sound. The Harpers are surely craving that old analog sound these days. Computer chips transform into transistors into tubes for this fine, smooth offering.

AS SERENITY APPROACHES - MARCUS ROBERTS (NOVUS/RCA)

It doesn't necessarily take a lot of players on a record to make the Gavin Jazz chart these days. McCoy Tyner, Kenny Barron/Stanz Getz and the new Marcus Roberts are a few shining examples of solo or duo performances. *As Serenity Approaches* is another lineage-packed set of solo piano pieces, a medium Roberts has spent considerable time developing. There are nineteen tracks in all, eight of which comprise of duets with piano, trumpet or clarinet. Perhaps this disc could be nicknamed *Left-handed Complement*. Of the most dominant tracks like "St. Louis Blues," "Cherokee," or "The Jitterbug Waltz" with Ellis Marsalis, Roberts employs a walking bass line pattern with his left hand. Even the lushness of "Where Or When" has that distinct separation of left and right. The left hand sets the foundational bluesy meter, while the right hand emits the more charged, expressive improvised spirit. *As Serenity Approaches'* appeal with Jazz Radio lies in its high discerning love of detail and discipline.

IT'S ABOUT TIME - BRIAN BROMBERG (NOVA)

Brian Bromberg temporarily sheds his Jazz/A A appeal to play straight acoustic Jazz: No electric bass, no drum machines. The tunes tilt

towards burning solos over smoldering melodies. Apart from drummer David Bromberg (Brian's brother, not the guitar picker) sounding at times like a power trio swatter, *It's About Time* will turn a few heads with its exuberant arrangements and fiery cameos. Another title for this disc could be *Bebop In Your Face*, because Brian and band do flaunt their solos to the max. Their penchant for precision and playing right on top of the beat makes the music flashy and chrome-plated. It's Bop designed strictly for the younger, wide-eyed set—which is not particularly a flaw. "Dear John" and "Buddha Belly"—with Freddie Hubbard sitting in—and "Yes Or Not" are the Jazz equivalent to a hot foot with a short match stick. The band comes out swinging, beating each tune to a bloody pulp.

WHERE ONE IS - DICK HECKSTALL-SMITH (MAINSTREAM 2000)

When *Where One Is* first came out, we thought it was a moldy reissue. We were mistakenly convinced that that Dick Heckstall-Smith was either deceased or still working as a cab driver safely out of music. We fondly remember DHS when he was that older beatnik bloke gigging with hippie blues bands like John Mayall's Bluesbreakers, Coliseum and the Graham Bond Organization throughout the sixties and seventies. He was best known for playing two saxophones at once—a rarity in British rock at the time. *Where One Is* is proof that DHS is still a part of the tentative British Jazz scene. WOI relies on obtuse electric fretted instruments for its edge, with Shaft-like electric guitar riffs and poppin' Edison bass. If you're in the mood for something quirky, try "A Knite In Who Needsya." It's bolted down with some beefy big band brass paws.

LUSH LIFE - JOE HENDERSON (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

During the sixties and seventies, when many sax players were emulating Coltrane's sheets of sound approach, more than a few came around to Joe Henderson's more soulful style, with a squawking kick of Free Jazz thrown in for good measure. Historically, many conveniently view Henderson's dominance in the seventies as a cross-pollination of influences of Rollins or early Ornette. One listen to the ultra rumbling, fluid swingfest titled "Rain Check" could support such assertions. *Lush Life* is Henderson's first in twelve years as a bandleader (that doesn't count some recent discs where he's damn near stolen the show). Wynton Marsalis returns the favor of Henderson's appearance on *Thick In The South*, by contributing some warm blues on another highlight, "A Flower Is A Lovable Thing." Pianist Stephen Scott's presence shows that Henderson is tapped into the very best of today's talent. *Lush Life* is a very cozy comeback. Rudy Van Gelder's studio sound is intimate and lifelike, minus the hiss and bright reverb present on more than a few session produced there in the last several months. The listener is not deprived of one single essential burst, shriek or trill, as evidenced on the free form sax/drum duet treatment JH gives to the anthem standard "Take The A Train." Ultra tasty and should race up the Jazz airplay chart.

The Real People

It's his first time in America and Tony Griffiths, bassist and one-half of the vocal talent in the Liverpool band The Real People, has been dragged from one end of the country to the other. All of the travelling and the countless "grip n' grins" hasn't made him any less easy to talk to—on the contrary, after his long day he's still quite animated. His enthusiasm about The Real People—which he started with his brother Chris—hasn't waned since the band's inception in 1988.

According to Tony, the band is comprised of "four mates that grew up together"—the Griffiths brothers along with drummer Tony Elson and guitarist Sean Simpson.

"Me and Chris," Tony explains, "had been writing a bunch of songs and we convinced our mate Tony to come play the drums with us. Then when we started playing the local pubs, we got Sean—who was in the same class as Chris ever since they started school—to play acoustic guitar."

Although playing in pubs allowed the band to hone their skills in front of an audience, it's an experience that, for a long time, went unrewarded.

"The trouble with playing pubs in England," Tony explains, "is that pubs are more for the middle-aged audience that wants to hear cover versions. We used to get sacked from some of the worst pubs in Liverpool," he laughs, "because we'd only play our own music and no one could relate to it."

"We're the first band from the dock area of Liverpool to do our own material. Everyone else was just doing cover versions,

you see. We started to build up a really strong following, and eventually the record companies started to hear about us."

Eventually the band signed to Columbia Records in the U.K., avoiding what they feel would've been a waste of time had they signed with an indie. As for their indie status in America, the

"Not really," he counters. "We've been playing this album for so long now that we're really much better live than we are on record. Our soundman used to work for Motorhead and he says that we're louder onstage!"

"Our new album is going to be produced, in part, by Jimmy Miller. He's done all our favorite records—The Rolling Stones, The Move, Spencer Davis Group, Primal Scream and he even did The Ace Of Spades album for Motorhead! We're working hard to attain the feeling—the passion—of us playing live. I think it'll be great getting to work with him—he's the closest thing to a George Martin these

band is happy to be with a supportive label (Relativity) that's as enthusiastic about The Real People as the band members are.

Tony elaborates, "In the U.K. the whole indie thing is a farce anyway, because what do most of those bands do as soon as they can? Sign to a major label! We're still perceived as part of the 'indie-dance' scene, but we don't get the sort of press the other bands do because we're on a major. We've had to tour constantly for two years to build up our foundation because we don't get any press support in Britain."

Undaunted, he continues, "Having said that, we can get a single into the Top 30 without any of it—even television. And really, I think we've outgrown the whole 'indie-dance' thing. Our new album is going to be real songs, not just breakbeats. It's going to be more like The Who and Jimi Hendrix."


That sounds like a pretty radical change of direction!

The recording schedule has been divided in two sessions, with a break in the middle so the band can tour America during March and April. Tony, speaking for the entire band, relishes the thought of playing to an American audience.

"I feel really good about coming to America," he says. "We're not middle-class art students so we don't fit into the trendy indie scene. We're not pretty boys—we're just four ordinary lads who like playing in a band. That just doesn't cut it in England, but I know once we make it in America, Britain will take notice. I don't know, people just seem more prepared to listen in America."

In support of this tour, Relativity has released the band's second single, "The Truth." Watch and listen for The Real People throughout March and April as they make their way across America.

When it comes time to interview John Lydon of Public Image Limited, we always share a joke. He calls me Journalist. I retaliate by calling him Rock Star. Of course it's all harmless fun. But the point remains that John Lydon has never been and probably will never be your basic Rock Star. Especially now, with age, he's gone way beyond all that. While his screech and wail has become almost operatic, his cult of personality has grown to the point where, in addition to music, he could probably host a talk show or perform Steven Berkoff off-Broadway. While he's been reputed to be vicious (no pun intended), I've always found him to be incredibly moral, holding himself up to impossible and stringent standards of honesty. The more you find out about John Lydon, the more you realize that, starting with the Sex Pistols, he has travelled down a road on which there is no return. He's lost his anonymity. In actuality he craves to be just one of the guys. Maybe that's why Public Image Limited has been touted as such a communal effort. In essence, it's one of Lydon's only outlets to submerge his outrageous profile in favor of being one of the boys. And he drinks of the opportunity with a vengeance.

"Love bites trivia severely/It has to be treated with respect/And taken seriously—seriously lonely/I want to belong."

That line from "Love Hope," taken from PiL's new Virgin release That What Is Not most accurately describes John Lydon.

"The whole album is that, don'tcha know?" he admits.

I'm A Rock Head

Near the eve of his first American tour in almost three years, we talk on the phone. John is crowing into a combination FAX machine/speaker phone after a day's rehearsal. He's about to embark on a five week MTV 120 Minutes tour with Big Audio Dynamite II that includes portions of the American Heartland. Reinforcing Lydon on vocals will be guitarist John McGeoch, bassist Allan Dias plus Teddy Chow on keyboards and additional guitar and a familiar face on drums, Mike Joyce of the Smiths.

"With the Smiths, it's a shame that Mike never had the chance to prove what a great drummer he is," Lydon reflects after a day of PiL rehearsals.

"Live, we sound almost exactly the same as on the record. If you think I'm joking, there's a cassette on its way to you. We played four songs live last week on BBC Radio. I think we proved our point. PiL is bloody good live!"

Best you've ever been?

"I think so. I wanted this album to sound like us live. With variations on the themes, of course."

While PiL has been known to chase the eternal dissonant dance beat, the band is reasonably on course to the march of an almost heavy metal back beat. Is it a return to the decibels that wasn't entirely

exhausted on 1986's generic Album featuring metal guitar looney Steve Vai? Why all this rocking again?

"Because it's the most enjoyable thing that I've done in years! I'm so bored with disco sad sack stuff—it doesn't seem fun and it certainly doesn't relate to me or my culture. I have to be honest. My culture is rock."

As for heavy metal, Lydon conveniently feigns ignorance.

"I don't understand what heavy metal really is. I think it's all about hiddley-diddley pee, too many

I'm bored with the imitators. I want to teach them all a serious lesson."

The first track, "Acid Drops," brandishes big guns against censorship. For someone who was always queazy about such social musical displays as Rock Against Racism and Live-Aid, it seems odd to hear such a blatantly political opening.

"Acid Drops! Anti-censorship!

the censorship subject months after it's cooled down as a hot barroom discussion topic, it has become a Presidential campaign issue, something Lydon couldn't have known

at the time he was writing the song. Is there really a censorship danger or is it a lot of bored artists over-reacting?

"It's a real danger, full stop. Censorship of any kind is a complete danger. It destroys culture, activity, human creation. Whether something is a good or bad creation, that's another issue.

The point is, you must stop censorship. You cannot deny money to the arts councils. This is what makes us, as human beings, worth our weight. If ever we were visited, for instance, by aliens, I don't think we could quite happily say that Pat Buchanan's mentality is what we really, truly believe in. You must never, ever be scared of sex or anything."

I have this theory that if you boil down all the post-punk four piece bands of the eighties and the nineties down to a concentrated reduction sauce, you get the Sex Pistols. Only thing is, you could never talk to Lydon about the Pistols specifi-



notes per second. I've always loved rock. That's where I come from. If you've ever listened to a Public Image album, you know it's rock, whether we have lead guitar solos, drum segue-ways, whatever. The point is all about kick-you-in-the-face. It's honest energy straight from the heart."

"I am a rock head and now I'm back with a vengeance because

Censorship will destroy our culture. This is something we all have to take a part in. The end result is ultimate chaos and Pat Buchanan."

So you've been keeping up with the American primaries?

"Yes I have," Lydon answers menacingly.

John Lydon, World Citizen?

"You have to be."

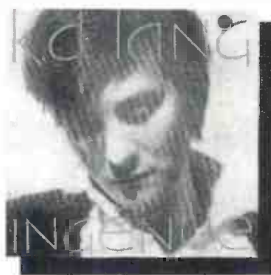

INGENUÉ - k.d. lang (SIRE/WARNER BROS.)

Admittedly a far cry—hell, maybe light years—from the rock arena, k.d. lang releases the crown jewel of her young career. Far away from the prairie cowboy look that first attracted attention, finished with all the flowing Patsy Cline/Owen Bradley tributaries, k.d. completely throws the compass out the window. By forsaking any sort of deliberate rock or Country path, she merely uses that fine voice and band to produce a rich collection of songs (remember those?) that blend and flow, borrowing just as much from the wind and the rain as any radio mood. For instance, the opening "Save Me" could be perceived as commercial suicide, however its seemingly languid pace makes a sharp, yet relaxing statement. Throughout *Ingenué*, Ms. lang is not about to be rushed or pressured into inducing couples to break into a Texas Two-Step. Nor are there any hidden renditions of "Orange Blossom Special" or "I'm An Old Cowhand From The Rio Grande." Rather, *Ingenué* is one of those extra special parcels from heaven. Start with "Constant Craving" (and with the CD repeat button in place) head back to the start, including "The Mind Of Love" and "Miss Chatelaine." "Wash Me Clean" could well be a nineties equivalent to Roy Orbison's "Crying." However, I still have a constant craving for "Constant Craving." Best song of the week.

A PICTURE OF NECTAR - PHISH (ELEKTRA)

A skillful, daffy American band from Burlington, Virginia dedicates their first album to the brave proprietor of a night club that handed over Sundays, Mondays

and Tuesdays to a rag tag outfit who wasn't sure whether it wanted to rock out, flip out or bop out. And that's good. Thank goodness guitarist Trey Anastasio and pianist Page McConnell play with a quirkiness that mixes the spirit of the Dead, Thelonious Monk and R.E.M. "Cavern" is sorta the title track, giving you an instant first impression of a band that careers away from terminal grooviness, dabbling one minute in hillbilly to super-clean Jazz chorded Alternative rock n roll. Anastasio seems to have the most eclectic tastes, although it's the rest of the band keeping up that makes Phish so darn interesting. On this album, the band stretches out to the tune of sixteen songs spanning an hour of music. Trax like "Stash" and "Chalk Dust Torture" display not only Phish's playful spirit, but their serious chops as well. I'll bet these guys are a hoot on Tuesday nights at Nectar's in Burlington. The catch of the week.



MYSTERIO - IAN McCULLOCH (SIRE/ REPRISE)

After disbanding Echo & The Bunnymen, Ian McCulloch learned a hard lesson when he realized that the group name had more retail recognition power than his Christian name. On the strength of Mysterio, McCulloch is on the road back towards reaching the heights of Ocean Rain or Porcupine. Things get moving immediately with "Magical World," "Close Your Eyes" and "Dug For Love." His dancing cover of Leonard Cohen's "Lover

Lover" faithfully resurrects LC's spirit, as it's impossible to escape The Shadow no matter whose voice is singing those words. Before checking out, McCulloch couldn't resist a tip of the hat to the Bunnymen sound. He's says goodbye with "In My Head," a tune that sounds at home among the best of his earlier group work.

"REVERENCE" - JESUS AND MARY CHAIN (DEF AMERICAN/WARNER BROS.)

This is J&MC's most controversial statement since the beginning furor over the band's name. Seven years later, the Christ and Kennedy death references here prove too strong for the BBC, which promptly banned this from being performed on Top Of The Pops. (Considering the crud that performs on that show, I'd take that as a compliment.) "Reverence" is a dank, barbed work that induces darkness, a deliberate ditty to wear black to. Dig that industrial bridge at the two minute mark followed by a psycho guitar solo.

COL. BRUCE HAMPTON & THE AQUARIUM RES- CUE UNIT (CAPRICORN/ WARNER BROS.)

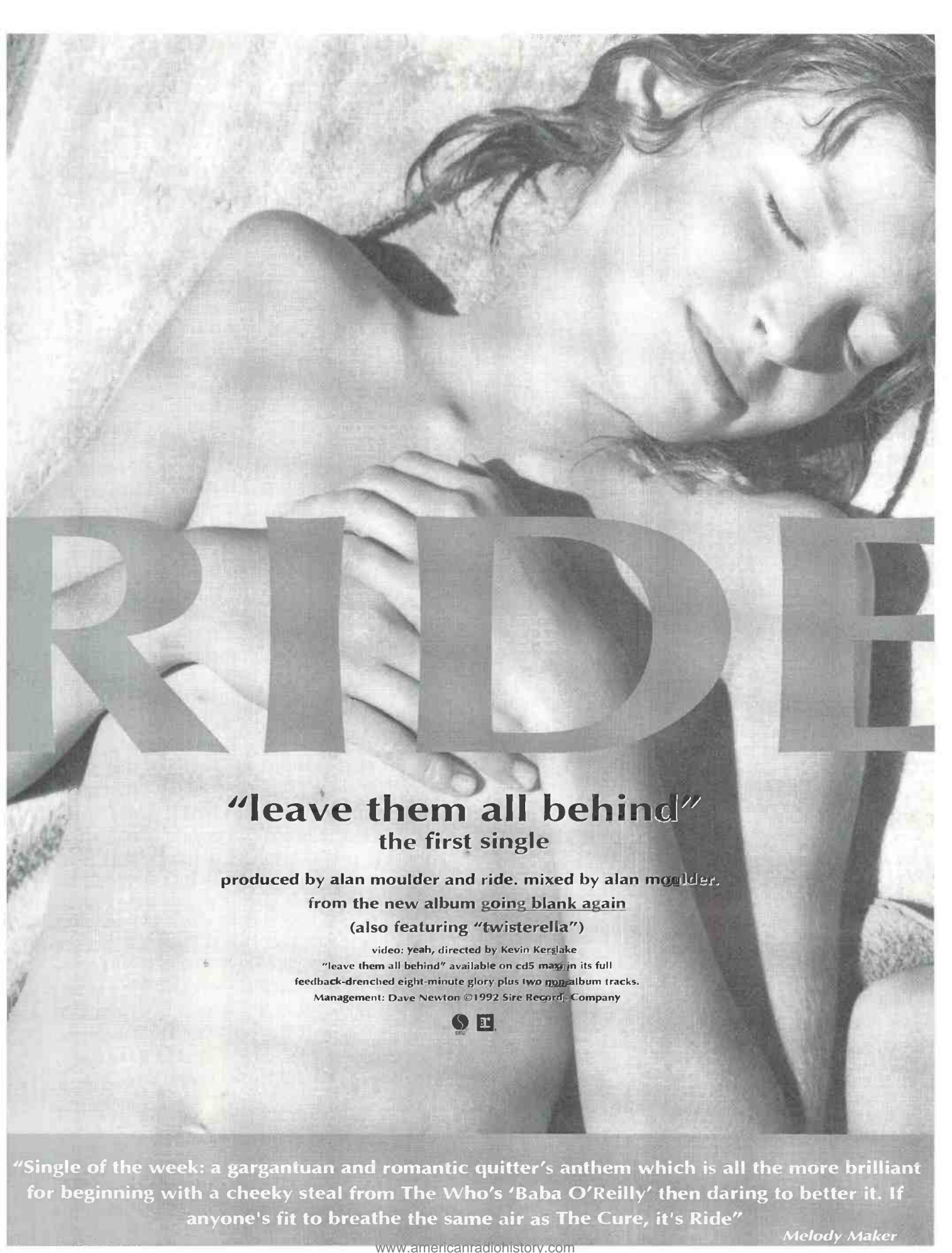
A treasure that took quite a few weeks to soak up. Back in 1969, Bruce Hampton had a group called the Grease Band that was eclipsed by an air guitarist/singer named Joe Cocker who was backed by a band of the same name. Hampton wasn't British, far from it. He hailed from Georgia, and has chosen 1992 to resurrect a new mad band that resembles kind of a crossbreed of the Allmans and Captain Beefheart. By coming back, the Capricorn label strangely epitomizes these strange times by combining the progressive nature of the dope-crazed sixties with the

quirky, misguided spirit of the hassle-filled nineties. As for the music here, if you hear a better guitarist than one Jimmy Herring ripping the bejesus out of a guitar, lemme know. All through this strange set, you keep forgetting that this is an Aquarium Rescue Unit live recording. Tell you what. If this doesn't catch on during this decade, this is the kind of disc that will be commanding huge collector prices come the 21st Century. Scary thought, huh?

GOING BLANK AGAIN - RIDE (SIRE/REPRISE)

One of those magnificently imperfect performances. Right from the get-go, Ride mean business, tearing through sheets and sleets of savage guitar chords and "Baba O'Riley" Who sequences. "Leave Them All Behind" is a massive introduction to the coming of age of Ride. Like all of the best "rides" we've taken in our lives, *Going Blank Again* (don'tcha just love that title?) takes you far away mentally and up close physically. This is the type of music sorely missed on conventional Album Radio. To discover songs like these on a rainy ride home would be a wonderful radio experience. I have to single out "Cool Your Boots" just because they sample a tiny bit of dialogue from "Withnail & I," one of George Harrison's coolest Handmade films. Start with "Leave Them All Behind" (which does) and proceed carefully down the face of the precipice.

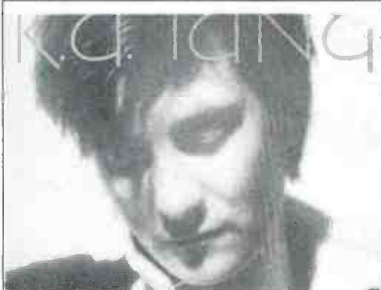

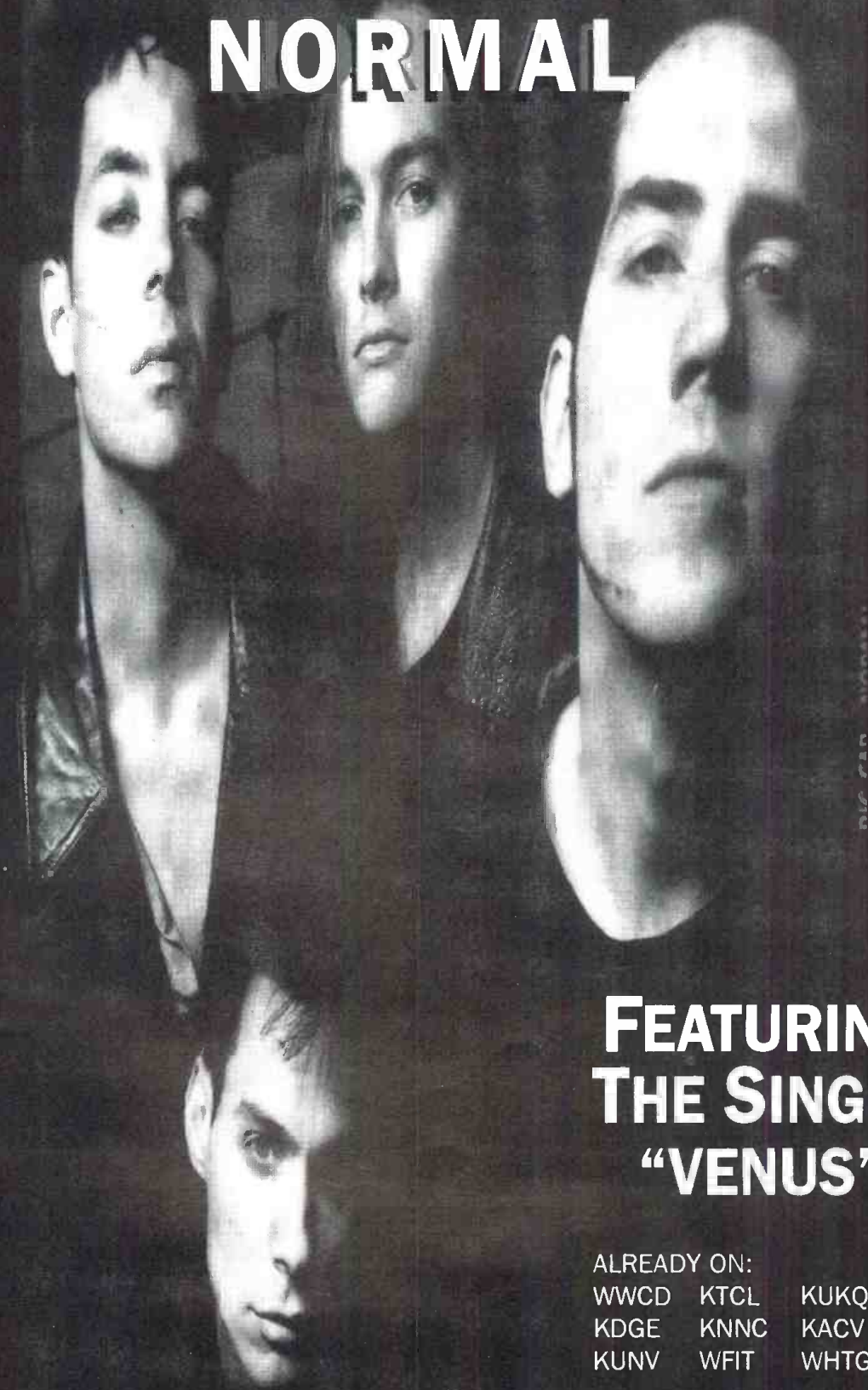

These are natural places to start when digesting *The First Of Too Many*, but don't stop there or you'll miss some of the best music this band has to offer. "Should I Feel It," with its rousing chorus and spitfire musical backdrop is a mega-hit waiting to happen. I also like the raw, lonesome twang to "Wrong Number," the acoustic flavored "Fishing At Tesco's," and the bouncing "Best Friend" and "Ex-Teenager." JAMES - SEVEN (FONTANA/MERCURY)

Some of you only became familiar with James via their massive single "Sit Down," but believe it or not, *Seven* marks the fifth album in about ten years for this Manchester band. Believe me, this is a band with a long-and-involved history! Tim Booth once told me during an interview that he felt each of us are allotted a certain amount of words during our lifetime and when we've used them up, people stop listening. I bring this up because on *Seven* he's used a fair amount of words relating to God and/or religion. But his opinions vary so greatly from song to song that, despite Booth's prediction, I don't stop listening because some of the

heaviest, most thought provoking lines are sang in the poppiest of songs. O.K., so James are a living, breathing dichotomy—life is like that sometimes—so is religion. The bottom line is that James make great music. One listen to "Born Of Frustration," "Sound," "Don't Wait That Long," "Ring The Bells" or "Heavens" and the music should speak for itself. Do you think Tim Booth did that on purpose? LR

DR. RAIN - AND THE KNIFE RAN AWAY WITH THE SPOON (IMAGO)

This one may take a couple of listens, or you may get it right away depending on your personal definition of Alternative. I look at Dr. Rain this way—they're a hot rock n' roll band, in the traditional sense of the word. With pop charmers like "Suzanne" and "Turn Your Head Around," Dr. Rain will most likely go beyond our format and into the mainstream much the same way labelmates Baby Animals did. Also check out "Go For Your Gun" and "Party Girl." LR

SOPHIE B. HAWKINS - "DAMN I WISH I WERE YOUR LOVER" (COLUMBIA)

Here's another one that's going to go format-hopping. This single will most likely be embraced by what I lovingly refer to as my "Granola" reporters—those stations whose audience responds to singer/songwriters of the Adult nature. Aside from the *Soul II Soul* breakbeats, this one's for Commercial ears. AC and Top 40 are next. LR

THE BEASTIE BOYS - "PASS THE MIC" (CAPITOL)

The Beasties are back with a vengeance. If you were lucky enough to see them at this year's Gavin Seminar, you're already privy to much of the band's new material, including their latest single, "Pass The Mic." Return-

ing to a hardcore (remember "Cookie Puss?") hip-hop flavor, The Beasties rock it hard and keep it funky on this one, which absolutely shines live. Don't look for the traditional hook 'cos it's just not there—but oddly enough, that doesn't take away from the song. Two things that will make you smile: rhyming commercial and the Jimmy Walker sample. Album out next month. LR

BIG CAR-NORMAL (GIANT)


Appropriately titled, *Normal* sticks within standard patterns of guitar-driven rock and roll, carving itself a home within these confines. "Venus" kicks off with stammering drums and a scorching guitar that turns to wailing and tortured bleating. The uncomplicated rocker, "Mad At The World," keeps things honest with a bass that shuffles around power chords and cymbal accented percussion. "Amazing Contradictions" assembles excellent background vocals and a chugging acoustic guitar to form the most memorable of these ten tracks. No frills or spills here, just a straight shot of guitars with

SKINNY PUPPY-INQUISITION (NETTWERK/CAPITOL PRODUCTIONS)

Welcome to the computer ridden world of techno angst where drum machines team with synthesizers to create an artificial landscape. "Inquisition" sputters by way of a whipcracking drum machine and siphoned metallic vocals. The bouncing hop of "Lahumans" becomes muddled and twisted into a grotesque symphony while "Mirror Saw" re-sounds with echoing strains of technology. This four-track EP may prove uninhabitable for some, but certain lifeforms who relish technology's possibilities will find *Inquisition's* atmosphere ideal. DB

cally. That's always meant dwelling on the past, and his response was usually sour. Now Lydon seems to be re-evaluating the Pistols impact on rock n roll to the degree that he chose to sample a slice of "God Save The Queen" (the noted "No future" chorus), grafting it to the end of "Acid Drops."

"There's a reason we put the 'no future' refrain at the end of the song. When I first started with the Sex Pistols, we had a problem with censorship. Years later, it hasn't changed. In fact, it's gotten worse. Nobody seems to care about free spirits—less now than ever before! You've got major league rock bands pontificating hate! I can only quote the lyrics of Guns N' Roses, 'All you niggers and fags.' That really offends me. It makes it disgraceful and pointless to live in a modern world when assholes are allowed statements like that. If we do not become united we will fall. We will dissipate and it will be the destruction of us all."

Doesn't Guns N' Roses have the same right to say what they please without any form of censorship? Maybe their standard of what is outrageous and offensive is different from yours and mine?

"Stupidity is always a valid option, but it should never be considered the most viable. I would much rather deal with honesty. Comments like that are not honest. They are naive at best and pig dog ignorant at worst. We can't afford that kind of mentality any longer. This is the modern world now. You have to stand or fall by what you believe in. If you want freedom for your big, sweet bad ass, you better believe in freedom for everybody else, also."

Missing Sid

If it's surprising to hear a Sex Pistols sample tacked to the end of a PiL song, it's even more surprising hearing Lydon sing a song, "Luck's Up," written to his long gone friend, John Beverly Richie, aka Sid Vicious.

"It's a song he would have loved. It's a put-down of his suicide and the cheap, sad sack way he destroyed himself. He destroyed himself through drugs. If Sid were around today, if he had recovered from his OD, or whatever else he

was involved with, I'm sure he'd laugh at this song."

Lydon turns sadly serious.

"And I miss him very much. We can't afford to lose human beings, not through nonsense. The song came about because I'm putting a book together. And it seemed that rather than be selfish and use these feelings for the book, I put should them in a song at the same time. I think it explains Sid's manic and confused behavior. Maybe it's a song Sid would have written about himself. I wrote it from Sid's point of view."

A tough one to write?

"Very much so, yes. How do you deal with friends who are dead? You miss them and you miss them and you miss them and you miss them! And there's nothing more you can say. Why are they gone? Why were they so stupid? If only they had carried on that little bit longer. Deep down in my soul I know that Sid could still have been a valid human. He had something in him that was extremely important, but he threw it away. And it's so upsetting."

As a tragic figure, wasn't he lucky to get as far as he got?

"No. He was incredibly unlucky. He made a dumb move. He killed himself. What more can I say?"

Another uncomfortable pause.

"By the way, recently, just this week, another friend of mine killed himself. No one you know. A friend. For the life of me, I can't understand how people get themselves into these situations. It really worries me that I didn't have enough to keep Sid alive. Do you understand how awful that makes you feel? It's almost like a selfish emotion. There are no easy answers to any of this."

While some people pray for answers, some write songs that roam into theological happenstance. All That Is Not offers a song re-titled "God." Is the song a prayer?

"Yes it is. It's telling you to be honest. 'How good to walk with the caprice of God. An ordinary human, an ordinary mortal.' We make mistakes, but you must always love yourself. Not from an egotistical point of view, but from the point of view, of 'Ouch I know I've done wrong.'"

Having been dubbed everything from Rotten to Anti-Christ, it's

unusual to see a PiL song written to God. Is Lydon a believer in an altruistic, omniscient super being?

"If you mean God, as in some chap with a big white beard, then no. God is yourself. Heaven is on this earth, as Bob Marley told us. There is no heaven after this, and if there is, then we wait as long as possible to find out. Live this life to the full. Hurt no one. Kill no one. Live long. Try to be happy. Try not to be stupidly happy."

Preceding "God" is a cryptic pop song titled "Cruel" that experiments with atypical forms of verse put to music. We learn that the song has roots in seventies rock.

"I used Roxy Music's attitude, 'In Every Dream Home A Heartache.' That was my root. On a press tour of Europe, I told all the Germans that it's about American female serial killers. Unfortunately they believed me. Then I find out there was one really bad girlie in Florida named the Damsel Of Death. Co-incidentally, that's where the American tour begins, in Tampax, Florida. Sorry, Tampa."

Kidding aside.

"Actually, it's a love song born out of desperation. Oh please, won't someone love me?"

Loud Love & Hard Work

Throughout PiL's existence, the band has had a tendency to express even its most tender thoughts (such as "Death Disco") in loud, aggressive shards of sound.

"I don't believe in mellow attitudes or being simplistic about life. I believe in out-and-out attack. I think that's the only way I've ever come to terms with myself and other people. Be loud, honest and open. Yell at each other. This is something I learned from my wife Nora, who often says, 'John, you dumb shit!' It works. It makes you wake up. There's something terribly dismal about people wanting sad love songs. That hurts me. Love songs don't deal with humanity, with the way real people deal with real people. We're all screamers! We wake up and yell at each other in the kitchen and in the toilet. That's where real life is worked out, in a high anxiety period of your life. People tend to run away from real problems in life, which is probably why everybody loves a sad love song. It's an excuse not to

deal with reality."

Beauty in loudness and energy could be the PiL credo. Lydon agrees.

"Absolutely, and do you know why? Because it's honest. It's clear, short, sharp and to the point. I'm not one to deal with trivia and trivial points. That's the difference between me and the American Top 40, or the English Top 40 or any Top 40. Why do people buy those awful records about running away from honesty?"

"I've had a terrible antagonism with American Soul music for a long time. I find all those vocalities merely excuses for not dealing with reality. Soul music today is not all about soul and what you feel in your heart and soul, rather it's a series of vocal lessons easily learned and duplicated by amateurs ad infinitum. I find the whole music very soul destroying. I suppose that's why most black kids are more interested in rap than sweet soul singers. They're fed up with being lied to."

Lydon bristles at the thought that rock n roll comes easy or that it can quietly enter the mainstream as affluent, middle class entertainment. Building and maintaining PiL has been one of his most difficult and trying tasks. That struggle stemmed from the layers of Sex Pistol law suits that for years denied John Lydon the resources of Johnny Rotten. But having won in court, he elected to split the proceeds four ways, between the rightful members. All this was done in the midst of nurturing PiL, sometimes on a shoe string budget.

"It's been hard work and it isn't easy to make records like this. It requires effort and commitment. These are not banal ditties that just trip off the top of my tongue or the end of John's strings or the bass player's doo-dahs. Or the drummer's flippity-flops. It requires work." ●

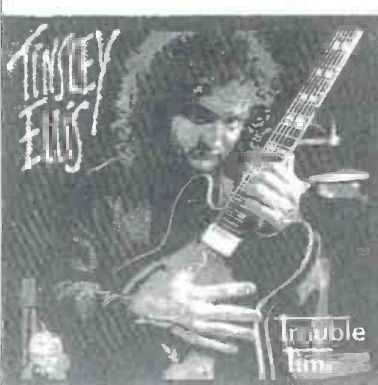

PERSONAL PICKS

SINGLES by Dave Sholin

COLORHAUS - *Innocent Child* (Interscope) A female vocalist from Australia and an English guitarist/writer/producer/engineer have teamed up to create some remarkable music that defines the Pop sound of the nineties. This debut effort by Sherrie Krenn and Phil Radford is somewhat like Roxette meets Wilson Phillips, and it's a song you won't forget after just one listen.

PAULA ABDUL - *Will You Marry Me?* (Captive/Virgin) It's a safe bet there are a few million guys who'd love to hear Paula whisper the title of this song to 'em just once! Unfortunately, unless your name is Emilio Estevez, it probably won't be happening in this lifetime. As someone who has been described as "cute and adorable," Paula's latest single has those same qualities. Spring officially starts today and a lot of couples will be posing this same question in preparation for those June weddings. By the time they march down the aisle, this tune will no doubt be very, very familiar.

MITCH MALLOY - *Anything At All* (RCA) Rock 'N' Roll from the heartland as this North Dakota native makes an impressive debut. Gavin's own Kent Zimmerman walked in with this a few weeks ago and asked, "Whaddya think?" I've been in love with this song ever since and checking early airplay stats, it seems a lot of programmers agree.

BONNIE RAITT - *Not The Only One* (Capitol) Featured on last week's Gavin Report cover, and entering the A/C chart as this week's second highest debut, this amazing talent has developed a following so immense she can't be considered anything other than mass appeal. Cool, smooth and soothing, Bonnie's vocal glides along this sensational song composed by Paul Brady. She is the only one who can sing 'em like this.

RIGHT SAID FRED - *Don't Talk Just Kiss* (Charisma) R.S.F.'s very first release captured the imagination of listeners around the world and got 'em in that sexy mood, so why stop now? On the heels of that massive hit comes this ode to foreplay that's supported by a video bound to keep audiences grinning.

JON SECADA - *Just Another Day* (SBK/ERG) A solo debut for a guy who is anything but a newcomer. A native of Cuba, Jon not only sang background for The Miami Sound Machine, he co-wrote Gloria Estefan's #1 hit, "Coming Out Of The Dark." Early airplay has generated immediate request action for this rhythmic, mesmerizing entry.

GREGG TRIPP - *I Don't Want To Live Without You* (Impact) It takes only a few seconds to feel the power of this compelling ballad that is heard in the Christian Slater film "Kuffs." Co-writer Elliot Wolff teamed with Tripp once before when they scored with Taylor Dayne's hit "Heart Of Stone." Sounds like the pair has definitely clicked again.

KEEDY - *Wishing On The Same Star* (Arista) How long ago did this song appear on the Picks page? Let's just say Bryan Adams's "(Everything I Do) I Do It For You" and Cathy Dennis' "Too Many

Walls" appeared the same week. Rather than re-run that review of this beautiful Diane Warren tune, I'll quote Wayne Coy, PD at B94.7 Redding, CA, instead, who charts it Top Five and declares, "It's one of the strongest researching records I've seen in the past two years."

CROSSOVER PICKS

TLC - *Ain't 2 Proud 2 Beg* (LaFace/Arista) This week's RECORD TO WATCH comes complete with a list of impressive stats (check "Inside Top 40" for the full rundown). No surprise that this happenin', Atlanta-based trio is turning in some phenomenal retail numbers.

ARRESTED DEVELOPMENT - *Tennessee* (Chrysalis/ERG) It only took four weeks for this exceptional track to land a Top Ten slot on our Rap chart. Words like "thoughtful," "sensitive" and "innovative" all apply to one of the freshest concepts to arrive this year.

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

k.d. lang - *Ingenue* (Sire) Sure sounds like k.d. is moving away from her Country roots. While not exactly a dead center Pop album, this set does put the lady in a new and brighter light. Her most recent album, "Absolute Torch & Twang," may have been her last attempt at culturing a Country base. There is still a frequent lode to her meter and there will always be a hopelessly domestic/romantic signature to her drift, but Ms. lang is deserving of so much more than one format's focus. Just as it would have been a crime for Linda Ronstadt to limit herself to Gilbert & Sullivan, so would it have limited k.d.'s potential to constantly re-create Patsy Cline. "Ingenue's" charm is in its pseudo innocence. k.d. is purposefully crafting a broadly appealing album, with exceptionally solid though often melancholic songs, performed in her usually brilliant vocal presentation. Hers is a voice most suited for heartbroken arias and ballads of affirmed devotion. And this is her most harmonic volume to date, as she is often thickly layering

her voice to great effect on the choruses. Among the special moments that must be heard are SAVE ME (with its Joni Mitchell-like chorus), THE MIND OF LOVE, MISS CHATELAINE, SO IT SHALL BE (with Gary Burton on vibes) and the set's most driven moment, CONSTANT CRAVING.
