US-China War Over; Piracy Was Main Issue

China has defused what could have become a trade war with the United States by agreement an signing February 26 in which it promises to clamp down on the manufacturing and selling of illegal copies of pirated American music CDs, movies and computer software.

If China holds up its end of the bargain, California's entertainment and software industries stand to gain a good deal of money, as the U.S. claimed that Chinese piracy was costing American artists and manufacturers more than \$1 billion a year.

China promised an intensified six-month crackdown on copyright violators and a longer term plan for the protection of intellectual property.

"Intellectual property is the present and future of California's economy," said Ira Goldman, the trade representative for Gov. Pete Wilson. "If it can't be protected, then our economic growth is going to be stifled."

The agreement also calls for joint ventures of American films, music and software. Quotas and licensing restrictions had blocked U.S. products at the Chinese border, creating a demand for products that bootleggers satisfied.

The U.S. imposed punitive tariffs last month on Chinese products to express its upset over bootlegging (GAVIN, February 10, 1995). China announced its own tariffs against American products, setting the stage for a full-out trade war until last Sunday's agreement.

Chi, Austin A3s Sold

WXRT-Chicago, which evolved into A3 from progressive rock in the '70s, has been sold by owner Diamond Broadcasting.

Group W reportedly paid some \$60 million for XRT and AM sister WFCR. Group W already has WMAQ/AM, the dominant news-talker in town.

The sale follows word that KGSR-Austin has been sold by Beasley Broadcast Group to Sinclair Communications of Norfolk, Va. KGSR has been A3 since 1990

Sinclair has also announced plans to build a new FM station in Austin. "The resulting duopoly will be a powerful force in the Austin market," said Sinclair president Bob Sinclair.

Minority Tax Rule Faces the Senate

Proponents of the minority tax rule, recently shot down bv the House of Representatives, are trying to gather supporters as the bill faces a fight in the Senate.

The minority tax certificate lets companies who sell to minorities defer payment of capital gains taxes, but is only one component of the rejected bill. The other portion extends a health insurance deduction to the selfemployed. The House's 234-191 defeat is seen as one of the first steps in eliminating affirmative action.

Viacom is most immediately affected, as the Ways and Means Committee wants the action to be retroactive

to January 17. That would put a damper on Viacom's plans to sell its cable system to InterMedia Partners, whose principal, Frank Washington, is African American.

"Tax benefits should not be conditioned on classifications such as race or ethnicity," said Ways and Means Committee chairman Bill Archer (R-Texas). "Does it make any sense that our tax laws should favor one person because he is African American...while disfavoring another because he is white?"

Viacom expects that the Senate will not allow the repeal of the minority tax certificate.

The Temptations' Mr. Bass Man is dead.

Melvin Franklin, anchor of one of Motown

Records' most successful groups, and the only original member who stayed with the Temptations as it changed personnel

through three decades, died February 23 in Los Angeles of heart failure. He was age 52.

Born David English in 1942, Franklin was a teenager when he hooked up with Otis Williams in Detroit in a singing group, the Distants. In 1961, the two were part of a merger with another local group, the Primes, whose



and with a Smokey Robinson tune, "The Way You Do the Things You Do," the Tempts began their run of 35 hits in an 11-year span.

Franklin was the bass on all the hits- "My Girl," "It's Growing," "Ain't Too Proud to Beg," "Get Ready," "Just My Imagination," "Papa Was a Rolling Stone"-and in all the group's configurations.

When, in the early '70s,

their songs addressed social concerns and hit the charts with "Ball of Confusion {That's What the World is Today}," Franklin seemed to be at home with the fiery works of such artists as the Last Poets, whose street poetry, set to heavy percussion, presaged rap.

"This," he said, "is the kind of stuff we used to shout to each other in the streets." Musical groups, he said, have to adjust and grow. "Those that don't mutate and broaden their scope just come and go."

September, the Last Temptations were awarded a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. When word spread about the death of Melvin Franklin, fans placed flowers on that star.

Walkout Works for **SF Talk Show Host**

Ronn Owens, the talk show KGO/AM-San host on Francisco who took a hike in late November when the station turned down his request to syndicate his show, is back.

And, yes, he's begun the process of getting syndicated. Owens, one of the few

talkers who's beaten Rush Limbaugh in the ratings. returned to his 9 a.m.-noon slot Monday.

"KGO thought that if I did a national show, it would hurt local ratings," said Owens, a 19-year veteran at KGO. "But I know my listeners, and this is where I belong."

that feeling, Despite Owens apparently was considering a deal with upstart FM news rival KPIX/FM.

In the end, KGO relented on the syndication matter and will be a joint partner

with Owens, sharing in any syndication profits. Don Buchwald, who handles Howard Stern, will handle syndication for Owen.

David Katz of Buchwald's office said no stations had signed Owens yet, but hopes to have him in Boston, Washington, D.C. and Denver soon. Owens will be marketed as a glib centralist, an alternative to Limbaugh.

"It's just a matter of letting the rest of the radio world know who Ronn is and what he does," said Katz. "We can pitch him as a Rush beater or go with Rush. If you're looking to dominate a market, put them together."

"I just wanted my turn at the plate," said Owens. "If I strike out, I can live with that. What I can't live with is never giving national syndication a shot."

Top 40: Up a **Breezy River**

It was a GAVIN Seminar first as Top 40 programmers and record execs convened aboard New Orleans' Cajun Queen and sailed the Mississippi.

Don't be misled thoughserious business was conducted. Along with Top 40 editor Dave Sholin, WEZB (B97)-New Orleans program director Scott Wright and Z100 (WHTZ)-New York star personality Elvis Duran helped moderate the session.

The main focus was the entertainment value of your radio station. Wright explained how B97 is New Orleans and specifically programmed for that city. Likewise, WHYT-Detroit's Rick Gillette explained the format facelift his station's undergone this past year, switching from an urban

"We're still a mainstream Top 40 station for Detroit," says Gillette, "and unlike our alternative competitor,

The gathering also discussed how too much research hinders rather than helps and how stations need to constantly re-invent themselves. As WPLJ-New York's Mike Preston advises, "Break the rules and color outside the lines. Keep your station fun, exciting and challenging.'

Saturday afternoon's panel centered on Americana radio's role in developing and exposing artists, while maintaining a balance that keeps listeners tuned in and the bills paid. "This format is cre-

ating a demand for radio to be important in people's lives," said panelist Brad Paul of Rounder Records.

Producer Pete Anderson, a panelist, wasted no time creating some sparks with his uncompromising viewpoints on the industry and where he stands. "Radio used to be an education. Next year at

this time you're going to be glad you did it," Anderson said about stations taking on the Americana format. Red House artist Greg Brown treated the crowd to a few songs as a special closer. On the whole it was a productive and entertaining way to get the Americana flag up and waving.

Urban Radio Takes it A/C

Urban radio's next logical turn is urban adult contemporary, according to a GAVIN Seminar group that included industry-ites from diverse formats.

Said one: "People like Vanessa Williams need black A/C." Attendees also grappled with the issue of yet another format label, with one of them lamenting, "Because of radio, our music is being re-categorized. It's being labeled urban contemporary for business purposes."

"We have to make sure we do what works in our markets," cautioned J.B. Louis of WBLX-Mobile, Ala., who confided that he is most concerned that his listeners get what they want. "We're not looking for originality," he said candidly. "We're looking for what people like."

One of the sessions' participants, Cliff Gorov of Groov Marketing, which specializes in jazz and adult alternative promotion, said afterward that a discussion devoted to urban A/C was well-timed. "It's a growing format," he said. "We needed to talk about it."

GRP s Tommy LiPuma Offers Miles of Stories

While last year's inaugural "Jazz/A2 GAVIN One-On-One" with maverick producer Joel Dorn turned out to be one of the seminar's surprise successes, this year's sit-down with veteran producer and new GRP president Tommy LiPuma proved equally entertaining and enlightening.

He told about trying (unsuccessfully) to get the vocal mix into Barbra Streisand's headphones while recording (in one day) "The Way We Were" (and the ensuing verbal tirade); he mimicked Miles Davis' voice to recall the jazz great's unique sense of humor, and he described his ascent from stock room to control room to board room.

LiPuma has been a major part of ground-breaking albums from artists such as the Crusaders, George Benson, Natalie Cole and Miles Davis. Asked how he determines good music, he replied, "If my ass shakes, it must be good."

With GRP artist Dr. John in attendance, LiPuma also disclosed new signings including George Benson and the Groove Collective. GRP will also re-start Blue Thumb (the Crusaders, Phil Upchurch, Dave Mason) and Impulse! The latter, he said, will offer new acts as well as classic re-issues.

College Radio Types Told About Life After School

You might not think that the first thing the college radio session at the GAVIN Seminar would discuss would be life after school—that is, jobs but that's what happened.

In his second straight year of heading *Dinky Pickle Alive II*, A&M rep Scott Carter, along with Slash's Carrie Murphy, Warner Bros.' Rob Goldklang and Sub Pop's Kristen Meyer walked guests through a week in the life of a promotion person. "A lot of you will be graduating soon, so I thought it would be good for you to see what we do," Carter said.

Radio folks are pretty much up on what happens Monday and Tuesday,

but Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, panelists said, are filled with writing reports, coming up with promotion campaigns, talking with managers. All confessed that because they're college reps, getting a band exposure is just as important as being a trade's "most added" record in a given week. "Warner Bros. knows college radio creates a buzz for new bands," said Goldklang. "A lot of bands won't be heard on (mainstream) radio. We use college radio to create that buzz."

When asked, "What was your worst promotional idea," Carter answered: "We sent out a sports drink with Dinosaur, Jr. and it exploded in the crate. That was sooooo *not* my idea!"

Seminar Exhibits Range From Radio to Rap

Between panels and showcases, Seminar attendees checked out several exhibits:

RCS (Radio Computing Services, Inc.) displayed its Master Control system . Mike Chapman, RCS' Midwest Marketing Manager, said that "It does more easier than any other system you can use," with features including setting up song segues so that you can hear how the last ten seconds of one song meld into the opening of the next.

A-Ware Software showed off its MusicMaster Scheduling System,

with consultant Bob Potter on hand to show PDs how they could spend less time going through logs by

using the computerized scheduling. EA/Sports and Immortal Records previewed the pre-release version of their *Coach K College Basketball* game. Visitors also played the pro game, *NBA Live '95*.

New York-based Radical Records distributed and played its line of hip hop and alternative releases, and Deadgame Records kicked it with their new rap releases and T-shirts. —DAVID BERAN

Drew Draws Line From Hookers to Hamburgers

Seminar attendees got strategic insights on the PD/GM relationship from Paul Drew, a well-respected programmer, businessman and first recipient of the Bill Gavin Heritage Award (in 1993).

Under the intriguing title, "From Hookers to Hamburgers," Drew



addressed topics such as negotiation, planning and motivation.

"Hookers are great negotiators," said Drew. "They understand that the value of services rendered is greater than the service itself. You should always negotiate for what you should get *before* you provide the service."


Drawing on his years of business dealings with the Japanese, Drew

told his audience, "The Japanese are great planners. Those who plan find greater success." As for motivation of employees, Drew counseled: "Praise usually speeds up people's productivity while criticism slows them down."

Oh, yes, burgers: Drew compared McDonald's with the best radio stations. "They found a great format, and it works."

Drew also noted that in every McDonald's restaurant is posted a quotation of President Calvin Coolidge's, urging burger flippers and others—to "press on," and saying that nothing is as important as "persistence and determination."

Programmer Jonathan Little from Madison, Wis., said he enjoyed another of Drew's quotes—this one from the philosopher Aristotle— "Excellence is not an accident, but a habit." R. Charles Snyder, PD at KTMT-Medford, Ore., said he learned that it's okay to not put all your cards on the table at once and that the art of negotiating is important, but above all that "If you've got passion, you can do anything."

Plentiful Champs at New Kids on Block **Rap RadiOlympix** For Alternative Jury

The Rap Radio Olympix at the GAVIN Seminar proved that rap shows no signs of slowing down in '95 and the comments generated from both the panelists and audience at this hip hop version of the jukebox jury provided some useful insight into what makes a record a hit or a miss.

Editor GAVIN Rap Thembisa S. Mshaka and comoderator Darryl James, Editor of Rap Sheet, presided over a panel including Adrian Miller, A&R Warner Bros. Records, Kobie Brown of Peace Records, producer Nikki Nikole, Mad Linx of WMNF in Florida, and Red Hot Lover Tone and Poke of Trakmasterz Productions.


Nine songs, both from signed and unsigned artists, got about 30 seconds of play each, with the DJs' response being monitored by the GAVIN applause-o-meter.

While the panelists generally dealt with the music, several audience members delivered further insight. Mary Datcher, of On the Street Promotions in Chicago, noted that many of the songs previewed were tailored for a specific audience and focused on regional taste and appeal.

Howie Klein presided over a room filled to the gills for the alternative jukebox jury, and he proclaimed the focus to be on "New kids on the block." The new kids were actually PDs and MDs who are new to their positions at college radio.

Ardent's Techno-Squid Eats Parliament opened things up by performing two acoustic songs. Another new addition was the applauseo-meter that measured the audience's response to the 1-1/2 minute song clips. The panel included WBCN-Boston's Oedipus,

Lisa Worden, WDRE-Long Island's Jonathan Shapiro, REV105-Minneapolis' Kevin Cole, Rock 102-Milwaukee's Tommy Wilde and Darcy Fulmer from VH1.

Juliana Hatfield's new single "Universal Heartbeat" kicked things off with a convincing ten on the applauseo-meter, and the voters gave it mostly sevens and eights. Cake's "Rock And Roll Lifestyle" also garnered a good response, but it was Rotator Cuff's "Alfa Romeo" that drove away with the highest honors.

But Seriously, Folks, A3 Radio Can be Fun

Don't take A3 too seriously.

That was the advice a roomful of the format's programmers and records people gave each other at an A3 breakout at the Seminar.

"One thing I hear over and over," said moderator Mark Marone of KIOT (The Coyote)-Santa Fe/Albuquerque, "is, 'You stations take yourself way too seriously.' That's the biggest complaint. How are you making the stations more fun?"

"Who says we're taking ourselves too seriously?" asked Norm Winer of WXRT-Chicago, feigning upset. "Give us some names."

The audience broke out in laughter, but those who spoke agreed that A3 stations could lighten up.

Zeb Norris of WXLE/ Clifton N.Y., who suggested that stations "address the music itself," because it impacts the flow of a station. "Tempo is important. It's hard to be funny when you're playing 'Carolina On My Mind."

But Judy McNutt, hard rocker turned A3 (at KBCO-Boulder), warned of too much talk about music. On her station, she heard a DJ go "for two hours without a break that didn't include a music sell, that assumed that people have a brain. If they like a piece of music, they know how to go and find it."

"What else can we bring to the format?" she asked. "We talk about lifestyles, about things that matter. Can we bring in some topical stuff?" -BEN FONG-TORRES

GAVIN opened its own onramp on the information superhighway at this year's seminar with Cybermarketing Jazz/A2, an in-depth discussion on how the radio and record industries can and are using modern technology.

Working their way through a corridor jammed with people waiting to get into the neighboring rap awards lun-

cheon, a sizeable techie interacted with turnout highway-literate panelists.

They agreed that to stay ahead, stations have to be everywhere. "Think ahead," said Julie Gordon (GAVIN'S "Flash" columnist). "Incorporate your e-mail address on everythingincluding directly on a CD."

Roy Gattinella of Windham Hill cited a marketing promotion they did over the "We've gotten Internet. response from 200 countries, including Micronesia," he said. "One hundred people a day visit, and they spend an average of 16 minutes with us." For their time, fans get everything from profiles to tour dates. Eventually. Denny Stillwell of Unisound said, BASS will go on line. Potential concert-goers will be able to click in, reserve tickets and pay for them all at once.

From the audience, Dore Steinberg of KKSF-San Francisco said that his station gets an amazing amount of e-mail.

Stillwell got right down to the nuts-and-bolts of what a station needs to get online: a 486 (386 will do) with a 512 MG hard drive, 4 (8 is ideal) MGs of added memory, a modem and a telephone line





elcome to this edition of "Small Market Success." This time around we take you to Quincy, Illinois, home to WQCY/FM (99Q), which has been playing Top 40 hits for that community for the past ten years. If you refer to your American history books, you may find out that Quincy was one of the Lincoln/Douglas debate sites the year Lincoln won the presidential election. We sit down and talk turkey with the station's music director, Brian Myles.

Why don't you give us a quick overview of your market and your position in it?

There are eight stations in our market,

soon to be nine with a collective ADI equal to Kansas City. We're virtually tied at the top of the last Arbitron with one of the two country stations. We've consistently finished on or near the top of each Arbitron since signing on as a Top 40 in 1985.

Does your competition force you to define your sound more than you'd like?

No. We love to let people know who we are and what we're about. There are three stations in our market playing SOME of the same music—one A/C, one hot A/C and us. We continually tell our listeners what the difference is between us and them, we perspire individually. We enjoy being the only station with the brains and balls to do it right.

You have a healthy portion of alternative music in your mix, what's your view on the strength of the genre?

I think that in the long run everything comes back to rock 'n' roll and alternative is a direct branch of that. It's basically just modern rock with a young '90s attitude. If you want to succeed with today's younger audience, speak their language and play their music. Today's alternative is so melodic that there's no reason why it can't be Top 40. That's why Elvis had fans. **Any examples of successful promo-**

tions in the recent past?

We get heavily involved with promotions and contests. We ran a \$20,000 Coke promotion that included an \$8,000 swimming pool. A Sea-Doo giveaway with 7-Up/Sunkist. We also promoted a Motley Crue concert that featured a prominent local band, The Undecided. We also gave away a \$20,000 stereo system inside a custom 1989 Fiero. Many of you may ask, "How do you come up with the goods?" It's all about having an aggressive sales staff and making sure advertisers know we're the best at what we do. The promotions will follow. **How much does research play a part in**

your programming?

Quite a bit. I study at least four trades, compile media-base computer research, and track local retail sales in three different cities within our market. When it's said and done, my gut is the most important factor. If it convinces me when I listen, I'll add it, even early at times. If I don't believe a song is a hit, I'll have to be proven wrong by research.

Where do you see WQCY heading in the future?

It's almost scary to consider the places we could go. The station is run by the best people I've ever been associated with. We also hire excellent part-timers with the idea that they should have full-time potential. It's an extremely supportive company that lets us have the reins when it comes to music.

Any final comments?

BY PAUL E. SWANSON

I'm glad to see the signs of resurgence within the format. I think we should all realize that we're in the business of entertaining. I'm not big on formulas or cookie cutter philosophies that make us all sound the same. Find out what your market wants and give it to them. If that means an alternative-flavored playlist, or urban, or mainstream, just find out and commit to it 100 percent. It isn't rocket science, it's fun, and it's entertainment. P.D. NOTEBOOK BY ERIC NORBERG

AN A/C AUDIENCE PROFILE

Even though adult contemporary is one of the two most widely presented music formats in the United States, many of its programmers don't understand their audience. One of the problems is that most of the A/C programmers are ment and the target audience is female. When male PDs use their own tastes and judgement in selecting new music, they sometimes seem to veer off in the wrong musical directon—encouraged by trade chart activity, which reflects that many other male PDs are doing the same thing.

Here's a finding that may surprise you: Female A/C programmers are often music enthusiasts whose music taste has been shaped by Top 40 or album rock radio—just as their male counterparts. And, as with their male counterparts, they too fail to realize their female audience doesn't share these same preferences.

Obviously, *all* A/C programmers need to keep in touch with the tastes and preferences of an audience that seldom calls in requests.

For your information, here are some of my current findings about the mainstream A/C audience:

They grew up listening to Top 40, and those who now prefer A/C find they not longer like a substantial amound of the music now offered by Top 40 radio. But, they probably will return to Top 40 over other formats, if an A/C station doesn't satisfy them. They still like melody and rhythm in their music and don't care for jazz. And they really don't like the "pop standard" sound.

And, surprise!, they prefer stations that play new music.

Hold on. Don't most A/Cs stress music that's not current? Yes indeed.

Do you see a problem here? The format tends not to be current-intensive; the listener prefers current music. Recurrents and oldies are simply the "comfort factor," and familiarity is no more important to the A/C core listener than is newness.

Maybe you're beginning to see why A/C is so vulnerable to sharply programmed oldies stations. Many A/Cs are so recurrent or oldies intensive that they have attracted a large number of oldies listeners, who can be picked off easily by a straight-ahead oldies station. Yet they don't play enough current music to maintain the listening loyalty of the core A/C listener.

And one more problem: Since so many PDs regard current music as "untestable," they lean on their own judgement, record promotion and "the charts"—and wind up playing many songs that actually

have little appeal to their target audience. By the way—that discovery by PDs via "hook testing" is what led to A/C's recurrent and oldies-orientation.

New music must be played, but it must appeal to the target audience. And until it's familiar, it should be tested with something other than its hook. Why not play it from the beginning? I make my living testing new A/C music, and full-song testing is, in fact, one of my secrets. I also know of a number of stations that test new A/C music using other inventive techniques.

A couple more research tidbits: A/C core listeners are song-oriented, not artist oriented. Generally they don't like remakes of old hits, and they *do* like catchy and melodict (but usually not jazz) instrumentals.

Inside Top 40

Only a few weeks after settling into his new gig as OM/PD of **KZFM**-Corpus Christi, **Mike Steele** traveled to the GAVIN Seminar in New Orleans to deliver a positive message to programmers: Not only can research be affordable, it can actually help make money for a station. Steele's presentation, *Maximizing Top 40's Potential in the '90s*, was one he took many hours to prepare and it helped shatter the myth that only stations with large budgets can conduct meaningful research.

In any size market, Steele argued, "It's critical to get accurate information on the music being played as well as the audience's perception of the station." Most everyone in the room agreed that research is especially important when detecting burn on a particular title. In response to his question about various criteria for burn, KKRZ-Portland PD Ken Benson cited a 20 percent burn factor as the point where he becomes concerned. "Research is only a tool, not a rule, and one must have a feel for research and its various fluctuations," Benson says.

It's Steele's belief that using a random sample is the way to go rather than utilizing contest winners who are your core listeners. Over and above research, a station's database can be used for direct mail pieces against competitors.

Before joining KZFM, Steele programmed **KIXY/FM-S**an Angelo, Texas and helped them become the highest-rated Top 40 in the country, and in the process turned the research department into a money-maker. "It's not mandatory to hire an outside \$45 or \$50 grand," Steele argued. "In-house

research allows for total control." Sometimes research can be as simple as hanging out at retail outlets (or, as KFTZ-Idaho Falls PD Rich Summers admitted, having your daughter working at a record store always helps get inside information), and as Steele noted, he does play songs for shoppers at malls to track their response. One system suggested for those with limited funds is TeleTrack, the program designed five years ago by KLYV-Dubuque, Iowa GM Kevin Kelly. Cross-tabbing questions by sex, age and daypart, TeleTrack sorts through some 400 to 500 calls a month in a matter of minutes.

Kelly said his goal was always to do in one month what Arbitron takes three months to do. "The numbers we show closely mirror Arbitron and Accuratings," he said. With nearly 20 clients who pay a one-time buyout fee of \$995, Kelly, who is TeleTrack's president, feels the user-friendly research program, which is possible to retrieve with pencil and paper, is a real timesaver for PDs. Former KLYV PD Joe Dawson (now at WWKX 'KIX 106'-Providence) finds the comments of not only core listeners but partisans of other stations especially useful.

Whatever method a station decides to utilize, Mike Steele emphasized how important knowing your market and correctly researching your market is if winning is your goal. "Take advantage of any tool possible to give your station an edge," he urged, "and by all means DON'T apologize for being a Top 40 station!" Next week: The Riverboat!

We have a new #1 as **The Eagles**' "Love Will Keep Us Alive" climbs to the top with a two-station advantage over **Madonna**'s "Take A Bow" in reports with 28 or more spins a week.

Six ADDs help **Martin Page**'s "In The House Of Stone And Light" reach the 5,500 spin level while holding temporarily at #3. **Bonnie Raitt**'s theme from *Boys On The Side* (wasn't that a **John Singleton** movie?) has reached #4 in just six weeks and its 843 Spincrease is third best in the format behind brand new heavies **Elton John** and **Linda Ronstadt**.



Two new top tens this week as John Waite's "How Do I Get By Without You?" enters at #8 and Foreigner's "Until The End of Time" comes in at #9. Waite's performance has taken nine weeks without an album to back it up and Foreigner's comeback has been accomplished in six weeks. Foreigner's Spincrease of 701 is fourth best in the format.

A³ New Releases BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN **Greatest Hits (Columbia)**

Bruce Springsteen curiously chooses to chronicle a rich career by blanking out on his first two albums. Still. since it's his Greatest Hits. "Born To Run" is as good a place to start as any. While the track pales in




comparison to the mastering job available on the expensivo gold 20bit CD released last year, it's the rest of the story that makes Greatest Hits a pleasant romp. While a true Springsteen hits package couldashould been a two- or three-disc affair, the final unreleased tracks are cause for celebration. As his sparse, handwritten notes indicate, Bruce's eyes have turned inward, and while there's no need to bang the drum about being hungry on the backstreets; there's always the spiritual well to draw from. Of the new tracks, "This Hard Land" (featuring the omnipresent A3 mandolin) may be the best indication of what we can expect "up the road."

(as in Williams) and Angus (as in AC/DC), which gives you a hint as to the versatility of guitarist George Bradfute ("the tone chaperone"). The guy's a killer on the strings. Natch, Webb is still knee deep in loud suits and kitsch, choosing cover material ranging from Small Faces ("My Mind's Eye") to Mott

The Hoople to Waylon to the Music Machine to James Bond to Rodney



Crowell. (Has Webb been sneaking around our record collections?) Town & Country is wacky, wild and odd cut by a guy with musical taste many of us can relate to.





Jazz/Adult Alternative New Releases

CHRIS BOTI FIRST WISH (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

For those of you who were in New Orleans celebrating early Mardi Gras at the Seminar, you know Chris Boti's latest, entitled First Wish, will be one of the biggest adult alternative releases of the year. Not only did everybody get to hang with Chris at Verve's after hours listening party, we watched him rack up enough points on the A2 jukebox jury to be ranked second best by a very discriminating (and at times critical) board of judges. Earlier in his career, Boti put in time with Paul Simon's band, and is a New York session player. With a sprawling, ultra-hip mix by Kevin Killen (Paula Cole, U2, Peter Gabriel, Tori Amos), First Wish transcends rudimentary smoothness for a more progressive feel. Boti's trumpet brings a stark, vocal quality to A2, a radio genre burnt out on too much saxophone. No high octave trills or improvisational noodling here. High level rock sidemen like bassist Pino Palladino, drummer Steve Ferrone and keyboardist Mitchell Froom are among the less predictable names that appear on this impressive debut. By the way, that's keyboardist Paul Joseph Moore making a rare appearance outside the cult group Blue Nile. The first songs that jumped out at us were the nocturnal ballad, "On The Night Ride," the Spanish lyricism of "Longing" and the textural mid-tempoed Miles-styled title track.

boardist Peter Horvath when he was playing with guitarist Ray Obiedo's band. Horvath originally hails from Budapest, Hungary (like Special EFX's George Jinda) and his brand of piano soul is light, accessible and glistening with chrome-plated funk chord changes. Our favorite pieces are the ones that utilize the seamless horn arrangements featuring woodwind player Norbert Stachel, who also played with Terra Sul. Three tunes co-written by Horvath and Stachel best represent Foreign Matter's commercial spectrum. "The View" has a more conventional jazz ensemble structure, while "This Side Up" is pure funky commercial A2 fare. "Something For Now" is a little more spare and ethereal as Horvath assumes the horn parts on sampled keyboard and Stachel moves over to electronic drum programming. Horvath is definitely making his move on the A2 airwayes and, so far, we like what we hear. While the tunes are certainly easygoing, the chord changes and arrangements seem more complex and disciplined after repeated listening.

HIROKO KOKUBU PURE HEART (JVC MUSIC)

One listen to pianist Hiroko Kokubu and the term "quaint" comes to mind. Kokubu plays in a florid and lyrical style, and her arrangements are fanciful and pleasing. Take the vamped samba treatment of "Luck In The Rain" or the acoustic quartet ring of "Carry Me With The Wind." These performances fit into a smooth, flowing pop feel, but with a dramatic and sophisticated jazzy build. JVC's full-bodied 20-bit mastering makes Pure Heart a very satisfying full-sound experience. Whether Kokubu injects charged Latin rhythms, as heard on a salsafied cover of "Mrs. Robinson," or graceful popping funk as heard on "Barefoot Steppin'," A2 can easily sort through these 11 tracks to find the right tempered song for their exacting type of broadcast sound. Abe Laboriel and Alex Acuna provide a solid rhythm bed throughout. **CAROLA GREY**

THE AGE OF ILLUSIONS (JAZZLINE) European drummer Carola Grey

fronts a driving band with some pleasant surprises by way of scorching solos and intimate arrangements. Young tenor sax player Ravi Coltrane moves closer toward adopting his own personality on horn with the brooding cityscape of "The Colour We Create." Enter Mike Stern on the title cut and the electricity starts to percolate a bit as Stern and soprano sax player Peter Epstein trade off a few anxious solos. Electric bassist Jeff Andrews and drummer Grey heat up the intensity with a throbbing and hypnotic rhythm base. As a bandleader, Grey has a rockin' power backbeat when necessary, but on the record's more pronounced bopping moments, like the fast 4/4 swing of "Aldo Thin Suar," she quickly adapts to a stinging snare/cymbal combination that conjures a fusionary Max Roach feel. Another Stern/Epstein juggernaut we especially dug was the spiraling "Attitudes." On The Age Of Illusions, Grey assumes a very serious, takeno-prisoners style to the sessions. The players are challenged to burn, as Grey emblazons her urgent rhythmic stamp throughout.

JAZZ/ADULT ALTERNATIVE

KEVIN EUBANKS SPIRIT TALK 2 (BLUE NOTE)

Since guitarist Kevin Eubanks migrated to Los Angeles to become de facto second in command to Branford Marsalis' Tonight Show Band, nobody can accuse him of going Hollywood on his subsequent solo recordings. If anything, they're more forceful and intense than ever. Brother Robin Eubanks affixes his more "outside" tendencies to these strenuous performances from the get-go, as he prods Kevin into some steamy guitar raves not three minutes into the first track, "Faith." Dave Holland's fervent bass presence heavies up the ante even more. On many of the compositions, the musicians play around the melody, albeit with swelling power, to make Spirit Talk 2 resemble an ECM improvisational session. Whether Eubanks plays acoustic or electric doesn't change the disposition much either. since he freely mixes acoustic and electric, usually within each song. THURSDAY DIVA

FOLLOW ME (DMP)

While DMP releases reliable smooth, commercial titles for A2 radio consumption like Fantasy Band and Chuck Loeb, we must admit we were caught off-guard by Thursday Diva, a duo fronted by singer Lisa Lombardo and percussionist/keyboardist David Charles. For reasons more to do with competition across the dial than personal music preference, many A2 stations don't want to rely too heavy on urban-flavored Luther Vandross-styled ballads to provide their vocal identity. That's where Thursday Diva's sultry, fullbodied delivery kicks in. Thursday Diva traverses freely across pop, progressive and R&B. If we aren't mistaken, David Charles used to record with another tasty duo called Airwaves on A&M Records, as well as having done pop productions in England during the '70s and '80s. Start with Lombardo's smoky cover of Don Covay's "Chain of Fools," then journey into the dreamy instrumental, "The Grey Ghost," and into the rockish hypnotic ricochet of "All I Knew.

"I'm trying to become a player that when you listen to me, you hear a lot of neat melodies going around rather than a whole bunch of patterns and scales...I started writing on paper again. Ine Jay Marks Blue and Green and the Melody Between

Outside, the pitch of the Mardi Gras festivities is feverish. The residents of and guests to New Orleans line Canal Street, hoping for a glimpse of flesh or a handful of beads as another parade winds by. Inside the restaurant, a lovely Italian eatery in the French Quarter, things are less frantic, although the crowds outside have delayed the arrival of the Jayhawks. When they arrive, Gary Louris (guitar and vocals), Mark Olson (vocals and guitar), Marc Perlman (bass), Tim O'Reagan (drums) and Karen Grotberg (keyboards) seem slightly frazzled. New Orleans suits the Jayhawks; Mardi Gras doesn't. The city's mysterious old-world charm and rich musical heritage provide a perfect setting for this Minneapolis-based ensemble's subtle, addictive and soulful blend of folk, country, rock and magic. Mardi Gras, with its shiny plastic baubles, mindless revelry and attendant cacophony is somehow, uh, wrong. Inappropriate. Too superficial. Maybe the band could return for the Jazz Fest.

The Jayhawks are in New Orleans for a House of Blues appearance concurrent with the 1995 GAVIN Seminar, the release of their fourth album, *Tomorrow The Green Grass* and the success of "Blue," its first single. The 13song, George Drakoulias-produced offering from American Recordings is chockfull of Jayhawks' specialties—insidious hooks, goosebump harmonies, breathtaking chord changes, wonderful bridges, masterful musicianship and heaps o' heart. This is a special record, and everyone, even modest-Pisces-guy guitarist Louris, seems to sense it.

"With our last record (1993's *Hollywood Town Hall*), we were under a lot of stress," he says. Making *Hollywood Town Hall* was brutal—it took forever. This was more live. I think we've always had *Tomorrow The Green Grass;* in us, it's just a side we've never really shown before. And I know it's a better record. Before, you got just a small picture of us. And, the next record is gonna be completely different. Hopefully, eventually, you'll just look back and see ten records by us and be like, 'Oh—that's what they're about'."

That question—what are the Jayhawks about?—has been debated in the press and elsewhere since the band's appearance some ten years ago. At that time, underground Minneapolis music was more rock-oriented, as bands like Soul Asylum, the Replacements and Husker Du were making noise in the clubs. Elsewhere, the Twin City was known as the Purple Pantheon, home of the artist formerly known as Prince. In that environment, the Jayhawks were something

of an anomaly. Although they were associated with the alterna-rock scene (*Blue Eartb*, their second full-length, was released by Twin\Tone, the label that first championed Soul Asylum and the 'Mats), the band's sound was different enough to challenge the critics, who began a comparison campaign that continues to haunt (and annoy) the Jayhawks. Louris notes, "I don't know if I've read of a band that gets more comparisons to specific other bands. Why isn't every other word written about Green Day something about the Buzzcocks or the Clash? They don't get it, why do we get it? I don't understand. I think what we're doing is pretty damn original, even though the stuff that it's based on is traditional. We're taking it to different places.

"I don't think we're a country band. That's why I don't think the Gram Parsons comparisons are particularly accurate—although I'm a huge Gram Parsons fan and I take that as a compliment. Our song structures are not all that country. I think that someone who likes country music would see the difference. We get no recognition from Nashville; nobody ever calls us and wants to get something on CMT. Of course, that's not really country any more, either."

However, when slightly pressed, Louris, who sings a mean high harmony, gamely admits to being "Emmylou in a man's body."

"Maybe I'm too close to it," he relents. "I've known people who have listened to the Burrito Brothers for the first time, and they'll say 'That sounds like you guys. Is that you guys?' I could be too close to it. But I'm not insulted. If they said we sounded like the Eagles, I'd be very insulted. I'll go on record as hating the Eagles— I've never liked them and I don't want any kind of association with them."

And "Parsons-esque" isn't the only label the Jayhawks resist. The band is equally uncomfortable with the narrow definitions provided by radio formatting. Although *Tomorrow The Green Grass* has been heartily welcomed by A3 (and lovingly embraced by Americana), Gary Louris remains wary. "The reason we've shunned

labels like the A3 thing is because Album Adult Alternative seems one step away from Adult Contemporary. And 'adult' usually equals 'boring.' I don't think we're boring—we're not 21 any more, but we're not boring."

Given the Jayhawks' early association with Twin\Tone, their current involvement with American (a label that, while diverse, offers only little country music) and the band's somewhat rebellious, we're-not-adult-or-boring position, it's no surprise that Louris' list of current favorite songwriters has a distinctly alternative flavor. In addition to mentioning Iris Dement and Victoria and Lucinda Williams, Louris expresses admiration for Jeff Tweedy and Jay Farrar (formerly of Uncle Tupelo), the Palace Brothers, the Jon Spencer Blues Explosion, Lou Barlow and Matthew Sweet. Bassist Marc Perlman has an (almost excessive) appreciation for Liz Phair. Says Louris, "What bothers me is that I think a lot of those (alternative) bands must look at us and think, 'oh, they're a A3 band'. And I'd like to be respected by those bands, because I respect some-but not all-of them." In fact, Louris and Perlman have alternative alteregos who play in a Minneapolis pick-up band, Golden Smog. The ensemble, which includes or has included Soul Asylum's Dan Murphy, ex-Replacement Chris Mars, Craig Johnson of Run Westy Run and Jeff Tweedy, released one EP a few years ago and has a 17-track opus forthcoming from Rykodisc in September.

How can Louris be so prolific? He says, "I don't think that people understand that there's not a lot of thought that goes into the Jayhawks. Whatever happens, happens. We write songs with whatever comes out of our heads, whatever we receive that day, you know? 'Cause I believe it's kinda floating out there and if you're open, you'll receive it. That's why I write in my sleep, usually—or when I'm drunk. I usually wake up in the morning with something in my head. When you start thinking, you're in trouble. So you wake up, you've got something going in your head and you run and record it before you start thinking about it."

Perhaps, ultimately, it's that connection, the link the Jayhawks provide between the conscious and unconscious that makes their music so mesmerizing and universal. It certainly clarifies the bond between N'awlins'—the mystical city—and this timeless, original band.

Tuesdays are usually very hectic and cause stress, headaches and grouchiness among industry people. Last Tuesday was no exception, but at least there was some great music added at radio, such as A&M's Monster Magnet, EastWest/EEG's Orange 9mm, Atlantic's Skid Row, Metal Blade's Killers and Island's Quicksand LP...Last week, Metal Blade's Grip Inc. broke the record for all time most added with 46 adds but Monster Magnet broke that record this week with 56 as did Orange 9mm with 53 adds. Grip Inc. still holds the record for all time highest plus trend. They got 167 more spins this week, which raised them from last week's debut position of 48 all the way up to ten this week. So who's going set the next chart record? I have no idea either...KNAC-Long Beach, who were one of the pioneers of hard rock and metal programming, broadcast for the last time on Wednesday, February 15. What is commercial rock radio coming to? Whenever I was down in L.A. I always tuned in and thought to myself, "Why can't we have a killer station like this in San Francisco." For those of you who've never been here, besides alternative there is no hard rock radio. San Francisco rock radio is in a sad state of affairs. If I ever win lotto I'll buy a station here and program nothing but aggressive music and I promise you'd never hear that annoying song, "I'll Melt With You." I say this because a couple of our stations spin this song, along with a few others, way too



many times. Metallica's James Hetfield and Lars Ulrich (above) dropped by KNAC to bid farewell and play their favorite classics...In other station news, Eric Slayter exits KATP-Amarillo to take on the music director duties across town at **KAKF**. He'll also be programming four hours of metal a week so congratulate him on his new gig at (806) 353-3500. Mike Shannon will take over the metal controls at KATP and can be reached Mondays 9:00 a.m.-12 Noon Central time at (806)-359-5999...Metal director Brodie Holmen would like you to know that his call letters have changed from WRPS to WMCI. The

station is still located at the same address in Brockton, MA with the same phone number, so don't freak out when you see these strange new call letters on your tracking or on-line information...I'm still waiting for people to send me seminar pictures. If you have any and you don't look too trashed send 'em my

ROCK Releases UNIVERSAL STOMP Stomping Of Jake (Overture)

Well, I'd sure hate to be lake if Detroit's Universal Stomp has any sort of a grudge against him. The fury and sheer intensity of the band's power chords and pummeling drums, which form the foundation of their metallic sound, is enough to make me run for cover. Universal Stomp (Ed McEachern, vocals; Dave Curry, guitar; Scott Poole, guitar; Aaron Ruby, bass; Jeff Shakin, drums) offer four exceptionally heavy tracks on their debut EP, Stomping Of Jake. "Circle Of Fear" is diluted with vicious vocal snarls highlighted by dual metallic guitar

hooks, stinging bass lines and overwhelming drum slams. "O.E.M." is another ferocious tune that showcases wiry guitar licks that flirt with the underlying crunching rhythms. "Intolerance" and "Lost" match the intensity of the latter two and will provoke mass moshing among your listeners. Stomping Of Jake is an excellent first effort and will get the attention of anyone into metal. 1 look forward to the full album sometime this spring. **CEMETARY**

Black Vanity (Cargo/Black Mark)

Cemetary's dark harmonic grooves are already getting adds from several GAVIN Rocks stations. On their third release, Black Vanity, Cemetary (Mathias Lodmalm, lead guitar/vocals; Anders Iwers, guitar; Thomas Josefsson, bass; Markus Nordberg) conjure up a twisted gothic rock mesh that hovers between death metal and doomsday rock. From the airy strings of "Black Flowers Of Passion" to the grinding guitars of "Ebony Rain" and "Last Departure," Cemetary will appeal to anyone into dark Sabbath-like rhythms and wiry melodic guitars. Cemetary discovered early on that the key to success was exposure. After solidifying a strong following in their Swedish homeland the band toured Europe with Benediction and Atheist, and that resulted in favorable press and a good amount of airplay. As if touring wasn't enough to keep some members of the band busy, Lodmalm, who wrote and produced this album, found time to produce another Swedish band, Lake Of Tears, while putting the finishing touches on Black Vanity. Cemetary's deep blend of '70s metal with '90s death rock will find a home on the playlists of many metal shows.

BATHORY Requiem (Congo/Pleak Mari

(Cargo/Black Mark)

Eleven albums and seven years later, Bathory are back to pummel you with their insane metal sound. There's no way to accurately describe the kind of mayhem this band produces because it touches on so many different styles including death metal, hard core, thrash and neck breaking, in-your-face rock. It's painfully obvious that Requiem is for the listener who has no concept of what slow, soft, gentle or easygoing means. Bathory is totally on fire right from the start with the ripping rhythms of "Apocalypse" to the pummeling drums of the title track. One of the few times that this band slows down is for the opening of "Suffocate" and "Necroticu." Both

feature creeping guitar hooks at first but they're quickly replaced by thunderous guitar riffs, speedy drum slams and vicious vocal yells. "Crosstitution," "Pax Vociscmum" and "Blood And Soil" are fiery tracks that should have caution signs attached to them. If your into the hard stuff, Bathory is the way to go.

CASPAR BROTZMANN MASSAKER Home

(Thirsty Ear)

Casper Brotzmann along with his bandmates bassist Eduardo Delgado Lopez and drummer Danny Arnold Lommen, who make up the German trio Massaker, returns with his fifth album, Home. Wtih his patented guitar torching skills, Brotzmann reclaims his status has rock's renaissance man with his unique playing style and unorthodox approach. You won't find any special effects or production wizardry on any of the five tracks offered on this album. Brotzmann, who specializes in driving, cut up guitar chords and cluttered rhythmic schemes, dives recklessly into each track vigilantly exposing and destroying any subtle harmonies that threaten to break the surface. Home is an epic of destitute songs, the shortest being "The Tribe" which is only a little over six minutes and is the focus track for radio. If song length is not an issue at your station be sure to check out the title track, 14.43 and "Bohmen," 10.45. Brotzmann and company will exorcise any commercial pop aftertaste that may haunt your station with Home, the apocalypse of reconstructionalist rock.

WISHBONE Wishbone (Stampede)

I usually prefer my music hard with an aggressive heat. However, my taste has taken a detour down the freshly paved highway of harmonious light rock after listening to the debut album from Orange County's Wishbone. Don't get me wrongthese guys are far from charting in A/C. Even though they don't have mush of a metallic edge, they still deliver tight, cohesive songs littered with flowing rhythms and traditional rock n' roll schemes. Wishbone (Sean Ryan, Vocals; Mark Kock, lead/rhythm guitar; Andre Robichad, rhythm guitar; Kurt Kock, 5 and 8string bass; Bryan Rosen, drums/ percussion) offers 11 tracks that contain excellent acoustic and electric guitar hooks, strong bass lines, modest drum beats and infectious vocals. "Timeless Moments," "Lay Down," "Song Everlasting" and "Hearts Like A Wheel" are COR/Album material; "Mad About

You" and "It Ain't Life" will appeal to college rockers. Wishbone's freshman effort is commendable and merits a few spins. Check it out.

COMBINE Norfolk, VA

(Caroline)

The boundaries between alternative and hard rock are barely visible within the revving guitar rhythms and edgy melodies of this highly energetic band called Combine. If you're wondering where the hell this threesome came thundering out of, just read their album title. Norfolk, VA contains nine tracks of grizzly guitar chords that punctuate the intensity of guitarist Brian Pafumi's vocals. Along with bassist X. Darryl Lewis and drummer Juan T. Corbett, Combine will surprise you with their brand of alternative hard rock. Throw on "Suckboy vs. The Hermaphrodite" or "Javaman" and get lost in the reverberating guitar spuzz and punchy, grooveriddled rhythms. Metal radio can be picky with bands that don't growl or have endless metallic hooks, but Combine's aggressiveness should win over the most meticulous metal director. "All Tore Up," "Cattle My Rage" and "Ephidrine" are tracks that will get the nod from your thrash rock listeners and will grow on you like the mold on your forgotten pizza in the corner of your living room. Crunch and munch. Combine will be a delectable addition to your playlist.

JAG PANZER Dissident Alliance (Pavement)

Jag Panzer are targeting metal radio with Dissident Alliance, their third full-length album. Founding members guitarist/keyboards Mark Briody and bassist John Tetely have joined forces with vocalist Daniel J. Conca, guitarist Chris Kostka and drummer Rikard Stjernquist to round out their new and improved sound. Heavy, hard and hellishly refreshing, Jag Panzer deliver a gloomy hard rock/metal sound on Dissident Alliance. Since they're natives of Colorado, where the grass is green and the mountains high, I wonder where the roots of their angst and frustration with society comes from. Regardless of their displeasure with the way the world works, Jag Panzer's forte lies in the tumbling waves of metallic hooks on "The Clown," "Edge Of Blindess," "GMV," "Last Dying Breath" and "Whisper God." Also be sure to check out the shredding romps of "Jefferey Behind The Gates." A bit of old school metal mixed with current leaning hard rock and a dash of doomsday rock, Jag Panzer will conquer metal radio with Dissident Alliance.





ROYAL TRUX THANK YOU (VIRGIN)

With the release of Thank You, the new album from the erratic Royal Trux, indie afficianados will resume the debate: Who's ultimately responsible for Pussy Galore's genius and legacy-Jon Spencer or Neil Hagerty? I've read at least one 'zine that argued that Spencer was originally inspired and influenced by a smack-addled Hagerty, but until Thank You, I was reluctant to take sides. This offering, the fifth disc from wandering Trux Neil Hagerty and Jennifer Herrema, is, as a whole, far more structured, coherent, and musical than the band's earlier efforts; such semi-consistency makes it easier for one to assess Royal Trux's relationship to the blues. And that assessment makes it clear that Hagerty-more so than Spencerappreciates his medium. In short, Hagerty understands that the blues are more about implosion than explosion.

Even though Royal Trux, with the help of three new full-time members-Dan Brown (bass), Chris Pyle (drums) and Rob Armstrong (other percussion)-has shored up and refurbished its heretofore rotting timbers of sound, with Thank You the band hasn't chosen to fully arrest decay. Unlike Spencer, who opts for tight licks and ego inflation, Hagerty and Herrema know that, for the most part, the blues reflect hopelessness and disintegration, and Thank You is infused with that knowledge. Check out the Stonesey "A Night To Remember," the perkier "Ray O Vac," the lazy lead guitar and gutteral vocals on "Lights On The Levee" and "Fear Strikes Out." ---SEANA BARUTH

ALEX CHILTON A MAN CALLED DESTRUCTION (ARDENT)

Those of you who were lucky enough to see Alex at GAVIN's cocktail party in New Orleans have probably already lent an ear to AMCD. Though he recorded the solo record Cliche last summer, these dozen new tracks offer a spate of the unadulterated emotions that our hero mined in his Big Star days. During recording, Chilton relied heavily on the backup band's ability to pick up songs right away, and they stir a raw R&B spice into the pop mix. "Sick And Tired" gives a nod to Carl Perkins' classic "Slow Down," complete with horns and a swamp-mired organ. The spirited bop of "Lies" finds Chilton's vocals wavering between innocence and experience, and "What's Your Sign Girl" features Rundgren-like falsetto. "II Ribelle" is an R&B blowout with an amazing rockabilly guitar and blues bass duel/t. Other cool cuts are the surfy instrumental "Boplexity" and the cover of Brian Wilson's "The New Girl In School." Hopefully a tour is waiting in the wings. ---DAVID BERAN

The Lund Letter

PROGRAMMING TRENDS



At the Gavin Seminar last week, we discussed how the role of the Program Director has changed in the last five years. Merely "playing the hits" is not enough to satisfy the goals of management. Performing the role of *Product Manager* is required.

Programmers today are pro-active as opposed to being re-active. **Top 10 Programming Trends**

in 1995: Trend #10: The programmer is

totally in touch with his audience and "lives the life group". Every aspect cf programming and promotion is specially geared to the target audience.

Trend #9: *The P.D. recognizes what listeners will be talking about* around the water cooler or coffee pot at work in the morning; this daily "Big Event" should be a topic of discussion during the morning show. All station promotions reflect "what's in", "what's hot", and "what listeners want".

Trend #8: Competition has increased dramatically. Today's P.D. thinks and acts strategically in face of direct format challenges. Being unique is an important aspect of getting ratings, i.e., the station should stand out from the pack. An outrageous morning show routine and bigger-than-life external promotions help the station to be remembered and will affect Arbitron diary mentions. Trend #7: There's more to building cume than advertising. How do listeners find a new station? A large percentage of people discover radio stations with the "scan" button while driving. This is especially true on the weekend when people search for a station that sounds different from their weekday choice to match a different lifestyle. Also, weekend programming sounds terrific! The second most popular way of finding a new radio station is getting a recommendation from a friend. "Big event" and topical bits in morning shows contribute to trial because they encourage

talk among listeners. Telemarketing at work or home solicits cume trial and is as important as receiving a recommendation from a friend. Telemarketing attains first-person consent to try a station.

Trend #6: Database Marketing is one of the most cost efficient tactical weapons to add listeners and revenue, and it re-sells present listeners on station benefits. Instead of relying entirely on mass media like TV to reach new listeners, the station markets only to those in the station's "frequent listener" files contained in its computer database. While influencing this core to increase usage of the station utilizing mail, phone or fax, the station continually builds the data base adding new names and listener profiles to the computer software



CHRIS BOTTI First Wish (Verve)






