Nice 'n Big Easy...

The Big Easy was easily the biggest one yet.

GAVIN'S tenth Seminar, staged at the Hyatt Regency in New Orleans, drew more than 3,000 participants, according to GAVIN CEO David Dalton, breaking the attendance record set just last year.

New Orleans added dimensions unseen in previous Seminars. The main Top 40 session took place on a riverboat. For the cocktail party, the Hyatt ballrooms were converted into faux Louisiana swamps, complete with a live alligator, a mini-Mardi Gras parade, and a jazzy funeral procession ending with GAVIN'S Bob Galliani rising from his coffin to welcome partygoers.

Louisiana, in turn, welcomed the seminar. "The economic impact is tremendous," said Lt. Governor Melinda Schwegmann. "Tourism is our major industry, and we are proud to have people recognize that."

The Crescent City drew numerous raves, and to the question, "Where will the Seminar be next year?" Dalton responded: "So many people have told us it was the best radio and music convention they've ever attended, and that they want to do it all over again next year in New Orleans. We're certainly considering New Orleans, along with several other options, but it's going to be difficult to top that cocktail party!"

Clive: Say 'No' to Formulas

In a session that was part homage, part interview, and part Q and A, Clive Davis showed no fear as he chal-

lenged radio to get away from "formula" radio.

The president and co-founder of Arista Records drew a capacity crowd of nearly 500 for his interview with GAVIN Top 40 editor Dave Sholin. Davis was introduced by way of a video history narrated by Casey Kasem that included salutes from many of the stars with whom

he has worked in a storied three-decade career in the record business.

The video also hinted at what was to come at session's end, the awarding to Davis of the 1995 Bill Gavin Heritage Award from GAVIN CEO David Dalton.

But before he received the latest in a long string of industry honors, Davis, who was greeted with a standing ovation, spoke with Sholin about career highlights and restated his philosophy: he seeks to sign and build stars,

and his A&R people are, similarly, instructed to envision potential signings headlining at places like Madison Square Garden and the Radio City Music Hall. "Then

you're building for the long term."

And he explained his ability to stay abreast of music trends and changes: "It's probably a fear of going over the hill."

As the audience laughed, Davis added: "You've got to keep fresh and be aware of trends—not to be trendy, but to understand the evolution of music. And I encourage radio to do the same."

It was on the subject of radio that Davis, while making certain to thank and acknowledge radio's role in his successes, was most pointed.

"I...find frustrating the rules that seem to be glibly given out" by radio, he said.

"'Take out the spoken words;' 'change this part or that part of a song.' It reached its height with what turned out to be the biggest single in history, when radio said to take out the a capella from 'I Will Always Love You.' " (It stayed.)

"You get these narrow definitions," Davis said. "I'm not telling you how to run your business," he continued. But if radio persists in its per-

if radio persists in its perceived direction, he cautioned, "you'll get formula records; you'll give your listeners everything they've heard before."

When an audience member asked where rap artists could go, in face of the policies of some Top 40 stations, Davis pointed to such media as THE BOX and 'street marketing. You've got to find stars, and they've got to find the audience, and then see if radio comes along or not."

Zelnick Calls for High Tech Reality Check

In flight, he couldn't get enough power from his Powerbook to write more

than a couple of thoughts, and resorted to pen and paper. He couldn't find the advertised "data port" in his room at the Hyatt. And, off hand, he doesn't know his own e-mail address.

But don't think Strauss Zelnick fears technology.

In fact, as he made clear in his keynote, the new president/CEO of BMG Entertainment North America is on top of new technology and how it is likely to impact the radio and recording industries.

Zelnick, who at 37 already has led a major film studio, an independent video company, and a software production company, wowed the crowd with a speech that sounded at once off-handed, anecdotal, and jammed with up-to-the minute facts.

For all the talk about the information superhighway, he said, "no one knows what it means." The term, he said, "has quickly evolved into a cliche and it's now rushing headlong into becoming an anachronism—sort of the verbal equivalent of the Nehru jacket."

"For me, it's more fruitful to look behind the phrase, and see what we can take from it that's useful." he said. "There's a simple fact about the computer revolution, which started 20 years ago. Every year since, computer power has grown, and the cost of that power has gone down." For the media business, "Digital computing lets us do things with infor-

mation we couldn't do before, and that creates the opportunities most of us are trying to make sense of today."

But our industries must separate hype from reality, he cautioned, and focus on technology that matters commercially, that supports activities people are interested in: interpercommunications,

sonal communications, news and information, fiction (stories), music, and games/sports. New technology, he added, must offer more value than existing media. He listed three crucial elements: quality, convenience, and price.

In music, Zelnick foresees a small, cheap, long-lasting chip-based medium—if a hardware standard can be worked out.

Zelnick concluded with an upbeat note on radio, whose "obituary has been written way too often. Radio isn't dead because it serves a strong consumer need" and because of its local focus. Digital radio's signal quality, he said, is the only threat. "Broadcasters," he said, "must get together and develop a digital standard."

Radio, he said, can take advantage of interactive technology for, among other things, marketing. But it's what it's marketing that counts. The challenge, said Zelnick, is to "create a quality creative product and deliver it effectively to your audience."

The industry must combine "talent and passion" and focus on quality in embracing new media, said Zelnick. "Or "even the brightest futurist has no future."

Musical Memories from a Party Disguised as a City

Transcendent moment number one: I was lingering on in Club Gavin at the Hyatt Regency for no good reason—except maybe that 12:30 a.m. was just too early to call it a night. Not in New Orleans, anyway.

Sure enough, along came a guy holding a sign, inviting all lingerers to meet Timbuk 3 in room 1906. Around 1:15, with a very superfluous Amaretto in hand, I was listening to Barbara K. and Pat McDonald. perched on the foot of a king bed, entwined in harmony, Pat's guitar amplified on a little Peavey set up by a window framing a view of New

the crowd that his "King of Broken Hearts" was inspired by the story that Gram used to be moved to tears by George Jones records.

And then there were the Jayhawks at the House of Blues. I've heard the similarities in Mark Olson and Parsons' earnestly sweet and reedy voices. But to see them-to witness Olson and the 'Hawks' youthful energy, to hear the hand-in-glove harmonizings (with Greg Louris) that date straight back to the Everly and the Louvin Brothers—the same heartbreak harmonies Parsons heard and fused with rock and roll-is to

schmooze, to see and be seen. But Dionne Farris made it well worth escaping the biz buzz at Jimmy's, to stand at stage front and soak her in-especially on the mesmerizing "Food for Thought" and her hit, "I Know"...Most inside joke: Jim Lauderdale to his audience: "People've been coming up to me and saying, 'Jim, I'm confused. I thought you were A3.' I said, 'I am A3, but I'm also Americana!"

Wading down Bourbon Street, past topless bars and female wrestlers, we wind up at Lafitte's Blacksmith Store, a dark bar reeking of history and unassuming jazz, played by a chain-smoking combo, one of whom says, at set's end: "Jazz is dead, man. It's all karaoke bars on

Bourbon Street."

I think and I hope he's wrong. Jazz is no more dead than the spirit of music, and in this party disguised as a city, music remains what it has always been: transcendent.

Orleans, resting between thunderstorms. They sang a couple of gorgeous songs from their new album, A Hundred Lovers, and then they did a gently rollicking "Born to Be Wild" from their six-song sampler of a year ago-this in response to a request for "In a-Gadda-Da-Vida."

Bouvard: Arbitron is a 'Totally New Company'

"This is Day Five for me," Pierre Bouvard, general manager at Arbitron Ratings, Inc., announced to his Seminar audience.

"Last weekend I was sorting and writing the auditorium test for Power 106 in Los Angeles, and Monday I started at Arbitron. I still think like a radio guy, and my goal is to not lose that perspec-

"It's a totally new company," said Bouvard, who worked at Arbitron in the '80s. Pierre Bouvard "The company I left '

was arrogant, and it cared more about the television business than radio. Then Steve Morris became CEO, and he said, 'Hey, we're pouring money down the drain with the TV business.' "

Before Morris' arrival (from General Foods), said Bouvard, when radio inquired about an increase in samples, Arbitron's response was,


"OK, you want ten percent more? Give us ten percent more money." Under Morris, the company offered to increase samples by 70 percent

for a four percent increase in cost

"This year, our mandate is to work on subcells-young peominorities...We'll focus on 18-24 males this year." It may be a tough project. "Have you ever done a focus group of 18-24s?" he asked rhetorically. "Trying to get them to show up is tough."



When a Top 40 programmer asked how Bouvard felt about AccuRatings by telephone, saying Top 40 has yet to gain an accurate reflection of its audience, Bouvard responded, "Every format feels under-represented." He said if there were a way to conduct telephone surveys to cover listeners for an entire week, he'd approve.



Researcher Has Surprises for Radio

For all the money radio spends trying to snare new listeners, few Americans bother to switch stations, and when they do, they rarely make a change because of media advertising.

Those were a couple of many revelations offered by

the Eagle Group, a Denverbased media research group that revealed its findings at the Seminar.

Matt Hudson, vice president of the wholly-owned subsidiary of Cox Broadcasting, said Eagle had interviewed 500 listeners representing 50 states to learn where radio fits in the constantly expanding media

landscape.

"The good news," he said, "is that radio looks great. With CDs and DMX and DCR and all these threatening media, we find

that they haven't pinched our butt, let alone knocked us out."

Asked which medium they spent more than one hour with every day, 70 percent responded

radio (59 percent FM, 11 percent AM), and 42 percent, TV. At three hours a day, radio beat TV 42 percent (36 percent FM) to nine percent.

But how do people find their stations? A shocking 90 percent, says Hudson, hear of new stations without media influence. "Over a half of them find a station by accident, by scanning the dial. And a third hear about it from a friend. Only 4 percent say TV commercials and 2 percent say bill-boards."

With the scanning phenomenon, says Hudson, "I'm on the bandwagon to eliminate segues. You can't

afford to go eight to ten minutes without saying who you are."

He repeated that appeal after revealing that 47 percent of listeners listen in cars (vs. 34 percent at home and 18 percent at work). "The challenge," he said, "is to get credit for minutes in the car."

Other findings: the average number of stations a listener listens to weekly is 2.8 (20 percent said they stick to one station). There

are 3.75 radios per house-hold. Some 79 percent of respondents listen to morning drive; nearly half listen to PM drive.

Among listeners with

both a radio and tape player in their car, 72 percent listen to radio more often, but those with a CD give radio only a 47-33 percent edge.

Noting that 56 percent say they

tape TV shows and that 90 percent of those admit to fast-forwarding through Hudson commercials. advised: "Half of the viewers see (a minute spot) as a 20. Fast-paced spots are not working. Buy 60s instead of tens and 20s." He showed a KMEL-San for spot Francisco that showed the calls on a banner that stayed at the bottom of the screen as a way to get a message through, past fastforwarders.

Cohen: How to Get From 'No' to 'Yes'

According to the master, negotiating is a game. "I keep referring to it as a game," says Herb Cohen, "because a game is where you really care—but not that much."

Herb Cohen's session at GAVIN, *The Art of Negotiation*, was a serious talk sprinkled with laughter and a touch of vaudeville.



Cohen drew on his wealth of experience as a negotiator for high-rollers and presidents to explain to attendees how to make people with no on their minds end up saying yes.

"No is an initial reaction to being taken by surprise," he said. "You've got to stay in there; you've got to wear them down."

According to Cohen, it's how you approach a situation. "Getting a record played," he said, "is tied to how a person acts."

As an example he pointed

out his past experiences with past Presidents Carter and Reagan. Carter's problem, he intimated, was that he addressed unpleasant issues, such as rising interest and education rates. Reagan was popular, Cohen said, because he was a pleasant person. "Do you think it was his policies?" he asked. "We don't even know what they were!"

Another fine point of negotiating is talking the same language. Cohen talked of working with an American businessman who spoke using terms such as "flank them" and "blow them away." The two communicated successfully, he said, when Cohen drew up their strategy in the businessman's language.

Cohen also said it's important to evaluate. "It's never between A and B," he said. "There's a C, a J and an omega." Taking notes is another good tactic. "It's a sign of respect," he said. There's a bonus that goes with it: people can't deny their words.

their words.

Cohen's style was a hit with the audience. He moved through the crowd easily, made good eye contact, and praised a woman who was taking notes. And, as a sidelight, he told us something we all want to hear: "The baseball strike will be settled by the end of March," he said. "You heard that from me."

The master spoke.

Lundvall: 'Jazz is Big Business'

Jazz/A2 keynoter Bruce Lundvall, president of Blue Note Records, opened his speech with a quote from Thelonious Monk: "I don't know where jazz is going. Maybe it's going to hell. You can't make anything go anywhere. It just happens."

At the end of Lundvall's appearance, however, it was clear that jazz *isn't* going anywhere and, yes, it is happening.

Jazz holds a four percent piece of the total record sales pie, he said, and that shows that it has indeed become big business. "Although a four percent market share doesn't seem like much, when you consider that annual record sales are in the nine billion dollar ballpark, those of us who toil in the jazz vineyards can finally say that jazz has become big business."

Lundvall said he was gratified by great young musicians like Joshua Redman who are "willing to forego the easy money that might be achieved in more commercial music forms for a hard-earned place in music



(jazz) that tests artistic skills and creativity to the very limit."

Part of Jazz's good health, Lundvall cited, was the fusion of hip-hop and jazz acid jazz—because, as in the case of his company's group, US3, acts that sample classic songs help turn listeners on to catalogue material.

He also took a quick minute to mention some of his pet peeves: companies signing young artists that "aren't ready," only to drop them before they develop; the lack of jazz radio; and, as he put it "the tendency of so many jazz disciples and critics alike to divide the music into nasty little enclaves reflecting personal taste and sometimes personal venom."

The lively discussion period that followed Lundvall's speech centered on an association he would like to see develop initially between record companies and later between all facets of the business to create industrywide promotion, a la the Country Music Association.

He then shared his experiences signing artists such as Dexter Gordon, Jacky Terrasson and Cuban pianist Gonzalo Rubalcaba.

"Jazz is absolutely the only reason I am in this business," Lundvall said.

KSFO Axes Fiery J. Paul Emerson

After six weeks on the air at KSFO/AM-San Francisco, where he spewed right-wing venom and drew listener complaints, a protest from AIDS activists, and an advertising boycott, newsman/commentator/morning host J. Paul Emerson has been taken off the air.

"All I can say is it hasn't worked out and he is not returning," said Jack Swanson, operations director of the station, now owned by Capital Cities/ABC, which also owns long-time market leader, news/talker KGO/AM.

Emerson, who joined KSFO shortly after being sacked by crossrown KFRC, where he co-anchored mornings with DJ Gary Bryan, has been nothing but controversial since his return to the market last year (he'd previously worked as morning news anchor on KMEL, in tandem with John London and Ron Engelman). His remarks about Chinese people while at KFRC, and about what he called the "stinking Japanese" while at KSFO drew the attention of the city's Human Rights Commission as well as calls for public apologies from the respective station managers.

Emerson's recent claims that AIDS could be spread by coughing, and a call for a quarantine of gays, ignited a protest picket line at KSFO, but also drew attention from the Phil Donahue show and the *New York Times*.

When KGO/TV chose not to run the Donahue segment, Emerson railed on air against his own parent company, and he was out the door.

Music Sales Roll Past \$12 Billion

It was no surprise to learn that 1994 was the biggest year ever in the recording industry, as the RIAA tallied \$12 billion of music recordings and videos shipped to retailers. The figure (calculated at suggested list prices) amounts to a record 20 percent increase over 1993.

In units shipped, RIAA fig-

ures showed a jump of 17.5 percent, from 955 million to 1.1 billion.

"There was just an enormous amount of good product out there," said Jay Berman, RIAA chairman and CEO. But the association also pointed to the rise of superstores and the increase of the retail base, along with

continued acceptance of the CD format and its switch from long boxes to smaller packaging, thus allowing for greater inventories, as factors.

Direct mail and record clubs also did well, the RIAA noted, with a 26 percent dollar increase, from \$1.2 billion in 1993 to \$1.5 last year.

Denny Cordell Dies at 52

Denny Cordell, who managed Joe Cocker and Leon Russell to their earlier heights of success, died February 18 in Dublin, Ireland, of lymphoma. He was 52.

Cordell, who was also a successful record producer, A&R man, publisher, and the founder of Shelter Records,

was the man behind the scenes of "Mad Dogs & Englishmen," the circus-like 1970 tour that was built around Cocker, but which propelled pianist-arranger Leon Russell into prominence. The tour became a film and a top-selling album.

At the time of his death, Cordell, with partner Kate Hyman, operated Realization Music, with Cordell in Dublin and Hyman in New York. 


Inside Top 40

From the amazing **Clive Davis** to the first-ever **Top** 40 awards presentation aboard a riverboat to **Ron Fell** tossing beads to the crowd at GAVIN'S own Mardi Gras cocktail party, there were plenty of memorable moments during our 10th annual seminar last week in the New Orleans.

Of course, renewing old acquaintances and making new ones never fails to be a highlight of each year's get-together and it's possible New Orleans '95 might have topped them all. Major league thank yous

to all who helped make it such a rousing success, including special participants Mike Steele OM/PD at **KZFM-Corpus** Christi for putting together a tremendous presentation on research, and B97-New Orleans PD Scott Wright and Z100 New York's Elvis Duran for co-

moderating the




Double large thanks to Andrea Ganis and Danny Buch of Atlantic, Jerry Blair and Charlie Walk at Columbia and MCA's Bruce Tenenbaum, Mark Gorlick and Paula Tuggey (she never stops working) for sponsoring the boat cruise and brunch. And to Rick Bisceglia at Arista for helping to make a dream come true—the oneon-one "fireside chat" with one of music's most influential figures, Clive Davis. Congratulations to all Top 40 Award winners (listed on page 9), and to all those nominated. Nominees are chosen by the industry, and being one of a handful is special acknowledgment indeed. Next week we'll begin reviewing some of what was shared at the key Top 40 sessions.

As for what lies ahead for Top 40, a front page story in last week's *New York Times* (February 12) should offer cause for optimism. Once more the second baby boom, or as it's now being called, "a boomlet," is getting media attention and, more important, the attention of advertisers. **Arbitron**'s new GM, **Pierre Bouvard**, revealed during GAVIN that he's considering a move to survey 6-to-11 year olds. What's

especially noteworthy is that since 1989 the Census Bureau has recorded more than four million births in the U.S. every year. The only other time the birth rate soared over four million was during the first baby boom. Hopefully, these potentially-new radio listeners will choose Top 40 stations and owners will sing "happy days are here again" at staff meetings.

Last year, teen buying power and teens' influence on family purchases was the subject of an *Inside Top 40*, which quoted from a *Business*

Week magazine cover story. The same can be said about small children, who often make the difference in some of their parents biggest buying decisions. Take, for instance, minivans. The New York Times reporter says "Boomers who grew up in the back seats of station wagons swore that they would not be caught dead driving their parents cars; when they had children of



One consultant of an auto group says, "What minivans did was make it acceptable for a boomer to buy a Dodge or Plymouth or Chrysler."

Kids also make a difference when parents buy personal computers. Most CD-ROM titles are geared toward children, according to an analyst at a New York research firm. On the entertainment front, just ask **Disney**, who scored with *The Little Mermaid* in '89 and never looked back. Last year's gross on *The Lion King* topped \$300 million.

Though it has been harder in recent years to reach parents through their children via radio, people change and music reflects those changes. In a perfect world the Top 40 station is the one everyone in the family can agree on. Programmers who can make that reality in the years ahead should have even greater success as the boomlet generation grows up. And how sharp are these kids? One market analyst, who says he's a "resident futurist," calls children under 12 the "Alexander the Great generation," after the Greek who conquered the known world by age 18.







The original gangsta of hip-hop returns with four slices of in-yourface Bronx-style ruffness. For the N.Y. Tapes section, Ice returns to the stylee that made him infamous way back in '89. Teaming up once again with KRS-ONE, the gruff one praises "da Cenci" in ragamuffin chatter over a simple 808 boom and tight hi-hats. "Keep It Reel" adds generous scratch, horns and rolling bass as Ice flips into a staggering brag mode. The S.F. Tapes side hooks up Bay Area technicians King Tech and Prince Ice with the Just One. Ruff-n-raw lyrical delivery meshes with the Bay Area slinky-style funk on "Livin' In Lockdown," creating a twisted mix of Bronx-meets-da-Bay style. "Kill The Rhythm" floats along to a droning bassline and haunted sound bytes. 

Inside Rock

The 1995 Gavin Seminar came and went like a roaring freight train, and what a wild trip it was. New Orleans is completely insane and I say this without even experiencing the official Mardi Gras celebrations, which started last Tuesday. I still can't believe there is a whole section of New Orleans, the French Quarter, that's geared solely toward partying. Consuming mass amounts of alcohol, flashing body parts and roaming around in a stupor is the norm in that twisted part of the city. It's a haven for anyone who likes a good party and an excellent place for people watching. Thank God and a few guardians (WFCS's Kevin Doyle and WWWQ's Judd Wesley) for seeing me through some pretty hazy times. As I said in my last column, it was just like going to a metal show except you didn't need a laminate because everybody was invited...During this wild party a Seminar broke out at the New Orleans Hyatt which, if you ask anybody who was there, or better yet, remember it, went very well. If you ever need a no-nonsense, in-yourface person to conduct a panel, Mark is your man. Panelist included yours truly, Atlantic's Jon Nardachone, Energy's Sheri Sinclair, McGathy Metal's Sudi Gaasche and WWWQ's Judd Wesley. We covered several topics but with any metal radio panel I've ever been to, it became a heated debate about whether or not hard rock/metal radio actually breaks bands. We also discussed the need to focus on working specific artists to the format as opposed to just throwing anything out there and playing what listeners want. It was a very vocal meeting and I thank everybody who attended and shared their views. Friday's Rocks panel featured Red Light's Jill Castellano moderating "Hard Music, Hard Women," along with panelists Cheryl Valentine of Epic Records, Sheri Sinclair of Energy Records, Debbie Abono of Debbie Abono

Management and WBGU's Jimmie Fredrick. The discussion focused on the women who work on a daily basis in a format that's considered male-dominated. Again, the audience was vocal and hopefully, as time goes by, this won't even be an issue. It was especially interesting to me because I think the format is dominated by women-considering that more than half of promotion reps I deal with are female—something I never really thought about until the session was over...The Jukebox Jury and Awards Luncheon was the last GAVIN Rocks event. It was held Saturday morning at the ungodly hour of 11:00. This in New Orleans where 2:00 p.m. is considered early. So thumbs up to everybody who dragged their ass out of bed to be there. Moderated by Skateboard Marketing's Munsey Ricci, the Jukebox Jury was an opportunity for labels to play never-before heard music and have it rated by the audience and four metal directors. The panelists included KMSA's Eric "Mr. Pain" Neilson, WSOU's Mike DePippa, KISS's Jave Patterson and WSGR's Mark Morden. One track each from 15 bands was scored on a scale from one to ten by the panelist and bonus points were added by the audience's response, which was monitored by an applause-o-meter. New Releases Orange 9mm "High Speed Changer" (EEG)

I've been listening to this band since last fall and was easily converted into their style of hard rock which meshes thrash, hardcore and a dash of funk. The strong guitars are like a jet revving its afterburners and compliment the booming bass lines, pummeling drums and the intense vocals. Taken from the upcoming album Driver Not Included, "High Speed Changer" is one of those songs that gets all your body parts moving. Actually, I'd settle for a dark room with soft black lights and maybe a bean bag or two. This is Flowerhead's (Eric Faust, bass/vocals; Eric Schmitz, guitar/vocals; Kyle Thomas, guitar/vocals; Buz Zoller, guitar) second album and it's absolutely dripping with distorted psychedelic guitar chords that wind their way around solid bass lines and glazed vocals. Produced by Robbie Adams, who brought you U2's Achtung Baby and Zooropa, The



People's Buzz is definitely a crossover album that will appeal to alternative and rock listeners with its cozy mixture of glowing melodies and swirling guitar hooks. For completely freaked out riffs and an upbeat drum vibe check out "Overdrive," "Hold Me Up" (my fav) and "Trip Around The World." 
ROSICRUCIAN **No Cause For Celebration** (Cargo/Black Mark)

The title of this CD is misleading because it is a cause for celebration if you're into pummeling drums, fast, ripping guitar slams, heavy bass thumps and aggressive vocals. Pure hard rock with a slight dose of death metal, Rosicrucian (Lars Linden, rhythm guitar; Magnus Sodermann, lead guitar; Ulf Pettersson, vocals; Fredrik Jacobsen, bass; Barget, guitar) are another Swedish band that specialize in fat, chunky riffs. If their brand of rock were pizza you'd probably choke on the enormity of their sound. In fact, the band has coined their unique sound "Porking Thrash." I couldn't agree more. No Cause For Celebration contains several tracks, "Much About Nothing," "Words Without Meaning," "A Moment Of War" and "The Opening Of The Glory End," that will appeal to your hard rock, thrash and speed metal-oriented listeners. "Stench Of Life" and "Naked Face Down" showcase harmonious rhythmic guitars while "Parts Of Me" has an undeniably infectious hook that'll keep your head banging. Rosicrucian is a must-play for metal radio. Don't overlook this one.

MEANS TO AN END Means To An End (Futurist)

A potent mixture of alternative spuzz and hard rockin' riffs comes your way via Means To An End. Storming out of Lawrence, Kansas, Means To An End (J.D. Warnock, guitar/vocals; Shaun Moore, Bass; Robert Mark Gregory, drums) will infatuate your ears with their blend of spirited guitars, solid bass lines, aggressive drum beats and coarse vocals. Their selftitled album is already getting spins on college and commercial radio, and will probably generate more airplay as time goes by since their sound is in the same class as Bad Religion, Face To Face, Samiam and Paw. "Bendsinister" emits catchy bass lines while "Lemon Taste Like Ammonia" and "Breaking Dummy" are driving guitar tracks that will keep your show upbeat. Be sure to check out the infectious rhythms of "Lickspittle," "Right Boss," "Terrible Sin" and "Shun." It doesn't matter if you're into alternative or hard rock, give this a listen and discover a Means To An End.







For the uninitiated, Country Radio Seminar can be an overwhelming wonderland of stars, knowledge and late night parties. In celebration of CRS-26, we asked some industry vets to share their Country Radio Seminar experiences—the good, the bad and the ugly. And most all of you have noble goals for the seminar. Our favorite response comes from KFMS's J.C. Simon (who, coming from Las Vegas, has presumably seen it all); he just wants to "keep learning new stuff."

We just have one more question: Who will take up Tiny Hughes' legacy? Read on, brothers and sisters. — CYNDI HOELZLE

What has been your most memorable or hilarious CRS experience?

"Escorting Eddie Rabbitt to his bus (from one end of the Opryland Hotel to the other at midnight) with him carrying my high heel shoes. Every time he stopped for autographs, he would hand my shoes to the person requesting the autograph!"

STEP ONE CELEBRATES TEN YEAR ANNIVERSARY

They call themselves Nashville's only major independent label, a multi-million dollar international company. They've kept a moderately low profile, but consider this: Step One Records has doubled its sales every year the company has been in operation, putting millions of dollars into the Nashville economy each year. They have grown from a three-person operation to the world's largest independent country record label, whose records consistently chart in the major trades.

Step One Records is celebrating ten years of operation this month, and we thought it be interesting to hear from the folks behind the scene.

Ray Pennington and Mel Holt formed Step One in 1984, and got started by marketing legendary acts like

Ray Price and Faron Young through television and mail order. Holt, who manages the corporate offices in Texas, knows the creative side of things—he was a band leader in both radio and television as well as a singer and screenplay writer.



Pennington has worked in all aspects of the music business, getting his start at the legendary King Records in Cincinnati

(home of James Brown). He recorded as an artist for Capitol, and worked as a producer and A&R staffer at Monument and RCA. It was Pennington who turned Ray Price on to the songwriting of Kris Kristofferson, which resulted in Price covering such songs as "For The Good Times."

Pennington left RCA to form Dimension Records with Ken Stilts, and when Stilts left to manage the Judds, Pennington formed Step One Records with the same philosophy that fueled Dimension—recording legendary artists who might be past their radio prime, but who people still wanted to hear. Pennington went right to the consumers through TV and catalog orders with their *Ray Price's Greatest Hits* album—it remains the label's biggest seller, and started the booming trend of TV and mail order marketing.


"Basically, we're the same as a major label, but we have to use different approaches to getting those customers, like using mail order," says Jeffrey Brothers, VP of sales and marketing. "As an independent label, if we have a good promotion idea, we can jump on it quicker—we don't have to get it approved by 14 Mr. Smiths up and down the ladder. That way, we can beat some of the majors to the punch. We have to do that to keep out in front."

In 1991 Step One began breaking new acts, including Clinton Gregory (who had two top 20 hits for the label), Western Flyer and Don Cox, as well as rekindling the careers of Gene Watson and the Geezinslaw Brothers. They've also found success on the blues side with the multi-talented Celinda Pink.


The promotion team, headed by Buzz Ledford, should be given a lot of credit for breaking those acts. And, after all, you have to respect a guy who was David Allen Coe's road manager. Ledford is also a former club owner, talent booker, music publisher and musician. "We've got an in-house promotion staff of seven. I don't feel anybody's going to work your record like an in-house person. Our whole deal is: give us a level playing field—treat all the records equal. Put 'em all in a stack and play the best record. That's all we've ever asked for."

"I give Ray credit for cutting really great songs," Ledford continues. "I told him, 'Give us a great record to work and we'll get the damn thing on the radio.' "So far Buzz has been true to his word. Step One is the only independent label that consistently charts in all the trades, and they are gearing up for Western Flyer's powerful new single, "Cherokee Highway."

Pennington credits his entire team for the success that Step One has achieved. "We've made history and I'm proud to be a part of what we've accomplished," he says. ●



DECCA...The Label To Look For.



We thought Alan Jackson would be the perfect spokesperson for our CRS issue, which is aimed at those who have recently, as his song puts it, "Gone Country." Jackson says he has enjoyed CRS since his first appearance in 1990 as part of the ASCAP luncheon (which featured another newcomer, Garth Brooks).

"The Radio Seminar has never been that tough on me," he says with a laugh. "I've always gone out and spent as much time as I could at the Opryland. I see a lot of radio people on the road during the year, so I'm familiar with most of them now."

At the rate he's going, Jackson will be in your town soon. His tour has become a huge operation, with three buses and four tractor trailers hauling more than 39 tons of lighting, sound and video equipment, and a crew of 33 to make sure it all runs smoothly. You'd think that with an organization that large, there's no room for surprises, but Jackson tells an amazing story that happened on the road recently.

The band has made it a tradition to visit Hank Williams' grave whenever they play Montgomery, Alabama, and last month they made the trek to the cemetery.

"It was about midnight, and we took a guitar and hung out, sang a couple of Hank songs, and then we did 'Midnight in Montgomery,' " Jackson recalls. "We were about halfway through it, and this falling star came down and hung there real bright. Then right when we got to the last tag of the song, we heard this train blowing in the background. It was really bizarre, like Hank was sending us a couple of messages to let us know he was there. It was definitely weird. It raised the hair up on my neck."

If Hank Williams were going to put his stamp of approval on any of the current crop of superstars, it would proabably be Jackson, who just keeps writing and recording great country songs without a whole lot of smoke and mirrors. "I don't think I'll ever venture too far from what I've always done," he says.

His latest album, *Who I Am*, includes 13 songs that Jackson says are more about him than any he's ever done, including "Gone Country" (which Jackson didn't write). "I was listening to a lot of different songs at the time for the new album, and you kind of get brain-dead after a while," he says, laughing again. "I wasn't paying much attention to the verses, but when it hit that chorus, I fell in love with it. And then I listened to the rest of the song and really liked what it said."

Who I Am also contains some very personal songs, like "Job Description," which he wrote for his daughters. "The hardest part of this job is leaving my family," Jackson says. "Job Description' is just a way of telling them what I do when I leave the house and go on the bus."

"I picked 'Who I Am,'" he continues, "because it sounded like what my wife has to go through with me. She does the best she can with who I am. I think that fits well for where I am in my life, and for our relationship."

Alan also wrote "Let's Get Back to Me and You" for his wife Denise. "This job is real hard on relationships. My head is always somewhere else. Fortunately, I'm at a point in my career where I can put the focus back to where it was when we first got married. I realize that your career can't be your life. I wouldn't have anything to write about if I didn't have a life besides the music business."

Jackson's current single is a cover of Rodney Crowell's beautiful "Song for the Life," which Jackson first heard years ago, and admits "is a little bit different" for him. "It's a more poetic kind of lyric for me, but it's been one of my favorite songs for a long time."

"I Don't Even Know Your Name" is another song that might seem different for Jackson; he wrote the wild story of a guy who falls in love with a waitress as a way to get his brother-in-law off his back. "One of my brothers-in-law always teased me, saying, 'I got this great idea; you ought to write, "I'm in love with you, baby, and I don't even know your name." I'd go, 'Oh, yeah, that's great.' This went on for years. But when I was working on this new album, the idea just popped into my head. I thought, 'I'm just going to write this as a joke.' So I wrote it and we worked it up."

Jackson has also shown his crazy side at CRS, as part of the infamous Arista Jam. "The funnest thing about CRS has been the Jam. It's real loose; we just show up and the radio people are all burnt from being out there all day, so they are just having a drink and relaxing. It's not a big serious business thing.

"Arista will never let us do our hit," he continues. "Last year I didn't know what I was going to do until about five minutes before I walked out. Lee Roy (Parnell, who was leading the house band) kept going, 'Whatcha gonna do?' I said, 'Oh, I don't know; you'll be able to follow it, it'll just be an easy blues progression. Don't worry about it. Just give me an A chord and we'll go at it.' I ended up doing a little blues thing, 'I got a great big woman who weighs 300 pounds.' I think I just made up most of the words."

Asked if he has any tips for artists attending their first CRS, Jackson replies: "Practice your smile. Your face is going to get really tired. Get ready to smile and shake hands and say 'thank you' a lot."







Of the top four, only **Martin Page**'s "In The House Of Stone and Light" was able to gain spins over the Seminar/Presidents' Day weekend. Page's +292 takes him to #3, but nearly 1,200 spins short of #2, The **Eagles**' "Love Will Keep Us Alive."

It's worth noting that now more than half of Page's play is at 28 or more spins per station.

There's only one new entry into the top ten and that's **Bonnie Raitt**'s "YOU got It" which moves from #14 to #7 and scores a format-leading spir crease of 927 with 20 ADDs. It's the format's HOTTEST by a wide margin. Only **Madonna** and the **Eazes** are on at more A/C stations.

John Waite, who starred at this year's Seminar in New Orleans, is on the verge of a top ten with "How Did I Get By Without You?" There are now 178 Gavin A/Cs on board and the average player is spinning it at better than 21 times a week. All this has happened with no album. It's set for release April 1. ADDS this week include KMZQ, WHFB and EQSO. Top spins of 30 a week or

more are now reported at KISQ, WQTU, KGLE, Q93, WBLG, KVIC, WCKQ, KYMG and WMXV.

TOP TIP to be next issue's highest charting debut is **Sophie B. Hawkins**' "As I Lay Me Down." The stats tell the story—nearly 1,000 spins from the first 65 players. The big believers include K103, WLIF, KUDL, JOY 99, WTSX, KVYN, WCKQ, KVIC and WBLG.

Last week's RECORD TO WATCH, Londonbeat's "Come Back," is now CHARTBOUND with 19 new including KXYQ, WGMG, WCKQ, KOKO, WFPS, WCPZ, WGMT and KGLE.

This week's RECORD TO WATCH is **Blessid Union Of Souls**' "I Believe." The edited version is getting the play at A/C and among the top calls are WMC, WRQX, KXYQ, K99, WBMX, KVIC, KELI and KMXS.

New Releases

LINDA RONSTADT 'The Blue Train" (Elektra)

The one gets the big "thumbs up" from the Gavin A/C department.

Here's an absolutely haunting performance from a true icon of our format. Listen for Emmylou Harris's soble harmonizing on the chorus and some of the sweetest electric guitar from Dean Parks. This train is leaving, with or without you—get on it or wave goodbye.



ELTON JOHN 'Believe" (Rocket/Island)

Elton relaunches his label and begins a new association with Island Records by delivering a hot pop track that takes him in a more soulful direction than the one established by his recent, lushly orchestrated, Grammy-nominated *Lion King* sessions. This 47-year old is as relevant and vital as ever.

BOZ SCAGGS "Sierra" (Virgin)



A touching song about a former lover who's gone to the high Sierra to get away from it all and has become an emotional survivalist among the natural paradise. Boz at his best.

SANDY PATTY "Find It On The Wings" (Word/Epic)

There's some potentially secular inspiration from this veteran Christian music superstar. This acoustic treat builds from its modest beginning to a swirling production piece with not one but two choirs—one adult and one childrens'.

JONATHAN CAIN "Wish That I Was There With You" (Intersound)

This one's a soaring power ballad from the Journey/Bad English anchor. It's written by Cain with John Waite, who's most adept at such songs and gets the most out of emotional peaks and valleys. A lesshot version with a minute less running time is also available on the pro-CD as an A/C alternative. Something for everyone.

THURSDAY DIVA "No More Promises" (DMP)

Thursday Diva is a duo of Dave Charles and Lisa Lombardo and they appear to have a good feel for our format's comfort zone. It's the kind of record that is only held back by their lack of name appeal. Check it out.

MANHATTAN TRANSFER w/ PHIL COLLINS "Too Busy Thinking 'About My Baby" (Atlantic)

This is not out as a single, but should be. Marvin Gaye's 1969 hit is another of the great songs re-done by the Transfer for their new *tonin* album. Phil Collins shares lead vocals with the group's Tim Hauser and the result is a rouser. Since this is not ever likely to be a single, we suggest you get it on as is.

Drew is one of the most respected radio programming minds of our times. The urban awards luncheon was held shortly after, and we were present-

Urban National Promotions Director of the Year: Eric Ford, Big Beat/Atlantic; Urban Promotion vice president of the Year: Manny Bella, Capitol Records (then eastwest Records); Urban senior vice president of the year: Ken Wilson, Columbia Records.

Congratulations to all the nominees and the winners. Friday session, "An Afternoon with Clive Davis, a

one on one with Top 40 editor, Dave Sholin. Shortly after that session we got together for Urban Radio at the Crossroads: Urban or Churban, Who Really Represents the Music? J.B. Louis of WBLX-Mobile, Harold Austin of KKBT-Los Angeles and Albie D of WPGC-Washington were the panelists and the lively discussion focused on the popularity of Black music and how it affects programming. The Gavin cocktail party was something to behold, to put it mildly. It took your imagination and senses to another place. There were alligator handlers, plenty of Cajun and Creole food, all sorts of visual effects, and then a Mardi Gras marching parade that came right through the party. BLACK HISTORY MONTH SALUTE Marvin Gaye



Marvin Pentz Gay Jr., was born April 2, 1939 in Washington, D.C. He belonged to vocal groups The Rainbows and The Marquees, and he later joined Harvey Fuqua in the revised Moonglows. Moving to Detroit in 1960, Gaye worked as a session drummer at Motown and it was there he met his future wife, Anna Gordy who introduced him to her brother Berry at a recording session. Gaye first recorded in 1961 but hit the charts in 1962 with "Stubborn Kind Of Fellow,"On which he was backed by Martha & the Vandellas. Of his 62 recordings, 12 were number one records. Following personal troubles, he left the U.S and Motown and lived in Europe for several years. He returned to America to a new recording contract with Columbia Records, and received his first and only Grammy for Sexual Healing. Gave was fatally shot by his father after a quarrel April 1, 1984, the day before he turned 45.

Making It without The Mainstream. The panelists were Stanley Winslow of Pendulum Records and Yvonne Anderson of WNAA-Greensboro. We were later joined by Tessaundra Latham of WMPZ-Chattanooga. We talked about how many companies have to take alternative routes to introduce their products and, how some radio stations have to appeal to listeners that are tired of the same ole approach to radio. Following that I went out to enjoy some of the New Orleans hospitality at the House Of Blues for the Columbia luncheon and then watching one of the many Mardi Gras parades. And, oh yeah, I did go to Bourbon street—a must when visiting New Orleans.

Nine meetings, six showcases, two award presentations and one new release reception later, we were punch-drunk and still standing. You needed a badge or a room key to be anywhere, and the pleasing result was we came to New Orleans to do our own thing and be left alone. No wannabes or music fans from the general public interrupted our groove.

This year, with a bolstered convention staff, Kent and I were free to spend more time hoping our meetings. Our first event happened Thursday afternoon when Blue Note president Bruce Lundvall delivered a short speech and sat in on a one-onone styled conversation. One highlight of Lundvall's speech was the informal discussion of forming a jazz music association, similar to the Country Music Association, to promote improvisational music and perhaps launch a national jazz awards television show.

Lundvall's address was followed by our Jazz Radio Expose, co-hosted by Keith Z and KPLU's Joe Cohn. We played telescoped versions of one hour's programming of stations like WRTI, WBGO, KSDS, WCPN, KPLU and examined them for content. We discussed issues such as how long fundraising pitches should be, the current/oldies ratio, concise on-air delivery and music blend. Eulis Cathey, Michael Camilo, Kim Berry and Bobby Jackson provided thoughtful, but honest, commentary.





Look for us to tweak this "expose" concept next year to a "best-of" jazz radio tape and include all dayparts, expanding our topics of programming and music selection.

The Thursday showcases included a "whenjagettin" live gig with saxophonist Donald Harrison and Larry Coryell, courtesy of CTI Records. One highlight was when the band broke into an appropriately slapping jam of the Meters' "Cissy Strut." Later that evening, young New Orleans trumpet whiz Nicholas Payton pierced the stratosphere with some timeless solos. If you closed your eyes, Payton transformed himself into a modern Louis Armstrong. Joining him onstage was another Louisiana talent, guitarist Mark Whitfield. While Payton's attack was sharp and brassy, Whitfield's smooth rounded notes, in contrast, took on a searing, yet tempered, approach. It was an impressive collaboration.

Thursday night was culminated by many dinner events, including a fine one we attended hosted by Muse Records' Joe Fields and Mike Hurzon of the Tracking Station at Tujague's. We followed the six course meal by parading down Decatur Street until we reached the RCA/Novus/Groove Town acid jazz bash at Cafe Istanbul featuring Omar and the Brooklyn Funk Essentials. The walls were sweaty as bodies

swayed during RCA's steaming showcase.

Friday morning's A2 radio expose, co-hosted by Kent Z and WLOQ's Steve Huntington, dealt with A2's mass appeal, commercial presentation and a well-researched sound. Hearing 'scoped versions of stations (in somewhat geographical order) like WQCD, KCFE, WLOQ, KLJZ, KOAI and KKSF brought up crucial issues like establishing credible personality on the airwaves, promoting local events and concerts, maintaining spot quality, establishing regionality, call letter/dial position familiarity, music flow and more. The session ended with a salute to KLJZ and their GM, PD Shirley Maldonado and new air staff. Keen commentary was provided by co-host Huntington, plus The Wave's Chris Brodie, Broadcast Architecture's Alan Kepler, programmer Tony Schondell (he's availablet) and Warner Bros.' Deborah Lewow. As with jazz and A3, we wished we could have played all of our entries, with the intention of providing a session that was utilitarian, hands-on and clinically informative.

Logistically, our proudest accomplishment was pulling off Friday afternoon's

luncheon/showcase/awards presentation. Food was served promptly at 12:30. Jacky Terrasson, backed by

Ugonna Okegwo and Leon Parker, kept the crowd at a hush all the way through his sparkling 40-minute set. Each player deftly reinvented their respective musical instruments, as the captive audience of top programmers and industry heavies gave their spirited approval. Two minutes later, the 14 awards were being presented. Keith Z, stage left, read the nominees as Tom Scott, stage right, read out the lucky winners. We finished at 2:00 p.m.

Turn to page nine for the full list, but congratulations to Josh Redman(jazz artist and record), Joe Sample (A2 artist), Norman Brown (A2 record), WRTI (jazz station), WLOQ (A2 station), Bobby Jackson (jazz programmer), Steve Huntington (A2 programmer), Steve Williams (A2 MD), Verve Records (jazz/A2 label), Mesa/Bluemoon (jazz/A2 indie label), Bruce Lundvall (jazz/A2 executive), Deborah Lewow (national label person) and Neal Sapper (indie promotional person).

This year's One-On-One subject, GRP president Tommy LiPuma, lived up to our expectations. We took over a cozy room on the fourth floor, borrowed some furniture from our soundman's hotel room and proceeded to bounce some topics off LiPuma. Within five minutes, Tommy had loosened up to the concept, the room jammed up (Joni Mitchell had

just completed her much talkedabout guest appearance), and the stories started to flow. LiPuma was very open, breaking news about the signings of George Benson and the Groove Collective, announcing reactivating the Blue Thumb and Impulse! labels, not to mention contributing three choice Miles Davis tales and more. We ended the one-on-one by giving away two sets of four gold-plated, 20-bite GRP CDs.

Special thanks are in order to Ron Alexenburg for putting on a superb cocktail party. The magic is back and he was responsible. If you weren't there, we won't try to explain it. Just ask Michele Clark about the melonhead man.

Friday evening we attended a gigantic dinner put on by GRP (including Dr. John and Teodross Avery) and we understand the JVC bash with Hiroko Kokubu was fine as well. We all spent the wee hours with Verve Records as they featured a new recording by trumpet player Chris Botti.

Kicking off Saturday morning was a breakfast listening party by Elektra, saluting David Sanborn's newest release, *Pearls*, with the artist in attendance. Apparently shy, Sanborn was dapper, friendly and relaxed, even choosing to address the audience prior to the opening meeting.

Saturday morning's jukebox jury was expertly assembled and cohosted by SW Network's Mike Fischer. Fischer's selections kept the ten-person jury off balance as many key programming issues arose from the music-oriented discussions. The top three scoring artists, based on composite averages from one to 10, as well as an applause-o-meter that enabled the audience to vote, were Spyro Gyra's latest, newcomer Chris Botti and, surprisingly, an oldie—Dave Brubeck's "Take Five." During the same time slot, jazz programmers attended a non-commercial breakout session dealing with NPR and the possible ramifications of impending congressional cutbacks to public broadcasting.

Our final meeting of the seminar was a bit of a surprise. Unisound's Denny Stillwell and Warner Bros.' Randall Kennedy co-hosted a highly informative session on computer and online technology and how it can bolster international communication between the growing computer user population and radio and the music industry. Tech talk as well as novice advice was freely dispersed by GAVIN columnist Julie Gordon of Gordon's Flash, Terry Walker of KBEM, Roy Gattinella of Windham Hill and Michael Fischer of SW Networks. This was not a sleepy closing meeting, as about 200 people sat in with questions and comments. Look for a cover story on computer networks and the Internet in the near future as a result of this meeting.

The 1995 seminar was closed in style by a superb performance by Gary Bartz and his quintet featuring Eddie Henderson and Mulgrew Miller. Atlantic Records' Eulis Cathey and Michelle Taylor supplied the right touch and some stinging live sounds. Afterward, we rushed back into the French quarter where Warner Bros. hosted an intimate evening with Bob and Hilary James in celebration of their new recording. Bob is finishing up another Fourplay release and look for Hilary to burn up the A2 charts in a few weeks. Overnights were hosted by Jim Snowden, Bud Harner and Mesa/Bluemoon with artists Jeff Golub and Brian Culbertson.

As you can see from this capsule review (sorry if I passed over anything), it was a non-stop affair. Make your plans today for next year's event. Rather than take our word for it, just call your peers, ask them, then make the necessary budgetary allowances.





GAVIN's bet is on the table. Joan Osborne will be the most significant A3 newcomer by the time the Summit rolls around in August. Balance is the key word here, as Relish is a textbook entry, weighing just enough swampy American instrumentation with modern production. Vocally, Joan Osborne fills the bill with a dash of Raitt, a pinch of Tracy Nelson, a dose of Melissa and an inkling of Brother Ray. Born in Kentucky and transplanted to the East Village, Osborne has the vividly sown the seeds of East Coast. Southern and Midwestern American culture atop her music as harmonicas, Hammonds, slide guitar and big drums wallow through the tracks. Then there's the songwriting, best personified the by the erotic "Right Hand Man" or our fave, the spiritual-



ly cryptic "One Of Us." "St. Teresa" is another stone cold winner. *Relish* is the entire hot dog, free of pretension, chock-full of literacy—essential qualities our format strives for. Look for it to span both the commercials and the non-comms. Due out March 21. Can we wait that long?

JOHN MAYALL & THE BLUESBREAKERS Spinning Coin (Silvertone)

John Mayall's latest find is guitarist Buddy Whittington, a lethal stringslinger who begins peddling his fire early on during *Spinning Coin*'s opening track, Jim Lauderdale's "When The Devil Starts Crying." *Spinning Coin* marks John Mayall's third decade, achieving something he's been striving for since we bought *Crusade* as teenagers—that is, he's an aged, respected bluesman. This collection is far from a guitar showcase.

Mayall's been around long enough to know that some blues need to flash a few contemporary poses, borrowing the odd Slim Harpo or Muddy or Otis Rush influence as opposed to giving a rote performance. Guitarist David Grissom's "What Passes For Love" swings with a Texas tinge.

MATTHEW SWEET "Sick Of Myself" (Zoo Entertainment)

Matthew Sweet continues to bring grit and gravel to A3 with more rusty guitarisms. Bouncing off the walls on this track is Sweet, Television guitarist Richard Lloyd and producer/rocker Brendan O'Brien creating enough dusty but kinetic energy that makes up for the fact that currently there's no Neil Young on the chart. Good right down to the last string buzz.







dismissed in the mid-eighties when attempting to make the transition from good-time bar band to radio-friendly professionals, was a product of punk's early, angst-y era. Sadly, the guitarist neither adjusted to a post-punk world nor profited from the genre's recent resurgence. Stinson was reportedly found dead from a drug overdose last Saturday, February 18. There is speculation as to whether his death was accidental.

BLUE RODEO Daze In America (Discovery)

If you missed Blue Rodeo's showcase at the New Orleans seminar, their new Daze In America CD-Pro is the next best thing to being there. Comprised of live versions from a recent December date and one previously-released studio track, Daze captures the band in fine form and at a new height in their career. Featuring songs from their successful Five Days In July



album, there are live versions of "Hasn't Hit Me Yet," with Greg Keelor leading the band through the country rocker, and a moving treatment of Jim Cuddy's "Bad Timing," which is highlighted by Kim Deschamps sweet steel playing. "Rain Down On Me" and "Trust Yourself," from the bands earlier works, are the gems on this disc and really flex Blue Rodeo's muscle. Their 1995 tour kicks up again on March 9. Catch them one of these daze.



But it's not until the seventh song, "High Turtle Wingtip Memoir." that Lilys distort the rules of guitar pop and harmony. The soundtrack to a drug-induced daydream could very well be "Kodiak Hermit Crab Guest." Besides incredible songwriting, Lilvs reveal their identities as instrumentalists with this album. 


