



SONG OF THE YEAR

Queensryche, "Silent Lucidity", EMI: When Empire was released in Septmeber of 1990, Queensryche's career up to that



point had been one of moderate critical and commercial success, but little in the way of across-the -board AOR airplay. While "Best I Can" and "Empire" improved their standing at the format, it was the release of "Silent Lucidity" that pushed Queensryche into the realm of stardom that they rode to multi-platinum, stadium sellout success for the remainder of the year. Using a mixture of emotionally intense lyrics and masterful Floyd-ian sonic composition, Queensryche defintely struck a nerve with AOR. While only topping the chart for one week (March 29th), the song spent 11 weeks in the Top 10 and a total of 25 weeks in the Hard Hundred. That serious hangtime was what enabled "Lucidity" to easily hold off the Scorp's "Wind of Change," R.E.M.'s "Losing My Religion," and the Crowes' "She Talks To Angels" when the final tally was made. Combined with the Top 10 success of the subsequent singles, "Jet City Woman" and "Another Rainy Night," it's what gave *Empire* enough headroom to come across the wire as the most played album of 1991 at Rock Radio.

ALBUM OF THE YEAR

R.E.M., Out of Time, WB If you were to plot R.E.M.'s sales from <u>Chronic Town</u> to <u>Out of Time</u>, one of the strongest artist development stories of the last decade would show a steady diagonal line leading from the lower left to the upper right of the page.



Turning platinum with <u>Document</u> and multi with <u>Green</u>, the latest offering from the Athens boys moved over 6 million units worldwide, 3 million plus in the US. It has become impossible for anyone in AOR to write them off as a "cult" or "college" group, as the format did to a large extent in the mid-'80s. Indeed, even without a tour, 1991 was an amazing year for R.E.M. <u>Out of Time</u> was chartbound for 33 weeks, with "Losing My Religion" starting it off in February, spending three weeks as AOR's #1 song (it finished at #3 for the year) and bringing home Top 5 honors at CHR. "Texarkana" hit Rock Radio's Top 10 in June, "Shiny Happy People" climbed to the Top 10 at both formats in August, and "Radio Song" reached the Top 40 in October. Steady press and MTV coverage conspired to keep the band in our faces despite the tour, with their lone concert appearance on MTV's Unplugged scoring one of the highest ratings (and taping) achievements that show has ever enjoyed. With most of the catalog now Gold or Platinum, 1992 promises even more success, with a new album and a tour in the works.

BEST BAND

Van Halen, WB With the smoke clearing on 1991, the awarders of the Hard Report had a hard time figuring out who should



receive this honor. In a year filled with so many AOR success stories though, only one band managed to put together incredible sales (including a debut at Billboard's #1 slot), a successful concert tour, and four Top 2 AOR tracks. Not a bad year for the Cabo Wabo gang. With the late spring arrival of "Poundcake," the band that came to define hard rock in the late '70s served notice that they were back on the crankin' track, with Eddie's hottest licks since 1984. And the sonic slamming paid off, with "Poundcake"'s number one status followed into the top slot by "Runaround" in August. In a year when many major tours turned into major disappointments, Van Halen hit the road to high expectations that were fulfilled night after night. Next up was "Top of the World," which received some serious play at CHR as well as holding down the #2 position at Rock Radio for three weeks in October. The present tense finds "Right Now" perched at #2 on the HH, and with 24 weeks and counting of high action on our album chart (it finishes just below Queensryche as #2 most played for the year), we wouldn't be surprised if Van Hagar sells another couple million and lands a few more airplay winners before it's through.

Best New American Group

Nirvana, DGC At this point, it's impossible to calculate the impact that Nirvana will have on the music industry. Their second



album Nevermind (first major label effort -- their first record was out on the indy Subpop label) has done more to set the music industry on its ear than any band since the Sex Pistols. While virtually unknown outside of Seattle scenewatchers and hip alternative programmers just four months ago, their "Smells Like Teen Spirit" is currently being segued into the likes of both classic AOR and Top 40 music on the radio (we've heard major market stations in the past week go directly from Nirvana to Journey, Salt N' Pepa, and Marky Mark!). What a wacky world! With sales now easily over 1 million, neither AOR nor CHR can ignore the street impact that these Seattle grungemeisters have brought forth and unleashed upon the universe. With "Smells" the most requested Rock Radio track for several weeks running, AOR (and now CHR) has learned what Alternative and Metal radio picked up on earlier -- this band rocks, and it works whether you're going into Zeppelin, U2, or Lawrence Welk next. One can only imagine the sheer volume of "Nirvana-esque" bands we will be confronted with in 1992, as label execs scramble to

find "the next Nirvana." In the meantime, there's the blank stare and mid-finger salute of guitarist/vocalist Kurt Cobain in the album artwork to remind us that if radio and the labels had their way, bands like Nirvana would probably never get signed to major labels or played at all. Happy holidays.



BEST MALE VOCALIST



Tom Petty, MCA We'd have to think back to the pre-Wilbury days to remember a time when Tom Petty wasn't riding the top of our charts for more than a couple of months. From his work with the Wilburys, duet with mentor Roger McGuinn, soldout tours with the Heartbreakers, and the mega-success of the solo Full Moon Fever to his latest, it's been quite a turn of the decade for Mr. Petty. TP kicked off 1991 with the duet with the former Byrd, and delivered "Learning To Fly," the lead track from Into the Great Wide Open, in June. "Fly"'s 5 weeks at number one indicates just how essential the former Mudcrutch leader has come to be at AOR. Given that the Summer of 1991 saw one of the heaviest blitzes of superstar product in the format's history the fact that Into has spent twelve weeks topping our album chart attests to the virtual format's history, the fact that *Into* has spent twelve weeks topping our album chart attests to the virtual stranglehold Tom has on AOR. And it's not that he's technically the best singer in rock and roll that caused him to win this award, just try imagining Rock Radio without his voice. Since "Learning to Fly" meanwhile, Petty has scored Top 5 results with "Out in the Cold" and the album's title track, and appears destined to do the same with "Kings Highway" when we return to chartwatching in January. Wonder what also he'll do in 2022 what else he'll do in '92?

BEST FEMALE VOCALIST



Bonnie Raitt, Capitol
Remember back in the '70s when Bonnie Raitt was a cult artist whose work barely saw the light of play at AOR radio? How about the '80s, when Bonnie struggled to keep a record deal? How about the '80s, when Bonnie struggled to keep a record deal? Those days are gone forever, Jack, 'cause this lady's gone multi-multi. That's multi-format and multi-platinum. It started in 1989 with Nick of Time's four grammies and cool 3 million in sales, and continues with her current Luck of the Draw album. Released in June, "Something To Talk About" was in the Top 10 at AOR, CHR, and A/C by August. It finishes at #37 on our year end countdown, the highest showing posted by a female vocalist (with Pat Benatar's bluesy "Paying the Cost" the only other female entry -- at #99). As the followup, "Slow Ride" has continued Bonnie's winning streak at AOR, with that tracks Top 20 showing enough to push Luck of the Draw to #26 on the year end album list, again the highest of any female rocker. And who says that the blues sung by a female artist can't sell? With Luck's sales at a solid two million, not radio, not anymore. A deserving award for a deserving woman whose time has come.

BEST NEW MALE VOCALIST



Marc Cohn, Atlantic

February 1, 1991. That's the day that those in tip-land put the word out to those in radio-land about the auspicious debut of this New York by way of Ohio-based singer-songwriter. The adds trickled in week after week. First it was the "granola" stations. Then the more adverturous or adult sounding AORs. Soon it was everybody, climbing aboard a hit that wouldn't stop until it had conquered Top 40 and A/C radio. One of the only Top 10 hits by a brand new artist this year (Eric Gales would be the only other we can think of), "Memphis" turned out to be one of the biggest 25 + records of the year -- finishing at #21 in our year end analysis. The followup of "Silver Thunderbird" did nearly as well, with Cohn's debut crossing the wire at #24 on the album chart. The success of Marc Cohn ("Is that Cone, Co-hen, or Con?" was a familiar question for April) proves once again that great songs will be heard, regardless of the "commerciality" of a particuliar arrangement or the haircut of an artist. If his 1991 showing guaranteed one thing, it's that we'll be hearing again from one of the best new talents to emerge during the year. And for that we can rejoice.

BEST NEW FEMALE VOCALIST



Suze DeMarchi (Baby Animals), Imago 1988 saw the emergence of the "folk" females, with Tracy Chapman, Melissa Etheridge, and the Indigo Girls all releasing impressive debuts. 1989 saw recognition at last come to Bonnie Raitt. In 1990 it was Canada's Alannah Myles who weaved a spell on AOR in "Black Velvet." This year's top female is the guitar slinging leader of one of Australia's hottest new groups. Neither sex kitten nor overt feminist, Suze is more than anything else a rocker. If there is one female she bears the most resemblence to on her band's Mike Chapman produced debut, it's Chrissy Hynde and the Pretenders. But this is no note-for-note copy. We'd be hard-pressed to think of anything the Pretenders have done in the last ten years as ballsy as "Early Warning," the first release from this project. That one made a lot of friends at the format, and paved the way for the success that the new track "Painless" is enjoying. As we go to press it's one of the hottest movers, with nine adds and ten rotation increases enabling it to climb into Rock Radio's Top 30 -- the highest chart position for any new female in 1991. Coupled with serious MTV exposure and an ongoing stint opening the European leg of Bryan Adams' tour, Suze heads into 1992 as not only the top new female but as one of the year's 'most likely to succeed' candidates.

COMEBACK OF THE YEAR



Roger McGuinn, Arista

Ten years after the release of his last solo album, Roger McGuinn returned to the hearts and charts of a format he helped define during his seminal years as leader of the Byrds. The 12-string innovator had more than a little help on the project, with cameos by Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, Elvis Costello, David Crosby and Chris Hillman, Michael Penn, Stan Ridgeway, and others. All were on hand to give back to the one who had been such an inspiration. The final results showed that not only had Roger not lost a step in the ten years away from a record deal, he had actually improved his act, taking back the sound that so many -- from Tom Petty to R.E.M. to you-name-it -- had borrowed. Scoring 138 adds on the first reporting date of 1991 (when he appeared as our interview coverboy), "King of the Hill" was a duet with Petty that eventually climbed to #1 in Februay. The Rickenbacker 12-string was back, and sounded better than ever. "King" finishes at #13 on the year end, with its followup, "Someone To Love" (which hung around the Hard 100 for over four months) clocking in at #90. And that's good enough to place Back From Rio at #14 on our album chart. A gentlemen, a rock and roll hall of famer, and still a great guitarist/singer/songwriter, we can't think of another performer we could be happier to present this award to. Here's hoping for another album in '92.






BEST LIVE ALBUM



Eric Clapton, 24 Nights, Reprise For years now, EC's Royal Albert Hall dates have grown to legendary status in the UK. Spreading different ideas and career phases over the course of several weeks of dates featuring four radically different lineups, the release of 24 Nights enabled us cheap Yanks to actually hear the best of it all without having to fly to London and scalp our way in to see every permutation of the residency. While there was plenty of competition in the live recording category this year (especially from New York Rock and Soul, Neil Young, and Keith Richards), for this reason alone we feel that Eric deserves the award. We also loved the album because he chose not to tamper with the recordings, leaving the warts and mistakes on and letting the feel of the performances speak for themselves. The highlights of the and mistakes on and letting the feel of the performances speak for themselves. The highlights of the discs are the rearranged versions of Cream classics and the blues side, which yielded Eric the most play. It's not often that a live album can net this much airtime, but Reprise's strategy to "put the A back in AOR" appeared to have worked, with <u>24 Nights</u> finishing at #68 on the album chart. Since <u>Pretending</u> won the award for album of the year in 1990, this makes it two in a row that Ol' Slowhand has taken home a trophy. At this rate he'll never even be eligible for the comeback award!

Guitar Hero



Neil Young, Reprise
"What are you, kidding?" someone around the Cabin asked when we said we intended to award this to Neil. In the age of Nuno, Slash, Eric, etc, giving the guitar hero honor to a forty-five year old hippie with the technical expertise of any bar band fretslinger may seem unbelievable to some, but we'll argue that what Neil Young accomplished with the guitar this year makes him not only the best of the season, but a candidate for lifetime membership in the Feedback Hall of Fame. Out on the road with the world's longest running and most successful garage band, Crazy Horse, Neil blazed a trail from coast-to-coast, weaving a fuzzy, angry choas that proved the perfect accompanyment for our crazy, war-torn spring. When the tapes were released in the form of <u>Weld/Arc</u> in October, the results were too intense for most stations to even play beyond the live option level. Which only illustrates the biggest difference between Neil and the thousand-notes-a-measure crowd. No one else has ever been able to express anger and the simple 'fuck-it-all' rebellion that is rock and roll quite the way Neil has over the years. No, we're not simple 'fuck-it-all' rebellion that is rock and roll quite the way Neil has over the years. No, we're not kidding. With a respectful nod in the direction of Nuno, Eddie, Eric (C or J or G), Stevie Ray, Vinnie, Hetfield, and Slash (although we'd rate him close for Illusion's combination of technique with Keith-like passion), we humbly offer our award for 1991's most crucial six-string performance to our man Neil.

BEST COMPILATION

Crosby, Stills, and Nash, Atlantic Each year it seems the amount of box sets released around Christmas time increases. We



found it difficult to narrow down our choice with all the great ones out now. Some of the compilations we like a lot include those by King Crimson, Aerosmith, Phil Spector, the great blues and R&B sets from EMI, Patsy Cline, the Clash, Jeff Beck, the excellent Stax/Volt collection, Hendrix Live, The Monkees, T-Rex, and the Skynyrd box, to name just a few. Last year saw the Byrds and Zeppelin sets competing for top dog, with the Byrds batch nabbing the honor. With CSN winning in 1991, it means that David Crosby has had a major hand two years running. What's it gonna be in '92, his prison tapes reissued? Actually, this year it came down to a close decision between CSN and Aerosmith's *Pandora's Box*. While both have their merits and received AOR airplay, the CSN set wins on the basis of the wealth of rare both have their merits and received AOR airplay, the CSN set wins on the basis of the wealth of rare material presented and the fact that it's the first time most of the solo-CSN material that's been tough to get on CD in the past is gathered together in one place. A note on an alarming trend in the box set business, however. Outtakes, alternates, and rarities are only interesting if they are good. While the CSN and Aerosmith sets each contain several gems ("Dear Mr. Fantasy," the long version of "Almost Cut My Hair," the Beatles' "Blackbird," and the alternate of "Helplessly Hoping" by CSN; "Helter Skelter," the live "Big Ten Inch," and Otis Rush's "All My Love" by Aerosmith), almost all the sets released this year feature some gratuitous and unneccessary tracks that don't deserve inclusion. Let's hope that trend doesn't continue. In the meantime, we're headed home to groove on some harmonies.

BREAKTHROUGH BAND



Extreme, A&M There was no question who would get this award this year. From a moderately successful AOR band to multi-platinum CHR stars -- Extreme owned two formats in 1991. It all started when a handful of AOR stations began responding to requests for this ballad off of *Pomograffitti* called "More Than Words." The song's beautiful harmonies and melody, backed by only Nuno Bettencourt's quiet acoustic guitar, struck a chord. Soon this faintly Beatlish track was nearing the top reaches of AOR. It was only a matter of weeks before Casey was saying, "And now, back to our countdown," with Extreme looking down from the top of it all. With sales exploding, A&M came back with "Hole Hearted," and reached the upper strata of both charts again. In fact, at AOR "Hole" finished higher on our year end chart (#6) than "More Than Words" (#25). And with *Pomograffitti* finishing at #7 on the album totals (highest for a "new" band - with a solid 28 weeks on the album list), when the followup comes, the question for AOR is if it will continue to embrace the stars it created, or write the band off to CHR. We fervently hope that Rock Radio sides with the overwhelming talent of Nuno, Gary, and the band and plays the bejesus out of whatever comes next from these Bay State rockers. whatever comes next from these Bay State rockers.




BEST NEW HARD ROCK ACT



Alice In Chains, Columbia One of the most successful long term promotion efforts of 1991 was the campaign that took Alice in Chains from virtual obscurity to a Gold album and opening slot on the Van Halen tour. After catching the early buzz of a Fall 1990 EP, metal radio rode the debut into the highest reaches of their chart in February of 1991. With constant touring as a support act for Extreme and Iggy Pop, MTV was the next to pick up the torch, adding "Man in the Box" to regular rotation. Soon every AOR PD and his brother were writing comments to the trades, raving about the incredible phone-ality and crunch power of this track. One by one, stations discovered these facts to be true. In June, "Man In the Box" peaked at 23, and would eventually spend 28 weeks on the Hard Hundred list, finishing at #64 for the year end chart. The followup, "Sea of Sorrow," did almost as well, pushing Facelift to #45 on the year end album chart. But much more than numbers or graphs, the breakthrough of Alice proved once again that records happen from the street up, with a solid buzz counting much higher than any hot air or hype a label PR department dishes out. The success of Alice In Chains means that ultimately, listeners create hits, a lesson that was drilled home to AOR radio again and again in 1991. lesson that was drilled home to AOR radio again and again in 1991.

ALTERNATIVE CROSSOVER

Jesus Jones, SBK Sometimes AOR has a tendency to be a little thick skulled when it comes to playing new music. Case in point, Jesus Jones. Scoring its first adds in early January, "Right Here, Right Now" took more than 5 months to reach its peak chart position of #6 on June 14th. By that time it was already on its way to becoming a smash, with more than a little help from MTV and CHR. Alternative radio of course, had known about the band since their 1989 debut, Liquidizer, and kept Doubt in the Alternative Top 10 for a large chuck of the year. "Right Here" managed the longest hangtime of any track during 1991, with a remarkable 31 weeks on the Hard Hundred and a year end placement at #23. The success of that song led to "Real, Real, Real," which enjoyed some AOR success, but really scored big again at CHR and MTV. With two mega-hits under their belt, Jesus Jones embarked on a whirlwind US tour with Ned's Atomic Dustbin that played to capacity houses throughout America. Meanwhile, "Right Here, Right Now" remains one of the strongest testing tracks of the year at the format, and with rumors pointing toward a more rock sound for the next album, 1992 might see Jesus Jones more firmly in tune with AOR Radio.



METAL CROSSOVER

Metallica, Elektra Metallica before 1991: Platinum sales -- sketchy airplay at AOR at best. Metallica after 1991: Sales topping four million -- tons of radio support at AOR and CHR, with non-metal fans coming into the fold by the truckload. With their Bob Rock-produced Metallica album, the band raised the stakes to a higher level.

By recording shorter, more accessible (yet still amazingly intense) songs, AOR was forced to deal with the group and found that heck, people wanted, yes demanded to hear this band. "Enter Sandman," with its sinewy riff, powerful vocals, and grinding crunch, took AOR by storm, rising to the mid-teens while owning the Top Request seat for several weeks. Heavy AOR and MTV play enabled this song to transcend the "cult/metal" tag the band had been saddled with in the past. Suddenly, whether your tape collection was littered with rap, classics, alternative, or cheesy pop, you were into Metallica. With "Enter Sandman" rock solid at #49 on the year end list, the Black album finishes at #34, and as we put the year to rest, "The Unforgiven" has entered the Top 10. with album sales over 4 million and CHR picking up to rest, "The Unforgiven" has entered the Top 10, with album sales over 4 million and CHR picking up the buzz. Without sacrificing the sound or ideals of the group, Metallica finds themselves firmly in the midst of the mainstream, and no one will ever call them a cult band again.





School of Fish, Capitol

Each year seems to produce its fair share of surprising or unpredictable successes. In 1991, one of the happiest long-term promotional stories was written by Jeffrey Shane and the Capitol folks with the School of Fish record. Released to alternative radio early in the year, it didn't take long for this LA-based band to establish themselves as contenders on that side of the fence. Once they'd hit the Top 10 there, Capitol pulled the pin at AOR, setting off a slow burning explosion that took sixth months to complete. In a climate where a backwards bullet is usually an invitation for the format's mass exodus from a track, these Fish swam unstream against two in addition to wading through two separate wayes of superstar releases. When the dust had settled, this previously unknown band had landed on our year end list at #52, with their eponymous debut album calling #55 home. With several stations still reporting the track in heavy rotation, it's apparent that the guys in School of Fish aren't the only ones who have experienced "3 Strange Days" during 1991.

BEST TOUR



Guns N' Roses, Geffen If controversy is a way of life, then 1991 proved to be a pretty typical, ho-hum year for the Gunners. Rumors abounded from wire-to-wire, with some turning into reality, some not. Early in the year came word that original drummer Steve Adler was out, replaced by former Cult skinpounder Matt Sorum. Axl and management got into trouble a few months later for an interview policy that ticked off many a journalist. With track leaks and cease and desists flying, the release dates for Use Your Illusion I and II got pushed from June to October, with rumors of artwork and mixing problems. The tour became the pre-tour (with the real tour just now starting up again), and here again was not without controversy. In St. Louis a riot broke out after Axl leaped from the stage to personally do a little security work, the city responded with a massive middle-finger salute. Finally, at year end, another personel change saw original guitarist Izzy Stradlin replaced (on tour at least) by former Kill For Thrills member Gilby Clarke. And through all the mess, Guns N' Roses managed to release some of the most compelling music in the history of rock and roll. The Illusion albums were a sprawling masterpiece of hard rock, stretching the band in of rock and roll. The Illusion albums were a sprawling masterpiece of hard rock, stretching the band in new directions and selling more than 5 million copies each worldwide. They also took their fiery rock

and roll on the road, exercising whatever demons haunted them offstage with 2 1/2 hours of dynamic magic a night. We chose them as the most important live band of 1991, and the good news is that they will be out on the road for the majority of '92 as well.





Various Artists, Until the End of the World Lp. WB... Imagine the year 1999. It's not too far away. That's the year this Wim Wenders directed (and William Hurt starring) film is set in. And though we haven't seen the movie

And though we haven't seen the movie yet, judging by the soundtrack, it probably isn't going to be going so well for us humans from earth. But what a near apocalypse boogie on the jukes! The lead track for radio is Lou Reed's "What's Good," which will also be the lead track on a new solo album (early '92 release date). Featuring Rob Wasserman's distinctive fretless bassline, Lou hangs it out with more of those wry observations and his New York attitude that he's used to furnish a career stretching back to the days of the Velvets. There's also a "new/old" track from Talking Heads, the Naked-era "Sax and Violins." Look for that to be included on the Heads' greatest hits package, slated for mid-'92. R.E.M. turns in "Fretless," an outtake from Out of Time, while Elvis Costello contributes a haunting version of the Kinks' "Days," T-Bone Burnett chips in with a hilarious song called "Humans From Earth," and U2 offers a version of "Until the End of the World" that is pretty different from the mix on Achtung Baby. Two thousand zero zero, when you've got a soundtrack this loaded with talent and tunes, it's easy to party like it's 1999.

Track Action



Eric Clapton, "Tears in Heaven", Reprise... While this isn't from a new Eric Clapton studio album, it is one of three tracks with vocals from his forthcoming soundtrack to the film <u>Rush</u>. And on this, Eric sings perhaps his most personal song since the painful <u>461 Ocean Boulevard</u> album. Written in the difficult months following the tragic death of his young son, "Tears in Heaven" is obviously for him, and after hearing the touching and sad lyrics, it is hard to believe how banal most "power ballads" seem in comparison. We've spent the last 25 years growing up, as people and an industry, alongside Eric Clapton, and now he has shared a very personal and private experience in this song. Reprise is looking for pre-Christmas adds at AOR, with A/C and CHR to follow in early January.

Ugly Kid Joe, "Everything About You", Stardog/Mercury... This has the potential to be a mega-hit in the months to come. Funnier than a Dan Quayle IQ test, we're already starting to get reports of Nirvana-like response to early airplay. If you haven't heard it yet, the lyrical catch is that if there were paranthesis in front of the title, they wouldn't say "I love" but rather "I hate." What did Spinal Tap say about the clever twist? That's what makes this song happen. Hard rockers who know how to laugh at both themselves and the world we live in, these Uglies couple just enough funky crunch with the funniest lyrics since "I'm An Adult Now." We predict the results will be reacting from coast-to-coast just in time for anti-Valentine's Day dedications.





Lillian Axe, "True Believer", I.R.S/Grand Slamm.... Another record that is doing well at metal radio and starting to cross over to AOR is this. To make some sense of their slightly confusing recent history, I.R.S./Grand Slamm recently released a compilation that covered their days at MCA, this meanwhile is the first track from the new album, Poetic Justice, due for release in January. But the advance track is getting tons of early play -- enough to debut on our Hard Hundred this week at 96*, behind adds from the likes of KBER, WXTB, KIOZ, WVBR, and WXRC. Meanwhile, WIYY, WWBZ, KRRK, KRXQ, and WSTZ were pounding it already. It's a catchy rocker with one of those hooks that never lets go. Look out for the album's crankin' cover of Badfinger's "No Matter What," which leads us to our next pre-Holiday release.

Jellyfish, Jellyfish Comes Alive EP, Charisma... Charisma has decided to let AOR programmers get their hands on what had developed into quite a collector's market over the past few months -- namely, the live Jellyfish B-sides from their British singles. After some of these were featured on Rock Over London, PDs and MDs began to query Lenny and the Charisma folks of their origins. Which led to the stocking stuffer you now find in your CD player. On it the band continues to explore its love affair with '70s pop culture, from the EP's Framptonesque title to their evocation of the spirit of Linda McCartney on their cover of Wings' "Jet." Quite the fans of Linda's hubby, the boys also work a verse of "Let 'Em In" into "That Is Why." But the real highlight is their version of "No Matter What," a song that's been begging to be recut since the Badfinger albums first went out of print in the late '70s. Rocking and melodic, if you played anything from their wonderful Bellybutton debut, consider this sweet treat a must for end of the year airplay.





Marc Bonilla, "White Noise", Reprise... Flash and burn guitarists seem a dime a dozen these days. But someone who plays with both the technical edge of a Satriani and the passion and precision of Jeff Beck is hard to come by. Young Mr. Bonilla is one such cat. This Bay area guitarist joins up with some pretty credible players too, like Tesla's Troy Luccketta on drums and Keith Emerson on keyboards. Yep, that Keith Emerson. And the result is one of the freshest and funnest instrumental albums we've heard in a long time. Reprise isn't really working this hard until January, but we expect response from programmers to kick start this project before we're singing Auld Lang Syne.

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THE HARD REPORT

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Impact Tracks



Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, "Kings Highway", MCA (55/135): Top added honors for the second week in a row go to this quality depth track from the latest effort from the Heartbreakers. It's no wonder Tom's walking away with the Best Male Vocalist award from the cabin this year -- this is the fourth track to burst into the Top 20, which has enabled *Into the Great Wide Open* to remain in the Top 10 on the album chart since its release in late spring. Just a few of the add casualties this week include WNEW, WLLZ, KLOS, KSHE, WKLS, KUPD and WYNF. All this means it's certain to be a Merry Christmas around the Petty household, with this well-traveled highway resting at 29-18* as we head into the break.

Ion Bon Jovi, "Levon", Polydor/PLG (37/55): As last week's ad stated, the timing for this track is impeccable. It must have been some insidious plot hatched to place the release of this track in the midst of the Holiday season. "Levon" indeed does live, and breathe at AOR, with more than three dozen beating their CHR brethren to the punch by adding the track this week. WWDC, WMMR, KLPX, WDHA, KATT, and WONE among those joining earlybirds KUPD, WIYY, WIXV, WIZN and KZAP to push one of the week's biggest jumpers on the chart, 80-45*.





Queen, "The Show Must Go On", Hollywood (36/43): The show goes on for one of the format's legendary bands this week, taking home honors for our highest debut on the Hard Hundred at 57*. WMMR, WPDH, KATT, WCCC, KFMU and WBLM all added it, with WNEW and WDIZ reporting early Top 5 phones from medium play. The Mercury man may have dropped low, but the music continues to warm the hearts of Rock Radio, and the influence (not to mention the hits) will be a part of this magnificent format long into the future.

Pearl Jam, "Alive", Epic (35/73): Buzz Buzz Buzz. Can you hear it? It's the sound of a band about to explode all over the airwaves of AOR. We welcomed the year with the buzz of "Silent Lucidity," and we see it end with the latest impending sonic Seattle sensation. In the course of 1991 we've had Alice in Chains, Nirvana, and Soundgarden, with Pearl Jam providing yet another example of the diversity of the Puget Sound sound. Fourth most added overall this week, the Jam is spread from Atlanta to Anchorage, with the chartspeak loud and clear, 67-47*.







Genesis, "I Can't Dance", Atlantic (27/118): You can grasp the inside scoop on the genesis of the latest from Genesis by checking out the Trappman's interview, while we'll tell you that airplay speaking, there ain't noboby sitting prettier at the moment. Occupying two of our Top 20 slots this week, the latest mover and shaker from We Can't Dance is the near-title cut, and quite a week it had. Storming past the century mark with ease, Phil, Mike, and Tony score at WFBQ, KLOL, KLAQ, and two dozen more. It's in the air and through the uprights (you can tell where our minds are) with rotation increases at KUPD, WCCC, KRQR, KZAP, and four more moving it up the HH 26-20*.

The Cult, "Heart Of Soul", Reprise (22/87): It's the most melodic accessible song on the album. It's also making friends at AOR like Santa in December, with adds flying from all directions, including WCCC, WXTB, WTPA, KSAQ and WXLP. Increases are noted from WDHA and WVBR. Lead singer Ian Astbury stated in a recent interview that the front man is the "He-dog, the phallus, the driving hunter." Ok, Ian. It's a bullseye on the chart, cruising up nine, 44-35* this week.





Keith Richards, Live at the Hollywood Palladium, Virgin (21/23): Keith rules! Shout it from coast-to-coast, or better yet, play it and satisfy the souls of all the frustrated rockers who rejoice in the fact that quality singers like Keith, Bobby D., and Joe Strummer have earned healthy livings off of rock and roll. KOME, KLBJ, WIZN, WHCN, WFBQ and KRQR are some of the stations doing the open thing, with several tracks standing out. The add response was even stronger than it looks, with "Happy" (14/17) scoring the lion's share (KLOS, KSJO, WEQX, WLLZ, WWDC) for a 100* debut. "Connection" grabbed four more, while several solo tunes garnered additional adds. All of this combined to give the album a healthy debut at 58*.







Richie Sambora, "Stranger In This Town", Mercury (15/109): Among the most added again, one of our favorite songwriters lands 15 to close out the Hard Year at 32-25* on the chart. Richie picked up a multitude of big boys in our final week grabbing KTXQ, KDJK, KEZO, KLAQ and others. 10 increases showed up for the "Stranger," and the LP went 28-26* on the Hard 60. Here's to a great Christmas seller!

Soundgarden, "Outshined", A&M (15/86): Although we're not in the business of investing, our money market advice this week: Buy into phone companies. Fiber optic lines are jamming nation-wide, with top requests at 7 including the mighty KILO, KGON, KTYD and WZNF. Soundgarden adds showed up at KDJK, KFMQ, WBCN, WEQX, WIYY, WMMR and WRIF. The list grows each week, and "Outshined" continues its upward momentum, charting a Hard move of 42-36*, and an LP mark of 41-33*.

Eddie Money, "She Takes My Breath Away", Columbia (14/145): Enough already! You may think it's about time for this phrase, but Eddie is still stealing the air from the lungs of stations everywhere like, KRQR, KKEG, KATT, KUFO, WKGB, WPDH, WZNF and others. He has been heard recently on the airwaves, doing holiday phone interviews, and just darn working hard. The payoff comes this week in the form of a 14-12* move on the Hard Hundred, and 17-15* jump on the Hard sixty.

Ozzy Osbourne, "Mama, I'm Coming Home", Epic (12/37): In the Christmas spirit of giving, we'll give WIOT's Michael (Santa's helper) Young an exclusive on Ozzy: "I've seen a lot of programmers over the years play the mandatory cut from a the new Ozzy album and say, 'Well, I'm glad that's over with.' Before you say that with this album, listen to 'Mama, I'm Coming Home.' I think this tune may make a lot of people rethink their position about the Oz. Brilliant transitions backed with Ozzy's vocals will take this one to the top of the chart before you stop writing '91 on all your checks!" Here, here! Ozzy takes a dozen adds with him down the chimney and up the HH 62-53*.





Rush, "Ghost Of A Chance", Atlantic (12/51): Canada's three point star is shining brightly, just in time for Christmas. The 3rd single from Roll The Bones is moving up steadily, with a host of new adds including majors KAZY, KILO, KRXQ, KSJO, WIOT, WKGB, WMMS and WTUE. Increased rotation was the word at KLOS, KSQY, WYMG and WTPA, as the Hard 100 chart slated Rush at 47-43* and a steady 5 on the LP chart.

Tall Stories, "Wild On The Run", Epic (12/96): In 1991, developing projects tended to rise and fall with alarming speed. Those that weathered the tough chart storms and superstar floods can be counted on a couple of hands, with School of Fish and the Northern Pikes being a couple who quickly come to mind. And now you can just about chalk up this mainstream, melodic rocker, which has surpassed most expectations by surviving near stalls only to turn in one of its best weeks -- nearly 3 months into the project. Adds are recorded by KLPX, WEGR, WIOT, WGIR, WTUE and KFMH. Increases at KUFO, WRIF, WQBZ, and KSQY. And the chart jump is 33-27*.





Webb Wilder, "Tough It Out", Zoo (12/39): Webb has indeed lived up to the title of this song, bouncing onto his third label for *Doo Dad*, his third album. We dare you to say this isn't the perfect segue into anything by ZZ Top. WAVF, KNCN, KATP, KLPX and KMJX all added it this week, with increases coming from WDHA, WKZQ and WVBR. Even early in the airplay life cycle KMMS, WIXV and WZEW report Top 5 phone action, as the Webbster slices and dices up the Hard Hundred 68-55*.

Skid Row, "Wasted Time", Atlantic (11/92): Wasting no time in reaching the Top 30, Sebastian's boys clamp down on another double digit week, scoring adds from KATT, WPDH, WAVF, KLOL and KLPX, to name a few. Phones are a-buzz at 11 (KMJX, KUPD, WIYY, WXTB, WYNF), with increases coming from WRIF, WKGB and KSQY. The chart chatter shows a 34-29* move happening, with room to grow as rotations rise to match response.





Smithereens, "Tell Me When Did Things Go So Wrong", Captiol (10/105): Crossing the hundred station barrier safely, these Jersey boys maintain their status as the great hope of popdom, carrying the torch once held so loftily by such classic core bearers as the Byrds and Beatles. WNEW, WPYX, WHTQ and KYYS are certainly the definition of a good day when you are about 8 weeks into the project, with the increased rotations of WAPL, WZZO, KLPX, KCQR, KFMZ, KWIC and WZNF. In the language of number-crunchers, that's enough for a 27-24* payoff.


Aldo Nova, "Someday", Mercury (8/23): Aldo Nova receives assistance again from his friend Jon Bon Jovi. The result is a dynamic mid-tempo (bordering on power ballad) heart throbber which few are able to top in tandem better than this duo. It's so hard to tell the two apart (from every aspect) that you'd be hard pressed to find a temporary (or even permanent) ensemble that complement each so well. KATP, KKEG, KRNA, KROK, WAOR, WAPL, WKIT and WZBH add it for a 100-89* explosion.





BoDeans, "Good Things", Reprise (8/54): How many milk, cheese and cow references can one band warrant or deserve? The answer, of course, is none. Since Wisconsin has nothing to do with the music (Seattle it's not), and an unbiased critique and objective/subjective analysis is definitely out of the question and against tip sheet rules and regulations, the facts are all that remain. And what facts they are!!! KQWB, WAVF, WGLF, WPDH, WRFX, WRUF, WRXR and WXRX pull the add udder to fill the HH bucket, 49-46*.

James Reyne, "Some People", Charisma (8/30): KRZR's E.C. Johnson said, "I needed a great song I could play at noon. This one fits the bill perfectly." Brad Hanson, at WMMS, told us, "The record has a hook a mile long. It should show positive research quickly!" And Michael Cross, of the frozen north (KJKJ) was more than happy to say, "Some People' is a great song. James Reyne has delivered his best stuff ever!" We are constantly hearing good words about this new artist, so for Christmas, we thought we'd give James Reyne what he deserves: A Hard Hundred skyrocket of 84-66* (actually, we can't take credit for the move, he earned it himself).







Doug Sorenson, Program Director, KATT/Oklahoma City: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: I'd probably say sexual harassment is the biggest issue this year. But let's call a spade a spade; this is not just for the record business, but for all businesses. As a manager, I've always been sensitive to it. I've seen situations where both men and women have been guilty, and I think it should be nipped in the bud so it doesn't escalate. PERSON OF THE YEAR: This is probably somewhat localized, but I'd put down Garth Brooks and the impact of Country radio for Noisemaker. It may be because he is from a suburb of Oklahoma City, but the of Country radio for Noisemaker. It may be because he is from a suburb of Oklahoma City, but the Country station here is pulling a 17 share. THE ECONOMY: The recession has given a whole new dimension to the concept of a value added promotion. Sometimes, our best promotions come from sales, and I have to enhance them with programming. Our KATT Track Of The Week with Sound Warehouse is a good example. We're going to have to work even harder to come up with more cooperative promotions if the economy doesn't turn around. The coming election will bring some sort of rebound, but regardless, radio is the most resilient medium during a recession. The low production cost, in particular, makes it real attractive. MUSIC: There is a void out there for hard rock bands that nobody plays. For example, Nirvana has exploded in sales, Metallica, Motley Crue, L.A. Guns -- why should we just give these acts to CHR? Rock radio will continue to evolve into two distinct formats: the pseudo- classic; and the young, aggressive 18-24 type. But in the meantime, those low end stations are the best place to shop for hot new bands, and that will be their

aggressive 18-24 type. But in the meantime, those low end stations are the best place to shop for hot new bands, and that will be their principal impact in the coming year. Otherwise, I expect the first quarter to be fairly regressive, especially compared to the musical climate right now. The new music now is probably the most excellent quality new music I've heard in years. It's made the music decision even more difficult because they tell you what you want to hear, "We're behind it," or "It's a Breaker," etc. I hope the purging of the industry continues to the degree that we can get a handle on what's really legitimate. As for all the inducements, you've got to be pretty desperate to add a record for a CD player or a trip somewhere. Finally, I wish the charts were more reflective of actual listening, instead of Breaker status, etc. Public awareness is much, much slower than the industry charts indicate, and sometimes records move way too fast. PREDICTIONS: My prediction is that "efficiency" will become the byword next year. I think we'll see a lot more work done by a lot less people.

Judy McNutt, Program Director, KXRQ/Sacramento: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The Economy is obviously uppermost



in everyone's mind, at least everyone who has their mind on their business. I think a secondary issue is station marketing. I guess that grows naturally out of worries about the economy. It's a continuous challenge for everyone -- even the brain trust companies are highly concerned. THE ECONOMY: I think stations are being forced to do more with less because of the economy. I see a lot of stations becoming more creative and doing the things they should have done all along, which is to spend more time in the community. One on one, that's the old trench-fighting idea. When things slack like this, it's time to become more aggressive, not less. It's true that if you become scared you've lost it. Fear is a great demotivator. So, just at a time when other stations are soft pedaling we put the pedal to the metal. THE FORMAT: This is a good time to do even more to support your community. We just finished one for AIDS Awareness Day, with a Rock-a-thon from 6 AM til midnight, and so far, we've raised \$6,000. PERSON OF THE YEAR: I hate to say it, but the Noisemaker has to be Babineau, if only for the attention he has drawn to harassment in the industry. THE LABELS: The influx of new labels has been good in a lot of ways because it has exposed a broader variety of new product to the public, and while it has been unfortunate in some cases, the overview will show that it helped the industry and that it was a good creatively. It's a bit disconcerting at times because I don't want any company to feel like they don't have access to me, but sometimes, it's physically impossible. Pam does such a good job, so that's not really a problem for me. PREDICTIONS: I predict the clear winners over the next couple of years will be stations who aren't afraid to go to the wall -- regardless of format -- to take it to the max instead of holding back. So a station just flirting with playing new music won't be a winner over the long haul, because they're not doing anything to create a future for themselves, and that's essential. challenge for everyone -- even the brain trust companies are highly concerned. THE ÉCONOMY: I think

Ted Edwards, Program Director, KLOL/Houston: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Just keeping our heads above water is the big issue right now. We're very fortunate because we're doing very well right now. But I hear over and over again from record companies and radio stations about how tough it is out there -- cut backs, paying the bills, etc. We'll probably see a lot of bodies in the street after the first of the year. The record companies and radio stations that have already done that are in the best shape right now. And those who have dedicated money in the less leans times to be sure their product, be it albums or airwaves, are the best that they can be will be the ones to survive. PERSON OF THE YEAR: A three way tie between, unfortunately, Marko Babineau, Howard Stern and Guns N' Roses -- all for obvious reasons. THE ECONOMY: Programming-wise, we're here to provide entertainment, and historically, free entertainment does well in times of recessions. People need a low cost escape from their eco-blues, and radio fits perfectly into that mode. Promotion-wise, if you have it in your budget, its never made more sense than now to give away money. We just gave away eighty thousand dollars in Ten Thousand Dollar Thursdays. THE FORMAT: If a company can make a decent living doing hard rock or any other format,

that's great. There are a lot of stations that aren't making a living at all, and the way that AORs, in lot of cases, really function as Classic Rock stations, it has really created an opening for stations with a hard rock format. To really make a good living at it, it would have to be in a large market, since it's not really mass appeal. Although The Blaze seems to be defying that cliche. THE LABELS: As far as the new labels, we try to do business with everyone in a viable position to do business. I've always thought there was more good music in the U.S., and the world in general, than was made available to me on major labels. It's made our job a bit more difficult. It's made Patty's job more stressful. The thing I find most difficult is it's really kind of grating to be worked by someone who has one record, and for that to happen over a three or four month period. How many times can you have the same conversation with someone? I sympathize with those who have to do this. It must be dulling for them, too. I can also the same conversation with someone? I sympathize with those who have to do this. It must be dulling for them, too. I can also empathize with the stressful position they must be in, trying to support a group of people with one artist. INCENTIVES: I've never been one to cut deals for goods and services. I detest the idea of the add tied into some kind of commodity. I especially find it reprehensible when the commodity has nothing to do with the artist in question. If we deserve some level of support promotion, we deserve that regardless of what kind of deals other people are cutting. Once again, I sympathize with people who are in the position where they have to depend on an outside source for exciting promotions for the radio station. PREDICTIONS: I get the feeling it's going to be an exciting year for AOR. There is a light at the end of the tunnel for heritage AORs. I also see a definite acceptance of Classic Rock.

Chris Miller, Program Director, KZAP/Sacramento: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year is all economic based.

There are LMA's, the fragmentation of the market, and the advertisers economic outlooks, which will




hurt radio stations. PERSON OF THE YEAR: The Noisemaker is Marko Babineau, if only because the media has made the accusations against him appear to be the norm in the entertainment industry. INCENTIVES: We look for promotional items that are realistic and of the non-necessity aspect -- a night out, weekends away. Basically, people are watching their spending. Things that before were normal purchases, like a weekend ski trip, now have a lot more value than it did year ago. THE FORMAT: Hard rock has proven that it can be successful. What programmers need to look at is, in their market, is their a enough advertising available to make that particular approach viable. Mointercape AOP's will listen a enough advertising available to make that particular approach viable. Mainstream AOR's will listen harder, looking for things that will fit the format. THE LABELS: The reason you saw so many labels start and so many fold was because of that goods for services mentality. They were no longer run as a business. They ceased to have a long term objective, and went for immediate chart action, regardless of

whether it would translate into sales and a viable long term business plan. You have to approach the charts and listen to the music with a somewhat jaundiced viewpoint. And make sure that if you see a lot of action on a record, that it is a legitimate response and growth, rather than artificially created hype.



ken Anthony, Program Director, KLOS/Los Angeles: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: I think the year should be evenly divided between two issues; the first one most definitely led to the second one. The main issue the first six months of 1991 was the Gulf War and all of the issues surrounding it. The War was an extremely expensive undertaking, which has led to the second issue of 1991, which is the poor economy, very much in worse shape as a result of the Gulf War's tremendous price tag. THE ECONOMY: The sad state of the American economy is bad enough to cast a bit of a gloom around everyone, especially the record industry. In a state like this, people are glad to have a job, let alone the luxury of disposable income. In times like these, people are certainly looking for entertainment as an escape, so radio remains a FREE form of entertainment which should remain strong but for some scraping up the extra bucks for a CD may well

The record industry is going through major shakedowns at the moment, and I'm sure most radio properties are shuddering at the bleak sales numbers already on the books for the first quarter of '92 as compared to last year at this time. THE FORMAT: The AOR format remains very stable and strong. It can legitimately be grouped into several subsets depending on demos and psychographics but the main areas remain mainstream, classic rock, and an ever increasing low ans hard rocker, which becomes increasingly more viable in most markets as the mainstream station battles it out with the classic rocker for 25 plus dominance. In addition to our own in-format battles, AOR will most likely battle another rock competitor in the future as the advent of digital audio cable begins to take hold in certain markets. We must watch for this and continue to program exciting, localized rock radio with an eye to the future. THE LABELS: This is easy...Too many labels are promoting too many records, when radio, in an increasingly competitive environment just doesn't have the spaces available to play all this new music. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out that poor economy or not, many more changes will be taking place in the record industry in the months ahead as several small labels will either be bought out, merge, or be flushed out altogether. MUSIC: It's been exciting to see that music on AOR has been heading back to the roots of rock n''oll during the last year. The Black Crowes were obviously the hot new band of the year, along with the emergence of the Seattle Sound (alternative metal) like Nirvana and Pearl Jam. And how great are those instrumental

Jack Emerson, Music Director, KGGO/Des Moines: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Who is in control of the radio business?



Is it radio? Is it records? God forbid - is it Radio & Records? Is it the labels? Is it Axl Rose? Is it Wilt Chamberlain? (He's fucked everyone else) Some of the decisions that have and will be made (ie the signings of the Stones and Aerosmith, the mergers, the foot soldiers being hung out to dry, stations leaving music out to dry) lead one to believe one thing: Darwin was right. THE ECONOMY: Remember what WWII did for the economy back in the forties? George thought maybe this Iraqi thing would do the same in the nineties -- not! When people can't realize that the Grand Wizard of the KKK might get elected to public office, they're numb! When bands try to fill a concert hall in Des Moines Iowa to the tune of \$25 + a ticket, they're dumb! Has there ever been a bigger oxymoron today that "free enterprise?" THE FORMAT: Let's take AOR back to the future. It's easy: 1. Actually listen to music instead of reading a chart or a fax. 2. Realize research is a tool - not an end-all. 3. Put guts back into programming. 4. Remember that they who can't do, teach. THE LABELS: Let me describe the record industry of 1991 using the paint store postulate. Each week the store calls up to try to sell me paint. I have a limited

number of walls to cover. I don't need ten gallons when two will do! And if my wall is sufficiently covered I don't need another coat! Of course, some walls (read stations) have had the same coat of paint on them for years. The store suggests that maybe they should change the color (read music). The station won't. So the store sends them four gallons of the same color (read box set). It's their fault. It's the station's fault. Hey, it's a double-edged brush. I'm just as guilty as the next painter. MUSIC: Did you play it because of who it was? Did you play it because it tested well on the coast? Did you play it because it had a bullet and a fax okey-dokey? Here in the great wide open, I look back to my playlists this past year to find not many currents made it to recurrent. Not that exciting things didn't happen (Guns, Crowes, Nirvana just to name a few). I hit a few and missed probably many more. When those new ones clicked it was special. But the classics remain special too. I know I didn't hear it all and I didn't play a lot. But I still loved to listen to it. That's what we're in it for, right? PREDICTIONS: I wear no sign that says "Kreskin." I don't have all the answers or else I would be consulting. All I know in '92 is what Chuck knew in '57; it's gonna be rock & roll music if you wanna dance with me. PERSON OF THE YEAR: I don't know him by name, but here's what he said -- no matter how much money you make, no matter how big your numbers are, no matter what rotation it's in, and no matter who you report to; the size of your funeral will still be determined by the weather.

Brew Michaels, Program Director KXRX/Seattle: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: AIDS and AOR's responsibility to educate



and "De-Voodoocize" the subject. It's criminal that even progressive souls as normally wander the halls of rock radio stations have been afraid to address this pressing issue which affects our primary audience of 20-45 year old males. Sexual preference needs to move aside for sexual practice as the focus of concern regarding this plague-like epidemic. My 19 year old nephew adds, "If they ever discover a cure for AIDS it will be like VJ day with a hard-on." THE ECONOMY: Creativity over cash outlay will be the battle cry for promotions in the first half of 1992. Generating non-traditional revenue and saying "Yes" to added value will be key functions of both sales and programming departments during the forthcoming rough water. THE FORMAT: Oddly enough we seem to be heading west at the speed of 42 knots per hour with some turbulence reported from the flank. THE LABELS: I'm very sad to see industry veterans losing jobs during the holiday season. I realize this is all part of the natural cycle of business but it's saddening nonetheless. MUSIC: More success for Seattle based bands. Queensryche, Nirvana, Alice

In Chains and Soundgarden have created a groundswell, look for a great followup to the Posies "Dear 23" debut as well as some terrific new music from Pearl Jam and War Babies. PREDICTIONS: Rock radio should have another great year. The same conditions exist today as in the late seventies when AOR last ascended the Throne. CHR today is very similar to what it was in the height of Disco: a non-stop dance track that is totally out of touch with the unparty-like realities of the current economic climate. When times get tough, the guitars get turned up and we've seen that with the new Neil Young and Mellencamp efforts and the emergence of Jane's Addiction, Metallica and the Seattle scene. As the guitars get louder on one side of the spectrum, introspection and "organic" music once again finds an audience so it makes sense that artists like REM and U2 created for their most romantic albums ever and the charts found room for michael McDermott, Vinnie James and Marc Cohn. I'm really looking forward to the next James McMurtry release as well as the new Bruce. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Dylan. His speech at the Grammys cemented his legend as an enigma, the Bootleg Box Set restored his reputation as Rock's foremost songwriter. The previously unreleased "Idiot Wind" was my song of the year.

Kevin Stapleford, Program Director, 91X/San Diego: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: How can radio and records (the industries



not the trade publication) continue to expand while the economy continues to fall apart? I don't think it's scientifically possible...and we're already beginning to see the results. THE ECONOMY: Definitely not groovy. Expansion with no cognitive forethought is resulting in cutbacks and mergers for both record companies and radio groups. Only the strongest will survive in 1992. Ouch. THE FORMAT: Groovier than the economy, that's for sure. "Alternative" approaches to both AOR and CHR are already looking very attractive to the enlightened. The unenlightened should immediately fuck off and go classic (a la KGB). Whatever you want to call it -- alternative, post-modern, adventure club -- this format is maturing into a major 18-34 contender. It can work in any market, 1992 will prove me right. THE LABELS: See the economy (Ouch). THE MUSIC: It was great to see as band like Nirvana crawl out of nowhere and stun virtually everyone. It was great to have artists like Joni Mitchell and Robbie Robertson putting out superb albums (although it was a disgrace that no one else in San Diego bothered to play them). The cross-over successes of Jesus Jones, EMF, Divinyls, Lenny Kravitz and others was very encouraging. The same should have happened for The La's, Smashing Pumpkins, Candyskins and a billion others (Wait'll next year)!

Curtiss. Johnson, Program Director, KUPD/Phoenix: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The continuing destruction of our planet's



environment. Saving it starts at home with you and I, and needs to continue into the corporations of the world. Think about what our world will be like in the next 20 years if we don't make a concerted effort. It scares the hell out of me. THE ECONOMY: Personally, I'm doing fine. The station is extremely healthy. I do know people in and out of the industry that times will be tough for in the coming year. I wish them the best. FORMAT/MUSIC/PREDICTIONS: AOR is aging well in Phoenix. It's continued to be fresh and exciting while still playing "the music of their life" for the children of the 60s, 70s and 80s. However, I don't think it's grayed as well in other markets. "Young AOR," "Alternative," whatever handle you want to attach to it will continue to grow and find acceptance. The chasm between this generation and past generations will continue to grow musically, fashion-wise and socially. The world we grew up in and the world they will have is radically different. Radio and the other media will need to reflect their world. We can't all continue to scramble for that 25-54 cell and hope to survive. Especially as that demo, no matter how many of them there are, spends less and less time with radio as they age. PERSON OF THE YEAR: No ONE person stands out in my mind!!!





Charlie Logan, Program Director, WYNF/Tampa: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The rise of racism in the United States personified by David Duke. Racism has reared it's ugly head in a big way in 1991. Having grown up in a multi-ethnic area in New York City I've always been appalled by racism. I've lived in Jacksonville, FL and seen the ugly ways of the Deep South. Yet, I've always hoped the American people would become more enlightened. Sadly, as we've seen in New Orleans, there are many more closet racists that I would have believed. Too many of the challenges facing our country today are being perceived as black or white have believed. Too many of the challenges facing our country today are being perceived as black or white issues and to me that's very sad. But it is good to note that rock n' roll is becoming more integrated. While in the past AOR was whitebread radio, it's good to see the emergence and success of bands such as Living Color, 24-7 Spyz, Follow For Now, Fishbone and others. THE ECONOMY: The economy will be the issue of 1992. Already, it's severely affecting the operation of most businesses. Major cutbacks amongst staff and expenditures is commonplace now and will be the norm in 1992. It will also be the issue that could topple George Bush. Locally, we've seen the effects of the recession. Only two or three shows have sold out in the last six months or so. Attendance at clubs and special events are way down.

Free shows and low-dough events will be in in 1992. Cash give aways will be the big thing on air. People just don't have expendable income. We will have to give more to our audience and work harder to keep them. THE FORMAT: The format is in a state of transition. What we did and believed in the 70s and 80s will not work as successfully in the 90s. That's the key guys, it's the 1990s. WAKE UP. The automatics are automatics no longer. We have to wave goodbye to the upper end of our audience who we serviced for years and embrace a new batch of 25-34's who used to be our low end. This will be difficult for many people who aren't creative or original enough to break with the rules of the past and forge ahead into the most exciting time I can remember in radio, the 1990s. THE LABELS: The labels will consolidate. There will be fewer and they will be of little help to radio. Unfortunately, they will continue to operate as usual with a one track mentality with too much emphasis on the charts. They will continue to pound mainstream AOR's on two fronts, chastising us for not being adventurous enough (in their eyes) and yet hounding us to play old established rock acts that they have lots of money vested in, but that the audience doesn't give a shit about anymore. MUSIC: 1992 will see more new up and coming acts played heavily on the radio. At least here in Tampa Bay. Once again, what worked in the past won't necessarily work in the 90s. The trend will be to the left. More crossover alternative and alternative metal will dominate playlists. Hairbands and non acts will ride a rough road in 1902. The successes of lesus longs and Nirvana will break down many of the formidable barriers. and pop acts will ride a rough road in 1992. The successes of Jesus Jones and Nirvana will break down many of the formidable barriers that bands of this ilk have suffered in the past. Programmers will actually have to listen to records again and those that don't will lose and lose badly. PREDICTIONS: 1992 will be a tough year for everybody. But the pendulum swings both ways. Those who have positioned themselves properly in 1992 will reap massive benefits when the pendulum swings back in 1993. Good luck and remember, it's no the 80s anymore. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Magic Johnson...not since the war, or even further back, the '60s assassinations have I been this moved by a person or event. Sorrow, anguish, that feeling of being cheated out of something special overwhelmed not only myself but I think the entire country. However, God could not have picked a better spokesperson for the AIDS problem. Selfishly, as a basketball freak, I will miss the smile, the exuberance and the remarkable ability to play the game, however it's great to know that those same attributed will be used to heighten awareness to one of the biggest problems facing our society today.

Greg Gillispie. Burkhart/Douglas & Associates: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: There are many important issues, but one that



sticks out in my mind is the continuing reliance on trade charts as a success gauge for songs. Songs rocket up the charts at an unbelievable pace, and as soon as they peak, they are outta here -- either to recurrent or Never Never Land. Unfortunately, these charts are so far ahead of the audience's tastes and needs, we are losing the true value of almost every song, or giving false value to songs of lesser importance. We, as an industry, butch about the validity of a report that reflects reported listening, but never about the validity of reported play. The chart mentality is a vicious circle, and is forcing us to eat our young. It's time to stop concerning ourselves with what other stations play, and spend more time getting in touch with the true feelings of our target audience and give them what they want and how they want it. THE

with the true feelings of our target audience and give them what they want and how they want it. THE ECONOMY: The economy may recover by mid year, however, it will never return to the previous levels. It's time to get back to the roots of being smart, creative, entertaining. LMA's will be severely restricted or banned by the FCC and Congress, and those operators that let another control some aspect of their station may lose their station when license renewal time comes. Stations will sell for a fraction of what they did a few years ago, and broadcasters will finally get back into the business of running radio. THE FORMAT: Which format? AOR is so fragmented and under such pressure to perform, many have lost sight of what we're about. You can only stretch the demographic boundaries so far before the middle collapses. If you want to get 25-44's, Classic Rock is the format choice for you; if you want to be "Mainstream AOR", stop trying to get older and younger demos, and realize you are in 18-34 format; if you are trying a fragmentation approach, be as pure as you can, as long as you're in a top 20 market. Otherwise, make your approach as mass appeal as you can, without compromising the core. THE LABELS: Once we get rid of the chart mentality, the labels can spend more time focusing on each station's goals and target audience. They can maximize each project by allowing it to fully grow and mature before focusing on each station's goals and target audience. They can maximize each project by allowing it to fully grow and mature before they cram another song down our throats. The labels can also save radio by using the medium as a marketing tool, and by doing more research on who is consuming each project. This would be far more effective than trying to dazzle the industry with millions of dollars of trade advertising. MUSIC TRENDS: First, radio must realize that a new release by one of its past superstars is not automatically, or maybe even desired by the listener. Secondly, while hard rock sells, gets requests, and tests, it also alienates women and older men, two potential key components of your audience. AOR has always been a balance of mainstream, hard, and modern sounds, and its time for AOR to get back to the basics of a balanced approach. PREDICTIONS: 1992 will unfold much like any other years. all the great product that we struggled to deal with the last several months will suddenly seem passe, and a bunch of new bands will try to find their way onto radio. Once we come to grips with the fact that the audience is still grooving on Ozzy, Guns N' Roses, John Mellencamp, etc., we can get on with the task at hand -- making radio more local, more entertaining, and less cluttered. Fragmentation will continue to be a fact of life, and those that understand how to get the most out of a narrower formatic approach, will stand a better chance of success. I am poised and ready to help anyone on both accounts! It's time to again make this business fun for the LISTENER! PERSON OF THE YEAR: The person of the year is Ted Turner for keeping The Braves in Atlanta through the lean years so we could chop our way to the top in '91! P.S.: Wake up, Ted... Have a great '92!

Doug Ingold, Program Director, KTYD/Santa Barbara: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Technology has got to be one of the



major issues of the year. DAB, LMA's, cable radio, etc. As soon as the dust settles, the main issue is going to remain the same -- change the way we do business. It's my feeling that a locally focused station with an entertaining presentation will keep commercial radio competitive with any new technology. The challenge for Program Directors is to spend as much time on talent development as Selector. THE ECONOMY: The economy has everyone concerned! If stations are working from a strong marketing plan with long term direction, then most operators should be okay. At K-Tide, our sales, programming and promotion goals are all aligned, and I think that's made our 4th and 1st quarters less stressful. THE FORMAT: The format is going to become increasingly niche-oriented. Advertisers target mini-targets within 25-54 cell, and the medium age of the baby boomer is 35. A lot of traditional AOR's are going to have to make a decision whether to mature with the high end of the audience or cultivate a potential gold

within 25-34 cell, and the medium age of the baby boomer is 35. A lot of traditional AOR's are going to have to make a decision whether to mature with the high end of the audience or cultivate a potential gold mine on the low end. As technology advances and the choices increase, the mass appeal approach is going to disappear. THE LABELS: The more labels the merrier. I'm listening to a lot more music. Joy and happiness to all. With all the mergers going on, it's easy to see that the marketplace is dictating who stays at the party. Stand outs for K-Tide this year were R.E.M., Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers and Living Color. The hard/alternative bands are going to do very well in '92. We like Pearl Jam, Soundgarden, Nirvana and My Bloody Valentine. PREDICTIONS: I predict that in '92, Roger Wilko will finally get a morning show, or at least someone will return his phone call.

Harlan Winslow, Music Director, KKDJ/Fresno: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The economy has got to be the issue of the



year. The reality of the economy has not hit our pocketbooks as much at it's hit our heads. It's been threatening to hit us in the head since '72, and everybody's managed to duck it. But now, the otherwise jaded and sheltered majority are starting to get a little taste of it, too. It's also the first time in history that war has not been good business, as it has been in the past. War is out. It's very unfashionable. Since there's only one world power (and that's us), Big Brother becomes the U.S. politician. I wouldn't count America out, yet, though. Time will tell. The bottom line is it's the 7th inning stretch, and the game's not over. Baseball will still be there next year. THE ECONOMY: The economy has forced radio to look at what we've been selling and how we've been selling it. Radio stations are on the air 24 hours a day, but are sold on a 7 or 8 hour period. That's crazy. You've got 24 hours to make money. If you're the only liquor store in town, you don't stay open just on the weekends, you stay open 7 days a week. Managers and sales people need to re-evaluate their tactics and they need to be in touch with what they're selling, and this will hopefully make for better radio down the road. Selling radio on a 24 hour basis will

allow programmers to add records for something other than a free trip to Hawaii. THE FORMAT: The AOR format, as a whole, is in an awakening period right now. We're finding things that were seen as uncool, unhip, narrow-minded, and not going to fly for the last 10 years or so, are now okay for AOR. Suddenly, people are finding out that it's okay to play the Blues or R&B, whether it's old stuff or a new artist. You're playing good music, and that's what AOR was all about in the beginning. It's supposed to be radio for people who like music. Not music that's popular, or hip, or sold a lot of records, or that you got laid to, but radio for people who like music. Stations that venture out and play good music will not only get great response, but they'll find that the listeners are coming back. We're starting to wake up to that reality. We're becoming aware of the people. AOR is alive and well. THE LABELS: The labels have created this monster. And they continue to feed it and nurture it along. Instead of teaching it, they've done just the opposite. They've let it go crazy. Now, the monster is going to bite them all in the butt. Some are going to lose a piece of their butt, and others are going to lose their wallets. They can't drop the ball on a record just because they didn't get the amount of adds they wanted in the first week. If they don't support their product, they can't expect us to support their product. When labels don't commit to a record, they not only do themselves a disservice, they do radio and their listeners and the buying public a disservice. MUSIC/PREDICTIONS: I see lots of doors opening in '92. The question is will programmers be smart enough and/or have enough guts to walk through the doors. I frankly haven't seen that many bands come along that I can see doing much of anything the 2nd or 3rd time around. What hits home for me and works on the radio for us are generally the bands that a lot of people wrote off. Little Feat is a perfect example of that. Little Feat, essentially, ceased to exist for radio for the past 9 or 10 years. But they never went away, and neither did their fans, even though they weren't on the charts. Charting has nothing to do with ratings, anyway. Bands like Little Feat and Eric Johnson and Steve Ray Vaughan-type bands that are making heritage music, without being heritage artists -these are the people making great music, regardless of what the rest of the world does. So many really good bands out right now are generally making one or two track records. They're brilliant tracks, but when you listen to the rest of the album, it doesn't even sound like the same band. If I had to pick one band that genuinely motivates me, a new band with a lot of substance and a lot of promise, I'd say it's the Eric Gales Band. They exhibit everything that's wonderful about rock and roll. No makeup. No leather. No smoke. No hairspray. No cute outfits. Just great music. Even the morning show likes it, and they don't like anything. PERSON OF THE YEAR: The person of the year is probably Ollie North because he continues to run around and rub the governments nose in the dog dirt that they've been spreading around for years. He stood up and took what was given to him like a man, like a true American, and then he went out and wrote a book and made lots of money... I think we also need a Mental Midget Award of the Year, and it would have to go to David Duke. He fooled 39% of the people, and that's pretty scary.

Chris James, Music Director, WTPA/Harrisburg: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The most important industry issue of the year



is tied to just about every other issue of the year...the economy. The fact that there were what -- 50 more labels than before, each with at least two records, made a major glut in the industry. There were so many good records, and a lot of so-so records out there, and more folks trying to get them played. The life of a lot of records suffered for it. Once again, the greed factor took control. Granted, there were a lot more records to choose from, but it was only a matter of time that things caught up. Plus, the fact there were not a lot of great releases helped fuel the demise. The audience decided not to plop money down on mediocre product. I just hope in these days of skyrocketing signings, that we don't suffer even more. THE ECONOMY: As far the economy in our market, it hasn't been as brutal as it has been in other areas. Things seemed to have stabilized somewhat. In fact, the station is going to see its best year of billing yet, and we continue to be sold out in some days. One area that was affected by the economy was ticket sales. Let's just say Sting had to cancel. Granted, it's not like booking The Police, but it should have done a lot better. When listeners need to spend anywhere from \$12 to \$20 on a CD, they're going to draw the line

when it comes to shows. THE FORMAT: The format had a banner year. I think much of that can be attributed to the "fucking up" of CHR. Adults are being rapped to death, and have found AOR to be the new comfort zone to listen to. As long as stations continue to evolve with the times, the sky is the limit, as far as AOR goes. The mainstream AOR could be the predominant station in any market. The 25-34 and the 25-44 Adults came from the mid-'70s to mid-'80s now, so the Classic Rock is beginning to burn. And the AOR that has been keeping hip all along will be the recipient of the big payoffs. THE LABELS: Being a music person, I was glad to see so many labels at first, because there would be more bands to pick from and more good bands would get noticed. But what happened was there were no new slots opening on stations, so you had to pick and choose, and play what was best for your station. Granted, there were a few new bands that broke through, but unless there are labels with enough cash to weather the storm and be there for the long haul...you will see attrition. MUSIC: As far as music for the year, Queensryche is probably the biggest winner. Although Guns N' Roses had a great year, the Queensryche CD was a career CD for them. Marc Cohn was a pleasant surprise for the year. As we go into the new year, the hottest thing going is the Nirvana record. I think it's this type of record that will help influence the sound of '92. PREDICTIONS: The Redskins will win the Super Bowl. The Cubs will win the World Series. Liz Taylor and Prince Charles will be divorced. Liz Taylor will marry Jimmy Swaggart. WTPA will remain the #1 Adult station in the market. AOR will continue to grow. Radio will be more popular than cable? PERSON OF THE YEAR: Dan Quayle was my first choice for person of the year, followed by David Duke. Then, it was George Bush's travel agent. But the real person of the year -- Saddam Hussein. Let's fact it, his name was on everyone's mind.

Beth Kepple, Music Director, WKLS/Atlanta: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year is censorship. What the fuck



happened to the First Amendment? Was it just a hallucination? THE ÉCONOMY: The economy sucks. I'm lucky I have a job and get free concert tickets and CDs. THE FORMAT: The AOR format -- it's still only rock & roll, and I like it. THE LABELS: I think we need MORE labels, so I can piss off even MORE people every week by not adding their records because there's no MORE room than there used to be for currents on our AOR playlist. MUSIC: I have seen the future of rock n' roll, and it's name is Dread Zeppelin. PREDICTIONS: In '92, the Braves will win the World Series, and I'll get fired for the first time in my broadcasting career -- I'm overdue. PERSON OF THE YEAR: The person of the year is Michael Hughes, the best Program Director and boss in the world.





Tim Parker, Program Director, KNCN/Corpus Christi: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: AIDS is the biggest social issue of the year. Hopefully, we will finally find a cure -- now that people will spend money on it. THE ECONOMY: Hard times are going to continue, especially in secondary markets. We've taken our biggest hit in the areas of national and regional sales. We just don't get the buys anymore, and it ain't 'cause of the numbers! Our local market is fine. Revenues will probably be flat, which will make it tough to ask for a budget increase, but I will. This is one of the most competitive secondary markets in the country, with 25 signals in an area populated by about 300 000 people. It's brutall. But we're going to have to spend 25 signals in an area populated by about 300,000 people. It's brutal! But we're going to have to spend money to stay even (competitively). THE FORMAT: AOR is healthy. It will continue to fragment, but that's good. The old days of being the single AOR in the market are gone. But that's okay too, because things really got boring when that happened. THE LABELS: Some good people are going to lose their jobs and I won't get taken to dinner as much. But I think we'll be okay in spite of the circumstances.

MUSIC: Bands who have been around forever will no longer be automatics. The bands of the 90's will be: Nirvana, Pearl Jam and King's X. PREDICTIONS: I predict that if stations like KNCN, The Blaze and WXTB continue to thrive, you're going to see stations like them in Dallas, New York and Philadelphia -- the current radio wastelands of rock and roll -- (where you hear B-O-R-I-N-G, nothing but classics). PERSON OF THE YEAR: Who else? Marko

Babineau.

Lenny Bronstein, Charisma Records: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue is that there are so many issues plaguing us today.



When Reagan & Bush asked us if we're really better off today than we were before, little did anyone know the sheer emasculation process we'd have to survive. There are so few of those "Points of Light" we were bamboozled into searching for. Bush keeps saying the recession we never really had is over. Roll over, smoke a cigarette and ask, "Was it good for you too?" - while you watch a homeless person park the shopping cart next to your car or on your lawn. Ask the millions of AIDS victims what is really being done to help them. Ask what we really won in Saudi Arabia & Iraq. Ask why we're pouring tons of money into every despotic regime in the world while millions are destined in every town in our country. Ask how someone like David Duke can get so far in our system. Ask our Education President how we Ask now someone like David Duke can get so far in our system. Ask our Education Frestdent flow we lost control of our younger generation, and can't walk the streets in urban centers or small town America without fearing gangs & drive-by shootings. Ask how someone can abdicate his franchise to vote, and then bitch about the government screwing him - you get what you don't vote for. If you still think it doesn't hit you, look at all the LMA's in 1991. Look at all the stations that changed format, went dark or went to satellite. Look at all your friends out of work because they couldn't justify their position. Look at the extra hours and jobs

everyone has to do to make up the slack. Look at how much more expensive everything is and, worse yet, how much more inexpensive it seems. When two scoop ice cream cones were 25 cents as a kid and they're \$4.00 now, or movies cost up to \$7.50 with 5-10 cents worth of popcorn costing \$4.00 & soda at \$2.75, how often can a family escape their pressure-filled life?... In the smaller scheme, our record/radio relationships pale by comparison, but it's all intertwined. The decade of Reaganomics and incessant greed was finally discovered by our industry with the "Deal of the Century" approach to music selection. Besides being illegal and immoral, it's foolhardy. Record companies are not bottomless money-pits; they're your partners in culture and entertainment. Don't strangle this gold-plated goose. Get back to the real reason those of us who still care barged our way into this business. The music, the artists, the exhilarating experience, the passion! THE ECONOMY: You already know your own shortcomings when you walk into a store, even on payday. Sober up! Name one recent improvement in your life fiscally, other than a meager pay raise or new job. You're the exception. You can't even put enough away to save for a rainy day. The stations that tap into helping their listeners with tangible promotions, not trips to "Monsters of Rock" will strike the necessary chord. There is no room for greed. Stations that interact with promotions, not trips to "Monsters of Rock" will strike the necessary chord. There is no room for greed. Stations that interact with their audiences, whether with editorials, direct participation or mobilization on issues, who address their day-to-day priorities, will win their hearts and time spent listening. It's a more serious and somber American tuning in...Is there anyone in any corner of the U.S. not pissed off about R&R establishing criteria for reporting Honest & Meaningful airplay? Well, 25% current is pretty pathetic, but the majority of stations still conspire to circumvent that paltry amount with a national average hovering at 21% at best. With the glut of superstars the format was blessed/cursed with this Autumn, one objective observer might expect the format to bend, expand and emphasize the cream of the crop, instead of further burying new artists in favor of "automatics", no matter how impotent or unexciting they may be. As we fragment more, we retrench more. We refuse to regenerate our format; to embrace and include the new converts and younger listeners who shortly become our core. No matter how many times a fact is showcased and proven, close-minded programmers fight the truth. It's worrisome that so many rap records can sell in such mega-numbers because it reaches close-minded programmers fight the truth. It's worrisome that so many rap records can sell in such mega-numbers because it reaches an active, disenfranchised audience. Rock records struggle to sell, tours are overpriced and fail miserably. The few breakthroughs are often written off as flukes. It may not be your job to sell records, but if they don't buy the 85% of your station that's entertainment-why should they "buy" your commercials? It's up to you to create excitement for your station via your jocks, promotions and music. Become a foreground AOR beyond your morning show. THE LABELS: Most of my predictions two years ago have materialized, but this supposed non-existent recession is truly endangering our industry and livelihood. We saw our first shakeout recently and it won't be the only one. Companies will have to get mean and lean at the expense of many excesses we consider normal recently and it won't be the only one. Companies will have to get mean and lean at the expense of many excesses we consider normal procedure. "Value for dollars spent" will be the phrase that pays. There are more rookies on both the radio and record sides that must learn weekly and be tolerated by the veterans. But where else can you develop on the job with so many mentors? There are many healthy, clever, fresh new ideas and ways of looking at things. Both sides need to lay out ground rules and stick to them. Both sides need to conduct business with mutual respect and disciplined practices. Courtesies and follow-through beget mutual success THE FORMAT: Fragmentation of the industry will be more pronounced along the lines of age, volume, lineage and the realities of the market and its economies. We will see album rock polarize as the audience ages and continues to be underserved, while their progeny enter the age of wondering and begin to reject their parents' music. There is a vibrant new music scene most rock radio continues to deny and avoid. They need to burst out and have an outlet. Instead of the great dream becoming the mass appeal Top 40 format for aging rockers, it becomes the Classic Rock "music of your life". Interestingly enough, as predicted, blues works! It sells! It reacts! It even tests! And it draws those coveted upper demos, even women in some cases. But radio says it can't play more than one or two. If someone offers you 2 or 3 extra .300/40 home run hitters, would you turn them down because you already have a clean-up hitter? Get real! Quotas on hits are asinine. The hard rock bands with a seemingly alternative edge are the vogue now because they inject fresh twists on what we already know. The most obvious format craves respect while wanting to live on its yellowed clippings. The audience wants some thrills. Don't discount the need for touring, especially since MTV, which has replaced the live experience for most of your listeners, is not embracing and exposing rock. Make rock a bigger slice of your audience's pie and they'll need a fix of your signal PREDICTIONS: Political upheaval of the parties as we know it. Incumbency may be a joke in the eyes of the frustrated and politically uninitiated. The wrong messages are being sent for our future and our values by the conservative court and governmental intrusion on one hand, while few wish to confront controversial subjects that are political suicide. Citizens are not voting by party lines, they're voting for the greatest demagogues pushing their hot buttons. The country's good is overshadowed by the individual's instant gratification and need to overcome personal misfortune. Within our industry, as long as so many CHR's collapse under the irrelevance of their music selection, rock must take up the slack and re-invent the musical wheel. It is an optimum progeny enter the age of wondering and begin to reject their parents' music. There is a vibrant new music scene most rock radio collapse under the irrelevance of their music selection, rock must take up the slack and re-invent the musical wheel. It is an optimum time to invite rockers to return to the fold and create a climate for new listeners to discover "their" music for the first time. PERSON OF THE YEAR: If this was Time Magazine, the person who impacted the world most in 1991 was either Saddam Hussein or Boris Yeltsen. If it was on a personal level, Bill Graham's death left an enormous void in my life. In sports, Magic and Michael dominate everyone's thoughts and emotions. If it's limited to our industry, the single most influential individual is one of two organizations: MTV or Soundscan. Both have changed the way we relate to success in our business. I can think of no single artist, label or radio individual who singularly changed what we do or feel.

John Knapp, Music Director, WIYY/Baltimore: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year has got to be the economy.



As far as radio goes, the next 6 or 7 months are going to be hell for the stations that were involved in leveraged buy-outs in the 80's; those carrying a great debt load. They are going to experience some real problems. It's hard to imagine, but radio is going to become more bottom-line than ever. We are going to have to come up with more creative ways to market our product. I see next year as the "year of the creative marketer." THE ECONOMY: 1991 was a good year. More and more AOR's re-invested in their 18-34 audience. Consequently, 1991 saw a few more stations looking for new music that could rock and fit with their library material. We had more stations experimenting with the traditional classic-current ratio, and that's great!. THE LABELS: The record industry will continue to consolidate, with the progreat of a chelr first great? with the prospect of a shaky first quarter. I hope all my record promotion friends stay put because I see a lot less promo jobs in 1992. Maybe we will see a return to some of the old promo days, where the local

person is really involved in retail and marketing. Maybe this time around, they'll save some costs. It will be interesting, with so many labels joining ranks. MUSIC: I see more acceptance of variety, as a trend in 1992. The continuing maturity of the MTV generation means a broader base of consumers who are not as value conscious. The group of people who grew up accepting MTV-type programming make up the low end of the 18-34 demo. They don't say "I'm a Classic Rock listener" or "I'm a Top 40 Listener" anymore. They listen to what they like, and tend not to make generalizations. The maturity of that generation will propose some quandaries to the Classic approach. PREDICTIONS: Predictions? Crowded House will go back to being three piece and Global warming will force me North!. PERSON OF THE YEAR: I'm a big fan of Cliff Bernstein. I think he's the dude of the year. He has an understanding of the "street level" mentality a lot of people lack. He's done a great job with Queensryche.

Neal Mirsky, Program Director, WDIZ/Orlando: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The two big issues of the year are LMA's and



sexual harassment. LMA's are eliminating competition in certain markets. It seems to like it's becoming, "If you can't beat 'em buy 'em." The FCC is just now taking a good hard look at the whole situation. LMA's are so new, there are no rules. It's one thing to sell, but to eliminate competition by governing the programming and other aspects of a station -- that's where it gets tricky. The sexual harassment issue is certainly not unique to our industry. We have to take a longer look at how we conduct ourselves around other employees. Our work places tend to be more casual and less regimented than say, a stock brokerage house. It's easy for those of us in this business to lose sight of the boundaries where we begin to infringe on someone else's rights. On a personal level, the issues that have recently come to light have certainly made me more conscious of things; like the language I use around female employees. I have gone to the ladies in my office and said, "Hey, I guess I use salty language once in a while and I apologize if I have ever offended you." I've also made a conscious effort to find out if to bothers them, and I have the courtesy to say, "Let me know." I hope I am setting an example for the rest of the men in the work-place. THE

ECONOMY: For a while, we were seeing the economy affect businesses around us, now it is trickling down. It affects car buying, then auto dealers cut back on spot buys. The recession just requires more resourcefulness. Accept reality and deal with it. It isn't going to be as good as last year, but it doesn't have to be bad if you're smart about it. A couple of rock clubs in central Florida have closed. Now, there are fewer venues and more competition for gigs. A lot of bands just can't support themselves anymore. They can't pay the rent, you know? They're breaking up before they get a real chance. I think that's a shame, and it's all cyclical. In the long term, it really affects the new music scene. Another situation that is happening out there, too, is that people are not buying as much product. The validity of sales figures is being questioned, and I think they have to be. The top 5 may be gang, but the rest are separated by just a few points. I see more desperation on the part of record companies. THE FORMAT: I expect continued fragmentation with the format. The days of one guy, alone, with double figures, is gone. In rock you have Classic, Soft, Upper Demo, Lower demo; Programmers are concentrating more on a focused group of listeners. Make them happy, keep them loyal, treat them right. The AOR format, itself, is healthy. The format with fragmentation is okay, pick your slice of the pie and super serve your segment of the audience. If you try to be all things to all people, you'll be nothing to anybody. AOR market shares seem to be doing fine, there are just more people cutting them up. With CHR so dance and rap-oriented, AOR has become more attractive to former CHR listeners. THE LABELS: The labels are going to have to become leather machines. Every kid in the mailroom had satin jackets in the old days. Those days are gone. There is not enough money for that kind of fluff now. I see it happening on both sides of the fence. A year ago, off-air MD's were common. Where's Erin Riley now? Trimmin' the fat is how I see things now. I think the worst is still ahead. But it will eventually get better. PREDICTIONS: I predict that in 1992, we will see at least two more Program Director changes across the street. PERSON OF THE YEAR: The Noisemaker of the Year is Bill Graham. He always did the right things for the right reasons. He never stopped giving back to the community. He did more than put his money where his mouth was. He for the right reasons. He was the most unselfish person I'd ever met. The music industry and the world are a much better place for his having been here.

David Fleischman. MCA Records: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The economic welfare and overall make-up of our industry.



There are a litany of problems, each one debatable for days on end, that we, as an industry, have to address. The first result is happening as you and I are talking -- layoffs, etc. THE ECONOMY: The economy is obviously not healthy. People with small amounts of disposable income are not buying as many records as they use to. Some are not able to buy records at all. People that have disposable income are concerned about the future, playing it close to the vest. They're simply not spending in many cases. As usual, for the wealthy, it doesn't make any difference. THE FORMAT: There is a tendency to be cynical and negative about the state of AOR. I am basically a positive person, and even though AOR radio, in general, and the majority of businesses, are completely crazy and unpredictable, I feel it will all work itself out for the best. I wish I had a more specific answer, because if I did, I would ask to be let out of my contract, open my own business, tell everybody else what to do, and make a billion dollars, give or take a few bucks. THE LABELS: It's great that with our system of government, everyone has an opportunity to take advantage of our free enterprise system. However, it seems that in the record industry

over the past few years, so many people have chosen to enter the industry, that the end result is there is more than the system can deal with. MUSIC: A lot of good music this year, I'm not so sure there has been a lot of great music. And only time will tell which music in 1991 turns out to stand the test of time. As long as there are young people with musical instruments, there will always be something new to come along. It's getting tougher and tougher for new artists to get their music exposed and be in a position to be liked or disliked, accepted or unaccepted (smash or trashed if you will). PERSON OF THE YEAR: Unfortunately, David Duke.



Jim Pemberton, Program Director, WRIF/Detroit: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Too many labels too many records, not enough room on playlists -- that's the big issue. THE ECONOMY: I think it will probably turn around by mid year. Just a guess. I don't think things will get much worse, though. Record label consolidation is almost like LMA's in a way -- to keep from going under, a larger company comes in and tries to salvage what's there and make it survive. Record sales haven't gone down a whole hell of a lot. I think it's just the overabundance of product, more than a soft economy. THE FORMAT: The format will probably continue to evolve, as far as musical tastes, wants, and needs from the listener, but I think the audience for AOR is growing older, and the younger demos are shrinking, so that could change a little bit of the direction of AOR in specific markets.



John Lassman, Music Director, KQRS/Minneapolis: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The Clarence Thomas hearings with their



impact on the industry as a whole, and the current ramifications coming from the L.A. Times. Also, the consolidation of labels and LMA's in the radio industry. THE ECONOMY: Radio stations will have to get down in the trenches and fight for every nickel they can get. Even mainstays in the marketplace are finding it difficult to get their usual buys. THE FORMAT: AOR continues to be stable, and in most finding it difficult to get their usual buys. THE FORMAT: AOR continues to be stable, and in most cases, is not simply "a jukebox". There are still a lot of creative things going on in AOR. THE LABELS: The labels are learning who to call for what project and when. They're also learning (de-listed or not), the importance of every station in a particular market. Education of the format goes a long way when you're promoting priorities. In the past twelve months, we've had better ratings than we did when we were a reporter. The de-listing of KQRS has not affected us in any way, although in a smaller market with time buy promotions etc, it may have a larger effect. MUSIC: More than ever the format of AOR is breaking into specialty segments, and finding its niche wherever possible. The recent past has proven to be successful for new projects by Dire Straits, Bonnie Raitt, Bob Seger, Tom Petty, Van Halen etc. on KQRS. That's our "niche". PERSON OF THE YEAR: Boris Yeltsen or Marko.

Dale Miller, Program Director, KATP/Amarillo: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: AIDS, due to the report of Magic Johnson,



and now, Freddy Mercury. There is a need for more public awareness on the HIV virus. It's really starting to hit home. THE ECONOMY: The economy is awful. The country is in a recession. Our market is not as bad as some parts of the country, but we are feeling the crunch. It is affecting our sales department the most, and it's obviously affecting the industry in general on a national level. As far as day to day programming, if people don't spend money, there isn't enough to go around, and someone has to gut back. The money has to go around someone has to cut back. The money has to come from somewhere, so we have to find it. In Dallas, for example, for the first time, stations that program Rock are allowing Country advertising on their stations. They're advertising Country bands in local bars and venues, and even Country concerts. THE FORMAT: AOR is very healthy. It's a growing format again. Rap and dance are turning the audience back to AOR. The rock audience just seems to keep growing and maturing with the format, with the success of recent artists like Extreme and Nirvana. The audience is maturing and appreciating a wider variety of music. THE

LABELS: Too many! The effect is being shown. Due to the economy, some of these labels are in trouble and people are losing their jobs. That's the downside. The upside? A tremendous amount of music to choose from. MUSIC: Classic Rock is becoming more and more popular due to the growth of the rock audience. Children grow up; they heard it with their parents, they strayed away, and now they're back. They are not afraid to widen their musical knowledge. PREDICTIONS: I see the music industry making a comeback. We're coming out of our slump as these baby bands mature into superstar status. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Anita Hill, general Pee Wee Herman.

Dale Kelly, Program Manager, KRZQ/Reno: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Obviously, sexual harassment in the work-place.

Al Hofer, Music Director, KSHE/St. Louis: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Over-promotion is the issue of the year. That's where

Although we are meeting budget, it's getting increasingly difficult to make ends meet. People are looking for more value for their dollar. THE LABELS: A lot of great music is falling through the cracks. If it's not a priority to the label, the band is dead. I think they're killing us with quantity, not quality. THE FORMAT: AOR is becoming a male only format. The way we're programming, we're really looking for men. The women are just along for the ride. I do, however, think the format is healthy. There is a lot to choose from. PREDICTIONS: I predict record companies are going to start making new bands more of a priority. We should see new tracks from new artists being released more often, rather than that fourth Bob Seger cut. PERSON OF THE YEAR: I have no idea...Marko Babineau?

Dave Einstein, Mercury Records: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The biggest issue of the year would have to be the breakup of the

MUSIC TRENDS: As far as trends in music and radio, the downturned economy will mean less national advertising, and stations will have more of a regional and local outlook, and that's positive. With less Budweiser dollars out there, it's going to force local radio to get out and meet their audience on the street... and that's good. The immediacy of radio and the fact that it's live age. has always been the advantage. Radio should react to the local community more and more. I think a smart record label in the '90s will look to as many different forms of marketing as possible in order to maximize its effectiveness. PREDICTIONS: You can't play the same 700 songs over and over again, so Classic Rock stations will have to think of a way to keep it fresh and exciting, especially with the advent of male-based A/C, which cut into Classic Rock station audiences, as well. Radio programmers are going to need to look to niche a little bit more. And you might see a station begin to lean to an Alternative or Harder Book direction depending on the market with more focus on 18 34. PERSON OF THE VEAR. Pam Brooks, Music Director, WHCN/Hartford: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: For me, the biggest issue of the year would have

THE FORMAT: Radio needs to focus more on the qualitative sell and, in addition to numbers, cultivate loyal active listeners that buy products and services. The record industry must sign acts selectively and work each one individually and vigorously. There seems to be a new wave of harder-edged, fresh-sounding, risk-taking, yet successful rock stations -- WWBZ, WXTB, WIYY. And as I hope that will continue, it would also be great to see a more fresh and exciting approach targeted to the underserviced, musically-starved adult listener, a la KBCO, WBCN, KTCZ, WXRT, WKLS. THE LABELS: Consolidation will essentially scale back the record industry to the way it was prior to the massive expansion of the late '80s. The casualties will include both established and newer companies.

Carter Alan, Music Director, WBCN/Boston: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The recession in the music industry. It is the mother of all other pressures... THE ECONOMY: The economy is so bad that music is becoming an unaffordable luxury for most consumers. It results in an intense survival of the fittest battlE, which hits new artists especially hard. THE FORMAT: The format has come a long way. It has split into a Classic artist/Classic Rock axis; a Hard Rock/younger demo axis; and to a lesser extent, Alternative. 'BCN gravitates to Alternative, Classic and hard hundred unusable. The format is fragmenting. It's going to be harder to program and for stations to keep their share of the pie. THE LABELS: We've seen expansion of the labels at the worst possible time. We're already seeing consolidation. These days, I will only get 40 calls instead of 60. MUSIC: Rock progress is flat. There are plenty of interesting, excellent new bands, but it's difficult to get above the new artist level. PREDICTIONS: Next year will continue to mirror '91 musically. The industry's impact will be as bad or worse. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Axl Rose (but did he really say anything?). Rose (but did he really say anything?).

Gene Romano, Program Director/OM, WDVE/Pittsburgh: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The industry issue of the year is



the LMA's and what they're doing to the competitive climate in many markets. I question whether they'll even exist one year from now -- and if so, under what conditions. THE ECONOMY: With fewer advertising dollars around, clients are obviously going to look for more value and that's a real challenge promotionally. They'll want even more from your radio station, and we have to deliver without compromising the station. In terms of the music industry, 1992 will be the first year that bands start compromising the station. In terms of the music industry, 1992 will be the first year that bands start lowering their rates. Too many are overpriced, and management and agencies are going to have to stop holding local promoters up for unreasonable amounts of money. When you've got acts like Stevie Nicks thinking they can sell out a twelve thousand seat hall for twenty bucks a ticket, it's time for a reality check. THE FORMAT: The demographic split will continue to accelerate for those heritage AOR's, depending on the ownership situation and the marketplace. The longer lower end stations are around, the better their 25 + share. Every month that passes, more 24-year old guys with bad haircuts will have birthdays, and it won't be long before we see that having a serious impact on the 25-34 sell. s that's happening, heritage stations are going to have to get much more concerned about the rate their library material is getting tired sounding. They're going to have to inject a hipper edge to their radio stations. With more older listeners developing an appetite for new music, they're going to have to satisfy that appetite and play more new music. THE LABELS: More labels means a better selection, and that's fine with me. I'm forced to spend more time listening, but I don't mind that because it increases the odds of finding good product to play. PREDICTIONS: If there is any economic growth next year -- especially in terms of retail sales -- it will be minuscule.

J.B. Brenner, (Chuck Bliziotis & Mark Tindle) A&M Records: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The Swimsuit issue is, by far, the issue of the year. THE ECONOMY: The economy is in need of some hands on TLC. VHS is the obvious winner, but we like Beta better. THE LABELS: The Labels are not to be removed under penalty]y of law, and always look for the Union label. MUSIC TRENDS: Looks like this rap thing is starting to catch on. PREDICTIONS: We predict that Peter Paterno will be going to Mackenzie, Brackman and Associates. Also, look for Soundgarden to EXPLODE in 1992.



Dana Jang, Program Director, KSJO/San Jose: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Too Much! -- too many labels, too many trades,



too many independents, too many phone calls, too much debt service, too many releases -- Too much excess. THE ECONOMY: In the recessionary times, consumers have become more cautious in their purchases. Exposure to music has become more restricted, as they are not as adventurous in buying new music or buying tickets to see music live. Marketing is playing a wider role in getting this "cautious" population aware of new music, as well as radio stations. The challenge is making music desirable to the "baby boomers" who have disposable income. If new music continues to be "unfriendly" to this influential population cell, we will see a greater amount of stations playing older material. THE FORMAT: AOR's past, present and future will continue to be one of fragmentation. In the past, we have seen "soft rock" permutations of AOR, as well as the hard rock "modal" approach. During the present, we have seen the split of AOR to Classic rock, much like what Oldies was to CHR during the '60s. In recent years, we have seen the niche of Modern Rock, the Male A/C of mellow rock, as well as the reemergence of 18-24

Male dominant hard rocking stations. The future will continue to see various derivative forms of AOR, as well as the evolution of the format taking account of the aging "baby boomer." THE LABELS: Line extension could prove to be a costly error for the labels. Creating another line should be to go after another niche, rather than competing with yourself and diluting your staff of some of the best people to work at a sister label. Rather than being like GM and creating Buick, Oldsmobile, etc., use the Japanese example of creating Acura to go with Honda, or Lexus to go with Toyota. Start a jazz label or alternative label, rather than another rock label. I think the trend has already started, and more consolidation will occur in 1992. MUSIC: 1991 gave us evidence that the guitar hero is still important to the AOR audience, with the success of Eric Johnson, Gary Moore, and the late Stevie Ray Vaughan. The influence of alternative radio was felt with the airplay success of Jesus Jones and School of Fish. The younger appeal bands, Firehouse and Steelheart, had impressive debuts. The bands who stood out in 1991 were the Black Crowes, Extreme and Alice In Chains, among the newer bands, and Queensryche, Guns N' Roses, Scorpions, Van Halen, Metallica and R.E.M., among the older bands. In 1992, Guns N' Roses should continue, as well as U2 and Genesis. PREDICTIONS: We'll see continued "shake-out" in all industries - speculators from radio, consolidation of labels, mergers in other industries. There will be a slow growth back into the American economy with consumers slowly gaining confidence. Cable will continue to have a greater impact with the division of MTV and more specialized channels being developed. Personalities will make its way back into AOR. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Magic Johnson.


Dave Oakley, Music Director, WZNS/Dillon: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: I will take an eclectic approach to this. I think the



dominating issue in the business is the ultra-conservative stance so many of the powers-that-be take. I hope to see a resurgence in "mavericks". I feel that so many in this business forget that *Entertainment* is the first word in Entertainment Business. Let the artists re-take control of the canvas. Racer-innovator Mickey Thompson said something to the effect of, "...By imitating someone, the best you can do is equal their success." THE ECONOMY: While I am no economist, I believe that the current situation will be around for awhile. With the tight spending, some real promotion people will make a career. These are the times that really test a staff's creativity to hustle a buck and put or keep a station in the listener's minds. The mass appeal functions where the listeners pull off the promotion are the ones to shoot for. The "What would you do for (enter nominal prize here)," and just hang the banner and do a live shot, and your stations is perceived as doing something for the listener. Total expense is nil, yet your station is active and in the forefront. Remember, Radio is the Theater of the Mind. THE FORMAT: I am

fairly new to AOR. We here at Z-93 are trying something new with a high energy/CHR delivery. Every AOR has "Stairway", so what we concentrate on is between the songs. We do phoners over intros, contesting, cards, bits, and all the other slammin' and jammin' elements of in-your-face radio. We feel that with the best 25-49 rock and roll and the high profile delivery, that we will be tough to beat. THE LABELS: The outcome of all of the recent consolidations has yet to be seen. I hope that there will remain enough diversity among artists, songs, service from the representatives and promotional tools. I truly believe in the open marketplace of ideas and products. Competition is not only good, but necessary. MUSIC: I think music will only improve. I hope there is a wide variety of real infectious songs from different artists on different labels. Homogeny is not only boring, but dangerous. This year is wrapping up with some real "Future Classics" from old and new acts. YES!!! PREDICTIONS: I predict that Z-93 ruins the Southeast for all other radio stations. PERSON OF THE YEAR: How about People of the Year? I would like to nominate all the label representatives who have jumped on our bandwagon and taken us seriously. Thanks also to The Hard Report and Bobby Poe Junior for giving us space every week.

Brad Copeland, Music Director, KATT/Oklahoma City: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: I would have to say the biggest thing



that happened was the breakup of the Soviet Union. Who would have thought it could have happened 15 years ago? To see those things actually happen was incredible. THE ECONOMY: The economy here in Oklahoma has been down since the drop off of the oil industry in the mid-'80s. While it's been a problem here, the fact that it's impacted the industry has been significant. Everyone in general has less money. And this chain reaction that has happened has caused problems for everyone from the labels to radio. THE LABELS: The label shakeup will continue. The people that are going to survive are the one's who have been smart. It's the labels that came in and spent tons of money on mediocre product that are gonna have a real hard time. Take, for instance, a label like Capricorn. Rather than hiring an entire field staff, they just hired the executives. That's smart. Until you have enough product to warrant somebody being out there in each market, it doesn't make sense to pay fifteen people to be in the field. Why pay a field staff to work one record? It's crazy, man. And it will probably get worse before it gets

better. I think we'll see more of these consolidations going on before the smoke clears. MUSIC: Musically, it's been a great year. It's not been the most lucrative year for new talent, though. There's just no room on our playlists to get a lot of these bands in. That may change since so many of the heritage bands came out with records this year, there may be room for the new artists next year. The bands that are going to survive are bands like The Black Crowes. A lot of the best stories this year have been from bands that have returned to the roots of the format, like Metallica and Queensryche. Chris Whitley, Vinnie James and some of the more acoustic-based artists worked better than the hair bands this year. PERSON OF THE YEAR: The first person that comes to my mind is David Duke. As Bill Cosby said, he succeeded in getting more people to vote than anybody in recent history has been able to do. But I don't think he's the type of guy who will give up. He will be around in '92. It's hard to believe he's been able to get as far as he has.

Jay Sisson, Music Director, WIXY/Savannah: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year was the launching of a batch



of new labels at the same time that the economy that would have supported them went down the toilet. THE ECONOMY: It used to be chic to sip champagne in your condo, before jumping into your BMW to yap on your car phone as you zip down the highway. But in the age of homelessness and recession, it now all seems a little grotesque. In the record industry realm, this has translated into less fat-catting around on the part of the labels. From the personal standpoint of my station, the economic hit as been fairly minimal. But our CHR competition just filed for Chapter 11 reorganization. We're pretty broken up over that. THE FORMAT: The state of the format is pretty apparent: a scramble for a niche, be it mainstream AOR, hard-edged AOR, or Classic rock. What individual stations should do depends on the individual market. It may seem blasphemous, but I really think Classic Rock has the potential to be an interesting format, if done right. THE LABELS: There are way too many labels, but the process of natural selection is apparently taking care of that. And I don't just see consolidation on the horizon --I've got it in my crosshairs right now! MUSIC: The biggest trend will be a move away from poofed-up,

hairspray metal bands, and a move towards honesty within the genre. We will also see more Alternative bands realizing that small concessions toward commercialization aren't such a band thing. The Kentucky Headhunters, Drivin' N' Cryin', Firehouse, Queensryche, Extreme, The Rembrandts, King's X, Eric Johnson, Alice In Chains, The Four Horsemen and Widespread Panic will all have a great '92. PREDICTIONS: Just as the Soviet Union has had to readjust after years of boneheadedness, so will America have to come back down to earth and realize that if something seems too good to be true, it probably is. The good news is that our readjustment will be much less painful than Russia's. PERSON OF THE YEAR: For person of the year, within the AOR format, I give Russ Mottla a lot of credit for showing how a heritage station can have new life breathed into it. Greg Mull and his managerial backers also deserve a nod for illustrating how to enter a market and give the heritage station a run for their money.



Wayne Watkins, Music Director, WCKW/New Orleans: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year is the Local Marketing Agreements. LMA's popped on the scene surprising many, especially in this market, with WEZB/WMXZ, and WLMG/KNOK, and another one a close possibility. LMA's are a direct result of the depressed economy (especially in New Orleans and Louisiana), plus with the rush to upgrade FM signals, moving and raising towers, there are now too many signals competing in the metro to get a share of the pie. Only the strong survive. Let's hop[e things turn around in '92. Coming in a close second for issue of the year is the fact that there are a large number of boneheads still pushing for music censorship legislation, including that freshly defeated David Duke here in La. Look out...he's got his eyes on the White House. THE ECONOMY: The economy sucks. In general, the rest of the country is catching up (or should I say catching down) with the depressed economy of Louisiana. And yes, now we can be so optimistic since Mr. Bush will not give a tax break to the middle class! Stations and record labels are

feeling the crunch, cutting back, laying off. Concert promoters are being very selective on the acts they book...ruling out the questionables. Stations are lucky if their sales are steady. You can see this with the LMA's. It's going to be interesting to see the FCC/Congress pending regulation. THE FORMAT: The format is still very fragmented. New Rock/early adders; Mainstreamers/50-50 types; Classic Rockers. Things haven't really changed, and I don't see much happening. It all comes down to who has to appeal to what demo in their market. THE LABELS: There are too many labels. Like radio stations, too many going for too little. Much too competitive. You'd have to have a 100 record playlist to satisfy (at least). I see more consolidation on the very near horizon. Only the strong will stand alone. MUSIC: Is it just me, or is there not that much to get excited about out there? With just a handful of exceptions, everyone just seems to be going through the motions. Disappointing sales may jump start some artists into being a little more aggressive, try a different style or direction, expand on that creativity. The "in" thing -- I guess because it's Christmas -- is to depend on your past with box sets, with one or two new tracks to promote it. I really don't see any "forthcoming" trends for the new year. It'll be the year of Guns N' Roses, U2, Michael Jackson (ughh!!), etc. Hope I'm wrong! PREDICTIONS: David Duke will defeat George Bush for the Republican Presidential nomination...NOT! To be hones with you, Duke's carrying with him a lot of good messages and ideas. Unfortunately, he's not the right messenger. I predict that here in the New Orleans market, WRNO will be sold, and WZRH will change format to Country. Super Bowl prediction: This, unfortunately, is still not the year of our New Orleans Saints. Redskins 42, Buffalo 17. 1991 will see the FCC halting LMA's...unfair trade practices. 1992 will be the year of 92 (WCKW). I will win \$92 million in the new Louisiana state lottery. PERSON OF THE YEAR: With so many possibilities, I'd have to say Homer Simpson is the person of the year. Or maybe Mikhail Gorbechev, survivor of the coup. He's sure made the world a safer place, it seems. Now, let's see him get them of of their slump.

Patty Martin, Music Director, KLOL/Houston: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The issue of the year is that record labels are



realizing that times are tough all over. THE ECONOMY: The economy, in general, is in sorry shape, but the indicators have shown that Texas, and Houston in particular, should weather the recession a bit better. Thankfully, KLOL and the Rusk Corporation are in good shape. We have smart, forward-thinking people in the place, who make intelligent and realistic decisions, without burying themselves in debt. Ticket sales are poor because prices are astronomical -- it costs \$100 for two people to go to a concert. That used to be a prom. Now, it's just a night out. Also, too many shows come to town at one time. For example, in a six week period in Houston, we have Guns N' Roses, The Cult, Van Halen, Metallica, Ozzy Osbourne -- all appealing to many of the same people. Where is the average person supposed to come up with all that money at one time? The can't. It hurts the artists, the labels, the promoters, and the regular people who'd but, can't afford it. The only ones to benefit are the radio stations who have lots of hot tickets to give away, and lots of listeners who want to win them. THE

FORMAT: With a few exceptions, AOR is no longer Album Oriented Rock, and the spirit in which it started no longer exists. That's not necessarily good or bad -- it's just different. Times change and the nature of the industry has changed. Radio changes, too. AOR's that are afraid to play a good number of currents are a disgrace. Good new music is the lifeblood of the format, and there is a lot of good new music (you just have to sift through a lot more crap to get to it). THE LABELS: There are way too many labels, and by their sheer numbers, they are shooting themselves in the foot. Where are tomorrow's classics? Where are the bands that are going to keep these labels going? Too many bands are being signed prematurely, bands that a few years ago, would have been lucky to have development deals. A lot of artist are going to have some shitty debut albums to live down...if they last. The focus now seems to be on getting a song to a breaker, or to #1, and then hurrying on to the next single. Sorry, but it doesn't work like that on a radio station that really plays its music. We want songs that are gong to live past current and recurrent. Tomorrow's classics. It takes eight weeks to develop a song on the air, and if it's working, we'll stay on it in current for 16-20 weeks. Unless the song is a dud, these follow up singles are coming WAY TOO FAST. MUSIC: The music industry is in trouble. Too many labels putting out too many inferior records, glutting record stores, confusing consumers. Hopefully, the cream will continue to rise to the top. The bands that will stand out will be the ones that ARE NOT clones of '80s hair bands -- they'll be bands that are fresh, exciting and willing to develop with the times. PREDICTIONS: I predict I'll have an office with windows when KLOL moves across the street in 1992. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Pee Wee Herman.



<u>Jeff Levine, Program Director, WBAB/Long Island</u> ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The economy. It's been a rough year for us



on Long Island. Hopefully, things will turn around. We've had to be more aggressive with our marketing strategies, and it's been tough on our sales staff, as well. The programming department has heard the words "value-added" from a lot of clients. It seems everybody wants a promotion, and there just aren't enough to go around. THE FORMAT: WBAB's vision of AOR is a lot different from most others. We are liberal, in that we play plenty of new music, yet we really play a fair amount of '60s and '70s music, as well. For us, the future of AOR looks good. But I can't speak for everyone. THE LABELS: Of course, there are too many labels. The people who know what they're doing are definitely starting to pull ahead of the rest. Those on the way out are covering too many territories, spreading themselves too thin. We no longer get service from New York locals, instead, we get the "East" reps. That job is often just too big. MUSIC: The trend continues to be a lot of great younger-end music, like Nirvana and The Farm. It's becoming more and more difficult to present this stuff to the upper demo's, which puts us in


a difficult position. We've always been a very broad-based station. We play Metallica, Guns, Nirvana, B.A.D. II, The Farm, and other alternative music. We were very early on Jesus Jones this year. We'll have to get creative to present it all in the most effective way for best audience reaction. PERSON OF THE YEAR: My pick for Person of the Year is Magic Johnson. I really feel for him, and I admire what he's done.

Mark DiDia, DEF American: ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The one with Bernstein and Mensch on the cover. THE ECONOMY:



On the music front, no matter how bad the economy is, great records are going to continue to sell. They always have and they always will. THE FORMAT: AOR is healthier than it was a year ago. It will continue to fragment. The stations who find their niche, stick with it, and execute well are gonna win. It's evident now that dominant AOR stations who mishandled their competition are losing. I think a station like KGB in San Diego just blew it! They were certainly the market leader, but they reacted wrong. THE LABELS: Too many labels. Too many shitty bands. Too much of a "throw it up against the wall and see what sticks" attitude. Too much product. Too many A&R guys signing too many bands. A lot of people are in the music business for the wrong reasons. You can't just sign a bunch of bands, hire a complete staff, and see your investment turn around in a year. It doesn't work like that. MUSIC: As proven in the past, music trends will come out of the phenomenon where a lot of record companies look at the top of the charts and try to duplicate what's popular. So, we should see a bunch of Nirvana

clones in '92, eh?! The last two years have been better -- not ground-shaking, but better, in terms of good, exciting new music. PREDICTIONS: The Black Crowes will release an amazing second record. More labels will fall apart. Survival of the fittest will reign true in '92. PERSON OF THE YEAR: MTV, again.

SCORPS & SOVIETS

The Scorpions will distinguish themselves as the first western artists to ever meet with the leader of the Soviet Union this weekend. Upon hearing the band's chart-topping ballad "Wind Of Change", a song inspired by the changes in the Soviet Union, President Gorbachev issued a personal invitation to the group to meet with him in Moscow. In 1988, Scorpions became the first major hard rock band to perform in that country. The following year, the band joined Bon Jovi, Motley Crue, Ozzy Osbourne, Skid Row and others in staging the spectacular Moscow Music Peace Festival. It was that performance that firmly established the band as the most popular western group in the Soviet Union. Last September, in the midst of a year-long international tour, Scorpions took time out to re-record "Wind Of Change" with Russian lyrics to commemorate the struggles of the Soviet people. Explains lead singer/songwriter Klaus Meine, "When 'Wind Of Change' became our biggest hit ever due to the inspiration of our experiences in Russia, we wanted to give something back to the Soviet people... We feel like musical ambassadors, and when you think about the history of our two countries (Germany and Russia), and the fact that we, a German band, will be the first rock band in history to meet a Soviet leader -- it's a dream come true. Our parents came with tanks and we come with guitars in the name of peace." Following the band's Japanese leg of the "Crazy World" tour, Scorpions will journey to Moscow for a private audience with Gorbachev and his entourage. In the face of so much news emanating from what remains of the Soviet Union these days, the band will present the Soviet leader with a plaque engraved with the lyrics "Wind Of Change". The band will also donate all monies generated from the worldwide sales of the recently-released Russian version to benefit the Russian Relief Fund.



The end of the year finally approaches and each and every one of us are once again put a little bit in shock as

to just how quickly the time has passed by. It was a tough year for most of us as the nation's economy bottomed out and many people lost their jobs. But as the ultimate optimist that I am, and 1991 may have been a harrowing year for most, but 1992 looks like the only place we can go from here is up. Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying that 1991 was a total washout because it wasn't. For me personally, it was a year filled with many high points. There was my trip in February to the shores of Miami, Florida, where I spent a week with Gloria Estefan and her husband Emilio. It was there that I had the chance to see her rehearse her current world tour for her comeback album, Into The Light (Epic). And it was also in Miami that I had the chance to meet an up and coming star by the name of John Secada. A singer of incredible range and depth, Secada has his debut album coming out on SBK Records and should be the legendary Charles Koppelman's next BIG artist. There was my trip to the land of Memphis, Tennessee, and the likes of one Riley B. King a/k/a B.B. King and the opening of his first blues club

appropriately entitled B.B. King's Blues Bar. My photographer David Allen and I had the time of our lives as some of the greatest blues that I have ever heard made it to my earlobes that memorable weekend. And had I not made the trip, I wouldn't have been able to have experienced the likes of the Allman Brothers. It would be on that memorable weekend that I would make a good friend in Dicky Betts. Having run into the guitar legend at B.B. King's new club, Betts and I immediately hit it off. I was invited back to Ardent Recording Studios where the rest of the Allman Brothers, including Greg, were busy putting the finishing touches on Shades Of Two Worlds (Epic). When we arrived there was an enthusiastic Alan Woody who proceeded to turn me on to the world's only 18-string bass guitar put out by Modulus. Made out of carbon graphite, the same stuff they use in satellites in outer space, this instrument was a marvel to behold because not any player could use it. Woody with his huge hands even had a tough time. Nonetheless, he conquered the challenges provided by the instrument and I was there to witness it. And then there's the traditional instrumental "Like A Bird." I must say that I am responsible for giving Dicky Betts the title for that song. That's right. My photographer David Allen is my witness.

Dicky brought us in to hear the song and all I could think of was the word "Bebop." I said to Dicky, "This isn't rock 'n' roll. This is Charlie Parker man! This is 'Like ABird!'" The next thing you know is Dicky's calling me up at home about a week later telling me he's going with that title and thanking me so profusely for having said what I said. Ah, a little bit of history. And who could forget my wonderful trip to Montreux, Switzerland, to bear witness to the last performances of the legendary Miles Davis. The hills were alive with the sound of music as some of the greatest superstars made their way to this beautiful little village. I must say

that my trip to Montreux was the best time this writer has ever had both on a professional level as well as on a personal one. Every single day I spent time at promoter Claude Nobs' chalet where I spoke freely and personally with people like Elvis Costello, Bonnie Raitt, Miles, The Moody Blues, to name just a few. I'll never forget interviewing The Moody's Justin Hayward overlooking the Swiss Alps as he sipped on champagne and looked like he was having just as much fun as I was. Or watching the sun set with the legendary Quincy Jones and singer John Hendricks. And even more so on the personal side of things I am proud of my exposure to the television medium. There were my appearances on "The Joan River's Show" and "The Joe Franklin Show", plus my first appearance on "The Maury Povich Show". 1991 was an above average year for rock'n' roll with a handful of exceptional releases some of which were highlighted by Squeeze, Guns N' Roses, Prince, The Rolling Stones, Tom Petty, to name but a few. On the negative side, there were some major controversies that were brought to the surface in lieu of the Clarence Thomas hearings. And once again the economy has forced the merger and consolidation of many labels highlighted by the SBK-EMI-Chrysalis and the Atco/East West deals. Economically, 1992 doesn't look much better but hopefully I'll be proven wrong. It wasn't perfect year but one worth remembering nonetheless. Maybe we didn't make as much money as we did in 1990 due to this year's lousy economy but I suspect that most of us still had a great time. Here's to making more and playing more in 1992!

KNOWING WHEN IT'S RIGHT THE CHARLES KOPPELMAN INTERVIEW

It's been a big year for Charles Koppelman. But, then again, he's used to big years. In fact, if there isn't an ambitious young screenwriter perched above the smog tipped canyons of LA who is working on a film treatment of Charles' life, he or she should begin right now. A native of Brooklyn, Charles was born during the onset of World War II. He began his show business career as one of the Ivy Three, a vocal group that hit the top ten with a novelty tune called "Yogi" in 1960. While working in the Catskills he met Don Kirshner during a pick-up basketball game and as a result he and fellow Ivy Three member Don Rubin joined Kirshner's Aldon Music, soon to be sold to Columbia Pictures in a deal that would create Screen Gems/Columbia Music, with a 24-year-old Charles Koppelman as Director. Not a bad beginning. After working with Don Rubin again in Koppelman/Rubin Associates during the mid-60's followed by a productive stint at the publishing arm of CBS Inc. Charles formed, with longtime partner Martin Bandier and New York real estate magnet Sam LeFrak, the Entertainment Company. It was during this time that Charles honed and exploited his justly famous gift for matching up the right singer and the right tune, pairing up some of the most successful duets to hit the charts during that period. After a long and successful run, Charles and Martin Bandier then joined with financier Stephen Swid to form SBK Entertainment World, the progenitor of all things SBK. After purchasing CBS Songs Inc. for \$125 Million, the trio effectively became the largest independent music publishers in the world with over 250,000 titles under their control. It was in 1989 that SBK sold their publishing interests to Thorn EMI for \$295 Million, establishing a corporate link that would prove extremely productive in the following years, and leaving Bandier and Koppelman free to form SBK Records. The rest, as they say, is a matter of record. Now, with the purchase of Chrysalis by Thorn EMI and the resulting merger of Chrysalis, EMI and SBK Records into a single company, folks are once again talking about the cheerful man behind that now famous Cuban cigar. We think you'll find that Charles Koppelman has plenty of reasons to be a happy man...

Let's begin with the new structure of your company. What is the game plan?

Charles: This is an opportunity to have a free-standing, terrific record company on the West Coast, Capitol Records, and a free-standing, terrific record company on the East Coast, called the EMI Records Group North America. Both of them will have a certain scale, size and significant rosters, something that only the WEA group has been able to accomplish. So, from a strategic point of view, it gives Thorn a terrific opportunity.

back East, or just to other places. I've been watching this thing shift. In New York, you have CBS/Sony, the WEA Corporate groups, as well as Atlantic, Elektra and Sire. The corporate people are here. You've got EMI corporate, and of course, these three labels. BMG, Arista, and PolyGram, as well as a handful of independents are also in New York. What do we have on the West Coast? WEA and MCA.

So you see the game leveling out over the last few years.

What we're doing is turning this organization into one record company with three musical identities. And those three musical and label identities will continue to flourish.

It has seemed for years now that the power in the industry has shifted away from New York towards Los Angeles. Do you feel that there's more territory to take over in New York?

Charles: I don't agree that the shift of power has been Westward. I've been bicoastal for 25 years. I spend about four months a year on the West Coast, about three to four in Europe, and the rest of the time here in New York. What I've felt over the last four or five years is a significant shift back to New York.

After a marked period of exodus out to the West Coast?

Charles: Yes. The reason that LA became more important is because a lot of artists who 'happened' ended up moving to LA, because of the climate, the artist community, etc., etc. But what I've found over the last four or five years, is a lot of those people have become disenchanted with the West Coast, and are now moving

Charles: Right. What you're looking at now is, from a numbers' point of view, a pretty even balance. And so, from EMI's point of view, it's only appropriate that if you're one of the three biggest music companies in the world, you need to have a significant presence on the East Coast, as well as the West Coast of the United States.

There's a high strategy to this, which you've just sort of brushed on. There's also logistical questions of how you take three fulbodied record companies and turn them into three record companies under a single umbrella.

Charles: What we're doing is turning this organization into one record company with three musical identities. And those three musical and label identities will continue to flourish. But it is going to be, for all intents and purposes, one record company.

So, the condensation of that, whether we're talking about roster reductions or staff reductions, is to be expected. I can understand that that's a very hectic thing for you to accomplish.

Charles: Hectic and painful.

I was going to say, how hard is it, from a personal standpoint?

Charles: You don't know me that well.

No, I don't.

Charles: I'm like Mr. Goodnews. I spend, normally, about 60% of my time listening to music. The last month, I've been spending hardly any time listening to music at all, only figuring out who stays and who goes.

So this has been taking a toll on you, then.

Charles: Oh, yes, most definitely.

When you say that you spend 60% of your time listening to music, do you think that's very far above average, or about average for your peers in the business?

Charles: I think it's way above average.

We always talk about things like, 'He's a good record man.' As you are now in a position where you are going to have to look at a host of professionals and decide who's going to do the best job for you. What's the Koppelman recipe for a good record man?

Charles: Well, different jobs have different descriptions. I think if there was one prevailing scenario, it would be that this company is going to be creatively driven -- financially sound, but creatively driven. The linkage between A&R and Marketing is very significant to me because in

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most companies, the people who sign the acts and who are accountable for them really don't end up having the power that prevails in the marketing strategies of that artist. At this company, that will not be the case. There's a real partnership between A&R and Marketing here. And since I'm the Chairman of the company,

and my strength is in the A&R area, I'm having marketing report to me, and of course, my head of A&R, Fred Davis, will be working very closely with Ken Baumstein, my head of Marketing. So, there's going to be what I think is a unique linkage between those areas. The other thing that is also significant is promotion and sales. Anybody who's part of the promotion and sales organizations is both a promotion man and a salesman. So, there's going to be a unique approach here as well.

That will have significant impact in the way that your field staff is organized.

Charles: Exactly. We will have our promotion field force deal with sales in every territory.

That's one of the things that has been stressed about your approach to the business; is that you

run a multi-national, far-flung empire like it was a small business. It seems like the condensation of the A&R process and the paralleling of your sales and promotion efforts, and everything else you're telling me, seems like that is an example of that strategy.


Charles: I'm not that scientific. I just approach it this way: I'm the head of A&R and I'm also a salesman. If you're a great promotion man, you're a salesman, too. And wouldn't it make more more sense that instead of a guy calling me to say, 'I just got the Loop on a particular artist, but there are no records in the stores,' that that same guys calls me to say, 'I just got the Loop and the records are in the stores?'

I don't know how many dinners I've had with promotion people, where the enemy is almost within, in that they get the airplay and then they fight to get the stores stocked.

Charles: Well, here and now, he's going to have to talk to himself.

Some of those guys are actually very good at that already.

Charles: I'm a big believer in accountability, and I'm a big believer in rewarding people handsomely for doing a terrific job. The only way I can effectively accomplish the reward part is by setting

up a system where people are accountable for their performance. I want to establish an environment where there isn't a lot of finger pointing for a job that one person should be doing. What I don't want is three guys having the same job and everybody saying, 'No, I thought he did it.' 'No, I thought he did it.' 'No, I thought he did it.'

Even though this makes sense on a purely street level, or from an organizational mindset. The other part of this is that we are reducing overhead by doing so, which would seem to be the cancer that is eating away at the business right now.

Charles: Oh, of course, we're going to get to that. But it's less an exercise of getting rid of overhead, and more an exercise in putting together a lean, mean machine.

There was a certain point in time when promotion was the be all and end all of this business. More and more of those organizations were praying at the altar of promotion. And the value of marketing and the

understanding of it didn't keep up as a result.

Charles: You're 100% right. But that was never the case in any of my businesses.

If that implies that that was a mistake made by other people in the business, why

was it ever made in the first place? Why did they buy into that?

Charles: Mainly because the people who ran those companies weren't creative individuals. Promotion isn't the dog at Elektra Records. It's not the dog at Atlantic Records.

It's the tail.

Charles: Right. It might be the dog at MCA. And maybe today it might be the dog at A&M, or maybe it's been that way for a long time. So, if you take a careful look at those companies that have a history of success, you'll find that they've all been led by what you and I would define as a creative executive.

From a broadcast standpoint, there are major chains that are run by General Managers who have runaway sales values. And it seems like this enter-

tainment business of ours -- radio, music, film, print and television -- breaks down into a very simple equation that runs something like this: You can either work for creative people, or you can answer to people whose job it is to make the most of that sales beat. And that's about it.

Charles: You've got it. And I would venture to say that most of the long term successful entities in any one of the businesses you just mentioned have a creative guy in charge.

How do you keep your edge? So many years in the business, and at every turn in your career playing at the uppermost level, there are a lot of guys who have gotten desensitized by that. I know you're a big family man and that's a great way to stay balanced. But how do you maintain your feel for the street, given that you have so many other things you have to do?

Charles: I love the music business. More importantly, I love music. I'm a real fan. That's what makes it easy. I enjoy going to see an artist. It's not ever

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a chore for me, in fact, it's a vacation. When I was a kid and I would feel pressured or troubled by something, I'd go to the backyard of my house and shoot baskets. Now, I can't go out and shoot baskets. But music is definitely my vacation. If I'm stressed out, or if I'm having a tough time about something, I just put on a cassette, and, if you had a monitor on me, you'd find that my blood pressure would go down and everything would even out. Music is something that really takes my mind away.

Many people have said that you're a man who knows the value of the tune. That's what you have amazing radar for. Reduced to its essence, can you bring a lifetime of experience to one maxim? What's the little blip that goes off in your head It's like a casting director in film.

Charles: Exactly.

'I want Bruce Dern for this part.'

Charles: That's just something that's second nature to me.

You're known as a very stubborn man when it comes to something that you buy into. The Russ Irwin project or bringing Tracy Chapman home stand out as good examples of that tenacity. Obviously, you have solid reasons to trust your instincts to that degree. Did you ever lose one that you know you shouldn't have lost?

Charles: Most recently, as a matter of fact. We lost a record by a spectacular group. We will win with the group in the long run, but we lost the single, which is

when you know you've found a Tracy Chapman or a Russ Irwin?

Charles: Actually, there are a couple of blips. The first, if we're just talking about songs, is the lyrics. Most people, when they listen to songs, hear the melody first. I hear the lyrics first. I relate to the lyrics, and then the melody comes after. If I'm touched by the lyrics, if I'm drawn into what they have to say, and then the melody is wonderful, my hair stands up, if you will. Then, if I truly believe the singer, we're off to the races. When I saw Tracy Chapman for the first time, I heard that voice and I believed every word she said. I listen to Francesca Beghe, and I believe every word this girl is singing. Those are the keys to me.

Does it hit you quickly, or have you put a tape away and come back to something months later just to rediscover it in the pile on your desk?

Charles: It always hits me quickly, with one exception. And that exception was when I first heard the Wilson Phillips original demo cassettes. It was the first time that I didn't hear a lyric first, so I got confused. What I heard were these voices, and they were so incredible that I couldn't quite get past them. So, it took me about two or three weeks of listening sporadically, until I could get into what the songs were about. That was a unique deal for me.

In the past, some of the big successes you've had in your career were when you matched up material with an artist who could make it go.

Charles: I always hear that. Once I hear a great song, I immediately, for some reason, go through a little card catalog in my head. 'My Heart Is Failing Me' by Riff. We lost it because we had a couple of critical records we were working at the same time, including that record and the Jesus Jones. It was one of the few times that I had to make a decision, and we lost the project as a result.

As you're listening to your competitors, are there any recent artists you've heard that you wish like hell you had signed if you had gotten a chance? Anybody new who's not in your company, who you think really has the goods?

Charles: I'm a little close to this one, but my son, Brian, found Michael McDermott. I think it would have been great if he was on SBK Records. He's going to be very big. Other than that, Mariah Carey is a great singer, and I've always enjoyed working with great singers and unique vocalists. I'm sorry I never had an opportunity to hear her tape or to be in that arena.

Let's talk about some of the people in your organization right now. My first introduction to the company was doing an interview with Martin Bandier when the company first got launched. And I found him to be a charming guy. The two of you have worked together for something like 25 years and now, in the new organization, although the two of you have these wonderful Oz-like comer suites in New York, you're not really working that closely together.

Charles: Marty and I are still partners, and we'll be partners for a long time to come. We're still partners in the rest of our SBK buyout. We own a catalogue of publishing songs together. Some other interests that we are involved in include real estate, etc. And he's always on the other side of the sliding glass door. But

I am only one person. And it was one thing to be the chairman of this worldwide music publishing company and the chairman of SBK Records, which was a small, startup company with a limited artist roster. I just didn't have the kind of responsibility that I'm now going to have at EMI Records Group North America. So, I really had to make a decision, which was an uneasy one to make because for the first time in my 30 years in the business, I can't attach 'Publisher' to my business card. But I made that decision based on my desire to accept this challenge. At SBK Records, I think we set the standard for new record companies. And that's why there was this proliferation of new record companies following us. Unfortunately, or fortunately, I don't think that they will rise to the standard that SBK did. I think that now, I have the opportunity to set the standard for all record companies. And that's a tremendous challenge for me. I want to successfully meet that challenge, so I have to give it my 100% effort to do that. The second reason for this change with Marty and myself was that it's something that Jim Fifield asked me to do. And I'm very much a team player. Even though, people look at me as this entrepreneur, or this individual player, I am very much a company man. And I know that there's a major job that needs to be done here, so I'm going to do it.

Daniel Glass -- Prince Daniel, as you called him when we spoke earlier. We were talking about great record men, here's a case in point. What does he bring to the table for you?

Charles: First of all, he brings an incredible amount of energy, focus, know-how, experience and dedication to our efforts. Daniel is probably the single most focused person that I know, next to myself.

He was one of the first people you hired for the company, too, wasn't he?

Charles: Yes, he was.

So, you obviously had been aware of him and his reputation long before you got the chance to give him a job.

Charles: His reputation, and equally important, his character.

Michael Mena. It seems like he's been isolated as a rising star within the company.

Charles: Michael is, I think, the best Alternative, new music executive out there. His influence, not only in the promotion arena, but also in the A&R arena, has been significantly felt.

You said you set the standard for new record companies at SBK, and that now you can potentially set the standard for all record companies with EMI Records Group North America. One of the things that was different about your startup situ-

ation at SBK was that there were fewer records being released to a greater success rate, as opposed to other people scooping up whatever was tossed out by the majors and trying to repackage them.

Charles: I've always believed that if I were on a baseball team, I'd be looking for guys with high batting averages. So, to me, the best ball player, as you well know, is the guy who can hit .330 and 35 home runs. So, that's what I look at when running my business -- batting averages and home runs. That's the standard by which I run my company.

Something you just said about you and Daniel also is implied in that, too, and that's focus. So many guys have too many projects to work. They simply cannot succeed in that way.

Charles: There's no question. You can't be in love with fifteen girls.

creative challenge? It would seem to be 'Let's strip down the marginal acts and just go with hits right now. Let's only do what we can deliver, as opposed to trying to throw so much against the wall.'

Charles: I define it a little differently. I want to go with quality. If your music is of quality, you're going to win at the end of the day. And, to me, there's a big difference between hits and quality. Hopefully, quality begets hits. But sometimes, I will walk away from a record I think is a hit because I don't believe the artist is of quality.

You've been at the top of the game in the '60s, '70s, '80s, and now in the '90s. The business during that period of time has really changed, has metamorphosed. How do you feel it to be different now? And is this the best time for you, personally? Is this the most fun that you've had?

Someone said to me the other day that I must really enjoy the chase. And what I said to them was, 'Not quite. What I really enjoy is the capture.'

Can you look back over '91, and give us any kind of read on how you think this year played out for the industry? Was it as good, bad or indifferent as people thought it would be in the context of the economy and everything else that was going on?

Charles: I think it was clearly worse than people thought it was going to be. When you take a look around, I don't think it was unexpected. We all know there have been too many record companies. We all know there are too many releases. We all know there is too much mediocre music out there, and we all know that at some point, that's going to crescendo into a real problem. And, I firmly believe, that what's going on in the business as we speak is in anticipation of avoiding the next big bubble.

So, you think that the bubble has yet to burst.

Charles: Actually, I don't think it will burst. I think that the business, on a whole, is in a pretty healthy state. Meaning, I look at who the captains are out there. And I think that we have more music people in the right positions today. And therefore, they're going to be making, I think, more sound decisions. They will, more and more, let the great music be the guiding force going into our future. They're going to avoid that bubble bursting, short of the economy just truly falling into a complete depression.

Do you have any feelings about that?

Charles: I think we're in no great shape at all. In fact, I think we're in really deep trouble. And this is a guy who always sees the glass half full.

Well, that's the fiscal challenge that's facing the business right now. What about the

Charles: I've had a great time throughout my entire career. A different time, doing different things, obviously, at different ages. I'm a lucky guy. But, and I think about this a lot, I really don't do anything different in my life today than I did when I started in the music business. Yes, I'm older; and yes, I have more experience, and obviously, one grows. But I'm basically the same, and I do the same things with my life. I approach the business the same way, whether it was with Don Rubin at Koppelman and Rubin in 1965 with 4 employees, or with Marty in '75 with 25 employees, or with Marty in '86, with 200 employees. My day is the same. I approach each day with a very positive attitude. And, most importantly, I'm into my music. I like working with artists and I like motivating people. I'm very much into the promotion, sales and marketing strategies of this business, and seeing that to fruition is one of my true loves. It's the same thing I've been doing since 1965. It's really not all that different to me now as it was then.

It's nice to talk to somebody who's so grounded at what could be perceived as an Olympian level. A lot of people play this game so that they can have the perks of a certain attainment in their professional life. You just seem to enjoy the game itself, which is all the difference.

Charles: Someone said to me the other day that I must really enjoy the chase. And what I said to them was, 'Not quite. What I really enjoy is the capture.'

You've been very generous with your time. I do have one other question though, and this has always nagged me as a programmer. As a programmer, I was always progressive-leaning. Of course, the consultants beat that down. They said,

'No. Reduce it to the common denominator and remain in the lower demographic cells where you can own the candy shop.'

Charles: What a drag.

It is a drag. But a lot of times, they would say to me, Well, look at the music industry. The music industry knows the people buying the records are teens. That's the music that's coming out. If the gun is primed from the beginning to be youth-driven how can we fight it?' Is the music business, by nature, youth-driven to the exclusion of other values?

Charles: Yes, young kids like Wilson Phillips. But I didn't sell 8 million albums to 12-year olds. We sold them to people from 12 to 50. That's a wide demographic. We sold Tracy Chapman to everybody. Young, old, black, white, female, male, American, Italian. Quality wins out every time. I think the problem at radio is that it is being run by people who aren't even in radio. They're not music people. They're not really radio people either. They're either accountants, lawyers, financiers or research people. They should be at IBM, not at radio.

Well, we can thank deregulation in large part for that.

Charles: Whatever the reason is, that's the problem. Forget the research and look to your heart.

People find themselves essentially having to get out of the business because the pressure of meeting those financial pressures really keeps them from being able to establish a new and creative strategy for the medium.

Charles: That's going to change, and sooner than later. Trust me. It's the same in our business. As always, quality wins out. Quality of people, quality of music, quality of character, those are the things to watch for. If one wants to look at what really works in this business -- the entertainment business, the music business, the radio business -- when times get tough, it's quality. And if what we're doing is of quality, we're going to be survivors.

Focus On...

FIFTEEN ALBUMS LATER:

DANCING ISN'T ALL THAT IMPORTANT

The advent of a new work by Genesis is always cause for comment. The band has long since successfully transcended their early art-rock roots and, along the way, have transformed into one of the most bankable bands in the rock and roll firmament. Their every studio utterance is cause for major celebration at the format, and this release is right on target in that regard. This week we spent a little time with the three men who make Genesis the unique entity it is: Tony Banks, Phil Collins and Mike Rutherford during a whirlwind of press activity on both coasts. We spoke about how four years away from each other had helped keep the flame burning bright in the studio. And we also talked about a select number of compositions from their 15th album, the vastly acclaimed "We Can't Dance". Our thanks to Danny Buch and Bob Clark for getting this opportunity for us...







Tony, there is an overriding sense of mystery to this album as compared to some of your other releases.

Tony: Other people have said this, as well. We feel that some of this gets down to the impression you hear on the first song off the album and continues from there. With an album like 'Invisible Touch' we were working with more of a lightweight song atmosphere. Whereas, 'No Son Of Mine' definitely has some of that mystery we're talking about. And I think that thought is carried on throughout the rest of the album very well. There is quite a series of contrasts from moment to moment throughout this entire album. With the 70 odd minutes of music that we recorded for this album, it gives you more of a chance to form certain impressions along the way. And we did have a chance to be a little more long-winded on some tracks when it comes to our musical content. But the lyrics, I think, are on slightly darker subjects throughout.

Phil, you're clearly proud of these lyrics. Were they a product of the sessions as you guys were playing, or were they brought into the studio ready to go?

Phil: Well, they weren't brought in. They came about in various different ways. A large percent of them came about at the time when we were recording. We used a drum machine during those sessions, which enabled me to sing, which is far more interesting for me than just banging away behind the kit. And I'm just singing anything that comes into my head, and sometimes, those ideas turn out to be okay, like in a song like, 'No Son Of Mine' or 'Jesus He Knows Me', the chorus came about that way. 'Hold On My Heart' came about that way, too, as did the chorus of 'Since I Lost You'. And then there's 'Driving The Last Spike', which I think is very different for me as a writer, because it's taken to an area that I've never written about before, or a style that I've never

written in before. And it's a long song, and I'm not usually in the right mood for those long songs. I had a few ideas, so I thought I'd rise to the challenge, and see if I could pull it off. I think these songs have become some of the best I've ever done.

Mike, of everybody in the band, you seem to have a real lock on the value of solo work as a way to recharge and come back to the band fresh.

Mike: I think it affects me the same way it affects everybody else really. It's the change that is the most important thing for all of us. Obviously, if all you're doing all the time is writing and recording and making music with the same people, that can be a kind of learning process. You're always learning about doing things differently. So over the years, you pick up little ways to record things, little ideas, and hopefully, you improve. The most important thing, really, is that you have this break from time to time to expand your perspective.

Does the same thing apply for the prospect of a tour?

Mike: I think the most important thing is we had to kind of be willing to leave the good life we have for some road time again. We certainly want to accommodate the fans out there, but in order to keep doing that, you have to be selfish to a certain degree, and we're doing shorter tours as a result. We'll be on the road, for about six or seven months and we're going to do 52 shows during that time. That's not a lot of shows. But the idea is, that we'll finish it while the album is still fresh in our minds, and we're still enjoying it all.

Before we move to the album, I just want to say that the on-line editing for the video to 'No Son Of Mine' is a technical masterpiece.

Phil: Well, we knew what we wanted from the beginning. We always do know what we want from the videos. But with this particular song, of course, you're just acting out the story. That's all you really need, just a small idea and a visually moving story, you don't really need much else for a good video. The concept of us being in the room, as almost flies on the wall was a very strong idea, and we came up with that one during the storyboard sessions. So, we're very involved in that whole process. But it's a bit early for my film experience to show through. (Laughs)

Let's begin a discussion of the album; 'No Son Of Mine'. A fairly bitter song and a pretty dark look at family life gone bad. Any of this drawn from personal experience?

Phil: I wrote the lyrics to that one, Jim. To be honest, once you've come up with a line like, 'No Son Of Mine', you could kind of take it in various directions, I suppose. It could be quite an optimistic song, if you treat it a different way. But the first thing that came to my mind was more the down side of it, which was maybe a boy being disowned by his father. Why? Well, maybe because he falls out with the family. And the story develops as you start writing the ideas down. You're not quite sure whether the boy or the mother is the party that's being abused. I left that ambiguous, so as not to lay it all out too obviously. You're not quite sure whether it's sexual battery or emotional abuse. You're not quite sure if it's him or his mom that's getting it. All you really know is that the father is the one that's causing it. Of course, today kids are the subject of that day in and day out. Whereas, they used to just get on with it, and they would end up in society and who knows what happens to them when they grow up. Maybe they just continue that cycle. But kids today are more likely to just leave home and go out on their own when that happens to them, which has its own risks and rewards. And this particular boy tried going back, hoping that his father had changed, and his father only aggravates the problem even more when they meet. You're right, it's not a happy ending. But then, if we had faded out another thirty seconds later, who knows what might have happened.

'Jesus He Knows Me'. TV evangelism. Do you see this as a particularly American situation or does England have their Jimmy Swaggarts, as well?

Mike: I think it's very much an Englishman's look into TV evangelists. When we first came over to America, we were shocked by what was on television. We're like, 'These guys are for real?' That's not to say that there aren't certain chaps who are actually very genuine. We just have to hope they're not the ones in prison, don't we?

The song 'I Can't Dance', we were curious where you would get inspiration for a song like that.

Tony: It's funny you ask because you really do need an explanation about that song to understand it fully. The original title of the song was 'Blue Jeans' because it reminded us of the kind of riff you have here in a typical jeans commercial. And we got the song down very quickly after that. In fact we recorded it in a few hours. The idea was to write a lyric about those annoying jeans commercials and the false values they portray. And the implication is that all these people can only do jeans commercials for a living. They can walk, but they can't talk or think.

The one personal reaction that I wanted to throw out was that when I listened to 'Since I Lost You' for the first time, it was the day following my father being put into the hospital. And I must tell you, I found that song almost impossible to listen to all the way through. You can take that for what it's worth, but it was a very powerful piece in its own way.

Phil: Thank you. I think when you write a song that has that kind of emotion in it, the best that you can hear from someone is that, as a listener, that's how they perceive it.

In one memorable dream I'm in a what used to be a favorite record store, one of the last to turn completely digital. Before getting too comfortable with acceptance try to remember that we've lost nearly as many signals as we've gained. Unemployment offices are littered with the spirit and souls of more true believers every day, as the recession rages and eats any and everything in its path. Fear rules, and I'm not referring to the band. "Is it safe?" isn't just a soundbite from "Marathon Man" anymore, but an increasing and disturbing mind set.





As a band they continue to virtually represent our format to those unini-tiated, uninformed or just plain ig-norant. That they are still qualified to dominate a year's worth of air-play by a huge margin (trust me, it wasn't even close) without the beplay by a huge margin (trust me, it wasn't even close) without the benefit of a tour, is almost as astonishing as their ability to remain relevant in an age bent on disposability. With the obvious exception of U2, how many bands/artists have had R.E.M.'s volume of success in other fields yet sidestepped the predictable "alternative" backlash? Perhaps the explanation for this undying devotion can be found in the lyrics of the album's opening track, "It's that same, same song—D.J. sucks! It makes me sad." A call to arms, a refusal to retreat and contempt for the "sheep mentality" of programming toward the lowest common denominator. Wasn't this the primary reason all of us started this thing we call Alternative in the first place? R.E.M. remember and understand. But whatever the politics of the dance may be, it's appropriate to equate the opulence of "Out Of Time" with a simple decree that great music sometimes does win out. Stipe wanted to call it "The Return Of Mumbles", but the audio verdict revealed a band able to come to terms with their own past, build on the ideal and welcome what lies revealed a band able to come to terms with their own past, build on the ideal and welcome what lies ahead. Their lack of public performance was underscored by an intelligent choice of highly visible alternatives, like National Public Radio and "Unplugged". This reinforced a core underground work ethic, further demonstrated by the volume and variety of unreleased, acoustic and alternate versions of tracks that surfaced throughout the year. In 1991 R.E.M. proved once and for all that it is possible to violate the questionable realm of commercialism without the aid of a media condom, and emerge uninfected and completely satisfied. More importantly we affirmed they were much more we affirmed they were much more than a schoolyard crush, proud in our commitment to a band deserv-ing of nothing less. (MM)

New Gold Dream

It's that time of year when we look back, look forward, toss back some nog, and watch "How The Grinch Stole Christmas" with glee. With Marrone's misty intro already dispatched, let's cut from the opening pan to the chase. The Top 100 of 1991, calculated according our accumulated airplay points, is a pleasant (or not so pleasant) reminder of the dizzying array of music that we as a collective got to enjoy (all the way from Diamanda Galas to Enya). Whether or not they're on their first album or their fifth, these bands are besting themselves, with their first appearance on our fifth year end chart.

Or present platinum performance, to paraphrase the headline. To say that Nirvana has done well is like using watercolors to



paint a Mustang. As Sub Pop's mail order catalog accurately forecasted in the line for "Bleach" (printed even before the band was signed away): "They're from Olympia, they own their own van, and they're going to make us rich." 1991 will be remembered as the year of "Nevermind", which, in our yard, spent five weeks at the top of the heap, only to be knocked down by the turbulent musings of

U2, and still has yet to lose any momentum, entering the year's tally at #14. Ultimately, Nirvana's big splat has done more than give Sub Pop that valuable catalog item or prove that the Seattle sound was (and still is) more than just a bunch of woodsy Black Sabbath wanna-bees. That's not to ignore the strides made by bands like Alice In Chains or Soundgarden, neither these nor any others had hit with such uniform punch all over the format map. Nirvana's overwhelming success has upped everyone's



expectations, and given the format another dose of credibility. Now everybody believes their underdog garage band can make the Jolly Green Giant look like Billy Barty, and Nirvana's breakthrough has upped the ante on some already mind-boggling contracts (let me make some suggestions: Urge Overkill, Venus Beads, Barkmarket). Everybody has their own opinion, whether they think

"Nevermind" puts a new lease on the life of the "underground" or that the circumstances around Nirvana are partially of cosmic origin: like the alignment of the planets, unlikely to be repeated in our lifetime. It all goes back to that nature vs. nurture, fate vs. free will debate. Nobody's arguing that "Nevermind" (and what's this about a hidden extra 10 minute track on the CD?) doesn't shatter your bones like a seismic baseball bat.

The Sons Of Nirvana are still forthcoming, and happily the signs



are very favorable for Primus, Smashing Pumpkins, Screaming Trees and King Missile, who all have made respectable headway out of the hip indie trenches into more prominent label status. With "Gish" having sold in the neighborhood of 150,000 copies, the Smashing Pumpkins followed their buzz-nicity with concrete results, roosted nearly half the year in the top 50, touring steadily since February. And Primus are back in the current

bins with a new Interscope EP containing a pair of cover tunes (Peter Gabriel's "Intruder" and XTC's "Making Plans For Nigel"), plus four tracks from the album. Both bands managed to find successful bills that connected exciting lineups with sellouts all over (in a year where tours fell apart like bottom line compact cars). The Screaming Trees spent the better part of the year turning in consistently impressive sets, supporting the "Uncle Anesthesia" album that only begun to hint at their gothic pop potential (and look for Lanegan's second solo album in the early part of '92). The Meat Puppets found themselves the target of criticism for leaving the SST camp. But asked about that indie vs. major coin, Curt Kirkwood compared it to "delivering

cookies" at the CMJ artist panel. "Either you're bringing them in a big truck, or you're riding on a bicycle throwing them at people." And speaking of mind-inspiring images, King Missile also jumped, in this case from Shimmy Disc to Atlantic. This could have spelled certain dismissal from the I'll-wear-anything-as-long-as-it's-black college crew, but fear not, gentle, uniquely fashionable readers. "The Way To Salvation" argued for many things, but banal pop was not one of them.

Where King Missile wrote according to their own mental demon of pop, other bands glided on the muses of more angelic or atmospheric influences. Their results were undeniably delicious. Capitol made the School Of Fish a yearlong project, forgetting alltoo-short, chart-turnstiling schedules that don't even give an album time to inhale and exhale. Chapterhouse's



American debut has also come to define "longevity", and their new EP bullets upwards (37-33* this week), following a 17 week initial chart run, topping out at 6*. Who could deny that The La's were made for hit play, and "There She Goes" quickly passed

from us to the CHR playlists, tho' we got to play with the rest of the album for quite a long while. Lush is the only 4AD affiliated band here (other than the Pixies, of course), and considering the add-water response to the Cocteau box, it seems equally natural to invest a little airplay into the new single "Nothing Natural". On the U.S. side, Material Issue (who got as high as 3* in their 21 week chart run), the



Judybats and Mary's Danish all came in with substantial pollings, and across the ocean, the Milltown Brothers, Candyskins, Frazier Chorus, Charlatans U.K. and the Hollow Men (remember them, "Cresta" came out almost a year ago) left the radio community as solidly impressed.

Unbelievable says it all about EMF. Not only did they work a hooky import single into a domestic album deal, but the band went on to dominate alternative, dance and CHR charts. A series of singles with gobs of remixes and extra tracks, vid clips, tour stories that are the stuff of

tour stories that are the stuff of legends, and outrageous infectious charm all contributed to the amazing success of EMF. "Schubert Dip" was, in fact, the highest ranking debut, and has gone platinum. A total of 29 weeks residing on the chart, highlighted by two periods in the top ten; first for 3 weeks, then 10. The Farm have gotten on their own "gravy train", thank you, but we're banking on the



follow up to "Spartacus" to be their real breakthrough. (Like a rigged minefield, all triggers have been set to a hair's movement.) Primal Scream's still in the top ten, and it's obvious that they've found that common denominator, following their singles with a strong album, able to leap playlists in a single bound, easily seguing from Rolling Stones as the Stone Roses. Other U.K. Brits reviving the Soul/Dance aesthetic on their own terms in-

clude the suave, image-wise Seal, Manchester's export Northside and the cool moo's Inspiral Carpets. Charisma sold over a million copies with the peculiar, calculatedly odd, European craze otherwise known as Enigma's "Sadeness" (on charts here it peaked at 7* during a total 13 week run). My Life With The Thrill Kill Kult never was meant to be a steadfast band with a detailed



bio/roster/lineup. "Sexplosion" became, however, the highest ranking genuine indie label release on the Top 100 of 1991 (selling upwards to 100,000 units -- and currently finishing up a



tour with Siouxsie And The Banshees), quite a feat for Wax Trax, and a statement on the treacherous state of independent music distribution and promotion. Fitting that Thrill Kill Kult should be so bombastic, carnal and theatrical -- quite the opposite for the stereotyped wimpy songwriters that many associate (mistakenly) with Alternative music-makers.

Careening and spinning towards the end of the calendar year, hurdling into a brick wall propelled by a crisis-driven catapult, 1991's dizzying release schedule had several consequences on the state of new music assimilation. Records several months (or years) old made interesting comebacks, such as Nine Inch Nails (crucial was their leading role in the Lollapalooza festivities) and Chris Isaak (the appearance of "Heart Shaped World" on the 1989 and 1991 year end charts qualifies



1989 and 1991 year end charts qualifies him as the Grover Cleveland of the late 20th Century). First independents shaved their already lean operations, then corporations crashing in upon themselves like collapsed supernovas, the scale of the business took a hairpin turn. Byzantinium politics have taken on a life of themselves, and you didn't have to read "Hitmen" to realize that. Between managers, booking agencies.

Between managers, booking agencies, marketing, retail, publicity and promotion staffers, and (my fave) lawyers, the collective power of the affiliated label has far surpassed in importance the quality of the record being worked. The breakdown of the label's share of the top 100 reveals that indies have been able to carry away fewer and fewer genuine

"hits" (as already indicated, this year's three indie records compared to 1990's five, 1989's eight and 1988's fifteen -- then stack those figures alongside WEA's '91 mind numbing 41% of the Top 100). Aside from conglomeration of companies like Time Warner, Sony and PLG, the pie is being minced into tinier and tinier bits, and it's more and more difficult to uncover that secret hit, that Nir-



vana. So for every album that made the top 100, like Kirsty MacColl's smooth "Electric Landlady", Blur's glib "Leisure", Chris Whitley's unvarnished debut, Havana 3 A.M.'s gritty guitar knots or the The Kitchens Of Distinction's darkly vibrant "Strange Free World", there were scores that flew through the safety net. A paltry number of examples must include the dis-

turbing second album from MC 900 Ft Jesus, the comeback solo album from the ex-Wipers Greg Sage, expansive passion of My Bloody Valentine, the Kilbey/McLennan collaboration of Jack Frost or the brain-denting "Gump" from Sons Of Freedom. Quality was everywhere, all you had to do was screen out the listening agenda being screamed all around you.

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The Overlooked Favorites

This is the time we set aside to examine year end polls and charts, trying to make sense of what the past twelve months have meant musically. Littered amidst the vast amount of new sounds heard through the year, we all have our own personal list of things we viewed as deserving more attention. Looking over the tally of artists on the final Top 100, there were several that I personally felt were needlessly neglected. As with any survey, there are bound to be results that differ from your own. If not, see a shrink, bartender or travel agent immediately! With that in mind, what follows is my very first "Top 10 List", actually half a dozen overlooked favorites. These records (can we still call them that?) are in no particular order of preference, and certainly not the only deserving missing pieces from the chart. Honorable mention should also go to Blue Aeroplanes (they just missed), Pere Ubu, Material, Springhouse (one of the best new bands of the year), Rain Tree Crow (Japan lives!), Peter Holsapple and Chris Stamey ("Mavericks" was truly wonderful), Roger McGuinn, Jack Frost ("I Thought That I Was Over You" remains one of the year's best songs), The 360's, Nathalie Archangel ("It Don't Heal Clean" should have been a major smash) and Chris Stamey's solo "Fireworks" ("On The Radio" still can be a huge hit).

1.) Into Paradise, "Churchtown" (Ensign/Chrysalis) One of Ireland's best continues to remain



an under discovered gem. Dave Long's fiery passion and darkly seductive songs have yet to show themselves on stage here in The States. That can be the only reason why more stations didn't pick up on outstanding tracks like "Burns My Skin", and especially "Angel". The band is cut from a similar cloth as producer Adrian Borland's old unit The Sound, but there's also a hint of early Televison in their highly emotional mix. This sophomore effort

was a grand leap from the debut, and hopefully the third time will be the right charm to snake loose some support.

3.) Uncle Green, "What An Experiment His Head Was" (DB RECS) A great title, and even finer



collection of guitar based pop. Uncle Green hit their stride with their third release for DB, and they may be able to leap from the best kept secret scene a little easier in 1992, through their new deal with Atlantic Records. This album was in fact shopped for a full year before DB put it out, making one wonder how so many could have passed in the first place. Tracks like "I Don't Wanna Know About It", "Deal

Of A Lifetime", the beautiful "Like Today", and especially "I Won't Let It Drop" should be required listening for anyone with a sweet ear for great pop tunes.

5.) Sam Phillips, "Cruel Inventions" (VIR-





severely overlooked woman, causing all of you to get yet another chance at discovering her. "Cruel Intentions" was a more acoustic based outing then her label debut, and incorporated bits of the feel that enveloped her last Leslie effort, "The Turning" (on Word Records). "Lying" may have been the first single, but the real unheard masterpiece of the set has got to be "Tripping Over Gravity", which is like

Peter Gabriel collaborating with Marti Jones. Once again produced by husband T Bone Burnett, the fact that you failed to expose this album makes me want to be a mailman.

2.) Massive Attack, "Blue Lines" (VIRGIN) Hands down, one of the year's best



Hands down, one of the year's best total efforts. Massive Attack may be too diverse for instant digestion, playing in a variety of sonic shades. Everything from Motown and Mayfield to Hip-Hop and back to the Beatles is thrown into the flow of "Blue Lines" with awesome results. How we could let hits like "Safe From Home" and "Be Thankful For What You've Got" slip by is beyond comprehension. But for

the true measure of this overlooked achievement, go back and listen to "Hymn Of The Big Wheel". Only this time pay attention! A melting pot of genre and execution, Massive Attack might just be the most glaring omission from this year's final tote board.

4.) American Music Club, "Everclear"

(ALIAS) It's records like this that so many of us proclaim to



be the reason for living, yet far too few expose with regularity. Held back, almost as if you feel the public just isn't smart enough to enjoy it, much the same as Van Morrison. Mark Eitzel explores side streets of the human condition with "Miracle On 8th Street", and steadfast hope on the anthemic "Rise". American Music Club makes you think, drawing blood with a hypnotic web of imagination that is all too

real most of the time. "Everclear" isn't just a record, it's a necessity never too late for discovery. Forget hit singles for a minute, and catch up on the real deal.

6.) Toad The Wet Sprocket, "Fear" (COLUM-

BÍA) There's still time to change the tally on this California



band, with their dramatic and powerful portrait of rape ("Hold Her Down") just released. But it seems that Toad either connect with the force of crazy glue or totally pass you by. I've always felt they were a great band, and "Fear" only reinforced that belief. In this opinion "Walk On The Ocean" would have made a better first choice, although "Is It For Me?" wasn't far from the mark (does anybody

recognize Josh Rosenthal's voice in that chorus--- it's there!) "Butterfly" was mostly a nod to Andy Partridge, but "I Will Not Take These Things For Granted" is near timeless.

With the mainstream success of acts like Jesus Jones, EMF, and most recently, Nirvana, you'd think that 1991 could be considered the year alternative radio finally gained the terra firma and widespread admiration it has deserved for so long. Unfortunately, it will probably be remembered in the years to come as the beginning of the end of the format. When we allow a supposedly credible trade publication to tell us that stations playing a John Prine, Sonny Sharrock, Linton Kwesi Johnson or A Tribe Called Quest have no place on their alternative chart, than that chart does not accurately reflect what alternative radio is. When we allow radio stations to be pressured into adding a "core" artist's release, regardless or how shitty it my be, we slap the faces of talented acts trying to become tomorrow's "core" artists. And when we allow college radio -- the very foundation of the format -- to be dismissed as nothing more than just a bunch of kids playing records for their friends, then we have turned our backs on those who will be creating the buzz on the next success story. We have done all of these this year, and unless we stop,

continued homogenization on alternative radio will ultimately result in its extinction.

When I got my gig at Rhino last year, my parents -- unsure of exactly what it was that their son did for a living -- asked me to explain "alternative radio". After spending nearly twenty minutes trying to do so, I finally gave up and, thinking to myself, just smiled. I would love nothing more than to be able to flash that same, knowing smile next year.

You can always count on Marrone to A) get everybody thinking and to B) make you nostalgic all over. '91 saw the beginning of what I perceive as a real positive decade ahead, fueled by a disgraceful war, growing dissent and disgust aimed at Bush, The Magic Johnson revelation, rock n' roll speaking for the untold millions of flannel-shirted, awkward teenagers who needed a voice (Nirvana, Guns) the continued palsy gripping college radio, (make no mistake, except for a few, the stations are mostly very boring, and run by very boring elitists/morons), the recmergence of rampant Nazism in Germany and Poland. All these events and things will have to be answered for, and we'll be challenged to face them in the months and year ahead. He's got the uncanny ability to spell this out very plainly lyrically, but the words go to the third power, multiplying over and over, like only maybe Lou Reed knows how to do (like the title of his new LP "Magic And Loss" doesn't just sit there, does it?) College radio has shut down. There are no crazies running stations. The conservatism that strangles the "format" at the moment exists because well-meaning, well-adjusted kids are playing acceptable records and they're (mostly) a bunch of doting fools following orders. Gimme some freaks! Gimme somebody who uses lots of drugs! How about someone with an opinion now and then? Enough of this bullshit at conventions about how the meany major labels brutalize these kids out of playing "underground" records. People who play interesting, intelligent music, underground, above ground, playground, are not readily swayed by conniving record types because they believe in themselves and they believe in the music they play and they believe that by playing these records they can have a piece of the fuckin' world that their's for a change. Audience be damned. Majors be damned. "Alternative" music be damned. Indies be damned. Whether it's the Chieftains or the Toiling Midgets. I just want to see more stations with passionate visionaries behind the wheel instead of hundreds of Hostess warehouses. Plans for '92: Get rid of craggy old Bush. 2) Recruit 700 malcontents to run alternative radio. 3) Revolution, and not of the Tracy Chapman or John Lennon strain, but one of humility that relies on pre-Bronski Beat musical knowledge for inspiration, one that's born of real curiosity and a desire to stimulate the intellect. I though that's what it was all about.

Bruce McDonald, Link Records

While I am encouraged by this past year's successes (Jane's Addiction, Nirvana, Nine Inch Nails, Jesus Jones, etc) I believe that there is cause for concern. As this industry falls over itself to cash in on this new (!?!) trend I find that with a few exceptions, radio and labels are chasing trends rather than setting them.

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Alternative radio stations are becoming so tightly formatted as to rob their programming of any real spontaneity and excitement. I am becoming convinced that more other a few of these programmers don't really listen to music anymore. And those who do listen, are spending a fraction of the time that they formerly devoted to the process. I find this particularly ironic considering that if you take away the music, you have just another radio station. What happened to the pure thrill of discovering and sharing new music? We need the folks in radio to actively seek out and support the next generation of bands. Remember, complacency is what crippled if not killed AOR radio!

On the label side, I can see the tug of war beginning between those looking for a quick fix and those in favor of artist development. I am bracing myself for an onslaught of Jane's Addiction and Nirvana clones. And I can't help but be enraged by the growing number of fine bands that get ground up and spit out after one release that was poorly marketed and, surprise, didn't meet the unrealistic expectations of the label.

I hate to seem so negative (or perhaps, paranoid) I am just concerned that many of the people who we rely on to have an open mind, have significantly narrowed their vision. And I feel that if we are not more careful, this alternative format, genre, whatever you want to call it, will collapse under its own weight.

Michelle Higgins, Boomerang

The words "streamlining", "meeting" and even "phone call" have became scary monsters for many of my clients and radio stations in the last year and indeed we have seen some fine people become devoid of jobs.

Along with that I'm seeing a lot more humanity coming back into the world, people helping each other and becoming more conscious of the environment and its needs, myself included.

Musically, we've seen a continued strengthening of independent companies who have lived with low overhead for year taking the recession in a less difficult stride than the majors have been forced to do. TVT, Caroline, Sub Pop, Mammoth and Alias are among many who can quote vastly improved sales figures this year.

I am also delighted to see each year how much priority is increasing with major companies regarding our format, with undying belief in bands. Mercury's devotion to Material Issue resulted in a debut album with three singles over seven months of airplay. In Minneapolis alone this band went from playing to 125 people to turning hundreds away at a 1,200 seater venue!

My greatest tribute to radio must be for their recognition of the Smashing Pumpkins, for commercial radio at least, went from being their worst nightmare to brilliant request, sales and concert stories.

It was also a pleasure to work with EMF and see six figure sales well before they went to the Top 40 arena. This year has been fantastic for alternative radio breaking bands to an extent where they can win at other formats and this is very much to all our credit.

We must remember where the bands broke first and make sure those stations are looked after when a band becomes multi format. Nothing pisses off a programmers more that when a band tours and all Top 40 station appears to walk away with all the kudos, it's tough but heads of promotion have to deal with it as it becomes a major problem the next time we got to them with a potential crossover band.

In the next year, we need to build the format in terms of numbers. We've welcomed several key market stations on board this year, and I hope this will continue as there is no doubt we will lose some more before the recession wanes.

Radio should feel an economic upswing fairly soon as the business sector will spend more now that interest rates have fallen

and that will follow through to the consumer market. Here's hoping anyway.

Personally I've had a great year in every way: Clients recognise and reward hard and tenacious promotion, and stations recognise and listen to people who continually bring them records they can have success with.

What we must not lose sight of is the non-obvious records. If a company makes a record a major priority and radio can see them hanging in, surely it makes sense to credit their intelligence and give the record a shot even if the station is not positive of its validity. By the same token, if a radio station or trade paper crusades for a band, companies must get behind them no matter what the in house priority.

Speaking of trade papers crusading for records, I can't thank Bill Hard enough for putting Paul Kelly's Australian single, "Don't Start Me Talking" on his Hard Report AOR sampler. He did it off his own bat because he cares so much about Paul and he did it for free -- gotta love that! Hopefully it will spark interest at the record company level for this very talented songwriter.

Playlists are tight but I'm seeing more stations crossing records over from new music shows or "test" rotations so dabbling with a record seems to give them confidence. I'm definitely feeling that our stations' audiences are growing in numbers and also T.S.L. seems to be up in many cities, particularly at night.

Local stories seem to be a key this year, look how Boston championed Tribe, Chicago rallied for the Pumpkins, and the Edge has to be given a lot of credit for their "Tales From The Edge" series -- brilliant marketing!

Keep up the good work, Mike and Beth, you're the best!

On the positive side of 1991 we have the emergence of new stations in Seattle, Austin, etc., and the crossover of artists like Jesus Jones, Divinyls, Nirvana, EMF and others to CHR and AOR. On a personal level, both Q-Fest's furthered the legacy of the festival. Plain and simple there was a hell of lot of great music in 1991. I got to meet and expand relationships with many people in the industry. Favorite shows of the year were Lollapalooza and The Pixies/Pere Ubu double bill. I'm amused that I was on national TV ("A Current Affair") and most of my peers didn't even see it! Personal musical faves were Primus, Nirvana, Joan Jett, Smashing Pumpkins, Starlings and Tin Machine amongst quite a few others. Band of the year, Carter The Unstoppable Sex Machine.

Instead of turning to indie promotion, some people are likely to start their own labels. It won't be the same in a sense, but it could have similar repercussions. This format is not going away, and as we get further into the decade there will be some cosmetic alterations, but I believe the soul will remain true. As a lifer of the format, with no end in sight, I couldn't imagine being more fulfilled in spirit and work than I am today. That may sound hokey to some, but is honestly the way I feel. In making an attempt to put 1991 into any sort of perspective, there are a million things that come to mind. First and foremost (and these will be the same gripes that we've had for at least the last five years) is the continuing lack of respect and credit given to the "alternative" format itself. Apparently, those of us who've been involved the longest are going about something the wrong way, as we've been bitching about the same things for years. We're doing some things right -- the amazing success with bands such as Nirvana and Jane's (and by no means should radio reps obviously started at alternative -- both retail and radio. So we're capable of doing things right. Still, records like that are the exception rather than the rule. But the pervasive feeling still seems to be "well, we don't really know what to do with it, so we'll start it at Alternative." I refuse to believe that I'm the only person (indie or label employed) who's still hearing those god-awful words. To the best of my knowledge, this is the only format given the option to report to nine different trades. And of those nine, the one that's the greatest barometer for success or failure (according to some) accepts reports from 29 stations. The format needs expansion, not constriction. We're elitist enough as is while at the same time, in the eyes many in the industry, we're still the bastard child. Quite a dichotomy. Airplay sells records. But if records aren't available in record stores, records can't sell. In 1992, we need to continue to explore any and all methods of exposing new bands. Radio is vital, and it always will be, but there is only so much room available on any playlist at any given time. Not an excuse, a reality. Marketing has probably never been more important than it is today -- and those of us in alternative promotion need to be cognizant not only of how it works, but how to use it.

Amy Grosser, Zoo

Another year older, another year wiser? I doubt it. So much has been said about the state of Commercial Alternative and College radio. It's been beaten to death at every convention while rehashing the same topics year after year. I see it as choice. The programmer of the station has a choice as to the direction of the station. This programmer has the option to use the many tools provided i.e. consultants (choice in some case, of course), trades, market research, outside influences, information from record people and indies, gut feelings, etc. The combination of tools used will aid the programmer in creating the sound he wants. Unfortunately rarely does an idea situation occur. Two problems stick out like sore thumbs dying to be chopped off. The first comes with the college stations. Many college radio stations are thought of as commercial alternative due to their market size,

reach and reputation. If these stations want to pattern themselves after commercial stations and receive all the benefits of commercial radio, they have to take the responsibility for it. Calling in to report a playlist takes maybe five minutes per trade (not counting time on hold). The point is a given. Do you take the responsibility or don't you? The second problem can occur with all radio stations. We all have jobs in this music industry. Ideally we're doing this because we love music but it is our job. We deal with people we've known for years and constantly meet new people whether it be on the phone or in person. In dealing with people one comes in contact with many different personalities, that's a force of human nature, however since we are in the business of communication, wouldn't it be a good idea if we just chilled out and gave each other the benefit of the doubt whether we could all get along. News flash, record people are not out to get you. I can't speak for everyone and I know everyone approaches their job in their own way, but let's just talk, it can be that simple. It's a two way street and we can all help each other in promoting alternative music. That was the idea, right? Music for the 90's: (at least some of my faves from the past year) Pixies, B.A.D. II, Nirvana, Harry Connick, Jr., Peter Himmelman, Garth Brooks, Fugazi, Smithsonian's Six Decades of Songwriters and Singers, Matthew Sweet and (the currently overlooked) Odds. 

There couldn't have been a band more deserving of the #1 position on our Year End Hard Hitters chart this year. Though most people expected Metallica to dominate it once again (they did manage #2), the incredible comeback release from this, one of metal's most loved veteran acts, wasn's to be denied. They first debuted on the chart April 26th, went Top 15 the following week, were Top Ten the next two, and then they slammed their way home to #1 the first weet of June (and remained there for a solid *40 weeks). At press time they are still on Hard Hitters, welLinto their 34th week on the chart. Armored Saint have been pounding metal pavement Tor near a decade (having first surfaced back im 82, with their first Ep "Armored Saint." released on Metal Blade in 1983), and it's stop been a road easily traveled Having overcome more than their share of hardships, the band (John Bush-vocals) Joe Vera-bass. Gonzo-drums, Phil Sandovalguitar and Jeff Duncan-gyitan, have come full circle with this critically acclaimed album and are now looking at a future of renewed ambitions and incredible possibilities. "Symbol" also was the first full record from them that marked their return to Metal Blade (though they also released their live "Saints Will Conquer" Ep on MB), after a rocky experience on, Chrysalis, which despite all the problems did yield the also much acclaimed releases "March Of The Saint" "Delirious Nomad" and "Raising Fear" bit also marked their return to the O-Prime Management family—a wonderful turn of events for so deserving a group. More than all that, however, "Symbol Of Salvation" is a record that documents this band's incredible ability to persevere, overcome and succeed in the face of tragedy (the untimely death of founding member? guitarist Dave Prichard). While they ery easily could have chosen to call it a career and move on to, other things, or change the name, they opted instead to buckle down and purge their frustrations sorrows, and hopes the best way they knew how—through their agreement family—a wonde


In Retrospect

The Metal Wrap-Up for 1991

And to the metal community, the family like no other in this business--You rock my world, you keep me sane and through it all we still come clean and strong and ready for the many challenges that still lie ahead. With the economic conditions the way they are, the touring situation in such a tailspin, record sales down, bands being dropped and/or struggling worse than ever, and jobs continually put on the line or worse, the chopping block...we've a tough year ahead, but hopefully with optimism, determination and dedication we can make it a prosperous one despite all the obstacles. Still to come in '92 new LPs from Spread Eagle, Guilt, Exhorder, Lawnmower Deth, Roxy Blue, TNT, Trouble, Danzig, Def Leppard, Saigon Kick, Love/Hate, Warbabies, Killer Dwarfs, Kiss, and tons more. See you in January.

The Hardest of the Hard

Metallica, "Metallica", Elektra.... One of the most highly anticipated albums of last couple of years was of course, the untitled (it's just come to be called "Metallica"), follow-up to the platinum "... And Justice For All". And it is a landmark release for more reasons



than just that. In our wildest dreams would we have ever expected Metallica (metal's ultimate band), to become an AOR smash (even after the radio/video success of "One"), on hundreds of radio stations nationwide and multi-platinum faster than you could bang your head? Obviously, the band and their management did, not to mention Elektra. Fans believe it now. And here I sit listening to "Enter Sandman" and feeling somewhat "tired" of it?! Arghhh!! Ah, "Sad But True" now that's better--I'll never tire of the rest of this LP--so brilliant. The record is most impressive in the fabulous transition that took place within the band's musical stance. Gone are the over long, brutal, aggressive pieces. Here are utterly musical "songs"--finely cut, chiseled to perfection, (Bob Rock) produced for ultimate clarity and BIG sounding drums, and ohmigod, perfect for radio play. Sell out? Never. Maturation and innovation? Absolutely. Metallica have risen above the sea of lemming sound-a-likes, to once again forge a path for all to admire and praise. A record rich in texture, emotion, reflection, and melody, while still offering up a nasty, crunchy bed of riffs, "Metallica" is the consummate metal record. A new standard in the

appreciation of what is "metal", what was, and/or will never be. It challenged the borders of AOR, crushed and buried them, and with the band now on the road (and selling out, natch), the videos for "Enter Sandman" and "The Unforgiven" all over your MTV, their reign over the AOR charts is far from over. Currently, they are descending Hard Hitters (to #4 after relinquishing a 14 week run at #1 to Soundgarden a few weeks back), but tomorrow's another year after all. Still the ultimate, though it's not just metal anymore... It's Metallica.

Fates Warning, "Parallels", Metal Blade/Reprise.... It's been a fine year for Metal Blade, as they can be proud of the wonderful job they did with Armored Saint. Now it seems they are readily following up that success story with this still building one.



Released only about six weeks ago, as we exit 1991, "Parallels" now sits at #1 on the Hard Hitters chart (after dethroning Soundgarden). The follow-up to the critically acclaimed "Perfect Symmetry" and its sort-of hit "Through Different Eyes", "Parallels" continues the bands move towards a greater accessibility by curbing their very progressive tendencies. A beautiful record, it has long-time fans in awe of its flowing nature and the stunning lyrical beauty, while claiming tons of new believers. Bah-humbug to anyone who thinks it's a sell-out. It's a very obvious progression for the band musically, and in all honesty, a very necessary one. Fates stood the risk of stagnating within the confines of the progressive realms, and it would have cost them their future as a band. Instead they opted to simplify, clarify and re-focus their style and sound--the result a record that simply rings (Terry Brown produced) with class and style, while still appealing to the metal base that has long

supported them. Several AORs have already added "Eye To Eye", sales are consistent and strong and the band hopes to hit the road early next year. So they head into 1992 on top, with still nowhere to go but up... even if it is over on the other side of the fence. We support them all the way...that much is obvious. Thanks to Metallica, Ryche, Extreme, Alice In Chains and the like... Fates may now get their chance.

Soundgarden, "Badmotorfinger", A&M.... It's a mighty band who can topple the likes of Metallica from out of the #1 spot on the metal charts, and so Soundgarden now holds the honor of having done just that. The metallic masses were first introduced to



this Seattle wonder (see the onslaught from that area didn't really start this year like everyone seems to think, it's been happening for a couple), by way of 1989's barrier crossing "Louder Than Love" album-the band's major label debut. With "Hands All Over", and "Loud Love" the band led by the ultra charismatic Chris Cornell, slammed out of the Alternative ranks and slowly began to pound upon and devastate the metallic masses. And while their chart story on the Alternate end left tons to be desired, Soundgarden, with their brutal grunge and grind (and "Jesus Christ Pose"--with it's mind-blowing video), were clutched quickly to metal's bosom, hailed as kings and ascended accordingly to #1 on the Hard Hitters chart just three weeks previous to this one (having only just succumbed to Fates after two weeks on top). This in the midst of their current 13 or so week run here on the hard side. Now on tour with Guns N'Roses, "Outshined" solidly sticking it to the AOR's and the buzz still just beginning on the somewhat more "rock" oriented "Badmotorfinger" (an incredible record that continues to further take hold

of my consciousness, with its incredible power), it's really all just beginning. Grows on you like crazy... and no doubt 1992, will be the year of Soundgarden, kinda like '91 belonged to fellow Seattlites Queensryche, Alice In Chains and Nirvana.

Sepultura, "Arise", RC Records.... Seattle wasn't the only new scene in town. Brazil's best thrash quartet offered up a new record this year, that would soon give Slayer a good run for their money. Hailed as the inheritor's of the thrash throne Sepultura,



create massive walls of riffs tighter than you can imagine, levelled by Max Cavallero's deep throaty growls, and because of their intense musicality have succeeded in winning over the massive amounts of metalliles from the most death entrenched camps to even the more sedate and commercial bound reporters. "Arise" managed a 29 week run on the Hard Hitters charts, four of which were spent at the highly coveted #1 spot. This at the height of their run on the immensely popular New Titans On The Block tour with Sacred Reich, Napalm Death and Sick of It All. And while currently rumbling below the chart, RC has just serviced the title track as the new single b/w two live cuts (easily nailing #1 Most Added as we head into the new chart year). Sepultura are one of the most devastating live bands I've seen all year, and I have a very strong sneaking suspicion that we most definitely have not heard the last from them on the charts. Check back in January and we'll see.

Hard Rock/Heavy Metal

Warrior Soul, "Drugs, God & The New Republic", DGC This New York, by way of Detroit, sensation first infiltrated



our collective metal conscious two years ago, with their stunning debut album, "Last Decade Dead Century". Shocking in it's political sarcasm and biting attack, the raw and raspy vocals of frontman Kory Clarke and its bleak outlook for a dying nation, amidst a call to arms for the huddled masses..."The Losers", it introduced one of metal's brightest new acts. Not a mild-mannered band by any means, Warrior Soul are aptly named--a force fighting for the underdog, the socially encumbered, the suppressed and more overtly, the angry. Striking deep within the heart of a struggling nation. Lyrically they attempt a poetic, yet political stance and succeed. Kory is like nothing we've ever seen. A wild man on a rampage, with a vision he's trying to make clear to the rest of the world. The breakthrough began, with the band's incredible follow-up, "Drugs, God & The New Republic". A sharp, focused package of songs, more accessible in nature, equally as angry, but less bleak. From the punk

grind of "Wasteland" to the powerful bass driven, "Hero" to the mind-blowing title track, the LP is a sonic experience. Whether the soapbox stance is one you ascribe to or not, it's hard to deny the songwriting and excellent musicianship this record offered. During its 23 week run on the chart it managed in between the slew of thrash rulers to nab one week at #1, but in my mind its still way up there and will be for some time to come.

Metal Church, "Human Factor", Epic.... When Metal Church, yet another Seattle sensation, departed 1989, they did so way



up on the year end charts with their "Blessing In Disguise" album, and in the same situation as Wrathchild (sce below). In effect they found themselves dropped from their label (Elektra) and looking at an uncertain future. Then came Epic to the rescue, following a tough couple of years (during which the band were plagued with label and management changes), the boys finally got down and out, their second Lp with vocalist Mike Howe at the Mic, "Human Factor". The record was accepted readily at metal radio, with its "real" music theme (no electronic gadgetry, sampling, etc...) and socially aware lyrical content. Immediately after that first blast of Church crunch in the ear, our metal reporters were slamming em onto the airwaves. First with the title tracks, then the follow-up "Date With Poverty" (to which they shot a much liked, often played video) and then most recently, "In Mourning". All totalled, "Human Factor" spent 24 weeks on the chart, two of which were at #1.

Not a bad chart year thanks also to a ton of touring (Operation Rock N'Roll/Europe/Japan). 1992 should prove all the more interesting, with hopefully a new LP from the band.

Wrathchild America, "3D", Atlantic.... One of Baltimore's prize live possessions (they practically call Hammerjack's home), Wrathchild have had one of those years that walks the line between really good and really bad. While having nailed #1 carly on and holding there for 6 weeks with their second album "3D" (the follow-up to "Climbing The Walls"), and in the midst of a tour with





Armored Saint and Last Crack, they were dropped from the label (all in all they enjoyed a total run of 26 weeks on the chart). Interesting ain't it? We and the hordes of metal fiends who jam on their funked up metal musings...well, we just don't get it. Bummer. Well, some cool label out there will no doubt see the merits of this talented bunch. Point is, Wrathchild are an incredibly talented band who are absolutely amazing on stage. If this is sounding like an advertisement... uh, well it's only because so many of us love them and want to see them find a new home real soon so we can get even more tunes to mosh to, ok? By the way, they came in at #7 on the Year End Top 100 (and are in some very big company). Hmmm. Down the road... who knows, they may be the next big thing to break through (they're already an East Coast phenomenon). We think it's just a matter of time. I only hope someone can afford to allow them the luxury of that. In the meantime NY's metal

posse will continue the crusade to make Wrathchild a household word--whether the rest of the world wants us to or not.

Megadeth, "Rust In Peace", Capitol... And last, but certainly far from least, 1991 was the culmination of a beautiful campaign by the label, management, radio and press, behind this hyper progressive speed metal sensation. Mustaine,

Mustaine, Ellefson and Co. sat on top, at #1, as we came into 1991, but it was really all just beginning for them at that point. The wave had just begun to crest as it were, since the band were just beginning a 9 week run at #1 (they spent a total of 26 weeks on this year), and were of course, well on their way to gold. Their role in the Clash of The Titans tour (not to mention dates in 1990 with Judas Priest and Testament) was a real key into bringing the clean, sober and revitalized (with two strong new members, Marty Friedman and Nick Menza now firmly settled into their respective roles) Megadeth even further into the ring. It's been a year of just reward for Dave and friends, as they swept metal radio with their most lethal offering yet. They wind down the year with an incredible #6 showing on the Year End Top 100 (last year they were #13). A good couple of years it's been

indeed. Congratulations to the Mega-ones on an excellent album, and such an incredibly successful year. Here's to the next one!

Pearl Jam, "Let Me Sleep (Christmas Time)"/"Ramblings", Epic... As you read this, you should just be receiving this nifty little surprise stocking stuffer. A 7" from the world's ultimate new Seattle hit, Pearl Jam. This quick little rollicking number is



a perfect way to "spread" a bit of holiday cheer--an it's one that echoes our year end sentiments perfectly--"Let Me Sleep it's Christmas Time"! So true. It's far from perfect, like it was recorded in front of the fireplace one snowy evening somewhere, just a tiny little lullaby to close down the year. But it's so very them--so very real. 1991's been a year that has brought Pearl Jam farther into the spotlight, and faster probably, than the band expected. Oh, and on the B-side is a very funny little howdy, hi-there session with the band, and it's them, well...rambling on through a mesh of holiday greetings, strange thoughts, lots of laughter and some food for thought, like "if you rearrange two letters in Santa...it spells Satan". Y'know bizarre little greetings like that, and it's really all quite fun. So there you have it, just another

way, you can help cultivate the Pearl. Merry Merry.

Music Now!

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The Jamaican Supreme Court has ruled that the assets of Bob Marley should remain with the Marley family, in a ruling being seen with nationalistic pride in Jamaica. Marley died in 1981 without a will and there had been strong feelings in Jamaica that his estate should remain there, the country where he received the National Honor of Order of Merit. Justice Clarence Walker ruled that the adult beneficiaries of Island Logic Ltd., a New York company run by Chris Blackwell, should receive the Marley assets for \$11.5 million. The details of the sale are to be announced in a few days. Rita Marley, Bob's widow and a member of the I-Threes backing group, and six of the eleven Marley children are said to be joyful that the Marley legacy did not go to the Japanese-owned MCA Inc., which had offered \$15.2 million. Island Logic plans to release a 100-song Marley compilation album.

British singer Cliff Richard has launched an attack on Guns N' Roses, branding them a bad influence on fans. The Los Angeles-based band's lifestyle has outraged Richard, who is currently on the British charts with "We Shall Be Together." He says Guns N' Roses make "dreadful" records and promoting a "fake" lifestyle. "A band like Guns N' Roses create a violent atmosphere," Richard says. "I was there at the beginning of rock and negativity is not what it's all about. Why do people accept this trash? It's time people like Guns N' Roses grew up." A Guns N' Roses spokesman responded by saying, "We've never heard of Cliff Richard. When he's as famous as Guns N' Roses, I'm sure they'll be happy to take anything he has to say seriously."

Nominations have been announced for the 1992 Brit Awards for the best British and international music. Stars present at the news conference in London included Seal, Beverly Craven and Cathy Dennis. Nominated for best British male artist were Elton John, George Michael, Kenny Thomas, Phil Collins, Seal and Van Morrison. Best female British artist nominees were Annie Lennox, Beverly Craven, Cathy Dennis, Lisa Stansfield and Zoe. Nominated for best British group were Dire Straits, James, KLF, Pet Shop Boys, Queen and Simply Red. For the best international artist, nominees were Bryan Adams, Enya, Madonna, Michael Bolton and Prince, while nominees for best international group were Extreme, Guns N' Roses, INXS, R.E.M., and U2. Members of the British Phonographic Industry, including over 150 record companies in the United Kingdom, were surveyed to come up with the nominees. The awards ceremony will take place February 12 at the Hammersmith Odeon in London.

A U.S. Bankruptcy Court judge in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, has voided Stevie B's contract with his past record label (LMR Records) in favor of a contract he signed (with Sony) in February. Stevie B had contended that his old label breached his agreement because it didn't pay his royalties in a timely manner, forcing him to declare bankruptcy.

Bruce Hornsby is planning to record orchestral versions of his songs with arranger Mike Gibbs. "I really like him from his work on old Gary Burton records and with Joni Mitchell on her song 'Paprika Plains.' I also want to work up orchestral versions of my songs because I'm playing with two symphony orchestras in Virginia next year." Hornsby is taking some time off from his Grateful Dead duties to go to Los Angeles to play on the next album from Shawn Colvin.

Faith No More are about to begin recording the follow-up to "The Real Thing" in San Francisco. The LP should be out in the spring.

Plans for Madonna's home entertainment company, "Home," have reportedly been put on hold until early next year.

The Lovin' Spoonful plan to tour next year with their original members except for singer John Sebastian.

A major record chain has decided to put its own warning stickers on NWA's "Niggaz4Life" album, banning sales of the album to those under age 18. It's believed to be in response to Ohio authorities who had been investigating whether copies of the album have been sold to minors. But a spokesman for the Recording Industry Association of America views it "as a bad move. It sets a dangerous precedent for other retailers to take this into their own hands."

Volkswagen is sponsoring a European tour by Genesis. The car manufacturer's support is valued at about \$12.5 million.

Members of the Guardian Angels demonstrated in front of Ice Cube's record label's offices in Los Angeles in protest of his "Death Certificate" album. They said they think Cube is "a musical David Duke." But Chuck D of Public Enemy says he thinks the record is great. "I bought the album the first day and

I can't seem to stop playing it," he says. "A lot of people (who are criticizing it) are just paranoid and they need to calm down and listen. Instead of complaining about being slandered, they should spend some of that energy coming into the black community and trying to come up with solutions to the problems."

Ozzy Osbourne plans a Los Angeles concert on March 19 marking the tenth anniversary of the plane crash that killed guitarist Randy Rhoads in Florida. Some of the money raised in the concert at the Sports Arena will go for the purchase of a tomb for Rhoads in San Bernadino. His existing grave has been desecrated by fans looking for souvenirs.

Michael Lardie, guitarist for Great White, recently suffered a hairline fracture of his wrist during an attempt to bench-press 250 pounds.

Gene Simmons has asked his attorneys to look into whether Teenage Fanclub have violated a copyright with the artwork on their new album, "Bandwagonesque." He says the use of the image of a large moneybag with a dollar sign is too similar to the logo for his record label, Loot Records.

Bad English won't be touring in support of their second album, "Backlash," but John Waite says he might put a touring band together "to play a combined set of Bad English songs and my solo stuff." Waite says the songs for the album were chosen by producer Ron Nevison. "I'm actually very pleased with the way the record turned out," Waite says. "It's too good a record to let die, which is why I'm prepared to put the work in to push it."

Officials in Dade County, Florida, have noticed that some of the court records involving the late Doors lead singer Jim Morrison are missing. A total of 43 Morrison-related documents and photographs are missing, and the county wants the Federal Bureau of Investigation to investigate the thefts. A bail bond sheet from when Morrison was arrested for obscenity in 1969 was auctioned in New York this summer for \$15,950.

The North American Concert Promoters Association has released a "Bottom 10" list of the worst-performing concert tours of the year, arguing that artists like Whitney Houston, Huey Lewis, Diana Ross and Steve Winwood demanded so much advance money that it was impossible for them to break even. A "Bottom 10" released by the organization said the Operation Rock & Roll Tour, which featured Alice Cooper, Judas Priest and Motorhead, was the biggest money-losing tour of the year. Tours by Whitney Houston, David Lee Roth, Huey Lewis, Diana Ross, Steve Winwood, the Club MTV tour which featured Bell Biv DeVoe and Tony! Toni! Tone!, the Doobie Brothers, Amy Grant and Alabama were listed in the "Bottom 10." The organization says it lost over \$4 million last summer. "We felt that it was time that people knew the economic realities of producing certain acts in the '90s," says Carl Freed, executive director of the promoters group. He says the economy meant that more than half of the tours this summer lost money, the worst summer for concert promoters in history, though Paul Simon and the Grateful Dead were notable exceptions.

An out of court settlement has been reached in the lawsuit filed by members of Brian Wilson's family who had claimed that Dr. Eugene Landy had taken over the former Beach Boy's affairs. The settlement will give an independent conservator "specific and limited power" over Wilson's affairs, while there will be a "lengthy separation" of Landy and Wilson. Superior Court Judge Hiroshi Fujisaki ordered the agreement to remain confidential, but it's believed that all business contacts between Wilson and Landy are being terminated and Wilson will be able to revoke all previous wills. "Brian is happy the hostilities have finally ceased," says Wilson's attorney, Michael Rosenfeld. "He is at work already on a new record, and he's very excited about his new music." Both parties are to go back to court in a couple of weeks to finalize provisions of the agreement. Jody Leslie, attorney for Wilson's brother Carl, his mother, Audree, and his daughters Carnie and Wendy, says the family is satisfies that the settlement "would allow the singer the freedom to live his own life as he chooses."

Paul McCartney's "The Liverpool Oratorio" is the number one classical album in the U.S., displacing an album with Placido Domingo, Luciano Pavarotti and Jose Carreras which had topped the classical chart for over a year.

Paula Abdul has gotten a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. A congratulatory telegraph from Gene Kelly was read at the unveiling ceremony.

A 20-year-old student was in critical condition after being stabbed just after a recent free Van Halen concert in Dallas,

Texas. The incident occurred near the concert site when the student got out of his car to check on a traffic accident, and he was stabbed by one of the people in the accident. There were five minor arrests, as more people showed up for the concert than had been anticipated.

An old pair of sneakers owned by Madonna was auctioned for \$5,250 in New York City, in an auction sponsored by the Fashion Footwear Association of New York which raised money for Broadway Cares and Equity Fights AIDS. In another event celebrating World AIDS Day, Cyndi Lauper and Debbie Harry joined about 8,000 people at a danceathon in Manhattan. Salt-N-Pepa and 2 In A Room performed at the event at the Jacob Javits Convention Center.

Lloyd Cole says he reminisced a lot when he recorded one side of his "Don't Get Weird On Me, Babe" album at the Capitol Records Tower studio in Hollywood, orchestrated by Paul Buckmaster. "It's where Frank Sinatra and Nelson Riddle recorded the famous Sinatra big band sides of the '50s," Cole says. "Songs like 'Butterfly' and 'Margo's Waltz' on my album almost demanded a full orchestra. When I tour, keyboards can stand in for orchestration, but there's something special about a real string section." Cole says it wasn't his original plan to use the Capitol studio, but other studios had already been booked. "I sat there while the orchestra played and looked at all the old photos on the walls: Frank in a swingin' mood, Nelson Riddle conducting "I've Got You Under My Skin'..."

Guitarist Jeff Trot of Wire Train and World Party has produced a five-song demo for San Francisco band Honeypot in Los Angeles.

Merl Saunders has a new album coming out at the end of this month called "Save The Planet So We'll Have Some Place To Boogie."

Pigface, the group that includes Martin Atkins (ex-PIL, Killing Joke, Ministry) and Bill Rieflin (Ministry) have their second album out, a live LP called "Welcome To Mexico" (on Invisible Records).

Guitarist Keith Richards says the Rolling Stones will not record or tour in 1992, as various members, including Mick Jagger, begin work on solo projects. "I think Mick's starting a solo album and Ronnie Wood's cutting some solo tracks and Charlie Watts has got his jazz thing going," Richards says. Richards plans to release a studio album in June with his X-Pensive Winos and then play small venues to support the LP. "Mick and I got together a couple of weeks ago in London, but we've been writing for the Stones only in the most remote kind of way."

Jimi Hendrix has received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, in a ceremony attended by about 600 people, including Hendrix' father, Al, and his brother, Leon. Hendrix' record label paid the \$4,800 for the ceremony, just as it releases a four-CD Hendrix compilation album. "It was a long time coming, but good things happen to those who wait," Al Hendrix said at the event. Hendrix' star, the 1,943rd on the boulevard, is located between those for actor Art Carney and director Fred Zinneman.

Linda Ronstadt is releasing a second album of Mexican mariachi songs sung in Spanish. "Mas Canciones" concentrates more on trio and ensemble singing, Ronstadt says, and features her two brothers, Pete and Mike. "I had started to make a record in English, but I didn't like it and put it away. I found myself sleeping and dreaming in Spanish, and these songs were driving me crazy," Ronstadt says. "I kept waking up in the middle of the night thinking that the musicians who know this music are old, and if they go I won't have anybody to help me do it. I didn't dare put it off another minute." Ronstadt is also considering recording a bilingual album of Latin Jazz songs ranging from the late 1800s to the 1950s. She's also planning to record an album with accordionist Flaco Jimenez of Texas border music. Jimenez, who has played on a number of Ry Cooder albums, appears on one song on "Mas Canciones."

A Washington, D.C.-area radio station (WHFS-FM) recently held a contest where listeners were invited to write in and tell why they would like Billy Bragg to come to their home. The winning entry came from a dog, or actually the dog's owner, Stephanie Fox, who proposed a tea with "milkbones instead of crumpets." So, Bragg went to Fox's home in Arlington, Virginia, performing for her and her dog, Wes, as well as some friends.

Swans will have a new studio album in March (on Sky Records), called "Love Of Life." Anton Fier of the Golden Palominos and Clinton Steele of Mary My Hope will be featured on the LP and the band will be touring in support of it. Their label will also be releasing previous Swans albums as well as their album under the group name World Of Skin.

Tom Waits says he agreed to appear on the new album from jazz sax player Teddy Edwards because he wanted to help the Los Angeles musician's career. "Teddy has great command, great

sensitivity and a tremendous amount of dynamic range," Waits says. "And I don't know that Teddy's ever gotten the kind of recognition he's due for the contribution he's made to music." Waits first met Edwards when he played with Waits' band in a West Hollywood club in 1982, and Edwards subsequently toured Europe and the South Pacific with Waits. Edwards' album, "Mississippi Lad," is his first on a major label and his first release in nine years.

A "Thriller"-era white rhinestone glove worn by Michael Jackson is to be auctioned at Christie's in London on December 19. It's estimated that the glove could sell for as high as \$45,000.

Retired four-star general H. Norman Schwarzkopf might be on the record charts before long. He's narrated a recording of Aaron Copland's "A Lincoln Portrait" with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra which will be released internationally next February. The Operation Desert Storm commander recorded the narration in late October for the album "American Portraits," which will go on sale the day before Lincoln's birthday.

Jane's Addiction will release a four-track EP early next year of material from the "Ritual De Lo Habitual" album sessions.

The Happy Mondays cover the BeeGees' "Stayin' Alive" and Sinead O'Connor sings "Silent Night" on "The Ghosts Of Oxford Street," a soundtrack album put together by Malcolm McLaren that's just out in Britain. "It's beautiful," O'Connor says of her contribution. "I just sang the song. That's all there is to it. I did it for myself."

Ice Cube was the winner of the San Francisco Examiner's 1991 Golden Turkey Awards for his commercials for St. Ides Malt Liquor, which were pulled after protests over his new album. The newspaper's list of bad or offensive advertising also ranked Revlon eighth for using Nat King Cole's version of "Unforgettable" and not using any black women in their ads until Cole's widow complained.

Wynton Marsalis has been named jazz musician of the year by Down Beat magazine, while B.B. King was the blues/soul/R&B musician of the year, Sting won in the pop/rock category and Milton Nascimento was voted best world beat musician.

Graham Nash and his wife, Susan, have donated their collection of 19th century camera lucida drawings to the J. Paul Getty Museum in Malibu, California. The drawings were made with the help of an optical device and include most of the only known drawings by Sir John F. W. Herschel, a noted British astronomer and mathematician. "It's a great collection. I thought it should be in a great place," Nash says. Nash is keeping 36 of 316 Herschel drawings he bought in 1974. He began collecting photography in the early 1970s, and in the past two years has auctioned some of his collection and donated 140 contemporary photographs to the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

Billy Preston is joining The Band as they tour without Robbie Robertson.

A Florida State University study has found that students who listen to rock music outperformed others in an experiment in which they thought they were compiling data. Doctoral candidate Constance Campbell and Florida International University assistant professor of management Sherry Moss-McCreary studied the performance of 70 students while listening to music. A group that listened to rock music of about 120 beats per minute outperformed all others. Students who listened to slow "heartbeat" music of about 60 bpm were the slowest, while a group that heard no music at all ranked in the middle. "If somebody is working in a very repetitive job, fast music might be good to give them stimulation," Campbell says. "But if they're in an intense high-risk job, you might want to have the calming effect of music to slow them down and make them think more clearly." Campbell says the students who listened to rock music said they felt more stress, but Campbell says "a certain amount of stress is good for you."

The Fat Boys' producer is going on trial in central Florida, charged with trying to swindle Kissimmee entrepreneur Dick Dickerman out of \$300,000. Phillip Bradley was offering to buy Makinson Island in Lake Tohopekaliga from Dickerman for \$50 million, and at issue is whether Bradley misrepresented himself. He says he was only tring to raise money for a new Fat Boys album. If the first-degree grand theft case goes to trial, Bradley says he'd call the Fat Boys as character witnesses.

oan Baez is working on a new album in Nashville.

Bass player Nick Seymour of Crowded House says Tim Finn decided to leave the band while the band was in Scotland. "It was working out really well for a while, but Tim, I think, was just not enjoying touring anymore," Seymour says. "That's a very big part of Crowded House, the aspect of performing live. And what makes playing our songs enjoyable is exploiting the intuitive chemistry that exists in the group. Tim would find he wouldn't

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have enough to do, he was feeling a little left out at times, and then he would try to steer the ship in a direction the band didn't know how to go in. It just ended up being a sort of conflict of interests. That still doesn't detract from the fact the album has some great compositions, and Tim's had an active role in writing them." Drummer Paul Hester says he thinks Finn was actually relieved to be out of the group. "I think he knew it wasn't working," Hester says. "And we're happy. It's helped us define the band again."

Country music singer Wynonna Judd has filed a lawsuit against a man who made a videotape in 1987 of Judd making a surprise appearance with U2 at a concert at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro. Anthony Noe offered the tape for sale in a newspaper classified ad, asking for \$5,000 or the best offer. Judd says she and her manager have the right to the use of her photograph or likeness in "any medium in any manner." Noe says he's considering leaving town rather than turning over the tape.

Whitney Houston showed off a multi-carat diamond ring backstage at the Billboard Awards, suggesting that she and Bobby Brown may get married just after Christmas. They've been looking for a house in Atlanta.

Quincy Jones has received an honorary doctor of music degree from Loyola University in New Orleans. He was also given the fourth Distinguished Guest Artist Award from the school's College of Music Visiting Committee. Loyola president Reverend James Carter called Jones a role model for young people because of his generosity and talent. "He exemplifies many of the highest ideals of the Jesuit academic tradition and the aspirations of our Jesuit university," Carter said.

The Grammy Awards will be divided into two presentations, possibly as early as next year. Awards for jazz and classical categories will be presented in a separate broadcast, though musicians from those fields would still appear on the traditional Grammy show. The National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences has also decided to move the 1993 Grammy ceremony to an arena like the Meadowlands Arena, Madison Square Garden, or the Great Western Forum near Los Angeles -venues that are three times the size of halls currently being used. NARAS president Mike Greene says the larger facilities will provide an increased sense of "spectacle" and "may allow us to pack in more music and less monologue."

Willie Nelson appears in new advertisements for Delta Air Lines running in Texas. He's changed his "The Sunny Side Of The Street" to "The Easy Side Of The Street" as the airline promotes its terminal at the Dallas-Ft. Worth International Airport.

Bob Dylan made a surprise appearance at recording sessions for folk-rock band the **Fishermen** in Nashville recently.

The National Organization for Women says it was "hypocritical" for Billboard magazine to run an editorial against Ice Cube's new album. "Slaughtering women is clearly an acceptable subject to address in popular music as far as Billboard is concerned," Tammy Bruce, president of the Los Angeles NOW chapter, told the Los Angeles Times newspaper. "Billboard didn't write any editorials to complain about the dangerous impact of hostile, misogynistic raps of NWA's Dr. Dre, who is being sued for beating up a female talk-show host. The men who run the industry obviously do not consider one crime to be as serious as the other." Over fifty record company executives and music journalists have signed a petition that Cube's label (Priority Records) plans to run as an ad in Billboard.

Richie Sambora says he probably lost money on his just-completed solo tour. "If I wanted to tour I had no choice but use some of my own money," he says. "People are used to elaborate Bon Jovi shows and a certain quality, and I'm associated with that. I have an image to uphold, so the whole thing can't look tacky. Excellent lights, good equipment, quality musicians -- they don't come cheap."

Bass player Chris Harford, formerly the guitarist for Boston band Three Colours, and a member of Matthew Sweet's backing band, has signed a solo recording deal (with Elektra Records).

Keith Richards says he was prompted to release the new album "Keith Richards & The X-Pensive Winos Live At The Hollywood Palladium, December 15, 1988," because he'd seen so many bootleg videos that weren't of very good quality. "There are so many of them, mostly from Japan. And they're outrageously priced and of such bad quality. (Personal manager) Jane (Rose) said, 'Let's check out our footage. Whatever we have has got to be 10 times better than what people are buying," Richards explains. "My main attitude toward bootleggers has always been live and let live. I've got nothing against them making bread. But the quality of what they were doing in this case was so bad. I don't know how they manage to shoot the shows, but

they do. Maybe they work their cameras into their hats or something."

Two Chicago men are planning to dedicate a marker at the currently unmarked grave of blues legend Little Walter in a suburban Evergreen Park cemetary. Radio station (WLUP) DJ Scott Dirks and harmonica player Eomot Rasun plan to do so on February 15, the 24th anniversary of the death of Marion Walter Jacobs. "He was the first to play the harmonica through an amplifier, cupping his hands around it and playing into a microphone, and that created another whole instrument," Dirks says. "So every harmonica player today, whether they realize it or not, is influenced by what he did." Jacobs played on many of Muddy Waters' records, including "Got My Mojo Working," and also toured with Otis Rush and the Rolling Stones.

A free Miami weekly newspaper decided it didn't want to wait for Bruce Springsteen's new album. So New Times music critic Greg Baker decided to make up a review. "We were thinking, let's just mess with people's heads here," Baker says. "We'll decide when this recording comes out, and Springsteen won't have any say in it. That's what he does to us." The newspaper ran a two-page review of the album, which it called "Parking Free," and provided sample lyrics and a claimed interview with Springsteen. But a careful read of the interview might have given away the fraud. "Sometimes it seems like they (critics) make stuff up to hear themselves talk and haven't even listened to the record," Springsteen said in the fake interview. Baker says it's an insult that Springsteen has waited over four years to release the follow-up to "Tunnel Of Love." "There's got to be some sense of obligation from an artist we made rich. The album should have been made by now. I'm calling him on it. I'm saying give it up or we'll make our own damn album."

Elton John's elderly father hopes to be reunited with his estranged son before he dies. Former RAF pilot Stanley Dwight says he hasn't seen Elton for nine years when he underwent the first of four major heart operations. "I just accept that Elton and I live on different planets," says the elderly Dwight. "But he's welcome to visit us anytime. We will always be here for him. Elton confirms he "had never got on" with his father. "I was very afraid of my father as a child, not because he was particularly violent toward me. I just used to fear his coming home."

Glen Hansard, who played guitarist Outspan Foster in the film of the Commitments, says he's not pleased to hear there will be a "The Commitments 2" album of songs "from or inspired by the movie." "Some of the cast are in danger of becoming 'professional Commitments,' they're happily living off the film without considering the future and there are going to be a lot of shattered illusions next year unless they manage to break free," Hansard says. "I wasn't prepared to be marketed as glorified dog meat and as I'm under no contractual obligation to MCA I decided to steer clear of the new album, which, as fas as I'm concerned, is flogging a dead horse." Hansard's own group, the Frames, is recording in London with producer Gil Norton, who has worked with the Pixies.

Former Night Ranger guitarist Brad Gillis will have an album out in the spring (on Cherry Lane Music). Gillis has been working with Gregg Allman and Carmine Appice, and contributed two songs to the soundtrack of "Don't Tell Mom The Babysitter's Dead."

Athens, Georgia, band Daisy have signed a deal (with Protocol Records, a new Virgin Records subsidiary) and hope to have an album out in the spring.

Spinal Tap will announce the name of their new drummer when they announce tour dates for next year, expected to begin in April. A total of 51 prospective drummers auditioned for the vacancy, including Mick Fleetwood of Fleetwood Mac, who wore a full-length silver asbestos suit, accompanied by aids carrying fire extinguisherr. Mickey Dolenz of the Monkees and ex-Jane's Addiction drummer Stephen Perkins also auditioned, while Gina Shock of the Go-Go's and Debbie Peterson of the Bangles auditioned together, on the same drum kit. The new version of Spinal Tap plans to have an album out in March.

Attorneys for Guns N' Roses have been dismissed as defendants in a lawsuit filed by ex-drummer Stephen Adler, who says he was kicked out of the group because he'd begun drug rehabilitation. Members of the band and their personal managers are still defendants in the lawsuit, which claims Adler was pressured into signing a document giving up his rights in the band.

Hunters & Collectors have been working with producer Don Gehman on a new album in Melbourne, Australia.

The Church have finished recording a new album for release early next year. Peter Koppes will have an album out with his group, The Well, later in the year. They've released an EP, "Iridescence," recorded during the same sessions that resulted in the LP.

Headman Tshabalala, a singer with Ladysmith Black Mambazo, has been shot and killed in South Africa. He was traveling in his car near Durban when he was stopped by a private security guard at a roadblock. Shabalala, the second oldest of four brothers in the group, was shot in a scuffle with the guard when he tried to disarm him. Paul Simon, who has worked extensively with the group, urged a full investigation into Tshabalala's death. "I would expect that a complete and thorough investigation of the circumstances surrounding Headman's death would be initiated immediately," Simon said in a statement. "Ladysmith Black Mambazo is known and loved all ever the weet death in the statement. all over the world and it is important that a sense of justice settle over his memory both for Headman Shabalala's family and for the sake of all South Africa." Charles Mabaso, secretary for the South African Musicians Alliance, says Tshabalala planned to establish a music academy in his native Natal province. "This is a blow to the whole industry," Mabaso says.

John Denver has filed for divorce against his wife of three years and has asked a court to bar her from entering his home to prevent "irreparable injury or damage." Denver is seeking joint custody of the couple's 2 1/2-year old daughter, Jesse Belle.

A lawyer has filed a lawsuit against Madonna's brother, Martin Ciccone, claiming he manages the budding actor and that Ciccone hasn't paid him his fees. Attorney James Randolph also contends in his Oakland County Circuit Court lawsuit that Ciccone hurt his marketability by appearing intoxicated in Madonna's video for "Truth Or Dare."

Two members of 2 Live Crew have filed a lawsuit in Dade Two members of 2 Live Crew have filed a lawsuit in Dade County, Florida, Circuit Court against label head and group member Luke Campbell claiming that he owes them at least \$1 million in royalty payments. David Hobbs and Mark Ross claim that Campbell violated the copyright of their names without permission as well as other contract violations. Their attorneys say they are broke even though at least the group sold six million copies of their biggest hits. "They are living with their mothers. Neither has enough money to fly to Miami to attend merings," says attorney Richard Wolfe Campbell says the two here constituted. says attorney Richard Wolfe. Campbell says the two have spent their money "stupidly -- buying cars, going partying, squiring girls all around the United States. I'm not responsible for no grown man or what he does with his money.'

Several people complained after a Guns N' Roses concert at the Worcester, Massachusetts, Centrum, because between sets a large screen on stage showed pictures of female audience members baring the breasts for cameras. The facility's manager says there was a "high energy crowd" at the show, but he didn't want to cancel the concert because of fear that fans would riot. They were upset at being kept waiting for Guns N' Roses for over an hour and a half after opening act Soundgarden finished their set. It was one of the band's first shows with new guitarist Gilby Clarke.

A Guinness World of Records Museum has opened in Hollywood, California, with a special Michael Jackson exhibit. The \$30,000 exhibit will get a "second opening" in March, which Jackson will attend. He already got a look at the tribute before the museum officially opened.

His publicist says Rob Pilatus of Milli Vanilli had taken too much of an anti-depressant drug with alcohol, leading him to become suicidal at a Hollywood hotel rcently. "Pilatus apparently misapplied the dosage of his prescription drug, which he was using for the first time, combining it with alcohol, which caused his irrational behavior," says publicist Joel Parker. He also denies reports that Pilatus had tried to slash his own wrist, saying it had only been bruised accidentally.

A number of Jimi Hendrix items will be auctioned at Sotheby's in New York on December 17. Included will be handwritten lyrics to 13 songs that were never released, as well as a 38-page movie treatment by Hendrix called "Moondust." Another item to be sold will be a Pan American Airlines travel bag that Hendrix had with him when he died in 1970 after a night of drug use in London.

A planned concert in Los Angeles to protest a new California law requiring the use of motorcycle helmets had more than its share of problems. Motley Crue backed out just a few hours before the show at the Shrine Auditorium, and John Mellencamp showed up with his band but was unable to perform because of time limits. The venue was only filled to just over half of capacity, and many had left by the time that Steve Vai, Don Dokken and Sam Kinison joined some female fans in singing Led Zeppelin's "Rock & Roll" and the Troggs' "Wild Thing."

Former Del Fuegos lead singer Dan Zanes is playing acoustic dates but says he doesn't know if he'll form a new band anytime

Love & Rockets will begin recording a new album early next year.

The 21-performance run of the national tour of "Man Of La Mancha" in Chicago has led to speculation as to whether Sheena Easton, who was making her theatrical stage debut in the show, will continue to play the role of a whore named Aldonza. She is reported to have missed more than half of the Chicago shows because of influenza, but it was not immediately known if she would rejoin the production in Los Angeles. Easton reportedly had trouble keeping her Scottish accent in check, leading executive producer Manny Kladitis to say Easton was playing a "naive" whore. "She's more tentative about who she's going to screw."

In Britain, all proceeds from the record are going to the London Lighthouse Charity and the Rainbow Trust children's charity. The original version by Elton John originally peaked at number 16 in 1974. Kim Syms, from Chicago, began her career singing television commmercials. U2's "Mysterious Ways" was recorded in Dublin and Berlin and produced by Brian Eno and Daniel Lanois. U2's "The Fly" single debuted on the British charts at number one. London-based Right Said Fred's new single features vocals from Jocelyn Brown. The band take their name from a song recorded in the 1960s by British comedian Bernard Cribbins. Right Said Fred's previous single, "I'm Too Sexy," peaked at number two. Cliff Richard's last British hit was "Saviour's Day" late last year. His new single has been previously recorded by Perry Como and Bing Crosby. The Mixmasters record was produced by Nigel Wright, who has worked with Jason Donovan and Sonia in the past. It features songs from Walt Disney's "Jungle Book." The last Mixmasters hit was a "Night Fever" megamix earlier this year.

Shonen Knife have a catchy bouncy "Space Christmas" single just out in the U.K. "Galaxy," from the new Curve EP "Cherry," is great, as good as previous material. Scottish band Love & Money have a new single out called "Winter," from their third album, "Dogs In The Traffic." Carly Simon's "Let The River Run," originally on the "Working Girl" soundtrack, has been re-released because of its use as the backing music for a television commercial.

FRANCE

"Amours secretes...passion publique" is the new album from Julien Clerc, recorded in Paris last December. It includes some of his songs from the 1970s as well as more recent songs. Claude Nougaro has a new album out recorded with pianist Maurice

Vander ("Une voix, dix doigts"), in which he leaves the funk style he adopted for "Nougayork" and "Pacifique." Instead he returns to his formula of classic French singing. French singer Alain Bashung has a new album just out in France, representing a more sentimental style for him -- sounding a bit more like Bob Dylan. It's his eighth album, recorded in Brussels. There are eleven songs on the LP, including one in English.

GERMANY

New singles include the Bingoboys version of "No Woman No Cry," "Love Conquers All" from ABC, and "Rainbow" from Bellybutton & the Knockwells.

UNITED STATES

Atlanta publicist Michelle Roche and studio owner Ed Burdell have teamed up to put together a compilation of 18 unsigned bands and artists from Atlanta and Athens, Georgia, called "Strange Bedfellows." The cassette compilation features Month of Sundays, Reuben Anderson & Jeremy Richmond, Big Sky, Kodac Harrison & The Cornerboys, Natalie Farr, Donkey, Praying By Numbers, Reversing Hour, Magnapop, Crash Lovely, Roosevelt, Greenhouse, Little Louis Groovy, Magic Bone, King Kill 33, Fracture, Gutterplow and the Mirthmakers. (For a copy, contact Michelle Roche: 404-607-1031.) Magnapop are working on a CD project (for Play It Again Sam Records)....I like the new tracks from Machines Of Loving Grace (on Mammoth Records). "Rite Of Shiva" manages to have a technodance groove without sounding too industrial and retaining a good rock feel at the same time. The samples on "All I Really Need," while likely to prevent it from getting radio airplay, provide just enough bite to latch a listener. There's also a track devoted to Italian parliamentarian "Cicciolina."...There are some bizarre covers coming out of the rap arena. The new Def Dames album includes a cover of Devo's "Whip It." And L'Trimm have a cover of the Archies' "Sugar Sugar" on their new "Groovy" album complete with flower-power cover....There are some good and reasonably hard dance tracks on "The Future Is Ours" from Musto & Bones....Head Of David's "Seed State" (Mute) is a bit more industrial -- replete with the sounds of heavy industry, while the new Holger Hiller "As Is" album (Mute) is a electronic as you'd expect....Best country song title of the week, found on a Nashville jukebox: "Daddy Can't Fly His Kite 'Cause Momma Won't Give Him No Tail."...There's a good cover of UB40's "One In Ten" on the new album from Peter Spence & Tippa Irie, as well as a great anti-smoking song called "Chain Smoker."

UK Music News

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Bookmakers William Hill have stopped taking bets on Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" topping the British singles chart at Christmas. Betting on the Christmas number one is something of a national obsession in the UK, but the bookmakers took their action after receiving over \$100,000 worth of bets in the three days after Freddie Mercury's death. Instead, the company is now taking bets on what record will hold the number two slot. At present Elton John and George Michael's "Don't Let The Sun Go Down On Me" is favored at 2-1.

The Farm have spoken out against the compilers of the British singles chart. The band are unhappy that their "Love See No Colour" single failed to make the top 40 last week, after limited edition copies were deemed ineligible for chart purposes. The limited edition was of the 12" version of the single, which came with a free white label 12" containing re-mixes of "Love See No Colour" by High Fibre and Kevin Petrie. The compilers of the chart, Gallup, ruled that the free record constituted an inducement to buy. However, the band claims that they have not advertised the free 12". Talking to the New Musical Express, a spokesmen for The Farm's label, Produce, commented, "Traditionally, The Farm's first week sales are predominantly 12". This is a real blow. Ironically, all of these mixes and more exist on the CD format of "Love See No Colour." Poor old vinyl can't take that many tracks without there being a loss of quality." Against this, John Pinder of Gallup, also speaking to the New Musical Express, said, "The BPI's chart rules clearly state that a double pack single is not eligible for the charts. Ironically, it was a rule made to protect small labels like Produce who obviously have much less money to spend on freebies than major companies." The dispute can be seen as part of an on-going debate on the way the singles chart is compiled. Many dance acts, for instance,

have claimed that the limiting of the number of formats that can count towards a chart placing is unfair to them because they rely on re-mixes. With the single still very important as a promotional tool for albums in the UK, this is obviously a debate which will run and run.

Ned's Atomic Dustbin came close to injury twice last week. The band was on tour in Belfast, Northern Ireland and were evacuated from their hotel after a bomb went off in the street. Eighteen people were injured in the incident. Although the band were reportedly badly shaken, they went ahead with a show at Belfast's Mandella Hall on the following evening. However, half way into their first number, the crowd got over security barriers and rushed the stage, which then collapsed. The band was forced to cancel the show, but hopes to re-schedule it for January 1992.

John Peel has decided to axe his Famous Festive Fifty. The legendary alternative DJ has invited listeners to send in a list of their favorite records for several years now, but this year only 100 votes were received. Apparently, Peel received more letters complaining about his decision not to proceed with the chart after he had announced it on the air! The Radio One network has denied that the poor response was due to Peel's show being moved from week nights to the weekend, saying that Peel's listening figures are now up. Peel's own comment was, "I think the chart has finally run its course. It's best to leave it at that, I think." It seems possible that the dropping of the festive fifty may be something of a relief to Peel. In previous years, he has complained that the list does not reflect the diversity of music he plays on his show.

There is a flurry of activity on the Lush front this week, with the band announcing a single, an LP and a world tour. The single "For Love" will be released by 4AD on December 30. the title track of the single was written by singer Miki Berenyi. Also included on the release are three other new tracks: "Starlust," "Astronaut" and a cover version of Wire's 1979 single "Outdoor Miner." An album will follow in January. Recorded at London's September Sound Studio, it's reportedly been delayed because of disagreements between the band and producer Robin Guthrie. The band's world tour will begin in the new year and include shows in Thailand, Russia, Jamaica, Japan, Europe and North America. Finally, the band will play a secret gig in London before Christmas as a good-bye to departing bassists Steve Rippon who finished the last of his commitments to the band last week with a promotional trip to Europe.

Radio stations in the UK have been asked by Sony Music International to limit the playing of tracks from Michael Jackson's Dangerous album to lifteen minutes in any one hour. Sony has also requested that the stations do not announce the playing of tracks from the album. It's reported that the label is concerned about home taping and that the instructions were sent out after Radio One DJ Mark Goodier said he would play the album in its entirety on the day before the release. Sony has warned that stations who do not follow the guidelines may face legal action. Elsewhere, the album has received a frosty response from some sections of the British music press. New Musical Express journalist, Barbara Ellen, gave the album 3 out of 10 and commented, "Michael Jackson is exposed here as being as out of sync with the Pop Mood as he is with the real world."

Nirvana's sold out UK tour has been dogged by problems with counterfeit tickets. The tour ended last week, but scalpers in Manchester, Nottingham and London all sold forged tickets. The promoters of the tour, Riverman, were forced to hire extra security staff after the problem came to light and managed to find over 100 forgeries at the band's final London date. Speaking to Melody Maker, a spokesman for Riverman said, "They were good forgeries. It was only once you noticed one that you knew what to look for." Elsewhere, the band had problems with vendors selling bootleg merchandise. In Manchester, the bootleggers turned out to be armed. A spokesman for the band's official merchandisers, Bravado, told the New Musical Express. "It's becoming more and more dangerous in Manchester. The bootleggers behave like a mini-mafia. Our security approached them and asked them to move on. One of the bootleggers opened up his jacket to reveal a gun. The weapon wasn't let off, but we were very worried that there would be a full scale panic if the audience inside the venue became aware that somebody outside was brandishing a gun." Despite the problems, the tour has been a triumphant one for the band and their "Smells Like Teen Spirit" single has gone as high as the top ten of the British singles chart.

Van Morrison has stopped the display of a commemorative plaque at his childhood home in Belfast. The plaque was placed by the door of 125 Hyndford Street two weeks ago by the Belfast Blues Appreciation Society and read, "Van Morrison lived here from 1945 to 1961." The plaque was unveiled by Buddy Guy and Morrison's uncle was among those at the ceremony. However, Morrison's lawyers intervened and the plaque was taken down, with his solicitors saying, "Our client was not consulted nor asked for permission for use of his name in this matter." Morrison's action has caused a minor row in Belfast, with local counselors objecting to his "unpatriotic" attitude. The present occupier of the house, paint sprayer Leslie Brennen, told local press, "It wasn't my idea. There's nothing in it for me. I didn't even know it was Van's old house."

Ian Astbury was taken to the hospital last week after he cut his hand. The Cult singer suffered the injury after breaking glass while trying to open a window at the Halcyon Hotel in West London. The wound required eight stitches at Lonson's St. Mary's Hospital. Later on the same day, the wound re-opened during a show by The Cult at Wembley Arena and had to be re-stitched

Moose's gig at London's ULU venue on January 10 looks likely to be their last for some time. After the concert, the London based band will begin recording their debut LP, which should be available via Hut in the fall.

Fontana will begin a major campaign for Scott Walker and The Walker Brothers re-releases on December 16, with re-issues of The Walker Brothers' classic "The Sun Ain't Gonna Shine Anymore." On the b-side of the release is Scott Walker's version of the Jacque Brel song "Jacky," a song which recently gave Marc Almond a top twenty British hit. An album, No Regrets - The Best Of Scott Walker and The Walker Brothers, will follow in January, along with the re-issue of Walker's first four solo LPs on CD-they have been unavailable for several years. Finally, Scott Walker is reported to be in the studio working on a new solo album. His last new release was 1984's Climate of Hunter.

Nitzer Ebb will release two 12" singles via Mute on December 30. Collectively titled *Godhead*, the two discs will feature the

following tracks: "Godhead (Remix)," "Let Your Body Learn/Murderous," "Control (I'm Here)," "Godhead," "Getting Closer" and "Join In The Chant." With the exception of "Godhead (Remix)," all the tracks are live.

Marc Almond is reported to be starring in a London stage version of Oscar Wilde's "The Picture of Dorian Gray." Apparently, the version is a musical one, with Richard Norris and former Soft Cell man Dave Ball assisting Almond with the music. Almond's record label, WEA, claims to know nothing about the project, but Almond himself is quoted as saying, "I'm perfect for the role. When I was asked if I could play it, I just told them, 'I am Dorian Gray." The play is reported to be opening early next year.

The London Arena venue has closed. Although it costs somewhere in the region of \$50 million to build and has hosted concerts by David Bowie, Public Enemy and New Kids On The Block, the venue never really established itself. In large part, this has been blamed on transport problems. The area of London it is situated in, Docklands, is notoriously badly served by public transportion.

The Beautiful South have announced details of a new single. "Old Red Eyes Is Back" b/w "Fleet St. BC" and "Diamonds" will be available via Go! Discs on December 30. The a-side is taken from a new album, which should be in stores in the spring. The band has also announced details of a British tour for April 1992.

The famous 'pirate' station Radio Luxembourg will cease to transmit on medium wave in January 1992. Instead, the station will only be available to those who have a satellite dish, more usually associated with receiving television transmissions. Talking to the New Musical Express, a spokesman for the station commented, "We know that millions of fans who grew up with Radio Luxembourg at 208 metres have a nostalgic attachment to the medium wave signal. But, in recent years its technical inferiority made this move necessary if we want to shake the image of being old-fashioned and behind the times."

The songwriter/producer Jacque Morali has died of AIDs in Paris. The 44-year old was best known for his work with the Village People and Richie Family during the disco boom of the seventies. He leaves a wife, but no children.

EMF have become the latest band to be at the center of a censorship controversy. Last week, the Labour MP John P. Smith sponsored a motion in the House of Commons which called for warning stickers to be placed on the band's albums to tell parents that some of the material is unsuitable for children. Smith's concern is over EMF's use of the word 'fuck' on the Schubert Dip album. The use of the word was drawn to Smith's attention by one of his constituents who bought the record for her son's birthday party. A spokesperson for EMI told the New Musical Express, "To be honest, we think that stickering can have a detrimental effect, encouraging kids to buy the records. Schubert Dip is not an obscene record. We're sorry that someone was offended by it, but there are far more worse things the touch of a button away, on television."

"Feile," Ireland's largest popular music festival, has come under attack by Dr. Clifford, Bishop of Cashley Emly. This year the event attracted 40,000 fans for a bill that included Happy Mondays, The Wonder Stuff and The Farm. Dr. Clifford is concerned about the effect the event has on Thurles, County Tipperary where it takes place. Last week, he commented, "Everyone here is on edge throughout the event. Many parents feel powerless and disheartened at the scandalous behavior which is taken to be the norm. Elderly residents live in fear for weeks beforehand." Dr. Clifford goes on to voice concern about facilities, "The large campsite was not properly supervised and was definitely a hazard. Many youngsters were afraid to stay there. The toilet facilities were simply atrocious. When sanitary arrangements break down in this way, civilized standards tend to break down as well. This is exactly what happened at 'Feile '91." For promoters MCD Concerts, Denis Desmond responded to the criticisms by telling the New Musical Express, "As concert promoters, we are concerned with what happens in the town. We are concert promoters. We promote concerts, not drug abuse or excessive drinking. The Bishop wants a ban on all concerts. This is ludicrous. It is the equivalent of saying that Guiness should cease production."

The Mena Fiddler Organization has announced that they are to start a new record label. The Mean Fiddler already run several London venues and promote the "Reading Festival."

Morrissey, EMF and Dave Stewart are to appear in a TV special for Amnesty International. Entitled "The Big Three-O" and, as its name suggests, celebrating Amnesty's thirtieth year, the special will be recorded this week in a studio at Nottingham in the Midlands of England. The show will be broadcast in the UK by the ITV network. Other stars set to appear include Jason Donovan, Roger Daltry, Tom Jones, Lisa Stansfield, Dannii Minogue, actor Michael J. Fox and comedians Emo Phillips and Gerry Sadowitz.



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The Crash Test Dummies and The Barenaked Ladies were the big winners at the 11th Annual CASBY Awards Show, held at the Showline Harbourfront Studios, Toronto, December 1st. The awards were started in 1981 as an alternative to the mainstream industry Canadian awards, the Junos, by Toronto station CFNY-FM. CFNY has tried to make it a truly national event, including categories for different regions of the country, attempting to make it a true rival to the JUNOS. Over the years, the show has enjoyed varying degrees of success. Several attempts to marry the ceremony with television, have produced sometimes mediocre results. 1989 was a bad year for the Toronto alternative station, as attempts were made by the management to force it to become a more CHR outlet. Now under new management and facing their second CASBYs, the organizers may have found a formula which really works. The show was closed to all but VIPs in radio, records and the media. The stage was minimalist, just a few broadcasting booths designed in the style of a fifties radio show - and a radio show was exactly what it was. The 1991 CASBYs dispensed with walks to the podium, opening envelopes and saying thank you for half an hour. This has never made good radio. Instead the winner was announced, sought out quickly either on the stage or out on the floor, a brief interview would ensue, then cut quickly to music. There were also a few acoustic performances. At a time when the public is increasingly fed up with the ever mounting pile of awards shows, it seemed to be a formula that got the thumbs up from both the listeners and the 16 stations that carried the CASBYs across the country. Fans were not left out, following the afternoon awards show, listeners were invited for the whole evening to a concert featuring Sara Craig, The Lost Dakotas, The Dream Warriors and The Barenaked Ladies. The Crash Test Dummies took away a heap of awards for Favorite Album (The Ghosts That Haunt Me), Debut Album, Favorite Song ("Superman's Song"), New Western Group (the group hails from Winnipeg), Album Art and Promising Male Vocalist (Brad Roberts). Explaining in an interview just after receiving an award how he keeps his voice so deep, Roberts replied, "I touch myself in a special way." The Barenaked Ladies were runners-up with three awards to their name. This is a remarkable achievement for a band who still is not signed and whose popularity has come from an independently produced cassette, a devotional following and lots of local airplay. The Ladies who are actually five young men, sing a mixture of acoustic novelty songs, "You Can Be My Yoko Ono" and "The McDonald's Girls" and tunes with more depth and seriousness, "Brian Wilson" and their new cover of Bruce Cockburn's "Lovers In A Dangerous Time." They have sprung up within '91 as a group who have gone from playing barbecues to selling out two nights at large Toronto venues. CFNY has given them lots of airplay support and recently awarded the group \$100,000 to make their first album. Until that album is made, the bets are off as to who will sign the band, as the financial award carries the stipulation that they must complete the album first. Other awards were: Favorite Reggae/Ska - King Apparatus; Dance/Rap - Bootsauce; French-Canadian Artist - Daniel Lanois; Most Promising Female Vocalist - Sarah McLachlan; Canadian-based World-Beat - Flying Bulgar Klezmer Band; Jazz/Fusion - Holly Cole Trio; New Eastern Artist - Thomas Trio & The Red Albino; Most Outstanding Musician - Bruce Cockburn; International Album - Out Of Time by REM; The Next Big Thing - The Bourbon Tabernacle Choir and a Special Achievement award went to the tireless Toronto promoter, Elliot Lefko. The CASBYs were not without its critics. As the full name, Canadian Artists Selected By You suggests, the winners were picked by public ballot. Just how national, rather than Toronto based, the ballots were, has not been revealed. Arriving onstage later, The Dream Warriors, denounced the Dance/Rap category, claiming that Bootsauce was dance and that they were rap. They were upset that they had been nominated in that category. One newspaper critic in The Globe and Mail, Bill Reynolds also took the CASBYs to task for shutting out more established acts like Tragically Hip and Blue Rodeo, calling The Barenaked Ladies "an acoustic comedy band which has not developed its constituency to the level of more established Canadian artists." This is hardly something the organizers can help. It is not that Blue Rodeo and Tragically Hip were not nominated, but rather, the public did not vote for them. To dismiss The Ladies as just a comedy band is both unfair and inaccurate. It

certainly could be argued though that the Toronto outfit's awards did not reflect a true national consensus, something the organizers work harder each year to achieve.

Four days after the CASBYs, Toronto station CILQ held their fifth annual Toronto Music Awards. As well as being a more local event, nominations were picked by industry figures, although the actual awards were tabulated by phone and mail from listeners. Blue Rodeo, who have also been honored on a national level by the JUNOS for several years running, took away the award for best local group. Tom Cochrane won two categories, for Best Male Vocalist and for Best Songwriter; Alannah Myles was Best Female Vocalist. Jeff Healey won two awards: Best Guitarist and Best Blues Artist. Gowan was voted Best Keyboard Player. Other awards: Rising Star - Barenaked Ladies; Folk/Traditional - Cowboy Junkies; Jazz - Holly Cole; Country - Prairie Oyster; Mayor's Award (given for international success) - Robbie Robertson. Confusingly, another award for "International Success" was awarded to Rush; Bass - Geddy Lee (Rush); Drummer - Neil Peart (Rush); Reggae - The Sattalites; Pop Group - Candi & The Backbeat; Rap - Maestro Fresh Wes; Best Club Band - Slik Toxic; Best Club - Rock N' Roll Heaven. The Scott Liddle Memorial Award, a \$6,500 prize awarded to an independent artist went to 21 year old singer Rob Tremills, to use towards recording costs. Prior to the awards, the event got some surprising criticism from one of its co-sponsors, the local listings magazine, NOW, for some of the nominations. NOW writer Kim Hughes, for instance, felt that including Neil Young in one of the categories did not constitute a local artist because he has long lived on the American west coast. But despite these minor criticisms, the awards were enjoyed tremendously by all who attended.

Bryan Adams was reportedly furious upon discovering that former Klansmen David Duke used his song "Everything I Do I Do It For You" at Duke meetings and rallies in his failed bid to become Louisiana governor. The song, which Adams co-wrote, has been a big international hit and was featured on the soundtrack of "Robin Hood," the summer movie starring Kevin Costner. Adams' manager claims that Duke used the recording without the permission from Adams, A&M Records or his publisher. Duke even proclaimed, "Everything I do, I do it for you," at the end of one of his speeches. Adams is considering legal action against Duke, but photographer Wayne Nash, who created and ran Duke's multi-media presentation, claims he does not have to ask permission to use the song as rallies are "private" and he is not selling or reproducing the show.

Meanwhile, the Vancouver rock singer won three awards at the inaugural Australian Music Awards at the World Congress Center, Melbourne, Australia. Adams was named International Male Singer of the Year, won International Song for "Everything I Do" and the top International Album award for <u>Waking Up The Neighbours</u>. "Everything" was number one in Australia for over a month.

The owners of two FM stations, Ottawa's CHEZ-FM and Calgary's CKIK-FM have made a plea to The Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) to exempt them from a new edict that requires them to play more titles every week. The new Broadcasting Act, which went into effect in Canada September 1st, requires all FM stations to play a minimum of 850 titles per week. Before the new requirement, the minimum was defined for each station and CHEZ-FM and CKIK-FM only had to play 550 new titles per week. According to The Globe and Mail newspaper, the owners claim that the new rules designed to introduce more new music onto the airwaves will actually force them to play more oldies. CHEZ and CKIK have traditionally concentrated on new releases and played them frequently, up to the maximum of 18 plays a week and make up the minimum requirement with gold and one play per week specialty selections. But the stations only have about ,200 play opportunities a week. Since the new rules came into effect, the number of current-selection play opportunities at CHEZ fell from 753 to 410, a decrease of 45.5 percent, gold and specialty selections increased from 447 to 790, an increase of 76.7 percent. The stations insist that to simply play more new music once or twice a week for ten weeks would not be beneficial to the listeners, the station or the artists. The stations requested

their exemptions within days of the rules going into effect and they have been backed by most of Canada's major record labels in writing, including Capitol/EMI, Attic, BMG, Polygram, MCA, Sony, A&M, Warner and True North. But opposition to CHEZ and CKIK's request has come from other big broadcasters like the CHUM Group. Although the other broadcasters agree that the 850 minimum is too high and would like to see it reviewed, they argue that special exemptions would give the station an unfair competitive edge. Michael Amodeo, the CRTC manager of FM operations has said that a decision on the matter is likely before Christmas, but will not be released before January or February.

Sexpot singer Mitsou, already a huge star in her native Quebec and France, has just signed a worldwide deal with Hollywood Records in Burbank. A steamy video paved the way for the deal, according to NOW magazine. The clip for "Dis-Moi, Dis Moi" suddenly found itself getting a lot of airplay on "Video Jukebox," a viewer choice cable program in California, leading to a rush of offers from Hollywood's top brass. Hollywood Records plans to release "Dis-Moi..." as Mitsou's first international single, followed by a self-titled album in February featuring a compilation of tracks already domestically available in Canada on albums El Mundo (1989) and Terres Des Hommes (1990) plus a few new recordings. Isba/Sony will continue to distribute Mitsou in Canada.

Jeff Healey has just been given a national radio show entitled "My Kinda Jazz" on CBC Stereo in Canada. The talented guitar player boasts an extensive jazz collection from the late teens to the early '40s. He cites Louis Armstrong as one of his biggest influences. Healey's new broadcasting job with the CBC comes only weeks after leaving a jazz program on Toronto's college station CIUT, a non-commercial community outfit. Details of Healey's departure are murky, but it seems to have been a direct confrontation with CIUT's PD Nilan Perera. It is alleged that Perera demanded a \$30 membership fee from the axe-man and that he undergo a training course in "human relations." Healey left. But Healey now downplays the incident, telling Eye magazine, "Basically, I just had the idea to move the show over to the CBC because we had a very good reaction on CIUT. In the fund-raising week, we did very well. We always got lots of calls and letters. So I figured, why not try this on a national level?" Healey believes that the show will fill a void on radio and says that he still gets to pick all his own music. CIUT is left with egg on their face.

CANADIAN NOTES

A survey conducted by The Toronto Star finds a shocking lack of helpful and knowledgeable sales staffs at Toronto record stores. Sales staffs were asked a series of simple questions and stores were also judged in terms of value. The article pointed out that in an age of the CD sometimes twice the price of vinyl and cassette combined with a recession, the shopper is looking for help and a bargain. The relatively new retail chain, HMV, which has brought its British based megastore philosophy to Toronto emerged the best informed and reasonably good value. Veteran Canadian chain A&As, which tetered on the brink of bankruptcy earlier this year, has fought back with the cheapest prices. But the article found many of the major stores "intimidating labyrinths...locating a helpful and knowledgeable sales clerk is a chore in itself." One befuddled clerk at a Music World location even steered the <u>Star</u> writer to the competition. "I dunno, why don't you try HMV? They have a catalogue you can look it up in."...Some of Toronto's roots artists can be found on a new compilation album on Moose Records. The Rheostatics, The Grievous Angels, Celtic Gales, Polka Dogs, Anne Bourne, Lost And Profound and Pretty Green are among the artists on Moose The Compilation distributed by Polygram Canada...Finally, may I wish Hard Report readers a very Merry Christmas. It's been a particularly strong year for Canadian music and it is a real privilege to be able to share some of the things going on up here with such a wide readership. Thanks to Bill Hard, who unlike editors of some other tipsheets, takes a personal interest in Canadian music and his Canadian clients. Special mention should also go to Jonathan Wright, who filled my shoes doing the UK column mid-way through the year and does, I think, and awesome job. Into '92, y'all.


