

As U2 continue to reinvent themselves with every album, Bono grows as a vocalist and as a rock icon. His nightly call to the White House during the Zoo TV tour will go down in history alongside Jimi's flaming guitar and Elvis' iumosuit.

NEW MALE

Matthew Sweet/Zoo



While Matthew is not a new face to those in the nutty world of Modern Rock, AOR got its first exposure to him in '92. Thanks to the tenacious promotion of the folks at Zoo, Matthew's Girlfriend album thrust him into the mainstream. The title track placed at #34 on '92's Hard Hundred while the long player goes down in history as the 29th most played album of the year.

LIVE ALBUM



Listen Bubba, there is nothing like live AC/DC to get your motor runnin'. We were treated to a marvelous live set from the band in 1992 and it's already become a staple of our record collection. Crank it up loud and wake the neighbors, AC/DC continue to salute all of us about to rock!! For those of us not about to rock, you better hide, 'cause they'll come looking for you.

Singles OST/Epic



Speaking of Seattle, our pick for soundtrack of the year is the music from the Cameron Crowe movie, Singles (Epic). Featuring music from Seattle faves Screaming Trees, Pearl Jam,

Bekka Bramlett (The Zoo)/Capricorn Bonnie's daughter not only helped Mick Fleetwood step back into the limelight, but she also cops the nod for Best New Female of '92. Along with Sass Jordan, Bekka helped make AOR a safer place for hard rockin' female vocalists. The Zoo's "Shakin' The Cage" (Capricorn) places at #84 on '92's Hard Hundred while their long player lands at the romantic number of 69 on our year-end Album chart.

Crossing the United States twice in 1992, U2's landmark Zoo TV tour gets the nod for Best Tour Of The Year. 

The Black Crowes/Def American



With the release of their second Def American album, The Southern Harmony And Musical Companion, The Crowes carved out a chunk of the AOR pie to call their own. The stats are quite impressive, their LP finished #2 for '92 and spawned four singles, three of which ended up in the year-end Top 20. Numbers like that are sure to hush anyone cynical about the band's potential. Take that airplay and couple it with massive MTV exposure and the result is The Black Crowes are the first major rock n' roll band to breakthrough in the '90s. More established bands, like U2 or R.E.M. could have easily had the "Best Artist" distinction bestowed upon them this year. However when we look back at 1992, there is a very good possibility it will be remembered as, among other things, being a pivotal year in the career of The Black Crowes. Any veteran of the format will tell you that next big things come and go, but the timeless sound and persona of The Black Crowes promises to be a part of the format for years to come.

Best Album

U2, Achtung Baby Island/PLG



Achtung Baby's dominance on both the year-end Hard Hundred and Hard Album Chart, easily makes it the Album of the Year. Five singles from the collection placed on the year end Hundred, with "One" copping the top spot overall. Achtung **Baby**'s performance on the Album survey is nothing short of spectacular, distancing its closest competitor,

The Black Crowes' Southern Musical And Harmony Companion, by a healthy margin. Apart from statistical success, the long player is arguably the band's best to date.

Breakthrough

Pearl Jam/Epic



1992 was the year of the Seattle sound, and Pearl Jam reaped most of the benefits at AOR. Their Ten (Epic) album had been out for almost six months when the year began, but it wasn't too long before "Alive" kicked in at album radio, peaking at #10 on Valentine's Day. "Even Flow" followed, giving the band a firm foothold at AOR. "Jeremy"

took Pearl Jam to the next level with wall-to-wall MTV exposure and top 10 AOR airplay. On our year end survey, "Even Flow" placed at #7 for the year while "Jeremy" snagged the #45 position, with "Alive" checking in at #59. As Nirvana did before them, PJ's success opened the radio door for other SuicideCity bands like Alice In Chains and Screaming Trees.

Best Song



Red Hot Chili Peppers, "Under The Bridge" WB This tribute to SmogCity snags the distinction by breaking the band across the board. Punching in at #2 on the year end Hundred, "Under The Bridge" marked a change in direction and an increase in popularity. In addition to their usual macho posturing, producer Rick Rubin broadened the band's scope by encouraging Chili Pepper Anthony Kiedis to include this very personal

tune on their Blood Sugar Sex Magik album. The rest, as we say in the business, is history. After the longest set-up in the history of the music business (almost 7 years on EMI), the Chili Peppers achieved platinum status.

Comeback

Tom Cochrane/ Capitol



If we would have told you a year ago that Tom Cochrane would enjoy an across the board smash hit in '92, you would have filed us under the "Lunatic Fringe" category in your Rolodex. Well, "Life Is A Highway" clocks in at #9 on our year end survey, so hang on to that gift wrapped straightjacket with our name on it. With massive exposure on every

video channel imaginable, the image of Cochrane playing his guitar in the desert was seen in millions of homes nationwide. No longer just a Canadian phenomenon, Tom's Mad Mad World (Capitol) album placed 15th overall on our album chart as well, making this quite the year for the Red Rider. Put this Red Rider under your tree this season.

NEW ARTIST/GROUP

Spin Doctors/Epic



With the top 5 success of "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong," the top ten performance of "Jimmy Olsen's Blues," and a third smash, "Two Princes," preparing to launch, our friends from The Large Apple (Or New York, depending on who you're talking to) justly deserve the Best New Artist nod. After months of tenacious promotion and tireless touring, these Spin M.D.'s wrote the proper prescription. Their Pocket Full Of Kryptonite (Epic) album takes the #21 slot on the year-end Album chart while "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong" shows up at #14 on '92's Hard Hundred. Be sure not to call them hippies, or they may beat you senseless with their tie-dye. Peace.

C.O.R., Alternative, and Metal stations are already raving about their straight ahead rock and roll. Look Blind Melon to hit mainstream AOR in January, with enough quality material to last well into the new year.

The Jayhawks, "Hollywood Town Hall" Def American/Reprise Radio likes a safe sound and The Jayhawks provide exactly what AOR looks for in a new group. Sure there's a touch of Neil Young here, but not enough to overshadow the band's own talent. An deep album with many cuts that will be discovered in '93.







<u>Neil Young, "Harvest Moon" Reprise</u> The sweetest album from Young in 20 years, that has the industry talking. It's true to form, and should provide a ton of new single action in the new year.

<u>Rush Soundtrack, Reprise</u> The album was the perfect vehicle for Clapton to continue his success from <u>Journeyman</u>. A major tour, MTV Unplugged, and a seat next to Elton John provided an incredible year for "Slowhand!"

Soundgarden, "Badmotorfinger" A&M The album went to Gold, and introduce the rock world to one of the most talented bands from the Great Northwest. The <u>Lollapalooza II Tour</u> left fans wanting more. Eyes are watching this groups next move with anticipation. Trust us! It's gonna be a BIG one!

Gary Moore, "After Hours" Charisma Moore's concerts in New York City and Los Angeles were some of the strongest of the year and proved he has found his niche as a true rock and roll Bluesman. The album was full of 25 plus material!

XTC, "Nonsuch" Geffen Why rock radio refuses to dig into, and embrace this group's great music, is one of life's great mysteries. There will come a day when XTC kicks down the wall between the Alternative and AOR formats. Until then, XTC will always deliver quality music with much acclaim from their many fans.

King's X, "King's X" Atl./Atl.Group Anticipation for this critically acclaimed band within the industry was running high. There was definitely enough action to continue the buzz on this Texas Trio, as ears are awaiting the bands next move.

Bruce Springsteen, "Human Touch/Lucky Town" Columbia In a move never before done, the "Boss" reclaimed sacred ground with the simultaneous release of two albums. His major tour pulled in the fans and showed us a whole new side of a quiet and incredible artist.

<u>The Cure, "Wish" Fiction/Elektra</u> Though most of the airplay occurred within the CHR and Modern Rock arenas, mainstream rock radio embraced "High." The Cure took more of a light hearted approach this time around, and produced a great album. Their successful stadium tour firmly implanted them in the minds of the masses and guaranteed the group a place in the format for many more years.

<u>Spinal Tap, "Break Like The Wind" MCA</u> The whole project gets an A+ for the best promotion. It was a fun and historic album that some got and some didn't.

Delbert McClinton, "Never Been Rocked Enough" Curb It was a close race between Tom Cochrane and Delbert for best comeback of the year. The record is still going strong and set Delbert up for major action in the format for a long time.

Def Leppard, "Adrenalize" Mercury One of the strongest albums of the year, and proved that you can't keep a great rock and roll band down for long. There's no question that we'll be hearing from them for many more years. Plus, their live show was one of the best and most satisfying.

<u>Black Crowes, "The Southern...Companion" Def American/Reprise</u> The "Crowes" had a lot to prove with their sophomore project. Radio has embraced every single from the CD and removed any doubts of their viability as a staple to the format.

KISS, "Revenge" Mercury Just when you thought it was safe to pack up that old KISS Army gear, the group whipped up one of their killer albums that had fans foaming at the mouth. It's not over till the "Masters" of the stage show say it's over!

<u>Ioe Cocker, "Night Calls" Capitol</u> That familiar voice graced the airwaves this year with some classic re-makes. It was the year for the big artists, and Cocker rightfully took his place in the format.

<u>10,000 Maniacs, "Our Time In Eden" Elektra</u> A favorite among the Triple A community, The "Maniacs" will have unlimited mileage from a very focused and well written album.

Faith No More, "Angel Dust" Slash/Reprise After the success of "Epic," San Francisco's wildest came on strong with the hard driving and kind of controversial album that will keep the "Faith" alive for a long time!

<u>Megadeth, "Countdown To Extinction" Capitol</u> Mustaine and Co. took a shot at the mainstream, and hit the bull'seye. Politics and rock are a potent combination, and Megadeth is the voice for a new generation.

<u>Alice In Chains, "Dirt" Columbia</u> It was a busy year for one of the "Emerald City's" best. Riding high off "Man," showing off true colors on the "SAP" EP, touring with the Screaming Trees, and producing their latest, have set the stage to make them a major player in 1993.

INXS, "Welcome To Wherever You Are" Atl./Atl.Group The band tapped into the talents of Mark Opitz who produced their first album and knocked out one of their best. Reaction at rock radio has been sparse, but there a a number of gems on the record that will guarantee them airplay for a large part of the new year.

<u>Ioe Satriani, "The Extremist" Relativity</u> He's one of the best at his craft, and AOR has only scratched the surface when it comes to the great material on the album.

Damn Yankees, "Don't Tread" Warner Brothers Once around is good, but twice around is better! The "Yankees" prove they have the staying power in the format and that it doesn't get any bigger than this!

<u>R.E.M., "Automatic For The People" Warner Brothers</u> What can you say about a super group like R.E.M.? The album is brilliant and the group will remain at the top with few contenders..

Elton John, "The One" MCA It was one of the nicest surprises of the year, as Elton John made a solid comeback by digging into his roots. He is truly an artist in a class of his own.

Singles Soundtrack, Various, Epic A breakthrough album because it introduced many new band's to the format. One of the most timely records, that pegged the rock scene.

<u>Michael Penn, "Free For All" RCA</u> Penn was another artist that the rock world anxiously awaited a second album from. Disappointment wasn't a factor here, as Penn displayed true emotions and made his mark.

<u>Ronnie Wood, "Slide On This" Continuum</u> The label gets five stars for the best packaging and five stars for hard work. Wood pulled together a strong pool of talent to shine as he "slid" through the rest of the pack.

Ugly Kid Joe, "America's Most Wanted" Stardog/Mercury The first group of it's kind to gain mass acceptance and set the trend of nasty/fun rock and roll. "Everything About You" was one of the most requested songs of the year. Look for a resurgence of popularity in the first few months of '93.

Bad Company, "Here Comes Trouble" Atco/Atl.Group The group has the formula that the format looks for. It wasn't ground breaking, but AOR knows it's roots. A few more singles left on that album.

<u>Great White, "Psycho City" Capitol</u> Talk about a group getting back to the sound that made them famous in the beginning. Blues rock is GW's specialty, and this album puts them back on track.

<u>Jude Cole, "Start The Car" Reprise</u> Everyone knew it would happen sooner later. Cole finally gained mass acceptance within the format, and received some overdue songwriting credits too.

Roger Waters, "Amused To Death" Columbia A brilliant album for the year. Waters can always be counted on to produce a timely and important record. A strong reality check for everyone.

Extreme, "III Sides To Every Story" A&M The pressure was on, since the industry was very critical of this groups early success. It has turned out to be real, and the band's latest is testament they will be around for a long time. Rock radio has only scratched the surface of a quality piece of work.

<u>Peter Gabriel, "US" Geffen</u> Gabriel exudes a certain global feel in all his music, that sits quite well with the format. Though the album has the same style and texture as <u>SO</u>, the video for "Digging" reached new levels of excellence.

Izzy Stradlin And The Ju Ju Hounds, "Self-titled" Geffen The Guns N' Roses factor helped, but more importantly, Izzy surprised us with his depth and classic feel. Look for a tour in early '93.

Keith Richards, "Main Offender" Virgin The man puts the word "cool" into rock and roll. Richards latest is much more diverse than his last studio project, and bound to lead the way in '93.

Bon Jovi, "Keep The Faith" Mercury They called upon the talented Bob Rock to produce the album and the early signs indicate the band is on course again. The first single went to Number One, and the tour in '93 will put the band on Top of the scene.

Annie Lennox, "Diva" Arista Though most of her success came with the Triple A stations, Lennox showed off her incredible vocal abilities with this retail winner!

Lindsey Buckingham, "Out Of The Cradle" Reprise It was a while since his distinctive vocal and guitar work graced the airwaves, but Buckingham was able to survive the one-two punch from other ex-F' Mac players throughout the year. He was even caught stretching his boundaries!

The Jeff Healey Band, "Feel This" Arista It seemed like a long wait between albums, but Jeff Healey has made the wait well worth it. While his re-make of "While My Guitar" set the groundwork for today, it is quite clear that he will be blazing his own trail with his latest. Guaranteed to produce a handful of singles that will make Healey one of the most sought after guitarist in the 90's.

<u>Jeffrey Gaines, "Jeffrey Gaines" EMIRG</u> There should be a seperate category for artists of Gaines caliber. It's obvious that he became one of the top singer/songwriters of '92, and we can expect a lot more from him in the future.

Little Village, "Self-titled" Reprise With talent this big all wrapped into one, you couldn't go wrong. The format is hoping to sink their teeth into another project from this bunch of rockers who will always play an important part in roll in rock and roll no matter what they do!

<u>Melissa Etheridge, "Never Enough" Island/PLG</u> Melissa changed her looks and reached for wider range sound. She accomplished both goals and confirmed her place in the format as one of the strongest female rockers on todays playlist.

Tom Cochrane, "Mad Mad World" Capitol It's been a long hard road since Cochrane's days with Red Rider, but he broke through with one of the strongest singles and albums of the year. If you think the project is over, guess again! Something this good doesn't fade away quickly!

The Zoo, "Shaking The Cage" Capricorn The label's excitement was running high as they unleashed the talent's of Mic Fleetwood, Bramlett, and Thorpe on the format. The Zoo brought one of the fullest rock sounds of the year to rock radio. Let's hope there's more to come from the Zoo.

<u>Soup Dragons, "Hotwired" Big Life/Mercury</u> The group was sitting at Gold out of the box, since their last project sold up to 400,000 units. They had one of the best Alternative crossovers despite the dance feel.

Lyle Lovett, "Joshua Judges Ruth" Curb It was only a matter of time until the pendulum began to swing into the rock arena for Lovett. It was a solid year for him as the walls between Rock and Country became paper thin. The perfect 25+ artist for those upper demo driven stations.

Roger Daltrey, "Rocks In My Head" Atl./Atl. Group Though it didn't set the world ablaze, it made us all appreciate that we are all growing a little older and wiser.

Patty Smyth, "Patty Smyth" MCA The combination of Smyth and Henley made for a strong comeback. The album has a little something for every one, pounding out the rockers as well as the sweet heartfelt ballads. Smyth's relationship with rock radio is just beginning.

<u>Tori Amos, "Little Earthquakes" Atl./Atl.Group</u> She was one of the most critically acclaimed artist of the year with rave reviews from the every magazine. Tori is paving her way and will undoubtedly make some inroads in a format that tends to shy away from her style of play.

Toad The Wet Sprocket, "Fear" Columbia Believe, and the truth will set you free. Toad hit the format hard and heavy with the controversial "Hold Her Down" and made their mark with "All I Want." After three albums, tons of touring and music that makes a difference, the sky is the limit for this little old band from Santa Barbara, CA.

The Men, "The Men" Polydor/PLG The label's golden boys (and girl) had a good run at some major players with a song that was a bit left-of-center for most. Rock radio asked for a few food "men" and it got them! Expect a lot more music rolling across the airwaves from this unit.

<u>Matthew Sweet, "Girlfriend" Zoo</u> It was a hell of a long year on the road for Sweet, but it paid off in a big way. Sweet's album had the feel that turned on a variety of different demos. He is destined to become a very strong pop/rock star. Sweet has an innocence and a Beatle-esque groove that catches on quickly.

Sass Jordan, "Racine" Impact/MCA The lady had two Top 5 tracks from the album <u>Racine</u> and quickly became AOR's Number one female rocker. She can only get stronger from here.

If nothing else, give the album a complete listen and you'll understand why we're so high on them! The Sighs, "The Sighs" Charisma Some groups will always make quality music that fits well with any format. The Sighs are non-offensive and will continue to build a loyal fanbase. Some things take time, but when it happens for the Sighs, it will happen big!

big! Devonsquare, "Route 66" Atl/Atl.Group You have to believe that something is going to happen with this group. They have one of the best stories of the year, as radio picked the hit and forced the label to chase the single. With a charismatic lead singer and an All-American sound, Devonsquare will continue to open eyes as well as ears in the near future. Cracker, "Cracker Brand" Virgin A major breakthrough for the label, and one of the best highlights of the year for rock radio. Though it may sound trite, there isn't one bad track on the album. It doesn't get any hipper than this! A group that sings about the times, without putting on those rose colored glasses. The group's sarcastic (yet hopeful) outlook is very refreshing. Los Lobos, "Kiko" Warner Brothers There comes a time in every groups history, where they finally get enough respect to create the album they've always wanted to. Kiko was that album for Los Lobos. Hitting traditional roots and solidly showcasing the players individual talents was the prime objective for Kiko. Guess what? Mission accomplished! The best record for the group and a project that will be the favorite of many for years to come. Died Pretty, "Doughboy Hollow" Beggars Banquet/RCA Watch out for this group, because when they catch on, there will be no stopping them. Completely different, Died Pretty laid down a very unique album that will be looked upon as the one that got away. Check out "The Love Song" or "Out In The Rain." Rock bands like this don't come around every day! Sugar, "Copper Blue" Ryko Disc Even if you were afraid of playing something from Bob Mould's latest project, you have to respect the artist in mention. Mould is a leader in his own right and has paved the way for many others. Dig into the album, and enjoy a great set of tunes.

Take a pick, with something this tight and right, you can't go wrong. <u>Glen Frey, "Strange Weather" MCA</u> There was a lot of feeling and emotion that went into the making of <u>Strange</u> <u>Weather</u>. Frey was stretching his boundaries and in doing so, gave us a very poignant album that taught us a little about ourselves and the life we live. <u>Soull Kitchen</u> "Soul Kitchen" Giant It's Southern Fried rock and roll at it's best even though the group is from the Fast

His album had tons of potential, and was a shining example why he is such a driving force behind some of Bruce Springsteen's and Neil Young's best material. Someday! <u>Fish, "Internal Exile" Polydor/PLG</u> Very strong record for a debut. Fish had to overcome the Genesis comparisons, and did a fine job with his freshman effort. You can count on Fish to break new ground with a healthy solo career! <u>The Wallflowers, "The Wallflowers" Virgin</u> The showcase in New York City was raw and tough. One would think that being Bob Dylan's son would at least let you park in Nauman's parking space...Not! There's something here that's hard to explain. James, "Seven" Fontana/Merc. U2 isn't the only group capable of combining hit material with a powerful political mes-sage. James is leading the way in a changing world and "Born Of Frustration" should have been the one! Strong concerts and mind blowing harmonies set James apart from the masses.

<u>Southgang, "Group Therapy" Charisma</u> These Southern rockers write songs that pull down the requests. The label folk know there's something here waiting to explode. Throw away those images of the "hair" band. Southgang gets bigger with every concert and you will be hearing more from the record in early '93!

RECORD OF THE YEAR

Megadeth, "Countdown To Extinction" Capitol Last year it was Metallica who set new standards for hard rock. 1992 was the year for Megadeth. Overcoming a heavy image isn't easy, but Mustain and Company have tapped into the mainstream in a major way. Few bands can mix politics and music with such class. Mustain covered the Democratic and Republican Conventions for MTV, and became involved in the process instead of just being an observer. "Symphony Of Destruction" was one of the Top phone burners, and "Foreclosure Of A Dream" makes a healthy 7-2* move on this weeks chart. No programmer will argue with Megadeth's huge fanbase, and the action from <u>Countdown To Extinction</u> proves that Megadeth is an important group, with important things to say.

BREAKTHROUGH OF THE YEAR

Pearl Jam, "Ten" Epic Though the album hit in 1991, Pearl Jam set the tone for most C.O.R. stations. It was the record that lower end rockers could break before the mainstream competitor in town. All the tracks tested, and it seemed listeners couldn't get enough from the band. The C.O.R. outlets continue to lead the way with early action on "Black," even though the label is through working the project. The sky is the limit for the "Jammers" as the format anxiously awaits the groups next move. You can bet it will be a big one!

BEST NEW ARTIST OR GROUP

Helmet, "Meantime" Interscope/Atl.Group The band hit the scene hard and heavy, and MTV jumped all over these young rockers. "Unsung" not only worked on the Metal side, but quickly crossed over to the C.O.R section and onto the mainstream side. The label had to fight to sign them, and it's understandable. The group's sound is reminiscent of the good old days of Black Sabbath. There's no doubt that Helmet will continue to impress and have a solid impact on the C.O.R. stations in the coming year.

BEST COMEBACK OF THE YEAR

KISS. "Revenge" Mercury KISS began by taking Lou Reed/David Bowie glitter rock and pushing it to the extreme. Throughout their illustrious rock and roll history, their albums emphasized Gothic, bigger-than-life aspects of rock, and their live shows started the "really big shows" we see today. *Revenge* is the way KISS fans like a KISS album to be. The "Army" is still alive and kicking after 20 years and they display the same intense enthusiasm for rock and roll that KISS still does. Congratulations to a group that survived the best and worst of the business. There will always be a page in the history books for KISS, and the final chapter is far from over.

MOST OVERLOOKED RECORDS OF THE YEAR Asphalt Ballet, "Asphalt Ballet", Virgin These boys pack a royal punch and should be watched closely when they hit with their next project. "Tuesday's Rain" was a great example of the groups powerful vocal ability and high potential to produce a hit record with an edge. They are currently on tour hitting small clubs and working on new material for the new album due in late March (the working title is "In A Pigs Eye). When all the right elements fall into place for Asphalt Ballet, there will be no stopping them!

Social Distortion, "Somewhere Between Heaven And Hell" Epic C'mon folks. Social Distortion is perfect for the format. Get over the image that they are just an Alternative act. Social Distortion rocks. See them live if you don't believe us. They play rock and roll that gets right in your face. Take a chance and remove the "balls and chains" that hold you back from playing them.

BEST CONCERT OF THE YEAR

Metallica. Elektra The "Snake Pit" was the ultimate experience from a group who cares enough about their fans to design a stage to ensure that everyone in the stadium could enjoy the show. Besides the incredible stage show, the high energy and perfection from Metallica could not be topped. Metallica's concerts were some of the hottest that got hotter over the Summer when they hit the road with Guns N' Roses. Surviving near riots and some down time because of G N'R, Metallica shined through with their Triple platinum-plus album and paved the road for groups in the same genera.

COR-Elements OF 1992

Def Leppard. "Adrenalize" Mercury Talk about pleasing the fanbase and continuing a legacy. Def Leppard has overcome more adversity than almost any other band, and has more respect than most of the groups on your playlist. <u>Adrenalize</u> was true-to-form, and fueled by their high energy rock and roll. Face it! Def Leppard has found the perfect formula that we all love. Every song is memorable because of those huge hooks. There will always be a space in rock and roll for a band this great.

Alice In Chains. "Dirt" Columbia What can you say about a group this strong? Alice In Chians produced an album that stayed true to their roots. There's no doubt that Alice In Chains is not only one of the strongest, but also one of the best groups for the format. Period!

Faith No More. "Angel Dust" Reprise The group had a lot of pressure to top the success of "Epic," but rose to the challenge. Faith No More is one of those groups you either get, or you don't. One thing is certain, a lot of C.O.R. listeners get it and responded.

Saigon Kick. "The Lizard" Atlantic/Atl.Group Everyone at the C.O.R. level knows that "Love Is On The Way" is not a true representation of what the group can do. Sure, they can whip up a beautiful ballad, but these Miami "maulers" are known for their kick ass rock and roll. True colors will shine through in '93!

Soundgarden. "Badmotorfinger" A&M The album went Gold this year and set these bad motherfu\$%&ers a place in the format. We can't think of one C.O.R. player, who isn't anxiously awaiting the next move from Cornell and Company.

Tora Tora. "Wild In America" A&M C.O.R. stations had a lot of success with "Amnesia" and re-discovered the potential of Tora Tora. There was some down time between albums, but the format seemed to remember the groups first album, proving that programmers have a strong belief in Tora Tora.

Temple Of The Dog. "Temple OF The Dog" A&M The album is a beautiful tribute that everyone was aware of almost two years ago among the C.O.R. players. Right time, right place was the <u>right</u> story this time around, as Temple Of The Dog got their just rewards by being Number One in our final issue. Yes folks, it's for real!

Extreme. "III Sides To Every Story" A&M The format was putting "heavy judgment" on this new album from Extreme. With all the action to date, Extreme not only overcame the harsh, "*they did it once, can they do it again*" comments, but expanded into new territory that will last well into '93.

Black Sabbath. "Dehumanizer" Reprise Though many stations didn't get into the album, it was a solid effort from a group that is over coming the loss of frontman Ozzy (who had an incredible year). If Ozzy wasn't on the scene as much, there may have been a different story here.

Iron Maiden. "Fear Of The Dark" Epic Maiden reached for that mainstream brass ring, and we thought they had it with "Wasting Love." They were one of the few groups of the past year to grace our cover, but rock radio passed on an album that would have set new standards for the group in the format.

<u>Great White. "Psycho City" Capitol</u> It was the year we saw a true Blues rock album from these guys. Faith in the group was running a bit low, but Great White went into the studio and laid down some of the strongest material since their second album. Look for more pure rock from <u>Psycho City</u>.

<u>Ugly Kid Joe. "America's Most Wanted" Mercury</u> The "kids" are "ugly" and they introduced us to a whole new street vibe. They overcame any novelty factor that the industry was trying to hang over their heads with the release of <u>America's Most Wanted</u>. Take our words to heart, Ugly Kid Joe will be right back where they were a year ago come mid-January.

Lynch Mob. "Lynch Mob" Elektra The big C.O.R. band for Elektra turned out to be half the other half of Dokken (one of the best hard rock groups of the late 80's). George Lynch and crew knocked out a stellar album that showed off the true potential of the group. Their tour brought out the fans as Lynch's playing set venues on fire.

L.A. Guns. "Hollywood Vampires" Polydor/PLG It was back in January and February that Traci Gun and his Hollywood "vamps" got serious about shedding their old skin for something new. It was the album they needed to make to kill any glam or hair band image that was starting to pop up. They stirred up a renewed interest from the format and you never know what the future holds for bands in L.A.

MOST POTENTIAL IN 1993

Ministry. "Psalm 69" Warner Brothers They are leading the way for a music that has been brewing on the streets for some time. Ministry has something strong to say and deliver their messages in a powerful manner. You may not quite understand it, but we guarantee, if you see a show and spend some quality time with the record, you'll get it. "Jesus Built My Hot Rod" is a phone burner and "N.W.O." is a fans favorite. Look for some major happenings from one of the most powerful bands of the last decade. <u>SEE THEM</u> LIVE!

Heavy Bones. "Heavy Bones" Reprise Why so many C.O.R. stations have not picked up on the potential and solid hit material on their debut project, escapes us. Heavy Bones have waht it takes to go the distance, so get ready for them in 1993. The album is far from over!

Trouble. "Manic Frustration" Def American One of the most talented groups of the year. Trouble is a Chicago based band who bring a different sound to the table. Metal radio already knows how well their music does, and some C.O.R. stations found out this year. It's only a matter of time till success is theirs.

Flotsam & Jetsam. "Cuatro" MCA Look for a ton of quality new material from this album in the new year. Don't judge the project by the single "Never Reveal." Overlooking Flotasm & Jetsam would be a grave mistake. There's strong tracks throughout the album, so spend some time with it!

Dream Theater. "Images And Words" Atco/Atl.Group The group's progressive sound finally caught on this year. "Pull Me Under" is a Top requesting record, and only the first successful track from an album that's loaded with deep material taht will keep things alive for Dream Theater for another 12 months.

COR-Uptions FOR 1993

Stone Temple Pilots. "CORE" Atlantic/Atl.Group Though they don't hail from the Pacific Northwest, STP has the grunge feel that everyone is looking for. The atmoshphere is right for these Southern Califona rockers to really take off in the new year. "Sex Type Thing" was discovered by the C.O.R. stations and is in the Top Ten this week.

<u>Slik Toxik. "Doin' The Nasty" Capitol</u> They were quite overlooked, but this Canadian rock group gave us a solid freshman effort. They even had the balls to tackle issues like drugs. You can bet we'll be hearing a lot more from Slik Toxik as they continue to work on a new album.

<u>Wildside. "Under The Influence" Capitol</u> The handful of C.O.R. stations that gave these "wild" boys a shot, have had great stories to tell, and Top 5 phone action. You may think they're a little too corporate if you rock hard, but we feel they provide a perfect balance to the playlist. You have the goods when you are allowed to record part of your first album in Eddie Van Halen's private studio. A major priority for Shane and Company.

Love On Ice. "Nude" Interscope Another record, from another band that are street wise. Portland Oregon's claim to fame, came to the attention of the label at a live show. There was a big rush to sign them, and the rest is history. Though play was limited, there was enough buzz to make them a very heavy group to watch out for in 1993.

Bad 4 Good. "Refugee" Interscope/Atl.Group If they can keep it together, we will put money down that says these young and talented rockers will be guaranteed a place in the format in the years to come. It's hard to believe such a mature sound came from a debut effort. That sound and production was the work of Steve Vai twisting the knobs and gave the group some heavy duty credibility.

Jackyl "Jackyl" Geffen The industry was concerned about all the hype surrounding the group when they first knocked their way into the world of rock, but any preconceived notions about Jackyl not being a real band are long forgotten. The Lumberjack is still pulling in Top 5 phones almost everywhere, (and yes they do have a killer track to follow). The group is nasty and controversial...just the way we like things at the C.O.R. level.

My Little Funhouse. "Standunder" Geffen Young rockers from Dublin too watch for in the new year. They are refreshing and far from trendy. Geffen has a knack for finding the next big thing, and it's groups like My Little Funhouse that fall right in line with a strong tradition.

Thunder. "Laughing On Judgment Day" Geffen There will be other tunes from the album next year. Thunder is bound to break, and break BIG! The whole album is loaded with hit songs for the C.O.R. format. One of the lost treasures of the year that will get a second wind in the first quarter.

<u>Cell Mates. "Cell Mates" Scotti Brothers</u> The interest factor for the twins is extremely high, since the format is void of quality female rockers. "Bottle Of Sin" was a great start for them, and the raves about their live shows are very positive. Keep them in mind for some serious action in '93.

Rollins Band. "The End Of Silence" Imago Kudos to the label for building stories throughout the year on Rollins. The industry knows of his talent, and it's just a matter of time before we start really introducing him to a mainstream audience. No one can argue that Rollins is one of the best writers out there who is at the point of breaking wide open in the hard rock arena.

Saints & Sinners, "Saints & Sinners" Savage The label came on strong toward the end of the year, and Saints & Sinners are turning out to be the early ticket for them. Look for good things in the year ahead from Savage as well as Saints & Sinners.

Testament is like Megadeth, Metallica, and Iron Maiden in the way they produced an album that tries to reach the mainstream without sacrificing quality and sound. "Return To Serenity" has been working for almost 6 months at some stations that report play.



Shotgun Messiah. "Second Coming" Relativity One of this year's best imports from Scandinavia made a ton of new stateside friends with their non-stop promotional tour and high octane concerts. The special EP of covers and live material was a nice way to close out the year, and the perfect way to keep the group on the minds of the masses.

<u>Vince Neil. "Encino Man" Hollywood</u> After they got a taste of his solo work on the Encino Man soundtrack the industry has been asking "what now!" We are all waiting fro his next move. Controversy surrounds Neil these days, keeping the format's interest at a high level.

Bob Dylan, "Step It Up And Go" Columbia The acoustic Good As I Been To You is for those who felt the slightest twinge when Bob picked up an electric guitar. Of course, we've always appreciated his electric side, but our hearts have remained true to the funny-looking folk singer with only his harmonica, six-string guitar and conscious raising lyrics to shield him from the elements and the critics. "Step It Up And Go" has emerged as the first single from this album, and the song is already receiving Triple A airplay. **KFMU**'s **Glen Roberts** commented, "It's working well in all dayparts. It's got a great hook. We feel it's one of the best tunes on the album." **Jane Frederickson** called in from KTCZ with, "This was the track that we went with right away. It has a stripped down appeal and straight-from-the-bones approach." Jane St. John easily slid this track into the KWVS

playlist, "It fits in well with our blues mix." Loudon Wainwright, III, "History" Virgin Speaking of Dylan, Loudon's "Talking New Bob Dylan" is just one of the tracks from <u>History</u> that is receiving heavy Triple A airplay, elevating the Lp to 31* on the Album chart. We stopped KGSR's Jody Denberg, who was just about to walk out the door to pick up his friend Loudon Wainwright, to give us his unbiased opinion, "*History* is quite simply the best album in Loudon's long, illustrious career. Try 'People In Love,' 'Talking New Bob Dylan' and 'When I'm At Your House' for laughs. Hear 'The Picture' or 'A Handful Of Dust' for Loudie in his serious mode."

ALBUM OF THE YEAR Well, we've learned two things this year: that there is no one Triple A Album of the Year, and that the PDs and MDs behind this format are

as eclectic in their musical tastes as the format itself... Jody Denberg, KGSR/Austin: "The two that immediately come to mind are Loudon Wainwright's <u>History</u> and Los Lobos' <u>Kiko</u>. You can't go wrong with either of those albums. The Bob Marley boxset and R.E.M.'s <u>Automatic For The People</u> are also strong contenders." Jane St. John, KWVS/Corpus Christi: "John Trudell's <u>A.K.A.</u>

Graffiti Man, was an excellent album that was, for the most part, ignored."

Tom Krumm, KAVE/Eugene: "Lyle Lovett's Joshua Judges Ruth and Peter Himmelman's Flown This Acid World are absolutely two of my favorites. Etta James' <u>The Right Time</u> is close behind." Jane Frederickson, KTCZ/Minneapolis: "Del Amitri's <u>Change</u>

<u>Everything</u> was a definite favorite. And XTC's <u>Nonsuch</u> was a nice album that was grossly overlooked."

Ginger Havlat, KBCO/Boulder: "Paul Weller and Annie Lennox's Diva.



Rosalie Howarth, KFOG/San Francisco: "Lyle Lovett's Josha Judges Ruth, Clapton's Unplugged, Spin Doctors' Pocketful Of Kryptonite, and Neil Young's Harvest Moon. Most overlooked/underappreciated albums: The Samples' <u>No Room</u> and <u>Cruel Shoes</u>. Honorary mention to XTC."

motion staff and working for a true leader among men, Butch Waugh. PERSONAL HIGHLIGHT: Meeting a woman who, even though from California, has brought balance, strength, and personal values into my life. ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The one with me on the cover. In one fell swoop, it allowed me to air my personal views on the state of our format and business, which I love, but find so totally twisted and misdirected all too often. NON-ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The one with me on the cover. In one fell swoop, it allowed me to show just how much of a total asshole I can be. Who cares about my personal views on the state of our format and business, even if I think it's twisted and misdirected sometimes? WHAT PISSED ME OFF IN '92: How incredibly naive the American public is about the political process. They believed every word a unified press wanted them to believe about George Bush and Bill Clinton. We elected a man from a state with less citizens than Atlanta, Georgia to be President of the most powerful nation on earth. Think about it. And we returned every incumbent to Congress who wanted to go back to Washington to steal, lie, and cheat everyone who doesn't live in their district. PREDICTIONS: Now that the election is over to the presses' satisfaction, it's amazing

how the news on the economy has turned around, seemingly overnight. 1993 will be a definite recovery year, consumer confidence will surge — not to 1980's levels, but healthy none-the-less. Unless Clinton gets mired in ridiculous issues like gays in the military when Americans need jobs. **PERSON OF THE YEAR:** Madonna. Anyone who can make that much money and be that famous with so little talent and so little dignity is a testament to her posers of manipulation and the enduring strength of capitalism and the American Dream.

Michael Hughes. WKLS/Atlanta: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: My personal highlight of the year also relates professionally. Our annual "96Rock and Roll Auction" raised over \$45,000 for the Atlanta Children's Shelter, a day shelter that cares for the children of Atlanta's homeless. In addition, our 18th Birthday party, "The 96Rock Georgia Jam", raised over \$21,000 for the shelter. Amidst the on-going pressures of ratings and revenue performance and the affect of the economy on our business, it feels great to mobilize the resources of our station to do a hell of a lot of good for people that need it the most. ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Certainly, the biggest issue of the year has to be the FCC's revision of station ownership rules. I recognize the necessity of a "rescue maneuver" for our industry, but from a programming perspective, I can't help but be bothered by staff reductions, format monopolies, network potential replacing localism and the on-going question of just how far it will go. WHAT PISSED ME OFF IN '92: While indecency continues to be a hot topic with the FCC, and efforts continue toward federally imposed censorship, we, as broadcasters, still have no clear cut guidelines as to what is and what isn't indecent. Until we get a letter of inquisition, we don't know we're subject to indecency fines. PREDICTIONS: We all know, even when we see the slightest turnaround in the economy, it


takes a while to see it's positive effect on radio. I believe we'll see recovery, but not to the benefit of radio until well into the second quarter, if that. I think we'll also see further streamlining of our industry, network formats and personalities, combined sales and programming staffs and the big boys getting bigger are all elements of our business that will grow. I also think we're entering an expanded competitive advertising battleground. The reach and cost-effectiveness of cable is a threat, as are the opportunities of database marketing as advertising alternatives and growing in appeal to major advertisers. Take a look at what Proctor and Gamble spent this year vs. last on direct mail advertising to core consumers. Car dealers, too. We as an industry must better market ourselves as an effective and immediate advertising medium. **PERSON OF THE YEAR:** Phil Walden — For reviving Capricorn Records and restoring integrity to his corner of the label community. Phil has demonstrated that a backwards bullet isn't the end of a project and the end of opportunity for an artist. They only sign artists they can make a long-term commitment to, not two short weeks to prove their worth on the charts. All of us could stand to learn the value of thinking "outside the box" and introducing alternative marketing approaches to our business. Good to have you back, Phil.

Jeff Shane, Capitol: PERSONAL HIGHLIGHT: Getting married to Diana was my biggest personal highlight of the year. PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: Professionally speaking, I've had a couple of highlights, one being the re-breaking of Tom Cochrane, and another, the tremendous challenge trying to overcome the name Megadeth. It has never been the music, just the name of the band that programmers couldn't say on the air. But now, massive nuclear death seems to have been put on the rear burner in our society. ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Without a doubt — the economy. We (in the entertainment industry) are usually the last to feel the problem. (Think of the amount of time one can reuse a CD or tape.) We are at a point with our companies where we must think of re-organizing and lay-offs. Now, everyone in our country is affected. HOW DID YOU STAY AFLOAT IN '92: Capitol saw this problem coming last year. We decided to dissolve a few territories and move local personnel around with no layoffs. Promotions, trips, and product giveaways have been greatly curtailed in order to reduce operating costs. This is a way to keep staff members employed. Capitol is, in no way, out of business. We are becoming more selective in the promotions we do. The days of throwing radio outrageous promotions for "just an add" are out. Being selective in the promotions department is the #1 priority. WHAT PISSED YOU OFF:

Our format is so tight, remakes and new versions of live singles should not take up a slot on a playlist. Give the live option to the jock, or drop it in when you would normally play the studio version. With BDS, you can get just as many plays — without the report. BDS lets you know just how many tracks the station is playing of the live CD. **PREDICTIONS:** '93 will be a year of transition. It is time for a democratic president and congress to, at the very least, change some laws to show that the country is really trying to change. There are no more excuses with the same party in control. Changes will be slow because the people are waiting for something to start to happen. We all must have patience. The problems we have did not start overnight. The confidence of the people is what is really going to make the difference. If ever the country (like during Kennedy times) must believe and rally around the new administration, this is it. **PERSON OF THE YEAR:** Bill Clinton is my man of the year. Early in the primaries he had some problems with his past, but he handled them very well. I believe that his persistence is what gave him the victory.



Lenny Bronstein, Virgin: PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: The professional highlight certainly has to be finally being a fully-



endowed Virgin (so to speak) and rejoining many old friends on the front lines, while bringing along lots of Charismatic buddies. **PERSONAL HIGHLIGHT:** On a personal level, it was a difficult emotional year with the loss of my mother. **ISSUE OF THE YEAR:** There can be no bigger issue than the enormous turnout at the polls of previously apathetic voters. The three major candidates brought out discussion and opinions from people who could only quote the latest Santa Barbara episode or Monday Night Football hero. Whether your candidate won or lost, you were probably better equipped to exercise your choice, and the climate should lead to some positive changes, even if they don't happen in the "first 100 days." The fact that Perot info-mercials and the debates held our attention so vividly has to portend well for both the nation as well as our won little world of radio & records. Maybe the listeners aren't as asleep as many programmers seem to want to believe. As a subheading to this greater national awareness of issues, we can't forget sexual harassment, anti-Semitism and racism finally reaching the doorsteps of most of America. It may not be as compelling as the AIDS epidemic and isn't as devastating, but we no longer are shielded from the harsh realities. It can happen here. The U.S. remained a world leader by delving into the problems of others. As citizens, we can't turn and hide from ugliness around us. Sure, most people will say the biggest issue is "the economy, stupid" — but that's only part of the malaise

we've avoided confronting for so long. The nation has been sufficiently scared into electing a new administration to hopefully tackle the problems. **PREDICTIONS:** 1993 will see the maturation of the alternative family of formats and the AAA format into a longterm success story. This parallels the early days of progressive rock and "FM", when we all listened to the music and went to shows and kept the radio on, obsessing rapturously to the latest new sounds and musicians. The consumer listens longer, buys the CD/cassette, traipses out to the clubs and, more importantly, patronizes the advertisers. We're building trust in the station and its mission and message, giving hope once again to the disenfranchised radio listener who has spent the last decade settling for tunes. We're learning to talk with, not at or down to our best consumers. We're trying to entertain and service our listeners' needs, not just be a free jukebox. AAA and alternative are not fads — they're the life-style formats speaking face to face to us and our peers. They're mobilizing actives, and not what ad agencies dread, but what they covet. That leads to the ratings and ad agencies discovering the truth about real audience TSL. I don't know if technology will catch up with reality, but at least someone is trying (i.e. AccuRatings). Radio needs to be more aggressive marketing itself to the consumer and time buyer. Great numbers don't correlate to being sold out. Salesmanship and attractive product will win, not just glossy packaging. **PERSON OF THE YEAR:** Obviously, Bill Clinton because he broke out of the pack, kept the lead and ultimately won. Ross Perot came in a powerful second by stirring up the emotions of the multitudes, even if he didn't have much more than a wish list. He made it very simple for the common man to want to better himself, his business and his government. By the nature of 1992 being a dramatic political year of upheaval, a new President wins hands down.

Cyndee Maxwell, KOLZ/Los Angeles: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: The highlight of 1992 for me was being



hired at Pirate Radio. It was always my goal to (help) program in my hometown market so huge thanks to Greg Stevens for helping this dream come true! **BIGGEST PISS-OFF:** Speaking of hometown, the thing that really pissed me off this year was the whole L.A. Riots crap. Bigotry, racism and hatred in full view on TV, and there was nothing anybody could do about it. I think Darryl Gates should be serving time behind bars for dereliction of duty. (And maybe Tom Bradley, too). I was sick to my stomach for 3 strange days. And now in the "post-riot era", nothing has changed. Too many negative and uncaring people wage too much influence over the sheep. In spite of the technical and industrial achievements and advances in our world in the last 50 years, when it comes to basic humanity, we are still sorely lacking. **ISSUE OF THE YEAR:** The issues of '92 were racism, the recession, politicians, and young people wanting to get involved in the political system (YES!!). The non-issue was the sale of Pirate! I think (hope) that in '93 the economy will finally bottom out and plateau. HAPPY HOLIDAYS!!!

Sky Daniels. PLG: PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: Being the point person for U2's Zoo TV Tour. Robert Hilburn of the L.A. Times billed it as the "SGT. Pepper of Rock Tours." Indeed, it stood as the singular rock event of the year in every market I attended. I had the joy of watching programmers and fans gaze in awe at a true spectacle. ISSUE OF THE YEAR: The biggest issue was the economy. Years of pressure gave way to desperation. In particular, the 18-24 cell is staring at incredible obstacles in the work-place. Frustration and rage are the emotive reactions. PREDICTIONS: In music in 1993, you will continue to see an acceleration of acceptance of things formally deemed "alternative." There has been a distinct divergence of musical ideology taking place in the last two years. Finally, the twain between '70s based heritage rock and low-end listeners interest has been cut. You either target classic/adult or you wake up to the here and now.



Bill Weston. WHIY/Providence: PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: The summer Arbitron. We were #1 12+ for the fourth of six consecutive books, 9.9 share. We were also #1 18-34 adults, 22.2, and #1 25-54 adults, 9.4. I really felt the station and all associated personnel were hitting on all cylinders. **PER-SONAL HIGHLIGHT:** The birth of my 2nd child, Jade Elle. **ISSUE OF THE YEAR:** The election. Rock radio (along with MTV) made a real difference with the `Rock The Vote' campaign. The Pollack organization was also a driving force in Radio getting their young adult audience to care enough to vote. (The biggest non-issue of the year was Madonna's book.) **PREDICTIONS:** I predict 1993 will see a minor increase in the economy. I see inflation rearing its ugly head, buried deep in the sands of the deficit since the Carter Administration. I see the `Grunge' sound/signing frenzy tapering off with a lot of Johnny-come-lately A&R departments holding the bag on a lot of mediocre bands. **PERSON OF THE YEAR:** My vote for person of the year is Homer Simpson. He's the only real person on TV today!

Jeff Appleton. Atlantic: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: The look on J.B. Brenner's face after he was assaulted by Danny Buch with the dreaded A&M death machine in the Atlantic suite at the 1992 Pollack Convention. PREDICTIONS: The Buffalo Bills finally win the Super Bowl. Bill Hard will cut off another extremity, however it won't be one on his hand or foot. Someone will finally get smart and video tape the next Radio Vs. Records seminar, so that at every convention after that, they can just play it on the hotel TV, that way, none of us has to get up early and attend in person to hear the same rhetoric year after year after year... PERSON OF THE YEAR: H. Ross Perot proved that anyone with enough money can run for president and possibly win...very, very frightening.





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Bob Walton. WRDU/Raleigh: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: I can't recall a harder, more challenging year -



personally and professionally. Now, more than ever, the old rules just don't apply. I hope that sometime in 1993, the entertainment industry will figure that out. WPMO IN '92: Nothing pissed me off more than the same stale lines: "It's doing well where it's being played." "Can't you just do a test?" "Do me a personal favor." I found less knowledge, and more importantly, less respect for what Tom Guild and I do for a living. The up side is that I have some hope. PREDICTIONS: In 1993, the record companies and promotions people who know radio and how it operates and why it does what it does will flourish. An honest effort to promote solid product with solid support (<u>NOT</u> "the home shopping network") will make projects successful where it counts — at the cash register. The lowest point I've had this decade is when a major label pitched an absolute fit and would have pulled every cent off the station (if they had been spending any) because we did a horrible thing — we actually added album tracks!!! They just don't get it. I hope the days of chart position equalling success are over. NON-ISSUE: "They're from Seattle." ISSUE:

The FCC getting back into the regulation of radio. I can't say they will represent the will of the community, but their red-tape stained hands will be all over radio in '93. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Easy - Howard Stern. Love him or hate him. Pay him or compete with him. He has dominated conversations at the water cooler and the radio station conference rooms. He's made us re-examine and rethink what works in radio today. Yep, 1992 was the best of times and the worst of times, but it's still the only thing I want to do. I'm glad I still have my job. I'm glad I work with the best staff and management team in the industry. I'm glad my lovely wife has put up with all the bullshit. I'm glad my owners stuck with us. And I'm thankful I never have the same day twice.



Fred Jacobs. Jacobs Media: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHT: The success of The Edge. This is going to be a for-mat to be reckoned with. ISSUE OF THE YEAR: Duopoly. It's really all that people are talking about. WPMO IN '92: I'm getting tired of PDs spouting off in the trades about the stupidity of their competitors. These comments are beginning to resemble WWF bravado. Aren't there good reasons why Don Shula would never say that the Colts suck? PREDICTIONS: 1) More duopoly and related fallout from stations combining forces. This will continue to have impact on jobs, careers, and the growth/survival of broadcasting companies. 2) The continued growth of Modern Rock as a viable format. Whether it's for stand-alone FMs or duopolies, more and more broadcasters will discover that there's really a viable new format that will win over a new audience. 3) Growth in satellite-delivered programming/personalities. Stern has proved that broadcast success isn't necessarily dependent on being a local medium. Z-Rock and other satellite formats have shown that ratings can be generated from nationally programmed services without the cost burden of a local airstaff. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Howard Stern. Who else?

Ziskrout, Arista Records: How can I take time to reflect on the year when it's not even over yet and I'm crazy tying up loose



ends, contemplating appropriate Xmas gives and setting up for the new year? I'll just try. HIGHLIGHT: My personal highlight of the year was definitely my 45 seconds of free-fall from a Cessna 210 from 13,500 feet above the Mojave desert! (There was another great 45 seconds that I had this year, but I don't want to mention her name.) Although I've been flying planes for several years, I've always had a major fear of falling. I conquered it. I loved it. I can't wait to go again! Professionally, my highlight has come late in the year. The release of the new Jeff Healey album has given me and my staff something to really sink our teeth into, and has given us our first #1 in quit awhile. There will be many successful tracks released from this album in 1993. In fact, we go for adds on "Heart Of An Angel" on January 11th. PISS-OFF OF THE YEAR: Although there are many major annoyances that accompany my daily challenges, I am very tired of the high quantity of pissed off people in this business. I think we could all be more effective in our respective corners of the business if we stopped getting pissed and began getting

smart. If we stopped expecting the things we want to be delivered on a silver platter, and began first with understanding the other guy's position and then working, promoting and selling our points of view, we would all find ourselves with a higher success ratio. Ego is No Go. PREDICTIONS: My predictions for 1993 and beyond are generally optimistic. Consultants and Rocket Scientists alike will suddenly proclaim that bands from Seattle are no longer testing well. So, where do we send our A&R people next? Well, we sendout ours to Hopatcong, NJ! High-tech radio usage measurement devices will finally begin to actually measure the effects of your programming, and not just what the diary keeper might happen to scribble. The effect of this will be a need to move away from passive research, and will open the door to more exciting programming. Smart labels will get more aggressive in alternative methods of delivering music to the people. This includes both getting consumers to listen to music and new ways of actually making the sale - music will be purchased and delivered without requiring a trip to the store. BDS and SoundScan will be improved and merged, so we can instantly get accurate snapshots of how our's and our competitors' records' sales performance relate to airplay and marketing efforts. PERSON (ENTITY) OF THE YEAR: It will require a run-off election between Ross Perot, Dana Carvey and MTV. I think that the combination of Carvey's hilarious, bigger than life satires of Bush; the equally hilarious, yet frequently on-the-mark campaign of Perot; and MTV's youthful, hip presentation of the issues helped create a dynamic political/social revolution in this country that seemed to wipe out compulsive apathy and negativity.

Gregg Steele, KNAC/Long Beach: PERSONAL/PROFESSIONAL HIGHLIGHTS: The past twelve months have meant some



of the hardest times for many people, but the current economic downslide has really socked it to Southern California in a major way. The amount of disposable income for KNAC's incredibly active listener base has been cut severely since the end of 1991. However, we've been able to creatively involve the audience in many low-cost promotions. The turnout at club nights and shows and other events in 1992 has been phenomenal! The continued importance of KNAC to its listeners and our importance in their very active lives has been one of the brightest spots of the year for me, both personally and professionally. The fact that they are so dedicated to us is truly rewarding. ISSUE/NON-ISSUE: Howard Stern and the FCC. Period. WHAT PISSED ME OFF THE MOST: The continued misconception of KNAC by some of the record industry. KNAC is the radio station of choice by hard rock fans in Southern California. Regardless of Arbitron, regardless of signal strength. KNAC's audience goes beyond its city of license. We are a Los Angeles radio station with appeal all throughout Southern California. Our audience is much more active and willing to spend their money at shows and record stores than any other radio station's

audience in the market. KNAC is often imitated, but we're the station of choice by hard rockers in L.A. ECONOMIC PROGNOS-TICATIONS: Whereas the U.S. economy has been given a boost in the past couple of months, the downtrend continues here in California. Unemployment keeps going up with more and more lay-offs and plant closures imminent. National ad dollars improve and local monies just keep on a-shrinkin'. The Clinton Administration may provide some sort of euphoria on Wall Street, but I'd say 1993 won't begin to improve in Southern California until 3rd quarter. But as John & Paul said, "I do believe it's getting better...(can't get no worse)". Amen. PERSON OF THE YEAR: Tipper Gore for keeping her mouth shut. Let's hope it stays that way!





Michael Lee. WXZL/Baltimore: HIGHLIGHT: My biggest professional highlight of the year was being named Program Director here at Rock 103! ISSUE: The birth of COR stations and the acknowledgement of those stations by the record industry. A lot of the credit goes to trades such as The Hard Report for making the industry aware that this is the format for the '90s. NON-ISSUE: It has to be "What happened to the AOR format." Hey, wake up!!! It's called the evolution of the format. You have to adjust or you'll be passed by! WPMO: What pissed me off the most this year - in fact, the last two years is the sniveling-ass-kissing record reps that play the R&R game and ignore stations that have a tradition of breaking artists and selling product in the marketplace. I understand having priorities in the market, but get your head out of the P-1's ass and take care of business! 





DENVER, ROCK CITY

The Denver Rock Wars are on, and it's looking like the low end blood gwan be flowing. When last we covered this unfolding scenario in Noise, KAZY's GM Steve Youlious had called KBPI's Bill Betts with word that he had been fired, that most of the KAZY staff was in jeopardy, and that since KBPI had "won the war," would Betts please refrain from further faxes and colorful correspondence aimed at KAZY PD Steve Kosbau and the rest of the lame duck airstaff.

As was widely predicted, **Jacor**, owner of classic rock "The Fox" (KRFX) in Denver, LMA'd KAZY from Summit effective last Tuesday at midnight. On the previous Saturday, KAZY hardened up their sound considerably, dropping in ten second Country sounders every half hour or so, followed by the Fox's "laugh" effect.

Then, at 11:00 Tuesday night, KAZY aired what could best be described as an on-air reminiscence of the highlights of the station's 20 year history, peppered with shots at KBPI and its program director. In-studio participants included Jacor's **Randy Michaels**, and two Fox female jocks who had worked previously at KBPI, and Ops Manager Jack Evans. Then, as the last strains of The Door's "The End" faded out, Evans again made reference to KAZY's long history, and all of the talented people who had worked there. But change was inevitable, and that KAZY's new sound would be bigger and better. Evans added that he knew that there were two program directors in town, sitting on their couches looking at their tuners with "tight sphincters." Then, with a "Ladies and Gentlemen, here's our decision," KAZY cranked up Hank Williams Jr.'s "We Are Young Country," and "The New Young Country, Y106.7" was born... Not! Actually, the station played an hour long tape of country radio as dummied up by Jacor's Jacksonville Country outlet **WQIK**. Then, the tape died out. Dead air for few seconds, followed by the Fox laugh. Next, a drop that said, "What KBPI promised, we deliver," into a doorbell effect and "106.7 KAZY. A full metal racket," as "Rock Til You Drop" kicked off a new armor plated approach roughly represented by these three sample hours:

7-8: AC/DC, "For Those About To Rock"; Jackyl, "The Lumberjack"; Bonham, "Wait For You"; Guns N' Roses, "Yesterdays"; Motley Crue, "Without You"; Van Halen, "Pound Cake"; Baton Rouge, "Walks Like A Woman"; Great White, "Once Bitten, Twice Shy"; Megadeth, "Symphony Of Destruction"; Nirvana, "Come As You Are"; Temple Of The Dog, "Say Hello 2 Heaven"; King's X, "Black Flag".

8-9: Winger, "Easy Come Easy Go"; KISS, "Domino"; Tesla, "Little Suzi"; Metallica, "Sad But True"; Skid Row, "Monkey Business"; Suicidal Tendencies, "Nobody Hears"; Def Leppard, "Love Bites"; Joe Satriani, "Satch Boogie"; Stone Temple Pilots, "Sex Type Thing"; Alice In Chains, "Them Bones"; Queensryche, "Another Rainy Night"; Slaughter, "The Wild Life";

9-10: Whitesnake, "Fool For Your Loving"; Ozzy Osbourne, "Time After Time"; Damn Yankees, "Someone To Believe In"; Bulletboys, "Hang On St. Christopher"; Four Horsemen, "Rockin' Is Ma Business"; Pearl Jam, "Alive".

But, is this the format the station is sticking with? Indeed, says Mr. Michaels. "We fed that Country rumor. We had an hour of fun with Country, and we did consider it very carefully. KYGO is OK, but not a great radio station. They're your typical `Rusty Walker, Patsy Cline into today's country and getting away with it' type operation. The question is, do you get piggy and go after a whole new audience, or do you lock up the one you've already got.

In the Duopoly world of the '90s, protecting your rock position is what it's all about. Bill Betts is a great programmer, but it will be tough for him to take on two stations. Maybe they ought to go country! If we took KAZY out of the market mix, Bill would come right up under us at The Fox. He has been playing more Led Zeppelin and Pink Floyd, and he's being punished for it." Regarding personnel and positioning, Michaels continues, "We'll have jocks eventually, and The Fox's OM Jack Evans will be in charge of both stations. KAZY's currently sort of an amalgam of the **Power Pig** in Cincinnati, essentially playing KBPI's list minus the classics, with a few additions we've seen test well at some of the other harder rocking stations. Certainly, the lineage and the attitude have been moved over from Cincinnati. Bill has tended to be more young hair band, avoided anything modern, anything Seattle, but we've got that stuff in there. He'll still step it down to play a Zeppelin ballad, and we keep it pretty well focused all the time."

With all those Power Pig references, you had to know that none other than Tom Owens would be in the building. We asked the multisyllabic one just how closely the two stations were presently aligned. "Right now they're fairly close. We are playing a lot of the Jackyl, Helmet, Testament, Megadeth, and Metallica, but none of the Zep, or the straight shooter records you might hear on KBPI like `Life In The Fast Lane' or `What Can You Do.'" We have retrospected the station to the late '80s, and we're a little more current intensive. We

figure they will probably try to lay a 'Z-Rock' type of rap on what we're doing, but the reality is that if you strain the two products, the differences between them would be fairly minute, perceptually speaking. There is some '70s corporate rock on their end, which they use in a 25-34 endeavor, and a lack of time restrictions on things like 'The Lumberjack Song' on our side of the ledger. But the differences are minimal. A lot of it is in the packaging, the presentation and the attitude." Gosh, judging from the "KBPI Must Die" and "A skid mark on KBPI's back" liners, it sounds like the station is pretty darn attitudinal. "Yes, the thing has a lot of bite to it. Early on with the Power Pig, we had a clearly defined enemy, and at this juncture, having eliminated the enemy in Cincinnati, we don't have as inviting a target as KBPI makes for KAZY now." But isn't Tom concerned about mentioning KBPI on air? "Betts is a terrific programmer who has done a wonderful job. KBPI is, by and large, perceived to be a pretty good station. We have to be careful on the merits with which we criticize them. They have to resonate with reality, as far as the consumers are concerned, so we are being fairly conservative, attacking the '70s music and too much talk relative to us. KBPI is a fairly personality driven station with Nasty at night and Steve Cooper in the afternoon." Does Tom think the Cincinnati showdown is a reliable blueprint for what's to come? "WCRZ carrying Z- Rock, owned by Reams Broadcasting, certainly, was not as formidable a competitor as are Bill Betts, Great American, and a product like KBPI. But it is similar in terms of the crossfire and forcing them to make some decisions in what they need to do." Finally, Tom's perspective on the country option: "KYGO has a second FM in the market, and anybody that comes in with a country format will quickly find themselves one of three country stations. KYGO has the potential to consolidate their two signals with a tremendous amount of firepower, and to operate the tw

Naturally, a little equal time for Bill Betts is in order, and that comes in the form of another trademark guerilla fax...

CROWE FLIES TO THE BIG APPLE'S CORE



It's been a busy two weeks around the megacabin, but we had the opportunity to slip away to check out a group not too many of you understand. Two years ago, people clued others in about a new music scene from the Seattle area that was going to break major ground in 1991 and 1992. In 1993, rock radio will have a new music force to deal with. We're talking about Ministry, the "Godfathers" of industrial music which is already brewing at the street level. Some programmers like Chris Squires/KRAB in Bakersfield were getting tons of response from "Jesus Built My Hot Rod," so that peaked our interest in the group. The first time we saw them was on the Lollapalooza II Tour. After the show we spent some more time with the new album, and started to understand what all fuss was about. Last Thursday in New York City, Ministry played the Paramount to a sold out crowd. Since they were headlining, the visuals were better and the sound was much more in-your-face than at Lollapalooza. We were surprised that we knew many of their songs after only casual listens to their catalogue. Two highlights from the show included, "Just One Fix" (a power-ful statement about drugs) and "Scarecrow" (a tune that shows the depth of their music and quite haunting). The sales on the album are a good indication that there's a loyal fanbase, and they continue to make new believers with every tour stop. Seeing Ministry served as a wake up call for the future. We know what a lot of programmers and music directors are thinking that Ministry are too hard or too out there for the format. It may not be pretty, and it may not be for your station, but you've got to appreciate the massive musical movement that Ministry's Al Jourgensen has been a major part of. Ministry and bands like Nine Inch Nails are in the vanguard of the next generation of progressive music. Certainly you can avoid these bands and not play them, but rest assured they won't go away. Face the music and face vour fears!

BUZZ KNIGHT TO PROGRAM WZLX

Buzz Knight, Program Director of Saga's WNOR/Norfolk, announced this week that he's heading back up to his Northeast Corridor home turf to program Boston Classic Rocker WZLX. That's the Cook Inlet property that Infinity takes over once the FCC Stern indecency issue is settled. I'm proud of the fact that our direct competitor never beat us while we were here and as a team that feels good". So, for the time being, Buzz reports to Cook Inlet, then to Uncle Mel. He arrives on site the week before Christmas, "to pick the brain of outgoing PD John Shomby." Buzz continues, "Personally and professionally, I'm super charged about the challenge. WZLX has some definable objectives, and I've definitely competed against classic rock enough to know the ins and outs." No word on Buzz's replacement, but we understand that as of press time the job is still very much open.

AL SIKES OFFICIALLY RESIGNS FCC

FCC Chairman Al Sikes announced his resignation from the commission effective January 19, 1993. President-elect Clinton is expected to name one of two sitting commissioners, James Quello or Ervin Duggan, both Democrats, as acting chairman. The departing chairman was criticized for his stance on indecency enforcement and minority issues during his tenure, but got high marks from broadcasters for reducing regulations imposed on the business of broadcasting. 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World Radio History



Dave Crowl: A Great American President

38 year old Great American Radio Group President Dave Crowl has radio in his blood, literally. His Dad owned WAVI & WDAO/Dayton for thirty years. It was an adventurous combo with WDAO featuring the country's first Black format on FM. He broke into radio at his Dad's stations, running the board and other odd jobs during school holidays. Dave has been with Taft/Great American since 1977 and his first full time job in the sales department of WLVQ/Columbus. He worked his way up through the ranks at the station becoming Sales Manager in '79 and GM a year later — at 26. In 1984, Dave signed on the company's CHR KKRZ/Portland taking it to #1 in the market within six months. In April '87, he transferred to the GM post at WLZR/Milwaukee, guiding it through its formative years. He rose to the VP/GM title before leaving in 1991 to succeed Carl Wagner as President of Great American's radio group. Dave presides over some of the country's most powerful and successful AORs: WKLS/Altanta, KYYS/Kansas City, WLVQ/Columbus, WLZR/Milwaukee, WRIF/Detroit, WXTB/Tampa and KBPI/Denver. The Great American AOR PDs are probably the strongest group of individuals since OPEC (That is, if you ask the record community) with Ausham, Betts, Duncan, Hughes, Moffit, Mull and Neumann exchanging ideas and information on the company's biweekly conference call. Great American's faith in the format is the obvious opener...

Great American's clearly bullish on AOR. What has kept you so confident in the format for so long?

Dave: We, as a company, are fans of the format because we have been successful with album rock. We've seen AOR go through a lot of differ-

ent phases and fragmentation, and we understand how to deal with those changes. There's a whole generation of listeners who grew up with album rock, therefore, we believe the format has a long-lived product cycle. People will listen to rock for the rest of their lives. Rock and roll is part of our society. AOR is an important music force that will always be in demand, and it offers many programming options like classic, alternative, C.O.R. or Triple A. As long as there are radio stations, people will punch up and want to listen to rock and roll. Baseball is no longer the national pastime. It was taken over about fifteen years ago by partying. When you party, you listen to music most of the time, and rock and roll is there to fit the bill. When I was at 'LVQ fourteen years ago, we were playing a brand new band named AC/DC that was selling records right and left off the shelves. That 18-year old fifteen years later is now 33, and probably still cranks it up once in a while. There is a future for rock music, unlike some other formats that have problems right now.

How do you feel about CHR? Are you not as familiar and/or comfortable with that animal?

Dave: No, I ran KKRZ in Portland for three years, and put that station on the air. I'm totally comfortable with the philosophy of the format. I'm still fairly familiar with the music and the bands that I think work for that format. I understand it quite well. But, to answer your question, CHR as a format is struggling. One of your PDs said, 'Top 40 is easy. Anybody who has a tough time programming a CHR station is a knucklehead.' Do you know who the PD was? lose its appeal, especially in the Midwest. And there was no product to back up these stations that were basically left holding the bag with very little user

Dave: I have no idea.

Greg Ausham.

Dave: That doesn't surprise me because he used to be in Top 40.

Greg's of the opinion that it's far more difficult to stabilize a library and keep things rolling than it is to bang the same 40 records. Would you agree with that?

Dave: CHR, five years ago, was a no brainer format. There was great music out, and you could play it and rotate it correctly, have a great morning show, and you could win. What has happened in the last couple of years is that CHR has become much more difficult to program. You can still do the wild, zany, upbeat morning show thing, and still do great marketing. But the problem with CHR is that the music changed on us. The record companies had a lot to do with that. They let CHR down. They turned their backs on the format. They knew damn well that all the CHR programmers in the country would follow the rules of CHR, and that was, 'Play the hits the record companies provide. No matter if it slants urban, or if it slants toward the Seattle rock and roll sound, you'll damn well play it. And we really don't have to help you very much.' What happened was CHR, over the course of the last two and a half, three years, got very caught up in the popularity of the urban dance rap movement, music that I feel was pushed by East and West Coast record execs and radio stations. First, it was okay, and then, it started to blame the format because very few people in CHR said, 'Hey, we're not going to play by the rules anymore. We're going to take matters into our own hands.' That didn't happen. The format is still stuck in a tremendous dilemma, including our two stations. And we're working very hard to redevelop the correct mass music approach.

You're certainly not alone. It seems as if there are about half as many CHRs now as there were three years ago.

Dave: And the ones that are surviving the great ones like the Z100's and KISS in L.A. - are all now trying experimentation and new music presentations. I don't know where it all leads, but CHR as a format has been dissected, broken apart, and fragmented by competitors, so now, it is more of a difficult format. Fortunately, current music is improving ,and for that I have to commend the recording industry. Better hits are the salvation of the format. I think CHR will come back. It may not be what it was. There may not be a million morning zoos out there anymore. But if the music gets better, that's a very critical step in the format's rebounding. It's not going to happen overnight, but I'm here to tell you that there are still a lot of people who will, out of habit, punch the stations that are known for playing the hits, or playing the best new current music. It doesn't mean you have to be a New Rock station like 99X in Atlanta. There's some great mainstream music out. Whitney

Houston's song is a smash right now. A lot of CHR stations, two years ago, were programmed not to play her anymore because she was 'too AC,' and, all of a sudden, Boom! CHR is hitting that record pretty hard. There's been some great music from Elton John and other established artists. And there are some exciting new things from acts like the Spin Doctors and similar bands that the format has expanded to embrace. I don't think the CHR product was particularly strong a year ago.

Right now, do you see AOR having a distinct advantage over CHR in terms of demo salability?

Dave: Yes, because AOR can still consistently deliver saleable 25-54 year old ratings, whereas most CHR stations have recently struggled with this demo.

How would you peg the shelf life of the Country format? Is it here to stay?

Dave: There's a foundation being built now with the Country popularity that will always keep it a more powerful format than it has been in the past. After we went through the 'Urban Cowboy' period, Country fell back on its rear-end, due to lack of talent depth. It seems like there are successful new Country artists hitting all the time, and that's very positive for that format. It reminds me of album rock in the late '70s, when it seemed like more new bands were hitting and sticking, many of which now form AOR's foundation.

Audiences are quite aware of the new Country acts and the presentation of the format is more accessible to non-fans today as well:

Dave: And the music is very good. Isn't it ironic that a lot of people are attributing the success of the current Country phase to its format being somewhat more rock based? Many of these acts have come from rock and roll backgrounds. They've applied both music forms very nicely. So, Country is here to stay. The one thing that you're going to see happen is that the broadcasters who are the lone Country station in a market are going to have a competitor on their doorstep sometime in the next three years. It's inevitable. There's going to be a struggling station in your market that is eventually going to say, 'What the hell am I doing? I'm going to enjoy splitting a ten share of lis-tenership!' The tone is being set in Dallas, where there were two Country stations on FM, now there are five all going different directions. Now, Dallas is a large market. I don't think there will be five Country stations in every market. But where there is one, there will eventually be two.

WIYY's Russ Mottla's research told him that his station was really sharing way too much audience with Country, and it was killing them 25-54. So, Russ started playing more traditional AOR acts, and he also started dropping in the occasional Country record. Do you feel that borrowing Country crossover tunes for some of your more heritage based AORs makes sense? And has that been active topic of conversation?

Dave: Our programers are not actively spending a lot of time researching that. In Atlanta, there's been a couple of situa-

tions where we have thrown in a crossover song.

Yes, I know WKLS played Travis Tritt, as did WIYY.

Dave: Travis Tritt researched very well, and was a very successful record for Michael Hughes down in Atlanta. That's the first time I had ever heard of us doing it. There could be potentially more of that, but I don't see everybody rushing to throw a Billy Ray Cyrus on their station.

Is this a researchable notion? Rock radio did pretty well with Charlie Daniels, Marshall Tucker, and the Burrito Brothers for a quite a while...

Dave: I'm sure there's research out there that will say yes or no on that. We haven't researched that point yet. I'm sure if there are guys doing it and it's working, then there's an interesting concept here. But I would be very reluctant to do anything like that until the research demonstrated that you could throw a little dash of Country in and not hurt your rock and roll base.

Being just out of the 18-34 demo yourself, and a reputed rock fan personally, how involved are you musically with your radio stations? in helping them sell records. The support should be there to help us get that job done for them, and also, help us have a revenue source, and not let that revenue source fall back.

I'm sure you're aware that labels have gotten extremely high profile about incentivizing radio stations with promotions involving travel, electronic consumer goods, and all kinds of hard goods and services, especially when they're chasing a Breaker or need a great first week on a new release. What's your feeling about that, and would you be comfortable in your capacity if you knew that record companies were coming to your radio stations and directly offering promotions and support, or timebuys in support of airplay on product?

Dave: That's an interesting question. I'm not comfortable for us to add a record because we are going to get a mega \$15,000 stereo to give away to a listener. To me, that's not the reason to add a record. The record still has to be good. Determining that is up to the Program Director. If we do happen to add the song and the record company wants to further increase awareness, then it's proper for the radio station to work with the record company and execute a promotion. That, I'm very much in favor of.

Most PDs in the past have never been perceived as good sales people. That's changing. Most are good communicators, and thus, are good salesmen. It's very important for them to be involved in convincing record companies to bring more revenue to the radio station.

Dave: I like to stay in touch with what they're doing. We do not set policy from here at all. We like to know what music they are testing and what the research is coming back with, but we really work very hard at trying to make sure that the programming people at those stations are making the calls on those decisions. For us to try to dictate it out of Cincinnati would be suicide.

Do you check the test results? Is that something you follow up on?

Dave: Yes, we like to know. To be quite honest with you, as a group, what's going on in one market may be of very good information to another Program Director in one of our other markets, particularly on a regional basis. We like to get all that information and get it back out. Our conference call that we have every two weeks handles that situation.

Those things are discussed — what's working, what's stiffing?

Dave: Oh, yes. I think we should sell time to record companies during the call. We could take little breaks and they could run commercials.

You mean we'd have to compete for the same budget?

Dave: I wish the record companies would come back and start to spend more advertising dollars. I was on a panel at the R&R convention, and I asked the people from the record side on that panel, `Where is your support going? I see you doing advertising in People Magazine and Time. Those dollars used to be on radio stations, or used to be co-op for record stores to give to radio stations.' That's changed quite a bit. The record companies have got to realize that radio is, first and foremost, their most important partner Maybe a different way to phrase that question is, if record companies are interested in more rotation and more visibility for a particular piece of product, do you think it's appropriate that they come to your Program Directors and indicate to them that they are ready and willing to place a timebuy, but in the fashion of all advertisers, they want to make sure that they've got solid rotation to back up the timebuy?

Dave: I wouldn't have a problem with that.

Do you envision your program directors getting much more involved in a true time sales capacity with record companies?

Dave: I do. That's something that we have to discuss in our company, as we move forward. It's possibly happening already. The Program Director will play a very key role in doing sales on the side with the record companies. I am in favor of record companies coming forth with some type of schedule put together for the amount of dollar volume that's placed, and maybe there is a feature that then is put on the radio station that highlights the song, or cuts from their CD in question. PDs are going to play a very important role in that. Most PDs in the past have never been perceived as good sales people. That's changing. Most are good communicators, and thus, are good salesmen. They have to sell concepts to their programming staffs, and they have to sell concepts to the General Manager. It's very important for them to be involved in convincing record companies to bring more revenue to the radio station. And they're all capable of doing it.

Back in the early days of the format, there was the notion that the FCC was constantly looking over your shoulder, and

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most programmers were fairly self righteous and far more difficult to promote. Concern about undue influence has almost totally evaporated, wouldn't you say?

Dave: Yes, it has. No question about it. The FCC has really relaxed a lot of those annoying little rules. They were serious violations. franchise. That's what WLW has done with WKRC here. Other operators are executing duopolies to gain an extension of their particular product, or possibly, offer an improved format version of a weaker competitor.

How far do you think the FCC will let the whole duopoly thing go?

We're really broadcasters, and always have been. That's what we do best and what we concentrate on. we made a decision to stick with our primary area of expertise, and that's television and radio.

Like the \$25 rule, for instance?

Dave: Yes, things like that. All of our stations had strict guidelines on the \$25 rule. We still are very careful with what our Program Directors receive from record companies.

Let's discuss LMA's and duopolies. You talk to consultants, you talk to Program Directors, and `eat or be eaten' seems to be the operative philosophy these days. Do you buy into that mindset?

Dave: Yes. In some markets, where you have many signals, duopoly will occur sooner. In cities that are under-radioed, like a Minneapolis, Indianapolis, or Atlanta, you probably won't see everybody rushing to match up, due to financing limitations and lack of signal inventory. But in markets like Phoenix, or even L.A., where the ability to sell in combo with two properties makes sense, the trading will be a lot more active. As this all materializes, the science of duopoly will really evolve. Over the next two years, I expect to see a lot of "experts" emerge. The one absolute that came out of the recent NAB was that 1+1 does not equal 3. Everyone hoped it would. At the present time it appears 1+1 barely equals two, and maybe just a little more if you're lucky.

Are you comfortable discussing the urgency you feel in regard to getting into the LMA/Duopoly game at this point?

Dave: There is an urgency, if the potential situation is financially correct. But let's remember that the ability to finance asset acquisitions is very limited currently. We have seen the first wave of duopoly hit. There are about 80 deals out there right now, twenty or so are in the Top 30 markets. What's going to happen in the first half of next year, the real second wave of duopoly will be determined by the new administration's effect on the economy. If the economic climate is positive, look for major deals to happen. Those rumored mega-mergers we hear about will happen before the Fourth of July next year.

Certainly, the intent of the original rulings was to prohibit, or block in whatever fashion they could, unfair competition. Do you think most of the LMAs that you've seen go down were designed to coopt competitors more than to strictly take advantage of other economic opportunities?

Dave: I think it's #1, to garner as much market share as you can, and sell that market share however you have to. Some people are afraid it's just going to be commodity selling and things like that. Some guys are doing it to protect their franchise and have an offshoot of that particular **Dave:** I would not be surprised to see further relaxing of market duopoly opportunities in five to eight years.

How do you feel about the change in the administration, both it's effect on business, in general, and how you think it will effect LMAs and duopolies?

Dave: I believe the Clinton administration will eventually be a more moderate presidency. Do not be surprised if many of his policies attach their objectives to the Bush administration's visions. In regard to duopoly, I believe the current policy will proceed. Many broadcasters are confident Clinton's administration will relax the indecency controls for radio. I, personally, believe the FCC will be directed to maintain most of the current indecency guidelines.

How do you see the current conditions, in terms of LMAs and duopolies, effecting the programming and music departments — the trickle down effect?

Dave: The trickle down effect is, it will eliminate some jobs with overheard cutbacks in duopoly situations. You're already seeing that happen. For one person to program two stations is going to take a tremendous amount of skill, attention and good marketing knowledge. Instead of two PDs, we'll see one PD with a strong assistant. People are going to get laid off. If you get down to the basics, I see the secondary LMA situations as almost startups, with some economies of scale, like the on-air PDs and really basic money saving management moves we've all done when we've started stations up.

Is this something you've gone through at your properties at this point? Has the economy effected things like shift lengths?

Dave: Yes, we've extended some shifts in a couple of places. We have not put the PDs on the air. I don't think that's right, unless the PD wants to be on the air, and there are a couple of situations like that. The economy has basically made us get back to what we used to do. In the '80s, when a lot of our stations grew rapidly, we added bodies for convenience in sales, promotion, engineering or whatever. We're not going through massive cutbacks, but we are looking very keenly at what is correct by market, what efficiently works, and do we have the right amount of people to get the job done.

Great American has sold some stations and I'd assume you regret that guys like Gene Romano and Marty Bender are no longer part of the operation?

Dave: Yes, we miss them. They're both very talented. We stay in touch. I've

seen them at a couple of conventions and things. Those are two very good radio stations that Taft and Great American had built, and they continue to be powerhouses.

Even though you lost two key players in the transaction, it seems to have been a sound business move for all parties involved.

Dave: That's exactly right. It was a good business decision for Great American, and it was a very good business decision for Broadcast Alchemy. We handed those stations over to Broadcast Alchemy on the heels of two of the best Fall books those stations had ever experienced. The staffs of those stations will continue to win.

How bullish is the company on TV at this point?

Dave: Very. The television industry has gone through a difficult period. I really believe that television is starting to figure out what they need to do operationally to proceed through the rest of this decade. Great American's TV stations are up to the task, and are putting together better marketing, programming, and local news presentations than they ever have before. It's starting to pay off.

Is cable putting a big dent in their profitability? Is cable's market share up, down or the same?

Dave: Cable is putting a big dent in the entire TV industry's profitability, I'm sure. I just read somewhere that cable is projecting 15% to 16% increases this year in revenue for that industry. That's huge! That's twice of any other industry that I know of in media. So, cable continues to impact TV revenue.

Is the consumer confidence that we're reading about in the fourth quarter and retail picking up extending to the industry?

Dave: Yes, I think it is. You can go to any mall in the next two weeks and instead of people walking out empty handed, they have a lot of bags in their hands. That says there is purchasing going on. The consumer feels better about the new administration, a feeling that should last at least five or six months. And we're seeing it trickle down in our business. From August through November, our business has been up, and I think most other broadcasters would agree. I know the RAB is reporting business up 6% overall in the last three months. We're seeing similar numbers, so, yeah, we're feeling more confident, too.

It's interesting to note that you did own Hanna Barbera at one point, and Spelling Television Productions. What does the organization gain by divesting of those properties and concentrating exclusively on radio and TV?

Dave: We're really broadcasters, and always have been. That's what we do best and what we concentrate on. Divesting of those other properties gave us the ability to write some debt down, and put ourselves in a more comfortable situation and to better concentrate on the radio and television business and proceed from there. We originally were a broadcast company, and those other subsidiaries we brought in were extensions

of that. There was a point in time when it all worked very nicely together. But we made a decision to stick with our primary area of expertise, and that's television and radio.

How do you feel about the satellite delivery system aspect of the DBS thing that the NAB is really working to get around now? Do you think they'll be successful?

Dave: I certainly hope so. The NAB has done an excellent job in defending radio. We do not, as radio broadcasters, need to have another 36 channels come in for potential consumption. Radio has to be on a level playing field in terms of technology. We cannot let satellite services deliver digital sound quality programming before we are able to.

Do you think the potential effects on radio revenue will be debilitating, or merely bad? each of those stations will probably build TSL out of it.

What effects have the FCC fines had on your willingness to pursue Howard?

Dave: They've made us step back and be a little bit more cautious about whether we would do it and where we could do it.

How big of a headache were the Bob and Tom fines when you owned WFBQ?

Dave: It's similar to the Stern situation. We had one person persecuting Bob and Tom in Indianapolis, and he brought on most of the FCC inquiries and challenges. I'm understanding now that there are more and more groups jumping on the bandwagon against Howard Stern, and I see that kind of snowballing as a bigger issue. With that happening, the overall growth of his network and the acceptance of it by broadcasters could get slowed down.

Every now and then, let's face it, every great morning show has a moment when they go over the line. I don't object to those moments. The problem arises when those moments become the norm.

Dave: If the satellite services eventually offer advertising opportunities, then it will be a concern. I expect that to happen. However, radio will continue to survive, just as it did during the advent of television. This particular situation is more of a concern because up front, the listeners who are at risk are the at-home audience, and that still makes up a large percentage of our overall listenership as an industry.

Why has cable radio not been successful?

Dave: The problem is convincing the consumer to pay for something they've always received for free. No one pays for radio, and all of a sudden, you've got to pay so much money a month to have access to a channel that plays music exactly the way you want it. It's the same thing with events like pro football or the Olympics. It didn't work in the '92 games. It works for some big fights, but that's because it's a unique event. People will very slowly grasp the concept that for ten bucks a month, they can listen to whatever they want to. That's where growth will slow down, just like any technology. Twenty years ago, the TV guys were saying that cable wasn't going to make it.

Ditto Howard Stern ten years ago. How seriously has Great American considered using Howard?

Dave: We have looked at it in a couple of markets. And we'll continue to do so. He is obviously very talented, and is getting some excellent results where he is established. We do see him making rapid progress where he is new, too. We're watch that situation very closely.

Do you sense Howard's momentum building exponentially at this point?

Dave: Yes. The street buzz will continue to accelerate, as will his results. In Albany, I'm predicting that he will be a smashing success there. I'm hearing stories out of Cleveland that he is picking up very nice momentum there. I don't know enough about the Dallas situation to comment. But I would imagine that in any major market like that, with the publicity that he is getting, he's going to continue to have people cume and tune him in, and I would assume you're conversant with the specific items Howard talked about that caused the problems? Did you see any of that the you felt would be problematic on your own stations?

Dave: I would have had a problem if our people were knowingly and aggressively presenting their show that way. Every now and then, let's face it, every great morning show has a moment when they go over the line. I don't object to those moments. The problem arises when those moments become the norm. In Howard's case, I would have been concerned, and probably a little upset with the content. But one must assess the overall success of the daypart. Again, all morning shows cross the line, and it's up to management to support them when they do. However, the morning show has to demonstrate some responsibility in making sure that they are not doing anything that could affect the stations' license You have to affect the stations' license depend on these guys to have the business sense to know whether or not their material is suitable and correct, while hopefully, having the comedy impact they're looking for. That's what we expect all of our morning shows to do.

Of course, many people have commented that 100,000 bucks — even if it's 100,000 per facility — is chump change compared to what a share point is worth in, say, Los Angeles or Chicago.

Dave: Yes, that's true in the larger markets, but as these networks expand, the FCC could start fining any station that carries indecent programming over a network. Radio stations in medium and small markets cannot afford 100,000 dollar fines.

Not to mention the megabucks indemnification policy that Stern stations are reportedly required to take out.

Dave: We think about all those issues. I've been listening to Howard Stern when I go to New York for a long time, and he's talented. His show has people talking about his radio station. Good or bad, broadcasters want their station to have street buzz. However, there are rules out there that we are expected to follow and are expected to adhere to. The licensee really has the responsibility follow those rules, or risk being fined. It's all laid out for us. The issue is, how much can I be fined, and is it a First Amendment issue? Those are all going to go through court procedures and legal processing to figure out what the answer too those issues will be. Until then, if you want to break the rules, you're going to get fined. And the fines are big now. They're not based on your market size. They're 20,000 bucks a clip these days. Most broadcasters are not willing to go through that situation and risk the fines and the legal fees entailed in that process.

What are your thoughts on consultants? For a long time, the chain worked with Dwight, dating back to the early Lee Abrams/Superstars days of the early 70's. Then, when Carl Wagner exited, it seemed your consultant relationships were more on a `station choice' basis. Now, Dwight seems to be back in the saddle. Can you discuss that evolution? What brought you back to Atlanta?

Dave: I have a close working relationship with Dwight. I've always used him at the stations I've run. I'm comfortable with Dwight. He's knows our stations very well. He's worked with our heritage stations, 'in some cases, for 15 years. We've used other firms, but we seem to have had our best results with Burkhart/Douglas. It's not me saying, 'Hey we work with Dwight or nobody.' I tend to want to stay where the better results are.

Makes sense. It seems to me that a disproportionate number of your players have come out of Bowling Green or WLVQ. Is there some sort of Ohio Mafia?

Dave: Bowling Green is known as the 'Yale Of The Midwest' in many social circles. We do have quite a few programmers and managers within our division who attended BGSU. I guess I was one of the first. Dave Kennedy from Susquehanna went to Bowling Green, so other companies must be going in and recruiting, too. I'm not surprised. Bowling Green has an outstanding broadcasting/journalism school. But it is funny that the most of the people running this company have come from Columbus or Cincinnati.

What do you look for in your PDs?

Dave: We look for people who are excellent product managers and understand the music and how to position it in a competitive situation. That is most important to me. Secondly, that they are good with people, good motivators, cheerleaders and team captains. You probably know this from being in radio, you can walk into a station and feel if it's up or if it's down. A lot of that has to do with a PD who can get the staff motivated. General Managers or Sales Managers can help, but the Program Director plays the key role in motivation. Pumped up air staffs win ratings. I've just seen it too many times. The other quality we look for, and insist on, is that they think like businessmen, understanding that the programming decisions they make relate directly to a radio station's cash flow and bottom line. Music adds, hiring talent, nurturing a morning show or whatever it might be, are all key business decisions. We expect

our PDs and OMs to approach those choices as if they owned the station. The old feeling from the album rock days was that you couldn't take the programming guy out to meet clients because he had long hair and wore ripped up jeans. Those days are obviously long gone, and Programmers are now more Product Managers. We look for PDs who can make bottom-line decisions, understand business, and who know how to read income statements and control budgets. Those are all key characteristics in being a successful manager in the 1990's.

One of the interesting aspects of your organization is that the esprit de corps is higher than anywhere else. The Great American Program Directors love to sing the company's praises. To what do you owe that kind of loyalty and high morale?

Dave: It goes back to long before I had this job. There's always been a confident spirit amongst our radio group. Number one, we have been successful. We are aggressive marketers and programmers. We always stress a `take no prisoners' attitude. There's a comradeship that's been built over the years. We run stations that do well. People like to win and be in winning environments. Let's face it, all stations have their ups and downs. Our AORs, even the heritage ones, have had their good days and bad days and some off years due to competition. Our guys feel good about being part of our company. They enjoy sharing ideas with the other PDs within the company. It's a unique situation because we have so many stations in one format. But even the non-AOR PDs have that same spirit.

Has selling a low-end station changed at all since you were GM at Lazer? Are agencies realizing that this is something they should be a part of?

Dave: It's changed somewhat, though, not as dramatically as some consultants and experts who are pushing young end rock stations would have you think. Hard rock is becoming more accepted as more of those bands have mass appeal hits. It's still very difficult to market stations like that beyond the core advertising groups. If you have good management and solid sales strategies, you can take the sales opportunities to another level. But you still have to put yourself on the buyer's side of the table. That's what I tried to do when I was at Lazer. It was very difficult for car dealers, banks and utility companies like AT&T, to spend big dollar volume to accept what is still thought of in some quarters as the `black T-shirt crowd.' It takes a very special kind of sales effort to educate potential advertisers. It takes whatever kind of demographic and psychographic material you have to get the point across. I'm not saying it's impossible because KBPI and WXTB have done an outstanding job of accomplishing that. Those stations are both successful financially, but they're in good sized markets. They're in markets that bill \$65 million dollars plus, with enough radio dollars to allow you to be that fragmented. That kind of money is not available in smaller markets, thus the opportunity for good cash flow with hard rock formats is diminished. We found that out at Lazer, even though after a couple of years of intense sales effort, we got over the hump. We had a smart overall approach and intensive marketing effort that made the advertising community feel we were a little more user friendly than they did in the early days. Another point is that this format takes some time and effort to establish. Usually, the people who switch to lower end have failed with another approach, so they're already in a crunch financially and need to get something happening quickly. But Hard Rock takes longer than two books to establish itself. It's not a quick fix.

You don't have any Alternative stations. Will you be exploring that format?

Dave: At the present time, no. Stations like KBCO and 'XRT have a brighter future than newer stations entering the format. I say this because both those stations have toiled many years developing their market position. But who knows? In fragmenting situations, maybe these newer stations with their 2.5 or 3.0 shares will be players, in another three or four years when everyone has a 5 share. Additionally, I don't know if the marketing and advertising dollars would be automatically attracted to this type of station. Most marketers believe generation X is a very difficult moving target.

Is it as tough a sell as a lower end rock and roll approach?

Usually, the people who switch to lower end have failed with another approach, so they're already in a crunch financially and need to get something happening quickly. But Hard Rock takes longer than two books to establish itself. It's not a quick fix.

Dave: Maybe not as difficult because in a lot of cases, people in the media will tend to gravitate to Alternative stations because the music is cool. It's a little hipper to listen to than a brand new throat slashing rock station.

Guess what station all the ad agencies play in Chicago? Let's see what happens with 99X in Atlanta. That will be a major testing ground for how quickly alternative stations can be established in the 90's. If it's successful, then maybe I'll change my mind. I don't know if that station is sounding correct or incorrect, but that'll be a great place to see if it works.

Has advertiser push for value added promotions in conjunction with time buys become a major quality control issue with your troops?

Dave: There is more pressure on what you do in between the records. It does make life more difficult. We're meeting the challenge by effectively integrating these demands into existing programming. You can take two of those requests and combine them into one blockbuster promotion, where everybody wins and both parties get what they were looking for and the radio station gets something that's valuable to their listenership. It's the only way you can deal with it because it's not going to go away. Given the fact that Great American has demonstrated a commitment to rock and roll, is the conservative perception of the company inappropriate?

Dave: We are a conservative company. Taft broadcasting was a very button down company and those are our roots. The rumors of the blue blazers and the khaki pants at company meetings are usually right on, but I think that's changing a little bit. Our management style here is still fairly conservative, but we are aggressive and continue to implement the kind of decisions that stimulate growth and hopefully success. You're seeing fewer and fewer of our guys wearing penny loafers. I haven't worn a blue blazer in a year and a half. I'm more into tweeds now.

Hey, don't knock penny loafers. That's all they wear around the Warner Brothers corporate office in Burbank, and you can't get hipper than that. With white socks, no less. Why, I'm actually wearing my Weejuns right now...

Dave: In the last meeting we had, I looked around the room and saw no blue blazers — maybe some khaki pants, but they were Dockers. Who knows, the all black look could be next.

One of your PDs told me that the only time he had ever seen you furious was when you saw a jock hang up on a listener.

Dave: It's little things like that which pretty much set me off, those unconscious mistakes that happen when people get careless. If ratings go down because a mistake might have been made with some type of music rotation, or some other controllable situation, that won't make me fly off the handle. But little dumb things like treating listeners, our customers, poorly seems to get me more upset.

Greg Ausham also told me a funny story about the two of you having an animated conversation about a station problem for about twenty minutes, at which point Greg turned to you and said, `Dave, you're yelling at me aren't you?'

Dave: Different managers have different styles, and I'm probably not as tough as I should be. My goal is getting to the bottom of the problem and solving it. Sometimes, if you're yelling and pounding your fist on the table with saliva flying out of your mouth, the thought gets lost, as well as some respect, and you might not get the problem solved. It's better to think things through because you'll go further that way.

Respect, Power, Strength, Fist-clenching, Brutal, Heavy, Intense = Pantera. I'm sure there was never a doubt in anyone's mind that this record would be the Record Of The Year here (I think we all knew way back in summer that it was unbeat-able). Especially since it completely dominated the top of the Hard Hitters chart for a total of 14 weeks (13 straight, one off, then back up for one more). The anticipation alone, leading up the album's initial release in January of this year, was staggering. The Cowboys From Hell already had a monstrous buzz building from one coast to the other, from one continent to the next, and with the release of "*Vulear Display Of Power*" they were about to go ballistic. That's exactly what they've done and they haven't stopped for a moment to look backwards. All the predictions for a crushing success have come true. Now into our second week of December, Pantera are still (a year later) out on the road, maintaining their reputation as one of the hardest working bands alive (everybody wants to tour with them — understandably). In retro-spect, Pantera (Phil Anselmo, Diamond Darrel, Rex and Vinnie Paul) were breaking records before the album had even seen full release. The LP was preceded by the lead single "Mouth For War", which managed an unprecedented debut at 3*. And the second the full album blew into town, (around February 21 to be exact) Pantera pum-melled their way to number one for an incredibly solid and extended stay. As of today, they've been on the chart a total of 44 weeks (out of a possible 49) with 30 of them in the Top Twenty while spending an additional 18 consecutive weeks at #1 Most Requested. Makes you weak in the knees just to think about it, doesn't it? Believe you me, the story's far from over too. Pantera have been one of the predominant forces behind derailing the masses from our staid path of metal, just as it threatened to lead us into a future filled with bor-ing, plaid infested, polyester wearing monotony. They crushed all of metal's preconceived borders the top has been an honest and natural progression, from the street, with the people, for the people. And the result is proof positive that there is strength in numbers and that Pantera is certainly blessed with those. The year certainly blitzed by, offering up enormous waves of hard rock metal releases, that once again caused heads to turn in our direction. It's safe to say the Seattle scene launched out of the Alternative and Metal formats and into the mainstream, and we are not without many crossover champions once again this year from all over the country. Obviously the huge success stories belonged to Megadeth, Metallica, Helmet, Pantera, Nirvana, Faith No More, RHCP, Soundgarden, Pearl Jam (like we even need to mention them) and Suicidal Tendencies, but there were also tons of up and coming crossover possibilities like: Dream Theater, Black Sabbath, King's X, Saigon Kick, Stone Temple Pilots, Widowmaker, Gruntruck, Screaming Trees, Soul Asylum (testament to the growing output of hybrid metal and alternative acts), Kyuss, White Zombie, Exodus, Flotsam & Jetsam, Collision, Warrior Soul, Spread Eagle, Copperhead, etc... The list grows daily. Rock Radio's beginning to learn what it's been missing all this time I think (the label's are catching on too). Check those COR stations. Looking back over the year's releases, it boggles the mind how many albums were competing with each other, and how radio was struggling mightily, trying to fit it all in. Better that than a dry year anytime I suppose. It's definitely been a year of change with all the familiar faces and names, shifting, dropping out of sight, rising to the top or holding their own. Friends became unemployed when the economy took a major swing at the music industry and landed a wallop that shook the foundations at many a label and company. Hopefully they will recover and return to the fold soon. Next year, we realign, rebuild and march ahead stronger then ever. Luckily we will be bolstered by even more tremendous releases from a ton of great artists, and we will continue to trace the paths of some superior rising stars who got their start this year ... right here in the metal arena. Somehow the metal sphere has remained in motion and seems to be growing evermore, rather than closing. And how fortunate for us all. As the rock gets harder, so do we. As it grows ... we grow also. A record just gone platinum, crossover success on an AOR level, a headlining tour of the States, awards and praise beyond one's wildest imaginations and ultimately, a new lease on life. And all of this wasn't just a fluke or some amazing stroke of luck. It was the culmination of very detailed planning and organization, and of course, perfect execution. Their success has been totally warranted and justified by the brilliant record that has literally launched them into the mainstream (and who would've believed it two years ago?). At press time Megadeth we're still Top 15 (at #11) on the Hard Hitters chart — this the end result in 1992 of 25 straight weeks on the chart. 14 of those spent easily holding down the coveted #1 spot after having debuted on the chart at #5 with the lead single "Skin O' My Teeth" (they also enjoyed a lengthy 20 week run at #1 Most Requested). Not a bad showing at all for a band that's been cranking away at their career since 1985. The flipside of the story has been equally as dazzling, with brilliant moves on the AOR and Billboard charts, MTV at saturation levels, and COR reporters tripping all over each other to be the first to say great things about this "new" sensation. Megadeth and all involved with them, are certainly to be congratulated on a very exciting and successful adventure in 1992. I'm sure we're all still going to be tasting some "High Speed Dirt" and "Sweating Bullets" right along side the guys in 1993. As for the year end numbers, Megadeth are #2, but they are definitely holders of one of the best Records Of The Year — without a doubt.





Corrosion Of Conformity, "Blind", Relativity.... Flotsam & Jetsam, "Cuatro", MCA....Surely one of the surprise stories of the year has to be the chart achievements of these wonderful desert rockers. Four albums, a couple bass players and a label or two later, Flotsam & Jetsam (Kelly David Smith, Edward Carlson, Jason B. Ward, Michael Gilbert, and Eric A.K.) finally get their due. And they've done it without compromising their natural thrash tendencies, having only enhanced their already aggressive style with thunderous and catchy grooves, a more melodic edge and strong rich vocals (not unlike the unstoppable detailing or Prong – both of whom Flots lost bassists to). What their aptly titled latest release has brought them is a refreshing new chance at crossover success (the COR and AOR folks are really digging them nowadays), and here on the metal end, numbers to rave about. They kicked things off by breaking the long held Most Added record by solidly nailing 65 stations for the album's first week at metal radio – an unprecedented number. The honest promotion approach to it, was also a beautiful thing to behold – well done folks. Following a debut on the chart at 49*, the album consistently managed large leaps forward until they found themselves nestled comfortably at #1 (after dislodging, amazingly enough, Seattle sons Alice In with 6 at #1), having only fallen to Pro-Pain this last week of reporting. Of course, this is not the end to the story as the band are currently out on the road spreading the word, and the COR and AOR numbers have only begun to rise. Iron Maiden, "Fear Of The Dark", Epic Ah, the rookies and relatively new folk, weren't the only ones to celebrate a move to #1 on the metal charts. 1992 was the year of the "new" Iron Maiden. A move towards modernization in their writing and recording



approaches, produced one of Iron Maiden's most up to date and competitive albums in quite some time. "Fear Of The Dark" was the band's first venture into digital technology and the improved sound quality is obvious from the very first song (which just happened to be the fiery lead track "Be Quick Or Be Dead"). Songwise, the addition of guitarist Janick Gers (who actually joined during the recording of "No Prayer For The Dying"), seemed to have rejuvenated and reignited the passion and aggression of Maiden. What's more, Exodus seem much more at ease and comfortable in their newfound skin. And the response has insured their survival at the format and refueled the interest of their fans. 
Side", which effectively helped launch them onto the charts the week of its release with a 49* debut. A week later with the full album hot on its heels, Exodus found themselves suddenly at 15*. From there, a series of quick moves positioned them at #2 behind labelmates Megadeth, just a matter of weeks later, and of course by the middle of October (the 16th) they could proudly say they had dethroned Mustaine & Co. from #1. And they were to enjoy a nice three week reign, only to be dislodged by "Dirt" slinging Alice In Chains. A great run for these Bay Area bashers nonetheless, and they continue to pound the metallic masses (still Top 10 at press time) on tour currently with Body Count, D.R.I. and Pro-Pain. #8 On the Top 100, Exodus are back and determined to continue their success story in 1993.

One of the brightest and best new bands to come flashing onto the scene this year, had to be New York's own (now L.A.'s) White Zombie (Rob Zombie, Jay Yuenger, Sean Yseult & Phil Buerstatte – who replaced Ivan dePrume). Granted, "Le Sexorcisto..." was not the band's first release, but it was their major label debut and it did virtually blast their early releases into the stratosphere. Punchy, groove laden, funky, far-out, heavy and unbelievably cool, White Zombie's music is brilliant and this Andy Wallace produced album is a testament to it. Blitzed with soundbites and samples from wacky old b-movies and other bizarre oddities, the songs on "Le Sexorcisto" are pumped full of aggression and attitude, but are ultimately danceable – and I don't think you could find a better combination than that. All fuzzed over and funked up "Thunder Kiss '65" launched the band into a hugely successful run on the charts and into the hearts of metal fans nationwide (their tour with Pantera was a phenomenal event). They debut at 19* on April 3rd and were fans nationwide (their tour with Pantera was a phenomenal event). They debut at 19* on April 3rd and were off and running pretty instantly, resulting in a 28 week run (14 of them in the Top 10, plus nine weeks on the Most Requested chart). The pinnacle being, of course, being when they landed at #1 at the end of May. It may have only lasted one week, but it was certainly a crowning achievement for this oh, so talented band. As of press time White Zombie are still out on the road, but all indications point towards a new release from them sometime in 1993, and you can bet your house, it's gonna be one helluva record. Then we'll see if the COR/AOR ranks snap to attention. What a killer band. They're a big bold #5 on the Year End Top 100. What a year for them. How righteous.



Alice In Chains, "Dirt", Columbia....I was convinced at long last, that there actually was some justice in the world and a synchronicity to the universe, when the debut album ("Facelift") from this incredible (Seattle, yeah, yeah) band went gold and broke them into the mainstream (with "Man In The Box" leading the way). To say I love their music would be an understatement, and this record almost left me worldess in excitement, I was so blown away the first time I heard it. Mind you, it's a happy coincidence that I happen to be ridiculously fond of all of this year's number ones. There's just something about Alice In Chains' (Layne Staley, Sean Kinney, Mike Starr and Jerry Cantrell), music that touches the darker side of me. Something remote and hidden by my otherwise optimistic (usually) self. With "Dirt", the band solidified their standing as a world class act, and quickly liquified any rumblings there migh have been about their success last time 'round being a fluke or a free ride a la the popularity of their home town. And the strategy the label employed for this release, was classic and beautiful to watch. The early, unofficial release of the "SAP" EP (which showcased the band's enormous growth and diversity and piqued interest instantly), and the band's inclusion on the "Singles" soundtrack (and their appearance in the movie), helped keep arc off the scale, they're all over AOR/COR charts and stations on the metal end they've been cranking away for 13 weeks (debuting with "Them Bones" at #47 in early September). They peaked at #1 November 6th, but remain at #3 at press time (11 weeks in the Top 10). Undeniably, it's still very early in this album's run, and with the band tearing it up on the Year End Top 100.

They for goodness sakes), but their run on the charts has been absolutely amazing, and their buzz even better. They slammed into our consciousness' with the release of the first single (which was the title track) in late September,

And the race was on as they debuted the following week (October 2nd) at 35* on the Hard Hitters chart. They've been Top Twenty ever since (with 8 weeks in the Top 10 Most Requested). Actually they were Top 10 within three weeks, and Top Five a week later. It's been a fierce little battle up there ever since. More like a cat and mouse, wait and see game between labels and their acts; each trying to predict when one band would begin to fall so they could move up notch by notch. Such was the case with Pro-Pain and Energy, who very patiently rode out the log jam action between Flotsam, AIC and Megadeth. And in a stunning piece de resistance, this week they jammed past all of the above to move 3-1*, where they will remain until we return in January. Next year should prove quite an interesting one for them, as things are really just starting to get rolling for them (they're on the road right now as well, with Body Count, Exodus and D.R.I.). To find out how long they manage to hold on to the highly prized #1 slot, tune in next year and we'll all see what happens. Congratulations to the band and everyone at the label on a wonderful and admirable job! job!



Every year I like to pick a real cool yule collectible for everyone to grab over, during and after the holidays. Last year it was Pearl Jam's Christmas Ramblings. This year, we've gotten the L.S.D. un-Christmas tune ("1000 Santas Getting Stoned") and this little jewel. It's of course much too important to let slide by with out any mention (especially since it will be on your desks Tuesday the 15th). What a gift this would make eh? So without further adieu...



Nirvana. "Incesticide". Geffen/DGC.....What could be better as you head into the holidays then some new (sort of) Nirvana to cruise to. Especially when it's a collection of hard to find tracks by everyone's great new favorite band. Those who have been following the band's career will undoubtedly recognize a bunch of these songs, but for all those new to the world of Nirvana (thanks to the brilliant multi-million selling "Nevermind" LP) can now claim a little history for yourselves. Included are 3 tracks from Peel Sessions ("Turnaround" – which is a Devo cover, "Molly's Lips" and "Son Of A Gun" – which are both Vaseline covers) recorded in 1990. "Sliver" (a Sub Pop A-Side) and "Aneurysm" (from a Mark Goodier session originally appeared on a CD5 of "Smells Like Teen Spint") have both been performed live pretty extensively. "(New Wave) Polly" is a sped up version of what appeared on "Nevermind". Three songs are available for the first time ever ("Aero Zeppelin", "Hairspray Queen" and "Big Long Now"). The first two were demos and the third was originally recorded for 1989's "Bleach" LP. And there's tons more here to check out – 15 tracks total of rare, fun, crazy and ultimately rocking. They all slam with that now familiar Nirvana crunch and burn, and Kurdt Cobain's snarly growls. Great stuff, great fun and we'll probably rehash all of this in the new year so you don't forget about it. In the meantime, enjoy this great collection and we'll talk in '93.

The fact that U2 garnered the most airplay at the format in 1992 may lead detractors to assume an apparent pall of stagnation settling in. If this is the case, "Achtung Baby" is certainly not a good example to bring to the argument table. U2 simply made a great record, and we responded in the appropriate fashion. The same band that thrived on simple stages and bare white lights all those years ago, made a decision to "go for it." With bug glasses and a convoy's worth of satellite dishes, they set about stripping away selected barriers, while adding as much flash as possible. All this pomp and circumstance could easily have backfired if the music wasn't worthy. Thankfully, it was. Even the faction shattered by the band's explosive popularity, and disappointing ego excursion of "Rattle And Hum," had to admit attraction to the insistent, experimental edge contained within the aural fabric of "Achtung Baby." Heartbreak, betrayal, doubt and confusion lurked beneath the surface of glittering Vegas gold stage gear, as Bono and the boys poked fun in their own direction, while giving the masses what they wanted. A steady stream of bonus B-sides helped, but the expansive core quality of the initial source is the primary reason for the resulting chart dominance achieved. What's the big deal? Have we reached a stage where it's no longer "hip" to like U2? If so, God help Nirvana and the rest in the year ahead. Roots and history are a healthy proposition, and U2 remain one of this format's building blocks, regardless of their massive commercial acceptance, or art damaged misguided ideals. Even as we go to press "Achtung Baby" looms as a vital part of our daily programming day, and that's not an accident, aberration or anything to be even remotely ashamed of. (MM)



DOMINANT DEBUTS

As far as a year for "alternative" artists, 1992 was not exactly the period for a large number of breakouts. Certainly there were enough records! As radio grows safer and more research driven, and crossover is demanded for key artists, the Top 10 "alternative" of the year is primarily made up of tried, and proven, artists who have gone on to the mainstream. To find folks who can be considered debuts, you'd have to go all the way down to #17 for Pearl Jam, and for an independent label, to #22, Ryko's Sugar, and #80, Relativity's The Real People. Outside the system is looking more and more like inside the system.

If 1991 was the year of the Northwest's stamping its feet on the welcome mat, then 1992 was the year of its pushing through the door. Nirvana helped open the floodgates, and in a brisk succession, other Seattle compatriots like Screaming Trees, Mud-



honey, Gruntruck, Alice In Chains, Soundgarden, and Pearl Jam followed. Certainly Alice and Soundgarden had established substantial audiences prior, but in the last 12 months these bands proved once and for all their commercial viability. Labels realized the value of timing and re-released Temple Of The Dog and Mother Love Bone. As if multiplatinum sales weren't enough, the

movie <u>Singles</u> bred even more flannel mall rats. To those not aware of the movie's longterm development by Cameron Crowe, it smacked of exploitation, but at the end of the day, it's an amusing film that deserves to be applauded for its unassuming demeanor. Pearl Jam and Soundgarden freshened classic rock affiliations with their own grind and wail, and touched a nerve with a generation who wanted their own version of "A Horse With No Name" or "Whole Lotta Love." With many acts, and the Northwest, subject to backlash in the wake of enormous popularity, only time will tell whether the Melvins, Tad, Fluid, Best Kissers In The World and Hammerbox will be judged on their musical merits or for what commercial pot of gold supposedly they're capable of stumbling upon.



And as far as the compilation fever hits, the summer was a hot season for soundtracks. Of the three in the Top 100, both "Until The End Of The World" and "Cool World" were top rate records, even if the critical quality of their films was somewhat less than Oscar caliber. "Singles" is still rolling (courtesy Smashing Pumpkins), one reason for its placement is due to its release way prior to the film's (which

due to the wisdom of film marketers, was delayed several months). Other soundtracks included the Tom Waits-penned "Night On Earth," "Buffy The Vampire Slayer," "Batman Returns," "Malcolm X" and "Gas Food Lodging."

Annie Lennox hit paydirt with her tremendously successful solo debut. "<u>Diva</u>" showed her luxuriating in the cool blue soul that drove the Eurythmics, and the audience quickly keyed into her basic approach. Along with the excellent album itself, the label kept the it from doing the all-too-familiar up and down chart bounce with a slew of extras, specifically the "<u>Unplugged</u>" EP,



which kept her profile high, and folks tuned into the radio and stepping into stores. With Sugar getting their due, it helps us believe that talent and savvy begets recognition. For a record that came out in the third quarter, "<u>Copper</u> <u>Blue</u>" finished quite high (#22) on the year end tally. It would be easy and incorrect to say that its strong showing was due only to Bob's deified status in the community. Yes, you love Bob.

the community. Yes, you love Bob, and we do, too, but this is an excellent album track by track. Ryko has played a strong hand well, releasing extra tracks (aka b-sides) available and packaging a retrospective double CD and promptly got a tour underway. Bob is handling many duties himself, such as managing the band, having learned that a musician can't sit back and wait for the label to take the initiative (kind of like



any relationship). **Teenage Fanclub** used to year to build a solid foundation with "<u>Bandwagonesque</u>." Amazing press and rabid cult fandom is bound to make their next album an event. The same wondrous things have been happening to all around keen guy Matthew Sweet. The album that he put together when he was without a record deal, "<u>Girlfriend</u>," has been a steady source of excellent and timeless pop

throughout the year. Zoo's consistent hard work, MTV support and nonstop touring resulted in near gold sales. Now that Matthew has earned some R&R, take the time to relax with either the promo-only "<u>Good Friend</u>" album or his last album, "<u>Earth</u>," for songs like "Vertigo" or "When I Feel Again."

Tori Amos is hardly remembered for her "Y Tori Kant Read"



album of a few years ago, but rather for her solo debut "Little Earthquakes." Kate Bush-isms abound when discussing her openly sensual (mandatory reference to the back cover art), but broadly appealing songs like "Silent All These Years" and "Me And A Gun." This album came out of nowhere, a dark horse entry, if you would. But, as you can tell from the abounding of EPs and non-LP type material, folks have

been learning that in order to keep your core audience, use something new and special to entice them. Soon to be trivia Q: What do she and "Weird" Al Yankovic have in common? A: They both cover Nirvana. L7 have more in common with Nir-



vana than Tori or Al, and the arbitrary sequence of the chart, not any sort of gender ghetto, that puts L7 and Tori in the same paragraph. "Bricks Are Heavy" tore through flimsy umbrellas, raining on skulls. Like the Runaways of long ago, L7 prefer to be identified as just musicians, and not automatic spokespersons for the feminist movement. Tracks like "Wargasm," "Pretend We're Dead" and "Mr. In-

tegrity" spit out fury like a pissed off hockey goalie spits out teeth in the heat of battle. Some of these songs scared away commercial play (a stone was in my shoe, the sun was in my eyes...), but college was there from the start, as they should have been with another terrific band on Slash, **Failure**. If "<u>Comfort</u>" is stashed away, find it and play "Something" or "Macaque."

Catherine Wheel may have a feminine first name, but these Scots are all lads. The My Bloody Valentine-geared "Ferment"



draped honey-sweet melodies with the heavy sap of guitar feedback. Its heavy throttle and dreamy expression made them an instant college fave, and with a club tour under their belts, the chocks has been pulled out from under this Wheel. Sarah McLachlan's "Feel" album of last year helped establish her here and in her native Canada, and unfortunately "Solace" seems to have been forgot-

ten by many of you already. Arista has sent out a Nettwerk limited edition EP of songs (many of which were originally on "Solace") recorded in this fall at the Harbourfront in Toronto. And speaking of live, the Pennsylvania quartet of the same name



was one of a handful of debuts to really make an impression on both radio and retail. Their first EP release (on Radioactive) led the way with "Operation Spirit" which got on MTV and consequently became a big hit. The band then hightailed into the studio in order to have an album to their credit, which gave us "Pain On The Riverside" and "Mental Jewelry." The band opened the road with Public Image

Limited and Big Audio Dynamite II on the MTV bill.

Although I'm not one of those people who goes bonkers with joy at Christmastime, an obsession to acquire strange and wonderful Holiday recordings has long been an admitted guilty pleasure. Maybe this is due to the fact that while growing up, Christmas was always the time to receive all those albums the paper route money failed to provide, not to mention offer a hilarious mental picture of Uncle Harold going to the record department at Korvettes, having to ask for something like Pink Floyd "Um-magumma" or "Atom Heart Mother." Hey, I'm dating myself... I must mean "Kiss Alive" and "Wings Over America" – ah youth! Actually, Christmas songs, no matter how hokey or con-trived, are always a source of common ground in terms of family, which is (or should be) the true meaning of joy the holiday spawns. Despite ethnic background, economics, age and taste in music, we can visit with loved ones and derive as much spirit from Nat King Cole as we can John Lennon, X.T.C. or Karen Mantler. Mantler.

Mantler. Back in the days when we still held our magazine together with a staple in the corner, I revealed this somewhat disturbing personal penchant for Xmas music through an article on Holiday tunes called "Spike's Stocking Stuffers." Since that diatribe dealt primarily with vinyl (especially 7" singles), this time let's explore what is currently available for you to program using the now standard CD source. This is in no way intended as a complete guide, but merely a listing of what I've personally found, so feel free to write or FAX your own adden-dums for next time.

Starting with the new ar-rivals of 1992, we must in-stantly break the digital only format to alert you to a green vinyl 7" from Luna. The B-side to their promo for "Time" contains a lovely instrumental called "Egg Nog," and a Merry Christmas greeting on the label from the band. This was serviced by Elektra, but if you missed it, the catalog number (I'll try to provide this for all items covered here) is ST-E-64679A. Now for the CD offerings. Alter-native stations should all find room for "You're A Mean One Mr. Grinch" rom New Jersey's Whirling Dervishes. This is just one of 4 songs with a Winter theme found on their recently released (and reviewed here) "Wish It Would Snow" EP on WM Records. A great rendition of the Dr. Seuss classic that has been a staple of the band's live show for about four years, it is just more proof they remain one of the country's best unsigned units. Another must play comes from the mysterious Pigs On Corn. The group is apparently a front for a well placed industry attack hamster (as Red would say, "We know who you are"), who does this for fun and education. Billed as LuAnn Olson & Pigs On Corn, the CD single of "Come On Home" (an excellent Every-thing But The Girl cover) and "Christmas Love" should have arrived at your station by now. LuAnn and husband Randell Kirsch used to be in the band Show Of Hands (on I.R.S. – hint hint, but it's not Barry Lyons), and they are the vocal point of this juscious new offering that will make any fan of Tracy Thorne and Ben Watt glow. As a special gift to our readers, the unidentified "brains" of the project promises to overnight deliver, free of charge, a copy to any of you who FAX the elf-infested (don't ask) Holiday bunker of Pigs On Corn at 310-457-6388. The pickings are a bit on the slim side this year in regard to quantity, but all will want to expose Enya's beautiful, traditional reading of "Oiche Chium" ("Silent Night")

A lesser known item equally worthy comes from Michael Mazzarella, who self-financed, composed, produced and performed a pair of beautiful tracks under the name The Rooks. "Christmas (Xmas)" and "Steeplechase" are both Lennon-esque excursions into a Winter wonderland of harmonic pop bliss. Again, this is a non-profit project, but a copy can be yours by calling Michael Nunziata at Allied Artists 212-865-0773. Those in search of a more specialized spiritual slant, will be

Nunziata at Allied Artists 212-865-0773. Those in search of a more specialized spiritual slant, will be satiated with Alligator Records' "Christmas Collection" (XMAS 9201), which boasts label hallmarks like Koko Taylor, Kenny Neal, Son Seals, Lonnie Brooks, Tinsley Ellis, Charles Brown, Charlie Musslewhite, Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown, Saffire, Katie Webster, Elvin Bishop and others painting a bluesy hue on the old yule log. Ryko takes us south of the border with "Mas! A Caribbean Christmas Party" (RCD 10150), collecting a bevy of ultra rare blue beat rasta jingle bell treasures. Lord Nelson's 1960 "A Party For Santa Claus" is just the first of a

series of highlights contained in the set, assembled by B. George from the collection at the ARChive of Contemporary Music. Lively up your tree and dance. And if a more American warm weather picture is in order, you'll find Saint Nick hanging ten in search of the ultimate tube on "A Malibu Kind Of Christmas" from The Malibooz (ILOKI Records ILCD 1015). This is the band Walter Egan (remember "Fundamental Roll"?) never left, and they've recorded a batch of surfin' Santa ditties even landlubbers will love, with a subtitle of "Malabooz Yule." Even Dean Torrence lends a hand, and it's instantly apparent this is a labor of love.

labor of love. Rhino has long been a leader in special compilations at Christmas, and this year they deliver "Doo Wop Christmas" (R2 71057), featuring many rare renditions of cheer from the street corner harmony era, including The Penguins, The Five Keys, Frankie Lymon, The Orioles and The Moonglows, to name a few. In addition, Rhino has assembled "Alligator Stomp, Vol 4 — Cajun Christmas" (R2 71058), a gumbo-fueled groove of silver bells, bayou style. The New Orleans climate may preclude a white Christmas, but the festive gris-gris of the region is perfect for a hair down holiday blow-out. Michael Doucet, Beausoleil, Johnny Allen, Belton Richard and Cajun Gold are the main ingredients of this sizzling seasonal sonic stew, providing more than enough heat to allow even the coldest climate to leave a log off their fire.

On the re-issue front, Razor & Tie Music have unearthed the sought after set, "A Partridge Family Christmas Card" (RE 2006). Out of print for some 15 years, the label has restored the glory of Keith, Laurie and gang with a fresh digital transfer, complete with new liner notes from Danny Bonaduce. Jeez, Danny Bonaduce. Jeez, it almost makes you long for an artificial silver tree

A annost makes you long for an artificial silver tree and a pair of color wheels, don't it? Actually David Cassidy and real life step mom Shirley Jones were the only cast members who con-tributed vocals, but we all believed, right? This (now) campy classic demands exposure, at least spread the word that it's back on the shelves. While we're in this mode, be aware that Restless Records has rescued Bobby Sherman's "Christmas Album" (#7 72721-2) from the dusty pile of past teen idols, and reduced it to the necessary 0-1 code of lazer land – Run for your lives!

lazer land – Run for your lives! Completing the current crop of special seasonings, more con-ventional outlets should embrace Johnny Winters' remake of "Please Come Home For Christmas." Found on his latest Pointblank/Charisma release "Hey, Where's Your Brother" (#86512 2), this Charles Brown classic gets yet another update. "A Very Special Christmas 2" (A&M/31454 00003 2) is already getting heavy exposure through Bon Jovi's version of the very same timeless track, but how anyone could pass up the unlikely duo of Frank Sinatra and Cyndi Lauper (with "Santa Claus Is Coming To Town") is beyond comprehension. The more mainstream should also explore offerings from the set by Sinead O'Connor, Run DMC, Extreme, Tom Petty, Ann and Nancy Wilson and Bonnie Raitt – who combines with Charles Brown himself on a blistering "Merry Christmas Baby." Now let's move on to a list of stuff you all should have somewhere

Now let's move on to a list of stuff you all should have somewhere in the recesses of the station library. These are discs that have arrived over the last few years, many of which are currently unavailable, many more hiding in a corner long forgotten. Last year Doctor Dream Records pressed up a limited edition of their "The White Christmas Album" (DD 9158), featuring Walking Wounded, the astounding Tiny Lights, Boingo spinoff Food For Feet, Swamp Zombies, Don't Mean Maybe and others. The version of "Little Drummer Boy" by Joyride that opens the set is reason enough to crawl through the cobwebs and locate the copy you must have received. I.R.S. Records (largely thanks to recently departed Dr. Barry Lyons) has also been a serious source of rare Holiday tunes, best represented with a pair of promo discs called "Just In Time For Christmas." The first of these appeared in 1987 (IRSD-XMAS), a simple paper sleeve containing 7 tracks from Timbuk 3, Jules Shear's Reckless Sleepers, the grossly overlooked Tirez Tirez, godlike pop genius of The dB's, Wall Of Voodoo, The Balancing Act and early techno of Torch Song. In 1990 a commercial version surfaced (X2 13052) with the same graphics (and a jewel box) that replaced some of the tracks, but added rare goodies like "Christmas Day" from Squeeze (the original white vinyl 7" is Now let's move on to a list of stuff you all should have somewhere

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fetching mega bucks today) and Klark Kent's (Stewart Copeland) "Yo Ho Ho."

fetching mega bucks today) and Klark Kent's (Stewart Copeland) "Yo Ho Ho." Just a year ago, Jeff Murphy assembled his Shoes brethren and a batch of friends, locked most into his Short Order Recorder in Zion, and emerged with a brilliant collection of holiday tracks bearing the name "Yuletunes" (BV12591-2). Innocent pop emotion from the always intelligent gift bag of people like Don Dixon and Marti Jones, Matthew Sweet, The Cavedogs, Bill Lloyd, Spooner (Fire Town and Butch Vig), The Spongetones (God, I love them) and Material Issue. It will be years before anyone comes close to topping this collection of primarily original holiday songs. Beg, borrow or steal a copy for air exposure. A rare item that may now be a chore to locate is "Christmas Cuts" from The BoDeans. Dating back to 1989 (Slash/Reprise PRO-CD-3863), it's a two track single recorded live at The Riviera in Chicago on 9/18/89. The pair of tunes included are "Jinga Bells" (sp) and "Christmas Time." If beg-ging on the phone for this one leaves you frustrated, get switched to the Warner side and start whining for "Winter Warnerland," which might be the best compendium of odd and unique Santa modulation issued within the last decade. Yet another promo only affair, this set was originally a double vinyl package (one red, the other green), but a CD also exists (PRO-CD-3328). Including a selection of ID and drop-in blurbs that range from Pee Wee Herman, Travelling Wilburys, Lou Reed and Ofra Haza, it also boasts hard to get Christmas tracks from the likes of Throwing Muses, Los Lobos, Hugo Largo, Daniel Lanois and many others. Certainly worth a search, or a solid kick some-where if you remember discarding it in haste. Another overlooked item is the 1989 "Christmas Medley" CD single (promo) from Shinehead (Elektra PR 8130-2), a fine roots



A year earlier Dreams So Real marked their major label baptism with an Arista digital promo release for their Beatle-esque "Red Lights" (ASCD-9784), while the more eclectic or receptive should embrace last year's offerings from Dillon Fence ("Christmas"/Mammoth MS-0031) and Karen Mantler's sar-donic "I Love Christmas" (XTRAWATT/PLG FLU-2). The latter is a personal favorite, comprising legit jazz chops and an attitude only the final customer at a Christmas Eve register inherits. Don't ask where you'll be able to pick up "Rockin" Your Stockin"" (Overdub Inc. ST-22-4-88) because I can't help you. But if you somehow possess a copy of this 1989 CD of mostly Jersey bands, obviously in the midst of a total sonic psychotic freakout, by all means bring it into the on-air studio immediately. Local legends, Arthur Kill and the Pollutants tear stained choral collostomy bag rasps forth with "My Christmas Tree's Got Balls," a Dolls-ish slide down the chimney that alone makes the entire set a definite must have. entire set a definite must have.

entire set a definite must have. Since space is becoming short, a list of other Seasonal treats seems the proper way to close, so keep those pads and pencils ready, okay? New Englanders will need to hear "The Dark Side Of The Christmas Tree," a compilation featuring members of the legendary Mission Of Burma, Birdsongs Of The Mesozoic, The Space Negroes and others. Released in 1990 on Performance Records (PERF 393CD), a simple call to (908) 545-3004 should fill your gap. The vastly overlooked pop rant boy Paleface also offered a promo only Holiday ode with the bonus track from his "World Full Of Cops" promo CD single on Polydor last year (CDP 602). Produced by Kramer, "Paleface's Jingle Jangle #1 Christmas Single" will make everyone feel the proverbial festive love. love.

love. More universal appeal is contained in selections like "Silent Night," an import CD single from Sinead O'Connor that was scrviced to all last year (Ensign ENYCD 652), De La Soul's "Millie Pulled A Pistol On Santa" (Tommy Boy TBCD 500), also from a year ago. We all know about the first "A Very Special Christmas" (A&M CD 3911/DX 2159), and with U2 bigger than ever, nary a nod to their rendition of "Christmas (Baby Please Come Home)" would be a glaring oversight, much the same as not utilizing a few selections from Rhino's brilliant "Dr. Demen-to Presents The Greatest Christmas Novelty Hits Of All Time" (R2 75755). Evan Johns And His H-Bombs spit out their brand of rock-a-hula Holiday cheer in a 1990 release called "Please Mr. Santa Claus" (Rykodisc RCD 30169), and come to think of it, nobody has heard from them since. "Christmas Party With Eddie G." (Strikin' It Rich/Columbia CK 46919) Another 1990 offering, this is truly essential. The brainchild of Eddie Gorodetsky, a comedy writer with a huge collection of Christmas records. His home made Holiday tapes were legendary for years, blending style genre and humor. Ex-actly the menu here. Billy West adds voices for Larry Fine and Stooges comedy bits, and the selections are ultra rare. Find this, you'll be glad you did you'll be glad you did.

The Yobs, "Xmas II" (Receiver U.K. RRCD 153) A 1991 follow-up to their 1980 effort of raunchy, rowdy yuletide ditties, chances are most will not be able to air either of the sets. But everyone should own them. The first album is also available on CD (Great Expectations U.K. PIPCD 006), and for those who don't know this is actually The Boys. Some tracks are okay to play, but please audition carefully if you dare to try.

Well that's about all time will allow. Again, this is not meant to be a complete accounting, just a nudge in the right direction. Happy hunting and even happier holidays.

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The **Overlooked** Favorites

We all have our personal musical highlights of the past year, and 'tis the season when an attempt is made to convene such things



in a sort of Top 10 form. It's not an easy task, given the staggering amount of music we all sift through over the course of twelve full months. In my opinion the biggest oversight of the year is unquestionably Flop. Their album "Flop & The Fall Of The Mopsqueezer" on Frontier Records is right at the top of my personal Top 5, along with "JehovahKill" from Julian Cope, the Television release, Mega City Four's brilliant "Sebastopol Rd."

and P.J. Harvey's "Dry" debut. Looking over a list of things that failed to crack the year end tally, honorable mentions must go out to Died Pretty for "Doughboy Hollow," Something Happens' "Bedlam A Go-Go," and from those that did make it, Peter Case, Wire Train, Buffalo Tom and Miracle Legion stand out as underexposed.

Checking around the dial, we discovered that Jeanne Atwood from WDST really enjoyed the U2, Ian MacCulloch and Peter Gabriel, but felt, "The John Trudell album was a beautifully spiritual record that was ignored." Jeanne also reports, "The Matthew Sweet is easily in my personal and professional Top 5 — we went 5 or 6 cuts deep on it! The same thing happened with Matthew here that occurred with Bonnie Raitt a few years back. Yothu Yindi, The Charlatans and Cracker were more records that worked for us. It was good to see Toad The Wet Sprocket finally come through and another station winner was Jeffrey Gaines. 'The City Sleeps' from MC 900 Ft. Jesus was very effective, although we did pull it off the air during the riots." As for musical predictions, Jeanne thinks, "The Thomas Dolby record will be with us for most of 1993."

Trying to harness WEQX's Kerry Grey long enough to get a complete sentence out of him is nearly impossible. So we just let him rant on about the highs and lows of 1992. "I rediscovered a lot of old funk, Funkadelic and George Clinton, Sly & The Family Stone. It seems every time a trend is rejuvenated people need to hear the root. What I hated — too many times Alternative stations were promoted with a xerox mentality. Just because it sells why should we play it? Where we were supposed to set trends, now they want us to follow them. Make up your minds. After all, how much further can we make the fine line between Alternative and Metal. It's a real identity crisis. Musically, Disposable Heros' 'Television' and 'Taillights Fade' from Buffalo Tom were two of my favorites. Currently I'm loving Rage Against The Machine for their raw energy. Other high marks go to Afghan Wigs, The Moodswings and Screaming Trees. On the station side of things, it's definitely been a year for The Spin Doctors and Matthew Sweet, now Soul Asylum and The Jayhawks, which more people should be playing."

Old friend Jerry Rubino, who does double duty at WFDU and Radioactive Records, can always be counted on to provide a detailed list. As usual he was ready. "Of the 1,816 songs that we've placed in rotation since 1992 began, getting a definitive personal fave list is rather hard to do. I'll keep my list to five albums and five singles, in no particular order. In the albums department: Pavement 'Slanted And Enchanted,' Vertigo 'Ventriloquist,' Luna 'Lunapark,' Treepeople 'Something Vicious For Tomorrow' and Polvo 'Cor-Crane Secret.' As for singles: 'Sunshine Smile' by Adorable, 'My Forgotten Favorite' from Velocity Girl, 'Conjure Me' by Afghan Whigs, 'The World Is Turning On' by The Pooh Sticks' and 'World Turned Upside Down' by 2 Lost Sons." For even more Rubino reflections, check the comments section of the magazine.

Bob Waugh, MD at WHFS, cites P.J. Harvey's "Dry" as his personal musical highlight of the year. "It's my most listened to record, most likely because I was a huge Patti Smith fan, but also because it's a great record with attitude plus. Others that moved me include The Walkabouts EP with 'Train To Mercy,' Tom Waits' 'Bone Machine' and the U2 record, which just may be their best ever. Sugar delivered, Bob Mould really proved something with 'Copper Blue' and the Television album was a pleasant surprise, simply because I was expecting the worst. Of the ones that got away, my choice for most overlooked would be the Me Phi Me record. It was a great effort that combined a host of diverse styles, perhaps that's what scared programers away. The track 'Think About It' featuring Michael Franks (of all people) is a powerful message that most unfortunately missed."

Moving over to the Motor City's WDET, Ann Delisi compiled an eclectic recap. "Paul Weller's solo effort will be with me for years, all the changes he went through. That as well as his 'Well Covered' EP top my list. Others include Angelique Kidjo 'Logozo,' a world music release on Mango. She managed to pull together African pop music in a very stylistic way. It lends itself to people that are uncomfortable listening to music in another language or those not disposed to world music. Alejandro Escovedo's solo album 'Gravity' on Watermelon Records and Ana Christenson's Relativity release are also up there. Thumbs up to Lyle Lovitt for his personality, songs and broad appeal—everyone from 12 to 90! Suzanne Vega, thanks for taking a chance and proving it can pay off. Los Lobos, I hope the recognition finally comes your way. Ronnie Jordon's 'The Antidote,' fused rap and urban with legit jazz chops, not an easy task, but Ronnie sure proved it can be done. Charles Brown is always a favorite and Tori Amos —gutsy and honest. On the re-issue front, the Aretha boxset and both King Crimson sets."

Before we get to Beth's pick for overlooked status, let's turn things over to Paul V. from Warner Brothers for his 1992 perspective. "Looking back on some of the music that reached out and touched me this year, I'd have to say that my favorites seem to have one thing in common: ambience. Not just in the definitive sense (music to do nothing to), but the records that have that mind-moving, soul-stirring gift. I would have to say the R.E.M.'s 'Automatic For The People' is the quintessential goosebump record of your life. One listen to 'Star Me Kitten,' 'Everybody Hurts,' Find The River' or 'Nightswimming' could melt an iceberg. I found this record to be comforting, wistful, and challenging at the same time. This album will sound even more like a masterpiece as years pass. I am blessed to be able to work with this great band. Other artists that got under my skin this year include Moodswings (what true, progressive moodmusic should sound like), Final Cut (sadly overlooked; could have been the next NIN-ish breakthrough), Neneh Cherry (gifted with the ability to be sexy, classy, politically correct, and delightful all in one), Baby Ford (another overlooked album that bridged rave and mood with an alternative attitude), and Meat Beat Manifesto (my favorite new record). 'Satyricon' is their perfect album. They still have that biting edge, and some of the samples and sounds are a real mind-fuck, but this record really has some great melodic moments. Listen to 'Circles' and tell me that's not a hit single. It will move you. Make sure you let Leshay knows he owes me a cheeseburger. Let's look forward to a great holiday season, a new year, new president, new ideals and more new rock, especially that with new vision. Brace yourself for the genius of the new Dinosaur Jr. Here's a toast to hoping that what the street is dictating will keep making its mark on the airwaves. Goodbye to the hatred; hello to tolerance."

While the intentions of columns like these are good, in some ways it reads like a post mortem. You're outside the circle, as if the story is over. While folks are conditioned to toss anything into the recurrent bin that's been out for more than two weeks, it's important to remember that bands can build over a period of months or years! One such outfit that's stumping for a better tomorrow is Walt Mink. Seeing them on a leg of the Soul Asylum/Lemonheads tour and some



Asylum/Lemonheads tour and some other asundry dates reaffirmed in our belief that they are supreme. That is, they are energy, finesse and enthusiasm in equal parts. Couch potatoes will perhaps have heard the opening measures of "Miss Happiness" on those TDK commercials ("the tape rock sticks best to" or something like that), a maddening snippet at that. Even though they've spent the second half of the year touring behind

"<u>Miss Happiness</u>," they've already demoed one song called "*Fragile*," and will be getting ready to record the next record in late January, to be released in midyear. As another fan and knowledgeable friend once observed, "power pop trio, what more needs to be said?" If it could be only as simple as that.

Rebel Writer: Gillian Gaar Talks With Beth Beth Renaud

It had taken a couple of tries to finally get this interview underway. A badly timed case of strep throat during CMJ postponed our first session, and a pre-election rally turned out to be a post election sigh of relief with Gillian (pronounced Julian) G. Gaar. A.k.a. Johnny Renton in one written incarnation, Gaar is a senior editor at Seattle's Rocket, a longstanding local music magazine, and also contributes to national publications such as Goldmine and Option. Her first book, She's A Rebel (Seal Press), is a comprehensive history of women in the rock music industry, not only as musicians, but also as heads of record labels, engineers, DJs, technicians, publishers and writers. Featuring a preface from Yoko Ono, the book chronicles the development of the rock n' roll genre from Willie Mae Thornton and Ruth Brown all the way up to the shenanigans of Madonna and Sinead O'Connor and everybody in between.

She's A Rebel goes beyond the "girl groups" to "foxcore" buzzwords, telling a rich and varied story in and around those stereotypes. Ranging from the girl groups to r&b to gospel to folk music to punk, the stories' only common denominator is their characters' gender. And in talking about women, it is impossible to omit sexism. Gaar clearly shows that throughout the years women have always been subject to second class treatment; their contributions trivialized, ignored or credited to other colleagues. And even if they accomplished anything at all, they were still seen as a novelty, or worse, a commercial trend. In other words: "women first, rock performers second." Overt sexism may not exist in its old form, but it is still there. Just because singers were treated like interchangeable components in the `50s and `60s doesn't mean that it has stopped — women are still told that they don't matter in many other, just as demeaning ways.

In a time when the women's movement has undergone fresh attacks against its relevance towards women and all people, Gaar's lack of a political agenda within the context of the book is in itself an important point. She does not intend to follow in Susan Faludi or Camille Paglia's footsteps, but to have a more objective voice. A devout Beatles fan, Gaar admits jokingly, "That's one of the problems I have with Paglia, she's a Stones person." She fairly acknowledges progress, but even today, for the most part, women are likely to be distinguished for their sex rather than their musical merits.

This is Gaar's first book, the subject of which was not originally her idea, but one that was suggested to her by the publisher. "They had initially conceived a book of essays by different women that I would ultimately edit. But the more we worked on it the more we realized it would be easier to have one person write everything instead of edit selected essays." Extremely well researched, entertaining and unpreachy, the book covers the well known (Karen Carpenter and Helen Reddy) and the obscure (Deadly Nightshade and Holly Near). Requiring almost three years' work, it was a massive undertaking from a woman who still holds two jobs to make ends meet. If you ask, "And what did you learn, Gillian?," she'll answer eventually "perseverance." She admits that the hardest part, as with any research heavy book, it's crucial to know discipline enough as to when to stop. "There's a point when you just have to admit that you're not going to put out the perfect definitive thing and you have to put it together with what you have."

Within the chapters of <u>She's A Rebel</u>, what each story is about is repeated again and again. At some point, each artist has to come to grips with control of their livelihood and, ultimately, their lives. Kate Bush is one artist who takes the reins of her career. After being discovered by David Gilmour and releasing a successful debut, "<u>Kick Inside</u>," she formed her own publishing and management companies and built her own studio — her commercial success forcing her label, EMI, to accept her on her own terms.

Unfortunately, the same financial status that permits independence puts Kate Bush in the minority. Women, especially, those who work within the business end of the industry have found themselves up against tougher, more entrenched hierarchies with less room to maneuver. While women have made substantial gains, many fields are still dominated by men, such as production, law, A&R, technical/stage work and label executives. Over the years, many more found the obstacles to autonomy, financial and otherwise, much too great and abandoned music. Yet women still fight the odds, taking the music industry on, sneering in its face, oh yeah? In the same vein as X Ray Spex and the Slits, ensembles like L7, Babes In Toyland, Hole, Bikini Kill and Dickless are all wonderful examples of sisters doin' it for themselves as the Annie Lennox and Aretha Franklin song proclaimed, but because of the bands' proximity in time, have unfortunately come to be rounded up in the same stereotyped "foxcore" phenomenon. Equality has come, slowly, but not without a price. As careers became the primary focus for an adult woman's energy, more and more discovered that that equality was illusory, whether you call it a glass ceiling or a biological clock. Even in the heyday of the relatively egalitarian punk explosion, "sexual 'equality'...seemed due to the denial, rather than a challenging of, sex roles."

Gaar's foregoing of politics within the book does not mean she ignores them entirely. She follows government officials and policy intensely, as a lengthy and intelligent discourse on everything from the Oregon Citizen Alliance. to the Equal Rights Amendment shows. We spent a good deal of time talking about recent elections, in particular the local Washington state elections, last year's abortion referendum (which guarantees right to an abortion even if Roe vs. Wade were overturned by the Supreme Court), presidential race and the "anti-gay" ballot Measure 9 on neighbor Oregon's ballot. A staunch supporter of Democratic Party candidates, she recalled the morning after, asking herself "am I dreaming?" She fumes at 12 years of Republican administration, blaming the Reagan/Bush era for contributing to unprecedented racial and economic tensions. But to balance that, she expresses relief at how people banded together against such right wing hostility, because "When people are involved in intimidation tactics like this,

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you have to clamp down right away no matter what the issues are. One defeat is not going to send them home now. They'll just move on to the next item on their hit list." Specifically, even though the Oregon measure has been defeated (by a small margin), Gaar says that the Oregon Citizen's Alliance, the sponsoring group, plans to change the measure's wording from "perverse" to "wrong behavior." Her irony meter picks up on that right away, and she remarks, "Bullying and intimidation is wrong behavior, maybe we should have some legislation about that." Some of her highest concerns are in regard to the inhumane treatment of other humans, and how we prioritize one kind of person over another. Her Rocket editorials allow her to voice her concerns. One recent column, included in a special "Women in Rock" edition of the Rocket, talks about feminism and the importance of equal access to political

ruled unconstitutional in October, Gaar postulates, "(Tipper) may not have been aware of the history of censorship in this country. The same things keep happening again and again." As a writer, Gaar says, "censorship has always been an interest of mine because it hits you where you live. It's what you could say perhaps or what you had access to that people might consider objectionable." And as recent years testify, it's not just what outside forces deem unfit for the public, but what happens internally, before the public sees it, that's where the real concern should be. Labels years ago decided to sticker their own albums, and now find it preferable to pressure on artists while still developing songs or artwork. Gee, why not just write music by committee? In the wake of the (continuing) Body Count "Copkiller" fiasco, one does not have to dig deep to document cases such as Paris and many others.

that means that you have to write off everyone else's life now." Unfortunately, there is not a mental reset button available for those over the age of 5. "That's why progress is so slow. You meet people who have a horrible bigoted attitude and it's echoed in their kids. If I could point it to a single root cause (of prejudice), I would say that a lot of divisions in this society on a lot of levels come from the fact that we perceive differences as a danger instead of as a sign of diversity. Of two people, black or white, you know that in this country anyway, a white person is more highly prized. So, it's not being merely different, but inherently better than the other. You could do that at any level — male, female, gay; straight, rich or poor. When confronted with two different things, it's insinuated that one of these must be better than the other. If we could just get away from doing that, I think it would probably solve a lot of problems."



power between the sexes. As she's commented before, "People think if you're pro-woman you must be anti-man."

Gaar also empathizes with, but does not villify, Second Lady-Elect Tipper Gore. "I have sympathy with a lot of her concerns... but I don't really agree where the PMRC is coming from. She's thinking not just about music but other things in popular culture. Movies, particularly, have so much violence and stupid, gratuitous sex. It's too much for kids, and actually, some adults, to see. The difference is that I wouldn't pass legislation saying that it couldn't be put out. They want to make it, fine, I don't have to see it." Opposed to the law that makes it illegal to sell "erotic" music to minors, which was passed this year and consequently

In an ideal world (it is the holiday season, right?), Gaar believes an all-encompassing equal rights amendment, "If we had those basic privileges in place, then people wouldn't have to spend so much energy on those fights and we could tackle other more important issues. One reason I don't like the banning of records or videos is because I don't think that really gets to the root of the problem. It doesn't change anybody's mind set. For example, let's say a heavy metal band puts out a video that's very degrading to women. Well, they'll make the next video not so blatant but it's probably not going to necessarily change the way they think. They may not think that anything's wrong, they know they have to present a little differently if they want commercial attention and they'll think to themselves, God, these prudes.' But to change a mind set starts at birth. I don't know if It may sound like Gaar has taken the role of crusader on her sturdy shoulders, but it's difficult not to get caught up when she waxes eloquent on humanitarian progress in the arts. Sometimes she's not even sure about what she can do. "I don't know if you can necessarily come to a conclusion about things. Like Madonna, is she good for women or is she bad for women?" But at no point does she attempt to draw a value judgement for you, like the best writers or artists, she's asking the reader to put some of their own mental energy into the equation. "Maybe the whole point is not to come to a conclusion but just that you got thinking about the issue. Just to wake people up to think a little more." In other words, not just sitting around, waiting for something to happen.

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Music Now!

Argentine President Carlos Menim has branded Guns N' Roses "outlaws" following an incident in which a father and daughter reportedly killed themselves in a dispute about her attending the group's concert. His comments came after news reports said a 16- year-old locked herself in a bathroom and shot herself after her father ordered her not to go to the concert. Her father then took his own life. Meanwhile, in Brazil, singer Axl Rose was charged with "endangering human live" because he threw a swivel chair off a mezzanine at the hotel where Guns N' Roses were staying in Sao Paulo before two concerts in the city. No one was injured when Rose threw the chair at a group of journalists, fans and guests in the hotel lobby, from a mezzanine 33 feet up. Journalists from several newspapers filed a complaint against Rose after the incident and then police formally charged him. Rose could be sentenced to a year in prison, if convicted.

Police in Chile searched Guns N' Roses' chartered plane after reports that drugs were found in clothes the musicians had sent out for cleaning at their hotel. The group was allowed to depart for Argentina after no drugs were found on the plane. At least 20 people were injured and 157 were arrested at the GNR concert in Santiago, Chile, which started two hours late.

U2 had a surprise for everyone when they played a concert in Dublin, Ireland, for a live broadcast on Britain's Channel 4. The band's first hometown concert in three years fell into chaos when U2 substituted a look-alike covers band called the **Doppelgangers** for themselves, without telling the program's producers. The copy band was flown in by U2 for the appearance at RTE's television studios, and they were dressed by U2's personal wardrobe designer. As they began a version of "Who's Gonna Ride Your Wild Horses," they were interrupted by a furious Irish television producer. Then, the real U2 emerged from the back row of the audience, apparently proud of their hometown sabotage.

John Cale says a boxed set spanning his 25 years in music is pending. He's also planning to tour in the spring, maybe with an electric string quartet.

Bruce Springsteen has a home video coming out this month of his appearance on the MTV "Unplugged" series. "Bruce Springsteen In Concert: MTV Plugged" includes a new song, "Red Headed Woman" and the first recorded performance of "Light Of Day." There are 18- songs on the 103-minute home video and laser disc versions will include an extra track, "Roll Of The Dice."

Jesus Jones release a new 12-song album in February, called "Perverse." Songs titles include "Zeros And Ones," "Get A Good Thing," "Your Crusade," "Right Decision" and "Spiral."

Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young's "Deja Vu" album has been certified by the Recording Industry Association of America for sales of 7 million albums. The "Crosby, Stills & Nash" album has been certified for sales of 4 million. Both albums were released 22 years ago.

Dirt magazine reports that Axl Rose can't stand movies starring Warren Beatty, who's a former lover of Rose's model friend Stephanie Seymour. "The Guns N' Roses management puts the word out before Rose arrives: If they want their TVs intact, they best be Warrened," the magazine says.

Canadian guitarist Lee Aaron has a compilation album just out (on Attic Records/Canada), called "Powerline," drawing from Aaron's music over the last ten years.

Egyptian pop singer Simone has been given a 15-year jail sentence for including obscene language and gestures in her performances, according to an Egyptian newspaper report. She was also found guilty of including a scantily-clad belly dancer in her group's routine. Simone is a pioneer of the current youth-music movement in Egypt. She was one of the first singers to shoot videos for songs, some of which are Arabic-language adaptations of well- known Western pop songs. It's the first time a female singer has received a jail sentence for obscenity in Egypt. A radio station in Ottawa, Canada, has banned the song "Run For Your Life" from the Beatles' "Rubber Soul" album, after getting four complaints from women the last time the song was played. "We received several phone calls from listeners who felt some of the lyrics in the song were offensive," says program director Mark Mahew of CFRA-AM radio, who notes there have been a number of recent instances of violence against women. Callers cited the line in the John Lennon's lyrics which says, "I'd rather see you dead, little girl, than to see you with another man." The complaints were referred to the radio station's community standards committee which recommended that the song no longer be played. "Our best judgement was, given the fact that the song was deemed to be perceived to be offensive by some folks, we felt we were within our rights to stop playing the song," Mahew says. "This shows that our work in bringing the issue of battered women out into the open is having an impact," says Sheighla Day, vice-president of the National Action Committee on the Status of Women. "Thirty years ago this was taken for granted...but the lyrics do not seem so benign today."

Robert Cray has fired guitarist Tim Kaihatsu from his band after six years. Kaihatsu says Cray fired him over the telephone after Kaihatsu had criticized the "I Was Warned" album in talking to a reporter. "It was nothing I really hadn't said to Cray," Kaihatsu says, explaining that he believes the new Cray album was little more than a "Strong Persuader IV." Cray says he got rid of the guitarist because "he had an attitude, a lot of negativity." And Cray says he's playing the guitar parts that Kaihatsu was playing and the band sounds great without him.

Tom Cochrane was in Somalia the day U.S. troops arrived to help feed people starving because of rival gangs. "It's like 'Mad Max' brought to the third world," Cochrane says. "They're gun crazy." Cochrane is in the east African country as part of efforts by the relief group World Vision. "We can't let them die," Cochrane says. "We gotta help these people."

Hot Tuna have a new all-acoustic album out, called "Live At Sweetwater," recorded last January in Mill Valley, California. Bob Weir of the Grateful Dead joins the band for a version of "Maggie's Farm" on the LP and Maria Muldaur sings backing vocals.

David Bowie has fallen victim to a massive fraud that has already cost him an estimated \$4 million in lost royalties. Bowie recently discovered that Mafia-style disc pirates are blatantly copying and selling his albums, netting Italian gangs around \$15 million per year. Gangs have been able to get away with the fraud because of Italy's lax copyright laws.

Boston band Contagious will release a seven-song EP (on Relativity Records) in March, called "Another Human Interest Story," with a full-length album due later in the year.

Asia recently played a sold-out tour of Japan where their current album, "Aqua," debuted on the album chart at number one with first-week sales of 60,000 copies.

The Scorpions will open a rally in Frankfurt, Germany, with an acoustic version of "Wind Of Change." The concert is intended to protest neo-Nazi violence in Germany. "Our involvement is crucial in communicating that we as Germans and citizens of the world will fight for human rights and freedom," says lead singer Klaus Meine.

The Farm have released a remixed version of their "Love See No Colour" from last year, in conjunction with the release of their new album with the same name. The CD-single includes the remix and album versions as well as a 1990 live BBC recording of "All Together Now" and "Anytown."

Pixies singer Black Francis will call himself Frank Black for his upcoming solo album coming out in March. The LP is being produced by Francis and Eric Feldman, a former keyboardist for Captain Beefheart. One of the 16 songs on the album is a cover, a version of the Beach Boys' "Hang On To Your Ego." Francis chose the different name to avoid being too closely associated with the Pixies.

Talking Heads are suing their British record label for over \$2 million, claiming they should have received an advance payment against their greatest hits album "Once In A Lifetime/Sand In The Vaseline." The group says their agreement with the label means they should get the advance because the compilation LP included two new tracks, but the label says the group no longer exists as an entity.

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Tone Loc brought together members of two rival Los Angeles gangs, the Crips and the Bloods, for the video of his "Funky Westwide." After shooting for the clip was completed, Loc gave a "Peace Picnic" for the gang members.

The Fall have left their British record label, blaming business procedures at the label. "The cost-cutters are taking over," lead singer Mark E. Smith told the British music paper Melody Maker. "Since we've been with Phonogram, we've given them three top 30 albums. Last week they asked us for demo tapes of the next album. We've never given demo tapes out and we never will. We're the Fall. We don't do that." The Fall have been working on a new album at New Order's studio, where the group recorded the "I AM Kurious, Oranj" LP. The new album is tentatively titled "The League Of Bald Headed Men" and the band hopes to have it out in April.

When the recent "Saturday Night Live" television program with Sinead O'Connor aired in Britain a few weeks after its U.S. airing, the scene where O'Connor tore up a photograph of the Pope was edited out.

Stone Gossard of Pearl Jam has finished work on his first solo album, which should come out in March. The LP is to be called "Shame."

Former Galaxie 500 drummer Damon Krukowski and Naomi Yang have released an album together, called "More Sad Hits" (on Shimmy Disc). The LP, produced by Kramer, is billed as Damon & Naomi.

Juliana Hatfield is releasing a new EP on Mammoth Records, called "I See You," that includes three new songs, as well as two tracks from her "Hey Babe" album.

808 State have done some remixes of UB40's hit from 1981, "One In Ten." 808 State are touring with Madness and the Farm in Britain this month.

The Orb and Primal Scream have played a benefit concert in Sheffield, England, for miners being laid off because the British government is closing many coal mines.

The U.S. Supreme Court has refused to reinstate a judge's decision finding a 2 Live Crew album obscene. Broward County Sheriff Nick Navarro had pursued an appeal of a ruling by U.S. District Judge Jose Gonzalez in June 1990 — which had overturned an appeals court decision banning the record. Now, Navarro may have to pay \$250,000 for 2 Live Crew's legal fees.

Oddsmakers favor the World Wrestling Federation Superstars for having the number one single at Christmas in Britain. Their "Slam Jam" is a 9-to-2 favorite, ahead of Freddie Mercury's "In My Defense" for which the odds at 5-to-1, according to Graham Sharpe, media relations manager for the William Hill betting shops. There are also odds on Whitney Houston, Madonna and Abba, but Sharpe says he's putting his own small wager on Cliff Richard.

A 26-year-old Indiana man has been sentenced to 18 years in prison for setting fire in 1990 to the offices of gospel singer Sandi Patti. No one was injured in the fire, but it caused \$650,000 in damage. Madison Circuit Judge Frederick Spencer sentenced Kelvin Fuller in the case, and also gave him a concurrent 18-year sentence for an unrelated robbery of a grocery store. Fuller is already serving a 36-year sentence for robbery, confinement and battery.

The bankruptcy of Factory Records in England with debts of 3.5 million pounds apparently frees New Order and the Happy Mondays from their British record contracts. Part of Factory's problems stemmed from the fact that neither band had a written contract with the label, which caused a pending deal with Factory's distributor (London Records) to fall through. The label had also spent a large sum on Happy Mondays' latest album, "Yes, Please," which fared poorly, and had also spent a lot of money on an unsuccessful new classical arm. While New Order had a new album almost ready to go, Factory didn't time to release the LP before receivers stepped in.

Another independent British record label is also suffering problems. Go! Discs, the home of the **Beautiful South**, **Billy Bragg** and **Madness**, has just announced a substantial number of layoffs. Garth Brooks won in seven categories at the 1992 Billboard Music Awards, while U2 won five awards. Brooks won for best Pop Artist, Country Artist, Hot Country Singles Artist, Billboard 200 Albums Artist, Country Albums Artist, and Billboard 200 Album and Country Album for "Ropin' The Wind." U2 won for best Album Rock Track ("Mysterious Ways"), Album Rock Tracks Artist, Modern Rock Tracks Artist, Moden Rock Track and Boxscore Tour. Boyz II Men won for Hot 100 Singles Artist, and won the awards for Hot 100 Single and Hot 100 Singles – Most Weeks at Number 1 for "End Of The Road." Jodeci won for R&B Album ("Forever My Lady"), Hot R&B Single ("Come & Talk To Me"), R&B Artist and R&B Albums Artist. Kris Kross won for New Pop Artist. Guns N' Roses won the award for Billboard 200 Albums Group Artist. Richard Marx was named the Hot Adult Contemporary Artist. Cypress Hill and their "The Phuncky Feel One" won for Hot Rap Singles Artist and Hot Rap Single, respectively. Winners were determined on sales and airplay figures compiled by Billboard magazine from December of last year to November of this year. Michael Jackson won the top Worldwide Album award for "Dangerous," the Worldwide Single award for Black And White," and was also given a special award for distinguished creative achievement.

A British rapper called JC-001 has been named the world's fastest rapper in the latest edition of the Guiness Book of World Records. His rap of 631 syllables per minute, beat the previous record of Daddy Freddy of 580. "It's a cross between the reggae style and hip-hop done a capella, not repeating any words," JC says of his own style. To qualify for the record, JC wasn't allowed to repeat any words in his rap. "I'm not allowed to," he says. "I gave 'em a script. They approved it. That's the whole point of speed-rapping."

A Miami weekly newspaper that caused a stir last year by printing a music critic's review of a fictional new Bruce Springsteen album — because the writer was tired of waiting for one — is in trouble again — this time for making up an interview with Michael Bolton. Greg Baker of New Times reviewed the non-existent Springsteen album last year. Now, he has to write a clarification about an interview his colleague, Todd Anthony, wrote. In the fictional interview, Bolton was quoted as saying, "I feel awful about butchering 'Dock Of The Bay' like that, but I really needed the money, and I figured, 'Otis is dead. He won't mind.' Then I did 'When A Man Loves A Woman,' and that sold like crazy, too. So I figured why not, you know, just butcher a whole album full of classic R&B? No need to waste time writing songs, just churn out the product and bank a few mill. That's how 'Timeless Classics' came about.'' The writer also quoted Bolton as saying he planned "to dedicate the rest of my singing career to cutting-edge, innovative music. I'm going to take risks and shoot for the moon creatively...I don't want to be remembered as the '90s version of Barry Manilow. Or Bread.'' Bolton's record company got New Times to print a clarification the following week indicating that the "conversation...was not real."

On the ABC-TV program "20/20," Mark David Chapman said he's sorry he killed John Lennon, and explained that he has now "exorcised" the demons that he says drove him to shoot Lennon in New York City. "Please understand, Yoko, I wasn't killing a real person. I killed an image. I killed an album cover. There's not enough pain in the world – and I caused a Titanic's worth overnight with some stupid thing," Chapman says in the television interview. "I took away a genius, took away somebody's husband, somebody's father...I don't expect them to forgive me. I'm not asking that. But I am sorry. And I mean that. I'm sorry. I am sorry." Chapman says he underwent an exorcism to eliminate the demons who possessed him when he killed Lennon. "This was real...and when these things came out of me I could feel them. I could feel them when they came out of my mouth. They were different personalities and they were different sounds and different languages."

Pink Floyd are ready to work on a new album and not rest on the laurels of the band's new boxed set, highlighting the band's 25- year career. "We're going to get on and do another record and do all the things we do. We spend most of our time looking at the future," Dave Gilmour of the band says. "This has been a little moment of looking through the past and examining it and finding out a lot that a lot really stands up and is something to be proud of."

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For the second year in a row, **Bruce Cockburn** will host a satellite-radio broadcast called "Christmas With Cockburn." The hour-long December 20 program will feature Lou Reed, Rosanne Cash and Rob Wasserman. Twenty-two Canadian radio stations carried the show last year, and over 100 broadcasters in North America have agreed to carry this year's show.

The Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland has launched a new Transatlantic Rock exhibit. It includes 100 pairs of autographed drumsticks used by people like **Ringo Starr** and **Mickey Hart**. There's also an original painting from **Peter Quaife** of the **Kinks** called "Groupies," a stage suit from **James Brown**, and the original "The **Who**" bass drumhead used by **Keith Moon**.

Sean Rowley, keyboardist and vocalist for Cause & Effect, has died of cardiac arrest from an asthma attack. The attack occurred just before the band was to have performed in Minneapolis.

The Hothouse Flowers should have their third album, produced by Stewart Levine, out in March.

A British magazine reports **Prince** is considering a semiautobiographical documentary called "My Name Is Prince" that would be similar to Madonna's "Truth Or Dare." Prince also plans a home video compilation that includes "My Name Is Prince," "Sexy MF" and other tracks.

Founding Asia bass player John Wetton is currently recording a solo album.

Van Morrison is choosing tracks for a compilation album, his second in as many years.

Ice-T is donating proceeds from his single, "Gotta Lot Of Love," to a youth group in south central Los Angeles. The track comes from his upcoming album, "Home Invasion," which comes out in February.

At the end of January, Overwhelming Colorfast begin to include "live studio" with copies of the band's self-titled album (on Relativity Records). The EP, called "Bender," was recorded in Los Angeles in October and includes covers of "You Keep Me Hangin' On" and Simon & Garfunkel's "For Emily."

Madonna has purchased a \$5 million nine-bedroom mansion in Hollywood Hills. The home, built in the 1920s, has six bathrooms and overlooks Hollywood.

Rock musicians aren't the only ones doing drugs. A study by David Sternback of the D.C. Institute for Mental Health has found that almost 30 percent of musicians in leading symphony and opera orchestras use beta-blockers while performing. They use the drugs against high blood pressure because of stage fright and a lack of artistic control.

Howie Epstein of Tom Petty's Heartbreakers is producing the new album from John Prine, which he'll start recording in February.

Guitarist Bob Spencer is leaving the Angels after they complete an Australian tour this month. He plans to concentrate on his new band, Temple Gods, said to have more of an Aerosmith and Free influence. The split is described as totally amicable, and the Angels plan to look for a replacement.

Prince has produced some of the songs on the second album from singer Louie Louie.

John Paul Jones of Led Zeppelin is producing the new album from the Butthole Surfers, which is due in January.

Long John Baldry, the guitarist who inspired Eric Clapton, is touring Britain right now in support of his current album "It Still Ain't Easy." It's been 22 years since Baldry released his "It Ain't Easy." LP. He'll also be putting on a jazz tour of Europe early next year. Baldry emigrated to Canada in the early 1980s. "For the last eight years I've been living in Vancouver, which I love and adore," he says. He's also been doing some commercial voice-overs.

Mariah Carey may tour in support of her third album, due out this spring.

Timmy T has agreed to share copyright on his 1990 hit, "One More Try," with Russell Hildreth, who filed a lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles over ownership of the song. Hildreth will be listed as a writer on future pressings of the record and he'll also receive an undisclosed financial settlement.

Ray Stevens has sold almost a million copies of "Ray Stevens' Comedy Video Classics" even though the home video has only been available since May and is being sold only by mail-order. And Stevens hopes that the home video, which includes clips for "The Streak," "Mississippi Squirrel Revival," "Everything Is Beautiful" and "It's Me Again, Margaret" that Stevens made well after the songs were originally hits. The compilation also includes four other clips. Stevens thinks his sales of almost a million are just the tip of the iceberg. "In the short history of telemarketing it has been proven that when you go to retail after you do your direct marketing on TV and in print, your retail sales are usually double the sales that you did by direct marketing," Stevens says. "Which means we could sell five million copies of this thing. Or at least three or four; it looks like there's a shoo-in."

"The **Bob Dylan** 30th Anniversary Celebration" that took place in October at Madison Square Garden in New York City will be broadcast on the Public Broadcasting Service on March 6 and 7. PBS also plans to air an Elton John concert taped in Barcelona, Spain, during the summer.

Paul McCartney has renewed his American recording contract clearing the way for release of a new album, "Off The Ground," and a compilation LP called "Hope Of Deliverance." The compilation album coming out in January will include one new song and three songs previously only available as b-sides. The new solo album will be out in February.

The Manhattan Transfer is donating proceeds from two concerts to a group that is challenging a new Colorado law banning discrimination claims by homosexuals. The group says Amendment 2 is a "discriminatory law against humanity." A group of Grateful Dead fans paid for a Denver billboard protesting the law. The Deadheads Against Discrimination paid for the billboard outside the venue of two Dead shows. It carries the message, "Ain't No Time To Hate - Undo 2."

Rick Springfield is back with a new album, "Rock Of Life," and will tour in support of the LP. "I've basically been home since 1986," Springfield says. "The whole time I was playing the recluse I missed making music." It's been ten years since Springfield had a hit with "Jessie's Girl."

Canadian singer Mae Moore worked on her new album with the Church's Steve Kilbey in Australia. "It was very much like a blind date," Moore says. "I was familiar with the Church's stuff from the 'Starfish' album, so I knew that I liked the music and I liked their direction." Moore says she wrote a lot of the LP based on her Australian experiences or while down there. "It was a brand new horizon for me – new vistas, new stimulation. I spent most of my time in Sydney, which is a real cosmopolitan city," Moore says. "Physically it affected me somehow." Kilbey co-produced the new LP with Moore. "I'd love to go to another country for the next album," Moore says.

John Mellencamp is playing a benefit concert in January for the family of his long-time keyboardist, John Cascella, who died of a heart attack last month. The concert will take place January 22 at the Murat Theatre in Indianapolis. Cascella left behind a wife, Kathy, and three children. He'd played in Mellencamp's band for ten years and died while the band was taking a break from recording a new album.

Frank Beard, drummer for ZZ Top, says he plans to begin racing a Porsche next year in the International Motor Sports Association's GTU Division. Beard recently completed a race-driving course at Road Atlanta in Braselton, Georgia. "ZZ Top has always gone handin-hand with cars, so this seemed the next logical – or maybe illogical – step," Beard says. Jeff Carlisi, guitarist for .38 Special, also completed the same course at Road Atlanta.

Crosby, Stills & Nash will perform at a private concert in Colorado to raise money for the Atlanta Project, an effort led by former President Jimmy Carter against poverty and crime among the poor in that city. Their concert is part of a fund-raising ski event January 20-24 at Crested Butte, Colorado. A \$2,500 donation to the Atlanta Project includes airfare, lodging, a reception and dinner with the Carters, ski clinics and races.

The Sleeze Beez release a new album next month, called "Powertool" (on Atlantic Records). The LP was produced by Gary Lyons, who has worked with Aerosmith, Foreigner, Queen, UFO and Humble Pie.

Living Colour release a new album in late February called "Stain." "The songs are fun," Vernon Reid says of the new LP. "I am trying to be less self-righteous. I've been on my soapbox too long."

Keith Sweat is forming his own record label, Keia Records, which will have offices in New York and Atlanta.

Webb Wilder has been added to the cast of the film "The Thing Called Love." He'll play the owner of a flophouse on Nashville's Music Row who helps struggling songwriters. Country singer Trisha Yearwood will play herself in the film and K.T. Oslin will play Bluebird Cafe owner Amy Kurland. Peter Bogdanovich is directing the film and Kevin Welch is writing songs for the soundtrack.

Scott Holt, lead guitarist in Buddy Guy's blues band, has begun playing some dates with his own band.

"12 Inches Of Snow" is the name of the debut album (on EastWest Records) coming out in January from S.N.O.W., a Toronto Jamaican ragamuffin rapper. Thirteen of the 14 cuts on the album was produced by rapper MC Shan.

Nashville band Valentine Saloon have their debut album just out (on Pipeline Records). The LP was produced by Jack Endino, who has worked with Nirvana and Mudhoney.

Canadian rapper Michie Mee has been sentenced to 15 months in jail for smuggling marijuana into Canada from Jamaica. Mee says the drugs were planted in her suitcase. "I've travelled the world. I've been on the road since I was 14," Mee says. "Why, in going to Jamaica, the so-called 'weed capital,' would I be coming back with a suitcase implanted with marijuana?" Mee is to begin serving her sentence on January 8. She had recently participated in an antidrug video called "Hold On." "I was in the wrong place at the wrong time and I've just got to make the best of it, for myself and my friends," Mee says.

Singer Alex Lee has left British band Naughty Naughty and plans to move to the U.S.

Former Poison guitarist C.C. DeVille has disclosed the line-up of his new band, Needle Park. The group includes former Hurricane singer Kelly Hansen, ex-Kingdom Come drummer James Kottak and former Warlock bass player Tommy Hendrickson.

Anthrax have begun recording a new album with producer Dave Jerden, who has worked with Jane's Addiction and Alice in Chains. This album is the sixth for the group and will be the first featuring new vocalist John Bush, formerly of Armored Saint.

Two former members of Armored Saint have formed a new band called Life After Death. Guitarist Phil Sandoval and drummer Gonzo have recruited singer Jack Emrick, ex-Warrior bass player Ray Burke and guitarist John Goodman for the group.

Guitarist Brian Baker and bass player Todd Muscat have formed a new band called Careless. Both were formerly in Junkyard, which broke up after being dropped by its record label (Geffen Records).

Redd Kross will begin recording a new album next month after having been picked up by a new independent record label (This Way Up). The band say they're considering asking Roy Wood, formerly of Wizzard, to produce the LP.

Jennifer Finch of L7 says the band has learned of a band that does nothing but play L7 songs. "There actually is an L7 tribute band in Chicago, called Corduroy," she says. "We saw an ad for it when they were trying to put the band together.' L7 reportedly have been banned from British television after guitarist Donita Sparks undressed during a performance on the Channel 4 program "The Word."

The National Academy of Songwriters has given a Lifetime Achievement award to Stevie Wonder, in honor of his contribution to popular music. Wonder's next album, "Conversation Piece," comes out this spring and will touch on the issues of homelessness, violence and the Los Angeles riots.

Ralph Reickermann has replaced Francis Buchholz on bass as the Scorpions begin pre-production for a new album. Reickermann is a classically-trained Hamburg musician who has worked on the scores to some European films. The new LP is tentatively entitled "Face The Heat," and should be out in the spring.

PM Dawn are recording a second album for release in February or March. The band also has a song on the soundtrack to the upcoming comedy film "CB4," which stars Chris Rock of "Saturday Night Live."

Oakland, California, rapper Paris has released his "Sleeping With The Enemy" album on his own (Scarface) record label. His major label declined to release the album and Paris says His major label declined to release the album and Paris says he used the "six figures" they used to pay off his contract to start his own record label. "That money put me into business," Paris says. "For the first time ever, I had the chance to put my money where my mouth is – and I took it." There were objections to a track called "Bush Killa," but Paris says the song doesn't support assassination. "Just because (Bill) Clinton's coming in doesn't mean things will change," he says. "I'm optimistic that things will get better and that I won't have to write 'Clinton Killa."

World Radio History

U2 have denied allegations of hypocrisy over the sponsorship of their Zoo TV special by Philips DCC. The band have spoken out against corporate sponsorship in the past, but U2 manager Paul McGuiness issued a statement saying, "We fully support the introduction of the ingenious new DCC music system...Much of the technology used in the Zoo TV stage production comes from Philips and I am delighted to have Philips DCC as the worldwide sponsor of the broadcast." A spokesperson for the band later added, "U2 have previously received sponsorship on a small scale: from Kodak film, for instance who were credited on the "Rattle And Hum" film. We feel that this is a separate issue from soft drinks manufacturers or clothing companies." Nevertheless, some have speculated U2 may have become involved in company politics as their record company, Island, is part of the Polygram group which is owned by Philips.

Pop Will Eat Itself have left the RCA label, despite 1992 being their most successful year to date. PWEI signed to RCA in 1988 and enjoyed three hit albums and seven hit singles with the label. However, some industry figures have suggested that RCA were looking for larger sales, particularly as the band's live following means they can sell out the 4,000 capacity London Brixton Academy. PWEI manager Craig Jennings denies this, saying, "When we signed with RCA, we were dealing with a completely different regime to the one now in place. The new people seem to have a problem with what we want to do next. We've got Adrian Sherwood in to produce the next album, which conflicts with the way they saw us going. I think they wanted us to become an out-and-out pop group." Some industry insiders have speculated that PWEI may be the first of a number of "indie-style" bands to be dropped by major labels because of the current economic climate. There is also speculation that the band may sign to a new label being set up by Korda Marshall, the former RCA A&R man who signed PWEI to the label. There are further rumors that The Wedding Present may also leave RCA in March when their current contract expires. Finally, PWEI's last single for RCA "Get The Girl, Kill The Badies" will be issued on January 2 and there are rumors a compilation and live album may follow.

Rob Collins, keyboard player with **The Charlatans UK**, was arrested on Thursday December 3 in connection with an armed robbery at a liquor store in Cannock, Stafforshire in the Midlands of England. Talking to *Melody Maker*, the band's manager Steve Harrison commented, "We don't know to what degree he was involved. An application for bail will hopefully be successful at the hearing later this week." A spokesman for The Charlatans UK added, "The rest of the group have expressed enormous surprise at the situation, as the very action is so out of character." Collins' arrest has forced the band to cancel two shows with **Ride** which were scheduled for the new year.

The German anti-fascist rapper J has been threatened by Nazis. J played London's Goldsmith's College last week despite threats from a group calling themselves the National Union Of Fascist Students. The group said they would firebomb the concert and assault J if he played the gig, but J refused to cancel. He was helped by Labor MP Greville Janner who asked police to provide additional security at the gig. J commented, "If we start giving in to the demands of these racist cowards, everything will end where it ended in Germany under Hitler. I knew the gig had to go on."

A report in the New Musical Express says New Order and Depeche Mode will tour the USA together next year. The paper quotes an "insider" as saying, "The band (New Order) have always been reluctant to do the rock n' roll thing, touring up and down the country, but they want 1993 to be their biggest year yet. They're determined to crack America on a major scale and going on the rad with Depeche Mode will be an ideal opportunity for them." New Order, who last played live at 1989's Reading Festival, are currently looking for a new deal following the collapse of Factory Records. They have completed work on their new album. Elsewhere, Factory's demise does not look as if it will damage the Manchester In The City seminar. The label was strongly associated with the seminar, but, last week, executive director Yvette Livsey confirmed that another seminar would take place between September 11 and 15, 1993. Hut Records have drooped Moose. Hut were forced into the action by their parent company Virgin. Virgin refused to release the band's "XYZ" album in the USA. Last week, Hut boss David Boyd commented, "I am frustrated because it's not what the label is about. Hut is about signing acts and supporting them over a long period of time, but it became increasingly impossible to work within the financial limitations of Hut. This was both because of the high advance payable on the second Moose album and the American record company not being able to see what the record ("XYZ") was all about. But, then, American record companies can't see their hands in front of their faces sometimes. There is no artistic lack of confidence in the band on my part and I am very proud to have the album on Hut. Both the band and myself are very pissed off that this had to happen, but we're still friends and I wish them all the best in the world." Moose will probably set up their own company to release a single early next year and are currently talking with American labels about the possibility of releasing "XYZ" in the USA.

The Orb and Primal Scream raised £36,000 for miners threatened with redundancy at their November 28 show at Sheffield Arena in the north of England. The money is being put into a trust fund which will be divided between 31 pits currently facing the threat of closure because of a reduction in the demand for coal. The two bands also issued a statement to thank people who helped put on the show at very short notice; Simply Red, for instance, suppled the PA and lights. There was also an apology from the bands after complaint about the strict security at the show. Elsewhere, The Rebel MC will headline a benefit show for miners at London's Town and Country Club on December 13. Proceeds will go the UK Miners' Support Group and South African Miners.

Sinead O'Connor is at the center of controversy (again) this week after offering to give away her California mansion to help in the effort to save starving Somalians. O'Connor phoned in her offer to the ITV network show *This Morning* on November 30 – the show was running a special on the Red Cross Somalia appeal – and it was reported by the delighted presenters of the show. However, doubt was then cast on how much of the 5-bedroom, \$500,000 mansion O'Connor actually owns. The national newspaper *The Daily Mail* ran a report which quoted estate agent Ken Winick, who has been trying to sell the home where O'Connor no longer lives, as saying the property is heavily mortgaged. Winick is also alleged to have said only £65,000 could be raised for charity after the mortgage is paid, that this would be taxable under US law and that the estate agents were "stunned" by O'Connor's decision. In a fax to O'Connor's manager Steve Forgnoli, Winick disclaimed the report in the *Mail*, saying he had never said any of these things. A second fax to Forgnoli from estate agency manager Diane Rudolph reads, "I can categorically state that there is, not at this time, nor was there ever during the ownership by Ms. O'Connor, a mortgage of any amount. Ms. O'Connor purchased the home with cash and it remains unencumbered by loans of any kind. I further wish to protest the statements by the press that this agency was "stunned" when the property was removed from the market. We have always enjoyed an open and considerate professional relationship with Ms. O'Connor and her representatives. We are thrilled that the proceeds of the sale of this beautiful home are to be so generously donated to such a worthy cause and commend Ms. O'Connor for making such a substantial gift to such an important project." It would appear that it has, as Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II might say, been one of those years for O'Connor.

The Lemonheads' Evan Dando has issued a statement after almost 500 fans were locked out of a lunchtime concert at London's famous Ronnie Scott's jazz club. The solo show by Dando took place at the 250-seater venue on November 27, but very few tickets were actually available to the general public as it was widely attended by music industry staff and journalists. With fans milling about, police had to be called and Dando had to make a dash for a waiting limousine after the show. As a result, the wisdom of advertising the gig has been questioned. Dando's statement said, "I had a real cool time in London and the Ronnie Scott's show was fun for me. It was a drag seeing everyone outside. I wanted to go out and busk on the street, but they told me they would call the police and I didn't want to get anyone in trouble. We will be back in April. Oh yeah, the limo, it was pretty weird." A spokesperson for The Lemonheads' label East/West conceded mistakes had been made, but said the company had not expected such a large turn-out at lunchtime.
