

'10,000 Drums' Lead Columbia Folk March



Better Quality Quick, Most **Urgent Need For Singles**

The crying need for instantly increasing the selectivity and quality of the singles product was pounded home anew last week when, out of a total of 215 singles received for review by the MUSIC RE-PORTER, only a bare handful were considered good enough for a "Scoop of the Week" rating and for recommending to the trade for buying and to the jocks for air play.

Even in this handful there were some that just made the grade and failed to show all of that commercial power and brilliance that has so often marked the big sellers of the past.

We have said before and say again that there is nothing wrong with the singles market that really good quality and business practices can't cure. It's up to the manufac-

turers, the A&R men and the songwriters. Quality sells 'em today and unlike bread and butter which everybody needs to live, the record buyer can easily transfer his choice of nutriment to another kind of entertainment.

Carl Smith's exciting chart climber "10,000 Drums" is symbolic of the leadership Columbia Records has exercised in helping establish on an apparently solid footing a new recording and listening trend.

The movement, of course, is toward songs based primarily on folk appeal—true folk appeal, not the manufactured variety-and which songs prove to be hits in all fields, popular as well as country and western

Columbia has had a line of such hits. The biggest was, and is, "The Battle of New Orleans" by Johnny Horton, which has such mass appeal that even with a change in lyrics that make the vanquished victors and vice versa, the disk still is going great guns in such countries as England and Canada.

Other Columbia folk hits which have appealed to the mass tastes of the record buying public are Stonewall Jackson's "Waterloo," Lefty Frizzell's "Long Black Veil" and Johnny Cash's latest comer, "I Got Stripes."

Carl Smith now has given the label another of the same caliber which promises to rival "New Or-leans" and "Waterloo" for sales prominence. His recording of "10,-000 Drums" has made a solid march through the charts and continues to get stronger each week. Although not yet at its peak, the disk is high in all the charts and







A belief seems to be growing that if you can't dish up top quality because of lack of top material or top performance, a second rate product must do — to keep the pressing plants busy and the organization together. The promotion man is often supposed to make up the difference in saleability by sending out hypos to charm the distributors and the jocks.

The old standards of value — top material, top performance — are as needful today as they ever were. It makes no difference in the size or age of the label. A top quality song put out by whatever label will outsell a thousand of the inferior type.

The rewards for songwriters with imagination and originality who reject all substandard stuff including "pot boilers," are as great as ever. The A&R mans responsibility in refusing to take something less than commercially excellent is as exacting as ever.

Top level management which encourages this "all or nothing" approach to perfectionism should find the policy most remunerative.


pushing higher.



HOW long does it take for a record to be a hit? To answer this question with a specific date is hardly feasible. Naturally, it depends on the content of the record itself. Yet there are manufacturers who believe that if they haven't sold at least 2000 copies of their current single after two weeks. they should release another and try again. This writer has actually heard label owners say, "Gee the record has been out for two weeks now and very little has happened. I guess I better release this new one." Of course, I'm not saying all companies give their records a two week tryout. Some labels wait a month, sometimes even two months before they concede defeat. The line has to be drawn somewhere just because some records have it and others do not. But certainly, two weeks doesn't give any release a fair chance. Concentration, naturally, is the keyword. It is easier to concentrate on one or two records than it is to work on three or four. If you (as a record owner) believe

you have a potential hit--work it. It seems that it is taking longer nowdays to get a hit record. For instance, if you would look at the national charts, you would see some records show that a lot of work has been done to place it where it is today. Tony Bellus' "Robbin' the Cradle" on the NRC label and Big Jay McNeely's "There Is Something On Your Mind" on Swingin', were both released in February - over five months ago. Old Town's record of "So Fine" by the Fiestas, Mercury's "Danny Boy" by Sil Austin, Phillips' "Mona Lisa' by Carl Mann and Unarts "You're So Fine by the Falcons, were March releases. Of a more "recent" vintage is Dinah Washington's "What A Difference A Day Makes" on Mercury, which debuted the first week in April. As anyone can see, in many instances, it doesn't pay to give up. Raynote Record's Tom Butler is happy that jazz pianist Calvin Jackson's new album, "Waiting For Calvin", is getting good reaction .


