ALL ABOUT THE COVER

Leon Russell's legend looms large in the history of rock 'n' roll music. Russell, a Tulsa, Oklahoma native, began playing professionally at 14. Early songwriting arranging and session credits include The Crystals, The Ronettes, The Righteous Brothers, Ike & Tina Turner. He toured and recorded with white soul rockers Bonnie & Delaney, was band leader-arranger-performer on Joe Cocker's Mad Dogs and Englishmen tour and played at George Harrison's Concert to Benefit Bangladesh.

As a solo artist, Russell's records have ranged from seminal delta blues-rock, to the classic jazz and experiments of Carney and the country rock hits that came from his Hank Wilson's Back LP, which featured Willie Nelson. Russell recently recorded most tracks for a new album due on his own Paradise Records label at the end of this month at his private 40-track Hendersonville studio. The first single is the Danny O'Keefe chestnut, Goodtime Charlie's Got The Blues. Now the "master of space and time" is also the master of country and adult contemporary, set to hit the concert trail again this summer.

CHARTBOUND ★ ★ Steve Haggard "Southland"



Performing in front of audiences since his college days, Steve Haggard cut his musical teeth in the small clubs and coffeehouses playing blues and rock and roll, while "sneaking in country tunes", when he could. It wasn't long before he realized that country music was what he wanted to play, and formed his first all country band, 'Boot Hill'. Response was so strong that the group was called on to play a summer tour throughout Europe.

Country Music Monthly recently reported on the native New Yorker, saying "Amazing! A Yankee who sings and plays real country music." Dreams magazine caught hin onstage at the well known Lone Star Cafe and said, "possesses that extra bit of flair and originality necessary for national success,"

Although the 5' 11" wiry performer has appeared with such artists as Razzy Bailey and Big Al Downing, he notes that the most memorable event in his career was recording in Nashville recently with some of his favorite session men such as Sonny Garrish and Jerry Kroon. "Two outstanding players that I've enjoyed listening to so many times in the past." Steve credits such country stars as the late Hank Williams, George Jones, Webb Pierce, and the Everly Brothers as having had an influence on his own singing style. "Each of them have their own distinctive style, and they've taught me that's it's important to be and sound like oneself."

Steve Haggard's first record charted nationally and went to #78. His new self-penned single "Southland" cut with the aid of Nashville producer, Bill VornDick (formerly an engineer at Marty Robbins' studio) is already being played on over 95 stations nationally.

Steve is now hard at work on a new video to be released in conjunction with his next release





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FARON YOUNG RECORDS DUET ALBUM WITH WILLIE

Faron Young and Willie Nelson have just completed recording their first duet album for Columbia records, produced by Fred Foster, and recorded at Willie's studio/golf course complex in Spicewood, TX, a suburb of Austin. Included in this album are several new versions of some old standards by the due. . . "HELLO WALLS," which brought Nelson's name into the limelight originally. . . "GOING STEADY." 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BUG LANDS IN NASHVILLE

Started in 1975 by brothers Dan and Fred Bourgoise. Bug Music is a publishing administration company. Their first client, Del Shannon came to Dan with a problem, he had not received any publishing royalties on his catalog for over ten years. Dan succeded in tracking down the funds, but realized that someone would have to administer the catalog, so Bug began.

According to Fred, some of Bug's services include: pitching songs, issuing mechanical licenses, lead sheets, royalty collections, and registering copyrights. They act as administrators for privately owned publishing companies for a negotiated fee.

Recently the company enjoyed several top 10 covers by country artists such as Rosanne Cash, Ricky Skaggs, and Emmylou Harris. After nine years of operation in L.A., Bug is now preparing to offer its services to Nashville writers as well. (213) 466-4352.





COUNTRY RADIO STATIONS REMAIN FIRM

The 1984 Country Music Association's Annual Radio Survey shows 36% of all United States and Canadian commercial radio stations are programming Country Music. The new report also revealed a dramatic increase in AM stereo and satellite reception capabilities.

According to the U.S. Federal Communications Commission and the Canadian Communication Commission there are 8,837 licensed commercial radio stations in the two countries. The CMA survey relvealed 3,138 of those program Country


61% or 1,907 Country radio stations now have the capacity for satellite reception. That marks an 86% increase since 1983, the first year CMA researched this factor.

Country AM stereo stations how total 65, a 442% increase over 1983, the first year AM stereo became available.

CMA President, Dick McCullough, Senior Vice President of the J. Walter Thompson Company/Chicago, commented, "the solidarity of Country Music is again evidenced by the results of this survey. It continues to be a major format throughout all areas of the United States and Canada."



Turn Me Loose

BOB: Vince Gill is one of the most promising new artists to surface in months. This former road band member with Ricky Skaggs and ex-lead vocalist with Pure Prairie League displays all the requisites for success on Turn Me Loose. He's got a totally engaging high-register voice that resonates with youthful intensity and sincerity. He's a damn good songwriter. (Just listen to the title cut, or "Half a Chance.") And he's also a mean-assed guitar player who's not afraid to rock 'n' roll when a song (like Delbert McClinton's "Victim of Life's Circumstances") calls for it. Most important, though, to my way of thinking. he wears his heart on his musical sleeve; not only is his music energetic and technically on the mark, but it also rings with a genuine sense of vulnerability and integrity.

PETE: Gill, producer Emory L. Gordy, Jr., and the players should indeed be proud of this

Your mention of Pure Prairie League causes me to recollect one of the saddest chapters in country music history: the recoil of the Nashville establishment against the development of country-rock in the late Sixties. For deeming a record that kicks this potently, "safe for country audiences", (as well as for sending other talented and unique newcomers like Gus Hardin and the Judds into the marketplace), RCA deserves praise.



MARK GRAY Magic Columbia 39143

BOB: It's not my nature to say something nice about two new albums in the same month if I can avoid it. But within the grooves of this debut LP, I hear portents of another success story about to unfold. Gray is not only a formidably gifted songwriter, having turned out hits for Melissa Manchester, Alabama, and Janie Fricke. He is also a gifted vocalist: a white boy from rural Mississippi with his roots dug deep into gospel and rhythm & blues.

My only complaint about Magic is that the project is marred by a touch of commercial impersonality. This comes across in Gray's slightly exaggerated, almost baroque phrasings, as well as in Bob Montgomery and Steve Buckingham's almost brassy production job. Instead of inviting the listener to share in a bit of musical intimacy, practically every track on the album seems to scream, "Buy me!" "Play me!" "Aren't I wonderfu!"

PETE: Mark Gray was recently quoted as saying, "For me, country music is that line between gospel and R & B." That seems more like Staple Singers territory to me, nontheless, Magic should enable CBS to challenge Lee Greenwood and Kenny Rogers for a share of the "hybrid heartthrob" proceeds. Though I find Gray more palatable than either, I prefer the lower-key soulfulness of a Russell Smith to the vocal overkill and orchestral bombast that too often mark this effort.



SYLVIA Surprise RCA AHL1-4960

PETE: Alas, the only real surprise in this package is provided by Sylvia's hair stylist (who is duly credited in accordance with the latest record jacket etiquette).

The proceedings do begin somewhat unexpectedly with "Give 'em Rhythm," a staccato tribute

to the power of rock therapy that is delivered with all the conviction and credibility of Ronald Reagan endorsing a holiday for Martin Luther King. After that, it's mostly business as usual, as producer Tom Collins demonstrates his customary fondness for adding uptown sophistication and assorted sweeteners to light, fluffy material (published by. . . guess who? RCA has unaccountably ceased to provide such information).

Sylvia is a pleasant, inoffensive singer; and this is not a bad album—just lamentably bland, predictable and insignificant.

BOB: You are being far too kind, Loesch. I can only assume that you've been taken in by Sylvia's new "doo", along with the rest of the world.

Indeed, judging from the silly parade of local newspaper pieces and "in-depth" TV talk show interviews, Sylvia's new look is, at least from Nashville's perspective, the most important international event since nuclear rearmament. (There are even vague rumors that the CMA is going to institute a new "Hairstyle Of The Year" Award, just so they can give it to sweet little Sylvia. Wouldn't that be precious!)

Granted, though, Sylvia's new hairstyle is far more memorable than the music in this album. I've always felt that Tom Collins was one of the least imaginative producers on Music Row, and one of those most responsible for mainstream Nashville music's aesthetic decline into "countrymush". This LP merely confirms those feelings.



THE OSMOND BROTHERS One Way Rider Warner/Curb 25070-1

PETE: All right, Allen, I hear you asking (like an audience cueing in during a Johnny Carson monologue) "How. . . BAD was it?"

Well, owing largely to Jim Ed Norman's proficiency at the control panel, One Way Rider is at least endurable. Except for an occasional attempt at funkiness (as in the title cut) that falls flatter than John Tate, the boys have wisely stayed within their considerable artistic limitations. The euphonious, sterilized harmonies, while hardly suitable for crying in your beer - er, cola, would serve nicely as, say, background music for mother's next visit.

Okay, your turn; but remember; you're supposed to listen to these things before reviewing them.

BOB: Get outta my life, you sanctimonious jerk!! Just because you came over to my house and caught me using this platter as a dog dish, don't jump to conclusions. I did listen—and it was definitely a three-Bufferin ordeal.

I remember once in New York, back in the days when electric bucking bulls were the rage. I got roped into going to some sort of opening party for a new line of "country & western" designer clothes. It was at Macy's or some such place, and Caroline Kennedy and some of her crowd were there, lapping up the free eats. The music was furnished by a whispy-looking bunch of preppy-type college kids with perfect hair, perfect jeans, and red scarves around their necks. The closest they came to real "country" was singing Neil Young songs in reedy Boston accents.

The point is that some people will pay convenient lip service to the real thing, but when it actually comes down to **listening**, they'd rather hear a poor substitute. And that's where a group like the Osmond Brothers come in.

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

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WHO'S HOT & WHO'S NOT

On the rise or on the slide, the charts don't lie.

And now, the envelope please. . .

ow pay attention if you want to know who has had the most successful year on the *Billboard* country singles chart. Oh sure, you wince, one more person who's gonna tell me that Alabama, Kenny Rogers and Willie Nelson rule the *Billboard* lists. Not so.

I was as flabbergasted as you'll be to find out that Mickey Gilley has been the hottest country artist on the radio in the past twelve months. This conclusion is just one of the surprises of this detailed study of the past year's BB chart activity, an enterprise which required hours of research, all accomplished without the aid of a computer.

Before careening on into this most perceptive analysis perhaps we should pause long enough for the guidelines to be summarized (but not long enough for Mr. T. to travel here to read them). The BB "Hot Country Singles" charts published between the first week in June of last year through the last week in May of this year were scrutinized. Index cards were prepared on every artist who reached the Top-20. The entries on each card read in the same form as the sample below:

Rogers, Kenny

"Islands In The Stream" (with Dolly Parton) 9/24-11-7-#1²

This notation of course indicates that "Islands In The Stream" entered the Top-20 on September 24th, logged 11 weeks there, seven of them in the Top-10 and peaked at #1 for two weeks. (This was the longest period any record spent in the Top-10 and Top-20 for the period surveyed. It was also one of only two records to last longer than one week at #1, a feat equalled earlier this month when Willie & Julio's reminiscences of things female enjoyed a two-week visit to the summit.)

The figures were then entered by the performer, each performer was listed, the points were added up and the totals were printed in the boxed visual aid which accompanies the text. It's there that you'll see that Mickey Gilley's records spent more weeks in the Top-10 or Top-20 than anyone else in country music. Mickey also tallied the most total points, a figure derived by adding the total weeks in the Top-20 & Top-10 to the total Top-10, Top-20 and #1 discs.

The numbers speak for themselves but they tell only part of the story. Who is coming up strong through the ranks, who among the stars has

slipped and who's making a comeback, what new acts have emerged and which label has been the "hottest"?

Let's take up these topics one by one. The artists nearest to breaking into this charmed list of twenty are as follows: Conway Twitty, Ronnie McDowell, The Statler Brothers, Hank Williams Jr., Dolly Parton, John Anderson, Charley Pride, Johnny Lee, Deborah Allen, The Bellamy Brothers and B.J. Thomas.

OK, who has lost a bit of momentum in the past year? Well, Conway hasn't scored a #1 for over a year. His last three releases have fallen short of the top, a situation which has occured only three times since 1967. Ronnie Milsap saw

his consecutive #1 streak snapped at 10 when "Stranger In My House" peaked at #5 while T.G. Sheppard's string of chart-toppers ended at 8 when "Without You" died at #12. Both men have recorded to post a #1 since so they may well be on the rebound. For trivia freaks Alabama has the longest current #1 streak with twelve, a total which puts them within shouting distance of Sonny James' sixteen consecutive #1's from 1965-1972, the all-time leader in this department.

A couple of legends: Hank Williams Jr. and Dolly Parton have also endured so-so years, at least in terms of the charts. Williams has gone over a year without a #1 and Dolly hasn't tallied a solo #1 since 1982's "I Will Always Love

You". Charley Pride has logged only one #1 out of his last three releases, a level of success beneath his standards. Anne Murray has tallied at least two Top-10's annually since 1977—but her last single expired far from #20. It's been eight years and twenty releases since Eddie Rabbitt saw a single die in double-digits but his last two: "You Put The Beat In My Heart" and "Nothing Like Falling In Love" crashed and burned at #10.

CBS must be wondering about Ray Charles future as a country artist. The best he could do with three singles was a finish at #20 on "Born To Love Me" and it took a duet with George Jones for him to make Top-10. It's also doubtful that David Frizzell, the Bellamy Brothers or Lacy

J. Dalton are raving about the chart heights each attained in the past twelve months while Rosanne Cash & Karen Brooks have each gone over a year without benefit of a Top-20, a fate which has also befallen Gus Hardin, Loretta Lynn, Juice Newton, Mel Tillis, Tanya Tucker and Tammy Wynette.

Ricky Skaggs, Lee Greenwood and Gary Morris are the three newest artists to break onto our Top-20. None had charted anything prior to 1980 yet all three are consistent hit-makers today. The best showings by brand new acts are as follows (in order) Atlanta, Michael Murphey, Lane Brody, Exile, The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Mark Gray, Jim Glaser, Dan Seals and Becky Hobbs, all of whom posted their first Top-10 platters during the last twelve months (save for Murphey who hit in 1982). You can expect each

of these artists to be the subject of concentrated label "pushes" during the next six months. In addition you can look for RCA to mount a campaign behind The Judds, Keith Whitley and Deborah Allen, PolyGram to continue working

Top-20 as opposed to six for MCA, five for RCA and two for Warner Bros. CBS also employs the top four finishers on our total points list: Mickey Gilley, Willie Nelson, Ricky Skaggs and Merle Haggard, as well as Janie Fricke, who wound up eighth. These five artists accounted for 11 #1 singles amoung them.

I hope that you have enjoyed this little excursion into chartland. Now that you know who is hot and who isn't you'll know whose calls to return, who to take to lunch and who to ignore.



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
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
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VIDEO VISION Video Music Reviews by Andrew Roblin

Do country music videos measure up to rock clips in terms of creative and technical standards? Obviously, the answer varies with the works compared. But if country clips generally feature stronger plots and more realistic characters, rock videos usually have an edge in most other aspects due to more expansive budgets.

"Nashville needs to be more quality-conscious in video production," says CBS senior vice presi-

dent and general manager Rick Blackburn. "With the sub-standard image some country videos have," he warns, "it could hurt both the artists involved and country video in general.

Programmers agree with Blackburn. Barry Mardit, co-producer of "Country Express," a clip show syndicated to PBS stations in 34 markets, notes, "With only a few really good country videos available, we have to spread them out."

Mardit adds that the better country clips have a longer life-span. "A good video, like 'Pancho And Lefty,' can be aired a number of times," says Mardit.

AMY GRANT

"It's Not A Song"

Producer: Scene Three. Word.

I'm knocked out! Culled from the 'Story, Songs and Stars' television special, this video is so exciting that the rest of that effort seems decidely tame. A sudden gust of wind sweeps away Grant's sheet music and the viewer follows along on an exploration of the power of song. In the superb climactic scene, the music leads us to an old folks home where dancers disguised as seniors break into the best choreography yet seen in a clip from a Nashville-based producer.



ANNE MURRAY

"That's Not The Way It's Supposed To Be" Producer: Mick Kleber. Capitol.

Murray redeems herself after the dismal video of "A Little Good News." Anne takes on a surprising punk persona that works effectively with this clip's wide-angle camera shots and disorienting viewpoints. Garbed in a drab trench-coat and a wide-brimmed fedora, Murray creeps up on a shiny aluminum trailer where she awaits her man. He soon comes along and pulls off his coat, revealing a muscular physique that belongs in an ad for exercise equipment. Artfully shot and tightly edited, "That's Not The Way It's Supposed To Be" is an unexpected gem.

THE JUDDS

"Mama, He's Crazy"

Producer: Hogan Entertainment. RCA.

Wynona swings languidly on the front porch and tells her mother, Naomi, about a new love. Mama gazes reflectively at her daughter and recalls her own first love as the color shifts to

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a sepia tone. There's nothing shocking or surreal in this depiction, but the video amplifies the unpretentious honesty and heartfelt wonder of the song. It's hard to conceive of a more country visualization.

ROBIN LEE

"Want Ads"

Producer: Daniels Television. Evergreen.

Hot on the heels of Buzz Cason's clip comes Evergreen's second strong video release. Robin catches her two-timing lover with lipstick on his collar and decides it's time to advertise for a replacement. Plenty of amusing characters, including some obnoxious paparazzi and a chorus of secretaries, contribute to the action. Overall, this is quite good, but Robin's tears over her boyfriend's infidelity look a little forced.

EARL THOMAS CONLEY

"Angel In Disguise"

Producer: Hogan Entertainment. RCA.

Earl wakes up alone and can't find his lady. Or should I say ladies? He finds his lover in the kitchen making breakfast. But as she butters up a biscuit, she changes into a succession of different beauties. Earl's face tells us he can't believe it and neither can I. The action has no apparent connection to the song, making this one of Hogan's weaker projects.

LARRY GATLIN & THE GATLIN BROTHERS BAND

"Denver"

Producer: Scene Three. Columbia.

How is it possible that the same production

company responsible for Amy Grant's stunning "It's Not A Song" clip could create this boring throw-away? Larry pawns his ring while his wife pouts in the background. The two of them break up, so Gatlin hits the bottle at his long-cabin retreat in the Colorado mountains. He plays a lot of solitaire. So do I, but I haven't made a video about it. Not up to par for CBS or Scene Three.

SYLVIA

"Victims Of Goodbye"

Producer: Hogan Entertainment. RCA.

"Victims Of Goodbye" opens with a studio scene—already a video cliche—where we see the various musicians laying down their tracks. Sylvia has a yen for the guitarist, but he gets frustrated and throws his music in the air. Tom Collins tries to ignore the pandering pair, but they embrace anyway. The next day, Sylvia wakes up alone in bed (maybe she should start dating Earl Thomas Conley) and cries. Why does her character seem like such a wimp? Why is this clip so forgettable?

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MID-YEAR PLANNING

In financial planning the old saying "time is money" is sometimes better put "timing is money." When you make a decision can be just as important as what your decision is. With half the year gone, now is a good time to take another look at your financial situation. Two simple tools will get you started: 1) a balance sheet (a list of assets, liabilities and net worth); and 2) an income statement (income less expenses). After you've compiled these, you can start to get into some of the details.

- I. Income Tax Planning From your Income Statement you can put together the following: 1) your taxable income year-to-date, and 2) a projection of the taxable income for the year. This will allow you to estimate your tax liability. If you're interested in reducing your tax liability, especially through tax shelters, now is the time to devise your strategy. With tax shelters, the earlier you make your investment, the better. Year-end tax shelters are generally poorer in economics and riskier in their tax structure.
- II. Estate Planning Your balance sheet can serve as the basis for projecting your potential

estate tax. If you are contemplating reducing your estate through gifts to children, etc, you may be able to achieve some benefit from doing it now rather than waiting until year-end.

Also, if your financial or personal situation has changed significantly, you may need to discuss with your advisors the need for updating your will

- III. Investments Your balance sheet should help you see what your investment progress has been. Today's financial climate is constantly changing. What sounded like a good strategy six months ago may be a poor one now. Now's a good time to take a look at your investment portfolio, keeping in mind the four key characteristics of investments: 1) liquidity; 2) debt; 3) risk/return; and 4) management effort.
- IV. Insurance Insurance needs change with your financial and personal circumstances. When reviewing your insurance situation, look to see if you are overinsured or underinsured and whether you are getting the best value for your insurance dollar. The main insurance areas to look at are: 1) property and casualty (house, auto, etc.);

2) liability; 3) life; 4) disability; and 5) medical. Financial planning is getting more and more complicated these days. Time spent in analyzing and reviewing your financial situation is time well spent. In the rapidly changing financial world of the 80's, your financial well-being depends on

Each object was personally selected by Dolly with the help of her record label, RCA, her personal assistant Judy Ogle, her family, and the Country Music Foundation, which operates the Hall of Fame and Museum.

"We are also pleased with the highly personal approach chosen for the exhibit. Visitors to the Hall of Fame will feel as if Dolly is sharing her life and experiences with them," Johnson explained.

Photos of her family, career achievements and events taking place during her climb to the top are included in each segment of the exhibit with Dolly's philosophy and personal thoughts at various intervals of her career highlighted through colorful quotes from the superstar. Artifacts such as her favorite banjo, given to her by a "banjo-picking friend," her famous butterfly guitar used to compose most of her hit songs, costumes, scripts and callsheets from her past two box office hits, 9 to 5and Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, as well as her soon to be released Rhinestone, are all exhibited.

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
