


TOPSIDES

MILAN WILLIAMS DID THE RIGHT THING

In South Africa, your life's worth, and the freedom that goes along with it, is based on skin color. South Africa is a place that, in many ways, makes the Soviet Union look like summer camp. In South Africa, depending on the color of your skin, your're a second-class citizen. Household pets in America have more rights than a Black South African. Hell, a New York City cockroach can go where it wants. In short, South Africa is a bad place.

There isn't a lot the free world can or will immediately do to change life for the oppressed South African. The country's wall of injustice is virtually impenetrable. It doesn't help that governments and companies around the world, including those in the U.S., continue to do business with South Africa, thus indirectly enforcing that wall. Directly, American Blacks don't possess many weapons powerful enough to fight this monster. However, indirectly we can do plenty, at least in one arena.

You see, like everyone else in the universe (and considering what goes, on this planet, you know there just have to be some sensible beings out there somewhere) those power-hungry South Africans loved to be entertained. And quite often, they like being entertained by Black folks.

After a hard day at the bank or running the gold and diamond mines manned by underpaid, overworked slaves, they like to ease back with a scotch on the rocks and watch a SAMMY DAVIS JR. or a MICHAEL JACKSON throw down. And that, my friend, is where American Blacks can make a difference: the powermongers might control the money, might control a nation of people, but we'll be damned if they will watch us sing and dance-even if the lure is incredibly big bucks. So when COMMODORES member/keyboardist MILAN WIL-LIAMS refused to join his fellow group members in performing in South Africa, he was doing the right thing.

According to Williams, he was forced

from the unit after 20 years of service (during which he supplied the group with early hits like "Machine Gun") because he voiced his disapproval with going to South Africa, both within the group and to the media. What kind of men you ask, would discharge a brother after 20 years of the good, bad and ugly? The same men who would make the decision to perform in a country where their ancestors are blatantly oppressed.

Certainly there are many Black entertainers who would eagerly play South Africa (some already have), despite the circumstances there; they resist the be-

ckoning of a big payday simply because it would be bad PR to do otherwise. But the Commodores, at least at the time of this incident, were managed by someone with years of experience as a publicist, someone who should have been sensitive to, if not the moral issue, certainly the public backlash. *You* figure it,

Not long after the media and public came down on the Commodores' decision to play South Africa, the group held a press conference in Los Angeles to explain why they weren't going after all. Why? Anyone in a compassionate state of being already knows why American acts shouldn't play S.A. Reportedly the Commodores justified the S.A. trip with plans to speak out against apartheid while performing there. What a sad cop-out. They can speak out against S.A. conditions from Denver or Vegas. Preaching from a South African stage is a moot issue when you're stuffing suitcases with money earned while entertaining the slave master of poor souls who don't share the same rights of those you so willingly entertain.

The Commodores by no means endorse S.A.'s conditions. The trip was obviously tied directly to finance; it was a money thing. Things aren't what they used to be for the group, but playing S.A. is bigger than a hit record. You go to hot songwriters and producers for a career boost: when morality is the issue, you go to your heart. At least we now know the Commodores' price of freedom—it was that fat fee S.A. offered.

What will Milan do now? It's tough to re-adjust after 20 years on one job. He says he'll pursue some type of a solo deal and/or production projects. While having the guts to stand up for what is right alone doesn't sell records, Williams deserves to have his calls returned by A&R people. Especially Black ones.

And what will the Commodores do? Who knows. It's not like the group hasn't overcome obstacles before. Weaker acts may not have survived losing to a fatal heart attack their guiding light of a manager, BENNY ASHBURN. Not long after, LIONEL RICHIE left the fold and the group survived that, too. Nevertheless, here's an option: they could apologize to the world-particularly Black South Africans-something more significant than a press conference. And then they could offer Milan his gig back. He may not want it back, but the gesture would prove the sincerity of the group's feelings. Unless they do this or something comparable, and unless they make Thriller pt. II, they may as well settle in, because it could be a long, cold winter.







Current Single: "Babies Having Babies"

BACKGROUND:

This graduate in Fine Arts from Seton Hall University was inspired by his work as a teacher in an alternative high school program for students with educational and personal difficulties. "These kids had problems consisting of child abuse. low attendance, non interest in school, and teenage pregnancy"-in turn making it difficult for them to pass standardized tests. Terry On Social Concerns:

The industry feels these issues are not marketable. But we as artists have that responsibility. We as public figures owe it to our people who support us, to let them know that therc are issues and concerns that really have not been confronted."

Lessons in humility are not often times pleasant, yet Carole Davis has taught me one. When her Warner Bros. CD "Heart Of Gold" arrived on my desk. I let it sit for a while. After all, there are so many female solo projects in the marketplace right now, soon many start to look and sound alike. So, there she is facing me, an attractive White girl in a leather studded bustier looking very much like Paula Abdul. But wait! Nile Rodgers produced. O.K., I'll give it a listen over lunch. In the portable CD player it goes and Slap! Wake up Charles! The next time you judge a book (or CD) by its cover, slap yourself.

Carole jams—plain and simple. Her product is one of the hottest R&B/Funk/Dance projects to come around in a while. It has a different sound, due in part to the fresh production work Niles has been turning out recently, yet a sound not so different that it will not connect with today's consumers. It is raw and very street and has a very New York feel about it. So, Carole must be a Hip little Hopper from the Bronx, right? Wrong again. Boy, am I batting a thousand with preconceptions or what?

Carole Davis is an internationally traveled young lady. She "had the world as my backyard" due to her father's involvement with the government. He worked in governmental defense, something short of the CIA but important enough to keep them in the wrong place at the wrong time. "I grew up in several political hotspots or around touchy situations. I just hope now I'm in the right place at the right time with my record," she laughed.

Carole has lived in Thailand for a decade, Bangkok, Rome, Paris and London (her hometown). Yet her biggest state of culture shock came at 16 when her parents divorced and she and her mother moved to another foreign country—New York. Now a girl used to private, shee-shee-poo-poo French schools was thrust into a public school in Harlem. But being an adapter, she dealt with the situation.

"I braided my hair into corn rows, got myself a boyfriend in the Savage Skulls and started hanging out heavy and learning a new lingo. I speak several foreign languages, but I didn't know Uptown. I learned quickly," she recalled.

Carole finished high school and went on to get a degree in Political Science and East Asian affairs. But politics was not in her blood — music was.

"It wasn't a conscious decision to en-

ter the music business. It was something that happened very naturally — just like an athlete as a kid naturally makes jumps and realizes that he's in shape. It's the same for musical abilities. You either have them or you don't. It's not a decision, it just happens."

Carole had been writing songs since she was nine. Her experiences in the Big Apple really shaped her music. "Being in New York at that time did everything for me, musically. I am thankful to that period of my life, for who I am today. That was the real formation. Rap was just beginning. It was so exciting, and the sounds of the streets — you can't get that education in school, you have to live it. My music changed, my songs reflected my experiences. Real life, not fantasy. Not a lot of sentiment or romance but real subjects; the want of money, having to say no to a boyfriend, not wanting to sleep around to get ahead ...things that people encounter."

Not many wanted to listen to her music. She was rejected everywhere and soon became discouraged. "I was beaten down. People told me I didn't know what I was doing. They would tell me I was cute, but forget about singing or writing. It took my confidence. Then Prince recorded a song I had written, 'Slow Love' for his 'Sign Of The Times' album. Suddenly everybody wanted to listen. That gave me the confidence to go out again with my demos. Without confidence you can't be an artist and that was the boost I needed," she said.

Soon she met up with Nile Rodgers through a mutual friend. She was on her way to L.A. to work with Maurice White when Nile said he would like to helm the entire project. Carole agreed and "Heart Of Gold" is the result. It is a sexy, sassy album from a sexy, sassy woman. Each song tells a story. Not just mindless Dance tracks, but songs with realistic hooks.


Carole also started a film career and earned many roles, two of her most successful being Andrew McCarthy's girlfriend in *Mannequin*, and as the second female lead in Matt Dillon's *The Flamingo Kid*. She wants to continue acting, but right now the record is getting all of her energy. She is working on the next, and promises that it will contain even more Rap and street sounds. With all of her gifts, what is her most prized? "Confidence. What greater gift could there be?"

C O N V E N T I O N

Panel: BY THE BOOK: The Ratings Game—How To Break Out Your Arbitron Book (In Six Easy Steps)

Synopsis: This discussion group was more of a workshop, that took on the overwhelming Arbitron ratings book. The workshop was presented in a six step method created by panelist Kurt Hanson, President of Strategic Radio Research in Chicago, Illinois.

He explained how to properly read and utilize Arbitron information. Among the steps included in the discussion were "Did you gain or lose listeners," "Did your weekends help you" and "How did you do hour-by-hour."

Panelist John Tyler, Vice President Sales, WGCI-FM, Chicago, stated, "Radio stations must find their own strong and weak points to target their buyers before they send sellers out. Furthermore, stations must price their product and know their worth."

Panel: ON THE QUIET SIDE: A Look At Alternative Programming, Quiet Storm/Jazz/Black AC

Synopsis: The subject of alternative programming radio formats was focused upon during this session. Along with the subdivisions of Jazz, Quiet Storm and the new Black Adult Contemporary format, each of the panel members was able to bring a host of information from their perspective background, be it from radio or record company.


Jay Johnson, PD/WTLC, served as the workshop's moderator. The subject matter shifted almost immediately from Quiet Storm focus to a Jazz theme, specifically that of traditional Jazz. Many who attended the seminar felt that current radio playlists were too limited, and that traditional Jazz could and should be incorporated into AC and Quiet Storm programming. Perhaps radio veteran Dave Clark summed it up best when he said, "Quiet Storm is nothing more than music you played when you wanted to cool down and get closer on the dance floor."

Panel: PRODUCTION/RECORDING TECHNIQUES

Synopsis: This discussion proved to be quite informative as host Nile Rodgers walked the audience through his experiences as a record producer, and some of the contributing factors that led to his tremendous success.

Along with good equipment for the creation of good sound quality, Rodgers stressed the importance of a strong song, and keeping an eye on the budget.

He also explained that one of his most successful methods to achieving good sound quality is the use of live musicians in the studio instead of the "organic" sound, reproduced in many instances today.

With the advent of the replacement of vinyl by cassettes and CDs, recording techniques must also change and adapt. Rodgers then proceeded to demonstrate sampling and MIDI techniques commonly used in studios with a variety of equipment.

Panel: RADIO PRODUCTION I & II

Synopsis: This panel included three of radio's best production wizards.

Moderator Mitch Faulkner led the way with quick wit and interesting, snappy jingles on today's radio stations. Richard Pegue expanded on the base of production to national spots and large scale acceptance. Jay Dixon moved the panel with voice and diction, adding that putting forth this extra effort will give your station a crisp sound that is rarely found.

The panel pointed out that a good production director can save the day for your station. They (program directors) have the opportunity to fuse a talent base, an understanding of the sales staff and programming knowledge to make it all work in harmony.

Pegue implored the audience to "be at your best at all times because your production sells you as well as your radio station."

S U M M A R I E S

Panel: FOUNDATION OF A RECORDING CAREER

Synopsis: Moderator, Debbie Sandridge and panelists Louil Silas, Jr., Scott Folks, Greg Peck, David Lombard, Debra Cain and Dexter Moore addressed the issues of a recording career from all sides of the coin.


Concentrated areas of discussion were performance rights organizations, various functions of A&R and the services rendered by management.

BMI and ASCAP representatives presented excellent material in terms of educating the artists on established mechanical, synchronization and performance rights. A&R execs from various labels stressed the importance of artist imaging, musical direction and marketing. In addition, David Lombard discussed key issues and responsibilities of management.

The panelists offered a tremendous amount of knowledge and information toward unlocking the industry door to a recording career, and educating one's self on the business.

Panel: BORN TO BE WILD Hiring Air Talent

Synopsis: This discussion proved to be quite interesting as the state of radio and hiring the air talent highlighted the session. Several points were brought out during the discussion concerning the importance of hiring the right disc jockeys. One of the most important characteristics, was the personality of the disc jockeys and their ability to hold audiences. This is the key to good ratings and in turn, could encompass strong advertising support from those companies purchasing air time. Another critical issue expressed was the jock's ability to keep his/her show fresh. It is important to try different techniques and ideas, so that the show will continue to improve. In the area of helping those who want to find jobs as disc jockeys, it was agreed that networking plays an important role in increasing your chances of finding the right job.

World Radio History

Panel: ARTIST IMAGING WORLDWIDE

Synopsis: The topic of developing an artist's image was the focal point of this informative seminar. Among the different themes discussed were developing the artist's total image, improving an artist's bio, what to look for in a photo from an image standpoint as well as a publication's standpoint, and how to handle negative press. One important point brought across was to make sure the marketing and image are congruent with the artist's concept of his or herself, thus creating an image that will carry with the overseas audiences.

Cynthia Horner, Editor/Right On Magazine, pointed out that while many in the industry may tire of seeing artists' photos or hearing their songs numerous times, the public still dictates what they want. In the end, the panel made clear that the artist's image is the most important part of a career, aside from the actual music. The proper image can make or break a career.

Panel: HERE WE ARE TO SAVE THE DAY

Synopsis: This panel focused on effective promotions that work. The keys to having an effective promotion are to 1) know your station; 2) identify the promotion; and 3) make it sensible (no clutter). Although the summer months are filled with promotions, each one must have some outstanding characteristics to make it differ from others. Simple promos are the best. Knowing how to get down to the details and using time effectively are important.

In a station atmosphere, the relationship between programming and sales needs to be very good; for the sales staff are the ones who obtain the accounts and are instrumental in putting together the copy. Successful promotions may be achieved by having an advertising budget, getting a rotation of the music and contacting wholesalers/retailers regarding the movement of product in the marketplace. Also, a close relationship with record labels help to determine the level of support for that artist.

CONVENTION

Panel: HOW TO DO BETTER IN ARBITRON

Synopsis: This seminar was conducted by Kurt Hanson, President of Strategic Radio Research in Chicago. It was a slide presentation marketed and researched by his firm. The main focus of the discussion centered around the attack and defense methods that could be utilized in helping to establish and maintain numbers in Arbitron. People were urged to analyze the competition, or listen to find a weakness in their competition's programming. The next step was to position your station and go in for the attack. As Hanson explained, this procedure is used by stations trying to sneak up on the market leader.

Another topic of interest was that of "dial positioning." With so many scan buttons on the newer radios and with the scanners usually moving from left to right, the audience was told to be aware of their competition to the right. Listeners may be lost during a station's stopset.

Panel: AIN'T NO STOPPIN' US NOW! - The Future of R&B Radio

Synopsis: The critical and current issues of R&B radio were the mainstay of this very timely topic. With Moderator Jimmy Smith, PD/WGCI-FM, Chicago, the discussion of this panel focused on the many facets of R&B radio including demographics, advertising, promotion, Rap music and programming. The panel agreed that the overall state of radio is in good shape. Revenues are being generated, and different challenges are being met. One of the challenges was the emergence of the Black AC format, signaling a shift of tastes and needs of the Black community. Other issues brought out were lack of innovation in radio station formats (i.e., playing "sound-a-likes" by the same producers in rotations). It was suggested that stations: begin utilizing research data; use focus groups as a way to learn of critical issues and music that needs to be addressed; and better mix music in Black music formats. Innovation is the key.

Panel: GREAT PROMOTION EQUALS SALES - THE BOTTOM LINE

Synopsis: This seminar covered a variety of contemporary issues dealing with the different facets of promotions. Moderated by Hank Caldwell (Sr. VP, Epic Records) the discussion involved the use of multiple mixes, video. Black radio, Rap, and lyrical content. The whole discussion proved to be quite interesting, not to mention heated. The discussion ranged from the issue of Rap music being played more on CHR radio stations than on Black stations, to Black radio's lack of support for Tracy Chapman's and Living Colour's albums (although they made advances on the Pop charts). In addition, the issue of Black artists being more concerned with "crossing over" than sticking with Black radio, contributed even more to intensify the atmosphere of the terrific and informative session.

Panel: GOSPEL SEMINAR '89

Synopsis: The days were filled with invaluable networking of ideas, facts and opinions. On the fourth and final day of Forum '89, the energy was still flowing—even at 9 a.m.

Armed with a wealth of knowledge, guest speaker Marvin Winans covered nearly every aspect of artist development.

He touched upon the issue of Gospel artists going into the secular realm, stating that, "It's not what you're playing, it's what you're saying. It's more important that the message of Gospel isn't changed." He added that some Gospel artist just have to do something "way out" to be heard.

He also noted that the problem with Gospel music is that there is no platform from which to speak. Therefore he suggested that the Gospel artists, Black radio and retailers as well, should reach out and support one another in order for this artform to become more effective and successful.





CHUCKII BOOKER: A Musical Genius At Work

e's young. he's talented. he's an intense performer and most notably—he's currently a No. 1 hitter. Only in his early twenties, Chuckii Booker is already Atlantic Records' hottest R&B musical commodity.

A native of Los Angeles, Chuckii's musical journey began in the church at the prompting of his mother and grand-mother.

"I was very young when both my mother and grandmother taught and encouraged me to play and stay in the church. I wasn't very serious about playing, even though I was playing the piano and drums, because at the time most of my effort was put into drawing."

But with his roots firmaly planted in the church, he remained a player and took that foundation and built upon it.

Chuckii began to take his music more seriously adding the guitar, the flute and other instruments throughout high school. However, he still flip-flopped around between his musical interests and his desire to become a graphic artist.

"I got a scholarship to the Art Center College of Design. After high school. I attented the college and finished. Then. art became boring again. So I went back to music, knowing that it was my first love."

Chuckii attributes his love for music to his mother, a great pianist (who is also featured on his album), his uncle. Barry White and his grandmother.

"They really encouraged and schooled me on the art of music, and the joy of living and giving. They helped me understand that nothing is possible without God in my life. I'm thankful to have been brought up in 'the Way.""

Being brought up in a musical and spiritual family *and* in the hub of the entertainment industry, Chuckii's future as a recording artist seems to have been a part of his destiny. And if not ... Uncle Barry would see to it anyway.

"I played throughout high school and all, but it was when my uncle signed me to his production company that my career began to take shape. Nothing really came out of our project—an album that didn't do anything—but more studio work was generated and my talent enhanced," he stated.

Over the years, Chuckii's work tripled. His list of credits as a writer, co-writer, player, singer and producer is evidence that he is an exceptional young artist. Gerald Albright, Vanessa Williams, Troop, C.J. Anthony and Geoffrey Williams, to name a few, have all been involved with this creative force, at one level or another.

Eventually his name and credits reached the ears of manager, Raymond Shields. "I got a call one day from Ray asking me to play on Gerald Albright's album. Ray really believed in me. He took the ball to Atlantic's court and the deal was sealed."

In addition to being actively involved in other artists' projects, Chuckii proved to be much of a one-man-show on his debut album, with the exception of two of the LP's outstanding tracks. *The hoy is had, yaw'll.*

Sylvia Rhone, Sr. VP/GM, Black Music Division, Atlantic Records refers to Chuckii as, "one of those rare 'genius' talents who without a doubt will be a musical trend-setter of the '90s."

Manager, Raymond Shields of Black Dot Management, says "The fact that he is a good person makes it so easy to work with him. He doesn't have a huge ego and doesn't create any stress or pressure. I believe in his talent and I believe in him as a person. And in one sense, he's like the little brother I've never had. I enjoy doing business with him, " he commented.

As does his management, Atlantic stands behind him 110%.

"Our marketing strategy included a

stage one 'awareness program,' which primed radio," adds Rhone. "Then it was up to 'Turned Away' which instantly became a very active record at Urban radio with immediate response at Pop. Second stage marketing plans are currently being implemented, including extensive promotion and press tours, television appearances, track and live performances." She notes that Chuckii has just recently finished taping for Bandstand which is set to be aired some time in August. Soul Train, the Apollo and others are set for tapings in the very near future. Chuckii is also playing a few concert dates with Gerald Albright, and he's keeping his fingers exercised writing and playing for other projects.

How is Chuckii faring through all the star build-up, treatment and attention? In a very humble fashion.

"I know that I am blessed. I've been really fortunate to have all these things come my way. I'm trying to do the very best that I can possibly do," he says.

On that merit alone, he's like a magnet. People are drawn near to this young man because they really believe in him and simply enjoy being around him.

The future looks bright indeed for Chuckii. He has the power of the people and his music behind him. What more could a new artist ask for? Another hit! Stay tuned ... it's about to be released.

I located a seat in the far corner of the auditorium to listen to the Rap Summit III panel. I was aghast at how many were crammed into the room. At first the discussion about the future of Rap music was flowing smoothly amongst the panelists. But once the moderator opened the floor to audience members, the posse got busy. Many threw out the fact that Rap artists get a bad wrap (no pun intended) adding the media gives Rap music and its artists a bad name. Is the media here to inform us or influence us? Others felt it was a problem, that Black radio is too slow to support Rap music. Why should an artist such as Tone Loc begin to gain popularity on Top 40 stations, and then cross over to Black radio? Various persons blamed the lack of belief on the record companies, because they don't allow enough money in their budgets to promote Rap artists.

Panelists Chuck D (Public Enemy) and MC Hammer suggested that records should be for the public, not radio per se, because Rap music began in the streets. If that didn't spark enough of a fire in the audience. Chuck D's surprise guest did. Harry Allen. The Media Assassin, took the entire discussion to another plateau. He pointed out that Blacks should become more fluent in business areas. They need to come together and learn how to manage their own money. There is a future beyond the artist; be it Rap. R&B or Pop. We as a people need to look harder at the broader picture of success. These points sent the panel into overtime. When people finally began to exit, they had the coal needed to start the flame in the follow-up session. I can't honestly say the panel solved all questions, but it left many thinking about the future of Rap. What more can we do but look forward to the Rap Summit IV?

Whew! Off to another panel in the south ballroom talkin' bout House Music...a phrase quickly thought of when House music is the topic of discussion. Unfortunately, right from the start, there was mass confusion about the origin of House music. Many believe Chicago is the home of House music. Most of the hour and a half allotted for House music was spent debating the definitions of the subdivisions of House music. Confused? Don't worry, so were many of us. Just remember that Acid-House, Deep-House, Techno-House, Hip-House, and House-House are all different. The one fact that all agreed on was that House music is underrated in the States. One gentleman from Europe made it clear that while Americans are debating where House music began, Europeans are expanding on it. The second fact agreed upon was that popular artists are labeling versions of their songs "House" when they don't fall under the true category of House music. These artists are simply trying to cash in on a trend that's selling in the streets.

Running a little late, I reached the Schubert Hall, out of breath and quite surprised at the size of the room. It seemed to be smaller than the others I sat in during the seminar. But it didn't matter because the record pools and label panels were my big-

gest reason for traveling 3,000 miles. I listened to the panelists explain the meaning of partial and full service to record pools. Labels realize how important record pools are to their sells. They acknowledge the fact that club DJ's are instrumental in making and breaking records. As I was crammed further and further into the room. I realized that this panel, in its third year, was extremely popular. Record pool directors, Foreigner "Eardrum" Suites, Terry Gilson, and Dan Miller were quick to supply information to the audience. They represented those who feel left out of the big picture club DJ's. Again, we are told that record companies turn to radio, because they reach a wider audience at one time, and this promotes sales. Many agreed, but stated that club DJ's normally play a song first, and continue to play it in many mixed versions, after radio has long forgotten the song. This promotes sales!

George Clinton, former Parliament Funkadelic member, was the highlight of New York night life. He put on an awesome show. It was like he'd never been absent from the musical scene. Clinton did everything from old to new, including singing and rapping. Whew! As if that wasn't enough, he and De La Soul did their hit single, "Me Myself and I." Clinton, as unique today as yesterday, tore the roof off the Palladium. They were still making repairs when artists Skyy, Ten City, and Soul II Soul entered the arena. Talking about the roof being on fire, just let it burn. Soul II Soul's first U.S. performance was enough to make me stay in New York an extra day.

As I entered the JFK airport once again, I was exhausted. But the thought of "Going Back To Cali" gave me the energy necessary to board the plane. During my flight I thought about the new ideas, hopes, and dreams, that now filled the void, once left in my suitcase.


STEPHANIE MILLS *Home* (MCA) MCAD 6312

Usually, when a product is released, the outcome is uncertain. Not this time. Stephanie's latest cannot miss. It has everything one has come to expect and more. Slow jams, powerful ballads, funky grooves—all are contained here. The album is filled with excellent production work by Angela Winbush, Gene Griffin, Sami McKinney, Marc Gordon, Gerald Levert and Alton "Wokie" Stewart, to name a few. The first single, "Something In The Way," is a jammin' cut. The title track featuring background vocals by Take 6, is a moving selection due to Stephanie's delivery. It is dedicated to Charlie Smalls and Ken Harper who recently passed away. This album presents a more mature Stephanie, both lyrically and vocally. When it jams, it jams hard with "Ain't No Cookin" and ballads don't get much better than "Comfort Of A Man." Once again, Stephanie brings her music *Home* to R&B lovers.

PIECES OF A DREAM *Bout Dat Time* (EMI) E1 92050

From the late '70s to the present, Pieces Of A Dream has recorded some of the most outstanding tracks to date. While many self-contained bands continue to fall apart and stop the good music from flowing, "Pieces" brings some new players into the fold of Lloyd & Harmon (James K. and Curtis). Scott A. Cannady, Norwood, Michael Antonio Thorton and Lance Webb are all unquestionably great players. With the production assistance of Gene Griffin, Preston Middleton, Nayan, Randy Bowland, Dinky Bingham, James K. Lloyd and Scott A. Cannady this album should hit hard. Some great ballads and uptempo tracks (more commercial than usual from "Pieces") can be found throughout the LP. Standouts are "Bout Dat Time," "What Can I Do," "Can't Be Alone," "For You," (*beautiful job, James*) and "Lonely Hearts." This is a good one folks.





DEZI PHILLIPS

Kickin' It (Tabu/CBS) FZ 45089

Dezi Phillips calls his sound "funky a-go-go," and I couldn't argue more. If being funky were a crime this guy would be doing hard time. Although Dezi is the nephew of legendary Blues artist Jimmy Reed, there is not one Blues record on this album. However, if you're looking for something that'll keep the party jumpin' pick up two copies (one being a reserve) of *Kickin' It*. My favorites include "She's Something," "Didn't Do It," "Love U Forever," "Fine/Fresh," "I Get The Feeling" and the current single, "Why You Wanna." All of these tracks are variations of Hip-Hop, Go-Go and the New Jack Swing grooves. "This Ring (Is For U)" is the lone ballad. As mentioned in a previous issue, Dezi Phillips is a rising star that's ready for the "Bright Lights, Big City."
