THE SOUND IS FADING AW

One year ago, Toronto had two three-track studios. As this year ends, Toronto will have FIVE four-track studios and their label work will probably be down in comparison with the same period last year. Something has happened in the past few months that has effected, quite noticeably, the label work being done in Toronto. For some reason, there is very little (if any) label work being done in the big recording centre of Toronto.

After the great hullabaloo about the "sound" that was to come from Toronto, only a whimpering can be heard.

One studio man couldn't explain the lack of action. The groups and producers who once were regulars, seldom make it to the studios anymore. The story seems to be the same with most studios. Label work was definitely down. Record production was also down. A & R men agreed that, although new productions from across Canada were on the rise. Toronto productions were reduced to a trickle. No one could offer a factual reason but there were

and groups have been waging a battle for recognition, and with only a few exceptions, one producer stated. "It was all a waste of money". Another producer was rumoured to be headed for and yet another had decided to return to his other profession which would at least keep the

STOP! If you are headed toward Toronto to get into the Canadian talent end of the music business, DON'T

All the producers and artists we talked to, agreed with one thing. You have to be encouraged to keep producing, and you have to have radio exposure and sales to stay in business. There has been neither the sales nor the exposure. There was too little success and only spotty success for a chosen few. The others have felt the pinch.

What was the answer? One very angry personal manager told us that the industry needed "cleaning up". A record man told us, "There's too much going on, undercover, in the industry for the rest of the industry to compete


One hold back could be the fact that Toronto groups are paying through the nose, or is it merely rumour that groups are paying 15% for booking and another 15% for promotion and

Scott Alexander, formerly of CKCY in The Soo and now with CKPT Brantford, sends news that their all night jock, lan Cook, has just returned from the Country Music convention in Nashville and was practically wearing a red maple leaf on his forehead, he was so proud of being a Canadian. Seems young Debbie Lori Kaye completely stopped the Columbia show 3 times. The crowd went wild over this fantastically talented 15 year old Canadian. By the way, this particular show which was held in the Opry House was produced by Columbia's own Bob Martin and drew over 3000 to watch and listen to Columbia's complete country roster. At this same show, Don Law was presented with a plaque honouring him for his A&Ring of country records. Getting back to Scott's letter, lan did a guest spot on WSM Nashville where he had a chance to boost Canada.

There's a lot of news including a good rundown of Niagara Peninsula activities by Morris Rainville, news from Ron Albert and a bit about CFGM banning the Marty Robbins disc. But we'll leave it to Penelope for next week.

London Records announces a price change in their jazz label, Limelight. Suggested list for the LM 82000 series (mono) will now be \$4.98. The two record set LM 2-8200 series (mono) \$9.96. LS 86000 (stereo) at \$5.98 and the two record set LS 2-8600 (stereo) at \$11.96.

Sparton of Canada has appointed Terry Turnbull as record salesman for Toronto and Western Ontario.

Carole Bertenshaw, the singles buyer for Kelly's seven store west coast chain, reports good Vancouver action for the Monkees' "Train" as well as their LP. Carole has been receiving hundreds of requests for "Fortune Teller" by The Rolling Stones which is apparently not released on any known label. One radio station in Vancouver has apparently been leaning heavily on this mystery disc and have listed it as their most requested record. The Abbey Tavern Singers have been chalking up good sales for their "Dublin" single as well as their album. Shea Duffy, a local, has a release of "Dublin" as well and is keeping neck in neck with the Singers' version. Rodger Williams' "Free" is creating strong sales and should make the Vancouver charts, soon. With the Vancouver appearance of the Temptations sales doubled on their single "Beauty"

Dan Bartollini, manager of Rendezvous Records in Toronto, writes "I am now convinced that the RPM chart is really beginning to make a dent in the otherwise solid Toronto chart scene. We get more and more requests for it every week. It somehow manages to give the complete picture not just the views of one radio

station or one or two record shops." Good sales are being experienced for "Godiva" and Ma & Pa's "Window". Ryder's "Dress" and the Beach Boys' "Vibrations" are also top sales items. "Winchester Cathedral" is very strong along with the Hollies "Stop". The Righteous Bros. are showing good sales form with their "This Side of Goodbye". Dan has some inside info on the record release for The Passing Fancy, a local group who are gaining a great deal of popularity. Release date has been set for the first part of January.

Lynda Smith reports good sales for the Monkees' LP but is of the opinion this will be topped by the Animals new LP release of "Animalism". Crossroad record buyers represent a big slice of the Toronto market, being as they are situated in one of the largest suburbs (Willowdale) of Metro. "Godiva", "Spin" "Devil" are getting top action. "Symbolize", Roger Williams' "Free" and Pet Clark's "Who" are moving well. All Bill Cosby's LPs are grabbing action as well as Lightfoots and Paul Butterfield's Blues Band albums.

Up in Smiths Falls, Ont., Del Bown of The Bown Electric, has had good sales for "Spin" and Colders "Persuaded No. 1". The Troggs are running with the winners with their "Control" with Dean Martin's "Baby" right behind. The DC5 are showing promise with their "Nineteen Days". Ma & Pa's "Window" looks big. Cosby is a big seller here as well as all Dean Martin material.

Nancy Miller, sales clerk at Kelly's in Guelph, Ont. shows "Winchester Cathedral", "Blue Dress" and Hyland's "Run" as top sellers. Pet Clark's "Who" and "Rain On The Roof" are cashing in. Topping the sales picture for LPs are The Monkees and Gordon Lightfoot.

Sayers, of Islington, Ont. lists "Hazel" as top dog in singles. "Wipeout" is still hanging on with "Spinout" and "Girl On A Swing".

The McCoys 'Mother' is showing good potential as is "Born Free" and "Nineteen Days". Joan Ziegler, manager of the store, also reports good action on "Control" and "Symbolize".

Down Kingston, Ont. way, Morton Morris, sales manager of Morton's Record Bar, gives top billing to "Walk Away Renee" with the Canadian entry of "Whistle" by the Mercey Brothers running close behind. Also up with the winners are "Black Is Black" and "Dandy". The Sandpipers "Louie" and "Picture" by Lewis are heading for the winners circle. The Ma and Pa's LP cops top slot for sales with the Monkees, Troggs, Supremes and Lightfoot following closely.

Vicki Paige, managing her own store in Richmond Hill, Ont. has been having a heavy run on "Godiva" and "Renee". "19 Days" and "Vibrations" are also getting the sales treatment. The Supremes are beginning to happen with their "Hanging On" and "Hazel" keeps chalking up sales. The Monkees and Stones top the pop LP sales and "Sound of Music" and "Dr. Zhivago" remain as consistent sellers.

(Ed: Perhaps if you would check the date of Issue your picks were included, you would find that the time we get around to printing your picks is the same week received. RPM is mailed each Thursday and according to post office officials should arrive at most centres in Canada by the following Monday, which is the date of issue. Some Los Angeles subscribers receive their copy of RPM on the issued date which is four days after actual mailing. Perhaps a check with your local Postmaster might speed matters up some. Local authorities are checking here.)

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publicity and a WHOPPING big 30% for personal management. That means, the total percentage some groups must pay out to stay in business is 60% and the 40% left doesn't leave enough operating capital to...operate.

Meanwhile the groups who aren't paying the high percentages just aren't getting the work. By the establishment's own admittance, the agreements signed by the groups are referred to as "slave contracts", and that "groups will sign anything if they feel they are on the winning side".

Toronto's five four-track studios want and need the extra label work and will need it more when the studio scene starts to get more competetive. The added dollars in bookings that come from hit records will have to be forgotten by the groups who aren't being recorded. U.S. sessions haven't proven to be the magic door opener that will ensure a Canadian group, air play.

What happens now? Is this the end of the proud "MUSIC CAPITOL" label that Toronto has been wearing for the past two years? It could be all over for the "TORONTO SOUND".



I think it would add to the polish of programmers to just PLAY it. I think your foreign programming services will agree with me.

IT IS INTERESTING that the Stacattos record of "Let's Run Away" was greeted only warmly by Canadian programmers but got RAVES in the foreign trade papers and confidential reports. Just proving that Canadians won't swing with a good Canadian production. 'Nuff Said!!!

THE WORDS PERSONAL MANAGER start to have a funny ring to them in the Cananian scene. I think someone should write
