VANCOUVER'S HAIDA GETS OFF NATIONALLY

Haida, Canada's newest label, has aimed its promotion guns east of the Rockies, a rare happening for a Vancouver-based company. Headed up by Keith Lawrence with promotion handled by Ray Pettinger, Haida, had originally made plans to accommodate Chilliwack but because of unforseen circumstances the popular West Coast group was dropped. They have, instead, gone with Valdy, Spring and Stallion Thumrock. Valdy was the first off with product and looks good with "A Rock & Roll Song", produced by former Chilliwacker Claire Lawrence in Los Angeles. The other two groups are expected to be off with product shortly.

Pettinger moved east through the nevernever land and surprisingly enough found a warm welcome and an open door policy at most MOT Canadian radio stations. He was able to establish good contacts and chart and playlistings for Valdy. An album by Valdy is now in the works with a hoped for September release.

Valdy has received the nod from West Coast critics, another rare happening. Jeani Read, one of the most influential columnists in Vancouver, wrote: "everyone has a friend that reminds him of Valdy: a hopeful sad idealistic realist of a bearded, messianic gentle fellow, given to chuckles and sudden bitter ironics. He sings songs that are plain and kind and cutting with an eye for paradox and a quick wit. It is easy to love him, and the audience in the Gardens did." Jeani was referring to Valdy's concert at Vancouver's Gardens where he shared the bill with Uriah Heep and Buckwheat. A performance at the Jubilee in

MONTREAL STUDIO GOES COMPUTER

Montreal's Studio Six has become the first recording facility in Canada to be operational with a computer-controlled mixing system. Tagged the Olive Automated Remix Programmer, the unit functions as both a memory device and a creative tool.

The new unit ties in well with Studio Six's recently revamped set-up which includes a sixteen track recorder. According to Studio Six Manager, Judy Gray, the studio is now gearing its operations almost exclusively to sixteen track recording with automated remixing.

Response from clients in the Montreal area has been reported as most favourable.

Valdy is 26 years of age, rather late to be making his record debut, but he obviously enters the disc race with a sound and mature knowledge of the business he is getting into. He's been a professional musician for about eight years, getting off on ethnic folk music while attending St. Pats University in Victoria. He has also gone the route of rock and rhythm and blues.

After university he worked for the City of Victoria designing sewage and drainage systems but chucked this for a small farm just outside the city, where he raises chickens and cats and grows enough vegetables to keep him going. The life of a farmer inspires Valdy on his hunt for the right lyrics for the right music. His "Rock & Roll Song" is an example:

"Play me a rock and roll song I've had it to here with your flowers & beads Play me a rock and roll song Or don't play me no song at all Well if I played you a rock & roll song It wouldn't be fair cause my head isn't there So I'll leave you with your rock and roll songs And make my way back to the country."

CHARLOTTETOWN'S "BALLADE" PRODUCES HIT MATERIAL

Far from the madding crowd, on the seacoast of Prince Edward Island, there is a Canadian cultural centre fast taking its place as the spawning ground of theatre for Canadians, by Canadians and about Canadians. The Charlottetown Summer Festival, which takes place at Confederation Centre has already given us "Anne of Green Gables" and this year, critics are raving over their presentation of "Ballade", a new Canadian musical. Michael Conte with lyricist Arthur Samuels supplied the compelling material for the six love ballads. Both Samuels and Conte are from Montreal.

Having another go at the stage, and this time coming out on top, is Vancouver-born Roma Hearn. Critics tag Miss Hearn as the "leading light" of "Ballade". Also receiving the nod from critics were Dennis Thatcher and Douglas Chamberlain. The latter portrays a deaf mute and comes up with a mindbending solo mime sequence with orchestra accompaniment.

There is no news at time of writing but it is expected that with the excellent acceptance of "Ballade" will come news of a soundtrack release.

NOLAN CERTIFIES FOR GOLD IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Dick Nolan has scored a first for the Canadian record industry. His RCA album, "Fisherman's Bay" has certified for Canadian Gold from sales in his home province of Newfoundland alone. VOCM's John Murphy reported breakout action on the "Aunt Martha's Sheep" cut from the album in last week's RPM resulting in exceptional sales across the Island.

However, it was not known until this week how widespread the sales were. Bernie McKinley, sales manager of Crawford Music Sales, (St. John's) reported the album as having surpassed the 50,000 units sold mark (Aug. 8). That same day, through Telex, he reported an additional 10,000 of the album ordered along with 3000 of the 8 track configuration.

Ed Preston, national promotion manager for RCA, has rush released a special single of "Aunt Martha's Sheep" for radio use only, and is preparing a national campaign to move the album across the country.

CAPITOL'S TOMMY GRAHAM ON PROMO TOUR OF EUROPE

Tommy Graham, making a strong bid for the charts with his most recent Capitol single release, "After The Gold Rush", is just completing a promotion and gig tour of Europe. His last date took him to Munich and the Olympics for a two week engagement. He has been appearing with Moose Knuckle Groovband who are set for an album release on Capitol Canada by mid-September.

While in Europe Graham met with several record execs including Martin Kleinjan, chief executive of Bovema Records, Holland's EMI company. It's expected that he will have an album release in Holland the latter part of August. Also slated for release are album and single product in the UK, Holland, Germany and Scandinavia.

TOP CANADIAN ACTS MAKE WESTERN GAINS

Three of Canada's top groups, Brave Belt, Dr. Music and Ocean have just completed a successful tour through Saskatchewan with the help of Lorne Horning, who made all the tour arrangements.

Ocean did so well at Bob Madowich's Red Lion Inn in Saskatoon they will be returning for another week (Aug 15). Their current single "One More Chance" receiving top play. Dr. Music's four day tour, Prince Albert, Saskatoon, Moose Jaw and Regina saw them pull excellent houses.

Brave Belt, presently on the lookout for a new label, completed a strong tour that took them to Saskatoon, North Battleford, Prince Albert and Greenwater Provincial Park. CKOM featured a "live" interview of the group, airing several cuts from their Reprise album

Promotion, Publicity & Public Relations

It's surprising how many record companies receive all the mileage, they deserve, in RPM, while others manage very little, or none at all. The same goes for radio stations.

The answer, of course, is Promotion, Publicity and Public Relations. Every company,



suposedly, has someone in charge of tooting their horn. But in many cases, there just isn't the activity one might expect from the department that should look for press.

In most cases, press releases are very few. Photos are scarce and when they do come in they are a printer's nightmare. Polaroids, colour or black and white, snapshots, black and white, photographs out of newspapers

etc. The more "tuned-in" promotion man knows that 8X10 glossies make for the best reproductions in an offset publication. Personal visits to the RPM offices are becoming almost non-existent by some promo reps of record companies.

On the other hand there are companies that can sneak a story into RPM on the Telex at the last minute and read about it in a couple of days. There are a few promo men who send their photos over by cab the day after the event was photographed.

For many years, the record industry in Canada suffered from and complained bitterly about the lack of a print medium. RPM supplied this medium, but the input has been a long time coming.

Industry-oriented press releases are often sent to the dailies. Time and money are wasted sending out an enormous radio station mailing, when a well worded press release to RPM could have resulted in a story being conveyed to the same people with a nil cost factor.

RPM has a nose for news, and we ferret out about 25% of the stories, but depend on press releases for the other 75%. News from Vancouver or Halifax is slow to reach us - by word of mouth. But, a press release could do the trick. This is where PP&PR is handy for the company with something to say to the industry.

What's trade news? A new act going into the studio for a recording session; a staff change or addition to; a label acquisition; the opening of a new retail outlet; or a radio station policy change.

It's quite easy to miss a story that hasn't been brought to our attention. Supplying details on the phone can turn out to be disastrous. The best means of conveying news to the trade press is through a press release. For those of you who can afford it Telex is fast, safe and fairly cheap and affords the safety valve necessary in dealing with matters that could involve legal entanglements. RPM's Telex No. is 06-22756 (Published each week in RPM on page 4, along with other important information).

In view of RPM operating like a tip sheet with ads, we lockup every Thursday morning. The record business is a minute by



minute business and it is therefore neccessary for us to accept ads and stories up until the last minute. However, we do have to work toward a deadline and too often story material arrives just as we are locking in making it impossible to include in that particular issue - or an ad will create a similar problem and end up in a bad position.

Ad deadlines are Tuesdays at noon. However, it is possible for us to make exceptions - to a certain point. Ad agencies have the right idea and some record company promotion men should take note. They reserve their ad ahead of time, giving the size etc. Copy and layout arrives by 5 PM Tuesdays giving sufficient time to process the ad properly. Booking ads early comes under the heading of public relations.

DONALD K DONALD GAINS NEW CANADIAN AUDIENCES

In a move to strengthen his image throughout Eastern Canada, Don Tarlton, wbo heads up Donald K. Donald Productions, sent out a unique Canadian package for dates throughout the Atlantic Provinces and Quebec. Groups used in the package were April Wine, Mashmakhan and newly discovered Mahogany Rush.

April Wine have become well known across Canada with their recent record releases, particularly their current Aquarius single, "Bad Side Of The Moon". Mashmakhan, who recently went through a personnel change, have made good strides with their Columbia release, "Ride Johnny Ride".

Seventeen dates in the Maritimes brought about good to excellent houses with the same number of dates and success in the province of Quebec. The latter was somewhat unique in that their audiences were predominantly French Canadian yet they were able to draw capacity houses.

Tarlton's next move is into the plum of the record buying market - Ontario. He will be working with Bill Smith who recently completed the successful thirtythree day tour arrangements for Capitol's Edward Bear.

Much of the success of Tarlton's eastern package was due the efforts of DKD's advance field man, Bill Smith. It was Smith's job to move ahead of the tour, prepping radio and press people. Smith will do the same for the Ontario tour.



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LAWSON COOK SUPPLIES WELCOME CHANGE

RPM's most recent addition, Classical Recommendations by Lawson Cook, has been highly acclaimed by programmers and record promotion execs from coast to coast in Canada. Many have expressed delight in this "welcome change" from the constant drumbeating of rock and pop music and have requested a profile on Mr. Cook, which follows.




Mr. Cook's musical education includes studies at the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto - studying piano with Hayunga Carman and Alberto Guerrero, and harpsichord with Greta Kraus. He obtained his A.R.C.T. and went on the complete his studies in London England at the Royal College of Music with British pianist Kathleen Long. While in the UK he performed several times for British sculptor Sir Jacob Epstein and gave recitals at the College of St. Mark and St. John. On returning to Canada he gave several recitals at the Royal Conservatory and the Art Gallery of Toronto as well as performing more than 40 times in concerts sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of West Toronto.

Having a sound knowledge of the Classics, Mr. Cook became involved in recorded music, generally, and opened his own Promenade Music Centre in the heart of Toronto, which he operated for several years. He quickly gained a wide reputation for his knowledge of recorded music, both popular

and classical. He also became involved in the promotion of Canadian artists through Tamarac, and was successful in producing several recordings released on Capitol. These included recitals by Canadian pianist Margaret Ann Ireland and Canadian classical saxophonist Paul Brodie.

Finding himself in the centre of a reconstruction program by the City of Toronto, Mr. Cook was forced to close his doors. He became Manager of the Classical Department of A&A Records during which time many radio stations, libraries and musical organizations from across Canada, sought his advice in planning and programming. He went on to join the staff of the newly formed Berandol Music Publishers Ltd. (formerly BMI) and took over as editor of the Microfiche Division (Trade name: MUSIcache).



It was Mr. Cook's responsibility to compile a basic library of standard music on microfiche, which contained over 90,000 pages of music. He also resear ched a Canadian supplement for this libr ary consisting of more than 200 major works by Canadian composers. It was during his tenure with Berandol that Mr. Cook gained a wide knowledge of the music publishing business.

Mr. Cook has written musical reviews and articles for several Toronto newspapers and periodicals (including The Globe and Mail and The Canadian Music Educator). He occasionally compiles riotes to accompany records for Rococo Reicords, Toronto.

KINGSTON KICKS OFF TERCENTENARY SONG FEST

The city of Kingston will, during 1973, celebrate their 300 year anniversary, hopefully with an appropriate Canadian theme. They are now in the midst off promoting their Tercentenary Celebrations and have offered \$500 as a first prize for the winning song. There will also be three consolation prizes of \$50. each.

Headed up by Chairman Andrew K. Marshall, who is also station manager of CFRC Radio (Queen's University) the Tercentenary song contest is being touted across Canada with cut off date set at September 30, 1972. Those wishing to enter the contest should attempt to encompass Kingston's points of historical interest, available at any library, along with its importance in the economical structure of Canada, Besides being the major link between Canada's two largest cities, Montreal and Toronto, Kingston has retained much of its pioneering character. Many of the old granite buildings still remain. Even the landscape has been relatively unchanged by progress.

Entries to the contest must be adaptable to 30 and 60 second jingle length as well as for a 45 single, vocal or instrumental. Should the winning entry be used commercially, additional royalt ies will be paid the writer. Control of the vinning entries will become the right of the: Kingston Tercentenary Committee.

Music and lyrics, both original must be included with each entry. Team entries will be accepted but no music without lyrics, or vice-versa, will be considered. Manuscripts or tapes should be accompanied by a letter certifying originality of material.

LEGRIS LOOKING AFTER MCA QUEBEC PROMO

Michel Legris is responsible for MCA's promotional efforts in the province of Quebec, contrary to a recent RPM story which had him placed as assistant to Quebec sales manager, Marcel Ledoux. 

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The Battle of Queenston Heights revisited

Rumblings from down south would seem to indicate the Canadian press has not been doing its job properly. Seems some wayward papers, RPM included, have been accusing the United States of economic protectionism. Damn the very though t say our American



providers and protectors. We are here, after all to serve and protect the free world, to provide a global marketplace for the free exchange of goods, ideas and weapons. We take your raw material, your power and your water, turn it into some usuable commodity or other and return it to you for only the cost of our labours and technology. Canadians, miserable ingrates that they are, doin't seem to see the true light, they accuse the southern benevolents of stealing our land, our water, our minerals, our best people. They say that the door is closed to them, when they try to recoup a buck or two.

Understandably, the Arnericans are upset. It seems that the only friends they have left are in Peking, and who knows, if the ping pong business goes into recession, what will happen? So now is the time to reassure worried neighbours. But they do have a rather strange way of going about it, taxing our miserable few exports with the result that they become non-competitive in the American marketplace, putting our performers through incredible complication if they want to play a date in Buffalo. But, doubtless they know what is right for us. They've never been wrong yet in running another country, have they?

The United States has a lot of problems and we should be more sympathetic. What with communists running about loose all over the place, oil republics demanding a piece of the action on their natural resources and the Viet Nam war winding down and throwing American industry out of kilter, they have enough problems without us adding to them. And just where the hell do we get off, forcing Canadian radio stations to play thirty per cent Canadian junk music? Just think about that piece of government meddling for a minute. Look at the implications: the maximum amount of American music they could play is seventy per cent. Talk about protectionism! Perhaps to try and patch up our failing friendship, Pierre could work out a deal with Dick whereby American radio stations be allowed to play

no more than seventy per cent Canadian music. Of course our programmers would be up in arms, saying that the Americans were only playing thirty per cent of their own stuff because they had to. The more nationalistic beavers would flap their tails up and down yelling that the Americans were restricting us to only seventy per cent of their air time, but fair is fair. I think overtures should be made immediately to arrange this. We cannot take advantage of the United States in this manner any longer and retain clear consciences.

We accuse them of protectionism, ha! When was the last time we allowed an American to own a broadcast license in Canada? After all, it is American culture the licenses are used to promote, and they could obviously do a better job at that, than Eskimos or Indians or whatever. And let's not forget the really big bucks. Do you know that an American is not permitted to own a chartered bank in this country? How ridiculous can you get, the chartered banks are one of the biggest lenders of capital to foreign concerns taking over Canadian companies, and we have a bunch of Canadians at the helm.

The whole situation is idiotic. Let's get rid of all this Canadian protectionism before we start complaining about American protectionism. But you know, there is a subtle difference; their's works, ours doesn't.

This past month over forty thousand kids rallied to what they called Explo '72, and for one solid werek under the guidance of Dr. Billy Graham listened to rock music and testimony by such people as Johnny Cash and Kris Kristofferson as they proclaimed their faith in this man called Jesus. Through such conventions as these Gospel music is having rebirth after rebirth as the Jesus movement sweeps across our nation.

Although the summer months usually cut down on the entour age of one niters performed by such gospel groups at The Revelations, The M: sters Trio, The

COLIN BUTLER SIGNED FOR WWVA JAMBOREE

Colin Butler, the eleven year old Ottawa country singer, has been signed for September 9th and October 7th appearances on "Jamboree USA". Negotiations were completed between Colin's manager, Bill Oja and Jamboree director, Glen Reeves.

Colin, tagged "Canada's young singing sensation", will have the added support of six busloads of Canadians, arranged by Oja and Travelways' Bus Services. The buses will leave Friday, September 8th at 9PM and return the following Sunday at 6PM.

Just released is Colin's initial album for the Marathon label. The set includes his own penning of "The Pepe Song" (about the family dog), "Rose of Romance", written by his mother, Elsie Butler, and "Big Wheels", from Allan Capson of Moncton. The first album off the presses was presented to Bob Dalton, referred to as "Canada's country music amabassador". The album sessions taped at Sound Canada Studios (Toronto) were produced by Bill Oja and Marathon's Doug Taylor. Back up musicians included some of Canada's best country pickers: Mickey McGivern (lead guitar), Eddy Poirier (rhythm guitar), Steve Smith (steel), Bobby Munro (piano), Andy Greatrix (bass), and Billy Wilson (drums).

Ottawa's favourite son, Cockburn, is currently warming in the glow of a very favourable response trom the European journalists who witnessed his Maple Music Junket performance. He was also a big winner at the recent CBS (Columbia) Convention, which was held in the UK. This exposure of his disc product plus his being picked by the MMJunketeers as the star attraction, has made him a must for a European tour.


Much has been written about Cockburn, which accounts for his success. He is perhaps the most successful word-of-mouth recording artist in Canada. He has received excellent exposure on the MOR stations and has become a favourite of FM progressive programmers, but he hasn't quite broken the ice with the MOTers. It's expected that with a well publicized national tour under his belt, he could be discovered as an all format recording star.

Somebody out there must know who Bruce Cockburn is - the Canadian music industry voted him Top Folk Singer of the year for the past two years (RPM Juno Awards). He is currently chalking up good sales with his "Sunwheel Dance" album.



Deegan supplies new concept

Rick Deegan, a graduate of anything and everything that has to do with music, has put together a unique colour cable show that should be of interest to those record companies looking for the last word in promotion. Using Metro Cable, which serves more than sixty thousand homes in the metropolitan Toronto area, Deegan, on his own hook, produces thirty and sixty minute "Tops of the Pops" and gab show productions. This rather difficult method of television communication has been mastered quite handily by Deegan, who has made a study of the Canadian music industry and has become exceptionally knowledgeable of Canadian recording artists.



As Deegan puts it, his show was designed to "review, in a personal way, musicians appearing in clubs and concerts about Toronto with an emphasis on Canadian artists appearing in town." His program involves news releases, bios and montages of artists. This offers viewers an entertainment package of what's taking place, musically, in Toronto on a weekly basis. Deegan is also experimenting with interviewing artists and those in the industry. First on tap was Dom Troiano, who has just released his solo album on the Mercurv label. The exposure Trojano received was quite invaluable as Deegan's "Out-a-Space" programme is televised during prime time 6PM.

Deegan has taken a trade/consumer approach in his programming. As an example, one of his earlier shows showcased Capitol's Christopher Kearney. After supplying pertinent information on Kearney, he played a cut from the two Capitol album, while the camera panned the album and available photo material. It was also noted that Kearney was appearing at Grumbles that particular week....an unprecedented and valuable free promotion for artist, label and club.

It's interesting to note that Deegan first

became interested in attempting a programme such as "Out-a-Space" during his last year at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute. Being that he was taking the Radio and Television Arts course, he became quite familiar with the thirty per cent Canadian content ruling as laid down by the Canadian Radio-Television Commission. His first on-air position was with CKOX, Woodstock, Ontario. In view of the thirty per cent ruling, he found himself listening very hard to Canadian recordings, much of it in the folk and rock bag, and found he was discovering excellent sounds. Because of this he was able to expand his program from thirty to fifty per cent, without any tune-out problems.

Deegan's second year at Ryerson brought him face to face with cablevision and Ritchie Yorke. He produced a show dealing with Yorke's role as a writer and concerned promoter of Canadian music, which was subsequently televised over the three largest cable systems in Toronto. About the same time, Deegan was putting together a session with writer/performer Paul Grady along with two members of Anne Murray's back-up band, Miles Wilkinson and Bill Speer, among others. Unfortunately, the talents of Grady would probably never have become known outside his own circle of friends, unless he managed an album release. This disturbed Deegan, who made a mental note that should he be successful in producing his own series on cable, he would offer an outlet to those who have "not yet emerged musically, due to the somewhat

McLAUCHLAN/DIAMOND BOTH HAVE "CHILDSONG"

Steve Love of David Rosner Music Co. (New York) has advised that Neil Diamond is the composer of "Childsong", the flip of Liz & The Kids' recent Cynda single, "Moonshadow". RPM inadvertently reported in the July 1st issue of RPM that "Childsong" was penned by Murray McLauchlan. The July 15th issue of RPM in New MAPL Releases however, does credit the Cynda flip to Diamond with Prophet Music Inc-ASCAP as publisher.

It should be noted that McLauchlan did write "Child's Song" which is published by Oyster Music-ASCAP, handled by Grossart of New York. This side was recorded by George Hamilton IV and gained strong country chart action on its release on the RCA label. McLauchlan is now finishing up an album session in New York, after which a tour of the U.S. is in the offing.

Diamond, a favourite to Canadian audiences, just recently appeared to a sellout crowd at Vancouver's Pacific Colosseum. He is currently showing as a chart winner with his "Song Sung Blue" from his "Moods" album and will shortly release his follow-up single, "Play Me", also from the "Moods" set. confusing media acceptance of Canadian talent in Canada."

Tucking more knowledge and experience under his belt through hosting a St. James Town community televison show, "Fanfare", Deegan decided to take his idea to Metro Cable, who had won two awards for programming and had just recently purchased two new colour cameras.

Televising of the first "Out-a-Space" programme brought favourable response, particularly from programme manager, Bill Crampton. Since then, Deegan has produced several shows—all showing exceptional professionalism. There is however one problem facing Deegan, and that is being able to continue through financial support. He believes that what he is doing is a viable promotional vehicle for club owners and record companies but few have recognized the potential of such a program.

Metro are also convinced that what Deegan is supplying is "good news" to both the industry and his viewers and have agreed to hold a screening to bring record and club people up to date on "Out-a-Space". It should be noted that Metro will be expanding their coverage to 100,000 homes within the next few months. At their present standing of 60,000 homes, they are enjoying 2% penetration, which compared to CTV's 24% is considered to be very good. Should it be found financially possible to carry on with Deegan's venture, it is expected that "Out-a-Space" will be televised over the Rogers Cable System as well, which adds another 60,000 homes.

Programming "Out-a-Space" takes Deegan three or four days. He is involved in the production, writing, directing, research and hosting, which is turning into a full-time occupation.

ROLF KEMP SIGNS WITH RAINBOW COLLECTIONS

Rolf Kemp, originally discovered by Alexander Mair of Early Morning Productions, has been signed to Don McLean's Rainbow Collections firm. This New York production house was originally formed as an independent to work with United Artists as their distributing label. However, they have now expanded their operation so as to deal with several labels.

Kemp recently played Toronto's Riverboat along with John Prine and received good notices from local critics which served as a "welcome-back" bit for the talented young performer/writer. Allan Miller, who does promotion for Herb Garth & Associates, founding company of Rainbow Collections, flew into Toronto to catch Kemp's show and to set up whatever promotion he could for his new charge. Miller and Kemp have entered into a management agreement.

Kemp, born in Germany but who has lived most of his life in London and Toronto, will be produced by Ed Freeman, who has produced Don McLean, Tom Rush and Murray McLauchlan. The latter's session was just completed in New York for release on Bernie Finklestein's True North label.

It should be noted that Herb Garth has been Don McLean's manager for the past seven years - one of the main reasons for McLean's success. It was also his association with McLean that supplied him with the necessary insight to form and successfully sustain Rainbow Collections. Other signings to the production house include Janice Ian, Judy Clay (sister of Dionne Warwicke) and The Buckey Politicians. The latter just recently opened at a main stem bistro in Toronto.

COMMUNICATION FOUR MONTREAL – SEPT 9 & 10

WHITTAKER/LEE INTEREST IN CANADIAN MATERIAL

Two major international artists, Roger Whittaker and Byron Lee, have expressed an interest in recording albums composed of CAPAC material only. The CAB-CAPAC Committee, through Jan Matejcek, has advised its publishers, asking that a maximum of three compositions be submitted to each artist, which would ensure all submissions being considered.

Whittaker, an RCA recording artist, has gained much fame in Canada, particularly with the MOR stations. His most recent trip to Toronto saw him taping a session for the CBC-TV's "Tommy Hunter Show". He is expected to tour Canada next year. Whittaker is completely bilingual, releasing in both English and French.

Lee was one of the first people to introduce Reggae to Canada. It's interesting to note that he and his band arranged and performed on Paul Simon's two latest releases. His band, which includes Vic Taylor, Barry Biggs and Hopeton, is completely versatile and handles anything from Reggae to rock to ballads, instrumentally and vocally.

OTTAWA'S GILLIS HOSTS CBC SUMMER FESTIVAL

Ottawa born Kevin Gillis has been signed to headline and host the CBC's Summer Festival for July 28-29. The show was taped at the Camp Fortune site and will be broadcast across Canada on the CBC radio network (AM & FM).

Gillis, a noted pop performer, used all his own material during his session. He has just recently signed an exclusive publishing agreement with Chappell Music along with a recording contract with producers Steve Tyrell and Al Gorgoni. The latter also handle B.J. Thomas and Barry Mann. Tyrell is Gillis' manager.

The CBC supported Festival, running through July and into mid-August, showcases talent from across Canada as well as many of the big names in the international music scene, including Kris Kristofferson, Sergio Mendes and Lionel Hampton. The Festival moves indoors in August to the National Arts Centre in Ottawa.

RCA PROVIDES PARABOLIC ANTENNA FOR SATELLITE

RCA Limited has provided a major component in a system to transmit and receive colour and black and white television signals. The firm's contribution was the creation and erection of a giant ninety-one ton parabolic antenna to receive and transmit signals from a network of satellites orbiting over Canada.

RCA has also provided the receiving and transmitting equipment for the system. It is eventually planned to have the Allan Park, Ontario facility tie-in with a telephone and television system linking the southern part of Canada with the Arctic through two other stations, one at Frobisher Bay and the other at Resolute.

GUESS WHO READY FOR TORONTO FAIR DATE

Just prior to the appearance at the Toronto Fair, Nimbus 9's Guess Who appeared in concert at the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium (Aug. 2). The WInnipeg-based group now has two new members. Don McDougall and Bill Wallace, replacing Greg Leskiw and Jim Kale respectively. The latter, one of the original members of the Guess Who (10 years) has joined the Guess Who's management firm, Ear and Fist, headed up by Don Hunter.

Wallace has been a part of the Winnipeg music scene for several years and will have the opportunity to try his hand at writing for the Guess Who as well as singing lead on his own compositions.

The Guess Who have been off the chart scene for sometime, a rarity. Their last single release "Guns Guns Guns" unfortunately stiffed after a few weeks on the chart but their "Rockin" album which certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) had a successful run on the charts resulting in a top sales picture.



This Melodiya-Angel disc, now a winner of the Sonic Achievements Award, has just been reissued in Canada (it was withdrawn at the peak of its popularity - why we will never know). Simply a fantastic record - a brilliant arrangement by Rodian Shchedrin of music from Bizet's opera Camen, for strings and forty-seven percussion instruments. And believe it or not, you never miss the brass or woodwinds.

PILAR LORENGAR - PRIMA DONNA IN VIENNA Pilar Lorengar - Soprano - The Vienna Opera Orchestra conducted by Walter Weller London OS 26246-K

The artistry of this very popular Spanish soprano is displayed to great advantage in this programme ranging from Wagner's "Dich, teure Halle" from Tannhauser to operetta arias by Lehar, Zeller and Kalman. The plumb of the album is a beautifully sung performance of "Gluck, das mir verblieb" from Erich Korngold's opera Die tote Stad. Lorengar is joined by Arlene Auger in a magical duet from Richard Strauss' "Arabella".

ADAGIOS IMMORTELS Philips 6511001-K

Perhaps the best known Adagio of the nine on this disc will be the "Celebrated Adagio" by Albinoni and featured in the film score "Interlude". Samuel Barber's Adagio for Strings will be familiar to Ballet enthusiasts. "Adagios Immortels" is a collection of cuts from other Philips recordings. In addition to those mentioned, the album also contains two other adagios by Albinoni, the Adagio and Fugue by Mozart, two adagios by Francois de Boisvellee, the adagio from the film "L'adieu a Venise" by Marcello, and the Adagio with Flute by Padre Rafael Angels, featuring Jean-Pierre Rampal. A quiet, relaxing recording.

ROSSINI Stabat Mater

London Symphony Orchestra and Chorus conducted by Istvan Kertesz

London OS 26250-K

This superb performance of Rossini's Stabat Mater is headed by a most impressive list of soloists. Pilar Lorengar, Yvonne Minton, Luciano Pavarotti and Hans Sotin perform with splendid conviction. Pavarotti is brilliant in his aria "Cugus animam".

J.S. BACH Six Suites for Cello Solo Pablo Casals - Cellist Angel CB 3786-F

Formerly available as three separate discs on the Angel "Great Recordings of the Century" series, these historic performances are once again available in a specially priced three record set. Recorded between 1936 and 1939, the sound is remarkable. Thanks should go to Angel for releasing these performances in mono rather than re-channelled "bogus" stereo.



Promo men vs programming

In the midst of formats and balanced programming, one often wonders what value, a promo man is to a radio station. The stations that are frequently visited by the promo



guys wish they didn't see them as much, while those very seldom seeing a promo man, which they would come around more often.

Obviously the record companies see a real use for the promo man and his expense account. No matter how much of their product they have on the charts, the promo man wants more. If the entire playlist was mde up of his product only, the promo man would probably ask that the playlist be made bigger.


Promotion in the early days was a great art. The industry was exciting because of a lack of good product and when a promo man

VOCM GETS OFF ON CANADIAN ARTISTS

VOCM St. John's is perhaps one of the most promotion-minded radio stations in Canada. Under the direction of programme director, Johnny Murphy, one of the original boosters of Canadian talent, the station has maintained an open door policy for all recording acts and somehow found room on their playlist and charts for most releases. Newfoundland has become a must for touring and much of this public acceptance of Canadian acts is due the nationalistic goings on at most of the Island's radio stations.

Considered an important breakout market in Canada, St. John's through VOCM would appear to influence the rest of the Island. Sales of records, through MacNeil's Record





walked in with a good record, the record very often would go on the air while he was still at the station. There was an excitement to being a promo man. There were fewer records to work, and the promo man picked his best and made his pitch.

The record librarian (because we are talking about the period before music directors) would welcome the promo man and listen to his new records. The disc jockey would also have a listen. If the record had the goods to make the turntable, the decision was made right there.

I don't think radio had less listeners per capita. I don't think listener's tastes have become more discriminating. I think the system created itself and the present procedure is just something that came from programming being more of a science. There are few record librarians now who have a say in programming. Disc jockeys have had less and less to say as the system gradually turned all the decisions over to

Service, adds credence to the importance, and necessity of radio play. The most recent blockbuster, and a left field sound for an MOT station, is Dick Nolan's budget priced RCA Camden album, "Fisherman's Bay" VOCM leaned on the cut "Aunt Martha's Sheep" and the response has been just short of phenomenal, Program Director John Murphy lays down the success of the station to "the community spirit prevalent in the station's programming". The Nolan cut is an example. Although not particularly suitable for the CHUM's or CKLW's, Nolan is a Newfoundlander and airing the single along with product like "Concrete Sea" by Terry Jacks and Marty Butler's "Time" has given the station that "personalized" feeling. Murph is doing it with Con Archer's "Robbin' The Cradle", a country folk single that, according to all the San Francisco and Los Angeles prophets should create heavy heavy tune-out. Not so, in the case of VOCM who maintain an exceptionally high rating among the 18 to 49 age group.

A little bit of Murphyism: "If more programmers across Canada relied on their own programming tastes we would end up as leaders not followers."

VOCM recently presented Polydor's Bells in two concerts at St. John's Arts & Culture Centre. Both shows drew capacity houses proof of the power of "community spirited radio". the music director.


The industry trades were the guide line to programming. Programming consultants were an unknown entity. Record sales were tabulated and jukebox plays were counted and requests showed what the public wanted to hear. Each region would have a distinctive group of records that they would play. If the record scored on all counts, it became a hit. If it continued to climb, the record would become top ten. If the sales showed it, the record would become a million seller.

The trade hasn't really changed much, but the job of the promo man has. In areas where hits can't be made, the promo man is little more than a messenger boy. In many cases the promo man can acquire the power to have himself and his record heard. There is always the chance that the music director will take a flyer on a new record by a new group. If the music director takes a chance and the record makes the grade, a hit is broken. I guess that's the way records get made these days, but there is no definite proof that this IS the case. But, records do break and do become hits. Someday we may figure out, how (if the radio industry lets us in on the secret).

Until then you can take my word for it, the promo man's job is a hard one and I know because I got my start in the record business as a promo man, but that was in the good old days ('62 and '63).
