A&M READIES CAMPAIGN FOR FALL PRODUCT

A&M's Fall Product campaign will feature Quad LPs and 8 tracks from several of their top sellers. Off already and showing early indications of capturing strong sales are Carole King's "Music" and "Come From The Shadows" by Joan Baez.

Cat Stevens is expected back to Canada and a tour of North America in the Fall. He is currently riding high on the RPM 100 Albums Chart with his "Teaser & The Firecat" set which certified for Canadian Gold several months ago. It's expected that A&M will have a new Stevens' album to coincide with his upcoming tour.

Haida recording artist, Valdy, is making good gains up the charts with his "Rock and Roll Song" which could become a national best seller if he extended his concert circuit to include the central and eastern provinces.

POLYDOR HOLDS MEET IN ST. MARGUERITE

Polydor's Fall planning workshop and "a new peak in group communication" were highlights at their recent Sales Convention at the Alpine Inn in St. Marguerite, P.Q. On hand for the four day meet was the entire sales, promotion and executive staff of Polydor Canada Inc.

The convention featured slide presentations by the Sales Department and Label Chief and a 40 minute colour film prepared by Allan Katz, National Promotion Director.

Workshops, conferences and midnight work sessions were spiced with entertainment by Polydor artists, Joey Gregrash (new spelling), Pelo andMax Swerling? Final dinner and closing ceremonies, hosted by Barclay Records, introduced the gathering to Robert Charlebois who was coaxed into an impromptu song routine.

It's expected that Polydor will mount a full scale promotion across Canada to introduce English Canadians to Charlebois with his latest album from which his successful single "Conception" was culled. Charlebois will criss-cross Canada on the promotion tour at which time it's expected he will release an English language single.

It's been reported that several promoters are attempting to set up dates for the duo to tour Canada once again.

Lani Hall, former lead singer with Brasil '66 for the past six years, has gone solo. Her initial album release "Sundown Lady" was produced at A&M's Los Angeles Studios by Herb Alpert.

Carole King, represented on the RPM 100 Albums Chart with "Tapestry" and "Music" will begin filming her television special in October. A&M will launch a major promotion campaign to coincide with the televising of the special.

The Blue Haze single, "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes", a steady climber on the RPM 100 Singles Chart, is to be released in the U.S. The release is due the efforts of A&M's Canada crew who were instrumental in capturing several principal and breakout markets to get the single moving.

KAGAN KEEPS JAZZ ALIVE IN MONTREAL

A concentrated effort by Montreal promoter Sheldon Kagan, who heads up his own Superior Sound Enterprises (SSE) has kept jazz alive in Montreal and has influenced the growing jazz community. Part of his success was his series of super jazz concerts held at Place des Arts last season which attracted thousands to see "the creme de la creme" of the jazz world appearing in their city.

Continuing his booking of the heavies, Kagan booked in a Jazz Extravaganza at the Salle Wilfrid Pelletier (Place des Arts) which headlined The Woody Herman Orchestra and the Modern Jazz Quartet. The Sept. 3rd, one show only was a giant success. Kagan has already tentatively booked many of the world's leading exponents of jazz for future dates, to be announced.

BLACK ARTIST DISC SALES ON INCREASE IN THE U.S.

There has been a notable increase in record sales of black artists in the U.S. which has somewhat influenced other countries, but not necessarily in sales. Both Cash Box and Billboard and most of the U.S. tipsters: Gavin, Rudman, Randall and others have long shown a high percentage of chart action for black artists, much of it coming from Tamla Motown and Stax. This was primarily in the singles market, but reports have it that album sales by black artists have shown an increase.

Canada has followed the lead of the U.S. tipsters with programmers leaning heavily on black artists shown as top potential by U.S. disc prophets. Sales haven't necessarily followed although there is good market in Canada for "live" black concerts.

Top buck makers from the black market are Roberta Flack, Joe Tex, Joe Simon, the Jackson Five, and just recently the Cornelius Bros. and Sister Rose.

LIGHTHOUSE SETS NEW GATE AT TORONTO FORUM

By actual count, GRT's Lighthouse broke all attendance records at the Ontario Government's lakefront showplace, The Forum (Aug 9). The figure, in excess of 14,000, was conveyed to GRT's Marketing Manager, Larry Green by Len Casey, Director of Programming for the Forum. In fact Casey was so excited by the group's draw and performance he sent off the following telegram: "Congratulations to Lighthouse for breaking all attendance records at the Forum. The crowd response was fantastic and Lighthouse was absolutely brilliant."

Even Toronto pop critics have taken a new and healthier approach to Canadian talent. Robert Martin, writing in the Globe, noted: "the strength of the group lies not only in its blasting hard rock numbers but also in its versatility. The presence of a string and a brass section enable the band to produce softer music without losing any of the complexity of sound that is its hallmark." The Toronto Sun's Bill Grav found Lighthouse have gone "far beyond the level of simple concerts; they're pageants, extravaganzas, complete with a very conscious sense of ritual on the part of both the band and its audience." The Toronto Star condescended to note that the audience was high on Lighthouse, rare reporting.

The GRT big buck maker are now off on a tour of Western Canada. Dates include Penticton (2), Calgary (7), Red Deer (8), Edmonton (9), Lethbridge Exhibition Pavilion (10), Saskatoon Centennial Auditorium (14), Regina's Centre of The Arts (15), Brandon's Western Manitoba Centennial Auditorium (16) and the Centennial Auditorium in Winnipeg (18). Dates have been tentatively set for Northern Ontario or California for the latter part of September and October.

RCA OFF WITH BELAFONTE LIVE

Jack Feeney's pride and joy, Harry Belafonte's Toronto produced album, "Belafonte Live" has been released to coincide with his Canadian tour. It was during one of Belafonte's performances at Toronto's O'Keefe that he expressed a desire to tape a "Live" session at the Toronto showplace. Feeney began working on the project and with RCA's mobile unit, producers John Cartwright and Jack Pleis and George Semkiw on the board, the session was underway. Guesting on the set are Letta Mbulu, Ella Mitchell and The Howard Roberts Chorale. Feeney takes executive producer credits.

The two record set includes his crowd pleasers: "Look Over Yonder", "Be My Woman, Gal", "Zombie Jamboree" and "Cut de Fire" and displays his unusual and exciting communication with his audience.

Belafonte kicks off his Canadian tour in Brantford (4), London(5), Kitchener (6), Peterboro (7), Oshawa (8), Sudbury (9), Montreal (12-17), Ottawa (19-24), Winnipeg (Sept. 26-Oct. 1), Saskatoon (3-5), and at Canada's most acoustically sound theatre, The Saskatchewan Centre of The Arts (6-8).

WORLD/CANADIAN TALENT LIBRARY - HEATING UP

Bob Stone's Shotgun-Gimme Holdings have released the latest Canadian Talent Library offering by the Laurie Bower Singers along with several releases recorded at Audío Atlantic Studios of Halifax.

The Laurie Bower set, "Morning Has Broken" contains some of the past chart biggies including the titler which became a hit for Cat Stevens; "Me & Julio Down By The Schoolyard", the Paul Simon giant; and Anne Murray's "Cotton Jenny", penned by Gordon Lightfoot. The Laurie Bower Singers are comprised of Kathy Collier, Lee Harris, Colina Phillips, Laurie Bower, Bill Misener and Brian Russell. Also included on the set is a Misener composition "How The Singers Sing", another Lightfoot song, "Pussywillows Cat-Tails" and Lee Roy's "Hold On To A Little Bit Of Love". The set was produced at RCA's Toronto Studios by George Semkiw with Ben McPeek doing the arranging and conducting. Musicians included on the session were: Red Shea, Brian Russell, George Semkiw, Jack Zaza, Bruce Farquhar, Zeke Sheppard, Al Brisco, Dick Smih and Ben McPeek.

Stone has been making good use of Audio Atlantic Studios, with much of the recording being released on his Audat label. Latest releases include: Ryan's Fancy with "Looking Back"; "Mr. Country Fiddle"/Bill Guest; "Make My Dreams Come True"/Frank Spinney and Ralph Vidito; "I Gotta Be Free"/Bob Harvey and The Pilgrims; Country Town Singers; Lee Cremo and The Eastern Variation; The Glorylanders from Nova Scotia; The Rising Sons; and The Pipes and Drums of the Antigonish Legion Pipe Band.

STAMPEDERS MAKE SONNY & CHER SHOW

Noted one observer, in her late teens, "Sonny & Cher were alright, but those Stampeders were just too much." How many of the record breaking audience of 25,000 who came to see the headliners, Sonny & Cher or the Stampeders could almost be ascertained by the shrieking and obvious total audience approval of the well paced and highly professional set by the Stampeders. Their big hit "Sweet City Woman" scored well with the crowd as did their current chart buster "Wild Eyes". Hopefully the Stampeders will hit hard with another world wide monster soon - "Sweet City Woman" has run its course. Anyway, they'll be into studios shortly prior to their European tour topped by a series of dates in the Argentine and Brazil.

Peter Goddard summed up the Sonny & Cher Grandstand appearance as "a matter of artfulness made to seem like artlessness."

The Stampeders have been scheduled as guest stars for CTV's "Rollin" series which kicks off its new season Monday Sept. 11 at 7:30 pm EDT. Hosting the show are Kenny Rogers and The First Edition. Also guesting will be Bill Withers. The Stampeders will perform their "Devil You" and "Sweet City Woman" hits and join in on "Smackwater Jack" with Withers, Rogers and the First Edition.

SHADOWFAX IN CONCERT AT ACTOR'S STUDIO

Shadowfax, a Toronto-based group being touted by Artie Kohn of Artko, have set Sept. 26 for the staging of an invitational concert at the Actor's Studio Theatre (Toronto). According to the press release, the group wants to bring all the people in Toronto's rock industry together to "give them an evening of knock-out music." It's hoped the evening will also attract A&R men looking for a group capable of "totally new sounds".

The group have been going through the usual disappointing trip: producing tapes etc., but not receiving any definite decisions from record companies, Andrew Thompson, leader of the group and the one who pens most of their repertoire explains that: "Until now, we've had to rely on audition tapes that were home produced over four months ago. Not only did we know nothing about recording at the time, but we had no one present who knew enough technically to actually capture the real sound," adding "you know, it's really hard for a group that's trying to make it to keep coming up with new tapes for people to hear; especially when you lack a backer." They are currently paying off their Moog and a set of tympani which somewhat limits their demo tape activities. Shadowfax are confident their concert will bring home their potential as a recording group - capturing their visual act. which they consider their selling point.

The concert will be made up of 90% original material with a sprinkling of material by Argent and Tchaikovsky. Shadowfax have a large plus through CHUM-FM's David Pritchard who has been airing their material on his late night show over the past few weeks.

WINNIPEG'S SPICE OFF WITH FRANKLIN SINGLE

Spice, a Winnipeg group formerly known as Sugar 'N' Spice and off the record scene for some time, have bounced back into action with their Franklin deck, "Just A Little Love" penned by Laurie Currie, group drummer. The flip, "Angeline" was written by Currie and organist Chuck Gorling. Franklin is distributed in Canada by London.

Comprised of Suzanne Morier, lead vocals; Brian Miessner; lead vocals and acoustic guitar; Phil O'Connell, lead guitar; Bob Walker, bass and vocals; and the two members mentioned above, Spice are just concluding a successful tour through Ontario which included: London's Brass Rail, the Coal Bin and Generator in Toronto, Harry's Hideaway in Oshawa and McMaster University. At time of writing they are playing Toronto's Penthouse (4-9) and at the Picadilly (11-16) before setting out on one niters in and around the Toronto area.

They have a session scheduled at Toronto's Manta Sound for the latter part of September with Lee de Carlo producing.

Prior to their trip into Ontario, Spice headlined Winnipeg's Get Together '72, which jammed the Portage Avenue street mall.


CANADA/U.S. MAGAZINE MAIL PROBLEMS SIMILAR

While many Canadian publishers have mounted a paper war with the Canadian Post Office over poor service, U.S. publishers are seeking an alternative for subscription deliveries. They are presently testing five separate systems. They have ruled out a separate delivery system as being too costly but are apparently in agreement over multiple delivery systems which would serve newspapers, direct mail advertisers, mail order retailers and sample operations.

In Canada and in the case of RPM, packaging, bagging and delivery to the Toronto Post Office terminal is completed each Friday, yet delivery takes up to two weeks. On the other hand, U.S. trade papers are delivered in Canada three to four days after mailing.

RPM has been subjected to many inconveniences in an attempt to increase the efficiency of the Post Office. Canadian centres receiving more than three copies are individually packaged and bagged. Special red tags indicating that the bagged contents are newspapers and should be regarded as important, have also been originated by RPM with no improvement in service. It has been suggested that RPM air express their statutory mailing to major mailing centres in each province. An investigation has revealed that those publishers who have adopted this practice are still not receiving proper service.

In view of the poor mailing service in Canada, RPM's first class subscribers have increased by more than 1/3 over the past few months.



CURTOLA RETURNED TO SANDS BY POPULAR DEMAND

Bobby Curtola, voted Canada's Top Male Vocalist (Juno Award 1965), has been returned to the Sands in Las Vegas by popular demand. Curtola was playing at Winnipeg's International Inn (Aug. 16-26) when his manager/agent, Maria Martell was contacted by the Hughes Organization and asked to bring Curtola back for an unusual tourist rush and a demand for the return of the popular young Canadian singing star. Curtola's contact with the Sands has been extended indefinitely. He made his Las Vegas debut, March 29 of this year and virtually took the entertainment strip by storm.

Joan Guertin, writing in the Vegas Visitor found Curtola: "a dynamic young Canadian who has everything going for him. He's a handsome lad with a gift for gab. His instant rapport with an audience is a sight to see. Even during a rehearsal his magnetism will generate audience attention." She added: "When you watch Bobby work, you know one thing for sure, that boy is earning every dime the Hughes Corporation is paying him. All in all Bobby Curtola is a total entertainer, and is destined to become an American as well as Canadian Superstar." The Hughes Nevada Preview noted: "Mr. Personality is one of the finest new talents to come through in recent years." The Las Vegas Review Journal reported: Bobby Curtola has received such rave notices, he has been held over indefinitely."

Curtola has gained many new friends in U.S. entertainment circles. Famous stars spotted in his audiences included Jimmy Durante, Desi Arnez, Pamela Mason, Jerry Vale, Joey Bishop, Don Adams, Sammy Davis Ir. They became so enthused over Curtola's delivery they joined him on stage and also did guest spots. Curtola and Miss Martell have also been included in the Hollywood clique with invites to cocktail parties thrown by Pamela Mason and others, It's expected he will announce shortly the purchase of a \$150,000 home in the Hollywood Hills. He hastens to point up however, that he won't be deserting Canada. This is where he got all the hard knocks and learned the business from the ground up. His past Canadian adventures at trying for the brass ring have paid off in his business-like manner of slipping into his new superstar role.

Last night's Toronto daily criticised the musical performance of a group, and they named the group. Time Magazine's movie review named a particular actor who hadn't come up to the reviewer's expectations.

NOW! Suppose a radio station refuses to play a record. That radio station is exercising their right of opinion. They aren't compelled, nor is it necessary for them to publicly state the record isn't worthy of play. They simply exclude (censor) that particular record from airplay — and silently make their comment or critique.

In the same way, RPM DOES print news and comment on the industries that we cover. If some radio station in Canada wishes to squeeze into the shoe of make believe radio station CRUD (pronounced CRUDE, we could only use four letters for obvious reasons) mentioned in last week's RPM, then I feel badiy that this station is suffering from a very bad case of exclusivity.

Once you get past the call leters CRUD pronounced CRUDE) we can discover that John Watts was actually suggesting a better rating system for radio, TELEVISION, MOTION PICTURES, RECORDS and countless other creative achievements. No doubt many of those radio and ad agency people, who got past the call letters CRUD (pronounced CRUDE) will agree with Watts' findings and that it's a forgone conclusion rating people are working on ways of improving their rating system. So, unfortunately CRUD (pronounced CRUDE) will have to suffer as part of the system - which could stand improvement. However, our thanks go out to CRUD (you know the rest) for permitting us to write what we thought was a very funny, but precise piece on ratings. Should the staff of radio station CRUD (got the message?) phone me collect -I would like to personally thank them.

SCHALLER'S "MANITOULIN" REGISTERS GOOD SALES

Arthur Schaller's "Momento of Manitoulin", produced and written by Schaller with Mike Graham as vocalist, has now exceeded the 2000 units sold mark. The album was released by Rodeo with Manitoulin Music (BMIC) as sole distributor of the album and sheet music of four of the ten songs contained on the set. The album, a tribute in song to Manitoulin Island, has become a tourist item in the famed holiday country.

Seven songs from the album were used in a half hour program, "Arthur Schaller — Songwriter of Manitoulin" over Sudbury's Channel 9 CKNC-TV with Gary Stevens producing. The show was televised twice, Aug. 1 and the 11th and featured an interview with Schaller with slides of Manitoulin Island providing the background for a scenic tour of the island.

POLYDOR REVIVES FAITH IN JOEY GREGRASH

Sporting a new spelling of his name, Joey Gregrash, and his manager Garth Campbell of The Blue Butterly Co. flew into the Alpine Inn (Quebec) to show off a new Gragrash, Campbell had brought along a tape of some of the final mixes from his new album which was produced by Ron Capone in Memphis, Gregrash and Campbell apparently had some trouble with the label the first part of this year but according to Campbell after a meeting with Frank Gould and Polydor's Canadian Director, Evert Garretson, "it was quite evident that a new spark had been lit in the Polydor organization." Gould has apparently started the works rolling for a Fall release and "is determined to make loey's new album one of Canada's top LPs of the year," according to Campbell.

Campbell also had extensive meetings with Polydor's national sales manager, Frank Henry, and national promotion Allan Katz, who assured him of a successful campaign for the Gregrash album release.

The Gregrash album with much of the material written by Gregrash and Ron Risko apparently shows a marked improvement and moves Gregrash into a slightly different direction. Says Campbell: "Polydor has been quick to recognize this and have taken the ball and begun to run with it."

COUNTERPOINT OFF WITH FIVE SINGLE RELEASES

Counterpoint, the Brantford Ontario based label, have released five singles by local groups and solo artists. Production on all singles was handled by Gerry Risser, president of Counterpoint Sound Corp. Ltd.

The release consists of "Smalltown Dilemma"/Nation, "The Unknown War"/Wayne Knights and The Branded Men, "Seven Dollar Gin, "My Love Is But A Word"/Jeremiah Peabody's Funky Little 3 Piece Band, and "Road To Nowhere"/Beau Key. The latter two qualify as Canadian A.P. while the rest are 100% Canadian content.

FILLMORE EAST SET FOR SEPTEMBER OPENING

New York's Fillmore East, which brought much fame but little fortune to BIII Graham, is to reopen under new management in September. The old rock emporium will again echo to the wailing sounds of amplified rock equipment. Graham has reportedly sold his east coast rock showcase to realtor Frank Morgenstern who believes he can revive that heavy era.

There have been no definite plans released to date other than the hall will be used for various activities encompassing rock programs. It's also expected the name will be changed.

GAS RELEASE FOR ROBERT BLYTH

Ottawa born Robert Blyth has been signed to the Avenue of America Recording complex who have bowed his initial single release, "There's Still Time". Both the plug side and the flip, "Roadman" were penned by Blyth with publishing handled by White and Black - BMI and Mark Logan - BMI.

The single is 100% Canadian content however there is no information as to what studios were used. Shel Safran produced.

Blyth fronted the Modern Rock Quartet which created a fairly strong image for itself throughout Upper Canada a few years ago and took the starring role in "Jesus Christ Superstar", the Canadian version which successfully toured much of Canada.

POLYDOR TO DISTRIBUTE NEW YORK'S MIRTHRA

Polydor Canada will distribute the New York-based Mirthra label. Polydor label chief, Frank Gould, announced the signing of the agreement. First product to be released under the arrangement is Bobby Callender's "The Way (First Book of Experiences)". The two record set was composed, produced and arranged by Callender. Polydor will aim special promotional attention towards universities and meditation groups.

CKLG PACKS STANLEY PARK WITH GOOSE CREEK SYMPHONY live rock and Led Zeppelin tapes for five

Vancouver's top pop critic, Jeani Read tagged it "the biggest, most positive outdoor event of the year". She was referring to CKLG's presentation of Capitol's Goose Creek Symphony at Stanley Park's Malkin Bowl.

The concert just about went by the boards due to interference by a competitive station. Apparently CKLG had been promoting their big outdoor show which was to take place at Alexander Park, a small grassy area near English Bay — close to a densely populated west end area of the city. The day before 'LG's concert the competitive station set up a sound system in Alexander Park and blew

Ilive rock and Led Zeppelin tapes for five hours. The Vancouver City Police and the Parks Board Office were kept busy handling complaints until they decided to cancel all concerts in the small park, including the well prepared Goose Creek gig. Station management and the Parks Board agreed after three hours of negotiation to allow CKLG the use of a larger area, outside the west end high rise district. The site was changed to the Malkin Bowl in Stanley Park.

CKLG bulletined the change of locale throughout Saturday evening and Sunday morning while their engineers worked through the night transferring the sound system to Stanley Park, Most of the station staff were up-tight about the shift in location and as

CKLG's Myles Murchison explained "We got pretty gung-ho about it, and that pressure brought out something good." The concert drew almost 10,000, far more than could have been accommodated at Alexander Park. Jeani Read, in reporting to her Vancouver Province readers, noted: "It was a space of a few hours when 'good-vibes' was much more than just a cliche — the kind of day when all it took was a request from a young girl to send a Kelly DeYong sound man scrambling up the tall scaffolding to rearrange speakers so that people over the hill could hear better."

Aftermath of the concert — the Parks Board banned "forever" amplified music in all city parks — with the exception of Malkin's Bowl in Stanley Park.





CHARLEBOIS HAS ENGLISH GROWING PAINS

It wasn't too long ago that Quebec Separatists boasted of the membership of Quebec's most popular "pepsi", Robert Charlebois. Being in showbusiness, and a highly lucrative one - French Canada, it was convenient, and gainful (financially) to be outspoken about the problems of the Quebecois. Charlebois apparently put into song the supposed discriminatory practices of the Anglo Canadians at a Northern Ontario lumber camp, toward the French Canadian. About the same time he was invited to perform at a Festival in Toronto, the heart of the "dreadful frog haters". There were no strings attached. He dld his own thing - and did it in French. What happened? He received a standing ovation and won over, completely, the "wicked" hearts of those discriminating Torontonians.

A couple of years have gone by since that event and Charlebois went on to gain favour not only in Quebec but in France as well. Unfortunately he was never exploited in English Canada — on the disc front. He did return to Toronto on a couple of occasions to "sold out" concerts which must have turned his head around, about the nasty hogtowners. On his last trip to Toronto he condescended to grant an interview with a

Toronto Star staff writer, Ian McDougall. This, in itself, was a new experience — for Charlebois, and certainly a rare exception for the Star.

Now, we are told, Charlebois wants to "get to" an English speaking audience and the best way he can do it is to record in English. Programmers have already had a taste of Charlebois "The Super Frog" with his "Conception" single and album. But now the real fight begins. One opinionated observer noted: "If he retains his French accent he has a chance, but if he goes the whole English route, they'll cancel him like a bad cheque."

He's got a lot going for him, this Charlebois. Guts, experience and a talent that should have no language barriers. He's ready to prove it with a session at Toronto's Manta Sound with Dave Green doing the board chores. Proof of the pudding will be "Hallowe'een In Hollywood". The single will be released on the Barclay label, distributed in Canada by Polydor. He returns to Toronto for a Massey Hall concert September 23, which will kick off his Canada/U.S. promotion tour.

Charlebois claims he doesn't mix politics with his showbiz career and apparently prefers the expression "Vive l'universe libre," which makes sense. After all, there's a lot of bucks to be made, if the English speaking countries are on your side.

BLUENOSE MUSIC SIGNS SUB-PUBLISHING DEALS

Greg Hambleton of Bluenose Music has announced the signing of agreements with two European pubberies for sub-publishing of Bluenose properties in Europe. One deal, concluded between Bluenose and Les Editions Claude Pascal is a prominent French publishing house which has met great international success with such tunes as "Mammy Blue" and "Love is Blue".

In England, Carlin Music, for three years in a row voted England's top publisher, will also represent Fergus, having acquired sub-publishing of "Here With You". At the moment, Bluenose is well represented in Canada with material hitting the charts by Thundermug and Gary and Dave.

HUMPHREY & DUMP TRUCKS NOW RESIDE IN TORONTO

Saskatoon's much-acclaimed Humphrey and the Dumptrucks are now established in Toronto. The popular four-man group left their western hometown to be closer to the major portion of the record market.

The group has been highly active over the past few years, having performed on numerous television shows, including "Country-time", "The Entertainers", "The Song Singers" and so on. Their two albums, for Boot Records, have met with critical delight and considerable airplay.

The group's management arm, Folkal Poynt, headed by Allen Shectman, also moves east to represent the group and sell their wares in Toronto and area.

PHIL COLLINS GENS UP ON NYC RECORDING SCENE

Phil Collins, who heads up his own Collins Productions Ltd. has returned to Toronto after spending several weeks sitting in on recording sessions at Electric Lady Studios. He was the guest of producers Bob Markoulaff and Malcolm Cecil. Sessions included those by Jeff Beck, Stevie Wonder, Dallas Taylor and Stephen Stills. Collins also found himself on the guest list for the debuting of John Lennon's new group, Elephant's Memory at Max's Kansas City as well as Mick Jagger's 29th birthday party which was held after his Madison Square Garden show.

Collins met with Polydor's Claude Palardy and Frank Costa of RCA accompanying them to Jimmy Weston's club to catch the Jocelyn Jocya show. Joining their party were Ira Howard (Belwin Mills), lyricist Lennie Bleeker and sales and promotion people from CMA and the William Morris Agency. Collins had been in meetings with Yvon Deschamps of RCA and Guy Bertrand of Polydor (Montreal) prior to his New York trip which accounted for his acceptance.

It's expected that Collins will shortly return to the Toronto studio scene and another go round at record production. He had reportedly been part of the Charlie (RCA) session.

Sergio Mendes and Brasil '77 were in for a July 31st date followed by Jose Feliciano (Aug 16), the Establishment (23) and Pierre Lalonde (Sept. 6). The Capitol recording star was to be followed Sept. 13 by Joan Rivers with Columbia's lan and Sylvia in for the last date in September (21).

Paul Anka, who was recently given the red carpet treatment in his hometown of Ottawa, has been booked in for Monday Oct. 2nd. The Millbank Summer Festival, a promotion by the Imperial Tobacco Company to promote its new Millbank brand, has been one of a series of promotions by the firm involving music. They recently supplied support for the Toronto appearance of Yvan Rebroff and will lay on a similar promotion for Karel Gott's first Canadian engagement.

FRANK MILLS COMPLETES WESTERN CANADIAN TOUR

Polydor's Frank Mills, currently happening with his album and single, "Reflections Of My Childhood", wound up his west coast tour with a heavy promo bit on local radio personalities. He also hosted a dinner for several radio VIPs including CKLG's Daryl Burlingham and Roy Hennessy and Marnie Ross, the world's record holder for the Max Gregor Olympic Frisbee Marathon.

Mills returned east and a date at the Toronto Fair's Grandstand before returning to his home in Montreal.

The musicbiz silent majority

Now that we've crossed the rocky mountains in our bid for international acceptance of Canadian music, it seems that we are getting back to our traditional modus operandi or small camps wasting time gossiping about one another.

This sort of negative energy has caused us to suffer greatly in the past; yet it seems

that we are never going to learn. Battles are won by together teams, not by small tribes bickering in backrooms. We will never solve the problems which surround our scene while we allow internal friction no outlet.

If we must continue to be at loggerheads, let's at least get it out into the open. If Joseph Discpusher at Groovy Records has a bitch against Radio station CYUR, he should air it. Inner turmoil is a fruitless exercise; the only way you can win is by open forum evaluation.

This weekend's C4 get together will provide us with a much-needed opportunity to bring out the beefs. Putting my ear to the ground during the past few days, I picked up the indications that a lot of people have a pile of things they want to bitch about. I only hope they will have the balls to do it at C4.

One of the more adolescent aspects of this music scene of ours is the incredible amount of backbiting and whining that takes place in the corridors and the washrooms. Not much of it is evident in the executive offices and boardrooms since the people that inhabit those places seem to be admirably above such petty insularity.

I don't know why it is that some of us can find the time to indulge in such wasteful activities. It would seem to be an occupational hazard associated only with those people who have reached their limit in life. Rather than use positivity to further expand their horizons, these dudes would prefer to waste their time, but more importantly other peoples' time, with this needless word and mind pollution.

It seems a shame that an industry so young should have failed to rid itself of dead wood and hangers on. Of course every industry has its share of biudgers but this business of ours appears notorious for its habit of attracting individuals who want to get in the way of progress.

Most of us have long since decided that there are two kinds of people in the music industry — the doers and the doubters. The doers really couldn't care less about the doubters, except in circumstances where the latter group begin to get in the way of evolution. Then such negative reaction requires positive, incisive action. I somehow sense that this is where we stand in the Canadian music scene at the present time.

I should point out around about here that

personally I am not addicted to progress. Rathermore I have a deep-seated moral suspicion of the progress-at-any-cost philosophy which it seems to me has damaged this world of ours almost beyond repair. In that sphere of endeavour, I am a decided conservative.

But when it comes to facing the Canadian music industry front on, I tend towards believing in the need to keep on greasing the wheels of progress. Others disagree. Some are hysterical about it. But also, a few people happen to be in agreement with our music's aims and desires.

I'm not for a moment suggesting that any side is right. I could be hinting that a push forward is inherently better than sitting back on our butts waiting for it all to happen. Canadians did just that for 15 years and we all know how far it went. Nowhere.

Now at least we're going somewhere. No-one really knows just where we're going but there is momentum. You don't have to be a physicist to understand that the laws of time and motion now prevent us from staying in the same spot.

Some people may feel we're moving in the wrong direction. This being the case, one can only hope that such views will be tossed into the C4 arena. Washroom gossip is not going to take us anywhere. Nor will inhibited thoughts.

If you've got something to say — be it for or agin — you owe it to yourself and to all of us to get up and lay it down. Don't wait to see if somebody else will do it for you. They may not.

History has shown that objectors who kept their dissent under wraps when the spotlight was on them did nothing for their cause. That may have suited them. Some of these dissenters thrive on the very nature of secret gossiping. They apparently believe that by putting something or someone down to another person, they can erode away the cause of their dissatisfaction. It could be said that people who get themselves off in this manner demand pity rather than scorn.

One thing's for sure — solid achievements are by nature, difficult to destroy. Alternatively, talk is cheap.

Honest, on the level communication is not. Nor is it negative. The energy of dissent, while sometimes misguided, is surely pure and sincere.

Any man worth his while respects dissent. He wants to hear from those who disagree. He wishes to discuss the basis of their disagreement. Only fools steamroll over all objections without giving them the obvious rights of just consideration.

There appears to be a pressing need in this industry of ours for such open discussion and debate. And there is clearly a desperate need to end the pettiness which not infrequently threatens to sink us all.

We are not going to make it if we allow ourselves to be split into tribes of antagonistic spirit. Like the song says, united we stand but divided we fall.

That is not to say that Policy A should be bulldozed through. Nor Policy B or C. Or that things must remain the same because Daddy Daredevil says so.

The Canadian music scene is a frail child. The day has yet to dawn when it can stand on its own two feet (English and French). What we are all now trying to do is to make it possible for such stabilization to occur.

The important point is that we will never stabilize the music industry of this country while pettiness and gossiping prevail.

What we must do is rise to the occasion and tell it as each one of us sees it. Right or wrong, all of us must respect individual opinion. No matter how much it hurts.

As we sit down at C4, let's all vow that we'll get up again as soon as the spirit moves us. Get it out into the open friends, and throw caution to the winds. Chicken hearts will not make roosters out of us.

Complacency and jealousy are our two most insidious enemies.

Other dates include the Annual Gaelic Mod in St. Ann's, and night club dates in Charlottetown and Summerside.

Cameron will then tape a segment of the CBC's "Singalong Jubilee" in Halifax, as well as a CBC special, to commemorate the inauguration of a new CBC TV outlet in Sydney, Nova Scotia.

Following his Maritime tour, Cameron leaves for a tour of Scotland, Ireland and Germany. He is managed by Anne Murray's Balmur

One of the most recent appeared in Germany's important trade paper Der Muskmarkt. They show a listing of Procol Harum In Concert with the Ed Monton Symphony Orchestra. By the by, it is released on the Chrysalis (Phonogram) label 6307 503.

STIGWOOD BATTLES ON AGAINST INFRINGERS

The recent action by The Robert Stigwood Group Limited, Leeds Music Limited and Leeds Music Corporation against John T. O'Reilly, Jack Coyne and Robert Cassidy over the controversial "priests" presenting Jesus Christ Superstar concerts as "The International Rock Opera Company" should become must reading for all those involved in the presentation of acts that could infringe on the rights of the originators.

Judge Robert C. Zampano of the United States District Court for the District of Connecticut rejected all the defenses raised by the O'Reilly, Coyne and Cassidy group and issued a preliminary injunction enjoining them from (1) infringing plaintiffs' copyrights in any manner, (2) performing, contracting, for, promoting, advertising, participating in, or in any way aiding or abetting performances of Jesus Christ Superstar, or any segment thereof, and (3) utilizing or permitting the use of any advertising which refers to Jesus Christ Superstar or Superstar.

Apparently the defendants' opposition was based on the seldom involved charitable exemption clause of the Copyright Law, which exempts from copyright obligations certain strictly limited performances of various musical works "for charitable or educational purposes and not for profit." In making his decision Judge Zampano found the defense presented "interesting"

"Thus the Court must consider whether the defendants on the present state of the record, sustained their burden of proof with respect to the requirements relevant to this case as set forth in \$104 that: 1) they are a church choir or vocal society who 2) perform a work such as an oratorio, which 3) was rented or obtained from a public library, public school, church choir, school choir, or vocal society, for 4) charitable or educational purposes and not for profit.

"The Company is not a church choir. The performances of Jesus Christ Superstar are not given in churches nor are they part of any church services; rather they are highly professional productions, presented in school auditoriums and theatres across the country. The mere fact that the many professional performers are under the direction of a few priests cannot turn a professional touring company into a church choir. Nor is the Company a vocal society. As the Court reads the meaning of this phrase in the statute, in the light of the apparent intent of Congress, it connotes an enduring, cooperating and unified group of singers, with common aims and ends, periodically meeting together because of a community of interest in the songs they sing. The defendants failed to produce a scintilla of evidence that, except for the five members of the Contemporary Mission, the remaining members of the Company share a clearly marked identity as a unit distinguished by similar beliefs, particular concerns, and the same interests. From the present record, it appears that the lay performers are professionals selected for their singing and musical abilities, and not because of homogeneous beliefs, charitable motives or religious affiliation."

Defendants did argue however, that recognition of plaintiffs' rights by enforcement of the copyrights would violate their Constitutional right of freedom of speech and free exercise of religion under the First Amendment.

Judge Zampano heid that:

"The short answer to the defendants' absolutist approach to the meaning of the First Amendment is that it is simply not the law. Were the First Amendment to be applied literally, our statutes pertaining to perjury, obscenity, mail fraud, among others, would constitutionally fall. While the Court must be alert to protect the defendants' right to a free exercise of their religious beliefs, it must recognize that the 'free exercise' does not include the wholesale appropriation of another's literary, artistic and musical works

"The defendants have copied in wholesale fashion the lyrics and score, the sequence of songs, and the overall pattern of plaintiffs' rock opera; there is outright plagiarism here, pure and simple."

The defendants claimed they were making

a "fair use" of the opera for purposes of criticising the Broadway production. Judge Zampano rejected this claim with:

"A careful review of the pertinent authorities discloses no suggestion that the doctrine of fair use protects a defendant who copies practically verbatim the plaintiff's work, but adds a few variations in order to make the plaintiff's production a 'better' one."

Judge Zampano declared that the defendants' performances of the rock opera were not merely "oratorio" performances by reason of the absence of costume, scenery and extensive stage movement — concluding:

"There is no question that the plaintiff Leeds Music Corporation holds the United States copyrights for the opera Jesus Christ Superstar as a 'dramaticomusical composition', and that the plaintiff Stigwood possesses the rights for the stage productions and dramatic presentations. As a prima facie matter, therefore, the plaintiffs' copyrights should be protected, and the defendants should be enjoined from any further infringements of these copyrights."

The above opinion was filed following five days of hearings before Judge Zampano. Plaintiffs were represented by New York counsel John L. Eastman of Eastman & Eastman, and Robert C. Osterberg of Abeles and Clark.

JASON'S PERSONAL CONTACT SELLS OUT "JUNKET '72"

Working through Media Man and personal manager, Craig Nicholson, armed with a truckload of promotional material including a film of the group in action, they have now invaded the U.S. college circuit.


Tagged "Jason Junket '72" they have already played several dates in New York and Pennsylvania states including: Gennessee Community College, Batavia; State U, Courtland, SUNY, Fredonia, St. Bonaventure U, St. Francis College, Loretto, Community College of Finger Lakes, Rosary Hill College, Buffalo, Elmire College, Auburn Community College and SUNY in Genesseo and Alfred.

his legally befuddled characters. I can't seem to remember any offhand, so you can appreciate the searing impact such names have.

The choice of the name CRUD was dictated by several considerations. It had to start with a "C", it had to have four letters and it had to be representative of the kind of station which would manipulate the ratings in the manner described. One other suitable word comes to mind but then we would have really been in trouble, wouldn't we?

And one more thing, we had four stations

CHAPPELL'S RENEWYCH MOVES TO TORONTO

Jerry Renewych, professional manager of Chappel Music in Canada, has moved his base of operations from Montreal to Toronto, according to Cyril Devereux, Chappell's general manager. During his two accuse us of writing nasty stories about them. All you've got to do is give 'em a shoe and they'll cut their toes off to get in it. "CRUD vs. CMOR" was not about any particular station in any particular place, it was simply a commentary on a well-known and pointless practice, the manipulation of the ratings.

One broadcaster did, however, make a good point and that is that such names could be considered to constitute negativism. To a certain point I'll go along with that but for God's sake let's try to develop a little sense of humour in this business. Instead of being a fun and creative endeavour, the broadcast business has turned into a dark alleyway filled with a bunch of guys wearing grey trencheoats who keep looking over their shoulders. If the station down the road doesn't get 'em, the CRTC will. And if they both miss, there's RPM waiting with the printing press poised high.

It's not like that. In our time we've gone after A&R men, recording executives, producers, artists, government, the Canadian National Exhibition, Calgary, the Maple Leaf System, concert promoters, sound system suppliers, pressing plants, jacket designers, the CRTC, Hogtown, and a lot of other things, people and places which we thought deserved our loving attention. It's not all done with destructive intent. We hope that even if our angle is wrong that at least

we will have drawn attention to something which needed to be put under the spotlight. In many, many cases a bad situation has been eliminated or at least improved by our "attacks".

We've often looked at the contrast between ourselves and the trade papers from other countries. RPM is virtually the only such paper in the world that prihts opinion, even unpopular opinion on a regular basis. To pick up a trade paper from most countries you'd think that nothing ever happened besides the inking of this artist or the appointment of Mr. X (notice the admirable restraint in the choosing of that name!) to the position of prexy. The sternest editorial comments usually concern the percentage of recycled paper in inner sleeves.

Who knows if we're right or wrong in admitting our problems to the world, but in this case, we can say that our attitude is uniquely Canadian. Now if only we could infect everyone with such openess and willingness to admit problems, it would be a different world.

So the next time you read something that ruffles your feathers, don't fly off into a corner and sulk, read it again, determine how much of it is true and how much is hogwash, then write your reply. Don't spare us, if you disagree violently, then disagree violently. We like to print opinions, not just our own opinions.

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



THE ENTERTAINER Ray Griff GRT 9230-1014-T

Griff is one of those unique standoffish Canadian country artists who has been kicking around for years and is still trying for the brass ring. His styling is "just plain Griff" no colouring, but a lot of gut meaning. It's not hard to become a Griff fan - you merely have to listen to him.

CORLISS Corliss Nelson Rare Earth NR103L-V

"Corliss" is pretty nonedescript until you've heard it a couple of times. Then, the joys of the rousing yet introspective, "Hang Nail" are easily appreciated. Nelson is competent, if not brilliant. and that deserves some attention from programmers.

KAREL GOTT Polydor 2634 043-Q

Unfortunately this two record set is in German by this top Czech artist. However, he does have an unbelievable communication power, one of the reasons for his almost "sold out" Canadian debut at Massey Hall in Toronto (Sept. 20). Exceptional backing and voice. 



Quality of programming must improve

Just from the attitude of the Canadian programmers, the whole industry of broadcasting must improve. Today, more than ever, the programmer has opened his mind to new and fresh ideas and to new and interesting dialogue.

The Programmers CROSSTALK walt grealis

Gone are the days of the broadcaster rhetoric that created little gods of the airwaves. The broadcaster is assuming a responsibility in his community. A lot of water has gone under the bridge.

Even in the smallest markets, the programmer makes himself aware of new trends and new ideas. In the larger markets, the programmer is becoming inventive. The competition is keen, but the wasteland of the hippy-dippy mile-a-minute jock is over. No ringing bells, no kazoos, no foghorns or cute weatherbirds. Programming is different in 1972.

In the sixties, the jock was an overgrown teenager who showed up at the openings of supermarkets to wrestle a bear. Later that night he wowed the younger set at a "hop" and MC'd a dance or two for a few bucks.

Today, the on-air personality has gained a great deal of honest prestige. Not the razzle-dazzle of yesteryear, but a true place in the community.

Being that we write in Canada, to Canadians, we can say that the Canadian programming system has come a long way.

CFPL OFFERS "EMERGENCY" BOOKLET TO BROADCASTERS

During Western Ontario's disastrous blizzard in 1971 London radio stations, CFPL, CJOE and CKSL, became the central coordinating forces in the city during the storm. All three stations operated on an "open line" basis handling thousands of calls and messages. In view of this community spirit displayed by local radio stations, a 50-page report, scientifically analyzing the social significance of CFPL Radio's "Open Line" during the blizzard, is being distributed to Canadian and American learning centres as well as to representatives of Canada's broadcasting community.

Titled "The Social Functions of Radio in a Community Emergency", the report was tabled by Benjamin D. Singer, University of Western Ontario, and Lyndsay Green, now of the University of Toronto. The booklet is being distributed by Copp Ciark Publishing Company, Reasons for concentrating on CFPL was because of its large audience and the "best established open line program". A play-back of the station's tapes provided researchers with detailed information about the role played by CFPL during the two-day period. Radio personnel estimated that during that time CFPL received about 25,000 calls, an average of nine calls each minute. Only a fraction of these calls were aired. The balance was a direct exchange of information between the caller and station personnel.

Dr. Singer noted: "In addition to providing for an exchange of vital information, radio provided the emotional support needed by people in any time of stress. Radio was able to serve as a source of security merely by being there." Steps have been taken to tighten communications between London City Hall and CFPL in the event of a similar community disaster.



Above all, we can respect the opinion of anyone who writes (whether they wish their name to be used or not) than I do when someone will only conveniently move toward their telephone to complain.

I recently wrote a letter to Life Magazine complaining about the contents of one of their articles. I wasn't the only one who complained. Life reprinted many of the letters that agreed with mine. Mine wasn't published, but it was reassuring to know that my letter added strength to the opposition to the article in question. Can you imagine how many letters Life must get each week.

We at RPM would welcome such a dialogue of agreement and disagreement. The right to write should not be exclusively ours. That right belongs to everyone by our laws of freedom and also the policies of RPM that say we are entirely an open forum for anyone who has something meaningful to say. Few publishers are as liberal as RPM in permitting negative comments from readers. On the other hand we also permit our writers a freedom that can do a great deal to stimulate the thinking of both industries.

This is just one of the problems I hope comes up in discussion at our Montreal C4 meeting.







VOCM GEARING FOR FM OUTLET

VOCM is a likely contender to be the holder of Newfoundland's first FM radio license.




Joe Butler, president of VOCM has revealed

that an application for an FM broadcasting license has been in the hands of the CRTC since last October. The VOCM application seeks approval for a stereo FM outlet, to operate out of the existing VOCM studios in St. John's. The application is for the highest power permitted an FM broadcast operation in Canada, in order to provide maximum service to the province.

VOCM first applied for an FM license in 1948, before the island joined confederation.

According to Butler, preparation for the current application began in 1966, when provision for a future FM operation was made during the construction of new studios. The entire operation is in such a state of readiness that VOCM FM would be on the air within ninety days of CRTC approval.

Previous applications for FM stations in Newfoundland have usually been for lowpower relay transmitters which would have been basically AM rebroadcasters. VOCM, is approved, will be a technically first rate, twenty four hour service.



GENE LEES SUBJECT OF CBC-TV SPECIAL

Kanata recording artist/executive Gene Lees has been scheduled for a one hour special on the CBC television network Sunday Sept. 24. Entitled "Words, Words, Words", the show will be telecast at 9 PM EDT as part of the "Sunday At Nine" series.

Entirely written around Gene Lees, the show has been described as "a kind of Man and His Music kind of show — hosted, written, narrated and sung by Lees." He talks of his experiences in the music business and how he came to write many of his songs, fifteen or so of which he will perform during the course of the show. Many of these songs are available on the KAN 2 album "Gene Lees Sings The Gene Lees Songbook" on the Kanata label.

Producer of the show was John Coulson with Rick Wilkins conducting the 30 piece backup orchestra and Dave Bird looking after the audio chores.

CBC LEASES THREE ANIK CHANNELS

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and Telesat Canada have reached an agreement that will allow the CBC to lease three of ten channels of the communication satellite ANIK 1. The satellite is to be launched in November.

The contract is reportedly worth \$9 million annually, and will allow Canadian residents in the northerly reaches to receive CBC television productions. It's hoped to eventually broadcast local Eskimo and Indian television shows.

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U.S. RADIO MAY BE SEPARATED FROM TV

A proposal by Torbert H. MacDonald of the U.S. House Communications Sub-Committee may result in radio being set aside for special treatment by the Sub-Committee when next year's hearings for license renewal legislation comes up. MacDonald hopes that the sub-committee will view radio as a "medium in its own right".


Canadian critics of the Canadian Radio Television Commission have long been of the opinion that Pierre Juneau's Commissioners are bogged down with problems relating to cable and television and do not have the necessary staff nor time to deal with this country's most important means of communication — radio. Noted one observer: "We copy everything else the

Americans do — let's hope the CRTC investigate the U.S. House Communications' attempts to streamline their operation'.

IT'S GO FOR BASSETT AT NEW OTTAWA STATION

Ottawa's newest radio station (change in call letters and owners) CJGO has made a bid for the 18-49 age group with an all-rock music policy. The addition to the John Bassett broadcast empire has taken out billboard space to promote its entering the Ottawa scene and is apparently going with the theme

Perhaps Mr. Bassett has been off the newspaper scene too long or it may be a clever new innovation to radio. Those same initials GO are used by a city homosexual group—Gay Ottawa.

FOUR-NATION MUSIC SHOW PRODUCED BY RADIO-CANADA 10 DANS LA PRISON DE LONDRES

A nineteen-hour musical weekend which covered the history of music (classical to rock) was recently broadcast throughout Europe and Canada, Produced by Pierre Rainville, "Du Rock au Baroque" was broadcast to France, Switzerland, Belgium and Canada and reportedly reached more than 60 million of an audience.

The production was part of Radio-Canada's four-country Communaute radiophonique de langue française and offered all types of music plus an analysis of the different kinds of music in various age groups.

ESPANOLA ENTERS BROADCAST FOLD

Espanola, Ontario recently unveiled its own broadcast facility. The Northern Ontario community began its own radio programming using the facilities of a CBC unmanned, low-power, repeater transmitter. Pat Reilly, a CBC broadcaster, established the station and helped to train the necessary announce and technical staff.

CBC Espanola is now incorporated and sanctioned by the CRTC. Although it is a CBC affiliate the CBC does not interfere with programming needs of the station.

HOT ENOUGH TO FRY EGGS ON KAMLOOPS' SIDEWALK

CHNL's successful "egg frying contest" brought out the best in some of their local citizens (see photo somewhere in issue). The station's advertising chief, Martin Jay Forbes, reports the contest began at 4:30 PM Aug 1st in the CHNL parking lot. The temperature, at that time, was 100 degrees in the shade.


