

April Wine launched nationally

AQUARIUS LAUNCHES APRIL WINE CAMPAIGN

Aquarius Records, along with their national distributor, London Records, have launched a national marketing campaign for April Wine's latest album, "April Wine On Record". With the recent release of their chart item, "Drop Your Guns", the Montreal-based group now have three singles released from their latest album, which has prompted Aquarius president Terry Flood into a national campaign to promote the album.

April Wine have been a top draw on the concert circuit and have maintained a strong image on the record scene. This past summer, through Donald K. Donald Productions, they toured Eastern Canada covering more than forty different markets giving them an audience of over 100,000 in a matter of a few weeks. They were the first group to appear on Iim McKenna's new nationally syndicated "Musical Friends" as well as CTV's "Rollin" with Kenny Rogers and the First Edition. Their album has been given the nod by U.S. and Canadian tradesters.

COCKBURN CROWD TOO ROWDY FOR VANCOUVER

True North's Bruce Cockburn continues to pull capacity houses on his tour across Canada, but unfortunately won't be heard in Vancouver. According to Bernie Finklestein, president of True North Records, they were advised by officials of Vancouver's Queen Elizabeth Theatre that Cockburn's previous engagement at the Playhouse (a smaller theatre within the QE complex) in May of last year, had left much to be desired. Apparently during Cockburn's two show engagement at the Playhouse in May of last year, for which he pulled a 75% capacity audience for both shows, some of the audience took advantage of the lack of supervisory staff and made coffee for themselves in the kitchen. Finklestein had to take on the extra expense of hiring ushers for the Cockburn show because Vancouver was going through a strike by city blue collar workers.

Cockburn will be heard in B.C. however, with his Oct. 3rd date at Victoria's Mac-Pherson Playhouse, now shaping up to be another good house. He returns to Ontario and Alumni Hall at the University of Western Ontario (London) on Oct. 15, followed by Massey Hall in Toronto (22) and his windup date (30) at Ottawa's National Arts Centre.

In the meantime, Cockburn's single "Up On The Hillside" (TN4-112), has been picking up heavy airplay from many of the MOR stations with some action from MOTers and exceptional support from the "progressive sound" stations.

True North did an extensive mailing of a promo package including Cockburn's past singles: "Going To The Country", "One Day I Walk", and "It's Going Down Slow" plus a complete itinerary of his tour, to programmers across Canada, prior to the tour which kicked off in Saint John, New Brunswick, August 17.

Flood's initial approach to the April Wine campaign is extensive radio advertising in Toronto and Montreal. If this proves successful they'll extend this promotion to every major Canadian market. Coordinating this campaign in Montreal and Toronto will be Keith Brown with London's Dick Riendo mobilizing his sales and promotion staff into thinking April Wine and making sure that product is available across the country. Sales aids including posters, stickers, easel backs, slicks, tee shirts and rack cards have now been shipped.

Getting the attention of the Canadian public is first and foremost for April Wine. They have just completed a hectic tour of Ontario. This took them into Sturgeon Falls (audience 1005); Sudbury (1800); Thunder Bay (2000); and similar crowds in McIntyre, Ottawa, Huntsville, Sault Ste. Marie and McMaster University. Bookings were arranged through Concept and Kilowatt, working with Donald K. Donald with Bill Hill doing the advance promotion.

April Wine are comprised of David Henman, guitarist; brother Ritchie, drummer; Myles Goodwyn, guitarist; and Jimmy Clench, bass. They were asked the following questions:

Where did the group originate and in what year?

April Wine was formed in Halifax in December of 1969. We arrived in Montreal the following April. All we had to our name was \$100 and our equipment. We signed to the Terry Flood management immediately.

Where did you tape your first record session?

Our first sessions were in Montreal at RCA with production by Billy Hill. They took place in early 1971 which saw the release of "Fast Train" and "Listen Mister" as well as our first album. The second set of sessions took place late in 1971 and early 1972 at Toronto Sound Studios. Ralph Murphy was the producer with Terry Brown on the board. Our entire second album "April Wine On Record" including "You Could Have Been A Lady", "Bad Side Of The Moon" and "Drop Your Guns" was produced at Toronto Sound.

What members in the group do the writing?

Myles Goodwyn is the most prolific writer in the group, closely followed by David Henman. Jimmy Clench writes occasionally and Ritchie will soon come up with one of

CRIA TO MAINTAIN ITS OWN VOICE

The newly-named Canadian Recording Industry Association will be "the only source of official information" on the Canadian recording scene, according to a recent statement by Phil Anderson, president of the Association and president of Arc Sound Co. and Ahed Music Corporation of Toronto.

According to sources close to the CRIA, the association's membership was becoming increasingly alarmed at the posturing of non-CRIA members as spokesmen for the industry. The CRIA will now issue press releases on a regular basis regarding matters relating to the Canadian music industry.

his own compositions. The only songs we have recorded but were not written by us were "You Could Have Been A Lady" and "Bad Side Of The Moon." We all work in the arranging session which can take place anytime, anywhere.

What do you look for in a production?

A sound that we can recreate onstage. We want to sound as alive as possible. One of the most important things to have is a high quality sound. We rely on our producer Ralph Murphy and engineer Terry Brown to give us that quality sound. We go out of our way to avoid over production and when the group is assembling material for production it is important to have two or three tunes with single potential.

What's your approach to the record company with regard to promotion?

We leave most of the promotional effort to our manager Terry Flood who also happens to run our Canadian record label, Aquarius. When we have ideas for promotion we tell Terry, but most of the time we just do what we are told. Aquarius is doing a good job in Canada. We'd like to work more on the promotional ideas for April Wine but right now no one in the group really has a feel for it. We do attempt to make as many visits as possible to television stations, radio stations, record stores etc., when on tour.

Besides being a struggling record group, do you have any other hangups?

We haven't got an awful lot of confidence, but it's getting better which can be a hangup and another could be a difficulty in making four completely different heads work together on the same thing. April Wine have worked on a solution for the latter — we work incredibly well together.

NAME CHANGE FOR RECORDING ASSOCIATION

The Canadian Recording Manufacturers' Association has officially changed its name, effective immediately to the Canadian Recording Industry Association. The resolution to adopt the new name was passed at a recent meeting of the Association in Toronto. Under the new handle, the industry group will, according to president Phil G. Anderson, "unite the representation of the entire recording industry in Canada, producers, manufacturers, recording studios and suppliers to the industry." Representation is expected from both French and English speaking Canada.

Are we taking full advantage of the interest that Canada is generating? When I think back to the English struggle (before they became aware of their own domestic disc potential) before the music and record explosion from "over there", Canada appears to resemble that sleeping giant. Although there was a very successful music industry in England (and a definite England first attitude), our present state of thinking doesn't include a Canada first attitude.

Many radio stations are starting to think positively about the Cancon ruling. Many are doing a great job of finding and programming the best this country has to offer. The more they program, the more the industry is encouraged to go back into the studios and cut more sessions. It isn't easy for an industry to share the mileage of the name international stars with the growing Canadian stars, but we are on a firm footing, and a great deal of excitement has been generated over the past few weeks that proves that a kind of adolescent nervousness has possessed the music industry. The industry is about to grow up. Many new rules are being made. Many new innovations are being plotted or planned.

In the midst of all the fears and anxieties, the industry has created an excitement that has never existed in this industry before.

In the months to come, the industry can look back at September of 72 and wonder at what progress was made. It may confuse some of the meek and timid that the industry can be recruited into creating its own excitement, but all you have to do is wave a few dollars at the passers-by and they want to join the club.

Certain elements of the industry have over reacted to their own folly, and have fallen into the pattern.

Today, and right now, there has never been such an interest in Canada, internationally, and such a demand for Canadian songs and masters throughout the world. All this is happening with few (if any) real hits internationally. Canada is just becoming the place where something is going to happen, and the world market is without a sound and without a monster. Canada could be that monster.

Anyone who doesn't believe should form a line to the right. We want to have a complete count of the negatives on the scene.

Don't bother. We know who you are.

The positive people are those who are using the music ruling to their advantage; the record companies that are using our new studios, the artists who are grooming themselves for the industry; the programmers who are working to make the Cancon ruling work. That's positive.

What is negative is the number of record companies who are only taking advantage of the readily available product and the radio stations that are trying to find ways of skirting the 30% and spend more time and money playing games than they do working on running an efficient operation.

There are negatives and positives, but one positive is that the music industry in Canada is too big to ignore and the timing may be right for Canada to emerge.

A few years ago, you could shoot a cannon down the Canadian music scene and not hit a producer, A&R man, songwriter or publisher. You may have hit a small ill-equipped three-track studio or two, or you wounded a struggling artist or two, but you wouldn't have hit anything important. That isn't true today, and it is only happening because it was planned to happen.

I wonder if the next star out of Canada will know what it was like only a few years ago.

So when you put the negatives and the positives together, it is shocking what can happen (if you don't blow a fuse.)

CRIA MEMBERS TO USE RPM MAPL LOGO

The Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) have submitted a request, on behalf of their membership, for the use of the RPM MAPL logo for Canadian content identification on records and pre-recorded tanes.

The MAPL logo was designed specifically for RPM, and for use on its charts as an assist to the programmer for quick identification of Canadian content recording. The logo appeared in RPM (June 1970) prior to the 30% Canadian content legislation. At that time several record companies asked for and received permission to use the MAPL logo on their labels, while others used the star system initially designed for CRMA members, and some preferred to use the word Cancon.

In an effort to unify the system of Cancon recognition, members of the CRIA agreed to adopt the MAPL system.

PAINE-BIBBY ON WESTERN JUNKET

MCA national sales manager, Richard Bibby, and national promotion manager, Barry Paine, are back in Toronto following a series of meets with MCA distributor personnel in the west. Meetings occurred with the staffs of Thomas Rathwell Ltd. (Manitoba and Saskatchewan), September 18th, Acklands Ltd. (Alberta), September 19-20th, and Johnston Appliances (British Columbia), September 21st-22nd.

Each meeting included a video tape presentation demonstrating the manufacturing techniques employed at MCA's Cornwall plant. This was supplemented by a slide showing on upcoming product, which includes releases by Neil Diamond, Elton John, Bert Kaempfert, the Who and so on. Also covered were plans for sales and promotional activity on MCA product to be implemented on forthcoming releases.

NEW DIRECTIONS FOR MAPLE LEAF SYSTEM

(Greg Haraldson - MLS 25/9/72)

All Maple Leaf System stations participated in an important conference call on Friday. September 22nd to discuss new directions for the system. With the present restrictions on requirements for submission (reviewing only those recordings satisfying all four Canadian content criteria established by the C.R.T.C.), it was decided to make some changes or disband. We did not choose the latter due to our belief in the system and what is felt to be a vital role in the Canadian Music Industry. In a continuing effort to make the MLS more efficient in its aims. the following changes have been voted upon and approved, and will become official policy effective on the agenda for October 10th, 1972.

"The MLS will accept for review any record satisfying the Canadian content criteria as established by the C.R.T.C. as it now exists at this date. In other words, any record which meets two of the four requirements is open for submission. There were just not enough records meeting all four requirements to make up a regular agenda with the four out of four policy.

"Record companies will now be allowed three weeks after the official release date to submit a recording for review. This measure is re-introduced to guard against a record being worked for weeks and weeks and finally submitted after it may have run its due course in some markets. Of course, the same re-submission procedures are still in effect.

"Any recording scoring an average of 6 or more will continue to receive a minimum of two weeks guaranteed airplay on all MLS stations. However, if on any given agenda no record scores a 6 or better, MLS stations will not be required to grant two weeks airplay to the record receiving the highest score. In past we've had records win with an average less than four, and that's ridiculous! MLS members remain free to vote on any recording as they see fit, MLS voting results will continue to be confidential to the individual member stations and the recording companies involved; and again, to stay away from the loser stigma, only the winners will be announced to the industry

"Regular conference calls with all system stations participating have been re-introduced. These will be carried out on the first Friday of each month. The next call is Friday, October 6th.

"The annual MLS convention has been called for on Friday, October 13th, 1972 in Vancouver to co-ordinate with Communication Five to be held in that city on October 14th and 15th."

It is hoped that representatives from all MLS stations will be in attendance in Vancouver for what is shaping up to be the biggest weekend ever in the Canadian Music Industry.

A reminder to all MLS stations that the next agenda will be on October 10th with the above changes in effect at that time.

broadcasting were at issue. He indicated that "All of these matters are part of the legislative control over program content."

Sopinka claimed that the pre-election ban is discriminatory and in violation of the Bill of Rights because it does not apply to the rest of the media. Thomson's argument was that radio is different because a radio "intrudes" but a reader has to pick up a newspaper. It was because of this that Parliament had decided it was not socially desirable for radio and television to participate the day before and during election day in partisan political broadcasting.

ONTARIO SUPREME COURT RESERVES CFRB DECISION

Ontario Supreme Court Justices W.D. Parker, Campbell, Grant and N.C. Fraser have reserved decision on a motion by CFRB radio for an order throwing out a charge that the station broke a ban on partisan pre-election statements. The action resulted in a pre-election statement during a Gordon Sinclair broadcast Oct. 20 of last year on the eve of the provincial election. Sinclair, during this broadcast, apparently endorsed the Conservatives for which he was charged with violating the section of the Broadcasting Act prohibiting partisan broadcasts on the day before elections or on election day before the polls close. His case has been delayed pending the outcome of the CFRB

CFRB's lawyer John Sopinka challenged the Commission's right to regulate the content of programming, on constitutional grounds. The CRTC's lawyer, Claude Thomson, pointed out that the Commission was specifically directed by the federal government to regulate program content to ensure the broadcasting systems operating to enrich and strengthen the cultural, political, social and economic fabric of Canada. He stated: "The consequences of this court holding to the contrary will be enormous to the maintenance of the Canadian broadcasting system as we know it." It was argued by Thomson that the Commission's policies of encouraging Canadian content and Canadian talent and the two-language concepts of Canadian

ELTON JOHN IN FOR TWO APPEARANCES

Elton John is in Canada for two appearances this month, October 2nd at Montreal's Forum and October 5th at Maple Leaf Gardens, Toronto. The concerts mark the first time the artist has appeared in either city. In the past two and a half years, Elton John has experienced the results of an intensive promotional push by MCA affiliates throughout the world. Four of his albums have received gold record status in the United States, "Elton John", "Tumble weed Connection", "Madman Across the Water" and "Honky Chateau". He is currently happening with his "Honky Cat" single, culled from the "Honky Chateau" album. MCA has co-ordinated an extensive dealer and radio campaign to push Elton John product as a tie in with the personal appear-

CBC RADIO OPENS DOOR TO CANADIAN CLASSICS

The CBC radio network (AM & FM) have scheduled 22 concerts of classical music with heavy concentration on Canadian content. According to the Corporation's network supervisor Carl Little, the concerts will "fulfil the CBC's mandate to Canadian composers and musicians and present Canadian music to the listening public."

The concerts will be open to the public at no charge and will be taped "live" from St. James Cathedral, Eaton Auditorium, the MacMillan Theatre, Hart House and the Town Hall of the St. Lawrence Centre. Tickets are available from the CBC Toronto Public Relations ticket office at 925-3311 extension 4835.

Several Canadian works will also be premiered during the series. These will include: Steven Gellman's Second Symphony, Alexander Brott's orchestration of Schumann's Kinderscenen. Oskar Morawetz' The World Of A Child, Brian Cherney's Seven Images for 22 Players, Charles Wilson's Sinfonia for Double Orchestra and Walter Buczynski's Zeroing in No. 2.

Six concerts will feature the CBC Festival Orchestra conducted by Alexander and Boris Brott, Hans Bauer, Lawrence Leonard and Lukas Foss. Performers in for the series include: the Festival Singers, Canadian Brass, Soprano Cathy Berberian, bassoonist George Zukerman and others.

The series opens Oct. 18 with a program by L'Ensemble Instrumental du Quebec and concludes April 30 with a program by The Camerata.

A bit of Olympian insight

As I mentioned a couple of weeks ago, what we really need to build stars is a star system. That bit of olympian insight will doubtless take me far. One of the prime elements in any star system is the daily press, and it is here that we run into some of the biggest obstacles. In this entire country there are

only a handful of music critics and reviewers who I would describe as being "good". There are a pretty fair number who are able to assemble words and phrases in a competent manner, there are an equal number who have a good bouncy style, but it's pretty darn hard to find one who's objective and fair enough to do his job.

Scott's Law states that the good humour of a critic is inversely proportional to the circulation of the paper he writes for. In English that means that the more important a writer thinks he is, the crabbier he gets. The same law applies to radio stations, trade papers and record companies. In the newspaper field, Scott's law is illustrated daily. Bruce Force, entertainment editor for a prominent metropolitan daily, the Posterior Examiner, hires former group member Lance

CAPRICORN LAUNCHES WINDMILL GROUP

Capricorn's president Sammy-Jo outdid himself in his usual fashion and launched one of his latest acquisitions, Windmill. The setting was Toronto's Palais Royale with more than 1000 invited guests (school reps, operators, union officials, press and radio personnel). Purpose of the gathering was to showcase Windmill, an eight piece, non-recording unit, ready to roll with almost two tons of the most expensive equipment available. Capricorn Music Associates (CMS) were putting their best foot forward to influence school reps in the potential of this super rock and blues band.

The beginning of their set was loud and brassy and an attempt to copy some of the hitmakers. Their full potential wasn't felt however, until they launched into their own material which revealed excellent songwriting and arranging ability on the part of someone within the group. They brought back some of the nostalgia of the real rock and roll era which resulted in the audience demanding an encore. Noted one observer: "If they stick to their own original material and move into the recording field, they could be all round winners."

After their short set, Sammy-Jo introduced the members of Windmill as well as his staff who made themselves available to pick up bookings while the guests consumed mounds of cold cuts, salads, rolls, and sweets. A cake measuring four feet square, decked out in a "Best Wishes To Windmill" greeting was donated by the group to the Children's Hospital of Toronto.

And if you judge them by considering how well they did what they were expected to do I'd say they earned that ovation."

Opener for the show was VOCM's morning man, Paul Bradbury and his Borealis group. They received a very critical, but not bad, review from Miss Baker.

The show at St. John's Arts and Culture Centre was presented by VOCM in cooperation with Bert Mitford's Music and Artists Agency and was completely sold out.

Rocque meanwhile, whose career as lead singer of the Craven Raven was cut short due to public apathy, is having a field day crucifying everyone from the Carpenters to Anne Murray to Paul McCartney. To convince editor Force that he is not entirely negative he will occasionally throw in an ecstatic review of albums like "Drowning in the Mississippi Mud While Daddy Stood By and Laughed" by Crippled Willy Oneeye and the Louisiana Losers. Like Force, Rocque has mounted the pedestal and lost contact with his readers.

While Lance Rocque with Spin Dizzy drives stakes into the hearts of artists and record companies, he continues to be on the receiving end of an endless stream of freebie albums, which he will dissect, groove by groove, tickets to concerts which he will despise and booze which he will consume gleefully.

By now we are all familiar with the Lance Rocques of the newspaper world and also with the dedicated and fair reviewers and editors. I suggest we take out a large black felt pen and draw a line between the two. Let Lance Rocque go out and buy one of your albums if he wants to chop it into small pieces, let him pay seven bucks for a ticket if he wants to verbally destroy your concert, let him drink his own booze while discovering the delights of Crippled Willy One-eye. And, on the other hand, go after those fair reviewers and help them out in all ways possible. Give them albums, tickets, information; anything to assist them. They're not going to like every concert or every record, but at least you know you've had a fair hearing.


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Don't be a "copy" cat

These articles dealing with the legal aspect of entertainment, are written especially for RPM by Kenneth M.Smookler, barrister and solicitor practicing in Toronto. He has a LL.B from the University of Toronto and a B.A. in Sociology from Wayne State University in Detroit.

Many people are afraid to say or write the name of an evil spirit, since if they do so, the spirit will suddenly appear, having been conjured up by the use of its name. I don't know if this is true but John Watts used my name in the September 16th issue and here I am to tell you about a copyright problem.

Let's try this situation on for size. My favourite rock group, RADAR PINEAPPLE MANHOLE decides that it is going to go trad. (traditional, for those of you who don't speak abbrev.) and do some folk songs. As a give-away at its gigs the lead singer puts together a song sheet containing twenty folk songs, with a line sketch of the group on the cover, topped off the group's logo, which happens to be exactly like the RPM Weekly logo. They are printed and distributed and appear to be quite a success; so much so that one of the boys in the band is handed an exact copy of it at a rock festival, several months after the song sheet first came out.

The festival's song sheet is identical with RPM's except for the removal of the logo at the top and its replacement with the letters F.F.F. (Funky February Festival). They take it to their lawyer (this is an intelligent group, obviously) who immediately contacts the directors of the F.F.F. and threatens to sue for breach of copyright.

The directors say "Go ahead; sure, we photocopied your group's song sheet, but every one of those songs is in the public domain. Do us something."

So he does.

After the dust has cleared the directors of the F.F.F. are stunned to discover that they have lost the copyright action and that the RPM boys had a valid copyright in the song sheet which they put together.

What too many people don't realize is that you can get copyright not just in a freshly written song or poem or book but also in a specific compilation of any of these. For that matter you can copyright anything which has been specifically arranged in a given fashion. Check your telephone books and you will find that each one has been copyrighted by the telephone company or one of its subsidiaries and that, if you photocopy a page of The Telephone Book, you are actually committing a breach of their copyright.

How come?

Parliament had very little to say about it but the courts (both in England and in Canada) decided that there were two ways they could approach the question of originality (only an "original work" can get copyright protection). They could assess the value of what has been done and decide that a poem, for example, was so bad it didn't deserve to be copyright.

For obvious reasons (no judge wants a horde of angry poets hunting for him with sharpened quill pens) the Courts took the other tack i.e. it wasn't the quality of the work which they would deal with but the quantity.

And so, it turns out that, as long as one does original work of any kind to put together a literary, dramatic, musical or other work, this can be copyright. The work required simply to list a group of names and numbers, put together a set of recipes or assemble a song sheet is enough to give it copyright protection.

Of course anybody can put together the same songs and create his own song sheet but,

if he does so, he is going to have to prove he went back to original sources rather than copying your work.

Next week we will take a look at the opposite side of the same question — how do you prove that somebody has copied your work?

THECYCLE PULL CAPACITY HOUSES IN WINDSOR AREA

Thecycle, a Toronto-based rock group, recently played to roller skaters and an enthusiastic gathering of young people in Tilbury, a small community 30 miles from Windsor. Emceeing the two night engagement was CKLW on-air personality Eddie Rogers.

This was Thecycles's second appearance in Tilbury over the past couple of years. The first being in December of 1969 when they played the Tilbury District High School. They are currently promoting their new single, "All I Really Need Is You", released on the Tamarac label and distributed in Canada by Quality Records. The plug, and the flip side, "Looking To Each Other", were both written by Paul Clinch.

Thecycle are comprised of Kevin Barry, feature percussionist; Paul Craig, drums; Joey Rome, bass guitarist; Sebastian Agnello, lead guitarist; and Peter Goodale, organist. Ages average 22.

The group's single has already been charted in several centres across Canada since its release early in September according to Terry Ford, Tilbury booking agent. It's expected that airplay from Windsor and local stations will pick up when Thecycle release their single in the U.S. A U.S. release is expected shortly. Another album is already in the can and ready for release which will beef up their concert dates, even though they are already booked 3 and 4 nights of the week well into December. Although 50% of the group's stage presentation consists of numbers by other artists, the better half is Thecycle which is "commercial rock with country overtones."

A&M ANNOUNCES FALL MERCHANDISING PLAN

Gerry Lacoursiere, managing director of A&M Records of Canada, announced in Toronto this week the label's fall merchandising program. Lacoursiere hosted A&M's first national sales and promotion meeting last week-end at which the new program was announced. Terming the meet "An outstanding success", Lacoursiere stated that "The opportunity to discuss individual marketing practices with each of the sales and promotion personnel has generated a new enthusiasm in each person connected with the company."

National sales manager, Joe Summers, announced the A&M fall album release at the meeting, the theme of which was "A&M Will Take You Higher". Product for the month of October consists of "Hurtwood Edge", Tim Weisberg; "Good and Cheap", Eggs Over Easy; "The Rain Book", Renee Armand; "Groucho Marx"; "The Lady's Not for Sale", Rita Coolidge; "Faces", Shawn Phillips; "Catch Bull at Four", Cat Stevens and the new Lorence Hud album, "Hud".

Said Summers of the October releases: "The perfect balance of new artists, up and coming established acts and, the always money in the bank, Cat Stevens, ensures us that we will continue to be a leader of the industry. Each and every act will receive the full benefit of A&M's sales and marketing strategy to establish their rightful places in today's market."

An example of this aggressive A&M marketing strategy is their "Total Commitment Campaign" for Lorence Hud. A&M went to extraordinary lengths to get the album established in this country. In speaking of the Hud campaign, Lacoursiere said: "We believe Hud has the potential of an international star and have backed up our belief with the biggest promotional campaign in our history."

National promotion manager, Pete Beauchamp, took advantage of the meets to familiarize the A&M people with upcoming single releases. These include product by Sounds 80, Randy Pearson and Keith Hampshire. According to Beauchamp, the A&M team has already demonstrated its abilities with single product through the establishment of the Blue Haze single, "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" and Valdy's "Play Me a Rock and Roll Song".

Keith Lawrence, who heads up the A&M-distributed Haida label, conducted a product seminar for the benefit of the distributors and stated, "Our association with A&M has already begun to bear fruit with the initial release by Valdy. After meeting with each distributor, I am more confident than ever that Haida Records will be an influence on the national record scene." Upcoming Haida product includes releases by "Stallion Thumrock, Spring, Cathy Stack and Claire Lawrence".

The three day-long meet concluded with the announcement of a window display contest, a national three month television campaign and a fall restocking program.

OTTAWA TRIBUTE TO PAUL ANKA

Paul Anka returned to his hometown of Ottawa Aug. 25 but this time to a red carpet instead of boos and catcalls. Even the Capital city's mayor, Pierre Benoit, took time out to head up the welcoming delegation at Ottawa's Uplands Airport. Somehow the rest of the country missed this great occasion and it had to be brought to RPM's attention by Denis Menard, formerly with CKBC Bathurst New Brunswick and now with the Canadian Radio-Television Commission.

It's been sixteen years since Anka hit with "Diana", the song that made him famous and sold more than nine million copies. Now, the same press that ignored him, or cut him up, were front and centre in handing out praises, even before they saw him in action at the Ottawa Fair. Don Butler, Citizen staff writer, wrote: "Backed by a 32 piece orchestra, Anka swung into a powerful version of For Once In My Life. In it he showed the qualities that helped make him a millionaire while still a teen-ager: the strong distinctive voice, his superb dynamic control, the consummate showmanship." The Citizen's Jim Blackwell displayed some of the old Ottawa "downer" attitude in reminding his readers that: "The skeltons which lay in Anka's professional closet seem to no longer exist. The ego and brashness of his younger days have apparently dissipated." Anka wrote a finale to his grandstand show while flying into Ottawa which drew the following from Blackwell: "It is doubtful it will become a smash hit, but through the melody of My Way the new

lyrics seemed to dispell some of that professional ego which has shouded him."

So, there was honest and there was tongue-incheek praise for the Ottawa boy who made good. The city named a street after him — Paul Anka Drive, and during his grandstand show, Mayor Benoit, Controller Claude Bennett and Lon Campbell, president of the Central Canada Exhibition Association officiated at a ceremony giving Anka a key to the city and a scroll making him "an honourary citizen of Ottawa." (Winnipeg's Mayor Juba was the first Mayor in Canada to honour local talent when he made the Guess Who honourary citizens of Winnipeg — back in the early sixties).

On completion of his two day engagement at the Fair which drew more than 100,000 people, Anka announced that his trustees are working on a scholarship fund for young Ottawa musicians.

HAMPSHIRE RETURNS TO DISC RACE

Scott Richards of the Record Club of Arabia did a little extra touting of A&M's latest signing, Keith Hampshire. Richards, delivered a copy of Hampshire's initial single for the label, "Daytime Night-Time", the old Manfred Mann hit penned by Mike Hugg. The session was produced by Bill Misener at RCA's Toronto studios with George Semkiw on the board. The Laurie Bower Singers were used as backup singers for the big session. One observer declared: "The best thing to happen for Hampshire since he discovered the cold remedy."

Hampshire is a valuable commercial property which could be used to advantage by the record company. He has been seen on national television, selling name brand products. He is also a valuable member of "live" theatre in Canada with several successful shows under his belt.

The flip, "Turned The Other Way" was written by Hampshire's producer, Bill Misener with publishing by Laurentian Music-BMI.

Mark Robbins, manager of Edward, Harding and George, has announced the setting of tour dates for the trio through the Eastern United States.

RCA's Carlton Showband have entered into a heavy schedule of Fall bookings that takes them well into November. The early part of September saw them at the Toronto Fair for 3 engagements as well as Fall Fairs in Brome, Quebec; Renfrew, Chatham and Picton. They moved west to the Assiniboia Fall Fair in Saskatchewan and flew back across the country for a date at the Shawville Quebec Arena (16).

So successful was the CTV "Special" on the "Pig & Whistle" group, that producer Johnny Johnson has scheduled another two specials, with one already aired Sept. 18 and the other later on in the season. Also coming up are dates in Alexandria (20), Lanark (22), Renfrew (23), Bolton (24) plus five days of taping of the "Pig & Whistle" and then they take the month out at the Niagara Falls Arena on the 30th.

October sees the Showband at the Royal York in Toronto (3), Huntsville (5), Hillsburg (6) and into Buffalo for the 7th. They'll be taping a "Special" Telethon at CTV on the 8th followed by the Sherbrooke Fair in Quebec (8). They move eastward and into the Atlantic Provinces with engagements at Moncton (11), Charlottetown (12-13), Sydney (14-15), Saint John (17), and finally into the University of New Brunswick (Fredericton) for two dates.

Moving westward the Showband are set for Quebec City (20) and the Ottawa Civic Centre (21) and then five days of "Pig & Whistle" taping (24-27) and a capper to the month of October at the Cornwall Armoury (28).

RCMP MOVING IN ON BOOTLEG TAPES

According to Bert Betts, executive secretary of the Canadian Recording Industry Association, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police have seized upwards of forty thousand tapes from more than one hundred distributors and dealers since the federal police body began to take steps against the illicit tape industry in April of this year.

The RCMP seizures are part of a stepped-up CRIA attack on tape bootleggers and pirates. Charges against those involved are now pending.

ROSCOE PRODUCTION BRINGING BACK BISCUIT

Joan Kirby of Moncton-based Roscoe productions advises of the second tour this year through the Maritimes by Daffodil recording artist, King Biscuit Boy, backed by the Gooduns. Itinerary is as follows: September 12, Dalhousie University, Halifax; September 13, University of New Brunswick, Fredericton; September 14, University of New Brunswick, Saint John; September 15, Mount Allison University, Sackville; September 16, Acadia University, Wolfville; September 17, Dalhousie University, Halifax, September 18, Sydney; September 21, Truro; September 22, University of P.E.I., Charlottetown; and September 23, University of Moncton, Moncton.

Back home in Toronto they play the Horse-shoe from Nov. 2 through the 4th.

Press coverage for the Carlton Showband has been exceptional. Joyce Walter of the Times-Herald in Moose Jaw, wrote: "I think it would be safe to say that no one was disappointed with the show and if they were they would certainly have to have a super reason."

VAriety reported that the Regina show pulled a gross of \$7,043 at the 2029 seat Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts with tickets scaled at \$4.00 compared to highly touted Doug Kershaw who drew a gross of \$2,493 from an audience of 743 with tickets scaled at \$4.50. The Showband appearance was booked by CKCK-TV who have booked the group back for March 13, 1973; while the Kershaw happening was booked by Cajun Canada Productions Ltd. of Calgary. Up in Saskatoon with the Showband booked into

the Centennial Auditorium by CFQC-TV they pulled a 50% capacity audience with tickets scaled to \$4.50.

The Carlton Showband are comprised of Mike Feeney, Seamus Grew, Sean McManus, Johnny Patterson, Freddy White, Christy McLaughlin, Bob Lewis and Chris O'Toole.

They first hit with their Arc album "Off To Dublin In the Green" which became a nationwide as well as an international success. They have had several records since then with one of their latest "The Best Of The Carlton Showband" (RCA Camden CAS 2483) certifying for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) last year. Their first CTV Special featured the group receiving their Gold Leaf Award from Bob Cook, vice-president and general manager of RCA's Record Division and their producer Jack Feeney.

He performs with the alacrity and poise of a thoroughbred and receives lively support from the Festival Strings of Lucerne. He is joined in the Double Concerto by an able partner, Regis Pasquier who is unfortunately not mentioned in the liner notes.

Interest in this recording will likely center on the conductor. Composer Hans Werner Henze has conducted many of his own compositions for Deutsche Grammophon label and this is his first venture into other repertoire. Eschenbach recently gave a first performance of a Henze Piano Concerto and they obviously share compatible views on what the Beethoven Third concerto is all about. An expansive, unhurried performance.

Late news from Truck Music Limited, who handle Kearney's promotion reveals that Kearney and his band, Pemmican, will participate in the Festival competition as well as make television appearances and attend scheduled international press conferences during his stay in Rio. There is no news that Kearney has submitted an unrecorded composition to the song fest. However, Magic Management, representing Kearney announces that upon his return he will make a number of personal appearances in Canadian and U.S. universities. It's also expected that Kearney will be included as an entry at the Midem Festival with a UK tour to coincide with the Riviera date.

BOBBY G. GRIFFITHS MAKES COMEBACK

The headline is a little misleading, Bobby G. Griffiths, has never been off the entertainment scene, he was just taking a breather while his manager Jules Rabkin was busy getting his foot into record company doors south of the border. Actually Rabkin didn't have to work too hard. He had a finished master, plus a very expensive CBC Transcription Service EP containing four of Griffiths' songs. These were "Sound Of Peace", "My Love, My Love", "Ain't No Chicken In Heaven" and "Donna Was A Woman". This session was produced by Jerry Toth with 21 musicians.

Rabkin worked the U.S. disc circuit, quietly but with much determination. He believed in Griffiths (they've been together for almost ten years) and he is a master at transferring enthusiasm. He received the ear of many A&R people but Dean Kay, of Vogue Music (Ranwood) fell in love with the sound of Rabkin's "Mr. Entertainment — Bobby G. Griffiths — sight unseen.

In an interview with Kay, RPM was told by Kay: "I just want you to know that we are very much involved with Bobby. We're going to be releasing his album here in the States on Ranwood, the same label, my boss Lawrence Welk, releases on. You know, you've got an awful lot going on in Canada, Toronto especially. We certainly want to generate as much, if not more, excitement in Bobby than anybody else who has come out of Canada, and we hope to turn him into a superstar. Welk is backing him 100% and we'll be bringing him down to do the show. This show will probably be a tribute to Canada with Bobby being the featured guest on the show. We'll be going with a single, 'The Sound Of Peace' and 'My Love My Love', written by Bobby with an album to follow. We are also into a publishing arrangement with him and artist contract. His session was produced at RCA in Toronto and that's where we would like to keep him. We like the sound. As a matter of fact we like a lot

of the sounds coming out of Canada and we're always looking for good masters from Canada."

The Griffiths' single will be released in Canada on the Quality label. A national push by the label is expected to coincide with several Canadian dates as well as Griffiths' appearance on the Lawrence Welk Show and his opening in Las Vegas before the end of the year. He is being booked by Queen's Booking out of New York, the same agency that books Sammy Davis Jr. Davis, who has already expressed an interest in Griffiths, will be in Toronto the first part of November to catch him in action.



One identifying feature about Griffiths is his ability to pick a strong back-up group. His band comprises George Dearling, drummer; Lou Fortin, bass; Valentine Bent, lead guitar; and Jimmy Carver, electric piano. Viewing his band alone, one might wonder why Griffiths surrounds himself with showman of this calibre. He showcases each of them, vocally and on their individual instruments. They, in turn, spotlight Griffiths with a very tight and professional assist,

Griffiths has just completed a successful engagement at Granny's in Toronto and moves uptown to the Friars for a couple of weeks commencing October 30th.

CAEDMON OPENS CANADIAN OFFICES

Caedmon, famous for its spoken word record works, has opened offices in Canada as a Division of D.C. Heath Canada Ltd. The Canadian operation is headed up by Cathy Ward who looks after public relations and promotion for the company. Ontario distribution is to be handled by Ray Johnston, who operates his own freelance sales and promotion firm. Almata Corporation of Montreal will look after distribution in Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces with a western distributor to be announced.

Caedmon, who release recorded works of Dylan Thomas, Poe, Ogden Nash as well as complete Shakespeare plays, will also release Canadian content recordings. Initial release will be Rich Little's "W.C. Fields for President" (Caedmon TC9101). The set, with no musical background, was edited and directed by Michael M. Taylor who noted: "In this album I have tried to extrapolate the original Fields humor from the book and to discard the superfluous padding, and employing the excellent talents of Rich Little, recreate as nearly as possible the campaign speeches as W.C. Fields intended to perform them in 1940!"

Scheduled for release are albums by the Travellers and Toronto poet Irving Layton.

Suggested retail for Caedmon single disc albums has been reduced from \$7.98 to \$7.29 with their Children's Best of All series at \$4.98. Cassettes are available on many releases but no 8 tracks have been considered for release.

It should be noted that Caedmon product is restricted for radio play. Permission may be granted, for broadcast, telecast or public performance use by writing in advance to Caedmon at Suite 1408, 100 Adelaide St. West in Toronto.

THUNDERMUG RECEIVES FULL LOCAL SUPPORT

London and area radio stations and retailers have sparked a tremendous amount of interest in local group Thundermug with various promotions and heavy airplay on their Axe album and current hit single "Africa". Both MOT radio stations CHLO in St. Thomas and CJOE London showcased the group as a Top 2 item for more than five weeks. Local retailer, Sam The Record Man, through manager Buryl Wilson, designed a flyer congratulating Thundermug on the sale of their 500th copy of "Thundermug Strikes". The flyer read: "This plateau superceeds any previous sale of one disc in such a short period of time." Buyer of the 500th album, Greg Brydon, had his money refunded and found himself in front of the cameras with Thundermug.

Much of the success of the album, on the

consumer level, was due the efforts of Vince Lasch, Ontario promo rep for London and Skip Fox of Media Man who provided much promotional material. Local bookings for Thundermug has also strengthened their popularity in their hometown. It's expected that the local press will lend a hand in popularizing the group.

Their current single, "Africa" has now picked up the new Ottawa MOT giant, CFGO, which moves it on to their survey at No. 22. Kingston's CKLC are in with a No. 6 while CKWS Kingston moves it from hitbound to the chart. They are also included on the CKPT chart at No. 26 and receiving heavy play at Welland as well as several other Ontario stations. Brent Marruci, former librarian at CJOE (now CJBK) and one of the programmers who gave top exposure to Thundermug, is now associated with the newly formed Hunter group.

GALLERY SINGLE IS NOT CANCON

Several radio stations have been under the misconception that the first hit by the Gallery, "Nice To Be With You" on the Sussex label, qualified as Canadian content. John Driscoll, A&R Director for Ampex reports that the Michael Theodore production was taped at Polaris Productions in Windsor in November of last year. His source of information was Ann Ausburn of Sussex records in New York. The Canadian Radio-Television Commission investigated and found that the disc was released in Canada after January 18, 1972 although U.S. copies were available before the official Canadian release. The single therefore does not qualify as Canadian content.

The single in question made it to No. 1 on the RPM 100 Singles chart July 1, 1972 and held this position for two weeks running. It was during the second week as No. 1 that the single was certified as Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award). According to Driscoll, "Nice To Be With You" has now sold in excess of 140,000 copies.

A&M SIGNS GREG ADAMS TO RECORD

Gerry Lacoursiere, A&M's managing director has announced the signing of singer composer, Greg Adams, to a long term recording contract. Adams, currently a resident of Montreal, will be produced for A&M by Yves LaPierre and George Kwasniak. A single release will occur in October or November.

Adams, who is bi-lingual, is making his recording debut through the A&M contract. He is managed by Ratch Wallace.

ONROT TO PRESENT McKUEN AT MASSEY

Martin Onrot's Encore Productions is presenting Rod McKuen in concert, October 23rd, at Massey Hall Toronto. The Massey gig is one of more than eighty concerts McKuen will be giving this year. He is well known for his books as well as his work as a composer and recording artist. Tickets are scaled from six dollars down to four dollars, plus tax.

HUMPHREY & DUMPTRUCKS NOW LOCATED IN TORONTO

Humphrey and The Dumptrucks wound up a successful week at Grumbles in Toronto and will now be working out of this city.

The former Saskatonians have established themselves across the country with Boot single and album product. Their most recent album release, "Hot Spit" has received heavy airplay from CHUM-FM as well as other "progressive sound" stations across the country. Most popular cut is "I'd Like To See You" which was culled as a single from the album. Their record sessions were produced by Boot's Mark Altman at RCA's Toronto, studios. Rumours have been circulating over a change in labels by the group which have now been shot down with the report that Humphrey and The Dumptrucks have re-negotiated with Boot.

Upcoming will be a new album release from the quartet. London's sales and promo rep for Edmonton, Jim Carey, is already touting the new album which he heard in its rough mix.

MORE SIGNINGS FOR FONTHILL

One of Canada's newest label complexes — Fonthill, Award and Fusion, have announced the signing of several new artists and groups. These include: Warpig from Woodstock; Ricky Francis of Kitchener; and a folk group from Brantford, Gary and Everill Muir. Singles and albums are now being readied for release.

The Fonthill label, headed up by Robert Thomson, recently bowed an album by Johnny Young, which has apparently created a healthy sales picture for the young Hamilton country singer. A single, "Rockin' As The Winds Blow" is now being set for release.

Thomson is also negotiating with Danny Coughlan and Des LaClair. The latter is produced by Gary Buck.

"Think about your children growing up Canadian" — nice thought expressed musically. Could catch on. Nice crisp sound with strong vocals. Lots of looseness which makes for an interesting set. Good storytelling album that should catch the Maritimer's ears.





Looking into the Cancon ruling

(7) If a station operator is able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Commission that the application of this section would result in a significant reduction in the quality and diversity of program service within the area normally served by his station, the Commission may vary the application of this section.

That's Section 7 of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission music ruling excerpt-

The Programmers CROSSTALK walt grealis

ed from the Radio (AM) Broadcasting regulations - June 24th, 1970.

The ruling clearly indicates that if any radio station finds the ruling is not viable, special status for the station may be established if the Commission feels the station is suffering actual hardship.

It is our understanding that, to date, there have been no special arrangements made by the Commission, which indicates that no approach was ever made under this provision, nor that any station has been able to indi-

cate actual hardship under the Canadian music ruling.

The ruling opens up every Canadian content record made, prior to January 18th, 1971 and makes it Canadian content forever if it only meets one of the four qualifications. Many programmers are still not aware of this. Every record released and qualifying, up to that date, is eligible to fulfil the 30% Canadian content ruling "thereafter", indicating for all time.

(6) A mechanical reproduction of a musical composition that is deemed at any time to be so deemed thereafter.

What a wealth of recording music, one portion of the ruling opens up for the programmer. Every Paul Anka composition, no matter who it is by; every Percy Faith and Guy Lombardo record, recorded and released before January 18th, 1972; all the music from "Hair", no matter who the artist is, or where it was recorded.

Any version of "The World Is Waiting For The Sunrise" would qualify as Canadian content, even though Gene Lockhart had only written the lyrics. Any version of "I'll Never Smile Again" written by Ruth Lowe, would qualify forever, if the recording was released before January 18, 1972. These are only the obscure and very old recordings that would qualify.

When the ruling was passed, it was suggested that RPM compile a catalogue of qualifying records. We turned down the chore because it was too large to handle. The number of Canadian content records that would qualify would be in the tens of thousands. Many record companies would find it impossible to dig up what they had in their archives, but many radio stations still have copies of the records - and they are still playable.

We heard in 1970 that certain shows would have to be cancelled because of the ruling, and that some radio personalities would be without a job because their programming could not fulfil the requirements. None of these things happened. What did happen was that librarians and music directors were forced to become familiar with Canadian content. That, in itself, is an accomplishment, in that it made their knowledge of music just that much more thorough.


For the many radio people who have never seen the ruling, we have again reprinted it below. Next week, we will take still another look at the ruling and take a positive approach toward explaining same. Any questions or comments from programmers or record companies are welcome.

Excerpt - Radio (AM) Broadcasting Regulations - June 24th, 1970

- "12. (1) At least 30% of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between the hours of 6.00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall be by a Canadian and shall be scheduled in a reasonable manner throughout such period.
- (2) From January 18, 1971 to January 17, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fulfils at least one of the conditions set out in subsection (5).
- (3) After January 18, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fulfils at least two of the conditions set out in subsection (5).
- (4) After January 18, 1973, at least 5 per cent of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between 6.00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall fulfil the condition set out in either (b) or (c) of subsection (5).
- (5) The following are the conditions referred to in subsections (2), (3) and (4): (a) the instrumentation or lyrics were principally performed by a Canadian;

- (b) the music was composed by a Canadian;(c) the lyrics were written by a Canadian; and(d) the live performance was wholly recorded in Canada.
- (6) A mechanical reproduction of a musical composition that is deemed at any time to be by a Canadian continues to be so deemed thereafter.
- (7) If a station operator is able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Commission that the application of this section would result in a significant reduction in the quality and diversity of program service within the area normally served by his station, the Commission may vary the application of this section.
- (8) For the purposes of this section, a person shall be deemed to be a Canadian if (a) he is a Canadian citizen;
- (b) he is a landed immigrant as defined in the Immigration Act; or
- (c) his ordinary place of residence was in Canada during the six months, immediately preceding his contribution to the musical composition in question."
