

Humphrey & the Dumptrucks

A few years ago the CBC had a show which featured Gordie Tapp hosting variety programs from various centres across the country. The name of the show eludes me, but not the name of a group that were on a program from out west. How can you forget a group with a name like Humphrey and the Dumptrucks?

Humphrey and the Dumptrucks began as an eight man jugband, formed specifically as a 'fill in' unit for Saskatoon's Blackstrap Folk Festival in 1967.


Although basically comprised of non-professional musicians, the band was so warmly received on its initial outing that the members decided to stay together "for laughs" if nothing else.

They met on weekends to play and increase their repertoire and before long they were being asked to perform at functions around Saskatoon.

By 1969 the group had reduced its strength to four people, and as a tight, compatible quartet they were much in demand for concerts and club dates throughout Saskatchewan.

You must remember that Humphrey and the Dumptrucks began during the time of rampant acid-rock pyschedellia. They came out of left field with a pure acoustic sound which combined elements of Bluegrass, Country, Folk and even a hint of rock. The DUMPTRUCKS continued on page 20





TERRENCE LYND APPOINTED CANADIAN GOLD VEEP/GEN MGR COLUMBIA

Terrence M. Lynd, a native of Whitby, Ontario, has been appointed Vice-President and General Manager of Columbia Records of Canada Ltd. He will officially take command of the Canadian operation Sept. 4/73.

Mr. Lynd first joined Columbia, as a comptroller, in 1961. He was appointed Executive Vice-President in 1968. He left this position to take over as Vice-President, Finance for Famous Players in 1971, a position he held until his Columbia appointment.

This is the first time since Columbia opened Canadian offices in 1954 that a Canadian has been appointed to head up the giant record complex.

RCA'S DIXON EXPLORES LIBRARY POTENTIALITY

With more than 7000 public libraries across Canada being almost ignored as a vehicle for the promotion of recorded product, RCA's Ontario promo rep, Neill Dixon, has taken it upon himself to research this field and has set up a pilot project. A sampling has revealed that many Chief Librarians are interested in recorded product but they are not tuned into the requirements of today's music listener. Dixon has discovered that some libraries are expanding their record collection and budgeting enough funds to cover the purchase of rock, country, folk. pop-mood, jazz and blues - a far-cry from their usual concentration on spoken arts and classical recordings.

One Chief Librarian, who has established his wide collection of recorded works, has found an increase in young traffic over the past four weeks with much emphasis on rock and jazz material. He reveals that on any given day, more than 400 of the 500 items are in circulation, Pop product circulates about three times each week. The demand is showing indications of becoming much more intense since the library installed three listening posts with headsets for in-house sampling.

The demographics range from eight to eighty, with pop lending heavy on teenagers, college students and young marrieds. There has been some concern as to whether retailers would object to this type of service, but it has been revealed that many record buyers would prefer to sample a particular album before buying. Record buyers have become much more discreet in their record purchases - no sample, no sale. This service from the libraries could stimulate sales at the local retail level. It was also discovered that many areas, serviced by libraries, do not have access to FM programming and, here again, the library service introduces product that would not be otherwise known or available.

One particular Chief Librarian concentrated on the country market and the availability of this type of product. After word got around, an increase in country traffic was registered. Jazz audiences in the same area is now beginning to build.

Dixon's sampling area, the city of Owen Sound, is a typical record buying Ontario

FOR McLAUCHLAN

Highlight of the recent "Family Of Music" presentation by Columbia Records Canada was the awarding of an industry Gold Award to Murray McLauchlan. The Gold Leaf Award, "for outstanding sales", was presented to McLauchlan for sales of his True North single, "Farmer's Song". The single, originally released in January of this year, with the flip, "Lose We" as the "A" side, was quickly flipped by country programmers who recognized "Farmer's Song" as having strong country flavouring. Actually, programmers became familiar with McLauchlan's all-format material through a mailing of a McLauchlan album by True North/Columbia and an accompanying letter pointing up selections that were country-oriented. When it was found that country programmers had shown an interest in "Farmer's Song" Charlie Camilleri issued a special mailing to the more than 185 stations across Canada that program country music.

GAGNE APPOINTED TO ALL RECORDS

Jacques Gagne has been appointed General Manager of All Records. He will be headquartered in Toronto, Mr. Gagne was formerly head of the Ouebec branch for Columbia Records. He first came to Columbia in 1962 where he took on duties as A&R assistant for French language product. In 1967 he took over as Branch Manager as well as the control of the French language A&R department

The latter part of 1970 All Records incorporated their Montreal branch and Gagne was picked to head up this operation as well which has given him an all-round knowledge of the record business generally.

Mr. Gagne will be reporting direct to Mr. Jack Robertson, Executive Vice-President, Columbia Records of Canada Ltd.

community. Musical outlets consist of a Towers and Woolco store in the Mall, a Muntz dealer and several other independents, including Blue Water Appliance, in the downtown area. Television is somewhat limited, there is no cable service, and only one radio station. The circulating record collection could therefore be a boon to local retailers.

Chief Librarian Andrew D. Armitage, of the Owen Sound Public Library, has welcomed RCA's launching of this project and is of the opinion that RCA can answer some of the basic questions about the effect of library record collections on the buying habits of customers of music and, perhaps, a new marketing device. Armitage has agreed to work with Dixon, using Owen Sound as a testing area, introducing questionnaires, written and selective; interviews; and checking with local record retailers on the change in buying habits of their customers.

Dixon's approach to the circulating record collection will be one of selectivity rather than random experimenting. There will, of course, be emphasis on Canadian product.

Country and pop music programmers almost immediately latched onto the McLauchlan sound. The single began climbing RPM's Pop Music and Country charts and on April 28/73 entered the RPM 100 Singles chart at No. 81. The stage was finally set and "Farmer's Song" became a Top Ten Canadian item on June 23/73.

It was noted in the presentation that "registering sufficient record sales to qualify for an Industry Gold Award is quite an achievement, particularly if you are handicapped by being a Canadian, McLauchlan, his manager, Bernie Finklestein and all the people from Columbia who strived to make McLauchlan a national habit across Canada, were representative of the togetherness that the Canadian recording industry is experiencing. The success of 'Farmer's Song' was an honest and sincere effort by programmers from all formats to showcase good, quality recorded product,"

McLauchlan has just put the finishing touches on his new album, produced at Eastern and Thunder in Toronto. Possible single release will be "Hurricane of Change" although Finkelstein also considers "You Need A New Lover Now" and "Linda (Won't You Take Me In)" as strong single material as well.

Upcoming dates for McLauchlan include the Philadelphia Folk Festival (Aug. 24-25-26) after which he will launch his Canadian tour. This will include dates in Vancouver (Sept 28) and Victoria (29). He will be back in Ontario for college dates in October and a Massey Hall engagement (Nov. 17) as well as the National Arts Centre in Ottawa (27).

PICCADILLY TUBE FEELS THE RUSH AUGUST 21ST

It's hard to say a band is debuting when they've been gigging around for the past five years, but Rush had their official industry debut last Tuesday evening at the Picadilly Tube in Toronto.

The band tells me that they sent out around 250 invitations to media people. How many showed up is hard to tell, but the joint was full and jumping to some of the best rock to ever come out of this town. Rush filled the evening with their hard sound that ran through all types of musical styles . . . blues, rock & roll, boogie and even a touch of country. No matter what the basic root of a song was, it got the Rush treatment and came out fast and hard. I've been trying to think up a new term for heavy metal music, but I haven't found one yet that can describe the kind of music that you not only hear but feel as the loud. raunchy vibrations bounce off you and everything else in the place.

By the time this article goes to print, Rush will have released their first single, "Not Fade Away". Surely everyone is familiar with this traditional rocker, but be prepared for it after the Rush treatment. It's on Moon Records and distributed by London. An album by the trio will be released in early September. The single manages to capture the excitement that they can whip up in a live performance and I have no doubt the album will do the same. - Peter Taylor

COMMUNICATION MEET

and whether we have the where-with all to produce this sound. We are also interested in how country records can be marketed without that awesome crutch - radio. There is one wholly Canadian-owned record company that has returned the owner a healthy living for many years, and he has never had to rely on radio play. A success story that will be revealed at RPM's Big Country.

If we're going to have a viable folk and country recording industry in Canada we must approach it and its problems with professionalism. We shouldn't cry "wolf", nor should we continue to bemoan our situation. Like every industry, there are those who do and those who don't. Unfortunately we are plagued with more of those who don't - and they are the most vocal. Communication is the only path to success. Producers, booking agents, country radio personalities, club owners, artists, managers, songwriters, publishers,

promotion men and anyone else who is interested in what goes down in country and folk should be ready to lend their support to the success of RPM's Big Country.

Guest speakers from Canada, and the successful U.S. country industry will lay a few surprises on those in attendance. We mustn't bury our heads in the sand and ignore what is going on south of our border.

We must endeavour to extend our hand - in friendship. Remember - success breeds success.

Also on hand will be a knowledgeable panel of Canadian industry people including programmers, producers, publishers, record company presidents, club owners, and many others who can evaluate the Canadian country music situation and, perhaps, open the door for new and more progressive thinking.



they sit back and continue to form their biased opinions of Canadian country performers based on their experience in the past? There may be a few dedicated agents, and perhaps a couple of club-owners (all from Toronto, no doubt!) How many agents are interested in upgrading the calibre of the performers in the country scene? After all, the clubs that book that "stuff" are considered "dives" and usually only pay scale or less. (The exceptions are well respected.) Club owners and managers are therefore in a position where they can persuade groups to accept less money just for the prestige of playing name "country" lounges that have a reasonably attractive setting and "decent" rooms for the musicians to stay in.

There will be a few artists and maybe even a few artists managers participating in the discussions; but will those who are always asking questions and demanding results from the industry be there? Probably not . . . they wouldn't waste their time offering criticism of a constructive nature; it's much easier to sit back and bitch at the country from some hidden corner of a smoke-filled bar.

Will there be many important record execs there?

Apart from the few majors that are really into country music, the other apathetic ones will be there mostly to lend deaf ears and token support, and to pay lip-service to a segment of their industry that they have chosen to ignore for too long! They don't need product that appeals to a minority audience that rack-jobbers won't even touch on a "guaranteed sale" basis; that gets exposed in the "best" time slots (after midnight and before six a.m.); that wouldn't get to first base in the U.S. market because their parent firms A&R people don't like it; and that needs some hard work and perseverance to develop. Besides, their promotion personnel are far too busy lavishing attention and the bulk of their time in TOP 40 product, to even listen to their country records. And on the odd occasion, when they get a chance to listen they must spend more. time on American product because the people in the U.S. who control the purse strings demand it. Fortunately, a few manufacturers have realized the need for specialists in the country promotion field, hired the personnel

and been rewarded with respectable results. Perhaps the management of other firms will soon come to the same conclusion and divert some of their efforts and budgets to this growing segment of the market.

The industry is in a dire state indeed when seasoned country performers begin looking to budget labels to establish a reputation for themselves across the country. They have even begun frowning at the major labels because of their past unfortunate experiences involving the lack of understanding, cooperation, promotion and financial rewards. It is so sad that the industry should have built such a false aura of success in the minds of everyone who goes into the studio thinking that they have finally made it to stardom.

Can we eliminate the caste-system in the industry and give equal treatment to the artists and poor, "demented" folks who program and listen to country music full-time?

We must first rid ourselves of some of our misconceptions of the country-music audience — many of them will buy regular-priced albums and tapes; they will spend \$5.00 or \$6.00 on a concert ticket to see their favorite acts; they do drink other things than draft beer; they don't all live in low-rental housing; they don't all come from the Maritimes or out West; they are a most loyal audience; and they are certainly more than a faceless crowd, they are "real people".

It will change for the better, despite the apathy and low-profile attitudes of many, because country-music, Canadian or otherwide, contains some ingredients not usually found in other types of music; its subject matter is realistic, down-to-earth, and so damned easy to understand that it hits close to home in everyone's life. Perhaps, that's why we tend to respect it less.

WHAT BIG COUNTRY SHOULD BE

- (a) A dialogue of people from every phase of the industry, perhaps even in co-operation with the Canadian Country Music Association with an ultimate goal of developing a Country DJ Convention for Canada with as many acts as possible appearing through the courtesy of their record labels.
- (b) A rallying point for country programmers to organize themselves into a cooperative network of information, including the sharing of news, interviews, special features etc
- (c) An occasion for truly constructive workshops involving production, song-writing and even performing. It would sure assist those young performers who are genuinely interested in becoming part of the country scene.
- (d) An honest opportunity for everyone to meet and communicate with as many of the people in the industry as possible-not just another occasion to "hype" everyone else and to wine and dine them for future consideration.
- (e) Something for the whole industry to look forward to with excitement, knowing that it is a prestigious event, not just

another "beef session" or gabfest. Something organized and co-ordinated to provide all with an opportunity to learn more so that they can contribute to the industry in their individual fields, on a more meaningful basis.



GODSPELL CLOSES AFTER RECORD BREAKING RUN

After 488 performances the religious rock musical Godspell has become the longest running Canadian production. The show closed at the Playhouse theatre on August 12.

It surpasses "Oh Coward" which had 470 consecutive performances at the Theatre in the Dell.

Godspell, which featured an all-Canadian cast, opened in June of 1972 at the Royal Alexandra Theatre and took a week off before moving to the Playhouse in September of that year. The show closed because the 500-seat theatre was just half-filled during July.

Hair now becomes the third longest-running production with 432 performances.

VANCOUVER SOCIETY FOR EARLY MUSIC NEW SEASON

"The Music of The Flemish Masters" will fill the Pacific Ballroom of the Hotel Vancouver as the Vancouver Society for Early Music opens its 1974/74 season on September 21st.

The members of the Hortulani Musicae (Ingrid Suderman, Ray Nurse, David Skulski, Patrick Wedd and Jon Washburn), Vancouver's young early music ensemble, will sing and play the music in authentic 17th century style using copies of historic instruments, such as recorder, viola, da gamba, harpsichord and lute. The music featured will be that of six prominent Flemish composers.

The agreement, signed by Art Snider, President of Sound Canada, and Joseph Pariselli, national marketing manager for AMD also gives AMD the tape rights for Periwinkle products in all of Canada.

EMILY QUATTRIN LAUNCHES NEW LABEL

Ralph Cruickshank (Berandol Music) and Paul Zaza (Zaza Sound Productions) have recently signed upcoming talent, Emily Quattrin to their newly formed label, ZSP. Records. Emily who plays piano and guitar hails from Woodbridge, Ontario, is seventeen and has about 100 songs she has written including her new single "Next Plane Back Home" backed with "Someone's Gotta Make You Smile".

Cruickshank has received favourable reaction to this first ZSP artist and plans for new artists in the future. Emily will be going into Zaza's Studio to record an album of her songs with Zaza producing.

The label has no distributor as yet, but negotiations are underway with Quality's George Struth for national distribution.

CLASSICAL REVIEWERS TO HEAR MOODY BLUES CONCERTS

On the heels of an announcement of the forthcoming international tour by the Moody Blues, invitations were extended to classical music reviewers in the U.S. This is the first time that a gesture of this kind has been made by a rock group. The classical reviewers will join the pop and rock writers invited to the concerts.

The Moody Blues have always been primarily a Rock and Roll band. However the Moodys and Threshold Records would like to stay away from categorizing their music.

The group has received critical acclaim from all segments of the musical spectrum ever since the release of their album "Days of Future Passed" in 1968. The album featured the Moodys playing with the London Festival Orchestra. The decision to invite classical reviewers is in response to the interest that such critics have shown in the Moody Blues albums.

Though the Moodys have not played with a classical orchestra since "Days of Future Passed", they are referred to by Tony Clarke, their producer, as "the smallest Symphony orchestra in the world". Between the five members of the band, they play a total of 16 instruments including the orchestra synthesizing mellotron.

It has been further announced that the members of the Moody Blues have been invited to lecture at the famed Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York.



FLUDD ON THE TUBE LIVE FROM WINNIPEG

On a Thursday night around 7:30, try to park your carcass in front of the tube and watch a CBC show from Winnipeg Called "Live". The program runs 30 minutes long and devotes the whole time to spotlighting one group or artist in a live concert format,

On August 9, the show featured Fludd and their Toronto flash. With only one commercial break in the entire half hour the band was able to cook through some longer numbers generally not possible on the television medium because of tight timing between advertisements. Fludd is a band that grows on you. By that I mean that I find them better each time I see them.

I guess you could call Fludd, Canada's glitter band. When they hit the stage your eyes are assaulted by the flash of sequins, glitter make-up, satin duds, feathers and five guys. who don't believe in standing still while they rock. At the same time, your ears are soaking up some of that good old high volume music.

In the past, it's been my experience that rock bands don't really come off well on television. It's extremely difficult to capture. the live feeling, but producer Ron Cantor handles this situation beautifully on "Live". The show is not recorded in a studio but rather in the Winnipeg Playhouse before a live audience. Sometimes this situation can cause a boomy echoing sound but the sound on "Live" is good and well-balanced, even when Fludd have the volume and the energy level high,

There's little or no promotion on this show, so chances are that you haven't heard about it. I had to get turned on to it by Fludd's manager. Pick up on the TV Guide and scan the Thursday night listings for confirmations, but generally the guide doesn't know which particular band will be featured.

Overall, we give the show an "A" for content and structure. - Peter Taylor

"COUNTRY MUSIC HAS COME A LONG WAY" Bill Anderson

Decca's country super star Bill Anderson brought home a sobering yet encouraging point during his speech at the Broadcast Executives Society luncheon, Monday Aug. 13. Country music, a \$100 million dollar business a year, is being programmed by more than 56% of U.S. stations (80% in Canada), with more than 700 AM and 300 FM stations in Canada and the U.S. into a wholly country format.

Anderson pointed out that "hillbilly" music developed into country music and an important part of the scene just after the war. Webb Pierce, Hank Williams and Lefty Frizzell, among others began to have their heyday. In 1955 Elvis Presley, who got his start with "hillbilly" music, brought world attention to the guitar and, at the same time, a death knell to country music. But, as Anderson put it: "Country music was only asleep. This music of communication was a mirror reflecting the legend and folk lore of North America — it's the sadness in a man's heart brought out in the open." Anderson

GROUP PROFILE

SNAKEYE

Snakeye's United Artists single, "Blue Feeling", has shown good sustaining power across the country with much of their strength coming from the Atlantic provinces. The Halifax-based group is comprised of: Allard Barkhouse, drums



and lead vocals; Tony Argent, guitar and backup vocals; James White, guitar and backup vocals; Kenny Umphrey, bass and lead vocals. The group was formed in 1971 and gathered a large following throughout the Atlantic Provinces. They tried the wax trip on their own and bombed out. They later teamed up with Keith Iollimore of Lighthouse which led to a meeting with Paul Hoffert of H.P. and Bell Ltd., the production arm of Lighthouse. The group finally found themselves in session at Toronto's Thunder sound and their first single success, "Blue Feeling" produced by Jollimore. Both sides of their single ("Choked Up" the flip) were penned by Snakeye with publishing by Hopo & Boco Music-BMI.

went on to explain that country music, today, has grown in popularity because, what is being presented is being accepted by every age group because of its real approach to life.

Anderson, who hosts his own country television show, seen on 126 U.S. stations, is one of the leaders in country music awards. He has been awarded 30 BMI Awards and been voted Male Vocalist of the Year, among others. His records, all Anderson originals. have sold in the millions. These include "Where Have All the Heroes Gone" and "Still". He remembers, when in 1959 one of his first personal appearance tours was a ten day junket in Canada. "I was amazed -I returned home with \$300 whole Canadian dollars". The Georgia-based ex-disc jockey, like so many of the country singers to the south, is tuned in to the Canadian country music scene, and would like to see Canada give more recognition to its country artists.

The Broadcast Executives Society, through BMI's Harold Moon, arranged for Anderson to hear an excellent sampling of what Canada has to offer in the way of country music. Rudy Meeks showed his champion fiddle winning form with a waltz, a jig and a reel, all done within three minutes. Diane Leigh, Canada's "Queen of Country Music"

gave a sampling of her work including "Sing Happy" which made it to No. 1 in Canada and her newest, "Making It Over The Hill". Gary Buck, who made it to Toronto only because Dougie Trineer and Paul Menard gave up their Air Canada seats in Halifax just hours before the luncheon, was in good form with "Sandy" and Joe South's "Don't It Make You Want To Go Home?". John Allan Cameron and his guitarist Richard Stewart presented a clever musical package of toe-tapping Maritime cum Irish Tom-foolery that gave the broadcasters an insight into what was listenable, hummable and ... programmable. This included his favourite Bruce Cockburn composition, "Goin' Down the Road", a little bit of Cape Breton fiddle magic and "Dear Abby".

Host/chairman of the luncheon was James T. Inch, president of the Broadcast Executive Society. Head table guests were: John Larke (CHYM Kitchener), Ray Stephens (CMPA), John Mills (CAPAC), Marce Munro (CBC), Alan Wood (Musicians' Union), Keith Campbell (CTV), Don Lawrie (Northern Broadcasting), Harold Moon (BMI), Peter Hill (Global TV), Cam Ritchie (BMI), Ross Reynolds (GRT Records), Jack Starr (Horseshoe Tavern), Peter Webb (CFGM), and Walt Grealis (RPM).

LEE MICHAELS — AN INDEPENDENT ARTIST

During his recent visit to Toronto, I had the pleasure of spending a few hours talking with Lee Michaels. In a hotel room, along with various members of the press we discussed music in general and Lee's music in particular. One of the most memorable quotes of the day was when he said jokingly. "I wasn't cut out for this life!". He went on to add that he really wanted to get a boat, build a recording studio on it and cruise around making records which he would mail to the record company every six months. He does have his own studio in his home in Mill Valley, California. Having your own studio has become almost a big ego thing for musicians but it really isn't that way with Michaels. One of the first things you notice about him is his independence. He has his freedom and cherishes it very much. Recording in his own home allows him the time and the solitude to produce his own music his own way.

It hasn't always been that way with Lee Michaels. Recently he left A&M. Records and is now with Columbia, He's happy with Columbia because they leave him alone. His greatest desire is to be left alone to be what he wants to be musically. It is this point that makes you understand why he has given up playing the organ for the piano. He is now playing guitar and announced that he will soon give up the piano for it exclusively. Michaels is known best as a keyboard man and primarily an organist. The way the public views and listens to him really doesn't concern him. He has his own musical goals and will pursue them regardless of opinion and regardless of how the public thinks he should sound and what he should play.

Lee Michaels is a man who enjoys his privacy and likes to keep to himself and his friends. His personal life is just that -- personal. In all

the time I spent with him he never touched on his personal life. In the entertainment business today people feel the need to know everything about a performer. They actually feel it is their right to pry. A man's life outside his professional one is his own and his privacy should be recognized. Michaels is his own man. He only wants to play weekend gigs now because long tours take too much out of him and keep him away from home too long.

Chances are that his attitude will put many people off. The refreshing thing about Lee Michaels is that he really doesn't care what other people think about him. He will continue to write and record his music which he will present to the public on his future albums. Whether they accept or reject him is their own business.

Because of past, bad experiences with the press and public relations people, Lee Michaels has been against any kind of rapport with media representatives. Now he knows that he has certain obligations to his public and now talks to the press. It's only been about a year since this change took place in him. As he said to me, "This is the new Lee Michaels . . . Co-operate, co-operate." — Peter Taylor

LYNDA LAYNE JOINS WITH FRANK POLLARD





She decided to get into the record business, and a chance meeting with Joe Palaschuck led to her recording session. Instrument back-up is supplied by John Arpin, keyboards; Zeke Sheppard, harmonica; Terry Clark, drums; and Ollie Strong on steel.

He opens in Toronto at the Horseshoe Tavern for a three night stint September 6 to 8, then through Ontario; Grand Valley (14). Kincardine (15), Manitowaning (17), Fort Frances (21), Dryden (22), Brandon, Manitoba (25), Yorkton, Saskatchewan (26), Estevan (27), Weyburn (28), and Swift Current (30). In October Tom swings through Alberta stopping at: Medicine Hat (1), Lethbridge (2), Calgary (3), Red Deer (5), Edmonton (6), Edson (7), Prince Albert, Saskatchewan (13), Melfort (15), Saskatoon (16), Regina (17), Wynyard (18) and Winnipeg, Manitoba (21).

NEW ALBUM AND SINGLE DUE FROM LIGHTHOUSE

The album will be released simultaneously in Canada and the U.S. with Polydor bringing it out south of the border.

H.P. & Bell are busy working on a number of projects with their artists. An album from Snakeye, who have a single on the RPM 100 "Blue Feeling", is in the final production stages as is an album for Flying Circus. Deals are being made for U.S. distribution of Bill King's album, "Goodbye Superdad" and H.P. & Bell are working with Capitol Records for a new country artist who calls himself Em. He will be the host of a new music series to be aired on Global television in the beginning of 1974.

Illusionist Doug Henning is working with producer Ivan Reitman to get a stage show ready for the fall. The show will be called Spellbound and will feature rock and magic acts.

AMPEX' YOUNG IN MIAMI JACKSON 5 IN MONTREAL

Currently engaged in a six week gig at the Marco Polo in Miami Beach are Ampex recording artists Young. They are now over halfway through their stint and have been playing to sell out crowds almost every night.

When Young wraps up the Miami Beach engagement their next stop is Mexico City. Following this gig they are scheduled to return to Toronto for work on their album. John Dee Driscoll will be producing Young at the RCA Studios.

Ampex also reports that the Jackson 5 will be in Montreal for a concert August 28,

GOOD NOISE PRODUCTIONS EXPANDS OPERATIONS

Montreal based Good Noise Productions, under the direction of well-known Canadian producer Andre Perry, has entered a new operational phase with the creation of Good Noise Records.

A recently signed distribution deal between Perry and Barclay Records will see new, original product released in Canada on the Good Noise label, while individual arrangements will be negotiated for U.S. and international releases.

First product from the new label, scheduled for September release, includes the debut album by Man Made, a group from Montreal. Quickly following will be the first album release by Jackson & Hawke, a duo that hails from Sault Ste. Marie, and the first single by singer-songwriter Brian Blain who has production credits of his own including the latest Fraser and DeBolt album on Columbia.

Good Noise Productions will continue independent production and packaging services for other companies, as well as maintaining production of material for the French market.

The single has now moved into the Top 5 at CKBY-FM in Ottawa.

On tap are dates in Chesterville and other Ontario communities including the Ottawa Fair parade in conjunction with CKBY-FM. He will be taping the Tommy Hunter Show (CBC-TV) the first week in September and then will move off on club and one nighter dates throughout northern Ontario. He has also been firmed for several dates in the U.S. during the month of November.

An extensive tour of Newfoundland is now in the planning stages.

Hooper is currently chalking up good sales with his Dominion album, "Fourteen Big Country Hits". A single is expected to be culled for a September release.

WALL TO RELEASE ON RODEO INTERNATIONAL

Michael T. Wall, "The Singing Newfoundlander", has signed a recording agreement with George Taylor's Rodeo International. His initial release will be an album of Newfoundland songs with release on the Banff label distributed by London. It's expected the album will be released in Australia, Ireland the the U.S.

Wall has had much success over the past couple of years, lending his time and effort to entertaining inmates of correction institutes throughout Ontario as well as establishing himself at country fairs and jamborees.

His efforts in promoting Newfoundland was recognized last year by Premier Frank Moores who presented Wall with an Award honouring him as an Ambassador of Newfoundland's music culture.

With more than 65,000 Newfoundlanders now living in Toronto, Wall's homebase, much concentration will be placed on this particular area. He is also planning an extensive tour of the Atlantic Provinces which would hopefully develop into a cross-Canada tour.

U.A./BROWN BAG END DISTRIBUTION DEAL

Michael Stewart, president of United Artists Records Inc. and Terry Knight, president of Brown Bag Records Inc. have announced the termination of their present distribution deal. Knight and Stewart issued a joint news release the first of this month. They both believe that it would be in the best interests of all parties concerned to terminate all contractual relationships effective August 1.

country sound was years away at this time from becoming what it has. To come out playing this kind of music in those days was often very dangerous financially. But theirs was "good time music", the type that endures regardless of the fluctuating fads and fancies of the music industry.

Now some six years later, Humphrey Dumptruck (Gary Walsh), Graeme Card, Michael Taylor and Michael Millar are still together. Their music has matured somewhat, which is only to be expected, but the good time feeling that they began with still prevails.

With two albums, as well as numerous TV and live performances behind them, the group has attained a strong measure of national popularity which has been further enhanced with the release of their latest album (their first for United Artists) entitled "Saskatoon", It was this album that brought them back to the attention of this writer and it provides perfect examples of what Humphrey and the Dumptrucks are all about. For the most part it consists of original compositions by members of the group and it showcases the tremendous musical abilities of each man vocally as well as instrumental. The boys are now recognizing a certain amount of success on the charts with their first U.A. single, "Snowball (If Wishes Were Horses)".

It's best to stay away from categorization when discussing their records for it can't be called rock, country, MOR or folk music. It is simply Dumptruck Music, a unique sound with universal appeal.

Musically, the group looks like this: Humphrey Dumptruck (Gary Walsh) plays banjo and dobro with the experience that ten years of diligent playing gives you. He also delivers a strong vocal styling to the group and his writings generally lean to the music though he has written some fine lyrics as well. Graeme Card is an English kid who came to Canada in his mid-teens and before Dumptrucking he had his own career as a folk singer. A prolific songwriter and a fine flat picking guitarist, Graeme is equally at home on mandolin, concertina, harmonica, dulcimer, string bass and even a little piano. His deep voice blends well with the others and adds a richness to the vocal sound. Michael "Bear" Millar is the only native of Saskatoon and brings his self-taught bass talent to add the bottom. He also shines on banjo and twelve string guitar, not to mention gut bucket, jug and bagpipes. Michael Taylor is from southern Saskatchewan and he adds the rhythm with his fine old Gibson six string guitar. He also plays autoharp and maintains a good, down home beat on washboard during the "juggy" tunes. Together with Graeme Card, Michael has written many of the songs in the Dumptruck repertoire.

Yep, it's pretty hard to forget a group with the unlikely name of Humphrey and the Dumptrucks, but an old Druid proverb springs to mind that goes . . . "A weird name does not a good group make". And that is very true with Humphrey and the Dumptrucks. They back up their unique, humourous name with solid talent and creativity.

NEW ALBUMS

FERRANTE AND TEICHER The Roaring 20's United Artists UALA 072-F

Roaring 20's music with the Ferrante/Teicher Orchestra includes all the goodies from "Sweet Georgia Brown" to "Five Foot Two, Eyes of Blue". It was fashioned for the MOR listener in mind and will no doubt gain popularity with its fresh approach.

JERMAINE JACKSON Come Into My Life Tamla Motown M775L

This album has received the finest in technical and production attention possible, and with reason - this talent must be pampered. Side one has a more mature sound to it than the usual Jackson Five material. Mature enough to qualify for MOR programming, anyway. But side two was saved for the many fans of Motown product, and includes dynamite like "The Bigger You Love" and Jermaine's rendition of "Does Your Momma Know About Me".

ALBERT HAMMOND The Free Electric Band Mums Records K232267

Philosopher/poet/singer Hammond has teamed up with Mike Hazelwood in writing and has performed and produced this, his second album. The title song is a musically sound rendition of Hammond's love for music while the other parts of the album show us his thinking side and concern for peace. Should have a wide range of appeal. Lyrics enclosed.

MIKE SILVER Troubadour MCA 348

This is the newest product in a series of releases from Rocket Records (Elton John). The lyrics and music have an unexplainable strength to them and the presence of British quality is obvious. "Pioneer's Return" is dedicated to Bob Dylan and turns out to be our fave. By the end of side two, Silver reminds us that what we have heard so far is . . . "To Be Continued".

IAN MATTHEWS Valley Hi Elektra EKS 75061

lan Matthews used to be with Matthew Southern Comfort. He is now on his own with his debut album and getting help from Michael Nesmith, ex-Monkee. Nesmith doubles as musician/producer for this set and this probably had much to do with the country nature of the album. "Keep on Sailing", an FM pick, makes you feel as good as Matthew seems to feel when he's singing it.





BEDLAM Bedlam Chrysalis/CHR 1048

Good, no-holds-barred rock with a Mountain-like sound probably due to the album's being produced by Felix Pappalardi and some of the songs being co-written by his wife Gail Collins. Notable tunes: "Hot Lips" and "Putting On The Flesh".





CAPTAIN BEYOND Sufficiently Breathless Capricorn CP 0115

Hard rock to be sure, and sounding a touch like some of the super British bands in their early stages. Not a bad effort either, considering its a first attempt, with lots of room for development. Strictly progressive appeal and late night FMers should take note of the special effects and hidden message in "Voyages of Past Travellers"...decode at 78 rpm.





CHIP TAYLOR Chip Taylor's Last Chance Warner Bros. BS 2718

From the fella who gave us "Angel of the Morning" and "Wild Thing" comes his first solo album that's just pure country. This album would be a welcome asset to the cab of any truck. The strange thing is that Chip Taylor comes from Metropolitan New York City... sort of an urban cowboy.





STOMPIN' TOM CONNORS To It and At It Boot Records BOS 7127 Proud and stompin', Tom Connors shows us how easily and naturally singing and twanging comes to him. Apart from having generous amounts of fun and humour throughout Stompin' Tom gets into some serious stuff with his "Martin Hartwell Story" and ballad of Don Messer. Titler is as amusing as it is right on. And it's MAPL through and

through.




LORI LIEBERMAN Becoming Capitol ST 11203

This chick is a fine singer. Her music and lyrics are managed by the Fox/Gimbel team and fashioned for her vocal talents. There is however, an unfortunate resemblance to other female vocalists even though it does not really hamper the ear pleasing music she sings. Perhaps she needs another album to become. Title song does have merits and gives her the foundation she needs.

MUSSORGSKY-RAVEL Pictures at an Exhibition MUSSORGSKY Pictures at an Exhibition (Original version) George Szell conducting the Cleveland Orchestra Sviatoslav Richter - Pianist ODYSSEY Y 32223

Here we have on side one the magnificent orchestral transcription by Maurice Ravel of Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition backed on side two with a performance recorded live at a concert in Bulgaria in 1958 by Richter of the original version for Piano solo. (Horowitz used his own arrangement of the work while Moiseiwitch's unsurpassed performance for American Decca features an arrangement by Thumer). The recorded sound for



George Szell's magnificent orchestra is brilliant and clear while Richter is at the mercy of a live performance sound which is hard and shallow. The playing is nervous and unsteady, with the "Promenade" whacked out in the same perfunctory manner each time it appears.

HEINRICH SCHLUSNUS Vo. 1 LEBENDIGE VERGANGENHEIT 108

From German Disc Import Co. Ltd., 4895 Dundas St. W., comes an interesting label from Austria called "Lebendige Vergangenheit" (let's hear you say that three times fast!) The discs are all mono and feature singers popular in Europe in the early part of the century. Heinrich Schlusnus was one of Germany's greatest Baritones. He was born in Braubach am Rhein in 1888 and died in 1952. This disc features performances recorded for Deutsche Grammophon between 1927 and 1937. The orchestra is generally the "Orchester der Staatsoper Berlin" and conductors include Clemens Krauss and Leo Blech. The main offering is four "chunks" from Wagner's "Tannhauser". Also included are arias from Verdi's "Rigoletto, Gounod's Faust, Marschner's "Hans Heiling", and Lortzing's "Ondine" and "Zar and Zimmermann". This magnificent singer was as popular in his day as Fischer-Dieskau is to-day. Although this disc features him in operatic arias, he will be remembered by many mainly as a lieder singer. The reproduction is remarkable, with little evidence of the original 78 RPM source.

ENGLISH BAROQUE TRUMPET MUSIC Maurice Andre - Trumpet L'Ensemble Orchestral de L'Oiseau-Lyre conducted by Pierre Colombo L'Oiseau I yre OLS 160

This disc originally appeared in the catalogues in 1955 and it now re-appears on L'Oiseau-Lyre's "Lyre Bird" series which is available in Britain at budget prices. It appears in Canada as a higher priced line due to the fact that London Records imports them. However, it is a twenty year old mono recording, electronically reprocessed and one wonders why, if they felt that they had to release it at all, they didn't press it in Canada and make it available at a sensible price. There are too many fine stereo recordings of Baroque Trumpet music at present in the catalogues for this disc to be competitive. The works featured include the Trumpet Concerto in D major by Richard Mudge, the Suite in D major by Jeremiah Clarke and Capel Bond's Trumpet Concerto in D major. A painfully dull listening experience.

FESTIVE MARCHES Various Orchestras and conductors DGG 2538 264


A collection of bright, glittering marches from the classical, romantic and modern repertoire is offered in this latest release in Deutsche Grammophon's successful "Festival of Hits" series. Beethoven is represented by marches from his Opera "Fidelio, the Wellington's Victory Symphony and the "Ruins of Athens" while Berlioz is represented by two excerpts from "The Damnation of Faust". Johann Strauss offers the Radetzky March and the Persian March, while Verdi features marches from II Trovatore and Don carlos.













BRAHMS Piano Concerto No. 2 in Bb Op. 83 Leon Fleisher - Pianist The Cleveland Orchestra conducted by George Szell ODYSSEY Y 32222

This disc makes available the companion disc to Fleisher's admirable recording of Brahms' Piano Concerto No. 1 in D minor Op. 15 which was released a few months ago on Odyssey Y 31273. Fleisher's collaboration with the late George Szell produced many fine recordings including the complete Beethoven Concerti, the two Brahms concerti and the Grieg and Schumann works. It is good to have them all once again available. Both conductor and pianist offer artistry of the highest technical and musical order and the recorded sound, in true stereo is more than adequate.

STEPHEN BISHOP PLAYS CHOPIN PHILIPS 6500 393

This young American pianist was a pupil of British pianist Dame Myra Hess. He has made a distinguished series of recordings for Philips mainly of works by Beethoven, Brahms, Bartok and Schumann. His Chopin recital features the Polonaise No. 7 in Ab Op. 61 (Polonaise-Fantasie), the Impromptu No. 3 in Gb, three Mazurkas, the Barcarolle in F sharp Op. 60 and a pair of Nocturnes Opus 62. The playing is big, beefy and passionate. No moon-lit dreaming here. Philips always have great success with their piano sound and this disc is outstanding. Sound playing of a high technical order.

Vancouver goes through changes

by Dave Chadwick

Vancouver is a different radio market from the rest of Canada. That statement was proven this week by two developments in the radio scene there......a ratings book that showed massive changes in audience over the last BBM, and, in an unrelated (later) change, leading (circulation) station CKLG introduced a new morning show and proceeded to promote it in several unusual ways that would seem too far out in left field in most other markets of Canada.

Let's look first at the rating book. CKNW, long the weekly circulation leader, lost its crown to CKLG's contemporary music. (However, CKNW is still tops in quarter hours.) CHQM was the only other AMer besides CKLG to show circulation gains, as all the others lost ground. Substantial losses in all parts of the rating book were apparently felt by CKVN. The station had shown a doubling or tripling in numbers when CHUM changed the programming, but slipped back a bit in March '73 and still further in July '73, although the rating is still higher than the other owners had at this time last year.

Among the talk formats, John Rody on CKVN is one of the major successes of that station, but No. 1 mid-mornings goes to CKNW's Investigators, followed closely by Jack Webster at CJOR. The latter with six-CHADWICK continued on page 24

Chartbuster of the week: we have three for you, namely B.W. Stevenson, Cher, and Grand Funk. All three records are confirmed from coast to coast with the major radio charts. B.W. Stevenson was charted at CJME, CKXL, CKLW and CFRW this week (previous total was CKOC, CKLG and CKRC). Meantime Cher was charted at CKXL, CKRC, CKLW and CFRW (previous cumulative of CKOC, CFGO and CKLG). And Grand Funk got charted at CFRW, CKGM and CKLG (last week's total was CKOC, CKRC, CFGO CJME and CKLW).

Canadian smash of the moment is Chester. Not only does this record have airplay on nearly 90% of the big-city stations, it is also SELLING at a good clip and will likely be one of the ten biggest Canadian singles of the year. The record was charted this week at CKRC, CHED and CKLG (last week's chart reports showed CFRW, CFGO and CKLW with several other stations placing it on playlist)

Four Tops are reviving now in Canada after nearly three months on the market. Charted this week at CJME, CKXL and CHED (previous chart was from CKRC).

Cross Country (formerly the Tokens) have regional chart action now. Added to CFGO's and CKXL's chart this time around (previous chart station: CKLG).

Gary & Dave is a record getting excellent airplay on major stations and is now showing signs of transferring this action into charts. This week, CKXL charted "Could"

teen hours a day of talk radio, looks to be showing good trends with Webster (formerly with CKNW) and they predict further gains for their station. As for the others, the winners love the summer BBM and the losers feel it was inaccurate. Here's the breakdown for you:

As for CKLG's morning time, music director Roy Hennessy (a 9-year CKLG veteran), has returned to the 6-9AM slot with a promotion in Tom MacLean's Leisure Magazine (a city listings magazine). This consists of a nude centrefold (created by photographer Ralph Wallis) backed by editorial and pics of Hennessy at work. The reaction so far: the station is using words like "stunning" and "incredible" and feels the excellent acceptance has been well worth it. The whole town is talking about the centrefold, and the fact that two hotels have banned the photo has only served to redouble the public's curiosity.

Of course, that's not all it takes for a winning radio station. But the award-winning programming items "People's Commercials" and Hennessy's expert music mind always helps too. And in the volatile Vancouver market, where listeners are fickle and the whole pace of life is different, contemporary radio as performed on CKLG seems to be the coming thing.

Mark Lindsay has partial gains in our sample for "California". Onto CHSJ and CJIC this week (last week, CFJC).

And Neil Diamond's "Long Way Home" is starting to pick up (another record out by Neil on MCA also). The Bang disc "Long Way Home" added by CHSJ and CJIC this week (from last week, CHEC).

Five other records have shown up with two breakout additions apiece, all in their first week out. These "possibles" for you to consider are Spinners (CKRD and CFJC); Steely Dan (CKWS and VOCM); Olivia Newton-John (CKWS and CKLC); Marvin Gaye (CKWS and CHEC); and Marty Butler (CFJC and CJIC).

Doug Fix (Md) and Glen Moore (assistant MD) have a note from CKRD Red Deer for programmers. It's about the new Spinners "Ghetto Child" single. They feel that in Canada, people don't relate as well to ghettotype songs, and besides, the flip side is a classic Spinners production, crisp and clear. They recommend "Together We Can Make Such Sweet Music" as the right side for Canadian psychographics on radio.

CJIB Vernon is full-time country during

the all-night show. Frank Martina is host of the show. The station al programs some country but the daytime programming is contemporary MOR.

New operations manager at CJOR Vancouver (format is talk from 9AM to 1AM) is Neil Soper. CJOR looking good these days as its mid-morning quarter hours were up, as compared to CKNW. The latter, which was No. 1 in circulation (it still is No. 1 in quarter hours) lost the weekly circulation battle to rocker CKLG. Meantime, CHUM's CKVN showed a decline in ratings, which is being attributed by its competitors, to the loss of the "novelty" appeal of the new radio station. In FM, CKLG-FM (progressive rock) looked the best in town in terms of trends.

Country programmers, don't forget to go to your station manager about RPM's "Big Country" meeting. This educational radio meeting will be well worth the \$25 because you learn a lot of things about music and radio that you can't pick up anywhere else. See details elsewhere in this issue and pick up your registration quickly.

The northwest B.C. broadcast company, Tall Totem System changes its address and have moved into a new building. The CFTK Terrace office (hub of T.T.S.) consolidates the various departments scattered around town, namely TV, radio, and cable TV. Previously the station had a half-block in town comprised of an old meat store, the (aging) original TK building, a fairly recent TV addition and a couple of private houses remodelled into offices. All the employees just getting used to the new setup and meeting lots of new faces. Current CFTK lineup: Ted Hockaday (PD) 6-10AM; Geoff Winter (ex-CIET Smiths Falls) middays: Bryan Edwards (ex-CKEC New Glasgow) drive-home; Paul Young, nights and automation midnight to 6AM, Jack Cooper manages CKTK Kitimat and does a morning show there from 6-10AM with the balance of the day repeating CFTK.

Air staffers at CKWS Kingston are now NABET members. They joined the union two weeks ago.

Note to campus stations: RPM's procedure for accepting your playlist additions is as follows (please take note as there are a couple of changes from last year). Please... ...,no phone calls. Type or print clearly, your new records, in the week that they are first added to your music list. Above the records. give your station name, campus and city, plus your (contributors) name and the date. No other information need be provided. and there is a limit of ten titles (five LP and five 45, or any combination). While we can accept complete (Top 40) playlists for chart research, just marking which records are new will not get them published in the "Campus Additions" section of The Programmers. They will only be used if the ADDITIONS ONLY appear on a separate page of your playlist. And each title is only to be reported ONCE, in the week that it first is aired over your station. Don't forget to include any gossip or news items at the bottom of your sheet if you'd like the rest of the music-biz to be aware of what's going on.

As a tie-in to the Pacific National Exhibition in Vancouver, the Victoria station and Emporium stores gave away twenty-four tickets, good for a day at the Fair and to see the Charley Pride Show.

Incredible the number of stations giving away meat. KFRC in San Francisco asks you to guess the number of pounds in their side of beef (hi-lo contest) and the prize is worh several hundreds of dollars depending how big it is. High food prices are major news, and a good, topical tie-in. Some Canadian

 stations have to restrict it to just \$100 worth or a dozen steaks or whatever, because the prices are just too damned high to give away a lot in a short time.
