LORENCE HUD.....Guilty of Rock 'n Roll

Lorence Hud established a respected name for himself a little over a year ago with the release of his first album on A&M Records and his "Sign Of The Gypsy Queen" made a very creditable showing on the national scene rising to number 16 on the RPM 100.


The first album was wall-to-wall Hud, with Lorence writing, producing and performing absolutely everything on the album. This time around though, he enlisted the help of some talented and respected people in producing his latest "Dancin' In My Head".

The set was produced by Norbert Putnam with some of the work being done in his own Quadrophonic Studios in Nashville. Hud spent about three weeks south of the border aided by seasoned studio musicians doing the album in The Audio Dimension Studios in Memphis and Columbia Studios in Nashville as well as Putnam's Quadrophonic.

The material on the album was not all written by Hud as with the previous set. He wrote six of the tunes, co-wrote one and the single from the album, both just released, doesn't qualify as Canadian. Both Hud and his manager Paul Cheeseborough believe in the deck and feel that it is strong enough to make it without the help of a MAPL logo.

Lorence Hud is an accomplished multiinstrumented musician, as demonstrated on his first album, but prefers guitar and piano having spent 19 of his 26 years studying

CNE TO MAKE GOOD GRANDSTAND FIASCO

The Canadian, British and American entertainment communities were recently shook over reports that several internationally-known artists were supposedly bilked out of their fee for performing at last summer's CNE Grandstand show. Some of the names included: Charley Pride, Tom Jones, The Guess Who and others. Dave Garrick, general manager of the CNE, has apparently soothed the troubled waters and indicated that all performers would be paid.

In the meantime, the Barco Media situation, which started the whole mess, has now apparently worsened. The Toron to-based company was placed in receivership Oct 30/73 to the tune of \$300,000. An investigation by Toronto fraud squad detectives has led to fraud and theft charges against Barco Media's former booker, Jack Thompson, a highly respected member of the Canadian entertainment industry. The fraud is reported to involve \$55,000, while the theft has to do with \$15,000 involving 3000 Grandstand tickets. Ironically, many of the Grandstand tickets were purchased by record companies, several of which admit to having never paid to date. Some observers are of the opinion there has been a lot of buck passing and that many innocent people are being irreparably damaged.

In the meantime the CNE would appear to be moving toward booking next year's acts themselves. Garrick has set up talks with promoters of Les Feux Follets and Doug Hutton, producer of Capitol's history of Canada, "Cantata Canada". The latter is at

present a recorded item but plans are underway for the Banff Fine Arts Theatre to stage a production. This however, wouldn't be ready until the fall, so Garrick is obviously looking at the stage show as a possibility for the following year.

The CNE has come under fire for the recent problems with Barco Media but it's interesting to note that from all the advertising placed by the CNE in Canadian and International publications in 1968, Barco Media was the only booking agency that responded.

The contract called for the agency to put up front money which would pay the Grandstand rental of \$5000 per night plus payment to ushers, cleaners etc. The procedure also called for Barco Media to enter into an agreement with entertainers or their agents for Grandstand dates. The CNE is not mentioned on the agreement.

Headline performers at the Grandstand usually work on a guarantee of 25% plus a percentage of the gate. The CNE does however, collect the gate with operating costs of the Grandstand and income tax deducted from the gross revenue before payment to the booking agent. The CNE also had what was apparently a firm hold on monies and it would appear that the CNE has been a victim of "association".

Much of the monies owing artists named in the Barco Media bankruptcy involved other than CNE dates. One in particular was James last, listed as an unsecured creditor at \$60,000. Another is Helen Reddy at \$20,000, which was apparently for a concert in the U.S.

TARGET COMPLETES EXPANSION PLANS

Target Tape's downtown Toronto location has now completed renovations which gives them an extra 4000 sq. ft. Purchase of the property to the south of the Yonge and Dundas store gave them the much needed footage. They now have three separate rooms of hi-fi equipment which includes a quad room. They have also opened their 2800 sq. ft. Birdhouse ("because everything downstairs is cheap") disc and tape room in the basement and are now experiencing an increase in traffic for this area.

They have maintained their discount album price at \$3.97 as the bottom figure with tapes at \$6.49. Like most high volume retail buyers they are, at times, able to sweeten the profit pot through purchases of deleted product offered in sales as above.

Adding to the competition in the new year will be the first downtown location for the highly successful Music World chain. They have taken over the old Edison Hotel at Yonge and Gould. Opening date is set for February 1st.

Target Tape is supplied by Stereo Tape Products, considered the largest independent tape distributor in Canada. Norm Borenstein, president of STP advises that November has been the biggest month in the six year history of the company. Target Tape, which has four stores in Ontario, accounts for much of the increase experienced by STP.

ROBBIE MacNEILL SIGNS WITH BALMUR

Balmur Limited has announced that singersongwriter Robbie MacNeill has recently left his native Halifax for Toronto to "Join" other members of the Maritime contingent actively involved in Canada's Music Industry.

MacNeill, who penned the award winning (Moffatt) "Robbie's Song For Jesus" for Anne Murray, has been actively working in the entertainment field during the past several years throughout the Maritimes. Some of his activities included; guitarist for CBC's Singalong Jubilee and directorarranger for The Privateers, a very popular Nova Scotian folk group who represented the province in such places as the New England States and Expo '70 in Japan. MacNeill has also worked as guitarist for Anne Murray, John Allan Cameron and Ken Tobias while all three performers were based in the Maritimes. One of his latest ventures was the production and arrangement of the 1973 theme for Halifax's United Way Campaign

A recipient of a BMI Achievement Award, MacNeill's works are published by Tessa Publishing of Toronto.

Plans are now being formulated for the production of his first solo album, but meanwhile he will tour as part of the John Allan Cameron show, and returns to Halifax this month to tape a guest appearance on Singalong Jubilee

ELEANOR SNIDERMAN/BOOT INTO CLASSICAL RECORDING

Eleanor Sniderman, one of the leading ladies of Canadian culture, will now have the opportunity to wax some of the works of her favourite masters. Mrs. Sniderman, wife of Sam The Record Man, now carries the title of A&R Manager and Producer of the Boot Master Series. The new label is an offshoot of Boot Records, owned jointly by Stompin' Tom Connors and Jury Krytiuk. Boot is primarily known as a country label although they recently experimented with pop music.

Mrs. Sniderman's first production will be at Manta Studios (Toronto) with the Canadian Brass. Her first classical album will be released for the international market within the next few weeks. Boot product is distributed in Canada by London Records.

CAPITOL CANADA ADOPTS NEW 8-TRACK CARTRIDGE

Capitol Records (Canada) Ltd. was the first company in North America to adopt a new tape cartridge platform for its eight track tapes.

The platform is a one-piece acetal unit engineered by Hardman Fittings of Toronto in close co-operation with DuPont of Canada.

One advantage of the new design is its smoother, gentler operation. In performance tests conducted by Capitol, the platform ran for 720 consecutive hours without any appreciable wear on the tapes.

Another advantage: since Capitol switched over, they have been able to increase 8-track playing time to 90 minutes.

Combine these benefits with twenty-five per cent reductions in cost and you have another Canadian patent with the potential for considerable impact on its small aspect of the music industry.

A TREE SHINES IN THE MUSIC BUSINESS

A new promotion and management firm, serving the Canadian entertainment industry, has been formed in Toronto. The creation of Richard Comber, late of Smile Records and the Canadian World of Country Music, Shining Tree Associates unites Comber with Allen Shechtman, producer and former manager of Humphrey & the Dumptrucks; Karen Quee, formerly associated with Magic Management and Quality Records and artist David Beuk.

Among the organization's early promotion and publicity clients are John Allan Cameron, Doug Lewis (RCA), Maple Street (Marathon), The Good Brothers and Barry Cobus Management.

Shining Tree is also entering the management field and recently signed Michal Hasek. The firm will administer Hasek Music (BMI), as well as its own publishing companies.



After last year's Juno Awards, it became obvious that the annual affair had grown to the point where it required refinement.

In the weeks that followed, we asked the trade to submit written suggestions that could be tabled and considered. Many res-



ponded and as a result several of the suggestions were implemented in this year's Juno Awards.

A new form of nominations and balloting was suggested. New categories were recommended and some categories were rejected. On the basis of all the suggestions received, we have revamped our system and are now looking at this year's Juno Awards as a dry run of a pilot project that could lead to a much larger affair in the very near future.

Sometimes, if you're quick, you can spot him at an Anne Murray or John Allan Cameron concert. He looks like a teddy bear on the make: he prowls the aisles, pivotting his vision between the stage and the audience. And at the end of a song this short, stocky creature with the built-in applause meter quickly measures audience response and files it before moving on to another position

Being out there, being among the people and smelling their reactions, is part of the job for Leonard Theodore Rambeau, As vice president of Balmur Ltd., he manages Anne Murray, John Allan Cameron and Robbie MacNeill with a mix of caution and instinctive good sense that makes him one of the most respected personalities in the Canadian music business. Since April 1971, when he joined her in Toronto and rescued her from the confusion of running her own phenomenon, the 28-year-old Rambeau has guided Anne Murray through all the decisions that have sustained her popularity and built a prosperous business with the resources to develop other new talent.

In person, Rambeau is friendly and selfeffacing, with no whiff of big-management cigar smoke about him. He talks in the simple language of Cape Breton and is still, after years in the playground of international glitter, capable of shaking his head at the wonder of it all.

His first contact with Anne Murray was on December 16, 1968, when he hired her for a benefit he produced for a youth club in Dartmouth. For that performance she was paid \$125. "Then," said Rambeau, "the following year I was approached by the Alumni Association at Saint Mary's University to produce a show for them and she did a concert for \$900, which included the musicians. It was the night before the first Capitol album, "This Way Is My Way", was released. At the reception afterwards. Anne came up to me and said that if she decided to stay in the business she'd hire me as a road manager. I thanked her and then ran home to look up the definition of road manager".


At that point in his life Rambeau was employed by the federal government as a student placement officer at Saint Mary's, with his career fixed by security and the prospect of regulated advancement. But he began to see more of Anne Murray and escorted her to basketball games and shows. His attitude began to change: "I started to see things that bothered me. Like press releases weren't being sent out to the big Toronto machine. Nobody really knew what was happening -- she just went and did things. And the fan mail business wasn't being taken care of. She isn't one to write letters so all that mail was piling up. I invested the grand sum of sixteen dollars to get a post office box to keep the mail away from her apartment,"

The next major step in the alliance was taken in December 1970, when Murray displayed her bare feet to a posh Toronto audience

Len Rambeau: "It all depends on the timing"

at the Royal York Hotel. Rambeau left his job with the government for a week to help her through a nervous booking and joined her permanently in Toronto in April.

He was greeted by chaos: Murray, too, is inherently cautious and was handling all her affairs herself. Rambeau quickly established an office and hired a secretary to cope with the avalanche of mail and calls gener-

ated by "Snowbird" and a runaway career. "She needed someone she could trust", said Rambeau, "and Bill (Langstroth) was too busy with other things to spend the time needed to manage her business." Murray was assaulted by promises in those days. from prospective managers determined to get their claws into her rising star, but she apparently chose Rambeau because she believed he wouldn't con her.

"But", said Rambeau, "it was a tough decision to make. I had a secure job with the government. Show business? Well ... it could all end tomorrow. And she had delayed asking me because she knew she couldn't match the security of my job. Nick Sevano was handling her affairs in Los Angeles but up here she was even paying the band herself."

Rambeau's first reaction to Toronto was typical of him: "I arrived at the (Murray) apartment at 6:15 and at 7:00 I was sitting in a meeting with Anne's accountant. The company had already been formed and they were waiting for me to arrive to sign the

I recalled my first meeting with Murray and Rambeau in her Balliol Street apartment in June of that year. It was an uncertain period for the organization, reflected by evident tension and a desk with a secretary where the dining room table should have been. Rambeau laughed at the recollection: "We didn't know where we were going then. And now, wherever we are, it seems like a long time ago."

"Wherever we are" is the closest Rambeau comes to defining Murray's present status: he shuns categories and titles and anything that fixes a situation or a person in time or space. Of his own role in the Murray machine he speaks evasively, reluctant to clarify beyond obvious generalities.

Like most successful people in any enterprise, Rambeau has a respect for timing and he prizes his own talent for choosing the right moment to make a decision. He credits Anne Murray's trust in him for the durability of their professional relationship: "It's been a relief for both of us, this mutual trust and friendship. We've never had an argument. Each of us knows instinctively that the other will do what has to be done and do it right."

Rambeau brings the same skill for both protecting and promoting his clients to the career of John Allan Cameron, whom he recently escorted away from Columbia Records. Again, Rambeau acted with inherent good timing by advising the move at a high point in Cameron's popularity. "John is 32 and he's been around, been kicked around, a lot more than Anne, But he's impatient and his impatience keeps me on my toes. The day that I don't have practical answers for him is the day he should start raising questions about me."

Rambeau is a planner and enjoys being in control of a situation. He has little time for anything or anybody outside the Balmur organization. He is either on the phone or on a plane, cajoling or conciliating to keep the careers of his charges constantly public. Balmur recently signed Robbie MacNeill, another talented ex-Maritimer, to the stable and Rambeau has already charted a development program for him; MacNeill will begin by backing John Allan Cameron and then gradually move into his own spotlight.

But not before Len Rambeau thinks he should, Close friends of both Murray and Cameron are constantly amazed by Rambeau's ability to persuade them into logical decisions. And it is generally acknowledged in the Canadian music business that Murray's career would have plummeted two years ago if it weren't for Rambeau's steady hand on the Balmur tiller.

But the teddybear-on-the-make apparently continues to glide through life, enjoying occasional vacations with his Cape Breton family and making endless phone calls to keep in touch with the people who make the cash registers chatter. He allows himself to relax in a sweatshirt that says UNIVERSITY OF SMELTBROOK in rah-rah letters; it's Len Rambeau's way of laughing at himself and the world.

Most people who don't know him would describe Rambeau as cool, detached and objective. But underneath his patina of management efficiency he cares, he really cares, about his friends Annie and John and Robbie. He works long hard hours for them every day.

But he has his own dreams hidden in a back pocket: "In order to keep my sanity, I think that after all this is over I want to get out there in front myself. May be politics. They're already starting to talk



NEW ALBUM/TV SPECIAL FOR MAHOGANY RUSH

Montreal hard-rockers Mahogany Rush, who headlined a show in Detroit November 23rd featuring Ted Nugent and the Amboy Dukes and Birtha, are presently working on the final mix of their second album tentatively titled "Child Of Novelty". The set was recorded at the new Tempo Studios in Montreal and a single is due to be released shortly on the Ko'tai label.

CBC Television is planning to build a half-hour special around the group to be shot live in Montreal and broadcast this winter across the country, "En Route: Starring Mahogony Rush" will be produced by Pat Cook

Major FM Stations in Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus, Chicago and Buffalo are playing "Maxoom", Mahogony Rush's debut album while record stores in Detroit report outstanding sales of the set.

While in Detroit in early October, the group was credited with contributing largely to the success of two sell out concerts starring lggy Pop and the Stooges. Mahogony Rush were called back for two encores on the two nights of the shows.

Back home in Montreal, CKVL-FM broadcast a five-hour jam featuring Mahogony Rush with Montreal Gazette rock critic Bill Mann hosting. This was part of CKVL-FM's first live midnight special. single was produced at Eastern Sound (Toronto) by Marathon's Doug Taylor.

Much of the success of Dianne Leigh is due the efforts of her manager Jack Thibeault who has guided his young Juno Award winner (1965, 1966, 1967, 1968, 1969) into the winner's circle.

Much of the success Dianne is now experiencing is because of her dogged determination to "hang in" when most would, and did, throw in the towel. She is also quick to credit many of her friends with helping her to make it, and in particular her manager Jack Thibeault — a success story himself.

It is because of Thibeault's awareness of country music men that Dianne's back-up groups have been the most professional available. Currently doing the back-up chores are Shades Of Blue, comprised of Bev West, steel; Willy Wallace, lead; Charlie Hanson, drums; and Pete Wallace on bass, a tightly knit country entertainment package containing vocal surprises that should develop into future solo artists.

After completion of her engagement at the Horseshoe Dianne moves into the Central Hotel in Oshawa (10) for two weeks and then up to Kleinburg (8) for two weeks.

IMPULSE RELEASES TWO "SAMPLER" SETS

Due to the tremendous success of the "Energy Essentials" album of last year (an album which went to the top of the jazz charts), ABC/Impulse is releasing two new sampler albums: "Impulsively" and "The Saxophone".

"Impulsively" features highlights from some of the 14 fall releases on the Impulse label.

The record, which includes artists like Gato Barbieri, Sam Rivers and Marion Brown, has been shipped to radio stations in fifteen different markets. The album is being sold as station promotion over the air with all profits going to local community charities.

Impulse feels that this type of promotion is extremely unique and that jazz music hasn't ever been exposed in this manner before. "Impulsively" is also being distributed to AM pop and MOR stations in an effort to expand the horizons for Impulse music in the future.

Impulse general manager Steve Backer and Impulse producer Ed Michel have assembled the three-record set "The Saxophone" primarily from material contained in the Impulse vaults. The package also includes two leased cuts, one from Lester Young and another from Charlie Parker. The album combines education and entertainment as the LP traces the roots of the instrument from the pioneers up to and including new artists on the Impulse label like Barbieri and Dewey Redman, With excellent liner notes by New York critic Bob Palmer, the album is a critical analytic guide to the major trends in the development of the contemporary saxophone. The consumers who enjoyed the "Energy Essentials" conceptually and musically will definitely enjoy "The Saxophone".

GOOD NOISE RECORDS RELEASES FIRST DECKS

Good Noise Records released their first two singles recently and have run into problems with the first coming from Montreal Rock band Man Made. Polydor Limited, the distributors of Good Noise product, shipped a mailing of singles that were pressed faultily. The label would like to inform programmers that the deck, "Keep On Moving" f/s "Country Company" has been re-mastered and re-pressed and a second mailing is taking place this week.

Meanwhile Man Made's debut album, entitled "Man Made' is experiencing good early sales action and airplay.

The second single off the line is by Tim Ryan, who recently represented Canada in the World Popular Song Festival in Tokyo. The deck is entitled, "Sweet December" f/s "Do It Right" and was released to coincide with Ryan's return from the festival in Japan. Both Ryan tunes will be included in his forthcoming debut album.

GOOD ACTION FOR FALL WITH DAFFODIL SINGLES

Love Productions Ltd. is enjoying unprecedented success with its current crop of Canadian singles. Major and secondary stations in all markets have put their weight behind Daffodil's latest releases with most gratifying results.

Fludd's current offering, "Cousin Mary", their fourth deck from the "...On!" album is repeating the success of their "Turned 21" deck. "Cousin Mary" is appealing to easy-listening and country programmers as well as Top 40 stations, with chart numbers registered at CHUM, CKLG, CKOC, CKCK, CKOM, CFTR, CHEC, CJET, CJOC, CKRD, CKLC, CKBC, CFBC, CHNL, CFJC, CKPG and CFOR.

"Love is Coming", the single culled from "The Second Foot In Coldwater" LP, was released over three months ago and continues to add stations to an already impressive list of believers numbering over one hundred. The song reached the number one slot at CJOC, Lethbridge and CYVR at the University of British Columbia, and has been charted at 24 other stations. Action still continues on this single with Montreal and Ottawa playlisting it.

Daffodil's most recent signing, Cochrane, have confounded the crystal ball with their first release, "You're Driving Me Crazy (Faith Healers)". The song represents the first completed track from the group's album "Hang On To Your Resistance", which is still being recorded at Toronto Sound Studios. CHUM AM and FM were on the song before finished pressings were available.

THE CARPENTERS LONDON GARDENS

The Gardens, London, Ontario, was almost filled to capacity on Wednesday, October 24, 1973, for the first London appearance of one of the most famous singing duos in pop music today. The patiently waiting audience had come to see Karen and Richard, in concert. First to appear on stage were Skiles and Henderson, the comedy duo who have been touring with The Carpenters for roughly two years. Following their very humourous act was a brief pause, in which the nowrestless audience could relax! All of a sudden the band began "Superstar", one of The Carpenters fifteen gold records, and the audience's relief was revealed in the wild round of applause which echoed throughout The Gardens. Karen and Richard opened with a medley consisting of "Superstar", and "Goodbye To Love", both gold records. They sang their latest smash hit, "Top Of The World", recently certified as a Gold record. When their Gold accomplishment was announced, the audience went wild with their applause.

Then they sang a medley of "the hits of yesteryear", following their solid gold "Yesterday Once More". The rock medley consisted of such hits as "Leader of the Pack", "Johnny Angel", "Da Doo Ron Ron", and "Book of Love", which were also

COLUMBIA INTRODUCES "SUPER STAR" SERIES

Columbia Records (Canada) have introduced a new "super star" series to carry a suggested list price of \$7.49 with tape product at \$7.98. Prices to the retailer for the new series is \$4.18 with bonafide rackers receiving an extra 10% functional discount. This series will be restricted to artists of the stature of Dylan and Santana. The latter's first release will be "Welcome".

Columbia is one of the few companies confining prices in their pop catalogue. Their regular pop series carries a suggested list of \$6.49 (dealer price \$3.62), while their standard tape product lists for \$7.98 (dealers \$5.19). The label's budget lines, in at \$1.98 (dealer \$1.07) and \$2.98 (\$1.66) are presently under scrutiny as to their future. Jack Robertson, executive vicepresident, Columbia Records, is convinced the \$1.98 album will be phased out shortly. Contrary to the thinking of some record people however, Robertson is of the opinion the 7" business will be kept alive - this, in spite of the disproportionate use of vinyl. He stresses that releases will be much more discreet, with cutbacks on promotion copies and the speculating on volume issues,

Columbia has obviously shown much discretion in the release of singles over the past few weeks. They would appear to be going on sure winners only. Two Canadian singles, almost guaranteed immediate radio play are "Million Dollar Weekend" by Crowbar and Bearfoot's "Molly". Both album cuts have received heavy airplay and requests from radio types to be considered as single releases. The Crowbar deck has been released minus the sound effects making it more suitable for AM programming.

The one hour taping took place at CBC Toronto's Studio 7 with Ray McConnell doing the producing/directing chores. William Hutt, of the Stratford Festival, does a solo song bit as well as a duet with Ginette which ends up in a dance sequence.

Also on tap for the Dec 14 show are Karen Kain and Frank Augustyn, stars of the National Ballet of Canada. They won first prize as the best duet ensemble at the Second International Ballet Competition in Moscow this past summer. George Crum, the National Ballet Company's resident music director, conducts the orchestra as the pair dance the pas de deux from Act 2 of "The Nutcracker". A fairytale sketch written for the special by Chuck Weir and titled "The Fable of the Mouse Prince", stars the two principals with a professional puppet backing by The Frog Print Theatre from West Hill, Ontario.

Ginette Reno, who records for London Records, won herself a 1972 RPM Juno Award for "Outstanding Performance Of The Year". That was her first CBC-TV Special, also directed and produced by McConnell. Although a big item with "pop" radio stations, Miss Reno has been off the disc scene for several months. She returns to Toronto for an engagement in the Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel early in the new year. She will also tape her next special the first part of next year.

His ability on keyboard makes for the best-ever version of "Rain-O". Bill Henderson is free to devote more time to vocals and innovative instrumental breaks.

A host of new tunes were unveiled, the strongest of which were "Far Side Of The Sun" and "She's My Lady". One observer branded the latter "a sleeper with a Corvette engine in a Volkswagon body". Musical highpoint was Henderson's Scottish runs in an extension to "Eat".

vocalist, though his current "Old Fashioned Way" deck is in English. Polydor, who distribute the Barclay line, credit Toronto's CFRB and CKFM with breaking the record which has already spread to other parts of the country.

Aznavour is in the midst of a North American Tour and has played dates in Toronto (November 25 & 26) and follows these with performances in Hamilton (December 11) and London (12).

English Canada are rapidly picking up on Mirielle Mathieu's "Acropolis Adieu", already over the 100,000 mark in Quebec. The song comes from her newly released album entitled "Disque D'Or". Both the album and Miss Mathieu were warmly received during an extensive Canadian tour just completed by the French songstress.

No need for artists not to know

Many years ago, artists or groups were so happy to have a record released, they signed practically any contract that was put in front of them. Over the years, Canada has acquired a number of young and knowledgeable lawyers who have specialized in



the music and entertainment business and know how to deal with the affairs of entertainers, nationally and internationally.

Many artists owe their careers to lawyers who have looked after details that, had they not been covered, might have ended their careers.

Many groups are no longer around because

ADAM MITCHELL PLAYS EGERTON'S IN TORONTO

Well, the voice does sound the same and he does look an awful lot like the guy who used to play with the Paupers, but the music is so different. The Paupers were a hard, acidrock band in the true tradition of the late sixties and I can remember when they shone on the Toronto Fair Coliseum stage opening Jimi Hendrix' first appearance in town.

Yep, Adam Mitchell is the same fellow who rocked out such great tunes as "Magic People" amid a swirling, imported light show and this same fellow sang some more great tunes, though somewhat mellower, amid the hum of a speaker column on the hummer. Mitchell jokingly referred to the speaker as "my friend the bass player".

This relaxed, easy mood went well in Egerton's, an excellent club to showcase the talents of Mitchell, who offered the audience a sampling of his new material, including his first single since signing with GRT. Records. The deck, entitled "Jenner By The Sea" has just been released.

The looser, more intimate atmosphere of a club allows for more contact between audience and performer and Mitchell has very alive, very communicative eyes that almost glow from beneath his bright red hair. His face is the kind that defies age and he'll probably look like a kid for years to come

But he doesn't sound like a kid, as his songs speak of a guy who's made the rounds. From his definitive country sound "Another Man's Hair On My Razor", that tells the story of an unfaithful wife, to his definitive greaser number "White Sox and Brown Shoes", that tells the story of a fifties hipster who longs for the good old days. Mitchell tends to mix the pain that often accompanies such experiences with a good sense of humour. His voice and style have been able to transcend the change from acid rock and I'm sure that we'll be hearing some fine things from Adam Mitchell in the not too distant future, — P.T.

of contracts that bound them to impossible situations. Of these many forged ahead without expert advice.

Like anything, good legal representation is costly, but only as costly as the end worth. If you can't afford a lawyer, you can't afford to sign any contract.

Contracts are made to be enforced and the idea of signing any contract is to have the full understanding of the parties who sign, as to what the parties expect from one another.

There it is in black and white and there it is exactly, so if there is any misunderstanding about what was agreed to, the paper can be looked at again and the situation resolved.

It is said, that the creative musician is a bad businessman. Many creative musicians are good businessmen and they are the first to put their legal matters in the hands of a lawyer who understands the very complicated music business.

There should be no such thing as a standard

WESTERN SUCCESS FOR QUALITY'S JOE OWENS

Sugar Cane, the newest addition to Quality's Celebration label, received an extra push from National Promotion Manager Joe Owens when he spent a week at western stations promoting their debut deck "Champagne Body".

Owens started his trek in Vancouver with visits to CKLG, CFUN, CKWX and to Ralph Harding's Studio 3 where Sugar Cane recently completed a demo tape of material to be included in their upcoming LP. Quality's B.C. promo rep Ray "Python" Ramsay accompanied Owens on these visits.

From Vancouver it was off to Edmonton where Music Director Mike Cranston added the deck immediately. Other Alberta visits included CJCA and CHED Edmonton and CFCN, CKXL and CFAC Calgary. Both John Oliver of CHEC and Barry Hegland of CJOC promised to put their support behind "Champagne Body" and it won't be long before the tune is being heard in Lethbridge.

In Winnipeg Owens met up with Quality Mid-west Sales Manager Chuck Porter and the pair met with CKRC's Doc Steen and CFRW's Bob Quinn.

All programmers met were presented with a bottle of champagne, a Sugar Cane T-shirt, bio and press material and a pass for a free mug of Root Beer at any local A&W geared toward promoting the song lyric . . . "You may have a champagne body but you've only got a root beer heart".

While Owens was busily covering the west, Quality's Quebec Promotion Manager Nicolle Dufour was picking up playlists in her territory.

A total of fourteen stations have jumped on the Sugar Cane single in the first week since its release. contract. There are so many things involved in your contract that you are particularly interested in, that a contract should be drawn up that makes you happy. If there are standard contracts, they would definitely favour the record company. A lawyer will bring to your attention any clauses that aren't in your favour, and they should be resolved before the contract is signed. It won't be easy (or often possible) to change that contract four years later.

Record companies live with the fact that the artist should know what he is signing, but they also like to know that once it is signed, that the complete understanding is there on paper so that no further hassles ensue.

The lawyers that can today quide your career came about because there was a need for specialists in the music industry. They were born out of the new interest in Canadain artists and records. They entered the field because it became apparent a few years ago that Canada was an emerging music nation and a living could be made on music and records as a specialty. They have proven their worth over and over again and Canadian artists can live with the security of knowing that legal help is available in Canada and when the contract is signed or a dispute occurs, there is someone knowledgeable to look after their interests. Record companies have that same advantage.

BEN KAYE REPORTS HEAVY FALL ACTION

Montreal based music publisher and record producer Ben Kaye reports a heavy fall release schedule of Canadian content product.

Topping the list is Trini Lopez' recording of "We Gotta Make It Together", already out in the States and scheduled for Canadian release soon. The deck was produced by Don Costa.

Kaye himself has been very busy producing Justin Page's "Stompin' On The Bayou" for Capitol Records at Toronto Sound; Marty Butler's "If You Wanna Go To New York City" f/s "A Petal From Her Hair", recently given the green light for an American release on Epic; Green & Stagg's "People Change" f/s "Leaves Of Summer" on London; Michele Richard, Quebec's top French female artist with her first English session, with her "No Deposit, No Return" deck; Martin Randolph's Polydor release of "Dr. Jekyll/Mr. Hyde"; and Karo who has just released a French single to be followed by one in English.

The report from Kaye goes on to list Mickey Posner's Elektra single, "I'm Gonna Get Out", produced by Ron Dykhof and Patsy Gallant's Bob Gallo produced deck "Make My Living At Night (Playing Rock & Roll)", recorded in Memphis for Columbia Records.

All of the tunes listed are published by either Bretanne, Halben, Vanessa, Windy Bay or Neiljoy Music.

New Albums

GUESS WHO -- The Best of The Guess Who, Volume II --APL1-0269-N

From Canada's BEST, their best of', in volume II form. There are favourites here, but for real fans that doesn't matter. For others, it's a good collection of recents. Always great "Life In The Bloodstream" and "Running Back to Saskatoon". Nothing new here, except for Burton's hair. Hope to hear some new, dynamic material for their next major album.

GREGG ALLMAN - Laid Back - Capricorn CP0116-P

Wholly progressive music here, ideal for FMers with little to offer the TOP 40er. It's his first solo effort yet there are other members from the Allman band helping out. In all, what a crew! The Allman music has its roots in the blues and Gregg's talents seem to be generally undisputed. Rendition of Jackson Browne's "These Days" sounds fine, with "Will The Circle Be Unbroken" closing up the whole set. Programmers will have no trouble choosing cuts, anything'll do. DYNAMITE...1, "Midnight Rider"; 2. "Please Come Home"; 3. "All My Friends".

PAINTER - Painter - Elektra EKS 75071-P

Kicking off this first try, is Painter's latest single, "West Coast Woman", a glance at the hard rockin', gutsy music that these guys are playing. The foundation is here for more good things to happen with their music, although some of the selections were a touch short and consequently lacked substance. Painter is more west coast talent (polished south of the border) showing us easties up. With the airplay they deserve, we should be hearing more and more. It's a good start. Try out . . . "Kites and Gliders" and "For You". What's in store for the future . . . perhaps more of "Goin' Down the Road".

JOHN STEWART — Cannons In The Rain — RCA LSP 4827-N Originally with the Kingston Trio, this is Stewart's debut album on his own. The album's a combination of soft rock/folk rock/country rock music with Stewart's voice dominating the vocals and the back-up music setting the atmosphere for some more serious (than usual) music. Needless to say, the lyrics are a very important part. "Road Away" is great listening material along with "All Time Woman". It looks like John Stewart cares. Good for him.

JUDI PULVER - Pulver Rising - MGM SE 4904-Q

Some of the best MOR listening you could have is included in Pulver's new album. With real pros taking care of the presentation, and Pulver writing all the selections, the association makes for a welcome sound. Ms. Pulver's gravelly voice gives her added power and strength. Side One . . . "Statler Hilton" and no. 1 . . . "The Trouble with Cabbages". Further material of interest "Fish Eye Blues".

BOB RUZICKA - Soft Rocker - MCA 375-I

Ruzicka's latest is a countrified album, done in the class of Nashville. Titler describes the feeling of the album whole, quiet













for the most part. Things liven up with "God Almighty Mama" and "All Over Again". Should have mainly folk/country appeal, with simultaneous release of album and single. Favourite ... "Home Front Hero".



JOHANNES BRAHMS Four Ballades Op. 10 ROBERT SCHUMANN Three Romances Op. 28 Wilhelm Kempff - piano DGG 2530 321

It is difficult to account for the extraordinary neglect by pianists of the Brahms, Four Ballads Op. 10. The first of the group, subtitled "Edward" after the Scottish ballade, is popular with students due to its picturesque, somber mood and lack of technical and musical problems. The first and third of Schumann's three Romances Op. 28 suffer the same unaccountable neglect, but the second Romance is one of the lovliest and most popular of his shorter works. Three short works conclude the disc: The Arabeske Op. 18, the Prophet Bird from the Waldszenen Op. 82 and a Novelette from the Bunte Blatter Op. 99

JOSEPH JONGEN Symphonic Concertante Virgil Fox - Organist The Paris Opera Orchestra conducted by Georges Pretre ANGEL S-36984

This is a re-issue of a recording which was originally released many years ago on Capitol Records. It was considered an outstanding sonic achievement at the time of its initial appearance and it still sounds very impressive. The instrument used in the organ in the Palais de Chaillot and was originally built for the Paris Exposition of 1878. Joseph Jongen was a Belgian composer who lived from 1873 to 1953. He composed mainly instrumental and orchestral works including Concerti for Violin, piano and harp. His Symphonie concertante for Organ and Orchestra was written in 1933. It is a massive, colourful work in four movements, and ends with a dazzling Toccata. Don't miss this.



THE CHRISTOPHER PARKENING ALBUM Christopher Parkening - Guitar ANGEL S-36069

Angel Records informs us that the release of this album marks Christopher Parkening's fifth year as an Angel recording artist. Enclosed with the record is a large 2 ft. x 3 ft. poster of the artist. Unfortunately, none of the material on the disc is new and is drawn from four previously released albums (S-36019 In the Classic style, S-36020 In the Spanish Style, S-36021 Romanza, and S-36041 Parkening Plays Bach.) Side one features works by Albeniz, Tarrega, Villa-Lobos and Anon., while side two is mostly devoted to Bach transcriptions, including the popular Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring, transcribed by Foster. Christopher Parkening scored a major triumph last season with his Toronto recital and must already be considered among the most interesting performers in his field.


JACOPO PERI — Euridice (complete opera) Coro Polifonico di Milano Solisti di Milano conducted by Angelo Ephrikian TELEFUNKEN SAWT 9603/4 (two discs)

Jacopo Peri's opera Euridice was composed and performed in 1600 and is now acknowledged to be the first opera of which the music has been preserved in its entirety. Peri wrote an earlier work titled "Dafne" of which only fragments survive. The work takes the form of a Prologue and a single act, and the libretto was written by Ottavio Rinuccini. The score consists of the vocal lines and a ground bass which is filled out here on the harpsichord, presumably by Angelo Ephrikian. The choruses are supported by wind and brass. Monteverdi's "Orpheo" was produced seven years later. The performance and recording, produced by Arcophon in Milan, are commendable in every way. The enclosed brochure, however, is one of the least satisfactory I have encountered in a Telefunken production. It consists of two pages and contains the text in Italian, with no translation whatever, and a not too informative note only three paragraphs long which is given in German, English and French. No information is given as to which edition the performers used. An important and unique release such as this is, a poor place to begin cutting corners.













SCHUBERT Sonata in A minor D. 784

Moments musicaux D.780

Alfred Brendel - pianist

Alfred Brendel - pianist Philips 6500 418

This recording is the fifth release in a series which will eventually cover all the major keyboard works of Franz Schubert, performed by Alfred Brendel The most successful playing here occurs on side two with magical, stylish performances of the six Moments musicaux. Schubert presented these works as his Opus 94, but divided them into two books each containing three pieces. Pianists have now gotten into the habit of performing all six together as a group. One wonders if they might be more palatable to listeners, one book at a listening. The Sonata in A minor is one of Brendel's less successful performances. The playing sounds tired and disinterested, and the final movement, marked Allegro vivace, is taken at an extraordinarily deliberate pace.

SCHUBERT Piano Sonata in G major Op. 78 Vladimir Ashkenazy - Pianist LONDON CS 6820

This is Ashkenazy's second disc devoted to the music of Franz Schubert. The first, CS 6500, contained the piano Sonatas in A major and A minor and some short pieces. Here, in his latest release, he presents what might be the greatest recording of his career in this magnificently thought out and executed performance of the gigantic sonata in G major, Op. 78. The first movement alone occupies the entire first side of the disc, lasting over twenty minutes. Side two contains the exquisitely beautiful Andante, followed by the rugged Minuetto and a charming, tuneful allegretto. An affectionate performance extremely well recorded.

CAMPUS STATIONS TO GET U.A. TAPED INTERVIEWS

United Artists has instituted a promotional feature that will provide Campus Radio stations with specially produced, taped interviews with their artists. These tapes as well as being up-to-date and informative, will feature cuts from the artists' current or (in some cases) upcoming albums and generally provide excellent material for programmers.

The first tape in the series, being called "United Artists Records Talent Showcase Series", has been released and to date the response from campus programmers has been overwhelming. It is a 55 minute long interview with David Wiffen, a popular Canadian Folk artist who's first U.A. album, "Coast To Coast Fever" has been gaining acceptance steadily since its recent release.

The interview was conducted by Claude Vickery of Radio York in Toronto and along with some very interesting dialogue, it features eight tracks from the new album.

Future installments in the series are now being compiled and the second tape will be announced soon.

CBC RADIO THE LOSER IN AXING OF GZOWSKI

What was shaping up to be Canada's most listened to morning show, "This Country" and its host Peter Gzowski will be phased out over the next few weeks. There's really not too much fight to continue. CBC radio officials would like to see the show continue, in spite of it not meeting its expectations, but the principals, Gzowski and the show's producer Alec Frame would appear to have lost interest.

To produce a daily show, which works out to fourteen hours each week, requires many more hours of research. It has been suggested that both Gzowski and Frame put in more than sixty hours of gathering interesting tid-bits etc. which is what the show is all about. One observer suggests the stars and the CBC are expecting too much and. like most CBC ventures, "Country In The Morning" lacks a realistic development period. It was also suggested that "people across Canada would like to be front and centre to what's happening in the nation even if it is coming from Upper Canada. Granted, punching into the nation for a three hour period on a day to day basis is a gargantuan - but so are the returns.

SUBSCRIBE TO RPM

WHO WILL PERCH ON WORLD'S LARGEST.....ERECTION??

The recent CRTC hearings in Toronto (Nov. 26-27) was almost a waste of much talent, insofar as the FM broadcasters were concerned. It's obvious that FM signals in Toronto's cement jungle are suffering and there it is — the soaring answer to all the problems — the world's largest structure (upon completion) and Toronto's largest erection, the CN Tower. Five Toronto radio stations banded together and gave valid reasons for being allowed to perch near the top of the tower with their own antenna. These stations are: CBL, CHFI, CKFM, CHUM and CHIN.

Johnny Lombardi, president of CHIN, complained that his present signal is constantly overshadowed by the powerful CKFM, just down the dial. He had even gone so far as to import several thousand Japanese

12-HOUR SINATRA SPECIAL DISTRIBUTED BY POLYGON

A twelve-hour special radio presentation on Frank Sinatra is being distributed throughout Canada by Polygon Media Services of Toronto.

The package comes at a time when Sinatra is again taking up his high position among the entertainment elite after a short-lived retirement. Made up of one-hour self sustaining blocks, the presentation is hosted by popular Los Angeles radio personality Paul Compton and represents a first for Sinatra. Never before has he sanctioned any such radio documentary of his life and in effect he shares hosting duties with Compton.

"Project Sinatra", as it is called, takes a close look at the singer's early years with many never-before-heard interviews including: Nelson Riddle, Sammy Davis Jr., Billy May, Lou Rawls, Quincy Jones, Rod McKuen, Dean Martin, Joey Bishop and children Nancy and Frank Sinatra Jr.

CJRT-FM CELEBRATES BEETHOVEN BIRTHDAY

CJRT-FM Toronto's only FM outlet concentrating on the arts, bows a Beethoven Special (Dec 16), the master's 203rd birthday. The complete day will feature only Beethoven compositions.

One catch — the station may not be on the air. The Ontario Government has sidestepped the question of the future of the Ryerson station. The station is now scraping the bottom of the barrel of emergency money which has been keeping the station on the air for the past few weeks.

AM-FM radios which he passed onto his listeners at cost in an effort to build his audience — only to find problems with CKFM

Canadian television spokesmen were the most outspoken during the hearings, and in particular, John Bassett, president of CFTO. He wants to make it to the tower so that he could fight for the \$6 million worth of Canadian advertising now appearing on the Buffalo stations. He is of the opinion that if he were able to beam his signal from the tower he could bring Canadian happenings to a whole new American audience. He told the CRTC panel that "if we are permitted to move to the CN Tower, we can go into Buffalo and compete on pretty equal terms, insofar as a picture is concerned."

Getting into figures, Bassett pointed up that his station (CFTO) which he referred to as "the top-rated television station in the Toronto area", holds 23 per cent of the total viewing audience in Toronto but only 13 per cent in the Niagara region, although, according to Bassett, CFTO is also regarded as the top-viewed Canadian station in that area as well. He claimed that CFTO is fourth behind the three Buffalo stations (WKBW, WGR and WBEN) all of which have 59% of the viewing audience in the Niagara area and only 37 per cent in the greater Toronto area.

Continuing on this theme, Bassett stated: "We believe that our programming is more appealing than that of the Buffalo stations, and we believe that if we are given an opportunity to project our signal as clearly as the Buffalo stations into that populous area, that we can beat them, as we have done in Toronto, and bring these Canadian viewers back to Canadian television."

In the meantime, south of the border and for completely different reasons, television stations in Chicago have refused to move their antennas to the top of the new Sears Tower building — at present the world's largest structure. Reasons for six stations (WBBM-TV, WGN-TV, WMAQ-TV, WFLD-TV and WSNS-TV) not moving from the John Hancock building, which is 700 feet lower than Sears, is money. Sears has apparently offered the stations \$5 million to assist with the move. Each station however, would have to come up with \$700,000 to make the move.

In the Canadian arena, it hasn't been definitely established as to what it would cost to install television and radio transmitters on the 1805 foot CN Tower.

As we go to press we hear rumblings of American retaliation — if Canadian television is allowed to move a healthier signal into that area. W.G.

PAST CAB PRESIDENT RAYMOND CREPEAULT DEAD AT 51

Raymond Crepeault, former president of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, passed away in Montreal (27) after a brief illness. He was 51.

Mr. Crepeault headed up the powerful Radio Mutuel Network and Civitas Corporation Ltd., controlling several companies in the field of communications, printing and construction equipment. It was in 1959 when he purchased CJMS in Montreal which later became the base of Radio Mutuel

A graduate of McGill University, Mr. Crepeault was a member of the Royal Canadian Navy during World War II. He went into service for the Federal Government immediately after the war becoming a legal and political adviser with the External Affairs Department.

PUBLIC "GETS TO" THE CRTC

The Canadian public are now flexing their muscles with regard to what they should or should not be allowed to view on their television sets. The CRTC has received more than 1600 letters of complaints from Toronto cable users over the possibility of WNED (Channel 17) being dropped from cable service.

The non-commercial station of the Public Broadcasting System (U.S.) is supported to a great deal by South Central Ontario viewers with the bulk of the viewers in the greater Toronto area. At the recent CRTC hearings in Toronto, Metro Cable revealed plans to go into extra-channel service to keep the Buffalo station available for its cable users. Metro had initially planned to drop WNED from its 12-channel system to make room for Global, which begins televising Jan. 6 Metro however, will allow WNED to continue on one of their extra channels, but it will cost the viewer an extra \$2.50 per month for a signal-converter. Metro is the largest single system in Toronto and one of the first to offer cable service. They are somewhat behind in extra-channel service as compared to the Rogers group who have been offering their customers this extra service for some time. Metro is working on upgrading its equipment to accommodate more channels. But the \$2.5 million project won't be completed until the end of this year. The WNED situation is just another curve but obviously one they can overcome without too much difficulty.

Cable companies are also running into some opposition from customers who aren't too happy with picture and service. They are now experimenting with a "back to antenna" move with an outlay of about \$185.00 (complete with rotar) which is apparently supplying a much better picture — depending on your location, of course.


