## BROWN & VANNELLI BUILDING FOR A&M

A&M's consistency in promotion for Charity Brown has established the group as a hot chart item in Canada and increased U.S. interest. The single, "You Beat Me To The Punch" has now been scheduled for release by A&M in the U.S. for Feb. 13.

Montrealer Gino Vannelli, who cracked the international market with his Herb Alpert assisted single, "People Gotta Move", has now cracked the colour barrier. He will be the first white artist to guest on the Don Cornelius TVer, "Soul Train". He will perform his newest single, "Powerful People", which is also the title track of his second album for the label. "Soul Train" is not televised in Canada but is available on bordering stations. Check local listings for time and station.

## CAPITOL RE-ORGANIZES QUEBEC OFFICE

Arnold Gosewich, president of Capitol Records-EMI of Canada Limited, has announced a major organizational move to accelerate market penetration in Quebec. The change involves key responsibility and reporting relationship revisions. All activities relating to domestic and foreign French recordings will now be totally administered by Capitol's Eastern region management in Montreal. These include advertising, merchandising, artist relations, publicity, and all artist and repertoire duties. Eastern region manager Bill Rotari, in addition to present duties, will be assuming responsibility for the re-structured areas. Pierre Dubord will report directly to Rotari as manager of A&R and Michel Tremblay, as well as overseeing promotion of French recordings, will be taking on artists relations, advertising and merchandising responsibilities. A publicity and press information function for French language records and artists will be established shortly to aid the new operating unit. Rotari will be reporting directly to Gosewich.

In commenting on the announcement Gosewich would not reveal plans but stated that a number of innovative and aggressive actions are expected in marketing and French talent acquisition in the months ahead. He stressed that the move has been made in keeping with Capitol's intended commitment to domestic and foreign French language artists and records, and also said "Our recent success with such artists as Beau Dommage and Suzanne Stevens domestically, and with Gilbert Beaud, Adamo and Julien Clerc from France is only the tip of the iceberg. We also have a deep commitment to our total talent roster including Alain Dorval, Karo, Lise Thoun and Maneige as well as from Pathe 974, our associated company in France."

## KELLY JAY RETURNS TO RECORDING SCENE

Kelly Jay, late of Crowbar, has bounced back into the singles arena with a new single, "If You Play Your Cards Right (Ya Gets Me)", released on the Columbia label. The flip is "Part II" of the above, a co-writing by Kelly Jay and Vikassis, and published through Freewheeled, April and Charity Music (CAPAC).

The session was arranged and produced by the Bad Manors group (Kelly Jay, Mike Quatro and Vikassis) and Bob Gallo takes credit as executive producer.

## MITCHELL & WEBB FORM NEW COMPANY

Grant Webb, former artists relations with WEA Music Canada and Bob Mitchell, who worked with the Martin Onrot Association, have teamed up to form their own production house under the banner of Warped Records. They will also be involved in management and concert productions. The latter will be looked after by Mitchell.

Publishing arms for the new complex have been registered as Warped Publishing and Warped Music. They are currently firming a unique distribution deal, to be announced at a later date. Announcements of U.S. and Canadian signings will also be made within the next few weeks.

Webb, just returned from MIDEM, has acquired Canadian rights to "Soul Train", a Los Angeles produced television show. Those interested on a syndicated basis should contact Webb at 27 Prince Arthur Ave., Toronto.

## POLYDOR RUSH RELEASES SHIRLEY & CO. SINGLE

Frank Gould, Director of A&R for Polydor, has rush released, "Shame, Shame, Shame" by Shirley & Company on the Vibration label. The release came about through a pacting between Polydor and All Platinum Records. The deal covers both new product and back catalogue.

Initial action in the U.S. has been exceptional with chart listings already secured in the trades. Canadian stations have also shown indications of getting on the bandwagon, particularly Montreal's CKGM.

## MCCANN-ERICKSON SCI DIV'N AWARDED STUDIO 4 CONTRACT

McCann-Erickson's SCI division has been appointed to handle Studio 4 Marketing's advertising and promotion. The 1975 budget has been set at approximately \$1,000,000. The appointment was made by Leonard R. Friedman, President of Studio 4 Marketing, a company primarily involved in promoting high quality records and tapes through major media on a national basis. Tape and record packages will be available from coast to coast in Canada through major retail outlets including department stores.

Len Friedman is well known in the record industry, having gained a great deal of knowledge in the marketing of records, much of it as Director of Columbia Canada's Special Products Division, a post he left to strike out on his own.

McCann's vice-president Sandy McKague and SCI Account Service Manager Dave LaFerie will handle the Studio 4 account.

# Industry angry at TV news and dailies

There are areas of the music business we have sadly neglected. For some time now, we have watched and not commented on the lack of interest shown by the television and

press media in Canada when it comes to Canadian artists and recordings. In fact in many areas of the entertainment business, there is only a token gesture on the part of the news and entertainment departments of local TV stations and the national news departments to cover national events involving Canadian entertainers.

The dailies across Canada and their news services have also shown lack of interest in the potential in what is now the largest entertainment media in the world, the record business.

The New York Times is certainly an outstanding publication when it comes to entertainment and records. The U.S. networks are keenly aware of the new country explosion now happening as well as the eager interest by the public in pop music. In Canada, entertainment editors and reporters are somewhat short of being professional and lack the ability to find the news. Theatre, movies and art often dominate the tiny entertainment sections of the dailies. Many of the stories concern foreign endeavour and a token amount of space is given to Canadians.

We will be concentrating on this sad state of affairs in RPM in the future and are already making moves to contact some of the people who can cause action and get results.

The CRTC has regulated 30% Canadian music on AM and is about to look at a fair percentage for FM and have also made the TV percentage 60% in prime time. It would be interesting for the CRTC to look at the networks and local stations and their coverage of Canadian entertainment.

It is also interesting to see the great amount of entertainment ads in the dailies and the small amount of editorial copy that surround

## WEA CANADA LEANS ON NEW DIAMONDBACK LID

WEA Music of Canada have regrouped their forces after their initial stiffing adventure with Diamondback's entry into the disc business "Just My Way (Of Lovin' You)", and are now confident of breaking the group with their new single, "Wait My Time". The Mike McKenna group is comprised of Peter McGraw, vocalist; Stan Endersby, second guitarist; drummer Rick Love; Scott Cushnie, keyboardist; and vocals; and Howie Smith on bass.

The Diamondback session was a co-production by Jimmy Kale (ex-Guess Who) and Jim Campbell of WEA A&R. The group is managed by Kale, Jim Millican and Martin Kamerman. Their new single is a group penning.

## POLYDOR & RPM HOST PREMIERE OF "TOMMY"

Polydor and RPM will co-host the Canadian premiere of the "Tommy" film as part of the kick-off activities for Communication Eleven (C11). The showing will take place Friday March 21st., before an invited audience of the Canadian music industry. The invitation list will be compiled by Lori Bruner of Polydor and will consist of those attending C11 and members of the Toronto media, dealers etc. Tickets will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

The soundtrack of the Ken Russell directed "Tommy" film is distributed worldwide on the Polydor label. The film is based on the rock-opera by Pete Townshend and The Who and is a Robert Stigwood production, with production credits going to both Stigwood and Russell.

Principals in the film are Oliver Reed, Ann Margret and Roger Daltrey as Tommy and features Elton John as the Pinball Wizard with guest stars Eric Clapton, John Entwistle, Keith Moon, Paul Nicholas, Robert Powell, Pete Townshend and Tina Turner as well as The Who. Jack Nicholson appears as a special guest.

the ad rip off that dailies are part of. As a contrast, the sports section of the dailies is filled with editorial and gets a very small ad revenue from sports clients.

In some cases, these dailies have a monopoly on advertising, but no monopoly on editors who can produce an entertainment section that is more than a few stories and reviews by critics whose capabilities are in question.

The industry should take a stand on press cooperation and work to make the CRTC aware of the lack of interest in Canadian entertainment on the part of television news.

A whole new cause presents itself to the industry, and it is opportune to work now to make some drastic changes, because the industry is incensed. Now is the time when a great deal of good can be done by exerting pressure to change the attitude of the television news departments and the entertainment editors of many of the dailies.

Fighting apathy and a lack of professionalism should be easy, and the trade has a great deal of power to make these changes... and very soon.

## POLYDOR/CLARIDGE FIRM AGREEMENT

Polydor Canada and Claridge Records of Los Angeles have signed a long term licensing agreement. The announcement was made by Frank Gould, director of A&R for Polydor.

Initial single release was "Don't Call Us, We'll Call You" by Sugarloaf, now an established hit in the U.S. and already playlisted by several Canadian majors. This is the first entry for Sugarloaf since their "Green Eyed Lady" which topped the U.S. Charts.

**NOMINATIONS AND VOTING  
FOR THE JUNO AWARDS  
(REVISED)**

FEBRUARY 11TH, 1975

Last year, Juno Award Presentations were asked by various segments of the industry to revamp the system by which winners were selected for the Juno Awards. A Committee was formed last year to select the artists who would appear on the Juno Awards Presentation and set up the categories. After negotiations with the CBC, it was agreed that the Juno Awards would be televised by the CBC on March 24, 1975 from the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, situated on the grounds of the Canadian National Exhibition. The Committee was given the responsibility of selecting the Awards that would be televised, establishing the criteria by which performers would be selected to appear on the program and introduce a new concept of nominations and voting.

The Committee has now become the Canadian Music Awards Association, a non-profit chartered association, with six board members. The president is Mel Shaw. Other members comprise: Greg Hambleton, Martin Onrot, Leonard Rambeau, George Struth and Ross Reynolds.

The following is an updated explanation of how the nominations and voting will be carried out and the procedure for voting.

Sales figures to be submitted are net unit sales times suggested list price as of December 31. Tape sales should be included in album sales.

Each company may submit one entry per category. These entries will be submitted to an independent auditor. Submitting companies must be prepared to submit to examination by the auditor.

Budget, premium, promotional, and record club sales should not be included on entries.

Net sales figures should be for a fourteen month period beginning with November 1st of the prior year and

concluding the last day of the subject year.

**B. Based on Votes**

6. Composer
7. Country Female
8. Country Male
9. Country Group
10. Folksinger
11. Most Promising New Female
12. Most Promising New Male
13. Most Promising New Group
16. Producer

Five nominations in each category will be listed on a ballot that will be mailed to each subscriber of RPM. These ballots will be returned to an independent auditor who will tabulate the results. The winners will be kept confidential until the presentations of the Award at the Queen Elizabeth Theater on March 24.

Nominees for Country Female, Male and Group, and for Folksinger would be based on the top five best selling artists in each category. The definition of sales would be the same as in the sales category except that the figure submitted by each company for each entry would be net sales during the 14 month period for all qualifying recorded product, regardless of release date; i.e. singles, LP's and tapes. Each company may submit up to five entries in each category. Obviously, discretion should be used to limit the workload on the auditors. If an artist has product released on more than one label, total applicable sales would qualify.

Nominees for the Most Promising New Artist category, would also be based upon net sales of all qualifying recorded product with the following restrictions: a) the first record by the artist must have been released within the subject year or the prior year; and b) a prior winner would be excluded from the nominees. A group with a name change along with a significant change in personnel would qualify as a new group.

Nominees for Composer would be the first ten Canadian composers of the singles on the RPM yearly wrap-up chart. These ten nominees would be listed on the ballot with the titles of their qualifying compositions. A co-composer would qualify.

There would be ten nominees for Producer based on the first five Canadian producers of the singles on the RPM yearly wrap-up chart and the first five Canadian producers of the albums on the wrap-up chart. A Canadian producer of a non-Canadian act would qualify. These ten nominees would be listed on the ballot along with the name and the artist of the records produced.

**C. Based on Votes and Sales**

Categories:

3. Top Female Artist
4. Top Male Artist
5. Top Group

The winners in each category will be determined by having the highest total of dollar sales and votes weighted to have an equal impact. Five nominees will be determined in the same manner as the voting categories; i.e. net sales for the 14 month period of all qualifying recorded product, regardless of release date, will be the basis for nomination. Winners will be determined by a combination of sales and votes, equally weighted. The nominees' percentages of (1) total sales reported for the five nominees in the category and (2) total votes cast in the category, will be computed by the award's auditors and added together, with the winner having the highest aggregate percentage total.

# (It's still what's in the grooves that really counts) by Ritchie Yorke

The other night I found myself on the stage at Maple Leaf Gardens, just a few feet behind the throbbing Marvin Gaye rhythm section which was laying back into "Let's Get It On" and Christ knows they sure were. The drummer was a pure delight, poetry in mollyduker motion, punching into the snare with the right hand and vibrating the high hat with his left, everything back to front but it came out sounding like he was chewing through the creative bottom line of twenty years of popular music. He wasn't a young man either but he knew his chops. And he and the bass player were laying down some numbers together that were classics in themselves. The enshrining of the contemporary urban blues.

When you get right down to it, and that's what I'm rapping about right now, you've got to face the fact that Motown Records has contributed more to this music than any other record company anywhere. Their track record is simply beyond comparison. Other labels have had their memorable moments but Motown made a business out of laying down the most ambitious line of rock singles, one on top of another, until they were so far ahead of everybody that the competition ran out of steam. Since 1960, Motown has given us a collection of classics strung together by one common denominator — each of them demonstrating the finest song, performance, arrangement, production and overall polish of its time.

The Motown history has yet to be written (and what an absorbing epic it is bound to be) but it has been obvious for several years that the creative souls at Motown possess an expertise and overview of pop music that is totally unique. Many of the Motown classics are mini-rock symphonies, and that's as high a compliment as can be paid any rock producer. They are unquestioned works of art, landmarks in a music form which has so often floundered around in mediocrity. Motown has always shown the way to tomorrow and is still doing so. As they used to say on the Gordy singles' logo: "It's

what's in the grooves that counts". It's all that counts in the long haul.

The recent release of eight Motown Anthologies only serves to underline the significance of the company's amazing qualitative output. Without batting an eyelid, I'd jump right in and say this is the most important collection of Oldies ever released by any company. I'm confident that most of my readers share that view but it would do no harm at this point to quickly recap the highlights of this outstanding Anthology release.

Smokey Robinson And The Miracles (M 793R3) is a three record compilation of this superb group's big ones. Between Dec. 1960 and the end of '71, the Miracles had racked up 32 chart hits (source: Joel Whitburn's Top R&B Records 1949-71) including such classics as "You've Really Got A Hold On Me", "The Tracks Of My Tears", "Ooo Baby Baby", "I Second That Emotion" and "What's So Good About Goodbye". No wonder Bob Dylan once described Smokey Robinson as "America's greatest living poet". His words are an education in lyric writing.

Four Tops (M-809A3) were another standout Motown vocal group and its anthology of three albums features historic chartbreakers like "Baby I Need Your Loving", "I Can't Help Myself", "Reach Out I'll Be There", and "It's The Same Old Song". Fantastic Holland-Dozier-Holland tunes delivered with stunning impact.

As everyone knows, Diana Ross and the Supremes (M9-794A3) are the most successful girl group ever, and at one point in the 60's, they had nine consecutive number one singles, one of the hottest streaks the pop music scene has ever witnessed. They kicked it off with "Where Did Our Love Go" and flew on through "Baby Love", "Come See About Me", "Stop In The Name Of Love", "Back In My Arms Again", et al. All of their tracks are marked by scintillating production and powerful vocal delivery.

Gladys Knight and the Pips (M-792S2) was an act brought to Motown after several R&B hits

in the late 50's, and the Detroit writers and producers set it on a trail which has burned ever since. Among their most impressive performances at Motown were "I Heard It Through the Grapevine", "Just Walk In My Shoes" and "Neither One Of Us".

Jr. Walker And The All Stars (M-786R2) established a sound which remains unequalled to this day. This double album includes dynamic classics such as "Shotgun", "Shoot Your Shot", "I'm A Roadrunner" and "What Does It Take" (most recently nicked by John Lennon for "Whatever Gets You Through the Night") genuine masterpieces which captured the motion of the 60's.

The Temptations (M782A3) have been through a kaleidoscope of changes since their first single "The Way You Do The Things You Do" in May 1962. They produced great rock vocal group shuffle hits of the 60's like "My Girl", "It's Growing", "Ain't Too Proud to Beg", "I'm Losing You", "Beauty Is Only Skin Deep" and "I Wish It Would Rain" and then blazed into psychedelia with "Ball of Confusion", "Papa Was A Rollin' Stone", "Psychadelic Shack" and "Runaway Child Running Wild". This three-volume Anthology captures their many classic moments.

As far as gal vocal groups are concerned, you'd have to go a long way to top Martha Reeves & The Vandellas (M-778R2). Martha of course is now endeavoring to launch a solo career with MCA Records and ultimately she'll make it. I'm not so sure if she'll ever be able to surpass the unbelievable dynamics of such classic sizzlers as "Heat Wave", "Quicksand", "Nowhere to Run", "Dancing in the Street" and "Jimmy Mack". They simply don't make singles like that anymore and it's a tragedy.

And then we comes to Marvin Gaye (CM 791A3). I've always considered Marvin to be one of the most remarkable vocal talents of popular music; his prolific work is vastly underrated. Yet he's had more than 30 hits since '62 and another dozen with various female combinations, including Tammi Terrell and Kim Weston. His work has evolved from the nitty gritty guts of "Stubborn Kind of Fellow", "Can I Get A Witness" and "I'll Be Doggone" to the superior sophistication of "What's Going On", "Grapevine" and "Inner City Blues". He is clearly one of the most articulate spokesmen of the war children generation, yet this does not detract from his devastating vocal style. To my ear, Marvin Gaye is one of the half-dozen greatest male voices in the history of 20th Century popular music. Certainly I can't come up with any current blues singer who could rival his ability. As Marvin himself once sang with Tammi Terrell, there "Ain't nothing like the real thing". And "that's just about where it's at".

Any radio station, press critic or record store in the country not making a big noise about the release of these Motown Anthologies is simply out of touch with contemporary music. These songs are the heart and the guts and the soul of the music — if they're not in your disc collection, then you simply don't have a representative gathering of rock on record. The most amazing thing is that despite the often stormy passage of time, the Motown classics stand up just as well now as those magic moments when we first heard them. You can't say that about many other records.

One of these days soon, I'm going to put together my own collection of Motown's finest moments. These records were just about the most important part of my rock music education and experience. And probably yours too.

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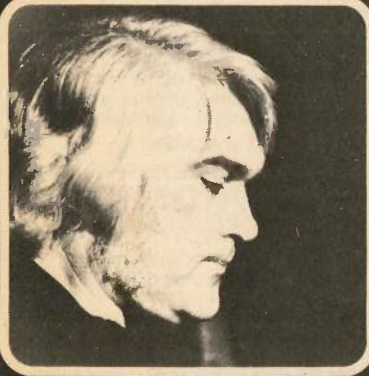
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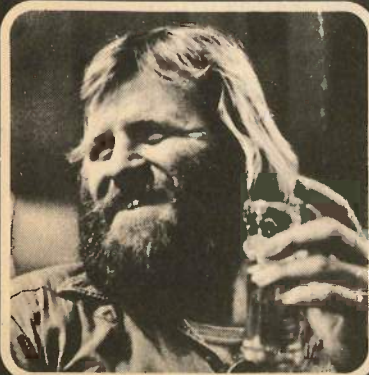

Initial reaction to the deck is very strong.

Paul Anka is in Canada to perform at Hamilton Place (18,19,20). Anka will do two shows per night at 7 and 10PM, and all shows have been completely sold out. His new single and album on U.A. records should be out by the end of February.

Columbia's Myles and Lenny reportedly broke all attendance records at Toronto's Chimney during their recent week of appearances there. The duo was also flown to Columbia's convention in Atlanta, Georgia, for a special performance in a showcase that featured the label's top Canadian and American talent. The revitalized Blood, Sweat and Tears, complete with David Clayton Thomas, were showcased as well and according to a spokesman for Columbia, sound even better than they did originally.

Led Zeppelin's recent concert in Montreal was a resounding success according to WEA national promo, Larry Green. Apparently it was the first time in Montreal's history that streets were cordoned off and a full police escort was given to a group as they were leaving the Forum to get to the airport. WEA's Georges Antigilio emceed the concert in French.

Frank Sinatra's upcoming personal appearance at Maple Leaf Gardens is beginning to look like a reality with the date set for May 10th. Sinatra will also perform in Montreal on May 9th, and is booked at Vancouver's Coliseum on April 26th.

The Strawbs concert at Toronto's Massey Hall resulted in a standing ovation from a full house and the group had just as much success at Montreal's La Plateau. Strawb's vocalist David Cousins reportedly brought the house down by appearing in a fleur de lis shirt for his final number "Grace Darling", which he sang in French.

A&M's Cat Stevens has booked a recording session at Andre Perry's Le Studio, forty miles north of Montreal. Billy Preston, Valdy, and Nazareth are numbered among those who have also made use of Le Studio's facilities. Stevens has scheduled studio time from Feb. 26 to April 4.

Lightfoot's annual Massey Hall concert has been extended to a week this year with the dates set for March 17 through to the 23rd. His album "Cold on the Shoulder" was featured on CHUM-FM over the weekend.

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## Programming-perspective '75

The discussion of what music to play on a radio station in a competitive market almost always leads to considerable disagreement, and if one asks about the ideal length of a

playlist the discussion frequently turns into a heated argument. Music and the length of playlists generally is the one area of programming that is discussed and argued openly, and is a paradox to the well founded belief that program directors will not divulge their secrets to anyone. While it is true that most music and program people will not pass on their special musical formulas to others in the industry, the individual records that are played and the number of records on a current list are always available and open to inspection. Just a moment's thought makes this seeming contradiction quite understandable. Ego plays a part in that the average m.d. or p.d. likes to be considered a hit-maker, so he's quite proud to talk about the new picks he has added to his station; if no chart is printed one can still listen to a station and quite easily determine the number of records that are being played at any one time; comparison of other charts also makes it quite easy to determine the musical programming policies of a station and the timetable used for adding or deleting specific records.

Since the general music information about most stations is readily available, or easily accessible, we must then turn our consideration to the reasons behind the length of the playlist and the type of music that is being

played. How long should the list be? What is the best time to add new records, before or after other stations? Should album cuts be played? How many? Should Gold be added into the mix? How many? How many new records should be added each week? Before attempting to answer any of these questions, it should be stated that in my opinion there is no exact answer to any one of them. There is no one perfect formula or perfect length playlist, there is only an attempt at perfection to satisfy a specific need or competitive situation! Each market, each radio station, each situation must be considered separately and individually, and the proper programming determinations and decisions should be made only after extensive research. I've stated it before, but it's worth repeating. Each market and each station is different, and programming should always reflect that difference. It must follow then, that while certain basic rules can and should be applied, the length of list and type of music should

### BUFFALO'S WBEN-FM GAINING IN TORONTO

There has been some concern among Toronto broadcasters over the inroads being made into the Toronto area by Buffalo's WBEN-FM. It has been suggested that the recent loss in ratings by some Toronto FM outlets was due largely to the popularity growth of the Buffalo station. To add a little salt to the wound, WBEN-FM and two other Buffalo FMers, WENY and WBLK, have reportedly applied for membership in the Bureau of Measurement (BBM).

A check of several youth-oriented commercial entities including Eaton's young men's shops, Bay Stores, clothing stores, health clubs etc., in the Golden Horseshoe, have indicated an almost total turnover to WBEN-FM, which features a syndicated "constant music" service. Canadian advertisers have latched on to this new powerhouse where they are offered one minute of airtime for only \$3.00, which is considerably less than the going rate on Toronto stations. One young Canadian observer noted: "I like to listen to the Buffalo station because I hear music and excitement that I can't get on any Toronto station. I'm tired of ding-dongs trying to lay psychic trips on me. Culture to me is music - my kind of music".

The Buffalo situation will no doubt become a part of the discussion at the CRTC public hearing on the proposed FM Regulations, March 11th.

be determined by market and competitive factors. Obviously, smaller markets will have different needs and requirements than larger. Unfortunately, too many in the industry base their decisions on the apparent reasons for success of leading stations in other markets, and copying becomes the compelling factor rather than professional understanding of what works and why. The result has been that if some leading stations in large markets go to, or have longer playlists, you can be certain that a whole batch of stations all over North America will follow that lead like puppy dogs or sheep. And that's wrong! Short list, long list, half gold, part gold, no gold, no albums, several albums, are not the questions that should be asked. What is right for your particular situation should be the only consideration.

Personally, I have never been an advocate of the shorter playlist, though I know that many of the finest and most successful stations in North America have relied on them for years. I believe, rather, that within a spectrum of music every single item that fits the format and demographic requirements should be played and should be played as early as possible. It makes no sense to me to wait until the whole world has played an obvious hit, when you know it is going to be played on your station and it is available to you. Yet there are an enormous number of stations that will sit on a record until it has reached the top ten most everywhere before they will take the chance and add it to their list. If they know they are going to play it, what the hell are they waiting for? The answer is, most of the waiters don't trust their own judgements. I don't think, though, that the short list or the long list is the major concern that programmers should have. Rather, I think they should be more intent on finding all of the music that fits their target demographic situation, and subsequently developing the most satisfactory and competitive formula for offering it to their audience. And that applies to all formats — popular, adult, country and good music. Of course, the problem is that you've got to know what you're looking for and its relative value, but recognizing and understanding that is certainly much more important and valuable than simply looking around to find something to copy. Next week we'll have a go at quality.

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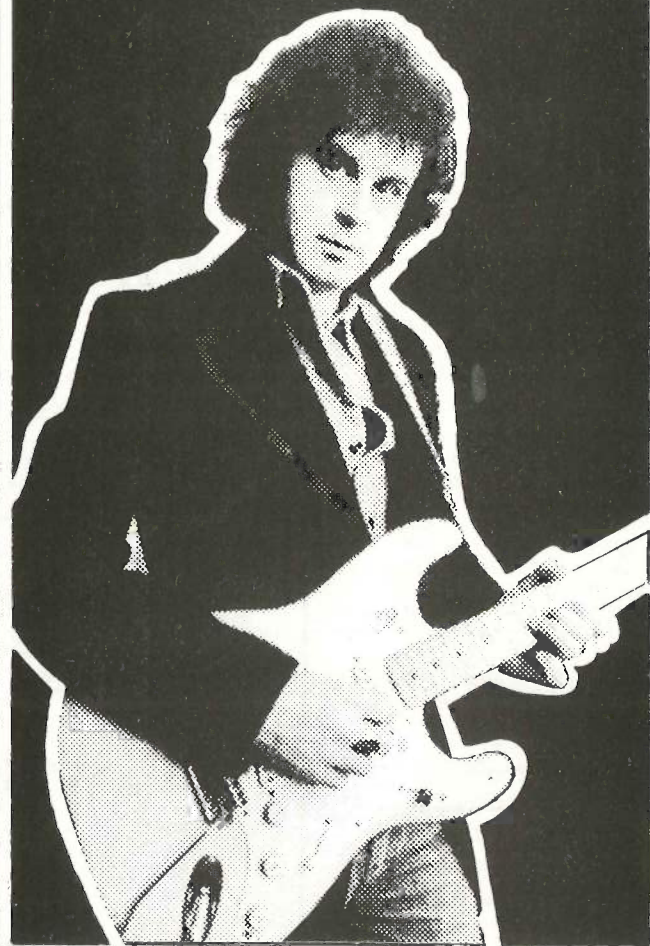

Shapiro is a well-known CBC producer of English and French language shows including "The New Generation", "Chez Helena" and "Les Montrealais", most based on communicating with young people. Other credits include his work as Media Consultant to the Government as well as to community and nationwide rehabilitation programs. Of particular note was his Radio-TV course for inmates of Canadian Penitentiaries, considered a breakthrough in panel education.

R. Harlan Smith's new Royalty single, "Song For Shelly", has shown an interesting pattern toward acceptance by pop programmers. The single scored early on release with country giants, CJVI Victoria, CFAC Calgary, CFCW Camrose, CKRD Red Deer and CFCG Grand Prairie. Pop programmers at CKEY Toronto, CFQC Saskatoon and CJCA Edmonton, among others, have apparently aired the single with good listener response.

**MONTREAL TV STATIONS

## ALBUM REVIEWS

**BOB RUZICKA**

What better way to prove you have a studio capable of high quality sound then to utilize the talents of a giant among



Canadian writer/performers - and what better way for this giant to prove himself then to do it all at home, where he obviously feels a "family" attachment for his backup and surroundings. Bob Ruzicka should break internationally, and this set could be his vehicle. Ruzicka, an Edmonton dentist, molds his soft prairie twang and equally soft lyrical message into a musical togetherness, acceptable for the contemporary rocker, middle of the roader and country buff. Damon Studios in Edmonton was the setting and the backing was supplied by the Northwest Rhythm Company, a group of professional musicians who display an incredible instrumental respect for Ruzicka, who co-produced the album with Gary McDonall. Ruzicka isn't a fresh new voice, his vocal expression and message display a maturity and a professionalism much needed in an industry attempting to build a star system. A Dynamite cut is "Sunshine Lady" and we like "Dude" but be careful of the line "a little more shit on your shoes".

Story of the Year - winner, Bill Kinsman of Kitchener; the Central Ontario Television Award of \$250 for Broadcaster of the Year - winner, David Baker of Kitchener; and a new award, the Carl A. Pollock Award for Academic Excellence - winner of this \$250 was Peter Kent of Kitchener.

Those attending the dinner included graduates who are now involved in broadcasting operations in Kingston, London, Kitchener, Guelph, the CBC, CTV, Global Television Network and one from Aberdeen, Scotland.

Larry Soloway, a part time weekly member of the Conestoga faculty, as guest speaker, questioned the value of Awards "in a business where too often Awards are given instead of money, and there are many awards given". He asked: "What guarantees do they offer for future success", and if there should be such competition among so many competent people". He went on to say: "There are only two things that anyone can expect of the 'real world' of broadcasting - the quality you put in, and the money you take out, and the latter depends upon the former."

## CANADIAN BRASS

In Paris  
Boot Master Concert Series BMC 3003-K

Some may question the reviewing of a classical album but "different strokes for different folks" and, really, it would bene-



fit many of the rock, acid, progressive, pop etc. oriented programmers, if they gave a listen to what must be the finest Canadian classical album on the market. Producer Eleanor Sniderman has served up the Masters (Bach, Handel etc.) in an ear-pleasing manner that almost removes the brass from the brass. Doing it the Sniderman way, Frederick Mills and Ronald Romm on trumpets, trombonist Eugene Watts, Graeme Page on French horn, and Charles Daellenbach on tuba, these instruments, usually manipulated in symphony orchestras to scare the hell out of you, suddenly acquire a soft and almost velvety timbre. The set was produced in Paris, France, which cuts down on some of the Canadian content credits with the exception of Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus" and Purcell's "Sonata In Three Movements", arranged by Brassman Mills. Regardless of the non-Canadian content, there are exceptional cuts including "In Pride Of May", a lilting and very effective Madrigal at 1:59, and a delightful Dahl "Intermezzo" at 3:13, both of which would shake morning or evening drive listeners. Sales on this album have been reported as "very brisk" - an indication that there is a great deal of listener value in the package.

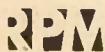
