Attic's Root Bear pays visit to RPM

Attic Records are promoting a new single release with a familiar waddling character known to many as The Great Root Bear of a leading hamburger chain. The single, which is his theme song, has been given the title Ba-Dum Ba-Dum (Ba-Dum Ba-Dum-Dum). The artists are known as Major Ursus, no doubt after the big bear constellation Ursa Major.

Among the promotional efforts from Attic, was a personal visit from the Bear himself, passing out copies of the single and his pamphlet, Everything You Always Wanted To Know About The Great Root Bear (but never cared enough to ask). The pamphlet contains such wisdom as Q: Isn't it rather unusual for a bear to walk on two feet? A: Not as unusual as five.

Attic's Tom Williams predicts the single will be a huge success, on the basis of reaction to the commercial, and that airplay is sure to generate immediate response.

The single is 100 percent Canadian content.

to record in Edmonton

Mason Williams is currently recording a session for Paul Hann's new album at Damon Studios in Edmonton. Guesting on the session is A&M's Ozark Mountain Daredevils. Holger Petersen is producing for Stony Plain Productions while Rick Erickson and Garry McDonall share board chores.

Other activity at Damon include sessions for Blizzard, a local group, who have received favourable response from WEA; an English and French CBC taping of a talent development series; the Allen Sisters' group, Cloudburst for a CTV pilot; Don Stonechild for Shannon Two Feathers; Nancy Nash with Blacksheep Man for an April release; and Tim Jeffery with Beer And Country Music for Damon itself. Damon and Mustard are distributed in Canada by RCA.

Dixon-Propas get Can management of Budgie

Toronto management firm Dixon-Propas have acquired Canadian direction of British group Budgie, who record with A&M Records. The deal was made between the Toronto firm and Graham Maloney, the group's manager, on a reciprocal arrangement with provisions for Maloney to assist groups managed by Dixon-Propas, should they tour in Britain.

Budgie have recently arrived in Toronto on a trip subsidized by A&M in the U.S. They are planning to stay in Toronto for several months. The four-piece group has been together for nine years, and has two North American releases on A&M. They generally play concerts in England.

WEA top list again in March

WEA Music remains the most often charted distributor in Canada, by study of the RPM Top 100 Singles charts for the four issues in March. WEA records were charted 99 times, for an average of 24.75 per week. Capitol, with a strong finish, overtook CBS for the number two spot, totalling 59 listings to 41 for CBS.

GRT continued to make strong gains. Ranked tenth as recently as last December, it moved from sixth spot to fourth with 38 chart listings, or 9.5 per week. RCA slipped to fifth with 35, followed by Polydor with 31.

WEA also continued to lead in Top 25 listings with 24, or six per week. CBS was also strong in this department, with 19, followed by Capitol with 14, RCA with 10 and GRT with nine. Motown had the distinction of seeing six of its eleven listings, or 55 percent in the top 25.

Cockburn scores with first full Quebec tour

True North recording artist Bruce Cockburn, on release with his new album, In The Falling Dark, recently completed his first extensive tour of Quebec. Management firm Finkelstein-Fiedler report the tour, which marked Cockburn's first live exposure before primarily Francophone audiences, very successful with near-sellouts, encores and standing ovations marking every stop.

Concerts included Jonquiere March 9, Thetford Mines (11), two in Quebec City (12), Ste. Anne de Bellevue (14) and two in Montreal's Outremont Theatre (18). Cockburn spoke to the audiences completely in French, and also did radio interviews and a Montreal television show in French.

One of the songs from the new album, Vagabondage, is French.

April dates from CPI & DKD for ELO. Stewart

Concert Productions International (CPI) and Donald K. Donald Productions (DKD) are gearing up for a full tour schedule over the first half of April, Featured tour artists include Electric Light Orchestra (U.A.). Al Stewart (GRT) and Shawn Phillips (A&M).

ELO's dates include the Ottawa Civic Centre (2), Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens (4) and the Montreal Forum (6). Stewart will be featured at the Montreal Forum (16). Hamilton's McMaster University (17) and the Maple Leaf Gardens Concert Bowl

Phillips' tour includes dates in Ottawa (6), Montreal (7-8), Cornwall (10), Quebec City (11) and Burlington, Vermont (12).

CPI is also handling exclusive bookings on two Toronto concerts in April. These are for Weather Report, firmed for Convocation Hall in Toronto on the 13th and Journey, Starcastle and The Steve Gibbons Band on the 17th at Massey Hall.

M - Music composed by a Canadian A - Artist featured is a Canadian P - Production wholly recorded in Canada L - Lyrics written by a Canadian Those artists included; Quebec star Yvon Deschamps, Toronto's Grant Smith, Atlanta's R&B band Crystal Brandy, U.S. singer R.B. Greaves and New York cabaret act Gotham. Crystal Brandy, Grant Smith and Gotham have signed with Direction for world-wide release.

Within the month, R.B. Greaves' single on Bareback Records in the U.S. Who's Watching The Baby has received strong U.S. trade standings, particularly in the past couple of weeks. The single's release in Canada, now scheduled for two weeks, was delayed due to a defective master. It will follow up Greaves' first hit Take A Letter Maria. John Williams' agreement with Stephen Metz, president of Bareback, entitles him to release material in the Philippines as well as Canada.

Yvon Deschamps is putting the final vocal tracks on his English album planned for a release date that will coincide with the CBC-TV April 14th airing of The Let's Save Canada Hour with Don Harron and a featured MacLeans article to run early May. Singles, I don't Know Why (English) and Je Ne Sais Pas Comment Faire (French) will precede the release of his Direction album. Deschamps has ten gold albums to his credit, prior to his signing with Direction.

Toronto entertainer Grant Smith, who

recently hosted The Miss Teen Canada Pageant is in the final stages of mixing single and album material for speculative release dates set for early April. Gotham, who is also finishing up material at Sounds Interchange studios in Toronto, is looking at a tentative release date to be set soon for the next couple of months. The night-club act out of New York consists of Michael Pace, Gary Herb and David McDaniels.

Direction's first single release Pussyfooter by Jackie Robinson is currently charted on Montreal's Disco Pool at 29 and will be followed up by two foreign singles -Fly Away (I'm Gonna Do It) by South Of Thunder and Love, Love Me Baby by T.B.S.S.O. (The Boston Symphony Sounds Orchestra). The two singles appear on German labels Jupiter and Hansa respectively. Some of the other MIDEM deals Williams acquired this past year include: releasing The Sandpiper's material on U.K. label Satril Records, Ariola in Germany, Kruger in Belgium, Dany Music and Platform 200 in France and Emerald and Mint Records in Ireland. Direction product will be distributed in Canada by RCA with publishing companies One Way Music and No Turns Music registered with performing rights organizations CAPAC and BMIC respectively.

Roy Kenner - - breakin' it with Law



The law catches up with Roy Kenner (r) with a little help from MCA's Randy Sharrard (I) and Bob Johnson.

Roy Kenner has been known as one of Canada's premiere vocalists since his early days alongside Domenic Troiano in such groups as Bush, Mandala and the James Gang, in which the two replaced Joe Walsh. The 28-year-old native of Toronto recently hooked up with another thriving Ohio-based band, Law. Kenner is one of two lead singers in the band, and also plays percussion when Law performs onstage.

The connection was made through the group's producers, Ron and Howard Albert, who had worked with Kenner on the last James Gang album. Law was looking for another lead singer and Kenner, who had been finishing a regular stint on CBC's Music Machine series and work in a band with former Guess Who drummer Garry Peterson, was looking for work.

The result was Law's debut album with MCA, titled Breakin' It.

The album, released last month, was produced by the Alberts for Goldhawke Productions, which is run by Who manager Bill Kurbishley and lead singer Roger Daltry. Recording was at Criteria Recording Studios in Miami. A first single, Shelter Of Your Arms, should be released by the end of March.

Kenner describes the band's sound as "kind of funk rock. There's a driving, funky kind of bass to it, and the rock edge comes from the guitar. The vocals have a salt-and-pepper feel to them - - you've got a black kid and a white kid singing lead."

Kenner enjoys splitting vocals with Lee Cunningham. They do the arrangements themselves: "We developed a rapport right away. We discovered that we could sing well together, and our voices blend really well together. It's been great working with him. I think it makes the band sound a little more unique."

Although all the members enjoy recording, Kenner considers Law basically an onstage band: "It's kind of a party-boogie band. We don't like to see the people sit still. The band has no trouble live. Even when we're a little loose it still ends up coming off okay."

Kenner is still a Canadian, splitting his time between Toronto and Los Angeles. He still keeps in touch with the Canadian industry: "It seems to have gotten a lot better than what it was then. For me, because I was in it back then, I wish it would have been happening a little bit sooner, but it definitely seems to have picked up quite a bit. Canada has become really important as far as records and acts go."

Kenner feels that the U.S. treats Canadian acts and records fairly and judges them by their quality: "There may have been a thing where because a record was only being played because it was Canadian, people might have looked a little bit askance at it. I think that's changing somewhat, because many Canadian acts are consistently putting out good product. I think the States is more aware of what's happening up here. They don't think of it as the land of eskimos and skis anymore."

Kenner is very happy in his situation with Law: "It's awfully hard to find something that could beat out Mandala - - that's been my favourite band up to now - - but Law is probably coming close to making me feel the same way. Everybody has a good personal rapport, and everybody likes to play onstage with each other. There's a real tight feeling here that we had in Mandala that I don't think I've really seen since up to now."

The group will be touring the U.S. shortly and hope to include Canadian dates. They are booked in Canada by The Agency.

The Refinery - - striking gold in Calgary

In the slightly less than three years of its existence, Calgary's The Refinery has established itself as a driving force in the western Canada entertainment scene. The club also has the distinction of booking in 75 percent Canadian acts, from both east and west, and turning a healthy profit with them.

In fact, club manager Lou Blair reports that at \$210,000, his 1976 entertainment budget was one of, if not the top club budget in Canada, to feature acts such as Downchild Blues Band, Shooter, Myles & Lenny, Sweet Blindness, Pagliaro and Brussels Sprout.

Blair, a veteran of record promotion (Capitol and WEA) and personal management as well as club management, took over the Refinery in October of 1974. He has built the Refinery in stages. At first

he brought in live disco music, and was the first to introduce the large disco horn band format complete with flashy stage act and custuming.

After a series of successful dates with Canadian acts, Blair noted: "I noticed I was getting bored with my disco format. Then on June 28, I started a campaign at the Refinery. I started with Shooter for two weeks, followed by Brutus, then Liverpool, Sweet Blindness, Crack of Dawn for two weeks. After getting Long John Bladry, who was just tremendous, I came back with Bounty, another Canadian act, and then Brussels Sprout for two weeks, and so on.

"The irony of the thing is that in that rush of acts I ran between June 28 and the end of the year, (15 of the 20 were Canadian) I made money. My business made money. The people in the city of Calgary

enjoyed virtually every one of those acts."

The 250-seat Refinery prides itself on its style and atmosphere, unusual for a rock club. The maitres d' wear jackets with flowers in the lapel. The waitresses are dressed in long gowns. Sneakers, leather jackets, hats and t-shirts are not permitted, although jeans are acceptable. Included in the price of admission is a hot buffet dinner and salad bar.

An additional lounge, a 100-seat unit called My Apartment is also being planned. It will include a bar suspended five feet over a moat. In the moat are four two-foot boats with capacity for remote control, and no crocodiles. The moat also serves as a good opportunity for bouncers to cool off the occasional hot-under-the-collar customer. At the bottom are such homey features as a library, fireplace, dining room and den.

Blair is keyed into the Canadian music industry, both as a talent buyer and a former record company man: "I attend all of RPM's functions. I've just finished with the Juno Awards and I was at RPM's Talent Buyers' Conference in October, on Ron Scribner's panel. I'm a heavy supporter of anything having to do with western Canada."

He is aware of some of the industry's problems, and offers suggestions: "We talk about the lack of a Canadian star system. It's like saying we don't have major league, NFL-calibre football here. We're like farm teams in our music here. We can't really have superstars until we develop our farm team until out of that farm team comes a star."

Blair feels that one of the solutions is to develop the industry from the performing level up through the recording and promotion levels. The first step is to decentralize the industry from Toronto and to concentrate more on the east, west and north: "Everybody was saying a few years ago, Toronto's the next centre. We've had our London and Liverpool, New York and Los Angeles, next is going to be Toronto.' It never happened and never will, because we've gone past the stage where a city is going to become the centre of the music industry again. It's too diverse now.

"We don't have that centre core in Toronto anymore. Eastern acts come out west and say, 'Hey, there's a whole market out here. We're working in nightclubs, filling the places, making money for everybody, including ourselves, getting records sold. The people are supporting us.'"

Blair also sees much room for growth in the eastern attitude towards western acts. He would like to see the major record companies throw more support into the western provinces, in an effort to build better studios and break local talent: "I am down on companies that pull thousands to millions of dollars worth of sales out of different regions, especially Alberta, and don't put one single penny back into them. They send their marketing people out across the country in droves. We don't see the A&R men very often, though.

"And they ask us what kind of incen-

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tives we have to bring them out west. Bim, Trooper, BTO, Terry Jacks, Susan Jacks, Hammersmith, Valdy - I can go on and on about the acts that come out of western Canada. What more incentive do they need?"

Another problem is that of getting eastern agencies to open their doors to western acts: "If people in the east want to see the Refineries and the Body Shops and places like that continue to keep their doors open to a lot of Canadian touring acts out of the east, it has to start becoming a two-way street. We have to see some of the clubs in Toronto start opening their doors to some of the western acts that want to travel.

"The record companies also have to get their acts together. Instead of telling bands they've got to travel all the way to Toronto for a session, send their A&R guy out with the band to the recording studios in Vancouver. Go to Sundown Recorders in Edmonton. Put some of that money back into it. Stimulate the economy. It costs less that way anyway.

"My message is very simple. If we're going to talk about a Canadian industry, which I'm totally willing to support, the bigwigs have to start waking up. They've got to quit being branch offices of the United States, and we have to quit centralizing the record industry in Toronto. Toronto will always be the home for all the main information and the flow, but to open Canada, you have to open Toronto up. If we want to build the Canadian industry, let's believe in it and let's do it."

Blair is very positive about his own particular interest, the western entertainment situation. Noting clubs such as the Refinery, Vancouver's Body Shop and Old Roller Rink, and the Landmark in Thunder Bay, he points out, "All of a sudden we now have Canadian entertainment, drawing people, making a nightclub operator like myself happy, because I'm making money. The groups are happy because now, for the

first time, there's a ray of hope when you travel west."

And Blair is particularly pleased with the Canadian acts he's booked into the Refinery: "of the acts I've booked over the last year and a half that were Canadian, I would say a good 80 percent have got return possibilities. Every one of them can come back for work, and every one of them can get a raise. And that's important."

GLORIA GAYNOR Glorious Polydor PD-1-6095-Q

Gloria Gaynor receives a great deal of help on her latest Polydor release with concentrated efforts made by producers Greg Diamond and Joe Beck, who had a hand in the writing of all but two of the cuts. Beck is also responsible for guitar solos and heavy orchestra arrangements on cuts As Time Goes By, We Can Start All Over Again and Sweet, Sweet Melody.

REO SPEEDWAGON You Get What You Play For Epic 34494-H

Reo Speedwagon guitarists Gary Richrath and Kevin Cronin justly dominate the band's music with nearly all cuts written by these two. The heavy metal sound of the band is rich with hooky guitar lines as Richrath and Cronin play constantly off of each other. Live, as opposed to studio, albums should bring out that extra energy.

RALPH MURPHY Star Born Every Minute GRT 9230-1962-T

Title cut is one of many possible single releases. Two other strong contenders are The Best Night Of My Life and Rides Me Like A River. Murphy, who has produced many bands in the past, recorded the album at Jack Clement Studios in Nashville with Roger Cook producing the Murphy originals.

101 STRINGS In The Sound Of Magnificence Mark-Lin ISP-1

Mark-Lin distributed and have fulfilled a wish by Adult Oriented programmers to supply "some 101 String material. All 15 cuts are familiar love songs such as Stardust, We've Only Just Begun and Theme From A Summer Place and produced to add particular clarity to percussion and solo instruments above the surrounding effect of the strings.

STREETWALKERS Vicious But Fair Mercury SRM-1-1135-Q

Album concept, material and ideas have been progressively becoming more shocking and imaginative. Streetwalkers keep with their stride-ahead-of-thetimes reputation. Lead singer Roger Chapman and guitarist Charlie Whitney have written songs in a sado/sex theme which suit Chapman's distinctively crazy voice such as Mama Was Mad and But You're Beautiful.









RONNEY ABRAMSON Stowaway

True North TN 27-H Set contains Abramson's own gentle and beautiful songs which touch on heavy emotional subject matter but never make the mistake of falling in and losing the listener. In songs such as Long Lonely Winter and Baby Brown Eyes she stands back from love and people and comments objectively on them but manages to remain extremely personal and intimate. The artist and listener discuss love soberly.

SUPERTRAMP Even In The Quietest Moments A&M SP-4634-W

By becoming immediately personal, Supertramp (still one of the few bands capable of successful social comment) has released an album on A&M Records that surpasses the success of Crime Of The Century and Crisis What Crisis? Social mores and the individual are attacked in cuts Lover Boy, From Now On and the title cut.





MARVIN GAYE At The London Palladium Motown T-352R2-Y Explosive 2-record set should bring Gaye back into the winner's circle. Live and tingling from the intro theme through to including a medley (111) with Florence Lyles, the closing theme. Side four is taken up completely with Got To Give It Up (11:48) edited and culled as a single already breaking in the U.S. through CKLW.



MCA scores with Trooper at Three Days In March

The featured exhibit in the MCA hospitality suite at the Three Days In March, a tribute to MCA group Trooper, was the result of great thought, expense and timing on the part of MCA and the various companies associated with the Trooper gold album, Two For The Show. The exhibit featured a series of displays by and of the companies involved, from the studio to the street

According to MCA vice-president and general manager Scott Richards, the philosophy behind the display was one of "Trying to do something different at this period of time every year when we get a chance to do something different if we want to. The concept we worked with was how and why Trooper gets into the Canadian rock fan's home."

MCA invited all the people involved with the group and with MCA at the dealer and racker levels, as well as all participants at the Three Days In March. The company's entire staff spent its whole weekend preparing the exhibit. Richards noted, "I didn't want to have anyone stop me with a hammer putting up a display and say to me, 'Why are we doing this?' I didn't want that to happen. I wanted everyone to understand that this was a gift. It was a gift to the group, a gift to our industry."

The group was present during both nights of the display, seated in chairs under signs identifying the members. Trooper, who are from Vancouver, have been at Toronto's Phase One, recording their third MCA album with Randy Bachman producing and George Semkiw engineering. They are also doing a series of small concerts in Toronto and the outlying suburbs.

The exhibit was arranged in a logical

order enabling the viewer to walk around and through the different stages from the studio to the gold record, in the order of their occurrence. The first display was from Toronto's Phase One Studios, consisting of a 24-track mixing board set up to allow the viewer to do actual mixes of several Trooper masters. A stereo cassette dubbing machine enabled the mixer to take home a copy of his work.

A montage by photographer John Rowlands followed, displaying the different facets of the mastering process.

The next exhibit featured pressing company Precision Record Productions. The display featured the Two For The Show album and title single, in a series of photographs including different parts of the pressing operation, PVC slugs, untrimmed albums and labels. Precision representative Bill Ronken was present.

Cinram, the Montreal firm that does all of MCA's 8-track and cassette tapes, was then featured in a photographic display of its facilities and the production process.

One of the more interesting displays was by packaging firm Ross-Ellis. It consisted of a half-ton animated machine simulating the package-making process from the inking stage through the four colour adds, culminating in the finished product. Representing Ross-Ellis at the display was Shaun Bernard.

Racks and retail were then represented in a small, anonymous display of a rack containing the Trooper album.

To demonstrate the radio aspect, MCA featured the CKOC Hamilton portable public relations robot, often used for such special promotions as hospital shows and children's parties. The robot is equipped

with a built-in eight-track player, and for purposes of the exhibit, wore a Trooper logo and carried the album in one hand and tape in the other.

Next in line was an MCA exhibit, featuring the company's sales, promotion and electronic data processing departments, complete with computer printouts. MCA is proud of being the first fully computerized record company in Canada, having started seven years ago. Also involved in the display was Yorkville Advertising, the agency used by MCA. Yorkville did the Trooper radio commercials, and are also involved in the company's marketing.

The next display was a mixture of trade ads, the RPM Trooper cover, and the album artwork. The artwork portion featured the artist's concept described from the beginning, a blow-up of the original black and white photo and the original water-colour painting of the photo, flown in specially from Vancouver.

The final display was of George Chow and Lifetime Plaques, who made the actual gold record. They produce all of CRIA's gold records, and also the Juno Awards, as well as all of RPM's special awards.

Trooper were presented with the gold albums at the exhibit. They are currently enjoying strong airplay success with their new single Santa Maria and Richards is particularly pleased with the single's quick success in Montreal. Trooper have recently been signed directly to MCA from Randy Bachman's MCA-distributed Legend Records. Hopes are high that the group will make strides into the U.S. with the new single and album. They also plan to spend more time developing their careers in eastern Canada





Cabinet set to cut down CRTC

The current Canadian broadcasting act the one that gave the CRTC the power to decree such policies as the 30 per cent Canadian content radio music quota without parliamentary action - seems to be doomed to parliamentary scrapping on the eve of its 10th anniversary.

The current legislation, an act everybody seems to love to hate, will give way to new legislation to appease demands for a larger provincial role in communications, according to proposals tabled in the commons by Communications Minister Jeanne Sauve.

But the real loser, according to these proposals, is the CRTC itself, which will lose its immunity to policy impulses of the politically-motivated Federal Cabinet.

At present, the CRTC sets communications policy in line with its perception of the public interest. The cabinet, or all of parliament for that matter, cannot reverse a CRTC decision without amending the legislation which governs it. Cabinet can ask for a policy review or reconsideration of any decision, but it can't dictate the conclusions.

Under proposed legislation, the government will have the power to order the CRTC to act or to override the commission's decisions - something Sauve has threatened for some time.

"The CRTC should not have a policy function," Suave was quoted in the national press last week. She charged that the commission now operates in a policy "vacuum."

She met last week with provincial communications ministers in Edmonton to sell the legislation to them.

The provinces - specifically Saskatchewan and Quebec - have asked for more powers in communications, especially in the field of cable TV.

Suave is trying to enlist their support in the government's broadside on the

powers of the CRTC, an agency, again, which everybody loves to hate.

But spokesmen for the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, while welcoming the role of the provinces in cable TV matters, opposed any new provincial powers over radio and TV stations.

The new proposals don't aim to alter the mandate of the CBC, but Sauve suggested that some of the corporation's local functions may be put under some provincial control. CBC officials responded to that with horror and surprise.

CRTC chairman Harry Boyle was quoted in the national press as being quite concerned, especially that the bill challenged the commission's present right to take positions in opposition to the sitting government.

The new broadcast proposals have been waiting in the wings for sometime now, but their introduction to the Commons last week was politically timed to play to the whipped-up national anxiety over unity following the election of the proseparatist Parti Quebecois in Quebec last fall.

The cabinet subsequently asked the CRTC to investigate "alleged separatists" operating within the CBC's French-language wing, Radio Canada. Many government observers felt it was a silly request - it would be quite common for many broadcast employees to be supporters of an elected majority government in any province. Some - like media writer Sid Adilman of the Toronto Star - called the requested investigation a witch hunt.

When CRTC chief Harry Boyle announced that it would be impossible to carry out the investigation, the Cabinet began firing its well loaded cannons at the regulatory agency.

The upcoming discussions surrounding the introduction of a new broadcasting act will be at least as heated as the rounds of politicking which led to the present act decade ago. But they will unfortunately be clouded even be dominated, by issues of separatism and federal-provincial relations with a variety of backlash interests.

The issues involved in the years of discussion leading up to the current legislation distinguished themselves by being essentially about the principles of the public responsibilities involved in broadcasting.

It seems unlikely, if the tone of the current debates continue, that we'll be so lucky this time. And now the issues of broadcasting in Canada are more crucial than ever.

Radio's 50-year club now has 38 members fall.

As time marches through the 1970s, Canadian radio's infant years - the 1920s - become its golden years. And the list of Canadian radio stations that have been on the air for fore than 50 years grows longer.

Montreal's CFCF, the first station to broadcast to the public - back in 1919 - is also Canada's oldest continuously operating station today. Before1977, 25 other Canadian stations celebrated their golden anniversaries, and this year seven more enter that select group: CHWK Chilliwack, CFJC Kamloops, CKUA Edmonton, CJGX Yorkton, CHML Hamilton, and CBL and CFRB Toronto.

CFCF began operating in 1919 as XWA. There was no licence until the following year, when the station adopted the call letters it's known by today. By 1926 there were 40 broadcasting stations in Canada; most of them still operate today.

Before late in 1925, broadcasting was outside of the Canadian copyright act, and at that time all transmitters and receivers owned and operated in Canada were subject to licencing and a fee by the federal government's Ministry of Transportation.

In 1926 the Canadian Association of

Broadcasters was formed, and by 1930 the government's Aird Commission recommended that formation of a national company, The Canadian Radio Broadcasting Company, to be the authority and management of the Canadian broadcasting system. Between that time and 1934 CAB, representing private broadcasters, and the government struggled to work out Canada's system of compatible private and public broadcasting interests which has existed in one or another legal form to the present.

The other golden-years stations still operating today are: CFUN Vancouver, CFAC and CFCN Calgary, CJCA Edmonton, CHAB Moose Jaw, CKCK Regina, CKOC Hamilton, CFRC Kingston, CFPL London and CKAC Montreal (all originally licenced in 1922); CKWX Vancouver, CJVI Victoria, CFQC Saskatoon, CKPC Brantford, and CFNB Fredrickton (1923); CKOY Ottawa and CFCY Charlottetown (1924); CBU Vancouver (1925); and CJOR Vancouver, CJOC Lethbridge, CKRM Regina, CFJR Brockville, CFCO Chatham, CKNX Wingham, CKVC Quebec and CHNS Halifax (1926).

Pascal: an erudite, glib individual

Al Pascal programmes one of Canada's most influential radio stations: CFRA-AM, Ottawa. CFRA's market dominance is legend, comparable, I think, only to WABC-AM, New York, The latest BBMs show CFRA's (7+) circulation to be near 540,000, which is about 2.84 times the audience of its nearest competitor - - if this is a competitive situation. CFRA loses just a handful of (7+) quarter-hours, several of which go to sister station CFMO-FM.

Pascal is an erudite, glib individual with a disarmingly articulate intelligence, Apparently of quiet demeanour, he comes alive when he's talking radio, which we did for

several hours a few weeks ago.

He came to CFRA in 1966, after apprenticing at stations in Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Montreal - - his home town, His affect on the Ottawa market was immediate. Says one long-time competitor, . . . he (Pascal) did more for Ottawa radio than just about anyone has. He contemporized it. Nobody was into production before he came. Nobody really took the 7-17 audience seriously before he came . . . now there's a station that survives on them.'

Beginning as an announcer - - he doesn't like the word 'jock'; he finds it perjorative - - Pascal became PD of CFRA, in March of 1976, replacing Paul Ski who exited for

Halifax.

How does he account for CFRA's success? "Well, it's a lot of things. I don't really think any one aspect of our operation stands out as the reason for CFRA being number one. CFRA, like any successful organization, is the result of a lot of different people and things working together well. The whole is greater than the sum of the parts."

What about CFRA's music policy? "We've just worked hard to keep it up-todate. Really, there seems to be only three things we can do with a record: add it, drop it or forget it. I get together with our music people every week and we go over what we're playing, what we might add and what we can drop. Everybody is expected to have done their homework, including me. The final decision is a collective one, based, in part, on intuition, our perception of the record's demographic appeal, tradepaper research, etc.

"We like to alter our playlist slowly, easing records in and out of rotation. Picks get aired maybe once a day. As their performance improves we rotate them more often, . . . or drop them, if need be. Supers (hits) may get played several times a day... basically the same process goes on in reverse as we ease records out of our current playlist and into gold rotation."

And the objective of this policy, "... is, of course, consistency, predictability. Our audience has to have a good idea of what they'll hear when they turn us on. Otherwise, they may turn somebody else on. And consistency doesn't stop with music . . . it extends beyond that. Our announcers stress personality . . . they're conversationalists . . . they're talking with, not at the listener - - to use an old phrase."

What is CFRA looking for in an announcer? ". . . a mature communicator. A guy or girl who is a hard worker; someone who has their rudiments down pat; someone who can contribute to CFRA, both on and off the air; someone who doesn't have any hang-ups and isn't on some kind of a (ego) trip; someone who can get along with everybody on staff."

Pascal believes in motivating people. Does that mean everybody at CFRA makes big money? "Not really, money isn't everything. We pay our people well, I guess. But I've found you can get more out of someone by working with them, by helping them, by letting them know you're always there . . . ready, willing and able to help."

"You have to always remember that everyone functions differently, so motiva-

tion isn't a one shot thing."

How does Pascal describe CFRA's overall approach to programming? "(CFRA) has, over the years, built its programming, its staff, its audience in a slow, methodical manner. You might say CFRA has evolved over time. There haven't been any great bursts of genius, which doesn't mean we haven't had some good, even great people working with us. It's just that our moves have been deliberate, well thought out and introduced slowly. You have to give people a chance to adapt. I guess CFRA really hasn't changed format in years . . . just kept it up-to-date."

Is this the secret of all programming success? "... for us, yes. Who can say about another station. Each of us is in a different milieu. What works in Montreal may not work here and vice versa. Changing formats too quickly and too frequently is deadly. Listeners get used to your announcers, your music, your overall sound. Change it too often and they'll head for something more stable, like CFRA."

But there's a natural attrition rate in radio, people come and go regularly. "For sure, but you don't always have to replace an announcer, for instance, with a strange, out-of-market voice. Maybe you can rearrange shifts, drop the swing announcer into the vacant spot. The idea is to be consistent, don't give the listener a reason to turn the dial."

What about the future? "We're going to keep on working harder, you don't want to

be number two."

And the future for Al Pascal? "I try not to think about the future too much . . . I'll let it take care of itself . . . there are enough problems keeping today straight."

Torstar reaches for broadcasting stars

The Toronto Star isn't just another afternoon daily newspaper in Toronto (it's the only one); and its parent corporation, Torstar Ltd. - formerly Toronto Star Ltd.

Torstar Ltd. - formerly Toronto Star Ltd., recently announced plans to invest \$100 pmillion over the next few years in the broadcasting business.

The Star's newspaper profits have declined this past year, and, in the face of corporate projections of a decline in the paper's advertising revenue in the near future, Star management have embarked on an austerity program and hiring freeze

for the paper's operations.

But the Star newspaper has occupied a constantly diminishing portion of Torstar's holdings in recent years. Torstar owns a string of weekly newspapers in the Toronto area, a majority interest in Harlequin Books, Comac Communications (Homemakers and Quest magazines) and sundry other firms directly related to its publishing interests.

Recently Torstar got a foothold in broadcasting by purchasing 17 per cent of Western Broadcasting. Western operates a number of TV and radio stations - including CKNW and CFMI in Vancouver, CHQR Calgary, CJOB in Winnipeg and CHML Hamilton. Western also controls the Vancouver Canuks hockey team and owns Little Mountain Sound Studios.

According to a Globe And Mail story based on comments from Torstar president William Dimma, the conglomorate has spent about \$100 million on new aquisitions in the past five years - about 2/3 of that coming from operating income.

The \$100 million Torstar plans to spend in the next five years is more significant because the corporation plans to concentrate its investments in the broadcast industry.

The move into broadcasting requries a big entrance, according to Dimma, to enhance the effects of economy of scale.

The Star, Torstar's biggest single holding, has been known as one of North America's healthiest newspaper businesses until recently. Star management denies any change in announced plans to introduce a Sunday edition next fall and to begin publishing a separate Toronto weekly magazine.

In the past the corporation has been frustrated in attempts to secure broadcast licences in the Toronto area, specifically for cable TV operations.

Library's Lyman Potts to speak in Australia

Lyman Potts, president of the Canadian Talent Library, has accepted an invitation from Australia's AWA radio network to spend three weeks in Sydney, Australia meeting and addressing the broadcasters

While in Australia, Potts will address an AWA executive meeting on the subject of broadcasting in general and Canadian broadcasting in particular. He will also speak to the Federation of Australian Radio Broadcasters (FARB) about Canadian radio.

Potts is looking foreward to the trip as an opportunity to meet the Australian broadcasters and to compare the two sys-







Country Week

Spring and Bluegrass on the way

The first brochures from Bluegrass Canada 77 have been in circulation for a couple of weeks now. (Can Summer really be far behind.) The gigantic outdoor show is set for Court Weaver's sprawling Court-cliffe Park west of Toronto June 3rd., 4th., and 5th. The Carlisle, Ontario extravaganza will headline, among others Bill Monroe, Doc & Merle Watson, Seldom Scene, Country Gazette and that extremely good area out-

fit, the Humber River Valley Boys. A highlight again this year will be the bluegrass band concert with a first prize of \$500, plus a recording session at the Mercey Brothers Studio. The Festival regularly draws throngs from both sides of the border.

Sharon Ward, composer of Welcome To The Other Side Of Me, is delighted with the way her tune is cooking on all the Toronto

country charts and moving in the record stores. That's a rare and altogether welcome combination of circumstances for Cancon country product. Often enough a record will become a turntable hit, and the retailers will give you a blank stare when you ask for it. Not so with this Cheyenne single by Donna Darlene. As a matter of fact, Welcome hit the CKFH top thirty chart at number seventeen for the week of March 28th. A good many country-formatters certainly play Cancon singles, but not too many show those singles on whatever hit list they mail to dealers and record companies. True, most of them have a section of their playlist wherein one finds all of the Cancon items that the station in question is currently playing, but seldom do you see such songs right out in front, listed with all the U.S. hit records, on the main chart. Believe me, in this instance anyway there's no artifical hype, the Donna Darlene single is heavily requested, and now that dealers can see it on at least one station's hit chart, they are stocking it, and even more importantly, selling the record. Seems like there's some kind of a lesson here for all of us.

The Singing Newfoundlander was doing his number for his native province again this past April 1st. Michael T. Wall, for the sixth year, was a part of Toronto's Daffodil Parade, staged annually by the Metro Toronto District of the Canadian Cancer Society. Meanwhile, there are many requests for Michael T's current single, Sweet Molly.

Country music gave a big boost to the St. Catharines area Easter Seal Campaign Sunday, April 3rd. Murray Hunt of the Garden City organized and produced his annual benefit for the crippled kids campaign. The campaign in that area is an an-

The "A" side is a run-away hit, the way I hear it, while the album is a must for any would-be complete country music library. Mal reports that Jackson's Nashville outlet will handle the new package on a retail level in Music City. With Shot's wife, Donna Darlene, doing so well with her made-in-Canada hit single, maybe he'll put that much more effort into promoting Lucier's efforts.

That's our story for this week, see you in seven days, and keep it country.




