CRTC rules Boule Noire, Toulouse not Cancon

The Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission has ruled that current singles by Quebec-based artists Boule Noire and Toulouse do not qualify as Canadian content under the CRTC regulations. Although the vocal and some of the instrumental tracks were recorded in Montreal, the basic rhythm tracks were recorded in Muscle Shoals, Alabama by the Muscle Shoals Rhythm Section. Therefore, production cannot be considered Cancon.

The two acts' material is primarily composed by American Barry Beckett, and Canadians Peter Alves and Georges Thurston. Thurston, in fact, is Boule Noire. According to the regulations, music or

lyrics must be written entirely by Canadians in order to qualify as Canadian content. The current Toulouse single, What Would My Mama Say, included participation from Beckett in both the music and lyrics. The group's previous single, APB, qualified as AL, in that the lyrics were penned by Canadians Alvis and Giacomelli. The current single is Canadian in artist only. Two categories are necessary in order for a single to qualify as Canadian content under the regulations.

Toulouse and Boule Noire record on the Magique label, based in Montreal. Magique product is distributed in Canada by London Records.

Matthews promoted to Vice-President, U.A.

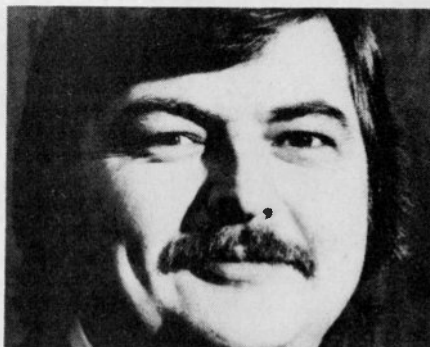
In making the announcement, Kulin noted, "We are confident that this new organizational change will play a major role in continuing United Artists' steady growth in all phases of the Canadian music industry."

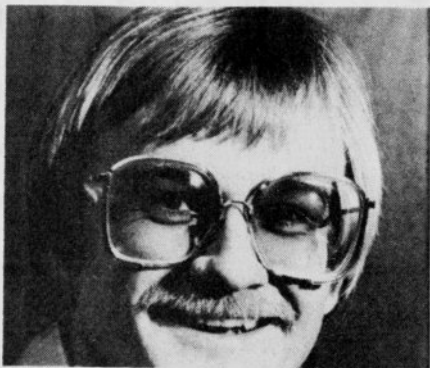
ments will ensure WEA Canada's continued dominance and growth in the marketplace."

British Records recording artist London Bobby, a transplanted Canadian citizen known for his unique brand of British comedy and music, has been slated for a six-month stint at Churchill's, a new British pub in the heart of downtown Waikiki, Hawaii. After finishing an engagement at La Pentola in Toronto, New Year's Eve, Bobby headed south for the Hawaiian date, which began January 3 and will run nightly until June 30.

London Bobby has been well-known on the Canadian music scene for eight years. He appeared regularly on the CTV Network's Pig & Whistle show, and on Toronto's CITY-TV in a 16-week series titled At The Pub, which he wrote and produced. He also has an Australian gold record for his album Pub Party - - even though he has never appeared there.

London Bobby, in real life, is Bob Smith, a Briton who arrived in Toronto as an engineering draftsman in 1953. He has been a Canadian citizen for 20 years.

The Poles - insights into the mechanics of civilization

One of the bright lights in Canada's budding new wave scene is a Toronto-based five-piece band called the Poles. The Poles are very much unique among new wave groups. In an idiom full of simple, blaring music and unintelligible lyrics, they produce sophisticated music interwoven with carefully planned message lyrics over a high-intensity rhythmic background.

The nucleus of the Poles is comprised of female front person Michaela Jordana (pronounced Michael) and keyboard player Doug Pringle. Jordana, who writes all the group's lyrics, is an accomplished painter, whose credits include a huge canvas in the National Gallery, another work in the Canada Council collection, and several exhibitions at the Isaacs Gallery in Toronto.

Pringle gained renown in Canada as a member of Syrinx, a popular, art-oriented, Toronto based progressive synthesizer group of the early 70's.

Filling out the group are lead guitarist Ricky Swede, bassist Stevie Good and drummer Rex Chainbelt, the newest addition. All three are accomplished veterans of club bands.

The group record out of Toronto's

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Soundstage Studios on the Nimbus 9 label, which has been reactivated for the first time since the dissolution of the Guess Who. Nimbus has released a debut single, titled CN Tower, and there are four new sides in the can. Doug Pringle notes that although the Poles do associate themselves to some extent with the rest of the new wave scene, they feel their material and their approaches are quite individual: "The kind of music that we do is very listenable. CN Tower is almost more AM in the traditional sense of AM than underground. In a way, it's a hymn to communication. When you look at the tower, most people treat it as a monument to Canadian identity, or something like that. In the song, we treat it as the biggest radio transmitter in the world, which is there for our personal use. One of the lines says, 'It's popping out our rock & roll'."

The Poles were formed last April. They spent the summer working at the Crash & Burn and various other new wave rooms in Toronto. Major dates followed, including concerts at the New Yorker theatre in Toronto and at CBGB's in New York. On December 26, they appeared at the El Mocambo in Toronto, their first date before a mainstream audience. They generated sufficient reaction to allow a return engagement January 19. Future dates include the University of Toronto (28), the El Casino in Montreal (Feb. 1-5), and a return to New York, followed by campus dates in

Ottawa and Toronto.

Onstage, the Poles' basic goal is to inspire their audience with the energy and the message of their music. Jordana provides a highly energetic front to an intense performance. However, the show doesn't include any of the crassness or violence sometimes associated with new wave music. "We're not into violence of any kind, but we do have a hard line sound."

In the studio, Pringle finds working with the production engineering team of Jim Frank and Keith Elshaw a very gratifying experience. "There's so much in the studio you can take advantage of, and I think we took full advantage of it, but at the same time, we're aiming at preserving our live sound. I think we got a really good hybrid of those two approaches. It's a very crystalline kind of clear sound. We're really after musical clarity."

The group's product is being distributed in Canada by P.J., and in the U.S. through a new agreement with Jem Records. The companies, basically importers, have achieved success with new wave product. In addition, Nimbus 9 are working on a U.S. major licensing deal for the product.

Pringle feels the future is looking bright for the Poles and for new wave in general. "I think the audience is growing right now. That's what's happening to the whole musical thing. It's stopped being just an underground thing, and it's becoming more mass oriented, because people are becoming more aware of it."

CARAS announces new Juno Awards, category changes

The Board of Directors of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (CARAS) has announced a number of revisions in the categories and voting criteria of the Juno Awards to be held this year at Toronto's Harbour Castle (Mar 29).

In the announced revisions, the definition of a "Canadian" has been amended to read: 1) a Canadian citizen or 2) any other group or persons who qualify under the CRTC regulations who have had permanent residence in Canada for at least six months during the last calendar year.

In order to maintain and further the Canadian nature of the awards, the Inter-

national Best Selling categories have been eliminated. Other changes in the categories will be the expansion of the Producer of the Year awards to include the production of singles as well as albums. Groups as well as solo performers will now be eligible in the top folksinger category.

The Juno Awards presentations have been announced for March 29 at the convention centre of the Harbour Castle Hilton in Toronto. The show will be televised live over the CBC network nationally. David Steinberg has been confirmed for a return as host of the show, with Burton Cummings, recipient of two awards last year, as co-host.

BPA's Ottenbach names 18 committee chairpersons

Roger Ottenbach, newly elected president of the Broadcasters Promotion Association, has announced the appointment of 18 members as 1978 chairpersons for the association's various committees.

Among the 18 BPA members selected are two Canadians. Gail Morrell of CFCF-TV, Montreal, shares awards committee leadership with Ann Coleman, KOCO-TV Oklahoma City. Ms. Morrell will also be in charge of the BPA's policy handbook.

Chairing the committee for industry relations - Canada will be Jack Shaunessy of CFPL-TV, London, Ontario.

The Broadcasters Promotion Association is a worldwide organization of station promotion people. One of the BPA's highlights is a yearly seminar featuring an awards presentation for such aspects as station promotions, community awareness work and public relations.

Uncle Bill's Management signs rock duo Busker

William Seip of Waterloo, Ontario-based Uncle Bill's Management has announced a representation agreement between the firm and Southern Ontario rock duo Busker.

Busker are a show duo who feature original and cover material basically in the commercial rock idiom. The duo, which consists of Randy Dawdy and Steve McCann have invested 40,000 dollars in equipment. The investment has produced solid audience response.

The duo have recorded a debut album, titled On Any Street Corner. The album features Dawdy on lead vocals, and was penned by McCann. Busker are also looking forward to release of a second album, as well as a tour of western Canada.

CTL promotes Thompson, names Rae exec producer

J. Lyman Potts, President of Standard Broadcast Productions Limited and general manager of the Canadian Talent Library, has announced the promotion of Mal Thompson to the position of manager, marketing and promotion, at the Canadian Talent Library. Thompson has been with the CTL for several years as executive producer.

Replacing Thompson as executive producer will be Jackie Rae. Rae has an extensive career in music and broadcasting, with a recent CTL collaboration album with Ben McPeck to his credit. He will be responsible for the supervision of artists and repertoire selection, and the production of CTL recordings.

Polydor Canadian acts gain live, disc action

A number of Polydor recording artists from Canada have been receiving action on product and live appearances. Punk rocker Stanley Frank, a Montreal native now based in Britain, made his hometown return December 14-18 at Montreal's El Casino. He is on release with a 12-inch extended play single, his debut Polydor product, titled Rejected.

Two Polydor acts still based in Canada are receiving action on new singles at the MOR level. Susan Jacks' single Daytime Hustler is being flipped by programmers. The other side, Mr. Vincent's Dancing Class, is reporting good airplay. Also receiving national MOR airplay is new Gary & Dave single My Lady Linda. The duo are completing a two-week stint at Toronto's Zodiac 1 room in the Ramada Inn, December 26-January 7.

Anne Murray slated for Int'l television spots

Capitol recording artist Anne Murray will be appearing on a number of international television programs during the month of January. Dates include the Bobby Vinton Show (17), the Merv Griffin Show (23), and Dinah (26). The appearances coincide with Murray's new Capitol album release Let's Keep It That Way, which was recorded recently in Toronto with producer Jim Ed Norman.

Murray is currently in pre-production for her upcoming CBC Superspecial titled Ladies Night, which is being slated for telecast April 10.

Hahn to national post for Island (Can) label

Cathy Hahn has been appointed National Coordinator for Island Records in Canada. Her main responsibilities will involve the

promotion and marketing of Island product as well as coordinating activities of Island acts.

Prior to this new appointment, Hahn worked with Andy Nagy, Operations Manager for RCA's Eastern and Central Region, based in Montreal. Effective immediately, Hahn will report directly to Nagy.

The above announcement was made by Ed Preston, Vice-President and General Manager, RCA Records Canada.

TM sues Gavin/Conner for copyright infringement

Dallas-based broadcast services firm TM Productions has filed suit against Kevin Gavin, Otis Conner Jr., and Gavin/Conner Productions, Inc., for alleged infringement of copyright to an original musical composition titled The Winning Score, and for alleged unlawful competition. TM is seeking actual damages of \$500,000 and exemplary damages of one million dollars.

TM Vice-President and General Manager Jerry Atchley noted, "This is the first time we have ever filed suit against a competitive company for copyright infringement. In the future, we will follow a policy of protecting TM against those who we believe have copied our work and represent it as their own."

According to the suit, defendants have "written, arranged, produced and recorded material copied from plaintiff's musical composition The Winning Score." The suit also alleges the defendants "undertook a course of unlawful competition against the plaintiff utilizing misappropriated copyrights, intellectual properties, music compositions, ID's, jingles, sales techniques and corporate opportunities."

One of the defendants, Otis Conner, Jr., is an ex-employee of TM Productions.

Record sales in 1977 - battling the economy

1977 saw the record industry battling the economy in Canada, and to a certain extent, holding its own against economic conditions which were tenuous at best. A number of trends are being noticed, and the industry, in some parts, is capitalizing on them by revamping its approach to record merchandising.

From the distributors, the reaction to 1977 was basically quite positive. WEA, CBS and GRT all reported record-breaking sales in the year, with RCA and Capitol also logging substantial gains over last year. WEA's Dave Tollington noted exceptional

sales, with the fourth quarter showing the highest figures in the company's history. WEA showed major strength in dozens of albums, topped by the Fleetwood Mac Rumours effort, 1977's album of the year.

CBS' A.V. Dunseith reported 1977 was by far the company's best year to date, after a slightly slow January, with a large amount of top product.

For CBS, the summer was a particularly strong season, boosted by their major Summer Saleathon campaign during which their market share jumped noticeably.

GRT president Ross Reynolds also re-

ported a record year, with the last quarter doubling the company's previous record quarter. Sales picked up largely at the end of August, and were very strong in western Canada. The Quebec market was slightly weaker.

Capitol's Bob Rowe and RCA's Ed Preston also reported major gains over 1976. Rowe noted a slight drop late in the year

after a strong fall. RCA found major success throughout the year, with strong support from their country club series in the first half, followed by the posthumous Elvis Presley explosion coupled with the acquisition of United Artists' distribution in the second half. RCA noted particular strength in western Canada, while Capitol cited slight weakness in the Quebec market.

Notably, each of the distributors were promoting highly successful product. WEA and CBS in particular carried huge catalogues of international hit albums.

Most of the record companies attributed much of their success to new developments in the merchandising field. One of the major developments has been a mass move towards television advertising. With their recent Best From CBS campaign, CBS has shown major results from such a campaign. GRT also reports success with television advertising, as does RCA, whose co-operative efforts with Tee Vee International on Roger Whittaker and Charley Pride campaigns met with highly positive results.

The companies are also gearing their

campaigns more to the consumer. Capitol's Rowe notes a trend toward more selective buying on the part of the company's accounts: "I think there are more better buyers out there today than there ever were before. They no longer buy just for the sake of buying. They want to know what the companies are doing with a particular product. To sell the record isn't the problem with our accounts. The problem is to move it from the retailer out to the consumer."

Advertising is now all oriented toward consumer

Dunseith, echoing the sentiment, notes CBS advertising is now all oriented toward the consumer. The role of the companies is shifting from one of simply selling records to accounts to one of bearing the responsibility of reaching the consumer and spearheading the promotional drive at that level.

WEA's Tollington also reported a step-up in the company's merchandising effort, both in terms of quality and quantity of merchandising material, basically at the in-store level, with successful results. They have also incorporated a volume discount plan to encourage accounts to buy larger quantities, and a policy of 100 percent return on singles, enabling dealers to buy and stock more product.

At the wholesale level, the reaction was highly mixed. Several major rack jobbers reported problems with record prices, lack of discounts, and fierce competition. Others countered problems by incorporating new merchandising methods or cutting back overhead.

ALL DISC

All Distributors deals basically with small independent retailers, primarily in Northern Ontario. President Tony Frank relies on a stable rural market which sells a large proportion of country music. Frank, whose market is not highly competitive, reports a good year with considerable growth over 1976. In the summer, an in-

crease in tape sales compensates for slackness in albums, and he uses a tried and true merchandising system: "We just give our customers the best possible service, and that's it."

CANADA RECORD SALES

Herb Berne of Canada Record Sales, whose department store and small retailer clients are located basically in Toronto and western Ontario, notes a problem with fierce competition. Although his firm experienced a solid year with some growth, he notes a number of distributors are permitting discounting at the wholesale level, causing price cutting competition. Berne cites a danger in companies which opt toward more volume sales at a lower profit margin, and feels some may have difficulties meeting their expenses. Some will be forced to close. His own firm is trying to maintain its profit margin, but it's difficult to do in competitive conditions, and, he feels, will cause problems for many wholesalers.

TAYLOR'S

Steve Taylor, Vice President of Taylor's Record Sales, also noted a major problem with competition. His firm, a one-stop which deals with clients from the smallest smoke shop to sophisticated chains in Canada, Japan and the U.S., achieved a steady growth in 1977 despite a soft first half and summer. Taylor cites a tremendous change in record sales at the retail level. Newcomers into the business are going for broke and engaging in a price-cutting battle with more established chain stores and independents. Taylor fears the newcomers, who operate with less inventory and lower overhead, will drive the established dealers into lowering their overhead and therefore, their displays and the amount of service they can give their customers. Taylor feels this is unhealthy, and lays the responsibility on record companies who allow these retailers the same discounts as the established dealers.

PINDOFF

Taylor Campbell, Managing Director at Pindoff Record Sales, reports a good year, with growth in excess of expectations, particularly in Ontario and the west. Quebec was slightly slow. Pindoff deals with major department stores from Quebec west, and also distributes for Music World in Ontario and B.C. Campbell is surviving the competition, and doesn't have any plans to cut staff or expenses. His basic goal is to improve department store merchandising of tapes.

ALL RECORD SALES

On the other side of the coin is All Record Sales, a national firm with six regional offices dealing with portions of most major department store chains and some larger independents. Marketing director Jerry Wipf reports an excellent year, with strength in western Canada and Ontario, although Quebec was slightly soft. Newfoundland was also solid, boosted by inroads into Labrador. Wipf notes two years ago, when the market softened, ARS stepped up its efforts rather than cutting back. They added field supervisors, increased their advertising, and computerized operations. In many cases, this resulted in convincing department stores to expand their record departments and improve their traffic positions in the store.

Through the computer, ARS can now track sales from their firm almost instantaneously, due to a new invoicing system. This enables them to shore up any weak spots quickly, leading to better overall sales. Wipf feels the secret is to advertise in the right places at the right times. ARS has also added a new position of merchandise manager in four of their branches. These people work with suppliers and chains to broaden the basic program. ARS implemented a major tape campaign over the summer to compensate for the album slack.

Success was such that Wipf reports the firm now sells as many tapes as albums overall.

HANDLEMAN

Handleman Co. of Canada, a national firm dealing to chain stores, also reported a good year. Sal Zagorski notes the firm was up across the country, and followed a slower summer with an excellent fall season. The firm is testing a new technique, using machine scanners in the stores instead of inventory to keep track of album sales. They expect this will make the process faster and more accurate.

ROBLAN'S

Robert Sniderman of Roblan's, suppliers to the Sam The Record Man chain, is happy with his and the chain's growth in the country. Inroads were made into Saskatchewan, P.E.I. and Newfoundland, with positive results, and Sniderman is particularly happy with the success of the Montreal store. He reports steady sales throughout the year, with rapid expansion keeping the organization busy. Part of this expansion is due to the RD 2000, the miniature record marketing mobile booth which Sniderman designed, and which he expects will soon begin to achieve its potential.

SAM THE RECORD MAN

At the retail level, reports were again mixed, with most of the retailers at least keeping even with the economy. Sam (The Record Man) Sniderman notes, "We're quite satisfied - our expansion's going well and our stores are doing well." His chain now includes 63 outlets, including several RD 2000's, and spans the country.

A&A

A&A General Manager Dick Moodey reports the chain's best year yet, with sales up 25 percent over 1976. The largest gains were made in Ontario and Quebec, although one Alberta store reported a 61 percent increase. Moodey feels that people are beginning to buy more product, and are also moving more from department store buys to shopping in record stores. A&A now includes 31 stores across the country, including six new outlets, and plans are to open six additional stores in 1978.

KELLY'S

Manfred Huesken of Kelly's Audio notes a change of emphasis in the chain towards record sales. The chain is well up over 1976, particularly in B.C. and Alberta, where record sales have traditionally held more emphasis. Kelly's consists of about 70 stores across Canada, including about a dozen new outlets. Growth is expected to continue over the next year.

RECORDS ON WHEELS

One of the most marked improvements in gross sales comes from Records On Wheels, where Don Ierullo reports massive expansion in the past year. Fifteen new stores were added, bringing the total to 32, throughout Ontario. Ierullo hopes for 25 new stores next year. His growth this year totalled about 250 percent increase over 1976, which he attributes to his stock as well as expansion: "We have stock that no one else has. We're more than doubling every year."

Formerly dealing basically in rock music the chain now offers full line service in most

of its stores. Ierullo gambled with a large stock of progressive music, from such artists as Tangerine Dream and Vangelis, which other firms seldom stock in large quantities. Ierullo notes, "We have no trouble - we never send it back!"

RECORD BUYING PUBLIC GROWING UP

At the individual retail level, most store managers and franchise owners noted a trend toward more selective buying on the part of the consumer. Lou Cooper, who owns three Sam The Record Man franchises in Toronto, noted the trend to more sophisticated music as a healthy sign and an indication of a record buying public "growing up." Tina Clarke, who manages a Kelly's store in downtown Toronto, sees music generally becoming more sophisticated.

Probably the most reported gainer was jazz. Both Cooper and Clarke reported major gains, as did Nancy Franchetto, who operates Sam's stores in Richmond Hill and Barrie. Dave MacDonald of A&A's Sherway Gardens, just west of Toronto, and Daria Davis, who manages another Kelly's in downtown Toronto. Franchetto attributed this growth to more AOR airplay of jazz product.

Another major trend which was often noted was the aging of the record buying public. Lon Appleby, who owns three A&A's stores, feels the aging of Canada's general demographic cross-section has led to more people in their 30's who are buying records. The trend toward older buyers was also noted by MacDonald, Davis and Clarke. It seems to be reflected in a number of changes in the buying habits of the consumer.

GAINS IN EASY LISTENING

One of the most successful lines in 1977 was easy listening music. Appleby noted the trend. He emphasizes to his managers the importance of promoting MOR as a priority. The results have been gratifying. Clarke noted the older crowds are buying in what was formerly almost entirely a rock market, with good sales on softer pop and crossover material from such artists as Crystal Gayle and George Benson. Tom Taylor, who owns the first-ever Sam The Record Man franchise, sees music becoming mellower generally, with hard rock markets diminishing accordingly.

The changing demographic scope has thrown an aura of confusion into the industry. Buying habits seem to be in a transitory period. One continuing noticeable effect is the move of the buying public from street stores and open-air plazas into enclosed malls. A primary example of this move is shown by Appleby. Last year, he reported his mall stores were successful, but his open air store, at Newtonbrook Plaza in Toronto, was slow. Since that time, he has moved the Newtonbrook operation to Toronto's newest mall, Sheppard Centre, where he reports business up roughly 40 percent over the previous location.

ENCLOSED MALLS ATTRACT BUYERS

Steve Taylor of Taylor's Record Sales feels the reason for the success of the malls

is purely environmental. They are located in the suburbs, where most of the consumers live. They are attractive, parking is readily available, and inclement weather is not a problem. Taylor also feels their attractiveness is one of the reasons more older people are buying records.

Although most of the retailers reported gross gains, the feelings were divided as to whether more product is being sold. Tom Taylor of Sam's, Golden Mile Plaza, feels the number of unit sales is decreasing. Other retailers felt volume sales were steady or even improving, particularly in the competitive downtown market.

NOT ENOUGH QUALITY CANADIAN PRODUCT

There is also mixed reaction to the status of Canadian content on the marketplace. Most of the retailers and wholesalers agreed that records will not sell because they're Canadian, but that high quality Canadian records will sell because they're good. Many felt there is not as much top quality Canadian product. Franchetto believes it is becoming more successful with better merchandising. Sheldon Frymerman, manager of two Mister Sound outlets, noted some success in moving Canadian singles, but expressed disappointment in not being able to move larger quantities of Canadian album product.

A number of people feel an overabundance of low quality Canadian records is having a detrimental effect on the status of the Canadian industry. Manfred Huesken of Kelly's feels manufacturers should be more selective in their artist rosters and in the amount of certain product manufactured. He feels this would lower record companies' expenses, permitting less price increases, and would avoid instant deletes which sit on shelves and don't sell. He feels too much promotion on bad product results in overbuys, leading to returns, which are expensive for the manufacturer, and he'd like to see better co-ordination between manufacturer/distributor and supplier.

RECORD INDUSTRY RECESSION PROOF

The record industry, for the most part, remains optimistic about the future. Although some fear price increases may lower volume sales, and some fear the state of the economy and its lessening of people's buying power, most feel the industry is in no immediate danger. Downtown stores are keeping prices low, and mall stores are continuing to grow and prosper with the continuing flow of consumers to the suburbs.

Many also feel that the current economic problems are of benefit to the record industry. Frymerman notes, "When people are short on money, the money that they spend is spent on their leisure, on their entertainment. Even if records should go up, people will still buy them."

MacDonald feels the record industry is almost recession-proof. Clarke notes, "People are buying entertainment because they can't afford to buy other things." Appleby, who remains cautiously optimistic, feels things will continue to improve.

Concept albums are not unusual these days, but Jackson Browne's fifth Asylum album Running On Empty is an unusual concept album. Browne, who has bridged the gap from noted songwriter/troubador to cult figure, produced the album as a tribute to the 'four. All of the cuts were recorded on tour. Five of them were recorded onstage, most of the others in back stage areas and hotel rooms, and one was even taped on a Continental Silver Eagle bus somewhere in New Jersey.

Unusually for Browne, only two of the songs were completely self-penned. Four were written by other writers, including a hotel room jam session on Rev. Gary Davis' classic Cocaine. The rest were collaborations. The songs are about life on tour, the groupies, the highways and the shows, with a particularly strong tribute to the roadies, the band and the audience, a medley of The Load-Out and Maurice Williams' Stay. David Lindley's slide guitar and electric violin are featured, as is the work of The Session, Browne's first-rate studio/tour band, which includes keyboard man Craig Doerge, guitarist Danny Kortchmar, and the rhythm section par excellence of Russell Kunkel and Leland Sklar.

Browne is not noted as a singles artist, and this album won't change that feeling. However, most of the selections show strong AOR potential. Running On Empty was self-produced on the road with engineer Greg Ladanyi.

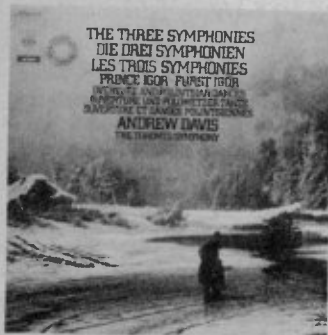

New album, return to TV for Condor's Julie Lynn

Condor recording artist Julie Lynn, whose debut Condor album, titled after her name, produced a number of Canadian country hits, is currently in pre-production for a second album on the label. The album will be produced in Nashville by Condor President Lonnie Salazar.

Lynn will also be returning to television over the summer for a second annual four-week CBC summer replacement series. The show, titled Coming Up Country, features Lynn co-hosting with RCA artist Tim Daniels. Series producer Jack O'Neill is currently lining up guests for the taping, which is slated for Halifax between February 13 and March 24.

Another Condor act, Toronto-based duo Burton & Honeyman, are also preparing for a second Condor album, to be produced in Nashville by Salazar.

New album, 45, concerts for Attic group Triumph

Attic recording group Triumph have achieved major successes with their new Attic album, Rock 'N Roll Machine. The album, the group's second on Attic, has gained airplay on all major AOR stations in Canada. In addition, the album is gaining sales throughout the country, and in Sweden and the U.S. In the U.S., substantial orders have been exported, particularly into the Midwest and Texas markets, where the group has achieved a following. In addition, an initial order of 6,000 units was shipped to Sweden, with orders received even prior to the release of product. Attic feels the album stands a good chance of achieving gold status in Canada.

A debut single from the album, a cover of the Joe Walsh hit Rocky Mountain Way, has also been released. The single has gained airplay on major and secondary stations throughout Canada, including Toronto's CHUM and CFTR.

Triumph are slated for a number of tour dates in the Texas market in late January, with stops slated for San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Austin and Fort Hood. In San Antonio, the date is a return engagement as headliner at the 6,000-seat Civic Arena, where the group achieved major headline success last year. Aquarius recording group April Wine of Montreal will be special guesting on the Texas dates.

Following the Texas tour, Triumph return to Canada to headline a series of concerts. Dates are being slated in Hamilton, London, Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto. In Toronto, the group makes their first headline appearance at Massey Hall, February 17, in a date promoted by Concert Productions International.

Triumph recently signed a management agreement with Toronto-based firm Dixon-Propas.

P.E.I., Aquitaine revive Legend of the Dumbells

The Dumbells were a group of Canadian soldiers during World War I, who were organized into a front line entertainment troupe at Vimy Ridge during the war. Returning home after the war, they became a major success on Broadway and in concert halls throughout Canada, lasting until the death of Vaudeville in 1929.

The troupe was revived by portrayal last summer in the Charlottetown Summer Festival's major hit, *The Legend Of The Dumbells*, conceived by artistic director Alan Lund. Now, the rebirth of the group's legend has given rise to the release of a record album featuring much of the Dumbells' original work.

The album, titled *The Original Dumbells*, was produced by Eleanor Sniderman on the Aquitaine label, manufactured and distributed by CBS Records Canada Ltd. Production was made possible through the

assistance of the Recorded Sound Section, National Library of Canada. Most of the musical selections are original recordings made by the Dumbells during the height of their success, following the war. Featured artists include Dumbells Al Plunkett, Red Newman, Jock Holland, Ross Hamilton, and conglomerations of these musical comics such as Sleepy Hall's Melody Boys.

The album jacket features a National Archives photo of the troupe in full costume, including two men dressed in female clothing, a permanent part of their act. Jacket notes on the back cover were penned by Edward G. Moogk of the National Library of Canada, who said in part: "They're all gone now, but they will be remembered with great affection until the last of the 'old sweats' passes from the scene to rejoin their comrades of the Dumbells."

Current Wings single top seller in U.K. history

Current single *Mull Of Kintyre* by Capitol recording group Wings has become the top selling single in the history of Britain. The single has achieved sales in excess of 1.8 million units, topping early Beatles single *She Loves You* by a margin of 200,000. The single is the first British chart topper ever for Wings, who are headed by former Beatle Paul McCartney. It reached the number one slot nationally in its second week of release.

Since the beginning of the national singles chart in the U.K., only 16 singles had previously sold in excess of the million mark. *Mull Of Kintyre* was penned by McCartney and fellow band member Denny Laine.

Wings are currently in studio recording a forthcoming album on Capitol.

GRT of Canada have released a new single from Vancouver-based GRT recording group Prism. Another Canadian single making gains throughout North America is Klaatu's We're Off You Know. GRT is running promotions on the single as is Capitol, the group's U.S. label. The single is the first release from the group's current Hope album, which is gold in Canada.

GRT to enter tape and record accessory market

Sunnyvale, California-based GRT Corporation has announced the acquisition of Charlotte, North Carolina-based Ampro Design Productions, Inc., from Ampro's parent company, Vlotho (Weser) West Germany. The German firm is an affiliate of plastics manufacturer Stiebel Eltron. GRT acquired the firm for an undisclosed number of shares of GRT common stock.

GRT (U.S.) President Vinton D. Carver noted the company would enter the tape and record accessory market in Canada and the U.S., offering a retail line of tape and record cleaners, stylus cleaners, static eliminators and storage units. The product will be marketed under the GRT label.

Fred E. Martinitz, formerly President of Ampro, has been named a Vice President of GRT. He will continue to serve as General Manager of the operation. Ampro was founded in 1976 and has been producing product for about a year.

Condor's Lyle score MOR air with Beginning 45

Condor recording group Lyle are receiving solid MOR airplay in major markets throughout Canada with their current Condor single The Beginning. Among the stations currently playing the single are Toronto stations CFRB and CKEY, as well as the CKEY affiliated stations. The single, penned by group member Cyril Rawson, is an

instrumental.

Lyle are currently planning material for a debut album on the Condor label. In the meantime, they remain busy with live performances. Following the completion of a week's engagement at the Brampton Hotel, they are currently appearing at the Shamrock Hotel in Kingston.

Canadian TV commercials 1978 Fest plans firmed

The TV Bureau of Canada has announced plans for the 1978 Canadian Television Commercials Festival. The festival, which features an awards presentation known as the Bessies, has been firmed for April 13 at the Sheraton Centre Hotel in Toronto.

The TV Bureau and the Broadcast Executives Society have supplied rules and deadline information for this year's competition. Entries are being accepted from any individual or group engaged in the production of Canadian television commercials, including advertising agencies, production houses, television stations and advertisers. Commercials must be conceived and produced in Canada, telecast between March 31, 1977 and March 31,

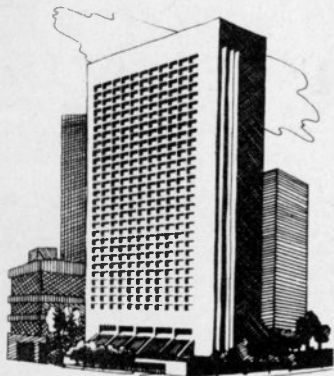
1978, and not previously entered in the Festival.

Entries will be placed in categories with commercials for similar types of products and services. The number of awards in each category will be determined by the number and quality of entries in that category. The grand prizes, consisting of gold, silver and bronze Bessies, will be chosen from among all category award winners, regardless of category. All three could conceivably come from one category.

Deadline for entries is February 3. Entrants will send their films, or video tapes, if films are unavailable, to Television Day, 65 Queen Street W., Suite 2115, Toronto, M5H 2M5. Entrance fee is 35 dollars per commercial, with cheques payable to Television Day 1977. Videotape entries will be returned collect, while film entries will be retained by the TVB library for educational purposes.

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Attic's Tobias promoting product through Europe

Attic recording artist Ken Tobias and his manager, brother Tony Tobias, are currently in Europe promoting their product at the MIDEM conference in Cannes, France. Following MIDEM, they travel on to Italy to meet with the Cinevox label and promote their product there. Tobias' second Attic album, *Siren Spell*, is about to be released there. The *Siren Spell* album is also on release in West Germany.

On the home front, Attic has recently released Tobias' third album on the label, *Street Ballet*. A debut single from the album *I Don't Want To Be Alone*, is being added at major and secondary stations across the country. The new album has also been released in Australia on the Attic label.

NAC reports success in July '76-June '77 year

The National Arts Centre in Ottawa recently announced that during the one-year period from July, 1976 to June, 1977, 763,320 persons purchased tickets worth \$4,164,600. The Centre comprises a 2,300-seat Opera, a 900-seat Theatre, a 350-seat Studio and a 150-seat Salon.

Over the 12-month period, a total of 827 performances were given, of which 72 percent, or 594, featured Canadian performers. Among those performers were such notables as Gordon Lightfoot, Dan Hill, Robert Charlebois, Harmonium, the Carlton Showband, Carroll Baker, Dick Damron, Andre Gagnon, Murray McLauchlan, Gino Vannelli, the Stampeders, Bruce Cockburn and the Family Brown.

The National Arts Centre received a Federal Government operating grant of \$8,476,000 and an additional \$165,000 from the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carlton. The Centre paid out \$6,415,463 for the 827 performances.

Solid crossover hit for RCA artist Dolly Parton

Current single and album by RCA recording artist Dolly Parton, both titled *Here You Come Again*, are making major gains in the top 40 market throughout Canada. The album, recently certified gold in the U.S. by the R.I.A.A., is approaching similar status in Canada. The single is making major inroads at the top 40 level across the country.

For Parton, long noted as a top country artist, the single marks her first major venture into the top 40 field. The success is the result of a year-long campaign to break Parton into the pop market without giving up her country identity. The success of that campaign is borne out by the country success of the single, a recent number one on RPM's country playlist.

The single is receiving top ten chart numbers at major and secondary stations throughout Canada. Both the single and album are charted on RPM's Top 100 Singles and Album chart.

RCA Canada is continuing a massive retail display campaign on the product, backed up by radio time buys on major stations.

Cap's Troiano slated to record 2nd LP, tour west

Capitol recording artist Domenic Troiano is currently in studio in Toronto recording his second album on the label with producer Terry Brown. His first Capitol effort, *Burnin' At The Stake* was recorded in New York. It has achieved airplay and sales in Canada.

Troiano is slated for a concert and club tour of western Canada. Dates include Calgary's Mt. Royal College (Feb 17), *Lucifer's* in Edmonton (20-25), Calgary (27-March 4), Banff (5), Whistler Mountain, B.C. (8-10), and the University of Victoria (11).

Music Shoppe showcasing Mathews Band at The Tube

Toronto-based booking firm Music Shoppe International is staging a talent showcase for the David Mathews Band, January 12 at the Picadilly Tube in Toronto. Attending the showcase will be various members of the press, media, and record companies, some of whom have expressed interest in Mathews.

The David Mathews Band is a five-man, driving rock unit featuring lead vocalist Mathews, lead guitarists/vocalists John Gonzales and Ron Barley, bassist/vocalist Rick Lazaroff and drummer/vocalist Allan Blenkinsopp. A former member of Whitehorse, Mathews formed his own band in 1976. The current group perform original material as well as covers from such groups as Led Zeppelin.

Mathews is managed by Garry O'Donnell of Boulevardo Productions & Management. He is booked by Music Shoppe.

Direction's Barde firmed for Toronto debut

Direction recording group Barde, a six man traditional folk group based in Montreal, have been confirmed for their debut concert headline appearance in Toronto at Convocation Hall January 26. The group have achieved a following in the Toronto market through successful week long appearances at the El Mocambo's downstairs room and the Midwich Cuckoo, two clubs which generally cater to a rock audience.

Barde are currently on release with their debut Direction album, titled after their name. The album has shown major sales strength, particularly in the Quebec market. It was produced by Michel Normandeau and features instrumentals from Quebec, the Maritimes and various parts of Britain, as well as songs sung in English, French

and Gaelic.

Direction's Ontario promotion director Jim Zeppa is promoting the Toronto date, which is being presented by local AOR station CHUM-FM. Zeppa feels the concert will serve to promote the group in the Toronto market.

The group are currently in pre-production toward their second album on Direction. Also in the works is a club and concert tour of eastern Canada, which is being handled by Toronto-based agency Listening House. They will return to the Toronto market after the concert date. Barde are an experienced group in a concert situation. In addition to numerous folk festivals and campus dates, they achieved major success at a recent date at Montreal's Outremont Theatre.

WEA group Alpha Ralpa breaking out of Quebec

WEA recording group Alpha Ralpa, a German-based group comprised of five French musicians, is achieving early success in the Quebec market with their debut album, titled after their name. The album, which is entirely instrumental, first gained airplay on powerful Montreal AOR station CKOI-FM. Station adds immediately followed on all major progressive rock-oriented outlets in the province, with favourable reviews in the major dailies and music publications.

The success of the group is now spreading outside of Quebec. Brampton, Ontario AOR station CFNY-FM and Toronto area campus stations are giving the album heavy airplay. In western Canada, it is receiving favourable press reviews. WEA is confident the album will spread throughout Canada.

Alpha Ralpa were formed in France last year when WEA Phillipachi producer Jean Maresko introduced his brother Michel to veteran writer-musician Claude Alvarez-Pereyre. The two, both guitarists, added keyboard player Jean-Alain Gardet, bassist

Charlie Carriras, and drummer Emmanuel Laccrdaire. WEA describes their music as a blend of "the cold element of German rock, the cool contribution of fusion rock and the warm influence of Gregorian 'cantiques'."

Alpha Ralpa are currently in France preparing for an early spring Canadian tour. WEA is preparing for release a debut single, Nova, from the album.

Patsy Gallant Canada's Top Female Disco Artist

Attic recording artist Patsy Gallant has topped off a highly successful year in 1977 by receiving the Canadian Record Pool award as top Canadian female disco artist. The award was announced at the Canadian disco awards, an industry gala which took place at Montreal's CFTM-TV studios and was broadcast over Quebec's TVA Network.

Calif. student invents snap-on cassette savers

Louis Loustaunau, a student in Los Angeles, has invented a device which he feels will protect cassette tapes from jamming. The device, known as snap-on cassette reel indicators, consists of a pair of round, flat discs with three prongs that fit into cassette reel centres and rotate with the reels. As the discs are considerably larger than the reel centres, irregular rotation is easier to observe. If rotation stops, the machine operator removes the discs with an accompanying extractor and adjusts the reels before the jam destroys the tape.

The invention is being introduced to manufacturers with the assistance of New York-based Raymond Lee Organization, a firm which assists independent inventors throughout the U.S. and Canada with the commercial development and presentation of their ideas to industry. The firm offers, free of charge, an inventor's kit containing information on the development, safeguarding and marketing of inventions. The kit can be requested from the Raymond Lee Organization, 230 Park Ave., New York, 10017.

New LP, German tour for U.A.'s Keith Barrie

United Artists Records are scheduling late January release for a new album by U.A. artist Keith Barrie. The album, titled Season Of Change, was recorded at Toronto's RCA Studios and in Munich, Germany at Trixi Tonstudios. Barrie's fifth album with U.A., it was produced by German producer Franco Taormina.

Barrie is planning a return trip to Germany in the near future, where he will appear in concert and on a variety of radio and television programs. He will also be promoting his fourth U.A. album Twilight Zone, which is about to be released in Germany.

Quality's Robert Gordon to promote in Canada

Private Stock recording artist Robert Gordon, whose current Quality-distributed album *Robert Gordon With Link Wray* is achieving sales and airplay across Canada, will be coming to Canada for a combination performance-promotion tour.

Gordon is slated to arrive in Toronto February 6. He will spend the next two days on a heavy press and media interview schedule, followed by an appearance (8) on CBC-TV's 90 Minutes Live. He then travels to Montreal for another heavy interview schedule, as well as an appearance at the El Casino.

Gordon then returns to Toronto for an appearance at the El Mocambo (13-14). Quality is supporting the date with a press party at the club and an increase in promotional efforts on the album.

Gordon is completing a new album with Private Stock. Quality is hoping for release in time for the tour or shortly afterwards.

Direction release new single by Billy Workman

Montreal-based Direction Records have released a new single by Direction recording artist Billy Workman. The single, titled *Boogie Home*, has been added at a number of stations in Canada, and at WCEX and WCEX-FM, Scranton, Pa.

Workman is currently at Le Studio in Morin Heights, Quebec, recording a debut album for Direction with the production team of George Lagios and Michel Pagliaro. The album, scheduled for release in March, contains the original mixed version of Workman's debut single *It's Only Money*, which received major and secondary airplay throughout Canada.

New LP, Q-107 show for U.A.'s Lavender Hill Mob

United Artists recording group Lavender Hill Mob, a Montreal-based group who achieved worldwide release of their debut album, have completed a second U.S. album. The album was recorded at Le Studio in Morin Heights, Quebec, with New York producer Rob Stevens of Cash-West Productions. The album, titled *Street Of Dreams*, is slated for a late January release, with simultaneous release in the U.S. on U.A. A debut single from the album, *Dream Away*, is also being slated for simultaneous U.S. and Canadian release at the same time.

Lavender Hill Mob completed a January 15 special live broadcast concert from Toronto's Thunder Sound Studios, aired by Toronto station CILQ-FM (Q-107).

Attic readies new Patsy Gallant LP for release

Attic recording artist Patsy Gallant, currently on release with new single *Back To The City*, is at Studio Tempo in Montreal completing her second English language, third overall, album on the Attic label. The album titled *Will You Give Me Your Love*, is being slated for a February 3 release. Production chores are being handled by Gallant and Ian Robertson of Gallant/Robertson Productions.

The single, a preview selection from the new album, is rapidly gaining airplay in major and secondary markets throughout Canada. It is one of several songs on the album penned by Gallant. Gallant is gaining notices as a songwriter, including an honourable mention in last year's American Song Festival for her composition *I Love You In The Morning*, from her first Attic album *Are You Ready For Love*.

On the international front, Gallant's previous single *Sugar Daddy*, which is certified gold in Canada, is being released in Britain by EMI. Her previous U.K. hit, *From New York To L.A.*, achieved silver status in the U.K. with sales in excess of 250,000 units.

Gallant is slated to perform at the Commonwealth Games February 10.

Capitol's Al Martino set for five Canadian dates

Capitol recording artist Al Martino, whose current single *The Next Hundred Years* is gaining solid MOR airplay throughout Canada, is slated for a five-stop Canadian concert tour. The tour begins January 30 at Montreal's Place Des Arts. Additional dates include the National Arts Centre in Ottawa (31), Toronto's Massey Hall (Feb. 1), London's Centennial Auditorium (2), and Hamilton Place (3).

On the tour, Martino will be backed up by Les & Larry Elgart.

LaLonde and Beatson exit Wireless; Morin replaces

Toronto-based rock group Wireless have undergone several membership changes. Lead singer Michael LaLonde and drummer Glen Beatson have left the group, to be replaced by Marcel (Marty) Morin, who will be the group's new drummer.

Morin, a veteran drummer on the Canadian music scene, has been a part of such notable bands as Goddo, Truck and Heat Exchange.

Bassist Alan Marshall will be handling lead vocal chores for the group, with Morin and Mike Crawford contributing backup vocals.

The new Wireless configuration made a successful debut as opening act at a New Year's Eve concert behind Anthem group Max Webster and special guests Moxy (Polydor) at Seneca Fieldhouse in Toronto.

Wireless are managed by SRO Productions.

Folk Festival in Edmonton to highlight games

A Canadian Folk Arts Festival will be a featured presentation of Festival 78. It's all part of the XI Commonwealth Games to be held in Edmonton later this summer.

The festival will feature singers, dancers and musicians from the 10 provinces and two territories of Canada.

Each province and territory is responsible for putting their show together, but the cost of transporting the entertainers to Edmonton and providing accommodation is being picked up by the Multiculturalism Directorate of the Canadian Government.

Festival 78 is being co-ordinated by the Canadian Folk Arts Council. It's being launched by Edmonton's annual Heritage Festival which begins on July 31. Last year's Heritage Festival attracted more than 40,000 spectators to Hawrelak Park. The provincial shows will be presented on a number of specially designed outdoor stages at Hawrelak Park, the Commonwealth Stadium, the Edmonton Coliseum, the Commonwealth Aquatic Centre and the Athlete's Village.

Attic scores solid air with new Larry Evoy disc

Current single *Here I Go Again* by Attic recording artist Larry Evoy has become a solid airplay item throughout Canada. Attic notes 176 major and secondary stations are on the single. Stations charting include CKGM Montreal, CKXL Calgary and CHED Edmonton, with playlists from Toronto's CFTR and CHUM. The single is charted at RPM on both the Top 100 Singles and the Adult Oriented Playlist.

Evoy is preparing to return to the studio to record several additional sides with New York producer Stan Vincent. In addition to his production work, Vincent is noted for having recently founded the Voyage label.

New direction, old name for Skyline's Wednesday

Toronto-based rock group Wenzday, who record on the Quality-distributed Skyline label, have undergone a number of changes in their careers. The group's name is being changed back to Wednesday, which was their original name, and the group have signed a management deal with Colonial Artists Management, who are making plans to revitalize the group in Canada. Colonial Artists have hired Toronto-based Bigland PR firm to handle the group's public relations.

Wednesday are booked in Canada by Canadian General Artists. A series of one-nighters and club dates are being slated for the group through the winter season.

The group are currently on release with Skyline single *Now You're A Lady*.

CKFM, Hotel Toronto team raises \$s for sick kids

For the second consecutive year, Toronto radio station CKFM has teamed up with the Hotel Toronto in a Christmas season charity drive on behalf of the Kidney Foundation of Canada, with monies earned to be used for the recreational facility in the dialysis unit of the Hospital for Sick Children.

Last year, the drive raised almost \$9,000. The 1977 goal was set at \$15,000. For each dollar donated, a bulb was lit on the 50-foot Christmas tree outside the Hotel Toronto. The fundraising drive was a complete success, raising over \$17,000.

The campaign was given impetus by the donation of 200 five-album Elton John sets by MCA Records CKFM program director

Jerry Good and MCA's national promotion manager Keith Patten decided one complete set would be given to anyone coming into the station and donating over 20 dollars. CKFM listeners soon depleted the supply, and MCA contributed an additional 50 sets. One individual donated \$100 for his set, and returned to his office to raffle off the set for another \$175.

Another aspect of the promotion was a celebrity photograph auction, held December 11 at the Hotel Toronto. The auction, hosted by the station's Carl Banas, featured Polaroid photos of celebrities from all walks of life. Each photo was autographed. The auction was deemed a complete success.

Prime Time is CTV's new prime time news show

CTV has started the new year with a new topical news show called Prime Time, hosted by veteran broadcasters Lloyd Robertson and Helen Hutchinson. The show started on January 15 and is seen from 10-11 pm (EDT). Prime Time features a magazine style format with weekly reports on important Canadian and international affairs.

Robertson and Hutchinson have a large crew of experienced journalists backing them on the show. The line-up includes Bruce Phillips, Jack McGaw, Andre Payette, Gail Scott, Bill Stevenson and Jim Reed.

The executive producer for Prime Time is Lionel Lumb.

Perryscope, FM-99 ready Cheap Thrills concerts

Vancouver-based concert promotion firm Perryscope and Vancouver radio station CKLG-FM (FM 99), have initiated a concert series designed to expose Vancouver audiences to a variety of new artists. The series, called Cheap Thrills Concerts, showcases artists and groups who might not otherwise have included a B.C. date in their tours. Tickets for the concerts sell for \$2.99 and are available at concert box offices.

The series was introduced with a January 19 appearance by Capitol recording artist Sammy Hagar at the Commodore Ballroom in Vancouver. Hagar, a California native, has recorded three albums for Capitol, including the current Musical Chairs, which features single You Make Me Crazy. Tying in with the date, Capitol instituted large discounts on the album.

Perryscope and FM-99 are hoping to

use the concert series to assist in the launching of new groups in the western Canada market, and to give people in the market an opportunity to experience new musical forms and new musicians. In order to support the growing Vancouver scene, the support slot in most of the dates will be reserved for local talent. In meeting their goals, they are hoping to gain support from record companies, managers and agents.

CBC Pirandello screened by scholars in Sicily

The CBC-TV production of Pirandello's Six Characters In Search Of An Author was screened by 500 scholars at the International Pirandello Conference held in Agrigento, Sicily in December. Claudia Persi Haines, Vice-Chairman of the Carlton University Italian Department, screened the production at the Centro di Studi Pirandelliani (Centre for Pirandello Studies) in Agrigento, and then delivered a paper on the production.

The production was first telecast on the CBC Network on February 2, 1977. It was adapted for television by David Giles and Larry Mirkin, who also directed the production. Produced by Robert Sherrin, the program starred Neil Munro, Brenda Donahue, Michael Kaye and Jayne Eastwood.

KAMLOOPS

Kamloops country station CFFM-FM reports successful reaction to one of its foreground projects, The Super Country, Star Hour. The program, which began September 20, 1976, has run daily at three p.m., ever since. The recent BBM survey shows strong ratings on the show.

The station's promotions director Daniel Earl Knecht feels the show's success is due largely to its unique nature. The Star Hour is produced live, and unlike some documentaries, offers detailed, extensive commentary in an informal, near ad-lib fashion which has registered favourable audience response. In addition, Knecht notes, "We believe country music is shaped by its diverse artists, and so the Country Star Hour documents the history of country music through the lives and music of its stars, as opposed to a chronology or a blind, impersonal spiel of facts concerning an artist."

The RPM Talent Buyers Conference is an annual entertainment and talent conference that brings the industry together to discuss ways and means of improving the business and to view talent. Launched for the first time in 1976, this conference is attended by buyers of talent from universities, colleges and high schools across Canada.

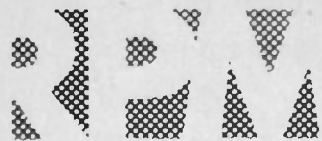

The computation of the records from 51 to 100 is based on early airplay, chart action and regional sales and breakouts. The chart is based on samplings from markets across Canada and indicates trends that may not be prevalent in all areas of Canada. Shaded numbers indicate a strong upward trend and gains in airplay or sales. This chart is offered as a guide to new product and an indication of trends in Canadian markets.

The Canadian country music industry is going to be without one of its biggest boosters, hopefully, only temporarily. Croft McClellan has exited his Program Manager's spot at Windsor's CKLW-FM. His efforts on behalf of Canadian artists and product on the border powerhouse are legendary, and

he is a veteran broadcaster of twenty-four years standing. This kind of expertise is essential in our flourishing, country, industry. It is certainly to be hoped that McClellan's sojourn on the sidelines will be short lived.

Gary Buck's new, gal singer, discovery, Heather Lane has already hit the chart at Vancouver's CKWX with her Broadland debut, Charlie's Angel.

It appears that Heather Haig will take aim on the country charts before 1978 is much older. The talented young miss is just back from Music City and a recording session at the Woodland layout with some of Nashville's top pickers and music people such as Lloyd Green and Janie Fricke helping Heather out.

Sneezy Waters returns to Toronto's Horseshoe for the week of Feb. 6-11. He literally tore the old town apart with his two-week effort at the Shoe before Christmas, recreating the Hank Williams legend. I Can't remember any country performer winning the hearts and typewriters of the normally, very tough, entertainment types on all the Toronto dailies as Waters did in his Hank Williams stanza. Dick Flohil indicates that Sneezy's return to the Horseshoe will spotlight the artist in his own right not in the role of Williams. He returns for this occasion to his regular billing, "The Great Sneezy Waters and his Excellent Band". It's the same bunch that did the Hank Williams number, but this time they'll be doing their own thing.

Glory Anne Carriere taped the Tommy Hunter show week of January 5th. Her stint on the George Hamilton IV syndie was telecast in most markets just before that. While dealing with the Royalty bunch, I'm hearing a good bit of pop, air play on/

Universal Girl by R. Harlan Smith lately. One deejay on CKTB, St. Catharines, commented as the song concluded, "Boy, that R. Harlan Smith sounds like Ray Price."

Price notwithstanding, the Smith song appears to be in rotation on Toronto's CKEY as well.

Some real mellow country sounds on the new David Thompson, Citation single. Label is a newcomer, owned and operated by David's manager-producer, Chuck Williams. Previously Thompson has had some degree of success with RCA singles. Right To The End is the kind of cross-over, ballad that could win favour from both country and pop programmers.

Don Cochrane dropped in the other day on his way back from his latest session at the Mercey Brothers' studio in Elmira. He has a complete album this time, and had high praise for the Merceys' studio facilities, and the production and organization of Dallas Harms. Immediate release plans are not available. Some top pickers took part in the Cochrane session including Brian Barron and Lee Roy Anderson, not to mention Ed Wideman's big bass voice in evidence on a couple of the new tracks.

There's mucho action around the new Condor layout this past little while. Some of the most commercial, country stuff I've ever heard was demoed for me by Lonnie Salazar a while back. He has persuaded one of Nashville's best producers, Joe Bob Barnhill, to vacate the control room and take over in front of the glass. Barnhill has been a top-drawer writer for many years, and a producer with numerous chart credits, including a good bit of Dick Dam-

ron's material cut in Music City. His debut, Condor single is an up-tempo tune called Let's Hear It For The Roses. Lonnie is also readying the debut single by Whiskey River. "A" side will be a new arrangement, instrumentally, of the classic, Amazing Grace.

There'll be a follow-up single for Carroll Baker in the American market. Her first RCA single outing, Cryin' Places impressed the Nashville powers that be sufficiently to green light a second single. At this point in time manager, Don Grashey, et al in the Baker camp are giving much thought to what that follow-up single will be. They are currently going over her catalogue in an attempt to determine whether a new U.S. single will be an already recorded item, or if a new session should be scheduled to produce some brand new material for Carroll's second American outing.

A pleasant surprise recently was the January issue of Music City News. The Nashville-originated, fan-oriented periodical devoted almost all of that edition to the Canadian country industry. They offered feature articles on Wilf Carter, Dick Damron, The Mercey Brothers, Colleen Peterson, Tommy Hunter, Carroll Baker, Dallas Harms, Mike Graham, Ronnie Prophet, Ray Griff and George Hamilton IVth. Much of the material was prepared by managing editor Lee Rector during his visit to last fall's Big Country Awards in Ottawa. This kind of exposure in the American market can only be a benefit.

Friends, and the industry at large, will note with sorrow the sudden passing of

Attic releases early Wurzels album in Canada

Attic Records has released a third album in Canada by the Wurzels. The album, titled The Wurzels Are Scrumptious, was recorded by the British group previously to their first Canadian release, Combine Harvester. Its release in Canada follows another Attic release, Golden Delicious.

The new release contains such songs as Don't Tell I Tell Ee, Drink Up Thy Zider and The Market Gardener.

The Wurzels, who have attained particular success in the Newfoundland market and the Maritimes, are being lined up for a Canadian tour in March, with possible dates across Canada. The group appeared in Canada twice in 1977. The first stop contained concert dates in Halifax, Ottawa, Hamilton and Newfoundland, followed by a single date in Halifax.

ABC's Oak Ridge Boys, Don Williams taping in Toronto

ABC country recording artists the Oak Ridge Boys and Don Williams are firmed for a segment of Ronnie Prophet's Big Country Award-winning series Grand Old Country. The artists will be taping the show in Toronto between January 24 and 26 for telecast on the CTV network in February or March.

The Oak Ridge Boys have been together in various permutations since World War II. They recently scored a major North American country hit with Y'All Come Back Saloon, RPM's tenth best country single of the year, and the title selection from their current ABC album. GRT, who distribute ABC product in Canada, have recently released a new single, You're The One. The single is gaining major country airplay in Canada, as is the flip side Easy. The Oak Ridge Boys have won three Grammy Awards in the U.S., as well as top country group awards in the States, Britain and Sweden.

Don Williams also scored a recent major country hit with I'm Just A Country Boy, the title track from his most recent ABC album. Williams is a noted songwriter whose material has been covered by such diverse artists as Eric Clapton, Pete Townsend & Ronnie Lane.

GRT is planning release of new albums from both artists, with Oak Ridge Boys product slated for March and a new Williams album in April.

RCA, Ray McCauley promote in Surrey, B.C.

RCA recording artists Ray McCauley & Wild Country gave a special promotional performance December 10 in-store at the K-Mart store in Surrey, British Columbia. In a promotion handled by RCA's B.C. promo representative Ray Ramsay, the group gave an hour-long concert amidst racks of their current album and tape product.

RCA supported the promotion with ads on local stations CKWX and CJJC. The product, a new album titled Sometimes Good, Sometimes Bad, showed good sales during the promotion. Product was sale-priced for the occasion, and McCauley signed copies of the album between sets. The group was also presented with a guitar-shaped cake by a fan.

Big Country scores high in BBM audience survey

There is a large Canadian market for country music, according to the BBM fall 1977 Survey of Audience. The survey determined St. Clair Productions' syndicated weekly country music program Big Country is achieving a weekly audience in excess of 600,000 listeners.

The weekly three-hour show is currently aired on 78 stations from coast to coast in Canada. Although many of the stations are country-oriented, some are MOR format including giants CFRB Toronto and CJAD Montreal. The show is written, produced and hosted by Bill Anderson. It includes interviews with country artists, artist news, new record releases, and a weekly count-

down of RPM's Top Ten Country Hits.

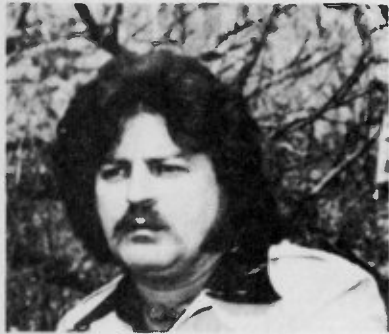
According to the BBM figures, 604,600 Canadians are tuning in the program every week. Of these, 510,000 are adults and over 90,000 are teens. The average quarter-hour audience is 265,200. The adult audience is evenly split between men and women.

Program distributor St. Clair Productions is highly enthusiastic about the survey results, which they feel justify the faith the firm had in the program. Big Country has been on the air only since last spring. Anderson feels the next step is for the recording industry to look upon the 600,000 listeners as potential record buyers, and to pay more attention to the potential of country record distribution.

The winner was Lucille by Kenny Rogers with number two spot held down by Glen Campbell with Sunflower, and the runner up position going to the Kendalls for Heaven's Just A Sin Away. Rounding out Red Deer's all time top ten were: Elvis, Charley Pride, Dolly Parton, Merv Smith, Cal Smith and John Denver. Pride had two on the CKGY top ten, Kiss An Angel Good Morning and Crystal Chandelier.

Mel Tillis was due to tape the Tommy Hunter Show January 20. Mel comes to town at a time when both sides of his latest MCA single have hit local airwaves. Woman, You Should Be In Movies, is a big mover for

Lin Ward at CHOO in Ajax, while Joe LeFresne over at CFGM has gone on What Did I Promise Her Last Night.

Toronto's CKFH turned out a king-size, poster edition of their weekly chart presenting the station's top one hundred hits of 1977. Number one was Waylon's Luckenbach, with Lucille by Kenny Rogers and Brown Eyes Blue by Crystal Gayle in the runner up spots.

Watch for some super developments in the career of Nancy Ryan. The beautiful singing lady will not be off the record market long, not with the new material she has at the ready. Beyond that aspect of her career, though is the new Nancy Ryan stage presentation now being readied by Ms. Ryan and her manager, Stan Campbell. Part of their efforts will be debuted early in March at the Cycle Canada Show in Toronto's C.N.E. grounds. It'll be some kind of tremendous presentation, covering all the bases from country to soft rock and back with Nancy and a full complement of back up musicians and singers offering a fast paced, well choreographed, colorful production that'll have the customers talking for weeks afterward.

Jim Haggart, one time partner with brother Don in the Haggart Brothers, is about to embark on a new career as a manager/producer for talented newcomer, George Cadden. The two are currently appearing together on some of the top night spot stages in Ontario. Before too long Haggart, Cadden and company will make the pilgrimage to Nashville for recording sessions hopefully to establish the twenty-seven year old native of Nova Scotia as a star in his own right. Cadden's singing style was recently described by Mike Mulhern in the London Free Press as: "one of those rare voices that's resonant, sweet and true . . . a bass baritone that's a natural for country." Keep an ear peeled for George Cadden.

Tommy Overstreet and the Nashville Express are set to open Ron Louie's Lakeview Pavillion, outside of Edmonton, on the weekend of February 17-18. Re-opening of Lakeview had been set for the latter part of 1977, but a couple of last minute technicalities held things up.

Dominic D'Arcy is a newcomer to the country record scene in the Ottawa area. Already though his debut single has been

Michael T. Wall will be putting the finishing touches to his debut album on Boot before too long. The set, to be entitled King Of The Newfies, will get heavy promo treatment from both Michael T (and let's face it, this guy's a promo man's dream) and label topper Jury Krytiuk. A single from the album will be released first. It's to be another Artie McLaren song, called the Newfie Polka, and according to Wall, it's a "different kind of Newfie tune."

Not to worry about any possible demise of country music on the Ottawa dial in the event there's a change in ownership of CKBY-FM. A well placed spokesman for the prospective new owners, Maclean-Hunter Ltd., has assured me that in the event their acquisition bid is approved by the CRTC, CKBY-FM will maintain, perhaps even expand their country programming in a couple of important areas.

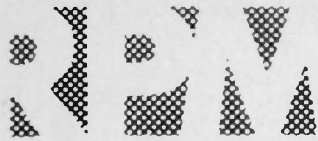

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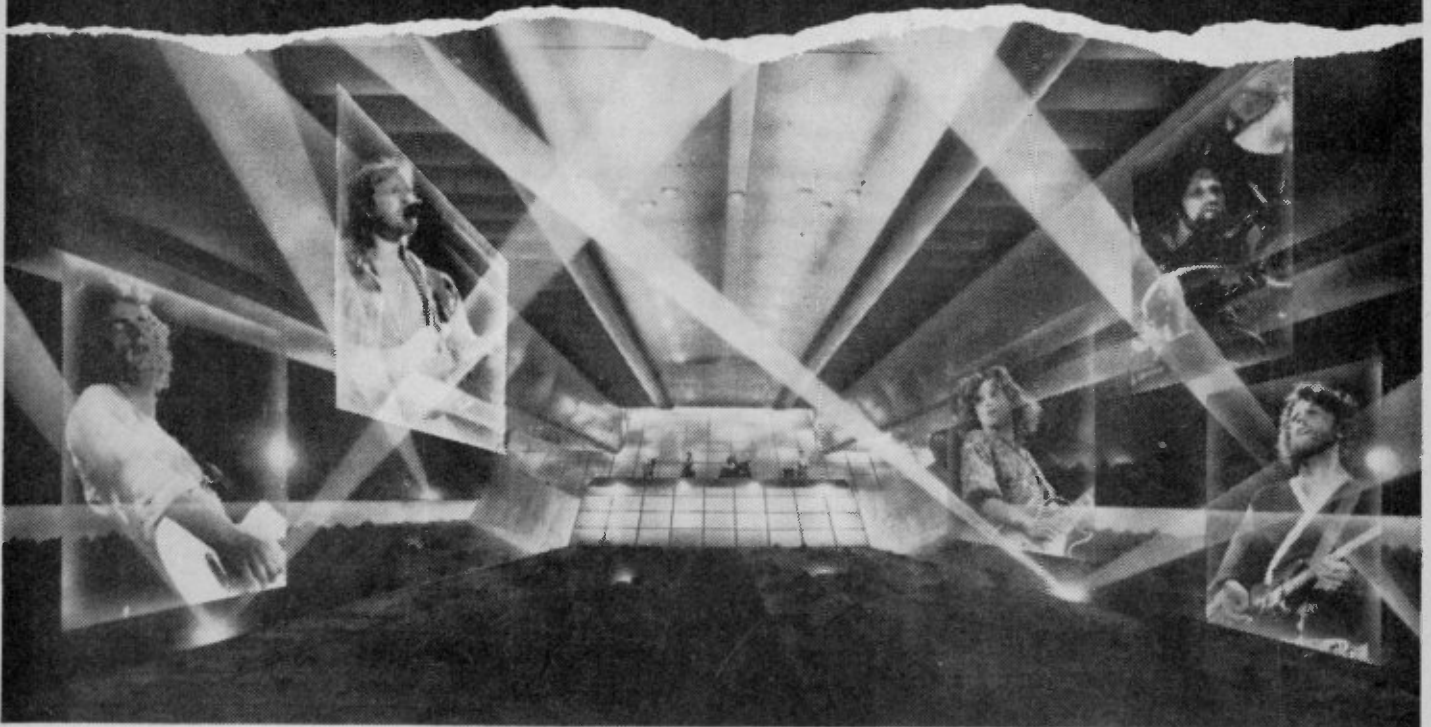
