

Sony's Thorpe says no problem in supply of CD units

Toronto: "our product is out there and selling like crazy," boasts Sony's Graham Thorpe. One Toronto outlet has gone through 30 units (CD players) since its introduction less than two weeks ago and one outlet in Montreal sold 12 units the first morning of their launch. That's \$1495. list - no discounts.

The Sony player is available at selected Sony Audio-Lab dealers, which number about 60 stores. Thorpe admits "There is no difficulty in supplying hardware at this time, but we might experience a tight time between the middle of April and middle of May because of supply and demand. There's not going to be a big problem but we are anticipating some backordering. Reaction to the Sony player has been phenomenal." The \$1495 price is for the player only, which can be added to an existing stereo system.

Sony has available through their stores, 22 titles from CBS, which are also available to CBS' regular retailers. It's expected the other manufacturers will have their titles available during June and July.

"We won't be carrying other company's titles," explained Thorpe, "only because we wanted to make sure there was software in the marketplace for the launch of the product. But we're not interested in being in the

CRTC gives stations a deal on the CRC

Toronto: The CIRPA/ADISQ Foundation reports that the CRTC has decided that radio stations may consider their subscription fee to the Canadian Record Catalogue as part of a radio station's Canadian talent commitment

The decision followed the submision of a letter from Earl Rosen, Executive Director of the CIRPA/ADISQ Foundation, to CRTC Chairman John Meisel.

In his letter, Meisel stated that "The Commission agrees that the bulk of a station's financial commitment should go to the development of Canadian talent, whether by homegrown albums, financing of live concerts or participation in activities like FACTOR," continuing with "The promotion of the works of Canadian musicians is also an important aspect of a station's commitment and there's no denying the Catalogue's contribution to the promotion of Canadian music."

Meisel added that it is for these reasons that the Commission "is pleased to regard the annual subscription fee as one element of a station's Canadian talent commitment."

Diane Hughes, Marketing Director of the Canadian Record Catalogue, said that she expected the ruling to lead to many more subscriptions, particularly from smaller stations with tmore limited programming resources.

The ruling means that stations can subscribe to the Canadian Record Catalogue without it costing them any more than they have already committed to spend.

The Foundation also announced the appointment of the Toronto-based firm of Linda Dawe Associates as sales agents of the Canadian Record Catalogue to radio stations.

software business. Of course there will be some questioning by record retailers as to why hi-fi dealers are carrying records, wondering if it's going to be another video situation. Many of these dealers didn't get into the video business fast enough and now they're having difficulties getting their marketshare back." Thorpe went on to explain, "We would rather have the software in the record stores where it belongs. That, in fact, adds a lot more validity to the whole format, when consumers can go into a normal record store and see compact discs as opposed to seeing this product in the hi-fi speciality shops. It has more mass appeal."

It's anticipated that the initial buyers of the CD player and discs will be the audiophile—"people who are really interested in their home system and who want the better performance of the compact disc, which is much better than records and much better than tapes," explains Thorpe. 60% to 65% of the titles available are in the serious vein and it's widely accepted that audiophile's tend to be more classical music oriented.

Broadcasters have also shown much interest in the CD player, with several already having ordered the Sony consumer model (CDP101). The commercial model (CDP5000) which will list for somewhere around the \$10,000 mark, won't be available for a couple of months. The reason these broadcasters have picked the consumer model is simply because it's available. There are major advantages however with the commercial model which allows for random ac-

cess (also available on the consumer model), which means the operator can punch in the track selected for airing; there is a pause and immediate start and unlike the broadcaster turntable now in use, the Sony player allows the operator to hit the start button and it starts immediately, there's no half or 3/4 revolution to warm up to the necessary speed. Another important feature with the commercial unit is the CRT (cathode ray tube), which is a television screen that will supply information that has been programmed on the disc i.e. control information - the track numbers, time of selection (which is also a feature of the consumer unit); access anywhere within a track; and the advantage of a crank, similar to a video editor, which allows the operator to twist a knob and bring up a number he wants access to, and the disc will start from that point.

When connected to a micro-computer the professional CD player will supply a hard copy print-out of the information i.e. liner notes, biographical information, lyrics, publishing information, and any other information the record manufacturer wants to make available.

The Sony CD player has been used on-air with good results. Toronto's artsy CJRT experimented with the system, airing a number of classical selections. Listeners were quick to advise the station that they had indeed noticed the difference on their regular FM receiver. Says Thorpe, "The most amazing feature of the CD player is what you don't hear - no surface noise and no wow or flutter."

P.R.O. Canada sweeps CARAS and JUNO awards

Toronto: The Performing Rights Organization (PRO Canada) made an impressive showing at this year's West Coast CARAS Awards (Mar 27) and the Juno Awards (Apr 5). Their writer's and publishers took 19 out of 21 of the CARAS West Coast Awards and 10½ out of the 20 musical Juno Awards.

P.R.O. Canada, which represents 12,231 affiliate writers and 2,393 publishers, and who were well represented at the Juno presentations, were ecstatic over their wins which were: Get Lucky by Loverboy as Album of The Year; Eyes Of A Stranger by the Payolas as Single of the Year; Bob Rock and Paul Hyde, writers, for Eyes Of A Stranger, voted Composers of the Year; Bryan Adams, writer, who took honours as Male Vocalist of

MCA inks 'Peg's Vienna to worldwide record deal

Toronto: MCA has just signed the Winnipegbased group Vienna to a worldwide agreement.

The group's debut album, yet untitled, is to be recorded in Canada and produced by Britisher Ashley Howe. No word of a release date as of writing.

The band previously released a three-track EP titled Tears On Celluloid on their own label which received local airplay.

Steve Leeds, A&R Manager for MCA Records in New York, was impressed by the band's local airplay and caught the band in action at one of their Canadian dates which resulted in the signing.

Hollywood - - Anne Murray broke her silence yesterday and returned some of the criticism she's received over Canada's controversial Juno awards.

"All those people who say I should go to the Junos should stay home one year and watch it on TV, and then they wouldn't want to go either," she said flatly.

She said she found this year's awards show "embarrassingly bad" and was particularly offended by the noisy talk and clinking glasses at tables when Governor-General Ed Schreyer was paying tribute to the late, great pianist Glenn Gould. "They couldn't keep quiet for a moment, not even for the Governor-General, not even out of respect to Glenn Gould. I thought it was appalling; God only knows what the public thinks of us, the Canadian music industry, after that."

A three-time Grammy winner, she was also criticized for appearing on that U.S.-based show - - "which is somewhat naive, I think, considering the fact that I have a contract with CBS television and the Grammys are a CBS show."

"But what it comes right down to, when you get right to the bottom line, is that yes, the Grammys are more important to my career than the Junos. I mean, who's kidding who? I have 19 Juno awards and not one has helped my career. They are, in fact, the result of my career."

"Listen, I spent 18 years growing up with five brothers," she added with a grin -"and no amount of criticism or digs I get now can hold a candle to the heat I used
to take from them!"

In the meantime Anne Murray's got her fans to keep her warm, and they made things pretty hot for her here on Wednesday night, (April 6), with shouts of We Love You Annie punctuating her teasing, tantalizing two-hour triple-ovation performance.

All in all, a Hollywood night to remember - - with or without those Juno awards.

Concludes Adilman, "The recording crowd really has class. Maybe next year they'll throw buns." Adilman followed this comment up in his Apr 11 column with "Alan Thicke, co-host of the Juno Awards. wholeheartedly agrees with my comments about the rude behaviour of the audience at last week's presentations. He attends the Oscars, the Emmys and the Grammies and says their organizers ensure that quiet is maintained." Adilman also talked to Jack Budgell, CBC producer of the Juno show, who told him he was "appalled by the noise."

A barn of an auditorium

In defence of the noisy behaviour of the Juno crowd, the immensity of the stage and the camera equipment put the audience in an awkward position, if you weren't close to the action, which seemed to be taking place all over that acre of staging. Many in the audience weren't even aware that the Governor-General was on stage. There was also a lack of television screens that could have forewarned the audience of what was about to happen.

PRO Canada's Western Div celebrates 15th birthday

Vancouver: To commemorate the Performing Rights Organization's 15th anniversary of its Western Division a Workshop was held at the Robson Theatre (Mar 28). P.R.O. Canada's affiliates in Western Canada, which includes B.C., Alberta and Saskat-

chewan, were advised of the workshop for song evaluation and were asked to submit demos for the all day event. The Workshop was open to non-affiliates as well on a first come first served basis. The \$5.00 entry fee was used to underwrite the cost of the lunch.

A panel of four experts comprising Frank Davies (ATV) - publisher; Bob Ezrin - Producer; Jeff Burns (CBS) - A&R; and Jim Vallance (co-writer with Bryan Adams) -songwriter, was chaired by the Western Division's Manager Lynn Partridge.

Nancy Gyokeres, head of P.R.O. Canada's Public Relations, reports "The theatre was

absolutely jammed to capacity, with over 350 registered. We could have doubled the number of people who attended."

There were 200 demos submitted and these were categorized according to format i.e. country, rock, folk etc. and divided into bins with the panel picking at random from the boxes. Says Gyokeres, "It was really remarkable how good the material was. At one point after listening to a tape, Jeff Burns mentioned 'See me afterwards' and there was a cheer from the audience, who obviously knew someone had hit home. It was very, very exciting and the panelists were taken up with the excitement as well. They've all agreed to do it again." CBC Radio were on hand to tape a segment of the workshop which was aired on the network (Apr 11).

Gyokeres pointed out that "The panelists were just as happy to hear so much original material in such a setting as the audience was," continuing with "It's rough at the best of times for songwriters to be heard by professionals, but this workshop gave these songwriters the opportunity to hear how songs are evaluated from a producer's point of view, A&R, from the publisher and from another songwriter."

The date for the P.R.O. Canada Workshop, dovetailed with the Tribute To West Coast Music adding a measure of importance to this awards evening presented by the Western Chapter of CARAS.

P.R.O. Canada represents 14,624 affiliate writers and publishers in Canada, of which more than 4,000 are handled by the Western Division, which is 26% of the total.

Much of the excitement for Kamahl was generated with his cross-country promo tour to Montreal, Toronto, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver and Winnipeg. While in Winnipeg he took part in a telethon.

During his stop in Toronto, Kamahl received word that he had been voted Entertainer of the Year in the MOR category through a public poll held in Australia.

Four singles were certified as gold - Masterpiece by Gazebo, Der Kommissar by After The Fire, Pass The Dutchie from Musical Youth, and Sexual Healing by Marvin Gaye. Rush remains No. 1 in U.S. concert dates

Fort Worth, Texas: Anthem recording trio Rush maintained their hold on the No. 1 spot (Apr 1) on Tops In Performance, a weekly barometer of box office action, published by Performance magazine. This was the second week at top of the chart and their 26th week on the chart.

Triumph moved from 31 to 21 after only two weeks of tracking. Streetheart move from 20 to 19 after 5 weeks of action and Neil Young holds on to the No. 2 spot after 9 weeks of action.

Q's Homegrown winners ready for the street

Toronto: Gary Slaight, Program Director of Q107 reports the winners of the station's 5th Homegrown Contest. From more than 300 demos submitted, 25 were picked for the semi-finals, judged by representatives of the record industry, out of which 12 were chosen to comprise the Homegrown album. These were: Sylum, Harbinger, Talkin' Dice, The Voices, Ira Brown, Mark Konnor, I.C.U. Honeymoon Suite, The Heroes, Tin Drum, The West, and 20th Century Rebels.

The album is scheduled for a late May release and will include a ballot. Buyers are asked to pick their favourite group and return the ballot to the station (a suitable prize will be offered as further enticement). The winner of this contest will pick up the grand prize: a \$12,000 sound system and a studio session, produced by Jack Richardson.

Nat King Cole because of his type of music," Kamahl noted. "Maybe because I'm an incurable romantic. I do keep an ear out for contemporary material and like Christopher Cross and Lionel Richie, both of whom use good lyrical content."

Not wanting to be a Cole sound-alike Kamahl incurred dramatic changes in backing and production over the years, having his albums produced in several countries.

Because of his unique feel for his lyrics and his rich baritone delivery, Kamahl prefers a somewhat subdued instrumental backing when he records and when he performs in concert. "The lush orchestral backing of the '50s and early '60s threw me completely," he recalled, "and I'd sing a capella in preference to any accompaniment at all." He signed his first record contract in 1967 but, again, because of his vocal qualities, the label made plans to record him as a classical artist, which he short-circuited and instead, made his recording debut as a pop artist. With the track record Kamahl enjoys he should be a shoo-in to the North American market. However, he's taking it in his stride. "I know there are a lot of people in North America who will enjoy my material, given the opportunity to hear it." he noted. "I haven't the slightest doubt that I will have a lot of support. This isn't starting over for me but merely making new friends. I'm starting here with so many credits behind me, it's like having a degree."

Humbleness is one of Kamahl's attributes perhaps best illustrated by the fact that it wasn't until he became the highest earning male star in Australia when he came to believe in himself.

A Red Rider/Deserters tour

Capitol Canadian recording groups Red Rider and the Deserters are embarking on a tour together in support of their albums Neruda and Siberian Nightlife respectively. Firmed dates for the bands include Vancouver (April 18), Prince George (22), Grand Praire (23), Fort St. John (24), Red Deer (26), Edmonton (27), Lethbridge (29) and Calgary (30). Capitol shipped radio and press a special package on Red Rider including the Neruda album, a 12-inch interview disc with group leader Tom Cochrane, a written interview, bio info on the band, a photo of Cochrane, a Red Rider poster, plus a biography on the late poet Pablo Neruda including one of his poems. The album was influenced and named after the poet. Human Race is the current single release from Red Rider.

Debut U.S. LP by Powder Blues

Vancouver's Powder Blues have had their debut U.S. album released on the EMI/Liberty label. The LP is a compilation package containing 12 tracks from their three previous releases. The band has also been touring the U.S. in support of the album. They played the Los Angeles area for several weeks and recently performed Western American dates with veteran Paul Butterfield. Also in the works is an Eastern U.S. tour. A highlight of their tour was performing at a cast party in Lake Tahoe for Walter Matthau, Robin Williams, Jerry Reed and their movie crew. Group leader and producer Tom Lavin reports that they're not expected to return to Canada until May or June.

NEW BOOKS

DEATH OF A ROLLING STONE The Brian Jones Story Mandy Aftel \$12.50 - 208 pages

A child of and a victim of the '60s, Brian Jones founded the Rolling Stones, an adventure that brought the Stones into world prominence, but was short-lived when Jones drowned in his swimming pool - July 3, 1969. The pathologist stated that Jones' death was due to drowning associated with ingestion of alcohol, drugs, and severe liver degeneration - and the verdict: misadventure. Mandy Aftel's biographical look at Jones took her on an eight year trip into the life of a fascinating rock 'n roll personality - the original rock radical. Aftel didn't receive too much cooperation from Jones' fellow Stones members, however she overcame much of this opposition to paint a highly entertaining word picture of Jones, from his early days in Cheltenham and into the '60s and the Stones' first break at London's Marquee Club (July 12, 1962); the changes Andrew Loog Oldham made when he took over management in 1963; the rivalry between Jones and Mick Jagger; and their first tour of America in 1964. Drug busts, jail terms, problem women and sensual and effectionate women - all played a part in the life of Brian Jones and author Aftel puts it all into exceptionally interesting reading.

New Gould LP from Moss Music

Spurred on by a continuing heavy consumer demand for Volume One, The Moss Music Group (Canada) has now assembled Volume Two of The Young Glenn Gould which is scheduled for a release the first week of April. The LP will contain performances of Mozart's 4-hand piano music featuring the late pianist and his only teacher Alberto Guerrero. The recordings, which are to be issued on the Turnabout label, will also be available on cassette and will mark the first time the privately-recorded performances have been made available to the general public. Julian Rice, Moss Music of Canada's Vice President and Co-Producer of the LP, stated that a special buy-in price will be offered to all of Moss' accounts and that a similar marketing campaign is imminent for U.S. distribution.

The Tait Brothers are off

Barry Kaplan, the producer who brought Lou Natale into the business, bows another act, The Tait Brothers. Released on the Dee Communications label, the plug side, Fussin' And Frettin', written by Jim Tait, has been picking up CHR and AOR airplay across the country. Returns from radio stations indicate that of the mailing 53% are airing the single I to 4 times per week and 20% are spinning it 5 to 14 times per week. Kaplan describes the single, produced by the Tait Brothers and Don Geppert as in "the jazz-funk style."



DOMINIC D'ARCY - Country
Autumn Rise - Diana DO-16

Regarded somewhat as the Pied Piper of the Ottawa area. Dominic D'Arcy has established himself as one of the foremost, all 'round entertainers from the capitol city. It was no doubt because of his audience draw that producer Ted Gerow features D'Arcy live on Side One and that's where he stands out as a perfectionist with traditional material such as his Irish Medley (Come In. Orange And The Green, MacNamara's Band and The Unicorn) and a warm delivery of Mighty Mississippi. The audience energies (students from W.E. Gowling and Fielding School) match that of D'Arcy's, which adds to the entertainment value of the package. The studio side of the album shows the more serious side of D'Arcy, which he might be better to avoid (Ocean Ranger and Father's Day). He does quite well with Sheik Of Newfoundland, which was re-leased as a single and My Canada, the latter with a good buffer of attractive young voices. An Ottawa policeman, D'Arcy vented his musical anger with Bassela's Theme, a dirge of an instrumental he wrote after investigating the case of a young pizzeria owner who was shot and clubbed to death in a senseless robbery. He makes his point quite effectively without the use of words. Country programmers are already familiar with Dominic D'Arcy but this package should attract contemporary adult (MOR) play as well.

ALEXANDRE - Pop/roc Let It Out - Celebration - CEL-2124-M

Montrealer Alexandre (Stanke) puts his early music theory to good use with his debut album for Celebration, It's difficult to categorize Alexandre, but it's relatively easy to slot him as "professional". His wonderings between rock, dance and pop with jazz overtones adds to the entertaining value of this set which he produced with Billy Szowlowski and Guy Rheume, The session was produced at Montreal's Tempo and Marko studios. Contemporary adult programmers have already given the nod to Alexandre's single, We Broke Up The Band, co-written by Alexandre and Jean-Pierre Cousineau, by far the best cut on the album, Cousineau teamed up with Alexandre for most of the material. Also choice from this team are a couple of impressive novelty dance tracks, The Tuba Song and You'll Know What To Do. Brass arrangements, and keyboards by Alexandre are standouts, as is most of the instrumental work. The ballady Where Could We Be. co-written by Alexandre and Rosemary Emery, is also choice. Lyrics included.

land's favourite son, John Crosbie's fight for the Conservative leadership. In fact, it's possible that most of Crosbie's humour is the result of the influence of Uncle Al Clouston. This is Clouston's fourth album, which in itself is an indication of the popularity of this Newfoundland storyteller. He has been gathering material of this nature for most of his life. Clouston doesn't mire himself down with mainland-type Newfie jokes - his are the real thing and, as strange as it may sound, his delivery has somewhat of a historian's approach, which is quite natural being that Newfoundland is rich in folk lore, music, and a history that overshadows all the other provinces in Canada. Says Clouston, "Newfielanders use the negative to make the affirmative more positive." Non-offensive, which is rare in the comedy business, this Clouston package should make the roving Newfielanders, of which there are more than 150,000 across Canada, quite homesick, and they could make this a platinum release for Uncle Al. Recorded at St. Matthew's Anglican Parish, Heart's Delight-Islington, Newfoundland, at the Celebration of St. Matthew's Day, which in itself, sounds like a Newfie story.

THE LINCOLNS Take One - Attic LAT-1167-Q

Bassist Prakash John has finally completed his long-running project, the release of a collection of R&B standards that made The Lincolns one of the most successful club bands in the country. John wanted his sound to be as close to what the group represented in the clubs, so insisted that the bedtracks for all cuts would be first takes. "I promised myself I'd live with whatever we did on that one take," says John. If you're into the sound of the '60s the Lincolns are one of the best in the business. They illustrate this love of their brand of music with How Sweet It Is, Walkin' The Dog and Road Runner and a powerful sound mediey of Ferry Cross The Mersey/On Broadway and Makin' It. The latter is the only group original on the set and was cowritten by John and lead guitarist Danny Weis. Other members are keyboardist Michael Fonfara and, of course, the lead singer, who acquired his exceptionally sensitive vocal qualities through long hours as a Gosepel singer. Drummers Jorn Andersen and Rick Gratton alternate dates with the Lincolns and both appear on this session. Lincoln fans should bring this album into the gold field and programmers should jump at the opportunity to air what could become a collector's item.

Z Z TOP - Rock Eliminator - Warner Bros 92 37744-P

Rock with balls, which is rare these days, brings Z Z Top back into chart position. Billy Gibbons, Dusty Hill and Frank Beard, who are ZZ Top, have just come down off two hot albums (Deguello and El Loco) and should continue in that direction with

this hot than hot package. Gimme All Your Lovin' has been taken as a single and it is totally representative of the other cuts from this old-time rock and roll production by Bill Ham. The Texas-based heavy metal trio picked Memphis to lay down their sound, which strays a little into the synthesizer world but doesn't take away from the recognizable sizzling guitar work by Gibbons. The trio penned all the material and besides the single, AM rockers should get into I Got The Six, Bad Girl and Dirty Dog.

SOUNDTRACK - Pop Local Hero - Music by Mark Knopfler Vertigo VOG-1-3321-Q

This Soundtrack for Bill Forsyth's Local Hero film is Mark Knopfler's first major solo event. As leader, songwriter and guitarist of Dire Straits, it's only natural that the musical influences of that powerhouse would pepper whatever Knopfler might do. His music here however, is clean, relatively simple mood music, but it does have the Knopfler touch. The Going Home track, which is the theme of the film, brings Knopfler front and centre with his extraordinary guitar work that almost does battle with the powerful and haunting sax talent of Mike Brecker, formerly of the Brecker Brothers, Alan Clark of Dire Straits provides keyboards on this track. Also choice is The Way It Always Starts, the only vocal track, with Gerry Rafferty doing the honours. Going Home has been taken as a single and is already showing a positive reaction with the contemporary adult programmers, which should add to Knopfler's status as an exceptionally-gifted musician and writer and not one restricted to one music form only. As an aside it's interesting to note that this song has become so popular with Dire Straits' audiences, it has become their closing number.
