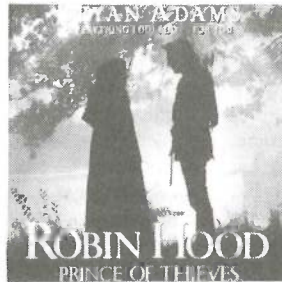

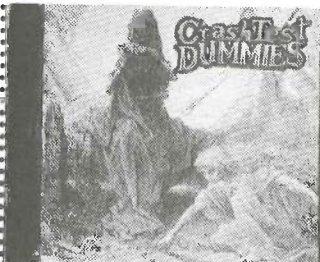

Boomtown's Big House featured at BMG meet

Boomtown's Big House was the centre of attraction at one of the showcase events for BMG's international convention (RPM - Aug. 17/91). The high-energy band performed in front of a full house at Toronto's Danforth Music Hall. In attendance were BMG staff from all over North America. It was obvious from the reaction of the crowd that the band scored big points with their critical audience. The band's self-titled album debut will be released in Canada September 9 and August 26 in the rest of the world.

The Big House foundation began in Edmonton, Alberta in the early 80's, when drummer Sjur Thronson (pronounced Shore) and frontman Jan Ek created Down Syndrome, a punk rock act that garnered a large bar following. "It was good in the 80's," recalls Ek, "That was our stomping ground, where we learned to play and write better. It was a free environment to get a grasp of what music was all about for us." But as the alternative scene grew into a largely competitive market with a limited direction, many acts experienced growing pains and focused their energy towards speed metal or the "rootsy, Stonese style." Down Syndrome was no exception. "We started to find a lot of redundancy in the hard core scene," Thronson remembers, "It had become very restrictive when we were growing and broadening our horizons."

After reassessing their direction, the band realized their roots were in rock 'n roll and that their career goals were to be musicians, not to be trapped in the stale, confines of alternative music. "It seemed only natural," Thronson continues, "for us to head into more of a dare I say, mainstream flow of things. Big House runs somewhere down the middle, between the two directions everyone else was going."

Lougheed signs deal with Sony Music Publishing

Sony Music Canada has signed Lisa Lougheed to an exclusive worldwide co-publishing agreement. Lougheed was previously signed to Sony in a development deal which allowed her to secure a recording contract.

Lougheed is currently recording her first record for Warner Music scheduled for release this fall.

Thronson and Ek joined up with guitarist K.B. Broc, who was living in Calgary at the time. After several attempts searching "across Canada and the States", bassist Jay Scott King was discovered. "At our first meeting, we realized he was cut from the same stone as we were," says Thronson. With the band complete, they moved to Toronto where they live in a house affectionately called The Big House.

With the release of their album, the band will be touring extensively across Canada and the US for the next few months and then hopefully, to Europe. The road is nothing new to these four, they already know most of the vigours and sacrifices of touring.

"That's where we're from," continues Thronson, "We realize how unglamorous it can be but we still love it. We love the recording and video end of things, but I think that any rock band would attest that the road is where it's at. We've had the good fortune to work with The Agency here in Canada."

The video for the first single, Dollar In My Pocket, was shot in Hamilton, Ontario in an old theatre. The band had the opportunity to play a major role in the art direction of the video. "We chose the location," exclaims Thronson, "We

Video Hits, CBC-TV's long-running network daily series, has a new host and a new banner. When it commences in September, the show will be known as Dan Gallagher's Video Hits.

Gallagher was named by Sandra Faire, the series producer, as the replacement for Bryan Elliot. Gallagher recently left MuchMusic to spend more time with his other interests, namely The Lovely Lads, his band with Andy Curran, which he plans to tour.

Gallagher's Video Hits will be taped on location in Toronto, and is seen weekdays at 5 pm, Monday to Thursday. An hour-long version airs Fridays at 4:30 pm.

Western broadcaster Charles Allard dead at 71

Dr. Charles Allard, founder of Allarco Ltd., the predecessor to Allarcom, has died of lung cancer. The Edmonton-based Allarcom was the umbrella company that included one of Western Canada's largest broadcast entities. Dr. Allard was in his 71st year.

Leaving his medicine practice in the late sixties, Dr. Allard entered the business world fulltime, becoming actively involved in the broadcast field. He launched CITV, the first independent TV station in Western Canada in 1974, and although his application to run a 24-hour all-news channel was lost to the CBC, his empire grew to include the pay-TV station Superchannel, studio facilities, CKRD-TV Red Deer, and 50 percent of the Family Channel, a national family entertainment pay-TV service. He sold his Allarcom holdings to Western International Communications Ltd. in July of last year.

Dr. Allard is survived by his wife Shirley and four sons and two daughters.

BMG got behind Big House for this project and basically let them "go for it", as Ek explains, "We're really happy to be working with David Bendeth, his representation within the company has been really valuable." Bendeth is the band's producer and BMG's A&R Director for Canada. "He has an intimate understanding of the band," conclude Ek.

The album was recorded in Minneapolis, Wisconsin and Toronto. The mixing was done in Montreal, mastered in New York and re-mixed in Los Angeles.

Aaron finishes 6th album prepares for major tour

Lee Aaron has finished mixing her sixth album for Attic Records and will commence a major tour of concert halls and arenas in Canada for the month of October.

Entitled Some Girls Do, the album was produced by Brian Allen and her longtime collaborator John Albani and is the follow-up to her 1989 multi-platinum Bodyrock album. The new album features 13 tracks including the first single, Sex With Love and a rocking version of Stevie Wonder's Tell Me Something Good. A video of Sex With Love will be shot with director Don Allen.

Aaron and Albani wrote nine songs on their own and collaborated on others with Jim Vallance (Dangerous), Haywire's Marvin Birt (Hands Off The Merchandise), and Paul Sabu (Can't Stand The Heat).

Guesting on the album are Randy Cooke (drums), Rob Laidlaw (bass), and Lou Pomanti (organ) on Tuff Love. Andy Curran, Phil Naro and Harem Scarem's Harry Hess provided backing vocals. Q107's (Toronto) on-air personality John Derringer plays the role of a Detroit D.J. on the Motor City Boy track.

The album, scheduled for a Sept. 23 release, utilizes the Roland Sound Space processor, which gives the listener the illusion the sound is coming from more sources than just the speakers in front of them.

On completion of the Canadian tour, Aaron and her band will set off on an extensive tour of Europe, after which they will tour Japan and Australia.

Record industry unites to challenge new US immigration regulations

US lowers "iron curtain" on Cancon recording industry

The industry works together to avert a crisis that could put an end to Canadian groups touring in the US and US groups touring Canada.

Canadians, and for that matter Americans, have found comic relief immemorial, in the oft painted elephant and mouse scenario. It doesn't take too much imagination to figure out who the mouse is, when it comes to disagreements, political or otherwise between the two countries. Well, on August 12, at 10 am, to be exact, the mouse roared, and with good reason.

... frenzy bordering on hysteria, fueled by misinformation and confusion

The American Congress, perhaps the most uninformed body of individuals in the world, were bamboozled by the American (Hollywood) movie industry and the AFL/CIO, no slouches when it comes to power brokering, into introducing a law that would prevent foreign entertainment groups, athletes and even fashion models from working in the US.

The new visa rules were known on Washington's Capitol Hill in October of last year, and published in the Federal Register (The American's equivalent of our Canada Gazette) on July 12 of this year. So, the call to arms, a month, or eleven months later, whichever way you look at it, created a bit of a frenzy bordering on hysteria, which was fueled by misinformation and confusion. However, and to be fair, it should be noted that our Secretary of State, Barbara McDougall, did fire off a letter to James Baker, the American Secretary of State. Her July 17/91 letter even went as far as to suggest retaliation.

In a nutshell, the new visa rules called for the scrapping of the H-Class and J-Class visas, replacing them with O-Class and P-Class visas, limiting the number issued to 25,000 each year. This doesn't mean just Canada, this is the quota worldwide. Last year there were 75,000 visas issued, but it's not clear how many of those were issued to musical groups as opposed to athletes who are lumped into these new regulations. Should the regulations be approved, the way will be cleared for the Act to come into force on October 1, 1991.

Also adding to the confusion is the part the NHL was to play in the visa quota. It has been learned that NHL teams will be able to obtain business visas, therefore they have a distinct advantage and will not be affected.

Particularly disturbing is the regulation decreeing that artists or athletes on group visits must have a "sustained and substantial relationship" with their group or team for one year. This would create a major obstacle for bands, established or new, who inevitably go through many personnel changes over their career, certainly during their formative years. As well, the new regulations demand that these bands must be "internationally recognized," and US performers' unions must give their

approval to visa applications. Another obstacle for touring bands or artists is that they must apply for visas no sooner than 90 days before an event. Most tour dates are set up six, eight and even twelve months in advance.

As the deadline for public comment drew nearer and there hadn't been a public outcry from the sports and entertainment people, the recording industry kicked into gear. The ball carrier was Graham Henderson, a lawyer with McCarthy Tetrault. As the television cameras whirled and the flashbulbs popped, the quickly arranged panel of representatives from all sectors of the business, publicly laid out their concerns regarding the new visa rules. "It's ironic," began Brian Robertson, president of the Canadian Recording Industry Association

(CRIA), "that just as Canadians are being accused by the US of protecting their cultural industries, the US itself is guilty of dropping a cultural Iron Curtain across its borders."

Speaker after speaker condemned the arrogance of the US government, and these were heavies in the business like True North's Bernie Finkelstein and Vinnie Cinquemani of The Agency. As well, Margo Timmins of the Cowboy Junkies and Moe Berg of The Pursuit of Happiness voiced their concerns.

Unfortunately, the American Federation of Musicians (AFofM) was centred out as being one of the major supporters of the visa changes. Vic Bridgewater of the Toronto local of the AFofM took his accusers to task at the Sutton Place meeting, reminding them that it was through the AFofM that the availability of the former J1 Visa was made possible. He also pointed out that the AFofM's Alan Wood has been to Washington twice exerting his influence in having amendments made to the Bill.

There has obviously been a lack of information as to the action taken by the AFofM as the organization's Vice President Ray Petch reveals. "But I assure you," says Petch, "we have been on top of this for nearly a month." Of particular concern to Petch is the 25,000 annual limit on visa applications, the 90-day application limit and the provision that members of groups have to have been a member of that group for a year. "These things are ridiculous," says Petch, continuing with, "Now, some of them apply in total, some only partially, but our concerns have been heard. We are assured that amendments are going to be made in that area. We are assured that the AFofM as an entity will only support the Bill if these amendments, which would clear up the Canadian situation, are going to be installed."

Petch goes on to stress, "What we want to do is carry through so that the J1 Visa that has been working for us up to now, will continue to work in the same way under another name, and we think that's the way this is going to end up.

"Our people in the United States, because we are an international union, are saying 'We don't want any restrictions on Canadian members... that's the last thing we want. And we're not going to force through a Bill without you having input and we want to know what your reservations are before we move forward with the Department of Employees AFL/CIO who we have already talked to.' So I think we are in pretty good shape," he concludes.

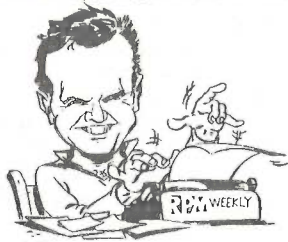
In spite of this assurance, it's expected, that the mouse will continue to roar, now that it has the ear of Washington. Tom Berry, president of Alert Records, recently signed a deal with Manhattan Records in the US for his artist Holly Cole (RPM - July 27/91). He echoes the concerns of many in Canada's independent field when he refers to the new US Visa rules as "a direct threat to how I make my living and how my artists make a living and what we do." Cole is the type of artist, like many, who needs the US marketplace and, conversely the US label's continuing support of Cole is based on her ability to tour the country. "This is a threat to my ability to take an unknown artist to America so that she can become a known artist. So, I not only fear for my own artists," concludes Berry, "but I particularly fear for future artists who haven't yet been signed."

The American market has long been important for Canadian artists. Without this lucrative market, many Canadian artists not be might not be able to survive. It's strictly a financial issue. Record companies would find it impossible to recoup recording costs for Canadian acts without the added support of the US marketplace. Tour support is a necessity for survival.

However, the Americans seem more obsessed with restricting the number of support workers, hairdressers, truck drivers, roadies, etc., and not the artistic end of the business. These were apparently the main items on the plate when it was first presented, but when there was no vocal opposition to restricting the performers, the Bill remained as it had been drafted. One observer noted that had the artistic groups challenged the Bill when it was first presented, there might not have been this down-to-the wire problem.

Whether by design or accident, the entertainment industry, notably the recording side of the business, gathered as one to challenge a major threat to their future. They displayed their anger and frustration with a foreign government that had drafted a law that could very well put their professional and artistic careers in jeopardy. Had there not been this show of solidarity which was carried nationally by all the TV networks, and by local radio and press, the controversial Bill might have become law. But it hasn't, and my guess is that it won't, certainly not as it is now drafted.

A real promoter that Joey Cee . . . ! You've got to hand it to Joey Cee . . . he's a real survivor. Joey has been a part of the Canadian entertainment business for a long, very long time. He is currently having much success with his latest endeavour, *Hot Spots*, a magazine that's even hotter with the dance clubs. Joey offered his clients and fans a Shmooz-Cruise on Lake Ontario early in June, a nice comfy promotion, and it was such a success, he had another one this past week aboard the *Empress Of Canada*. A great party, good food and lots of prizes and well organized by Joey and Derek Macrae. *(EC: Joey knows how to throw a party . . . !)*

Slash Puppet adamant on taking U.S. by storm

Slash Puppet have been together approximately three years and, in that short time, they've made quite an impression on the Canadian music scene. This independent hard rock band is now gearing towards a major recording deal with their sights set on a U.S. deal.

Comprised of singer Tony Dartanian, bassist Peet Dove, drummer Franklyn Wyles, and guitarists Lou Garscadden and Bart Bartoletti, they have proven themselves to be one of the stronger rock bands on the market. They were named Best Toronto Club Act at the 1990 Toronto Music Awards. Their independent demo cassette, *The Demo*, has now sold over 2,000 copies, primarily through word-of-mouth, and the track *Slowdown* has received impressive airplay on college radio throughout North America. The video to *Slowdown* is also becoming a club favourite. "I don't know how you can dance to *Slowdown*," chuckles Dartanian, "but they're doing it."

Dartanian and the band have recently been showcasing their talent in the hopes of landing that major deal. "Right now we're in the process of being looked at and showcased, which is probably the most difficult process to go through at this stage in the game. You're under a great deal of scrutiny when you've got these people coming out," Dartanian stresses, adding, "It's just a matter of time before someone comes up here and says 'I like these guys, let's do something with them'."

Being signed with Ray Danniels, President of SRO Management and Anthem Records, gives the band a very positive advantage. "We're very excited about Ray. He's got some great connections," confides Dartanian. No matter who eventually picks them up, Slash Puppet are firmed for release in Canada on Anthem and are gearing towards recording later this year. "We plan on being on Anthem with distribution by a major. It's worked for Rush," adds Dartanian.

Excited about the band's future, Dartanian is confident on making a dent in the American music scene. "Canadians tend to be trend-followers rather than trend-setters. It's about time we set some trends of our own instead of taking a back seat to the Americans. Let's start showing them how it's done!" concludes Dartanian.

Teapot tempest . . . ? As all that posturing was going on at the luxurious Sutton Place regarding music acts entering the US, there were many in the audience who knew that the new visa rules had been stalled until April of 1992. They also knew there was really little chance that the Bill would ever pass. The object of the exercise was really to show how difficult the US can be, and how good they are at putting up barriers. All this leads to the question of when will the matter of culture become part of free trade? *(EC: I still like the part about "business visas" for hockey teams like, the rest of us don't consider ourselves as being in a business . . . !)*

Broadcasters should walk softly . . . ! There are a few broadcasters who just might find themselves in difficulty if they move too quickly on September 1st. Not with the CRT, but with their listeners. *(EC: You mean radio might become interesting again . . . ?)*

South of the border . . . ! Forget Mexico! We just might see a major shift in command and location of a very big corporation. When the initial shock subsides, watch out for the after-shocks. We may not recognize the Canadian record industry in five years. *(EC: Hey! If things got really bad - we could join Quebec!)*

Quebec is for Quebecers . . . ! Well, that's what some Quebecers would have us believe. But watch for a movement, small to begin with, of Quebec recording artists, moving westward. You can sell a lot of records in Quebec, but you can sell millions more in the rest of the world, en anglais! *(EC: All it takes is one to make the move . . . !)*

More radio changes . . . ? Watch for some very drastic changes and cuts in radio, and it doesn't have to do with Sept. 1st. I heard about a radio time salesman, who had to unload his Porsche and his downtown, handy, away-from-home condo. *(EC: Life can be tough in the fast lane without a Porsche . . . !)*

It's tough when you're on top . . . ! Decisions, decisions, decisions . . . and no one to turn to. What do you do when you have a hit single and the rest of the album, which isn't even released doesn't come close in sound? Do you fire your producer, the second one, and they don't come cheap these days . . . or collar another to see if he can make the album more "poppy"? *(EC: Decisions, decisions, decisions . . . and who can he turn to!)*

Spice - pride of Barbados returns for 6th summer

Every summer, for the past six years, Canadian audiences have been enjoying the calypso/pop/reggae sounds of Barbados' most popular band, Spice And Company. They consider Canada to be like a second home.

They were first introduced to Canada by a friend of the band who invited them to play London's Western University. From there it became a snowball effect. In fact, Spice And Company are so well received in Canada that they won the COCA (Canadian Organization of Campus Activities) Award for top non-recording act in 1986. They were also named Band Of The Year in Barbados five years in a row before declining the nomination in 1990, "so they could give it to some other band trying to make a name for themselves," says lead vocalist/keyboardist Alan Sheppard.

Comprised of Sheppard, guitarist/vocalist Dean Straker, bassist Roger Foster, percussionist Michael 'Smasher' Cadogan, drummer Maxie Taylor and Andre 'Vine' Woodvine on woodwinds, the group has been together for fifteen years. Straker, who is the son of Emile Straker, leader of The Merry-men, founded the group with Sheppard and Foster while still in school.

He recalls, "It started off by Alan giving me a call and asking if I'd like to form a group. I said 'What do you play?'. He replied 'I don't play anything, I'm a singer' so I told him that was no good, that he had to play something. He said 'OK, I'll call you back'. He called me back saying 'I can play guitar now and I'm ready'."

They got together and what started out as a hobby has turned into a lifetime career. "There's nothing else we'd rather do, so we've stuck together," says Straker. "When you start that young," adds Sheppard, "you don't start the same way that someone who seriously studies music may start; going to university to study then replying to a newspaper ad for a position in a group because you want to be in a band and you know what the business is going to be like. When you're young like we were, we didn't have a clue what we were getting into. It was just a driving desire."

Having recorded their first album while still in their teens, they now have nine albums to their credit. As well, they've put a lot of time and energy into recording songs for various charities such as the Barbados Cancer Society (Sad Love), The Children's Development Centre (Nobody Can Hurt Me Now) and UNICEF (Give Them Freedom). They recently released *The First Fifteen*, a compilation of all their best numbers and plans are in the works for another album.

Spice And Company recently wound up two months of touring by performing at Toronto's Ontario Place Island Club for four nights. "I can't remember the last time we did more than one night at a venue in Canada, so this is nice for us," confides Straker.

They will be returning to Barbados shortly to rest for a few weeks after which they will set off on another hectic tour schedule of performances to the end of the year.

Ontario court judgement for Sunday retailer

Marty Herzog owner of Tunes, a Toronto (North York) record store, was charged a few months ago for opening his business on a Sunday. Under the laws of Ontario, cassettes and CD's are considered "hardware" and are not directly related to products used for educational, recreational or amusement purposes.

The Retail Business Holidays Act provides exemptions to retailers if: The number of persons engaged in the service of the public does not exceed three (3) at any time, and if the total area used for the serving of the public is less than 2,400 sq ft.

These laws wouldn't be so hard to accept, but in the same plaza where Herzog's store is located there is a drug store, a convenience store and a video store selling pre-recorded and blank cassettes and/or CD's. These stores have the right to sell these products on Sundays.

In the words of Herzog, "This law is blatantly unfair and biased. It is legal to purchase an X-rated video, but it is against the law to purchase the soundtrack to Walt Disney's *Bambi* on a Sunday from my store. By law, I do not provide product for education, recreation or amusement purposes."

RPM spoke with Herzog after he appeared in court on August 8, "Quite honestly," he says, "I expect the decision to be against me. The judge announced that if I were renting my products, I could legally stay open, but if I'm selling them I'm in violation of the law. So I asked, what about book stores? He looked at me and asked, 'Are book stores allowed to be open?'"

Doug Chappell, president of Virgin Records Canada, was asked to appear in court as an expert witness. After Chappell gave a brief history of his thirty years in the music industry, the judge asked "What business are you in?". Chappell was deemed not qualified as

an expert in the industry and was not allowed to speak.

"He (Herzog) is being harassed," says Chappell, "He's being jerked around by the justice system, if you can call it a justice system. Personally, I think they're all a bunch of jerks. They're going to keep hammering him, but Marty won't stop." Herzog himself admits that if he is found guilty, he won't pay any fines. "If our courts wish to jail me for trying to earn a living, then so be it," comments Herzog, "That's life in Ontario."

Herzog hasn't taken the judge's comments lightly. He has put in motion a plan to rent all his product on Sundays. The conditions of the rental, however may be slightly questionable. The rental agreement states that consumers can take possession of the product for a period of fifty years. If the product is not returned after this time, the consumer owes a total of one Canadian penny. "What's the definition of rent?," asks Herzog, "You take something for a given price and return it by a certain date or else you owe a pre-determined fee."

Herzog was to appear in court August 15 for the judge's decision.

As we go to press, it was learned that Marty Herzog was fined \$6,000 for selling music on Sundays. Provincial Court Judge Carter announced his final verdict, finding Herzog's Tunes Music Store guilty of conducting business on Sundays.

The fine of \$1,000.00 per conviction, with six convictions upheld; \$6,000.00 total.

Outside the courtroom, Herzog noted, "I found it very ironic, this same Judge let a drug dealer go free last week because of a technicality, and a man with a break and enter, and prior convictions, was fined \$150.00, the cost of repairing the window." He concludes with, "I'm guilty of letting people shop in my store and fined \$6,000.00

The list keeps growing . . . Bryan Adams' (Everything I Do) I Do It For You has once again increased its already massive lead over all other songs. Look for it to remain at the top for a couple more weeks at least. Over the past two weeks, I've posted some of the stations that have listed the song at No. 1, other stations to do so include: C-100 Halifax, CKOI Montreal, CFIX Chicoutimi, FM 93 Quebec City, Q-94 Winnipeg, CHCL Medley, and LG73 Vancouver.

Not much 'Love' in the 80's. The Boomers' Love You Too Much has the third highest entry on the Hit Tracks chart at No. 85. It brings to six the number of songs that begin with the word Love. Compare that to one year ago when there were no such songs. Only nine songs beginning with that word have ever reached No. 1, the last being Janet Jackson's Love Will Never Do (Without You) earlier this year. Name the song prior to that one to do it? Hint: you have to go all the way back to the dreaded year of 1979.

Remember the Four Lads? Maybe there just aren't many names left for bands any more. While looking over the chart of Toronto's CFNY, I noticed the following names for artists: Meat Puppets, Carter The Unstoppable Sex Machine, Ned's Atomic Dustbin, Smashing Pumpkins, New Fast Automatic Daffodils, and winner for best new name of 1991 . . . 1000 Homo DJ's!

Off and running . . . Although Metallica's self-titled album didn't have much time at retail this week, it still manages to debut at No. 18. With a full week on the racks, it seems likely to hit the Top Ten next week.

Tough at the top. The only change at the top of the Albums chart is a reversal of positions between Tom Petty and R.E.M. For the past three weeks, the same albums have held the Top Five spots. The Robin Hood soundtrack appears ready to crack into that area though as it bullets to No. 6.

Boys will be boyz. The only new entry on the Dance chart this week is Now That We Found Love from Heavy D & the Boyz. Now don't confuse it with any tracks from the Boyz In The Hood soundtrack or anything from Boyz II Men. Apparently, thiz iz the newz trend in the muzic buzzinezz!

You remember Disco? Before Janet Jackson's Love Will Never Do (Without You) did it earlier this year, the last song beginning with the word 'Love' to reach No. 1 was the Bee Gees' Love You Inside Out in June of 1979.

Power Hour. The band jokes, in their best Rutles impersonation, that part of their initial success is due to "our tight trousers."

Presently, the band is feeling very positive about their future but, as RPM found out in a recent interview with singer Harold 'Harry' Hess and guitarist Pete Lesperance, the members have had an impressive history. Joining Hess and Lesperance is bassist Mike Gionet and drummer Darren Smith. The quartet has been together for over three years with Hess being hailed as the founding member. Hess, in fact, was already a recording star when he met the other guys in the band. At seventeen he was a member of Blind Vengeance, which was signed to Attic Records. "You know how well we did because you've heard of us, right?" jokes Hess. "They went Cardboard," laughs Lesperance.

Lesperance has also been playing for years, having first hit the road at age fifteen to tour with a metal band, opening for Anvil. Gionet and Smith also have years of

France's famed Archaos to play Toronto's CNE

Archaos, the revolutionary theatre company from France, which claims to be a circus, but is a far cry from the conventional ringmaster, horses and clowns usually associated with the big top, will play Toronto's CNE Stadium.

Archaos replaces the norm with smashed cars, chainsaws, trucks, motorcycle stunts, corrugated metal armour and sparks.

The history of Archaos dates back to 1975, when a band of young circus performers grouped together to return to the original style of the circus. For eleven years they travelled, throughout France and Italy under the name of Circus Bidon. Twenty five horses pulled nine gypsy caravans from village to village. In a short period the cavalcade became one of the most popular circuses in Europe.

Eventually, time caught up with the troupe and they decided to bypass the present and move directly into the future. Caravans were changed to trailers and the name to Archaos Cirque De Caractere. The circus now boasts performers and crew from Europe, North Africa and Brazil.

Archaos has been described as "a sci-fi cyber-punk nightmare", "exhilaratingly bizarre", "entirely terrifying", "wildly amusing", "slightly dangerous", "separate and subversive strands of eighties youth culture", "Mad Max" and "not for the faint of heart".

Broken bones, fractures and sprains are common among Archaos performers. As a result, the show changes from night to night with the addition of new performers, most of whom come from the crew. Although no members have ever suffered fatal injuries during a performance, it was reported that a member of the audience in Marseilles, France suffered a fatal heart attack when a trapeze rigging collapsed in mid-act. Statistics prove that each member can expect at least three broken bones and multiple fractures in one season.

experience; Smith played with Hess in Blind Vengeance and Gionet paid his dues playing all types of formats, even polka. All four are multi-faceted musicians, as is evident on their debut.

From the moment the unit got together, they spent much of their time honing their writing skills as well as doing plenty of leg work performing in the clubs. In 1990, the band finished second overall in Q107's (Toronto) Homegrown contest. This led to negotiations with Warner Music Canada who signed them in December of that year. Ironically, Hess had been involved with Warner Music earlier in his career, as an employee in the warehouse. "I was only there a week," he laughs, "I couldn't get up that early in the morning."

The band spent approximately three months recording the album. The bed tracks were laid down at Toronto's Sounds Interchange and all the vocals and overdubs at Hess' home in Newcastle, Ontario. "I've got a twenty four track studio and it's actually in a cabin," boasts Hess, "so we saved ourselves a lot of money doing it that way." Hess and Lesperance co-produced the album with Kevin Doyle who has worked with Hall & Oates, Allannah Myles and Glenn Gould. "He was great," says Lesperance, "he really helped add a lot to the arrangements."

Hess, who considers himself a songwriter before anything else, admits to writing primarily love songs and says, "It's just something everyone can relate to. We try and do them as interestingly as we can and in the best that we can present them, but they're basically love songs." The guys collaborated with some heavyweight writers for this project, namely Christopher Ward, Dean McTaggart (The Arrows) and Ray Coburn (keyboardist for Honeymoon Suite), who also played keyboards on the session.

Warner Music has expressed very high hopes for this band and is 100 percent behind them, which is, as Hess says, "the main reason we went with Warner. They were so excited about the project. That's the most important thing about putting out a record; getting it somewhere after that. They're a great label and they haven't forced their opinions on us at all. We did the record we wanted. They've been really cool about everything."

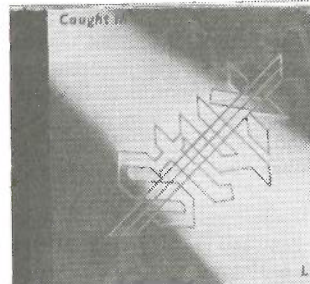

Caught In The Act contains 14 of the band's biggest hits ranging from 1975 to 1984, including *Suite Madame Blue*, *Crystal Ball*, *Miss America*, *Come Sail Away*, *Babe*, *Too Much Time On My Hands*, *Don't Let It End*, *Mr. Roboto* and *Music Time*. This double CD was recorded live at the Paradise Theatre in New Orleans and produced and arranged by Styx. Tommy Shaw, Dennis DeYoung, James Young, Chuck Panozzo and John Panozzo put on an impressive performance. A definite must for fans. (CD reviewed) - JL

DUTCH MASON - Blues
I'm Back

Truro's Dutch Mason, the king of Maritime Blues, but probably better known as Prime Minister of the Blues, has returned and he's ready to tour the nation with his unique brand of entertainment. This Bruce Greenaway production, the first from Mason in nine years, is just a sampling of the vocal talent this unique blues performer is capable of. Much has happened to

Mason through his seven album career and he wears the experience well with this new album. He borrows from some of the top blues tunesmiths to lyrically slate his perfected interpretation from Albert King, Albert Collins, and songs associated with Bobby Blue Bland, Sonny Boy Williamson and Little Walter. Key are *Who Do You Love*, a Willie Dixon classic, and *Trouble And Me*, from Toronto keyboardist/writer Melwood Cutlery. Also key, and apropos to Mason's past link with the bottle, *I Ain't Drunk (I'm Just Drinkin')*, but don't overlook the title track, which says it all. (cassette reviewed) - WG

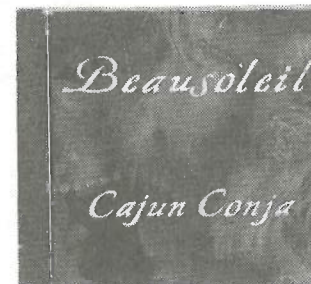


ART BERGMANN -Rock

For too long this Vancouver artist has been compared to the likes of Iggy Pop and Bowie. This latest release from Bergmann will easily convince listeners that he is very much a unique artist that has enormous potential. His music is at times brooding and often textured with elements of punk, even alternative garage rock. The first single, however, is a fairly boppy number, entitled *Faithlessly Yours*, that has surfaced on RPM's CanCon chart. The album was recorded at Toronto's Manta Sound and produced by Chris Wardman. Cajun music is finally out of the closet, thanks to Beausoleil perhaps the greatest moving force for this highly energized music form. Michael Doucet, founder of the band, co-produced the album with Carter All Tharp. Doucet has



shifted the band away from electric guitars and rock 'n roll, coming full circle to its more traditional sound, "but it's a live tradition," says Doucet, "We don't want to be known as a band that never changes. This is living music, and this record reflects that. We use original ideas but it all touches on the psyche of

our people, the Acadians." The proof of what he says is illustrated here, twelve times. By the way, that's Beausoleil backing Mary-Chapin Carpenter on her current charter, *Down At The Twist & Shout*. Although all tracks are key, *Conja* (New Orleans 1786), *Cajun Telephone Stomp*, *Clifton's Night* and *Tasso/McGee's Reel* are power-packed tracks. This album should be front-racked, and given priority play. Guaranteed to attract customers and listeners. (CD reviewed) - WG

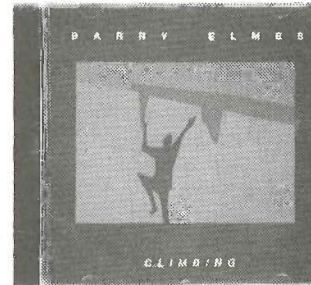
TAJ MAHAL -Country/Blues

Mule Bone is currently running on Broadway, a 1930 collaboration between poet Langston Hughes and folklorist/novelist Zora Neale Hurston. Rather than use old blues standards, Taj Mahal, who has been on the leading edge of black folk and roots music for more than 30 years, was commissioned to put together the music for a '90s approach. His only restriction; to accompany and augment the poetry of poet Hughes. Mahal obviously took more than a little creative licence, fusing his own brand of soul into a musical blues picture that is funked up with reggae, bluegrass, rock and folk. Mahal wrote ten tracks that serve as integral parts of the play, but also stand alone as accessible originals. Six of the tracks conform with the lyrics as set down by Hughes. Of particular interest is *Shake That Thing*, a blues standard from the twenties written by "Poppa" Charlie Jackson. Also key are *Me And The Mule*, *Bound No'th Blues* and *Graveyard Mule*. THE FABULOUS THUNDERBIRDS

Jimmy Vaughn may be gone but that hasn't stopped The Fabulous Thunderbirds from rockin' the house one bit. This is their fourth album for Epic and it is quite simply an amazing album. Vaughn is replaced on this album by two guitarists, Duke Robillard and Kid Bangham, who fill out the tunes while bringing their distinct styles to the already potent T-Bird sound. This album has something for everyone, from bopping shuffles and funky grooves to dirty Texas blues numbers. The production kudos go to Steve Jordan who also adds guitar, percussion and backing vocals. *Twist Of The Knife*, the opening number and first single, is a gritty, cool track that is bound to do well at AOR with crossover potential for CHR. *Born To Love You* is sublime while *Sweet Thang* and *Work Together* are also quite noteworthy. BARRY ELMES - Jazz
Climbing

The most important ingredient for a jazz recording is experience, and although Elmes is still comparatively new (early eighties) he has obviously acquired an inner feel for this much maligned music form. Elmes has the *creme de la creme* of Canadian jazz sitting in on his production which he recorded at Toronto's Jazz Partners Studio. This is straight ahead, simply layered and purely entertaining jazz. Elmes and his players don't wander into the unknown, which adds to the album's appeal. Elmes sheer writing genius aside, the album will gain its major thrust through the professionalism of the session players; Ed Bickert (guitar), Alex Dean (flute), Terry Lukiwski (trombone), Mike Murley (saxophones), Kevin Turcotte (trumpet, flugelhorn), Jim Vivian (bass), Steve Wallace (bass), and Gary Williamson (piano). Elmes gained much of his knowledge by performing with Dizzy Gillespie, The Mike Murley Quartet, The Moe Koffman Quintet as well as co-leading Time Warp since its inception. Key are *Fat Cat*, *The New Shim Sham Shimmy* and *Leviathan*. Also impressive is the 1990 Suite. (CD reviewed) - WG



METALLICA - Metal
Metallica

This is a surprise. Put away all of your pre-conceptions and ideas of what this album sounds like. The self-titled fifth album from Metallica is something new. James Hetfield, Kirk Hammett, Lars Ulrich and Jason Newsted have released a collection of mild thrash songs including a couple ballads, *The Unforgiven* and *Nothing Else Matters*. Of course, the trademark Metallica sound is still present in *Of Wolf And Man* and *Through The Never*. Produced by Bob Rock in *One On One Recording* in L.A., Metallica shipped over 100 000 copies in Canada upon release. The first single, *Enter Sandman* has already received impressive airplay. Watch out for *Nothing Else Matters* and *Sad But True*. (CD reviewed) - JL

CRTC ruling sparks fear among jazz enthusiasts

Effective September 1st, 1991, radio broadcasters will no longer be required to program specialized music formats presently required under their Promise Of Performance commitment. Jazz, classical, folk, blues, new age, spoken word, among others, fell under the CRTC's Category 6 which dealt with specialized programming. Only FM stations will be affected by the CRTC's new regulations which replaces Category 6 with Category 3. Depending on the individual station's licence it will be possible for many stations to eliminate block programming at their own discretion.

Quality's TV package covers rock to country

The August release of seven TV targeted sales packages from Quality Special Products covers a wide variety of country, pop, dance and rock titles. The release is timely in view of the increased interest in catalogue type product, which is made easy by Quality through its special television campaign.

There are three albums for the pop/easy listening field; The Wedding Album contains tracks by Anne Murray (Could I Have This Dance), Joey Gregorash (Together - The New Wedding Song), Linda Ronstadt (All My Life, featuring Aaron Neville), and Sheriff (When I'm With You); Crooners, with an impressive lineup of the old standard bearers including Tony Bennett (I Left My Heart In San Francisco), Perry Como (It's Impossible), Andy Williams (Days Of Wine And Roses), and Al Martino (Spanish Eyes); and keyboardist Richard Clayderman's From Me To You, which includes The Love Songs of Andrew Lloyd Webber, plus several memorable oldies including Strangers In The Night, When A Man Loves A Woman and Nights In White Satin.

Heart Of The Country - Volume 5, contains three Cancon hits, Joan Kennedy's The Trouble With Love, Patricia Conroy's Take Me With You and Watch Love Grow Strong by Rita MacNeil. Also included are Carlene Carter's I Fell In Love and Good Times by Dan Seals. The other country offering, Born To Boogie - Vol. 4 contains Billy Dean's Holed Up In Some Honky Tonk, Ricky Van Shelton's Hole In My Pocket, Mark Chestnut's Brother Jukebox, and Highway 101's Someone Else's Trouble Now.

For the dance market, Dance Mix '91 features the Cancon 12" club mix of The World Just Keeps On Turning by Candi And The Backbeat, along with M.C. Hammer's 7" mix of Pray, Vanilla Ice's club mix of Ice Ice Baby and Enigma's album version of Sadness.

A good representation of Canadian rockers (seven out of sixteen tracks) are contained on Rock Trax; I Think I Love You Too Much by The Jeff Healey Band, Gowan's Lost Brotherhood, T Is For Trouble by Colin James, Two Girls In One by Pursuit Of Happiness, Haywire's Taken The Pain, Jack De Keyzer's That's The Way, and Life Could Be Worse by Barney Bentall & The Legendary Hearts. Also included are Poison's Something To Believe In and Bad Company's Holy Water.

Essentially, what this amounts to is that stations will no longer have to support such alternative formats as jazz music, which has given industry people cause to worry. It boils down to dollars and cents and alternative radio isn't thought of as a big draw.

Bill King, a Toronto area writer, on-air personality and musician, recently expressed concern over the matter. His syndicated program, The Jazz Report, has been dropped from all but one of the sixteen radio stations on which it was featured, the exception being CKFM in Toronto. "Nobody likes to be told what to play," says King, "and I sympathize with programmers. It's a log jam on both sides but I think it's a shame that this type of format (jazz) will suffer the most." He adds, "That time on radio is gone." King's show was on the air for over two years, and for that he says he's very thankful. "I cry no sour grapes. They've been great to me for two and a half years." He does, however, point blame at the record companies, asking, "Where have they been?"

These types of programs have been very beneficial in exposing many artists, both Canadian and foreign, to Canadian audiences. King feels it will be the artists who will suffer the most.

Peter Budge, of the jazz/new age label, Mesa/Blue Moon, couldn't agree more. "I

Jewish Jazz to showcase in Volgograd, U.S.S.R.

Toronto's The Flying Bulgar Klezmer Band have been invited to perform at The First Volgograd International Theatre Festival, which takes place in September of this year in Volgograd, (U.S.S.R.).

Also, these purveyors of jumpin' Jewish roots music will be performing in England, Holland and Switerland in the fall before making their way back to Toronto. On October 31st, they will showcase at the Ontario Contact, which is organized by The Ontario Arts Council at The Ryerson Theatre for concert programmers from around Ontario and Canada.

For those unfamiliar with Klezmer, it is Jewish roots music, also called Jewish Jazz, and is known for its pulsating rhythms, beautiful melodies and wild improvisations. It is festive music that is often associated with weddings and bar mitzvahs. Its origins are Eastern European, concentrated geographically from Moldavia through Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey. Also influenced by roots music of non-Jewish populations, Klezmer made its way to North America with the waves of Jewish immigration in the early part of the century where it was further influenced by African-American jazz music.

The Flying Bulgar Klezmer Band started in '87 simply to play at a friend's wedding and have been going strong ever since. The band consists of David Buchbinder (trumpets, arranger, band-leader), Anne Lederman (violin), Martin Van De Ven (clarinets), Laura Cesar (bass), Allan Merovitz (vocals, percussion), John Lennard (drums) and Evelyne Datl (piano, accordion).

don't think it's a good idea that these stations are doing this in a knee-jerk reaction," Budge told RPM. "Jazz artists, God love 'em, work harder and travel harder and have spent more years trying to get recognition than the 'big-haired bands' that are instant stars overnight. Now they have nowhere to go and I'll tell you, they'll go to the States," Budge assures.

Lloyd Nishimura, Manager, Music & Tape Division, Denon Canada Inc., has already been told by some radio programmers not to bother servicing them with his jazz product. What worries him is a possible snowball effect. "Stations that may have considered keeping their jazz shows will see that other stations are dropping theirs and they'll do the same," he says. "The problem," he continues, "is that the alternative music industry is a weak industry at best. For example, with the jazz industry there are only a certain number of radio stations that support jazz music. But at the same time, people are able to make some a living and they're able to make records because there is some sort of radio outlet for them. Sure, it was all ghettoized to Sunday mornings or evenings, but now they're eliminating all that, too. Without a regular outlet for this type of music, you're missing one of the key components of the industry."

Take away one of the older forms of popular music, and you may be taking away people's livelihoods warns Nishimura. "You've got people who've put their own money into recording and there are record companies that will distribute the product and retailers who will sell it. If we have radio stations that refuse to play any of it, well, the entire industry is at risk," he says.

Jazz music will now fall under Category 2 and 3 in the CRTC's new regulations. Category 2 only considers two styles of jazz; rock jazz and jazz in a pop format, for example Kenny G. Traditional jazz, Dixieland and swing fall under Category 3 but not all stations will be required to commit to this category come September 1st.

It remains to be seen as to what will happen to specialized formats but there's no doubt radio in Canada is gearing towards massive change, both good and bad. "The role of the CRTC is to make sure the public is well-served by the radio stations. By de-regulating the radio stations, it may be good for some of the stations, but it's not necessarily a good thing for the Canadian public," concludes Nishimura. "I just hope programmers will program for their communities and their listeners and not for their wallets," adds Budge.

CFRB flagship station for Canada Cup Hockey

Toronto's CFRB will be the flagship station for the coast-to-coast radio broadcast of the Canada Cup Hockey Games. The station's Ron Hewat, who has done play-by-play for Cnaada Cup since the inception of the games in 1976, will resume his familiar role. CFRB's Sports Director, Bill Stephenson will host the broadcasts with former Maple Leaf Captain Darryl Sittler who will act as colour commentator.

The games will run from Aug. 31 through Sept. 18.

Weird's current category for Canadian recordings expands to 25 from 14. "There is some truly exciting growth taking place in our area of country music," says Weird, concluding with, "a growth that is most assuredly welcomed by all of us who care about where the music is taking us."

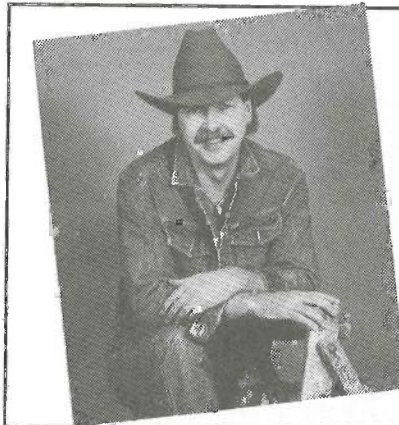

Dick Damron will be inducted into the Alberta Country Music Hall of Fame at the August 25th proceedings.

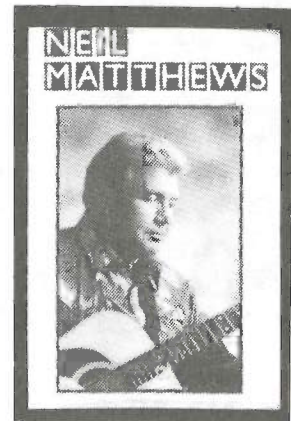

Native rockers Kashtin firm second album release

Florent Volland and Claude McKenzie, better known as Kashtin, are currently preparing their second album which is geared to a fall release. Their self-titled debut album is still active with over 200,000 units sold worldwide to date.

Kashtin, which is the Innu word for tornado, hail from an Indian reserve near Sept-Îles, Quebec and sing in their native language, Innu. This is the language spoken by approximately 10,000 people in the world; the surviving members of the Montagnais nation.

Friends for over ten years, the two met while playing cover songs in separate bands around their reserve. McKenzie came to see Volland play at a gymnasium and, after the show, he was asked to join the band as the bass player. They performed together in the band for two years until internal disagreements brought an end to the group. "There were too many chiefs and not enough Indians," jokes Volland.

McKenzie went off to Montreal for a short period of time, but a year later returned to the reserve where he hooked up with Volland. They decided to form a new group and Kashtin was born.

Gradually, their songs moved from being performed in English and French to Innu, their native tongue. The pair then released a tape, "for friends and family" says Volland, that eventually began selling at their shows at various reserves. This led to interest from outside the reserves, interest that at first intimidated Kashtin. "We were happy with the way things were going. We had been the kings of the native tours and were quite happy just playing to friends. We were afraid to get bigger and leave our families and our good times," says Volland.

After being featured on a television documentary about native reserves, Kashtin was approached about a recording deal and, after taking some time to think about it, decided "OK, maybe it's time." It appears they made the right choice as they are now making their living by performing. "I don't want to say it's a job," says Volland, "but if it is a job, it's a real good one." Signed to the Trans-Canada label, they have performed all across Canada and much of Europe to rave reviews. In three short months following their first release, they had sold over 100,000 copies. "Our people love our album and are very proud of us," boasts Volland.

More recently, Kashtin performed at the 16th Annual Festival Of Friends, in Hamilton.

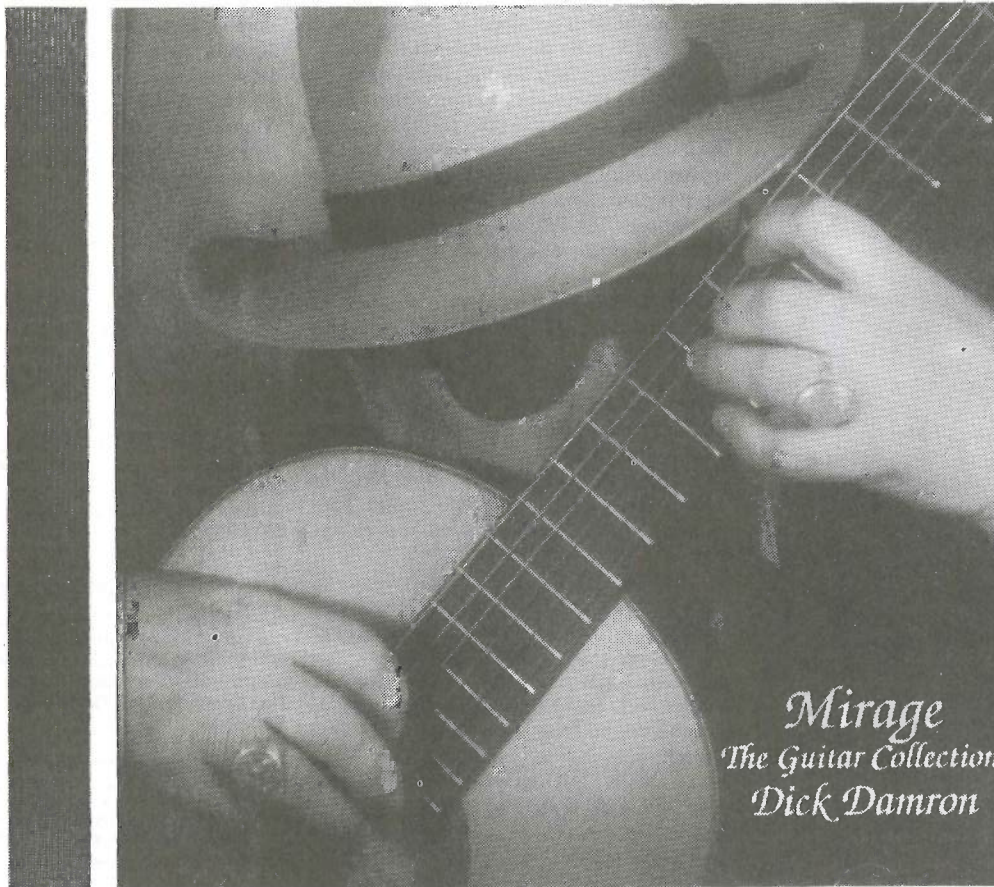
