Williams replaces Rivera in Spider Woman

Garth Drabinsky, the chairman of Livent Inc., announced that Vanessa Williams has been signed on to replace Chita Rivera in the role of Spider Woman/Aurora in the Broadway production on Kiss Of The Spider Woman.

Rivera will take a break from the role she has played for the last two years in London, Toronto and New York.

Williams, a six-time Grammy nominee, has released two albums on the Mercury label, The Right Stuff and The Comfort Zone. The latter contained the hit song Save The Best For Last, which reached No. 1 on the RPM Hit Tracks chart (May 2/92).

Kiss Of The Spider Woman co-stars Jeff Hyslop and Brian Mitchell, and is directed by Harold Prince. The Broadway production received Best Musical of 1993 honours from the Tony Awards, the New York Drama Critics' Circle, and the Drama Desk. 7. The luncheon, in effect, became a listening session for Drabinsky's latest project, a cast recording of Show Boat.

The release is being billed as one of the most expensive projects in the history of Canadian recording. Of the \$500,000 laid out for the session, an estimated \$300,000 went to salaries.

The album, which was produced by Drabinsky and Martin Levan, is released on Livent's new label, Livent Music. The label was established for the purpose of the release which is being distributed by Quality Music & Video, and will serve as the label for any subsequent releases by Livent productions.

The album features the voices of 63 members of the original cast currently performing at the North York Performing Arts Centre in Toronto. Included are stars Robert Morse, Elaine Stritch, Lonette McKee, Rebecca Luker, Mark Jacoby and Michel Bell.

The more-than 74 minutes of music on the album includes some of the musical's most popular songs written by Jerome Kern: Ole' Man River, Can't Help Lovin' Dat Man, Bill, Make Believe, After The Ball, Why Do I Love You, and You Are Love.

The recording also showcases the new contemporary orchestral arrangements created for the production by William David Brohn, as well as the new dance music and underscoring arranged by David Krane.

Quality expects to ship platinum (100,000 units) on the official launch date of March 22.

RPM introduces the Ultimate Cancon logo

In celebration of the 30th Anniversary of RPM Weekly, RPM has commissioned Stan Klees to create a new standard for Cancon as we approach the 21st century. Below is a reproduction of the Ultimate Cancon logo. This logo will be made available to the industry in weeks to come and will signify a new level of Cancon.

The logo is designed so as to reduce and



reproduce on label copies of compact discs that qualify, and on liner notes of compact discs that qualify.



To radio stations and record stores, this logo will indicate that all four criteria of the MAPL system have been met and the record is 100% Canadian content.

Like the MAPL logo, this new symbol of Cancon is owned by the creator, Stan Klees, and can only be used with the permission of the owner. Details regarding the procedure required for use of the logo will be announced in RPM in the weeks to come.

More seats available for Miss Saigon's Toronto run

Having broken records performing to more than 700,000 patrons in 10 months, Miss Saigon, now playing Toronto's Princess of Wales Theatre, is offering more low price seats to an even larger audience.

Ed Mirvish, head of Toronto's Mirvish Productions, points out that because the production recouped its original investment of \$12 million in only 23 weeks, "most musicals take far longer -- we are now able to make a special offer."

Effective immediately and running through to June 2, 1994, there are now more than 600 choice seats available in the orchestra

and first balcony for only \$25 and \$48 for each of the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evening shows and the Wednesday matinee. The theatre is dark on Mondays.

"With these new ticket prices, we are opening up the show to many more thousands of audience members, who may not have been able to attend before.

"It's also our way of ensuring that great popular theatre is brought within the price range of as wide a public as possible. We hope to bring new audiences to the theatre who have never before seen a live show. They are the theatre's future."



Eating out in Toronto . . . ! As he did last year, Stan Klees has come up with a guide to Toronto's upscale restaurants. Here it is. In town for the Junos? While you're here, you should do some dining in the posh places. Last year I recommended a few of the trendy spots and received a lot of plaudits. Here is an updated list and it has changed. Still topping the list is Centro. In a very tough business, this restaurant still seems to lead the rest, and it isn't just the food. The place attracts many of the visiting celebrities, and people from coast to coast know about it. A bit expensive, but worth the treat. Book way ahead and ask for table 26. It's usually occupied, but it makes them aware that you know something. North 44 is in second place, but with some people it's a toss-up between Centro and N44. Still pricey, but sports, movie and record people like it. The table is No. 30. Usually booked weeks ahead, but it's worth a long distance

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call to grab a table in this posh eatery. It's favoured by basketball notables. (WG: Yah!!! What does that mean . . . ?) Number 3 is Splendido. Tom Cruise eats there. Number 4 is Acrobat. If you like trendy people, it attracts the fashion crowd. Better to eat than drink. Number 5 is Il Posto in Hazelton Lanes. This restaurant is slowly growing in popularity with record and showbiz people. Cibo has closed since the last Junos. It remains for rent. What a shame. A victim of high rent . . . it was the gathering place for many of the stars who came to Toronto. Here's a list of the five above. Use my name. It may have some clout!!!

5. Il Posto 416-968-0469

It's quite an experience to have lunch or dinner at the Top Of Toronto dining room in the CN Tower, even if you only sit and look at the city laid out below. Do you believe that dinner there is more expensive than at Centro? On Sunday afternoon, take a walk north on Yonge Street from Eglinton. It has become the trendier part of town with nice shops and restaurants. Walk up to Roots or Collegiate Sports. A great shopping area. Youreally should write a weekly column. Who could do it better? (EC: Hand me the phone book...!)

Rejuvenated . . . ? While many in his company, and a few outside, had written off the old war horse . . . seems he emerged recently as a big winner with his fellow employees, minus an obvious one who could use a little industry tutoring. Meanwhile, the ivory tower continues to overlook someone whose years of experience makes him a great asset to his company. Unfortunately, too many companies take dedicated employees for granted, and often bring in newer, younger people, who don't have the knowledge nor the professionalism. Never write off an old war horse. You can't buy experience! (EC: Buying inexperience can be costly . . .!)

Edwins of Bloor Street...? What's going on? Is it true that the famous Honest Ed's emporium is going classy with a snooty name change? Has the news finally come down from Buckingham Palace that our Honest Ed is being considered for knighthood? Would Edwins of Bloor Street fit better into the Queen's language? Come on Ed! You've never been known to hold back any secrets from the press. Spill the beans. (EC: Will that now-famous orange crate bear the insignia of the Royal Arms...?)

We've got his number . . . ! GD has been crowing about slagging information to the underarm press. He didn't have much of a career as a writer anyway, so this is just another step down. He's hurting for recognition so badly, he'll probably include it on his resumé. (EC: As the worm turns . . .!)

Penny Lang was superb ...! Had a chance to sit in on a set of Penny Lang at Toronto's Ultrasound Showbar the other night.

In spite of the din from the back-of-the-room-yahooassholes, who get drunk on each other's farts, Penny and son Jason, put on an incredibly fine-tuned and warm performance. By the way, Jason is an exceptional guitarist, who barely manages to keep up with his dynamic mom. He's got a great teacher, not to mention future. (EC: Yahooassholes...yahoo...!)

Even as we announce the new Ultimate Cancon logo, the industry is already embracing this symbol of Canadianism with open arms. Many feel that those labels that have gone to the trouble of making all the parts Cancon should have an advantage over some of the expatriated parts. It could lead to a stronger industry. The CRTC seems to feel that the ruling that came into effect in 1970 will remain the same forever. (EC: I bet it will get 100 per cent support . . .!)

Here's your hat . . . ! What's your hurry? Seems a morning co-host, who made her partner look good (she has hair), but not sound better, bowed off the air, never to return to that particular station. Is there a story there? Does stress enter the picture? Who's next? (EC: Behind every successful guy . . .!)

Gotcha by the short ones ...! A fairly important cog in a very large wheel has apparently booked off sick, but has been seen cozying up to execs from some other large wheels. Looking for another job? Well, if someone books off sick from this particular wheel, they have 15 weeks to heal or get out. (EC: Wow! That's a hot one ...!)

Fart as a word ...! Just in case you thought the word fart was vulgar, which it is, it's such a well-used word, that the Oxford Dictionary offers this: "fart v. (vulgar) to send out wind through the anus." Now that's gross. (EC: Phew! You had me worried ...!!!

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Is There Room For AAA radio in Canada?

A format that has been coined triple A, AAA, or A-to-the-power-of-three, meaning Album Adult Alternative, is currently making waves in radio markets in America. The new format is becoming one of that country's hottest formats for programmers, advertisers, and listeners alike.

As Canada is a nation receptive to many ideas from our southern neighbours, there have been early rumblings that this format may make its way into this country. But, there are some outstanding questions relating to whether or not triple A can fly here.

For one, is this new, untried format even worth considering for our smaller Canadian markets? Would it be commercially viable? Are there presently gaps in the small and large radio markets that need to be filled? It seems triple A in the States is generating a bit of discussion as to what the needs of radio are, an issue that could very well translate up here.

After having talked to a cross-section of

record company heads, the indication is that there is a glut of like-minded radio in certain Canadian markets. David Freeman, vice-president of marketing for PolyGram, recently returned from a stint in Nashville, and had these issues fresh in his mind.

"One of the radio stations I spent some time listening to there was a triple A station called Lightning 100. It adheres to the principal that a lot of people who grew up on, for lack of a better word, alternative radio, follow, and that is, learn by experimentation. It was refreshing to hear Lightning's variety and diversity."

As one with immediate experience in a triple A format, Freeman's comment hints that there is a demographic that is not being served by today's stations. But, what exactly is this lauded triple A format?

Opinions differ on this one. According to Attic Records' president Al Mair, "on triple A there's not one format that's prescribed and everybody adheres to its rules and regulations. There are variations on the triple A curve, but they all fit into the category of stations trying to do new and exciting things."

Nat Merenda, director of national promotions at Sony Music Canada, concurs. "It's an aggressive pop adult station. It seems to be an eclectic format. It's a progressive format with a very pro-active audience, as opposed to a reactive one."

However, Randy Stark, vice-president of marketing and promotion, domestic and international division at Warner Music Canada, has a slightly different take on triple A. "It's a categorization for the Americans of something they can't categorize."

Stark offers a format precedent from a few years back that didn't fly the way some thought it might. "There was a format called EOR-Eclectic Oriented Rock. That was born out of San Francisco as well. I think this is a more palatable categorization of what that was."

When asked what happened to EOR, Stark notes with a sly tone that "I guess Old McDonald didn't have room for it on his farm."

However, triple A is differentiated from the EOR format, and, from a record company perspective, there are certain advantages to it.

"There's an opportunity," says Freeman, "for a record company to expose more of its repertoire that's left of centre. "

"It may be a good starting point," says Merenda. "It's an exciting mix. They're pushing what's current rather than what's retro."

Indeed, by looking at some of the tracking sheets of triple A stations, this holds true. Artists such as Bruce Cockburn, new songs by Mae Moore and Sam Phillips, and Tori Amos and Richard Thompson are aired in this format.

However, this raises the question of the position of large and small market radio stations in Canada on a general level.

According to Freeman, "if I used the Nashville station as my point of reference, I wouldn't say there are any Canadian stations that are even close to what Lightning 100 is doing. If you look at some of the CAR and CHR stations across the country, some of them are sharing up to 80% of playlists. In a saturated radio market, you wonder why one of those stations wouldn't want to distinguish itself."

This sentiment is felt by the other executives. "I look in Toronto at the majority of stations chasing the same demographic, and something's gotta break," says Mair. "There's only so many buyers."

Buyers is the primary demographic this kind of station could be chasing in Canada. As the main thrust of the industry these days seems to be album sales, it appears as if an

album adult format might be most suitable for the industry's, and by extension, the listener's, needs.

As well, if triple A continues to sail in the US as a foreground radio station, it would benefit not only the record companies and advertisers, but programmers, artists, and listeners.

Stark posed this hypothetical question: "Do I think a network of stations could make an impact playing newer music? Absolutely. When I see Tori Amos selling 50,000 copies without airplay, it kind of screams out for a need."

Freeman echoes this sentiment when he relays the story of his visit to the only Tower



Records store in Nashville. "Seeing what was front-racked there and what was selling, no doubt the radio station has an influence on selling records. I can't be too specific, but it seems to have, at least superficially, an impact."

While there were some variations on triple A in Canada from the past, such as CHEZ in Ottawa, KICK in Calgary and CFMI in Vancouver, this new format seems to have ironed out the wrinkles of the older EOR experiments, at least stateside. But Freeman has the last word.

"Is there room for triple A to slide in? That's a very good question, and it's probably more worth asking radio programmers than record companies. For my own purposes, I say, if there's a radio station in markets like Calgary or Vancouver that programs a high percentage of repertoire that gets absolutely no exposure anywhere else, then I'm all for it. But whether you could actually generate the kind of revenue necessary, that's for the programmers to figure out."



John McDermott Danny Boy'd himself into stardom

At 37 years of age, John McDermott is living proof there are no age barriers in getting into the recording business, although he may be one of the few exceptions.

McDermott came to Canada from his Co-op home on Nitts Hill in Glasgow at age 9. He inherited his vocal gift from his parents,

fondly recalling that his father would quite often offer a bag of candies to his five sisters and himselfifthey each sang a song before they went to bed.

McDermott was brought up on a steady diet of some of the world's top tenors, including Kenneth MacKellar and John McCormack. Danny Boy was one of his favourites, which he would launch into, a cappella, at the drop of a hat.

Ironically,

performing for family and friends became just a hobby for the young McDermott. He was mainly concerned with stabilizing himself in the workforce so that he could eventually marry, settle down and have children.

Fortunately his parents 50th wedding anniversary became a date of much celebration in the McDermott family. What better way to express his appreciation for his parents than to record an album of their favourite songs. At that time he was working in the circulation department of the Toronto Sun, and became quite popular with management and staff. He was asked to perform at a birthday party in 1987 at the Hot Stove Lounge of Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens for Harold Ballard and King Clancy. His performance of Danny Boy, of course, brought the house down and prompted Conrad Black, who was associated with the Sun at that time, to offer to finance his album.

McDermott was also asked to audition for singing the national anthem at the Gardens, which he did and has since become a regular.

McDermott titled his album Danny Boy and had World Records package it up for him. This was a high in his life. At age 35 he was finally in the record business and he began shopping his album, sending tapes to all the majors. For those who took the time to respond, the concensus was that there was no market for his kind of music.

Just as he was about to give up in frustration, EMI Music Canada president Deane Cameron came through. "I like your record John. Let's sit down and talk about it." McDermott gave EMI the finished product and his career was launched on the prestigious Angel/EMI label, a three-year, five-album deal. Danny Boy has not only sold more than 100,000 copies in Canada, but has achieved platinum sales in Australia, and the UK, and is triple platinum in New Zealand.

Interestingly enough, it was the battle of two Canadians in New Zealand, with McDermott knocking Bryan Adams off the No. 1 position.

Much of McDermott's sales in Canada were achieved without the help of radio. Outside of the CBC, most radio programmers didn't know where to slot McDermott's music. He did however, gain RPM AC chart action

with The Sun Is Burning, his first single.

The factor in the buying spree for McDermott's album however, is the material, which appeals to a demographic that has never been properly addressed. A large portion of Canada's population is made up of founding families who, for the most part came from England, Ireland and Scotland. McDermott's song material on Danny Boy is timeless, from

Yon Bonnie Banks and Auld Lang Syne to And The Band Played Waltzing Matilda and Eric Bogle's penning of Green Fields Of France.

With Danny Boy now an integral part of Angel/EMI Music's catalogue, a new album, Old Friends, was launched. The album was produced by McDermott and Bobby Edwards and recorded at Toronto's Sounds Interchange.

Since the release of Danny Boy, McDermott has a fan club of sorts in place. "I received a lot of mail from fans. Many of them suggested songs for my new album."

He recalls a meeting after his Ottawa date with Jean Critchlow, who was confined to a wheelchair. She had waited in the theatre for two hours after his show to chat with him. "It was really a touching moment. She told me how much Mother Machree meant to her, and how spiritually uplifting it was."

McDermott was so taken with her request that he included Mother Machree on the album, dedicating it to his patient admirer. Other fan favourites included on the album are: Amazing Grace, Ye Banks And Braes of Bonnie Doon, My Love Is Like A Red Red Rose, and The Skye Boat Song. One Last Cold Kiss, written by Gail Collins, has been taken as the first focus track from the album.

Now that McDermott is in the second phase of his career, he remains optimistic about his future. With a platinum plus album under his belt and with increased popularity at the concert level and a new album now falling neatly into its own pigeon-hole at retail, there is reason for optimism.

In his last interview in RPM (Jan. 26/93), McDermott wisely pointed out: "People have yet to put a name to the face. But there's no shelf life to this material. I think when people put a face to a name and they learn a little bit more about me, it will help."

It would appear a significant number of record buyers have put a name to the face. McDermott's new album is being front-racked

at major record chains, and dates for a new concert tour are quickly filling in. He is scheduled for a combined concert and promotion tour of the west coast, the prairies and the east coast which will take him through to May. He is then off for a tour of New Zealand and Australia which will coincide with the release of his new album.

Like Danny Boy, there is no shelf life to Old Friends.

High-flying Crows! It took Bruce Springsteen almost 20 years to have a No. 1 song in Canada. It didn't take Counting Crows quite as long. With its very first charted song in this country, The Crows' Mr. Jones edges out Streets Of Philadelphia. The song hits the top in its ninth week. Actually, the top four songs all entered the chart nine weeks ago.

Look up in the sky. The Counting Crows isn't the first band with a type of bird in its name to hit No. 1. Two other bands share that distinction. Name them. Hint: They are both from the '70s.

Fresh Cantaloop. It took a while for US3 to hit the chart with Cantaloop, but once it did, the song has really taken off. The track jumps 16 spots to No. 46.

Changing times? It wasn't very long ago that artists such as Beck, Tori Amos, Alice In Chains and Soundgarden couldn't possibly make the Hit Tracks chart. Now, it's not only possible for one of them to chart, but all four are charting. Soundgarden's Spoonman is even the top add as it enters at No. 73. Alice In Chains bullets to No. 42 with No Excuses, while Tori Amos' Cornflake Girl is No. 32 with a bullet and Beck's Loser is No. 27.

Hot Canadians. Sass Jordan's Rats album has an impressive debut. It enters at No. 25. Only Beck and the Rhythm, Country & Blues collection enter higher. John McDermott also makes a big dent in the Albums chart. Old Friends debuts at No. 36, while Bruce Cockburn breaks in at No. 44 with Dart To The Heart.

A Grammy boost. It's hard to imagine, but there were a lot of people who never heard Whitney Houston's I Will Always Love You until her performance on The Grammy Awards. The result is another boost in album sales. The Bodyguard Soundtrack moves up four positions to No. 21.

The Top Three. It was a great week for Canadian releases at the Sam's store on Hamilton's James St. Chris Walsh reports the following as the best-selling albums at that store. 1. Bruce Cockburn 2. John McDermott 3. Sass Jordan 4. Counting Crows 5. Meat Loaf 6. Alice In Chains 7. Tori Amos 8. The Cranberries 9. Curtis Mayfield Tribute 10. Crowded House.

For the birds. The two other artists with a type of bird in their names to have a No. 1 song are The Eagles and The Partridge Family.

Denon to distribute high profile Sub Pop label

Independent label Sub Pop, perhaps best known as the label that spawned Nirvana, has signed an agreement whereby all of its product will be released in Canada through Denon Canada Inc.

Sub Pop's exclusive distribution deal with Cargo Records expired at the end of January 1994. Both parties agreed to end the relationship amicably, and old MCA/Cargo titles will still be available through Cargo until Oct. 31.

Kensington/Quantum's Mike Alyanak dead at 43

Toronto record producer, label and studio owner Mike Alyanak passed away March 1st after a prolonged battle with a respiratory illness.

Mr. Alyanak founded Kensington Sound and Quantum Records with his brother Berge and Vezi Tayyeb. Kensington Sound, a 24-track recording facility has been in operation for 19 years, and Quantum, an independent label was launched in 1980.

Associated with the music industry for more than 20 years, Mr. Alyanak produced recordings for several Canadian artists including Rex Chainbelt, Belinda Metz, Harlow, Mad About Plaid and the Look People.

Mr. Alyanak is survived by his parents Nubar and Arusyak, and brother Berge.

Funeral services were held in Scarborough on March 5th.

Kelly Mulvey, in promotions and publicity at Denon, downplayed the signing, noting that "anything is a major signing, because we don't sign that many things. It's a high profile thing in some people's minds, but it will sell as much as, say, our Rykodisc catalogue."

Denon now has a large and diversified catalogue of music, although it started off as a small distributer of its own imprinted jazz and classical labels, and moved to CBC and some other classical labels. After this, it acquired Rounder Records, Rykodisc and some soundtrack labels. In addition, Denon still retains its hardware division.

"We're just sort of doing it, you know," continues Mulvey. ""It's not really a concentrated effort, more of a natural progression."

As for the premise of the distribution end of Denon, Mulvey offers that "if there was a thought involved, it's trying to cover all the elements so that it would be one-stop shopping in any store that stocked Denon. We have a very wide range of recordings. Sub Pop came to us, and it was just another natural extension of our diversity."

Sub Pop became renowned when the 'Seattle scene' began to pick up steam in the early '90s. The label signed Nirvana and Soundgarden before those bands were picked up by major labels, and also has Seaweed, Mudhoney and Pond on its label.

Since the explosion of the early '90s,

Sub Pop has diversified its roster widely, signing Sebadoh, Canada's Eric's Trip, Afghan Whigs, and Velocity Girl.

"It's new for us. We only found out last week that it was a done deal. After we'd met the two owners of the label, we got a really good feeling from them. Their new artists are not in the same spirit as those from the early years. Mark Langean's new release and The Spinanes are not from that grunge ethic Sub Pop is known for."


The label has offices in Boston, Beverungen, Tokyo, London and Sao Paulo. The first two releases through Denon will be Red Red Meat's Jimmywine Majestic and the Spinanes' Manos. All vinyl titles will only be available through Sub Pop in Seattle.

Juno host Voisine to play select provincial dates

Superstar Roch Voisine will play a short tour of Ontario and Quebec cities following his appearance as host of the 1994 Juno Awards (March 20). Voisine is up for three Juno awards.

The first dates on the tour will be in Quebec City (April 7-10) followed by Montreal (14-16), Ottawa (20) and Massey Hall in Toronto (27-28).

I'll Always Be There, Voisine's latest Star Release, is approaching four times platinum in Canada. His first English television special, aired in direct competition with the Super Bowl, reached 1,000,000 Canadian viewers.

Majors tone things down for CMW this year

The major record companies are laying low this year during Canadian Music Week, as compared to year's past. With independents taking on greater importance during the week, the big boys will focus much of their emphasis on the Junos themselves.

PolyGram picked up just four nominations for the upcoming Junos, and with most of its top domestic acts on tour, the company is essentially looking to next year to showcase artists during the festival.

"We find ourselves in a period where everything just came out, so we're just working our Canadian repertoire now." according to PolyGram's Anne-Marie Cyr. "Lost And Profound is doing a lot of promo work across the country, Bootsauce is preparing for a campus tour across Ontario. And the Barra MacNeils are opening for Celine Dion, so they're on the road as well."

Juno nominees from PolyGram include Bon Jovi's Keep The Faith (best selling album), Shania Twain (country female vocalist) and Charles Dutoit and the Montreal Symphony (two best classical album nods).

A&M/Island/Motown Records will have perhaps the most diverse list of nominees heading into this week's Juno Awards.

Leading the way for the company is Jann Arden, who was nominated in three different categories: best new solo artist, best video and the SOCAN Juno for songwriter of the year. Other notable A&M nominees include Doughboys (hardrock album), Rob McConnell (mainstream jazz album), West End Girls (dance recording), and Rumble and Split Personality (rap recording).

A&M will also have fine representation during the music festival portion of Canadian Music Week, with one of the country's hottest bands, Lowest Of The Low.

Like most of the other majors, BMG will be maintaining a low profile during the week. But you can expect to hear the company's name announced a few times on Juno night, with numerous artists up for awards this year.

Among the BMG artists nominated are Michelle Wright (Canadian entertainer and single), Charlie Major (country male vocalist and new solo artist) The Jeff Healey Band (group), Jack Grunsky and The Child's Play Collection (children's album), and Oval Emotion and Red Light (dance recording).

BMG's Dale Curd said one of the nominations they were happiest with was the best new group nod to Odds.

"There's a lot of appreciation for Odds in this company. They're signed to Zoo Entertainment in the states, so effectively they aren't a BMG Canada act. But we've always treated the band as a domestic priority."

While other majors might be staying low during the week, Warner will be flying high, a result of the 33 Juno nominations accorded the company's acts. Included are three best album nominations (Snow, Neil Young and Alannah Myles), two group of the year nominations (Blue Rodeo and Moxy Früvous), and four producer nominations (KD Lang and Ben Mink, Daniel Lanois, Jane Siberry, and Steve Mackinnon and Marc Jordan).

Warner will also be putting some of its top domestic acts front and centre during the festival portion of Canadian Music Week. Moxy Früvous, Spirit Of The West, The Irish Descendants, The Waltons and Wild T And The Spirit will all perform at one venue or another during the week.

Warner's Steve Waxman pointed to several nominations as company highlights, including Jane Siberry for songwriter and The Waltons as best new group. But he noted that 1993 was just a great year all around for Warner's domestic roster.

"For us the highlight was how the domestic roster was accepted by the public this year. To be able to give The Waltons and Spirit Of The West gold records, around the same time we gave Moxy Früvous and Blue Rodeo platinum is pretty exciting for us."

Sony Music Canada's prize Juno candidate is Celine Dion, nominated for both Canadian entertainer and female vocalist. Sony Classical's Tafelmusik is nominated for best classical album in both the solo or chamber ensemble and large ensemble departments. And Rush picked up nominations in both the producer and hard rock album categories. Rush will also be inducted into the Juno Hall Of Fame on this, the band's 20th anniversary in the business.

As far as the CMW Festival, Sony's Bill Bannon indicated "we're showcasing Things Of Stone And Wood, an Australian band, Thursday and Friday night at Ultrasound. And we have our regular Juno party Sunday night at the Shoreline."

EMI will throw a lot of its support for this year's Junos behind Cape Breton's Rankin Family. The group garnered the most nominations of any artist with four (Canadian entertainer, single, group and country group). EMI also scored big with The Tea Party, nominated for best new group, hard rock album and album design.

"It's been a very good year for our domestic roster" said EMI's Peter Diemer, "and we're hoping for good things at the Junos."

Like some of the other majors, EMI doesn't have a lot of major acts being showcased during the week. Among those who will be performing are Econoline Crush, David Gogo, Colin James, Jim Witter, Ron Hynes, Susan Aglukark, and Devon.

MCA is once again pinning its Juno hopes on The Tragically Hip. The band picked up three nominations, for Canadian entertainer, best selling album and single. Other notable MCA nominees include Joan Kennedy (country female vocalist), Joel Feeney (country male vocalist) and Sloan (new group).

MCA's A&R director Cameron Carpenter noted that "because of my involvement with Sloan it was nice to see them up for best new group. And The Hip for entertainer of the year is always gratifying."

MCA will be showcasing a number of up-and-coming acts during Canadian Music Week, including Eric's Trip, Headstones, Merlin, The Morganfields and the recently-signed Love Chain. The company is also hosting an invitation-only post-Juno party at Le Papillon.

Toronto radio heavyweights contribute to CMW

With music taking on even greater importance during Canadian Music Week, it's not surprising that some of Toronto's biggest radio stations will be lending their support to the festival.

Q107, Y95, CHUM-FM and The Mix 99.9 have all lent their support in one way or another to the week's festivities.

According to music director J.J. Johnston, The Mix will be very busy throughout the week.

"We're going to have a booth there, but it's basically through Sound Source and Standard Broadcasting. However, The Mix's involvement is fairly extensive. Once again, we'll be producing and syndicating Native Beat II, which is just a great event. We're also doing a command performance with Colin James, recording him live Friday night (18) at Danforth Music Hall. On Wednesday night, there's a command performance as well with The Waltons and Moxy Früvous. We're going

to be busier than hell."

Hamilton's Y95 will be on hand for most of the week as well, although in a slightly more subdued fashion.

Y95's Maureen Bulley noted that her station will be on hand "just in a sponsorship capacity. In most of the grab bags being handed out to the delegates we've included a copy of our Future Classics CD from 1993, which is our unsigned acts. We'll be involved in the Rock N' Bowl thing as well."

According to station marketing director Darren Wasylyk, Q107 will be sponsoring the Rock For The Children Auction at the Hard Rock Café at SkyDome.

"In between performances by Wild T And The Spirit and the Headstones, we'll be auctioning off tons of rock and roll memorabilia."

Both Q107 and CHUM-FM will be participating in the Rock N' Bowl Event at Mississauga's Classic Bowl.

"We went to another distributer who could do as equally as good a job in Canada, but also open up internationally as well. In particular, the US, because the band has a huge following there."

Guha hopes Cargo, with its international offices, can push King Apparatus into a new sales level, as Cargo has a strong record promoting and distributing North American talent.

"With Cargo, once they signed the product, it was automatically distributed through affiliates in the US and the UK. There was no discussion about it. We wanted it to happen and it did. No other company could offer that without having to go to American distribution or whatever.

"Ska is very much alive in the states, but it's still an underground thing in Canada."



Juno '94: A perspective from the independents

While this year's major Juno categories are filled with nominations from the six major Canadian labels, there is no shortage of artists on independent labels operating at different levels vying for numerous awards.

Most of these nominations are in the perimeter categories, the awards such as Instrumental Artist Of The Year, the majority of the classical music and jazz awards, most of the urban and dance categories, and the roots, global, and aboriginal sections.

As the Juno telecast, limited to a compact two hours, will broadcast the major, high-profile awards, there is a large number of quality nominees across the board that will not benefit from televised exposure.

In fact, the host of this year's telecast, Roch Voisine, is poised to become the first international Canadian superstar not affiliated with a major label distribution or marketing team. Voisine, who is also nominated for Album and Male Vocalist categories, is signed to Montreal-based Star Records, also home of Instrumentalist Of The Year nominee André Gagnon for his Noël album. Voisine and Gagnon are distributed through Select, also based in Montreal.

Another primary category sees Nettwerk's Sarah McLachlan up for Female Vocalist. McLachlan was also a big winner at the ECMA awards in February. John McDermott, on Angel also through EMI, is nominated in the Male Vocalist category.

Fre Records, referred to by Fre president Derrick Ross as an "AAA independent," and distributed through EMI, has garnered two major nominations for Jim Witter: New Solo Artist and Country Male Vocalist. Fre was a winner last year as The Skydiggers took home the Most Promising Group Juno.

"The impact of a nominations," says Ross, "is that it gives visibility to our artists. One of the top five in a certain category is a testament to Jim's success in the last year, and it comes from peers and from industry people. Being alongside Jann Arden and Charlie Major is very nice. Ten months ago, people might not have known who Jim Witter was."

Speaking to a number of people at the independent level, they all indicate the additional media and promotional zing a Juno nomination allows.

"It gives us some ammunition when we try to work radio for people who might not be aware of what they have accomplished. We can run some Juno ads in retail papers along with other artists. It gets us more product in the marketplace and greater visibility. It has also helped with our pricing as it pertains to live performances. The nomination tells us that we've done our job in getting our artists recognized, and it creates a curiosity factor with the consumer."

As for the Junos on the whole, Ross says "I don't consider myself in any way handicapped by being an independent. Last year, The Skydiggers won and they were the only independent on the list. The scenario of voting along the party line might be changing, but I'm not sure."

Attic Records, distributed by MCA Records, is up for four awards, two as direct signees to Attic and two as a distributor. John James, Andy Hermant, KC Music's Inspector Lenny, and Chacra's Jacques de Koninck are all nominated in various categories.

"The best impact we have from a nomination," says Kevin Shea of Attic, "is the press angle, bringing the artist back into people's faces for a week or so. In some cases, we'll issue a new single to take advantage of renewed interest. It's also wonderful for our foreign territories, to be able to say we have the Canadian equivalent of a Grammy. It gives you that much more momentum for outside territories. And there's all kinds of

secondary impacts."

A Juno nomination can also reap artistic benefits. "It's really hard for an independent to sign acts right now because the majors are very active. By having a Juno, it helps to draw attention to the fact that the company signs good bands, takes good care of marketing and publicity. In this way, it can help draw artists to your roster. This will help draw attention to us as a domestic label."

Bill Carruthers, general manager of Savannah Music's Toronto office, whose company has Anita Perras up for Country Female Vocalist and One Horse Blue for Country Group or Duo, and manages Michelle Wright, notes that "it's nice to know we can continue to get activity as an independent label.

"Every year we receive some sort of nomination recognition. It helps us provide our artists with a little more high profile impact in the industry. It helps our credibility as an independent."

In 1993, Savannah won with Gary Fjellgaard for Country Male Vocalist. This enhanced the profile of Savannah and Fjellgaard.

"It depends on how you utilize the actual nomination. One Horse Blue is coming for a short tour of southwestern Ontario during CMW.

"To me, any kind of national recognition is great. We can't expect the type of TV exposure as the major categories. It would be nice if all the country categories were performing on the Junos, but that's not realistic at this point in time."

Hi-Bias Records is a first-time nominee this year for two artists in the dance recording category. "We get exposure from a press perspective and recognition within Canada," says Hi-Bias president Nick Fiorucci. "Most of our sales are international, and this is a new thing for us, having a nomination in our own country. I don't know how it will affect sales."

KC Music Group's Keef Whiting notes that "unless it's one of the major televised awards, a nomination doesn't have much affect, although last year Kaleefah (nominated for World Beat Recording) ended up performing with Celine Dion."

Whiting, whose company has one nomination for Inspector Lenny in the reggae category, is concerned with the lack of televised exposure for the perimeter awards, which he feels are as important as the majors even though they are shuffled into off-camera timeslots.

"Things like R&B and dance, these are fairly major categories. Dance is one of the biggest markets in Canada and it doesn't get recognition on the mainstream part of the show. But that's the way it is.

"The problem is the industry is so small. You can't divide all these categories up (like R&B/Soul and Gospel/Blues) properly. Unfortunately, I think people within the industry don't look at the Junos as having much weight. A Grammy nomination immediately leads to more airplay, whereas with the Junos and Kaleefah, we didn't get any more video or radio play. You don't get the support from within."

CBC Stereo's classical music program RSVP will visit Toronto during spring break. Host Leon Cole will broadcast live from the CBC's Broadcast Centre in Toronto from March 14-18, 10 am to noon. The public is invited, and being spring break, they are asked to bring along their children. Cole's children, jazz singer Holly Cole and composer Allen Cole, will drop by for a performance on March 15 at 11 am. Other guests during the week include composer Oskar Morawetz (14), singer Lois Marshall (16) and CBC's The World At Six host Bob Oxley (18). Cole will be joined in Toronto by RSVP producer Andrea Ratuski, associate producer Alison Mitchell, and technician Mike Harding. While in Toronto, Cole will take in a Blue Jays' exhibition game and attend the Junos, where he'll cheer on daughter Holly who is nominated for Best Contemporary Jazz Album.

CBC Radio will profile jazz legend Oscar Peterson in a series entitled About Oscar, to run every Sunday (3-4 pm) from March 13 to April 24. Award-winning broadcaster Chris Brookes edited down over 100 hours of material for the show, which will feature interviews, rare archival tapes and plenty of music. The series will recount Peterson's life and music chronologically, culminating with the recent presentation of the 1993 Glenn Gould Prize for his contribution to music.

Toronto's Q107 debuted a new show last Sunday (March 6), called The Best Of Modern Rock. The two-hour show, hosted by former CFNY music director and current PolyGram promo rep Ivar Hamilton will focus on artists and music from 1977 through the '80s. The show will feature the earlier music of U2, Talking Heads, REM, Lou Reed, The Clash and many more. The new feature runs every Sunday from 10 am to noon, just before Psychedelic Sunday.

The Canadian Broadcast Standards Council (CBSC) announced the appointment of Daryl Braun as the newest member of the Western Regional Council. Braun is the news director at Winnipeg's CKRC/CKLU-FM, and is also regional director of the Radio Television News Directors Association. The CBSC also

Quality/Warlock signs R&B singer Medina

Canada's Carol Medina has signed with the American label Quality/Warlock, who will distribute Medina's dance hit And The Song Goes (Doo Dit).

That single, which reached No. 53 on the RPM Hit Tracks Chart, garnered Medina a best R&B song nomination at the Juno Awards.

Warlock is an independent specializing in dance, rap and R&B. The label recently bought out Quality US to form Quality/Warlock.

Carol Medina was first heard on the single The Tears I Cry, and has recorded numerous singles since, including Sooner Or Later and Love Me Just Enough.

announced the renewal of the terms of Dwaine Dietrich as chair and Sally Hall as vice-chair of the West Regional Council. Dietrich is president of Monarch Broadcasting in Medicine Hat, while Hall, a public rep on the council, is former provincial president of the Consumer's Association of Canada.

Toronto's CISS-FM announced last week that Jane Brown has left the station. Brown was formally at Q107, and had been at the new country station for less than a year. According to program director Sharon Taylor, Brown is departing for family reasons, and work at her husband's studio. Brown and her husband also plan on expanding their family in the near future.

297.3 FM, Toronto's Classic Hits is giving away ten vacations to Universal Studios Florida with its Movie Sweepstakes Contest. Four times a day during the week the station

will play a montage of classic film clips, and listeners will be asked to identify all the movies in the montage. The clips will be played at various times during the day, with clues also being provided. Listeners can also visit any Toronto Cineplex Odeon theatre to receive a ballot for a bonus vacation that will be awarded.

Radio Canada International will be distributing the audio broadcast of the Juno Awards to Canadian peacekeeping forces in Bosnia, Croatia and Somalia, as well as to NATO forces in Europe. Perry Goldberg, chairman of the Juno radio committee, informs that the Juno audience will be augmented by numerous radio station contests winners from across the country. The contests are run in conjunction with VIA and Air Ontario, who are providing transportation for the winners, and Toronto's Holiday Inn on King, who will provide accomodations.

US3 airplay boosted by album-track-that-wasn't

The first US3 single, Cantaloop (Flip Fantasia) off its Blue Note/EMI debut, Hand On The Torch, was recently the beneficiary of a second life thanks to some enthusiastic radio support.

Wayne Webster, music director at The MIX in Toronto, played the album version of the first single in a listening session. "I tried to play it at our meeting with the vocal part," says Webster, "but we have an ID that we don't play rap.

"I then decided to play the instrumental for J.J. Johnston, our program director, and he liked it so we stuck it in."

However, the version played was only available on promo CD singles. The station

received tremendous listener response to the song and was the number one most requested song for 11 straight nights.

But when consumers went to pick up the album, they did not find the song on the original Hand On The Torch. The buyers returned the disc to some retail outlets.

This led to Ron Robles and the people at EMI to insert the 'lost' instrumental track onto the album. Since then, all parties have been satisfied and the album is doing very well at retail. And both versions are still hot on the radio dial.

Says Webster, "it's good to see that we can still do that from a radio station."

Tori Amos breaking out of the box and on radio

As sales reports roll into the RPM offices from various retail outlets across Canada, consistently near the top of the lists is the just-released second effort from Warner recording artist Tori Amos, Under The Pink. And while more than a few skeptics feared Amos would collapse under the industry's self-imposed 'sophomore jinx', early indications are that Under The Pink is delivering figures to shame any previous scepticism.

Her debut album, Little Earthquakes, was a long-term project that has sold an impressive 60,000 copies since its release. However, these sales were the result of minimal radio play across the country.

"That was a record that struck people," says Bruce MacTavish, Warner's International Marketing Manager. "This one has struck them hard as well, and in different ways. But the retail action has been very exciting."

Under The Pink shipped 20,000 units as an initial release. But, in the two weeks following, those figures have jumped to 42,000 and are rapidly climbing as Cornflake Girl, the first Canadian single, crops up on more and more playlists across the country.

"Retail was willing to help us out with rack and display space. It didn't matter what video and radio's reaction was. That was the effect out of the box for this record. And it's the kind of record store managers want to see do well. I give retail, especially Sam's and HMV, credit."

However, contrary to the reaction to the first album that had only limited modern rock airplay, Cornflake Girl is having some unpredictable results.

"We had an excellent week at radio last week. It looks to be a radio hit in Canada. This country has such a hybrid of radio stations. We might get a combination of CHR, CAR, Hot A/C, A/C, a few key stations adding it here and there. I think we'll get eight to 10 key stations adding it that'll put it on the charts.

"It's getting that sort of response. The first week, we got a few A/C stations, a couple of CHR stations, a couple of non-reporting stations. CFNY added the two lead singles out of the box. It hit in sort of an unpredictable way."

MacTavish also reports the support of MuchMusic. "They were always supportive. But people at radio didn't know where to slot her, where she fit in. She has a lot of fans at radio."

MacTavishrelays the story of an in-store Amos did at HMV last March. 600 people showed up and it lasted more than five hours, and he notes that Amos gave liberally and honestly of her time to each person. "In my 11 years with Warner, I've never seen anything like it. Tori is a unique artist with a unique performing style. She has an uncanny connection with her audience."



NKOTB Face The Music Columbia-52969-H

-Dance/Pop

First of all, to answer the obvious question: Yes, this is what used to be known as New Kids On The Block (couldn't fool us). After fading from the picture several years back, the group is back, hoping that an older, tougher appearance will spark the same remarkable enthusiasm the group caught hold of last time. Doubtful. However, don't just shrug off the record as another mix of formulated pop destined for the shelves of 16 year old girls. The group has recruited the likes of Walter Afanasieff and Narada Michael Walden to both write and produce some of the tracks, finally giving the heave-ho to former creative mentor Maurice Starr. And judging by the assortment of names listed alongside some of the tracks (Girls has an unbelievable eight songwriter credits), some serious work has gone into the making of this record. So we'll just have to sit back and see whether New Kids mania is still thriving. And yes, there are real vocals on this album.



SOUNDGARDEN ·Hard Rock Superunknown A&M-31454-0198-Q

Screw grunge, ditch alternative, this new and higly aniticipated album by American foursome Soundgarden is hard rock at its road-ready, earsplitting, crunchingly supreme best. While under the intense scrutiny of a major label deal, the band has put together a cleaner record that should excel in the same radio and retail space as Alice In Chains' latest EP. The band delivers its frightening mesh of metal and progressive rock in tight fashion, delivering both the unpredictable and the unstable, but what sets Soundgarden above its hard rock contemporaries is singer Chris Cornell (he-of-minimalist-hair), who alternates between deep, sexy growls and scratchy, muscular, Robert Plant-like wails. The opening track, Let Me Drown, breaks the album open with one of the meanest guitar riffs heard in quite some time. The fadeout of the second strong number, My Wave, laces into layers of piercing fretwork reminiscent of Rusty Cage off the band's second album, Badmotorfinger. The title track has AOR and hard rock airplay potential, while the outstanding first single, Spoonman (about a spoon player?), brings us to a sort of rock riff Fantasyland, like visiting a revamped Disneyland made under the direction of Jimmy Page, Tony Iommi, and Eddie Van Halen. On the whole, the album is too 'hard' for CHR, but the last track, Like Suicide, might surprise some the same way Alice In Chains' No Excuses is opening up the radio doors for all kinds of new music. -CT

ELVIS COSTELLO Brutal Youth Warner-45535-P

Casually dropped into our laps from Warner, this extraordinary return to form for one of rock's preeminent songwriters was the most delectable surprise of the last month's releases. Costello has reunited with his band The Attractions, responsible for Costello's groundbreaking first two albums, This Year's Model and My Aim Is True, and the timing could not have been better. While it was necessary for Costello as an artist to depart from his original band, it is such a relief to hear him play with this stellar band, and it's almost as if Costello's songwriting skills

work with The Attractions again. This album is fifteen strong tracks deep. Take your pick, radio! My suggestion would be the lead single, 13 Steps Lead Down, with the great first lines 'nobody knows/she puts on secret clothes/she lies in the meadow/with her hands tied behind her' and featuring Steve Nieve's characteristic organ pounding. Or, if this isn't your fancy, then pick the choice second track, Kinder Murder, with Pete Thomas' rough and stylish drumbeat carrying the song. This is Hell ('this is hell/this is hell/this is hell/I'm sorry to tell you'), 20% Amnesia, Sulky Girl, there are numerous possibilities for the adventurous programmer. Don't let this one slide by at radio or at retail: it's a breathtaking and revelatory revitalization of a genius' career.

- Italian Pop STAZZA Senza Impegno Hey Pupa Music-10002

An extraordinary debut for Italian troubadour Stazza (just one name, thank you). Contains wide-ranging rock and pop gems written by Toronto-based Gianluigi Pilato and Gervasio (Jerry Caringi), who also produced the album with Michael Sarracini. Don Parravano takes executive producer credits for the album which was recorded at Toronto's Arnyard Studios. Stazza's vocals connect with passion and understanding maintaining an incredible resilience, language aside. His vocals are particularly enchanting on Piccola Lisa Innamorata, Le Donne Di Domani, Amore, Amore, Amore, and Guardando Una Foto Del 66'. He'll probably attract more of the younger listeners with Hey Pupa and La Mosca Rap.



Off the top, this latest release by the Vancouverbased off-the-wall classical quintet is a "celebration of the acoustic sounds of junk," a description by the ensemble's publicist. Having heen forewarned, expect the unexpected, but be prepared to be entertained. Not for the faint of heart audio-phile, unless he wants to drive his neighbours crazy. The clever layering of gentle musical sounds inspired by household articles is sheer genius: floating wooden bowls, miniature glass bottles, vacuum cleaner hose vocals, duck, goose and pheasant calls, tomato slicer, porcelain teacups, basket shakers, Zube Tube, potato masher, knitting needle, conch shell, glass jug, plastic plumbing pipe, milk bottles, water bottle shaker, struck glass jugs, stainless steel water



drum and the liquid voice of a carpenter's hand saw, et cetera. Sounds pretty weird, but jump in, you'll enjoy it. One very pleasant surprise is a teasing love song, Why Don't We, featuring the enchanting vocals of Carla Hallett. Also key is the title track, described as "a work for driftwood and saw evoking the fog and forests of Canada's west coast, a tribute to Clayoquot Sound," and the dreamy contentment of Joshua's Lament and Bittersweet Time. -Pon BRUCE COCKBURN Dart To The Heart True North-TNK 82-H

Cockburn often spends so much time fighting the environmental fight, that you wonder if he has any time left over for making music. Perhaps, however, that is his gift as a songwriter. He doesn't have to work at it quite as hard as others might. The songs on Dart To The Heart reflect an ease and comfortability with the songwriting craft that few artists possess. Cockburn's music has never attempted to drive right over you. He gets themessage across with subtle suggestion, a folk/pop feel that never gets too loud or too soft or too blasé. On this record, Cockburn delves into some blues roots, bringing on T-Bone Burnett to produce the record. Also making a noteworthy appearance is guitarist Colin Linden, who makes his impression felt on a number of tracks, including All The Ways I Want You, Scanning These Crowds

and Burden Of The Angel/Beast. Cockburn is a sure-fire add at A/C, and his solid core of fans will flock to this release.



THE GANDHARVAS A Soap Bubble And Inertia Watch-89303-J

-Pop/Rock

The Gandharvas, a band in the southern Ontario region, is the second group on Watch Music after initial signee The Morganfields. The Gandharvas is an interesting band, though, because it runs the gamut from heavy alternative/hard rock all the way to... soca! This diversity rears its head on the first three tracks, The First Day of Spring, Saturn Quits Fasting and The Coffee Song. Then, the record shifts into a number, Bundle, that is quitar and atmosphere heavy, like on Alice In Chains' Facelift, Though a comparison like this becomes redundant in the face of The Gandharvas independent spirit, it it important of note because when the airy, first notes of The Supreme Personality hit with their soca-flavour, you have to marvel at this band's ability to sample different musical styles with ease and grace. Also of note is the title track, a seven-minute plus song that swells and recedes in a truly Gandharvas way. Intriguing first record.



BRENDA BAKER - Radical Pop Daughter Of Double-Dare

Brazen Hussy-BB3-DDD93 A Saskatoon playwright, fiction writer, singer, poet, musician and children's entertainer, Brenda Baker leaves everything to the imagination with this powerful, eclectic excursion into her own musical world. Grouped in five chapters: Drawing The Line, Playing With Cupid, Nobody's Little Girl, A Woman Driven, and Dancing In Cages, Baker's vocal integrity eases the listener into various compromising situations, all of which create acceptable niches for ear entertainment. Baker appears to revel in risk, alternating from cutting and chancy lyrics to a distinct inner vocal warmth that demands attention. Musical theatre comes instantly to mind. This is obviously an album that was conceived from an understanding of all music genres, from rock and folk, to what she describes as "chat rap". This Room was taken as the first single, a track that showcases the guitar work of Jack Semple (formerly of The Lincolns and more recently a principal in Guitar Man, a Super Channel Movie), and producer Rob Bryanton on keyboards. Man Of My Dreams will be the follow-up. The F Word is a clever little piece about feminismn. Keeping it on the straight and narrow. Baker has more than a couple of gems here, including What We're Capable Of, Barcelona Bridge, and Songwriters In Love. The title track, taken as a single, the seventh from the album, has made excellent gains up the chart and bullets into the #45 position. The video, a first time collaboration between Fjellgaard and director Steven Goldmann, was shot near Fjellgaard's home on Gabriola Island. The video features three generations of Fjellgaard's family as well as his band, Friends. Goldmann has worked with Pam Tillis, Patricia Conrov and Clint Black. Last year, he won both the CCMA video of the year award and Much Music's country video of the year award for Michelle Wright's Take It Like A Man.

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
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
