

TDK to offer world's first recordable CDs for consumers

TDK, one of the world's leading producers of audio and video tapes and data storage, has announced the introduction of recordable compact discs to be made available to consumers. TDK plans on making the CD's available in April of 1996.

TDK's gold-coloured CD-RXG discs will be available in a 60 minute length. The production and availability of the CDs will go hand-in-hand with the development and introduction of consumer recordable CD players. Pioneer is one company that has plans for a consumer recordable CD player in the immediate future.

The consumer recordable discs will be capable of handling all the functions of normal prerecorded CDs, such as random accessing, scanning, and track skipping. These new consumer CDs are strictly for digital audio use only, and will not be able to be used to record other CD formats, such as CD-ROM, CDi or photo CD.

According to their media release, TDK's

CD-RXG discs will be marketed according to the Audio Home Recording Act of 1992, which stipulates that a royalty fee be paid at the manufacturer level for consumer digital recording media. Such royalties will be distributed to record companies, artists, publishers, songwriters and other copyright holders.

The industry, particularly the retail side, greeted this latest news with a collective sigh. In the case of retailers, it means more money out of their pockets, which in turn means less money for the artists, songwriters and record companies. There are those, however, who see recordable CDs as potentially another DAT or mini-disc.

"It's just something else new, again," according to Sunrise Records' Tim Baker. "So if you want this, you'll need two CD players, you'll need a digital amplifier, which most people don't have. You're looking at a lot of money. The

Jesse Cook signed to US-based Narada label

Canadian flamenco guitarist Jesse Cook has signed a multi-album deal with Milwaukee-based Narada Records. The signing comes after only eight weeks of the release of Tempest, Cook's independentlyproduced Canadian album (RPM Albums - June 12/ 95), which was released on his own JC label.

Cook's album, which he describes as "rumba-flamenco guitar blended with music from the global village," is set for a US release on Sept. 26. The album will be reintroduced in Canada shortly thereafter by MCA Music Canada, which distributes Narada in Canada. Narada

is distributed in the

US by UNI Distribution (formerly MCA Distributing) and in more than 40 countries worldwide.

Narada showcased Cook and his fivepiece band at the annual UNI convention in Boca Raton, Florida on Aug. 9. More than 300 UNI executives form across the US and Canada.

The Cook deal was signed by Narada

CEO and president Wesley Van Linda.

Roch Voisine inks distribution deal with BMG Canada

Steven Ehrlick, vice-president of business affairs/ human resources for BMG Music Canada, has announced that the label has entered into a multialbum distribution deal with Quebec-based R.V. International, for the Canadian distribution rights to recordings by Juno Award-winner Roch Voisine.

Ehrlick noted, "It is not everyday that we have the opportunity to sign an artist of Roch Voisine's caliber and renown. We are very proud to be adding Roch to BMG Music Canada's distribution roster. We have long sought to secure Roch for Canada and with this signing, the final link in the BMG chain is in place.'

Voisine is currently in Los Angeles co-writing new material for preproduction of his next album. This upcoming English-language record will be produced by Don Grierson, and should be released in the spring of 1996.

Voisine's current Star Records Englishlanguage release, I'll Always Be There, has sold in excess of 450,000 units in Canada. In July of 1994, R.V. International signed a worldwide license agreement with BMG France, excluding Canada.



audiophiles will like it, but the average punter out there is quite content to make tapes for his car. We'll worry about this years down the road, because right now there's nothing we can do about it.

Baker is one who doesn't buy into the theory that the industry is losing millions every year due to home taping. And he feels that the new CD technology won't change that.

"I've always been the believer that people that record on blank tapes are recording something they already own. The reason we sell so many blank tapes now is because people have CD players at home, but not in their car. They're dubbing tapes from the CD's they already own. That to me is fine, I don't have a problem with that, and neither should anyone else. And I think the same thing is going to happen with recordable CDs."


Richard Singerman, a spokesperson for AVS Technologies, the Canadian importer-marketer of TDK, says that the introduction of home CD recording in Canada depends a great deal on the availability of the hardware.

"Right now, it's really tied into the hardware. The hardware is only available in the US. We could get inventory of it for Canada, but when the hardware is going to come to Canada, is hard to say. It may still be six months to a year away. Pioneer has a home audio CD writing unit, which is capable of recording with our new CDs.

Singerman also pointed out that recordable CDs for the home would come with a

significant price tag, considerably more than blank tanes

"I would say the recordable CDs will probably be a little more expensive than prerecorded ones. Currently, on the industrial side, blank CDs are available for around \$18-25. And



because this is a specialized product, when we market it to the consumer, it will be at a slightly higher price."

CRIA's Brian Robertson expressed both shock and dismay when informed of the soon-to-be-available home CD taping. But, he too says the industry will have to adopt a wait and see attitude.

"I guess this is the next generation of home taping problems for the record industry. We'll

obviously have to wait and see what the level of penetration of the hardware is, as you know, it wasn't very successful with the mini-disc. Basically, you had the same technology there with the recordable mini-disc. So I really don't think it's any different from that. It really relies on the hardware, and there's no guarantee that the hardware is going to be successful. But I think any device that's going to make home copying easier, is going to escalate the problems of the record industry."

Roblan Distributors' Jason Sniderman cringes whenever the subject of home recording comes up. He questions the motive behind TDK's new venture, as, in his opinion, in can do nothing but harm the industry.

"Anytime you're talking about the recording of pre-recorded music, I find it distasteful. You have to wonder about the motive behind someone wanting to introduce recordable CDs. It's not really for recording your kids singing or stuff like that. The point is, every piece of pre-recorded music that gets recorded at home, without paying royalties or publishing rights, hurts the artists and hurts the industry in the long run.

Sniderman feels that before the recordable CDs are introduced, the government should finalize some type of legislation that covers all home taping.

"The average consumer shouldn't be the one left to make the decision on whether there should be some protection of performance rights on the taping of pre-recorded music. If the industry isn't going to enforce it themselves, I think government legislation has to come into effect."

CRIA launches generic test campaign in Calgary

Members of the Canadian Recording Industry Association, in conjunction with Calgary's music retailers, have launched a test marketing campaign designed to remind consumers of the value of prerecorded music. The target market for the campaign is consumers in the 25 plus age group.

Backed by the entire Canadian recording industry, the campaign is marked by a unique partnership between major and independent record companies, racks and music retailers.

The campaign will be featured over a sixweek period, August 14 through September 24, offering consumers a mix of radio, television and print, along with an informative printed music guide. The 16-page guide will be distributed to 90,000 homes via the Calgary Herald newspaper on August 25, offering readers more information about the available prerecorded music.

A recent national market survey indicated that the sales of prerecorded music were definitely slanted towards a younger age group. According to CRIA president Brian Robertson, "purchase frequency declines as consumers mature into their late 20's, 30's and beyond."

According to Robertson, "The respondents told us that in this life stage, they are less exposed to prerecorded music - the everyday realities of career, household and family taking up

more of their time - but if they had more information about sound recordings that catered to their changing tastes and a more specialized retail environment, they would be more likely to increase their purchases of prerecorded music."

Calgary was chosen as the test site in accordance with the market research study. The Alberta city was found to have the right mix of record retailers and a relatively self-contained media market. CRIA will analyze the effectiveness of the campaign messages and anticipates this launch to be a percursor to a national campaign in 1996.

Creative work for the campaign is being handled by Roche MacAuley & Partners, with Retail Media handling the media and promotion plans.

World Domination stays True North to indie alternative

Like punk music before it, alternative music has always been non commercial by definition. The 'alternative' has always referred to a stance with respect to the mainstream, to wit, commercial pop/rock music with its dogmatic adherence to formula and its canonization of standard if safe approaches to the form.

Of course, once the commercial viability of alternative music was discovered and exploited to the point that the label became a byword for anything *new*, things began to change considerably. Today, the lines between alternative and the

than anything that has come before. But mainstream is mainstream and not (at least in theory) alternative. So we still have the alternative music of theory; the loyally non commercial stuff that has remained fiercely independent and occupied the fringe on specialty labels.

World Domination is one such label dealing with these independent alternative products. Formerly distributed in Canada by EMI, World Domination was picked up by True North Records, a twenty five year old independent label and North America's oldest independent

record company. Yes, the music is alternative; "Everybody hates that word, but I don't know how else to describe it," says Doug Flavelle, national press and promotions for True North Records. He's right. One has the impression that whoever came up with that word must have had something like Low Pop Suicide, Noah Stone, Sky Cries Mary or Lizard Music in mind. Ring any bells? Chances are they won't. The reason: "They are predominantly college radio though some have had spotty commercial radio play across the country.

World Domination's Low Pop Suicide was one of these exceptions. It was added



mainstream have been effectively blurred, so much that there is an almost absolute rejection of the categorization, certainly from many of those involved.

The changes, however, haven't been all bad. Consider, for instance, that the mainstream has become inherently more experimental as a result, and that some of the staunchness, particularly with respect to three chord rock'n'roll, has been effectively thrown to the dogs. All things said, today's top ten is a more eclectic mix





to CFNY's playlist and was on that station's regular rotation for some 8 to 10 weeks and even saw movement in the charts. Still, the main of these bands only see campus radio at best and frequently no airplay at all. That's not surprising, given that there is a strong impression the artists would rather avoid any form of commercial promotion. Flavelle, however, insists that is not the case.

"There is no intention beyond the fact that these are American alternative acts," he says, "the huge college radio market in the US . . . is a totally

In Europe, this band is actually known as Stone Age, but due to some copyright entanglements, they've had to go with Stone Edge here in North America. No problem, though. A rose by any other name ... as they say. Stone Edge (Age) is made up of a foursome of folks with the names Lach'ilaouet, Terra Cotta, Marc de Poncallec and Kervador. Those rather surreal names should give you a strong indication of the music contained within. Stone Edge has taken the ambient artistry of the Enigma type acts, and infused it with some strong pop sensibilities, making for a highly listenable piece of music. This stuff combines massive keyboard swaths, the occassional tinge of

bagpines and other assorted instrumentation, as well as a touch of vocals, all meshing together in some poetic music that leaves just enough for the imagination. If Enigma can sell millions of records with its monkish pastiche, than surely Stone Age (sorry Edge) can also sell a little Highlight tracks include the first track, appropriately titled Stonage, Zo Laret (It Is Said), Yesterday's Child, Stone Transe and Ti Plad (Flat Roof). Produced by Stone Edge. -RR

CHRIS SMITH Room Inside My Heart Equinox Records-9501

Chris Smith is the former lead singer of a band called Regatta, a group that won Toronto's Q107 Homegrown Contest several years back, and went on to a major label deal with BMG. The record went on to sell close to 20,000 units in Canada, but the band didn't last long enough to see any further success. It's obvious though, from his brief recording experience with that band, that Smith learned a few tricks of the trade in the process. Room Inside My Heart is a very mature record, one that speaks of experience gained in the studios. At times, the record veers into jazz, latin and worldbeat sounds, all of them couched in a simple song styling that gives the album a strong foundation. Some of the stuff may be a little too polite, but for the most part, very appealing stuff. The key is the first single, Room Inside My Heart, a beautiful acoustic piece that could easily find a home at AC radio. Also key are Over The Moon, Something Sexual, Sunlight and Don't Let Anybody Keep You Down, It doesn't hurt that Smith has lined up a strong backing of studio players, including Matthew Gerrard (Von Groove), Marco Luciani (Zappacosta), Phil Poppa (The Spoons) and Chris McNeill (Alan Frew). SHIRLEY EIKHARD -Folk 'n pop If I Had My Way Denon-9023

On Eikhard's previous five albums, her song material was fairly constant, in one groove. Here, she crosses and re-crosses whatever boundaries she had previously restricted herself to. There's a touch of jazz, rock, blues,

pop and, of course, folk. That's the beauty of this album, she's coming from everywhere. Eikhard, and it's hard to believe she's 40, spreads her vocal warmth and writing charm with exquisite ease to cover those years with simple and idealistic panache. Interesting enough, and again, this album shows Eikhard's penchant to maintain her independence, her most successful recording, monetarily speaking, (Let's Give Them) Something To Talk About, isn't included. What we do have is an impeccable list of for sale song material, but hopefully Eikhard will herself enjoy the feeling of her



own vocal accomplishment before others. There is something forlornly beautiful about I've Learned A Lot About The Blues, and Walkin' In Your Daddy's Shoes. The title track is vintage Eikhard, with Rob Piltch on classical guitar, Evelyne Datl on harp synth and string synth, George Koller on fretless bass, cellist Richard Armin, drummer Gary Craig, and Eikhard, Mary Lu Zahalam and Glyn Stephens supplying background vocals. Produced and arranged by Eikhard and Evelyne Datl. -WG

JAMIE WATLING **Different Trails** Bay Street-9504

Former New Brunswicker and now living in southwestern Ontario, Watling makes a healthy and expensive pitch to country music programmers and fans with his solo debut. Even before reading his bio, it's obvious Watling has gained a whole lot of club smarts. He doesn't step into his role of country balladeer with too much trepidation. There's an outlaw flavouring here, which persists throughout the production. Watling has a don't give a damn vocal projection that works more in his favour than against. The same goes for his lyrics; straight ahead, raw and take 'em or leave 'em. He pulls no punches. He has age on his side and obviously a determination to survive. Livin' The Blues, Son Of The Factory and Drop Fear are key tracks, but don't overlook Haven't



Given Up On Lovin', which he co-wrote with Chris Over, who also doubles on mouth harp and bass. A nice mix of instruments, including Watling on banjo and guitar, fiddle inserts by Ricky Gee and Gavin McKenna, Don Mclean on squeezebox, Frank Barth on dobro, Charlie Gelinas on keyboards and bass, plus bassists Terry Burke and John Kendall and guitarists Cam Milne and Sabastian Agnello. Watling produced the session which was recorded at GFT Recording Studios in Toronto. Available through Bay Street Entertainment. A sixsong video is also available.



THE RAKE'S PROGRESS

Altitude Almo AMSSD 80001-J

-Alternative

Having germinated for seven years in New York's smoky bar scene, The Rake's Progress have gotten their act down to a note for their debut album. I'll be a rat's ass if the single here isn't El Camino (an incongruously titled punchy little track), though the truth is it's as misleading an indicator as anything else to where this album ends up over thirteen tunes. Track 2 (Howard Is A Drag) already has a completely different feel, though the transition is smoother than oil dipped satin courtesy of flawless production from Nicholas Sansano (Sonic Youth). There is a notable mellowing as the album progresses but the tunes remain distinctive and occasionally (successfully) reach some really far off territories (Eggs Any Style, I Hope You Miss Me, Looks Like This Could Be The End). Tangible and oftimes sensitive lyrical content broadens an already broad spectrum and keeps the proceedings just that much more interesting (when was the last time we heard that about an alternative record?). Little known fact: all but animated vocalist Tim Cloherty have played with New York's legendary Dean and the Weenies and lived to reach these hard alternative shores. What else do I need to say? Check this out. -RG



BUFFALO TOM -Alternative Sleepy Eved

Beggars Banquet 76974 2067-2-Q

One has got to give credit to a good idea. The good idea, in this case, is going off to some 19th century deconsecrated church in Woodstock and recording an album for fourteen hours a day six days a week for three weeks. Specifically, the good idea was to capture the music in a raw, live format. The decision seems to be a tactful one given the music; one resists the thought of Buffalo Tom's coarse harmonies being in any way dusted off and polished in a gadget stuffed studio, just as the pioneer spirit that their name invokes wouldn't seem right without a little bit of dirt. But alas, its strength also proves to be its weakness. It turns out that the record does not develop a whole lot; by the time one gets to the acoustic Twenty-Points, it's been a long time coming. After that track, it's back to uncouth riffing and the loud, punctuated crash of the cymbal. The lack of movement doesn't prevent it from painting a convincing picture, however, the highlights which can be heard on Your Stripes, Sparklers and especially the single Summer. No surprises then, but a gritty comfortable groove, might not need any. -RG

ALBUM PICK

BLIND MELON Soup

Capitol-28732-F

For a group that basically rose up out of nowhere, Blind Melon enjoyed some rather healthy success on their first release for Capitol in '93. Part of that success has to be due to timing. The group came along at a time when that stripped down, bare-bones alternative sound was really taking off at rock radio, and they were good enough to spawn a single (No Rain) that obviously hit home with those angst-encrusted generation X-type alternative fans. No Rain eventually hit the top spot on the RPM Hit Tracks chart (November 13/93), and the album topped out at #3. Obviously the pressure to repeat here is enormous, as it is with all artists who grab success right off

the hop. But part of the appeal of the alternative crowd is that they have this "don't give a fuck" attitude that almost belies success and popularity. It's as though they're saying "yes, we've sold a lot of records, buy so what?". This latest effort is, if nothing else, a wonderful piece of packaging. And hey, anytime you get hold of something that goes beyond the run-of-the-mill jewel case, it's worth checking out. Musically, the band has obviously taken a step forward from their last release. Maturity and grunge don't often go hand in hand, but in this case, the band has obviously learned considerably in the two years since the last record. The alternative/go-your-own-way slant is



obvious from the first single, Galaxie: "Because the Cadillac that's sittin' in the back/ It isn't me/Oh, no, no, no it isn't me/I'm more at home in my Galaxie." Key tracks include the aforementioned Galaxie, Toes Across The Floor, Car Seat and St. Andrew's Fall. Should be a no-brainer for rock radio.

legitimate market where they can sell a lot of records. In Canada that's certainly not as true, so it's a lot harder work for us to get these records radio airplay in this country, because really there are only maybe three or four obvious radio stations for that kind of music right across the country."

So the biggest impact for alternative independent music is at a college level, and what an impact. A cursory glance at college radio playlists would suggest that a record's position on said charts is proportionate to that record's commercial obscurity. This makes for an chasm between the respective ideologies of college and regular radio which might not synchronize their playlists any time soon. Flavelle agrees.

"I don't see [playlists] changing, not quickly anyway. The only thing that I think that is changing is that what is being considered alternative is starting to more and more become the mainstream. So you have an act like Low Pop Suicide that really did get a good kick at the can, good radioplay on the stations in Canada that can't play that kind of music. It really is a grey area where that line is



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The CRTC: its revenues and deregulation

by Professor George Pollard

Regarding CRTC revenues, and while the numbers may not be exact to the penny, the principal is intact -- about \$40,000,000 annual revenues (may be as low as \$35,000,000) with operating costs of about \$20,000,000 (50% of revenue holds).

Excess of revenue over operating costs goes into the Consolidated Fund of the federal government for use for whatever.

Drastic reductions in license fees for smaller operators, even from \$38,000 to \$25,000, only reduces CRTC revenues by \$2,500,000 maximum. Chains and major players don't get much of a reduction, and continue to account for most of the broadcast revenues.

Regarding the Broadcasting Act — the 1968 Act was clearly intended and designed to foster and strengthen Canada as a distinct society (from USA, Britain or whatever). It was a maitre chez nous (keep our own house) document and, as such, naturally led to Cancon and the FM Policy.

Social responsibility was the goal. Without a pre-occupation with social responsibility, CKO would never have been licensed as it was and to who it was. Risks were to be taken for the good of Canada, not the particular interests of licensees.

The 1987 (or so) revisions changed the nature of the Act dramatically, and for all time, altered the nature of Canadian broadcasting. The emphasis shifted from the interests of Canada, generally, to the particular interests of licensees—namely profits. The rationale for this was survival—without greater opportunity to make money, all would fail. This of course, allowed the chains to swallow-up more and more stations on the grounds it was close 'em or sell 'em and only the chains had the available funds to buy 'em.

The problem is, more stations made more money when the regulations (FM and AM) were more comprehensive and strictly enforced. Profits dropped, in Canada and the USA when deregulation became vogue. Regulated industries are the most short-sighted of all industries.

The Canadian Independent Record Production Association (CIRPA) has announced the creation of the definitive directory on the music business in Canada for the international marketplace. The directory will be made available at the Canada Stand at three major events: MIDEM France, MIDEM Asia and Pop Komm.

The directory will include listings for record companies, publishers, associations, recording studios, manufacturing facilities, multimedia and video production, internet companies, managers, booking agents, promoters, publicists and music conferences.

CIRPA plans on issuing the new directory at the largest and most important events on the music industry calendar, including MIDEM, taking place January 1996 in Cannes, France.

The directory will also be made available at MIDEM Asia and Pop Komm. Held in Cologne, Germany, Pop Komm has rapidly become the second largest music trade fair in the world.

general concern for social responsibility and the good of Canada to the particular interests of licensees is, for all intents and purposes, irreversible -- in all regulated industries, the ceiling quickly becomes the floor and once given latitude to be socially irresponsible, the regulated want to keep going in that direction. They think they will benefit more from deregulation than regulation, even though in virtually every instance, in whatever industry and in whatever country, points to greater and greater long-term losses. Consider the railways, for example.

The time has come, I guess, for the CRTC to be integrated into the Department of Communication (DOC) for the purposes of spectrum management, and a new socio-cultural watchdog to be legislated into existence. Then, at least, it will be a generation or two until the leaders of the new agency will be co-opted into the industry. Hopefully, those of us concerned with Canada will have learned the lessons of the co-option of the CRTC and work harder to ensure it doesn't happen again.

General Public singer signs with Famous Music

Roger Charlery, better known as Ranking Roger of the Epic recording group General Public, has signed an exclusive worldwide co-publishing agreement with Famous Music. The announcement was made by Ira Jaffe, president of the publishing company.

General Public is currently on its first tour in nine years in support of their latest Epic release, Rub It Better. This is the group's first album of original material since 1986's Hand To Mouth. The album is co-produced by ex-Talking Head Jerry Harrison.

Along with Dave Wakeling, Ranking Roger was one of the founding members of both the English Beat and later, General Public. The duo has produced such hits as Tenderness and Save It For Later. After disbanding in 1987, General Public was resurrected in 1994 with a cover of the Staple Sisters' classic I'll Take You There, which was featured on the soundtrack from the film Threesome.

Famous Music is the worldwide music publishing division of Paramount Pictures, which is part of the entertainment operations of Viacom Incorporated.

RADIO

Sudbury's CHNO has gone the news/talk route, as of August 2. According to station PD Bruce Lindsay, "Sudbury residents now have a chance to get involved with radio on a local level. Not only will we present a completely local morning program with John Kennedy and Rick Wyman, but by accessing 1-800 numbers, listeners will be able to participate in programs originating all over North America via satellite." The new format will also feature One On One Sports overnights with John Renshaw, a three-hour midday show hosted by Lowell Green, and psychotherapist Dr. Laura Schlessinger also during the midday hours. Saturday and Sunday mornings will feature Kid Waves, the first Canadian-produced national radio program for young children.

CBC Radio is sponsoring the 11th annual National Competition For Amateur Choirs, offering a total of \$57,000 in prizes. Three categories have been replaced. Youth choirs will now compete in two separate categories - mixed voice and equal voice. Church choirs are invited to compete, replacing the large choirs category. Cultural traditions replaces the ethnic category, with the five remaining categories remaining the same: children's, mixed, chamber, equal voice and contemporary music. First prize in each category is \$3,000, with a \$2,000 second place prize. The \$5,000 Canada Council Healey Willan Grand Prize will go to the choir giving the most outstanding performance in terms of musicianship, technique and program. There are also two \$1,000 prizes for best performance of a Canadian work. The competition finals will be broadcast on CBC's french and english networks in the spring. Entry forms can be obtained at CBC stations across Canada.

Toronto's MIX 99.9 held a people's choice Battle Of The Bands to determine the city's first choice for induction into the new Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, and to find a MIX correspondent for the grand opening. Toronto's favourite artist proved to be Elton John, beating out Bryan Adams in the final round on holiday Monday, August 7. Listener Don McKay will head to Cleveland to report live from the Hall of Fame in September.

Sound Source has reached an exclusive marketing and sales agreement with Radio Express of Los Angeles to represent American Country Countdown in Canada. The agreement takes effect September 4, with distribution being handled still by Broadcast News.

Ottawa's CKBY has relaunched itself after 23 years, becoming Canada's first young country station, Y105. According to station PD Rob Farina, "country music has undergone an extensive evolution and Young Country Y105 is poised to deliver to our listeners North America's fastest growing music format while focusing on community involvement and promotional activity."

Rhona Raskin will be featured on 97 KISS-FM, the Rogers-owned Vancouver station, starting this September. Raskin signed a multi-year agreement with Rogers' syndication division, the Satellite Radio Network. Raskin's Sex, Lies And Audio Tape show will run Sunday through Thursday, from 9 to 11 pm.

Lisa Brandt is leaving Waterloo's KOOL-FM on August 18 to take on co-hosting duties at Hamilton's CHML. Brandt, who will share the mike with Bob Bratina, will also become the station's new entertainment editor.

Mercury artist Twain paved the way with seven nominations based on her double platinum selling album, The Woman In Me. Twain scored nominations for female vocalist and album, and two nominations for single and video, in both cases for

the songs Any Man Of Mine and Whose Bed Have Your Boots Been Under. She was also nominated, along with husband Mutt Lange, for the SOCAN song of the year award for Whose Bed...

Aglukark, who was last year's winner of the CCMA's Vista Rising Star Award, is nominated this year for top female vocalist, album and top-selling album (foreign or domestic both for This Child, and single and song for O Siem (which she co-wrote with Chad Irschick).

B.C. native Lisa Brokop picked up five nominations: female vocalist, album (Every Little Girl's Dream), single and video (Take That) an vocal collaboration with The Johner Brothers.

The album was recorded in Sulphur Springs, Texas.



BMG Music Publishing acquires Rick Giles catalogues




Since arriving in Nashville in 1983, Giles has rapidly become one of



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
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
